Property booming

DEMAND for houses across the region is so high that properties are being sold without purchasers even looking at them.

Graeme Cleeves, director at Limestone Real Estate, said he has never sold as many properties sight unseen than through the pandemic.

"I have been in the real estate game about 22 years and very rarely sell a property sight unseen but since Covid-19 we have been," Mr Cleeves said.

"A lot of them have been investment properties sold this way, because investors are mainly looking at the percentage of returns

for their investments.

"Our property prices are low compared to other places around.

"To do our due diligence we do the building inspection, pest inspection, walkthrough videos, photos, they can Google Earth it, they can ring the local council.

"People are getting used to online auctions

now and buying things sight unseen.

"When you buy things online, you do not see that in real life, so people are getting used to that sort of thing.

The improvement of the local market may mean there will be less properties for renters. be able to meet the demand.

"We are finding that there are a lot of investors that have invested in the past and are landlords of rentals, and putting them on the market because they are picking up some good dollars now," Mr Cleeves said.

"The whole industry needs more listings, to "It is the best time I have seen in the last 22 years for properties selling fast, and for really good dollars.

Director at Malseeds Real Estate Jason Malseed said he has observed the same phenomenon.

"This is really rare," he said.

"It is starting to be a trend everywhere not just here.

"Our real estate is so cheap people interstate cannot get over it, and there are good returns here - that is the main driver.

"There were 2000 properties including blocks for sale two-and-a-half to three years ago, and now it is in the hundreds.

"A lack of [property] listings is driving up the price."

While professional photos and videos can give someone a good feel for a property, Mr Malseed said some aspects to the property can be difficult to explain virtually.

"But sometimes they do not often 100 per cent understand location," he said.

"I had a buyer's agent from Melbourne ring up and ask me why a property was worth more than another one we have listed; he could not understand the difference with location.

'When you live here you understand our locations, and some are better than others.'

Valarie Jones from Millicent Real Estate said that sales are up in Millicent as well.

"At least 80 per cent of sales have been sight unseen," Ms Jones said.

"It is a very good time, certainty a sellers'

"We were cheap, but all our prices have gone up now.

"I do think now that the borders are open there will not be as many sales sight unseen, they will start to come over to inspect."

Ms Jones said that it is not just investors who have been buying, but families that are looking for a different type of lifestyle after the pandemic.

"A lot of people I have talked to that have come from the city are enjoying Millicent," she


"They are enjoying the freedom."

According to realestate.com.au, the median property price in Mount Gambier is \$290,000 for a house and \$200,000 for a unit.

The median rental is \$310 per week for a house and \$220 per week for a unit.

Nightmare on Ramsey Ave

VIGILANTISM is being considered to help curb illegal behaviour on Ramsey Ave, according to a local resident.

The avenue has been subject to vandalism, along with residents saying they regularly observe speeding cars along the road well over the legal limit.

Brad Shannon has lived on Ramsey Ave for the last 12 years and said he, along with other residents, have had enough of inaction.

"Last Saturday someone vandalized trees along the road, it caused a lot of damage - they are half the size they were," Mr Shannon said.

"We are just fed up with it."

Mr Shannon said that residents regularly clean off the graffiti along the street themselves, and are considering what they could personally do to help solve the issue.

"We are happy to sit out here ourselves and when this guy comes back, grab him by the scruff of the neck and haul him down to the police station," he said.

"But we should not have to do that.

"There is also have a real problem with speeding motorists.

"We have speeding through here, particularly at peak hour in the afternoon."

Akuna Kindergarten is on Ramsey Ave, with signage limiting speeds to 25km/h when children are present.

Limestone Coast Superintendent Campbell Hill said vigilantism was never advised, and that the community should contact police if observing a crime.

"We are not advocating for anyone to intervene with these people," Supt Hill said.

"The reality is if people are going to be behaving in this manner there is no guarantee for what their mindset it, or whether there is drugs or alcohol involved.

"We do not want people putting themselves at risk.

"If people are seeing things happening in real time calling 131 444 is the best option.

"There is always effectively an idiot somewhere, and that is largely what this sort of behaviour is"

Supt Hill said that often these crimes are solved from tips, and if the community is aware of any type of illegal behaviour, they should be calling Crime Stoppers.

"People can call that number and pass on information for anything they like," he said.

"If they are aware of property damage, or

people doing burnouts, habitual drink drivers, it can be anything."

Council has been aware of the speeding problem for almost two decades, with plans in 1994 produced to curb the problem with slow points, chicanes or street changes, but never implemented, according to Mr Shannon.

One slow point was installed in the last year, but Mr Shannon said he believes that not enough has been done to deter speeders.

General manager of city infrastructure at the Mount Gambier Council, Barbara Cernovskis, said that traffic counts and movement statistics were collected and used to inform their actions.

"There is an existing 25km/h area around

the childcare centre that was not being adhered to, and trucks have been accessing and using that road as a shortcut," Ms Cernovskis said.

"Putting the slow point in, that has actually then remedied that problem." Ms Cernovskis said that Ramsey Ave includ-

ed a mix of industrial, business and residential use which made management complicated.

"It comes down to a number of things, there is no one answer," she said. "We can keep putting in slow points and

"We can keep putting in slow points and adding bits and pieces, but we need to do it based on evidence.

"Is there an engineered solution that does not just push it elsewhere? Because it is a behavioural problem. "When you have multiple users, with different uses in an area, it just becomes a little complex.

"A simple solution is not necessarily the best solution, it is just shifting a problem to somewhere else."

Ms Cernovskis said that council was looking into adding a driveway to the Akuna Kindergarten.

"We will be doing some design work and costing to be able to improve the carpark, and give that two access points," she said.

"That will improve safety there.

"None of this will happen tomorrow, but we need to plan and move towards those things."

Funds for structural timber

A SOUTH East timber mill may have a solution to help satisfy the demand for structural timber following a state government grant.

More than \$400,000 has been handed over to NewGen Timber to further develop the recently purchased site in an effort to increase the structural timber supply.

NewGen Timber directors Craig Nisbet and Shaun McDonnell recently took over the H and L Scheidl mill in August of this year and were soon successful in obtaining the grant.

Mr Nisbet said they were fortunate enough to have a mill which was operating on one shift, which then provided an opportunity to utilise the equipment and provide a quick boost to the local supply.

"We are now looking at upgrading the yard and the roadworks and providing more lighting which will allow us to operate at night time hours as well," Mr Nisbet said.

"This will allow us to extend our hours of operation and therefore create employment opportunities for people."

He said alongside employment opportunities, the increase of operating hours would also allow the mill to increase the timber supply and hopefully decrease the waiting time for building houses.

"Everyone is seeing the timelines for building houses and the strain that is on the timber supply at the moment," Mr Nisbet said.

"We are hoping this upgrade will further help with that.

"During my time in the timber industry I

have never seen such a demand for structural timber as is happening now.

"Traditionally Australian structural timber is made up of 20 per cent imports largely from Europe and the difference we are seeing now is with the United States market, they tape it off with the global financial crisis and the markets are back on and like our housing market, the demand for housing in the US is also at an all time high."

He said with the demand coming from all corners of the world, structural timber within Australia is scarce for those wanting to build a new home or extend on their current one.

"The domains are higher but the supply is actually lower which is a real imbalance in the market at the moment," Mr Nisbet said.

"That is what we are hoping to do, is to help with that balance."

During a whirlwind visit to the region, Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham said the ongoing demand for structural timber provided a unique opportunity for further development to other mills within the region

Mr Basham said the state government was looking into investing further funds into different timber mills across the state, including a number within the region.

"This will get the mills upgraded and bring more structural timber into the market," Mr Basham said.

"We are now having the conversations that need to happen within the industry going forward so we understand their needs."

"This ensures we make the right investments and it is a commitment that we will make sure those future conversations have the

best possible outcome."

Mr Basham said throughout recent years, the forestry industry had changed with officials observing the supply demand for structural timber increase.

"We need to ensure we are adaptive and the industry can deliver," he said.

The planned upgrades of the NewGen Timber mill are expected to be complete in April.

WITH the border open, there is now extra pressure on local businesses to make sure patrons are adhering to health directives.

"By and large when people are causing a disturbance, the minute they know police are on their way they shoot through anyway.

"The best thing we as a community can do is support businesses by doing the right thing.

"We have already seen in the space of a few days several venues and areas within the Limestone Coast that has come under different levels of contact.

"That is just our new business as usual."

Supt. Hill said that the community has so far been doing the right thing.

"Community uptake has been exceptionally good," he said.

"We have had a really good run of rehears-

"Every now and again we are seeing those odd people that might be turned away or questioned.

"The best thing we as a community can do, is support businesses by doing the right

Members of the community can be fined more than \$1,000 for not complying with Covid-19 directives.

"It is a significant amount of money, if people are not going to be compliant with the direction, they run the risk of either receiving an expiation notice, or if they really want to push the issue they can be arrested," Supt. Hill said.

Mark Perry, manager and Covid marshall at Metro Bakery, said there have only been a few incidents where people have been asked

"Some people do refuse to do it, I will ask them to check in, and they will refuse so I ask them to leave," Mr Perry said.

"The do huff and puff, but they will leave.


"I have boxes of masks and will offer them if they have forgotten.

Covid-19 exposure sites

A COVID-19 testing site will be open in Robe following a number of exposure sites.

Since the South Australian-Victorian borders opened on November 23, there have been 15 Covid exposure sites listed in the Limestone Coast. There have been nine low risk casual contact sites, three close contact sites and three casual contact sites.

Those identified as a low risk casual contact must monitor symptoms and get a Covid test as soon as symptoms appear.

Casual contacts must get tested immediately and quarantine until a negative result prior to getting re-tested on day six and 13.

They must also wear a surgical mask when around others at all times and avoid contact with vulnerable people, avoid non-essential activities where possible, avoid shared spaces and maintain physical distance.

Unvaccinated close contacts must immediately quarantine for 14 days since being at the specified location, get tested immediately

and again on days six and 13.

They must also complete a form to notify SA Health they were at the location. Unvaccinated people living in the same house must also abid by the same requirements, however vaccinated people in the household must only quarantine for seven days and get tested immediately and again on day six.

Vaccinated people who has visited the exposure site must immediately quarantine for seven days since being at the location and receive a negative result in the day six test prior to leaving quarantine.

They must also get tested immediately and again on day six and 13, not attend a high risk setting or attend events for 14 days after exposure, wear a surgical mask when around others at all times and avoid contact with vulnerable people.

MP push for Head to Health services

MEMBER for Barker, Tony Pasin hosted a from serious injury or even death have mental health services round table recently as part of his push to secure a Head to Health adult mental health facility for the Limestone Coast.

Mr Pasin was joined by 20 stakeholders from key mental health service providers and State and Local Government in the region to discuss what he refers to as the 'Shadow Pandemic'.

'The lockdowns and other restrictions that have been put in place to protect us

given rise to widespread mental health impacts," Mr Pasin said.

"The Federal Government has embarked on system wide reform to ensure Australia's mental health system is more compassionate, accessible and affordable,'

As part of this reform an investment of \$820m is earmarked to establish a national network of adult, child and youth mental health treatment centres across the country which will operate under a 'no wrong door'

approach. Head to Health Centres, as they are known, are intended to complement, not replace or duplicate, mental health services already provided in the community.

"Approximately one in five Australians and nearly half of all adults will experience a mental or behavioural condition in their lifetime," Mr Pasin said.

"I want to ensure that our region has the resources to help members of our community when they need it.

"This is why I'm advocating within Gov-

ernment for a Head to Health facility for the Limestone Coast."

Recommendations on locations will be made through consultation with State Government and Primary Health Networks.

Liberal candidate for the State seat of Mount Gambier, Ben Hood is currently circulating a petition calling on the Federal Government to provide funding for a Head to Health service.

So far 1600 signatures have been gathered for the petition.

Heartless bird killing

MORE than 20 corellas have been mowed down as they fed on the side of a regional road, leaving wildlife carers and residents in shock.

Last Thursday and Friday night, Mount Gambier Wildlife Carer Julia Dangerfileld was called out to O'Niel Road, Worrolong, following reports of more than 20 corellas laying dead on the nature strip.

Ms Dangerfield said she was called to the scene following residents finding one of the birds severely injured but still alive, yet it had passed prior to help arriving.

"There was a resident who was coming out of her driveway and she witnessed a ute purposely veering off the road and into a flock of corellas, killing them," Ms Dangerfield said.

"The residents were in absolute shock because they actually love the birds, they feed them and look after them so to have them mowed down is devastating."

Ms Dangerfield said she understood birds often flew in front of cars and are prone to accidentally getting hit, however it was reported this was not the case.

"This car drove onto the nature strip to purposely hit these birds and residents say the birds that nest here almost never fly in front of cars along the road," she said.

"Once it had mowed them down, the car then went back on the road and kept driving."

After the first incident on Thursday night, Mr Dangerfield said she received another call around the same time on Friday with residents upset that it had happened again.

"Over the two nights, I counted more than 20 birds and I think it would have

been more because some may have flown away and fell into long grass or anything like that," she said.

"I understand why people find corellas a pest and that they are actually an agricultural pest, however the birds here were not bothering the residents and a lot of them actually looked after the birds.

"It is quite dangerous to swerve all over the road to hit animals and the people who are doing this are actually leaving some animals injured on the side of the road too."

A Department for Environment and Water spokesperson said intentionally running over protected fauna was likely to be an offence under the National Parks and Wildlife Act.

"Penalties of up to \$100,000 or two years imprisonment may apply and similarly, intentionally running over any animal may be an offence under the Animal Welfare Act, carrying a maximum penalty of up to \$50,000 or 4 years imprisonment," the spokesperson said.

"People may apply for a permit to destroy wildlife to where protected animals are causing or likely to cause, damage to the environment or to crops, stock or other property, including built structures or constitute a safety risk or hazard to people or industry.

"Destruction of protected fauna must be undertaken in compliance with the relevant Code of Practice for Humane Destruction, for birds, shooting is the only permitted method of destruction."

Anyone with information on the alleged illegal killing of protected fauna should contact the National Parks and Wildlife Service on either the Mount Gambier number 8735 1177, Naracoorte number 8760 120, or lodge a report on the Department for Environment and Water Website.

Horse therapy proves effective

RESCUED horses have proven to further develop the wellbeing of Limestone Coast residents as Tarpeena's Kehsarra Clydesdale Horse Rescue continues to support those in need.

Opening in 2018, the rescue has rehomed a number of Clydesdale horses which are then trained specially as therapy animals.

The horses allow those with multiple difficulties - such as depression, learning difficulties or post traumatic stress disorder - to learn how to remain calm and work in a stressful environment,

Owner and operator Lynn Brierley said throughout the years, clients have experienced significant benefits from the ongoing programs which are catered specifically to each individual.

"We deal with a wide range of clients from across the region including those from the retirement home and children with behavioural issues," Ms Brierley said.

"We see a lot of benefits from our clients and through the program and they manage to build their confidence and reduce their anxiety.

"We also get a lot of high school students that come through with a lot of engagement issues and anger issues who come out of the program well."

She said the programs were designed for

each individual client based on their specific needs.

"The programs help with mindfulness and helps the clients realise where the anger is coming from and how they are feeling," Ms Brierley said.

"Each client tells us what they want to get out of the program and we work from there.

"This creates a bit of ownership for the clients because it allows them to achieve goals they have set themselves."

She said clients also go through the program at their own pace.

"If the clients want to stand in the paddock with the horses they are able to, but we make sure they know they only get out of the program what they put in," Ms Brierly said.

"Some clients find the horses intimidating, so we also have a miniature horse to help them ease into the program."


She said clients thoroughly enjoyed the programs with a number of different activities available including grooming and helping with the horses overall.

"We are also looking for volunteers to come out and help whether that is just helping with cleaning up low hanging trees or anything else they may be able to do," Ms Brierley said.

Preacher's van salvation

"MY dad helped from above," said Merriwyn Thonard, thrilled that a task she and her late father began more than 50 years before was finally being realised thanks to the passion of horse drawn vehicle restorers at Millicent's Museum.

Recently visiting Millicent from Mount Compass, Ms Thonard was looking over the dismantled pieces of a historic horse drawn van that she donated to the museum where it is in the throes of being returned to its former glory of 100 years before when it was used by a preacher on missionary work in Australia's outback.

Ms Thonard has donated the van to the Millicent Museum and will provide the funds to enable it to be restored so that it will be able to take its place among the museum's horse drawn vehicle display which is the largest in South Australia and possibly the best in Australia

She said the task of restoring the van began more than 50 years ago when it was a 16th birthday present from her father.

"Sometimes we'd go for Sunday drives and at Bull Creek (south of Adelaide in the Hills area) we saw three old wagons sitting in a paddock.

"We introduced ourselves to the farmer, Bruce Gray with whom we became friends for many years.

"He offered to sell one of the three vehicles so dad asked me which one I wanted for my birthday and I chose this one; he bought it for \$150.

"I fell in love with this van because it looked a bit 'Wind in the Willows' (a children's book about three animals - toad, mole and badger - who have adventures in a horse drawn van).

"My friend Jane and I were horse mad and we had dreams of driving around Australia with her two horses pulling our gypsy van, as you do when you're 16.

"The van went into our backyard in Kensington Park; we had appeased my mother that it could be there saying we would use it as a changing room for the swimming pool.

"Dad and I then set about fixing it up.

"We replaced the canvas top and then started sanding down the boards on the sides of the van - that's when the layers of paint coming away stopped us; 'Dad', I said, 'there are letters here'."

Ms Thonard said they slowed down the sanding down process and carefully revealed a passage from the bible written onto the sides of the van - and with it the revelation that the van was special.

"We knew this was important; it didn't seem right for us to sand this wording off, so we stopped."

Research has discovered that the van began its life as a merchant's cart and was converted into a horse drawn caravan in about 1922 to be used by Swiss preacher Rev Ernest Kramer.

The van carried the missionary's family throughout the South Australian and Central Australian outback before being sold to Bruce Gray - who was the farmer the Thonard's purchased the van from - when he was a stockman for Sir Sidney Kidman.



The van sea-changed with Mr Gray (known as Saltbush Bill) when he moved back to his family's farm near Adelaide and used the van at his riding school at Henley Beach.

Mr Gray told Ms Thonard that he had bought the van from Dame Daisy Bates (a journalist who lived with and wrote about Aboriginal people from the turn of the century to the 1940's) but proof of this has yet to be found.

Ms Thonard said, with the van's history revealed, many museums were interested in having it, even a transport museum in Oxford, England.

"They wanted it but I wanted it to stay in Australia where it had created its history," said Ms Thonard.

Making multiple enquiries within Australia she was disappointed that museums either wanted to charge her to house the van or intended to use it for children to play on.

Time ticked on and the van got moved in 1992 to Ms Thonard's father's farm at Mount Compass where she now lives.

Not long after her father (Dr John Thonard AM) passed away in 2017, Ms Thonard received a call from Peter Foster OAM who, despite living in Adelaide, has been heavily involved in the Millicent Museum for more than 30 years where his expertise with restoration of horse drawn vehicles has greatly assisted in the creation of its extensive horse drawn vehicle display.

The result was it arriving at the museum

earlier this year where it is being restored under the direction of Mr Foster and a team of volunteers at the museum.

Ms Thonard said the Millicent Museum was a great fit for her van.

"I believe in restoration and this van is part of the story of Australia so it's important to protect it," said Ms Thonard. "I am absolutely thrilled to see the caravan's new home in the horse drawn vehicle collection of Millicent's National Trust Museum, and the remarkable work the preservation team is doing.

"The museum has got to be one of the best country museums in Australia; the collections and working displays are exceptional."

Funding for glamping in seaside town

GLAMPING will soon be available at Port MacDonnell with the reopening of the Dingley Dell Cottage.

Current owner and operator of the Coonawarra Bush Holiday Park, Steve Moignard, received a \$233,000 grant for the total project cost estimated at \$466,000.

Mr Moignard will develop a similar accommodation style to his current glamping site at Coonawarra, near the heritage listed museum

at the Dingley Dell Conservation Park.

The project will include 20 new canvas glamping tents, showers and amenities with the museum also planned to be reopened and running.

The cottage was the home of poet Adam Lindsay Gordon and will be upgraded along with ongoing maintenance of its stables and gardens

Mr Moignard said he also planned to reexhibit a number of personal items from Adam Lindsay Gordon which had previously been removed by the Department of Environment and Water for safe keeping.

"One item that I was interested in since the start of this project was Gordon's saddle," Mr Moignard said.

"The previous caretaker of the cottage had a complete inventory of Gordon's items there and I think it will be in the best interest of visitors that they be returned."

He said in addition to the historical artefacts, a number of holographic displays were also planned for the museum.

"We are all so excited to get this business on track including the accommodation side

of it," Mr Moignard said.

"It will be such a positive as we will now draw people to Port MacDonnell with the same model I have used for the bush park.

"The accommodation area is less than two kilometres from the beach which makes it a prime location as well."

He said in addition to the museum and accommodation, the business would also host a number of events throughout the year including live music.

The site is expected to be reopened close to Easter next year.

Ex-vet clinic now vax site

MILLICENT'S former veterinary clinic is being used as a Covid-19 vaccination clinic.

Vacated in recent years when the veterinary clinic moved across the road into bigger premises, the old building has been unused until the Covid-19 clinic began administering vaccinations on November 17.

The Limestone Coast Local Health Network (LCLHN) said the vaccination clinic had been moved to the new premises from the Millicent hospital and about 80 to 90 doses have been administered each day since the new clinic has been open.

"We relocated the Millicent Hospital Covid-19 vaccination clinic to the former Millicent veterinary clinic to free up space and allow the hospital to regain the area utilised by the vaccination clinic,' said a LCLHN spokesperson.

"This regained space will help improve flow

throughout the facility (hospital) and ensure we have the necessary space and resources to provide care to the community as part of our ongoing Covid response.

The clinic (at the former vet premises) will continue to be operated by hospital staff and provide vaccinations every Wednesday and Thursday, and we encourage people to get vaccinated if they are yet to do so.'

The clinic is open between 9am and 3pm every Wednesday and Thursday.

Bookings are available online at sahealth. sa.gov.au/covidvaccine

The Millicent hospital continues to provide testing for Covid-19 with the number of tests almost doubling to 83 in the week that the State's borders were opened from 48 the previ-

The hospital's testing clinic is open seven days a week from 2 to 5pm.

Possible new housing land soon

A POSSIBLE new area for housing could become available in Millicent next year at the former soccer grounds and Italian Club near the town's business centre.

Wattle Range Council recently resolved to hand back the 3.93 hectares of land to the South Australian Government for potential

The crown land, off Academy Drive, had been in the care, control and management of Council and the land in question, which adjoins the disused railway line, has not been used for some years.

The largest open area involved was last used as the town's soccer fields in the early 1990's when new fields and a clubhouse were built at the town's multiple sports area at

In 2015 the Italian Club was handed over to Council and the building has had no use in the

Council has declared it as surplus to its requirements with a number of other buildings available for hire under its control within the township

Council's Director of Corporate Services and Deputy Chief Executive Officer, Paul Duka said the land would provide a much needed opportunity for new residential developments

"Land for residential developments in Millicent is in short supply and this land would provide a good offering for this sort of use and would enliven the whole town," said Mr Duka.

He said the adjoining disused railway line land, which is contaminated, had been on the market through the South Australian Government for about 18 months and freeing up this uncontaminated land had the potential to enhance the saleability of the entire area.

Prior to deciding to relinquish care, control and management of the land, Council underprocess which resulted in three submissions; none of which were negative towards the proposal to revoke the land's status as 'community' which would allow it to be sold by the State

"The submissions were on the whole supportive of the land's potential to further develop the town with residential allotments,' Mr Duka said.

None of the submissions came from Millicent's italian community.

Council has declared that it would not be purchasing the land, nor would it receive any proceeds from any potential sale of the land.

A spokesperson for the State government department involved said: "On 9 November the Wattle Range Council made a formal resolution to revoke the community land classification and this is now with the Department for Environment and Water for consideration. A decision is expected to be made early next year and will inform any sales strategy."

Now that's a local knife

THREE years ago, Kieran Swift decided to make a knife for the first time, now he's selling his custom made creations around Australia.

Recently, the Millicent refrigeration technician traded his modern gas fired forge at his home for the old style of blacksmithing with a coke forge and bellows at the Millicent museum during the town's 150th birthday celebrations.

About 300 people who came through the museum for its open day saw Mr Swift working with steel in the blacksmith's workshop and admired his hand-made knives on display.

"I was with a mate one day in 2018 and we basically just said, hey let's make a knife, and that's where it all started," said Mr Swift.

The off-the-cuff idea has now turned into a hobby business he calls Swift Steel and Forge.

Moving to Millicent six months ago, he is now one of seven knife makers in the South East, including three in the Australian Knife Makers Guild and among them is one of Australia's best knife makers.

"We get together every couple of months and have a 'Hammer In' and share ideas," said Mr Swift

He said knife making is growing in popularity and in particular the highly decorative skill of damascus which involves layering and folding steel while forging the knives which results in an aesthetic pattern on the blades.

"I make them with my passion for creation," he said adding that he is a member of the Australian Knife Art Association.

"Layering steel goes back a long way; there are 13-25 layers of steel in my damascus knives."

Enjoying the chance to work on an old bellow and coke fired forge at the museum,



Mr Swift said he had been encouraged by the President of the Millicent National Trust, Barry Long, to become a more regular attendee at the museum's blacksmith workshop.

"I've not worked with a coke forge before; it's been great to use it here at the museum, it brings it back to working with history, to go back to how it used to be done.

"It's great to demonstrate how to make something from nothing.

"It's important to contribute to the community you live in - so I'll be back."

Help keep our Red-tails flying

Trees For Life is calling on landholders with properties in the south east — near Hynam, Kybybolite, Frances, Mundulla and Wolseley — with suitable sites to plant buloke (Allocasuarina luehmannii) to help the endangered South-eastern Red-tailed Black-Cockatoo (Calyptorhynchus banksii graptogyne).

Buloke is one of only three native tree species that Red-tails will feed on, and is by far the rarest. With less than three per cent of the original amount of buloke trees remaining in the south east our red-tailed cockatoos urgently need more.

Trees For Life Habitat Officer, Cassie Hlava said, "With only 1,500 Red-tails remaining in the wild, it's critical that trees are planted now to provide future feeding habitat. The Communities helping Cockies project is providing funding to cover the cost of plantings but we really need help to find more suitable sites."

The Communities helping Cockies project is supported by the Limestone Coast Landscape Board, through funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program and is delivered in partnership by Birdlife Australia, Zoos SA and Trees For Life.

The project is flexible to fit in with what farmers want and they are supported through every step of the process to ensure the project is successful. Jess Livingston, a participating landholder, wanted to create a shelterbelt on her place near Frances.

Jess was able to incorporate 200 buloke trees with other shrub species to create a shelterbelt that will also provide food for Red-tails.

"Participating in the project was great. We were



involved in the planting and fencing aspects. The team who completed the work were all very lovely and they involved our children in the aspects that they could help with, so that made it a really enjoyable process. For us it is a nice continuation of the work that has already been done here by previous owners and custodians of the land that we

hope to continue on with." Jess said.

Homelessness issue raised

HOMELESSNESS difficulties remain with ac.care resorting to handing out tents and sleeping bags to those in need as a last resort.

The ongoing issue was recently highlighted by Mount Gambier City Council during the 2021 Local Government Association annual general meeting.

During the meeting, council submitted a notice of motion to seek support from the sector to write to key federal and state members on current housing issues.

ac.care homelessness and community service manager Trish Spark supported the motion and said she hoped it would increase pressure on the government.

"The housing issue is happening across a number of regions in the South East," Ms Spark said.

"We need some change to happen because

"We need some change to happen because if the government decides to provide more public housing or rentals for low income people through projects it will help but that is a long way away."

Ms Spark said since the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic, more residents are in need of financial and housing assistance.

She said this included those who would not typically need the organisation's help and consisted of nurses and other critical employees.

"We are not able to take on people like that because our priority is those who are in a low income situation and are unable to find a house," Ms Spark said.

"The housing issue is not discriminating at all and our biggest issue is around our clients

with mental health issues or drug and alcohol reliance.

"People who may have rented at a higher end will take what they can get and that then pushed our clients out which makes it really difficult."

She said the situation also made emergency accommodation more difficult due to motels not wanting to take in people with potential issues.

"Due to all this, as a last resort to help the disadvantaged as much as possible, we have been handing out tents and sleeping bags," Ms Spark said.

"However we don't just hand them out and then leave people to it, we continue to work with them until they are able to be put into either emergency housing or otherwise.

"For most it is only a very short amount of time they are spending in tenths and we have been able to get them into emergency accommodation quite soon but for others it has been longer."

Ms Sparks said the tents and sleeping bags were only an option after all others had been exhausted.

"This includes whether or not they can stay at a friend or family member's house until we find them accommodation," she said.

"It is a very hard position to put people in, especially when there are children involved because we don't want anyone to be in that position.

"However we do have to prioritise if there are kids involved and luckily it is not very often we have to provide tents for families because they are prioritised for housing."

Ms Spark said there needed to be a continued push by government and local councils for housing developments to be established within regional communities and ensured one or two of each development would be a low income house.

City Council Mayor Lynette Martin said the issues were not unique to the Limestone Coast and were present in other regional areas.

"Homelessness and housing difficulties prey on our most vulnerable community members," Ms Martin said.

"These issues impact those on a low income and the vulnerable as well as our ability to attract workers to the region which then impacts on the local economy.

"Whilst the pandemic has impacted on this, regional Australian institutes stay under investment in new properties in the region which has been happening nation-wide for 18-months."

Ms Martin said the phenomena of air bed and breakfasts had also contributed to short term accommodation becoming unavailable with the Covid health emergency also increasing competition and decreasing affordability with workers relocating.

Police look out for fire bugs this summer

AS the fire danger season has started, South Australia Police is focusing efforts on its response to the threat of bushfires through Operation Nomad.

Operation Nomad is a focus on deliberate, reckless and negligent acts that may cause a bushfire.

Patrols are deployed on total fire ban days (this includes severe, extreme and catastrophic fire danger ratings) throughout the season.

These patrols are not only proactively detecting risky and deliberate behaviour they are also a source of education for the community to reduce the risk of a bushfire.

Assistant Commissioner Noel Bamford said this operation focuses on known arsonists within our community, but also has a strong focus on preventing those bushfires which are started accidentally and can be avoided.

"Police will continue to monitor the 88 persons of interest during this year's fire

danger season, this includes those currently incarcerated who may be released in coming months," said Assistant Commissioner Bamford.

Minister for Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services, Vincent Tarzia, said SES personnel have once again boosted SAPOL's resources for Operation Nomad.

"We're ensuring as many eyes as possible are watching firebugs over summer," Minister Tarzia said.

"People who intentionally light fires are scumbags. $\,$

"We know how devastating bushfires can be in South Australia and must do everything in our power to keep the community safe. "Whether bushfires are deliberately lit

or accidental, we all have a responsibility to protect lives and property."

Last year there were 526 Operation Nomad fire incidents, 46 were determined to be deliberately lit first and 61 suspicious. Eleven

people were arrested for Nomad related fire offences and 14 people were reported and 33 fines were issued, fines mostly related to the lighting or maintaining a fire during the fire danger season and or cause bushfire intentionally or recklessly.

"Many fires which started last year were not criminally motivated and classified as non-suspicious – this can be anything from use of power tools or farming equipment when restrictions are in place, to parking a hot car on long grass during summer," Assistant Commissioner Bamford said.

"Bushfire prevention is a community effort and while SA Police will proactively monitor and detect risky and deliberate bushfire activity, we rely on the information for the public to keep our community safe."

CFS State Duty Commander Brett Loughlin said: "There are strict rules around the use of everyday items – such as barbeques, pizza ovens, power tools or spark-producing

equipment – that change on a Total Fire Ban Day.

"It's everyone's responsibility to know their obligations to keep themselves and their communities safe.

"Bushfire risk may not be as high this summer as in some years, but bushfires happen every summer in Australia and even short periods of hot and windy weather will raise the fire risk especially in areas that have seen a lot of vegetation growth during spring. It takes the slightest spark to start a catastrophic bushfire."



Extra funds to fix saleyards

ALMOST \$700,000 will be spent by Wattle Range Council on Millicent's saleyards following a special meeting of council on Tuesday attended by about 100 people.

Held at Millicent's RSL Hall, the meeting considered a report on the saleyards' future following a safety audit, conducted by Safe-Work SA, which resulted in aspects of the saleyards being closed when they were found to

While sales have been able to proceed, the special meeting was needed as SafeWork SA requires progress to be made on rectifying the identified safety issues by December 7.

In order to fix the issues at the 45 year old facility, the meeting adopted a recommendation of the report, written by council's Chief Executive Officer, Ben Gower, to spend \$689,980. This will be money in addition to council's adopted budget for this financial year.

Members of the public at the meeting included farmers, stock agents and Millicent business representatives, six of whom addressed the meeting in support of keeping the saleyards open.

A further 26 written submissions were tabled at the meeting - all in support of keeping the saleyards operational.

Strong emotions among the crowd were obvious with many attendees expressing disappointment, distress and anger that the ongoing operation of the saleyards was in question and on several occasions during the meeting Mayor Des Noll intervened to ask attendees to refrain from making personal remarks towards council and council staff.

The addresses from the attendees were extensive but were consistent in describing the saleyards as financially important to the farming and wider community, both directly and indirectly.

Some also described how the saleyards were important to their mental health in providing an opportunity to socialise among fellow farmers, while also supporting the town's shops on sale days.

Others expressed exasperation that the council appeared to have an "open cheque book mentality" for other facilities which did not generate profits - listing items such as the Millicent library, parklands, artwork and the Beachport boat ramp, along with the proposed new council offices - while it had not adequately supported the saleyards.

"Council should represent their people and spend our rates wisely; we are only asking for a fair slice of the pie," said Wattle Range farmer Sam Croser.

The future of the saleyards has been uncertain since a review of the facility, presented to council in 2018, found that the council was facing ongoing financial losses due to declining numbers of cattle being sold at the yards.

As a result of this review, in January 2019 council considered a motion to close the saleyards in June 2020.

This motion was moved by former council-

lor Rick Paltridge and seconded by Cr Moira Neagle.

However, the motion was amended by former councillor Glenn Brown and seconded by Cr Dean Burrow to hold a public meeting to address options for keeping the saleyards open and if none were forthcoming to close the saleyards on 30 June 2020.

Since then public meetings have been held and proposals made prompting the council to move the deadlines out and remove them altogether in February 2021 stating it would continue the operations of the saleyards with a proviso that throughput numbers were maintained above 8500 head per annum which was later clarified as a rolling average.

Council had resolved that if throughput numbers fell below this number, it would trigger another review of the saleyards' perfor-

The report to the special meeting said numbers fell below the threshold to 8323 head of cattle in October and 8234 in November.

This compares with 35,000 in the year 2000.

Also in October this year, the council received an unsolicited expression of interest to purchase the saleyards.

This led to the council formally calling for expressions of interest to purchase the salevards with expressions to detail the intentions of possible purchasers in relation to the operation of sales at the saleyards.

The recommendation of the special meeting on Tuesday to spend \$700,000 on fixing the safety issues at the yards was supported unanimously by the councillors.

In addition, Cr Moira Neagle attempted to move a motion to put a five year moratorium on debate over the future of the yards so that the yards would be guaranteed to remain open until the end of 2026, and that \$300,000 annually for the next five years be spent on the yards, and to raise the per head fee from \$12

However, her motion was ruled out as being unlawful to commit future councils in this way. With the suggestion that this could be considered within the council's long term financial plan, Cr Neagle agreed to withdraw the motion with a view to refining it as a potential notice of motion for the next council

Cr Dale Price successfully moved that council seek legal clarification of the responsibilities of a 'Person Conducting a Business Undertaking' at the Millicent saleyards and council take steps to mitigate any risk to council.

Cr John Drew moved that the council invite expressions of interest for the operation of the saleyards for 10 years with a right of renewal for a further term - this was seconded by Cr

Cr Drew said: "Others reckon they could do this better and I think they could and it would help because they would have an ownership of the saleyards they would be supported better because people would own the saleyards 'it's ours not the council's' and we could run this process in conjunction with the expressions of interest to purchase process.

This motion was carried by a majority.

Eradication of feral deer

ACHIEVING eradication of feral deer is a key objective for the Limestone Coast Landscape Board as part of its hard-line stance on the declared pest species.

The region's feral deer population has been reduced through successful implementation of the LC Landscape Board's control programs

and farmed deer compliance operations but much more work remains to be done.

Reaffirming the LC Landscape Board's strong approach, General Manager Steve Bourne said the board's initial phase is to work closely with participating landholders to achieve property scale eradication.

"We are now working to ensure the community are aware of the devastation caused by feral deer on our landscape, in particular to the agricultural industry and the region's biodiversity," Mr Bourne said.

"Feral deer significantly reduce productivity on farms as they compete with livestock for

pasture, damage infrastructure such as fences and have the potential to spread disease," he

"As little as nine red stags on a property is the same as 387 rabbits and reduces the grazing capacity of that property by over 30 sheep.

"Not only do feral deer impact the agricultural bottom line and environment, they also attract illegal hunting and create public safety hazards on our roads.

The LC Landscape Board recently hosted a dinner at Kingston for landholders participating in feral deer control programs.

LC Landscape Board Feral Deer Project Officer Aidan Laslett and Department of Primary Industries and Regions SA National Deer Management Coordinator Dr Annelise Wiebkin both spoke at the November 19 event, providing insight into the scope of feral deer control programs in the region and updates on trials of new thermal-assisted aerial control (TAAC) technology.

Mr Laslett praised participating landholders for their involvement.

"Through working together we are achieving intensive feral deer control at the largest possible scale, resulting in significant inroads to achieving eradication and protecting our region from feral deer impacts," Mr Laslett

Managing feral deer populations is best achieved by involving all land managers in the local area as feral deer will wander across adjoining properties.

Fox bounty proves popular

FOX scalps from the Limestone Coast accounted for 90 per cent of the total number of scalps collected from around South Australia in the first round of the State Government's bounty program.

Almost 2,500 fox scalps have been collected from South Australian farmers: 2177 of them from the Limestone Coast.

This follows the announcement in August of a \$220,000 program providing a \$10 payment for each fox destroyed to help cull the pest and further support drought-affected

Recently, Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham said the first round of scalp collections across nine regional centres netted almost 2,500

"Foxes prey on newborn lambs, calves, kid goats and poultry and every pest fox which we can remove is a preventative measure for our farmers," said Minister Basham.

"In total there were 2,429 scalps brought in from a total of 33 claimants for the first round and we expect the numbers to grow when officers hold more collections across our regions.

"Returns were varied across the state with the Limestone Coast region having the most fox scalps.

"The feedback in most areas was that many people are collecting scalps and we expect to see a strong return across the state at the next round of collection days.

"Government recognises the importance of biosecurity, including feral pest control, and

that's why we are running multi-faceted programs to bring down populations of foxes.

The collection day for the first round of the bounty program in the Limestone Coast was held at Lucindale on October 21.

The next is expected to be at the Lucindale Field Days in March next year.

Livestock producers who have a Property Identification Code (PIC) are eligible to claim the bounty for each scalp taken to a collection

A minimum of 10 scalps and a maximum of 100 scalps per property can be claimed per collection day. Each property may claim up to a maximum of 300 scalps per year.

Farmers may enter into their own arrangements with professional and recreational shooters, but the person who claims the bounty at the collection day must be the holder of a PIC.

The fox bounty, which is running in addition to baiting programs to combat the feral pest, will be available for two years, or until funding runs out.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LCLB) Operations Manager, Mike Stevens said the scalp results reflect that the Limestone Coast is a productive part of South Australia and highlights that pest control requires continual

"It is great landholders and the community are supportive of new ways to control fox populations in our region, complementing the current baiting and control programs provided by the Limestone Coast Landscape Board," said Mr Stevens.

The fox bounty program provides another control tool to help reduce the fox population and provide a benefit to primary producers and native wildlife.

"The bounty has provided a great incentive for landholders to achieve additional fox control and expand their control efforts into

Mr Stevens said a combination of control measures is the most effective.

"Particularly teaming up with your neighbours in a coordinated program using a variety of fox control methods, such as ground shooting, baiting and fumigation of dens," he

Last financial year, the LCB sold 30,120 fox baits and 5948 meat baits.

Foxes are a declared pest animal and it is the responsibility of landholders to control foxes on their properties.

New research grants for growers

AN important stream of funding for research and activities to benefit South Australian grain growers is now on offer.

The South Australian Grain Industry Trust (SAGIT) is accepting applications for its 2022 project funding grants.

Research organisations, grower groups and individuals are encouraged to submit their research project or industry activity

SAGIT Chair Max Young said the Trust's annual round of funding provided the research community and SA farming systems groups with a valuable investment platform to help grow the State's grain industry.

"South Australian grain growers are among the most efficient and productive in the world, but they depend on outcomes

from new research and development to continue to advance their enterprises," Mr Young

"SAGIT allocates funds to projects that have potential to drive real improvements in farming systems in this State, so we are keen to receive applications from groups and individuals who have ideas and proposals that could make a difference on-farm.

SAGIT invests an average of \$1.8m per year to support research that specifically benefits the SA grain industry. The funds are raised from a voluntary contribution from SA growers of 30 cents per tonne of grain

"The voluntary SAGIT levy is well accepted by SA growers because they can see the projects SAGIT invests in on their behalf are relevant and tailored to their unique circum-

stances and environments," Mr Young said. SAGIT earlier this year announced more than \$2.45m in funding for 25 new grain research projects which started in 2021.

Notable new programs underway include a three-year study into variety selection and weed management options for genetically modified canola, research to improve management of herbicide resistant barley grass, and a look at the implications of green hydrogen technology and production for SA grain

Funding applications for 2022 must be received by Friday, February 4, 2022.





HYUNDAI POWERING

BY DEREK OGDEN, **MARQUE MOTORING**

LIKE fingernails running down a blackboard, the unbearable prices of electric vehicles tend to have most potential buyers shying away.

Roll on a few years from now and automotive industry sources say EV production costs will be in line with those of fossil-fuelled ve-

In the meantime, there are manufacturers bringing prices down by limiting battery

Hyundai is one such example with its pricey Kona small electric SUV taking a kilometre and dollar haircut.

August saw the release of the Standard Range model delivering around 305 kilometres compared with the Extended Range's close to 500 kays.

Available in Elite and Highlander specification, prices differ by \$6000 - \$64,000 to \$58,000 (Highlander) and \$60,500 to \$54,500 (Elite).

Powertrains vary from 100 kW / 39.2 kWh to 150kW / 64 kWh, respectively.

No poverty pack here, Hyundai says all share the same technology, safety and convenience features, with Extended Range models taking price drops of \$1500 (Elite) and \$2000 (Highlander).

STYLING

Twenty-five millimetres longer than the Kona it replaces, the 2021 EV has been given a series of design changes.

These include a new front, with a shuttered grille and new daytime running lights that are aimed at emphasising the car's width.

An asymmetric flap on the charging port adds a focus on the left, while new LED headlamps, with multi-faceted reflector technology, wrap around the sides, connecting to the wheel arch cladding.

The latter adds to the Kona's aerodynamics by reducing turbulence in the wheelhouse area. An air intake in the lower bumper incorporates satin bars.

Out back, the look has been refreshed with a new bumper and widened rear lights.

The makeover is signed off by new machined-face 17-inch alloy wheels.

INTERIOR

The Kona Electric Highlander leather-appointed cabin features heated front and outboard rear heated seats, the powered driver and front passenger positions also being ventilated.

Shoulder space in the back is adequate but leg room is extremely limited by the floor height increased over conventional powered Konas to make room for the battery storage.

If things up the back are tight, there is room up front for Hyundai's hallmark 'flying' centre console, with wireless charging bay, which is good news for the driver and front seat pas-

senger. A rear console USB point allows backseat occupants to 'fuel up' mobile devices.

Ambient lighting in the footwell gives a cosy glow to the surroundings, while a headup windscreen display delivers a range of information without unnecessary distraction to the driver. Boot space is 332 litres.

INFOTAINMENT

A 10.25-inch colour LCD dash cluster features full digital display with user-chooser sections linkable with the selected Drive Mode.

Also projected are trip computer info, system status and visual alerts.

A Harman/Kardon premium audio includes eight speakers and an external amplifier offering exceptional sound reproduction via optimum tuning.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The 150 kW / 395 Nm motor powers the front wheels which are fitted with low rolling resistance tyres on 17-inch alloys.

There is a single-speed speed reduction gear automatic.

SAFETY

The 2021 Konas have cracked on to upgrades to the standard Hyundai SmartSense safety system of the outgoing model.

These include lane following assist, blind spot collision avoidance, rear cross-traffic avoidance assist, safe exit warning and rear occupant alert.

DRIVING

The Kona Electric hums happily off the mark

at the instant the power pedal is prodded.

Little fazes the power plant from then on up to cruising speed.

Braking is positive and the forward motion of the vehicle is converted to money-saving battery top-ups.

Three levels of regenerative braking are available through the car's paddle-shift system. Energy consumption, hence available range, is officially put at a combined 14.7kWh per 100 kilometres, which would allow for 484 km to 'empty'.

The previous best was 449 kilometres.

On test the Kona came up with 13.5kWh.

Kona's lithium-ion battery on DC charging can power up at a maximum rate of 100 kW with a 10 to 80 per cent charge time of 47 minutes. On 50 kW charging this will take around

On home AC charging, the Kona's maximum rate is 7.2 kW, charging from 10 to 100 per cent in nine hours.

Kona Electric now features remote starting via the smart key fob.

With the handbrake on and vehicle locked, the user can remotely start the vehicle by pressing the lock button, followed by pressing and holding the engine start button

SUMMARY

While not the cheapest fully electric vehicle around (see Nissan Leaf), neither is the Kona the most expensive.

That is the territory of the likes of luxury • Five years / unlimited kilometres

cars from Tesla, Audi and Mercedes-Benz.

Hyundai is ploughing the small SUV furrow with the Kona Electric, which goes a long way almost 500 kilometres – to matching the big boys.

The Autobiography will also be available in long-wheelbase format, with the Autobiography LWB available as a seven-seater – a first for the Range Rover model.

The range begins with the Range Rover

SE, which is available with either petrol (P400) or diesel (D300) power.

Both of these engines come from Jaguar Land Rover's Ingenium family, with turbocharging, 3.0 litres capacity across six inline cylinders, and 48-volt mild hybridisation.

The P400 powertrain makes 294kW and 550Nm, while the diesel D300 makes 221kW and 650Nm, as used in the Defender, Discovery and Range Rover Sport.

Higher grades can have a 258kW/700Nm 'D350' diesel powertrain, as well as a new 390kW/750Nm 4.4-litre twin-turbo-petrol V8 in the P530.

This replaces the 5.0-litre supercharged V8. Plug-in hybrid Range Rover P510e and SV grades will arrive in Australia in the second half of 2022.

Like all previous generations, the 2022 Range Rover will be capable off road.

It will have up to 295mm of ground clearance and 510mm of articulation through air suspension and Terrain Response 2 off-road traction control system.

The air suspension is joined by 48-volt active sway bars and adaptive twin-valve Bil-

The new Range Rover also features rearwheel steering, which works to improve dynamic stability and reduce the turning circle to 11 metres.

Infotainment will be centred around a 13.1-inch curved, floating display, which includes the ability for software updates over the air for 69 individual electronic control modules.

This infotainment system uses Land Rover's new Pivi Pro operating system, and includes Amazon Alexa voice control and Spotify music streaming functionality.

Note that this information is from a global press release and some details may not apply to Australia imports.

As we receive Oz-specific details we will provide further details.

The 2022 Range Rover will arrive in Australian showrooms in June 2022 and order books are now open.

FORD PUMA ST-LINE V

ELECTRIC vehicles have a fair way to go before they become realistic in the greater automotive world.

In the meantime, the internal combustion engine is fighting a rear-guard action in the battle to remain relevant.

With steep pricing and limited range holding back the bright sparks of the planet-saving private car world, one such petrol-powered protagonist is the Ford Puma, a compact sports utility vehicle boasting a combined urban / highway fuel consumption of 5.3 litres per 100 kilometres, which puts almost 800 km of driving from its 42-litre fuel tank.

Based on a stretched and widened Fiesta platform, the petite Puma, with its 1.0-litre, three-cylinder turbocharged engine, leaves the traditional hefty fuel slurping SUV in the dust, so to speak, the test vehicle recording 5.7 litres per 100 kilometres of premium petrol in a mix of driving over a week.

Engineered in Germany and put together in Romania, the new Puma comes into some stiff opposition in the mini-SUV market Down Under. Rivals include the Hyundai Venue, Kia Stonic, Toyota Yaris Cross and Nissan Juke, as well as small segment derivatives such as Mitsubishi's ASX, Mazda CX-3 and Hyundai Kona.

Pricewise, for starters, the Puma, at \$29,990, plus on-road costs, can't match it with the Venue (\$20,940), or Stonic (\$21,490), while the Yaris Cross (\$26,990) comes closer. Top cat Puma ST-Line V (the test vehicle) tips the scales at \$35,540 but does carry quite a lot of kit for the price.

All take advantage of a five-year unlimited kilometre warranty and Ford Service Benefits such as complimentary service loan car, auto club membership, including roadside assist, as well as SYNC 3 sat nav map updates.

STYLING

Each 2021 Puma variant sports a unique front end with different radiator shape and grille design, the 'V' model carrying chrome-like highlights, so there's no mistaking the owner's investment as the car approaches.

Up from the ST-Line's 17-inch wheels, the range-topper rolls on 18-inch stand-out alloys, while privacy glass adds a premium look to the sporty lines.

Lighting is up to the minute too with automatic high-beam assist LED headlamps, LED lights down the back and LED daytime running lights joining the sharp nose.

The leather-trimmed seats feature an attractive stitched pattern and are on the firm side of supportive.

The substantial steering wheel, with paddle shifts, adds to the feel of a true sports car.

The 410-litre boot is up there with the best in class and adds the bonus of a plastic-lined 80-litre compartment with a drain hole to take wet swimmers and towels.

Bag hooks and a 12-volt outlet are on hand, under the floor is a space-saver spare wheel.

INFOTAINMENT

Standard fitment is an 8.0-inch touchscreen. with rear-view camera, along with Apple Car-Play and Android Auto, wireless phone charging, an embedded modem, and climate-control air-con.

12.3-inch instrument cluster is easy to read, push-button start, DAB+ radio is in the hands of a premium 10-speaker Harman / Kardon system and as well as wireless charging, there are two USB inputs.



ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The Puma is powered by Ford's 1.0-litre, threecylinder turbocharged petrol engine mated with a seven-speed dual clutch automatic transmission, feeding 92 kW and 170 Nm to the front wheels. Fuel is rated 95 RON.

SAFETY

The Puma won a five-star ANCAP safety rating with a 2019 European testing regimen.

Advanced systems across the range include autonomous emergency braking, with pedestrian and cyclist detection, lane departure warning and lane keeping assist, traffic sign recognition, driver impairment monitor, rear parking sensors, tyre pressure monitor and emergency assist.

Airbags include driver and front passenger, front seat side and side curtain.

The test car included a Park Package (\$1500), adding adaptive cruise control, with stop / go, and lane centring, active park assist with front, side and rear sensors, front parking sensors and blind spot detection.

Push-button start fires up the cheeky 1.0-litre, three-cylinder engine, feeding 92 kW to the front wheels.

After an initial surge as the turbo clocks on, the test Puma motor channelled a lawnmower when setting off.

Gear shifts were surprisingly smooth for such a small motor and had the Puma almost loping along the open road. Brakes needed to be given some leeway in a bid to pull up

As mentioned above, the Puma ran to form, swallowing 7.1 litres of 95 RON petrol per 100 kilometres in city traffic, with the stop / start engine system on, and sipped 4.4 litres per 100 kilometres on a motorway run, which equates to the Ford combined claim.

Firm, some would say harsh, suspension had the Puma ST-Line V banging away as it tackled even minor bumps and dents.

Potholes were a particular problem.

Things were just as shaky in the rear seats, which were also short on leg room. While handling was assured and especially grippy on fast • Fuel Type: Petrol 95 RON bends, it's not high on ride comfort, this one.

I don't know of another vehicle this size



swapped the Puma's hands-off workings for more cabin comfort.

While the Puma ST-Line V is well kitted out, the buyer has a steepish price to pay for an SUV of this size. There are other compacts to consider for value for money.



FCAI WELCOMES ANNOUNCEMENT ON ZERO **EMISSIONS**

AUSTRALIA'S peak automotive body, The Federal Chamber of Automotive Industries (FCAI), has welcomed the announcement Australians will be encouraged to choose the technology that best suits their needs as the country aims for net-zero carbon emissions by 2050.

'This announcement, which forms part of the Government's direction towards a 2050 net-zero emissions target and ahead of the 2021 United Nations Climate Conference in Glasgow, provides a signal that Australia is wanting to step up its adoption of new technologies and improve our national environmental performance," said FCAI Chief Executive Tony Weber.

"The FCAI will work alongside the Federal Government on the adoption of its strategy."

The FCAI and its members introduced its own Voluntary CO2 Emissions Standard targets for 2030 and reported for the first time in March this year.

"The automotive sector is ready and willing to participate when it comes to a direction on emissions reduction and the adoption of world's best vehicle technology," Mr Weber said.

I encourage the Federal Government to adopt the FCAI Standard and work alongside the industry to send a strong signal to global manufacturing headquarters that Australians want access to the best vehicle technologies in the world."





In order to keep up the ruse and land this book deal, she has to pretend to be her mother when Jack and his mother fly over to her farm in Queensland.

"She has to recreate her mother's life, which is with a kid and a husband, and she has to throw that together at the last minute," McMullen said.

"And her gay best friends have to step up, one plays the husband and she cons one of the local farm girls into pretending to be her daughter to pull the wool over the Americans' eyes.'

It's a classic comedic farce, with a dash of romance thrown in.

Being able to pull it all off was dependent on the chemistry between McMullen and Montgomery. Having never met each other before, the pair took some time to get to know each other before they shot the film.

"We spent a good couple of days hanging out together in Brisbane before we started filming, having dinners and drinks, and seeing if we could make this work," he said.

"Because it's really important when you're working that closely with an actor that you can be vulnerable and just throw yourself

McMullen, who comes from Dunblane in Scotland, says it's still hard for him to shake the idea that Christmas should be cold and snowy.

"To me, Christmas is cold and snowy, but the great thing about this film is that a lot of it is meant to be Manhattan, and obviously Manhattan at Christmas is snowy and cold, and then the rest of the movie is set in Australia, so you get the perfect combo of both."

He's getting more and more used to the warm Christmases too, considering how much Australia is beginning to feel like home.

"I made the decision to stay here in Australia when COVID happened,"

"I was working quite a lot here anyway so I thought I'd stay. It was definitely the right decision and I think I'll probably reassess where I plant myself moving forward now.

"I think being away from Australia for a number of years and coming back has given me a new appreciation for just all the wonderful things this country has."

"All students are very chuffed and proud of what they have done."


Director of nursing Catherine McKenna said the artwork would enable patients to feel more at home during their stay if the artwork was to be displayed in their rooms.



Tough day at Coonawarra

AFTER being postponed for a week due the threat of torrential rain, the Mount Gambier Cycling Club's Kidman Cup was held under blue skies along a 35km course in the Coonawarra on the weekend.

The strong southerly wind had some of the three junior and 21 senior riders wondering if the race could be held in a single direction, out towards Lucindale, but the logistics in getting the bikes back to the start line proved difficult.

The juniors were first to leave, with a 5km tailwind followed by the brutal return leg into a headwind of approximately 22km/h.

The usual riders were joined by first-time racer, Simon Nicholas in his first road race.

He was given a four-minute head start over Eddie Buckland, who was in turn given a further 1:30 gap from Molly Opperman.

Speeds were high as the riders and their chaperons charged downwind for the first 5km, trying to make the greatest benefit of the wind at their backs.

As the riders made the turnaround point, Nicholas was still just in front, with Buckland and Opperman making use of their experience to reel him in.

The brutal headwind made the trip back much harder and average speeds plummeted.

Nicholas relinquished his lead with 4km still to travel, as first Buckland then Opperman surged past him.

Each pedal stroke was becoming labored as the riders made their way back to the start/finish line, but Opperman was able to maintain the higher average speed to ride past Buckland and win by 27 seconds.

The main race saw Damian Buckley, Jen Buckland and Jason Buckland lead the way.

They tried to make the most of the nineminute gap to the next group of Chris O'Donnell, Dave Delaland and Mike Bakker,

while Bruce McLaughlin, Julian Nicholas and Harry Opperman began their chase three minutes later.

They were followed one minute later by the largest group consisting of Madalene Cleary, Dean Zeven, Spek Peake, Phil Stasiw and John Cranwell.

The stronger junior riders, Riley Hill, Patrick Langsmith, Jami Buckley and Matt Fiegert were joined by Malcolm Tirabassi and started their race three minutes further back.

Nick Kidman and Matthew Opperman were given their orders to begin the chase of

all other riders some 20 minutes after the first group had left.

Once again the pace was high as the riders flew towards the turnaround, with average speeds mostly in excess of 40km/h, which made it difficult for the faster riders to peg back much time on the groups ahead.

The first group arrived at the turnaround point still eight minutes ahead of any group behind them.

As the riders made the turn for home, the importance of remaining with the groups began to shine through, with the only relief from

the relentless headwind to be found behind the wheel of another rider.

The group out in front made slow headway into the wind, halving their average speed from the outward leg.

Within sight of the finish line a small bunch of six riders from the middle groups surged past as the pace quickened towards the finish to try and negate some of the sprinter's power.

At the line Harry Opperman had surged clear, followed by Cleary, with Peake rounding out the podium.

Kidman claimed fastest time honours.

Post race formalities were held on the grounds of Kidman Cup sponsor Banks Thargo wines, along with a barbecue.

Rider fees collected for the race were donated to Nick Kidman who has been cultivating a moustache as part of Movember Foundation's fundraising campaign.

Pin point: Wind plays its part

A THEME of adding a little extra challenge emerged over the recent Blue Lake Archers outdoor and indoor rounds.

As new archers have settled into the sport it was time to reintroduce some old club favourites

A breezy Sunday afternoon on November 21 added to the pressure when the archers decided to challenge themselves by using the 80cm target face at its maximum range of 50 metres.

A Holt round is 90 arrows and leaves little room for error in the smaller of the outdoor target faces.

Peter Donhardt had nothing to lose and everything to gain in the changeable wind con-

ditions.

The wind had the established archers well off their normal level of accuracy and were left in Donhardt's wake with a final adjusted margin of 131 points to his nearest rival, Ben Kilsby.

Friday night indoor archery explored the World Archery 18-metre round, a more difficult round for the compound archers who are required to hit the very centre of the target to gain a maximum 10 points.

The first half of the round was a point-bypoint scrap between Kilsby and Graham Lock, while the second half saw Paul Freeman hit his straps to take it right up to the leading pair.

The final scores put Lock in the winner's

position, with Freeman only five points off forcing a count-back.

The most recent outdoor event last Sunday returned to a triple-distance round after a staple diet of single-distance rounds.

A sunny day saw the World Archery 60/900 return to the score sheets after a long hiatus.

Fresh from a win in the last outdoor event, Donhardt was keen to keep that run going while Kilsby was determined to put the brakes on Donhardt and Freeman.

The final results could have gone either way between Kilsby and Donhardt but in the end Kilsby's score was superior by a single point to deny Donhardt a second win on the trot.

Calm conditions and seas has fish on the chew

SETTLING seas and easing winds from the end of last week and onwards have been taken advantage of by local anglers.

There was plenty of opportunity to get out offshore for the boaties and the surf fishos had a little bit of wind to contend with, but plenty of anglers have hit the water.

The offshore fishos have been into plenty of sharks this week, with gummy and school shark on the menu for most.

There has been plenty of flathead caught out in 100m and some nice snapper, knife-jaw and terakhi mixed in.

Plenty of fishos have been talking about chasing a make this week while the weather is nice and this is the perfect time of year for a look.

I think with the forecast of low winds and flat seas for the next few days, a few boats will no doubt gear up and head for the shelf.

Blue eye and hapuka should hopefully be

on the chew and next week I hope to have a few pictures.

The inshore guys are still having a ball on snapper around the kelp beds this week with fish in the high 60cm range caught.

There are good numbers of smaller fish mixed in - everything from 15cm babies, through to pan-sized 40cm fish and even bigger.

There are not only snapper on offer down there at the moment, but patches of nice whiting, a few snook and even some nice schools of salmon.

There have also been a lot of squid caught in the same spots, so keep a squid jig handy.

The whiting fishing this year has been red hot so far.

There has not been much of a hot spot as such, with just about everywhere fishing quite well.

The boaties are doing well in the Port MacDonnell breakwater, Hutt Bay and Carpenter Rocks, while the land-based guys have done well in Nene Valley, off the Port MacDonnell jetty and Blackfellows Caves.

The size and numbers have both been impressive this past week or so, but I would expect we may see them thin out a little as we go a week or so with low seas.

There have been some reasonable garfish catches this week, with a few anglers telling me the numbers seem to be a bit better than the previous week.

Our usual gar haunts have fished quite well, with Livingstons and Cape Douglas both productive, along with the Petrified Forest and Racecourse Bay.

Waders and boaties are both sharing in the success, with both types of anglers taking home some nice fish.

I am starting to hear of a few tommy ruff in the evenings at a few of the local jetties recently, so much the same as your gar, throw a few gents under the float and have a crack.

There have been plenty of anglers this week heading down for a drop net session while the weather has been so good.

There have been some real stags caught so far this year - I know a few blokes who have already landed fish over 3kg and several of those 2kg and bigger fish.

There is not many secrets to drop netting other than as soon as you grab the rope, pull like mad, otherwise they can flip themselves out.

Always keep an eye on the sea - when we drop net we are in and around the reef, so just be weary of what is going on around you.

The Glenelg River Angling Club held a competition over the weekend and things were a little quieter than we would have hoped.

There were some nice bream caught in the Reed Bed and Donovans areas by the bait fishos, but the perch and mulloway were pretty elusive.

Things will no doubt kick into gear in the coming weeks, but for the meantime, the bream are great fun.

Ben Jeffrey and crew boated some nice fish down there on cranka crabs again this week, but Ben also said the going is still pretty tough.

The forecast for the weekend looks fairly fishable at this stage, so here's hoping we get some usable weather.

THE majority of us were pleased when the state border with Victoria was reopened last Tuesday week.

Among those not so ecstatic for it to happen - at least for an extra week - were the owners and trainers of two and three-year-old pacers in South Australia.

The heats of the annual Southern Cross series were held at Globe Derby Park last Saturday night and, with the border reopened, it opened the floodgates for the cream of the Victorian youngsters to come over and compete.

It probably did not help turnover on the Globe Derby meeting either as the Victorian pacers dominated their heats, with visiting trainers Geoff Webster and Emma Stewart winning six of the eight heats conducted, all at Winx-like odds.

The two heat winners from South Australia were trained by Paul Cavallaro and our own Alvce Finnis.

It turned out to be a South East quinella in heat one for the two-year-old colts and geldings, when the Finnis trained Art Jester (\$2.40) upset the odds-on favourite Jawsoflincoln.

They were by far the two fancied pair in betting and the only two runners under double figure odds.

Driven by husband Jayson, Art Jester settled behind the leader (Jawsoflincoln) and used the sprint lane to advantage to score by 3.3 metres.

The other heat was won by the Webster-trained Cobber who recorded a mile rate of 1.58.6 with the Alyce Finnis trained Ever Hoping finishing third.

That second heat mile rate was almost a second quicker than Art Jester, and it means that Alyce Finnis will have two runners in the \$50,000 final tomorrow night.

For Jayson Finnis, he has the dilemma of deciding which of the two pacers to hop

into the sulky of, with Art Jester drawing the pole and Ever Hoping in gate five.

Over the years, South East trained pacers have had a tremendous record of winning finals of the Southern Cross series and it seems only Cobber will stand in the way of another scalp tomorrow night.

With the four \$50,000 finals of the series all run tomorrow evening, all up the South East will have seven runners competing.


