THE Premier has indicated that there may be changes announced today about the current Covid-19 restrictions following a meeting of the state's Transition Committee.

'Traumatised'

NEIGHBOURS of the Mount Gambier woman who tested positive for Covid-19 say they are "traumatised" by the potential for community transmission amid silence from official sources as to the infected person's whereabouts while symptomatic.

While SA Health's latest statement – shared to social media late Wednesday afternoon – said the authority did not expect any further public exposure locations to be listed in South

Australia, neighbours of the infected woman remain anxious and fearful due to a lack of information from authorities.

Mount Gambier resident Theo, who lives directly across from the woman, said the neighbourhood was "horrified" to hear about the positive case and subsequent claims about the 40-year-old's movements after experiencing symptoms on September 26.

Five days after the woman returned a positive test, both SA Health and SA Police are still yet to determine where the mother-of-four had been while infectious after initially claim-

ing she was visiting family in Casterton.

Following widespread speculation about the veracity of the woman's claims, due to Casterton not recording any positive cases during that time, a staff memo issued by the chief executive of the Casterton Memorial Hospital said the woman's supposed Covid-19 contact in the border town was "found to be a non-truth", claiming the infection was acquired while the woman was in Melbourne.

The 'non-truth' staff email

ON Monday, an all-staff email sent by the Casterton Memorial Hospital chief executive claimed the Mount Gambier woman's supposed Covid-19 contact from Casterton was a "non-truth", alleging that the woman "used Casterton as an excuse".

South Australian chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrer said the woman

- who said she was visiting family in Casterton - experienced symptoms on September 26, and returned to Mount Gambier on October 1.

The email, viewed by The Border Watch and sent by hospital chief executive Owen Stephens, said: "The woman concerned has travelled, we understand, directly from Mel-

bourne and through Casterton. She has used Casterton as an excuse to SA Police to get through our bubble zone into SA."

The Casterton Memorial Hospital confirmed that the email was sent by the chief executive officer to all-staff at the hospital.

The woman had a Covid-19 test at Mount Gambier's drive through clinic located at the

showgrounds and later transferred to the Royal Adelaide Hospital.

She has been released from hospital and is now in quarantine at Tom's Court medi-hotel in Adelaide.

Prof Spurrer said the woman has four children aged between 13 and 18, who have been tested and returned negative Covid-19 tests.

Police Commissioner Grant Stevens told a press conference he had "not been specifically advised that this woman has lied", but did concede that there had been "some challenges in obtaining relevant, up-to-date information".

Theo claimed he had viewed footage from a closed-circuit camera (CCTV) set up at another neighbour's house that allegedly shows the woman leaving her house while purportedly in 14-day quarantine.

He rejected claims that the woman arrived in Mount Gambier and went directly to get tested prior to entering self-quarantine, alleging that there had been a number of movements at the residence.

"When she said she came home and isolated - that's an absolute crock," Theo said.

"I watched CCTV footage which shows her leaving her house at least eight times.

"The authorities are powerless because they rely on people to tell the truth, and it takes individuals such as myself and others to help fill in the jigsaw puzzle."

Theo claimed neighbours had advised authorities of the movements of the woman and provided the footage to help assist the inquiry.

However, authorities did not confirm whether they had viewed the CCTV footage or if any video had captured the woman leaving the house.

South Australian chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrer told reporters earlier this week that "a number of people [had] come forward and [say] that they had contact with this person or believed they had".

Mount Gambier resident Jessica - who is currently in quarantine after being determined as a secondary contact - claimed the infected woman left the residence where she was supposed to self-isolate.

According to Jessica, the woman left the home "for a number of hours" after returning from Victoria.

Jessica, who is also a business owner, said her son was friends with one of the infected woman's children and claimed the woman left her residence for approximately five hours after she returned from Victoria.

"My kid has had two incidents face to face with [the woman and her children] since she has been symptomatic," she said.

"As soon as we found out it was them, we called SA Health, asked what we should do and where to go from here. They told us that my son was a close contact and we were secondary close contacts.

"I run a cleaning business here in Mount Gambier and because we are all close contacts, we now have to isolate for two weeks which means I cannot work and lose income due to her doing the wrong thing."

Despite Prof Spurrer to "be very cognisant" of the "number of reasons why people don't tell us absolutely what those people have been up to", Theo said it was irresponsible and unacceptable for people to risk the public's safety.

"We feel this first hand, and me being an Aboriginal who has a life expectancy of 15 years lower than the other community, it is traumatising," Theo said.

"I was born and bred here, so when people like this jump the border, be dishonest and abuse our community, it's not on.

"One of our neighbours has a heart condition, another neighbour has an issue with her lungs, a couple of houses down there's a family with beautiful baby twins.

"If those beautiful babies caught a cold - they'd die.

"There's a lady who lives right next door to the family who works in a facility.

"The stakes are that high and there's no room for error at all."

Mil Lel show victim of rules

ANOTHER Limestone Coast community show will not go ahead this year just five days before the expected launch date.

Earlier this week, the Mil Lel Agricultural and Horticultural Show Society made the tough call to cancel the annual event for the second year in a row.

It comes following a string of forceful restrictions implemented within the Mount Gambier, Grant District and Wattle Range council electorates after a Covid-19 positive case was found to be active in the community.

The current restrictions in place for the electorates left the society feeling as if they had no choice but to cancel the event - which would have had severe financial consequences had sponsors not donated their funds.

Show society treasurer Liza Kirby said all volunteers found making the decision difficult to make, yet believed it was the best option for broader public safety.

"Normally we would have an excess of 3000 people coming to our shows and we thought that it was not appropriate for us to host an event when there are all these restrictions and private events are being cancelled," Ms Kirby said.

"It is really disappointing because we were having site-holders from Adelaide come down for the event but now they are also missing out too."

Describing the annual show as a "get together" for the Mil Lel community, Ms Kirby said it will be hard for the broader community to not participate in a show for the second year in a row.

"It is frustrating and we always run the risk of having the virus come into the state but it is disappointing that it has happened so close to

our event," she said.

"Looking forward we are hoping to host the event again next year, and when our

showbags do arrive we are also looking to host a drive-by purchase point so the children don't miss out."

Covid testing ramps up

INCREASED restrictions for cross-border communities and the Mount Gambier, Grant District and Wattle Range council areas have caused a surge in Covid-19 testing numbers.

The Mount Gambier Covid-19 testing station - at the local showgrounds - reported 530 tests conducted on Tuesday and 475 on Monday, an increase of almost five times from the week beforehand.

It comes following uncertainty surrounding the whereabouts of a 40-year-old Mount Gambier woman who told health authorities that she returned to the region on October 1 before receiving a Covid-19 test at the showground's facilities and returning a positive test the following day.

SA Health confirmed with The Border Watch a total of 37 contacts have been identified following the positive result with 17 being classed as primary close contacts.

These contacts have also been transported to a medi-hotel in the city with a further 20 residents also classified as secondary contacts.

On Tuesday, SA Health announced the South Eastern Hotel's drive-through Sip n Save bottle shop as an official exposure site with the Covid-19 case reportedly visiting the venue between the hours of 5.30pm and 6.05pm on October 1.

Monday also recorded a significant increase in testing with SA Pathology workers recording 475 conducted tests held throughout the day.

Alongside the reported exposure site, new mandatory travel restrictions for cross-border community members came into place earlier this week, requiring travellers to present a negative Covid-19 test each week to travel between South Australia and Victoria.

The Mount Gambier Covid-19 testing station will extend its opening hours until 6pm until Monday, October 11.

Current directions

NEW Covid-19 emergency management directions were released by SA Police Commissioner Grant Stevens on Monday for local government areas of the City of Mount Gambier, District Council of Grant and Wattle Range Council.

In summary, the directions are:

- One person per four square metres in public venues.
- Gathering at home capped at two people more than usual residents
- Private activities capped at 10.
- No communal consumption facilities (buffet or similar).
- Seated food and beverage consumption only.
- Restrictions on dancing and singing.
- Sports spectator restrictions.
- Covid-19 management plans for events of

more than 1000 people and outdoors only.

• No change to mask requirements.
Yesterday, Premier Steven Marshall told ABC radio that the Transition Committee 'will be looking at restrictions' at a meeting this morning and described the restrictions as 'very punishing on businesses and individuals'.

Mr Marshall said the state's health authority had not identified any new cases since the Mount Gambier woman tested positive on October 1. The state leader said authorities were pleased with the 'very large numbers' of Mount Gambier residents who had been tested for Covid-19 this week.

'Artificially low' rate

GRANT District Council has backed suggestions that vaccination rates in the sprawling rural area could be "artificially low" due to residents registering their address as a Mount Gambier post office (PO) box.

According to Federal Government data, the council's vaccination rate is the lowest in the country, with just 20.8 per cent of first dose vaccines administered and 11.5 per cent of Grant's 7072 population fully vaccinated.

At a press conference held earlier this week, South Australian chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier said the figures "didn't really make a lot of sense" due to the high level of vaccinated Mount Gambier City Council ratepayers.

Federal Government data shows of Mount Gambier City Council's 21,802 residents, 81.4 per cent have received at least one dose of a Covid-19 vaccination, with 50.7 per cent of the population fully vaccinated.

"Looking into this in more detail... our vaccine team suggested that it may be because people in Grant actually register their post-code as a PO Box," Prof Spurrier said at the press conference.

"Their address might be a PO Box in Mount Gambier.

"It may look artificially low and we're just going to delve into that in a little bit more detail."

Grant District mayor Richard Sage said further investigations will be undertaken to determine whether addresses are contributing to the purportedly low vaccination rate.

In a statement, Mr Sage was cited as being hopeful that "additional information will be released which will identify a more accurate figure for vaccination rates for the District Council of Grant area".

Mr Sage said the Port MacDonnell Pharmacy - which is the only location within the council area that is administering Covid-19 vaccinations - had started an outreach service to outlying townships, with bookings of eight or more people.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin acknowledged the possibility that postal addresses may have an impact on the data, but said the South East region had a much lower rate of

vaccination than the rest of Australia as well as South Australia.

"It is imperative that we get these vaccination rates up," he said.

"This is why I've previously asked the State Government to increase supply of vaccine into the lower South East.

"The latest case has highlighted that the South East community is at risk and the best way to lower this risk is to be vaccinated.

"It's the best way to protect you, your family and the wider community from serious illness and death."

Mr Pasin has previously called on Premier Steven Marshall to establish a pop-up vaccination clinic in either Port MacDonnell or Tarpeena to increase vaccine availability in the council district.

The state's health department said plan-

ning was underway to establish pop-up, community-based clinics within the region to facilitate greater access to vaccines, with more detail expected to be released in coming weeks.

In a statement, a SA Health spokesperson said an additional 50 appointments had been added at the Mount Gambier Vaccination Clinic each day this week, which will increase to more than 100 appointments as of tomorrow (Saturday).

"In addition, up to five additional Registered Nurses will commence this week to support the increased demand," the statement said.

"Extended vaccination clinic hours and times will be confirmed once the additional nurses are on site, with new vaccination clinic also being explored".

'Urgent discussions' on financial support

THE State and Federal governments are having "urgent discussions" to determine whether a jointly funded financial assistance package can be rolled out to lower Limestone Coast businesses impacted by density and trading restrictions.

Treasurer Rob Lucas told The Border Watch that the State Government was in active discussions with its Federal counterparts to determine whether South Australia was eligible for a scheme which provides cash grants to businesses impacted by Covid-19.

Mr Lucas said, if approved, the scheme would be similar to the support grant provided to small businesses in the aftermath of the July lockdown, which provided cash grants of up to \$3000 for traders that experienced a decline in trade.

Pending Federal Government approval, Mr Lucas hoped the State Government would make an announcement by the end of the week.

"(The scheme would be similar) to what we've done previously here in South Australia, albeit it was for the whole state," he said.

"There are some other examples that we're told in other states and territories where the Commonwealth Government has agreed to what's called 'localised assistance' rather than whole state assistance.

"It might be seven days for some businesses, it might be four days trading depending on whether they normally trade on weekends and public holidays or not."

Mr Lucas said the payments would be provided solely to businesses with employees who lose work due to restrictions not eligible for payments.

"(Income payments are) only if the Federal Government declares a hot spot which is when you go into lockdown and the Federal Government hasn't declared anything a hot spot," he said.

"If the business is getting some funding, well they might be able to keep on some of their employees for some of the time.

"But the only possible scheme which is

possibly available is the business support scheme which is 50-50 funded by the Federal Government and the State Government."

The high-level discussions precede Mount Gambier MP Troy Bell calling on the State Government to provide financial support for Limestone Coast businesses and tourism operators.

Mr Bell said he was pleased to hear discussions were underway but urged both the State and Federal Government to quickly provide reassurance to business owners.

The independent MP said localised restrictions strongly impacted businesses and tourism operators in the Mount Gambier, Grant and Wattle Range local government areas.

"These restrictions have unfortunately fallen at a time when our town is at full capacity with school holidays, major tourism and sporting events and community shows scheduled for the week ahead," Mr Bell said.

"Having spoken with tourism operators this week, the fall-out from the announcement has been immediate with people cancelling accommodation and choosing to stay at home rather than head out to events."

Testing truck drivers

COMMERCIAL transport and freight workers entering South Australia by road must provide evidence of at least one dose of a Covid-19 vaccination if they have been in NSW, Victoria or ACT in the 14 days prior to their arrival.

On October 3, South Australia Police emailed all current holders of this class of Essential Traveller required to provide evidence of at least one dose of a Covid-19 vaccination.

The email requested permit holders to provide a copy of vaccination evidence via email to SA Police's Central Assessment Unit via SAPOL.Covid-19Command@police.sa.gov.au.

Evidence includes a copy of any document provided to you by your health care worker at the time of immunisation, or the Medicare certificate for those fully vaccinated.

Once evidence is provided, the traveller's Cross Border Permit will then be updated, with no requirement to produce the evidence on a subsequent arrival if travelling on the same permit

Other categories of Essential Traveller who have been in NSW, Victoria or ACT in the 14 days prior to arrival - namely National and State Security and Governance, Emergency Services Workers, Remote or Isolated Worker, Specialist Workers in Essential Sectors, Passing Through, and Foreign Diplomatic or Consular Staff - must provide evidence of having received at least one dose of Covid-19 vaccination if arriving after 12.01 am on October 11.

These classes of Essential Traveller received an email on October 5.

Hospitality restrictions bite

AFTER slowly rebuilding business following months of strict Covid-19 management measures, the region's hospitality industry has been hammered by new restrictions that limit the number of patrons to 25 per cent of capacity.

On Monday, Police Commissioner Grant Stevens enforced "severe restrictions" on the Mount Gambier, Grant District and Wattle Range local government areas after a woman tested positive to Covid-19.

The restrictions include a return to one person per four square metre density rules, with businesses now forced to operate at 25 per cent capacity just two months after rules were lifted to allow 75 per cent capacity.

Private activities at non-residential premises are capped at 10 people, while restrictions on mask wearing, dancing and singing remain.

Thyme at the Lakes operators Nick and Kylee Katris said the change in density limits had resulted in a wave of dinner and event cancellations as no more than 30 people are able to be seated at the Mount Gambier facility.

The couple said a special wining and dining event scheduled for tomorrow night (Saturday) had been cancelled due to having 80 people scheduled for the sold-out, five-course degustation.

"Luckily it was called off early in the week, because if the restrictions were announced on Thursday, we would have had a loss of product," Ms Katris said.

"Ordering products has been an ongoing battle with Covid and as a business, you just try not to order too much of anything in case there is a change.

"It's frustrating because you just start building your business back up from the last restrictions and then something happens and you are back at square one.

"Lately, we have been booked out every Friday and Saturday night which has been fan-

tastic for our business."

Mr Katris said the restaurant had previously trialled a takeaway meal program but the pair were more focused customer satisfaction through a memorable dining experience.

"Takeaway is not really what we do, which makes it hard to provide what we do and that is the dining experience," he said.

"We've been pretty lucky over the past six months that we have been able to have a full restaurant and trying to provide people with joy and a good experience.

"With takeaway, you're competing with everyone and it wasn't really worth the 10 or 20 meals we would do but we did that mostly for our own sanity."

In addition to a decrease in the number of people permitted in indoor venues, all consumption of food and beverages must be done while seated.

Pines Hotel Tarpeena operator Lynton

Cram said the prohibition on standing up while drinking would discourage patrons from attending licensed premises.

"It has been alright up until now as people were starting to get back into it and starting to come back up the pub because the rules had been loosened, but now you've got to sit down and I think that will certainly take a lot of business away," he said.

"I think that lot of people just can't be bothered going to the pub if they have to sit down, they might as well stay at home.

"The one person per four square metres will certainly impact trade, because people don't like second guessing about whether there will be room for them in the pub - they just won't turn up."

Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce president Hayley Neumann said the restrictions were particularly disappointing given it was school holidays and the start of the region's weddings and event season.

"[This will have a] huge impact on tourism and our hospitality industry, which has a huge flow through our local economy," she said.

"Town already seems quiet [with] less people around spending money.

Ms Neumann hoped the State Government would provide assistance to businesses affected by the snap restrictions.

State Treasurer Rob Lucas said South Australian and Federal Treasury officials were undertaking "urgent discussions" to consider a joint funding scheme for businesses in Mount Gambier, Wattle Range and Grant District council areas.

Mr Lucas hoped the scheme would be similar to a cash grant made available to businesses during the seven-day lockdown in July, which provided up to \$3000 for businesses.

He expected a decision would be made within days and hoped an announcement would be made at the end of the week.

Top cop urges claim

SOUTH Australian Police Commissioner Grant Stevens has urged lower Limestone Coast residents to show tolerance after arsonists targeted the car of the Mount Gambier mother-of-four who recently tested positive to Covid-19.

Emergency services were called to Sandalwood Crescent in Mount Gambier just before 10pm on Tuesday following reports of a vehicle on fire.

According to police, a Holden sedan had been set alight in the driveway, with flames threatening to spread to the house.

Fire crews managed to extinguish the blaze which destroyed the car and caused surface damage to the building.

There was no one at home at the time of the fire and there were no reported injuries.

Police said the fire appeared to be a targeted attack.

Comm Stevens warned those responsible that they had committed a serious crime and police will "be dealing with them appropriately" if they are detected.

"Obviously we take it very seriously and

we are looking at that as much as possible," Comm Stevens said.

"It's completely unnecessary [and] it's unwarranted."

Comm Stevens pleaded with community members to remain calm and patient amid widespread speculation across the region, as well as silence from official channels about the infected woman's movements and potential exposure sites.

"People shouldn't assume that they know what's going on," he said.

"We don't know exactly what has gone on, let us get to the bottom of this and we'll provide that information to the community as quickly as possible.

"I'm just asking people to show tolerance."

The investigation into the incident is continuing.

Call to register fire units

FARMERS throughout the Limestone Coast are encouraged to register their farm fire-fighting units in a new trial program hosted by the Country Fire Service (CFS).

The newly adopted state-wide program allows for the registration and coverage of farm fire-fighting units, which has proven a valuable asset for firefighters throughout the bushfire season.

The registration process will provide the farm fire-fighting units with a basic understanding of their role and responsibilities when on a fire ground and once registrations are completed, an official sticker will be given to display on the vehicle.

Mount Gambier CFS deputy group officer Jon Lamond said the lower South East CFS groups were not expecting a large uptake of registrations at this stage due to the close proximity of groups within the area.

Mr Lamond said many times with regional bushfires, property owners would already have their units on site to protect their own property rather than assist with larger fires.

“The only issue which could drive the units to being registered is a big fire danger season and if we have multiple fires at once,” Mr Lamond said.

“We already have access to aircraft at the drop of a hat and within the lower South East there are CFS groups every 10km or so which are more than happy to help if needed.”

He said being surrounded by township and volunteers also drove down the registration numbers, however within the upper South East, more farm fire-fighting units were in need to be registered.

Wattle Range CFS group officer Fred Stent said registrations were currently filtering through the system slowly with a number of

units showing interest.

“Registering these firefighting units has a range of benefits and they are very important because they are typically the first one on the scene and if the fire is reasonably small these farmers are able to tackle it and keep it under control,” Mr Stent said.

“When the fires are bigger the units typically come behind a bigger CFS unit which will knock the fire down while the farmers attend to hotspots and mop up spot fires.”

As for the up-and-coming fire danger season, Mr Stent said it was too early to tell whether it would be a dangerous season or not.

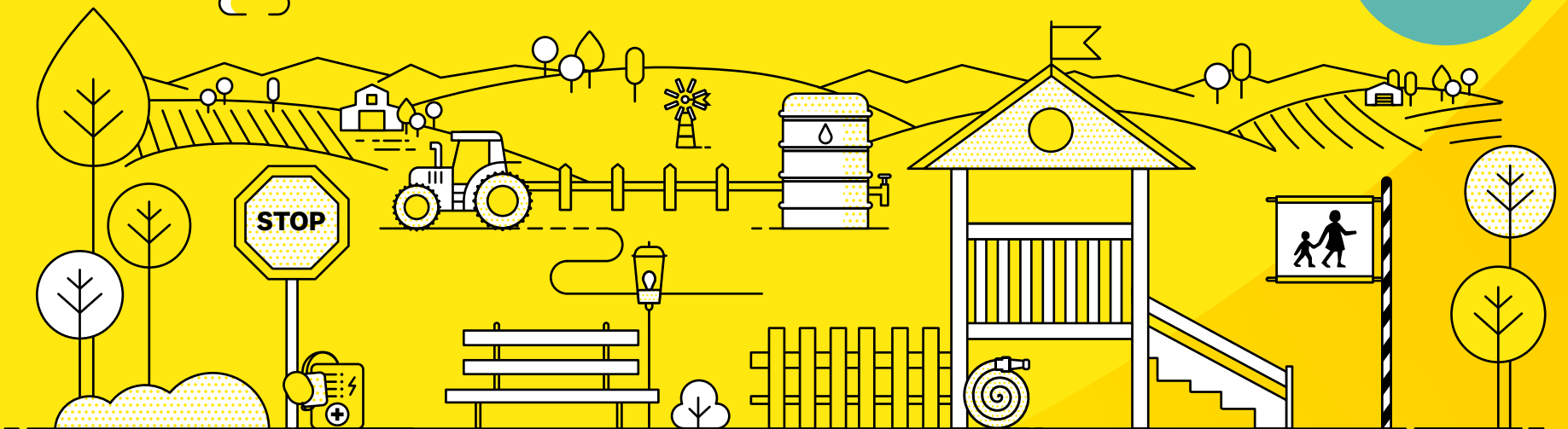
“There is plenty of feed around and winds have been getting up unusually over the past few years,” he said.

“I think there is a possibility that we may be in for a dangerous season because grass has grown very fast lately but it depends on what happens over summer with the weather.”

A LOCAL initiative has landed Mount Gambier's Zoe Simpson a nomination for 2022 South Australia Young Australian of the Year following her ongoing success for the Mount Gambier Hay Run initiative.

Ms Simpson will be one of four finalists for the top award after being shortlisted out of 140.

Originally growing up on a farm in Mingbool, the South East resident has remained involved with the farming industry long term.

Beginning the program in 2019 following the significant bushfires, Ms Simpson has assisted farmers struggling in Keilara, New South Wales and Kangaroo Island.

Next she hopes to organise a hay run for farmers in the Tintinara region following requests and reports of dry farmland and little feed.

Ms Simpson said when she first embarked on this journey at the age of 17, she never expected the hay run to reach this level of success.

"Initially I just wanted to help those who help us first," Ms Simpson said.

"We have had amazing support from the community in regards to hay donations and truck availability and I wouldn't be able to do it without them.

"The support from the truck drivers as well as my fellow team members has been amazing and I would never have been able to get the hay run to this level without them."

The volunteer work had not gone unnoticed by the broader community, with Ms Simpson scheduled to attend the annual South Australian of the Year Awards later this month.

"I am pretty gobsmacked about the nomination and never expected such big recognition in South Australia," Ms Simpson said.

"I am proud to work for our community and very excited to experience everything that goes on in regards to the nomination process.

"I think the community will be very proud of the achievements we have made over the past couple of years and through this I never looked for fame, I just wanted to help the farmers."

Power from the skies

SA Power Networks completed its pre-summer helicopter patrols along bushfire areas in the Limestone Coast last week.

The patrols covered a series of bushfire areas around Bordertown, Coonalpyn, Mount Gambier, Naracoorte and Millicent.

SA Power Networks head of corporate affairs Paul Roberts said crews were now undertaking a series of bushfire related ground patrols within the area.

"Aerial patrols form part of our annual maintenance program to inspect our power lines and other assets in bushfire risk areas and prior to the start of the CFS (Country Fire Service)-declared fire season, we undertake a follow-up pre-summer patrol to check our assets and ensure any vegetation remains outside the clearance zone," he said.

"This is important in minimising the risk of a fire start and ensuring supply reliability through the summer months."

SA Power Networks has around 9600 kilometres of powerline to patrol and

maintain, within the Limestone Coast region, and helicopter inspections provide an efficient way to identify obvious faults or potential defects.

"Using a helicopter also reduces the impact on properties as there's no need to drive through paddocks or crops," Mr Roberts said.

"However, not all inspections can be done by helicopter and we also patrol from the ground if required."

SA Power Networks crews look for potential risks such as vegetation that has grown too close to powerlines, birds' nests built on electrical assets, low hanging power lines and damaged equipment.

"We have identified trees [in need of] trimming along about 1500 spans of line between stobie poles - work that will be completed before the start of the fire season in the Upper and Lower South East," Mr Roberts said.

Crews from SA Power Networks will also be undertaking their cyclic trimming program later this year - which occurs once every three years - focusing on removing vegetation near power lines within the townships around the South East.

EDITOR'S COMMENT

AS a community, we have the right to be angry – extremely angry.

Our anger stems from the current Covid-19 restrictions caused by the alleged deceptive actions of a woman who has contracted the disease while travelling in Victoria.

However, the alleged actions of this person do not give anyone the right to take vigilante action.

The 'border bubble' has given South Australians and Victorians living and working each side of the border a level of comfort in undertaking their personal and business activities.

In the past 18 months it has worked reasonably well.

Sure, there has been a level of frustration by some but the reason for the conditions of the bubble is clear – to protect South Australians while allowing business and personal movements across the border.

The elephant in the room is, of course, that the whole concept relies on honesty from people travelling from both sides of the border.

South Australia police do not, and can not, control an individual's movements in Victoria.

Police can only take the word of someone travelling back into SA that they have not travelled beyond the bubble.

Again, it comes down to honesty.

This week's case of the woman claiming that she had returned from Casterton where she contracted Covid-19 is a perfect example of how a 'non-truth', as the chief executive of the Casterton hospital described it, can place our community in danger of an outbreak of Covid-19. It has been alleged that she actually travelled to Melbourne and back - well beyond the border bubble.

Any person found to be putting our community at risk needs to be handed a penalty proportional to the risk of life and financial cost they have caused our community.

As a community we must not take the law into our own hands, but the justice system must not let us down.

I WAS watching a short story about a 40 year old woman in the Adelaide Hills who is a pen pal to an 80 year old woman in Sydney.

They became letter based friends last year through an initiative called Postcard Pen pals which is an initiative designed to address social isolation during COVID. It is run by the aged care, not for profit group, Your Side.

My older brother had a pen pal in England through his childhood. He got to meet her on a trip to London in 1980.

I'm surprised, as a child who was always writing that I never sought to set up such a relationship for myself.

However, following a working holiday on a fruit block in the Riverland, I wrote to the daughter of the blocker for whom we worked for many years.

She invited me to her wedding and I drove up, pitched a tent in the local caravan park and took myself along to the wedding at which

the only person I knew was the bride.

The Australian writer, Geraldine Brooks, wrote a book, 'Foreign Correspondence: A Pen Pal's Journey From Down Under To All Over.'

As a young girl in a working class suburb of Sydney, she yearned to learn the history and geography of other places.

She enlisted pen pals from the Middle East, Europe and America.

As an adult, Geraldine embarked on her own human treasure hunt to find and meet in person all her pen pals. She met men and women who had grown up with their lives shaped by war, hatred, mental illness and even fame and notoriety.

It's not too late.

I have gone to the Your Side website and sent them an email.

I think I have enough words in me to share with a pen pal.

Rare earth concerns

CHINA has been the biggest producer of rare earth minerals globally to date, with a legacy of serious environmental and health impacts, (especially cancers), and toxic wastewater ponds.

I understand China is now starting to account for the cost of this legacy.

The mines have been profitable because of little or no regulation as rare earth minerals are expensive to separate from the ore body, involving acid leaching, Wikipedia.

"Rare earths" are not actually rare and alternative substances are being developed. Toyota is developing alternatives to rare earths use.

Rehabilitated land can be unstable over time and pollutants can leach into aquifers.

The Australian Rare Earths leases from Keith to Penola are in an area where there are sink holes, runaway holes, a major fault line, and hilly terrain, not to mention three of Australia's premium wine regions.

In 2016 I saw water pouring across a bitumen road in Koppamurra and pouring off paddock hillsides, as well as a huge sheet of water in Possingham's Road which vanished into a runaway hole in a week.

Cross country creeks flowing from east to west also cross the leases with Morambro

Creek at Keppoch, The Naracoorte Creek, Mosquito Creek which feeds into Bool Lagoon and others. The Padthaway aquifer is confined and any serious acid leaching would concentrate there.

Exploration drilling will only occur between dawn and dusk due to noise. Having just read "Toxic" by Richard Flanagan, industrial noise can destroy people's mental and physical health as can signing confidential gag orders.

Australia has far too much "self regulation" of it's industries, and an unwillingness to investigate corruption which makes me sceptical about the future safety of our air, soil and water (on and offshore), and our human rights to a clean environment which is also noise and light pollution free.

Far from handing over environmental responsibilities to the states, the commonwealth government needs to show good governance by having oversight of all potentially polluting activities while we still have a sovereign country to regulate.

The South East of SA should have been declared a mining and petrochemical free zone years ago.

Bumper crop this year

LIMESTONE coast farmer Robert Chant said, despite heavy winter rains, his canola crop is looking "pretty good".

Mr Chant said the price for canola was the biggest driver for planting the crop this year.

"I try to fit canola into the rotation (of crops) every year – it's about 30 per cent of our cropping area," Mr Chant said.

"The price is up over \$800 per ton this year, up from about \$600 last year and there is a forecast that it (canola) could reach over \$1000 per ton."

He said the growth in demand for Australian canola has been driven by drought in America.

"That seems to push the world markets the most...what happens in America is followed by Europe – we are only a drop in the ocean here," Mr Chant said.

He said he was very confident with the climate in the Limestone Coast for cropping.

"We have very reliable weather."

Regional road safety grants

COMMUNITY safety across the state will receive a \$70,000 boost with the launch of RAA's annual Regional Safety Grants program this week.

Lee's Top End council bid

FORMER Mount Gambier Mayor Andrew Lee was unsuccessful in his bid to be elected to a council in Australia's Top End.

The Northern Territory's Darwin City Council election was held last month with eight candidates contesting three positions for the Darwin ward of Lyons. Mr Lee finished sixth.

Mr Lee held the position of Mount Gambier mayor after being elected in 2014. In 2018 he was defeated by current mayor Lynette Martin.

In 2017 the State's Ombudsman cleared Mr Lee of misconduct after claims he had used his mayoral position to gain a personal benefit. However, the ombudsman said Mr Lee had "walked a very fine ethical line" in dealings with a Chinese company that bought the Rymill winery in Coonawarra.

"Given the language and cultural differences involved, and perhaps an incomplete understanding of the history of the deal on the part of some observers, it is not difficult to see why some in Australia have concluded that Mayor Lee's business dealings in the winery sale were suspicious," Ombudsman Wayne Lines said.

If no other applications were approved by council prior to the deadline - Thursday 5pm - Mr Brodie will be elected.

On August 3, the position became available to those wishing to apply earlier this year following a sudden resignation by Rick Paltridge.

nola War Memorial Hospital garden and his involvement with the Penola National Trust branch.

"Taking part in council is a big job and to help the community I plan on allowing their input to get what needs to be done, done and following Mr Paltridge I believe I have big shoes to fill but am happy to give it a try.

"There are not many issues within the Riddoch Ward which have been highlighted to me but I have noticed there have been a lot of things going on such as drainage and the new entrance way but I am also hoping to find out about other things which may be of concern."

Mr Brodie said he continued to care about the community and that he planned to help enhance the care the community has expressed as well.

"There was a need for someone to join the council and I thought I would be able to do that, so I am hoping I could be of some benefit," he said.

Coonawarra celebrations on hold

HARSH border and Covid-19 restrictions have put the annual Coonawarra Cabernet celebrations on hold during one of its busiest months.

Earlier in the week, tighter border and Covid-19 restrictions were implemented within the Limestone Coast, following a positive Covid-19 case reported in Mount Gambier.

Throughout October, wineries on the Coonawarra strip are typically alive with activity as business owners host a variety of events to celebrate and attract tourists to the region with owners now concerned the series of events will deter future visitors after restrictions are lifted.

Coonawarra Vigneron marketing and events officer Heidi Eldridge said some major events - such as Rymill Coonawarra's Cabernet Carnival - have been postponed until later in the year with other events being cancelled out all together.

"There are also various other smaller scaled events where the organisers are considering as to whether they can manage these events or need to cancel at the last minute," Ms Eldridge said.

"The real difficulty is the inconsistency in restrictions because businesses are being encouraged to operate, but we are not able to host private functions and there is also the continuous concern surrounding potentially unknown exposure sites."

Ms Eldridge said many wineries remained feeling frustrated with the positive case "hitting close to home".

"We have put in a great deal of effort to promote and draw people from outside the Limestone Coast to the region and this time, given

the scenario is within our region, we believe it will make it difficult to attract people in the future," she said.

"We are all worried that people will not want to travel to our region for the remainder of the month because of uncertainty and although the scenario may blow over in a few hours or days, there will still be that hesitancy for travellers."

Alongside the restrictions, Ms Eldridge said tight cross-border restrictions was also cause for concern with wineries relying on interstate travellers.

"The biggest impact for the wineries here will be visitation and we are expecting that to reflect throughout the rest of the month regardless of restrictions or our continued program," she said.

Capacity slashed at pubs

LESS than a week after South Australia eased Covid-19 rules in pubs and restaurants, Millicent's hospitality providers have been hit by additional seven-day restrictions following the discovery of a positive case in Mount Gambier.

Residents and businesses of the Wattle Range Council area join Mount Gambier City and the District Council of Grant in adhering to fresh restrictions for at least a week as authorities continue to investigate the movements of the 40-year-old Mount Gambier woman.

As of Monday afternoon, all indoor venues reverted back to the one person per four square metre rule after being able to operate at 75 percent capacity.

The Somerset Hotel owner/manager Amanda Gordon said dining capacity at the Millicent pub will decrease from 118 patrons to 35.

"As soon as it went to 25 per cent capacity, I went to straight to two sittings, one at 5.30pm and 7pm, plus we do a lot of takeaways and people will still get their meals if they want them," she said.

"We'll wait and see what happens, especially because we don't know whether a case will pop up at any minute and obviously the expectation for us is that we could get shut down."

Ms Gordon said contingency plans were in place in the event of tighter restrictions, with staff attempting to operate the business as usual in the interim.

"We generally try to carry enough food, obviously we keep things frozen and Cryovac items so you do get a good life out of them," she said.

"Normally we expect a certain amount of meals, and basically we'll just order a little bit less and not sit on two week's worth of stock at a time.

"Alcohol isn't such an issue, but obviously kegs we have gone a little lower on at the premises.

"Staff numbers decrease a little but you properly maintain more staff than what you'd like to because you've got to monitor everyone all the time."

Millicent Business Community Association chair Lee Morgan backed additional State

Government support for businesses affected by the Covid-19 restrictions, saying the new measures created uncertainty for small business and consumers.

Mr Morgan also urged community mem-

bers to get vaccinated to help Millicent and district businesses quickly bounce back after restrictions are lifted.

"Time is not on our side and I certainly think for businesses to continue, people need

to be vaccinated," he said.

"We have got to protect our businesses and if you want to choose not to be vaccinated, you may be told you can't go to certain businesses."

Long vaccine wait for residents

MILLICENT residents could be waiting weeks for a Covid-19 vaccination, with limited availability of Pfizer and AstraZeneca appointments at the town's two vaccination sites.

As of print, the next available vaccination appointment at the Millicent and District Hospital - which offers Pfizer to anyone over the age of 12 - is on November 11.

The next availability is one slot on November 25, followed by another slot on December 9.

A number of appointments can be booked on December 16, with a majority of 15-minute times available on December 22.

The Medical Clinic Millicent, which is the town's sole clinic, administers AstraZeneca and Pfizer, with some appointments remaining on October 14.

Medical Clinic Millicent nurse practitioner Jill Little said the health service had ramped up the number of Pfizer appointments, with medical practitioners offering a Saturday clinic for individuals unable to receive the vaccine during the week.

"We found a lot of people who are eligible for Pfizer work between nine to five, so we opened up another Saturday clinic to make sure we can reach them," she said.

"The clinic receives about 300 vaccina-

tions per week, plus the AstraZeneca, but that has really slowed down since Pfizer has been available to everyone.

"After the October 14 appointments, we don't have anything until November which is also pretty heavily booked as a lot of those appointments are second doses."

Ms Little said the clinic had administered approximately 3000 first and second doses of both vaccines.

"We haven't offered Moderna at all because that is being delivered through the pharmacies," she said.

"There are a lot of clients coming in from Mount Gambier, but there's not really scope to increase the vaccines we are doing because we still have to do our day to day business."

Despite Moderna being available in pharmacies, the vaccine is not being offered at either of Millicent's two chemists.

Millicent Chemist and Giftware said although it was unlikely the pharmacy would be able to offer Moderna this year, there was potential for the vaccine to be administered in 2022.

In a statement, SA Health said planning was underway to improve accessibility to vaccination for Millicent residents and will provide more details once finalised.

"Appointments are in high demand and we encourage everyone to check the website for new appointments that are being added as more vaccine becomes available," the statement said.

Fishing for a vote

LIMESTONE Coast resident Peter Dunicliff is seeking election for the state government's recreational fishing advisory group.

Mr Dunicliff, of Millicent, is the only resident of the South East who has nominated for a position on the eight-member Minister's Recreational Fishing Advisory Council.

The aim of the council is to advise the state government on recreational fishing matters such as development initiatives and policies.

Half of the advisory body positions are open for election every two years.

It currently does not have a representative from the region and, to address this imbalance,

the state government will dedicate one position in the up-coming ballot to a South East representative.

Mr Dunicliff said he has fished the Limestone Coast from Port McDonnell to the mouth of the River Murray for more than 40 years both from the shore and at sea.

He previously owned and operated a fishing tackle shop in Beachport.

"I would be a strong voice for all South East fishers," Mr Dunicliff said.

"I know what is required for effective results," he said.

Mr Dunicliff said that because of the lack of representation on the current council from the Limestone Coast, decisions have been made without input from the region.

"The state-wide snapper closure and the introduction of tags was put in place unsuccessfully, without them understanding the situation in the South East," Mr Dunicliff said.

Mr Geoff Gallasch from Meningie is the only other nomination for the South East position.

Votes can be cast at yoursay.sa.gov.au/fishing by noon October 22.

Agriculture visa changes

FARMERS and primary producers are a step closer to benefitting from the Federal Government's new Australian Agriculture Worker Visa (Ag Visa) according to Baker MP Tony Pasin.

Mr Pasin said the Federal Government amended the migration regulations last month to create the Ag Visa.

He claims the announcement the Ag Visa will help secure the long-term labour force our farmers and create a pathway to permanent residency for those workers who will help secure the future of our region.

"We promised this Visa and here it is," Mr Pasin said.

"The creation of the Ag visa under the migration regulations is landmark moment for the sector and delivers on our promise to have it in place this year.

"The Ag Visa will be the biggest structural change to agricultural workforce in our nation's history and producers in Barker are poised to be able to grab the benefits with both hands.

"The visa will be available to seasonal workers, skilled and semiskilled workers and not just those on the farm that benefit, the fisheries, forestry and agricultural processing sectors and will also get access to workers under this visa."

He said worker restrictions have always been a problem, but it has been taken to the next level with Covid and the subsequent international and internal borders.

"We now have a visa that will give Barker a long term, reliable workforce for our agricultural industries," Mr Pasin said.

He said regulation provides a new Australian agriculture worker stream which will provide for the entry and temporary stay of workers across primary industries sectors.

According to Mr Pasin the visa provides the pathway for workers to arrive with first worker arrivals once partner country negotiations are complete.

Any workers will also need to meet necessary Federal and State quarantine requirements.

Lake George study to identify inflows

AN investigation into alternate sources of water to increase the inflows into Beachport's Lake George has been launched, including diverting water from Lake Frome and connecting elements of the region's drainage system.

The State Government and the Limestone Coast Landscape Board have partnered to fund the study - with a range of expertise expected to be used including the Goyder Institute for Water Research and the Environment and Water Department's Water Science and Monitoring team - which aims to improve the health of Lake George.

Environment and Water Minister David Speirs said the volume of water in Lake George has gradually declined over the past two decades, threatening the ecological health of the lake and its recreational value.

"Historically, a regular supply of freshwater from the South East Drainage Network has helped keep Lake George healthy," he said.

"The water discharged through the Reedy

Creek Mount Hope drainage system at Southend is contributing to seagrass damage and coastal erosion"

"The study will investigate alternative sources of water to increase the inflows into Lake George.

"This will include examining diversion of

water from the Lake Frome catchment to Lake George and improving the operation of the Lake George outlet to more efficiently and effectively manage water levels.

"The concept of connecting elements of the Reedy Creek Mount Hope drainage system to supplement flows to Lake George will

also be assessed."

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride said the lower-than-average water levels in recent decades have caused significant algal bloom outbreaks which have only recovered after large flushing flows in the past five years.

"Average water inflows in the last decade are only a quarter of that seen in the 1980s and there has only been four occasions in the last 20 years when inflows have reached the historic 40 gegalitres per year levels" he said.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board chair Penny Schulz said the results of the study will inform future management solutions for Lake George and the surrounding region.

"The health of the Lake is critical to the Limestone Coast region, and we expect this study will help us to better understand and manage our valuable water resources and landscape" she said.

The results of the study are expected by early 2022.

Feral deer removal

MORE than 600 feral deer were recently removed from the Limestone Coast landscape as part of a coordinated effort to reduce the pest's impact on the region's agriculture, native habitats and public safety.

The five-day aerial culling operation was conducted across 57 private properties and 22 Department for Environment & Water reserves throughout the Limestone Coast.

The operation is held twice a year and provides essential support to participating landholders to eradicate deer.

Feral deer can attract illegal poaching, create a public safety hazard and compete with livestock for pasture, as well as causing damage to fences, have the potential to spread disease and considerably impact the region's biodiversity and agricultural industry.

Under South Australian law landholders are responsible for the eradication of feral deer on their properties as the species is a declared pest.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board Feral Deer Project Officer Aidan Laslett said the LC Landscape Board is committed to supporting landholders to eradicate feral deer.

"Our most recent aerial shoot covered 128,000ha and removed 603 feral deer from the region," Mr Laslett revealed.

"The enthusiasm of landholders in the region to participate in the eradication of feral deer is great, and this financial year we have already added 17,000ha to the aerial shooting program compared to last year."

The board's aerial and ground shooting operations removed 1994 feral deer from the Limestone Coast landscape in the 2020/21 financial year.

"The increase in the number of properties participating in our control programs demonstrates the commitment of the community to eradicate feral deer and protect agricultural productivity and biodiversity across the Limestone Coast region," Mr Laslett said.

"The Limestone Coast Landscape Board is committed to supporting landholders and my role is to encourage more landholders to participate. By working together we can implement intensive feral deer control at the largest possible scale and make a real difference to achieving eradication and protect our region from feral deer impacts."

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board is implementing a variety of control tools to achieve eradication such as aerial shooting, use of professional ground shooting contractors, commercial harvesting and supporting partnerships to trial new approaches such as deer traps and thermal-assisted ground and aerial shooting techniques.

PREDICTING CANOLA'S FUTURE: Rabobank agriculture analyst Dennis Voznesenski believes government initiatives to curb emissions in the northern hemisphere will create opportunities for Australian canola growers.

Canola boom

CHANGES in the global market are expected to provide growth opportunities for Australia's canola industry, according to a newly-released industry report.

With canola prices breaking records this year, the Rabobank report says Australia's canola industry has more potential upside ahead, with policies to curb emissions in North America and Europe expected to lift global demand for oilseeds, and in particular canola, through to 2030.

Over the next decade, government initiatives to curb emissions in the northern hemisphere will fundamentally change, and be the key drivers of the global canola market.

Rabobank agriculture analyst Dennis Voznesenski believes these changes will present opportunities for Australian canola exports.

"The global supply of canola in the current 2021-22 season has been severely reduced by drought in Canada, the world's largest canola exporter, and by continued heavy EU (European Union) import demand, and this has been benefiting Australia and other exporters," the report says.

"Domestically, canola prices are edging towards the \$1000 a tonne mark, while overseas markets broke through that level earlier in the year.

"A substantial lift in global canola production is expected next season, driven by improved seasonal conditions and elevated prices, which will expand acreage worldwide.

"Both will contribute to a large re-supply globally," Mr Voznesenski said.

"However, in 2024-25, we expect new Canadian crushing capacity to come online to supply a growing renewable diesel sector across North America and this will reduce Canada's exportable surplus, primarily to price-sensitive markets in Asia and Mexico, but also to Europe."

Canada typically produces close to 30 per cent of the world's canola and accounts for around 64 per cent of global exports.

"Then, from 2026-27 onwards, we expect a sizeable reduction in the EU's use of palm



oil, as a feedstock for biodiesel, as it is phased out to meet sustainability commitments," Mr Voznesenski said.

"The feedstock gap created will deliver an opportunity for even greater use of canola in the EU.

"Even under favourable European growing conditions, we could see EU import demand for canola then rise to levels similar to those of recent drought years."

Both these factors will lift global demand for canola, the report says.

However just how much Australian canola and canola prices will benefit will depend on a number of variables.

These include how quickly the EU phases out palm oil in biofuels and how much Canadian canola exports drop, as well as how much global production grows and what additional sustainability requirements may be placed on Australian canola.

"While the road to 2030 for canola contains many uncertainties, we can be sure that the global exportable surplus is on a downward trajectory," Mr Voznesenski said.

"This will create opportunities for the Australian canola industry and in years when global production significantly underperforms, which it inevitably will, shortages will result in even greater opportunities for Australia."

"Australia can lift canola production, and it will continue to have an export surplus, potentially much larger in periods of supportive price signals and favourable seasonal conditions.

However, its capacity to fully capitalise on the opportunities presenting over the course of the decade will depend on meeting sustainability credentials and being 'fit' for the future global market."

NUMBERS fell by almost half as agents yarded 256 head of live weight and open auction cattle.

The Kaylock family are preparing for the future.

Technology is helping them boost productivity within their Merino flock, as they use data to make management decisions based on individual animals.

Their breeding goals are tailored towards improving their flocks' wool cut and fibre diameter and lambing percentage, while reducing the time it takes lambs to reach market weight.

Embracing industry tools such as genomics, Australian Sheep Breeding Values (ASBVS) and electronic identification (eID), the farm-

ing family from Mallan near Moulamein in NSW are looking at what's possible for their sheep and wool business.

And they are excited.

New infrastructure to enable them to make the most of the latest technology and animal husbandry practices has also been a part of their proactive approach to sheep management.

So, it's no surprise they also built a new Entegra shearing shed.

"The shed makes life so much easier; we can keep sheep separate once we have organ-

ised them into the categories, we want them to be in," Peter explained.

Lucerne pastures

THIS is the thirteenth of a series of articles prepared by Gambier Seeds to feature in the On the Land section of the Border Watch through this year.

The focus of these articles will be to assist farmers to optimise productivity from their pasture and forage bases.

At Gambier Seeds we believe that pastures and pasture renovation are an investment, not only in your farm production and profitability, but in its future.

Lucerne (Alfalfa to most of the rest of the world) is often referred to as the king of fodder.

This is due to the high forage quality of the material produced, and that it is most productive at a time of the year when other forage species are dormant. When sown into ideal environments, and where managed correctly, lucerne can deliver high yields and be relatively persistent.

Counter to this is that lucerne has grazing and disease issues that require specific management strategies and it is slow to establish, with vulnerable seedlings.

So, while it has significant upside in the right environment and with correct inputs, lucerne can also fail to meet expectations where conditions and management are not optimised.

This is especially true in our local environment.

Our soil and environmental conditions are not ideal for lucerne in many areas. In particular, shallow soils over limestone negate the summer growth benefits of deep-rooted plants such as lucerne, even with irrigation.

If you are considering establishing a lucerne stand or adding lucerne to your forage production program, please consider the following as key factors in achieving success.

Planning and fit

First and foremost is ensuring that lucerne has a place in your enterprise mix.

The following are key questions to answer before embarking on the lucerne path.

- Does its timing of production suit your requirements?
- Do you have the environment for it to achieve the summer growth required to make it a profitable/correct option?
- Can you fully utilise its forage quality benefits within your system?

Variety selection

There are many varieties of lucerne on the market with a wide range of attributes.

These varieties vary with dormancy, disease resistance, grazing tolerance and forage quality traits to highlight a few.

The choices and information can be overwhelming.

The key here is to start with what you require and what your management, environment and conditions are.

These factors are the keys in then determining the attributes of the plant required to not only thrive in your situation, but to deliver the most profit for you.

Selecting the variety that best suits you should be the end result of this process – not the starting point.

We can assist you with this process and we know the varieties with the different characteristics that perform best in our district.

Keys to successful Establishment

Lucerne density is set at establishment.

Stands do not increase in plant numbers over time, nor are you able to increase stand density by oversowing.



Well managed lucerne stands can produce high quality forage.

Optimising establishment and plant density at the beginning of the stand's life is critical to long term success.

Most people are aware of the processes required to optimise the seeding process.

These are around weed and insect control, seed bed preparation and seeding depth.

There are several other less focussed on key factors critical in successful lucerne stand establishment:

- Disease – the leading cause of death of lucerne plants at establishment is generally disease, not insects.

Diseases that terminate lucerne seedlings persist in the soil for long periods.

We strongly advise our clients to have a minimum of 2 years with zero lucerne plants present in a paddock before attempting to establish Lucerne

- Allelopathic effect - additional to disease putting the seedlings at risk, Lucerne is one of a group of plants that exude a toxin into the soil that prevents establishment of "like" plants.

This will lead to unacceptable seedling mortality, ending in a failed paddock.

- Strong viable seed – I'm sure this is an expected comment from a seed salesperson! However, there is a repeatedly proven link between seed health, proven seed quality and established stand density.

This is also replicated for the inoculation process – fresh strong rhizobia population is critical for stand establishment and longevity. Don't skimp on seed or seeding costs – this is a proven false economy over the stand life.

- Harvest timing and management – many farmers don't fully understand that Lucerne has a "required rotation length" between harvests or grazing events, to optimise both yield and stand persistence.

If this is ignored – especially in the lead up to, and during winter, stand productivity and stand life span are greatly reduced. Not allowing the plant to replace and build stored energy reserves, stresses the plant, and impacts critical growth phases.

This in turn lowers root and leaf growth, reducing plant yield potential, leaving the plant vulnerable to diseases and insects.

Observing this management requirement is the most critical in my experience in determining life span of, and profitability of Lucerne stands once they are established.

Water plan discussions

WATER licence holders in the Padthaway Prescribed Wells Area are invited to learn about the key concepts underpinning proposed modifications to the Padthaway Water Allocation Plan (WAP) and provide feedback at the upcoming consultation meetings later this month.

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board will host licensee consultation meetings in Padthaway on October 13.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board Chair Penny Schulz is encouraging all licensees to be involved in the consultation process.

"The licensee meetings are an important opportunity for water licence holders to understand the key concepts proposed for inclusion in the draft Padthaway Water Allocation Plan and provide feedback," Ms Schulz said.

"Being involved in the consultation is important because the water allocation plan helps to manage our groundwater resources by balancing the long-term sustainability and security of the resource for water users."

The current Padthaway WAP was adopted in 2009 and has been undergoing a review to meet statutory requirements under the Landscape South Australia Act.

A Stakeholder Advisory Group featuring local community representatives from a range

of industries was formed in 2019 to support the process.

The consultation meetings will last for two hours and will present the key concepts developed in collaboration with the Stakeholder Advisory Group.

There will also be the opportunity to book one-on-one sessions with a Limestone Coast Landscape Board staff member for licensees that require further discussion or clarification on particular concepts.

These will be held in Padthaway on October 26 and 27.

"All feedback will be reviewed in consultation with the Stakeholder Advisory Group and will help inform the Draft Padthaway WAP," Ms Schulz said.

"We look forward to hearing from the community."

An invitation to attend the consultation meeting is being sent to all water licence holders by email or post.

VALIANT AP5, A VETERAN OF THE ROADS

THE introduction of the AP5 Valiant in May 1963 was timed perfectly with Chrysler's strengthening presence in the Australian market.

A few months before, the car maker had decided to take the plunge and started stamping panels and dies at a brand new plant in South Australia.

By the time the AP5 arrived, it was no longer a case of local assembly.

Chrysler was now building the cars and the level of American content had dropped dramatically.

Chrysler's investment in the Australian market was growing almost by the month.

With the AP5 Valiant came a new model - the Regal - a nameplate that would last until Valiant's eventual demise 18 years later.

Although most of the mechanical features of the new Valiant were carried over from the S Series, just six body panels were shared with the car's American version.

The styling of the AP5 bore little resemblance to the R and S Series and, in fact, moved more towards the conservative look of its rival from Ford and Holden.

To many observers this was a disappointment as the looks of the previous two Valiants were believed to have been Chrysler's biggest advantage over the competition.

After the release of the AP5 sedan in May, the Valiant Safari station wagon followed in November.

Up to the rear doors, the wagon used the same panels as the sedan.

One of the main features of the Safari wagon was the rear window, controlled by an exterior handle.

The window could be wound down to any position, but it had to be wound down fully before the tailgate could be opened.

While standard equipment was similar to the previous models, the AP5 was sold for a lower price than the R and S Series.

The new body meant that the AP5 was slightly longer than the R and S Series it replaced, but was as wide and retained the same wheelbase and track.

For the first time since the Valiant was introduced, Chrysler marketed a separate, more luxurious model to bring the car-

maker in line with Holden and Ford, which sold the Premier and Futura as their up-scale variants.

The Valiant Regal was immediately identified by its exterior badging, including a raised emblem on the bonnet and a Regal badge on the boot of the sedan as well as whitewall tyres, chrome body mouldings,

window trims and different wheel covers.

Inside the Regal the seats were padded and trimmed in a soft vinyl, while the interior body side panels were also in vinyl and colour matched to the seats to give it more of an upmarket feel.

It also had a folding centre arm rests for both the front and rear bench seats, carpeted

floors, two-tone steering wheel and a heater and demister.

In total 49,440 AP5 Valiants were produced before the AP6 was introduced in 1965.

Late in 1962 Chrysler announced a \$36m expansion plan that would eventually lift production to 50,000 cars a year by 1967.

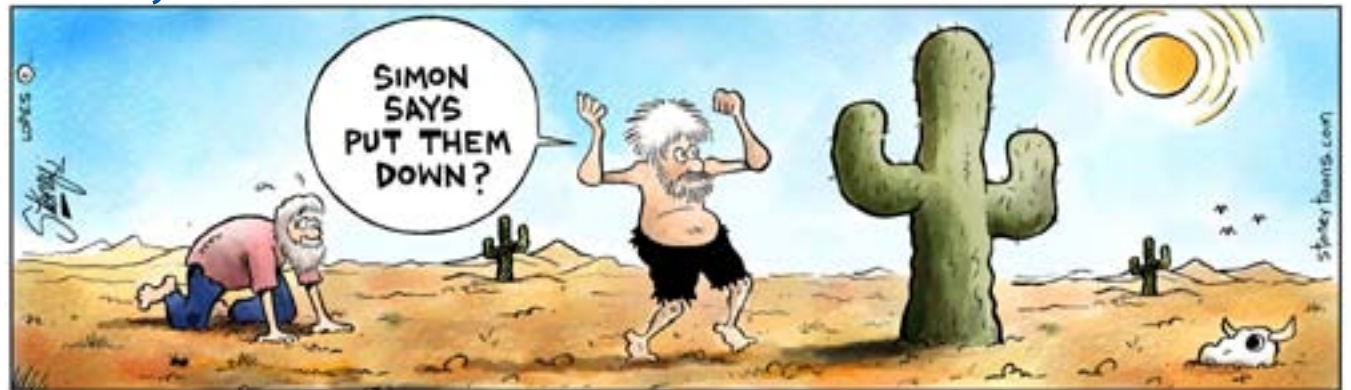

Out of the frying pan

Celebrity MasterChef Australia is set to air with 10 famous faces ready to test out their home cooking skills in front of the nation. Comedian Dilruk Jayasinha tells **Danielle McGrane** why he decided to take part, even though it might not be a wise move.

DILRUK Jayasinha knew how to make just three dishes before he went on *Celebrity MasterChef*, but he had a very interesting reason for going on the show.

"If I feel a sense of fear and anxiety about something then I think 'I have to do this now', because when I look back on the things I'm truly proud of, all of it is borne out of a place of discomfort," he said.

"There's nothing I'm proud of that happened in the comfort zone, so for me this ticked all of those boxes."

It might seem like a foolhardy approach, but Jayasinha's career was built upon this discomfort.

"I used to be an accountant and now I do stand-up comedy, and I had a fear of public speaking," he said.

"So for my first few gigs I'd be on stage shaking and shivering, with sweaty palms and I just kind of pushed through that pain and found a lot of benefit from sticking with that discomfort and coming out the other end, so ever since I had that experience I've always decided to lean into discomfort."

There was also the added bonus that whatever he went through was potential material for the comedian to use on stage.

"I know how to bounce back from a public humiliation," he said.

"We all have strengths and weaknesses and my strength is being able to push myself through that pain of public humiliation. But at the same time, I think maybe deep down, just having the title of comedian means I'm allowed to just enjoy the failure. Everything is potential material in the future so every negative that happens to me has the potential to be positive down the track."

Being on *MasterChef* was still one of the hardest things Jayasinha has ever done, but he had further motivation for doing it. He knew this would be the one show he could do that would truly make his family in Sri Lanka proud.

"My aunts back in Sri Lanka are big fans of *MasterChef*, that's how far and wide this show reaches," he said.

"They get the Aussie version so it was very exciting when I was able to reveal that I'm going to be on it."

"It's the only TV show that I've been on that actually airs over there – so that is one of the biggest reasons I said yes to this. It's huge."

And despite his lack of skills in the culinary department, food preparation was a huge part of his life growing up.

"Food is life back in Sri Lanka where I grew up," he said.

"I grew up in a house of 14 people and my grandma was the matriarch of the family. She would prepare these amazing dishes. We had a catering business from our house and we had a shop that was attached to the house that they'd sell the food from."

"And not once did I step into the

kitchen to see how it was all done. I just knew that when I sat at the table the food magically appeared."

Jayasinha does have some cooking skills, largely thanks to the pandemic. Being plunged into lockdown forced him to develop those skills.

"I started cooking about a year ago when the lockdown happened because I live in the city and at the time I was a single guy and there's really no motivation to learn how to cook because every recipe is for a group of four," he said.

"And if you cook for one person you still have to find the same amount of ingredients – you can't just find one clove of garlic and a bay leaf – so if you buy everything and you put all this effort in and it's

not good, then you've got all this food wastage and you feel bad. So I would just go straight to takeaway, deliveries and eat at restaurants. And living in the city especially, it's not like I was saving that much money cooking for one person.

"Then when the lockdown happened, I was bored and the nice restaurants or little cafes I used to eat at were all closed so I thought I'd try to teach myself bits and bobs."

Learning how to cook some of those delicious Sri Lankan dishes is a lot harder though from this distance. Not learning those family recipes, he says, is one of his biggest regrets.

"During this entire process I just kept kicking myself that not once did I stand next to Mum and ask

her how she made that, or how do I know if something needs more flour and water? Or what temperature should the water be? I asked as much as I could over FaceTime but there's only so much she can teach over that medium," he said.

Growing up around all those wonderful cooks did mean that he developed an appreciation for food and he knows what certain dishes are supposed to taste like, so that was one talent he brought to the *MasterChef* kitchen. He needed something in his arsenal, considering his competition included celebrity chef Gordon Ramsay's daughter, Tilly Ramsay.

"Initially you think because it's a celebrity thing everybody's going to

be relatively amateur and you think 'Hopefully I'm not the worst there', but then you go in and see the daughter of probably the world's most famous chef is there," he said.

"I think she had her own cooking show when she was a kid so I thought 'I'll curb my expectations of how well things are going to go'. But Tilly is an absolute delight and arguably the opposite of her dad. I never heard her swear once."

Aside from Ramsay's legacy, Jayasinha also had to deal with his own level of hero worship while he was on the show.

"I'm a massive AFL fan so to be in the same competitions as an absolute superstar like Nick Riewoldt – but at the same time, standing next to me is Australia's greatest Olympian Ian Thorpe – and to be brushing shoulders with sports royalty like Archie Thompson – it's just incredible," he said.

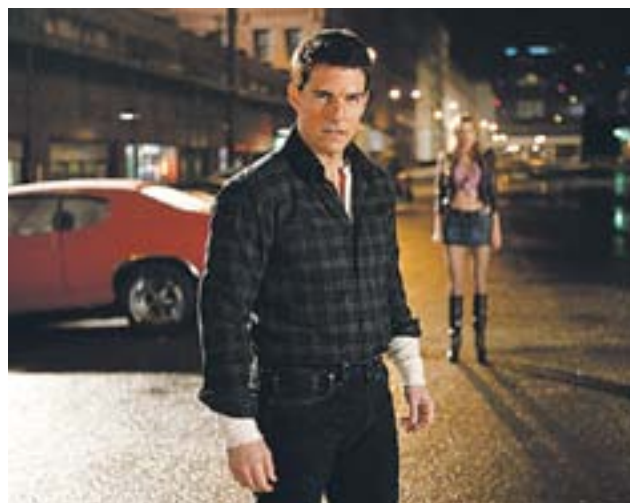
UNSTOPPABLE

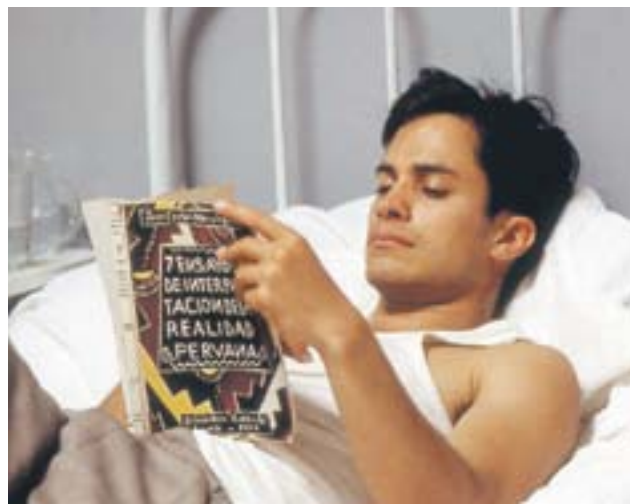
BOHEMIAN RHAPSODY

FIFTY years of embroidery within the Mount Gambier region is celebrated through an elaborate display at the Riddoch Arts and Cultural Centre this month.

The Mount Gambier branch of Embroiderers' Guild of South Australia will continue its celebration of the milestone alongside its 17 members with the exhibition 'Thousands of uses for Millions of Needles' available on the Riddoch's King Floor room.

Branch member Robyn Inverarity - who has been a part of the statewide group since 1986 - said members were generally supportive of one another with skill levels varying.

"Sometimes we meet up to have embroi-

dery classes and other times we just workshop our projects," Ms Inverarity said.

"All members have a range of embroidery projects with some people enjoying cross stitch and others enjoying other forms.

"Cross stitch is usually the best place to start and yet some have already moved onto more complicated projects, such as Norwegian embroidery."

Ms Inverarity said throughout the years, there had been an increase in non-traditional embroidery which also enhances imagination and creativity.

"There is nothing wrong with non-traditional embroidery and it is perfectly okay for some to break the rules at times as embroidery is a creative outlet," she said.

"Our group is a major social interaction

which is so important these days, because participating in these groups gives people a reason to come out - especially those who may have lost their partner."

She said many members took great joy in embroidery and the process of completing projects with a number available for public viewing.

"The process for embroidery is quite meditative and at the moment our membership is largely retired ladies but I think that may also be driven by many people having to work during our regular meeting times," she said.

The guild's exhibition will be on display at the Riddoch Arts and Cultural Centre until October 25.

HISTORICAL actions of the Glencoe Woolshed has been hailed as a significant success with a locally produced novel receiving the Keain Medal awarded by the History Society of South Australia.

"We did a bit of research and that research soon turned out to be enough for a 200-page book," Ms Grbich said.

"Putting together an entire novel was not planned and it did turn out to be a really good book in the end which we are proud of.

"We are part of the National Trust for the Woolshed branch and we really just wanted to give something to give back to those attending the area."

The author said despite the novel originally coming out over a year ago, the two were overjoyed to receive the award.

"We were surprised to find out we received the award and we continue to be excited to contribute something like this to the wider community," she said.

"The book has done very well in the South East so far which is fantastic and to receive this further recognition is fantastic."

The books are now available for sale at a range of retail stores across Millcent, Mount Gambier and Penola.

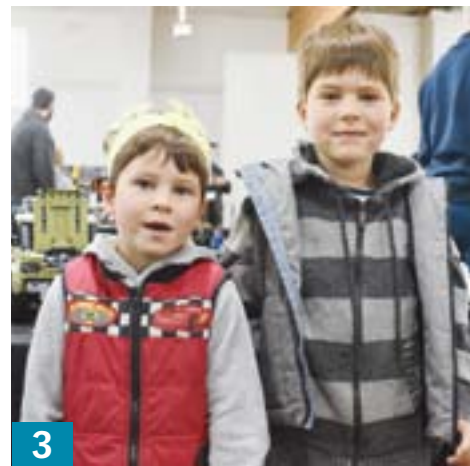

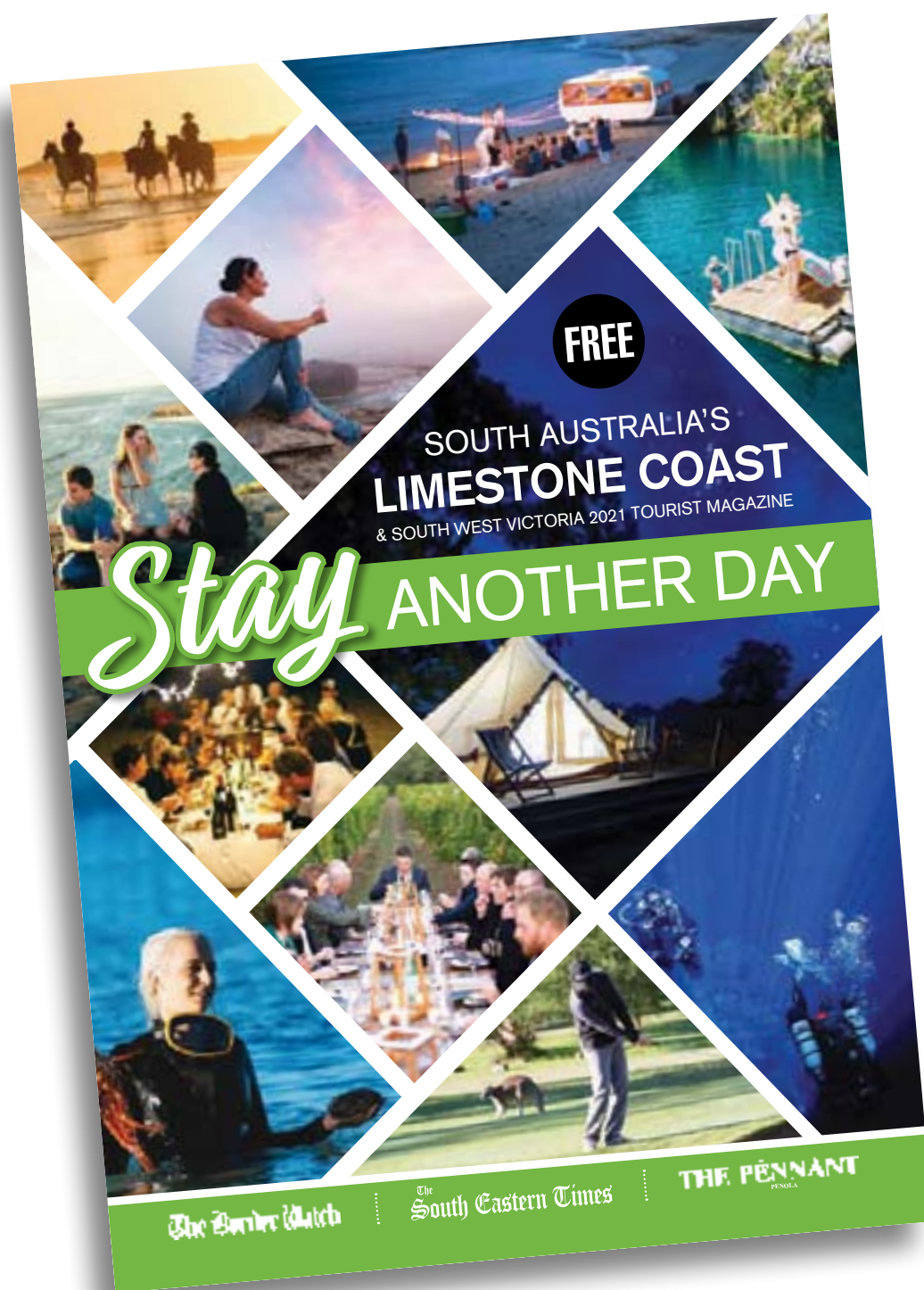

on the water
FISHING

REASONABLE weather for the start of the long weekend was a delight to anglers across the Limestone Coast.

Plenty made the journey offshore in search of bottom fish, while others hit the surf beaches or even chucked in the craypots for the start of the season.

The offshore guys got some nice fish this week in varying depths.

There were a handful of boats headed for the shelf while the weather was nice and most found some cracking fish.

Matt Bell and Dennis Heinecke boated some nice hapuka in 450 metres and a lot of those came on metal knife jigs.

Jigging is hard work at the best of times, let alone over the shelf.

I did see a picture of one of Belly's jigs that had a hapuka hanging off each end, so pulling two big fish up that far on one lure is a great feat.

In a bit closer, I saw some great shark from the 60-100m depths, with both gummy and school shark on the menu.

The calm weather allowed anglers a drift in the 100m area for flathead and there were some nice fish caught, along with a handful of knifejaw and latchet fish.

Surf fishos had a ball over the long weekend, with people spread out right along the coast and most were reeling in fish.

The Coorong fired up for a big group of local lads who headed up on their annual October long weekend boys trip.

Ten gummy shark to 6kg, plenty of small mulwoly and some nice salmon were caught,

so plenty of fresh flake went into the freezer.

Locally we saw some nice gummy shark.

Wayne Little fished Piccininni and managed some nice ones and some reasonable salmon in the mix.

Graeme Ploenges fished Nene Valley and managed some nice salmon to 2.5kg and a little gummy shark.

While we are talking salmon, I did hear of some nice fish to a couple of kilos from Nene Valley on metal lures down the western end of the bay.

There have been a few reports from up around Beachport this week, with numbers and size up and down.

The garfish have been in good numbers again.

I have heard of some nice catches from both boaties and land-based guys.

Livingstons and Cape Douglas are still probably the two most talked about areas, with good numbers and size at both spots.

There is plenty of room down in both bays, so you do not have to fish on top of each other.

Other spots like Pelican Point, Hutt Bay and the Petrified Forrest have also produced well and are worth a dabble.

Squid fishos have been into them again this week, and we are starting to see some of those bigger samples around now.

Early morning sessions when the sea is flat and wind is down have been the most successful, but now we are into daylight savings, I can see a few more anglers having a crack in that hour before the sun goes down.

I have no doubt there will be some great fish caught.

It will not be long until we start seeing the local jetties fire up.

A few keen fishos have done a couple of trips to Cape Jaffa already and they are starting to land some nice numbers, so it will not be long until Beachport, Southend and Port MacDonnell all kick off.

There has been a few more boaties chasing the whiting and with the settling sea, a few of the usually hard to get to spots have started to produce.

Boaties have been back into Red Rock and Lighthouse Bays down at Carpenter Rocks and have found some decent fish.

There have been some nice whiting also from Gerloff Bay through to Livingstons Bay, so they appear to be nicely spread out.

Anglers in the Port MacDonnell breakwater have found some reasonable fish, but as per usual for the breakwater, it is a bit of a nursery,

so you do have to fish through the little fish to find some bigger ones.

Crayfish season has kicked off for the amateur fishos this week and quite a few have had a taste already.

There have been good reports from cray potters, drop netters, snorkelers and bait stickers, so when that good weather finally rolls around, it will be time to have a crack.

The freshwater scene is not overly big down here, but I did receive some pictures over the weekend of young Henry Smith and a cracking silver perch caught up at the Black Cockatoo Bush Camp over the other side of Naracoorte.

I have never been there myself, but it looks like an awesome little spot, something I can not wait to check out.

The Glenelg River has fished well again this week in the SA section.

Some lovely bream and estuary perch have been landed by the boaties on a mixture of baits and lures.

I am also seeing some cracking mullet landed off the Donovans Jetty of an evening.

Cam Ward managed half a dozen or so to the mid 40cm range which are absolute beauties.

The mulwoly news has been a bit on the quiet side this week, but there have been whispers of some reasonable fish back in the estuary again.

I am yet to see any pictures, but when all the putters are down there, there is something going on.

The forecast for this week does not look super good, but looking forward into next week, we should really start to see some decent weather.

Hopefully the weatherman nails it and we can string more than a couple of days together.

Until next week, safe fishing.

Up and down round

OUTSTANDING Mount Gambier Golf Club member Darren Bilney claimed his fourth South East Open Championship in testing conditions at the Attamurra layout on Sunday.

The 43-year-old needed two play-off holes to beat long-time rival Anthony Williams after the pair had been tied at five-over par at the end of 36 holes.

Williams, chasing his ninth win in the prestigious tournament, was unable to get up-and-down from just off the ninth green, while Bilney recovered from a wayward drive to post a par four and complete the successful defence of his title.

Playing in the same group, Williams held a two-shot lead after the first 18 holes thanks to a four-over par 76.

Bilney and Joel Mann were the next best with 78s, while Hayden Cook and Nick Black were one shot further back.

Bilney's day was off to a disastrous start, dropping four shots on the opening five holes but a superb tee shot to inside two feet on the par 3 sixth hole gave him his first birdie.

Another on the par 4 ninth saw him make the turn on 38, one behind Williams.

The pair struggled on the back nine, Williams shooting 39 and Bilney coming in with 40 which was not helped by a double bogey on the par 4 14th hole.

The weather cleared for the start of their second 18 holes and it was Bilney who took advantage.

He posted a superb three-under par 33 on the front nine thanks to birdies on the first, fourth and seventh holes.

Having started his second round with a two-shot lead, Williams found himself trailing by three after 27 holes, posting 38 on the front nine after bogeys on the second and third.

Bilney's lead fluctuated between two and three shots on the final nine holes before the defining moment came on the par 5 15th.

After spraying his drive onto the adjoining 13th fairway, he lost his ball after hitting a tree trying to hit up to the 15th green.

With Williams needing only a tap-in for birdie, Bilney had to play his fourth shot from 190m out and on the wrong fairway.

But he produced a miraculous four-iron to 12 feet and rolled in the putt for par, limiting the damage to a single stroke.

After they both made pars on the 16th and 17th, Bilney held a one-shot lead on the 18th tee, but elected to play safe down the middle with an iron to about 120m from the back flag position.

Williams on the other hand hit driver to about 40m from the front of the green, pitched

to about five feet and rolled in a tricky downhill putt for birdie, squaring the score after Bilney could only manage a par.

With the nearest contender eight shots adrift, the pair headed to the first hole to start the play-off.

They both took par fives before the contest was settled on the second play-off hole.

While Williams said he was "reasonably happy" with the way he played considering the tough conditions, Bilney pointed to his first nine holes on the second round as the difference.

"My start on the first round was shocking, but I played really good on the first nine the second time around," he said.

"I really struggled with my putter ... would have missed five putts from inside two feet, although I did make a few long ones."

Mann ended up in third place after shooting 78/79, just ahead of Kevin Cook and Andrew Stark who finished on 14-over.

Meanwhile the winner of the best net competition on the day was 14-handicapper Tony Steen who finished one over his handicap after shooting rounds of net 71 and 74.

That was one ahead of Cook who was four over his handicap of six on his first 18 holes, but followed that with an excellent 76 off the stick the second time around to finish two over, edging out youngster Blake Schroder on a count-back.

Trio prove a fine combo

Era over: Bolt from the blue

WE all knew it would happen one day, but when Racing SA announced last Friday the end of jumps racing here in South Australia as from next year it was, nevertheless, a major shock to the racing industry in this state.

While the anti jumping campaigners are over the moon with the decision and claiming a huge victory, it was really the industry participants here in SA that brought about the demise of jumps racing leading to Racing SA making the announcement.

With only a handful of trainers committed to jumps racing and hardly any jumps jockeys based in SA, it meant we relied entirely on Victorian jumpers, trainers and jockeys crossing the border to make every jumping race viable in SA.

Here in the South East, the only jumping trainers in recent years have been John O'Connor (Mount Gambier) and Ray Gilchrist (Millicent).

For O'Connor, the face and voice of jumps racing in this region for decades, it has always been a huge part of his life and this latest decision was a bitter pill for him to swallow.

"It's very disappointing as I have been involved in the jumping game since I was a kid and I have always headed to Oakbank over Easter," O'Connor said.

Not only Oakbank, as O'Connor can be seen frequently at any jumps meeting on both sides of the border.

Mount Gambier was the only local club to conduct hurdle and steeplechase races and that was on a limited basis for the past decade.

The Mount Gambier cup carnival always had a hurdle and steeple chase and the cup day crowd loved watching the South Eastern steeplechase.

That race and the Mount Gambier cup were the only two races which always emptied the marquees and bars, and saw the crowd line the outside fence.

The club that will be decimated by the decision is undoubtedly Oakbank, as will the surrounding towns of Woodside, Balhannah and Hahndorf.

Even though the crowds at Oakbank for the two day Easter carnival had fallen away alarmingly in the past decade, up until COVID the Adelaide hills track still attracted 20,000 people on Easter Saturday, nearly twice as many people than for any other SA race meeting during the year.

Victorians would make an annual invasion to those towns for Easter and not only stayed for all the long weekend but, in some cases, for a week.

I now realise just how fortunate I was to be at Oakbank this year to see the last Von Doussa steeplechase (a classic two horse war between Zed Em and Spying On You) and the Great Eastern steeplechase (won by the local, Spying On You).

In my opinion, Oakbank will become just another run-of-the-mill meeting over the Easter break and I will be surprised if it can attract more than 5,000 people to the main day, Easter Saturday.

Oakbank Racing Club chairwoman Arabela Branson stated, "It means we can attract a new audience to Oakbank by broadening opportunities for some new and exciting initiatives".

I wish her well in regards to that.

Then to announce the three iconic jumping race names associated with Oakbank (the Harry D. Young hurdle, Von Doussa steeplechase and Great Eastern steeplechase) would be retained as flat race names in future is, in the eyes of Oakbank diehards such as myself, bordering on sacrilege.

Suddenly, spending next Easter in the Grampians and attending Warracknabeal races on Easter Saturday is much more appealing.

FIRST DOUBLE FOR NEW SEASON

Local apprentice Jacob Opperman notched his first city double of the 2021-22 racing season at Morphettville Parks last Saturday.

Both were at good odds too, with Dexelation scoring as an \$8 chance followed by the outsider Wylie Ol' Coyote (\$21).

When the money arrived for Maharajah (\$2 fav.), Stratofortress blew from \$2 out to \$2.60 however the Naracoorte-trained pacer had the favourite beaten from the 500 metre mark.

At the same venue, the incredible winning run of local pacer Van Mara came to an end after eight successive victories when a gallant second to Assassinator.

NOW FOR PLAN B

Hopes of the Naracoorte stayer Hasta La War securing a start in next month's Melbourne Cup are still no clearer following last weekend's racing.

Hasta La War was third emergency for the 2520 metre Bart Cummings at Flemington last Saturday (a race whereby the winner automatically qualified for a Melbourne Cup start) and failed to gain a start.

His trainer Sue Murphy now has plan B in motion and that will be tomorrow at Caulfield.

"Hasta La War is in the Group 2 2400 metre Herbert Power handicap and he will be floated to Melbourne with Horsham trainer Paul Preusker, as were the plans for last weekend," Murphy advised.

Although the winner of tomorrow's race is not guaranteed a start in the Melbourne Cup, it will certainly boost Hasta La War's chances (currently an 82 rated galloper) should he win or be placed.

Hasta La War has drawn well in barrier three and will be ridden by Linda Meech.

IN Mount Gambier for the long weekend, Adelaide-based members of the Nineofus Syndicate picked a good day to be at last Sunday's 12-race greyhound meeting at Tara Raceway where they had seven runners engaged.

However, as far as the syndicate members were concerned most interest was always going to be centred on their latest acquisition - a March 2020 youngster by the name of Captain Larry.

According to syndicate manager Ross Schurgott, Allendale East trainer David Peckham's reports on the brindle dog had been very promising.

In fact, promising enough for the syndicate to invest a few dollars of its accumulated funds on the chances of Captain Larry in the 400-metre Progryhoundtips.com Maiden Stake.

"We don't usually get too involved in backing our dogs," Schurgott said.

"And I don't mind telling you, it was a nervous wait leading up to the race for syndicate members Garry Siney, Samantha Sterzl and Grant Sterzl who were on course.

"Personally, I was shaking like a leaf."

There was never any cause for concern, though.

Captain Larry led all the way from box four and eventually won by 10¼ lengths in a close to best-of-day time of 23.02 seconds.

Schurgott's phone ran hot pretty soon after the win.

"Wow, wow - just wow!" was one message and to quote Del Shannon's 1961 chart-buster, it was "Hats Off to Larry".

Always on the lookout for new contacts when it comes to the purchase of greyhounds, the syndicate manager spotted an on-line advertisement for an unnamed dog that had been posted by NSW trainer Adam Crouch of South Windsor.

"A son of El Grand Senor x Chill Easy, he had been bred at Richmond, NSW by Ayden O'Donnell who was looking to sell the dogs in the litter at around the \$5000 mark and keep the bitches," Schurgott said.

"Previously Ayden and Adam had combined to race the former NSW all-distance dynamo Big Butters so there's obviously not too much wrong with the way they go about things."

While there is still a while to go, Captain Larry, from a whelping date point of view is a good age for next February's 512-metre Summer Classic.

Last year's age-restricted classic was won by the syndicate's Sweet On Me.

Later in the day, the Nineofus Syndicate had Midnight Blast engaged in the Hyland Fox Stake (400m), the first heat of a grade six 1-3 wins event.

The black son of Collision x Midnight Starlet took up the running down the back before going away to a five lengths win over Norket Boy in 23.03 seconds. The winner, trained by Peckham, was part of a package deal negotiated with David Pringle of Clergate, NSW.

Also in the deal was litter brother Midnight Bandit who is through to this Sunday's final as well after finishing third behind Roxy Patron in the second heat, the Trackside Meats Stake.

Wrapping up a big day for the syndicate, which also includes Neville Schurgott, Steve McGuire, Steve Mason, Mark Quin, Artie Sleeth and Peckham, was Silent Jacko in the Winning Post Supplies Mixed Stake (512m).

Another purchase from Pringle, Silent Jacko ran down kennelmate Aston Model in the shadows of the post to win in 29.90 seconds and bring up his 23rd win.

Meanwhile, local nine-member syndicate Rise N Shine, which is managed by John Podgorski, kicked the day off with a winner when Cawbourne Nosey turned in a big effort to win the Klaassens Contractors Maiden Stake (305m).

Having her second run for the syndicate, Cawbourne Nosey was slowly away from box five.

She was then checked into the first turn before finding the front and running away to a 3½ lengths win over Compton Banjo in 18.25 seconds.

Formerly based at Gifford Hill with Tony

Rasmussen, the daughter of Ritza Lenny and Cawbourne Clover had been sourced for the syndicate by Podgorski.

"I had been watching her for a while at Murray Bridge where she had strung together three handy minor placings," he said. "I figured that form would probably hold up down here so we made an offer to Tony which was accepted."

Yesterday was the first time the syndicate had been represented by two runners at a meeting - litter brother Cawbourne Shiny later leading all the way to defeat Giveaway Vegas by 3¼ lengths in 23.26 seconds in the Commercial Hotel Stake (400m).

For Tarpeena trainer Dita Mitchell the double was her third at Tara Raceway this year.

Extrasensory and Connor's Choice won on March 21 and Norket Boy and Cawbourne Jumpy on May 6.

Speaking after yesterday's wins, Mitchell said it had been pleasing to see Cawbourne Nosey respond to quite a bit of extra starting box work.

"Even though she was still slow out it was certainly an improvement on some previous efforts. She was actually sitting down in the boxes at one stage," Mitchell said.

"Hopefully we've overcome that trait.

"And it was good to see Cawbourne Shiny, the syndicate's first greyhound, showing what he can do when he gets around without finding any trouble."

IT was a three-peat of Master of Mac Park victories for Arthur Sissis on Sunday and a new lap record to boot.

That put him on the back foot, while later in the race Carberry took the challenge right up to Sissis.

At one stage Carberry led the race but the experience of Sissis shone through in the end as he claimed Master of Mac Park honours.

Sissis also lowered his previous lap record during Saturday's racing to 1-minute 08.634 seconds.

In other feature races, Grant Howarth and Samantha Gittus teamed up to claim the side-car honours from Adrian Van Utert and Mark Holloway.

The Historics feature event went to Any Pitman aboard a 350cc Yamaha, a clear 14 seconds from his nearest rival, with a fast lap time of 1:22.201.

Mike Engberg came home second on a 400cc Yamaha from David Ellis on a 400cc Honda.

A Lightweight Master of Mac Park event showcased some of the smaller machinery, with a competitive race unfolding.

Sam Pezzetta on a 300cc Yamaha made the most of the weather and claimed the win, some eight seconds ahead of Cooper Rowntree on the same type of machinery.

Gordon Hensley was three seconds further adrift on a 300cc Kawasaki.

Back to business as usual on fairways

WHILE some confusion reigned earlier in the week with announcements regarding sport shutdowns due to a recent Covid-19 case in Mount Gambier, the news was soon cleared up and some competitions are on track to kick off this weekend.

South Australian police commissioner Grant Stevens incorrectly announced sport would shut for the seven-day lockdown of the region, but it was not the case.

The following day he apologised for the misinformation, citing a simple mistake but stated spectators would not be allowed at sporting events.

For some sports - golf in particular - there are no real issues at this stage.

Blue Lake Golf Club's Bill Burley said this week it would basically be business as usual up at the Lakes course this week.

"We got a directive from Golf SA to say it is business as usual because there isn't much contact in our sport," he said.

"At the moment we haven't really got any restrictions ... we are just lucky we can continue to play."

Burley said few spectators attended games, apart from some of the bigger tour-

naments throughout the year.

He said golf had continued to increase in popularity, possibly on the back of the Covid-19 pandemic which limited the options for some keen sportspersons since it began.

In South Australia competition golf had been put on hold earlier in the pandemic, but players were able to enjoy social games, while adhering to social distancing and other Covid guidelines.

Another advantage was the ability to simply play a round of golf on your own, without the need for a team to compete with or against.

The solitary style of golf means gatherings at a clubhouse needs to be policed but otherwise it is possibly the perfect sport for these coronavirus times.

"We have an outside area now where we are allowed to have a few more players gather," Burley said.

"We have a shelter at the driving range and the amount of people using that is unbelievable.

"I think 80 per cent of those would be non-golfers.

"All around the world golf has gone crazy. You even have to pre-order goods now.

"A lot of clubs in Adelaide, all their member categories are full - it is unbelievable."

Night lights on the cards

THE Mount Burr Football Club hopes to secure a grant from the State Government in order to install a new set of lights at the club's oval, facilitating night games.

President of the Mozzies Maurie Puiatti said the club had lodged a grant application with the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing and was expecting a response from the department around December.

"Financially we've got everything pretty well in place, fingers crossed we think

we're in with a good chance [of getting the grant]," he said.

If successful, the government grant would account for 50 per cent of the total project cost - which is estimated to be around \$210,000.

Wattle Range Council has also given \$50,000 to the club via a grant, with the remainder to be contributed by the Mount Burr Football Club.

Puiatti said replacing the lights had been something the club had been hoping to achieve for a long time.

"It's something that has been talked

about here over the years, but no one ever knuckled down and applied for a grant," he said.

"We found the poles are in a very poor condition, so we got an engineer to give us a report on it and hopefully that helps our cause in getting them replaced.

"The lights are very very old and have been like that for a long time.

"They have been replaced over the years with some second hand lights, but the quality is very poor."

The new lights would also be a significant upgrade for the club in terms of allow-

ing teams to play night games, something Puiatti believes would attract more people to games and increase the club's financial turnover.

"We've seen that with other clubs doing that, they seem to attract people from other clubs with the night games," he said.

"So that's sort of been our aim, it just adds another dimension to footy, occasional night games and stuff like that."

Assuming the grant is successful, the Mount Burr Football Club hopes to see a night game organised for the start of the 2022 season.

However, after the decision had been made it was decided to leave the round abandoned and begin next week.

submitting teams for the Division 1 competition. However, Millicent stepped up for another tilt at Division 1 to ensure the season would go ahead.

Federals have dropped out for the season after injury and other issues forced their hand.

Despite that Clark said he expected another entertaining season of baseball.

At this stage the season is expected to start on Friday, October 15.
