\$100m health promise

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THE State Labor Opposition has vowed to scrap the Marshall Liberal Government's \$662m inner city multipurpose arena and commit \$100m to country health if elected at the 2022 polls.

In this week's State Budget, the government has committed \$79m from 2022 to 2025 for planning and site preparation works for a new arena within Adelaide's Riverbank Precinct, which will host netball, basketball and tennis and have a capacity of 15,000.

But Labor leader Peter Malinauskas has pledged a Labor State Government will not proceed with the stadium and invest the funds in the state's health system to address hospital overcrowding and ambulance ramping - with \$100m annexed for country health.

SA's 'worst budget'

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INDEPENDENT MP Troy Bell has slammed the State Government for failing to deliver for the Limestone Coast in the 2021-22 State Budget, labelling it as the "worst budget for our region that I've seen in seven years".

Despite a number of big ticket health and infrastructure items touted for Adelaide in the recently released document, no new funds have been allocated for any projects within the Mount Gambier and MacKillop electorates.

The Member for Mount Gambier said the final budget before the 2022 polls was a "La-

bor-like budget" which provided nothing for critical infrastructure in the Limestone Coast.

"This is a city-centric budget which we see billions of dollars being spent in Adelaide's central business district and regions within a one hour radius of the CBD and very little for the Limestone Coast," he said.

"The two announcements for my seat are

actually renouncements which were put out in March and May this year.

"This budget does nothing for critical infrastructure in the Limestone Coast, there is no commitment to roads, power, sewerage, fibre optic to attract businesses to our region."

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War gun back in city park

ONE of Mount Gambier's few remaining war relics has been returned to Vansittart Park.

The German-made 1917 Krupp 77mm field gun was removed in February for a complete restoration, with Mount Gambier City Council workers delicately placing the relic back under its rotunda setting on Tuesday morning.

Mount Gambier man Murray Langford completed the restoration, three decades on from when he last refurbished the weapon following a seven-year campaign to retain it in the city as a public asset.

Mount Gambier Community RSL president Bob Sandow said the restoration was "magnificent", encouraging the community to view and take pride in the work.

"The work that Murray has done is going to make sure this last well beyond another 30 years," Mr Sandow said.

Council building maintenance coordinator Trevor Pettingill said it important the community now treated the public relic with respect to ensure it remained in good condition.

The Australian Imperial Force 27th Battalion captured the gun at Warfusee Abancourt near Amiens, France on August 8, 1918 during World War I.

Coastal ambo base

THE South Australian Ambulance Service (SAAS) has acquired a new base station in Port MacDonnell, after the Port MacDonnell and District RSL sub-branch donated its old premises.

Members from both the RSL and SAAS gathered on Monday to formally handover the keys to the RSL sub branch building, which was purchased by SAAS for one dollar.

Port MacDonnell RSL president Wayne Manser said he couldn't think of a better use for the old RSL building, after it was decided the RSL sub branch would cease operations and merge into the Mount Gambier branch of the RSL.

"This building's always been here for the town. It was originally a school... and then it

became the RSL," Mr Manser said.

"We leased it to the Red Cross at one stage... and we raised a hell of a lot of money for the area and for the town.

"And now we pass it on to the ambulance service, so it's still there for the town's benefit."

SAAS Limestone Coast relieving operations manager Daniel Forrest said the new station benefitted both Port MacDonnell residents and ambulance service volunteers.

"With the team now being a full ambulance crew, it really provides them a space for training somewhere and to really have ownership [towards] the local community," Mr Forrest said.

The new base will also be able to house the current ambulance vehicle fleet, which is cur-

rently located offsite in a rented storage shed.

Port MacDonnell volunteer team leader Pamela Carter said the new space offered the ambulance service a chance to grow its presence within the region and also attract new volunteers.

"We're very grateful to the RSL for giving us this opportunity to grow," she said.

"And that's what we've done for the last few years, we've gone from four to six to eight and now we're at 12 volunteers."

The entire SAAS team was excited about the new station and expressed its sincere gratitude towards the RSL for its generosity.

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Region given little backing

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THE Limestone Coast has received little backing in the State Government's 2021-22 budget, with the last budget before the next election showing no big infrastructure wins for the Mount Gambier or MacKillop electorates.

The government announced three Limestone Coast projects in the 2021-22 State Budget - including \$850,000 towards Grant District Council's \$5m Mount Gambier salesyards transformation - which was previously announced in May.

A \$800,000 allocation towards the \$1.6m Mount Gambier cycle path and extension and solar light installation was announced in March, while \$662,000 towards the \$2.65m Kingston Beacon visitor centre at Cape Jaffa lighthouse was announced last year.

Despite jobs, health - particularly mental health - and education being budget priorities, the document does not provide any significant capital expenditure for the region.

Under the government's \$163.5 Mental Health Package, a new 16 bed crisis stabilisation facility will be built in Adelaide's northern suburbs which will operate 24 hours a day aimed at reducing admissions to public hospitals and ease pressures on emergency departments.

The government will spend \$12m next financial year to support the fit out to create additional psychiatric care bed capacity for up to eight additional beds, to be commissioned by SA Health as necessary based on future demand.

While the government has allocated 140 new treatment spaces across a number of metropolitan and regional hospitals - includ-

ing Murray Bridge and Victor Harbor - no funding has been announced for the Mount Gambier and Districts Health Service.

The government aims to start concept planning and funding approval phase of an

ambulatory care hub - which aims meet the needs of patients requiring emergency access to medical care but who can be managed to avoid admission a hospital bed - at the Mount Gambier Hospital.

The budget provides \$8.2m as of next year to recruit an additional 74 emergency operational staff to the South Australian Ambulance Service - including up to 24 additional staff to enable up to four regional stations to achieve active shift rosters.

A further \$5.5m will be provided to SA Health-run regional aged care facilities to transfer from a paper-based system to an electronic management system, which will include medication management at the bedside and supporting data entry at the point of care.

The government aims to continue the Country Fire Service's (CFS) facilities renew program to manage maintenance and upgrades at stations across the state, as well as deliver 40 new trucks inline with the emergency service's ongoing annual capital program.

Amid a nationwide timber storage, the State Government will also develop a wood encouragement policy for South Australia to promote the benefits of wood in building and construction.

As part of its forestry policy, the government also aims to grow farm forestry in South Australia to expand commercial forestry resources and diversify farm incomes.

SA Police will receive \$98.9m over five years to help manage the state's response to COVID-19, including costs relating to border patrols, medi-hotel security, cross-border travel authorisations and compliance activities.

Funding also includes 168 additional Protective Security Offices to support the operation of medi-hotels and employment of SES volunteers for broader COVID-19 related activities.

Bell lambasts government for 'worst state budget'

The Member for Mount Gambier said the final budget before the 2022 polls was a "Labor-like budget" which provided nothing for critical infrastructure in the Limestone Coast.

"This is a city-centric budget which we see billions of dollars being spent in Adelaide's central business district and regions within a one hour radius of the CBD and very little for the Limestone Coast," he said.

"The two announcements for my seat are actually renouncements which were put out in March and May this year.

"This budget does nothing for critical infrastructure in the Limestone Coast, there is no commitment to roads, power, sewerage, fibre optic to attract businesses to our region."

Mr Bell said he was disappointed the government's \$165.5m spend on mental health - which includes the construction of a new 16-bed Crisis Stabilisation Centre in the Adelaide - did not include any targeted funding for the Limestone Coast.

He said two drug and alcohol counsel-

lors - including a youth-specific counsellor - was required for the city of Mount Gambier to complement existing services, as well as two dedicated detox beds located within the Mount Gambier Hospital to provide medical supervision for alcohol detoxification.

"I would have liked to have seen projects with a real focus on mental health with clear projects, targets and spend for our region," Mr Bell said.

Mr Bell said funding to position Mount Gambier and the broader region as a desirable place to live and work was also notably absent from the budget, saying a business attraction and retention strategy was required.

He also said funding to support the region's agricultural and forestry sector was missing, with budget papers showing a \$2m decrease to forestry next financial year.

"We have a skilled workforce shortage and

there needs to be a clear focus on attracting a skilled workforce," Mr Bell said.

"There's no industry-specific funding for forestry or anything about water initiatives for the retention of water to grow all the sectors that use that resource and would benefit their growth.

"Having a real target on specific industries and what it would take to grow those industries is important because that grows the revenue and the jobs for State Government.

"There's plenty of initiatives the government is aware of - at the moment we have got a shortage of structural timber - and there could have been a targeted fund for those mills that can increase their capacity and increase the structural timber output that would service our nation going forward."

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FUNDRAISING efforts will continue for the much loved Mount Gambier Library with pre-loved books, movies and more on sale as part of a yearly big book sale.

Mount Gambier's Friends of the Library committee volunteers will assist the public in finding fantastic deals on books, DVDs, CDs and jigsaw puzzles whilst helping fund critical community projects within the local hub.

Following its cancellation last year due to the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions, this year is looking to be bigger and better than ever with it being held at the Mount Gambier City Hall for the first time.

Funds raised through sales will contribute to activities and critical items for the library with previous years funding the sensory wall and the after school Lego club.

Mount Gambier Friends of the Library president Chris Lloyd said the committee is dedicated to helping the library purchase objects it typically would not be funded for.

"These ideas come from recommendations from the library staff and sometimes we come up with our own ideas as well as what would be good to add in and the objects are usually things that would add value to the library itself," Ms Lloyd said.

Throughout the years the committee has helped the library purchase objects such as hearing books, picture books, signage and sensory toys.

"We have been running for just over ten years now and we are all about raising money but also profiling the library in any way we

can," Ms Lloyd said.

"Raising the profile of the library and being that support mechanism is great because the library here in Mount Gambier is fantastic and knowing there is that little bit of extra cash that we can spend on the community to better the resources here is such a good feeling.

"The community also really enjoys the fact that the books we sell are in great condition and are good quality but also the reasonable price they go for."

The committee president said volunteers typically see hundreds of community members filter through the doors observing what bargains they can obtain during the event.

"Libraries are so important because it is a place where people can meet and it doesn't cost anything to walk in the door, it is warm and welcoming and the staff are amazing," Ms Lloyd said.

Mount Gambier Library children services manager Kelly Lynch had been lucky enough to provide the committee with a proposal in recent years resulting in the hub's sensory wall and many more activities.

"The impact of these fundraising events is hard to measure because children get to engage with a number of different technologies throughout the library due to the funds raised," Ms Lynch said.

"Thanks to the funding provided through events like this we have also been able to purchase more Lego and develop a second Lego club for more intermediate visitors."

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Labor picks country health over stadigm

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THE State Labor Opposition has vowed to scrap the Marshall Liberal Government's \$662m inner city multipurpose arena and commit \$100m to country health if elected at the 2022 polls.

In this week's State Budget, the government has committed \$79m from 2022 to 2025 for planning and site preparation works for a new arena within Adelaide's Riverbank Precinct, which will host netball, basketball and tennis and have a capacity of 15,000.

But Labor leader Peter Malinauskas has pledged a Labor State Government will not proceed with the stadium and invest the funds in the state's health system to address hospital overcrowding and ambulance ramping - with \$100m annexed for country health.

In the 2021-22 budget, the government announced a \$7.4b spend on health to fix ramping and ease pressure on emergency departments, but little new funding has been earmarked for country communities and the Limestone Coast.

Mr Malinauskas told The Border Watch he did not believe the multi-million dollar basketball stadium was the right priority given the state's "urgent needs in our health system".

"You've got to be willing to make some tough calls and we are being honest with the people of South Australia before the election that we won't proceed with the basketball stadium and instead we use that money to invest in people's health both in hospitals and the ambulance service," he said.

"In that regard, we're going to invest in the whole state, it just can't be a city-centric policy.

"There is need in the country as much as there is need in the city and that's why I want the people in regional South Australia to know that if I am made Premier, that I will prioritise them as much as anyone else."

When asked whether \$100m would address the needs of the state's regional hospitals and health services - including the public Mount Gambier, Millicent, Naracoorte, Penola, Kingston and Bordertown facilities - Mr Malinauskas said the health system needed "more resources, not less".

"Almost every South Australian has heard a story of a friend or a loved one who has been impacted by the crisis that our health system is currently in, whether it be ambulances being delayed, people not getting access to emergency department on time, hospital ramping or elective surgery delays," Mr Malinauskas said.

"I think we've got an obligation to make sure that when people are in their extraordinary time of need and call an ambulance, they have some confidence that it is going to show up on time and if it does show up on time, they'll get admitted to the hospital and get access to the care and service they deserve.

"We are in a first world country and our hospital system is breaking down before our eyes."

While the State Opposition said specific funding details would be released closer to the 2022 election, it is understood Mr Malinauskas has a "keen eye" on areas in need within the Limestone Coast.

The State Government has previously slammed the opposition as having "no credibility on health" and said it will always take action to protect South Australians from COVID and address whatever health challenges the state faces.

MacKillop MP backs budget

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MEMBER for MacKillop Nick McBride has defended the State Government's 2021-22 Budget as one that will provide flow on benefits to the Limestone Coast despite a lack of investment in the region.

While Treasurer Rob Lucas has rejected characterising the budget as a "big spending, pre-election budget", Mr McBride said the document was a "budget to win the next election".

"Any budget nine months out before an election, when there's no other budgets to be had between now and the election, is a pre-election budget," Mr McBride said.

"The Marshall Government is making sure it is turned to government and I think anything about being equitable doesn't come into that argument.

"As of 2022 and beyond the state election, we can start looking after our regions again and that can be everything from making sure the forestry industry is well looked after and making sure our regional towns have affordable housing.

The first-term MP said while the budget did not provide MacKillop with funding for individual projects, big infrastructure spends in Adelaide would provide benefits to the already "strong economy" in the Limestone Coast.

"Even though it may look like we didn't get a lot of individual projects through the this budget process, the expenditure in the city will overflow right across the state," Mr McBride said.

"The Limestone Coast is going to be guided by whatever the strong economy of South Australia has to bring.

"The Treasurer may have other ideas and policies to roll out before the next election so maybe there will be some election promises in the lead up to March.

"I am hoping things get better from this budget onwards."

Shadow Regional Development Minister Clare Scriven said Limestone Coast residents were "rightfully disgusted" with the government's priorities and a lack of new projects for the regions.

Ms Scriven said the State Government claimed just three projects for the Limestone Coast totalling \$2.3m, but all of them had been previously announced.

"The Government is spending almost \$700 million on a basketball stadium in Adelaide, yet for our region it can only re-announce projects already going ahead.

"It shows a total disregard for people in this area."

"We have pressing local needs in our health system, for housing and for road improve-

ments, but the Government has ignored them all."

Budget documents show the number of full time equivalent positions within the Limestone Coast Local Health Network will decrease by 10, but the State Government rejected claims it was cutting health workforce staff.

"Full time equivalent estimates in budget papers are an accounting measure, they are not a target; they simply indicate broader planned efficiencies and express them in terms of full time equivalent," a State Government spokesperson said.

"The Marshall Liberal Government has continually promised that no doctor or nurse will be sacked as a result of savings outlined in the budget.

"Every year under the Marshall Government, our health workforce has increased.

"The government will always take the action needed to protect South Australians to protect South Australians from COVID and address whatever health challenges we face."

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Forest trail on track

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MOUNT Burr is on track to become a eco-tourism hub following the creation of the first mixed use recreational trail.

Located on the slopes of Mount Muir, the 1.5km loop walk marks the first trail in an ambitious five-year plan to grow Mount Burr into a world class mountain bike destination.

Mount Burr Trails public officer Rob Gordon said the trail was a work in progress but aimed to establish the former timber town as a destination for family friendly, nature-based activities.

Mr Gordon said the shared-use recreational trail - which starts near the Mount Burr town playground - guides users through eucalypts, shears, wattles and open grasslands to the top of Mount Muir.

He said the loop trail was part of stage one of a broader ambitious plan to grow the timber town into a world class mountain bike destination.

"Mount Burr hasn't really had too much spent on it over the years and it was really hurt in terms of forestry and the mill shutting down," Mr Gordon said.

"Without that industry, the town has been struggling ever since and it doesn't appear to me that the council or the State Government hasn't put their hand up to take responsible for what was is lacking in Mount Burr.

"There are a lot of people who are quite happy with Mount Burr being the place that it is, but we think the trails will enhance the town and provide recreational activities for residents and visitors."

Mr Gordon said work was underway on the Hollow Tree Trail - a 1km track which-

will loop around 12ha site of eucalyptus trees.

He said the trail group was exploring funding opportunities to transform the track into a wheelchair-friendly facility to enable access to people with mobility issues.

"We have always believed a well-established trail require some funding and so far, we have had very little luck with the grants we have applied for," Mr Gordon said.

"We have been very surprised by the response we have from people about the establishment of the Lookout Loop Trail, which shows there is an interest in these trails.

"The school has gone on walks along the Lookout Loop Trail and has used QR codes to help students in their learning.

"There is also an opportunity to have some interpretive signage along the trail and we can see that with technology and education, it could even be a place where kids can learn outdoors."

Former Mount Burr Primary School teacher Lisa Scott said the trails have the ability to help young people be active and gain access to native habitat that can be used for a range of learning opportunities.

"Students are interested in using the trails for cross country and as part of their science learning," she said.

"The information that will be placed around the trails will be a great way for students to learn and inquire about our local native habitat."

Long-term log supply

TIMBERLINK'S Tarpeena sawmill is one of three beneficiaries of ForestrySA timber from the Mount Lofty Ranges, successfully winning a long-term year supply for sawlog as part of a competitive tender process.

The facility has secured 10-years of timber supply from state forests, which will help to address the nation's shortage of structural timber.

Timberlink executive general manger for sales, marketing and corporate affairs David Oliver said although the volume of log was "relatively small" in terms of the facility's potential output, the long-term supply will help ease the demand for timber.

"We are producing more timber than we have ever produced before... we're at all-time high record volumes," he said.

"We certainly welcome the additional volume, but it is a relatively small in relation to the size and scale fo our operations.

"The ongoing log supply will ensure we can supply or customers with structural timber.

"We are certainly doing our bit to increase production and we will reduce the Australia's reliance of imported timber by 2pc."

Mr Oliver said timber produced by the company will be sold to the domestic market, with no structural timber sold for export.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham said the long-term supply agreement will help secure the future of the domestic timber processing industry.

"In a strongly competitive national and global market for timber, it is exciting to see local sawmills successfully secure supply contracts with ForestrySA," he said.

"We know how important local sawmills are to our regional economies and these supply contracts will help support South Australian businesses and local jobs.

"Demand for timber has increased with the local housing industry booming, which is great news for the South Australian economy, but has put real pressure on supply chains."

Mr Basham said no logs of sawmill quality would be exported as a result of the tender, adding it was a "strong sign of ForestrySA's support" for the local industry.

"ForestrySA's direct contribution to the economy in regional South Australia has increased by more than 50 per cent as a result of this successful tender," he said.

Barker MP Tony Pasin said the outcome of the tender process was great news for the local timber industry and said increased supply to the Timberlink mill at Tarpeena will help to full a raw log supply shortage.

Mr Pasin said the growth potential of the Green Triangle timber industry would be a strong focus of Assistant Minister for Forestry Jonathon Duniam's visit to the region today.

"It all feeds into the concept of Aussie Logs for Aussie Jobs," he said.

"I'm a big advocate for ensuring that our locally grown logs are processed by our local mills to ensure that we are value adding to create and sustain jobs for the future."

Native seedlings find home

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THE grass will be greener at a popular reserve on Penola's fringe following the donation of a number of native seedlings.

Greenrise Recreational Reserve has received up to 250 seedlings of native grass and shrubs, which have been grown by Millicent High School.

The committee was approached by organisers of a Geocache convention in the Limestone Coast to launch a planting initiative, which will result in around 700 visitors planting the seedlings at the reserve when the event takes place.

Reserve committee chairperson Peter Bissell said volunteers would focus on the two entrance points of the popular attraction with more planting planned for the future along the Adam Lindsay Gordon walkway.

"There is a section of walkway there that is narrower than usual so the sheep typically don't graze there, which gives us an opportunity to plant shrubs and beautify the area and get more native plants in that area," Mr Bissell said.

"What we have been trying to do over the past six years in general is make the reserve a recreational area similar to what it once was without the water as it is impossible with the drying climate."

Mr Bissell said the committee has since focused on other areas including the recently developed tracks through the arboretum and tree plaques.

"We have also been completing the process of cleaning out all the deadlings and dead trees to tidy up the area," he said

"The reserve is around two decades old and this is the first time we have really had tracks in there for access to the trees and cleaning them up.

"Now it is a pleasant place to go for a walk and we see lots of people walk from town with prams, dogs and many more."

Alongside the donated seedlings, new fencing and gates have also been installed for easier access to the reserve.

"We have seen lots of activity with people staying in their recreational vehicles in the delegated area which has been popular and those who have stayed there that we have spoken to have said it is a fabulous spot because it is so quiet and away from the road," Mr Bissell said.

"We are excited to be able to deliver an expansive program this year, with everything from exclusive museum wine tastings to winemaker dinners, masterclasses, long lunches, high teas and even a campfire event to embrace the winter conditions - ideal for

warming up with Coonawarra's wines.

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Flow study floated

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THE Lake George Management Committee are hopeful a pre-feasibility study into diverting flows to the wetland via Drain M is done with a sense of urgency to supplement the current "precariously low" water level.

A bid to fund the study - which will examine diverting flow from the Reedy Creek Mount Hope System to Drain M - has been submitted into the Limestone Coast Landscape Priority Fund for 2022/23.

It follows concerns raised by the Lake George Management Committee about the lack of budgeted funds for the Beachport wetland and a decrease in winter rainfall bringing sufficient flows to the facility.

Lake George Management Committee chair Jim Pegler said the group had met with Environment and Water Minister David Speirs and Member for MacKillop Nick McBride about exploring options to supplement Lake George to redirect water from the South East Drainage Net-

work at Southend.

A State Government spokesperson said investigations and information was required to help both Environment Minister David Speirs and the Environment and Water Department with long-term management options, which "could result in direction of flows that are currently discharged to sea".

"In the past, the South East Water Conservation and Drainage Board has opened the ocean outlet to provide inflow to the Lake in times of low inflows," the spokesperson said.

"The regulating structure at the outlet is currently requiring maintenance which is likely to be undertaken in the next financial year, pending budget approval."

Mr Pegler said the committee supported the scoping study into the best management options, labelling the investigation as "quite critical".

"The committee are very pleased that the government is currently investigating options to increase water flows into Lake George," he said.

"To successfully open the lake to the sea we need greater volumes of water in the lake otherwise the reverse delta simply fills with sand which affects future water flows."

Mr Pegler said visitors to national parks had increased by 60pc over the past six months, but there was no budgeted funds to provide road maintenance or improvements at Lake George.

The department said while road maintenance and improvements generally fall under the care and control of Wattle Range Council, the State Government was prepared to work collaboratively to consider what opportunities may exist for improvements on Crown land "on a case by case basis".

Mr Pegler encouraged council to work with the State Government to obtain funding for upgrades to access tracks around Lake George.

"The tracks are currently unsafe as vegetation is encroaching onto narrow tracks making for poor visibility of the road ahead," he said.

Driver reported for crash

A RENDELSHAM man will appear in court for allegedly causing significant damage to a guard rail in a crash police believe came close to causing serious injury or death.

Millicent Police, acting on information from the public, reported the 27-year-old man on Wednesday or driving without due care and failing to report a crash.

It followed a public appeal for information into the incident, which is believed to have occurred around 5.30pm on Saturday.

A maroon-coloured car collided with a guard rail on Carthew Road near the Hatherleigh Drain.

The vehicle - which caused significant damage to the railing - then left the area.

The impact nearly resulted in the vehicle breaking through the guard rail and falling several metres below into the water.

Police located a maroon Subaru sedan hidden at a Rendelsham property, leading to the man being reported.

Limestone Coast officer in charge Superintendent Phil Hoff said the incident was a prime example of how close dangerous drivers can come to causing serious injury or death to themselves and other road users.

"Police urge members of the public to report any poor behaviour on local roads via the Police Assistance Line on 131 444," Supt Hoff said.

Millicent Police also thanked the public for their assistance in the investigation.

The man will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

A new model of care

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A MULTI-MILLION dollar vision for a dementia village in the heart of Mount Gambier has been unveiled following five years of extensive planning.

Boandik Lodge's Lake Terrace East facility will soon become a construction site as a number of unused buildings are cleared to make way for the landmark project.

Developed specifically to enhance and reduce the stress associated with dementia and memory loss in elderly residents, the facility will include 48 beds across six villas.

Influenced by the Hocesweyk model from Amsterdam, the project will house residents in a neighbourhood-style village where they will reside with others based on similar lifestyles.

The village will also include common shops found in the main street of Mount Gambier, such as a cafe, hairdresser and laundromat.

Boandik Lodge chief executive Gillian McGinty said the design for the different form of accommodation and model of care was around residents continuing to be a part of the community, created within the village, and allowed for residents to move freely while also remaining in a safe environment.

"We are trying to create an environment that creates meaningful engagement for people living with dementia but one that is also familiar to them with a shed for the men and women that want to utilise them, chicken coops, raised garden beds and barbeque areas," Ms McGinty said.

"Residents will be able to stop by the general store and pick up a copy of the newspa-

per or go out to the hairdresser as they usually would because we are just trying to take everything that is at home and put it in the village to make it a very home-like environment."

Staff members working onsite at the village would remain responsible for resident's day-to-day activities including supporting them with meals and other activities plus any extras they wish to be involved with.

"It will really promote a sense of independence because the residents will be involved in selecting the food from the store and bringing it home, preparing it or discussing how they would like it prepared with the staff member," Ms McGinty said.

"By having this familiar environment and for residents with dementia being able to walk out of their bedroom and see the lounge area or kitchen such as they would at home, it will create a very calm and serene environment because it is as if they are still living at home and not taking them out of their comfort zone."

Iconic Mount Gambier landmarks were also included in the design to maximise the familiarity for the residents with features of the village shaft modelled after the Centenary Tower, with a jetty also in the plans.

"A majority of our residents would have some form of dementia or memory loss so we do have two memory support units that operate on our normal care level but we are really excited to be able to offer something different that will allow for those living with dementia to live better," Ms McGinty said.


Tender for the development is currently open with demolition of the current buildings scheduled for August.

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Therapy pool makes splash

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THE Boandik Community Wellbeing Centre has made a splash across the state, awarded a gold medal at South Australia's Swimming Pool and Spa Association awards.

The Lake Terrace East hydrotherapy pool remains between a comfortable 33 and 35 degrees, allowing the perfect temperature for deep tissue muscle repair and therapy.

Open to the wider Mount Gambier community to increase their health and fitness through gentle exercise and aquatic classes, the complex is an all-inclusive facility with a ramp for wheelchair access, water-based wheelchairs and an overhead hoist system, which travels from the changerooms into the pool.

Hydrotherapy remains as a benefit for those suffering from hip or knee replacements, arthritis, diabetes and even heart conditions while also increasing sleep quality and many more health advantages.

Launched in February last year, the complex has presented a number of benefits to the community with Boandik Lodge chief executive Gillian McGinty stating the community feedback continued to be overwhelmingly positive.

"There still seems to be some thoughts out there from people that it is not open to the general public, which it is," Ms McGinty said.

"It is the general public that is predominantly using it and we would really like to open it up even further because the more people that want to use the pool, the more hours we can open the facility and offer that service to the whole community."

Ms McGinty said the facility would also be open to sporting communities for fitness or recovery activities.

"People who use the pool more regularly, whether it be as a part of the class or individually and whether they have a physiotherapy program or have been focusing on something particular, they have all reported a lot of benefits," she said.

"We are seeing people who are building up muscle strength prior to a hip or knee replacement and then coming back after the operation and recovering so much quicker than what they would if they had to rely on land-based exercise.

"We hear a lot of positive stories and everyone keeps coming back every week or two or three times a week because it is giving them the outcomes they need."

Ms McGinty said those living with a disability were also reaping the benefits of the complex, allowing them to exercise when they may be limited in other forms.

She said they were able to safely get into the pool and perform different activities allowing for regular exercise.

"We see a diverse range of people using

the pool, everything from parents with young children right through to 100-year olds who use it for exercise," she said.

"We put a lot of research into the pool prior to building it and we did visit a lot of different areas to check out their facilities and decide what we liked and what we didn't as well as what would work best for us.

"When we were designing the facility we ensured everyone would be able to have easy access in and out of the pool and what would work for our specific community."

The facility opens at 9am seven days a week with closing hours varied depending on classes or private bookings, which can be made by members of the public through the Boandik Lodge website.

The new headstone was donated by the District Council of Grant.



Time to enrol

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EARLY childhood is a critical time when a child's brain is impacted by the contexts and environments around them, with high quality preschool providing children with the best start in life.

Families with children who are eligible to start preschool next year are encouraged to enrol their child this month.

Aboriginal children and children who are or have been in care are eligible to attend once they turn three.

Acacia Kindergarten director Jane McDonald said children who have turned four before May 1 2021 can enrol to attend preschool as of now.

Ms McDonald said kindergarten provides experiences for children to grow and develop through play and interaction and also allows children to become confident learners in a safe and supportive environment.

"We provide foundation skills for school and life in general such as social development, language, motor skills and independence," she said.

"We use play-based curriculum as that is what is developmentally appropriate for children of that age and they learn through play while nurturing that love for learning.

"The centre has a big focus on music and movement this year and there are a number of benefits that has on a child, including hearing sounds through words, beat and rhyme.

"There is so much that can be learnt through engaging with the outdoor world and we do a lot of nature-based play, which builds awareness of how to care for the environment."

Ms McDonald said the centre engaged with organisations such as the Mount Gambier Library and the Mount Gambier North Primary School to build help build positive relationships among the broader community.

"Every week we go to the school and engage with the reception class to build those connections with school environment and teachers," she said.

"We are also connected with the Books in Home project which is connected with the library, so they'll come here and we also go to the library for a book giving event.

"Previously, we have gone to the theatre to watch productions and we have been on excursions to the railway lands, which builds children's connections with their environment and the community.

"This has huge benefits for the children, particularly the school visits, and the transition into school is so much smoother because they have an understanding of their environment."

Ms McDonald said the kindergarten facilitated an inclusive preschool program to provide education for children with significant special needs.

"We have our own space but we are also integrated within the mainstream children and that builds awareness of people and that all people are different, as well as acceptance of children's different ways of learning," she said.

"The program provides access to the curriculum in an appropriate way and with staff who are trained in how to engage with special needs children.

"It also builds family connections, families in those situations are often quite disconnected from community and we are able to provide somewhere for them to talk about their experiences and also connect them with services in the community."

Families with children who turn four before May 1 2022 need to enrol their child by June 30, 2021 to start preschool next year.

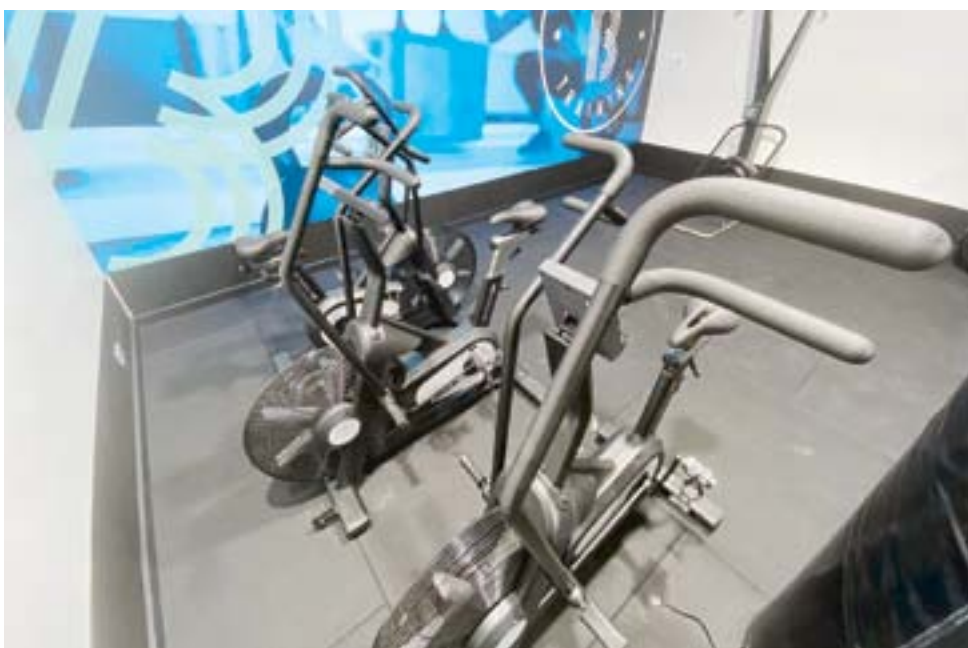

Feral olive trees in sights

THE Limestone Coast Landscape Board is targeting the control of feral olives in the Padthaway area to complement the work already undertaken by landholders.

Feral olives are highly invasive to native vegetation, degrade the habitat of native wildlife and are a significant bushfire hazard - burning with great intensity due to the oil inherent in the plant.

A targeted control program for feral olives has directly engaged 19 landholders within the Padthaway area.

It encourages landholder responsibility and awareness of the compliance requirements of owning an olive plant.

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board operations team leader Deb Lang commended the efforts already undertaken by landholders targeting the control of feral olives.

"The feral olive control work undertaken by the community will still require persistent follow up to treat seedlings and regrowth in future years," Ms Lang said.

"We are working directly with landholders to treat feral olive infestations on their properties and to implement responsible maintenance.

"In South Australia, domestic olive growers are legally required to reduce feral olive spread by ensuring trees do not fruit either by pruning before seed set or by ensuring all fruit is harvested."

Landholders are also encouraged to con-

sider their choice when purchasing an olive tree given the maintenance required in their management and the alternative native plant options that offer similar aesthetic qualities

and the added benefit of habitat for native wildlife.

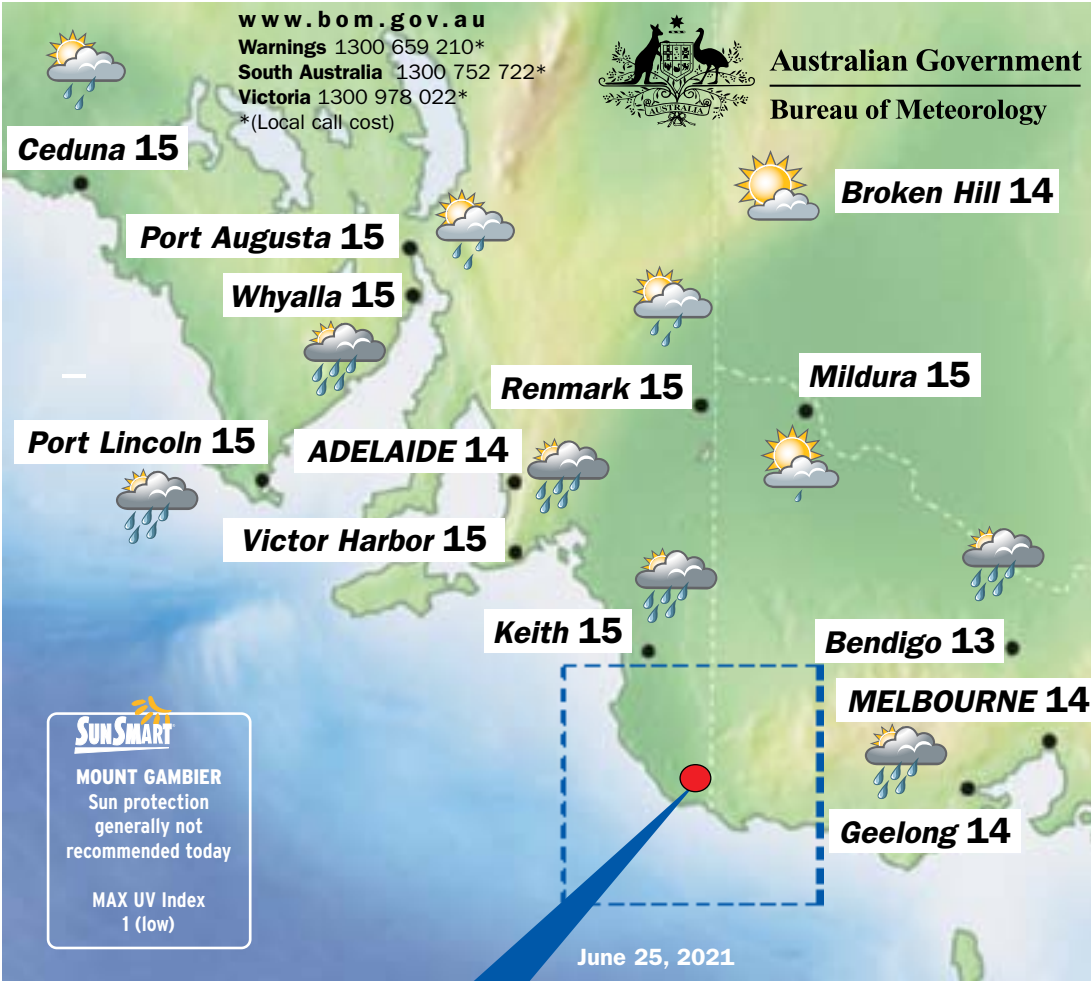
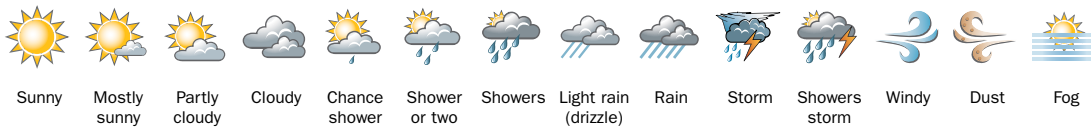

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Sheep health probed

A PhD student from the University of Adelaide is developing automatic devices to measure temperature in sheep, to better understand the impacts of body temperature on health and reproductive success.

Bobbie Lewis Baida will be among the first to complete intensive research on the effects of heat stress in grazed ewes, using automated devices.

Lewis Baida, who was recently awarded the 2021 SARDI Science Bursary for Women, will attempt to remotely measure ewes' body temperature to determine its impacts upon their physiology, behaviour, fertility and pregnancy.

She said although this is a vital area of research, it has not been thoroughly investigated in the past.

"The impact of heat stress in sheep in extensive grazing systems is not well understood," Lewis Baida said.

"In a hot environment like South Australia, heat stress can affect sheep by threatening their physiology, reproductive function and overall health and productivity."

"Remote measurement of body temperature may be an efficient tool to prevent and manage heat stress in free-ranging sheep."

Lewis Baida is working with other researchers at the University of Adelaide to develop automatic devices to measure temperature.

She said the automated devices are invaluable to her research, as they eliminate the need for human interference in data collection, which is crucial when working with sheep.

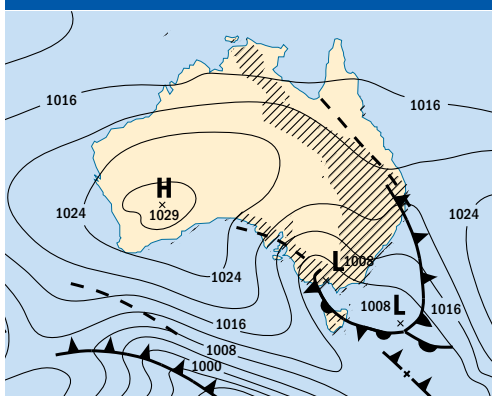
"Human presence disrupts the physiology of sheep and leads to stress-induced hyperthermia and increased metabolic heat production associated with the flight response," she said.

"With the automated technology, you get a much more accurate insight into an animal's thermal status and can analyse their true response to heat whilst they are in the paddock."

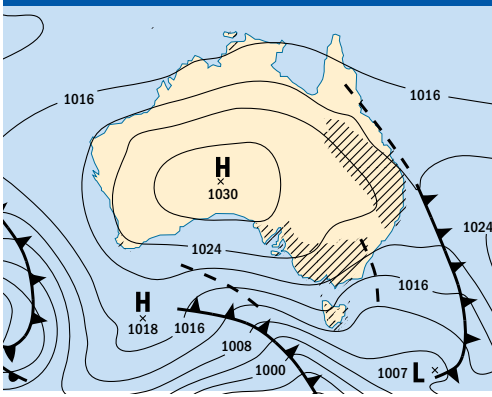
"I'm hoping the information will determine the true impact of hot conditions, not only on sheep physiology and behaviour, but also on reproductive outcomes."

Lewis Baida said she would use the SARDI Science Bursary for Women to help cover the cost of the "high-quality temperature loggers" needed for the research.

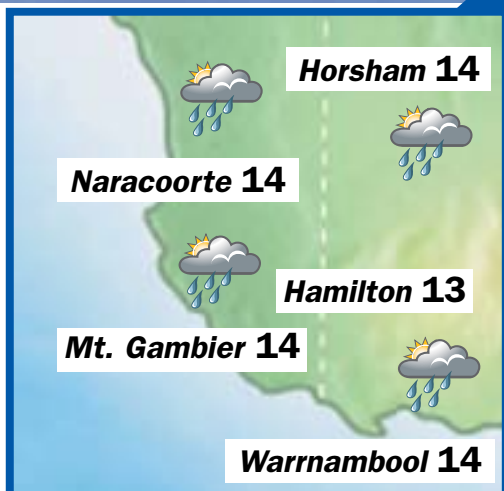
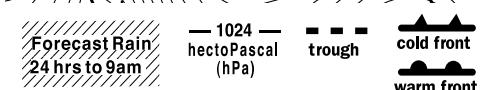
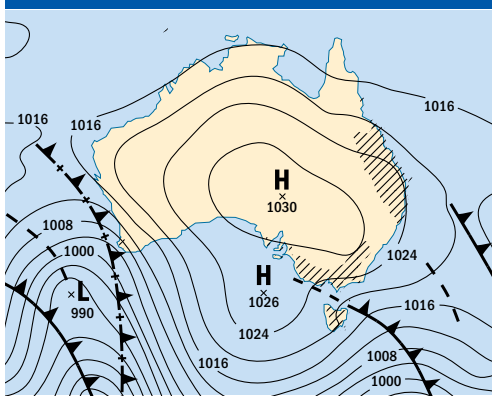

NUMBERS rose a little as agents yarded 419 head of live weight and open auction cattle.

These sold to the usual field of trade and processor buyers with feeder orders and a small amount of restockers active over the offering.

Quality was mixed across the pens however this didn't stop the buying field from competing strongly for supply in yet another dearer market.

Yearling steers went mainly to feed from 456c to 492c, with the trade paying to a top of 455c/kg.

Restockers sourcing lighter weights paid from 456c to 520c/kg.

Yearling heifers to the trade ranged from 393c to 490c, with feeders active from 420c to 490c, and restockers paying to a top of 480c/kg.

Grown steers and bullocks made from 320c to 435c with feeder support paying from 420c to 467c/kg. Grown heifers to the trade sold from 384c to 450c and feeder activity from 387c to 438c/kg.

Manufacturing steers sold to a top of 300c/kg.

Heavy cows made from 314c to 360c with the lighter pens making to a top of 300c/kg. Bulls ranged from 295c to 305c/kg.

NUMBERS fell this week as agents offered 556 head of liveweight and open auction cattle.

These sold to the usual field of trade and processor buyers along with feeder and restocker orders.

Quality was mixed with a wintry feel over the pens with a number of cattle coming off grain helping to boost the quality on offer as the market ranged from firm to dearer in price.

NUMBERS lifted a little as agents yarded 5,370 lambs and 1,171 sheep to total 6,541 head overall. These sold to a larger field of trade and processor buyers along with a number of active restockers.

Quality was similar to the week before with a wide range of type, weight and quality coming forward as the market sold from firm to dearer rates this week.

Light lambs to the trade made from \$88 to \$157 with the light weight trade score 2 and 3 selection making from \$155 to \$164/head.

Restockers turned lambs back out from \$113 to \$159/head.

An increase 23 head of open auction cattle in the yarding of mostly good quality cattle was offered to the regular processor buying field, supported by feeder and restocker activity.

Vealer steers and heifers were too few in number to quote. Finished steers ranged from 330 c/kg to 415 c/kg.

Yearling steers ranged from 100c/kg to 502c/kg and young heifers from 100c/kg to 480c/kg.

Grown heifers were too few to quote.

Cows sold from 150c/kg to 352c/kg, stronger than the previous market.

Overall, prices were firm to dearer.

Only one bull was offered, returning 285c/kg.

The next sale at the Millicent Saleyards will be held on July 7, upon the completion of the Mount Gambier market.

New Ag visa set to help with seasonal workforce

A NEW seasonal agriculture visa was announced last week in the wake of the Australia-UK free trade agreement.

The new visa should help producers struggling to find seasonal workers.

As part of the FTA negotiations the working holiday visa age limit will increase to 35 and the maximum length of stay will be extended to three years.

"A new visa will be established to ensure we increase the number of UK backpackers willing and able to undertake agricultural work, building on and adding to the success of the existing Pacific Labour Scheme," Member for Barker, Tony Pasin said.

The new visa will be modelled on the existing Seasonal Worker Program and is expected to be up and running for UK citizens by the end of the year, before being ex-

panded to all ten ASEAN countries.

"Our agricultural work force has been hit hard by international travel restrictions on the back of COVID," Mr Pasin said.

"South Australia has led the way with the quarantine facility at Paringa. This really saved the SA citrus crop this year and hopefully when the new Agricultural Visa comes into effect, we can be equally accommodating to help more farmers get our produce off the trees, out of the ground and off to market."

South Australia's agriculture industry is expected to generate \$66.3 billion this year.

"It's an industry that, with the help of our 15 free trade agreements, has huge potential. A reliable workforce is vital to help reach this potential and that's what this new ag visa hopes to achieve," Mr Pasin said.

Winter market impresses

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A WINTER market has kicked off a significant schedule at the Riddoch Arts and Cultural Centre with more than 2000 eager residents getting a first-hand glimpse at local art.

Held over the weekend in conjunction with the popular Illuminate Adelaide Digital Garden event, 20 stallholders filled the Mount Gambier City Hall complex for the Winter Solstice Artisan Market.

Indoor numbers were capped at 199 due to COVID-19 restrictions, causing hundreds to wait patiently for their turn at observing and shopping with the handmade vendors.

HYUNDAI has announced pricing and specification for the new 2021 i30 N, which goes on sale in July.

With a variety of new features to improve both everyday and high-performance driving situations, it is a racetrack-capable everyday sporty car.

The upgraded 2.0-litre turbocharged petrol engine now delivers 206kW.

This is an increase of 4kW over the original i30 N and is available with both six-speed manual and double-clutch auto.

Maximum torque has been increased by 39Nm to 392Nm.

The new i30 N maintains maximum torque between 2,100 and 4,700 rpm and achieves maximum power at 6,000 revs.

It can get from zero to 100 km/h in 5.4 secs, a significant improvement of 0.7 seconds.

In the double clutch auto, drivers can enter manual mode in the auto setting and shift gears by using the paddle shifters on the steering wheel or on the gear lever.

How to prune roses

KALANGADOO ROSE GROWER

I AM often asked when it is the right time to prune roses and my answer is very simple: any day after June 21 will be fine.

Rose plants are dormant in winter - no flowers, no leaves, just sticks in the ground.

It is exactly at this stage that we need to give them a good "haircut" and the right start for a new big growth in spring time.

Do not be too afraid when you decide to prune your roses and just follow these simple steps.

Bush Roses and Shrubs

1. Remove two thirds of each stem.
2. Cut out any old and dead wood, if possible.
3. In older bushes, create some space in the middle of the plant, cutting out any central canes that look too close to each other or are spindly and remove spent leaf matter from the middle of the plant.
4. Prune the bush to shape.

Standard Roses

We call "Standard" a rose grafted on a straight stem, so it looks like a ball-shape on top of a stick that can be 60, 90 or 120cm high.

1. Remove one half - two third of the plant.
2. Cut out any dead and old wood - it is your new season's wood that will produce flowers.
3. Prune to the shape you like.
4. Use a wire brush to remove old bark around the crown, to promote new growth.

Climbing Roses

The general pruning rule of thumb mentioned for bushes and standards can have serious consequences for a climber and the approach needs to be very different.

It is more about training and shaping the plant, than cutting and reducing its size.

1. Encourage the central canes to grow towards the trellis or the support you want to use.
2. Cut out any dead or old wood, as well as spindly and crossing over canes.
3. Do not touch the new growth, as this will give you flowers the following spring.
4. Remember the main canes form the structure of the plant and the lateral canes produce the blooms. The main canes should be trained from the base to the top, allowing the lateral canes to grow horizontally from the base.
5. Space the lateral canes 30-40cm apart and secure them on the support with a soft tie or any material that will not cut into the rose cane.



PLAN: Have a good look at your roses before deciding where and what to prune.

6. Look at the number of the main canes, decide which ones can be removed and leave as many as required to fill in the area - normally around five or six.
7. Cut out the surplus lateral canes.

For all kind of roses, always remember these two important tips:

- Do not prune roses on a wet or rainy day, as the cut area will not have that protective layer of woody cells which normally form in dry conditions and use a fungal spray after pruning.
- Be sure to clean up all the cut wood from beneath the rose you have just pruned to avoid any potential disease during the growing season.

A DECENT weekend weatherwise was enjoyed by anglers across the Limestone Coast.

The sea backing off and the wind doing the same made for some excellent fishing trips.

Port MacDonnell has been a hot spot for a few weeks now, with plenty of the offshore guys making the most of the cool but calm weather.

The tuna news has been scattered, but still quite good.

Some fishos are finding the schools of school-sized tuna in relatively close to shore, some days as close as 20 or 30 metres deep, whereas others are not finding the fish until much deeper water, 200 metres or even more in some cases.

The numbers are still excellent - just keep on the move and they should pop up somewhere.

The big fish news has still all come from over the Victorian border, but the fish seem to be heading our way.

Warrnambool, Port Fairy and Portland have been the go-to areas in recent weeks, but most are getting the feeling now the fish have been on the run west, hopefully to our waters very soon.

The shark and deep fishing over the weekend was excellent again off Port MacDonnell.

Plenty of boaties make the trip to the shelf on Sunday and found some excellent hapuka, blue eye and gemfish, while the anglers fishing the shallower water found a nice mix of gummy and school sharks, along with plenty of red snapper, flathead and morwong.

A few boaties had a crack at the inshore sharks down along the coast and it is encouraging to see there are still plenty about.

Flinty Point, Danger Point and Green Point are all very productive areas and this weekend proved no different.

The 7-15m zone has been red hot for a couple of months now and is not really showing any signs of slowing down just yet.

Gummy and school sharks have been the main targets, with fish in excess of 25kg caught in both species, but there are also a few salmon, pike and even whiting sniffing around in the same areas, so throwing down smaller baits does not hurt.

Surf fishos have tucked into the salmon this weekend.

The dead flat conditions of the last week made the going a little tough, but the stir up during the week has spurred them into gear.

Jake Dowdy, Stewie McLaughlin and Dyl Vanderhoorst managed a heap to 1.5kg over the weekend on 35-50g metal slugs.

The Beachport Salmon Hole has been a bit hot and cold.

Some days anglers find countless numbers of smaller lumpies, while other sessions the numbers are down, but the big Jackie salmon to 3kg or more are in.

It is a real flip of the coin but this time of year, you should be almost a certainty to beach a few.

Canunda and its beaches have been productive this week.

The usual spots such as the old drain, Whale Rock, Channel Rock and the Oil Rig are all fishing well and the size of the fish seems to be pretty good too.

Garfish numbers have been excellent.

I have seen some catches of not only big numbers, but big fish too.

The usual haunts such as Cape Douglas, Hutt Bay, Livingstons and Pelican Point have been fairly productive for both the boaties and waders and fishos have also mentioned some pretty big tommy ruff coming around the burley trail too.

There have been plenty of fishos taking to the local jetties this week.

Beachport and Southend have been very popular and there has been some nice fish caught.

I have heard of salmon, tommy ruff, trevally, bream and flathead caught down that way and even the odd squid still.

With the school holidays only a couple of weeks away, these are great places to take the kids for a night or two, or even just a day trip.

You also have Robe, Cape Jaffa and Kingston which are all within couple of hours drive from us here in the South East and with similar fishing to Beachport and Southend, they are definitely spots worth throwing a line in.

There has only been a handful of river reports this week, which is probably less than most of us had hoped for.

The mullet fishing has not been red hot by any stretch of the imagination, but Karl Leggett has been boating a few smaller fish on trolled lures around the Donovans area.

The bream have been a bit patchy, but there are still plenty about if you are willing to keep on the move and track them down.

The productive lures for the bream have been natural coloured grubs and minnows in a 2.5 inch to 3-inch profile.

Some fishos have reported a bit of colour starting to come down the river now from that last bit of rain we had, which will only do good things for the fishing.

The forecast for the coming week looks a bit wet and a bit windy, but the keen anglers will not be deterred.

The river and protected bays will be worth a look - just keep an eye on conditions if you are planning an offshore trip.

Until next week, safe fishing.

Club experiences growth

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FISHING is one sport which has been enjoyed by South Australians through most of the coronavirus pandemic, while across the border Victorians have not been so lucky.

Numbers taking up the hobby are on the increase, while organisations such as the Port MacDonnell Offshore Angling Club have enjoyed new members.

The PMOAC runs the popular tuna and sportsfish tournament each year, with the 2021 variant - the 40th running - as popular as ever, with 119 anglers and 42 boats.

Prizes are handed out for tuna to shark and many other species, with line class awards and a prize of a boat package which attracts many keen anglers.

Last year's event was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but this year all went to plan.

"I think people saw it as an outlet to get back to some sort of normality," club secretary Glen Sparks said.

"The weather was good and there was only one day we couldn't fish.

"We made a regulation once the sea and wind got to a certain level we wouldn't weigh any fish, so it wasn't worth people going out.

"We also brought in a regulation any tuna had to be gilled and gutted, which looks after the flesh.

"Everyone gilled and gutted their fish and there were some great fish came in."

The event itself has previously been recognised in the local Australia Day awards as an outstanding event.

Sparks said there were many reasons to be a part of such a club, with the fishing the obvious attraction.

"Fishing is an outlet, like a pressure relief valve," he said.

"Once you get out on the ocean - it sounds strange, but if you ever see the sunrise from the ocean it is just magnificent.

"You have nothing on your mind than what you are doing, so it takes you away from the everyday humdrum."

The club began back in 1977 after a meeting at the old Brown Brothers building.

From there it simply progressed and went from strength to strength.

The club was responsible for building the first toilet block down at the current site, along with the clubrooms and the original boat ramp.

The club boasts 171 members, 17 of those juniors, with facilities to ensure those big catches are recorded correctly.

That provides a chance for members to claim world records, with two currently pending.

To claim a world record, certain criteria has to be met, which can all be organised through the club.

Weighing fish in also provides the added incentive of more prizes.

Those members who weigh a fish in go into a monthly draw for prizes such as reels and other gear.

Sparks said one other advantage of the PMOAC was the willingness to share information.

"Some fishermen won't share where they catch their fish, but down here they do," he said.

"There is a lot of experience here to learn from.

"The good part is you have the young kids coming up who are really keen and want to know everything, then you have the older blokes who have the experience and are happy to share."

Sparks said the membership had certainly

grown through the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I think the parents are keen to get the kids off the electronics," he said.

Sparks said the support from Limestone Coast businesses was pleasing, with Ploenges Marine on board for many years with the boat package for the tuna fishing tournament.

He said there were now only three game fishing clubs in South Australia, with two in Adelaide and one at Port MacDonnell.

While game fishing may seem a bit daunting to some, Sparks said you only need a small boat to fish around the bay.

The PMOAC will hold its AGM on July 11 at the clubrooms, with an 11am start and a barbecue to follow.

Following his recent relocation, Trengove, accompanied by his Two Wells-based cousin Harry Trengove, made his first trip to Mount Gambier's Tara Raceway last Thursday with eight runners.

The 23-year-old, who has been training greyhounds for seven years, did pretty well when landing a treble with Curiouser, It's A Louie and Jackie's Exhibit - all coming off recent wins at Broken Hill.

Curiouser, a daughter of Fernando Bale and middle-distance winner Kapitalos, looked particularly good in the 512-metre Bartholomew Pick 6 Stake when leading all the way to defeat Connie's Entity by 7¼ lengths in a quick 29.77 seconds.

Purchased by Trengove from Adelaide in February, he is the fourth trainer for Curiouser.

He has now won three races with her,

while her overall tally of wins is 14 - accumulated in three states.

It's A Louie, a son of Worm Burner and Batty Allen and bred in Broken Hill by the trainer's father, Clayton, had raced early in the year at Tara Raceway when trained by his uncle, Clint Trengove.

That was on a day when only six races were run due to kennel house cooling problems, the blue dog leading all the way for a quick Juvenile win over 400 metres in 22.99 seconds.

Last Thursday's win saw It's A Louie once again lead all the way when defeating cousin Harry's Bottled Fury by 4½ lengths in 23.22 seconds in the Bourne Kennels Stake.

Jack Trengove's treble came in the form of a quinella in the 400-metre South Eastern Hotel Stake when Jackie's Exhibit led all the way to defeat Invictus Lenny by three lengths in 23.47 seconds.

By Champion Exhibit, who sired only two litters, Jackie's Exhibit is out of Monster Foxy, a nine-race winner and member of the successful Cape Hawke x Rustic Reeta litter.

In fact, Sweet Savage, a winner of five races over the 400-metre journey at Gawler and the dam of Hostile Raven, also a win-

ner last Thursday, is a litter sister to Monster Foxy.

Wrapping up a good day for the Trengove clan was Harry Trengove's Material Girl who took over the running off the back when defeating Compton Tess by 3¾ lengths in 23.42 seconds in the Produce Store Stake (400m).

Come Sunday and it was the turn of Clint Trengove (the father of Harry and uncle of Jack) to get among the winners at Tara Raceway.

First it was with For Five Seconds, a maiden winner at her first start in early June at Tara Raceway, who led all the way in the Bourne Kennels Maiden/One Win Stake (400m) to defeat Compton Casey by 1¼ lengths in a quick 23.09 seconds.

Then it was Born A Runner who staged a terrific performance in the Rock's Tavern Stake (512m) when leading all the way to defeat Smokey River by 3¾ lengths in a best of day 29.65 seconds.

Raced in partnership with Michael Wallworth of Gisborne, Born A Runner is now on her seventh trainer after joining Trengove's Lewiston kennels in April.

All told, she has now won five races, two of those in SA at Gawler and Mount Gambier.

The red brindle bitch is a daughter of Collision and Duna Runa, a winner of 11 races and \$37,000 in stakemoney.

Duna Runa is also a litter sister to Cee Me Burst, winner of the 2015 Winter Classic (512m) at Tara Raceway for Tracie Price.

Another recent family success story at Tara Raceway has been that of Two Wells sisters Kiah and Jayde Hurley - Kiah successful on June 13 with Sarcasmic over 400 metres in a quick 22.84 seconds.

Jayde then followed up four days later with Ikaruga Bale, a 5¼ lengths winner over Picogram in 23.11 seconds.

Back in Mount Gambier on Sunday, Kiah was successful in the Gordon Refrigeration Stake (512m) with Sell More Houses who brought up his fifth win for connections after being purchased for \$2500 from NSW in February.

Two races later she brought up a double when Lily's Lad strung together his fourth consecutive win after leading all the way in the Greg Martlew Autos Stake (400m) in a quick 22.92 seconds.

Purchased as a pup by the Hurley family, the son of Barcia Bale x Gloria's Bills was resuming after a minor injury.

Connections expect further improvement from Lily's Lad.

MOUNT Gambier trainers continue to rack up winners and veteran trainer Trevor White has joined that list.

White took Clever Man, a relative newcomer to his stable to Gawler last week and came home a winner when the gelding won the 2100-metre BM 54 handicap.

Clever Man was purchased for a jumping career and defied a betting drift (\$3.50-\$6.50) to salute after being given the run of the race by Kayla Crowther.

As far as the Casterton meeting is concerned, it does not matter how much rain we get this week as the river valley track is one of the best wet weather tracks in Victoria.

"It is a typical winter program with three jumping races and five flat races, however, we may end up with four jumping races as there are so many maiden hurdlers in work this season," Casterton Racing Club general manager John Donnelly said.

"Crowd restrictions at Victorian country meetings have been lifted and we will welcome spectators with open arms.

"Patrons can either book on line or pay at the gate for what should be a good day's racing."

Of the local contingent heading to Casterton, trainer Michael O'Leary may be the one to follow with Action In Cairns - a close fourth last start at Warrnambool - in the 1400-metre 0-58, and Emil - dare we give him one more chance? - in the 2000-metre 0-58.

TO the dismay of its many loyal clients, the West Gambier TAB is in the final week of operation.

The door will close for the final time at 5.30pm next Wednesday, June 30, after 49 years of service to the public.

There is strong speculation tomorrow - Saturday being the biggest day of trading - sandwiches and nibbles will be supplied for the faithful to enjoy.

JUMP OUTS SOON TO BE PROGRAMMED

WE are accustomed to having official trials conducted at most local race meetings in the Limestone Coast.

They are run after the final race, often in fading light during the winter months and they can be cancelled at the last minute should the race meeting be called off at some stage during the day.

The other alternative, soon to be introduced, will be jump outs to be conducted on non-race days at various local tracks, including Millicent.

The main difference between official trials and jump outs is licensed jockeys can ride in the trials, while track riders - who are unlicensed - can ride in the jump outs.

New Limestone Coast steward Darren Holland has been given the responsibility

of introducing the local jump outs and recently undertook a course with fellow stewards in Adelaide

"It is more for the babies (young horses) to get their barrier passes to race," Holland explained.

"I have not heard back from the stewards in Adelaide as to when the jump outs will commence, but I am hopeful it will be at the start of next season (from August 1)."

WENT DOWN LIKE DOMINOES

IF you were looking for a "demolition derby" Tuesday night, the Greenwald Paceway was the place to be.

Only one pacer was left standing in the NR 40 pace after the Andrew Clarke driven Selaphobia fell heading down the back straight the final time when racing in second spot.

That produced a domino effect and the other three runners, Bayside Victory, Citysiren and Ramsey's Hope, all dislodged their respective drivers - Brent Howard, David Millard and Kayla Hryhorec.

In what was a fortunate result, no serious damage was done and Hryhorec was the only one taken to hospital with minor injuries.

The hot \$1.22 favourite Seal The Destiny was left to finish the race by himself and give trainer Barry Finnis and driver Jayson Finnis the second leg of an early double.

The pair had won the opening event with the well supported Royal Speech (\$1.75-\$1.35 fav.) who overcame a wide run to score by a metre.

Trainer David Phillips was in the winner's stall after the final event when Badluckbaz was backed from \$3.10 into \$2.20 favourite to give driver Mark Phillips his seventh winner of the local season.

Only 15 runners, all Limestone Coast trained horses, went around in the three races.

It is my understanding Victorian trained pacers are currently disallowed from crossing the border, not due to COVID but because of a ruling from Harness Racing SA.

Meanwhile, local trainer Ray Latin continues to make hay while the sun shines with his pacer Don't Need An Excuse.

The five-year-old gelding made it two wins on consecutive Saturdays at Globe Derby Park as the \$2.60 favourite in the NR 49 pace last Saturday night.

Flat stick magic

IT is no secret chipping and putting well can turn an average round of golf into a potential winner.

That was the case again on Saturday for Damian Smith who took out the par competition at the Mount Gambier Golf Club with an excellent +5.

Playing off a handicap of 14, Smith was lucky to escape with a half on the par-five first hole, but he quickly hit his stride with pars on the second, third and fourth to move to +3.

Two of those pars came courtesy of chip and one putts, something Smith acknowledged had played a big part in his win.

"That part of my game was very good ... I only ended up having 25 putts for the round," he said.

After a bogey the fifth hole for a half, he had another one-putt hole on the par 3 sixth, getting up-and-down from the bunker for a par to remain at +3.

A regulation par on the seventh hole took his score to +4 and another chip-and-putt on the signature par 3 eighth kept him on that number.

A bogey four on the ninth saw him make the turn at +4 and he wasted no time advancing to +5 with a regulation two putt on the difficult par three 10th.

Bogeys on the 11th and 12th kept his score on that mark before he produced an incredible shot on the par 4 13th.

An errant drive ended up on the adjacent 14th fairway, but a fantastic three-wood over trees to just short of the 13th green was followed by another chip-and-putt for a par to move to +6.

He dropped his first shot of the round on the 14th after finding bunker trouble, but a par on the 15th for a half and yet another par from just off the front of the 16th green quickly got him back to +6.

A bogey on the 17th for a half set him up for the victory, although the easy par 4 18th again proved his nemesis.

"I should have made an easy par after driving down the middle, but I just can't seem to hit a decent second shot on that hole," he said.

Still, a +5 was good enough to finish on top of the leaderboard, one clear of Simon Tulak.

Playing off a 15 handicap, Tulak could count himself unlucky not to win thanks to the vagaries of the par round scoring system.

For example, a birdie on the first hole gave him a plus, but on a par would have given him the same result.

After ending the front nine on -1, not helped by double bogeys on the third and seventh holes, he needed an extraordinary back nine to move into contention.

He made a good start with a par on the 10th hole to get back to square, but gave that straight back with another double bogey at the par 5 11th.

Lucindale is looking to stay in contact with the top five and will be fired up, but Padthaway is in good form at the moment and should get across the line.

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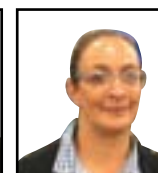
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Winter season winding down

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Locals protect home soil

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LIMESTONE Coast running talent has defended home soil in the 2021 Tower Trail Run 56km ultramarathon, with Mount Gambier man Danny Habets and Millicent woman Danni Vanderheul outlasting all challengers.

Near-perfect conditions greeted the field of locals, a strong contingent of Adelaide runners and some interstate competitors, all eager to test themselves around Mount Gambier's iconic Crater Lakes precinct.

The 56km ultramarathon was one of four distances on offer for an entrant list of around 250, with runners and walkers of all ages competing in the 5km short course, while the 21km event produced some of the fastest segments of the day, including a new men's and women's course record.

Race day had been a long time coming for Tower Trail Run race director Phil Ackland, with last year's postponement meaning some entries had been entered as early as November 2019.

Despite the lengthy lead-in, Ackland said the entries were almost identical to the 2019 event - the biggest on record - with a swarm of late entries flowing in across all distances this year.

"It was a matter of people not knowing - a lot of people would have held off," Ackland said, referring to the ever-changing COVID-19 situation and subsequent restrictions.

"There is always a late rush but it was really pronounced this year."

Ackland said the 5km event - now in its second year - remained a popular feature given it carried no lower age limit, allowing children and families to tackle the trails.

FINDING HIS FEET AGAIN

Danny Habets has a humble, no-fuss approach to his running but the results speak volumes to his calibre - both on road and trail.

Sunday's 56km outright victory in a time of 5:31.15 capped off a long road back to running for Habets, with the long-limbed 45-year-old conceding the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic caused significant disruption to his motivation and fitness in 2020.

Habets started running competitively in 2007, leading to several strong results in road marathons, being crowned the inaugural Blue Lake Fun Run winner, and two strong showings at the ultra-test of endurance at the then-North Face 100km trail race in the Blue Mountains - now known as Ultra-Trail Australia.

In recent years Habets has turned his focus to triathlons and adventure races - endurance events which combine multiple disciplines

such as running, swimming, biking, kayaking and more.

However, his fitness pursuits came to a grinding halt last year as a combination of cancellations and border restrictions limited event options, while the closure of the Olympic Park swimming pool impacted his swim routine.

"I sort of pretty much just wrote it (2020) off," Habets said, adding he gained weight as his training routine lapsed.

"I sort of lost interest a little bit and didn't really do a hell of a lot."

It was an invitation by a friend to tackle the Kangaroo Island half marathon - held in April this year - that re-stoked the fire inside Habets and helped turn his focus to a shot at hometown glory on the Tower Trail Run course.

"It was a bit of a struggle to get back running and I really struggled the first sort of month," Habets said.

Habets worked his way up to a training volume of around 90kms per week in early June, before tapering off to recover in preparation of four laps of the 14km loop, which takes in iconic features such as the Blue Lake, Leg of Mutton and Centenary Tower.

"The plan came together really well, the nutrition and everything was where I wanted it to be. The weather was good too," Habets said.

While muscle spasms and cramp threatened to derail his race in the third and fourth laps, Habets held firm to finish just shy of nine minutes ahead of Penola runner Justin McDonald.

They were followed by Jan De Braconier Harders and Howard Norton, while women's winner Vanderheul and runner-up, Mount Gambier woman Anna Mitchell, finished fifth and sixth outright.

"I hit the wall a little bit in those last couple of laps but I was just drinking, trying to get the electrolytes in and get some food in," Habets said.

Praising the support of his race day crew and close friends, Habets will now turn his attention to the 63km Wonderland Run, scheduled for late August in the picturesque Grampians.

TRAILS OFFER SOMETHING FOR ALL

"There is always a percentage of entrants that are out to be competitive and hunt for those top positions, but people sign up for a whole

range of reasons," Tower Trail Run race director Phil Ackland explains.

"For some it is a race against themselves, for others it might be a day out on the trails with their friends," he said.

"A lot of times it is people doing an event for the first time and it's more about the adventure of going somewhere new and seeing the scenery."

It is that adventurous spirit, coupled with the iconic surrounds of Mount Gambier's volcanic crater lakes, that Ackland believes sets the Blue Lake city event apart.

"People will travel all sorts of distances just to do a specific event," he said.

"We had a lot of people quite deliberately stay in town Friday night so they could do Parkrun on Saturday morning and then the Tower Trail event while they were here.

"It was a great example of one thing playing off the other and expanding the time spent in the region."

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THE excitement is building as the South Australian Country Football Championships approach, with the Murray South East Zone Squad set.

The championships take place on July 10 and 11 July in Victor Harbor, with training for the MSE squad on Sunday, July 4 at Keith.

From there a final team of 24 will be selected, including at least two Under 21 players.

Penola's Adam Merrett takes the reins as coach, with assistants, River Murray's Wayne Knowles, Western Border's Steve Duldig and Mid South East's Ben McGregor.

While the squad has been set, the selectors have the ability to add players before the championships.

As it stands Merrett is happy with the players he has at his disposal, noting all are keen to be a part of the representative program.

"It was harder than normal to get the KNT guys," Merrett said.

"I am still actively playing at Penola, so you get to look at some of the guys, but we haven't played every team.

"Not playing at interleague, you don't get the chance to sit back and watch them at the next level.

"I had to do as much ringing around and talking to the coaches as I could to get the players that want to play.

"The squad we have picked, they have all put their hand up to say they want to play zone rep footy and that's what I like about it."

Merrett said quite simply it was the buy-in from the players which helped create a strong side.

"I want blokes who want to go away and play," he said.

"If we can get 22 out of that list of 55 or so I will be pretty happy.

"There are some good names there and there will be some unlucky blokes missing out.

"I just think it is important we get that buy-in from our good players to show there is still a good brand of footy and good footballers in our area."

Selection criteria has changed somewhat this year, with 24 players to go away rather than 25, while only two Under 21 are required, down from the previous five.

It all seems simple enough but Merrett has faced the tyranny of distance, playing himself each weekend and only two leagues participating in the SE Zone interleague competition this year.

It is clear Merrett is excited about the team he can possibly select and its chances of success.

"We have some handy names there to play at the next level," he said.

"To get a Matt Willson back into Zone footy, depending on (Mark) Rumbelow if he can up and about - we know he has the raw talent.

"Nick McInerney is in really good form - he played great in the interleague and had his first crack at the Zone two years ago.

"He will be better for the experience.

"Your Darron McElroys of the world - the way he plays his football.

"Watching him in the interleague was fantastic.

"He is a ruckman who can play like a ruck rover - his hunger and second, third and fourth efforts are what you need at the next level.

"He will lead by example if he gets a crack."

The list goes on, with Merrett rattling off names at will and why they should have a chance to represent the region at the next level.

He mentioned such names as River Murray's Adam Diamond, a "gun" on-baller, how Ben Warner is in "career-best form" at Kingston, and why the experience of Scott Merrett and Brad Bryant would be beneficial to the side.

"Hopefully we can get 80pc of these blokes at training on that Sunday at Keith and I can have a selection drama," Merrett said.

"Let's hope we can put a decent list together and have another crack at it.

"We have been fairly successful over the last seven or eight years at Zone level - last round we dropped off the pace a bit and only won one game.

"Let's hope we can have a good list to pick from on that Sunday and we can take 24 good footballers away hungry for success."

Apart from the chance to go away and win at a high level, Merrett said this year the stakes were even higher.

"On the back of Sunday's meeting about the three leagues and the footy reforms, it would be nice to see us go away and play some good football," he said.

"This reform they are talking about - if we need one or not - is about change for the better.

"Maybe as part of that change we could see a River Murray coming in once a year and form a four-league interleague weekend.

"It would be fantastic if we could make that happen."

The WBFL has worked hard to keep the Cats this side of the border, while it is hard to imagine the competition without the likes of East involved.

For the two teams to leave, the league would simply not be viable.

A meeting was held on Sunday at Naracoorte between the WBFL, SANFL representatives and those from the Mid South East and Kowree Naracoorte Tatiara leagues.

A further meeting is set down for October, where the situation will be discussed again.

Summers said the WBFL instigated the meeting, with the hope to sort out any problems facing the sport in the South East into the future.

The situation is so dire, one suggestion floated by the WBFL was to dissolve the league voluntarily, with the six clubs then left to find a place to play.

That suggestion opened the lines of discussion, which Summers said the league had wanted to do for many years.

As the biggest regional city in South Aus-

tralia, it is only reasonable for Mount Gambier to have a strong league in place.

After what is believed to be a healthy discussion, no decision was made.

It leaves the WBFL with no real options at this stage but to simply wait and see what unfolds, which is not ideal for the sport or the league.

"We can't as a league wait until October's meeting for a decision," Summers said.

"We need a decision early September, or late August.

"Once the grand final hits, players want to know where they are going and you start to lose players."

Summers said the WBFL simply wanted to be on the front foot with the SANFL to say they need help.

"We wanted to have a discussion with every league and club in the same room instead of going back and forth to try to get something to happen," he said.

"All the clubs were invited, the SANFL was there and the netball associations were invited too.

"Numbers suggest we are all declining, so whether it happens this year or into the future, there will be clubs that won't be around any more.

"Spectators are not coming, players are sick of playing each other every five weeks, the revenue is not there and it is harder to get sponsorship.

"We are trying our best to help the clubs, but it is getting harder."

Summers said the league would continue on with six clubs, but if Casterton Sandford and East Gambier leave, it will simply not survive.

SANFL Football Operations Coordinator SE Michael Mourbey said the SANFL would look at the situation and make a decision in time.

"The meeting (Sunday) was led by SANFL, from Lisa Faraci and myself," he said.

"We wanted to talk about various matters, but one of the things we were focusing on was the future sustainability of football in the South East and we have clubs and leagues operating at their maximum capacity in 10-20 years time.

"We have looked at population graphs to see where growth might occur and to see if the fit we have at the moment is the right fit moving forward."

The regional football council will now undertake a survey over the coming weeks and present back to the same group with options into the future.

Mourbey said a final decision was never going to be made on the day of the meeting.

He agreed a major centre such as Mount Gambier should have a "vibrant football competition", to include teams from the city and surrounding areas where possible.

He also suggested the three leagues and all clubs also need to take responsibility for the future of the sport.

"What we did say at the meeting was we are all part of the community of football in the South East," Mourbey said.

"We all have a responsibility to ensure everyone is playing football to the best of their ability and capacity."
