Dance flawed

MOUNT Gambier MP Troy Bell is expecting a close result at the next State

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THE relaxing of Covid-19 dancing restrictions has venue operators expressing mixed feelings about how the rules affect party goers in the lead-up to the festive season.

As of yesterday morning licensed venues can welcome up to 50 guests on the dance floor for private functions only with a cap of 150 guests, yet at public events - such as live entertainment - patrons must remain seated for the duration of the show.

Commodore on the Park general manager Tom Kosch expressed excitement at the easing of restrictions labelling the announcement as a light at the end of the tunnel with the venue hosting predominantly private functions.

"The announcement is definitely a step forward and by reintroducing dancing in venues, it will be seen as a positive across the industry and we are hoping this can continue to step forward in the not too distant future," Mr Kosch said.

According to the manager, businesses within the industry were cautious leading up to the start of the festive season with Mr Kosch labelling it as an important time of year for hospitality businesses across Australia.

Liberal Party MP stays put

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PREMIER Steven Marshall has acknowledged MacKillop MP Nick McBride's "great level of frustration" regarding the state's travel exemption process, pledging to process the 11,000 applications currently awaiting approval as "expeditiously as possible".

Last week, the first-term Liberal MP confirmed he was considering defecting to the crossbench over delays in processing travel exemptions for MacKillop constituents.

Following what he described as "productive discussions" with Mr Marshall and Treasurer Rob Lucas earlier this week, and consultation with constituents, Mr McBride confirmed he would continue as the Liberal Member for MacKillop.

Mr Marshall told parliament he "completely appreciate[s] the frustration" that MPs are feeling and sought to assure parliamentarians that authorities would continue to process applications as quickly as possible, while remaining focused on keeping the Delta variant out of South Australia.

"I completely appreciate the frustration that members of parliament are feeling on the frontline, because they're on the frontline responding to some of these requests," he said.

"Some of the stories we are hearing are very compelling but at the same time we have been... given that requirement to balance the need for people to come back in with the need to keep South Australians safe.

"The Member for MacKillop is a passionate member, he's got an excellent electorate, it's a very attractive part of our state, it's a very productive part of our state and we are happy to back it at every single opportunity.

"We love hearing matters being raised by regional members and one of the things we're

going to do going forward is to have a more direct dialogue with me and the Cabinet.

"This is something I feel very, very positive about"

In a statement, Mr McBride said Mr Marshall and Mr Lucas had committed to improving the flow of communication between the parliamentary party and regional members, including through the establishment of a monthly regional members forum. However, Mr McBride would not respond to numerous questions regarding whether he had sought funding commitments for MacKillop from Mr Marshall or Mr Lucas.

Mr Marshall said that the forum will be established as a subcommittee of the Liberal Joint Party Room but would not be open to other regionally based independent or Labor MPs.

"It probably would be extended to some of

our candidates in regional South Australia," he said.

"It doesn't mean that if people aren't attending, they don't have the ear of government"

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell would not be drawn to comment on Mr Mc-Bride's prospective independent bid, simply saying "I respect the decision Nick has made".

Possum circuit breaker

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AIMED at stopping possums from causing power outages, SA Power Networks has installed guards on power poles for about 100kms from near Millicent to Robe.

SA Power Networks Manager of Corporate Affairs, Paul Roberts said the electricity distributor was installing anti-climb guards on all 563 poles along its 33,000 volt line that runs from the Snuggery Substation through Millicent and onto Robe.

The project will cost around \$380,000 and will prevent possums from climbing up power poles.

Manufactured and installed by Millicent based J&M Shanks General Engineering, the galvanised steel sheets sit about one metre off the ground and are approximately one metre in height.

J&M owner, John Shanks said there were around 15 different styles of guards that had to be designed and manufactured to accommodate the different power poles along the line.

"They're all roughly just over a metre high and then it's just all the width and depth measurements that change, depending on the size of the pole," he said.

"And obviously, when there's a service coming down the pole that goes on the ground, I've got cables that stick to the outside of them.

"And the poles have got other guards, so you have to accommodate those with the possum guards as well."

Mr Roberts said the Snuggery substation supplied electricity to around 6,900 customers throughout the South East and that the interruptions from possums were common enough to warrant the project.

"The South East does have a large possum population, so outages caused by possums are more common in the South East than other parts of the state: other than the Adelaide Hills," he said.

"As the length of the line from Snuggery right through to Robe is very long, we have had more possum related outages than other lines, hence the reason we are installing the guards on this line as a priority."

Mr Shanks said there were a handful of poles left to fit with guards, and that the project would finish in about a week.

'Education first' approach on off-leash dogs

OFF-LEASH dogs will be prohibited at the Little Blue Lake, Mount Schank and Donovans Landing Reserve later this year following changes to Grant District Council's

At this week's meeting, elected members supported the addition of a number of locations to councils existing dog-on-leash ar-

eas, which include all council-owned sports grounds, Port MacDonnell Lions Park and a portion of the Port MacDonnell foreshore

Councillors voted to axe the current \$50 expiation fee for by-law breaches, instead implementing an "education-first" approach to enforcement and providing staff with au-

thority to issue penalties on a case-by-case basis up to the proposed legislated maximum of \$312.50.

The changes to council by-laws will take effect later this year and also encompass a prohibition on camping or erecting a tent on any council land which is not designated paid camping or free-camping area at the

Port MacDonnell Foreshore Park and Pine Country Caravan Park.

Camping will also be restricted in the Canunda National Park, Tarpeena Recreation Reserve, Carpenter Rocks Recreation Reserve, Brown Bay car park and Port MacDonnell Cape Northumberland car parks.

He said staff were not expecting an influx of private functions following the announcement however those who had already booked would begin to feel at ease.

"It will ease the minds of wedding couples that have booked their reception with us as they will now be able to have their friends and family join them on the dance floor," Mr Kosch said.

With the festive season around the corner, Mr Kosch said the business would maintain its model for Christmas party functions which focussed on seated events rather than traditional dancing events.

"Since the pandemic began we have remodelled the way we run our Christmas shows and took the opportunity to have more people come out to dine in, as opposed to Christmas dance functions that would have been held in the past," he said.

He said the changes in the way they have held Christmas functions had were supported in 2020 and he expected that to continue as guests will also now have the added opportunity to get up and dance if they wished.

While South Aussie Hotel venue manager Joseph Ratcliffe also welcomed the lessening of restrictions, he labelled the difference between private and public functions as conflicting and confusing.

"These restrictions do not suit regional

South Australia and we are not Adelaide - we have not had a case in the region for over a year so why can't public events such as live music also enjoy dancing," Mr Ratcliffe said.

"One of my biggest concerns surrounding the restrictions is the impact on performance and live music because they cannot book the events they need and although it is fantastic that private events are able to dance, public events such as live music should be able to as well"

Mr Ratcliffe said it was not the same experience for guests to be required to sit down at live performances as it would be if they were allowed to dance - stating it was difficult for venues such as the hotel to make these events private to meet requirements of the Covid restrictions

"These bands have gone through hours a week of practicing and the planning is a lot of time as well so to not be able to host them is disappointing for all involved," he said.

Mr Ratcliffe said within recent months the venue had a number of events cancelled due to restrictions and border closures.

"Although it is good that private events are allowed to dance there will always be concerns that these restrictions will be reimplemented and we will have more cancellations of booked events," he said.

Alongside the easing of dancing restrictions, consumption of alcohol while standing will also be allowed in outdoor venues.

Historic sale in the making

A HISTORIC Mount Gambier house is on the market and is expected to fetch more than \$1.6million which could be the highest price ever paid for a residential property in the city's history.

Colhurst House, owned by the Matthews family, has two storeys with 19 rooms including seven bedrooms and five bathrooms with an additional two cellars.

Adelaide-based selling agent, Anthony Hurl said the asking price is in the range of \$1.6 million and above.

"It's a once in a lifetime opportunity to acquire an iconic historic property in Mount Gambier," Mr Hurl said.

Mount Gambier valuer, Travis Turnbull said Colhurst House had the potential to be the most expensive house sold within the city of Mount Gambier.

"Few residential properties have sold for say more than \$900,000 within the city of Mount Gambier previously," he said.

"Rural and residential properties surrounding Mount Gambier have been achieving prices of over a million dollars for a number of years now but this is because their land value is higher when compared to smaller city housing blocks."

Mr Turnbull said that the unique property was well placed to achieve a record price.

Agent Mr Hurl said there has been no shortage of interest in Colhurst House - including significant interstate interest.

"On the basis of enquiries, we've had a considerable number of groups from around Mount Gambier look at it." Mr Hurl said.

"We've also had quite a number of residential based enquiries from Adelaide looking for a country retreat or looking to perhaps retire in the country."

He said Victorians in particular, who see South Australian property as relatively cheap in comparison to their own property, want to

come across to a state that has had less Covid lockdowns.

Colhurst House was built in 1878 by Mr Thomas Williams and was then valued at £100.

Mr Williams was a successful businessman, one of the first councillors appointed to the newly formed Town Council in 1876 and served as Mayor in 1881.

Originally called Llandovery - in honour of

the birthplace of Mr Williams in Wales - Colhurst House has had many uses throughout its

When Mr Williams was Mayor, the house provided an ideal location for social functions and garden parties.

During the Second World War it housed airforce officers.

The Williams family sold Llandovery in the

1940s to the Arthur family, where it was converted into a series of flats.

In 1981, the property underwent an extensive restoration having been bought by the Davie family.

The Matthews family have owned the home since 1990 and operated it as an upmarket bed and breakfast accommodation business.

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
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Sexism funding claim made

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A WATTLE Range councillor has labelled a recommendation to grant a football club \$2000 for new junior guernseys as an "endorsement of sexism" during an animated debate at council's monthly meeting last week.

Elected members were split on whether to allocate the funds to the Glencoe Football Club for new football uniforms under council's Community Sport and Recreation Grant Program.

Despite the application meeting the grant program's eligibility guidelines, Councillor Graham Slarks decried the recommendation as contrary to council's gender policy saying junior netballers are required to hire or purchase uniforms while footballers are lent guernseys by clubs.

"The Glencoe Football Club have not sought money for young girls dresses and, having recently purchased three, they are expensive," he said.

"The expectation is that the girls buy their own dress, while the boys are lent a jumper.

"If you wish to borrow a dress, you have to hire it.'

Glencoe-based councillor Dale Price told the chamber that there are a number of girls playing in the Glencoe junior football league,

with the club fielding a minimum of 24 players each week.

"Throughout the season, Glencoe has provided six to seven players to clubs with lower numbers of players, enabling children from other clubs to have a game," he said.

"It's important for the Mid South East to have those younger players coming on.

"I would argue that the social aspect of football far outweighs the social aspects of the sale yards and we are more than happy to fund that to the tune of \$150,000 a year.'

Cr Price did however acknowledge a degree of inequity with the funding allocation and encouraged all football clubs fielding female players to apply for grants.

Sorby Adams Ward councillor Deb Agnew raised concerns with the grant program in its entirety, saying the funding stream was "not empowering sports clubs to do what they do very well and that's look after themselves".

"Sports clubs actually have capacity with numbers to make a significant contribution to developments and raise money for themselves," she said.

"They can do it themselves and we just get lazy."

Councillors considered changing the eligibility criteria and guidelines before Wattle Range mayor Des Noll urged members to focus debate on the staff recommendation.

"I worry about these grant applications because they fill out the application, we get to this point and we want to change the rules," he said.

However, Cr Slarks reiterated the recommendation to fund the grant was "sexist" and in "violation of our moral code".

"It's not about whether they have met the criteria or not," he said.

"We have a gender equity policy, council endorses it, we employ women we pay the same amount as men, we promote it and now we are going to turn a blind eye.

"Boys get given guernseys and girls have to rent uniforms."

Elected members were split when voting on the matter, with Mr Noll using his casting vote to support Glencoe Football Club's grant

Entry into the event closes October 8.


This year's event will stick to its regular three-day format.

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MEMBER for Mount Gambier Troy Bell will demand \$100m to fund the four-year Future Mount Gambier and District plan in the event either major party needs his support to form government after the State election next year.

The independent MP was "very confident" of a close result at the March poll, saying a funding commitment for his long list of Mount Gambier priorities would be a non-negotiable condition of support if he was to hold the balance of power.

The State Government currently relies on the support of crossbenchers in a minority government, with the Liberal Party holding 23 seats in the 47-member lower house following the mid-term resignations of Fraser Ellis and Sam Duluk.

However, Mr Bell – who will seek another four year term as the Member for Mount Gambier at next year's election - would not be drawn to comment on whether he believed the upcoming election would return a Liberal or Labor minority government.

"It's too hard to predict those things, and there is so much time for things to play (out) and change," he said.

"My focus is on making sure that our region is positioned in the best possible way going forward, and that is through the nonnegotiable condition of funding the entire \$100m needed for the Future Mount Gambier and District plan.

"Whoever supports that document will have a very good chance of getting my support."

The plan, which is currently in draft form, seeks to secure millions in State Government funds for Mount Gambier-specific priorities, including health, housing, tourism, waste and recycling and drug and alcohol services.

Specific funding streams include \$20m towards the forestry industry, \$10m for housing and the establishment of a \$10m sports fund to help clubs refurbish ageing infrastructure.

Labor leader Peter Malinauskas attended the official launch last month of Mr Bell's multi-million-dollar plan and announced the State Opposition will release its own Mount Gambier pre-election policy document.

A spokesperson from Premier Steven Marshall's office has previously said the plan "will be considered".

"I would welcome both parties committing to that plan before the election, but if one side is going to back our region, I feel obliged to progress with that party however we can to develop the opportunities in the Limestone Coast," Mr Bell said.

"The other factor that I would also consider in the event I am elected and there is a hung parliament is the party who gets the highest two-party preferred vote."

Mr Bell highlighted the 10-year ban on fracking in the South East, successful changes to the State's Covid Emergency Management Act and the current forestry inquiry as demonstrative of his productive relationship with both the State Government and the Labor opposition.

"The forestry inquiry was actually my Bill but was rejected by the Liberals in the lower house and supported by the Liberals in the upper house," he said.

"I worked with Labor and the crossbench to amend the government's bill on the Covid Emergency Management Act, which was initially going to be extended until after the state election and was also successful in having a regional representative on the Transition

"I also pushed for a 21-day timeline on cross-border exemption approvals and proper briefings for MPs because, at the end of the day, I just want to deliver for our region which has been neglected for generations.

"The Liberals always say the regions have been neglected for 16 years, but I'd argue it has been 20."

Access to beach

GRANT District Council is still investigating issues around Green Point beach access almost a year after passing a resolution seeking more information.

Last year, Wye residents Jo and Morgan Feast urged council to consider the closure of a council-owned unmade road reserve leading to beach entry.

Historically, the family allowed recreational beach users to cross their farm to access their private gate onto the beach, but an increasing number of behavioural incidents and damage prompted the pair to lock the gate.

A COUNCILLOR describing the approval of a grant for children's football jumpers as an 'endorsement of sexism' is disappointing.

Wattle Range Councillor Graham Slarks' comments came when the council last week considered applications in its latest round of grants which included an application from the Glencoe Football Club to enable them to purchase guernseys for their

The comments only create unwarranted community division on two fronts particularly given the club in question has had girls playing in its junior football team for decades and there was no grant application for netball uniforms.

The question is then - how is this sex-

All applications for sporting grants should be assessed on merit rather than what sex has traditionally dominated or currently dominates a code.

Supporting sporting clubs, particularly junior sport, is a positive and thankfully the majority of council's elected members voted to fund junior football jumpers for Glencoe children.

Council has given grants to many organisations over the years. Let's hope that in the future Wattle Range councillors don't argue that a craft group, dominated by women, shouldn't receive a grant because the Men's Shed didn't put an application in.

Councillors need to move on from debating children's football jumpers to the real issues affecting people's lives within the spectrum of what is normally expected of local government. The last thing we need is a local council attempting social engineering in the same way some metropolitan councils do.

Perhaps next time the netball players will submit an application for uniforms to even the playing the field. They should be guaranteed funding success given the debate at this month's council meeting.

Councils should always direct political debate away from junior sport and instead encourage children of all sexes to participate in an active healthy lifestyle.

AS people continue to suffer the mental health effects of the pandemic Red Cross is reminding readers there are things they can do now to regain a sense of control, and prepare for the inevitable disasters ahead.

New research by Australian Red Cross has found that two in five Australians' mental health has been hit by Covid, and a similar number say they feel less hopeful about the future. Some 37pc feel less secure and safe.

This week is our annual campaign to encourage people to prepare for disasters, as the better prepared people are, the better their experience when a disaster hits. Better preparation also leads to a better recovery.

There are excellent resources on the Red Cross website www.redcross.org.au/prepare including steps to create your own emergency plan, to download the Red Cross Get Prepared App, a survival kit, emergency contacts list, keepsake list, information to help manage stress and more.

With disaster season almost upon us, we strongly encourage people to start thinking now about how they will manage. Your mental health will be better for it.

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Leake can be plugged

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WATTLE Range councillor Dale Price has claimed the removal of blue gum plantations near Furner has contributed to a five metre increase to the water table in the area, suggesting the pine plantation adjoining Lake Leake could have a greater impact on water

However the Limestone Coast Landscape Board has rebuffed Cr Price's suggestion, saying a number of factors - including water allocation reductions and higher rainfall years - could be attributed to higher groundwater

At last week's council meeting, Cr Price questioned council chief executive Ben Gower on a resolution passed in August calling for a review of the Lake Leake catchment area and requesting a change to the rules governing OneFortyOne Plantations for the adjoining plantation area.

Cr Price told the chamber "reliable sources" had informed him that the water table of an area near Furner had increased following the removal of blue gum trees.

"[This] suggests that the [effect of the] pines around the top of Lake Leake may be greater than what we were led to believe by OneFortyOne," Cr Price said.

Speaking to The Border Watch, Cr Price did not reveal his source, but said he was "told by a person who I believe is well informed".

The Border Watch contacted an individual who revealed themselves as the source - but who did not wish to be named - who confirmed the removal of blue gums near Furner had resulted in a five metre increase in some

A Limestone Coast Landscape Board spokesperson said the area in which the blue gum trees were removed - the management area of Short - has undergone a schedule of reductions to water allocations that have been applied to all water licence holders in the area.

"Given reductions to water allocations have occurred across the management area of Short, and to many water users and not just

plantation forestry, it is not possible to identify a point source for any groundwater level increase," the spokesperson said.

"In addition to a reduction in water allocations, there have been some higher rainfall years which would also positively impact groundwater levels in the area.

"Based on publicly available observation well data, we are not aware of a single location that has seen increases of groundwater levels of five metres in recent years.

Cr Price said he would welcome the publication of all observation well data with maps showing well locations and the readings for the 20 years.

"I'd also like to know how many observation wells there are, because I believe there has been a pretty significant reduction in the number of wells they are now collecting data from," he said.

"I would also like to know whether the publicly available data is all the data that is avail-

"There is little doubt where forestry is cleared, there is an increase in the water table".

OneFortyOne Plantations has previously addressed Cr Price's concerns about the effect of the forestry estate on Lake Leake water discharge, with general manager operations Mick Theobold telling council Lake Leake was

particularly vulnerable and entirely reliant on rainfall and runoff from within its immediate

In a letter to council, Mr Theobold said the plantation crop was situated higher than the lake and did not draw from the water body.

He suggested a drying climate was mostly responsible for the decrease in water levels.

The letter and its contents, which was tabled at Wattle Range Council's August meeting, was rejected by Cr Price who said the claims made by the forestry organisation were "easily contested points".

OneFortyOne Plantations was contacted for comment.

Labor shadow cabinet return to the region

entire South Australian Labor frontbench will descend on the Blue Lake city for the second time in just over 12 months for the party's second Limestone Coast Country Cabinet meeting.

State opposition leader Peter Malinauskas and Labor's shadow ministers will be making various visits to organisations, community groups and businesses across the Limestone Coast over the course of the two-day visit on October 17.

During the tour, the shadow cabinet will hold a Town-Hall style community meeting in Mount Gambier to provide an opportunity for community members to have access to Labor's main decision-making group, who will answer questions from the audience.

South Australian Labor leader Peter Malinauskas said he had visited the Limestone Coast on a number of occasions since becoming opposition leader, and was looking forward to bringing shadow cabinet to Mount Gambier for the second time.

"The Limestone Coast is an important contributor to South Australia, not just in the supply of jobs and economic growth - but it has so much to offer as a region," he said.

"I'm firmly of the view that political leaders from Adelaide have consistently failed to understand the opportunity that exists for our State in Mount Gambier and the Lime-

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Bond Store repairs

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VANDALISM conducted to Penola's historic Bond Store heritage building is set to be repaired soon with the Penola National Trust president labelling the incident as disappointing.

Police around the region continue the investigation of the vandalism with damages expected to proceed upwards of \$5,000.

Last week several youths were witnessed removing bricks from the exterior walls of the heritage building located in Bowden Street all of which was critical to the structure of the building.

The Bond Store was originally under the ownership of the Wattle Range Council, however changed hands to the Penola National Trust three years ago.

Trust president Peter Balnaves said throughout the trust's ownership of the building a number of volunteer based hours were put into maintaining and upgrading the facility which was now utilised for private meetings.

"We lease this building to the Coonawarra Vignerons for storage and meetings when there are dignitaries coming into the area which allows the organisation to conduct its business elsewhere from their own offices," Mr Balnaves said.

"So to have this vandalised in such a significant manner is extremely disappointing."

He said due to the manner of the incident the repairs would not be covered by insurance stating the costings would be at the expense of the National Trust itself.

"We have been very lucky to secure a tradesperson who is able to complete the repairs and we were hoping to get them here last week however they are currently in the middle of a job and due to the amount of rock and type of rock that has been pulled out, we will have to secure some paddock rock," Mr Balnaves said.

"Penola is one of the oldest towns in the South East and to find this sort of damage is sad because it is a criminal offence and the Bond Store is a part of our history so by con-

ducting this vandalism it is a complete disregard to that element.

Funding to help save beach

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SAND from Southend's West Beach will be carted to the town's caravan park beach as part of a collaboration between Wattle Range Council and the Coast Protection Board to combat erosion.

THE Coast Protection Board will match council's \$40,000 contribution to replenish some of the material lost from Southend's caravan park beach after recent storm events.

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower said the replenishment program was a temporary measure, but would provide council and the community with time to investigate and consider a long-term strategy for the site.

Mr Gower said tenders were currently open for local contractors to undertake the work and expected the program to start in coming months.

He was unable to provide any detail regarding when Southend's Eyre Street beach access - which is currently closed due to erosion risks

"We will try and open it up when we can, but there are a few complications with the project that the engineering crew is working on at the moment," Mr Gower said.

"Due to the location of the groyne, we can't get machinery in so we might have to dump sand from the top of the caravan park, but we're working through it.

"It is a short-term solution and it's only going to be as good as the next storm.

Mr Gower said a report into Southend coastal erosion and inundation risks was due to be presented to council this month, but is

likely to be tabled at the October meeting.

"Some of the ideas that have been discussed include realigning the groyne field," he

"I think some discussion is around shortening the groyne field at the outlet which builds sand on West Beach, but stopping it from flowing to the caravan park.

"If we shorten that groyne, some of that sand will divert to the caravan park and that is the conversation council and the community need to have."

Council backs land purchase

WATTLE Range Council has approved a \$71,000 budget variation to purchase a parcel of vacant land in the heart of Millicent for future development.

The State Government-owned land is adjacent to Fifth Street and is located within the Millicent Community Hub precinct.

The land contains a number of community facilities, including a portion of the Millicent Road Safety School, Men's Shed and the Millicent Craft Centre buildings.

 $A\,staff\,report\,supported\,the\,purchase\,of\,the$ land, saying it was "desirable" that the community assets are contained within councilowned land to reduce red tape.

"Currently if any lease or development does occur on the Road Safety School, Men's Shed or Millicent Craft Centre, it requires Crown approvals to occur before any development or lease can be finalised," the report said.

"This additional step adds unnecessary administration time and delays in the development approval process, which is both inefficient and frustrating for the applicant.

"It would also be of benefit to council to purchase the whole Crown land allotment including the vacant portion for future town planning for Millicent.

"...the purchase of this land does provide future opportunities for future residential allotment expansion or expansion of community facilities depending on the requirements of the community."

"I also extend my thanks to Baxter Hire, Baker's Delight and Shelton's Butcher for their generous donations, without which this event would not have been the success it was."



Care giving continues

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LIMESTONE Coast resident and former foster child Kevin Ashton knows first-hand the benefits of a stable environment and secure attachment.

"I grew up in the system and was in foster care when I was young," he said.

"I lived with my Nanna when I was younger and she got sick, and that's why I ended up in care.

"To start with I went from home to home, it was kind of like respite, but it was for longer periods.

"It got to the point where I was placed with a family full time, and having discipline, someone to come home to and the feeling of a family made a huge difference.

"With the guidance of my foster parents, they taught me right from wrong and I knew to have respect and things like that.

"If it wasn't for that, God knows where I would have ended up."

Mr Ashton's intimate knowledge of the system and the importance of having dynamic and disciplined role models inspired his and wife Donna to become foster parents.

More than a decade ago, the couple took four-year-old Dakota into their home after a series of tragic family events.

"Dakota was being sent to respite - and respite care is awesome - but having to go to respite care every weekend was really tough on him,' Ms Ashton said.

"I witnessed him hopping into the car to go to respite and he was screaming and crying – he was an emotional wreck.

"It broke my heart.

"After seeing that, Kevin and I had a talk and we both agreed he would be better coming to us every time his carer needed respite."

Four years after taking in their first foster child, the pair welcomed Dakota's half-sister Hope – who was 15 months at the time – into their home.

"The Child Protection Department rang us up and asked whether we would be interested in taking on a second child and there was absolutely no hesitation on our part," Mr Ashton said

"These kids are going to need each other later on in life and we were more than happy to have them both and encourage that."

The family expanded four years ago with the addition of Amelia, followed by her brother Tyler a year later.

"We have biological children, but we were mum and dad long before that," Ms Ashton said.

"I take pleasure in watching them achieve their goals that they set themselves and knowing that we have made a difference in someone's life.

"It is so rewarding for us to give them a happy, healthy and stable life and given them the opportunity of feeling like a family."

The Ashton's encouraged individuals and families to consider providing care during this week's observation of Foster and Kinship Care Week and ensure that children and young people thrive in the community.

"We struck it lucky because we have two amazing children, but I think anyone can do it," Mr Ashton said.

"You've got to have the heart and a lot of mental strength, because you are dealing with children who have demons through no fault of their own and you need to help them get through these issues.

"The support from the Child Protection Department is amazing we wouldn't have got through challenging times and teenage behaviours without them and our support workers.

"Although there are highs and lows, we wouldn't change a single moment and this is going to be our life until we can't do it anymore"

Child Protection Minister Rachel Sanderson praised all foster and kinship carers across the region "who go above and beyond every day to provide love, support and care to our most vulnerable children and young people".

"We know that stability and permanency is vital for good outcomes for our children," she said.

"Foster care gives young people an opportunity to have a supportive and loving family when they're not able to live with their biological family for whatever reason.

"We are always looking for foster carers right across South Australia so to anyone considering fostering, now is the perfect time to take the next step."



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A CUDDLE bed for palliative care rooms may be in sight with a classic ballroom dance fundraiser on the way.

The inaugural Key 2 Kindness charity ball will focus on the raising awareness of local palliative care and end of life services within the community.

It comes following the establishment of the initiative which was kick started by Key 2 Sale real estate agent Gail Richards.

Ms Richards said she hoped the event would promote giving back to the community following her grandmothers passing in palliative care last year.

"The Key 2 Kindness program aims to give back to our local community through donations to community organisations and we decided this year that our major fundraiser would be a charity ball," Ms Richards said.

Speaking on the motivation for the fund-

raiser Ms Richards said the palliative care facilities at the local hospital was provided in an environment which was clinical and busy for end of life care.

She said everyone should have the right to care which was dignified and best suited to the needs of the individual and their families.

"Earlier this year I contacted Maureen Klintberg of the Mount Gambier Health Advisory Council to discuss the proposed fundraiser and to also identify a specific project which would benefit patients, families and staff," Ms Richards said.

Ms Klinterg said the idea for a cuddle bed came following discussions with hospital staff with the bed planning to be placed within one of the rooms which was built for palliative care and end of life patients.

"Research reveals that the specialised beds are highly valued by patients and their families in settings around Australia," Ms Klintberg said.

"The power of touch is so important, particularly for patients and families preparing to say their goodbyes and how wonderful it would be if we- as a community - can help our hospital to provide a warm, homely, non-clinical environment where families are given every opportunity to share cuddles and comfort in such a special bed."

The fundraiser will be held at Commodore at the Park on October 9 with tickets available for purchase at the Key 2 Sale office with donations for the bed also welcome.

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Bridal weed blitz

THE Limestone Coast Landscape Board is urging members of the public to be on the lookout for Bridal Veil, an asparagus weed causing a severe environmental threat.

With only a handful of known infestations in the upper Limestone Coast, keeping on top of new sites is imperative to halt its spread and prevent new incursions.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board, Landscape Officer, Michelle Sargent, highlighted the importance of community members and landholders being vigilant on their own properties and working with the Limestone Coast Landscape Board in managing Bridal Veil within the region.

"Infestations of this weed have been found in the Naracoorte, Lucindale, Avenue and Reedy Creek areas," she said.

Ongoing mapping and yearly treatment assist in ensuring the isolated Bridal Veil infestation sites are targeted for control and spread of the weed is contained.

"Herbicide controls are best used at optimum times, and for Bridal Veil this is when it is actively growing and flowering," she said.

"Unlike its relative bridal creeper, there are no known bio-controls for Bridal Veil. with herbicide being the best recommended treatment.

Bridal Veil (Asparagus declinatus) was introduced from South Africa as a creeper garden plant and was popularly used in weddings for floral and table decorations.

It has since escaped gardens into native vegetation and is now classified as a weed of National Significance in Australia.

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board is urging the community to get in touch if they would like to be involved in control days and to learn more about Bridal Veil.

Fox baiting

BAITING for foxes at least twice a year, during early spring and again in early autumn, can provide significant benefits to producers in the region and a coordinated approach with neighbours can be key to a successful control program.

Spring is breeding season for foxes, with an increased food demand for rearing young.

Not only will baiting in spring help protect native wildlife, it will also reduce fox numbers in the lead up to lambing in autumn.

In the Limestone Coast, foxes have a significant impact on the regions biodiversity and agricultural production, spreading diseases and weeds that can entail costly control methods, along with predation on native fauna such as ground nesting birds, small mammals and reptiles.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board Landscape Officer, Alan Robins, said that there is no stand-alone method to controlling foxes.

"The best approach to managing fox prob-

lems is through a coordinated fox control program utilising a variety of fox control methods such as ground shooting, baiting and fumigation of dens," he said.

Most effective control occurs if multiple methods are used and by teaming up with your neighbours in a coordinated approach.

"Foxes do not recognise property boundar-

"Working with neighbours to bait at the same time will have a much greater result, reducing both the fox population and the level of reinvasion whilst limiting the social impact of the baiting."

Landscape Officers are able to supply 1080 fox baits, PAPP fox baits, canid pest ejector capsules, and provide trap hire.

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

Farmer truck training fund

SOUTH Australian primary producers will be able to access more valuable heavy vehicle training with Grain Producers South Australia set to receive funding through the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator's Heavy Vehicle Safety Initiative, supported by the Federal Government.

The new project, which will bring together an industry steering committee later this month, will use evidence to inform how road access can be improved for agricultural vehicles and primary producers.

NHVR Portal training will also be given to producers and other industry stakeholders as part of the project.

Grain Producers South Australia Regional Field Officer Shane Gale said the funding will enable them to continue to improve road access and heavy vehicle safety to members from all Primary Producer SA commodity groups.

"This HVSI grant will allow the GPSA to deliver another highly successful grower education campaign similar to our Chain of Responsibility Made Easy! and Roadworthy Heavy Vehicles Made Easy! programs," he said.

"The new funding will enable Grain Producers South Australia to conduct a comprehensive research study into the behaviour of South Australian primary producers in accessing public roads.

"We will use those findings to develop a new education campaign in conjunction with NHVR and Primary Producers SA, to further

improve safety for all road users while maintaining productivity for primary producers.

"This will form part of GPSA's commitment to improving heavy vehicle safety in the primary production sector for the benefit of our industry and regional communities."

Mr Gale said Grain Producers South Australia was pleased to be supporting heavy ve-

hicle safety for the primary production sector.

"The grain industry is reliant on the safe transport of grain on our roads and GPSA is committed to improving road safety not just for heavy vehicle operators, but for all road users." he said.

National Heavy Vehicle Regulator CEO Sal Petroccitto said the Heavy Vehicle Safety Initiative program supported key initiatives that deliver tangible safety improvements for the heavy vehicle industry and all road users.







Fresh calls for station

INTERSTATE livestock drivers have been turned away at the Bordertown cross border check point following difficulties surrounding Covid-19 testing requirements.

According to the Livestock and Rural Transporters Association of Victoria, several trucks have been turned away at the borders throughout recent months with two transporting livestock from Melbourne into South Australia.

Association president David Rogers stated in a letter addressed to Premier Steven Marshall that other drivers had been turned away due to not receiving a confirmed negative test prior to entering the state despite the current restrictions stating drivers need to present evidence of a test.

South Australian representative for driver and animal welfare committee and Mount Gambier driver Peter Edmunds said drivers across the region would welcome further testing stations specifically designed for truck drivers with concerns surrounding animal welfare.

"We all have concerns for summer with livestock being in extended line ups such as at the border or testing stations which adds extra stress and waiting for the stock," Mr Edmunds

"It is difficult enough for drivers to manage log book hours, welfare of the stock and now this extra pressure on drivers to figure out where they will get tested is difficult."

Merrett Logging haulage manager Adam Merrett supported initiative stating having a 24-hour station would be ideal for the forestry industry.

He said alongside the difficulties surrounding constant testing many drivers had experienced inconsistency with check in stations.

"Although we may not always travel outside the 70km cross border bubble, if we are in a truck we still have to be tested and if some drivers appear with their cross border permits there has been difficulty presenting them just because they are in a truck," he said.

Spring into planting now

SPRING is such a lovely time in the garden and if we ever get some consistent warmth and sunshine things would be a whole lots more enjoyable.

After what has been the wettest winter in five years we are all set for some wonderful gardens this season with good soil moisture in the profiles across the region which will hopefully mean a little less watering of our gardens this summer.

Summer veggie and flowering seedling planting time is upon us and lots of early season tomato growers have been flocking in for our veggie plants in an array of sizes from your basic seedling punnets right up to some well advanced plants to get you a head start and especially in this colder weather where the little seedlings tend to suffer.

We have a good range of seedling specials in our three day Spring Spectacular Seedling Sale on Friday, Saturday & Sunday, but be quick as we have the lowest priced premium seedlings in Mount Gambier they are sure to go quickly.

Also ready for planting are our now famous virus free seed potato tubers with all the many usual varieties and we still have good stocks of the very sought after Pontiac potato which is in short supply now from what customers have been telling us.

They are so easy to grow and of course grow

very well in our region with all of the potatoes farms around the place a testament to that. Heat loving veggies such as capsicums, pumpkins, zucchini and egg plant are starting to come even but protect these from the cold if you are planting as the nights have been quite cold.

Summer herb planting is much along the same lines with basil, coriander and dill seed-lings close to planting time but all of the normal perennials herbs such as oregano, mint, parsley and marjorams can all be planted now without any pampering.

Our famous sweet potato tubers are start-

ing to run low and this a very inexpensive way of growing heaps of your own Sweet potatoes for very little work so hurry in for those.

Ensure you prepare your planting areas with a light dressing of fertiliser across the soil and dig in, add any composts and manure (well rotted) to your beds and dig through and make sure to rotate your plantings from year to year especially so with tomatoes and potatoes to reduce the risk of soil borne diseases affecting your next crops.

Direct sown vegetable like peas, beans, corn, can be planted now and root crops are best direct sown from seed too.

I particularly favour the seed tape for carrots and beetroot as they are pre spaced seed along a tape that you simply cut off at however many you wish to grow and therefore no thinning of seedlings, the tape disintegrates with moisture and heat and a very easy way to grow these

Parsnips can also be planted at this time too and summer producing long season cauliflowers like 'All year Round' will have enough chilling in our region to head up properly.

Most other winter veggies are too late to plant now.

Onions can be planted from seedlings now or direct from seed and shallot virus free bulbs can also be planted now.



Remote venue should stay

THERE is a growing public backlash against the pending closure of the Halidon racetrack as a racing venue.

The "club in the scrub" is the home of the Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club, about 80 kilometres northeast of Tailem Bend in the Murray lands region of South Australia.

It only conducts one race meeting a year, which was last Sunday and it attracted a capacity crowd for the COVID restrictions in place (1,200 people comprising1,000 general admission ticket holders plus 200 industry workers).

If Racing SA has its way, it was the last meeting to be conducted at Halidon as the powers that be want the club to race at the more upmarket Murray Bridge racecourse as from next season

Mindarie-Halidon have been racing for over a century and the meeting has always been highly successful, attracting racegoers from Adelaide, the Fleurieu Peninsula, Adelaide Hills, the Riverland and nearby towns along the Murray River.

According to Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club secretary Krystina Durdin, public admission tickets sold quickly and there were another 200 people on the waiting list.

Originally, an email was sent by Racing SA to the Mindarie-Halidon club asking to have a meeting with officials and a suggestion of its meetings in future going to Murray Bridge.

According to Mindarie-Halidon officials, when the discussions eventuated, it was more a case of "it will happen".

Yes, the committee at Mindarie-Halidon is an ageing one and there was a shortage of volunteers at the time which, I am informed, has been addressed with new volunteers subsequently coming forward.

Finance is not an issue at all, according to Durdin and the biggest hurdle is to keep those volunteers and the maintenance of the track.

Certainly, there was a feeling of outrage about the closure of the Halidon track among everyone I spoke to on Sunday.

Normanville trainer Denis O'Leary, a well-known face at just about every country track in SA, said "it is a disgrace".

"Everyone, including the trainers, wants the meeting to continue here at Halidon," he

"It's only the power brokers at Racing SA who want it to end."

Social clubs from all points of the compass converged on Halidon last Sunday to make for an excellent atmosphere on a near-perfect 23 degree day.

Noticeably absent were Racing SA Chief Executive Officer Nick Redin and Chief Operations Officer Vaughn Lynch.

Country Racing SA representatives Wayne Henson (Balaklava) and Ian Millen (Gawler) were in attendance and were suitably impressed with what they saw.

The pair made mention of the fact Country Racing SA had not been consulted at any stage by Racing SA regarding the transfer of future meetings from Halidon to Murray Bridge.

Mount Gambier bookmaker Darren Guthridge, who has operated at Halidon since the mid 1990's commented "it's just ridiculous".

"It's my favourite and busiest meeting of the year by far and they should be promoting it, not shutting it down," he said.

"It is a special meeting and could be another Dunkeld if they promoted it correctly."

If Racing SA think the crowds who have supported Halidon races over the years will automatically go to Murray Bridge, they are in for a rude shock.

The general feeling on Sunday was anyone can go to Murray Bridge races up to a dozen times a year and Halidon is a once-a-year fixture and a very unique one at that.

Sure, the facilities at Halidon do not rank with those at Morphettville, Flemington or even Murray Bridge.

The good folk who go to Halidon know that and accept that and definitely prefer a day in the scrub in the middle of nowhere.

Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club president Geoff Redden was overwhelmed with support from everyone on Sunday and he would love to continue racing at Halidon.

My advice to Mindarie-Halidon officials is to make as much noise as they can through the media and to get their local State MP to go in and bat for them.

Sport of the four-legged kind is a thing of the past in the neighbouring Riverland to the east, with Barmera dogs and trots, plus Berri races, all a very distant memory.

The local football club (East Murray Tigers) folded eight years ago, there is no local cricket club and Halidon races are about the only occasion when all the locals can get together and have a day out.

Racing at Halidon is a special event for South Australian sport and I sincerely hope the little "club in the scrub" dig their heels in and have a red-hot go at keeping the meeting at their home base.

EIGHT WINS IN SUCCESSION

Just how good is the local pacer Van Mara?

Certainly far too good at present for any of his rivals at free-for-all class here in South Australia.

Van Mara had good form at Victoria metropolitan level before coming to local trainer Steve Fennell earlier this year and the eightyear-old pacer's form has gone from strength to strength.

He made it eight wins in succession (all at Globe Derby Park) last Saturday night in the NR 72 or better pace.

With regular driver Samantha Pascoe in the cart, Van Mara (\$1.35 fav.) overcome working outside the leader after crossing from barrier six to account for his five opponents by seven metres.

BEST WIN YET

The many local owners of the talented galloper Thrill Kill may have to become accustomed to winning in Adelaide.

Last Saturday at Morphettville, Thrill Kill scored the best win of his brief career in the 1200-metre class three at only his second run this campaign.

It would have been a tragedy had the fouryear-old gelding been beaten as he was going half pace on the home turn and only needed a clear passage in the straight to put his rivals away.

Jockey Ryan Hurdle found the gap and the race was over in the twinkling of an eye as the Peter Hardacre trained gelding registered his

third win (and his second at Morphettville) from 10 starts.

The way some of his owners were seen celebrating after the last race suggest they may have had a piece of the \$10 odds.

It turned out to be the perfect weekend for Hardacre as his only other runner got the money in the 1000-metre maiden at Halidon on Sunday.

The first starter Richter had run a close second in a recent trial at Penola but gave the impression he had plenty in reserve.

When the money arrived for another first-starter Valaroc, Richter eased from \$4.40 out to \$6.50 and the pair had the race to themselves from the 400 metres, with Richter proving too strong in the final 200 metres.

"It was a bit of a surprise, as we brought him here mostly for the experience," Hardacre stated

Hardacre is currently based at Murray Bridge where he has 10 horses in work while he sets up his new property.

Ryan Crute took home the top prize with a 5kg gummy shark and Graeme Ploenges managed second prize with a gummy shark also

There were also a handful of salmon weighed in by seniors and juniors, so it is good to see the guys out there still even when the weather is not amazing.

There have been plenty of anglers targeting the salmon this week right across the South East coastline and there have been some reasonable fish caught from Beachport salmon hole, all the way south back through Canunda NP and into Cape Banks.

Lures and baits are still both working well, so whichever you prefer should see you get into a few fish.

While the weather was calm late last week, a few anglers started to target the squid in Livingstons Bay.

There have been some good sized squid coming through now and the numbers are kicking into gear.

Water clarity is the key for the squid in Livingstons - if the water is nice and clear, the squid should not be too hard to find.

Find yourself six to nine feet of water near the ribbon weed beds and you are in

Mix up your jig colours until you find what they like, then go for it.

Garfishos have found some more nice fish this week, with the usual hotspots like Livingstons and Cape Douglas both producing.

Size and numbers have been decent, so now is a great time to get out and have a

The boaties are doing just as well as the land based guys, so everyone can have a go.

There has not been much talk around bycatch like mullet and tommy ruff, but I am

sure they will be there if you go looking.

The Glenelg River has been a bit hot and cold for anglers this week.

Some are finding reasonable fish in decent numbers, while others would swear there was not a fish in there.

I know of some nice fish on bait just below Donovans from a few boaties and cut prawn has been the standout.

There has not been a lot of mulloway action in the SA section this week, but young Madison Carlin did land a nice 82cm specimen on bait in the Dry Creek area last week.

It is great to see the youngsters out there and getting into them.

There have been some nice fish caught down in the estuary for the guys on the Victorian side.

Some fish have been around that 30-pound mark, which is not only a cracking fish for the river, but a cracker fish anywhere.

This week does not look fabulous on the weather front, but the long range looks like after this weekend we should start to see some improvement.

IT is an ill wind that blows nobody some good.

"I said to the guys I was playing with before we teed off that +4 would be good enough to win considering how windy it was," he said.

"I certainly didn't think that was going to be me after I had -1 on the front nine.

That score included dropped shots on the third, fourth and sixth holes, with pluses on the fifth and ninth thanks to regulation pars.

While that average front nine provided no hint of what was to come on the back, a chipand-putt for par on the par 3 10th hole got him back to square for the round.

A missed short putt for par on the par 5 11th cost McIntyre the chance to get to +1, but he quickly made up for that with pars on the 12th and 13th holes, moving him to +2 and within reach of his winning prediction of +4.

Dowie did that on his outward nine, having a slight stumble on the sixth hole before righting the ship with a par on the eighth to see him turn with 17 points.


He equalled that after book-ending threepoint pars on the 10th and 18th holes for another 17 points.

Robinson's efforts also took him to a 1000 goal total for his career.
