\$35m tech college

EXCLUSIVE

A NEW \$35m technical college will be built in Mount Gambier if Labor is elected to govern South Australia next year.

Labor leader Peter Malinauskas, who announced the plan to build the college this week while visiting Mount Gambier, said the

new college would be operational by 2026.

The Labor election pledge is to build the technical college at Mount Gambier High School and include the latest equipment to ensure students are being properly prepared for modern trades and give students access to other subjects at the high school to ensure

they complete their SACE. Mr Malinauskas said, in addition to the initial building cost for the college, a further \$6 million will be budgeted annually for operating costs.

“Our policy is to build five new technical colleges across the State and if we are not willing to build one in our second largest city then

it's hardly a serious policy about investing in the State's growth,” Mr Malinauskas said.

“The simple fact is that the lack of access to skills is acting as a constraint to growth and that's particularly acute in our regional communities.

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Door open for deals

IN contrast to the Liberal Party, Labor is willing to form government with the support of independents if it does not win the majority of seats in parliament at the next election.

While State Labor Leader Peter Malinauskas, who visited Mount Gambier earlier this week, said he would prefer a Labor majority government, if the election does not provide that, then an alliance with independents would be an appropriate step to take to enable the Labor Party to implement its policies.

“My objective, quite firmly, is to form a majority government at the next State election as I think that is most likely to deliver stable government – we have a plan to do that – we believe we can do that,” Mr Malinauskas said.

“I think the State is yearning for leadership and an ambition about our future beyond Covid.

“We’ve got a comprehensive policy that we will be taking to the election.

“We have already announced a lot of education policy and we’ll be announcing more.

“My firm aspiration and intent is to form a majority Labor Government.

“I think serious political leaders understand that once the people have spoken, you’ve got to lead accordingly and if the people of South Australia don’t elect a majority Labor Government, then if I’m serious about implementing our policy, then we are duty-bound to have discussions with independents – that’s the way our parliamentary systems operates – anyone who thinks otherwise is utterly misleading.”

Last week, Premier Steven Marshall told The Border Watch that he had ruled out forming government with the support of independents if the Liberal Party did not win a majority of seats at the March poll next year.

Mr Malinauskas believes Premier Steven

Marshall is being misleading about his government's position regarding the support of independents.

“I am aware of the Premier's comments last week – they are completely disingenuous, if not dishonest, because the Premier already has a minority government and is already doing a deal with independents,” he said.

“Premier Steven Marshall says he doesn't

deal with independents, except he does – right now.

“He's got a minority government now, he's lost MP (Member of Parliament) after MP but as soon as he losses an MP, five seconds later he's doing a deal with them so he can stay in government.”

Independent MP for Mount Gambier Troy Bell was contacted for comment but declined.

“Mount Gambier and the Limestone Coast is full of economic opportunity; it's a part of our State that has been under invested in by the former Labor Government and current Liberal Government.

“If I become Premier, I want to right that wrong.

“Our commitment to build a technical college is the first step in that direction.”

He said the new technical college will not only provide young people in the region with a career pathway for the future but will also provide a pool of talented young people to meet skills shortages in the community.

“Not every kid wants to go to university; we need to invest in pathways for all children so every young person can fulfil their potential,” Mr Malinauskas said.

“We have got to address this need because it isn't just holding back younger people – it's holding back the economy.”

Labor claims that the industries with the highest levels of vacancies that are looking for people with vocational qualifications are in the areas of building and construction, food and automotive trades, community services and hospitality.

The technical college will establish partnerships with TAFE and industry training providers and also look to establish partnerships with the forestry sector which is a critical employer in the area.

Seeking crayfish markets

CRAYFISH season will keep on going this year with industry leaders working to find alternative export options following continuing difficulties with China.

China unofficially banned the importation of live lobsters from Australia due to an accusation of the lobsters having high cadmium.

Managing director of the Ferguson Group - which operates Five Star Seafood in Port MacDonnell - Andrew Ferguson said the allegations from China were incorrect, stating the company had lobsters tested for the metal.

"Authorities have said we don't have these heavy metals in our live crayfish or lobsters but we feel the Australian product falls below the levels to be concerned about," Mr Ferguson said.

"This is why we are looking at alternative markets such as hospitality, hotel venues and supermarkets but also places like Hong Kong and Singapore.

"We are also selling half lobsters at the moment which is going really well at the moment and as Covid-19 dissipates we are hoping to find our way to be able to travel a bit more, which will allow us to find more opportunities."

Minister for Primary Industries David Basham said the cadmium claim was proven incorrect with testing showing the products

were well below acceptable levels.

"While the claim is disappointing both the State Government and Federal Government are working with industry to resolve these issues," Mr Basham said.

"The Marshall Liberal Government is already supporting the industry by helping explore new markets as well as allowing greater fishing flexibility which doesn't impact sustainability, such as extending seasons and allowing carryover of uncaught fish from one season to the next."

Mr Ferguson said prices were stabilising at \$45 for the season, half of what it used to be.

"These prices have a big effect on the industry because it costs the fishermen so much to pull a lobster out of the water per kilo and the cost to go fishing isn't much, which means there is not much in it in regards to price at the moment," Mr Ferguson said.

"We did have a week or so where the prices were pretty good because the catches were also pretty good because the catches were also pretty good."

Commissioner to report directly to Premier

THE appointment of a cross-border commissioner, pledged by Labor this week if elected to government next year, will be independent and have direct lines to the Premier, according to Opposition Leader Peter Malinauskas.

The announcement came following a shadow cabinet visit to the South East earlier this week where Mr Malinauskas spoke on a range of issues at a community meeting.

He said Labor would provide \$2m over four years to create the long-advocated position which would streamline processes for border communities and reduce red tape for residents and businesses.

The opposition leader told The Border Watch a Labor government would ensure the commissioner remains independent, allowing them to "speak out" against the government if needed.

"If the government is doing something wrong, the commissioner would be able to speak out against it similar to what the small business commissioner does now," Mr Malinauskas said.

"They would be established and based in Mount Gambier as it is the state's second largest city and close to the border.

"Labor does not see the commissioner being answerable to a particular minister but rather having an independent function to speak to the government and advocate against it if it is doing something wrong."

He said the opposition party did not want another bureaucrat within the system and guaranteed the commissioner would have a direct line to himself if he became premier.

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell said it was a great initiative announced by the opposition leader and encouraged the Liberal State Government to follow suit.

"I would very much like to see the commissioner to be similar to the small business commissioner and am glad to hear they would have a direct line to the premier," Mr Bell said.

"A cross-border commissioner is a level of influence that we need to get things done and it is a good move and is something I have supported for years.

"Being independent, the commissioner will have the ability to influence regulation and, if Covid-19 remains around for another

year, the commissioner should be a voice on the transition committee."

Mr Bell said a regional voice with common sense on border issues was a necessity and that those living in Adelaide had "no idea" what occurs along the border communities.

"Moving forward it is about working with the Victorian departments as well, especially tourism and attracting more visitors to the Limestone Coast," he said.

"I see this position as an economic driver which will end up creating jobs, streamlining processes that occur on cross border communities including fire preparedness as well."

The local member said the commissioner would not toe the party line due to being an independent position and would work more in regards to regulations rather than legislation.

Founder of the Cross Border Callout campaign Paula Gust said she hoped for the election promise to come to fruition if Labor became the governing party.

"The only thing is the independent and direct contact with the premier has not happened with other cross border commission-

ers across Australia," Ms Gust said.

"The commissioners have an avenue to speak but that has not always been the case.

"Here along the South Australian border I would like to see it be a whole different ball game but I am not sure it will be."

She labelled the promise as "wishful thinking" and stated the commissioner would need to be employed by the government.

"This means they could toe the party line because it is what they will need to do," Ms Gust said.

"But a commissioner would still be needed even after the border opens."

Mount Gambier City Council Mayor Lynette Martin stated she was pleased to see such an appointment pledged and that the value of a cross-border commissioner was a position needed prior to Covid-19.

"Whilst the value of a cross-border commissioner would be obvious in Covid times, it is also a position that has been needed prior to the pandemic given our proximity to the border," Ms Martin said.

"Given this and the challenges associated with doing business across the border it would be most welcome."

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Family investment in paper

Community concerns raised at Labor hall meeting

HOUSING shortages, education, health and the Covid-19 pandemic were highlighted as significant issues within the region following a Labor shadow cabinet visit earlier this week.

State Opposition Leader Peter Malinauskis was joined by his entire shadow cabinet at the Mount Gambier City Hall on Sunday evening with community members invited to discuss issues.

People spoke about housing difficulties, claiming there was an alarming number of homeless residents sleeping in toilets and in tents across Mount Gambier.

Shadow Minister for Human Services Nat Cook said she was aware of the issues raised and that she would continue to advocate for better services.

“Labor is planning to release a policy surrounding the issue prior to the election,” Ms Cook said.

In addition to homelessness issues, Mr Malinauskis reiterated his previously announced policy on education which would include pre-school being available for three-year-olds.

“We are dead serious as a proper united team about taking a policy vision which is focused on the future of our State, one that will set ourselves up for the long term and presenting that to the people here of this community,” Mr Malinauskis said.

“This could be an education system that sets our kids up for the future and the great complexity that is coming their way in regards to a modern workforce.”

Mr Malinauskis also announced the promise of a cross-border commissioner during his visit on Sunday, stating living within a cross

border community had presented challenges throughout the Covid-19 pandemic.

“This has been a challenge for people on the Limestone Coast but also up in other parts of the border as well,” he said.

“It has affected businesses and has restricted access to services, friends and family and you have paid a particularly big sacrifice in the name of everybody so there has been a lot of people that should be grateful for what the residents here are doing.”

Mr Malinauskis also welcomed the Mount Gambier Labor candidate Katherine Davies, stating she was an incredibly passionate resident and community member with the interests of the Limestone Coast at the forefront.

Concerns surrounding cross border medical staff were also raised on the night with residents claiming they had found it difficult to access South Australian specialists for further care.

Advocacy for specialists to be enlisted and encouraged to work within the regions was raised and Shadow Minister for Health Chris Picton said there were a number of examples of service issues within the State overall.

“We have clearly seen these border issues exacerbating the problems in terms of being able to access [specialists] on either side of the border and this is another reason we are highlighting the need for the cross-border commissioner,” Mr Picton said.

“This is a really urgent thing across Australia that we need to grapple with and unfortunately there is no quick fix.

“It is something we are very acutely aware of,” he said.

Other issues brought up on the evening included reinstating a country cabinet, drug and alcohol support, foster careers and other health service difficulties.

Show action

THE 144th Millicent Show began this morning for three days of fun and competition following a hiatus last year caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.

"Where we would normally do about 12 shows we've only done five shows in the same period," he said.

"It's been a tough year but we're looking forward to once again putting smiles on lots of kids faces.

"The Millicent Show organisers are quite incredible really," he said.

"This show is one of the best we go to as it is packed with so many features for show goers to enjoy.

"It's good entertainment value for their money."

Mr Girdler said 14 rides are operating at the show with everything to please from the older thrill seekers to small children and having hand sanitiser at the entrance to each ride and extra cleans between rides were some of the measures put in place to comply with Covid-19 restrictions.

In addition to side show alley swinging into action today, 13 times Australian aerobic champion, 82 year old Chris Sperou will be performing this evening while the ever popular motocross will roar into action tonight on the newly upgraded track at the showgrounds.

Tomorrow Chris Sperou will take to the skies again in the afternoon and the motorbikes will continue racing while other features of the day include lawnmower racing, yard dog competitions, and a unique vehicle and stationary engine display. The traditional grand parade will be followed by the popular demolition derby.

Other activities include face painting, show person competitions, roving entertainment, indoor displays and livestock judging, along with three days of horses-in-action including hacks, show jumping and, on Sunday, a stockman's challenge, harness and topsy ring.

Councillors walk out of council meeting

A GRANT District Council meeting was brought to a stand still this week when four elected members left the meeting less than half an hour after it began.

The walk out was in response to Mayor Richard Sage refusing to apologise to Cr Shirley Little regarding comments about her husband's employment with council during a recent meeting.

Cr Megan Dukalskis quizzed Mr Sage at an earlier meeting as to whether he had a financial interest in TAFE with the mayor denying a conflict of interest - despite listing TAFE as an income source on the Council's register of interests due to his wife being employed there.

The discussion then led to Mr Sage claiming he did not have to declare a conflict of interest and added "Cr [Shirley] Little's husband cleans toilets...she doesn't report that."

At the October 18 meeting, Cr Gillian Clayfield put forward a motion without notice that Mr Sage apologise to Cr Little and her family with the motion passed unanimously by elected members.

The apology was expected to be made at the council meeting on Monday night but Mr Sage announced he would not make the apology as he did not find the comments 'derogatory'.

Mr Sage made the statement not allowing elected members to reply - stated his previous comments were 'fact' and that Cr Little's husband was a 'valued employee'.

The refusal prompted Cr Little to ex-

press her disappointment and reiterate that the Mr Sage's comments have hurt her family prior to leaving the meeting - just seven minutes after it began.

Cr's Clayfield, Dukalskis and Kylie Boston soon followed suit after putting forward a number of motions without notice - leaving the council without a quorum.

Cr Clayfield stated their decision to leave was in support of Cr Little and that Mr Sage's behaviour 'would not be tolerated'.

The councillors soon returned for the motion of Greenpoint Access 'out of respect for the ratepayers' with other agenda items adjourned for the next council meeting on November 15.

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Strength in Numbers

Heavenly service for pets

CREATURES great and small gathered at Mount Gambier's Anglican Parish Church last Sunday to be blessed.

The service, conducted by Father Neil Fernando, attracted more than 50 people and their pets.

Father Fernando said the service was held outside the church and welcomed people from the wider community, including those that did not normally attend church.

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We're keeping eyes in sight

DESPITE a dip in the national average, eye testing within Mount Gambier has remained consistent, bucking the metropolitan trend.

According to an analysis of the latest Medicare data by Vision 2020, there were 516,906 less eye tests conducted nationally compared to the previous 18-month period. Vision 2020 Australia CEO Patricia Sparrow said the reduction in eye tests was the result of Covid and the subsequent lockdown restrictions imposed across states.

Mount Gambier based optometrist Brad Mann said the border restrictions with Victoria had obviously impacted the number of clients booking an eye test - as they were unable to travel to the clinic.

However, Mr Mann believes the decreased eye test numbers were predominantly felt within metropolitan clinics. Victorian clients aside, he has not experienced any significant change

in client or eye test numbers within his clinic.

"We have been reasonably busy all the way through [Covid]," he said.

"Funnily enough after the lockdown in March, we had a really busy 2020... in fact, last year was probably one of our busiest years."

Regardless, Mr Mann reiterated Vision 2020's message about the importance of regularly undergoing eye testing.

"A lot of the eye diseases - the big ones being glaucoma and macular degeneration - you don't notice you've gotten the early stages," he said. "So, by regular eye tests it's the only way of finding those diseases early and early detection means better outcomes, better prognosis and better treatment outcomes."

Ms Sparrow concurs. "Around 90 per cent of vision loss is preventable or treatable if it's identified early, and eye tests are the early warning system which could save your sight," she said.

Council staff spending without approval

MOUNT Gambier City Council's purchase and procurement procedures have been flagged as concerning for the second year in a row.

A recent interim audit, conducted by local accounting services firm Galpins, described the procedures as a moderate financial risk and in need of improvement.

The concerns, which were also raised last year, highlighted council workers were purchasing items before gaining the required authorisation through the use of a purchase order.

Auditors took a random sample of 20 payments made to suppliers last financial year and found that 35 per cent of transactions tested did not have an associated purchase order raised until after the council had been invoiced.

This was an improvement over the previous financial year in which 59 per cent of tested transactions failed to have a purchase order raised until after council was invoiced.

City of Mount Gambier General Manager Shared Services Darren Barber said that, despite this, Galpins auditors were satisfied that "overall, the council demonstrated

a high level of compliance with the implementation of an internal controls framework consistent with the Better Practice Model".

Furthermore, he said that the council's management team had reviewed the seven instances highlighted during the interim audit - where purchase orders had been raised after council had been invoiced - and was comfortable that controls were in place to account for these instances of non-compliance.

This could include transactions where a contract was already in place or items where a purchase order would not be required;

such as an elected member's allowance.

Despite this, Galpins auditors made a series of recommendations in order to improve the council's purchasing and procurement procedures, with a focus on educating staff about when to raise a purchase order.

Mr Barber confirmed that the auditors recommendations had been reviewed by members of council's management team and they had agreed to begin implementing the recommendations during the current financial year, with the council's audit committee receiving ongoing updates about the implementation and outcome.

It would be very hard for Troy Bell to reject Labor if it has made pledges seen favourably by our community and the Liberals haven't.

The challenge is now for the Liberal Party to make meaningful commitments for our region.

To this end, this year in marking Remembrance Day I intend to pay special tribute to five individuals who enlisted from Barker who would have turned 100 this year.

In sharing their stories I hope to honour their memory and that of their fellow servicemen and women.

A high for the Lowes

THE oldest rural Toyota dealership in South Australia took special honors on Saturday during the Millicent Business Community Association's (MBCA) annual awards ceremony.

Recognising 55 years in business, Millicent Toyota was inducted into the MBCA's Hall of Fame with owners Geoff and Judy Lowe and their son Simon, along with several of their long term employees, accepting the award from Wattle Range Mayor, Des Noll, on stage at the Millicent Civic and Arts Centre.

Then named Junction Auto Sales, the business was situated across the road from its current building in the disused old Caltex service station.

From here the business sold and serviced

a wide range of machinery from tractors, motorbikes and hay rakes to Toyota vehicles.

The business expanded in 1976 when the current building, with showroom and office, was erected. In the 1980's the name was changed to Millicent Toyota with the addition of a purpose built workshop and vehicle service facility.

Today the 45 year old showroom is going through an upgrade and is expected to be completed soon.

Mr Lowe began working with his father, Roy, in the business in 1967. He served in Viet-

nam from 1969 to 1971 then returned home to the family business where he worked alongside his father until Roy's health declined and he retired leaving his son in the business.

Today the third generation of the Lowe family has entered the business with Geoff and Judy's son, Simon joining the team in 2004 and today he is the Dealer Principal of Millicent Toyota.

Mayor Noll said in his presentation speech: "If you can't find Geoff, more often than not he is in the back shed detailing a car ready for sale as he will never ask anyone to do anything he

wouldn't do himself.

"He is a true gentleman and treats his customers and colleagues with the utmost consideration and kindness.

"His professional business manner has made him well respected locally and wider afield with customers spread all over Australia.

New pavilion open

RESIDENTS and long term supporters of the Penola Pastoral Agricultural and Horticultural Show joined together over the weekend to officially open the brand new pavilion.

The mammoth project was funded under a \$79,540 grant from the Federal Government's Regional Agricultural Show Development program as well as contributions from the society, Wattle Range Council and Penola Coonawarra community members.

The previous pavilion - which was 60-years-old - has since been demolished and replaced by the fully-powered steel pavilion.

Council also waived fees for the demolition of the previous pavilion and building permits in an effort to maintain low costs.

During the official opening, show society president Kinta Wilson acknowledged the contributions made to the project and expressed sadness over the cancellation of this year's show.

"We opened this pavilion on what would

have been the day of our 157th annual show," Ms Wilson said.

"As with many productions over the last two years which were cancelled, we are saddened that our show could not go ahead in its entirety this year.

"The Penola Show is a time honoured tradition in our community and celebrates all things pastoral, agricultural and horticultural."

Ms Wilson said the society acknowledged the ongoing support from the community which included donation of time, skill, special machinery which remained essential for a community show and were grateful for all contributions both large and small over the last 157 years.

"Our first regional show here was held in 1864 and was held on several sites around town during the late 1800's and 1900's," she said.

"It was in 1946 that the 21 acres of land [now McCorquindale Park] was gifted to the society as the site for the new showgrounds by the Miss McCorquindale Family.

"The society had been planning to redevelop the previous pavilion for three decades and now our multi-functional and modern

pavilion will be a great addition in our 2022 Penola Show."

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said agricultural shows were the "heart and soul" of regional communities across the electorate, which helped bring communities together and bridge the divide between country and city.

"Unfortunately, Penola had to cancel their annual show this year, so I am pleased to see the Show Society were still able to celebrate 2021 with the official opening of their new pavilion," Mr Pasin said.

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride also congratulated the society on its successful achievement in securing the new facility as he officially unveiled the donor board for the pavilion.

"Volunteers, earth works and local things which take place here are great and the volunteers, their time rather than a cost is a donation," Mr McBride said.

"The names which are on display at the pavilion are a cross section of the community from Penola through to Mount Gambier and it is great to see all who have contributed to this project."

NATURALIST, historian, author and former post office employee Noel Boyle was awarded Senior of the Year at the closing event for Celebrate Seniors Month at the Millicent Civic and Arts Centre on Friday.

Mr Boyle's list of achievements were read out to about 100 people by Wattle Range Councillor Dennis Muhovics assisted by Catarina Santos, Council's Environmental Health Officer who was one of the major organisers of Celebrate Seniors Month.

After almost 46 years of service at the Millicent Post Office, Mr Boyle retired in 2010 and has devoted even more of his time to volunteering ever since.

President of the South East Family History Group since the 1980's and a member of the Millicent National Trust for more than 20 years, he has a bent for history and much of his volunteering achievements have come under the banner of these groups.

He also has a love of natural history and is a member of the Millicent Field Naturalists and his active membership of the Lake McIntyre Committee has him working countless hours there.

He also served 29 years in the Millicent Country Fire Service (CFS) from the age of nine. He retired from the CFS in the 1980's and in his time was proud to serve alongside his three brothers and with them was active in fighting many fires including two of the largest being the Millicent Institute fire in 1964 and the Ash Wednesday bushfires in 1983.

This commitment, along with his work as an author of a number of short stories on the district's history and personalities, assisting in the compilation of historical books including 'School Days' and 'Through the eyes of Goyder', and his efforts to plant trees in public areas and provide well researched advice on

names for possible use on relevant roads in the district, was recognised with the 2011 Australia Day Millicent Citizen of the Year Award.

His work has continued since then including a number of particular projects this year.

With the help of a small band of volunteers he has been cleaning up the old section of the Millicent cemetery and this year he has begun installing name plaques on unmarked graves.

At the 170 year old graves at Gran Gran near Mount Burr, he instigated and was a major part of their restoration this year after they had fallen into disrepair.

Along with Kalangadoo's Nick Hunt, Mr Boyle was a major part of having a sign placed on the roadside to mark the site of the first

homestead on Kalangadoo Station, the Hunter Homestead.

He is also working with the Millicent Council to ensure the site of Millicent's first cemetery is recognised with an informative marker on the site behind the current Millicent hospital.

On Millicent's Matheson Road, Mr Boyle, along with other volunteers, has been clearing weeds and introduced tree species from a crown land reserve.

He is also in the final throes of writing a book on the history of post offices in the Millicent and surrounding areas – something he has been working on for more than 30 years.

Theatre planning makeover

A PROPOSAL for an estimated \$35m makeover at the Sir Robert Helpmann Theatre has been unveiled in an attempt to further enhance the art community.

The mammoth project will give the 40-year old structure a facelift as well as a new entrance planned to be installed at Ferrers Street.

Inspired by a multitude of discussions with the local arts community, the plans highlight a number of significant additions to the theatre including a community make space for workshops, a music studio and a smaller, separate flexible performance space.

The front entrance along the Cave Gardens will remain but is expected to include a new airlock entrance and glazing under the current canopy, increasing the size of the current foyer.

Theatre manager Frank Morello said the planning for the new facility had been in the making for over two-years, with the Covid-19 pandemic putting a pause on the works.

Mr Morello said despite the minor setback, the current plans were exciting for the broader arts community and residents within Mount Gambier.

“This is all about creating a space for local artists to create regional stories that reflect this area and resonate more widely,” Mr Morello said.

“There are not many spaces throughout the region which allows the creative community to create works of visual art and network which is exactly what we were told is needed.

“With a combination of work and consultation, we were then able to provide this plan.”

He said following the difficulties the arts community had experienced throughout the pandemic, the new plans would hopefully

push those struggling forward in their careers.

“If we can redevelop the theatre to today’s standards in regards to aesthetics and access it will certainly enhance and further support the industry,” he said.

“There will be a number of exciting elements but the main aspect of the design is the new entrance planned for Ferrers Street which will also have entrance landscapes, a forecourt and outdoor breakout terrace leading through to the community making space.

“This making space will be fantastic for artists across the board and we heard the callout

for it loud and clear during our consultation process with many visual artists wanting an area they are able to use for things such as pottery and other visual art models.”

He said the proposed music studio would also provide a fantastic opportunity for local musicians with a continuing growth in aspiring young musicians and established musicians who continue to write original songs.

“Having a space like this for musicians will allow them to make and record music and is a wonderful addition for Mount Gambier,” Mr Morello said.

“We will also be joining the Varcoe building to the theatre making it under the one roof which will then further assist with our backstage usage and provide more residential space.

“International, national and local artists will be able to come and work directly within the building where they can create their work which is a fantastic initiative.”

He said the more comfortable and inviting proposal was expected to go before all tiers of government where investment discussions will begin.

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

Award winning dramatic photo

A BRAND new ambulance has been delivered to the Port MacDonnell South Australian Ambulance Service (SAAS) with volunteers rejoicing at the innovative technology.

Ms Geraghty's top photo depicts a Covid-19 positive patient in the intensive care unit within the St Vincent's Private Hospital in Sydney.

She began her journalism journey through studying in Perth before securing a cadetship at The Border Mail.

She then travelled to Sydney where she has continued to work as a photojournalist for the Sydney Morning Herald for more than 20 years.

"It was an honour to receive the award especially among the world's best photojournalists across Australia," Ms Geraghty said.

"The calibre of photojournalists in this country is exceptional."

She said the concept for the photo originated following the delta-strain outbreak within New South Wales and continued from previous documentation she had taken throughout the pandemic.

"I had been documenting Covid since February last year and the first thing I did

in regards to Covid was the return of the Ruby Princess," Ms Geraghty said.

"I had been documenting the St Vincent hospital very early on in the pandemic, ranging from the red zone in emergency all the way through to pandemic training and testing.

"This meant I already had built a relationship and trust with the staff there and when the delta strain came into the state we knew this would be a game changer."

Gaining access to the intensive care unit, Ms Geraghty said the opportunity came with a number of conditions.

"I had to be fully vaccinated, go through a fit test for a mask and was monitored with all the personal protection equipment that the medical staff were also wearing," she said.

"I was monitored the entire time and was only allowed one camera and a lens to limit the exposure to the virus.

"When I was finished, the equipment had to be sterilised properly afterwards."

She said being at the epicentre of the Covid response was a story which had to be told and she was invited within the facility during the height of lockdown.

"I did it because I wanted to show families how beautifully their loved ones were cared for," Ms Geraghty said.

"Each patient in the intensive care unit

had an individual health care nurse monitoring them and I saw incredible compassion.

"I also wanted to show that this was the reality of what was going on, that this is why we were in lockdown, why people were staying home as well as showing the family members that their loved ones were being cared for."

Ms Geraghty said being a photojournalist throughout the pandemic did not come without challenges, stating the public needed to remember the industry remained essential.

"Journalists were still out and about during Covid but it changed how we worked," she said.

"We were probably busier than ever, between daily press conferences, testing, vaccinations, political responses, economic responses and the impact the pandemic has had on society.

"Our job is always to inform the public and I went into the intensive care unit surrounded by the delta strain to show people what it looks like."

The avid photojournalist said she had always been interested in photography and wanted to use her skills to tell a story.

"Our squad numbers have built up with a lot of locals joining in but the Penola pool has also been busier than ever and lessons have also been very popular."


Lap swimming for the community will be available Monday to Wednesday evenings from 7pm with a \$5 entry fee per session.

Average price was up 9 cents to 483 c/kg returning a lighter average of \$2,256 per head.

New remote road funds

THE Federal Government has launched a new \$150 million Remote Roads Upgrade Pilot Program targeting unsealed roads throughout remote Australia.


Councils will be offered between 80 per cent and 100 per cent funding to upgrade unsealed roads and improve safety with works including resurfacing, removing dangerous corners and managing vegetation.

Federal Member for Barker Tony Pasin said the funding would make a real difference to rural and regional communities.

"The Government recognises local government bears the brunt of the often significant costs of upgrading rural and regional roads and we are stepping in to back councils to undertake crucial works," Mr Pasin said.

"We will partner with local government to deliver this funding and address many neglected roads that most people don't see.

"Everyone should have access to local community centres, including schools and medical care, and nobody should be cut off from their township because of the condition of the roads."

Maintaining irrigation

IN the lower South East of South Australia, we are blessed with access to sustained volumes of high-quality water for both stock and irrigation in most regions.

Irrigation is expensive to establish and with current energy pricing, expensive to run.

It can and should be very profitable though.

The key to profitability lies in the irrigation system being set up, managed, and operated to its optimal capacity.

This is not new, nor is it unproven – there are many studies over numerous decades now that show the direct link between optimised production and profitability from the irrigation system, not via focus on reduced inputs and costs.

“Are you irrigating or just shifting water?”

You need to ensure your system is operating to its optimum efficiency. Studies have shown that for centre pivots, pressure regulators and sprinkler packs begin to degrade in performance after five years and can be in very poor condition by ten. Pumps also have an efficiency lifespan and optimal operating conditions (engine revs and flow curves). Poor system performance can have enough water being pumped, but in the wrong places at the wrong rates.

“It costs the same to run a poor performing system versus a good system”.

The financial returns are significantly less from an inefficient system. Having your sys-

tem analysed for performance and serviced annually can mitigate this issue. Catch can testing will show how efficient the system is and highlight any areas that need attention. Testing can highlight the need for a new sprinkler pack.

Even where a new package has been installed, a catch can test for around \$800 for a 50 Ha pivot is a cheap long-term investment to know the system is in fact working as it should.

Testing to know your soil nutrient levels and knowing your RAW values are critical to enabling correct irrigation scheduling – if you don't know these terms or what the values are for the soils under your irrigations system, then you aren't actually managing the irrigation.

We can point you in the right direction for this or seek input from your irrigation system supplier or irrigations scheduling service.

Ensuring that plants can access the nu-

trient required easily is a key to optimising growth during the irrigation season.

If water quality or soil conditions are less than ideal, there are some liquid products able to be supplied, that may alleviate these issues.

“Water should be thought of as a key nutrient not a commodity.”

Soil moisture must be kept in the field capacity range and above refill to optimise growth. Scheduling irrigations around evapotranspiration rates is a key requirement, but knowing what is happening in the soil is critical and can be shown by the use of soil water monitoring equipment.

This can be constant logging equipment that shows in real time what is happening in the soil. Costs for these systems are much less than even five years ago and their reliability and information access are also significantly greater.

“Are you making money from watering or

just keeping things green?”

Always keep in mind that irrigation is about capturing the increased sunlight and temperatures of the irrigation season and turning these into increased daily growth rates.

Achieving these and then utilising and converting this into saleable product is the key.

This can't be achieved from poor density or older pasture species and weeds.

Ensuring that you have dense pastures / forage crops that optimise growth during the irrigations season delivers the productivity you are after.

Ten to 20 per cent poor density or poor species is 10 – 20 per cent of the irrigation area that is not being profitable but is still costing you for inputs. These areas need to be addressed.

Remember that correctly managed irrigated pastures deliver approximately three times the growth of dryland over the 12-month period – and this figure expands when quality is taken into account.

Keep this in mind when looking at required inputs to optimise growth or cost of pasture to be established.

Aussie canola fit for export

AUSTRALIAN canola will need to ensure it will be 'fit' to take advantage of future export opportunities, says a recently released industry report by Rabobank.

Rabobank's agriculture analyst, Dennis Voznesenski said, in the next 10 years, the Australian canola industry will continue to have two primary export outlets in any given year – Europe, for accredited canola, and Asia, where sustainability requirements by governments are to date minimal.

"These options will not be mutually exclusive and, in fact, in years when EU (European Union) production is high and large volumes of imports are not required there, the industry will need to price itself competitively to capture Asian sales," Mr Voznesenski said.

"Also, we don't discount the growing demand for accredited canola in Asia, driven by the commercial/private sector rather than regulation."

In that regard, the report says, Australian canola will need to ensure it will be 'fit' to take advantage of these future export opportunities, in particular in meeting the sustainability credentials which will be increasingly required in export markets, especially Europe.

Mr Voznesenski said a large proportion of Australian canola was already fit for the EU market by way of International Sustainability and Carbon Certification (ISCC) accreditation, but being prepared for further changing requirements would be key to remaining 'mar-



ket ready' in the future.

"Being mindful of changing EU restrictions on agri-chemicals that can be used in production, potential changes to the EU's views on which canola varieties are considered non-GM, and also carbon intensity scrutiny as part of the region's 'Fit for 55' ambitions - to reduce its greenhouse gas emis-

sions by 55 per cent in 2030 compared with 1990 levels - are all going to be critical to capturing the European canola opportunity," he said.

"By nature of its geographical location, Australia will already be at a disadvantage on the carbon front in the future compared with competitors such as the Ukraine," Mr Vozne-

senski said, given the distance – and associated carbon emissions of transport – that Australian canola has to travel to Europe.

Past 2030, the Rabobank report says that the EU biodiesel demand – and hence canola demand – is expected to ease as the region transitions to electric and hydrogen powered transport.

Power play

**Deborah Mailman takes
the lead in season two of
political drama Total Control**

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Power balance:

The life of the party

Political drama *Total Control* returns for a second season of strategising and power plays. Deborah Mailman tells **Danielle McGrane** how things are looking for her earnest character in this world of backstabbers and betrayers.

Roles like Alex Irving don't come around very often, and Deborah Mailman knows it.

"I wish I could be a little more like Alex," Mailman said. "She's a bit fearless, whereas I'm too worried about everything. My anxiety levels are through the roof. I'm always second guessing myself, whereas she just goes in and does what she believes is right and I love that about her."

Mailman is back playing the fearless Alex for season two of *Total Control*, a political show of Shakespearean proportions.

In season one, her character was appointed to the Senate, betrayed by the Prime Minister (played by Rachel Griffiths), who she then managed to stage a coup against.

But her fearlessness doesn't always work in her favour. And in season two, it seems Alex's bold

moves don't have the effect she expects them to.

"We start the season pretty much directly in the aftermath of the ousting of the Prime Minister, so we see Alex jumping ship to the opposition party," Mailman said.

"But she quickly learns that nothing's going to change and she gets quite frustrated and angry because no one really cares in the way that she does and she sees that nothing's really going to accelerate in the way that she wants it to."

It's a tough lesson to learn, that politicians aren't always in it for the right reasons. So Alex decides to run as an Independent, and tries to win what's seen as an unwinnable seat.

"It's a seat that's been Conservative for over 25 years – and she's going back to a community that distrusts her," she said.

"In some respects she knows that she may not win this fight. But I think her resolve to right the injustices is such a powerful drive for her."

There's no doubt Alex is up against the political system and public sentiment.

"There's certainly cracks forming in Alex's armour and it gets really personal for her," Mailman said.

"The abuse that is thrown at her from every angle does take its toll and not only on her but on her family as well. You can see the armour crumbling a little bit this season."

But the fact that Alex keeps going and fighting for what's right is testament to her belief that what she's doing is worthwhile.

"We had to really look at what she's fighting against," Mailman said.

"She has to be fighting for something and what pushes her to keep that drive within her is being a black female politician.

"That's already a target on her back and she's not naïve around any of this, she knows what she's going into. This time there's a little bit of uncertainty for Alex in what she's doing."

Alex is also unusual in that she's a politician who's not out for herself – she does what she does for her community.

"I think that's the whole point of it," Mailman said.

"She didn't grow up in the same ways that other politicians have that have been a part of the establishment for so long. She's sort of trying to rewrite her own rules a little bit and it's absolutely about change."

In saying that, Alex is learning how to play the game a little bit more, realising it's the only way she can get ahead.

"She becomes a really keen negotiator this season," she said.

"Being an Independent, she knows she has to get support from other parties to play. So

this time around you see her being a little more savvy in her politics, negotiating with the other independents to form a bloc of power within government.

"It's good that you get to see her political smarts this time around, that she's not just throwing grenades left, right and centre."

The ousting of Rachel Griffiths' prime minister Rachel Anderson, which kicks off this season's wheeling and dealing, feels quite dramatic but also believable and not that far removed from what's happened in Australian politics over recent years.

"Well, let's count how many prime ministers we've had in a short amount of time," Mailman said.

"The public has witnessed parliament blowing itself up over so many years so we're not writing science fiction here. And I think from the writers' point of view and the producers, they're trying to create a sense of authenticity around the world because that was so important to the show. There's got to be some believability around this world."

While her character is a bit of a political animal, Mailman doesn't share her interest in the Canberra bubble.

"I'm pretty basic," she said.

"I make sure I'm up to date with things and know what's going on but I certainly don't have the passion for

it in the way Rachel Griffiths does – she's such a political junkie, she's amazing and I sort of had to lean on her when it came to the ins and outs of the political world."

Mailman and Griffiths are two very strong leads, and this show's real drawcards. Griffiths is also one of the show's creators and has a clear vision for what she wants the show to represent, according to Mailman.

"Rachel is very much about the female perspective within our show," Mailman said.

"You see that happening a lot with our dramas, and not just Australian dramas but dramas all over the world, driving a female perspective within the story."

"I love Rachel, she's just fabulous. I've always been a big fan of her work. She's such a positive influence and inspiration in this whole process for me."

Now Mailman is waiting to see if the show will get another season, and she's convinced there's more of this story to tell.

"Fingers crossed," she said.

"I feel like there's enough there to go for a third season. Where we ended it, it's like 'Wouldn't it be great to see how we can go from here?'"

"I love this show so much. I love Alex. She's a fabulous character."

fertilisers provide much-needed nutrients to growing plants.



fertiliser, but must be mixed in well with soil to avoid burning plants. Depending on the varieties you have in your garden, you should be wary of pests such as caterpillars, rats and aphids.

As the weather begins to warm, be sure that your plants receive plenty of water and sun. Likewise, when spending time in the garden over the warmer months means sun protection and water is important for the gardener too. Following these basic steps should put your garden in good stead for the season ahead. Happy planting!

Fine days fire up anglers

FISHING

SUNSHINE and calm seas have been the story for the best part of the last week.

We have also had a few days with light winds thrown in which has really kicked the local anglers into gear.

Offshore fishos have made the most of the conditions, heading out to the deeper water and most have found good numbers of fish.

Robbie and Angelo Ferraro along with Ryan Kobes managed a nice mixed bag of gummy shark, knifejaw and flathead late last week in around 100 metres of water off Port MacDonnell.

I know of several other similar catches from roughly the same area, so when the weather allows, that is definitely a great option.

In a bit closer, the 60m line has produced some nice reefies such as snapper, red snapper and terakhi to name a few.

With our days getting longer and not so cool, plenty of fishos head out for a couple of hours after work and still have plenty of time to enjoy.

The inshore snapper fishing has kicked off fairly well this season.

I already know of a few crews who have put in several sessions in recent weeks and found some reasonable fish.

The bulk of the news is from Danger and Green points, but as far west as Orwell Rocks is worth a look.

The sea has been fairly flat for a while now, so a bit of a stir will not hurt but looking at the forecast, we may have to wait a little bit.

There has not been a lot of shark news from

down that way of late, but I think there are two reasons.

Firstly being it is so flat and clear, the sharks prefer a bit of stir and second, a lot of anglers who would usually fish that area are making the most of the flat seas and heading out to deeper water.

We are not concerned though, this time of year we do see things start slowing down a little bit.

The whiting fishos have been doing well again this week.

I have seen some nice bags of fish from

right across the South East from both the boaties and land-based anglers.

The Port MacDonnell breakwater has been fairly reliable, as has Cape Douglas and Carpenter Rocks.

The land-based guys are doing well in Cape Douglas and Nene Valley.

There are some big silver trevally mixed in with the whiting lately, so if you hook one of those bigger trevallys at two or more kilos, you are in for a fight.

Gar numbers have continued to impress this week again, and much like the whiting,

the land-based and boaters are all sharing in the success.

The usual haunts such as Livingstons Bay, Cape Douglas and Hutt Bay have all produced some decent fish this week.

There has also been a handful of good ones caught inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater.

The breakwater is also producing a heap of small salmon trout which will no doubt swarm you if you burley too much in there, but being between 21cm and 30cm, they are great fun.

With the sea being so flat, we have seen plenty of anglers target sweep on the reef.

We do not get too many days each season to get into them, so make the most of it while you can.

I have seen several different rig set ups for the sweep, but my favourite is still a small float, just to hopefully give you a chance to stop them before they hit the reef.

The Glenelg River has been a bit slow again this week.

There has been a handful of bream caught that I know about, but we hope in the next few weeks once the border opens we will be able to find a few more fish and be able to spread out a bit.

The forecast is good looking forward, the sea and wind looks like it is going to be down for the remainder of this week and into next, which will hopefully see more anglers hitting the water.

As always, keep an eye on it and make the decision on the day.

The weatherman does not always get it right.

Until next week, safe fishing.



This bunch was assisted by a strong turn on the front by Decker just before the catch was made.

In the final sprint to the line Bryant managed to finish just ahead of Kidman and Opperman.

Close call at Attamurra

EVERY golfer knows how physically and mentally demanding the game can be.

It is doubly so for Stephen Wyte.

But on Saturday the former Australian Defence Force parachute rigger came out a winner when he combined with Mount Gambier Golf Club captain Peter Waters to claim victory in the 4BBB stableford competition at Attamurra with 47 points.

While Waters did most of the heavy lifting on the front nine, it was Wyte, a relative newcomer to the game, who came to the fore on the back nine.

The pair secured a reasonable 21 points on the front, with Waters contributing most of those, including three points thanks to a par on the fourth hole, four points following a one-putt birdie on the par 4 fifth and another three after making par on the par 5 seventh.

Winning was a long way from their minds at the turn, Wyte admitting the front nine was "a bit of a struggle" for him.

"In 2008 I was in York in WA doing some work for the SAS and as a parachute rigger you also had to be prepared to skydive yourself," the 40-year-old said.

"One landing went badly wrong and I almost killed myself.

"I'm still carrying the mental and physical scars from that."

But starting on the 10th hole he was able to produce enough good shots for his team to come out on top.

A three-point bogey on the 10th hole was a good start, but even better was to come.

A chip and putt from just off the 12th green led to a four-point par, two more four-pointers followed on the 15th and 16th and another three points jumped onto the card when the 36-handicapper made bogey on the par 4 17th, despite a wayward second shot.

Waters did not have to do much, but a three-point par on the par 4 13th hole helped the tally on the back nine reach an impressive

26 points, the total of 47 ending up one better than runners-up Tony Reville and Kev Lennon who edged out David McPherson and Peter Berkefeld on a count-back.

While Wyte's impressive run on the back nine led to a win on Saturday, it was a consistent 18 holes (21 points on each) that helped Jim Pegler take top honours in Thursday's stableford competition.

Almost 12 months since he last tasted victory, Pegler said he had no idea why, but had "suddenly started to hit it better in the last couple of weeks".

Fifteen points after the first seven holes was a decent start, but it was the next seven holes where he really caught fire.

In that stretch he produced six three-pointers and another two-pointer on the 12th hole to add 20 more to his score and bring morning leader Graham Greenwood into his sights.


A hiccup on the 15th resulted in a double bogey for one point, but the 32-handicapper bounced back with six points on the final three holes, including a wipe on the 17th, to finish one point ahead of Greenwood.

It was not all bad news for the runner-up however.

Each session costs \$5 which includes a barbecue.


The sessions will involve learning all aspects of the game.

Going the distance at Tara

GREYHOUND RACING

WITH distance racing over 732 metres back at Tara Raceway after a two-year absence, the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club is now in the unique situation of being the only SA club able to run races over five different distances.

When racing commenced at the Lake Terrace East venue on January 25, 1997 it was the Richard Clayfield trained Bright Option who won the first race run at the track - a maiden over 512 metres in 31.30 seconds (best 30.95).

The short-course distance of the day was 277 metres while an occasional 732-metre race was run from the same starting boxes.

In 2010 the 277 metres scamper was replaced by the 400-metre distance.

In June 2014 middle-distance racing was programmed at Tara Raceway over 600 metres - the first race to be run won by David Peckham's Thanks Tubby in 35.56 seconds.

Then, in January this year, 305 metres was introduced.

Primarily intended for younger greyhounds, the first of the Sundays-only short-course events was won by Annette Kampman's Myola Dawn in 17.66 seconds.

As it turned out, last Sunday's 10-race meeting marked the return of distance racing and also included races over the other four distances.

Members of the Lewiston/Two Wells-based Trengove team were back - Clint and his son Harry looking to take over from where Jack (nephew/cousin) had left off at the previous Thursday's meeting with four winners.

The suggestion had been put forward that Clint, his wife Shelley and Jack between them looked well-placed to perhaps being able to win races over the five distances.

Clint and Shelley Trengove's Victa Jess and Crown Suzie fought out the Williams Crane Hire Mixed Stake (600m) with the former winning by two lengths in a quick 35.06 seconds.

Shelley was successful in the Exchange Printers Stake (400m) when Howling Hoss scored an outstanding win over Glenville Rose by 8½ lengths in a quick 22.77 seconds.

Bella Rocks, a litter sister to Clint's Leigh Rogers finalist Frankie Boy at Angle Park last night, was then too good for Galactic Medusa over 512 metres in a time of 29.98 seconds.

With three of the four runners, the Trengove family looked to hold a strong hand in the Winning Post Supplies Back to Distance Racing Stake (732m).

That is how the race played out.

Criminal found the front down the back the second time around before running out a 4¼ lengths winner over Born A Runner and disappointing favourite Stella Stone in a pretty handy time of 43.76 seconds.

By Barcia Bale out of Appointed, the black dog is trained by Jack Trengove and raced by the Pearceedale-based Tullio family.

Their association with Tara Raceway goes back to 2014 when they won the Mount Gambier Cup with Veetee Express.

Criminal, who won his maiden at Tara Raceway over 400 metres in July, had previously raced once over the distance when finishing fourth over 730 metres at Angle Park in September.

While the Trengoves did well to win races over four distances - Emerley Apep actually made it five wins for the day when also suc-

cessful over 400 metres - the Klaassens Contractors Juvenile Stake (305m) was probably always going to be the stumbling block.

Taking full advantage of his SA-bred status, Arctic Bear, trained at Worrolong by Lee Bartholomew, had already won three Juvenile races for the month - one of those resulting in a track record of 17.35 seconds.

An October 2019 whelping, last Sunday was Arctic Bear's last chance at a crack at the non-penalty grade for greyhounds two years old and younger.

The big white and brindle son of Flying Stanley and Galactic Cat never really looked like being beaten, eventually running out a 3¼ lengths winner over another Trengove runner in Gypsy Boy in 17.52 seconds.

Speaking after the race, part-owner Steve Bartholomew said Arctic Bear's litter sister Mary Bridget had returned to Worrolong after

a short stint of racing in Adelaide.

"She was racing in terrific form when winning the Winter Classic here back in August," he said.

"The fact that she's not a good traveller prompted us to place her in Adelaide to see how she measured up in the city.

"She had two runs at Angle Park but was disappointing in both of them so we decided to bring her home."

Meanwhile, after 10 months, Allendale East's David Peckham has hit the front in the Ian Badger Leading Trainer award.

Wins by Trademark Bourne in the Todd's Photographics Mixed Stake (400m) and Educate in the Progreyhoundtips.com Stake (400m), plus four minor placings, now has him on 718 points, 10 clear of Compton's Tracie Price.

King of the youngsters

OWNERS and trainers are always thrilled when a plan hatched some time ago comes to fruition.

That was the case for the local owners and trainer of the two-year-old pacer Jawsflincoln when the youngster won the feature race at Globe Derby Park last Saturday night.

The Golden Nursery final for two-year-olds is one of the major races on the South Australian harness racing calendar, and has been a good result for South East trained pacers over the years.

It continued last weekend when we had three starters in the \$24,000 race and all three were in the first four of betting on the race.

Jawsflincoln was the red hot favourite (\$1.75) with Ever Hoping and Art Jester as \$9.50 and \$16 chances respectively.

Previously trained in Victoria, Jawsflincoln was sent to Greg Scholefield's Naracoorte stable in September with the specific aim of being set for the finals of both the Golden Nursery and Southern Cross series.

Convincing wins in two lead-up races for the Golden Nursery suddenly thrust Jawsflincoln into favouritism and the youngster was able to lead all the way from barrier four.

Jawsflincoln is raced by John and Mick Lamond, Stephen Coote, Marty and Timmy Von Stanke, Anthony Sneath, Justin Cook and Andrew Telford and, for several of them, it is their first foray into harness racing.

"He really let down good and is going to be a nice horse," part owner Mick Lamond stated.

"He will have a little freshen up at Scholefield's stable in preparation for the Southern Cross series later this month."

Winning driver Gaita Pullicino experi-

enced the highs and lows of harness racing within the space of half an hour.

The following race was declared a no race after a race fall which resulted in Pullicino fracturing her pelvis.

Local trainer David Phillips knew what he was doing when he took the unraced youngster Joelita to Globe Derby Park last Monday.

Joelita drew the inside of the second row in the 1800 metre pace for two year olds, however a superb Mark Phillips drive saw the filly in the preferred one/one sit after only 100 metres.

Joelita (\$7.50) ran home strongly from the 400 metres to pip the odds-on favourite Just Chai by a short half head.

UP TO HER OLD TRICKS

Even though Miss Mosh is an eight-year-old mare, she can still be very piggish and have a mind of her own on race days as apprentice Ben Price found out at Bordertown last Friday.

Price was kicked in the stomach by the mare in the saddling enclosure prior to race six and was taken to hospital later that night, resulting in the teenager having to forgo all seven rides at Morphettville the following day.

Racing at Bordertown was not affected by Thursday's downpour or power blackouts in the region and the track was upgraded by stewards from a Soft 6 to a Soft 5 early in the program.

The only Mount Gambier stable to have success was the Bob and Kane Post combination with Salisbury Hill in the 1550-metre maiden.

Ridden by Kate Walters, Salisbury Hill started favourite following three recent placings and the five-year-old mare powered home once Walters was able to find some galloping room when mid field at the 400 metres.

The ride of the day had to go to Stacey Metcalfe, who was still able to win aboard Keysor in the 2000-metre BM 62 handicap

despite the saddle slipping and making for a hellish ride up the straight.

For Murray Bridge trainer Mick Huxtable, his trip to Bordertown produced the perfect result when both of his gallopers for the day - Baraconi and Annika - won, to give Adelaide jockey Paul Gatt a winning double in successive races.

The Bordertown club did exceptionally well to attract 69 runners for the seven events when you take into account there were no Victorian horses plus Murray Bridge had raced 48 hours earlier.

WINNERS KEEP COMING

Trainer Peter Hardacre was on the ball when he advised The Border Watch readers six weeks ago his stable would start to fire now the tracks have dried out.

Since then, Hardacre's team have been great money spinners by either winning or running a place at city and provincial level.

At Murray Bridge last week, Hardacre produced the first starter Halifax Road in the 1400 metre maiden for his Heywood owners.

The three-year-old gelding justified heavy backing (\$6-\$4.40) to record a super impressive win with Anna Jordsjo in the saddle.

Halifax Road sat three wide for the entire journey and was never going to lose from the top of the straight.

Morphettville on Melbourne Cup day was also fruitful for Hardacre when Sebona (\$2.60 fav.) made it successive wins in the 1800-metre BM 62 handicap.

The five-year-old gelding is in career best form and came from the rear of the field for jockey Karl Zechner to reel in his rivals with relative ease in the final 300 metres.

HARNESSES RESUMES TONIGHT

The co-share harness meetings (Port Pirie and Mount Gambier) resume tonight with the later start (7.58pm) for the Mount Gambier races.

Club secretary Maxine Milich has advised, as there are only three races here

tonight, it will be free admission for the public and all entry will be through the Pick Avenue entrance.

There is more four-legged action at Penola on Sunday where there is a seven race gallops program.

FULL OF PRAISE

Hasta La War did not go around in last Tuesday's Melbourne Cup even though, as it turned out, he would have made the final field.

His trainer Sue Murphy was more than impressed by the treatment she received from Victorian Racing Club officials in regards to getting Hasta La War into the big race.

"They could not have been more helpful and were constantly on the phone to me in their endeavours for Hasta La War to make the cup field," Murphy stated.

"Hasta La War is still on the mend from a corn which developed into an abscess and we have earmarked a possible start in the Ballarat Cup later this month."

PLACINGS CHANGED

Murray Bridge trainer Grant Young recently pleaded guilty to a charge of presenting Santelmo Fuego with a high level of cobalt in his system when the gelding won the 1800-metre BM 68 handicap at Naracoorte on August 22.

Stewards disqualified Young for three months, commencing on Wednesday, November 3 and duly altered the placings for that Naracoorte race.

That is good news for Mingbool trainer John O'Connor and jockey Dominic Tourneur, as O'Connor's galloper Grosvenor Bridge ran second and has been promoted to winner of the race.

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Hill climb run was legendary

ON an almost-perfect weekend for motorsport, drivers descended on the Valley Lakes for the annual Legend of the Lakes hill climb.

No one could stop Dan Day as he blazed to his sixth straight victory, surpassing the previous record of five straight by Mount Gambier's Peter Gazzard.

But the Adelaide driver could not break his previous record time up the hill of 49.89 seconds, despite changes to his Subaru this year with that specific task in mind.

He was not far off, with a quick time of 50.32 set on Sunday morning.

With the sun out early on the final day, the times began to tumble, with all enjoying the sticky surface.

Day had his challengers, with Craig Van Diemen close behind with a time of 52.05 seconds set late on Sunday, while Damian Brand rounded out the podium with a hot 52.74-second Sunday run.

In fact, the sub-one minute runs extended down to 63rd position but one second is a large margin in a hill climb and Day prevailed.

Action was certainly the order of the weekend, with the likes of Mark Povey lifting wheels at every opportunity to thrill the limited crowd, or those watching from home on the live stream.

After wrestling with his Corvette-inspired Commodore, Mick Argoon managed to break the one-minute mark on Sunday, down to 56.64 on his final run up the hill.

The matt-black livery and roaring exhaust of his purpose-built machine certainly made for an impressive spectacle on the normally-quiet public road.

Sean Day - Dan's father - made his return to the event after many seasons on the sidelines in an impressively-presented 22B Subaru WRX, with a fast 54.51 run to finish just inside the top 10.

The Subaru looked the goods with its WRC-inspired livery and was not far off the pace.

A popular driver at the event was Katelyn Bowering, who was given the chance to compete over the weekend, an honour bestowed the organising body - the South Eastern Automobile Club - to recognise the hours she volunteers throughout the year at SEAC Park, along with the fact she is a promising junior.

Bowering certainly had plenty of support up and down the hill.

While limited spectators were allowed due to Covid-19 restrictions, the live stream proved popular, with running commentary to ensure fans were up to date with what was happening.

Sunday also saw an effort to raise money for the Flying Doctors service, with all markers or barriers hit bringing a "fine" for that competitor, along with the usual five-second time penalty.

At the end of the day more than \$3000 was raised for what race director Kevin Raedel deemed a worthy cause.

Raedel experienced first hand the need for the service in the region, recently transferred to Adelaide via the RFDS due to health issues.

Day untouchable with sixth win at Lakes

IT was probably an expected result, as Dan Day stormed to his sixth straight Legend of the Lakes hill climb title in a row to surpass Peter Gazzard's former record of five straight.

Day achieved the milestone over the weekend at the time-honoured event, with a fast 50.32-second run on Sunday morning.

While that did not break his standing record of 48.89 seconds, Day said he was pleased to claim his sixth straight title.

"The aim going into this weekend was to make sure we really put it together and secured the win," he said.

"The same as last year, the first and second places were a good couple of seconds off, but the pressure was still on to pull off a run to put us up there.

"There was pressure to make sure the car was performing right and I did the job to get it up the hill in one piece, which is always a challenge."

Craig Ven Diemen was close behind in second place with a time of 52.05, a fair way off in hill climbs, but it kept dropping as Sunday wore on.

"He was reeling in that time, especially on Sunday," Day said.

"He was dropping half a second every run.

"He hasn't driven there for a few years so it was a solid effort by him."

Day put in times around the 51-second mark on Saturday straight off the trailer on old tyres - enough in the end to claim the win - and was pleased with that effort.

However, the course record was what he was chasing and he pushed on from there.

"Once I got those first couple of runs out of the way and got down to a low 51, I knew the car where it needed to be and it was up to me to adjust to the new tyres," Day said.

"I used the third and fourth run on Saturday to scrub them in then got down to a 50.5 which I was happy with."

However, the new style of tyre came with its own issues, requiring adjustments to suspension and sway bars in an attempt to extract the best from them.

"I was struggling to come to grips with how they worked," Day said.

"It would have been good to have a second set of those to run in the shoot out - I used the best of those tyres while I was getting the car set up on them and once I had that sorted out I think the tyres were past it."

Despite those issues Day still managed to secure the win, but the course record evaded him.

He said from a driver's point of view it was a bit disappointing.

"As soon as I knew Kevin Mackrell wasn't coming and we put in a couple of good times, I knew we were in the clear to win the event," Day said.

"The next challenge was to reset the record ... we didn't quite get there which is a bit disheartening.

"But in saying that I think looking at the weekend as a whole, I know where the issue was and we will move forward into next year.

"In the end we won the event and got the six event titles - the record would have been

the cherry on top."

The format and course layout of the event dictates no practice runs in the leadup, which means using 12-month-old data each year.

To improve enough to break the current record will require a huge effort from Day, but one he certainly has not given up on.

He said micro-changes will now be required for next year's event, with the possibility of using his previous brand of tyre.

One other highlight for the team was the inclusion of Day's father Sean's newly-built Subaru 22B.

It certainly turned heads and finished inside the top 10.

Dan said as a team they were all pleased with the effort to run both cars and claim such good results.

"The goal was to have both cars in the top 10 and we achieved that," he said.

"Both cars ran faultlessly all weekend which is another big achievement.

"To have a two-car team and have them do every run without an issue, knowing we have prepared and built the cars through our workshop, it shows our team is doing the right thing too."

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Stark's on the pace early

SPEEDWAY has made a tentative start to the 2021-22 season, with various drivers from the Limestone Coast in action.

Last weekend saw the Stark's car out of Port MacDonnell make the long trip up to Whyalla to compete in Round 1 of the City of Whyalla Track Championship sprintcars event, with Daniel Pestka again behind the wheel.

While the team's opening round at Murray Bridge ended with a DNF, Saturday night saw a second place in the A Main feature race, behind the fast Ryan Jones and ahead of the equally quick Matt Egel.

Team manager James Stark said he has a long-term deal with Pestka which provides some stability for the team.

"Last year was about us finding our feet and building a bit of a partnership," he said.

"We have been friends for more than 10 years, so it works well.

"We finished last year with a podium and started this year with one almost straight up, so it looks good so far."

The car itself was certainly on the pace straight out of the blocks.

Pestka drove to third quickest in the time trials, before a second place behind Jones in the heat, a third place in the dash and the second place in the feature race.

The result came on the back of a stellar last season, where the team raced 24 nights for nine podiums, 18 top fives, a couple of DNFs and all A main feature races, not having to advance through the B Main on any night.

Stark said little has changed since then, with just the motor freshened up and the trailer refitted.

He said the team had hoped to run plenty of events this season, but it all depends on the Covid-19 situation, border closures and venue restrictions.

"We had planned to do the full SRA season then fill in with a bit of 360 stuff," Stark said.

"Now it is take each week as it comes.

"SA is OK, you can plan, but Victoria has all these government restrictions coming in for big events so it is all a bit up in the air.

"We hope to be at Warrnambool on December 18 if the borders open and subject to everything else."

For Pestka, Saturday night's result was welcome after the DNF at Murray Bridge on

the team's first night.

He said the partnership worked well last year, providing him with a quality car to drive each night.

"Saturday night wasn't too bad," Pestka said.

"I probably let them down a bit in the dash but I was pretty happy with the result.

"It is along way for them to go so to get a result takes the pressure off a bit."

Pestka said the track provided some challenges, with the sandy surface unusual in Sprintcar circles.

"The track was pretty good really," he said.

"It is a more sandy surface, goes to a hard

pack and is really slippery.

"In the A Main I got a good start and got into second after the first turn.

"I concentrated on doing consistent laps and make sure Ryan Jones didn't get away.

"I was almost there but not quite.

"We kept up with him and tried to chase him down but it is pretty one-laned that track."

Despite not catching Jones, the car is clearly on the pace, with the development over the last season paying dividends.

Pestka said the team was a long way ahead regarding preparation and development, with some improvement still to come.

He said it is the best position he has been in during his racing career.

"I had a good team of my own and we did pretty well but it is always hard to maintain your own and race," Pestka said.

"Now I have a good team and James is pretty smart at making the car go faster.

"That is what you need really, a good crew chief to be consistent.

"I feel I have that at the moment so I am pretty happy driving for them."

The team will now head back to Murray Bridge on November 13, then Whyalla the following week, before the Borderline Speedway opener on November 27.

The event includes classes ranging from novice, to advanced, to women and all in between.

Mount Gambier Disc Golf Club president Mat Weyers said the course was in pristine condition at this time of year and the club is keen to showcase its venue again to a wider audience across three days, although the event almost did not go ahead.

"This is our big event on the national tour," Weyers said.

With national tour points up for grabs, players will certainly not take this event lightly.

Schulz currently leads to women's FA4 division, ahead of Kolodina and Amy Weyers.

For the men, the MM1 division provides some interest for the Limestone Coast, with Nicholson in fourth place, two spots behind

Hartley. Local knowledge could play a role, but with the difficult water hazards, which take in the edges of the Valley Lake itself, there is little room for error.

Long shots are required to clear the danger and make good position, which should provide plenty of excitement as the players push to move up the national leaderboard.

With the six best round for the year going towards the national tour points, there is plenty of incentive to perform well.

The event will take place over three days, with 18 holes played each day.

Action kicks off on Friday at 1.30pm, then 9am Saturday and Sunday.
