Covid queries

HEALTH officials are yet to release details about what quarantine facilities will be available in the Limestone Coast to deal with a Covid-19 outbreak once borders open.

Officials have said they are continuing to look at options across the region with 10 days until South Australia opens its state borders.

SA Health said it continues to work with local health networks and a wide range of stakeholders in its planning for Covid, including quarantine facilities.

Currently, the Mount Gambier and District Hospital has two negative pressure rooms and 10 ventilators for Covid-positive patients with a vast majority of patients expected to be treated in their homes via virtual care.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network chair Grant King expressed the importance for regional areas to play a role in supporting metropolitan South Australia in response to potential Covid-19 outbreaks.

"We are currently continuing planning which will show that we have a good, safe service and are working as an overall state response," Mr King said.

"We recognise how regions will need to respond to Covid and will continue working with the department."

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell said it was pleasing SA Health and local health networks had plans in place, yet stated it was necessary for it to be released in detail.

"I am happy to comply with whatever needs to be done, however we need that communication so members of the community can get themselves prepared for a Covid outbreak and find out what impact it will have on businesses, staff and others," Mr Bell said.

"If SA Health thinks that regional quarantine is a necessary step, then I think it is too however the borders open in 10 days and this should be in a testing phase now and already announced." Mr Bell said the announcement of future plans came very late and provided anxiety among the business community.

"I am calling for SA Health to communicate with the community and businesses around what steps will need to be taken if a Covid-positive patient attends a business because we are the second largest city in South Australia and we will have an increased percentage of Covid here because we are so close to the borders," he said.

Vaccine push

VACCINATION rates in the Limestone Coast need to increase a further 10 per cent to reach the level indicated by the State Government to open the borders.

With 10 days to go before the borders open, the Limestone Coast's new mobile Covid-19 vaccination van is busy helping to bolster the region's vaccination rate.

In some areas of the Limestone Coast, second dose vaccination rates of those older than 16 need to increase by more than 10 per cent before the target of 80 per cent is reached which will allow some restrictions to be eased.

The Wattle Range Council area currently has the lowest double vaccination rate at 68 per cent.

Under the State Government's Covid-19 roadmap, the South Australian borders will be

opened on November 23 to all fully vaccinated people from all Australian states and territories.

Other restrictions eased on that date will include halving the quarantine period for vaccinated international arrivals from 14 days to seven and increasing the home gathering cap from 20 people to 30.

Current restrictions such as wearing masks in indoor public areas, density of activity requirements as well as the cap of 150 people for private functions, will stay in place until 90 per cent of the population aged 12 years and over is fully vaccinated when most restrictions are expected to be lifted.

The vaccination vans are one of the methods being used to increase the availability of vaccinations to the community to raise the vaccination rate.

Known as the vax van, the Limestone Coast's Covid-19 van was in Mount Burr last Friday where more than 20 people were administered with vaccinations.

This follows its visit to industries in the region including abattoirs JBS in Bordertown and Teys in Naracoorte, timber company One Forty One sites and Kimberly-Clark Australia's tissue paper mill near Millicent. The van has also been in Tarpeena and other outlying sites such as the Bellum Hotel near Mount Gambier.

This is helping to address a shortfall in the vaccination rate in the Limestone Coast, particularly in the Wattle Range Council area which, as at last Sunday, was at a 68.6 per cent two dose vaccination rate.

Beach access discussions

PORT MacDonnell based fisheries have pleaded with Grant District Council this week to reconsider its initial decision to delay an inquiry into developing a walkway to Green Point beach.

Located between Browns Bay and Piccaninnie Ponds, the privately-owned beach access point was recently shut by property owners, the Feast family.

The family state they closed the entrance-gate due to ongoing safety concerns and farming stock issues.

Grant District Council recently decided to revisit a number of recommendations aimed at resolving the issue, one of which included undertaking an initial road design assessment.

Following council's decision, local fisherman Rodney Virgo further discussed the issue at the Port MacDonnell town meeting held on Tuesday.

Mr Virgo said there remained community safety concerns surrounding the inaccessible point to the beach.

He said that he believed the public was entitled to answers regarding the closure and decision made at the previous meeting and requested council table a large number of questions at the next general meeting.

"I have previously relayed concerns to the council and I believe that the councillors have at the very least not encouraged the participation of the local community as I have not been taken up once on my offer to discuss further," Mr Virgo said.

"Council has not encouraged and developed this initiative to improve the social and mental quality of life of the community and has not represented the interests of its wider community.

"It also did not facilitate communication between the community and council and I myself and others that have contacted the council and given presentations to councillors have not received any communication or inquiry."

He stated that the private section of the road should be accessible for the broader public due to concerns surrounding emergency services access and other potentially dangerous situations.

During his discussion to the broader community, Mr Virgo also claimed the access gate to the public road leading to the private entrance to the beach had barbed wire along it.

However, Jo Feast has stated the barbed wire was not in any position where it could cause injury and was only in place to prevent bulls from rubbing along the gate.

"We are not trying to block access as we have been giving the public and fisherman unlimited access to our private property for decades," Ms Feast said.

"It is now a biosecurity hazard and there is no barb wire where you open the gate nor

where you push the gate to swing it open.

"The only gate which is not able to be opened by the public is the private exit gate onto the beach."

Ms Feast said the decision to close the private access gate was made mid-last year following a string of calls from stranded community members whose vehicles had become stuck in the loose sand.

"We constantly get calls for people to help with our tractors which then gets salt damage and if it does become a road it will be a nightmare for us as we will have cars everywhere out there and we have decided we will not help them if they become stuck," she said.

"Browns Bay and Piccaninnie Ponds is within a five kilometre access point and we can't understand why people would want to rip up and destroy coastal joins and poten-

tially ruin the environment.

"The laneway is between our paddocks and is our main access point and it would be an absolute nightmare having a number of cars traveling there."

Ms Feast said another reason why the access gate was shut was due to visitors doing the wrong thing, including driving onto the Feast family's private property and bringing hunting dogs onto farm land.

"We are now also urging all council members to come and have a look at how easily accessible the public road is and what we are trying to relay in regards to our private sector," she said.

Council officials said they would take on board the discussion held at the town meeting and would further discuss the questions presented.

On a first dose basis, all council areas in the region have exceeded 80 per cent with Kingston at 88.8 per cent, Mount Gambier at more than 95 per cent, Naracoorte/Lucindale at 91.6 per cent, Robe at 90.1 per cent and Wattle Range at 88.1 per cent. No figures were available for Grant.

On a second dose basis, the highest rate is in Mt Gambier with 79.1 per cent followed by Naracoorte/Lucindale with 77 per cent, Kingston on 76.8 per cent, Robe on 75.5 per

cent and Wattle Range on 68.6 per cent.

While the State as a whole is at 70 per cent two dose vaccination rate, the Limestone Coast Local Health Network (LCLHN) is optimistic that 80 per cent for the Limestone Coast region, before November 23 when the borders are intended to be open, is achievable.

In a statement this week, the LCLHN said: "We are pleased to see more than 70 per cent of South Australians aged 16 or over already fully vaccinated and we (in the Limestone Coast) are on track to reach the 80 per cent

mark in the coming weeks.

"We received a great response from the community on our mobile vaccination van and we plan to visit other industry sites for a second round with our vaccination van to ensure more people in the community can roll up their sleeves and get vaccinated.

"We encourage people to continue to roll up to get vaccinated and we have appointments available, with walk-in appointments offered at selected LCLHN run clinics including Mount Gambier, Millicent and Kingston.

"We are always looking for ways to make

the Covid-19 vaccine more accessible and will roll-out more mobile and pop-up clinics wherever possible."

At Mount Burr last Friday, vax van staff Sue Carrison and Fiona Unger said the vehicle was well set up, was being appreciated by the community, and was helping immensely to increase the number of vaccination appointments available.

They said this was demonstrated by an increase from 7,500 vaccinations being administered in September, before the van was on the road in the region, to 9,500 in October.

Mount Gambier City Council's events team, the Mount Gambier Christmas Parade Advisory Group, and many volunteers have been planning the Covid-safe drive-by static Christmas spectacle to be held on Haig Drive at the Valley Lake in place of the annual Christmas Parade which won't go ahead due to Covid-19 restrictions.

Unions lobby for Christmas Day public holiday

UNIONS will gather in Mount Gambier today to rally for the State Government to declare Christmas Day as a public holiday.

The Shop, Distributive and Allied Employees' Association (SDA) will be joined by a number of other unions including the hospitality and health sectors.

It comes following Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell stating he will move an amendment to declare Christmas Day a public holiday.

Mr Bell said he fundamentally believed if an employee worked on Christmas Day they deserved to be paid penalty rates for that day.

"However I understand the proposed legislation to be debated before parliament because the changes would mean employers will be paying 250 per cent penalty rates for the Friday through to the Tuesday," Mr Bell said.

"My amendment would ensure that when Christmas Day falls on a Saturday, already existing Christmas Eve penalty rates would move to Saturday.

"This ensures a fairer system for both em-

ployees and employers and brings the situation in line with other Australian States as they don't pay the Christmas Eve penalty rate."

SDA SA secretary Josh Peak said for essential workers and their families, earning public holiday penalty rates on Christmas Day was

not a stocking filler but a 'make or break'.

"Fortunately it is not too late for this to be made right," Mr Peak said.

"Right now, there is a piece of legislation in the state parliament that will fix this issue for once and for all.

"Troy Bell has always stood up for Mount Gambier and delivered for his community and constituents and he can rise above the petty and punitive politics being displayed by the Marshall Government."

Mr Bell said the active union campaign around the legislation had hidden the fact that state workers were also eligible for penalty rates on Christmas Eve.

"What the unions are not mentioning in their ads is that South Australia also has a public holiday on Christmas Eve, meaning a worker gets paid from 7pm – midnight, which is different to every other State except the Northern Territory" he said.

"So, if the legislation passes unamended, an employer will be paying penalty rates for 4.5 days.

"The other issue that is incredibly frustrating for businesses, is how late this piece of legislation has been introduced into Parliament."

Local agents missed

MOUNT Gambier travel agents have been left short following the announcement the Limestone Coast travel vouchers will be booked through metropolitan agencies.

The South Australian Tourism Commission (SATC) has stated the allocated agencies taking on booking the vouchers - Phil Hoffman and Holidays of Australia - were chosen due to a significant database within key markets with the vouchers available as of Monday.

In the year leading to June 2021, tourism in the Limestone Coast generated \$475m in visitor expenditure with SATC chief officer Rodney Harrex said the state's key domestic markets included New South Wales and Victoria, labelling it as a huge opportunity for the industry.

"For the Limestone Coast region, with its border on Victoria, it means reopening to their biggest interstate market and reopening to the self-drive market which we've seen soar in popularity this year," Mr Harrex said.

"Pre-Covid over 40 per cent of overnight visitors to the Limestone Coast were from interstate. "While South Australians have done a sensational job of embracing local holidays, interstate visitors spend on average three times more than intrastate, so the reopening will provide a real boost to the region's economy."

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell said any financial incentive to visit the region was welcomed by many and that the vouchers would be a great support to accommodation and tourism providers who experienced losses during restrictions.

"Summer is a great time to visit the Limestone Coast and I thank Premier Marshall for listening to my call for tourism incentives and giving our region a much-needed boost," Mr Bell said.

"However, these incentives are different to the Great State vouchers in that people will have to book through two major travel companies, both based in capital cities, who are probably getting government rebates.

"I'm concerned to see our local travel agents, who have been very badly affected by the pandemic, have been left out of the picture."

He said nobody knew the Limestone Coast better than those who live and work here and that by cutting out local travel agencies, local knowledge was lost.

"There's also not a self-booking option, which is the way many people like to travel

these days," Mr Bell said.

"I would hope the full financial benefit flows onto our operators and is not lost through booking agent fees.

"So whilst a great incentive, there are improvements to be made, through adding the option to book direct or through a Limestone Coast travel agent."

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride said despite the awkward mechanisms he was happy to see the initiative available.

"It may not be accessible in the way that we would have liked it but it is what it is and it is great the rollout is happening for the region," Mr McBride said.

"It was one of the first things I asked for alongside Troy and it is great to see we are on the government's radar and that the vouchers have eventuated."

"I am concerned about the lack of communication and information as well as the plans but I will trust that SA Health has adequate plans.

"We need the communication and assurance that everything is under control particularly for our businesses."

Shadow Minister for Health Chris Picton also expressed concern for the South East, stating planning had not been sufficient enough for the community.

"The South East community had been let down by the government who needed to make sure plans are in place," Mr Picton said.

"We are about to open the borders with the South East - the closest region to Victoria where most of the cases are with no available plan currently in place to manage cases."

Mr Picton echoed Mr Bell's comments, calling for better communication with regional communities leading up to the borders reopening.

"There has been no communication with the community about the plan or how outbreaks will be managed, what the requirements are for those in quarantines or those identified as close contact," he said.

"We are days away from opening the borders and people still don't know."

Minister for Health Stephen Wade said the government would continue to deliver a strong Covid-ready plan in time for the borders to open with restrictions planned to ease as the state reached key vaccination levels.

"South Australians can have every confidence that when our borders reopen, our health system is well placed to provide the community with access to world-class health care, as needed," Mr Wade said.

"As we move closer to reaching our vaccination targets, we are building a stronger, more agile health system to ensure residents have access to the care they need when we relax our borders and learn to live with Covid in the community.

"We are adding hundreds of beds, in both public and private hospitals, as well as out-of-hospital care services that provide hospital level care in a person's home environment."

Booster shots for frontline workers

COVID-19 booster shots are now available for South Australian frontline workers, aged care and disability residents, as the federal government rolls out its Covid-19 booster vaccination program - with the general public eligible for a booster shot from December 1.

Minister for health and wellbeing Stephen Wade said booster doses would be available from today for frontline workers who received their vaccinations as part of phase 1A when the rollout first began, including frontline hospital, GP and testing clinic staff, medi-hotel and quarantine pathway workers, aged and disability care staff and residents.

"Frontline workers and vulnerable aged

care and disability residents were the first to roll up their sleeves to protect themselves, their loved ones and the community and we are ensuring they have priority access to booster doses of the vaccine," Mr Wade said.

"Priority access to the booster doses will give this at-risk cohort increased protection before Covid-19 enters our state and helps our essential frontline workers to continue to perform their vital roles, while providing an extra layer of protection to those they come into contact with.

"Eligible workers and aged care and disability residents will be able to walk-in to any SA Health vaccination clinic to receive

their booster dose." Frontline staff will need to show their employee identification at the clinic or they can book an appointment online.

Federal Member for Barker Tony Pasin said booster doses will be administered for free from a variety of locations across Barker with in-reach clinics being used in relation to local residential aged care facilities.

The Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation has recommended the Comirnaty (Pfizer) vaccine be preferred for the booster dose - irrespective of what vaccine a person received for their primary course of vaccination.

Divine guidance sought

WATTLE Range Council will ask Penola's Catholic community about moving carved statues from Father Woods Park into the township.

Prompted by an approach by a local farmer concerned about aspects of the route for the rail trail, which is currently under construction, the decision to discuss the statue moving proposal with church authorities was made at council's monthly meeting on Tuesday.

Attending the meeting was Churinga Park farmer, Peter Hocking, supported by two other farmers, George Kidman and Tom Edwards.

Mr Hocking's wife, Elke, who could not be in attendance, provided a recorded visual presentation in which she outlined the Hocking's concerns in relation to the intended construction of a path from the rail trail which would use an unmade road reserve through their property. The path is included in the current plan for the rail trail project to allow users of the trail to access Father Woods Park where the statues are located.

During extended discussion, several councillors expressed concern about the planned route due not only to the Hocking's issues but also due to costs associated with providing amenities at Father Woods Park and potential safety issues with trail users crossing the Riddoch Highway from the west to access the park which is on the east side of the highway.

Two motions, both carried with a vast majority of the councillors in favour, essentially asked for the construction of the rail trail to continue only along the disused railway corridor to the next road crossing and to await the outcome of discussions with church authorities, and information requested from the Department of Transport in relation to safety at road crossings, before considering the remaining route of the trail.

Cr Debbie Agnew said she and Cr Dean Burrows had met with two local farmers at the site the previous day.

"No reflection on your driving Cr Burrows, but I don't mind telling you that I was nervous turning right into the carpark [Father Woods Park]," she said.

"Within about five minutes four b-doubles [trucks] and seven cars had passed along the Riddoch Highway.

"It's a dangerous spot."

Cr Peter Dunicliff said that when the park was first opened in 2010, there were complaints that people slowing down to look at or enter the park was almost causing accidents for traffic on the Riddoch Highway and he asked if the speed limit in the area could be reduced to 80kph.

Council's Chief Executive Officer, Ben Gower told the meeting that the rail trail was progressing at a rate of about 800 metres per day and that the Catholic church was spending about \$60,000 to upgrade the statues and move them further to the back of the park to allow room for the provision of a sealed carpark and installation of other facilities such as public toilets.

"We had this discussion when I first came here to bring the speed limit down to 100kmph and that wasn't supported at the time," he said.

Council's Chief Executive Officer, Ben Gowers told the meeting that the rail trail was progressing at a rate of about 800 metres per day and that the catholic church was spending about \$60,000 to upgrade the statues and move them further to the back of the park to allow room for the provision of a sealed carpark and installation of other facilities such as public toilets.

One of the successful motions came from Cr Dale Price after he was the first to suggest

the possible movement of the statues.

"It's just a case that the statues are in the wrong place," he said.

"It's not just the safety concerns of turning right into the park but even turning left.

"There are a range of places in Penola where the statues could go to condense the attractions in town.

"People would come down the street and maybe spend some dollars in Penola and support the community; they will not do that at Father Woods Park," he said.

Cr Graham Slarks said Father Woods had travelled far and wide to deliver his sermons.

"Someone else celebrated that by donating the land [for the park]," he said.

"This was Father Woods' spot so I don't

think we can move it; I think it is disrespectful."

In closing the debate, Cr Price said he believed the church would be equally concerned about the safety issues.

After the meeting he said moving the statues would solve a multitude of issues.

"The relocation of the statues would be good for Penola economically and it also alleviates a serious traffic issue at the current location and also allows for the current proposed bike track to be redirected to a safer location which will connect with the track being created by the Naracoorte/Lucindale Council," he said.

"There is also a benefit to the family affected by the current proposal down the unmade government road.

"In the long term there would also be savings to council as, under the proposed agreements [for Father Woods park], council would provide a bitumen carpark, toilets and the ongoing maintenance of the toilets, rubbish removal and grass slashing for a minimum of 20 years.

"It is my understanding that all the statues bar one will need to be replaced and so it seems appropriate timing to consider their location."

Also after the meeting, the trio of farmers who attended expressed their support for the proposal to move the statues.

Mr Kidman said: "I have lived my whole life there and the safety issues are real. It's an accident waiting to happen."

Father Woods Park is 21kms north of Penola on the Riddoch Highway and includes a series of statues sculptured from tree stumps depicting the life of Father Julian Tenison Woods and Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop.

The land for the park was provided by the Gartner family and is across the Riddoch Highway from a large gum tree known as Father Woods Tree which is said to mark an area where the parish priest conducted mass when he served in the area in the 1850's and 1860's.

The statues were sculptured by Kevin Gilders and were unveiled in 2010 by the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Adelaide, Philip Wilson.

AN allegedly dumped puppy has made a safe return to its original breeder after community support to help the animal.

Max, a 10-month-old American Bulldog, was first spotted near Hell's Hole sinkhole late October and soon took the Mount Gambier community by storm.

Multiple community members made an attempt to rescue the pup prior to one persistent member - who wishes to remain anonymous- succeeding.

The community member travelled to the location where Max was found multiple times per day across approximately two weeks to gain the pup's trust before securing him in their car.

Following a scan for a microchip, Mount Gambier registered breeder Darryl Pearce was contacted following his name remaining as the primary contact.

Mr Pearce said he had been breeding American Bulldogs for a number of years, and was in a sense of denial Max was one of his prior litter mates when he saw the numerous posts on social media.

"Someone put a photo of him up on social media stating they had seen the dog and as much as I thought he looked like one of mine, I refused to believe it," Mr Pearce said.

"I always thought I chose owners well and didn't want to believe someone would have abandoned him."

However, upon receiving the call and referring to previous microchipping and breeding papers, Mr Pearce soon concluded that Max had indeed come from one of his previous litters.

"As soon as I figured out he was legitimately one of mine, I followed it up," he said.

"All of my pups are microchipped before going to a home and when they came back he was mine, we soon found a perfect home for him."

He said despite the disappointment in Max's alleged dumping, he was happy the pup had been safely caught and was now in a loving environment.

"The person who rescued him from out in the pines was fantastic, she managed to gain his trust and after that there was no looking back," Mr Pearce said.

"He is such a beautiful animal, so loving and after a few weeks of loving care he will come good and trust people again which will be fantastic."

He said the community response to Max's rescue and rehoming had been overwhelming with offers of support from food right through to veterinarian bills.

"The community really came together to rescue this boy which is fantastic," Mr Pearce said.

"It was fantastic to see because at the end of the day, pets are just like family.

"He is now healthily regaining weight again and really it is the best possible outcome we could have asked for."

EDITOR'S COMMENT

WE were initially told by the Prime Minister that the Covid-19 vaccine roll-out was not a race.

With the planned border opening on November 23, it appears that we now have a race on our hands.

Premier Steven Marshall said that the milestone of an 80 per cent vaccination rate across the State would be the trigger to relax border restrictions.

The problem is that a State average does not necessarily mean that all regional areas are at that level.

While there has been a push to increase vaccination rates in the Limestone Coast, in some locations, like the Wattle Range Council area, vaccination rates are lagging.

As a result of data gathering confusion, the Federal Government is no longer providing vaccination rate data for the District Council of Grant.

Unfortunately, the State Government still has some work to do.

Once Covid-19 makes its way into our communities, people who contract the disease will be required to self-isolate.

If it is not possible for people to self-isolate in their own home, they will be required to isolate in a government appointed facility, such as a medi-hotel.

With less than two weeks to go, SA Health is yet to announce if such a facility will be available in the Limestone Coast.

It would be extremely disappointing if the State Government required people from the Limestone Coast with Covid-19 to transfer to Adelaide to self-isolate – an outcome like this would not be well received.

There is also uncertainty on whether the borders will open if individual local government areas do not reach the 80 per cent vaccination rate target.

Many questions need to be answered in the next week.

We can't be left lingering with a Covid-19 'road map' that is lacking detail.

A 'road map' should give us all confidence that plans are in place to address all parts of the State, not just Adelaide.

Health appreciation

FRONT-LINE health workers across Australia and indeed the world have stepped up during the pandemic and done an amazing job in exceptionally difficult circumstances.

While the Limestone Coast has been spared from much of what we've seen in Sydney and Melbourne's COVID outbreaks, our local health network has continued to punch above its weight during the pandemic delivering exceptionally high levels of patient care, deserving of public acknowledgment.

The orthopaedic services offered at the Mount Gambier Hospital highlight this care and give piece of mind that, like other services offered at the Mount Gambier Hospital, if we need orthopaedic services we are in exceptionally good hands.

In the first six months of the 2021 the Mount Gambier hospital welcomed more orthopaedic inpatient admissions with less complications than at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, one of Adelaide's major public hospitals with over 300 beds servicing a population of more than 250,000 in Adelaide's western suburbs.

More admissions, fewer complications and all done at a lower staffing level.

In fact, while the Queen Elizabeth Hospital's orthopaedic department operates with the benefit of three accredited trainees, three service registrars, two residents and three in-

terns the Mount Gambier Hospital manages with two local specialists and a single service registrar.

While regional health services sometimes struggle to service patients living outside metropolitan areas because State Government resources are concentrated to high population areas, we should be incredibly proud of the breadth and quality of care provided to the Limestone Coast community by the staff at the Mount Gambier Hospital.

Without question Australia has one of the best health care systems in the world and while this doesn't translate to perfection and we should and indeed will always strive for improvement, we are incredibly blessed to have access to such quality public health care here in the Limestone Coast.

These outcomes are attributable to the professionalism and dedication of staff at the Mount Gambier Hospital as well as that of those engaged in our broader health and allied health services.

The pandemic has brought into sharp focus the importance of these services, services which do great credit to those involved and for which we should all be incredibly grateful.

IVF financial support

Farm day activities

THE financial pressure of in vitro fertilization (IVF) procedures will lessen for Limestone Coast families following a Federal Government decision.

Families needing testing services that can help prevent them passing serious genetic disorders onto the child with pre-implantation genetic testing now available on the Medicare rebate system.

The \$95.5m incentive will allow those in need of the service to be reimbursed through Medicare.

The sophisticated scientific technique is used to test embryos for either a specific known single gene condition or chromosome variation.

This then allows chromosomally healthy embryos or those unaffected by a specific genetic disorder to be selected for implantation during an IVF cycle.

Mount Gambier resident Rebekah Scott spoke about the incentive following a recently successful IVF cycle due to polycystic ovary syndrome.

Ms Scott and her husband decided to pursue an IVF cycle approximately 18-months ago, resulting in a healthy baby boy named Teddy.

She said despite the success, she remained aware that there were women who continue to struggle with fertility issues despite IVF availability.

"Trying to fall pregnant and taking all these tests and waiting for appointments and all the unknowns is the hardest thing because you don't know if it has been successful and you know it is not guaranteed," Ms Scott said.

"There are a lot of stories out there as well about people being unsuccessful which just

adds to the anxiety and stress of the situation."

Despite the ongoing emotional and financial struggles associated with IVF treatment, Ms Scott said the pre-implantation procedure being added to the Medicare scheme was a positive step forward.

"IVF procedures are such an expensive thing including medications and appointments so any help to ease that financial burden on couples to help gain healthy and successful babies is a positive step forward," she said.

"It has got to be a step which will help a lot of people in the long run and make these tests more accessible for those needing them as well."

Ms Scott said herself and her husband paid

approximately \$10,000 for their IVF cycle and labelled herself as lucky to have been successful on the first round.

"I did get some rebates back but we then also had to continue paying for ongoing storage of other embryos we had from the procedure," she said.

"It is not a cheap way of having a baby, but when people are successful it is worth it.

"There are so many people that need either IVF or other reproductive assistance so any kind of help is welcome especially if it keeps the cost down and makes the procedures more successful."

A GROUP of mums have brought the New Zealand concept of 'Calf Club Day' to Kongorong in an effort to introduce farming to children and celebrate the town's sense of community.

Kongorong Primary School supported the event, dubbed 'Farm Day', by integrating lamb and calf rearing topics into the classroom during the week leading up to the event; while also making arts, crafts and posters about farming and agriculture to display on the day.

Students were also given the opportunity to rear a calf or lamb over the past few months, before bringing them to 'Farm Day' where they competed in presenting, leading, calling and handling their animal - with prizes awarded to the winners.

Hilary Ellis, who helped organise the event, hopes to see 'Farm Day' become an annual fixture.

"It was so simple and fun, everyone enjoyed it," she said.

"We had every old person from down the back paddock come along, we had the CFS there to encourage locals to join... we had one of the dads cooking a barbecue, a coffee machine, a jumping castle and one of the farmers brought down a heap of his own machinery just for atmosphere."

Mrs Copping put some of the show's success down to the it, and many other events in the community, being cancelled last year due to Covid-19.

Sheep yards found unsafe

SHEEP yard loading ramps and holding pens at the Millicent Saleyards were closed and locked last week when Wattle Range Council staff took action to eliminate significant safety risks.

While sheep sales have not been held at the yards since 2007, some farmers were still using the yards to consolidate smaller quantities of stock from various farms into a larger load for transport.

According to council, this has often been done without council's knowledge or oversight and without any fee for service being collected over the last 12 months.

At the council's monthly meeting this week, several councillors asked why the action had been taken.

Chief Executive Officer, Ben Gower told the meeting that he had been at the yards last week inspecting the saleyards in general after council was issued with five SafeWork notices in July on a range of safety issues which required work to be undertaken on the facility by December this year.

"While I was there I actually witnessed a truck loading up through the one and only sheep ramp there and he had it extended to its extreme and there was a real fall risk as the railing is below waist height," Mr Gower said.

"It is an extreme risk so we had no choice but to cease using the ramp straight away."

In a statement issued last week, the council said the yards were closed down and locked on Tuesday, November 2.

"Built in the 1970s at a cost of more than \$7million, many elements of the ageing infrastructure are now at end of life and need to be replaced or upgraded to accommodate modern safety standards," the statement read.

"Council has acted without delay to address these notices, which has included a comprehensive risk assessment of the site to identify all potential safety hazards.

"Site users and stakeholders were invited to inspect the saleyards site and contribute to the hazard identification process.

"As a result of this process, two extreme risks were identified with the sheep yards infrastructure and Council has acted immediately to eliminate these risks by closing and locking out the sheep yards and loading ramp."

The statement said the ramp and yard infrastructure does not meet current safety standards, posing an extreme fall from

height risk to site users.

It also said there were significant compliance issues with wastewater that runs off the sheep yard, posing an extreme stormwater contamination risk.

"Council is investigating all future options for the site, including if it's possible to provide this transit service for sheep into the future. However, in the short term, due to the risks, current site users will need to make alternative arrangements," the statement said.

All aboard for skating

ON Sunday, November 21 local skaters, BMXers and scooter-riders will have the opportunity to compete for a regional place as part of the Australian Skate Park League series held at Millicent skate park.

Held in partnership with YMCA Action Sports, Skate Australia, Aus Cycling and Wattle Range Council, locals and out of towners are expected to take part in the event.

The scooter, BMX and skateboard competitions are a part of a structured and interconnected Australian Skate Park League series held across the country.

YMCA Action Sports Specialist Lily Smith said the competition at Millicent was a chance for young locals to showcase their talent.

"There are some amazing up and coming skaters, scooter-riders and BMXers," Ms Smith said.

"These competitions give them the spotlight they deserve."

She also said that this program, as well as skateboarding being added to the Tokyo Olympic Games, was changing the face of traditional skateboarding.

"The series presents a great opportunity for young skateboarders to harness their skill and progress through a structured national pathway," she said.

There are more than 100 Skate Park League events a year, making up the Australian Skate Park League, which is the biggest and most established grass roots skateboard, scoot and BMX series in Australia.

The SA competitions makes up one part of YMCA's national pathway program which are held in skate parks across six states and territories.

As well as showcasing talent the league also creates opportunities for young people to gain experiential practical training in skate park event management.

The Millicent round has been brought to life through a partnership between Wattle Range Council, YMCA SA, Aus Cycling and Skate Australia.

Mr Mohan-Ram will be joined by MFS Firefighters Joel VanEeten and Ian Borchard at the Mount Gambier High School theatre next Wednesday November 17 at 6:00pm.

The Road Awareness Program uses video footage and photographs of real crashes, as well as recreations, to give participants a confronting yet realistic insight into road trauma.

Mr Mohan-Ram was left in a coma for 46 days, with a 10 per cent chance of survival after he was T-boned riding a motorbike.

His injuries were so extensive that they prevent him from working full time.

He now spends his time volunteering and is determined to help ensure people learn from his mistakes by focussing on educating young drivers through the Road Awareness Program.

His presentation highlights how taking a single risk on the road can have major ongoing consequences.

"For every fatality, there are many people like me who survive with serious injuries," he said.

"My crash left me in a coma with broken bones throughout my whole body, a bruised heart and reduced lung capacity."

Time to open town history

TWENTY five years after he designed it, Richard Nobbs will soon be helping to reveal the contents of a time capsule and then refilling it with a new trove of history as part of Millicent's 150th celebrations.

Now retired, Mr Nobbs was an engineer at the since dismantled Kimberly-Clark Australia (KCA) Tantanoola pulp mill when a time capsule was constructed for Millicent's 125th celebrations.

Built from high standard stainless steel left over from the construction of the pulp mill, the time capsule was designed by Mr Nobbs with other work undertaken by Prince Engineering boiler maker Peter Mackie and KCA boiler maker Craig Robinson.

Mr Nobbs said an inert gas, argon, was used to fill the capsule to ensure all oxygen was removed.

"Oxygen, weevils and moisture are the biggest threats to documents," he said.

"So we pushed the oxygen out by filling the capsule with argon which in turn ensured no weevils would survive, and we put a basket of desiccant in the bottom to absorb any moisture that might come from the documents.

"It was a bit of challenge as I'd never designed a time capsule before but it was great to achieve this; something different."

The time capsule will be opened at a special ceremony on Saturday, November 20 at 3.30pm at Millicent's rotunda. Both Mr Nobbs and Mr Robinson will return for the event to help with the opening of the capsule they created. It is also hoped some of the people who put items into the capsule 25 years ago will be

in attendance to retrieve and read out what they submitted.

There is believed to be about 80 items in the capsule ranging from articles from the then South Eastern Times, which has since been incorporated into The Border Watch newspaper, to stories from primary school children who

would now be adults.

Wattle Range Council's Manager Libraries and Cultural Services, Janice Nitschke said the time capsule spent many years in the foyer at the Millicent library but in recent times has been in storage and is being readied for its change-over.

Having worked at Millicent's library for 50 years Ms Nitschke oversaw the 125th time capsule filling process and is doing the same for Millicent's 150th.

"We have been collecting stories from a wide range of sources to put into the capsule after it is opened," she said encouraging people to come forward with further stories and memorabilia to put in.

"Children from the primary schools have been doing stories on what Millicent means to them and they will be put in the capsule, along with history pieces, and transcribed interviews conducted with some of the residents of Boneham Aged Care.

"We will be digitising the stories and allowing people to view them through a QR (Quick Response) code and it is expected that the capsule will be reopened for Millicent 175th celebrations in 2045.

"It is anticipated that we will publish a book in the New Year."

Museum turns 50

AT the same time Millicent celebrates its 150th birthday, the town's award winning National Trust museum will mark its 50th birthday with an open day on Sunday, November 21.

Called Heritage Day, the event will include vintage children's games, ponies and sulkies, vintage engines in operation, pinstripping demonstrations with wagon restorer Peter Foster OAM, and a display by the Country Fire Service, while volunteers in costume will show guests around the museum's exhibitions.

Entry to the museum for Heritage Day will be free from 10am to 3pm.

Millicent National Trust chairman, Barry Long encouraged people to take the opportunity to see the museum's attractions, learn about the history of Millicent and district, and enjoy the extra activities of heritage day.

Often described as one of the best coun-

try museums in South Australia, the museum was opened in 1970 under the chairmanship of the town's doctor, David Harris who had founded the Millicent branch of the National Trust 10 years earlier and went on to serve 36 years as its chairman only retiring shortly before his death in 1996.

The museum was first set up in the old Millicent primary school building and the museum grew and evolved from there.

Built in 1873, that original building now houses the museum's excellent display of shipwreck information and artefacts including an anchor from the infamous Geltwood which was wrecked off the coast from Rivoli Bay in 1876.

Buildings around it house a wide array of displays including the largest collection of fully restored horse drawn vehicles in South Australia, an extensive collection of costumes donated to the museum by Helen Hughes, a fully equipped blacksmith shop

and saddle room, natural history displays, aboriginal artefacts, an interactive display of the South East drainage scheme, farm machinery in working order and not to mention a T-class steam locomotive which is on static display in pride of place.

To mark the museum's 50th anniversary, a booklet on the museum's history has been compiled.

The birthday celebrations have been delayed by one year due to covid-19 restrictions in 2020.

Congratulations Millicent on celebrating 150 years.

Gold medal varieties

OCTOBER 25 was an important day for the rose industry, as the National Rose Trial Garden of Australia (NRTGA) has announced the awards for the best roses in our country.

I've been to the awards night in Adelaide and I'm proud to say that some of the new rose varieties we are growing are the 2021 winners.

The NRTGA was established in 1996 to help the Australian rose growers introducing the best rose varieties for our climatic conditions.

Ninety five per cent of new roses introduced into Australia were, and still are, coming from overseas breeders, mainly from Europe, and sometimes were not performing too well in the southern hemisphere.

The Trial Garden is based at the Botanic Garden of Adelaide and it has gained a very good reputation in the international rose industry.

Every year in winter time, rose growers and agencies for international rose breeders submit their new varieties to be assessed for the following 2 years, and every October awards are announced in an official event that sees all the main rose growers coming together (in an ideal world without Covid restrictions, of course, as last year the award night was online, and this year had only SA rose growers participating).

In the last few years, the Trial Garden has been offering the opportunity to test Australian bred roses as well, which is a very important achievement for rose growers like us, who

want to promote locally bred varieties.

Bruce Brundrett is a well-known Victorian hybridiser and he's one of the best Australian rose breeders; he won many awards in the last few editions of NRTGA and this year he got a top

Gold Medal for a beautiful variety that we have just introduced is called Jessica's Rose.

Jessica's Rose is an elegant, soft pink rose, which won over many other international roses and was also awarded as the Australian Bred Rose of the Year, and the

Best Hybrid Tea of the Trial

Bruce Brundrett is not new to such an important award, and in 2018 was the first Australian rose breeder to win a Gold Medal at the NRTGA, with a bright yellow floribunda that was chosen to celebrate the wives of the Governor Generals - Lady of Australia - winner of other important awards like the Trophy for Best Rose of the Trial, Best Floribunda rose, Most Pest and Disease Tolerant Rose of the Trial, and the Australian Bred Rose of the Year.

Lady of Australia will be officially launched on November 11 at the Government House in Canberra, and it'll be released in 2022.

The Gold Medal is given to rose varieties that pass several tests in the two years trial and collect more than 75 percentage points for pest and disease resistance, vigour, growing habit, beauty of blooms, fragrance and hardiness.

Know your harvest code

AS the fire danger season kicks off and harvest activities ramp up across the Limestone Coast, Grain Producers SA (GPSA) is calling on growers to familiarise themselves with the South Australian Grain Harvesting Code of Practice.

The Code of Practice outlines the conditions under which grain harvesting and handling should occur in the paddock, including operating grain harvesters, vehicles involved in grain transport, and grain dryers and augers.

GPSA chair Adrian McCabe said it was integral that growers abide by the voluntary code during harvest in order to maintain community trust and freedom to operate without the burden of legislation.

"Through our Know Your Code campaign, GPSA has distilled the code down into five simple steps growers can take to ensure they are compliant with the code and practising safe harvest activities," he said.

"It's important that we as growers all do the right thing and maintain the highest standards of fire safety or risk becoming regulated, just as those in other states are."

The Know Your Code campaign encourages growers to take the following steps to help reduce the risk of harvester fires: preparation, maintenance, monitoring, safe operations and communication.

"Preparation includes establishing fire breaks across the property or in paddocks and ensuring all staff are appropriately trained in the event of a fire," Mr McCabe said.

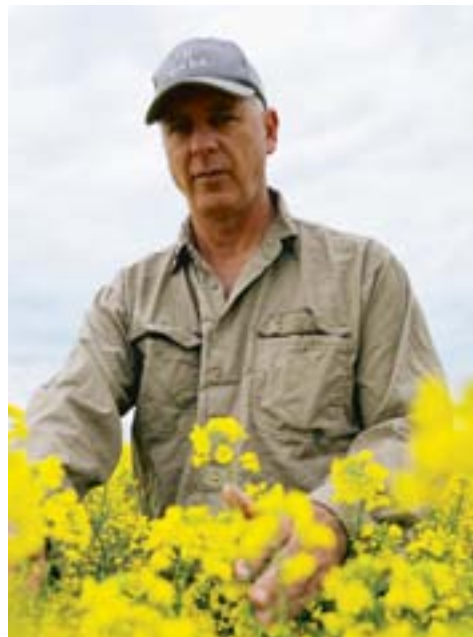
"A regular machinery maintenance program is essential before and during harvest, with particular attention on wearing parts and bearings.

"We also ask growers to monitor conditions against the Grassland Fire Danger Index (GFDI) using a fixed or portable weather station and cease harvest activities if the GFDI reaches or exceeds 35.

"Safe operations include having someone present when using a stationary engine to auger grain or having a four-metre area cleared around the engine.

"It is legislated that growers must carry a shovel or rake and a portable water spray and they should have a fire-fighting unit with at least 250 litres of water in the paddock being harvested.

"Open communication with neighbours

and others in your area is vital; we encourage growers to make the decision to pull up and cease harvesting as a community."

Mr McCabe also acknowledged the Country Fire Service's farm fire-fighting unit (FFU) registration trial for the fire danger season, which would see FFU operators having to log on and off the fireground.

"The value of FFUs has been recognised in inquiries following the Cudlee Creek, Yorketown and Kangaroo Island fires," he said.

"In fact, these inquiries identified the need to better coordinate FFUs with emergency services to ensure a common approach as well as the safety and welfare of everyone on the fireground.

"GPSA acknowledges there are some concerns among growers with this scheme, however, we believe there is considerable merit in the trial.

"GPSA wants to hear from growers involved in the trial so we can work with government to make changes in the future, if required."

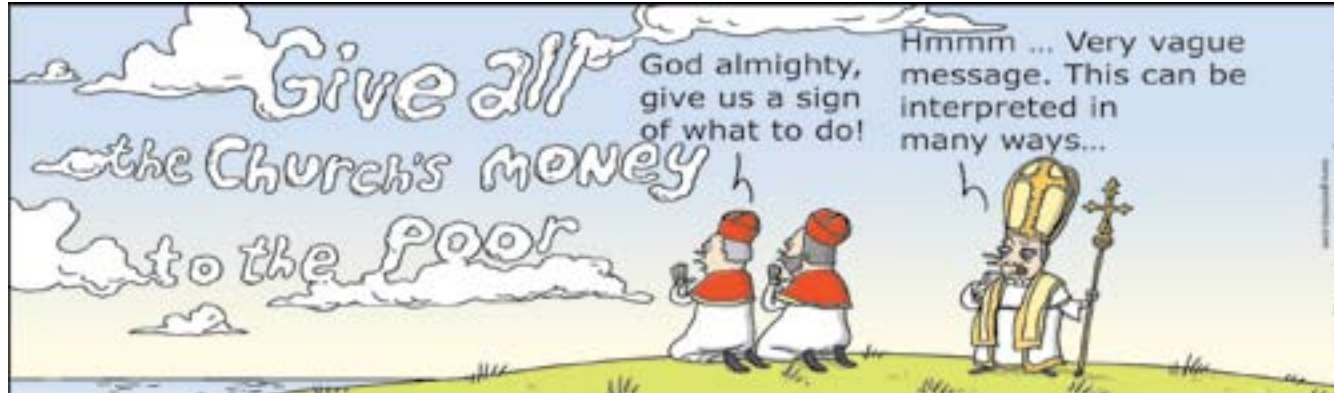

Julie walks the line

Could You Survive on the Breadline? places several prominent Australians into new situations to show what life is really like for those who are disadvantaged or living in poverty. Julie Goodwin tells **Danielle McGrane** why she did it and how surprising the results were.

Julie Goodwin is happy to test herself. She proved that in 2009 when she went into the *MasterChef* kitchen and won.

This time she's testing herself for a worthy cause as part of the TV show *Could You Survive on the Breadline?*

Goodwin experienced what it was like to be on the JobSeeker allowance and to survive on just \$40 a day, and what she found was there wasn't much room for anything outside of the ordinary.

"One of my tyres kept going flat and I just thought, 'How are you meant to deal with those little things that life does throw up?' You cannot save," she said.

Her limited income also took away any chance for social spontaneity.

"In your everyday life you say to someone, 'Let's go grab a coffee' or 'I'll meet you down the waterfront and we'll get some fish and chips', but that stuff can't happen," she said.

"Your life turns inward.

And obviously living in those circumstances you can't have your mates around or have a dinner party. So it's not just the dollars and the cents that you've got to count, it's the cost to you as a human being to really have to consider every dollar when you're thinking about how you connect with other people. And the loss of those connections has massive mental health repercussions."

Goodwin also spent time in a carer's household with someone who spends 24/7 looking after their husband.

"The level of care that he requires is so constant," she said. "It's so full-on that it's something that you can't even afford to look at from a financial viewpoint because your pay rate is too depressing to focus on. It's just got to be something you do out of love," she said.

It was a highly emotional experience for the TV personality.

"I felt it deeply because the truth is that it could be me, or it could be you," she said.

"That is just a bunch of circumstances that could be so far out of your control. People go on about the choices you make but there is so much that happens that's out of our control and being struck down with a debilitating illness is one of those things.

"I looked at this beautiful couple, who adored each other, who'd lived a community life, a man who was loved and adored by his family and his community and I saw myself and my husband."

Food for thought: TV chef Julie Goodwin experiences life on the JobSeeker payment for new SBS series *Could You Survive on the Breadline?*

It felt personal to Goodwin, as did her next experience where she met a local cafe owner who had to close her business because of the pandemic.

"Her little space has so many parallels with my hospitality business, right down to the signs on the wall and the semi-industrial, funky vibe of it," she said.

"She could be me and I could be her."

All of these experiences hit home in ways that Goodwin could never have imagined.

"It's not just reading about it in the paper, it's not just watching it on the screen, it's walking into the place where this happened and feeling the struggle and the pain from the human beings that are experiencing it," she said.

"It hits you at a bone-deep level."

That's the aim of this new TV show, it's a social experiment placing Goodwin and other prominent Australians - NSW Greens MP Jenny Leong and

journalist Caleb Bond - smack-bang into the world of poverty and disadvantage in Australia.

And it tests them to see how they would survive in these trying situations.

Goodwin was surprised that even with her own involvement in her local homeless shelter, and her previous charity work and advocacy work, she still had so much to learn about what it was like to live in poverty.

"When you think about people in poverty you have an image in your mind of what that looks like and what that feels like," Goodwin said.

"But I guess the thing that came to me is that there are so many different shapes and sizes of it. It's not just homeless people who are poor, it's not just unemployed people who are poor. And it's quite invisible. It could be happening in the house next door to you and you wouldn't even know it.

"It was all quite overwhelming and it opens your eyes up."

It wasn't a fun and easy TV experience, but Goodwin had other reasons for deciding to take part.

"I've long believed in the power of storytelling to make change," she said.

"I've grown up being involved in charity and being involved in social justice since I was a teenager. So to me, the fact that I was on a cooking show 12 years ago that has ultimately led to an opportunity to be a voice in that arena, it just felt right."

She hopes that by watching her experience, others will start to understand what it's really like to be placed in these tough situations outside of your control.

"I really hope that this program can open more people's eyes to the falsehoods that are fed to us about poverty and about what it means to be in poverty, about what gets you into poverty and about how hard it is to get out of poverty," she said.

"It's not a lack of will, and it's not a lack of hard work ethic, it's not any of those things and that actually this country has the resources to help people but the top end of town is busy wasting it."

But TV, as Goodwin knows, has the power to effect change and she hopes this show can at least start some important conversations.

"I think the power of television is not just in what it evokes as people are watching it, it's in the conversations that come afterward and the determination people get to do something to change it, even if that something is to think a bit harder about who you're voting for and think about other people when you cast your vote," she said.

"Or throw your hat into the ring yourself to be a voice in an arena that can make a difference."

Seven/Prime7, Saturday, 7pm, PG (2010)

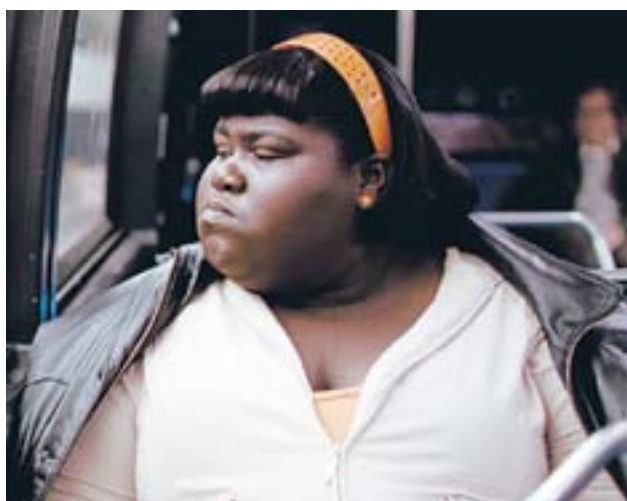

Based on Jo Bloom's hit novel, you can expect an edge-of-your-seat thriller that ticks all the boxes, featuring romance, a period setting and espionage. To top it off, the story is loosely based on real events. It's the kind of show that you could easily find yourself bingeing on all four episodes in one sitting – you've been warned. Starring Rory Kinnear (*Black Mirror*), Tamzin Outhwaite (*New Tricks*) and captivating newcomer Agnes O'Casey, *Ridley Road* is soapishly compelling from the get-go. In 1960s London, a young, soon-to-wed Jewish hairdresser risks her life when she joins an underground movement trying to stop the rise of the far right.



BLITZ SPIRIT WITH LUCY WORSLEY
SBS, Friday, 8.30pm

The saying "keep calm and carry on" – seen on tea towels and posters in kitchens and living rooms worldwide – is simply a motivational phrase for some. Indeed, it may be a shock to learn the saying's origins in this gripping documentary presented by historian Lucy Worsley (pictured). Used in British propaganda material during Hitler's relentless bombing campaign in the UK, known as the Blitz, the words take on a much darker meaning. Worsley explores the lives of six real people who lived, worked and volunteered during the Blitz, using archive material to reveal the myth behind the Blitz spirit.



NOUGHTS AND CROSSES
ABC TV, Sunday, 9.35pm

Sometimes, it's hard to know whether to cringe or be thrilled by another series based on a great book. *Normal People* recently proved how expertly the tricky adaptation process can be done, but the jury's out on this reworking of Malorie Blackman's acclaimed book in which racism is inverted. The premise of an alternate world where Europe has been colonised by black people is arresting but this six-episode series never seems to shift gear out of the young adult genre. In the second instalment, the *Romeo and Juliet*-esque Callum and Sephy (Jack Rowan and Masali Baduza, both pictured) are desperate to be alone together.



THE BACK SIDE OF TELEVISION
SBS Viceland, Monday, 9.20pm

Here's a great new three-part series that dusts the cobwebs off the weird and downright misjudged moments in Australian TV history. It's not a celebration of the most terrible soundbites, but rather an insightful and humorous exploration of what happened, and why. Hosted by comedian Mitch McTaggart (pictured), it's a shrewd look at the worst on the box throughout the past 70 years. In this premiere episode, many things are explored including how true crime has gotten worse, how psychics are never much help, and which network is preoccupied with missing British tourist Peter Falconio. It's fascinating stuff.

PASSING

Nothing is black and white in this striking adaptation of Nella Larsen's 1929 novel from first-time director Rebecca Hall.

A standout of this year's Sundance Film Festival, *Passing* tells the story of Irene and Clare (*Thor: Ragnarok*'s Tessa Thompson and Academy Award nominee Ruth Negga), two mixed-race women who can both "pass" as white, but choose to live on opposite sides of the colour line in Harlem, 1929.

Irene lives a comfortable upper middle-class existence, identifying as African American, married to Brian (André Holland), a Black doctor, with two young sons. A chance encounter one summer afternoon reunites Irene with Clare, a childhood friend who, with a platinum blonde bob and a sweet Southern drawl, is unrecognisable to her at first.

Before an ultra-stylish monochrome backdrop, the two women resume an uneasy friendship as Irene introduces Clare, who obviously longs to recover a sense of Black kinship, to her family and social circle.

Irene is astounded by Clare's ability to deceive those around her, including her very rich, blatantly racist and utterly detestable husband John (Alexander Skarsgård).

Filmed in a claustrophobic 4:3 ratio rather than the standard 16:9 widescreen format used today, *Passing* is a compelling work that explores the repression women face from society and each other, the lies people tell themselves and what they will do to protect their carefully constructed realities.

Adolescent Wonderland to visit Riddoch

NAOMI Hobson's series Adolescent Wonderland will come to the Riddoch Arts and Culture Centre later this year as the exhibition presents evocative photographic portraits of young Aboriginal people from her community of Coen on Cape York Peninsula.

Ms Hobson is a Southern Kaantju and Umpila woman who lives in Coen, a small town of 360 people in the centre of Cape York Peninsula in far north Queensland.

A multidisciplinary artist, she regularly works across the mediums of painting, ceramics and photography.

Inspired by her immediate environment, Ms Hobson's works express her ongoing connection to Country and her ancestors' ties and relationships with their traditional lands.

Through her work- first seen by Adelaide audiences in Tarnanthi 2020- the avid artist references her family's political and social engagements as well as her own personal engagement with her country and community.

In her Adolescent Wonderland series, Ms Hobson is working to empower young people, to encourage them to be themselves and to celebrate their uniqueness. Her photographic series allows the viewer to become part of the community and provides an insight into the vulnerability, playfulness and everyday moments of a generation transitioning from teenagers into adults.

The title Adolescent Wonderland is inspired by the classic children's novel Alice's Adventures in Wonderland by Lewis Carroll.

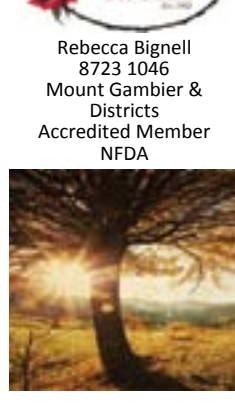

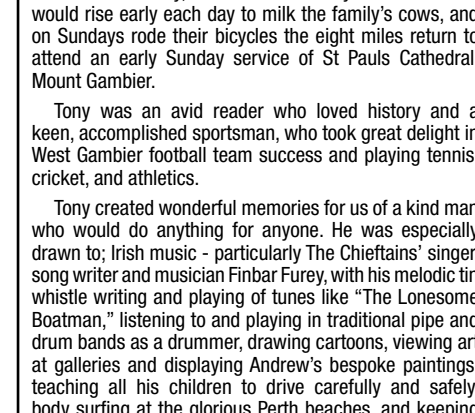

Back in the winning groove

IT did not take long for the talented local galloper Royal Mile to find winning form this campaign.

Last season, in his first year of racing, Royal Mile made a huge impression on South Australian racing by winning five of his nine starts, three of those at metropolitan level.

At his second start this preparation, Royal Mile regained winning form with a comprehensive victory in the BM 82 handicap over 1550 metres at Morphettville last Saturday.

The betting suggested the four-year-old gelding would improve significantly on his first-up fifth at the same venue three weeks previous when Royal Mile raced wide for much of the trip.

Local apprentice Jacob Opperman, in racking up his fifth city win this season, did his part last Saturday by having the Lee Creek trained galloper in second spot at the girth of Noir De Rue until the top of the straight.

Royal Mile (\$2.40-\$2-\$2.20 fav.) then stamped his authority to go on and win by nearly a length and take his career earnings to \$232,880 with Opperman in the saddle at all 11 starts.

Royal Mile started his racing career 13 months ago when second in a Penola maiden and all of his six wins have come this year.

BOTTLENECK AT THE TOP

We have entered the second quarter of the racing season with a plethora of trainers and jockeys in contention for premiership honours here in the Limestone Coast.

Following the meeting at Penola last Sunday the jockey's title is wide open, with four principal players at the moment.

Strathalbyn based Justin Potter has been coming to the Limestone Coast for many years and has never won a local title.

It would perhaps be fitting if the likeable hoop could win it as he enters the twilight of his riding career.

Potter notched a winning double at Penola and has the narrowest of leads (6 wins, 4 seconds and 7 thirds) over Adelaide jockey Dominic Tourneur (6, 2, 2).

Hot on their heels are last year's winner Jacob Opperman (5, 5, 2) and the Adelaide based Kayla Crowther (5, 5, 2).

It is even tighter for trainer's honours with five trainers on four wins each.

The Bob and Kane Post combination (4, 6, 8) have taken the lead after the win by Melissa Kate at Penola on Sunday, ahead of Sue and Jason Jaensch (4, 4, 4), Michael O'Leary (4, 3, 3), Darryl Dodson (4, 2, 4) and Lee Creek (4, 1, 0).

CENTURY OF WINNERS FOR TEENAGER

Nobody In their wildest dreams would ever have envisaged local apprentice Jacob Opperman chalking up 100 winners in his first 19 months of riding.

However, that is the amazing scenario for the Mingbool teenager, with the magical ton coming up in the final race at Penola last Sunday.

Opperman started his race riding career in April last year and went into last weekend with 97 winners, before riding one winner in Adelaide on Saturday and then a double at Penola.

His first winner at Penola was for his father/trainer Jamie Opperman with Mulga Lil leading nearly all the way to take out the 1700-metre BM 62 handicap.

Opperman's milestone came aboard the Lee Creek trained Wild Willy who is emerging as a real talent, with a hat-trick of wins already this season in the Limestone Coast.

Once again, Wild Willy defied a betting drift (\$2.40-\$3.50) but was always the one to beat from the 600-metre mark.

Justin Potter also finished the day with a double and both his rides were candidates for ride of the day.

Co-trainers Bob and Kane Post continue to rack up winners on the local circuit and were in the winner's stall after Melissa Kate broke her maiden status at her fourth run this campaign.

Week about, another win

TALK about hogging the limelight.

After combining to win the four-ball competition the previous week, newcomer Stephen Wyte and club captain Peter Waters showed it was no fluke by backing up to take out this week's Thursday and Saturday individual competitions respectively at the Mount Gambier Golf Club.

Playing off a 34 handicap, Wyte posted 43 stableford points to beat Sam Mainwaring by two on Thursday, with David Cameron another point back in third place.

Then Waters came out in Saturday's monthly medal and finished with a net 68, earning a spot in February's Medal of Medals competition after beating David Anderson, Bryan Pink and Matthew Bowering on a count-back.

Playing off a 12 handicap, he was steady on the front nine, finishing with pars on the first and eighth holes, with bogeys on the other seven to make the turn with a 43 off the stick.

"The score didn't reflect it, but I was actually swinging pretty well on the front nine ... my radar was just a bit off," Waters said.

That was not an issue on the back nine, however.

He started with pars on the 10th and 11th holes, but had a tricky third shot over the corner of the bunker on the par 4 12th.

Hoping to escape with a four, he did even better than that, his pitch shot rolling straight into the cup for a birdie three.

He followed that with a regulation par four on the 12th, admitting it was the first time he had achieved that for longer than he could remember.

"You just need that bit of luck at the right

time," was his humble assessment of that superb start to the back nine.

He knew he was on track for a good score, but certainly was not confident of winning because Pink was playing in his group and was also having a good round.

When the 10-handicapper birdied the 18th hole, Waters admitted he thought he might have been pipped at the post.

A quick check of the cards, however, showed a pair of net 68s, with Waters taking the honours courtesy of his one-over-par 37 off the stick on the back nine.

As well as winning the monthly medal, Waters also took out first place in A Grade, edging out Anderson on a count-back, with Pink relegated back to third place.

Bowering, who also finished with a net 68, won B Grade by a single stroke from Damian Smith.

In C Grade it was Kev Lennon - who finished second in the four-ball the previous week - taking the honours from Jack Peacock after shooting a net 69.

Meanwhile on Thursday it was Wyte who came in with 43 points to follow up his victory with Waters the previous Saturday.

He also started modestly, finishing with 19 points on the front nine after wiping the third hole.

But he made up for that on the inward nine, securing five three-pointers and a four-point par on the 13th.

His only single-point hole for the back nine came on the par 4 18th after a double bogey but even that did not derail his victory bid.

Mainwaring split his round 19/22 to take second place and would have been pleased with his 39 off the stick on the back nine.

Special mention must go to Richard Gosling who finished in fifth spot with 39 points off his three handicap after shooting an even-par round of 72.

He made 16 pars for the day, making up for a bogey five on the fifth hole with a birdie on the par-five 15th.

YOUNG Western Australian Blake Houston has taken all before him and claimed the City of Mount Gambier Eruption Pro Open disc golf tournament on the weekend.

The 15-year-old claimed the win by a healthy six shots.

His final score of -7 for the three rounds of 18 holes included rounds of 63, 63 and 62 over the par 65 layout.

The event - part of the National Disc Golf tour - was run by the Mount Gambier Disc Golf Club and tournament director Ryan Nicholson said it was pleasing to see such a young star rise up to the challenge of the pro course at the Valley Lakes venue.

"Blake had been in second place on the Australian National Disc Golf tour up until this tournament," he said.

"The trip across from WA has earned some extra points on the ADG tour, which is great for him."

Not only that, Houston also claimed the win in the Sacrifice to the Gods one-off shot.

Players were chosen by a random draw, a raffle, a nearest to the basket competition and the leading man and woman.

With just the five players competing and \$500 on offer for the closest disc to the basket, it was all up for grabs.

The players are 175 metres above the basket, and 300 metres away from it.

"Blake landed a disc 49 metres from the basket," Nicholson said.

"It is not a record, but pretty close.

"There is nothing else like that in the disc golf world - it is really unique.

"We hope it will grown in stature in the future and we hope to get some real money behind it for a hole-in-one."

Connor Donnelly claimed the Advanced category by eight shots over Jonathan Dragt after a strong final round of 63.

Nicholson competed in the Amateur Masters 40+ division and finished runner-up to Daniel Hartley, just three shots in arrears.

"I entered the event with a significant shoulder complaint," he said.

"I didn't know how I was going to go until I started throwing some discs.

"It was hard to get the shoulder feeling loose and going at the start of each round but once I was warmed up I got some decent rounds in.

"I had a strong round three (73) to sneak into a tie for second place with Jason Browne."

Other Limestone Coast players to perform well included Rob Marcanto in the Amateur masters 50+ category with a convincing victory.

Adopted local Alex Costales claimed the In-

termediate category by just four shots.

The Mount Gambier disc Golf member lives in Adelaide but his partner lives in Millicent and he travels to the region regularly.

The Novice category included many Adelaide players, with the Limestone Coast's Curtis King finishing in fourth place.

The Novice Women's division saw Mount Gambier's amy Weyers and Michelle Schulz fight it out with Anna Kolodina.

In the end, after trailing by one shot heading into the final round, Weyers shot an impressive 88 to claim the win by just two shots.

"Those girls had a real tight tussle through the whole event," Nicholson said.

"I don't think they were more than two shots away from each other for the whole tournament.

"Michelle was instrumental in running the tournament and had a lot of distractions, so to go out there and back it up playing three rounds and finish third is a credit to her."

Overall Nicholson said the event seemed to be enjoyed by all who attended.

He said many of the players were at the course for the first time and were impressed with the layout.

"The positive feedback we received from the visiting players was fantastic," Nicholson said.

"They rate the course as one of the best in the country and see themselves coming back to play in the event every year.

"We hope to see it getting bigger every year - we were restricted this year with registrations due to border restrictions with NSW and Victoria but the way disc golf is trending around the world, numbers for these big events just explode."

Nicholson said the course itself provided a real challenge, with water in play alongside the lake but the chance to play it smart and go the long way around.

Typical of the dedication to the weekend was South Australian Disc Golf president Gareth Morgan who played two rounds with a moon boot after tearing the ligaments in his ankle a week before during a beach volleyball game. Nicholson said he was pleased with the support the event received, with the main sponsors the City of Mount Gambier and New Zealand based RPM Discs.

He said many other sponsors also helped along the way which made it all possible.

"We had a tremendous diverse array of local sponsors who backed the event," Nicholson said.

"The players were all taken aback by how professional the event was.

"We couldn't do that without the sponsors, club volunteers and committee members who all invested a huge amount of their time and money to really turn it on."

Great weather means crays on the menu

LOVELY weather offshore over the last week or so has been awesome for the boaties heading out to the deep water and those who have been able to get out have found some excellent fish.

The bottom bouncing in 80-100m of water has been good, with some nice catches of gummy shark, flathead and knifejaw.

The fishos staying in a bit closer around the 60m zone have also found some nice shark this week.

I know of gummy shark to 15kg and some nice snapper too.

There were a few boats that went in search of tuna over the last weekend while the weather was nice but unfortunately they came back empty handed.

The signs of life were there and looked great, but they just could not manage a fish from it.

Amateurs have been getting some nice

crayfish this week in craypots, drop nets and even while diving.

Calm weather and flat seas have been excellent for fishos, so let's hope after this stir we see some more good weather so we can get back into them.

There has been plenty of anglers hitting the surf beaches this week while the weather has been nice and mixed in with all the usual rays, skates and other bycatch, there have been some nice ones caught.

Gummy shark, elephant fish, salmon and snapper have all been beached this week and a few smaller mulloway too, which is sure to spur on some of the keen guys.

The most productive areas have been Piccininni through to Browns Beach, Nene Valley and Canunda NP.

If you can get good conditions, now is a great time to head down and have a crack.

Garfish have been great again this week in most of the usual hot spots.

Livingstons, Cape Douglas and the Port MacDonnell breakwater have all fished well for both land-based and boat fishos.

A few anglers have fished Racecourse Bay for their garfish too and doing well, so that is another nice spot to try too.

There have been some big tommy ruff getting around in Livingstons Bay, which is a nice change from the swarms of smaller fish that were around in previous weeks.

Good whiting reports continue this week from right across the South East.

The best area I have heard about this week is the Port MacDonnell breakwater.

The fish coming from there might not be the biggest in the area, but they are good, consistent fish between 34cm and 40cm which is perfect plate size.

There are quite a few small fish in there too, but that is normal and a great sign for the coming years.

There are big schools of salmon trout in the breakwater at the moment, so if you like salmon for bait or for the smoker, grab the kids and the tinny and go trolling small lures around.

Even though they are not monsters, it is good fun.

The Glenelg River has been a bit slow again this week, but I do have a bit of mulloway news to report.

A few anglers have been trolling live mullet in the upper reaches of the river, around the Sapling Creek area and picking up a few fish.

The bream news has been patchy but there has been a few caught.

The best areas seem to still be Dry Creek through to Donovans, so luckily it is right in the zone where we are allowed to fish.

The Glenelg River Angling Club kicks off its 2021-22 fishing season this weekend with the first competition starting at 6pm SA time at the Donovans landing.

All are welcome and memberships are available at the sign on or pop in and see me at Spot On, Mount Gambier.

The weekend's weather looks very average to say the least.

Wind and swell both picking up are going to make the going tough for most but the keen anglers will always manage to wet a line.

Supercross goes off

THE Millicent Stadium Cross has been deemed a success, after around 140 riders converged on the showgrounds for the annual event.

Mount Gambier Junior Motorcycle Club president Richard Humphries said the weekend ran well, despite a couple of serious accidents, with both riders said to be recovering well at this stage.

"We had a couple of major accidents but all in all, the weather and riding conditions were good and the event run smoothly," he said.

"We wish both riders well in their recovery.

"It is a difficult course and not for the faint hearted.

We don't have that style of track anywhere in South Australia and it can catch people out.

"It is really just for the more experienced riders and even they can come unstuck."

One such experienced rider was Brett Metcalfe, who claimed a win in the coveted Dale Teagle Memorial race, a 16-lap stand-alone race, along with the Laurie Fox Hole Shot honours and class wins in the Expert and Veterans categories.

Humphries said it was good for the young riders in the region to see Metcalfe ply his trade on such a challenging course.

"There are no bigger names than Brett Metcalfe," he said.

"He spent 15 or 20 years of his life riding motocross and supercross in America.

"His style and the way he rides is phenomenal ... he is a special rider that's for sure.

"He would still be in the top five in Australia."

Humphries said around 150 bikes were registered for the two-day event, with 135-140 entrants from as far as the Barossa, Adelaide, the Riverland and right around the South East.

The field also included 18 riders in the Expert class, which Humphries said was exceptional.

"Millicent is not for everyone but the calibre of rider was good," he said.

"Speaking to people who have been around

the club for a long, time they have never had 18 experts.

"They normally have about 10."

The club has been busy this season running grass track events while waiting on approval for a purpose built facility.

He said the club would often see around 150 bikes entered for its grass track series, with the sport clearly in demand in the Limestone Coast region.

"It is always tough trying to get these things sorted," Humphries said of the new track.

"It takes a lot of time and money and it is a work in progress but I have some good people working on it.

"We have a few things we need to get sorted before the council can make a decision, so we will just wait and see how it goes."
