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'Holey' hell

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NEGLIGENCE, rainfall and lack of maintenance has left a number of State Government roads littered with potholes, prompting a Limestone Coast council to issue an urgent demand to fix the dangerous defects before a fatal crash occurs.

Motorists along a number of key roads - including the Princes Highway, Southern Ports Highway, Mount Burr Road and Millicent-Penola Road - are being forced to plough vehicles through rapidly expanding potholes, with dozens of drivers reporting flat

tires and damaged rims.

At last week's meeting, Wattle Range Council voted to write a letter to Infrastructure and Transport Minister Corey Wingard asking for repairs to be undertaken to the Princes Highway between Millicent and Mount Gambier after the state of the road was labelled "horrific" by a senior executive officer.

Wattle Range mayor Des Noll (pictured) has urged the State Government to undertake permanent road repairs as a matter of urgency to boost safety across the region.

SA'S STAY AT HOME RESTRICTIONS

REASONS TO LEAVE HOME

- Care and compassion reasons.
- Essential work.
- Purchase of essential goods, such as food.
- Medical reasons including COVID-19 testing and vaccination.
- Exercise - only with people from the same household and within a 2.5km radius of your home or workplace (before, after or during your shift). 90 minutes maximum per day.

As of Thursday, single people can leave home to visit a friend or partner (if aged over 16 and they live alone).

OTHER CHANGES

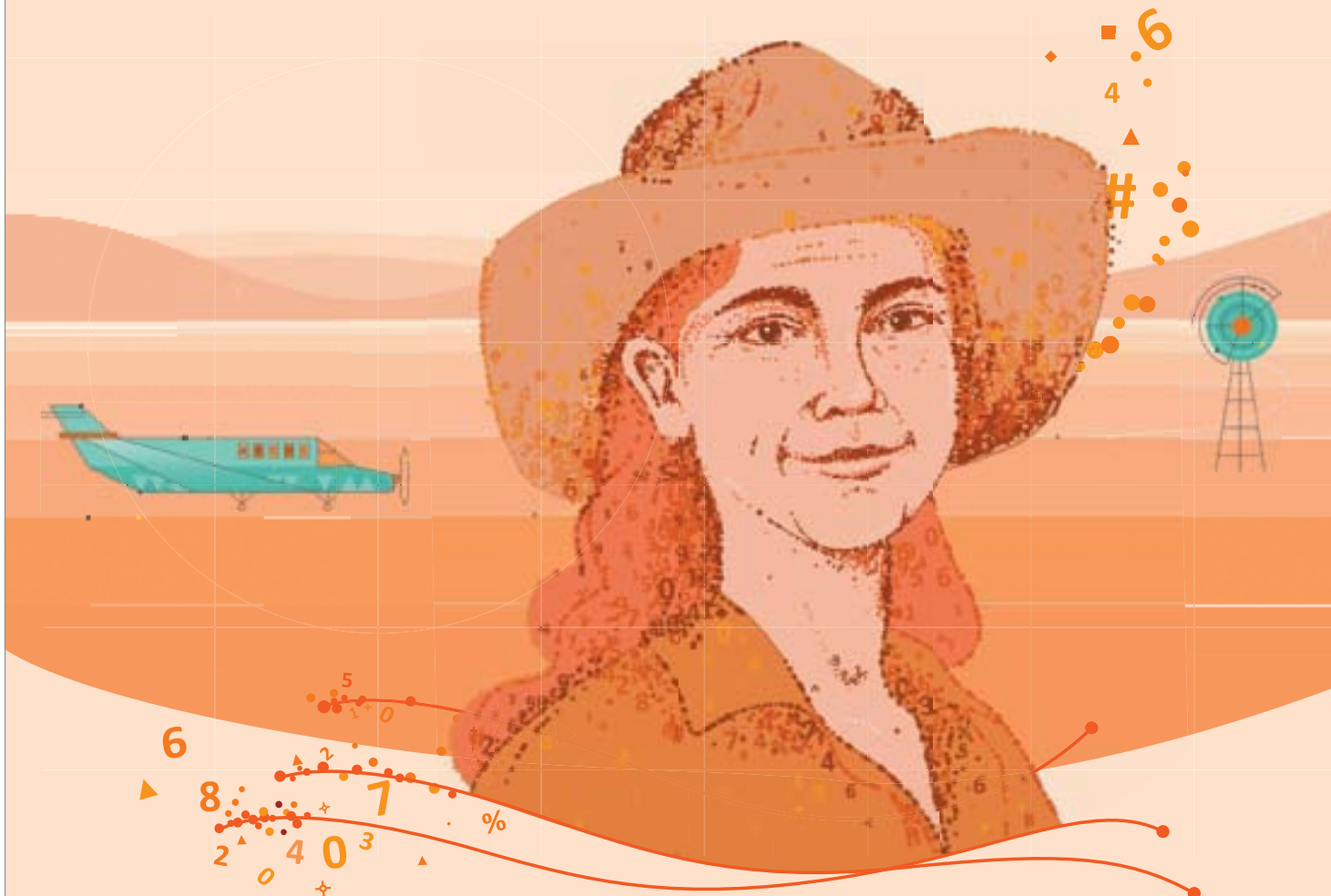
- Schools closed but open for children of essential workers.

- Face masks must be worn in public places. They are not required at schools, while exercising outdoors and in office buildings (unless face-to-face public interactions occur). Masks are also not required for people under 12, those with a relevant medical condition, if the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication or the removal is required for identification purposes.
- Visitors are not permitted to any Limestone Coast Local Health Network site, with exceptions available for maternity and end-of-life visits.
- All elective surgeries across the region have been cancelled. Category-1 surgeries will be judged on a case-by-case basis.

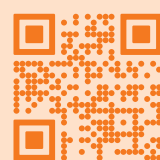
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Forestry industry fires up

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THE region's timber industry is back in full swing after Tuesday's lockdown announcement caused "chaos" across the sector but strict COVID-19 testing requirements continue to burden freight workers.

Freight workers completing cross-border movements can now operate within a 100km radius but are required to undertake a COVID test every 48 hours, with drivers parking their vehicles on Pick Avenue and walking onto the testing site.

Green Triangle Forestry Hub chairperson Ian McDonnell said the initial lockdown announcement caused chaos for the sector, adding consistent testing requirements were becoming onerous.

"Health wise it is a challenge for drivers even though they are able to get their test and continue on their way," Mr McDonnell said.

"It is time consuming for them and at the moment the only place they are able to get tested is at the Mount Gambier Showgrounds, which can be dangerous if there are multiple trucks there at a time."

The Mount Gambier COVID-19 testing station on Tuesday was forced to close due to bad weather, briefly disrupting drivers' testing regimes and threatening to stop some from completing cross-border movements due to not having an up-to-date test.

"It astounds me that something as important as getting tested at the station can be stopped due to a windy day, we would hope there would have been something more permanent there by now," Mr McDonnell said.

Council reviews bin policy

ALL Grant District ratepayers could receive household and recycling bin collection services following a review of council's waste management offerings.

At this week's meeting, councillors backed a move for a review of council's waste management system ahead of the 2022/23 budget.

Council will undertake research, consultation and costing to consider expanding the household and recycling collection service to all Grant District Council properties.

Staff will also research the cost and benefits of rolling out additional green and food waste bin collection services at townships.

Financial package delivered

MOUNT Gambier Chamber of Commerce president Hayley Neumann has described the State Government's \$100m business package as a "good start" for businesses affected by the state-wide lockdown, but any extended closure would require more assistance.

Businesses that have been forced to close because of the lockdown are eligible for a \$3000 cash grant, while regional workers who have been stood down are eligible for up to \$600 a week in compensation.

The \$100m Business Support Package will help an estimated 50,000 small and medium-sized businesses across the state and also includes a new \$1000 cash grant for eligible small businesses who do not employ staff, such as non-employing sole traders.

South Australians who lose between eight and 20 hours of work will be eligible for \$375, while individuals who lose more than 20 hours will be eligible to receive \$600.

Ms Neumann said although the grants provided some breathing space for employees and businesses, the application process could pose problematic.

"Employees are able to apply for the grants themselves, but they will need a MyGov account if they don't have one already," she said.

"The process for the grants is a bit of a problem; the businesses still have their bills and applying at the end of the seven days is difficult because the process is still really unclear.

"It will be interesting to see what the government defines as a small business because last lockdown it was a business with \$75,000 turnover and a premises, which cancelled out a lot of trade businesses.

"Hopefully these grants give businesses a bit of breathing space for this week, but it's also about the loss of stock and people in the doors.

"It's a start, but these grants are not going to cover profit and businesses are not going to be left with much either."

Premier Steven Marshall announced an extension of the Federal Government's COVID-19 disaster payment scheme on Wednesday morning, which provides disaster payments for areas considered a COVID hotspot.

Mr Marshall said the Federal Government was not in a position to declare a 'hot spot' - which triggers the federal support package - in areas where there have been no cases of COVID.

"We've decided from the state taxpayers perspective we want that hotspot declared across the entire state, even if the Federal Government has a different trigger for that," he said.

COVID-19 CASES INCREASE

AS OF midday Thursday, South Australia had recorded 14 cases of COVID-19 linked to the Modbury cluster.

Seven new cases announced since Wednesday afternoon are linked to Tenafeate Creek Winery at Yattalunga, which had been listed as a high-risk site.

Chief Public Health Officer Professor Nicola Spurrier urged South Australians to stay home and "minimise the reasons" to leave their residence during the lockdown.

A number of new exposure sites associated with positive cases of COVID-19 were announced by SA Health late Wednesday night, including Modbury Hospital Emergency Department, the Elizabeth city centre and two northern suburb schools.

Applications for the grant are expected to open within the next two weeks via the Treasury website and grants will be processed as quickly as possible.

The payments will be paid in arrears for the lockdown and anyone affected can apply through myGOV from Wednesday, July 28.

Businesses forced to adapt at short notice

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LIMESTONE Coast residents are urged to continue supporting the region's economy during and beyond the lockdown as businesses come to terms with the Stay at Home restrictions.

Premier Steven Marshall announced the seven-day statewide lockdown on Tuesday, leaving many businesses in limbo as they reviewed the essential worker classifications.

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell called for the state to adopt a localised approach to COVID-19 outbreaks given the significant economic and social impacts being felt in the region.

Among the small businesses affected in Mount Gambier was Fox's Chook House, with co-owner Amanda Fox stating the butcher relied on foot traffic within the Mount Gambier Central complex to trade.

"There are not many places that are open in Mount Gambier Central this week and the tough thing with fresh produce is that we cannot just lock it up and walk away," Ms Fox said.

"We have had wholesalers of our products that have shut as well so we have more stock than we are used to that we need to sell as soon as we can so it doesn't spoil for our customers.

"We all understand why we are in lockdown but it still provides stress.

"We are all cautious about what is to come out of this week's lockdown and waiting to see whether it will be extended or not."

Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce president Hayley Neumann said the business community understood the health focus of lockdowns, especially on the back of the school holiday period.

However, with no declared hotspots in the region, Ms Neumann said businesses felt frustrated and upset by the restrictions, adding skeleton services such as takeaway-only were not financially viable long-term.

"As soon as a business turns on their

lights, they are paying bills and as soon as an employee walks into the store they are paying wages," she said.

"If a business has fresh produce they cannot guarantee that it will sell."

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell said a statewide lockdown was a "one-size-fits-all" approach and while commending the community safety element, he said the continued lockdowns had a devastating impact on businesses, people and communities.

"My phone rang hot on Tuesday with business owners and employees scrambling for information literally hours before the lockdown deadline, asking me if they fall into the classification of an essential worker," Mr Bell said.

"This needs to be clarified and communicated before it comes into effect and you have to ask whether a case in regional South Australia would spark a lockdown of metropolitan Adelaide."

He said there were thousands of people who live in the state's border communities who were just as important as the people who live in metropolitan areas.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said he understood the lockdown was incredibly frustrating for those living away from declared hotspots and the impacts the decision had upon businesses and the local economy.

"The State Government made the decision and as such is responsible for economic compensation to those businesses and individuals impacted," Mr Pasin said.

Looking to the days ahead, Ms Neumann urged residents to support the local economy where possible.

"We need to help each other out during these times and support each other afterwards," she said.

"Unfortunately we need to go through this so we are just hoping that we can all bounce back from this."

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Region rallies

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THE region's social support services are rallying around vulnerable residents to soften the impact of the statewide lockdown.

Mount Gambier's Australian Red Cross office is offering free face masks to help residents meet the mandatory requirements, providing three disposable masks through a no-contact pick-up.

Australian Red Cross Limestone Coast regional manager David Walshaw would help vulnerable residents continue on with their essential activities in a safe manner.

"A lot of people with those who are vulnerable or cannot afford face masks will be those to receive the free ones but we will also be giving them out to disadvantaged people who don't have access to masks," Mr Walshaw said.

He said the masks were designed to last up to 24 hours if kept clear of potentially unclean areas, such as car floors.

Mr Walshaw said the office would still operate as per usua, providing transport for those in need or who may be in isolation.

Volunteers will also transport food to residents unable to leave home and will conduct phone welfare checks to elderly clients.

"Throughout the last lockdown we saw a lot of non-traditional workers who needed further assistance and they had never been to us before, including university students and even blue collar workers who had no money because they were unable to work."

Foodbank South Australia chief executive Greg Pattinson said workers and volunteers spent the first half of the week preparing for a multitude of clients following the closure of a number of other charities across the state.

Mr Pattinson said Foodbank SA would continue its home delivery program and en-

couraged residents across South Australia to remain calm and sensible throughout the rest of the week.

He said the Foodbank Food Hub in Mount Gambier was prepared for the expected influx and noted last year's lockdown consisted of home deliveries to Mount Burr, Millicent and Kalangadoo.

"We are expecting more home deliveries during this lockdown especially if residents across the Limestone Coast came across from Victoria or have been in isolation due to the exposure site in Tailem Bend," Mr Pattinson said.

"The first point of call for those needing home delivery is those in quarantine and we do suggest if residents are able to leave their homes then they do so in a safe manner to come into our food hub and do their shopping."

He said although volunteers across the Limestone Coast had thus far been comfortable continuing their work, if there was a shortfall the organisation would request assistance online.

Renewal plan slammed

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ONE of Wattle Range Council's highest-ranking officers has slammed the State Government's renewal program and the subsequent "horrific condition" of a number of Limestone Coast roads.

Elected members voted in support of a multi-part motion moved by Councillor Dale Price requesting immediate upgrades on a number of state-owned roads, including the Princes Highway, Kangaroo Flat Road and Mile Hill Road.

While discussing the motion, elected members sought the inclusion of Mount McIntyre Road, Southern Ports Highway and Clay Wells Road.

But Cr Dale Price said an amendment to include more roads could dilute the motion and "make it easier for a bureaucrat to say it's too hard".

Wattle Range Council engineering services director Peter Halton supported listing the roads in the region that require upgrades, saying council should highlight all roads requiring immediate attention.

"I don't think it's up to us to prioritise the way they spend their money, I think it's for us to explain to them that there is a massive backlog in renewal spending across regional areas," he said.

Mr Halton told the chamber that the State Government spends approximately 29pc of what its renewal spend should be.

"We get criticised for not spending 100pc of what our renewal capital is to ensure we are upgrading our assets when they need it," he said.

"The State Government is only spending 29pc - that is horrific and that's why the road is so bad.

"It's unfortunate that we actually need to spell out the safety issues and the damage.

"This is what the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan should be doing - they should actually be focusing on the state of the South Australian roads and our road network."

Mr Halton described the 50km stretch of Princes Highway from Millicent to Mount Gambier as being in a horrific condition and desperately needed upgrades.

"I am looking after council's road network and I'm not too worried as we've got a few minor potholes," he said.

"But I am horrified by the condition of the Princes Highway. I drove across it a couple of times this week and it's falling apart - the government is up for big, big dollars."

The 'highway of holes'

Wattle Range mayor Des Noll - who recently sustained a deflated tyre after hitting a pothole - has urged the State Government to undertake permanent road repairs as a matter of urgency to boost safety across the region.

"Minister Wingard needs to do something urgently about the condition of South Australian regional roads," he said.

"Regional roads in the Wattle Range Council are simply falling apart.

"It's only a matter of time before a fatal accident is caused by poor road condition.

"Our community needs action now."

Millicent resident Tegan Merrett is among the growing number of community members reporting damage as a result of the poorly-maintained roads, shelling out thousands of dollars in repairs.

"I was following a car and there was an oncoming car in the distance on the right hand side of the road," she said.

I saw a rough patch in front of me coming up and I saw the oncoming car and I had no choice but to hit the pothole.

"I immediately knew that I was in trouble after hitting that pothole as it was incredibly loud and I started to notice my steering was affected."

Ms Merrett - who is currently using a hire car to travel to work until her car is fixed - said she was reluctant to travel from Millicent to Mount Gambier in the event of hitting another pothole.

"It's so scary and I feel so unsafe," she said.

"We pay our registration which is also meant to help upkeep the roads, this is simply dangerous and accident is waiting to happen."

While driving along the Millicent-Penola road at 110kph, Millicent resident Sarah Hanaford-Meyers hit a pothole resulting in two bent rims.

"I was able to get second-hand rims for \$100, then \$50 to have it changed over and \$115 for a new tyre," she said.

"I have just got it fixed and moved on, but it's annoying that it happens.

"We have to keep our cars roadworthy to drive on roads that are not car worthy."

The Border Watch sought comment from Mr Wingard, with the Infrastructure and Transport Department responding that the State Government was committed to improving the safety of roads across the state, including in the Limestone Coast.

"A number of road infrastructure upgrades have already been undertaken, or are planned for in the future, in the Wattle Range Council area," a department spokesperson said.

"There was funding in the 2021-22 State Budget for road projects in the Wattle Range Council area, which includes new overtaking lanes and extensions of existing overtaking lanes between Meningie and the South Australian/Victorian border, intersection upgrades near Millicent, audio tactile line marking, safety barrier and rest area upgrades along the Princes Highway, as part of the Princes Highway Corridors Improvement Project."

The department said surface treatments would be undertaken on various sections of the Riddoch Highway between Keith and Mount Gambier, in addition to an overtaking lane on the Riddoch Highway between Edenhope Road and Coonawarra.

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride said a number of constituents had expressed concern about the road conditions and he was endeavouring to get a response from Mr Wingard.

But Shadow Transport Minister Tom Koutsantonis said the State Government had failed to address the continued deterioration of regional roads, adding most of the road infrastructure spend since 2018 has been centred in metropolitan Adelaide.

"The Liberal Party talked a big game before they entered office about what they claim was neglect on regional roads," he said.

"As soon as they got into office, all the people they relied on to vote for them for the last 16 years to keep them competitive while they were losing election after election, they abandoned them.

"The Premier has allocated nearly \$9b on eight kilometres of road on South Road meanwhile regional roads remain in tatters."

Mr Koutsantonis said the State Opposition planned to release a comprehensive infrastructure package ahead of next year's election, which would include road maintenance and new road builds.

"When we announce that, I will come down to the South East and answer people's questions about regional roads," he said.

"Corey Wingard needs to explain to the people of the South East that why over four budgets and \$80b, he couldn't find \$10m or \$20m to repair roads that are vitally important to key communities in the South East in the two seats that have supported the Liberal Party through thick and thin for the last 30 years."

Wattle Range Council urged motorists to contact the Infrastructure and Planning Department on 1300 872 677 to report potholes.

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Private hospital 'pressure'

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THE Mount Gambier Private Hospital has entered voluntary administration, citing changes in the operating model of the Mount Gambier and Districts Health Service – the facility's largest creditor.

In a statement, Mount Gambier Private Hospital acting chair Catherine Lunnay said the 20-bed facility – co-located with the Mount

Gambier hospital - will continue to operate as normal during the voluntary administration period and will have no effect on current patient care and staff.

Ms Lunnay said over the last five years, changes in the operating model of the state-run public hospital has resulted in "operational pressures which have had a direct impact on our economic performance and long-term feasibility that we can no longer sustain".

"We enter the five-week voluntary administration process, managed by Meertens

Chartered Accountants, very hopeful that the situation can be remedied and look forward to working with the Limestone Coast Local Health Network to identify a new, cooperative working model that is in the best interest of both parties but most importantly, the community of Mount Gambier, who have long been very supportive of our hospital," she said.

However, the Mount Gambier Private Hospital board refused to answer a series of questions – including what the changes entail and

whether money was owed to the health service – saying it recognised that a successful conclusion to the ongoing negotiations "require that details remain commercial in confidence".

The Limestone Coast Local Health Network did not address questions, but said through a statement that they had worked closely with the Mount Gambier Private Hospital to help ensure the viability of its services to the community.

"We look forward to working with them going forward," the statement said.

In-home hospice support boost

A GROUP of 20 volunteers is now equipped to help Mount Gambier residents (with a terminal illness), live out their life in the comfort of their home.

The Mount Gambier In Home Hospice Care service celebrated the graduation of its first batch of volunteers, trained in palliative care practices, and ready to support patients nearing the end of their life journey.

A graduation ceremony was held last week - at the Mount Gambier Community RSL - to recognise the 20 volunteers that took part in a nine-week course, with Warrnambool hospice trainers and Flinders University staff, via Zoom.

While the volunteers do not provide medical care or advice, they work closely with health professionals to provide patients with practical and emotional support, addressing their individual needs and preferences.

The emotional support offered by the volunteers attempts to humanise patients, focusing on a person's life rather than their illness

In Home Hospice Care chair Maureen Klintberg said the volunteer service fulfilled the not-for-profit's commitment to provide terminally ill patients - together with their families and carers - the option of practical, holistic care, in the comfort of their home.

"The In Home Hospice Care service will help fill the gaps and further build on the existing services that are already provided in our community, to those facing a life-

threatening illness," she said.

The new service also reflects In Home Hospice Care's advocacy of Compassionate Communities, a relatively new concept in public health approaches to end of life care and bereavement.

"The concept of Compassionate Communities is being widely advocated and involves the activation of community members to care for each other," Ms Klintberg said.

Palliative Care Projects nursing director Kate Swetenham reinforced the twin message of emotional in-home support and compassionate community.

"Volunteers that have undergone this training have a genuine opportunity to provide psychosocial symptom management, where the emphasis of the support is around human connection and the development of a compassionate community," she said.

Data collected by the Warrnambool Community District Hospice management team over the past five years shows the number of clients wishing to die in their own home grew from around 15pc to 50pc.

Mount Gambier Private Hospital chief executive Sandi Elliott has managed the project, supported by the private hospital board members and a steering committee.

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

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Jazz festival tune-up

GENERATIONS in Jazz has endured a two-year hiatus but work continues behind the scenes in anticipation of the major festival's 2022 return.

Event coordinator Karyn Roberts said the Generations in Jazz board had used the two-year break - a result of the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent restrictions - to reflect, plan and improve on the event.

"Whilst the past two years have been challenging as we navigated the ever-changing rules of the pandemic, it has provided us time to reflect and take a closer look at the event, exploring areas for improvement to ensure it continues to meet, and aim to surpass, school and audience expectations," she said.

In particular, the board has focused on improving onsite logistics and band member comfort, using the construction skills of a group of volunteers - affectionately known as the "band of merry men".

These volunteers, largely retired men from Mount Gambier, have converted shipping containers into modern warm-up spaces - ensuring band participants have a comfortable, warm and soundproof location to practice before going onstage to perform.

One of the larger containers has also been repurposed to provide onsite storage.

The shipping containers were donated by Australian businessman Lindsay Fox, with K&S Freighters transporting the containers to the festival's OB Flat site.

Work has also started on a new stand-alone ticket office near the main car park, neighbouring the Big Top tent.

The ticket office will help fast-track public ticket purchases and free up administration space for event organisers.

More importantly, the relocation of the ticket booth will help disperse crowds and improve social distancing.

"We are extremely grateful for the dedicated efforts of our hardworking site volunteers, coordinated by Greg Muller, who are assisting us to take our event to the next level," Ms Roberts said.

"They generously spare hundreds of hours working behind the scenes throughout the year, rain, hail or shine, to ensure our event infrastructure is ready to cater for the thousands of participants who will flood through

the gates next May.

"Without these people, events like Generations in Jazz simply would not occur. It takes a huge community effort and we thank each and every one of them for their generous support."

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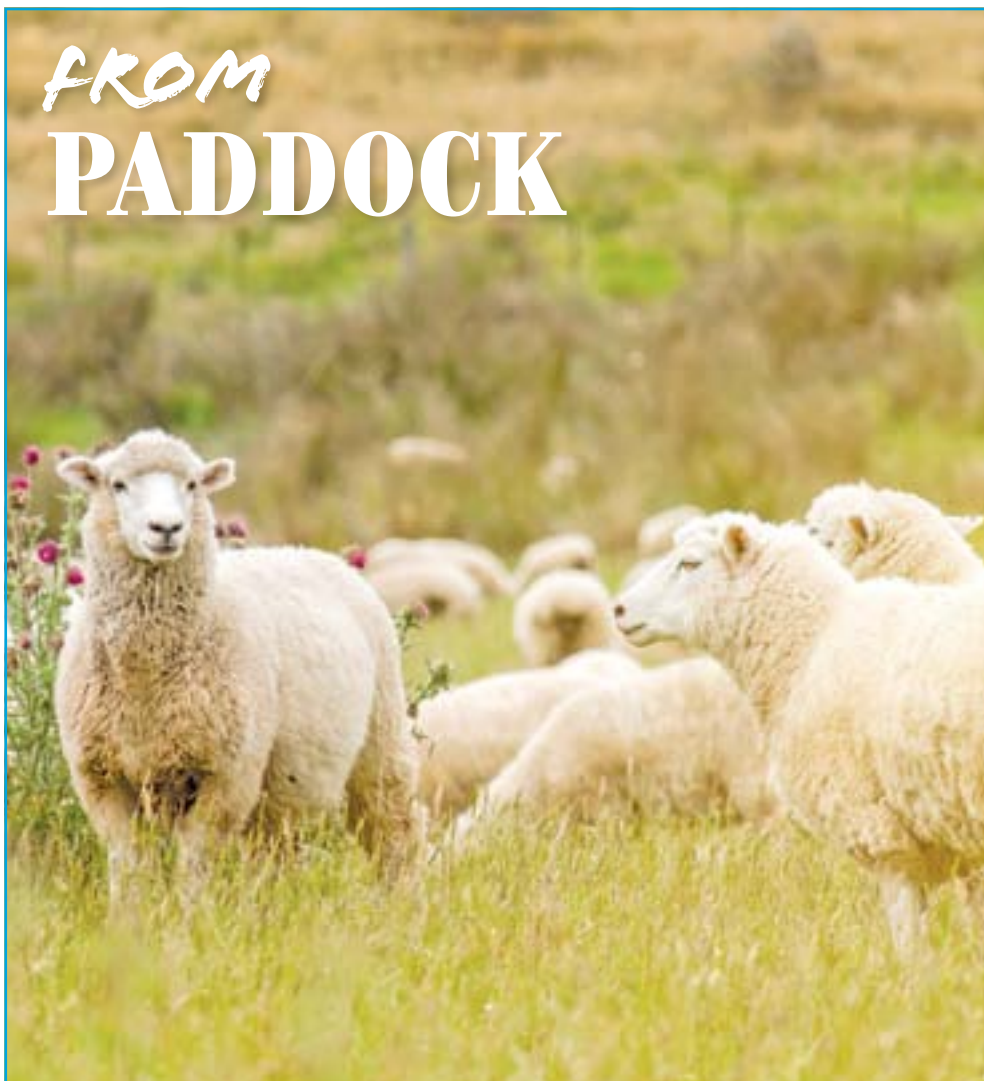

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AN online group providing support and information for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, queer and questioning community members will formally establish a committee to further drive advocacy and visibility of the Limestone Coast LGBTQIA+ community.

The community-led LGBTQIA+ Limestone Coast Connect is a point-of-contact for people who have any expression of diverse sexualities or genders and foster inclusion within the community.

Initially established as an online safe space, the proposed committee aims to become the peak LGBTQIA+ organisation in the region and advance equity for sexuality and gender diverse people.

LGBTQIA+ Limestone Coast Connect member Patrick Smith said the group was buoyed by the need to provide regionally-specific, tailored information to individuals.

"There are national organisations and groups across the state, but we want to have a presence in the region to provide help on the ground," he said.

"Local knowledge is really important and it's not always easy to access information about services unless you are in the region.

"Visibility is important for queer people who are moving to the region because it shows that they are going to be accepted and that it is okay to be you."

Mr Smith said people who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, queer, questioning, asexual or any other expression of diverse genders and/or sexualities were welcome to join the group.

He also encouraged allies – heterosexual and cisgender people who support the LG-

BTQIA+ community – to join the group.

"We see ourselves as a one-stop shop where people can access information about health, beauty, social interaction and general advocacy," he said.

ton. "Everyone of any sexuality is able to join, including allies, but the group is not designed for them as we are going to be catering to queer people."

Servo to go

MILLICENT will soon have one staffed service station when the Mount Burr Road Caltex closes its doors next month.

Customers were notified by a sign on the door stating the last day of trade will be on August 4th.

"It is with great sadness that this site will be closing its doors," the sign says.

"This is a Caltex decision."

A Caltex spokesperson said the decision to close was prompted by the lease expiring over the site.

The freehold of the Mount Burr Road premises has been owned by council since 1958, with the current 20-year lease expiring on October 31 this year.

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower was unable to comment on the situation, saying a special confidential council meeting was being held next week to discuss the Millicent service station.

Mr Gower did say council was "working on issues in the background" and focussed on the ongoing service to the community.

Last year, Wattle Range Council received an unsolicited offer from a local business purchase the site, prompting elected members to seek expressions of interest.

In August 2020, council authorised chief executive Ben Gower to progress negotiations on the terms and conditions of the contract of sale with K&S Corporation for the purchase of the site.

K&S Corporation was contacted for comment.

Association fee value questioned

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WATTLE Range Council will pay an additional \$62,000 for subscription fees to the Limestone Coast Local Government Association over the next five years, prompting elected members to consider its value to council.

In the Limestone Coast Local Government Association's 2021/22 business plan, the association proposes increasing Wattle Range's contribution from \$134,499 in 2020/21 to \$196,204 in 2025/26.

The association has proposed an increase of almost \$150,000 across all of the seven constituent councils this financial year, with a majority funding a new Destination Development Strategy aimed at supporting tourism growth.

Despite the association netting almost \$800,000 this financial year, it Limestone Coast Local Government Association forecasts a \$124,000 loss.

At this month's Wattle Range Council meeting, councillor Peter Dunicliff said while he admired the objectives of the Limestone Coast

Local Government Association, elected members were not privy to results.

"I'd like council to ask for their objectives and for them to show their results because they are very few and far between," he said.

Council chief executive Ben Gower said the 2021/22 business plan had a renewed focus on the "right elements of our regional alliance".

Mr Gower said the document outlined projects that will transition to a self-sufficient state, including the Substance Misuse Limestone Coast and Limestone Coast Leadership Program.

"[the plan] talks about what they are going to hand off or give to another organisation or to stand on their own two feet... that is, in my view, a very promising sign," he said.

Councillor Dale Price raised concerns about the contributions of each council - which are based on the number of residents within the council area and range from \$180,168 for Mount Gambier City Council to \$40,000 for Kingston District Council.

"When you look at the contributions of each council in terms of the amount and the

fact that all councils have equal voting rights strikes me as quite inequitable," he said.

Cr Dennis Muhovics echoed Cr Price's comments, asking whether the \$62,000 increase over five years would result in value for money for Wattle Range.

Mayor Des Noll told the chamber he had considered whether Wattle Range's contribution was resulting in benefits for the council region, adding he expected there would be some "interesting discussion in the future".

"I have thought about that myself Cr Muhovics on numerous occasions," he said.

"Now it has been brought up here, I'll be thinking and talking about it substantially more."

Limestone Coast Local Government Association executive officer Tony Wright said the return for councils was on average 400pc and included road funding, tourism activities and waste management.

"We haven't had any change in members contribution since 2015," he said.

"Rather than try and do everything, we are going to focus on core projects such as roads, waste and tourism."

HOME: Recently relocated from Mount Gambier to Millicent, but I photograph people all around the South East, Western Victoria and up to Adelaide.

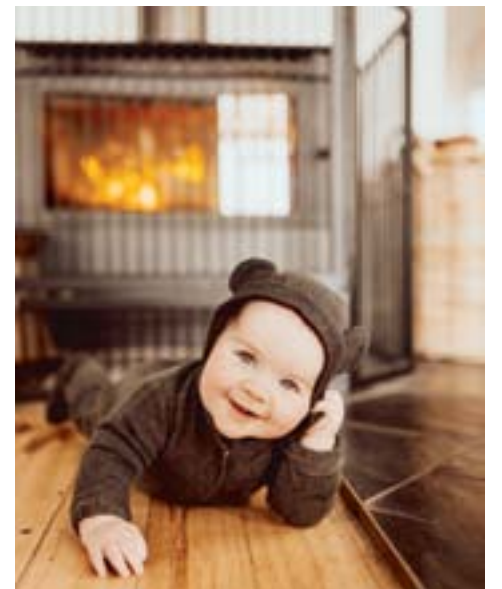
AGE: 34 years.

Ms Reilly said she was excited about the scholarship to help revisit her business structure as she develops goals for the future.

WiBRD board member Ebony Moulden reflected on the importance of the scholarships for the community prior to the announcements, stating the scholarships exemplify the values at the heart of the organisation.

Country Press SA wants to commend Mr Troy Bell, Independent, Member for Mount Gambier for his motion in the House of Assembly regarding Government advertising in regional newspapers. Plus, all the Members (Liberal, Labor and Independent) for speaking in favour...

Mr Bell (Mount Gambier) Independent:

- That this house –
- (a) recognises the importance of independent media platforms as both the voice for regional communities and a trusted information source;
 - (b) provides financial assistance to help support both new and established platforms to continue
 - (c) recognises that print is a vital information source for regional people; and
 - (d) commits to an annual spend for communication in regional communities.

He said among other things...
When a minister or senior politician comes down to regional areas, regional media show up, take photographs and attend press conferences, all of this without paid advertising going along with it—not that they are complaining about that service. It is a longstanding expectation and agreement between both sides because it is newsworthy. However, what I am calling for is a commitment to an annual spend for communication in regional communities to help underpin this very important industry.

Other MPs to speak in favour of this motion:

Mr McBride (MacKillop) Liberal: I understand and appreciate the importance of independent media, and in particular print media, in our communities.

Mr Piccolo (Light) Labor: Quoting from a report by Deakin University into regional media: I will quote from the report, and this quote covers very well what I think is the importance of country press:
When practised well, country journalism informs, educates and entertains a public that is often marginalised in favour of their big-city counterparts. It contributes to a functioning local democracy and public sphere, creates a shared sense of community, and fulfills a watchdog role by providing a check and balance on institutions such as local government, courts, churches, schools and police.
The audience of this survey said. They overwhelmingly indicated that additional funding for local news should be directed to employ more local journalists to report news rather than to increase digital connectivity and digital innovations. In other words, people said they still had a strong preference for print media over digital media.

Mr Whetsone (Chaffey) Liberal: Regional communities deserve to have that balance. They deserve to have

that voice. Whether it is a voice on either side of the argument, it is critically important that our regional newspapers survive. I would like to think that all levels of government will continue to support and advertise in our regional newspapers and not use the digital age. Our regional newspapers are the fabric of a regional community.

Mr Hughes (Giles) Labor: It is incredibly important that we retain print media in regional communities because it is an important voice on current affairs. Social media is not an alternative. Some of the stuff I have seen locally on social media has been an absolute disgrace. There is no filter; there is no responsibility. Some of the stuff that is put out there is so factually inaccurate it is disturbing. In some ways, social media represents a long-term threat to a well-functioning democracy.

Mr Pederick (Hammond) Liberal: Regional papers give that absolute community coverage of things like community football, netball, bowling, lawn bowls, cricket—whatever is going on—and it is magnificent coverage.

Ms Wortley (Torrens) Labor: If we do not advertise in our printed newspapers in regional South Australia, many people will miss out on the information that could be included... but newspapers, although printed on fewer days now in regional communities, are extremely important.

Mr Brock (Frome) Independent: It is becoming very disturbing that in lots of acts of parliament there is a tendency for the local council and other government departments to not have to place any communication in the newspaper but rather on social media or a

website, which takes revenue away from those who employ the journalists, and very importantly not everyone is glued to a computer, their mobile phone or other apps.

Mr Bignell (Mawson) Labor: I wholeheartedly agree that the government needs to be spending money advertising in these papers, but we can all take responsibility by not going onto Amazon and those types of sites and ordering shoes and clothes and all these products from other parts of the world. When the local shoe shop...dress shop or jeans shop in one of these country towns loses out on sale after sale from people going online and ordering their goods, it means that they have less money in their cash registers, which means they have less money to buy ads in the local paper, which means the paper produces fewer pages of news and employs fewer journalists. Any move to cut government advertising in country newspapers would be a backwards step and I wholeheartedly support the member for Mount Gambier's move to make sure that the government is held accountable and that they do help prop up and support country newspapers in South Australia.

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WOMEN living and working in the agriculture industry will meet in the Limestone Coast next month for a whirlwind tour of the region's primary produce sector.

Members of Women in Agriculture and Business South Australia and guests will explore the region during the group's annual gathering on August 7 and 8, led by the group's state president Narelle Scott.

The tour includes some of the region's most successful agricultural operations and businesses, including the state's biggest onion packing facility, Dolling's Produce, Mini Jumbuck's wool processing factory, the Naracoorte Regional Livestock Exchange, Valley View Gardens, Naracoorte Caves, Petticoat Lane Historical Site and various vineyards and wineries around Penola.

Participants will also have the opportunity to learn about flooding irrigation.

Women in Agriculture and Business promotions officer Helen Colliver said while the sites visited during the event would help showcase the Limestone Coast, participants would also get insight into a number of useful business practices and agricultural techniques.

"It can be something scientific or procedural things. Sometimes it's how they run the business or how they advertise their business or the benefits to the district... It's a learning process really, for all manner of reasons," she said.

An official dinner at the Gather on Gordon Function Centre will also be held, with guest speaker Alex Thomas delivering an address on occupational safety around the farm.

Vaccine requirement for cattle

LIMESTONE Coast-raised livestock destined for Australia's largest cattle feedlot and processing group will need to be vaccinated with Bovilis MH+IBR to help control the effects of Bovine Respiratory Disease.

JBS Australia has announced its three New South Wales feedlots will only accept vaccinated cattle from September 1 in a bid to reduce sickness and mortalities at its feedlots.

Around 2000 to 2500 head of cattle are transported from the Limestone Coast to JBS feedlots annually.

JBS Australia northern livestock manager Scott Carswell said the critical point of BRD prevention in cattle happens on farm, prior to feedlot induction, making BRD pre-vaccination the last piece of the puzzle in terms of striving for the highest animal welfare standards.

"The risk of BRD is at its peak in the first couple of weeks at the feedlot and the critical point of prevention happens on-farm prior to feedlot induction," Mr Carswell said.

"Vaccinating prior to feedlot entry with Bovilis MH+IBR has two main benefits. Firstly, when cattle are pre-vaccinated in an unstressed environment, they are expected to develop a better response to the vaccine. "Secondly, and most importantly, pre-vaccinated cattle have a higher level of protection at the time of maximum risk, which is immediately following feedlot induction.

"That's why we are making it mandatory from September 1, 2021 that all cattle who enter our feedlots in Caroon, Prime City and Riverina have at least one shot of Bovilis MH+IBR from 180 days to 14 days prior to delivery."

In addition to mandating the use of Bovilis MH+IBR, JBS Australia will continue to pay a premium for Bovilis MH+IBR pre-

vaccinated cattle of \$15 per head.

"At the end of the day, it's a win-win situation for producers," Mr Carswell said.

"They get paid to pre-vaccinate with a product that could improve the performance of their cattle on farm, and we get healthy and high-performing cattle delivered to our feedlots."

In the lead up to the cut-off date, JBS will continue to receive cattle during August that have not been vaccinated, but will apply a \$0.05/kg discount to these cattle.

BRD is a devastating respiratory condition affecting cattle of all ages and the leading cause of mortality within the cattle industry.

There are two main pathogens that cause BRD, Mannheimia haemolytica (MH) and Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis Virus (IBR).

Both pathogens are known to cause BRD, but IBR in particular can spread rapidly when cattle are stressed due to transport, mixed with other cattle from different farms, and introduced to different feed.

Trade weight score 3 lambs made from \$172 to \$200 with a lift of \$10 to \$14/head with most sales averaging from 840c to 880c/kg cwt.

Heavy lambs received a similar lift in price reaching a top of \$228 while the extra heavy pens made from \$222 to a high of \$264/head.

Hoggets made from \$139 to \$212 while light sheep returned from \$90 to \$123/head.

Medium weight sheep made from \$133 to \$170 with the heavy pens selling \$6 dearer to make from \$178 to a high of \$225/head.

Wethers made from \$190 to \$256 and rams ranged from \$110 to \$174/head.

The right start for your roses

BRIAN WAGNER

Kalangadoo rose grower

ROSES are deciduous plants; they shed their leaves in winter time and stop flowering until the weather starts getting warmer and days get longer.

Once a year, in the coldest months, they become dormant plants, just bare sticks with nothing on them, and this is their strategy to survive harsh weather conditions and have a rest.

That's why you'll find bare root rose plants in winter time only, and the rest of the year you'll only see potted roses for sale at our nursery and in all garden centres.

Winter is certainly our busiest season at the nursery; we have to pull out thousands of plants, prune them, grade their quality one by one, and select only the best plants for our market.

Then we pack the roses and post them to our customers everywhere in Australia. We work most of the time outdoors, in the field, no matter how the weather is, and you can imagine it's not fun at all when it rains, it's cold and we have to work in the mud all day...

Weather conditions can impact our production a lot, and every year our budding season is different; it's really hard to predict when we'll finish digging.

As soon as you receive your new roses, there are a few simple things you will need to do to give them a good start and enjoy their flowers in spring time.

Planting

- Prepare your rose bed. The bed should be in a sunny position, free from competition from shrubs and trees. Enrich the soil with an organic fertiliser and compost (not mushroom). Clay soil will need gypsum. Watch the video on how to prepare the soil for your new roses.
- Dig a hole, approximately 30cm x 30cm x 30cm. You could place a handful of organic fertiliser at the bottom of the hole. Make sure you have a buffer of soil between the roots and fertiliser to prevent root burn.
- Leave your bare root rose in a bucket of water for 24 hours before planting.
- Put the rose in the hole, making sure the bud union (where the rose is grafted) is around 2-3cm above ground level.
- Backfill with soil until the hole is half full. Add a bucket of water. Fill the rest of the hole with soil when the water has drained away and water again.



STAYING ORGANISED: Roses come in a variety of sizes, colors, shapes and fragrances. Labelling newly planted roses can help keep your plants organised.

Watering and Fertilising

A baby rose needs more attention and to be fed more often, to get ready for spring time.

- Make sure your just planted bare root rose receives 20 liters of water 3 times a week.

- Do not fertilise it until the plant grows a canopy of leaves. When you have leaves on the plant, fertilise a little and often: sprinkle on and water in well.
- Try to use different fertilisers. New roses are

like children: they need a varied diet and lots of TLC in their first year.

Winter gardening tips

DON'T let the cooler weather deter you from getting stuck into the garden. Here's what to get done during winter.

While it might be cold outside, work in the garden will give you a warm glow in both body and mind.

Here are some winter gardening tips to get you started.

1. Help the rain soak in

If your soil has been dry for an extended period it can become water-repellent (hydrophobic), even after heavy rains. Look for water pooling on the surface, which can be fixed with a good soil wetting agent and/or seaweed-based additives.

Remove heavy layers of autumn leaves that can stop the rain getting to the soil. Use these excess leaves to make nutrient-rich compost.

2. Get stuck into weed control

With rain comes weeds. Make sure you remove weeds before they mature and set seed. Weeding by hand can give an effective result. Be careful to remove roots and all, and use garden hoes or tillers for larger areas.

3. Get on top of those jobs

This is the perfect time to get on top of 'those jobs'. The ones that have been niggling in the back of your mind. Do you need to relocate underperforming plants to a more suitable spot, or replace them with something else? Do you need to attend to a garden path or fix some irrigation?

Life is busy but once these chores

are ticked off your list, you will have time to focus on the more satisfying activities.

4. Veggie patch-up

Winter's the time to prune your existing fruit trees or buy new ones to put in the ground. It's also a great time for planting brassicas (such as brussels sprouts and cauliflower), lettuce and Chinese vegetables.

Take the time to tidy up your veggie garden, enrich the soil with compost and start thinking about what you're going to plant next season.

Check with your local nursery to see if they have any new veggies you'd like to try growing.

5. Take time to prune

Winter is a good time to prune for

structure on young deciduous trees. Because these trees are without leaves, the form of the tree can be seen easily, so crossing wood, double leaders and a plethora of other problems can be picked up early.

Hydrangea pruning can also be done now the flower buds have set. The old wood can be pruned out and the shrubs pruned back to those healthy fat flower buds for a good display next year.

Rose pruning is a winter must – any time from July onwards is fine. When you've finished, apply a seaweed-based product to condition the soil, which will help the plant with drought tolerance, resistance to frost and attack from pests and disease.

6. Start something new

Put the kettle on and get cosy indoors as you make plans for your garden. Think about whether you would like a new design or theme for your garden.

Is it time to add more shade or to plant native plants to encourage native wildlife into your outdoor space? Birds, bees, butterflies and other little creatures will do wonders for your garden by helping to pollinate veggies and gobble up pest insects. Native bee hotel, anyone?

So when the rain pours and the wind howls, get online to do some research, plan your project and you'll be ready for action when there's a break in the clouds.

Decorating trends

WARM, grounded colours that speak of security and comfort are set to dominate winter decorating trends, according to Dulux trend forecasters.

"The cooler months call for richer hues and cosy textures, and never more so than in a year when most people's worlds have been turned upside down," says Dulux colour expert Andrea Lucena-Orr.

"There's a collective yearning for reassurance and a return to simpler times. We want our homes to provide comfort, a sense of safety and to remind us of better days ahead. And this will be reflected in more than just colour in 2021 – expect to see a rise in plush, comfy seating, handcrafted furniture with an artisanal feel and a greater focus on 'purposeful decorating' rather than just decorating to make an aesthetic statement," she says.

The Retreat palette – one of three trend colour palettes identified in the 2021 Dulux Colour Forecast – captures the mood of this winter.

"These earthy tones and muted colours are all drawn from nature – think oceanic blues, nourishing greens, soft greys and touches of mustard. They bring the outside in – ideal for a time when most of us are stuck indoors for long stretches – and plug into the growing movement for wellness in design."

To give you ideas on how you can use these comforting hues in your own home, Dulux worked with stylist Bree Leech to re-energise a child's bedroom using colours from the Retreat palette.

"Light-filled and spacious, this bedroom ticked all the right boxes, however, the room needed some personality and tactile elements to create warmth. You want your child to love spending time in their room – it should be somewhere they can escape, relax, read and play. The quickest and easiest way to switch up the mood is with colour," says Bree.

Bree kept the big-ticket items in the room – the bed, bedhead and solid-timber bedside table, and focused on updating the room with bold colour. She chose shades that worked with the neutral tones in the foundation pieces and added in plenty of textures to dial up the cosiness.

She started by adding deep blue to the walls and a gentle neutral to the ceiling and window detailing.

"We opted for pale greige rather than a classic white for the ceiling and windows to soften the contrast with the blue. A sharp colour contrast can be very effective in a space, but in a room that's all about relaxation, you want it to be a little less pronounced.

"Inky blue works well here – it's cosy and timeless and sits beautifully

alongside the natural materials in the room, such as the timber and woven-rattan. It also draws attention to and complements the artwork above the bed. I specified a matt paint finish to magnify the intensity of the blue.

"A woven wall hanging adds accents of rust and quirky bedside lighting creates a playful mood, adding contrast against the deep blue.

"To make the space feel more inviting, I layered the bed with cosy cushions and snuggly, fringed woollen blankets. Curvy furniture is a great addition to break the architectural angles in the room to make it feel more relaxed, while introducing pattern with a striped rug and crisp, striped bedding accentuates those added curves even more," she says.

"For me, a rug is an essential in a bedroom; the floor is the first thing you feel when you get out of bed, so it needs to be soft.

A rug also helps anchor the bed in the space. This one has dusty blue and stone hues, the latter being reflected in the finish of the cupboard.

"For the main artwork above the bed, we deliberately chose a piece that will work in the space as the child grows – a geometric abstract in various shades of blue. To personalise the bedroom, we framed and hung two of the child's illustrations along with an

artist's fun print," she says.

Bree created a place to read in a sunny spot by the window, complete with a velvet-upholstered armchair and a pair of side tables, perfect for keeping a book or two nearby.

"Don't be afraid to bring in pieces from another room, like this armchair, so long as they serve a purpose and fit with your colour palette," she concluded.

Bree's kids' bedroom styling tips

- **Invest in quality:** Kids are tough on furniture, so it's worth paying more for well-made pieces that will last. You can save money on smaller items, such as bedlinen, art prints and rugs.
- **Add an upholstered bedhead:** It makes for a comfortable spot to sit up and read.
- **Size it right:** As a guide, when choosing a rug for a child's bedroom it should fit two thirds under the bed and extend at least 30 centimetres beyond the sides of the bed – any smaller and it will look lost in the space.
- **Think multi-purpose:** Children's rooms are often small, so seek out flexible pieces that can be used in different ways, such as an ottoman that doubles as storage and seating.
- **Make storage easy:** Add in baskets for toys and cupboards or shelves to hide mess away.

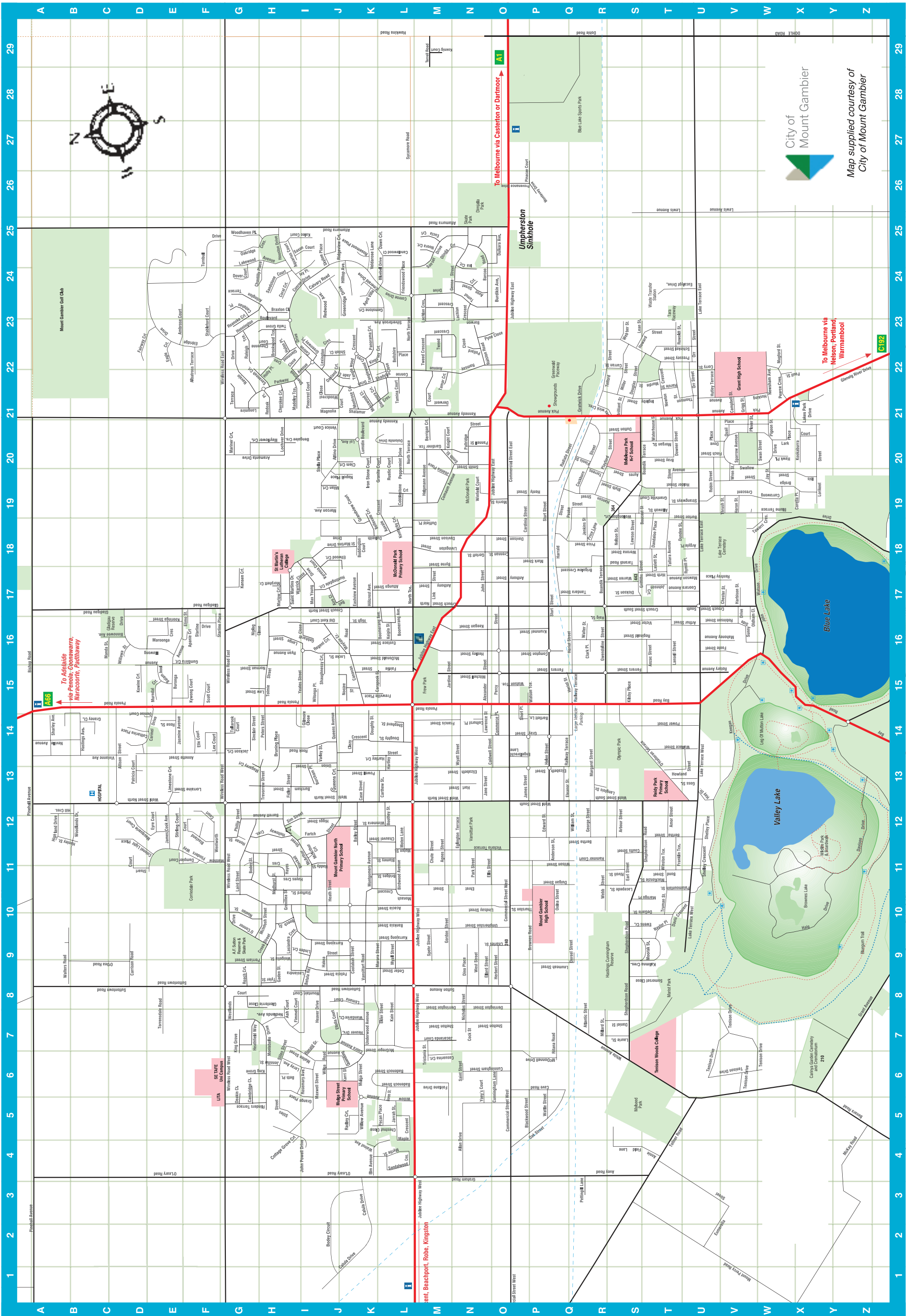

A MID-YEAR MAKEOVER

THE Subaru Forester is getting a mid-life makeover for 2022.

It has a revised headlight, foglight, front bumper and grille treatment as well as numerous technology and suspension upgrades.

Retuned front suspension coil springs and dampers improve ride comfort, steering responsiveness and handling.

New aluminium engine mount bracket reduces vibrations and noise.

Foresters with the Driver Monitoring System gain gesture-controlled temperature adjustment for the air-conditioning, a new feature for Subaru that enables drivers to adjust the temperature via a simple hand gesture.

In all models other than the Forester 2.5i, Adaptive Driving Beam is updated to an array headlight system.

An eight-inch touchscreen is now standard across the range, previously the Forester 2.5i, 2.5i-L and Hybrid L had 6.5-inch screens.

An updated instrument panel design is introduced in Forester 2.5i Premium, 2.5i Sport and 2.5i-S.

Forester 2.5i Sport has a circular foglight design with six LED lights and geometric black door mirrors.

Inside, there are gunmetal and orange interior highlights throughout the cabin.

The Forester 2.5i-S and Hybrid S have new alloy wheel designs, while the Forester 2.5i-S gets platinum coloured armrest inserts.

Forester 2.5i Sport, 2.5i-S, Hybrid L and Hybrid S have a revised rear bumper lower clad-

ding while the S and the two Hybrid variants also have revised silver roof rail finish.

New body colours are Autumn Green, Brilliant Bronze and Cascade Green, which are available on all variants other than the Forester 2.5i Sport.

"We've never had greater demand for Subaru SUVs and current generation Forester is leading the charge," Subaru Australia general

manager Blair Read said.

"These latest subtle changes to the Forester range will add to its appeal, which has already attracted new audiences with the introduction of hybrid variants and the Sport over the last 18-months."

HORNET A HUDSON CLASSIC

HUDSON is another brand that is no longer produced.

Although it started in 1909, by the early 1950s the brand had been acquired by Nash and went into limbo.

If Hudson is to be remembered for anything it should be for their innovative engineers who were able to produce good designs with very limited budgets.

In 1954 Hudson launched its Hornet which replaced the aged 1948 model that had proved unable to compete with the V8s from other manufacturers. Although the Hornet had only an L-section six-cylinder 5.0-litre engine which developed 120kW, this was one of the fastest six-cylinder cars of the period.

The engine had a hot camshaft with an alloy head and was fed through a Carter two-barrel carburettor.

Amazingly, Hudson never offered a V8 version which no doubt hastened its ultimate downfall.

The car was available as a two-door coupe and a convertible as well as the popular four door sedan, which looked rakishly low and modern.

These Hudsons were known as Step-Downs; because of their low-slung construction.

This lower body position gave the car excel-

lent handling and many of them were raced in competition during the early 1950s.

Front and rear drum brakes were used and the suspension comprised typical coil springs at the front and rear leaf springs.

A three-speed manual transmission came as standard with an optional Hydra-Matic automatic transmission also available.

The sloping back on the four-door model was very different from the conventional shape of the two-door and the rear fins swept back holding the tail lights. Now, unlike the previous model, the windscreen was a one-piece unit.

The interior of the car was quite modern with a distinctive half circle speedo and was adorned with many chrome fittings, to match the chrome trim on the exterior.

HYUNDAI Australia says it is taking the SUV high performance market to the 'N'th degree with the importation of the all-new Kona N.

This is the first Hyundai N model with an SUV body.

It is powered by a 2.0-litre turbo-petrol engine with 206kW and 392Nm.

With "N Grin Shift" selected the power is enhanced to 213kW and is mated with Hyundai's N eight-speed wet-type dual-clutch transmission.

Standard racetrack-ready equipped includes 19-inch alloy wheels with high-performance brakes and Pirelli tires.

Kona N has a maximum speed of 240km/h and can accelerate from 0-100 km/h in 5.5 seconds, when Launch Control is activated.

The Kona N also features Hyundai's "N Corner Carving Differential", which is an electronic limited slip differential (E-LSD) for controlling torque distribution to the front driving wheels.

For Australia, Kona N will be offered in two trim levels and will go on sale locally in the third quarter of this year, priced from \$47,500 MLP.

Some big news offshore

FISHING

THERE has been a lot of changes come into effect since I last wrote, but that has not slowed the fishing down at all.

There has been some fairly average weather, but some nice fish caught.

The offshore news has been dominated this week by Bodhi Pannenburg and Jaz Miller's 122kg tuna caught on 24kg line.

A short 25 minute fight and then a wrestle at the side of the boat with just the two of them to try and lift it in was a massive effort.

There has been at least one other tuna I know about that was hooked and then lost later in the week, but once we see the weather start to fine up - and if COVID restrictions allow - we will see plenty more.

The shark fishing has been excellent out in the 60-100m depths again this week.

Anglers are finding shark to 20kg, along with some nice snapper, flathead and other tasty reefies.

The surf guys have been pretty quiet thanks to the weather, but those chasing the salmon are still finding some nice fish.

The hot spots have been Cape Banks just under the lighthouse, along the beaches in the Canunda NP and the salmon hole at Beachport.

The size is varying quite a bit, so some sessions will be predominately smaller lumpies, while other trips you will tuck into the bigger jack salmon.

There have been some nice catches of garfish this week.

The protected bays across the Limestone Coast are perfect if there is a fair bit of wind.

There is always going to be somewhere you can get out of the wind - you might just have to go for a little drive and check out new spots.

IT is anyone's guess just how the Exchange Printers Anniversary Cup final, run at Mount Gambier's Tara Raceway, would have panned out but for severe interference going out of the first turn.

What we do know is that by the time the dust settled, three greyhounds - Maximum Refusal (David Peckham), Close Your Eyes (Nicole Stanley) and Tandiki (Tracie Price) - were going to fight out the finish of the 512-metre event.

Allendale East-based Peckham was chasing his first Anniversary Cup, Stanley, of Portland, her third after Fiorelli Rose and Ben Nevis in 2017 and 2018, while Price, who trains out at Compton, won last year's event with Spring Cuervo.

Down the back Tandiki was last of the trio but given her customary powerful finishing burst she was always going to be the one to beat.

In the race that celebrated 42 years of greyhound racing in the South-East, she was simply too strong in the run home.

On the line she had two lengths to spare over Maximum Refusal, with a further 4½ lengths back to Close Your Eyes in a time of 29.75 seconds.

Price, in recent times twice Mount Gambier's top trainer, leads the way in this year's Ian Badger Trainer of the Year award with 72 wins at Tara Raceway.

By now, well and truly versed in presenta-

tion race procedure, he expressed his thanks to Kath Matthias and her crew at Exchange Printers for their valued sponsorship of the cup.

He thanked the South East Greyhound Racing Club/Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club which conducted the first race meeting at Glenburnie on Saturday, July 21, 1979.

He also thanked his wife Karen and his team at the Compton kennels for their untiring efforts.

Price also touched briefly on Tandiki and

the setbacks she encountered that resulted in her being off the scene for the first three months of this year.

In fact it was not until May 9 she opened her winning account for the year when defeating Rough Pearl in a grade five final over 512 metres.

Since then she has raced on a further nine occasions for seven wins and two seconds at Tara Raceway.

Without doubt, Tandiki has been one of the real feel-good stories to come out of local greyhound racing this year.

By Peter Rocket out of Headline, Tandiki was also bred by Price.

Taking a liking to the breed and looking for a dog and a bitch were local owners Michael Robinson and Willie Vossen who previously had combined to race Bekim Lucy's, a winner of 11 races and also bred and trained by Price.

As far as the dog was concerned there was only a black male left - later to race as Rock-etline.

But in relation to the females there were three white and black ones to choose from.

Sometimes you get lucky.

Robinson's involvement in greyhound racing goes back to that first meeting in July all those years ago at Glenburnie where he was a spectator.

A couple of years later he was training some of Newman McDonnell's lesser-light "Tara" greyhounds in partnership with Steve Bartholomew.

Incidentally, in the 1990s, both Robinson and Bartholomew were awarded Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club life membership.

In 1982, Robinson joined the greyhound stewards' panel at Glenburnie before becoming the chief steward in 1987.

This was a role he then held until retiring from the position six months prior to the introduction of TAB racing at Tara Raceway in 2012.

So, given Tandiki's local upbringing by way of her breeder-rearer-trainer and her owners, it is probably fair to say this year's Anniversary Cup, for all its sensationalism, turned out to be an appropriate result.

For Trengove, a great supporter of Mount Gambier greyhound racing, it was a case of him once again catching up with Dale Lewis of the Coonawarra, on track with wife Judy for the eighth running of his father's memorial.

Trengove trained the quinella in last year's Lewis Memorial - run over 732 metres - after My Boy Bean defeated Victa Jess by 1½ lengths in 43.92 seconds.

All told, it was a running litter treble for Lenehan after Lektra Violet led all the way

in the Williams Crane Hire Stake (512m) in 30.11 seconds.

Where's Goose, also, was never headed in the Gambier Vets Maiden/One Win Stake (512m), when running 30.20 seconds.

For Lenehan, it was his first treble at Tara Raceway since Sunday, February 25, 2018 when Miss Ding, Lektra Viki and the former 512 metres record holder Lektra Stomp had been successful.

Speaking after the treble he said both Lektra Violet and Lektra Moon had now been sold to leading Adelaide owner Tim Aloisi.

"Currently I have 18 pre-trainers to sort out so I have to keep moving my dogs on," he said.

Among the pre-trainers are members of Lektra Fire's next litter - whelped in January 2020 and by Barcia Bale.

Meanwhile, members of the Reid family once again entered into the spirit of the day with their support of the John Reid Memorial which was first run in 2005 when won by Robert Halliday's Itza Bee.

Spokesman Daryl Reid said the family was now looking at the introduction of a perpetual shield to commemorate the long-running event.

Derby Park, unlike our gallopers who have hit a brick wall and have not won a race in town for over two months.

It all started on June 12 with a treble - Don't Need An Excuse, Vain Mara and Jaccka Ted - and it has continued unabated, with the latest victor being the Kevin Von Duve trained Springfield Affair in the 1800-metre NR 49 pace last Saturday night.

Nobody could deny the three-year-old gelding the win as he had been placed at his previous four starts.

Springfield Affair - who started the \$2.90 favourite - won fair and square after sitting outside the leader for driver Gaita Pulicino before scoring by three metres.

That was the fifth win this season for Springfield Affair, the last three all being in Adelaide.

Meanwhile, our current lock down means there is virtually no chance of the harness meeting at the Greenwald Pace-

way proceeding next Tuesday night.

The gallops, trots and greyhounds were given the green light to continue earlier this week by the government, but that will not help the cause for the local club.

"Local trainers have turned their horses out because they cannot go to Victoria to race and the Victorian pacers cannot currently come across the border," Mount Gambier harness racing president Simon Phillips stated.

THE SHOW MUST GO ON

RACING Victoria officials obviously abide by the saying "the show must go on", if last weekend is any guideline.

Wet weather meant the tracks at meetings set down for Echuca on Sunday and Warrnambool on Monday could not be considered and late transfers quickly came into play.

Echuca was moved to Warracknabeal (300 kilometres away) and Casterton hosted the Warrnambool fixture (170 kilometres away).

That meant a huge inconvenience to some stables in regards to travelling and it resulted in a total of 49 scratchings for the Warracknabeal meeting, but it still left 67 horses in the seven-race program.

Warracknabeal and Casterton are only small clubs but their tracks are winter friendly and showed how invaluable they are to the Victorian racing industry.

This Sunday, Warracknabeal will again host another transferred meeting, with Racing Victoria moving the Wangaratta meeting in the north east to the opposite side of the state.

One local trainer who did not mind the transfer to Casterton one little bit was the Caroline based Belinda O'Loughlin.

It meant only a third of the travelling plus it saw her in the winner's stall after the final event.

That was courtesy of Canny Move (\$6.50) who produced the goods at his fourth run this campaign in the 1200-metre BM 58 handicap.

The seven-year-old gelding has always shown affinity for the Casterton circuit and darted through near the rails in the

final furlong to beat fellow local Wild Colonial Boy.

Meanwhile, Mount Gambier racing club officials and ground staff have been on the road lately to assist fellow Limestone Coast racing clubs on race day.

At recent meetings at Naracoorte and Bordertown, the crew have helped repair the track after each race to ensure the day's racing went ahead without a hitch.

TAKING ALL BEFORE HIM

IF Clever Man is a better jumper than a flat horse, then we all have something to really look forward to.

As it is, the Trevor White trained galloper is taking all before him in flat races at the moment, but his main objective all along is to take flight over the hurdles.

"He's a natural jumper and I'm trying to push for a hurdle race to definitely go ahead at the Naracoorte meeting next month," White stated after Clever Man (\$8-\$11-\$10) made his rivals look second rate in a 2500 metre BM 52 race at Murray Bridge last week.

"He was trained in New South Wales by Anthony Cummings and I paid \$20,000 for him on line at an Inglis sale, and have got friends involved in the ownership and we are having a lot of fun."

Indeed they are with a win at Gawler in June over 2000 metres followed by a second to the wet track specialist Bear Arms at Naracoorte.

A classic Kayla Crowther ride at Murray Bridge enabled Clever Man to have his rivals beaten as far as 400 metres from home and he careered away for a six length win.

With six runs since joining White's stable Clever Man, has already repaid his owners the purchase price.

In the days since that impressive Murray Bridge win, White is now eyeing another start on the flat in a 2500-metre BM 68 handicap in Adelaide tomorrow week.

A quick inspection showed some free standing water on holes three and eight, but with no further rain forecast for the morning it was decided play would be safe.

Despite a couple of hiccups on the front nine, Matthews still turned with 41 off the stick thanks to another birdie on the sixth hole, but it was a superb nine in those conditions.

With the course recovering quickly, Matthews consolidated his great start with opening pars on the back nine.

Just the one double on the inward journey saw him come in with a match-winning 40 off the stick for a nett 66.

Having relished the blustery winter conditions in his outstanding football career, it was no wonder Keith "Hooker" Ransom excelled in the wind and rain to claim the A Grade honours.

What made Ransom's win even more remarkable was he still won despite a double-doughnut on the fourth hole.

Scrambling to get his round back on track after turning with 43, he then excelled over the back nine with a superb 37, with bogies on just the last two holes.

After taking to the driving range during the week for some practice, Colin Ferguson put that to good use with his second place.

Ferguson recovered well from an average start with a double-bogey on the eighth hole negated by a birdie straight away.

He then birdied the 16th as well to come in with a 36 off the stick, one over the card.

It was pleasing to see Jamal Jakubenko return to the podium with his third place finish after his round of 85-11-74.

While he will be disappointed to have left some shots out there with a number of dou-

Ransom took out the pro shot on the fifth hole with his tap-in and Graham Burke was rewarded with his great shot on the 16th to claim that pro shot.

One group, amazing result

It is a pretty remarkable day when a hole-in-one is not the highlight of a round of golf.

But that is exactly what happened at the Mount Gambier Golf Club in last Thursday's stableford competition.

Michael Cutting and his playing partners were thrilled when his 9-iron sailed over the flag on the par 3 eighth hole, hit the green and spun back into the hole for an ace.

While he rightly thought that would be big news when he got back to the clubhouse, his effort was overshadowed by what one of his playing partners did on the par 5 15th hole.

After hitting a solid drive to the right side of the fairway with about 175m to the flag, three-handicapper Richard Gosling pulled out a 4-iron and knocked the shot into the hole for an even-rarer albatross two.

While everyone in the group saw Cutting's ace from the elevated eighth tee, Gosling said he had no idea his ball had found its way to the bottom of the cup.

"I knew I'd hit it pretty well, but you can't see where it ends up from down on that fairway," he said.

"One of the other boys got to the green first and couldn't see the ball, so he had a look in the hole and there it was.

"I was in complete shock to be honest ... I thought it would be 10-to-15 feet from the hole at best."

While the odds of making a hole-in-one are about 12,500-1, that number is reduced to 5000-1 for low handicappers like Cutting who was playing off two on Thursday.

The chances of making an albatross, however, are variously quoted at somewhere between a million to one and six million to one.

But the chances of two players in the same group achieving a hole-in-one and an albatross in the same round ... that is pretty much off the scale.

In fact MGGC pro John Martin said it may never have happened before.

"I spoke to a tournament director at PGA Australia and he said he had never heard of it happening, and had never seen it recorded anywhere," Martin said.

While making an albatross is extremely rare, it was not the first time it had been done at the Attamurra layout, although possibly the first time on the 15th hole.

Multiple-time club champion Anthony Williams produced one several years ago thanks to a hole-in-one on the par 4 18th.

Incredibly, Richard Gosling's brother John

achieved that same result on the 18th back in 2010.

While both Cutting and Richard Gosling had an incredible story to tell on Thursday, only one of them cleaned up.

No prizes are on offer for an albatross, but Cutting collected the hole-in-one prize of a \$1000 pro shop voucher which has already been converted into a new bag and buggy.

The last time he had an ace - two years ago on the same hole - Cutting received just \$120 because Jeff Hodge had claimed the jackpot of more than \$1200 just two days earlier.

"The best thing about this one was it ended up being exactly what I tried to do, although obviously you don't expect it to go in the hole," Cutting said.

"It probably spun back about 15 feet ... it

was like something you'd see on TV."

Despite their heroics, the pair did not play well enough to trouble the leaders.

New member Dane Handreck stole the show and raised a few eyebrows, with 44 points off his 25 handicap.

Chris Lynch was seven shots back in second place, while Gosling came in sixth with 35 points and Cutting was back in 18th place with 33.

Meanwhile Saturday's par round was almost a washout thanks to torrential overnight and early morning rain, not to mention gale force winds.

In the end just 43 players braved the conditions, with Mitchell Broome the only one to beat his handicap.

Playing off a 20 handicap, Broome finished on +2, two shots ahead of John Gosling and Chris Gabriel.

Amazingly, Gosling almost replicated his brother's albatross from two days earlier, hitting his second shot on the 15th just past the pin.

He had to settle for an eagle, although his score was good enough to win A Grade by two shots from Clint Mitchell.

B Grade went to Sam Mainwaring who beat Brad Von Dube on a count-back after they finished on -3.

Broome took the honours in C Grade from Gabriel.

Level 4 restrictions announced on Monday precluding the lockdown had already barred team and contact sport from taking place until today, but any hope of sport continuing was dashed by Tuesday's Stay at Home order.

The Mid South Eastern Football League is the only football/netball league in the Limestone Coast which has not missed a round this season, with both the Western Border and Kowree Naracoorte Tatiara leagues previously affected.

The WBFL lost a complete round last week, with a catch-up game played between East Gambier and Casterton Sandford on the bye weekend for the SA Country Championships.

The KNTFL had previously lost a round due to South Australian restrictions on Victorian players, but went ahead the following week.

The MSEFL up until this point had been free from issues with its South Australian base and players - unfortunately that changes this weekend.

Despite the setbacks, the presidents of all three competition were committed to completing their seasons, albeit somewhat reduced.

All three have played enough football this season to validate a finals series, which now hinge on how the COVID-19 pandemic plays out.

The hardest-hit league in 2021 has been the WBFL, with the Victorian restrictions affecting Casterton Sandford's chances to cross the border in recent weeks, but president Michael Summers was positive about the current situation.

He said at the moment it was a matter of waiting to see how everything pans out.

"This weekend will be postponed and probably tucked in somewhere," Summers said.

"Hindsight says we will probably push it out another week ... we don't want to do that because we will clash with the Mid South East, but we will have to talk about that when we get back to some sort of normality."

Summers said one option was to play the semi-finals over one weekend and still fit the grand final in on September 11.

Last week's Round 13 was lost due to Victorian restrictions, which was slotted into the draw in place of Round 16, meaning every team would play each other three times.

Summers said that was the best option rather than trying to catch up one game (Casterton Sandford) at this late stage of the season.

He said if the restrictions were lifted in time, there would be scope for a valid finals series, even based on the games already played.

For MSEFL president Peter Mitchell it is a similar scenario, despite the league having played all its rounds so far.

Mitchell said it was simply a matter of waiting for more information to come out.

"We have some contingency plans in place and have a few different options we can use" he said.

"We will have a meeting to run through them and decide which way we want to proceed with them.

"It depends on how long this lockdown does continue for.

"If it goes for the seven days or gets extended or we have another one at some stage, that will be the overriding factor."

Again Mitchell said there were enough games played to warrant a finals series.

"We can always extend beyond (the season) if we want to," he said.

"We can have a bye on the AFL grand final if we want to go beyond - that is something to look at.

"We can also play a first semi and second semi on the same weekend, one on Saturday and one on Sunday, or we can cancel a round if we want to.

"There are all sorts of options we can look at.

"The worst case scenario is the season gets abandoned - that is the option no one wants but that could happen."

Mitchell said it was not hard to make a final decision, even if some people do not agree with it.

"We can't control it (COVID), all we can do is make assessments as things come out and look at what is in the best interest of our clubs and the safety of the people," he said.

"It is no ones fault, it is what it is.

"There will always be people upset which ever way you go, but you just have to run through the details you have at hand and make that assessment at the time."

KNTFL president Peter McLellan said while

the league was in good shape at the moment, they would do what is required to finish the season if possible.

"We missed one round, this will be two and we have extended one," he said.

"If we go back the week after, we might swap this round for the last one.

"If we miss the next three weeks we will still have another two.

"We will still have played 12 or 13 matches and that is enough (to hold finals)."

McLellan said he felt the league could not extend too much further due to bookings for caterers and other requirements.

But he said the league was committed to complete the season.

"If we can get going we will run hard and finish on the 18th of September," McLellan said.

"If you go too long you could run into another one (lockdown).

"We would love another few matches - we

have five left - this one is wiped out so we won't pick this one up again.

"We will just push on."

McLellan said final ladder positions could come down to match ratio, with Border Districts and Lucindale already down one match for the season.

"I think everyone in the league and state will start doing that kind of stuff," he said.

"Victoria is doing that, we do that, netball has done it and juniors have done it for years.

"It is not always an even amount of games.

"You do the match ratio and go from there."

While McLellan accepted football was a high priority for many in the community, he said there were other important factors to consider with the pandemic.

"We want people to get back to work," he said.

"In a lockdown they don't get paid.

"But we are keen to get back and when we do, we will be sprinting to the line."

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Final hope

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THE Limestone Coast's three major football and netball codes remain committed to playing out a finals series despite the latest setback due to the statewide lockdown.

South Australia was thrust into a seven-day lockdown on Tuesday due to an outbreak in the Adelaide suburb of Modbury, with genomic testing confirming it is the Delta strain.
