THE tide is turning for refugees who now call Mount Gambier home as growing support from businesses continues to secure long-term employment and career opportunities among the Burmese, Congolese and Yazidi population.

Hydro pipe dream

THE region's depleted gas wells could help accelerate the state's transition to 100pc renewables, according to an ambitious hydrogen underground storage plan by energy

startup Henergy Technologies.

The Adelaide-based company is seeking State and Federal Government funds to investigate the storage of hydrogen near Penola and production of the emissions-free fuel through the water electrolysis. It is also contingent on securing depleted gas wells currently operat-

ed by Beach Energy, with Henergy suggesting the transfer of Katnook's petroleum production and gas storage licence - which has been held by Beach since 2011 - back to the State Government. But the plan is likely to remain a pipe dream, with a Beach Energy spokesperson saying the company had "no plans for

hydrogen production at the Katnook facility".

Henergy, which was founded earlier this year, says the Katnook field was an "outstanding candidate" for underground storage, citing underground pressure, temperature and comparative low risk of seal failure.

Ambitious gas plan

THE region's depleted gas wells could help accelerate the state's transition to 100pc renewables, according to an ambitious hydrogen underground storage plan by energy startup Henergy Technologies.

The Adelaide-based company is seeking State and Federal Government funds to investigate the storage of hydrogen near Penola and production of the emissions-free fuel through the water electrolysis.

It is also contingent on securing depleted gas wells currently operated by Beach Energy, with Henergy suggesting the transfer of Katnook's petroleum production and gas storage licence - which has been held by Beach since 2011 - back to the State Government.

But the plan is likely to remain a pipe dream, with a Beach Energy spokesperson saying the company had "no plans for hydrogen production at the Katnook facility".

Henergy, which was founded earlier this year, says the Katnook field was an "outstanding candidate" for underground storage, citing underground pressure, temperature and comparative low risk of seal failure.

Henergy Technologies engineering manager Peter Archer said the proposal aimed to address hydrogen storage issues, replace imported diesel and help bring South Australia to net-zero emissions.

"Hydrogen is a clean burning gas as when it is burned it just creates water, so there's no more carbon dioxide in the atmosphere," Mr Archer said.

"Companies in Australia are making hydrogen, but they have the dilemma of storing it before selling it.

"What we are interesting in storing hy-

drogen in depleted gas wells underground and what's unique about the Katnook field and the Penola region is there are depleted wells which are great reservoirs and well sealed to store hydrogen. "Hydrogen can be supplied at diesel-equivalent prices into vehicles, which will particularly benefit the heavy transport sector and can also be used to make a liquid called ammonia, which is used in fertilisers."

Mr Archer said the \$24m project - comprising of drilling, testing and the establishment of a processing plant - would provide stability to the interstate power grid by substituting natural gas with hydrogen.

"It's already begun in South Australia and we think in 10 years from now, the percentage of hydrogen going into the natural gas pipeline network will gradually turn over to 100pc hydrogen gas," he said.

"Depending on customers and we have several to work with at the moment, we will work with them to produce it back from the reservoir and their intent is to blend it into the natural gas pipelines to reduce the carbon dioxide emissions.

"We are very, very interested in turning over to 100pc eventually, but it will take a full 10 years to go from blue to green."

While underground hydrogen storage is not legal in South Australia, the company said it has been advised the State Government "is planning to amend legislation".

The State Government has been contacted for comment.

Henergy is seeking \$9m from the State Government and \$20m from the Federal Government over the next three years for the project and to provide supply for initial hydrogen customers. Mr Archer said the level of government funding would determine the level of production at the site and said "super investors" would be required if no funding was available.

"Instead of building a two terajoule plant we could build a four terajoule plant and that changes the price you could potentially get from hydrogen," he said.

"The bigger you make it, the cheaper your operating costs are, but you are still in competition with natural gas.

"Without government funding... we expect to fundraise from investors.. it would take some super investors to believe in us." Limestone Coast Protection Alliance chair Angus Ralton said although the organisation supported the production and use of clean energy sources, Henergy's proposal raised "red flags".

"The proposal is not renewable for the first decade and is relying on people wanting to drive hydrogen trucks," he said.

"I don't know of any hydrogen trucks in development anywhere on the planet.

"We are going to have infrastructure to transport hydrogen to put in into field stations and the cost of that will be ridiculous... who will pay?

"Hydrogen is a great tool for where we need to go, but I think this plan is a money grab by a company that is looking for taxpayers to subsidise the cost."

Library support mobilises under threat of funding cut

THE region's public libraries will learn their fate next week amid fears of a potential cut in the State Government budget.

The current long-term arrangement between the State Government and the Local Government Association will expire at the end of June, with a new funding arrangement yet to be confirmed.

Currently, the State Government provides around \$20m per year to South Australia's libraries through the partnership and councils provide approximately \$86m.

The Local Government Association has been negotiating a new agreement, but said it had not been provided with any figures.

Local Government Association president mayor Angela Evans said the association

would not sign off on the arrangement without a confirmation of funding.

"At a minimum, the LGA wants to see current funding levels maintained, with indexation applied every year for the term of the new agreement," she said.

The State Government has not responded as to how much funding would be provided under a new agreement and previously said the budget was still being finalised.

At Tuesday night's City Council meeting, councillor Ben Hood queried council's advocacy on the matter, triggered by a social media post from Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell.

"We have been undertaking, with the whole of South Australia public libraries, an

advocacy campaign talking about library dollars, which has been quite successful," council acting community well-being general manager Georgina Davison said.

"(There has been) quite a lot of uptake from the community sending letters to local members supporting funding for libraries and we've been actively campaigning, interacting with customers and social media as much as we can."

At the recent opening of The Haven, a domestic violence hub co-located at the Mount Gambier Library, City Council mayor Lynette Martin described the library as a "wonderful space".

During the same event, Assistant Minister Carolyn Power praised the "incredible library"

and said it was a "safe place for women to get access for information that they need".

"Negotiations are underway but our Attorney General spoke in parliament... about our strong commitment to libraries in lots of different ways," she said.

"In my local area, I've got two libraries that have received significant State Government funding - the City of Mitcham for example - even outside those negotiations."

"There's lots of opportunities in how we are supporting and backing libraries."

Itch trees are up to scratch

A ROW of mature trees will not be removed from an inner-city Mount Gambier street after they were deemed to be structurally sound with extended useful life expectancies.

An independent health and risk assessment of 14 Lagunaria trees which line Mitchell Street's western footpath found there was no issues to warrant their removal.

Council commissioned the report in March following a request from a Mount Gambier property developer and Jardine Street resident, which claimed the trees - also known as Norfolk Island Hibiscus - dropped numerous materials on to structures and gutters.

The complainants also aired concerns over the potential contamination of rainwater from white fibres found inside brown seed capsules which fall from the tree.

They argued the pods were a known irritant to people and animals with contact producing a skin irritation in some cases, leading the species to be known as the "Itch Tree".

The request at the time was criticised by councillor Steve Perryman, who urged council to 'not jump at shadows' and said the issue of falling materials could be managed with

routine home maintenance.

Arborman Tree Solutions inspected the 14 trees on May 4, rating the trees' condition as either good or fair with the majority carrying a useful life expectancy over 10 years.

Senior consulting arboriculturist Marcus Lodge deemed the trees to be at low risk of failing, adding they provided an important heritage link with the history of the area.

"None of trees display features that indicate they are in health or structural decline or that they are not suited to the environment," Mr Lodge reported.

"They are not considered to warrant remedial action at this stage."

Council also sought State Heritage advice on the matter given the trees border the Roman Catholic Church Complex, which comprises several State Heritage-listed places and a Local Heritage place.

Removal of the trees would have required council to seek state approval given the material affect it would have on the precinct.

Council determined at Tuesday's monthly meeting to advise Empak Homes and the Jardine Street resident of its decision not to remove the trees.

Improved marine rescue push for Port MacDonnell

GRANT District Council has urged the State Government to establishment of a marine rescue service at Port MacDonnell to improve safety following a number of incidents along the coast.

But Emergency Services Minister Vincent Tarzia says the establishment of additional capabilities requires consideration of budget impacts and "must be considered in the context of the whole of government budget process".

In a letter to Mr Tarzia, mayor Richard Sage called for a marine rescue service to be established at Port MacDonnell to improve safety, boost community confidence and boost the

recreational and commercial aquatic activity.

Prompted by the resume of two amateur fishermen off the coast of Port MacDonnell in 2012, Mr Sage said council held a series of public meetings regarding rescue capabilities in the area.

Mr Sage said after the meetings, council made a submission to the former State Government seeking the establishment of a marine rescue service.

The submission outlined the significant recreational and commercial fishing sector in the region and a predicted aquatic risk profile, along with highlighting that the closest marine rescue services are located at Kingston.

Mr Sage said council had met with representatives from the state's emergency ser-

vices and provided in principle support for the provision of council-owned land at Port MacDonnell on which to site a rescue facility.

He said despite marine incidents occurring regularly in the area - including a number of drownings - since the submission was tabled, the response to marine incidents has been left to "ad-hoc arrangements" with "many incidents being unrecorded as no central body has been made responsible".

"Sadly, this was brought to the fore again in January this year with several marine emergencies, including the search for a 32-year-old Victorian man who went missing whilst snorkelling off Port MacDonnell," Mr Sage said.

"Another incident occurred at Carpenter

Rocks where a boat capsized and saw four people needing to be saved, putting untrained people at risk."

Mr Sage said fishermen were concerned about undertaking rescue activities as they have not been trained and do not have insurance cover to undertake rescues.

In response, Mr Tarzia said he had sought advice from the South Australian State Emergency Service (SES) and was assured the service was "cognisant of the community's desire to establish a capability at Port MacDonnell."

"The SES is continually working to identify opportunities to improve marine rescue capabilities across South Australia," he said.

"I am confident the SES will continue working on this matter to ensure that the community is as safe as possible."

Another 'show up' blow up

COUNCILLOR attendance was again thrust into the spotlight at Mount Gambier City Council with one elected member slamming the issue as "embarrassing", while the city's mayor conceded it was a "disappointing" reflection of the current elected body.

First-term councillor Max Bruins rose before his peers to challenge the chamber of attendance to meetings, workshops and informal gatherings, particularly over the last six months, which he said needed to be rectified "sooner rather than later".

His stance drew the ire of several councillors, including long-serving member Steve Perryman, who stated there had been no breaches of the Local Government Act and claimed council overused workshops and informal gatherings, which are closed to the public.

Taking the floor, Cr Bruins requested a report into councillor attendance from January 1 to June 30 be produced for public record.

"I know an absence here and there is unavoidable, and we will have people and responsibilities competing for our time, but we made a commitment when we made it to undertake the role to the best of our ability, and I feel the community should be made aware of who is taking this commitment seriously," Cr Bruins said.

Mount Gambier Mayor Lynette Martin said elected member attendance had been "disappointing" throughout the current council term, stating councillors knew their obligations when they accepted their nomination.

Cr Bruins argued attendance at recent council workshops had been as low as 50pc of elected members, a record he believes is "not good enough".

While Cr Bruins did not highlight any specific examples, Cr Perryman - who has previously been subjected to questions regarding his attendance - said if there had been no breach of the Local Government Act, there was nothing to report.

"If there is anyone in the community who wishes to check the attendance of members at meetings, they can do so, each year in the annual report," Cr Perryman said.

Cr Perryman said records of attendance were also available on council's website as part of the minutes published from each meeting.

"I don't know the purpose of this particular motion, perhaps it's factional, perhaps it's just a gripe, perhaps it's aimed at me, perhaps it's not," he said.

Cr Perryman then produced a detailed report of his attendance over the last six months, giving insight into several examples where he did not attend committee meetings or informal workshops.

"I would submit respectfully, Your Worship, that the items that appear on those agendas were not earth-shattering," Cr Perryman said.

"Everything's been going straight to council," he said.

Cr Perryman also called into question council's use of informal workshops, stating his belief the elected body overuses the format.

"I make conscientious decisions not to go to too many workshops because I believe the business of council should be done in an open, public and accountable forum, such as this," he said.

Ms Martin disagreed with Cr Perryman,

stating workshops were important as they provide valuable information to help make informed decisions.

"I can understand Cr Bruins concerns that he feels there could be better attendance and I know when we undertook this role and we accept the nomination, we know the obligations of being an elected member," she said.

"I certainly take mine seriously, and want to be here to represent the ratepayers who voted for me."

Cr Christian Greco rhetorically queried whether councillor attendance figures were published in council's annual report and also called for the foreshadowed report to take into account other forums used by elected members, such as one-on-one meetings with council staff.

In response, Ms Martin highlighted the significant amount of staff time used to prepare documents and reports for all council workshops and meetings.

Cr Greco then took aim at Cr Bruins directly across the chamber, asking his peer to reveal who the complaint was directed at.

"It's the entire chamber - it's embarrassing when we turn up at a workshop with external third parties to present and half the chamber's empty," Cr Bruins said.

Cr Greco then quizzed Cr Bruins on if he would be seeking re-election on council, which was quickly retorted by the latter.

"I haven't made a decision on that yet - its going nothing to do with this," Cr Bruins said.

Cr Paul Jenner said he hoped the motion's intent was not pointed at any individual.

"Everyone has a life to live - so long as they are doing their homework to make a fair decision in council," Cr Jenner said.

"If they're not doing their homework, well then there's an issue."

A report will now be prepared on elected member attendance at council meetings, workshops and informal gatherings from January 1 to June 30 this year.

It is expected to be tabled at the July monthly meeting.

Caring for the community

NEVILLE Gilbertson received a "great surprise" when told he would be awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) in the Queen's Birthday Honours, but the accolade would not shock those who have witnessed his service to the Mount Gambier community.

Mr Gilbertson's involvement in Ryder-Cheshire Australia, the Rotary Club of Mount Gambier West and the Mount Gambier Friendship Force was highlight as part of the honour, awarded in recognition of his community service.

Mr Gilbertson has invested a significant amount of his time into support Ryder-Cheshire Australia and was pivotal in its growth in Mount Gambier.

Named the inaugural president of the Ryder-Cheshire Mount Gambier Home Foundation, a role he served from 2004-18, Mr Gilbertson was also a national board member (2006-18), the national Biennial Conference chairman, and currently serves as the foundation's South Australian treasurer.

Speaking to The Border Watch, Mr Gilbertson recounted the community campaign to establish a care home to support young people requiring full-time care, with two homes now present in the city, supporting 10 individuals.

"Working for a program like providing accommodation support for the disabled in our community is a rewarding feeling," Mr Gilbertson said.

"You take a real interest in it and hammer away each day to achieve that," he said.

It was a task not without significant challenges, including several attempts to gain federal and state funding.

Mr Gilbertson hoped plans for a third home could be secured in the city within the next five years.

"The number of disabled residents in our

community is always in excess of the actual residential care available," Mr Gilbertson said.

"There is always a need there and it will never be fully met."

A past president of the Rotary Club of Mount Gambier West, Mr Gilbertson has been a member since 1981 and was named a Paul Harris Fellow.

However, his time serving on the Australian Rotary Health district committee is among the highlights, witnessing how the organisation impacts significantly on Australian health initiatives and research.

Mr Gilbertson said Australian Rotary Health was among the nation's top donors to mental health initiatives since 2000, with a targeted focus on youth mental health since 2012, which is ongoing.

Mr Gilbertson has also been a Friendship Force of Mount Gambier member since 2002 and held the role of treasurer from 2010-19.

His involvement has taken him to Turkey, Greece and Vietnam, among other places, with Japan remaining one of his most memorable trips.

"Involvement in something like Friendship Force puts a focus on international relations and learning to understand the culture and attitudes of people from other countries," he said.

Three other Limestone Coast residents were named in the Queen's Birthday OAM honour list, including Robe man David Thomas, who was recognised for serving the Robe and Naracoorte Lions clubs and Australian Red Cross.

Naracoorte woman Barbara Johnson was acknowledged for her community service, including to Australian Red Cross, as well as aged care and education, while Kingston woman Patricia Ratsch received an OAM for community service, including to the Red Cross, St John Ambulance and Kingston Retirement Village.

MOUNT Gambier man Thomas Robin Conboy - known as Robin to many - has been awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) as part of the Queen's Birthday 2021 Honours.

The award was given for service to the Mount Gambier community, a fitting reward for a man who has served on numerous not-for-profit boards and committees since retiring 20 years ago.

As might be expected, Mr Conboy was "surprised" to be awarded the OAM.

"I found out about two months ago. I

think we got two emails from the Governor General's secretaries [asking], would you like to be involved in it and all that sort of thing," he said.

"One of my mates put in my name, and three or four others endorsed it, and they had a long list of things I did, and you don't realise just how much you get involved in."

Mr Conboy's community spirit seems to be driven by a sense of wanting to meet people and where possible, help them.

But there's also a pragmatism - perhaps symptomatic of his generation - behind Mr Conboy's drive to be involved within the community.

He points out that it's no good sitting

around "doing nothing" and that "you've got to be busy".

At 83 years of age, Mr Conboy can still be found helping within the community.

These days he is predominantly involved with the Old Mount Gambier Gaol Community Garden - having been one of its founding members and president.

Having owned a garden centre before retiring, Mr Conboy continues to provide his extensive horticultural knowledge and expertise to the community.

Mr Conboy has also been involved in numerous other organisations and initiatives including the Mount Gambier Lions Club

Posthumous AM honour

TRANSPORT, sporting and charitable organisations have paid tribute to late Mount Gambier stalwart Ray Scott who has been posthumously awarded Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for decades of community service.

After a long battle with cancer, Mr Scott died on July 13, 2020 at the age of 70.

Mr Scott - who joins his father on the Australian Honours List - was honoured in the Queens Birthday Honours List for his significant service to the road transport industry and the broader community.

Australian Trucking Association chair David Smith said Mr Scott's honours list recognition was "extremely fitting" and testament to the work members can deliver.

"Mr Scott played a significant role in the trucking industry, from humble beginnings his father's family business, through to becoming a major shareholder in Scott Group of Companies, including the K&S Corporation," Mr Smith said.

"Ray achieved a lot in his lifetime and made a great contribution the wider trucking industry, but in particular the general fuel and live-stock sectors.

"As well as being a highly accomplished operator, Mr Scott was also well-known for his kindness and willingness to help those in need, as evidenced by his philanthropy and community spirit."

Borderline Speedway club president Cary Jennings praised Mr Scott's long-time charitable and participatory endeavours in sprint-car racing, saying he had been instrumental in supporting the club.

"He used to race an AP5 Valiant back in the

day and he had a hot rod, super modified cars and later in life he had a couple of sprint cars," he said. "Ray had a two seater he'd take people out on for rides during ride days.

"Whatever we would ask, he'd always help us out whether that was sponsorship or in-kind support."

Mr Scott was a long-time supporter of the

Castec Rural Mount Gambier Pioneers, the Generations in Jazz Festival, the James Morrison Academy and patron and benefactor of the Stand Like Stone Foundation until his death.

His philanthropy also extended to the Royal Flying Doctor Service and the Craniofacial Foundation, an Adelaide-based charity which

provides support to families and patients whose lives have been affected by craniofacial conditions.

Craniofacial Foundation corporate manager Amanda Haskard said Mr Scott's donations had been instrumental in helping achieve best outcomes for people suffering from craniofacial deformities and injuries.

"The money he donated helped support patients with craniofacial conditions and enable them to have life-changing surgery that they need in order to treat their condition," she said.

"Ray was a generous supporter and we very much value his contribution.

"He had a very generous heart."

In a statement, Mr Scott's family said he would have been "honoured but humbled" by the award, adding his commitment and influence on the Australian transport industry was a lifelong passion.

"His life revolved around trucks from a very young age," the statement said.

"There are not many types of trucks or machinery that he hasn't driven, nor roads in Australia or America he hasn't travelled. "His great joy was getting in his Western Star with his dog Effie and heading to his Queensland stations."

The family said Mr Scott was dedicated to the development of the community and was generous with both financial assistance and time.

"[He] was genuinely interested when anyone wanted advice or a chat," the statement said.

"He loved us, his family, dearly and we miss him greatly.

"We are so sad that he isn't here to receive it in person."

EDITOR'S COMMENT

While open and transparent council meetings underpin democracy and ensure confidence in decision-making processes, informal gatherings - which are meetings generally held behind closed doors - are important sessions to help elected members share information and generate ideas.

Mayor Lynette Martin told the chamber attendance rates had been "disappointing" throughout the council term, prompting a sharp rebuke from long-serving councillor Steve Perryman, who claimed council overused informal workshops.

State legislation allows informal gatherings and private discussions to be held, provided that the meeting does not obtain a decision on a matter outside a council meeting.

While councillors are encouraged to attend informal gatherings - particularly those meetings designed to inform to assist elected members in undertaking their functions - the meetings are by their nature not compulsory for elected members.

More than 20 informal gatherings have been held by City Council in addition to its committee and ordinary meetings over the past six months.

Some gatherings have centred on the Community and Recreation Hub, including a three hour meeting with accounting firm BRM Advisory to discuss "Wulanda operator presentations" and another meeting to discuss a single item titled Local Government Finance Authority - Wulanda Recreation and Convention Centre.

Any report on councillor attendance should perhaps also look to City Council's neighbouring councils such as Wattle Range, which in the same period has had 14 informal gatherings or Grant District, which has called 10 informal gatherings or Naracoorte Lucindale, which has had seven.

Councils have the opportunity to have frank discussions with stakeholders to gain a thorough understanding of an issue through the informal gatherings.

It is also an ideal chance to discuss topics in the absence of the media and the public.

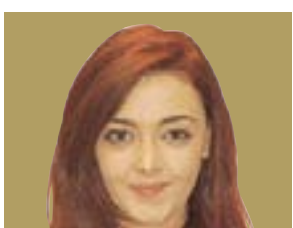

Upgrade to 5G initially disconnects

MILLICENT residents may experience disruptions to mobile services next week as Telstra undertakes upgrades to its base station to improve coverage and activate 5G in the area.

Work is scheduled to start on Monday, with the telecommunications provider required to shut off the tower for extended periods over several days.

Telstra regional general manager South Australia Mark Bolton said the upgrade is expected to be finished by June 22.

Mr Bolton said although Telstra does not operate the EFTPOS network, some businesses may experience issues with EFTPOS machines.

He said many EFTPOS terminals can be connected using fixed line or WiFi/nbn internet connections.

"While our crews need to work during daylight for safety, we'll only be switching off the sites when we need to and we'll have it back on as quickly as possible," Mr Bolton said.

"Landlines or non services will not be impacted and there will still be some outdoor Telstra coverage in the town from another nearby Telstra base station at Mount Burr.

"There's never a good time to undertake this sort of work but once it is completed, it will mean better mobile services for Millicent residents."

Mr Bolton said calls to Triple Zero will automatically be connected to any other working mobile base station in the area regardless of carrier.

"For people with a Samsung or Apple mobile device purchased in recent years, we also encourage people to activate WiFi calling on their phone," he said.

"This is a free setting and enables you to make and receive mobile calls when logged into a WiFi network.

"To find out more, Google Telstra WiFi calling."

Blankets of hope

A MILLICENT woman is adding colour and warmth to an often stark situation by crocheting lap blankets for transplant recipients.

While waiting for her husband to recover from a heart and kidney transplant, Trudi Jones picked up the needles and started to crochet.

After Glen had awoke from an induced coma and started his recovery, Ms Jones continued to crochet, piecing together the squares to create the family's "journey blanket".

Three years after Mr Jones' successful transplant, Ms Jones has continued to crochet blankets to provide comfort to transplant recipients and their families during treatment.

"The transplant process can be really lonely and really isolating and it is a lot of time spent in the hospital, particularly for heart transplants," she said.

"There are a lot of tests and biopsies and if the patient is in the ward, they get in a wheelchair with nothing over them apart from a hospital gown.

"It's also just something to let people know that there is someone else thinking about them and there is someone else who gets it."

Ms Jones has created more than 130 lap blankets, which are distributed to patients at Melbourne's Alfred Hospital.

"I do them in the DonatLife colours which is purple and white, bundle them up and include a little note to let people know it is from a transplant recipient to a transplant recipient," she said.

"They are given out by the hospital and I have made sure I am incognito, because I have never wanted to do it as a gratification thing.

"It's just my way of giving back."

Ms Jones' creative milestone coincides with the upcoming DonateLife Week, a national awareness week dedicated to promoting organ and tissue donation.

The campaign will run from July 25 to August 1 and aims to encourage Australians to discuss their donation decision with loved ones and join the Australian Organ Donor Register.

"It's really important for people to have the conversation about being an organ donor with their family because at the end of life, people from DonateLife are going to have that conversation with you anyway," Ms Jones said.

"Some people may not have even thought

about it and I would hate to think if I was put in that situation, whether I would be in the right mindset to say yes or no.

"If I have had the conversation and know what my family wants, I can say 'that's what I want to do'.

"To be on the other side and get that phone call because someone has made the decision to be an organ donor is a life saver."

Initiative diverts waste

ALMOST five tonnes of green waste was diverted from landfill last year as a result of Wattle Range Council's free community mulch days.

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower said the program has continued to grow in popularity, with a significant increase in community uptake in 2020 despite the reduced number of collection sessions due to COVID-19.

Mr Gower said just under five tonnes of green waste - which includes green waste combined with clean timber products such as pallets, stakes and plain pine furniture - had been collected by residents for use on gardens last year.

"The primary aim of the environmental initiative was to divert green waste from unnecessarily going to landfill," he said.

"All green waste taken to the Penola or Millicent Resource Centres is combined with timber products, processed into mulch and distributed through the free community collection sessions."

Mr Gower said council was trialing truck only appointments in response to the increase of trucks attending the mulch days last year.

"To assist in reducing wait times and increase safety around trucks, a new appointment-based approach for trucks is being trialed this year on regular mulch days," Mr Gower said.

Sessions are held in Millicent on the third Sunday of every month and in Penola on the fourth Sunday of every second month.

Mayor spreads joy through Christmas Appeal

WATTLE Range children and families doing it tough will be able to continue to share the festival joy in December with the launch of the new Mayoral Christmas Appeal.

The appeal will be a continuation of the Millicent Combined Churches Christmas Appeal, which provided hundreds of hampers, vouchers and toys to the town's vulnerable population.

After more than 30 years of operation, volunteers of the Millicent Combined Churches Christmas Appeal - many of whom are in their 70s, 80s and 90s - announced they would no longer provide the program as of 2020.

Wattle Range mayor Des Noll said the new scheme would provide an opportunity to extend beyond Millicent and ensure disadvantaged residents across the council region could have a joyous Christmas.

"We had a meeting with the ladies from the Combined Churches Christmas Appeal who indicated they were not able to run it again because of the commitment and their age and my view was we couldn't let it go," he said.

"As mayor, I am not prepared to leave any person behind just because they are not financially secure.

"It is our responsibility to pick those people up and take them with us in the community."

Mr Noll said service providers, charities and businesses involved with the previous incarnation of the appeal had indicated a willingness to continue supporting the initiative.

He said several new businesses and organisations had also expressed interest in donating funds, gifts or in-kind support.

Millicent Men's Shed secretary Chris Mathias said the groups' 37 members were working

on a range of wooden toys for children.

Mr Mathias said the group had committed to supporting the appeal and hoped the handmade toys would provide joy for underprivileged children and families.

"We have three bikes that we have done up for kids and a few more toys we are working on so that kids can have a happy Christmas," he said.

"Like every organisation, a lot of our members belong to multiple groups who work to make the community a better place," he said.

The Millicent Combined Churches Christmas Appeal has donated \$3500 towards the new appeal, with council's contribution yet to be determined.

Work will start on the appeal next month and distributions will be made to families and individuals in need mid-December.

A Christmas lunch will be held in collaboration with agencies late December.

Home given star treatment

AFTER being on the market for over a decade, one Penola home is getting a makeover and hopefully, a new owner.

Rob Tully and Robyn Hughes have been trying to sell their Penola home for 12 years.

Serendipity stepped in when the producers of Selling Homes Australia contacted the owner's real estate agent, Thomas DeGaris & Clarkson consultant Karly Honner, to see if they would appear on the popular TV show.

It was something of a coincidence, as Robyn explains.

Coonawarra Vignerons event and marketing officer Heidi Eldridge announced the mammoth program at a launch event on Wednesday with around 30 winery representatives and supporters present, signifying the community approach to growing the event.

While the 2020 program was subdued due to COVID-19 restrictions, Ms Eldridge said this year's program was jam-packed with many cellar doors hosting dinners, bonfire nights and much more.

"Last year the event was on when the cellar doors had only just opened and we didn't have too long to consider whether we delivered the event or not," Ms Eldridge said.

"But the Cellar Dwellers event is quite simple because it is just wine tasting so we were able to go back to basics and do that.

"Fortunately this year the restrictions are even less and we are back to the full extensive program which is a combination of great events."

Ms Eldridge said alongside the schedule of events, the online program had been streamlined to make it simpler for visitors to book in.

"For the Cellar Dwellers there is also an initiative where we are trying to encourage people to go that little bit further and entice them into visiting that one last winery," she said.

"We have developed a passport system where if they receive five stamps they go in the draw to win a case of Coonawarra wine."

Long-time Coonawarra Vignerons mem-

ber Doug Balnaves said it was a great initiative and lauded the opportunity to once again be part of the month-long event.

"Many years ago there was a discussion in the marketing committee about what to do during July because it is generally our quietest month of the year and there was a proposal put forward that we make it a discount month but that soon developed into

Building long-term success

THE tide is turning for refugees who now call Mount Gambier home as growing support from businesses continues to secure long-term employment and career opportunities among the Burmese, Congolese and Yazidi population.

Previously hindered by cultural and language barriers, improved education among businesses, coupled with the strong work ethic and reliability of workers, is fuelling a low unemployment rate among refugees.

While a significant amount of refugees have traditionally worked as part of the seasonal workforce - including fruit picking and forestry roles - Australian Migrant Resource Centre Mount Gambier manager Anelia Blackie said more long-term opportunities were steadily becoming available across the region.

It has been a mountain of work to educate and support the city's business sector, which Ms Blackie heaped praise on for its willingness to employ from the refugee communities.

An employment forum, held at the Mount Gambier Italo Australian Club on Monday, will delve into several success stories within the region, seeking to educate and help businesses understand the opportunities and pathways available.

Ms Blackie said while many sustained their livelihood by working in the seasonal workforce, improved job security was a major focus moving forward.

Outside of season work, Ms Blackie said refugees were serving in aged care and health, manufacturing and forestry, as well as trades such as carpentry, tiling and painting.

"Some of these residents have very good skills and can really do much more than working in the seasonal jobs," Ms Blackie said.

"The main feedback we get from businesses is the language is a big barrier for them, and sometimes they don't understand certain behavior," Ms Blackie said.

"For instance, in certain cultures, people don't make eye contact or show emotions in certain situations, which can leave an employer wondering how they feel," she said.

"We have to remember that for the migrants themselves, it is also very difficult. There's a language barrier for them as well, not just for the Australian workers."

Ms Blackie said a lack of understanding had fuelled several concerning approaches, including businesses questioning pay rates and entitlements, as well as offers of cash-in-hand payment.

"They are permanent residents - that gives them full working rights," Ms Blackie said.

Among the speakers planned for Monday's event is Group Training Employment general manager Greg Megaw, with the training provider first working with Burmese refugees eight years ago.

"We have had some great outcomes - we just get really loyal, respectful and hardworking people," Mr Megaw said.

"They're appreciative of what they get and very dedicated to their work."

Mr Megaw said refugees applied and won jobs and opportunities on their own merit, working with specific employers best suited to meeting the cultural and language requirements.

"We are about helping our whole community - we do not discriminate, especially because of the positive experiences we've had," he said.

Other speakers will include Boandik Aged Care chief executive Gillian McGinty, HollaFresh managing director Ian Lines and Sureway Employment and Training employer relationship coordinator Kyle Glead.

Congolese man Joseph Njdeka will also share his journey from arrival in Mount Gambier in 2015 to studying nursing locally and recently becoming employed at the Mount Gambier Hospital.

Live entertainment from the Congolese, Burmese and Yazidi communities will also be a feature.

The event is scheduled for a 6.30pm start and is free.

Millions a mystery

JUST one month remains for the mystery winner of a \$1m Saturday X Lotto draw to come forward with their ticket, which was purchased in Naracoorte in July last year.

The winning entry - drawn on July 18, 2020 - was sold at newsXpress Naracoorte but was not registered to an account, meaning The Lott officials have no way to contact the mystery person.

Division 1 winners have 12 months to

claim their prize directly from SA Lotteries before the process is turned over to the Lotteries Commission of South Australia, with claims incurring a cost.

The mystery million-dollar haul is one of 22 unclaimed Division 1 lottery prizes across Australia, worth more than \$22m.

The Lott spokesperson Ally Ramsamy urged everyone to remain vigilant for any old

lottery tickets they may have.

"People tell us they find their winning tickets in the most unusual places, from a car glovebox to the bottom of a reusable shopping bag," Ms Ramsamy said.

"If you realise you're the division one winner we're looking for, hold on tight to that ticket and give us a call immediately on 131 868 to confirm the win and start the prize claim process."

Bad behaved Crs on notice

BADLY behaved mayors and councillors could soon be put on notice if a Bill aimed at reforming the local government sector is supported in State Parliament.

The Bill, which passed the Upper House last week, seeks to establish an independent behavioural standards panel to deal with serious behavioural matters among elected members.

Local Government Minister Vickie Chapman said the objective of the panel was to resolve matters relating to repeated or serious misbehaviour by an elected member, or where an elected member has failed to comply with a council's processes or resolved actions.

Ms Chapman said the Bill has established panel membership to include three members - a Ministerial nominee, a Local Government Association (LGA) nominee and a joint nominee of the minister and the LGA.

She said a new conduct management system will be established to help councils deal with "low-level" matters quickly and effectively.

The wide-ranging reforms - which Ms Chapman described as the "biggest sector shake-up in 20 years" - also include an expansion of anti-discrimination laws to cover sexual harassment and new measures to improve financial accountability. "Under these reforms, councils will need to seek regular advice from the Essential Services Commission of South Australia on rating decisions, with that advice to be made public," Ms Chapman said.

The Bill returns to the Lower House and the government and LGA will determine an implementation timeframe.

Principal gets back to basics

MOUNT Gambier North Primary School principal Paul Harmer is taking a hands-on approach to advocate reading programs within its curriculum, visiting classrooms to personally read to students.

Inspired by a recent development seminar, Mr Harmer has prioritised reading to classrooms in the hope students develop a love of reading that extends into adulthood.

"Recently, I attended Anne Bayetto's professional development session, focusing on the importance of a story reading program," Mr Harmer said.

"This is why I am taking the time to personally go around to classrooms and read to our students," he said.

The seminar highlighted the importance of reading to students and suggested a series of research based reading activities to help motivate children to read - as well as improve their reading skills.

Community funds roll in

TOOLS, training and a trailer are among some of the outcomes from the recent allocation of \$85,000 in grants through OneFortyOne and Stand Like Stone.

Allendale East Area School is one of 10 groups that will receive a grant, and plan to purchase a luggage trailer for the Steven Noble Community Bus.

School Governing Council chairperson Jenna Griffiths said the grant would help provide a better service to those using the bus.

"The bus is used by a number of local groups to keep people safer on the roads, to and from functions and events," Ms Griffiths said.

"Until now we've had to have people's luggage, such as sports equipment, in the bus itself.

"Having the trailer will separate passengers and their luggage, making it more comfortable and safer for anyone using the bus."

OneFortyOne Jubilee Sawmill general manager Paul Hartung said the organisation would provide beyond its \$50,000 commitment with Stand Like Stone to directly support more projects, citing a need in the community.

"We are in a position this year where we are able to support a number of worthwhile projects beyond our partnership with Stand Like Stone," Mr Hartung said.

"The amount of applications received made it clear that there was a need in our community," he said.

"Even more so, it was clear that groups are passionate about taking action on meaningful projects that will help their communities and beyond.

"That kind of drive is something we want to encourage."

When assessing grant applications, the committee considered factors such as wider impact of projects, longevity of a project and in-kind support.

Stand Like Stone chief executive Anne Kerr said the value of the grants went well beyond a dollar value.

"The positive effect of the projects we're able to support can be life changing," Ms Kerr said.

"A relatively small thing, such as funding a workshop, upgrading machinery, or installing solar panels, can have significant immediate and flow on benefits to the community."

It is a background that should serve her well as she takes over as the manager of the Naracoorte Regional Livestock Exchange (NRLE).

Growing up on the family farm in The Wimmera, Victoria, Ms Barry said farming was in the blood.

"It's something I've loved and been passionate about... it's always been what I know because I was born and raised on a farm," she said.

Unsurprisingly, Ms Barry went on to university to study Agricultural Sciences.

She graduated from the University of Melbourne in 2006 and spent the next 12 years working as an agronomist and territory manager, with an interest in animal health.

In 2018, Ms Barry, together with her partner - who is also a livestock farmer - bought and sold various farms around the Limestone Coast and Western Victoria.

Eighteen months ago they moved to Apsley, near the Naracoorte border, to work a farming property there.

Ms Barry will take over from the previous NRLE manager, Richard James, who will retire

on July 7, after 41 years in the role.

The fact Mr James was in the position for so long was one of the factors that drew Ms Barry to apply for the job.

"This position isn't something that comes up very often and I thought it would be a good challenge for me, professionally," Ms Barry said.

"It's [also an] opportunity to be able to continue all of the work that Richard has done with having a fabulous facility and being able to grow it and help local producers market their stock."

Whilst it's still too early to speak of future plans, Ms Barry is keen to keep improving the saleyard's facilities.

In particular, she would like to upgrade some of the infrastructure from wood into steel, which would help improve animal welfare, along with the ongoing management of effluent treatment.

As for market trends, Ms Barry feels confident of the market conditions heading into the second half of the year.

"I think that it will continue to be strong... In terms of yarding, the cattle number here at Naracoorte is fairly steady. But there's been an increase in sheep yarding this financial year. So I think that it is trending in a fairly positive way," she said.

Water plan consultation

Water licence holders in the Tatiara Prescribed Wells Area are invited to learn about the key concepts underpinning the

Limestone Coast Landscape Board chair Penny Schulz encouraged all licensees to be involved in the consultation process.

FIREFIGHTING skills and preparedness will be the focus of a female-only workshop this weekend to better prepare Limestone Coast women for bushfire seasons.

The CFS is also planning a weekend community event in Lucindale, scheduled for August 14 and 15, which will focus on supporting bushfire-affected residents in the area.

Ms Hurrell said affected residents will receive assistance with a focus on where to go from here and what to expect in the years fol-

lowing devastating bushfires.

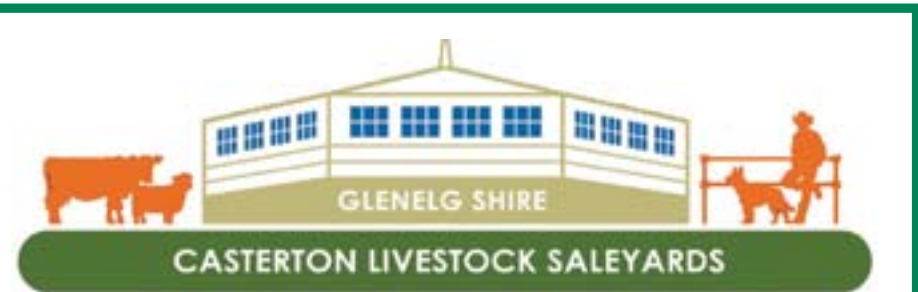
"It will be really helpful for residents to look at what happened and what they did," Ms Hurrell said.

MOUNT GAMBIER CATTLE Wednesday, June 16

NUMBERS climbed a little this week as agents yarded 327 head of live weight and open auction cattle.

These sold to the regular field of trade and processor buyers with both feeders and restockers present and active over the offering.

Quality was generally good although small in numbers in certain categories.

This made quoting difficult in most areas while cows continued to be in demand to sell to dearer rates.

A small number of mixed sex vealers came forward to sell from 487c to 520c/kg.

Yearling steers to the trade made from 365c to 462c, while the heifer portion made from 391c to 485c/kg.

Feeders sought steers from 382c to 500c and heifers from 362c to 460c/kg.

There was some restocker activity on steers that made from 451c to 500c/kg.

Grown steers and bullocks to the trade made from 365c to 385c with feeder support making to a top of 415c/kg.

Grown heifers to the trade sold from 340c to 432c, with feeders operating here from 399c to 410c and manufacturing steers making from 335c to 355c/kg.

Heavy cows doubled in numbers with strong buyer support from 300c to a high of 358c, to be 4c/kg better in price.

Lighter cows made from 250c to 313c, with heavy bulls making from 272c to 280c and light weights selling to a top of 378c/kg.

NARACOORTE CATTLE Tuesday, June 15

NUMBERS climbed a little as agents yarded 696 head of liveweight and open auction cattle, with almost 100 head sold by open auction.

These sold to the usual field of trade and processor buyers along with feeder orders and a smaller number of active restockers this week.

Quality was mixed ranging from store types up to cattle off grain.

The yearling cattle being sought after to sell from firm to dearer rates, with the older types falling in price this week.

Markets

Yearling steers to the trade made from 430c to 499c, to lift in price by 10c to 15c, with similar heifers making from 354c to 497c/kg. Feeder orders sought steers from 440c to 509c, with heifers making from 354c to 476c/kg.

There were insufficient grown steers and bullocks to quote as grown heifers to the trade made from 345c to 399c to lose 20c to 30c, with feeders operating here from 330c to 430c/kg.

Cow numbers fell by half as the heavy types to the trade eased 4c to return from mainly 300c to 330c, with a high of 346c/kg being reached in an isolated sale.

The light weight types made from 240c to 275c to the trade, with feeders active from 258c to 332c/kg. Heavy weight bulls made from 262c to 285c, with light weights making up to 355c/kg.

NARACOORTE SHEEP

Tuesday, June 15

NUMBERS rose this week as agents yarded 4,470 lambs and 1,205 sheep, to total 5,675 head overall.

There was a large field of trade and processor buyers along with a number of active restocker orders.

Quality continues to be mixed as we head further into winter. More weight came forward this week with some excellent pens of extra heavy lambs being presented with the overall lamb market ranging from firm to slightly dearer while the sheep market rebounded to sell to dearer rates.

Light lambs to the trade made from \$105 to \$153 with the light score 2 and 3 trade weights making from \$142 to \$160/head.

Restockers paid from \$87 to \$154/head. Score 3 trade weight lambs returned from \$162 to \$177/head to be fully firm in price, to average 770c/kg cwt.

Heavy lambs improved in number and condition to make from \$182 to \$212, lifting \$4, while the extra heavy pens made from \$210 to a top of \$259/head.

Hoggets ranged from \$176 to \$220 with light sheep making from \$63 to \$108/head.

Medium weight sheep ranged from \$125 to \$174 with the heavy portion of ewes making from \$162 to \$240/head. Rams ranged from \$75 to \$160/head.

The current plan was adopted in 2010 and has been undergoing a review to meet statutory requirements under the Landscape South Australia Act 2019.

FRIDAY MASTERMIND AUSTRALIA

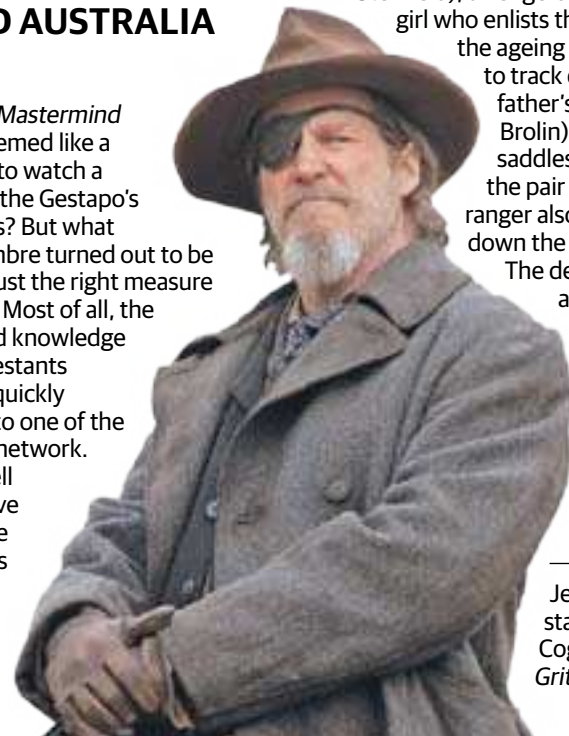
SBS, 7.30pm

Local author shares life journey

THE Mount Gambier Library will host Limestone Coast author Jenny Marshall this month for the launch of her memoir, *Death by Chocolate Cake: My journey through obesity with love*.

Ms Marshall has endured more than most could imagine.

Her childhood was marred by years of emotional, psychological, physical and sexual abuse.

Food became Jenny's only source of comfort, leading her down the road towards morbid obesity.

At age 12, she weighed 132kg.

A target of school and, later, workplace bullying, her weight continued to increase, as did her sense of shame and severe depression.

At her heaviest, Jenny reached 250kg and had begun to suffer serious health issues.

Death by Chocolate Cake documents Jenny's journey from a place of deep-rooted shame and depression towards a place of self-love and happiness.

Her decision to change her life for the better was instigated by a friend who convinced her that her life mattered, and by her recognition that her obesity was a symptom of her abuse and not a disease.

"My first experience of being loved was the catalyst for my journey of inner healing and overcoming obesity," Ms Marshall said.

"It motivated me to find the root causes of my obesity and to address them which ultimately led to my transformation and freedom."

By learning to accept herself and her body, becoming more informed about food, and hiking with her adopted greyhound Dreamy, Jenny lost over 100kg.

She is now an accredited Functional Medicine Health Coach and plans to use her own

experiences to help others.

"My hope is that people identify with my story and have the courage to change their life for the better," Ms Marshall said.

THE Mercedes-Benz S 450 4MATIC range has been expanded with the introduction of the long-wheelbase, V8-equipped S 580 L 4MATIC.

Also coming Downunder is the Maybach-badged saloon featuring a V12 engine.

Both have 180mm added to the wheelbase to provide added comfort and luxury for the rear-seat passengers.

THE Mercedes S 580 L 4MATIC is powered by a V8 (370 kW and 700 Nm) and for the first time is paired with mild-hybrid drive.

Available exclusively in the long-wheelbase configuration, the S 580 L has Nappa leather upholstery, as well as glass that reflects infrared and insulates against heat and noise for all windows.

An Active Multi-Contour seat package is also fitted as standard, which includes adjustable air chambers in the front seats for fine-tuning of their position and support, plus a variety of massage programs.

All-new Digital Light headlamps allow new functions.

Inside each unit is a light module with

three powerful LEDs.

These make for a projection range on full high-beam is 150 metres longer than the Multibeam LED.

The standard Burmester 3D sound system has 15 speakers and 710 Watts.

On the options list is a Burmester high-end 4D surround sound system with 31 speakers and output of 1750 watts includes a subwoofer and eight bass shakers (exciters) in the seats, the latter allowing passengers to feel the music.

THE Mercedes-Maybach S 680 4MATIC is powered by bi-turbo V12 (463 kW and 900 Nm) and aimed to guarantee the second-row occupants travel in first-class comfort.

They have rear comfort doors providing additional powered assistance, high-pile floor mats and exclusive Nappa leather in distinctive design style throughout the cabin.

The Burmester high-end 4D surround sound system, and adaptive ambient lighting (front and rear).

Front seat passengers enjoy a warmth comfort pack including warmed seats, armrests and centre console, while the driver sits before a heated multifunction steering wheel beautifully crafted from polished woodgrain

The Mercedes-Benz S 580 L 4MATIC saloon is priced at \$329,900 (MRLP) while the Mercedes-Maybach S 680 4MATIC saloon is priced at \$565,800 (MRLP).

Both models will be available to order in Q3, with first customer deliveries expected in Q4 of 2021.

These prices do not include on-road costs and any dealer delivery charges.

TAILGATING ON THE RISE

DATA from South Australia Police shows a 15pc rise in the number of drivers caught tailgating in the past five years, from 1216 fines worth \$459,415 in 2016 to 1408 fines worth \$582,515 in 2020.

Research by RAA Insurance also shows rear-end crashes are the most common collision type on South Australian roads.

RAA Safety and Infrastructure senior manager Charles Mountain said drivers risked more than the current penalty of a \$358 fine and \$90 Victims of Crime levy if they failed to keep a safe distance from the vehicle in front.

"Depending on the speed of impact, rear ending a vehicle could have catastrophic consequences for the occupants of all vehicles involved," he said.

"Whether it may be a consequence of

driver misjudgement or impatience, rear-end collisions are unfortunately all too common on our roads.

"Latest State Government crash data shows rear-end collisions accounted for 27pc of all collisions on the state's roads between 2015 and 2019 - much higher than right angle crashes, which were the next most common at 19pc."

Mr Mountain reminded drivers that breaking distances were also significantly increased during wet weather.

"Motorists must keep a greater space between themselves and the vehicle in front when roads are wet because it takes a longer distance to stop," he said.

"RAA road safety calculations show cars travelling at just 50km/h required almost 10 metres more stopping distance in the wet

compared to dry conditions.

"And the faster you are travelling the longer it takes to come to a stop in the wet, with potentially dangerous outcomes for all road users.

"For example, if you are driving at 60km/h it will take an extra 13.5 metres to come to a stop in wet compared to dry conditions.

"Travelling at 80km/h, that stopping distance blows out to an extra 24 metres in the wet, and at 100km/h you require an extra 37 metres to come to a halt."

Mr Mountain said these extra braking distances reinforced the need for motorists to be mindful that a change in weather conditions poses a potentially fatal risk to road users.

"Drivers must also be aware that pedestrians and cyclists can be harder to detect when it's raining," he said

THROUGHOUT the world the name of Rolls-Royce has been associated with the best in automotive engineering.

Prior to World War II the name Packard gloried in the popular title of 'the American Rolls-Royce'.

In fact, during World War II, Packard manufactured more 24-cylinder Rolls-Royce Merlin motors than the entire British aero engine industry.

Packard started its climb to success in 1915 when it introduced the world's first production V12 engine, based on a competition engine built by the British firm Sunbeam.

Packard called their cars using this engine Twin Six cars and they were very popular throughout the 1920s.

To compete with General Motors, Packard introduced a straight-eight engine, but some of their customers still wanted the V12.

When Cadillac came out with their V16, Packard had little option but to recreate the legendary Twin Six in the early 1930s.

This, of course, was the time of the Great Depression so Packard resisted the concept of annual model changes and released the Twin Six as a new series rather than giving it a year model.

The Twin Six pioneered the vee-shaped radiator which became a feature of all later model Packards.

It had hydrostatic bumpers; a vacuum servo boosted the braking system; the aluminium-headed engine had dual-downdraught carburetors with thermostatically controlled automatic chokes and the dashboard was fitted with an electric fuel gauge.

In later models also had an in-built car radio.

The side valve V12 engine had a capacity of 7297cc and powered the rear wheels through a three-speed gearbox and a live rear axle.

Four body styles were originally introduced.

These were a sport Phaeton, a fixed-head coupe, a convertible coupe and a convertible sedan.

With the depressed market some of these cars took two years to sell, but this merely endorsed the wisdom of Packard's policy of avoiding annual model changes.

It also meant any model could be changed as the manufacturer saw fit.

As new modifications were introduced the Twin Six went to a Seventeenth Series before being discontinued at the start of World War II.

The last model produced was made for President Roosevelt and had bulletproof windows and bodywork.

In fact, earlier bulletproof Twin Sixes were popular with a number of people and organisations, such as the US Secret Service.

Even Al Capone had one during the prohibition period to ensure his safety and models were shipped to places like Venezuela and China for the protection of their leaders and politicians.

The original Twin Six chassis also found much favour with undertakers seeking a state-ly hearse.

HYBRID STILL STRONG

RESISTANCE is futile: Mitsubishi recognised this years ago when it became the first automobile maker to 'electrify' the sports utility vehicle (SUV), taking the hybrid road with the Outlander on its journey to an alternative power source.

The Outlander PHEV (plug-in hybrid electric vehicle) hit the road in 2017 running on electrical power with the back-up of a petrol engine used to charge the battery or add extra performance to the vehicle.

The thinking behind this, says Mitsubishi, is that the Outlander PHEV gives owners driving that most family cars encounter in the school drop-off or daily commute, which often involve stop / go traffic, conditions in which the internal combustion engine is least efficient.

Late in 2020 the two-model mid-size SUV was given a drivetrain upgrade with the addition of a Sport mode. For MY21 has added a third variant blessed with a Bilstein premium suspension package tuned to enhance the driving experience.

Also, with the introduction of two-directional chargers in 2021, the Outlander PHEV will be the first SUV to be able to store electric power and return it to the home or grid.

The technically sophisticated SUV now comes in three highly specified variants – Outlander PHEV ES selling from \$47,990, plus on-road costs, Outlander PHEV GSR, \$52,490, and on top Outlander PHEV Exceed, \$56,490.

All Outlanders are covered by Mitsubishi's ten-year 200,000 kilometre warranty and capped price servicing when all scheduled services are done through the authorised Mitsubishi Motors Dealer Network. Some customers, such as government, taxis, rentals and selected national business, are excluded.

The Starlight White test vehicle took the popular road to SUV exterior design with contrasting black mica roof, rails, rear spoiler, plus

front and rear bumper skid plates and rear-view mirrors.

Not to be left out of the contrasting colour scheme were a black chrome plated radiator grille, front bumper air ducts and tailgate garnish. Highlights of a different nature up front were LED auto levelling headlamps and front foglamps.

The modern look was emphasised by 18-inch black machined two-tone alloy wheels.

Styling included (you guessed it) black accents, in the form of shift knob and steering wheel, roof lining, a-pillar trim, silver stitched armrest and door trim. A four-way power seat with micro-suede facings and synthetic leather bolsters offered the drive a deal of comfort.

Rear occupants also were well looked after with above average head room for adults and ample leg room with the front seats accommodating.

With the rear seat backs folded, cargo space extends to 1741 mm in length, a completely flat 463 litres of luggage room. A power tailgate makes for easy access.

An under-floor compartment provided space for the charging cable and other small items.

The conventional Outlander's multi-information system is augmented with a PHEV-dedicated menu which provides access to functions and displays for electric vehicle usage.

This includes a 7-inch display screen with a navigation system that includes a charging station search, charging cost, scheduled charging and air cooling and remaining cruising area display.

A PHEV Driving Information Display incorporates an energy flow display, energy monitoring and ECO system information.

A Mitsubishi eight-speaker sound system is included.

Petrol power comes from the tried-and-tested 2.5-litre four-cylinder engine, while twin electric motors – 60 kW, front; 70 kW, rear – contribute to combined maximum power of 157 kW (parallel hybrid mode) and combined

maximum torque of 332 Nm (all modes).

Drive battery capacity is 13.8 kWh, giving the vehicle a claimed potential electric driving range of up to 54 km.

Approximately seven hours charge time: type 1; 3 hours, type 2; 25 min, DC fast charger.)

All Outlander PHEV occupants are protected by Mitsubishi's Reinforced Impact Safety Evolution bodywork and seven airbags, including front driver and passenger, side and side curtain positions.

The entry-level ES model has cruise control, lane departure warning, and auto high beam on top of forward collision mitigation, autonomous braking, plus rear parking sensors and reverse camera.

The Outlander adds with blind spot monitoring, lane change assist, rear cross-traffic alert and front parking sensors.

Outlander PHEV GSR has Bilstein suspension. Together with a low centre of gravity, thanks to the underfloor drive battery, delivers a high standard of handling and ride comfort not normally found in an SUV.

Together with responsive steering, this gives the GSR model the ability to take being thrown around fast bends and tight corners with a level of driver confidence unheard of in a similar vehicle.

Add to this, the upgraded safety systems and the ability to go beyond the 54 kilometre electric motor range with the petrol engine kicking in, the latest Outlander PHEV offers minimum anxiety on most on-road (and soft road) travel.

The PHEV makes the best use of petrol and electricity by delivering power in three modes – EV Drive Mode, Series and Parallel Modes – that operate without any intervention from the driver.

EV mode is all electric driving, using only electric power from the drive battery. Carbon dioxide emissions and petrol consumption are zero up to 120 km/h.

In Series Mode, the petrol engine is used to recharge the battery which supplies the

electric motors to drive the wheels. The system switches to Series mode when the battery charge falls below a predetermined level or more performance is required, such as during overtaking or on a steep climb.

The switch to Parallel Mode occurs when the vehicle reaches highway speeds, or extra power is required. In Parallel Mode, the petrol engine provides drive to the front wheels with help from the electric motors.

The electric motors also manage Outlander's dynamic stability, the integrated S-AWC system ensuring it has the same levels of road-holding as a conventional four-wheel drive.

The electric motors act as generators during deceleration. They recharge the drive battery when the driver releases the accelerator or when the brake pedal is applied.

The degree of energy recovered can be controlled using the gear lever or paddle shifts on the steering wheel. The driver can increase energy uptake by moving the lever from 'D' to 'B' where two levels – B3 or B5 – are available. Alternatively, by using the steering wheel paddles, the driver can adjust the level of regenerative braking to any of the six levels, from B0 to B5.

Consumption figures obtained on test were: 6.1 litres of fuel per 100 kilometres and six kilometres per kWh on a mix of city and motorway driving.

SUMMARY

If superior ride and handling are requirements, the Bilstein advantage Outlander PHEV GSR is the SUV for you. However, patience could pay off by waiting for the all-new Outlander due for release later this year.

Now is the time to act

THE Queen's Birthday long weekend is now behind us, with a huge flurry of customers visiting us, all eager to do things in the garden - as well as a dose of lovely rain.

It is now time to turn our thoughts to winter gardening and of course all the things that come with that, namely all of the newly-released trees, shrubs, roses and fruit trees and winter produce, such as virus-free seed potatoes, Asparagus crowns and Rhubarb crowns.

It seems winter is here with this week's rain and the nights are certainly getting a little crisper and are a tad darker - it is a great time for planting.

Autumn is such a great time to plant, as the soil warmth is there but we have the guarantee of cooler weather and, of course, rain.

For the past month or so we have been flat out digging all of the new seasons trees and roses for bare root sales through the winter months with our grape vines being dug in July.

There is also the "Thomas A'Becket", named after the famous Bishop of Canterbury who met with a very sad ending.

The day played out with Kilsby claiming the handicap adjusted score win for the day as well as the bragging right of the best off-

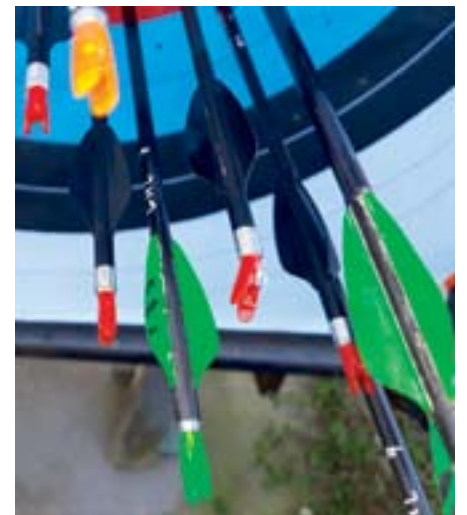
the-bow score.

IMPRESSIVE weather was just what the doctor ordered down here in the South East over the weekend and plenty of anglers made the most of it, with some nice fish caught.

The offshore guys had been waiting for a run of decent weather and to get it over a long weekend was just that little bit sweeter.

Crews made their way out to the shelf over the three days for a crack at the deep water and most were not disappointed.

Hapuka to almost 30kg were boated, along with plenty of blue eye, pink ling, gemfish and blue grenadier.

The 450m and beyond seemed to be the magic number, although some guys were a touch deeper.

In a bit closer we saw some lovely fish from the 60-100m marks.

Probably the most notable capture was Jamie Williams fishing with Clint, Carn and the crew on Southerly Charters who managed to boat himself a 20kg+ samson fish.

The guys also managed blue eye, snapper, shark and flathead just to top off the day.

There has been no shortage of school tuna this week out the front of Port MacDonnell, anywhere from 40m to the shelf has produced, but be willing to keep on the move until you find them.

There has been some barrel news from just over the border in Portland - a 111kg fish was boated out wide - so let's hope they are on their way back to us.

The inshore shark fishing this weekend was excellent.

We saw gummy shark nearing the 30kg

mark and schoolies in the tall 20kg range too.

Brad Kain and Sally Czerwonka landed some crackers in 10m of water off Race Course Bay and I also saw some nice fish from other boats out there too.

Surf fishos got onto some nice fish over the weekend.

The bigger salmon have started to fire up in the Canunda NP.

The old drain, Whale Rock and Channel Rock have all fished well for bait fishos, while lure casters have done pretty well inside the Beachport Salmon Hole.

Fish to 3kg have not been uncommon this week and it is great to see those big fish back again.

There is still smaller lumpies around Cape Banks for the lure casters, but the flat seas over the long weekend made the fishing a little slower than we would have hoped for.

A bit of a stir up is forecast for this week, so I have no doubt they will fire up very soon.

Gar fishos were making the most of the calm conditions to try their luck at bagging a few.

The Cape Douglas and Livingstons areas fished fairly well and there were also some nice fish caught at the Petrified Forest at Port MacDonnell.

There have been some nice tommy ruff and mullet mixed in with the gar, so anglers are getting a nice mixed bag.

There were a few boats that targeted the sweep while the conditions allowed and there were some nice fish boated.

The sweep fishing is something we can not do all that often because of the conditions, so when it all lines up, it is great fun to get out and have a crack.

The Glenelg River has been a little quiet,

but there were a few fish caught over the long weekend.

The mulloway were slow, but a few fish in the 60-70cm bracket were caught.

Even with the ET numbers for cross border members, anglers are still a bit reluctant to cross the border, so the majority of news has been from the SA section.

The Reed Bed to Dry Creek stretch was probably the most productive for both mulloway and bream, although there were some nice fish caught down at the bottom border

below Donovans. Bait fishos have done the best on prawn and crab, and the lure guys have been using natural coloured grubs and cranka crabs.

The forecast for the weekend looks pretty average, so I think the river or inland is going to be the best bet for most.

The stir will be good for the salmon at Cape Banks to fire up, so play it by ear and see what happens.

Greyhound racing still with thrills

IT was on Thursday, September 14, 1972 a public meeting was held at the Mount Gambier City Hall to form the South East Greyhound Racing Club.

Initial overtures were then made to the A. & H. Society seeking its interest in a greyhound racing track being erected on the Mount Gambier Showgrounds.

However, on December 3, 1972, after having presented a plan of the layout of the proposed track to the A. & H. Society, objections were raised by the Trotting Club and Horses-in-Action Committee.

After further deliberations, it was resolved on March 9, 1973 negotiations would remain open with the Show Society but the SEGRC would also look at the possibility of leasing land from the city council.

On April 3, 1973 it was agreed not to proceed with the A. & H. Society and formal application was made for an area to be allotted by the city council for the erection of a greyhound racing track at the Blue Lake Sports Park.

But on December 10, 1974 it was decided not to proceed with the Council land due to the massive earthworks required and significant cost of making the area suitable.

So again the SEGRC turned to the A. & H. Society.

As an alternative, though, the club also made an approach to the Mount Gambier and District Coursing Club for a lease of suitable land.

A reply was subsequently received from the coursing club stating it was not interested.

A track was then pegged out at the trotting track but this was unacceptable to the Show Society.

A licence to conduct greyhound racing in the South East had been one of seven originally allocated by the controlling body of the day - the National Coursing Association of South Australia.

By the time the SEGRC approached the Mount Gambier Racing Club in September 1975 the other six clubs - Angle Park, Gawler, Strathalbyn, Port Pirie, Port Lincoln and Whyalla - were already racing.

Needless to say, the pressure was on.

But in October 1975 a letter was received from the racing club indicating support for a greyhound track at their Glenburnie racecourse.

On February 3, 1976 a track was pegged out in the area allocated by the racing club.

An appeal for a track building fund was then promoted by a series of public meetings at Naracoorte, Millicent, Portland and Mount Gambier.

An agreement with the Mount Gambier Racing Club for a 21-year lease was signed by all parties on Friday, March 4, 1977.

Earthworks commenced in July 1977 while the erection of the rail was completed in March 1978.

The Bramich lure was installed in April 1978 and the first series of trials was held on August 10 when 55 greyhounds participated.

Fielding at Mount Gambier's opening meeting at the Glenburnie track on Saturday, July 21, 1979 were six bookmakers.

George Kay called all the action at the 10-race opening meeting which ran with distances of 289 metres, 476 metres and 667 metres.

Winner of the first race, a maiden over 289 metres, was 3/1 chance Aqualair (Overflow Eagle x Cheeky Moss) who clocked a time of 18.40 seconds for Mount Gambier trainer Ralph Patzel.

The final of this year's Anniversary Cup (512m), sponsored for the first time by Exchange Printers, will be run at Tara Raceway on Sunday, July 18.

A second placing with Iron Eyes Punk behind the tearaway Rock It Barcia in the Klaassens Contractors Stake (512m) had her in the money mid-meeting, but her main chance always looked to be Sarcasmic in the last race.

Raced by Victorian owner Jeff Galea of Brookfield, Sarcasmic went into the Gordon Refrigeration Mixed Stake (400m) from box one having won his past three starts at Gawler over 400 metres.

The black dog never looked in any danger of defeat, leading all the way to defeat Rough In Vegas by 4¾ lengths in a quick 22.84 seconds for Hurley, a great-niece of long-time greyhound industry stalwart Judi Hurley.

The win was the 14th overall for Sarcasmic, who was also bred by his owner.

It also continued the good run for Hurley who has now won five races since March with the son of Fernando Bale and Little Pookie, who raced on 170 occasions for 16 wins and 50 minor placings.

The litter also includes the Galea owned and trained Scatterbox, a winner of 12 races and \$71,000 in stakemoney, and his kennel-mate Run Baba Run (22, \$120,000).

RACING journalists and the South Australia sporting public are running out of superlatives for apprentice-of-the-moment Jacob Opperman.

The Mingbool teenager continues to rewrite the record books and a new entry was required after racing in Adelaide last Saturday.

In what was a personal best in Opperman's brief 14-month career, he booted home five winners at Morphettville Parks from his first five rides, ending the day with five wins and a third from seven rides.

That took his tally of metropolitan winners to 22 and, remember, he was only granted his metropolitan licence six months ago.

The way Opperman has burst onto the scene in Adelaide is reminiscent of when Darren Gauci took Melbourne racing by storm as an apprentice many decades ago.

Opperman's previous best day in the saddle in the big smoke was a treble, also at Morphettville back in March.

A \$1 all-up bet on his five winners would have netted you \$284.

And, how he would have loved to have made it six winners for the day in the final event.

He was aboard his favourite horse Rohlon Drunk, trained by his father Jamie and Opperman gave the gelding (a \$16 chance) every possible chance before running third.

I was sitting in a Pub-TAB at Paringa (across the river from Renmark) on Saturday when a punter loudly stated that "a young bloke in Adelaide has ridden five winners so far today".

It gave me great pleasure to inform the punter and his mates at their table just who "the young bloke" was and where he comes from.

With winners coming at such an alarming rate, Opperman is quickly having his various claims altered.

"I am loving riding and just trying to do my best for everyone," Opperman told the media after his fifth winner.

"It's great to outride some of my claims."

He can no longer claim in the country, at the provincials he is down to 1.5kg, while last Saturday's bevy of winners has resulted in his metropolitan allowance being reduced from 3kgs to 2kgs.

To cap off a brilliant weekend, Opperman then rode a double at Murray Bridge the following day with rails hugging rides in the straight.

It was in successive races when he won on Victory Club for Murray Bridge trainer Matty Seyers, then aboard the Darren Magro (Morphettville) trained Betta Eddie 40 minutes later.

Opperman has not ridden since last Sunday, instead taking a well-earned holiday on the Gold Coast with his parents.

EARLY TREBLE FOR THE LOCALS

YOU would have to go back quite a few years to discover when three local pacers won at a Saturday night Globe Derby Park meeting in Adelaide.

That all changed last Saturday night when local stables came out with all guns blazing to win the first three events at Globe Derby Park, starting with the Ray Lattin trained Don't Need An Excuse (\$12-\$9) in the NR 49 pace.

The five-year-old gelding, driven by Mark Bellinger, was having only his second start this campaign after finishing a distant eighth when resuming here last month.

"I won a race with him about 18 months ago in Adelaide and he stayed up there but broke down," Lattin explained.

"He came home and we had trouble getting him right again, so it was very satisfying to see him win again last Saturday night.

"He will stay in Adelaide for a week or two as the border restrictions means there is an uncertainty about meetings going ahead here plus we cannot go over the border."

It didn't take long for Van Mara (\$4.50), a former interstate pacer now with local trainer Steve Fennell, to get into the winner's stall for his new stable.

The eight-year-old gelding, a multi Melton winner during his career, won at his third start

MEECH CLAIMS SECOND APSLEY CUP

TOP Victorian female jockey Linda Meech has only been back riding spasmodically for just over two months and has wasted no time claiming a country cup.

Meech gave up race riding early last year and had a baby in January before having one ride for her partner/trainer Mark Pegus at Warracknabeal on Easter Sunday.

She won the Apsley Cup in 2016 on Sandhill Chief for Bordertown trainer Sam Turner and won it again last Sunday at Edenhope on the second favourite Last Week.

That gave the co-trainer combination of Ciaran Maher and David Eustace their first Apsley Cup success.

Fellow female jockey Carleen Hefel, fresh from a double at Sandown the previous day, came back to earth literally when she fell from her mount Pres De Toi as the cup field entered the straight and fortunately escaped serious injury.

"Carleen spent the night in Horsham hospital for observation and was released the following morning," Apsley Racing Club president Roger Pfitzner stated.

"We, as a club, are very pleased with the outcome of the meeting despite racing without any crowd in attendance.

"We had capacity fields in seven of the nine races, with a great cross section of jockeys and trainers supporting the day and the Apsley Cup field was easily the strongest we have had for many years."

BUBBLE PROVED A BLESSING

THE 70-kilometre border bubble that currently exists in regards to COVID-19 proved opportune for Limestone Coast trainers last weekend, enabling them to take horses to compete at Edenhope on Sunday.

Three of our trainers came home with winners, all ridden by Mount Gambier jockeys.

Trainer Michael O'Leary's Darwin holiday felt even better after Picaroon, ridden by Geoff O'Loughlin, was well backed (\$4.80-\$3.50) before winning the 1200-metre maiden.

Apprentice Libby Halliday, who returned to race riding from injury in early May, used similar tactics to that of Walters in the 1200 metre 0-58 handicap.

Halliday rode the Richard Nicholson

trained Anrushka (\$8-\$4.80-\$9.50) and the gelding produced his best at his third run this campaign for an all the way victory.

Black bookers from Edenhope are Atomic Rock (got lost early and rattled home for third) and Dr Dee Dee (sat three wide all the way in the Apsley cup and still managed to run fourth).

Short game up to par

AFTER Bryce Whicker won the Driscoll Summer Cup, which wrapped up at the Mount Gambier Golf Club in January, he said his chipping still needed a lot of work.

At that point his handicap had come down from 26 to 14 in the approximately 18 months he had been playing competitively.

He said if he could improve that one area of his game he was confident he could reach his goal of making A Grade - for handicaps of 12 or below - within a few weeks.

Fast forward to last Saturday and he has certainly achieved both goals.

Playing off a handicap of 11, Whicker claimed victory in the A Grade stableford competition with 40 points, one clear of a quartet of players on 39.

It was pretty clear which part of his game contributed most to the win - his chipping.

"I certainly didn't hit many greens in regulation," he said.

"But I chipped very well.

His only wipe of the day came on the par-three sixth hole when he found bunker trouble, but after making two more pars on the seventh and eighth, plus a bogey on the ninth, he started the back nine with 19 points in the bag.

That increased to 24 with a par on the 10th and bogey on 11, before a sequence of four pars had him in a winning position with 35 points after 15 holes.

"On each of those holes (12, 13, 14 and 15) I chipped and one-putted to make par," Whicker said.

"I'm using a gap wedge to chip with now and if I'm within 30 or 40 metres of the green I'm confident I can get it close (to the hole)."

While he only scored one point on each of the 16th and 18th after bogeys, one more three-point par on the 17th, again after getting it close from about 60m out, was enough to seal the win.

Club benefits from federal grant

THE Australian Government is helping to deliver a more inclusive sporting experience for communities on South Australia's Limestone Coast after opening a new multipurpose sporting facility at Kalangadoo.

The building at the Kalangadoo War Memorial Park and Community Sports Club includes new unisex toilets, warm-up area, parenting and baby change room, umpire change rooms and first aid space.

The Federal Government contributed \$266,000 to the project as part of its Move It AUS Community Sport Infrastructure grant program with the State Government, Wattle Range Council, Kalangadoo War Memorial Park and Community Sports Club and local sporting clubs also contributing towards this and other upgrades.

Federal Member for Barker Tony Pasin said the new facility would benefit local sports clubs and community groups and addresses a lack of female friendly facilities at the venue.

"This new development caters to the needs of all users by providing an inclusive change room space which will encourage

greater levels of participation and physical activity for local residents," he said.

Sports including football, netball, lawn bowls and cricket already use the facility with the club looking to implement additional programs such as Auskick, Net-Set-Go and a mid-week seniors netball competition as a result of the upgrades.

The club also plans to add three new yoga sessions per week and increase the number of gym classes currently held at the club

from one to five.

The addition of a flexible indoor space and multipurpose change facility enables sporting clubs to extend competition and training opportunities.

The work also includes an equipment storage room and external verandah which provides players with an undercover warm-up space.

Kalangadoo Community Club president Andre Carlson said they were elated to receive notification they were successful in their grant application.

"Marrying this Federal grant with the Liberal State grant, Wattle Range Council grants, donations and funding raised by the clubs, our long-time dream was about to begin," he said.

"After some 18 months, a labour of love and countless volunteer hours, we now have new state of the art facilities.

"We now have some of the best facilities not only in our league but our two neighbouring leagues as well."

"What all this work and new facilities has done is brought people and the clubs closer together."

From its original 10.5km loop, a 21km distance was added, followed by a 42km marathon distance, the 56km ultra-marathon distance and a short 5km run.

The 42km distance has since been dropped, with most people preferring the longer 56km run, while the 5km run is in its second year, after competitors expressed interest in a shorter distance.

While the event was postponed last year, this year it has attracted plenty of interest, with similar numbers nominated.

Some of those are from last year's event.

"Many of the entries that existed last year came into this year," Ackland said.

"We carried about 100 entries across into this year.

"We are looking at about 300 entries which is similar to where we were at in 2019.

"With everything up in the air we didn't know how people would respond, so it is good to see a good number, considering the conditions we are under."

While some competitors come from Victoria and have been hampered with the current coronavirus restrictions, Ackland said the majority came from South Australia, with many of those participating as part of a five-race Trail Run series.

Ackland said the run attracted plenty of interest, partly because of its unique layout.

"Most of the trail events are all fairly unique," he said.

"With a road marathon, you know what you have under your feet.

"These trail runs depend so much on the landscape and the terrain.

"For us it is running in and out and around volcanic craters, which in itself is quite unique.

"We get some interesting feedback from people who haven't been here before.

"We tend to take it for granted living here - we are living on the side of volcanic craters, so it is just what you do."

Start times for each distance have been staggered to keep distance between runners and to provide plenty of action around the course.

The 56km event starts at 7am, with a cut off time nine hours later.

The 21km starts at 8am, with a cut off at four hours and 30 minutes, the 5km starts at 9.15am, with a two-hour cut off and the 10km at 9.30am, with three hour, 25 minutes.

All distances showcase some of the best scenery in the region around the Valley Lakes, while the 56km event also includes laps of the Blue Lake.
