# No jab-no job

TWELVE staff at Mount Gambier's largest aged care sector have handed in their resignation following the implementation of mandatory Covid vaccinations.

The announcement of the mandatory vaccination was made last month with all staff, volunteers and contractors needing at least the first dose of an approved vaccine prior to today.

Boandik Lodge chief executive Gillian McGinty said a number of staff had left their positions following the announcement with the remaining 299 staff members abiding by the requirements.

Ms McGinty reported 100pc of staff had received their first dose and 81pc were fully vaccinated.

The report coincides with a majority of South Australian aged care workers as SA Health reported 70pc of aged care workers recording their full vaccination with 95pc receiving their first dose as of Wednesday evening.

Ms McGinty said the local aged care organisation also had 99 active volunteers who had rolled up their sleeves with 100pc receiving their first vaccination and 79pc receiving their second.

"The vaccine is not mandatory for community staff but the Boandik staff have been proactive in sourcing the vaccine and we also

have 70pc of our community staff receiving at least one dose of the vaccine and all staff and volunteers are booked to receive their second," Ms McGinty said.

"Some staff have chosen not to continue working in aged care because they didn't want the vaccine and if they do not receive it they are no longer able to work for us in residential aged care."

She said the mandatory vaccine program included receptionists and volunteers as well as contractors which have personal contact including allied health staff on any of the premises.

# McBride considers future

MEMBER for MacKillop Nick McBride has yet to detail what consultation he will undertake with constituents to determine whether he should defect from the Liberal Party, despite reports claiming he has given himself two weeks to make the decision.

Sources have told The Border Watch the move followed Mr McBride being "shut down" by Premier Steven Marshall at a Liberal party room meeting last Monday following a series of questions over delays in processing travel exemptions.

Attempts to contact Mr McBride have been unsuccessful, but the first-term MP released a two-sentence statement earlier in the week acknowledging media speculation that he was considering becoming an independent.

In the statement, Mr McBride said he did not wish to make any further comment other than to indicate he "will continue to engage with constituents to ascertain their opinions on a variety of matters."

Premier Steven Marshall did not respond to requests for comment, but Health Minister Stephen Wade told a press conference that both regional and metropolitan-based MPs were fielding calls in relation to travel exemptions.

Mr Wade said enhancements to the exemption portal were underway and would allow individuals to track the progress of travel applications and help constituents and MPs.

Earlier this week, Mr Marshall told report-

ers that Mr McBride was "doing some consultation at the moment" about his future in the party.

"I think he's very passionate about his electorate - I'm very passionate about his

electorate," he said.

"They elected a Liberal and I think they expect that to continue."

Mr McBride's departure from the Liberal Party to the crossbench would leave 21 Liberal votes in the House of Assembly, meaning the party would need to secure the votes at least three independents.

If re-elected without the party backing MacKillop would be held by an independent for the first time in 24 years, with long-serving MP Mitch Williams initially elected as an independent in 1997.

Mr Williams did not respond to comment, but his 1997 campaign manager and former Liberal Party Millicent Branch president Peter Altschwager said it was likely Mr McBride was exasperated by restrictions affecting cross-border community members.

"I think Nick McBride has been an outstanding local member and I suspect he is somewhat frustrated with trying to look after the electors in his electorate," Mr Altschwager said.

"This has been an ongoing problem for MPs representing country electorates... a long ongoing thing."

## Lobster season starts early this year

THE southern zone commercial rock lobster season opened two weeks early on Wednesday, with commercial fishers being able to carry over 20 pc of their uncaught 2021 quota into next year's season.

Minister for Primary Industries and Re-

gional Development David Basham said the changes were being introduced at the request of the state's rock lobster fishers, in response to difficulties felt by the industry over the past 12 months - specifically, trade issues with China and the economic impacts of COVID-19.

"To help navigate the current market turbulence, our fishers have requested extended fishing seasons as well as the opportunity to carry over quota," Minister Basham said.

"The Marshall Liberal Government is pleased to support these requests and pro-

vide fishers with the flexibility they need, so long as the sustainability of our premium fish species is protected."

The rock lobster seasonal closure remains in place for recreational fishers, in the southern zone, until 6am October 1.

# Council considers bin tags

KALANGADOO, Mount Burr and Nangwarry residents could have the contents of their kerbside bin examined to reduce contamination and properly sort and clean recyclable material.

A Wattle Range Council climate change committee has supported the investigation into a bin tagging project which will involve visual rubbish bin inspections of selected households in areas where there is a large problem with inappropriate waste in red bins.

The scheme, has been credited for decreasing contamination in one metropolitan council by 66pc, would rely on council staff or volunteers to inspect bins prior to the rubbish pick up.

Data for each household is collected based on the visual assessment and then a coloured tag is placed on the bin – red for serious contamination, orange for mild contamination and green for no contamination – to provide individualised feedback about the content of the bin.

Currently, Wattle Range Council's waste contractor Veolia uses trucks fitted with video cameras to monitor waste, with individuals found to have disposed non-recyclable material in recycling bins issued a 'contamination' letter.

Engineering Services director Peter Halton said committee members had discussed the potential of adopting a scheme where contamination was identified prior to the contents of the bin being emptied.

Mr Halton said council staff were investigating the logistics and costings of rolling out the bin tagging program across Wattle Range before the item is considered by the committee and council.

"It will need a bit of due diligence before we stick it back in front of council and that will include things like service costs, pros and cons and risks and challenges," he said.

"It certainly has some benefits, it certainly has some logistical challenges and cost implications, but on the flipside, we are paying for the cost of contamination both in our loss of recycling material that's going to landfill as well as paying for contaminated items going to recycling facilities.

"Not all costs will be financial, some of

those are environmental costs and that's another consideration.

"At the moment it costs more to dispose of recyclable material at a recycling facility than to landfill, but where we're not saving the community's hip pockets, we're trying to look after the environment."

Mr Halton said rolling out the program across councils' smaller towns was not in response to higher levels of contamination but said trialling the program would be easier in locations with lower population rates.

"There's no doubt when we have done recent audits there are pockets within towns that are worse than other areas, but when you want to roll out a program like this you want to roll it out across an entire town," he said.

"Doing an audit in that form in a big town like Millicent would be challenging just because of the number of residents.

Kalangadoo resident Peter Savage supported the proposal, saying a visual tag proving information to residents on how they can better recycle would encourage compliance.

"I thought people would have been used to the different coloured bins for different items by now and it surprises me that people are not aware of the uses and the guidelines," he said.

"I can't see where people go wrong with putting the wrong thing in their bins, unless people are doing it deliberately, which they might do.

"I think it would make people change their

ideas and start putting the right items in the right bins."

Mr Savage was not concerned about the bin audits, but acknowledged some residents could view the approach as council intruding on their privacy.

"There's no invasion of privacy as far as I can see and if people end up being proactive about what they put in their bin, that's good," he said.

"But there may be some people who would not want other people to know what they have in their bins.

"I couldn't care... the contamination is more of a worry."

# Mandatory jabs for truckies

INTERSTATE truck drivers must roll up their sleeves or fear being turned around at state borders following a State Government directive implemented last week resulting in mandatory Covid vaccinations.

Approximately 10pc of heavy haulage staff within the Green Triangle Region continue to express concerns and have made the decision not to comply with the recent vaccination requirements for truck drivers travelling to and from the Australian Capital Territory, Victoria and New South Wales.

The South Australian Liberal Government announced the change last week following six truck drivers travelling from interstate whilst positive with the virus with drivers having until the end of the month to receive at least one dose of approved Covid vaccinations.

The new requirement comes as mandatory testing within 72 hours of crossing the border remains in place for driving staff which travel to neighbouring states.

Green Triangle Forest Contractor Group representative Wendy Fennell said industry leaders remained concerned surrounding the ongoing implications of mandatory testing and vaccinations.

Ms Fennell said there were fears within the industry that staff disagreeing with the mandatory vaccinations would resign leaving the forestry industry short staffed.

"We need these staff more than ever to deliver our growing freight task," Ms Fennell said.

"Ultimately it is a driver's personal choice to have the vaccine and as an employer we cannot make this control mandatory.

"The State Government needs to offer an alternative solution for this small percentage of employees who don't want the vaccination and industry leaders have requested meetings

with SA Health to further discuss viable solutions."

She said forestry industry leaders believed drivers should keep the right to maintain their employment and undertake essential services whilst maintaining the strictest risk mitigation controls.

"These drivers are already exhausted by the huge toll the pandemic has brought upon their daily work from the arduous testing regime, strict personal protective equipment, regimented cleaning regimes and restrictions of freight routes," Ms Fennell said.

"The mandatory vaccination ruling is the last straw for many of these dedicated workers."

Victorian livestock transport company leader Anthony Boyle of Boyle Livestock Transport said he felt the freight industry was lacking the support to deliver its essential task of providing supplies to all Australians safely and practically.

"The Governments have had almost two years to get a national system in place for testing and vaccinations and now have just thrown the industry under the bus so to speak by mandating vaccines in a very short timeline," Mr Boyle said.

"Many young drivers have not even had the chance to get the vaccine even if they wish to due to supply issues and if something does not give there is fear we will see a huge number of staff leave our industry and I fear a number of employers will give up."

An SA Health representative stated officials continued to work directly with the South Australian Road Transport Association on opportunities to reduce impacts of cross border requirements within the industry whilst continuing to look into ongoing measures to help increase support for those to comply with direction requirements.

"It was difficult to get appointments for our staff and volunteers for a long time but through a collaboration with the primary health network and Hawkins Medical Clinic we were able to offer an in-reach clinic to achieve the vaccination within the required timeframe for staff and volunteers," Ms McGinty said.

"We are happy with the number of staff who decided to receive the vaccination although ideally we would like all staff to stay with us.

"We also appreciate that people have a choice and if they are not happy with having the vaccine it is their choice not to continue and we support their decisions."

Ms McGinty said despite the yearly requirements for staff to receive their flu vaccine, there remained doubt surrounding the Covid vaccinations.

"I believe this is fueled by social media

and a lot of misinformation but people have their opinions and are entitled to act upon those opinions," she said.

Mount Gambier's Resthaven aged care services stated the organisation had not received any staff resignations due to the mandatory vaccine.

"Most staff understand that vaccinations protect not only themselves but the people they care for and that it is something they need to do," a Resthaven spokesperson said.

"We have been extremely pleased with the response from staff in regards to the mandatory vaccine."

Millicent's Boneham Aged Care Services also recorded similar outcomes stating the company had received support from both the Millicent and District Hospital and Medical Clinic Millicent.

"We have also maintained open communication with our staff and residents during this pandemic to better inform people regarding the situation and our response," Boneham Aged Care Services chief executive Michael Filsell said.

# Pop-up clinic push

BARKER MP Tony Pasin has called on the State Government to establish a pop-up vaccination clinic in either Port MacDonnell or Tarpeena to increase the number of fully vaccinated residents within Grant District Council.

Despite the rural council having just 7.6pc of residents vaccinated – the lowest of all local government areas in Australia – Premier Steven Marshall has yet to commit to addressing the discrepancy in vaccine uptake, saying any additional clinics or pop-up hubs will be determined by need.

In a letter to the state leader, Mr Pasin encouraged the South Australian Government to consider establishing a pop-up clinic within the Grant area to address the low rate of vaccinations within the council district.

The latest vaccination data shows 16.9pc of Grant council's 7072 residents have received one dose of any vaccine, compared to 68.2pc of Mount Gambier residents, 60.1pc of Wattle Range residents and 65.5pc of people living in the Naracoorte Lucindale council area.

More than one-third (37pc) of Mount Gambier City Council's 21,802 residents are fully vaccinated, while 38.4pc of Wattle Range Council's 9916 residents have received both doses of a Covid vaccine.

Almost half (44.4pc) of Naracoorte Lucindale Council's 6866 residents are fully vaccinated, with the total number of vaccinated residents across the Limestone Coast currently sitting at 35.3pc.

Mr Pasin cited the comparative low rates in Grant

District Council and encouraged Mr Marshall to consider supplying additional Pfizer doses across the area serviced by the Limestone Coast Local Health Network region.

"I note with interest the State Government's decision to open a 'pop-up' Pfizer clinic at Pooraka to boost vaccination rates in Adelaide's Northern suburbs," he said.

"I agree with your comments... that it would be undesirable to have an uneven distribution of the state's vaccinated population.

"As a border community, I see it as extremely important that the vaccination rates increase as expeditiously as possible for the health and safety of individuals but also to ensure we can ease local restrictions on our cross-border residents and businesses as soon as possible."

Mr Pasin estimated 440,000 doses of the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines will arrive in South Australia this month.

SA Health said almost 2000 doses of vaccine were provided across the Limestone Coast Local Health Network last week.

During the same week, the state's health department increased the number of appointments at the regions' seven state-run vaccination clinics by an additional 800 appointments per week.

The next available appointment at the Mount Gambier Central Shopping Centre is December 31.

According to The Advertiser, Mr Marshall said health authorities would take "corrective action" to address any local government area with low vaccination rates.

The Premier's office did not respond to whether the government was considering establishing a

pop-up clinic in Port MacDonnell or Tarpeena, saying "there are currently three sites where locals in Mount Gambier can book in for their vaccine".

"If there is a need to open more clinics or pop-up hubs in the Mount Gambier area, we will," a State Government spokesperson said.

"We want to make it as easy as possible for every South Australian to roll-up to a clinic, roll up their sleeve and get this life saving vaccine."

Currently, the Port MacDonnell Pharmacy is the only location within the Grant District Council area administering Covid vaccinations and offers AstraZeneca.

Port MacDonnell Pharmacy owner Amir Hanna said the first delivery of Moderna vaccine will arrive next month, with doses available for people aged between 12 and 59.

Mr Hanna said the shifting advice on AstraZeneca fuelled hesitancy among some older community members and said the pharmacy would attempt to get approval to administer Moderna to over 60s.

"There are some people who are over 60 who still don't want to get AstraZeneca, so we are going to ask whether we can give them Moderna," he said.

"We are definitely getting a lot of interest in people wanting to get the Moderna vaccine and we already have a lot of bookings in place.

"For the first two weeks we are going to offer the vaccine from Monday to Friday, but we may reduce it to twice a week depending on demand.

"Each vial has 10 doses and only lasts for six hours, so I don't want to open it for one person and not be able to use all the doses."

# Regional voice to be heard

A REGIONAL representative who has knowledge of and interest in matters affecting cross-border communities will sit on the state's Transition Committee after a lock-in amendment was passed in the state's Upper House.

Greens parliamentarian Tammy Franks sought to strengthen Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell's successful move to include a regional representative following concerns an Adelaide-based bureaucrat would be selected for the role.

The government opposed Ms Franks' amendment, with Treasurer Rob Lucas said the amendment was not necessary as "it is implicit the regional representative will have knowledge of regional communities".

During an earlier debate, Attorney-General Vickie Chapman told parliament that a "senior person from the Primary Industries Department" will be placed on the committee, sparking a rebuke from Mr Bell who said a regionally-based representative was paramount to ensure cross-border community concerns were addressed.

"My concern is these public servants get paid next Thursday like they did this Thursday and it's just a job to them," he said.

"We don't need a PIRSA representative who lives in the city, we need a true regional person on that committee."

Mr Bell has suggested a number of people for the role including MacKillop MP Nick McBride – who crossed the floor in support a change to the state's emergency act – following revelations the Transition Committee comprises of Adelaide-based public servants, with the Premier nor any cabinet ministers sitting on the committee.

Ms Franks' also gained majority support for an amendment requiring minutes of any Transition Committee meeting are provided to the Legislative Council's Covid-19 Response Committee within 10 days after the meeting.

She said despite the Upper House committee requesting records of meetings, it had not received any minutes from any Transition Committee since March.

## Council postpones RDA funding cut

WATTLE Range Council will postpone a decision to withdraw almost \$20,000 in funding to the Regional Development Australia Limestone Coast (RDALC) until after representatives address elected members.

At this week's council meeting, mayor Des Noll moved a motion recommending council cut its funding to the association - which aims to support and broker regional development opportunities - citing a lack of value for money.

Mr Noll told the chamber there had been continued discussion by Limestone Coast mayors and chief executives about the collective funding to the RDALC.

He said the proportional funding - which totalled \$93,000 in 2021/22 - was used for small business assistance and development, but said it was difficult to measure the effec-

tiveness and whether any tangible outcomes are being achieved.

"At over \$250 per referral, the value proposition is questionable," Mr Noll said.

"Wattle Range Council's proportion of funding being paid to the RDALC for customer service to delivery is not value for money.

"I'm not seeing outcomes that would be expected for the outgoing investment that we are committed to."

Council chief executive Ben Gower said he had met with representatives from the RDALC prior to the meeting and suggested members invite the association to present a deputation ahead of any prospective funding cuts.

He told the chamber he believed the association had a key role in economic development in the Limestone Coast, but the engagement, funding model and service provision needed to be reviewed.

"This was the first meeting I've had with

the RDALC of this nature in four years," Mr Gower said.

"Most of their engagement in the last five years has been through the Limestone Coast Local Government Association board and not with individual councils.

"There has been a stand-off relationship for quite some time."

Councillor Peter Dunncliff indicated he would support Mr Noll's motion and highlighted whether council was getting value for money.

"I find this to be a bit like I have found the Limestone Coast Local Government Association for the last 15 years in which we haven't seen a result, we've only seen a template of what they try to do," he said.

"I'll support the motion which withdraws funding as of 2022/23... if it comes back that it has been useful and profitable for members, then we can revisit it."

Cr Dean Burrow moved an amendment that council consider withdrawing its fund-

ing following the RDALC addressing Wattle Range Council at a future meeting.

"I don't like having it on the books that the mayor withdrew the funding," he said.

"Maybe they need the funding."


Cr Dunncliff said the amendment was unnecessary, saying council should not rate-payer funds based on a deputation.

Elected members ultimately voted to adjourn debate on the motion until after the RDALC has presented to council.

Regional Development Association Limestone Coast chief executive David Wheaton said he respected council's right to examine its funding streams.

"Wattle Range Council have been a respected and long-time funding partner of ours," he said.

"Their support allows us to provide support to the small business community, but we respect their right to examine their expenditure and in their view make sure they're getting the best value for money that they can."



# Farm confidence growing this season

FARMER confidence is on the rise as the Bureau of Meteorology forecasts a wetter than average spring in its quarterly seasonal outlook report.

The Bureau of Meteorology's climatologist, Dr Andrew Watkins, said the extra rain would also lead to slightly cooler than average temperatures during the day - with average maximum temperatures hovering around 20.8 degrees, dipping to an average low of 9.7 degrees.

The South East is expected to receive around 100-200mm of rain throughout spring, which combined with late winter rains and strong commodity prices, has helped bolster crop prospects. Limestone Coast farmer Richard Auld said the weather has also had a positive impact on livestock producers, with conditions providing an abundance of feed.

"The winter season has been great with fantastic weather which has helped the grass grow and produce good stock," he said.

"We are expecting a good spring season with good rain to continue."

The spring outlook reinforces a Rabobank report released this week, which highlights record levels of confidence within the farming sector - driven in large part by a solid winter season and favourable spring outlook.

# 'Wage theft' claims made

MORE than 30 current and former workers at four Limestone Coast supermarkets owned by Eudunda Farmers have claimed they were underpaid and misclassified as part of legal action that claims the supermarket underpaid staff upwards of \$1m.

However, the Shop, Distributive and Allied Employees' Association (SDA) expects the number to rise, with the union receiving a "flood" of responses in the last 48 hours - including 15 from Millicent. Eudunda Farmers was the previous long-term owner of the Millicent IGA, but the business was sold to new owners in September 2021.

The allegations do not relate to the current owners of Millicent IGA. The union has lodged a claim in the Federal Court against Eudunda Farmers alleging underpayments of at least 64 workers across the state over a number of years. According to the union, 19 current and former workers at Eudunda Farmers' Bordertown store, 11 workers at Kington's IGA supermarket and three workers at Robe's Foodland supermarket are in statement of the claim.

SDA secretary Josh Peak said the union had been inundated with claims from former workers this week, with respondents reporting widespread non-compliance with the Fair Work Act and the Retail Award, particularly around misclassifications or higher duties.

"Store managers, store supervisors, people who are opening and closing the store, people who are doing cold work, people who are required to wear a type of special clothing weren't getting classified correctly or getting paid higher duties or higher allowances," he said.

"What we're hearing from Millicent and Bordertown specifically is for those who were misclassified... the underpayments are on average \$10,000 a year.

"We're going to be going back six years, so for those people who did work for the entirety of the time, we are seeing underpayments reach up to the \$60,000 mark."

Among the other breaches alleged to have occurred at the Eudunda Farmers stores were the denial of cold work, higher duties and laundry allowances under the Retail Award and workers being denied overtime rates while working more than 38 hours a week.

The union secretary said 87pc of Eudunda Farmers workers were casual employees

despite working regular hours - including a Limestone Coast-based manager who was classified as a casual employee for 32 years.

"That high casualisation rate isn't just terrible for those people who can't get home loans and have a degree of certainty over their lives, but it's also a way in which it makes it hard to speak out because they're worried that they wouldn't be on the roster next week," Mr Peak said.

"That is certainly the kind of culture that was existing across those stores and it is a very big issue in some of the stores in the South East."

In addition to the underpayments, Mr Peak said the union would be seeking backpay for all entitlements plus interest and superannuation. Mr Peak said the union would ask the Federal Government to impose a \$1m fine on Eudunda Farmers for the breaches.

"One of the things that we have tried to reiterate clearly is that for many people, they might think a Foodland or an IGA in a small country town is owned and operated locally and that's not always the case and that's not the case this time," he said.

"Eudunda Farmers is a public company, it has got shareholders and is based in Adelaide.

"They had revenue in the last financial year of \$180m, assets of over \$70m - the company can afford to pay people properly and they can afford to back pay people.

"What's outrageous about it is not only were they ripping this money out of that worker who lost \$10,000 a year for not being paid correctly, but that is money that has been ripped out of Millicent. That's money that's taken from the local community... and it's really not just wage theft of those workers but regional theft from this regional communities."

Eudunda Farmers were contacted for comment, but did not respond before deadline.

## EDITOR'S COMMENT

With plans for restrictions around Australia to ease by Christmas, getting vaccinated against Covid couldn't be more important.

Here in South Australia, Premier Steven Marshall announced earlier this week that Covid restrictions will be dramatically reduced and state-wide border closures will become history.

He says the milestone allowing us to move back towards the freedoms of the past will be an 80pc vaccination rate across the State.

We can assume that the 80pc vaccination rate is determined by the State average. Pretty straightforward – or is it?

Given reports of low vaccination rates in parts of our region, when the 80pc target is reached state-wide, we may be faced with the reality of being below the State average – not a good position to be in.

The two factors that will determine our region's level of success are the availability of vaccines and the willingness of people to take-up the opportunity to be vaccinated.

State and Federal governments control the availability of vaccines and the allocation to our region needs to be proportional to our population in line with metropolitan Adelaide.

In the lead-up to Christmas, the State Government needs to ensure vaccines are made available locally to those who are eligible and regularly update our community on the progress made.

Special attention may need to be made by the State Government in areas not meeting the state-wide vaccination rate and, as suggested by the Member for Barker, Tony Pasin, this may involve establishing pop-up vaccination clinics in some of our smaller towns.

While it appears to be inevitable that the future means that we are going to have to learn to live with Covid in our communities – being part of the non-vaccinated brings with it the obvious risks.

The best thing to do, if eligible, is get vaccinated - for yourself, the people you love and the community you live in.

# 'Broken record' on broken roads

I AM not sure how well the metaphor "like a stuck record" works these days.

I guess it depends on the current quality of LPs and turntables.

Nevertheless, I may well sound like a stuck record in this week's column.

In the early hours of Monday morning, a burst water main on Fullarton Road sent a torrent of water gushing and creating a sinkhole at an intersection.

Nothing new in this, I hear you mutter.

Exactly my point.

Successive State Governments of both hues have sold off public services for short term gain and, invariably, longer term pain.

The infrastructure is not being adequately maintained and/or renewed.

Fullarton Road was closed in both directions causing major traffic delays.

So, the underground pipes needed to be fixed and some major work needed to be done to re-instate the street.

A number of homes were also damaged and 13 customers were without mains water until late into the afternoon.

The ramifications of a lack of maintenance and renewal impact way beyond just a broken pipe.

This type of event has been occurring in Adelaide over a number of years and will continue to happen.

The contracts successive State Governments have made when selling off public services appear to have holes in the detail of how the infrastructure is to be managed into the long-term future.

We don't seem to learn from these experiences.

Recently, I wrote about similar implications with DPTI outsourcing road maintenance to a private company.

If you are going to do this, then the contracts need to be tight (I'm refraining from using a well-used simile here) and dedicated government employees need to be on the ground to ensure that contracts are followed to the letter.

We either insist on this or we allow our public infrastructure to deteriorate.

Prostate cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australian men with 20,000 diagnoses and close to 3300 deaths each year.

## Black Spot funding bid rejected

A NOTORIOUSLY dangerous intersection has missed out in gaining Black Spot funding due to not meeting eligibility criteria, prompting Wattle Range Council to seek information about the guidelines.

Council staff applied for funding to undertake safety improvements at the Southend Access Road and Southern Ports Highway to decrease near-misses and combat a potential accident.

The funding, which would have facilitated a left turn lane from Southern Ports Highway onto the access road, give way signs and line marking, was rejected by both the Australian Government and state-funded black spot program due to not meeting eligibility criteria.

Council's Engineering Services director Peter Halton said staff intended to question the department to determine what criteria the project did not meet.

Mr Halton suggested criteria could include accident statistics, saying there was no historical records of fatalities at the Southern turn-off.

"That's always a problem I have with this program... you could have a really dangerous intersection that needs some attention and because everyone knows its dangerous, they are very cautious," he said.

"A regular comment is do we have to wait for somebody to get killed to fix the issue.

"This project is well and truly supported from a political point of view by both our State and Federal Government representatives and that's why we thought this was an important one to address."

## 'Concerned' Mayor

WATTLE Range mayor Des Noll says he is "concerned and disillusioned" with the decision-making process of elected members following an eleventh hour attempt to change the site of council's new \$5.5m administration office.

Despite work progressing on the North Terrace/Williams Road site, Penola-based councillor Dean Burrow sought support for the development of a new design in the vicinity of the Millicent RSL Hall and the drain.

Council heard rescoping the design at the Jubilee Park precinct was likely to be in the vicinity of \$30,000 and would most likely require a change of architectural plans.

Cr Burrow said that the decision on the location was "rushed" and further claimed "a majority decision of a council is not always the right one".

The Riddoch Ward representative was backed by Sorby Adams councillors Dale Price and Deb Agnew, both of who agreed the site should be closer to existing council assets and Millicent's central business district.

Reading from a prepared statement, Cr Agnew reflected on what she termed as a "hurried and rushed choice of an almost evenly divided group" and expressed dis-

appointment with the "easy option decision".

"What has happened to our courage and our representation as a team to deliver a really good outcome? she said.

"I am not the only person who believes that if we place the new office at the proposed site, we will be doing a disservice to the staff and the community.

"This is about so much more than spending money and getting it done."

"I think opportunity awaits and we need to have some courage."

Following contributions from councillors Mr Noll - who has been a vocal supporter of the site at its current location - expressed exasperation with the continued debate on the location, which was passed by council earlier this year.

"When we started this term, there was a lot of discussion about once we make a decision, even if some of us don't like it, we go with it," he said.

"That was hammered home quite early... you have to fall in behind and go with it.

"Clearly that's not the case... it is demonstrated to me that this is not the case with this council.

"If you don't like the decision, we bring it back to the table some months later which I think is extremely disappointing.

"I don't see any team environment involved here; I see individualism coming out more and more."

Mr Noll's comments sparked a sharp rebuke from Cr Price, who said elected members were objectively reflecting on a previous decision.

"A decision made that cannot be reviewed and is possibly a wrong one, is a bad decision," Cr Price said.

"We're having a debate about a decision that we made earlier and it was a close call.

"If there was acrimony in this debate I'd be really concerned, but there's not.

"We're entitled to vote and debate this and you to adjudicate."

Councillor John Drew supported Cr Price's sentiments around the debate, but said any change in location was likely to further increase the costs of the project.

"I do not believe that this community has an appetite for increasing the cost substantially," he said.

Corcoran Ward councillors John Drew, Dennis Muhovics, Kevin McGrath, Graham Slarks and Moira Neagle, along with Beachport-based elected members Sharon Cox and Kevin McGrath voted against any change.

Cr's Burrow, Price and Agnew voted in favour of the motion.

## Road closure rejected

A MILLICENT landlord fought back tears after Wattle Range councillors unanimously knocked back a proposal to sell the unmade Lock Street road reserve to Teagle's Contracting as an alternative access for commercial vehicles.

Residents of Bellinger Street packed the chamber at this week's council meeting to oppose the sale and closure of a 910m2 section of the unmade road.

Homeowner and landlord Lynette D'Onghia addressed elected members in an emotional plea, labelling the proposed development and upgrade of the Lock Street, solely for the use of Teagle's Contracting, as "absurd".

"For many people here tonight, Bellinger Street may have been little known because it's a no through street and only comprises of three residential houses," she said.

"My dad is a resident who has been there since 1969 and is very concerned for his well-being and the impact on his health as he did not buy in an industrial area.

"There's a family, first-home buyers, who are expecting their first child who bought in this location due to it being safe [and] quiet.

"We built a house, it is tenanted and it has already been a concern for our tenants."

Landowner Bernard Kierns also addressed council, saying the private purchase of the road reserve would restrict access to his property.

"If this purchase is to go ahead, I would effectively be cut off from all access to the north east side," he said.

"I intend to subdivide this block in the near future and local real estate companies will tell you blocks are becoming a scarcity in Millicent.

"Teagle's already have access to Williams Road, a road owned by the State Government, thus reliving council of the burden of maintaining it as well as ratepayers."

Staff recommended against the proposed road closure based on feedback from 10 landowners and occupiers, all of which objected to the proposal.

Elected members unanimously rejected the proposal.

## New playground plan

CHILDREN in Millicent's south will soon have a new location to play with Wattle Range Council proposing to transform the vacant Lions Park into a state-of-the-art playground.

Wattle Range Council has allocated \$20,000 to develop a masterplan on the Stark Street and Scanlon Avenue site.

At this week's council meeting, elected members discussed seeking funding from community housing provider Unity Housing.

Lions Park is located among housing stock formerly owned by the South Australian Housing Trust but was offloaded to the not-for-profit in recent years.

The properties attract a 75pc rate rebate - equating to approximately \$90,000 each year - from council.

Councillor Deb Agnew flagged a future motion seeking matching financial funds from Unity Housing for the playground in light of the rate subsidies.

# Stepping in to fight cancer

TWO Mount Gambier women are putting one foot in front of the other to raise funds for cancer following close family ties to the disease.

Paige Carter and Ashlyn Wagener have committed to walking a certain amount of kilometres each day to raise funds for prostate and pancreatic cancer.

According to Cancer Australia, there were an estimated 3,300 deaths due to pancreatic cancer and a further 3,152 male deaths from prostate cancer.

Ms Carter said she was committed to raising funds for prostate cancer following a number of family members falling ill from the disease as she tackles the challenge of walking 72 kilometres this month.

"My father found out he had prostate cancer in 2015 and it was at stage three when we found out," Ms Carter said.

"He spent a total of eight weeks in Adelaide for treatment and although he has gotten rid of it and all his medical levels are normal now, I think it is important to keep raising the money."

Alongside her father, Ms Carter's uncle and extended family have also recently been touched by the disease.

"I usually raise money through my netball team but our season was cut very short this year so I wanted to do something different," she said.

"And because I am doing this for someone specifically in mind it makes it really personal and encourages me to go out and walk a few kilometers each day."

Ms Wagener echoed Ms Carter's comments stating her main motivation behind her 63 kilometre track was her grandmother's diagno-

sis of pancreatic cancer two years ago.

"My grandmother gave so much to the community throughout her life so it is only right that I do something in return," Ms Wagener said.

"Her battle was only eight months before

she passed away which was around two years ago and I hope that by doing this it will raise awareness of the disease because this type of cancer prognosis is very bad."

Labelling every type of cancer as very sad, Ms Wagener said it was simple for herself and

Ms Carter to walk in comparison to what cancer patients experience on a daily basis.

# Green visit

A NATIONAL strategy aimed at supporting sustainable agriculture is fundamental to adapt to and mitigate the challenges of climate change, Federal South Australian Greens lead candidate Barbara Pocock AM says.

The economist and Emeritus Professor met with primary producers involved in sustainable farming practices as part of a pre-election tour of the region.

Ms Pocock, who was raised on a farm before starting a career as an economist, said agriculture had an important role in climate change mitigation, with many opportunities to reduce and capture greenhouse gas emissions.

She said she hoped to challenge assumptions about the Greens', citing a focus on food security, land, soil and water degradation and a skilled labour force to tackle climate change.

"I have an emphasis on farming because of my background, but if you look at the international science

around one of our key priorities of climate change, the way we grow our food is a major contributor to a successful response to climate change," she said.

"Farmers have to make a living, but we can also do it in ways that respond to less water, more dramatic environmental events, a rising temperature, flood and fire."

Ms Pocock visited Tenison Woods College as part of the regional tour, praising its award-winning sustainability program to nurture an understanding of environmental management within the student population.

"Tenison Woods College is doing great things about embedding sustainability into the curriculum and we need more services into the education sector to support that," she said.

"The school is doing that out of values more than resourcing and I think it would be great to take that kind of innovation across our education system more broadly.

"The future of our labour force is in those brains."

## Grants for businesses

SMALL businesses within the Limestone Coast are set to benefit following the announcement of \$15m in a supportive grants scheme between the Federal and State Governments to further lessen the strain of COVID-19 financial difficulties.

Announced last week tourism and hospitality businesses which had already received the COVID-19 Additional Business Support Grant will now be eligible to apply for further funding of up to \$20,000.

Employing businesses with a turnover of less than \$2m will be eligible for a grant of \$3000 with businesses of a greater turnover of \$2m will be eligible for \$10,000.

Those businesses with a turnover of \$5m or greater will be eligible for a \$20,000 grant and non-employing businesses will be eligible for a \$1000 grant.

Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce president Hayley Neumann said she believed businesses within Mount Gambier would have a good chance at securing grants within the region with some businesses receiving previous funds.

"It is important for businesses in Mount Gambier to reach out to the Regional Development Australia personnel or even their accountant to gain as much information about the grants as possible as well as their eligibility," Ms Neumann said.

"These grants just postpone the inevitable for some businesses and may keep them afloat while potentially helping to pay costs but the problem is a lot of businesses within the region wouldn't have a turnover of \$2m."

Ms Neumann said the grants would assist local businesses yet certainty surrounding open borders both domestically and internationally was also needed.

She said businesses were finding it difficult to plan for the future with the unknown consistent across the state.

"Hotels are specifically finding it difficult because most places still need to pay rent as there is no rent relief this time around," Ms Neumann said.

"There is also no jobkeeper this time or ongoing support which is what the businesses need."

MOUNT Gambier residents were surprised with a free cup of coffee last week and a reminder to check in with friends and family as part of the R U OK? Day and World Suicide Prevention Day observation.

StandBy Support After Suicide employees and volunteers from the Mount Gambier and Districts and Treasuring Life suicide networks shouted the morning rush in three coffee shops to encourage conversations on mental health.

Individuals were provided with resources aimed at helping identify the signs of mental health struggle in friends, family and colleagues before it reaches crisis level.

StandBy Support After Suicide coordinator Tracey Wanganeen said the drop-in sessions were held at Bay Blue, Metro and Confessions coffee shops to attract a broad range of community members.

Ms Wanganeen said despite the Covid pandemic's devastating effects, the pandemic had reduced stigma and had led to increased discussion around mental health.

"Covid has really normalised the notion that it's okay not to be okay and it's okay to reach out if you need help," she said.

"We're slowly chipping away at the stigma and I think that is one of the positives to come out of Covid."

"There's been so much encouragement around calling a support line and or a friend to stay connected and this year's theme of are you really okay focuses on keeping the conversation going when someone seems off."

Ms Wanganeen said coffee drinkers were provided with pamphlets with information about how to start a conversation, as well as identifying warning signs such as behaviour change, loss in interest and verbal cues.

She encouraged people to remain connected with family and friends amid lockdowns and travel restrictions through phone calls and online meetings.

"Being able to see and speak to each other plays a huge part in our mental wellbeing," Ms Wanganeen said.

"The connection is what we need to maintain in tough times."



THE Bunganditj language continues to be highlighted across the country following Australian author Mem Fox granting permission to have her iconic children's story *Where's The Green Sheep* translated into the indigenous language for a short period of time as part of Indigenous Literacy Day.

A short video of previous Mount Gambier resident and proud Boandik woman Brooke O'Donnell will continue to be available online throughout September.

Ms O'Donnell said the initiative was based around celebrating different stories in multi-

ple languages and bringing that identity back together.

"These initiatives are part of our identity and having children seeing their traditional language in books like this is a great way to introduce these languages," Ms O'Donnell said.

# Roses made in Australia

Kalangadoo rose grower

WITH thousands of different rose varieties growing around the world, and many international breeders releasing new varieties every year, we can certainly say our country is now showing its talent and is coming out with interesting creations for the Australian market.

Most of the varieties we grow and sell at Wagner's come from breeders based overseas - mainly from France, UK, Germany, United States and soon from

Italy too - big rose nurseries with an established and well-known reputation like Meiland, David Austin, Delbard, Kordes, Barni and many more.

Since 1880 though, some Australian passionate rosarians started breeding new roses from seeds resulting from cross pollination and selection of existing varieties.

The breeding process is long and complicated - we'll talk about it in one of my next articles - and needs years of studies and selections, but breeding a new rose within Australia can have many advantages, as the new variety is created to perform well in our specific climate and growing conditions.

Up today, we have had over 100 Australian rose breeders who introduced new varieties to the rose industry.

Well-known and prolific rose breeders were Dr Bruce Chapman, Alistar Clark - known for Black Boy, Lorraine Lee, Nancy Hayward and many other roses bred between 1910s to the 50's - and Bob Hamilton (he created Black Magic in 1953), just to mention a few of them. Today our beautiful Australian roses are bred by passionate rosarians like Paul Hains - probably one of the youngest rose breeder in Australia, who started playing with cross pollination 10 years ago and introduced to the market beautiful varieties like Governor Marie Bashir (2015), and the more recent Toni and Lady Endo, as well as:

- **Richard Walsh:** Do you know his latest creations? The multi-awarded Dusky Moon, Miss Jane, Our Amanda, Custard Cream, Darling Charlie, The Governor's Wife and the 2021 releases Trendy and Birchgrove.
- **Bruce Brundrett:** One of the most awarded Australian breeders, with his beautiful Miss Unique, The Opportunity Rose, Shirley's Rose (his very first creation, named after his wife), My Yellow, The New Look Rose, The Jubilee Rose and the 2021 releases Jessica's Rose and Happy Birthday!
- **George Thomson:** From South Australia and

a strong passion for roses growing in the southern climate.

- **Graham Sargeant:** He created the multi-awarded and miniature mauve variety Gra's Blue.

All these roses and breeders are listed in

# Farm

## Grower confidence soars

THE latest quarterly Rabobank Rural Confidence Survey has found that South Australian farmer confidence has soared to its highest levels in a decade - as late-season rains bolster prospects of above-average crops.

The turnaround in seasonal conditions - together with strong wheat, canola, lentil, lamb and beef prices - is set to boost farm incomes with 52pc of South Australian farmers surveyed expecting to generate a higher income in 2021-22, increasing to 82pc in the grains sector.

And this is set to boost investment right across the state's agriculture sector, with close to a third of those South Australian farmers surveyed intending to increase investment in their farm businesses in the year ahead.

Increased investment is planned for on farm infrastructure, upgrading plant/machinery, the adoption of new technologies and increasing livestock numbers.

But it is the state's grain growers who hold the strongest expansionary intentions, the survey found, with one-in-four looking to purchase additional property over the next 12 months.

The latest survey, released Tuesday, found 42pc of the state's primary producers expect conditions in the agricultural economy to improve over the year ahead - almost double the 23pc holding that view three months ago.

Approximately 52pc expect similar conditions to last year, with just 2pc anticipating a deterioration.

This is the highest level of rural confidence reported in the state since March 2011.

Rabobank regional manager for South Australia, Roger Matthews, said good general rain which had fallen across the state from late June had fuelled much of the upswing in sentiment, as it marked a "significant departure from the past three years where seasonal conditions have been patchy".

This was reflected in the survey results, with 77pc of those with an optimistic outlook, about the upcoming 12 months, citing seasonal conditions as the reason for their positive view - this was up from 31 per cent in the June quarter.

Commodity prices were also a factor underpinning the positive outlook, nominated as a reason for optimism by 70 per cent of those surveyed.

After a very dry summer and autumn period and plenty of dry sowing undertaken, Mr Matthews said the winter-rains provided "a lot of catch-up".

Mr Matthews believes there's now potential for an above-average crop, albeit dependent on seasonal conditions through spring.

"September is critical to the outlook, as

the crops mature and require ongoing rain to bring them home and reduce the prevalence of frost," he said.

Mr Matthews said early-season projections by the Department of Primary Industries and Regions had pegged the South Australian winter crop at 7.6 million tonnes, the second-largest harvest in five years.

This has buoyed confidence in the grains sector, with 69pc of surveyed grain growers in South Australia expecting improved business conditions in the year ahead - up from 19pc last quarter.

"The combination of good seasonal conditions and prices is expected to flow into good returns, particularly if spring rains deliver decent yields," Mr Matthews said.

"With the wheat price still around \$300 and lentils above \$1000 per tonne, it will set many up with 82pc of grain growers expecting to generate a higher income in 2021-22 according to the survey."

While grain grower sentiment outstripped the other surveyed commodity sectors in the state, Mr Matthews said confidence remained strong among beef producers; with 56pc ex-

pecting business conditions to improve (up from 46pc last survey), and the majority of sheep producers expecting either a continuation of current conditions (67pc) or an improvement (27pc).

"It is largely a price story, with record beef prices and the combination of high sheep and improving wool prices driving the positive outlook for 82pc and 88pc of beef and sheep producers, respectively," he said.

Mr Matthews said a key challenge overhanging the otherwise positive outlook for the state's agriculture sector was the availability of labour, particularly in the horticulture sector.

"The federal government's recent announcement of the Ag Visa is a welcome step as it is something the industry has pushed for and recognises the importance of agriculture to the economy," he said.

But any concerns around the availability of labour have done little to dampen investment plans within the sector.

Around 29pc of South Australian farmers are looking to increase investment over the next 12 months, with a further 65pc intending

to maintain investment at current levels.

The survey found grain growers held the strongest investment plans, with 48pc planning to increase investment.

Of these growers, around 53pc were looking to purchase more property Mr Matthews said.

"The strong appetite amongst ag businesses to expand their enterprises - underpinned by healthy balance sheets - has driven much of the upswing in property prices," he said.

"And it is the combination of these rapidly-appreciating land values, low interest rates, good seasonal conditions and strong - and in some cases record - commodity prices that have all aligned for the first time in many people's lifetimes."

The Rabobank Rural Confidence Survey questions an average of 1000 primary producers across a wide range of commodities and geographical areas throughout Australia on a quarterly basis - conducted since 2000 by an independent research organisation.

The next results are scheduled for release in December 2021.



## NARACOORTE CATTLE Tuesday, September 14

NUMBERS remained steady as agents yarded 744 head of liveweight and open auction cattle.

These sold to a slightly smaller field of trade and processor buyers along with feeder and restocker orders. Quality was mixed over the pens with some variation in price being the result.

A single pen of vealers came forward with both the steers and heifers selling at 564c/kg. Yearling steers to the trade ranged from 405c to 551c, with similar heifers making from 450c to 520c/kg.

## NARACOORTE SHEEP Tuesday, September 14

NUMBERS rose sharply with a big increase

in new season lambs as agents yarded 10,158 lambs and 2957 sheep to total a combined 13,115 head overall, which was an increase of over 5000 on the week before.

These sold to a slightly smaller field of trade and processor buyers along with a larger field of active restockers.

Quality was mixed with smaller numbers of old lambs coming forward as some excellent new season lambs filled the start of agents runs in a market that ranged from firm to slightly easier in both the sheep and lamb sections.

Light new season lambs made from \$155 to \$177 with the lightweight trade 2 and 3 score types ranged from \$170 to \$195/head.

Restockers were very active as they sourced light lambs from \$117 to \$168 and they paid from \$174 up to \$225/head for those with better conditioning.

## Students improve habitat

STUDENTS from both Mount Gambier High School and Penola High School have completed a wetland assessment and habitat restoration project at Penola Park Swamp.

The program was part of the 2020-21 Grassroots Grants program - funded by the Limestone Coast Landscape Board.

Timberlands Pacific, Nature Glenelg Trust and Burrardies Aboriginal Corporation partnered to help deliver the project, while offering students an immersive educational experience in the field.

The students gained knowledge of wetland ecology, habitat conservation, seed collection and germination, biodiversity, the history of the site to First Nations people, and the importance of cultural connection to country.

Mount Gambier High school teacher, Jess Magarey, said the Penola Park Swamp project provided a natural environment for students to learn and added immense value to classroom content.

"A number of activities were set where the students undertook assessments of the area, providing an engaging way to cover the curriculum content," she said.

"The students really enjoyed putting their classroom lessons into practice on the ground and learning how their actions can have a lasting impact on the landscape."

The annual Limestone Coast Landscape Board Grassroots Grant program supports community initiatives that play a significant role in sustainably managing the landscape.

## Weed control from the air

AERIAL weed control methods are being used to combat the spread of invasive weeds throughout the internationally-recognised Coorong landscape.

Treatment of the declared pest plant African Boxthorn is being delivered by helicopter across the Coorong area from Parnka Point to south of the Murray Mouth.

The approach is considered efficient and cost effective in the Coorong area, delivering a measured dose of granular herbicide in an effort to control the Weed of National Significance.

"Controlling boxthorn from the helicopter also means we can treat 7000 hectares of difficult to access terrain that we wouldn't be able to reach manually," Limestone Coast Landscape Board Our Coorong Our Coast project coordinator Julie Palmer said.

The Coorong is one of Australia's most important wetland areas, recognised by its Ramsar listing as a Wetland of International Importance, and is home to internationally significant migratory birds and endangered resident beach nesting birds.

"The impact of invasive pest plants like boxthorn can be disastrous to their fragile coastal habitats," Ms Palmer said.

"Left untreated, boxthorn can severely alter habitat by outcompeting native vegetation, and harbouring pest animals such as rabbits and foxes.

"The aerial treatment is very precise and

has minimal impact to surrounding native plants and animals."

The Board also issued a reminder to landholders neighbouring the Coorong National Park of their legal responsibility in controlling

the declared pest plant on their land.

The project's weed control program, incorporating on-ground works and the aerial boxthorn control, has covered 70,000ha across the Coorong and the Limestone Coast area over

the past three years.

The project team has also worked collaboratively with Ngarrinderji Lands and Progress Association over this time to ensure effective control methods have been undertaken.

Following the same design, homologation, and manufacture processes that the recent RAM 1500 DT underwent; that is 50,000 hours of pre-build development; 80,000km of rolling road testing; 50,000km of real-world road driving; and a 20,000km full vehicle durability test.

"All-new 2500 starts the roll-out of our next generation Heavy Duty trucks," says RAM Trucks Australia National Manager Jeff Barber.

"Built for serious assignments, the all-new 2500, which will be joined soon by the next-gen 3500, sets new benchmarks in performance, capability, technology and luxury.

"Only RAM Trucks Australia can deliver such a vehicle thanks to our robust and detailed planning, development, remanufacturing, and testing programme in conjunction with our local and global partners including Stellantis (formerly Fiat Chrysler Automobiles, US)."

The screen can display one application, such as the navigation map, across the whole 12-inch screen, or can be divided to operate two different applications at once.

The all-new 2500 features a 7-inch, full-colour, 3D animation-capable driver information display. A reconfigurable function enables drivers to personalise information inside the instrument cluster. There's even a

## HYUNDAI KONA ELITE UNIQUE STYLING

HYUNDAI has a strong line up of models in its Kona series - everything from a relatively basic petrol engine models all the way up to a full electric. Much as we enjoy getting behind the wheel of any electric car this week's road test review is the Kona Elite variant.

At \$31,600 plus on-road costs it's far more affordable than the (Gulp) \$64,000 Highlander Extended Range full-electric model.

The Kona is sold in a crowded class, with its major competitors being Honda HR-V, Mazda CX-3 Mitsubishi ASX and Toyota C-HR.

### STYLING

Kona is a cross between a hatchback and an SUV in its shape. The protection around the wheels arches adds to the SUV look. The body is stylish without going over the top.

We particularly like the front with its high-level daytime running lights and the low-slung headlights.

Ground clearance is 170mm which is higher than the typical on-road hatchback but falls well short of the 210mm in "real" four-wheel drives. That 170mm does add to the appearance, though.

### INTERIOR

There's an upmarket look inside the Kona, though the materials themselves don't have the feel to match that look. Fair enough because it's sold at a far lower price than the prestige cars and money has to be trimmed somewhere.

We like the practical dashboard with its large dials and an easy to see centre display set at the same level as the instruments so you spend minimum time looking away from the road to check it.

### INFOTAINMENT

The Elite model has an eight-speaker Harman/Kardon premium sound system, we found the setup of the speakers and gave us the sort of sound we like.

### ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The 2.0-litre naturally aspirated four-cylin-

der engine sits across the front of the Hyundai Kona and produces 110kW of power and 180Nm of torque at a rather high 4500 rpm. Those revs mean most drivers will seldom go as high as 4500, however there's reasonable punch below that number.

The automatic transmission is a continuously variable transmission to maximise performance and minimise petrol consumption. More about the auto in the Driving section of this review.

As part of the mid-life makeover the CVT replaced the six-speed conventional auto previously used.

### SAFETY

All Kona variants have received five stars from ANCAP. It has six airbags, forward collision warning, lane keeping assist and lane-following assist.

The Kona Elite model also has blind-spot warning, rear cross traffic alert and safe-exit warning. The automatic emergency braking recognises cars, pedestrians and cyclists at low and high speeds.

It also has rear occupant alert in case you've forgotten there are kids in the back seats when you get out. No doubt it has happened somewhere sometime.

### DRIVING

Let's get to the CVT automatic straight away as that's what friends have been asking me about due to my previous complaints about CVTs in other cars. There's good news as Hyundai's engineers have got it pretty well sorted out and have given it a feeling of having pre-set ratios, it did jar a little but we soon ceased to notice what was happening

under the bonnet.

You can sort of use it as a manual by changing 'gears' if you feel that way inclined. After trying this we simply left it to do its own thing.

There's less room in rear seat of the Kona than we had expected, meaning I had to move my driving seat forward a couple of notches to provide knee room for anyone behind me.

The Koreans have a long history of tuning their cars to suit Australian roads and what we Aussie drivers like in the way of handling and comfort. Kona is obviously not a sports car but does hold on nicely during cornering and gives good feedback through the steering while and your backside.

It's a bit noisy on gravel road and there's some bump-thump on concrete road joins such as those on our road test section on the M1 motorway between Gold Coast and Brisbane.

Fuel consumption during our test period was in the eight to 10 litres per hundred kilometres in town and suburban driving. It fell to five to six litres per hundred on country and motorway testing.

All Hyundais have a five-year/unlimited-kilometre warranty and a lifetime capped-

price-servicing plan.

# NEW YARIS CROSS SUV

IN 1994, Toyota pioneered the small sports utility vehicle market with the RAV4, which nearly 30 years later with the now 'grown-up' version, is the best-selling SUV in the world.

Now, with its new 'baby' Yaris Cross the Japanese automotive giant is aiming to continue its success in the compact class. Coming in nine variants, with petrol or petrol / electric hybrid powertrains, front-wheel or all-wheel drive, three grades – GX, GXL and Urban – are on offer.

Toyota Australia Vice-President Sales and Marketing Sean Hanley says the Yaris Cross is set to appeal to metro-living, country exploring, active urban dwellers. With a versatile and premium interior, AWD availability (some models) for when the tarmac runs out, dynamic driving characteristics and comfortable raised ride height, it is the ideal small SUV.

The test vehicle turned out to be the 'below stairs' entry-level GX front-wheel drive, selling for \$26,990, plus on road costs, as opposed to the 'footman' GXL FWD hybrid, \$31,990, or range topping 'Lord of the Manor' Urban all-wheel drive hybrid, \$37,990.

Yaris Cross is covered by a five-year warranty, seven years for engine and driveline, and up to 10-year warranty on the hybrid battery, with a capped price for the first five services at \$205 each.

## STYLING

Based on the Yaris Cross hatch, side-on, the Yaris Cross stands its ground, with robust SUV lines, dominated by a line linking geometric wheel-arches bridging 16-inch alloy wheels.

A bold face features a split grille with a lower diffuser, flanked by deep-set LED daytime running lights and slimline headlight clusters, while at the rear a squared-off rear hatch suggests a practicality fit for purpose.

Likewise, at the rear, the broad horizontal lines connecting the integrated taillights and squared-off rear hatch suggest a robust and practical attitude.

## INTERIOR

While the platform of the Yaris Cross is only slightly longer and wider than that of the Yaris hatch, it features a substantially longer, wider and taller body to provide more interior space and versatility.

For example, the rear cargo area in two-wheel drive models has a 60:40 split false floor, which when removed makes room for up to 390 litres of cargo. With the base in position there's a capacity of 314 litres.

Inside the cabin the larger body translates into a light, airy space with a premium ambience for five occupants and plenty of luggage with all controls designed to optimise ergonomics. The quality of materials and finish are top notch.

## INFOTAINMENT

A digital instrument cluster with a 4.2-inch Multi Information Display, while 7-inch touchscreen display sits above the centre console offering convenient controls and information for the latest generation multimedia system.

The system features AM / FM / DAB+ radio, full Bluetooth connectivity, Apple CarPlay and Android Auto compatibility, voice activation and audio through six speakers.

There's single-zone climate control air-conditioning, but factory fitted satellite navigation re-quires a move up to the GXL grade.

## ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The two-wheel drive Yaris Cross is available with a 1.5-litre three-cylinder petrol engine that generates a maximum power of 88 kW and peak torque of 145 Nm, driving the front wheels through a Direct Shift constantly variable transmission.

The Direct Shift CVT features a mechanical first gear for strong off the line performance and a 10-speed manual sequential shift function that can be operated by either the shift lever, or paddles on the steering wheel.

## SAFETY

The latest generation Toyota Safety Sense includes pre-collision safety with day / night pedestrian and day cyclist detection, plus emergency steering assist, lane trace assist and lane departure alert with steering assist, daytime intersection turn assist, automatic high beam, road sign recognition and adaptive cruise control.

A rear-view camera incorporates guide lines, and eight airbags including first-in-class front centre airbags helping to reduce potential injuries caused by contact between the front passenger and driver are also standard.

The Yaris Cross is the first of the company's models offered with Toyota Connected Services, using a data communication module to automatically generate an emergency call to a round-the-clock call centre and relay the location of the vehicle in the event of a collision that requires intervention, or if an airbag deploys.

The driver is also able to request emergency assistance via an SOS button on the over-head console and if the vehicle is reported stolen, Toyota Connected Services can help authorities track the vehicle's location via the Stolen Vehicle Tracking service.

## DRIVING

While the new Yaris Cross is built on the same GA-B Toyota New Global Architecture platform as the Yaris hatch, it sits on a 10 mm longer wheelbase and 35mm - 45mm wider track to provide a broad, stable platform for all driv-

ing conditions and surfaces.

Ground clearance has also been increased by 20 mm to 170 mm. All 2WD models share a front MacPherson strut and rear torsion beam suspension providing stability, ride comfort and average luggage capacity.

Power-assisted rack-and-pinion steering and a small diameter steering wheel serve up responsive vehicle control, while assured braking is provided by ventilated front and solid rear discs, with the incorporation of electronic aids including vehicle stability control, active cornering assist, secondary collision braking and cross-wind assist.

The 2WD Yaris Cross GX, with its 1.5-litre three-cylinder petrol engine, does little to excite with its performance.

Delivering maximum power of 88 kW at 6600 rpm and peak torque of 145 Nm between 4800 and 5200 revs the CVT is quiet enough until these peaks are approached but then works with an uncharacteristic raucous note, an unwelcome visitor to the passenger cabin.

No complaints with the fuel economy, however, with a company claim of 5.4 litres per 100 kilometres on the combined urban /

highway cycle translating to test car totals of 8.6 litres per 100 kilometres in the city and 4.6 litres on the motorway.

## SUMMARY

While sharing styling cues with the compact Yaris hatch, Toyota's first entry into the light SUV market presents an image of robustness and a touch of the high-riding attitude of bigger soft-roaders.

# NEW CAR SALES MASSIVE GROWTH

SALES of vehicles in Australia are up 33 pc on the same month last year, demonstrating the resilience of Australia's car market despite the impacts of lockdowns and microprocessor shortages.

Consumers purchased a total of 81,199 new vehicles during the month of August, despite Covid-19 restricting access to vehicle

showrooms in many States and Territories.

Queensland, Western Australia and the Northern Territory all recorded growth greater than 30 pc compared to August 2020. Victorian sales have rebounded resulting in an increase of over 150 pc, while the ACT and NSW recorded declines.

Federal Chamber of Automotive Industries Chief Executive Tony Weber said that uncertainty around lockdowns meant manufacturers were having to remain agile in the ways they engage with customers.

"The bounce of 33 pc on last year's figure

demonstrates the resolve of car manufacturers to engage with customers and drive-up new vehicle ownership.

"With access to showrooms limited, vehicle makers are working to engage customers in their homes and other places of isolation."

Strong sales of electric SUVs amidst a global shortage of microprocessor parts are a result of manufacturers working with their suppliers to match vehicles with market demand.


"We know that the car industry is suffer-

ing the global impacts of Covid-19 on supply chains. An increase of 635 per cent on the sale of electric-powered SUVs shows just how diligently manufacturers are working with suppliers to deliver vehicles to market."

Toyota was market leader in August with 24.6 pc of overall sales. This was followed by Mazda (9.4 pc), and then Kia, Ford and Hyundai who all recorded around 6.2 pc of market share. The Toyota Hilux was the highest selling model with 4,770 sold with the Ford Ranger and Toyota Corolla achieving second and third place.

# Put a spring in your step

**W**ITH spring just around the corner, the weather is about to shift. As we say goodbye to winter, a new variety of plants will be ready to flourish as the temperature slowly rises.

If you're stuck for ideas about what to plant at this time of year, read on to find out the best spring seedling varieties and how to help them thrive!

## Spring varieties

### Flowers

The best flower varieties to plant in Victoria when spring comes around include salvia, snapdragons, petunias, marigolds and impatiens. After the last frost of the season has passed, sunflowers are a great option to plant. Summer-flowering bulb varieties such as dahlias, lilliums and gladioli.

Fruits will tend to struggle a little until around October given the cool temperatures of early spring, however strawberries and rhubarb can be planted in sunny areas. Rockmelon and watermelon will go well after the last frost has passed.

### Herbs

Beginning in early spring, herb varieties for the new season include lemon balm, coriander, parsley, dill, sage, thyme and rosemary. Basil should be planted later in the spring to avoid cold and frosty conditions.

### Vegetables

Leafy greens such as cabbage, kale, spinach and lettuce should grow nicely from early spring through to the summer, as will more dense vegetables such as beetroot, carrot, radish, leek and sweet corn. Beans, peas and tomatoes do well on stakes when the weather starts to warm, and capsicum, zucchini and cucumber plants flourish in heat more than cold.

### Preparation is key

One of the most crucial steps in maintaining a healthy garden is to prepare the garden bed properly. Good soil is a must, with mulch, compost and fertilisers providing much-needed nutrients to growing plants.

Firstly, ensure that all weeds and other debris are removed. This will

mean that your new garden has a clean slate without hindrances to their roots.

Though many people think any old soil will do for their gardens, it's important to ensure a good quality soil is used to provide the right vitamins, minerals and other nutrients for your plants. Your local nursery or hardware shop is likely to have a few different options of organic garden soil.

While sourcing your soil, have a look at the selection of compost, mulch and fertilisers available. Mushroom compost and sugar cane mulch are good all-rounders for a general garden, but there are often many other suitable options available.

Fertilisers and plant foods are often specialised to certain plants, so it would be useful to know what kind of varieties you are planting. Alternatively, cow or chicken manure is an effective general fertiliser, but must be mixed in well with soil to avoid burning plants.


Once your soil is on the ground, add a few inches of compost and turn it into the soil. It is important to distribute the

compost evenly to ensure all plants are covered well. If you are using cow or chicken manure, now is a good time to mix it in with the soil and compost.

Be sure to follow the distance guidelines on your plants, ensuring they have enough space between them as they grow up and out. Poke your plant tags into the soil in front of each variety to make sure you remember what grows where.

Once your new varieties have been planted, spread a layer of mulch around the garden. Be sure to leave a space around the base of the plants, then follow with a sprinkle of fertilising plant food and a good drink of water and you're all set!

As the weather begins to warm, be sure that your plants receive plenty of water and sun. Likewise, when spending time in the garden over the warmer months means sun protection and water is important for the gardener too. Following these basic steps should put your garden in good stead for the season ahead. Happy planting!

"I had previously experienced the thrill of winning as an owner but that first win as a trainer took it to a whole new level," a delighted Hawker said.

"Cap (Abbott) and I purchased Gold Rocks from Victoria back in February after she had won a couple of races in quick times at Bendigo and Shepparton.

"She hadn't won since then so it was pleasing to see her back among the winners."

"She's a nicely bred daughter of Banjo Boy x Black Traminer and after winning two races in the ACT was given to me by Banjo Boy's owner, Andrew Varasdi," she said.

"She then went on to win a further 12 races when trained by Tracie.

"Speaking of Tracie, I certainly have to acknowledge the help he has given me along the way and I also have to thank Cap for his invaluable assistance."

# \$2000 surprise for O'Leary

WHEN Wild Colonial Boy won the final race at Penola last week, albeit by a nostril, his trainer Michael O'Leary had no idea \$2000 would soon be credited to his bank account.

The race was the final heat of the South Australian section of the National Jockey Trust series and O'Leary clinched the award with the highest number of points (20), five clear of Morphetville co-trainers Richard and Chantelle Jolly.

He had previously won another heat of the series at Naracoorte on August 22 with Scenic Host.

O'Leary was surprised and chuffed to learn of the \$2,000 windfall when contacted by The Border Watch earlier this week.

"It comes as a complete surprise as it is the first I have heard about it," he stated.

"Winning the bonus is the equivalent to first prize in a race of \$20,000, so it is more than handy."

He was referring to the fact trainers receive 10pc of first prize in a race which, in this case, is like winning a race in South Australia worth all up around \$40,000.

The winning jockey in the series just happened to be Hong Kong born apprentice Gary Lo who was aboard Wild Colonial Boy at Penola and is also \$2,000 better off.

"I have had great support since coming back to SA and hope that continues," Lo said.

"I am enjoying being back in Australia for my second stint."

O'Leary was confident of a bold showing by Wild Colonial Boy at Penola and believed his price of \$7 was way over the odds.

"I reckoned he was more of a 7/2 (\$4.50) chance as he runs his best races over 1400 metres with three wins and two placings from seven starts," he said.

"At his previous start at Casterton over 1200 metres, he raced wide and was doing his best work at the finish.

"The only doubt I had at Penola was the state of the track as he is more of a wet-tracker, and stewards upgraded the reading

from a Soft 6 to a Good 4 earlier in the day."

It is like old times for O'Leary as he currently finds himself on top of the Limestone Coast trainer's premiership ladder, albeit early in the season, with only three meetings completed.

"I'm not confident about staying there as I only have a small team of horses in work these days in comparison to the likes of the Sue Murphy and Jaensch stables," he said.

As for Wild Colonial Boy, O'Leary would like to run him at Coleraine next week if there is a suitable race.

## TICKETS SNAPPED UP

It is three years since they raced at Halidon and the public have jumped at the opportunity of going to the annual meeting of the Mindarie-Halidon racing club this Sunday.

Due to COVID, the crowd capacity has been capped at 1,000 people (plus industry workers) and tickets went on line a few weeks ago.

They were all gone within a few days and all is needed is a fine day for everyone to enjoy one of the most popular meetings on the South Australian country racing scene.

There is speculation this could be the last meeting held by the club as they believe they cannot continue without manual assistance from other clubs.

Just over the border, the Coleraine Racing Club is gearing up for the first of ump-teen Victorian country cup fixtures during spring.

Coleraine normally conducts its cup meeting around AFL grand final time and that is again the case this year.

"Instead of racing the Sunday after the AFL grand final, we applied for, and were allocated, the day prior to the grand final (Friday, September 24) as that is now a public holiday here in Victoria," Coleraine Racing Club president Rod Neesom advised.

"The downside is that no crowd will be allowed as any lifting of crowd restrictions will not be made until after that weekend.

"Also, Racing Victoria have indicated that perhaps the meeting may be moved to grand final day itself, as it coincides with the Underwood Stakes meeting in Melbourne and the grand final will not commence until the early evening."

## DECISION TIME NEARS

A decision will be made in the next fortnight as to the commencement of racing here at Glenburnie.

The Mount Gambier Racing Club has not raced here since mid June last year and the committee will get an update of the track from track manager David Shepherdson at its next meeting later this month.

The racing calendar has Mount Gambier pencilled in for a meeting on Friday, December 3, which may also be Mount Gambier cup day should the green light be given for racing to resume at Glenburnie.

## BACK IN WINNING STYLE

Local apprentice Jacob Opperman returned to race riding from an enforced break last weekend and ventured all the way to Oakbank on Sunday for just the two rides.

His first mount ran last, but the teenager quickly found himself in the winner's stall after the last race.

That was aboard Pollyanna (\$5.50) for Morphetville trainer Ashton Downing in the 1400-metre BM 54 handicap.

The outside barrier at the tricky 1400-metre start at Oakbank never inspires punters to back a horse, however Opperman

overcame that by having Pollyanna in second spot after only 50 metres and the mare had the race in her keeping from the top of the straight.

## DESERVED OF A SPELL

The Trevor White trained Clever Man has earned a spell following his convincing win in the 2100-metre BM 68 handicap at Penola last week.

With three wins and four placings from 10 starts on the flat for White, Clever Man has been somewhat of a surprise packet as the gelding was purchased to be a hurdler.

"He has done a lot of schooling over the jumps and it keeps him sharp," White explained post race.

"It was his third win for jockey Kayla Crowther and he will go on holiday tomorrow for four weeks at Echunga and then another four weeks at Kayla's property at Kuipo."

The vast majority of quadrella punters had worthless tickets after the first leg at Penola which went to the outsider Ali Orphan (\$26-\$21).

Unplaced at four previous runs this campaign, the Bob and Kane Post trained mare made a one act affair of the 1700-metre BM 54 handicap and won eased down for jockey Kate Walters with five lengths to spare.

The black booker from the meeting is the Jake Stephens trained Boomer Beach who had plenty of fuel left but was badly blocked for a run over the final 300 metres.

## BOTTOMLESS PIT OF MONEY

When it comes to racing in Victoria, there has been seemingly a bottomless pit of money being dished out in recent years.

This month alone has seen two press releases with money being directed at jumps racing for next year.

An extra \$745,000 is being injected into prizemoney for jumps racing in Victoria in 2022, the majority of it into the lesser jumping races.

Racing Victoria is also providing funding of \$460,000 from the Jumps Industry Infrastructure Fund for the purchase of 21 new steeplechase fences, solely for the Warrnambool club.



# Seniors turn back clock

TWO of the Mount Gambier Golf Club's senior members turned back the clock with victories in last week's competitions.

Former high school principal Grant Stephenson, who got his handicap down to as low as five during the 1980s but at age 75 has seen it drift out to about 20, won Saturday's stableford event with a score of 39 points.

Former talented East Gambier footballer Dennis Smith, who got his handicap down to seven in his mid-30s but now at 73 plays off about 23, took out Thursday's stableford competition with 40 points.

Stephenson, who was a member and committeeman at the Attamurra club in the 1980s before moving to Penola with the Education Department, only returned "home" a couple of years ago.

His handicap at the time was "about 13 or 14", but it has slowly drifted out as he simply cannot hit the ball as far, or as well, as he once did.

"The body has certainly slowed down," he said.

"At my age it just can't do what your mind thinks it still can.

"Winter was so wet there wasn't much run on the fairways which makes it hard, plus my putting is pretty ordinary.

"Having said that I'm quite enjoying playing off 20 ... I was certainly pretty chuffed with the win."

While winners often point to a good day on the greens as their reason for their victories, that was not the case for Stephenson ... well, up to a point anyway.

He still had 38 putts, but a hot run with the flat stick in the space of four holes on the front nine was enough to see him top the leaderboard.

After notching just seven points in the first four holes, he made a one-putt birdie from about 12 feet on the par 4 fifth hole to add four more, before a two-putt par on the par 3 sixth saw another three added to the tally.

Two more rare one-putt greens on the next two holes, for a three-point par on the seventh and a four-point birdie on the eighth saw him race to 21 points with one more hole to go on the front nine.

However, that was where the putting demons returned.

A four-putt green on the ninth hole produced his first wipe of the day and three putts

on the par 3 10th added just one more.

Another single point on the par-five 11th saw him come back to the field, but he stead-

ied to rack up 16 more on the final seven holes to come in with 39 points.

That was one ahead of Paul Kenny who

took out B Grade by two points from Moryn Sullivan.

A count-back was needed to determine the winner in A Grade, with Archy Arch getting the nod from Peter Waters after the pair signed for 37 points apiece.

Stephenson's best score of the day saw him win C Grade by two points from John Miles who managed 37 points, despite wiping the fifth and 15th holes.

Special mention goes to high school student Mitch Handford, the five handicapper managing just 13 points on the front nine before lighting up with 23 more on the back nine after shooting a one-under-par 35.

While the wind was up on Saturday it was not quite as bad as Thursday's gale force conditions, although the good scoring showed many in the 81-strong field did not let it put them off their game.

Fourteen players managed to match or beat their handicap, with Smith's 40 points one better than Jeff Hodge, Rodney Summers and Leigh McCracken, who all finished with 39.

Smith, who has only been back playing regularly since early last year after an almost 20-year break, started on the 10th hole and had a solid 19 points on the back nine.

He looked like he may have blown that after wiping the par 5 first hole, but got back on track with a three-point bogey on the second and a four-point birdie on the par 4 third.

The hole that made the difference, however, was the par 5 seventh where he chipped in from about 20m short of the green for another four-point birdie that helped him score 21 points on the front nine.

# A changing of the guard

## A GRADE - EAST GAMBIER v MILLICENT

It should be the highlight of Western Border netball grand final day and there is nothing to suggest it will not be, as the benchmark of the past decade goes up against the new leaders of the pack on Saturday.

East Gambier has dominated 2021 with only one loss - a final-round one-goal defeat at the hands of Millicent when Tarsh McCallum was missing and Lisa Fyfe sustained an early injury but stayed on court.

However, Millicent has been building and last weekend in the preliminary final showed they are far from done with yet with their largest margin win over a top-four side for the entire 2021 season. The Bulldogs have been around the mark for the past five years without breaking through for that elusive premiership and adding paying coach Emily Hunter to the line-up, along with star defender Lisa Fyfe, has seen the Bulldogs add even more quality to the line-up.

The elevation of star teenage shooter Amryn Bosko to a permanent A Grade role has also been pivotal. Five of the Bulldogs' starting line-up this weekend were named in the 2021 Western Border Team of the Year which shows how the rest of the competition rates this line-up as well, with goal keeper Bo Creek and mid-courter Tarsh McCallum joining the big three in the line-up.

Creek has the unenviable task of limiting supply to in-form Saints shooter Tabatha Sanderson, who had a strong preliminary final thanks to the patient feeding of her team mates, while McCallum is the level head in the East frontline, who works the angles, directs and encourages and has a great connection with her two goalers.

For the Saints, they will need to bring the relentless defensive intensity that they brought to the preliminary final and right from the first whistle if they are to topple the Bulldogs.

Portia McRae was on song at the weekend, with Hannah Nitschke and Lisa Duldig providing their usual no-nonsense hard work out front, denying time and space to the North frontline. They will need to do that and probably more to limit the scoring power of the Bulldogs, with Hannah Nitschke having the toughest task on the day - ensuring Gray does not earn too much ball in dangerous positions.

At the other end of the court it will be all about speed of ball, avoiding long cross-court entries, which Fyfe and Creek will swallow up and trying to isolate Sanderson one-on-one.

Paige Nitschke, Demi Verbena and Lucy Denton were much more patient in the preliminary final and will need to continue that high work rate to shake of the tight checking of the East defenders, with Hunter and Tyne Bosko two of the best at pressuring the feeders.

It will be physical, uncompromising and tense, with the Bulldogs to claim a drought-

South goalers Jaymee O'Neil and Leyna Bruggemann will need to be on song in the season decider. They play a moving circle that tests all defensive combinations and Heather Douglas and Nicole Domaschensch will need to deny this duo supply or the scoreboard will favour the Demons.

At the other end, association runner up best and fairest Charlene Riley headlines the Demons defensive line, with strong support from Bella Morale, who has been a revelation in 2021 as a circle defender and Tash Attiwill who is the heart and soul of this South line-up.

They will harass and pressure the Saints

forward line that boasts plenty of experience in coach Jacqui Matthews, alongside the talent of Mia Varcoe and Kate Walker. It is all about speed in the mid court for the Saints with association best and fairest Jackie Sunderland and Tayla Werchon who run hard all day and create turnovers.

With long-range specialist Jodie Reilly and association runner up best and fairest Sapphire Sims in goals, plus Sophie Skeer and Nicola Batten delivering the ball, the Saints have been a high-scoring outfit. Defensively they are also sound with the likes of Abby McShane, coach Kalli Brown, Ella Wesolowski and Lilly Gray rotating through the defensive goal third.

Then there is association best and fairest Krystal Coghlan, who creates turnover ball at will and also proves critical in transition as a link player through the mid court.

North has plenty of potential match-winners as well, with the star shooting combination of Hannah Fox and Bailey Young coming off a stunning preliminary final performance.

At the other end, the Tigers have been rotating their defensive combination with Ilana Adam, Chloe Miller and Kate Dyson providing a close-checking style of defence.

West's defensive line of Hayley Pearson, Hannah Seidel and Maddie Milich went above and beyond in the preliminary final and will need to reproduce that tight checking effort to stem the Saints scoring. It would not be a shock if West won, but it would be an upset - the Saints to defend their title.

# Demons and Saints face off

Presentations to follow game.

A LOT has changed since the last season of Western Border football.

That was back in 2019 and North Gambier won the season decider.

The Demons advanced to the final after a huge win over West Gambier in the semi-final round, while the Saints also won their semi-final against East Gambier, but then had to line up against West the following week in the do-or-die preliminary final.
