Cancellations hurt

UNCERTAINTY surrounding the status of South Australia's borders and frustration created by the State Government's Covid-19 testing and quarantine requirements has caused many visitors to cancel their Christmas holidays and business visits to the Limestone Coast.

Manager of Mount Gambier's Barn Palais, Kent Comley said 125 room nights had already been cancelled from bookings that had been made through to New Year's Eve, and he feared there would be more.

"It's a nightmare - we're getting a lot of cancellations for the Christmas and New Year period," said Mr Comley saying that 40 per cent of the venue's accommodation patrons come from Victoria and that when the border opening was announced the venue was fully booked for accommodation during the festive period but that had changed when the difficulties of getting across the border became apparent.

He attributed many of the cancellations to the time that would be cut out of stays by testing and quarantine requirements.

"People are queuing for hours to get tested and then they are having to quarantine waiting for results," Mr Comley said.

"They don't have time to lose," he said explaining that some visitors are business people and the downtime is costly for them.

"People don't want the hassle of isolating.

"The general population has held their end of the bargain and got vaccinated, now the other side [the State Government] should be holding up its end of the bargain," Mr Comley said as the opening of the borders on November 23 had been promised as the first step in reducing restrictions.

"The rules remain in place and there is uncertainty about whether they will close the border again," he said.

"We have to open up the economy; the hospitality and related industries have been carrying the can for the last two years, we have been through so many ups and downs, we have borne the brunt.

"We can still have sensible measures in place; but for them [the State Government] to say the borders are open, but they are not open - we just need certainty."

Mr Comley said keeping up with the changes in restrictions and requirements was also difficult.

"They are designed by boffins for boffins," he said.

"In saying all this, at least we have been able to trade so we are not ungrateful; imagine having a restaurant in Sydney or Melbourne."

Mount Gambier MP, Troy Bell said he had received information from numerous accommodation venues in the city which were dealing with cancellations of bookings from people who had previously planned to holiday in the South East.

"The borders are open by name only," said Mr Bell.

"A lot of people got vaccinated to get their freedoms back, but that hasn't happened - they are angry."

He believed that one of the discouragements for people to come to Mount Gambier from Victoria was a new border testing regime which has added unvaccinated children to the testing list.

The changes came into effect last week, requiring unvaccinated children aged under 12 and 2 months travelling with parents to get pre-arrival tests and also test upon arrival and quarantine until a negative result.

Mr Bell said the new rules had been brought in by stealth and had taken many by surprise.

"It seems every new day brings a new border rule for people to get used to before entering our State," he said.

"There are lots of families travelling to-

gether for holidays or Christmas and this will impact a lot of people - not to mention the huge impact upon accommodation providers who are again facing scores of cancellations from people who can't afford to quarantine or have simply been scared off travelling into the state."

Mr Bell said he also did not agree with young children having to face constant Covid-19 testing.

"Let's face it, getting a Covid swab is not a pleasant procedure for anyone and it's a very confronting thing to have a person in full PPE (personal protection equipment) come at you with a swab through your car window as an adult, let alone a child," he said.

"Imagine a three-year-old being forced to have an invasive nasal swab 72 hours before entering South Australia and then another on the first day, then having to isolate until the negative result comes in.

"No wonder many parents are saying that they are not going to put their children through that and are deciding to stay away from South Australia during the summer holidays.

"Children shouldn't have to be tested unless they or their parents are symptomatic."

Mr Bell said there was a tremendous level of confusion and anxiety about the new testing regime.

"The communication about changes is deplorable," he said.

"Most commonly, the news is simply announced purely by posts on SAPOL (South Australia Police) or SA Health Facebook pages, yet a large cohort of the population don't use Facebook.

"Every day, we are fielding calls from people who are asking for help navigating through the chaos that is our border system - it's clear as mud."

Last day for free Christmas trees

TODAY is the last day to take advantage of free Christmas trees from pine forest company OneFortyOne. In what is becoming a local tradition, for the sixth year OneFortyOne began spreading some festive cheer yesterday and will continue today by giving away Christmas trees.

Silviculture Forester Adrian Lynch said the radiata pines have been thinned from the OneFortyOne estate and are available for the

community to collect at the Glencoe Nursery and depots at Mount Gambier, Nangwarry, and Mount Burr.

Man arrested for breach

A MAN has pleaded guilty to breaching the Emergency Management Act in Mount Gambier, after entering the State earlier this week.

When arriving in South Australia on Monday, SA Police (SAPOL) confirmed the 37-year-old had not followed current bor-

der entry conditions.

"The man provided false information on his EntryCheckSA application, and he did not have a COVID test upon entry into South Australia," a SAPOL spokesperson said.

"On Tuesday December 7, police attended at an address in Mount Gambier and arrested a 39-year-old man and charged him

with breaching the Emergency Management Act.

"He was refused police bail."

Appearing in the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court on Wednesday, the Courts Administration Authority of South Australia confirmed the man in question had pleaded guilty.



Testing delay frustrations

EXTRA medical staff, known as a 'surge team', may be supporting Mount Gambier's Covid-19 testing station following lengthy delays for people requiring testing.

Mount Gambier MP Troy Bell said he has been advised by SA Health that a surge team was being sent to support the existing testing station resources.

Mr Bell labelled the current delays, which have been reported to reach up to four hours, as completely unacceptable.

"It is basic common sense, if the transition committee is going to change the entry requirements into South Australia, they have to increase the testing capacity," Mr Bell said.

"Our city shouldn't be disadvantaged because we are five hours away from Adelaide."

He said the surge team was overdue following community reports of extended waiting times.

"We've had 20 months to deal with the ebbs and flows of Covid," Mr Bell said.

"We should be better at this by now."

"South Australia could and should lead the way for testing and result turnaround times and we can only do this by proper planning,

resourcing and communication."

Despite the difficulties, Mr Bell asked the community to remain patient and understand the difficulties SA Pathology staff were facing.

"I understand waiting in line is frustrating but please be patient and understanding of the SA Pathology staff out there, who are doing an amazing job under tough circumstances," he said.

An SA Pathology spokesperson said it was not planning any Covid-19 testing site closures or reductions in operating hours over the holiday period and would continue to monitor the situation.

"We will keep the community updated with any changes and adjust operating hours at our

clinics according to demand where possible," the spokesperson said.

"We ask members of the community to be patient as our staff work hard to provide testing to the community, and we remind those waiting to be tested to keep up their physical distancing and hygiene measures and wear a mask while waiting to be tested."

According to new border restrictions, all people planning to travel to South Australia from interstate, including returning South Australians, must apply through EntryCheck-SA and should take into consideration the possible requirements of testing upon arrival.

Applicants will be assessed on their level of risk and will be advised of any entry conditions.

Controls

LESS than two weeks after opening borders, restrictions into South Australia have been updated due to concerns about the new Covid-19 variant Omicron.

Level three moderate risk restrictions were put in place Saturday December 4 for vaccinated arrivals entering the State from New South Wales, Victoria or the Australian Capital Territory.

These include:

- Pre-arrival negative test result taken within 72 hours before arrival.
- Test upon arrival and quarantine until negative test result.
- Test on the 6th day after arrival.
- No entry to high risk settings for 7 days.
- Symptom checking for 14 days after arrival.

If community members located within the Cross Border Corridor's in both NSW and VIC enter parts of the State not within their bubble, they will also be subject to level three restrictions.

Any unvaccinated arrivals into South Australia have to apply for a border exemption.

The State Government has not ruled out closing the border if circumstances change.

Financial plan

THE Mount Gambier City Council has planned for the scenario of a future possible 50 per cent drop in revenue from the Wulanda Recreation Hub but will not release details of how much money it is expected to generate because of its 'commercial-in-confidence' discussions.

The scenario is one of three released in council's long term financial plan which has been going through an updating process with a draft of the updates expected to be considered at council's monthly meeting next week.

Council chief executive officer Sarah Philpott said the scenario was not expected to occur and was in place as more of a "what if" situation.

She said council was currently in discussions with a private operator and it was not in a position to release financial details about the recreation hub.

"Council is also still working to finalise the operating model for the centre which includes operating costs and revenue streams," Ms Philpott said.

The draft updated long term financial plan covers the next 10 years and outlines that council's debt will increase beyond the local government accepted 'sustainability' indicator of a maximum equivalent to 100 per cent of rate revenue to \$44m or 132 per cent of rate revenue next year as a result of the building costs of the recreation centre.

Rate revenue is also planned to increase 4.5 per cent each year for the next 10 years under the plan.

South Australia's inflation rate is currently 2.51 per cent.

Despite the increase in rate revenue, the plan states that council is expected to run budget deficits until 2027, peaking at a \$2.3m

deficit next year.

The plan also outlines other future possibilities such as an increase in loan interest rates of one per cent and, to the relief of rate-payers, a possible reduction in rate revenue increases of one percentage point to 3.5 per cent increases each year.

"When we plan over the longer term, we have to build it on assumptions so we have to think about what we can see coming up in the future," Ms Philpott said.

"The purpose of the plan is to observe the coming decade and develop an idea on how elected members were able to manage the council's finances."

She said the scenarios were testing assumptions which have been made if "something drastic were to happen".

"When we develop these plans we need to think about what impact these scenarios will have and whether we have enough financial cushion to continue on," Ms Philpott said.

"The scenarios are not there to say we expect them to happen and they are just an alternative."

"When we plan over the longer term we have to build it on assumptions so we have to think about what we can see coming up in the future."

Ms Philpott said the financial plan worked alongside council's long term strategic plan and helped council plan for managing assets over the long term.

"Local governments have a lot of assets with roads and footpaths and many more, so for us it is critical that we can manage those assets over the longer term which is what this document is for," she said.

Wade promises palliative care improvements for community

MINISTER for Health Stephen Wade has assured Grant District Council members that work is underway to improve palliative care facilities.

In a letter presented to council this week, Mr Wade stated he had been assured by the Limestone Coast Local Health Network that improvements to the palliative care rooms are continuing.

Mr Wade said Mount Gambier and District Hospital currently has five large single rooms in the original medical ward which were equipped with additional facilities such as personal bar fridges.

"Four rooms in the new North South medical ward section which were designed with family-orientated care in mind," Mr Wade said.

"These rooms open onto a courtyard and there is a small lounge with kitchen facilities opposite these rooms."

He said there were plans underway for

this area to be upgraded and include improvements to the aesthetics of the rooms through addition of artwork and the purchase of new reclining chairs.

However, Mr Wade also stated the rooms were not exclusively reserved for palliative care and were made available as a priority when required for palliative care patients.

"The hospital considered creating a specialised palliative care space within the former private hospital," he said.

"However due to the high level of bed occupancy at the hospital and data showing that there are some months when there are no palliative care admissions, it is not feasible to quarantine beds for exclusive palliative care use."

Grant District Council elected members expressed disappointment at Mr Wade's letter with Mayor Richard Sage reminding members it was an issue that council has no control over.

Learners facing road rage

LEARNER drivers are often subject to road rage, a new RAA survey has found.

Of students with a learner or provisional license, 26 per cent have been a victim of road rage, with 82 per cent having witnessed a road rage incident as a passenger prior to receiving their license.

The survey showed almost half, 45 per cent, of those who had observed road rage said their parent had instigated the aggression.

Driving instructor Shaun Woolley from All Driver Training Solutions said the report mirrors his experiences teaching in Mount Gambier.

"People are beeping at us all the time," Mr Woolley said.

"I tell the students to completely ignore it, do not start looking at the person in your mirror.

"Otherwise they start to panic, it will affect how they are driving.

"People have just not got the patience on the roads, that is why I had to add the stickers to my car."

Mr Woolley has resorted to putting a 'please be patient' sticker on the learner vehicles, to encourage the Mount Gambier community to do the right thing.

Worryingly, Mr Woolley said he has observed parents often teaching their children

the wrong road rules, not remembering, or even never learning them properly themselves.

"The older generation are teaching their kids the wrong things," he said.

"They are surprised by what is in the learn-

er's book, they do not know a lot of the rules.

"There is a lot of misuse of mobile phones, particularly when at traffic lights, the first thing they do is pick up their phone when the lights turn red.

"Parents do it, children watch and then

think its acceptable behaviour."

RAA senior manager of community education Ben Haythorpe said the findings were concerning.

"It's very disappointing that an overwhelming majority of the students had already witnessed road rage as a passenger – many whose parents were the perpetrators," Mr Haythorpe said.

"It's also of great concern that so many novice drivers have already been victims of road rage, while others are fearful they will be targeted when they get their license.

"Female students, at 63 per cent, are significantly more worried than male students, at 36 per cent, of being a target of road rage, the survey also showed."

Mr Haythorpe said it is important to ensure road rage does not result in aggression.

"That is why it is important we send a message that all road users need to be courteous and considerate to each other," he said.

"Experienced motorists need to cut learner drivers some slack, show them patience and do not express any frustrations.

"It is also important for novice drivers to not be aggressive or react to aggression, and these are the messages we are keen for them to share with their friends and parents."

Learners are more likely to be driving over the school holidays, with the RAA reminding all to be patient on the roads, and to set a good example.

People encouraged to report inappropriate medical behaviour

A LIMESTONE Coast resident is encouraging others to report inappropriate behaviour made by medical professionals.

Following an uncomfortable experience with a male doctor, Jacinta is now advocating for female patients to enforce and report inappropriate behaviour through the Australian Health Practitioner Register Agency (AHPRA).

"I was involved in a number of incidents which were ongoing between 2017-2020 with a male doctor in Mount Gambier," Jacinta said.

"When I was in the middle of doing an assignment for my nursing legal ethics class, I had to go onto the AHPRA website and look

up how to report people.

"That was when I realised that as a patient I could report doctors."

Jactina said since making the report, the most difficult part of the process was finding the registration number of the doctor, which was not something she knew she was able to find.

"I don't know why it is not common knowledge and isn't advertised locally that patients are able to do this," she said.

"I am really encouraging people to hold doctors accountable for their behavior and being inappropriate with patients."

Jactina said since advocating for the issue

she had other women come forward and express similar issues, all of which have since reported the incident.

She said her experience was once so uncomfortable she felt obliged to take a support person into the clinic with her to prevent inappropriate behaviour.


"Since then I have learnt that you need to ask consent before a doctor or a nurse touches a patient because it only takes one person who has been through a horrible assault to be triggered," Jactina said.

"Doctors are people in power and are trusted, and patients should only be touched if medically needed.

"I believe it should be advertised better on how to report a doctor because I never knew a patient could even do it until I started studying."

According to AHPRA's website, the agency dealt with a number of complaints including serious or repeated mistakes in carrying out procedures, failure to examine a patient properly, the management of personal information as well as acts of violence, sexual or personal relationship with a patient or inappropriate examinations of a patient.

IT'S probably time the people we elected to represent us did exactly just that.

It was March last year when the State Government handed over tremendous power to a handful of Adelaide public servants.

Police Commissioner Grant Stevens was appointed State Co-ordinator under the Emergency Management Act after a Declaration of a Major Emergency was made to deal with the Covid-19 pandemic.

He also had new powers under the Covid-19 Emergency Response Act – those powers have now expired.

Commissioner Stevens has used these powers to detain people in quarantine, close state borders, introduce mask wearing and even banned 'vertical consumption' in a pub – just to name a few measures that have been taken to deal with Covid-19.

Many of us have understood the reasoning behind the actions taken and, as South Australians, we have been fortunate enough to get through this unique period reasonably well.

What we need now is certainty.

We were told that when we hit the 80 per cent vaccination rate the borders were going to be opened on November 23 and it was going to be a form of 'freedom day' - well, that did not exactly happen.

The testing regime that now applies to visitors from interstate has resulted in many holiday cancellations hurting our hospitality and tourism industry.

The moving of goal posts by the 'transition committee' has deterred potential visitors from interstate as they have now decided to put visiting South Australia in the too hard basket.

What we need now is certainty from the State Government.

It's time the Premier took control of the State.

Of course, with a State election just around the corner, Premier Steven Marshall currently has the ability to shield himself from criticism by saying: "I'm taking advice from the health experts".

Penola ED closed down

PENOLA residents have been left without an emergency department once again following its temporary closure in response to Covid-19.

The Penola War Memorial Hospital was one of nine rural emergency departments closed late last week following the threat of Covid within the state.

Last year, the department was also closed for about 11 months, with the Limestone Coast Local Health Network stating the decision was due to it being joined with Pinchunga Aged Care facility.

The department officially closed on November 27 with health officials stating it was only a temporary closure and would be regularly reviewed.

Patients presenting to the department will be triaged by a registered nurse either by phone or in a designated screening location outside the site.

Where medical emergency attention is required, staff will contact SA Ambulance Service to transfer the patient to Mount Gambier.

Penola resident Bill Murray said the decision was another safeguard for the more vulnerable community members.

"We cannot do operations here at the hospital anymore nor can we do x-rays or ultrasounds which gives us very little diagnostic ability beyond a general practitioner's field of experience," Mr Murray said.

"We are relatively close to Mount Gambier, Naracoorte and Millicent all of which have operating facilities and it would be a much safer option to go directly to one of those rather than being triaged through Penola where we don't have the staff to support an emergency department situation.

"The staff we do have switch between aged care and the regular hospital which could then pose a risk to those living in aged care despite being fully vaccinated."

Mr Murray said he hoped the community understood the reasoning behind the closure and that the department did not have the

resources to work as a proper emergency department.

"We are much better off being seen by our local doctor and in usual hours while leaving the emergency situation to the three surrounding major hospitals," he said.

"People need to take responsibility for their

own health and ability to get to an emergency department rather than rely on a system that is under pressure and can be compromised at any time with a major incident."

Minister for Health Stephen Wade said it would be quite difficult to separate the hospital to allow the department to remain open due to it being part of the main building.

"This is not the first time the department has been closed and it is one of seven rural emergency departments closed with the primary responsibility being to protect the residents," Mr Wade said.

"Compared to last time the department closed, we have seen a significant increase in vaccination levels across the South East so the risk is lower, but it is still important to remember that Penola is on the frontline of Covid."

Mr Wade said the decisions were made on a local health network level which would also determine when the department was to re-open.

"It is also important to remember this decision was made before the Omnicron variant and it is not in response to that development," he said.

"These safeguarding measures are appropriate protections of vulnerable residents in those transitions."

Shadow Health Minister Chris Picton said there should have been further safety measures put into place which would allow for the department to remain open whilst protecting the vulnerable.

"We are now 22-months into the pandemic and there are other country hospitals with aged care sites where the emergency departments are staying open," Mr Picton said.

"Whether you are in Penola or places like Karoonda, Tailem Bend or Barmera, there is now no longer an emergency department open when you need it."

Long trip for Covid Testing

PENOLA'S Covid-19 testing station is no longer open to the general public as those presenting with symptoms must now travel to either Naracoorte or Mount Gambier.

It comes following the temporary closure of the Penola War Memorial Hospital emergency department due to the looming threat of the virus.

Penola resident and business owner Cate Cooper said the decision to restrict Covid testing in town was letting the community down.

Ms Cooper said she had an employee turned away from the local testing station due to being symptomatic.

"Luckily she was able to just get tested because she was already there, but she was initially told she had to go to Mount Gambier or Naracoorte," Ms Cooper said.

"If people from Penola need to go to Mount Gambier for a Covid test, it is safe to assume they would probably do some shopping as well while they are there and if they do have the virus, then they are spreading it across the region."

She said as a business owner it was of great concern for her with staff now needing to take the day off in order to have a test done.

"Instead of just going down on their lunch break, they now need to make essentially a day trip," Ms Cooper said.

"It is around a two-hour round trip to and from Mount Gambier plus the waiting times at the testing station there, it isn't feasible for businesses to lose staff like that.

"We want people to come over the border and visit but if we can't even provide them with an accurate testing service they won't want to come here."

Shadow Minister for Health Chris Picton said he was concerned about the lack of testing availability within the region.

"Limiting testing by excluding people with symptoms goes exactly against the health advice on the need for people to come forward," Mr Picton said.

"No one wants to see a serious outbreak in the South East where health services are already limited and under stress.

"Permanent testing needs to be available, particularly as we enter busy summer tourist months when interstate tourism to the region will increase."

A Limestone Coast Local Health Network spokesperson said the state had done an excellent job getting tested for the virus in order to keep the community safe.

"With testing as crucial as ever now that our borders are open," they said.

The happy squeals of children are the reason the Farmers make the effort every year.


"From inside we hear the little kids - they love it," she said explaining that a steady stream of cars goes slowly past their home and then down Banks Street to view the side of the display also.

Financial corner for Boneham

MILLICENT'S Boneham Aged Services is turning a corner financially, the organisation's recent annual general meeting was told.

Two years ago the organisation recorded a loss of nearly \$1million while this year there was a \$100,000 loss.

Boneham Aged Care Services Chief Executive Officer, Michael Filsell told The Border Watch after the meeting that the result was a "good operating turnaround".

"There are continued headwinds that will not make it easy going forward, but we're in a better situation this year than previous," Mr Filsell said.

Board Chairman, Gwenda Lawlor was also encouraged by the results and said she was keen to get the organisation back into the black.

"Even if it's just by \$1," said Mrs Lawlor.

Mr Filsell said that Covid-19 had provided many challenges for the organisation but he was full of praise for the staff and families associated with the facility.

"The last 12 months have provided a fluctuating landscape," he said.

"It has been unprecedented in terms of the impact on aged care but our staff have been fantastic.

"Their commitment to normalising the situation for our residents has been second to none and the staff have successfully negotiated the pandemic; and the families have worked with us in relation to the restrictions on visitation to keep everyone safe".

"All our staff were willing to get vaccinated so we haven't lost any in relation to that, but we are always looking for new staff as some

leave for other reasons."

He said the staff attrition rate for the facility matched the industry average of 30 per cent and that aged care was competing with the newly funded disability areas for staff but that an ongoing internal trainee program was providing new carer staff on an ongoing basis.

The facility has 90 full time equivalents which equates to 140 staff members in addition to 20 volunteers.

Mr Filsell said the facility had full occupancy with all 90 beds and 23 independent living units filled.

"The national trend is 92 per cent occupancy so being at 100 per cent is good," he said.

He said the facility's capture area had increased with some residents coming from Robe and Mount Gambier, and the Covid-19

induced escape to country areas had also had an effect.

"A lot of people are moving from the larger metropolitan areas into country areas; some are moving here and they have brought elderly parents with them."

"Boneham's good reputation has made it the first choice for a lot of people," Mrs Lawlor said.

The organisation was fortunate to tap into some Federal Government funding to assist in the development of a new strategic plan for the facility's future but that further building expansion was not on the agenda for the foreseeable future.

Home amongst the wildlife

'ANIMALS rule this house - all day and all night' reads a sign in the garden of retired former Limestone Coast top cop Trevor Twilley, and he wouldn't have it any other way.

Surrounded by a menagerie of rescue animals, Trevor's daily tasks are a world away from those he faced as the region's Police Superintendent, a position he held for more than eight years.

Last Friday marked the third anniversary of Trevor's retirement from that position after a career in the police force spanning 40 years.

Now he and his wife Trina look after 50 rescue animals at any one time on their lifestyle block on the outskirts of Mount Gambier.

Known for her work with the South East Animal Welfare League and wildlife rescue programs, Trina's devotion to animals infected Trevor years ago and the move to the South East further fostered the couple's passion for animals.

Today their property is specially set up to look after injured and orphaned native animals and they are caring or have cared for a wide range of them including ringtail possums, sugar gliders, brushtail possums, kookaburras, tawny frogmouths, kangaroos, wallabies, wedgetail eagles and, Trevor's personal favourites, wombats Roxy and Dozer who have an especially magnificent enclosure built for them to cater to their every need, including digging.

Interspersed with them are domestic chooks, a fish pond and a rescue dog, Belle, who was saved by the Twilley's from an abusive past and now lives in harmony with their other fur children.

These animals are at the core of why the Twilley's remained in the South East bucking the trend of many other former Adelaide based high ranking public servants who often return to the city for retirement after a stint

in the country.

"We look after animals because of our passion for saving Australia's wildlife for future

generations - it's why we bought this property," said Trevor.

"But it's also because of this community;

people still come up to me in the street even now that I'm retired and say hello and thank me for my efforts in the police force."

Wombats targeted by drivers in Coorong

FOLLOWING a spate of wombat deaths in recent months along a stretch of road within the Coorong National Park, National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) rangers will shortly deploy camera surveillance to monitor the area.

Limestone Coast NPWS Manager, Nick McIntyre said concerns had been raised about an unusually high number of deaths of wombats within the Coorong National Park, south of 28 Mile Crossing.

"Parks rangers have recorded a significant increase in the number of dead wombats along the Old Coorong Road recently, and we've also received reports from the public leading us to believe that, sadly, wombats might have been purposely targeted," he said.

"We are deeply concerned by these reports.

"If members of the public know of instances of this behaviour, we ask that they contact the NPWS Limestone Coast office, as it is an offence to harm protected native wildlife.

"If you have seen or heard anything, please let our rangers know, so they can protect the animals that call the Coorong National Park home."

Coorong National Park Senior Ranger, Chris Hannocks, said the common wom-

bats found in the Coorong National Park are native to South Australia and can be distinguished from the more widely known southern hairy-nosed wombats by their bald nose.

"The common wombat is listed as rare in South Australia and are a protected species under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1972," he said.

"Wombats are most active at night when they forage, which can attract them to roads and verges to eat and drink where they can be susceptible to being hit by motor vehicles.

"When rangers come across dead wildlife, we check pouches for young and move them off the road to prevent any further vehicle impacts.

"Signs are also installed along our roadways to remind and warn motorists of the likelihood of native wildlife being present in the area."

Significant penalties apply for illegally killing an animal of a protected species.

The maximum penalty for illegally killing a common wombat is a fine of up to \$5,000 or imprisonment for 12 months.

Anyone with information relating to suspected unlawful wildlife activities can make an anonymous report to NPWS by calling 8204 1910.

Better late than never

DREDGING is finally underway at Beachport's boat ramp, after delays due to border closures.

Originally intended for September, the annual activity had no choice but to start late after the contractors were turned away at the border.

The delay has meant dredging is actively occurring during the professional crayfishing season, when the ramp is in daily use.

Beachport professional fisherman Shannon Moran said while it would have been better to have the dredging completed earlier, the contractors have done their best to work around the professional fishermen.

"Obviously it would be good if it was dug out right at the start of our season, the locals are always keen to get their pots out on October 1," he said.

"They have done all they can under the situation, we understand why it is late.

"The system they have got to be able to maneuver around us is brilliant, there is never any waiting once they start dredging, they always make room for you.

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower said the dredging delay this year was unavoidable.

"We like to try and get the ramp dredged before the crayfishing season starts, so we always book in advance of that, and then the borders got in the way," Mr Gower said.

"We literally had to wait for the borders to lift.

"We work pretty well with the fishermen, they are used to working with the tides, so as best they can, they will wait for high tide."

The area around the boat ramp will be

dredged to four metres deep, which will likely settle to around three metres soon after.

"We aim for two dredges a year, one before the beginning of the season, and one sort of February or March if it is silting up too much," Mr Gower said.

"The last couple of years we have gotten away with just one.

"It is normally the winter weather that determines how much sand movement we get, over summer with the calmer seas you get a lot less build up."

The contractors are in their third year of

a seven year contract, and Mr Gower expected them to become more efficient with the dredging process each time they undertake the project.

But there may be more updates to come, with sections of the boat ramp pontoons due to be replaced next year, and further potential upgrades flagged by a yet to be released report.

"Last year we put a whole bunch of sensors in Rivoli Bay to see what is happening with tidal movements," said Mr Gower.

"All that data was then shipped off to an environmental scientific organisation to analyse it.

"They have come back with a fairly technical report making some recommendations on how we can improve a couple of infrastructure elements around the bay."

Mr Gower was unable to advise when the report would be finalised, but indicated recommendations would be discussed by council once published.

"We are waiting for a second company to convert that technical report into words that the community will be able to digest a little easier," he said.

"Then we will be coming to talk to the community about those recommendations."

Pub renos nearly complete

RENOVATIONS costing more than \$1.5m are nearly complete at the historic Gambier Hotel on Mount Gambier's main corner.

While work began about two months ago, the appearance of scissor lifts and similar equipment on the outside of the hotel this week heralded that the final stages are under-way.

Assisted by a \$336,740 grant from the State Government's Tourism Industry Development Fund, the renovations are expected to be finished by the end of next week.

General Manager of Hospitality for the Matthews Hospitality Group, which owns the hotel, Lee Cook was in Mount Gambier this week from Adelaide to see the fruits of some of his work.

A part of the team that planned the renovations, Mr Cook said that the major revamp of the hotel did not alter any of the structure of the 159 year old building but gave it "a facelift".

New guttering and painting will be among the external touches while the hotel's 16 accommodation rooms are undergoing an extensive transformation.

Mr Cook said the work was in keeping with the historic era of the building while also providing modernised facilities for people staying at the hotel and would include a room especially designed for disabled people, and two dog friendly rooms for the increasing number of people who travel with their four legged friend.

"I am a dog owner myself and it is hard to find places to go where they will let your dog stay with you," he said explaining that the dog friendly rooms will have floor boards and a fenced outside area along with a dog bed inside the rooms, which will match the guest

beds, but all will be easily cleaned to ensure hygiene is maintained.

Mr Cook said bookings had already been taken for people to stay in the new rooms, including the dog friendly rooms, when they are complete.

He said the renovations would not have

been possible without the government grant and he also thanked the Mount Gambier City Council and local tradesmen and suppliers for their part in the project.

Launching the renovations will coincide with a new menu that will focus on local product.

"The aim is for everything on the menu to be sourced from within 100kms of the venue," Mr Cook said adding this would be visually supported by a live crayfish tank to be installed in the hotel on view to patrons.

In addition, plans are being finalised to provide tours of the local area from the hotel.

WW2 vet honoured

WORLD War Two spitfire pilot and Mount Gambier character, the late Charlie Miller OAM, was memorialised this week with the opening of a garden at Moorak Primary School.

A favourite speaker at the school around Anzac Day, Charlie passed away last year at the age of 96 leaving the school with a memory the staff and students wished to honour.

The brainchild of teacher Penne Paltridge, the garden has come together with the assistance of donations from the community including Gambier Earth Works and Bunnings, and the artistic skills of other school staff but most importantly with the students planting shrubs and decorating the area with artworks reflecting their memory of Charlie and the messages he delivered when he spoke to the

them and answered their questions about war and his military service.

An added attraction for the garden is a bench seat, donated by the family of airman Geoffrey David Abbott who drowned off Port MacDonnell in 1943 after baling out of his aircraft.

His is one of four World War Two airman's graves in the Lake Terrace East Cemetery which are being tended to by students from the Moorak school following in Charlie's footsteps as he looked after the graves for many years.

The opening ceremony for the garden began with student Makayla Fleming singing the Anzac version of 'I am Australian' before school captains Ben Harfull and Ethan Brook, being joint Master of Ceremonies, gave an overview of Charlie's significance to the school.

"He loved coming to our school and we loved having him here," said Ethan and Ben.

The boys explained that the students loved

hearing Charlie's story of growing up wanting to be a pilot and then becoming one at the age of 18, and his first experience in a spitfire - the aeroplane which he later flew during the war and taught other pilots to fly.

Mount Gambier Returned and Services League (RSL) President Bob Sandow undertook the official cutting of a ribbon to open the garden.

"Charlie would have loved to be here; this is a great way to respect him - he was a local hero," said Mr Sandow.

Mr Sandow has offered an interview he did with Charlie about his life for use by the school so that Charlie's message and stories could continue to be heard by new students at the school.

Teacher Penne Paltridge said the garden would continue to be developed with further artwork and plantings including Gallipoli, Anzac and RSL roses.

20 years caring in Millicent

A DIVERSE human services centre established in Millicent two decades ago when a need was identified for local support for vulnerable people continues to serve the community.

Twenty years of service delivery at the ac.care Millicent Community Centre was recently celebrated with clients invited to express what the centre meant to them, prompting praise for the support they received in the “welcoming” and “safe zone” from “kind staff”, some of whom have been employed at the site since it was established.

“We do have a lot of housing issues in the Millicent area and people can visit the centre to access services and payments or even just obtain some emergency food supplies – it’s great that ac.care has been able to continue the service in the town for 20 years.”

Mrs Lambert said the centre was extensively supported with diverse donations, including food from Millicent supermarkets and restaurants, together with contributions from service clubs, Wattle Range Council and the broader community, to increase its impact for vulnerable people.

She said the longevity of staff service demonstrated their commitment as they embraced ac.care’s mission of providing support for country people to have safe homes, enough money to live on and strong, positive relationships.

ac.care chief executive officer Shane Maddocks said local people providing local services was vital to identify and deliver community needs.

“ac.care is incredibly proud of the service that has been provided to the Millicent community over the last 20 years,” he said.

“Our dedicated staff team with over 80 years of experience serving this community continues to provide a range of services, often saving people a 100km round trip to Mount Gambier – it is important people can access local services close to home, particularly when we know there are limited transport options.”

Wattle Range Council member John Drew said the work of organisations like ac.care supporting the community was vital.

“You just have to look around the centre and you can see what they provide to help people who are battling and those who just don’t have access to a bank or need help with

Rabbit control measures

LIMESTONE Coast landholders are urged to implement rabbit control measures as ideal breeding conditions and an abundance of food has fuelled population growth in some areas.

Maintaining pressure on rabbits each year improves farm productivity, reduces food resources for foxes and feral cats and helps protect remnant native vegetation and wildlife habitat.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board Landscape Officer Saxon Ellis said the damage caused by rabbits to both primary production and infrastructure can be devastating.

"A single pair of rabbits have the potential to breed and multiply up to 180 rabbits in 18 months under ideal conditions," Mr Ellis said.

Although summer is usually the ideal time to start a control program, rabbits can breed year-round in the southern Limestone Coast region due to readily available food sources.

"The rabbit control tool box needs to be well stocked with tools and determination to make an impact on the rabbit population," Mr Ellis said.

"There is no stand-alone method to control rabbits," he added.

"The best approach to managing rabbit populations is through a coordinated rabbit control program utilising a variety of rabbit control methods such as spotlighting to find your problem areas, targeted poisoning and follow up warren destruction."

Options available for landholders can include trail baiting with poison 1080 oat bait, poison pindone oat or carrot bait, fumigation, biological control with Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus (RHDV) and warren destruction.

Landholders have the option to purchase and introduce rabbit calici virus to their rabbit population and this can be achieved by lacing oats or carrots or by injecting and releasing an infected rabbit in a population (if you can catch one).

Landscape Officers from the Limestone Coast Landscape Board are located throughout the region and can support landholders in planning their rabbit control program, including supply of baits and bait-laying equipment hire.

"We encourage landholders start planning their late summer rabbit control with 1080 or Pindone now as the demand for baitlayers can be high," Mr Ellis said.

An important consideration is to plan rabbit control with your neighbours where possible as this can achieve the most significant reduction to the rabbit population, be more cost effective and provide less likelihood of fast reinfestation.

Baiting at least twice a year during early spring and again in late summer is optimal.

Farming expected to surge

ACCORDING to the Federal Government, Australian farmers are propelling the agriculture sector towards anticipated new records in this financial year.

"These are achievements to be truly proud of and show how strong the agriculture sector is despite the uncertainty of recent years.

"We're supporting farmers all the way as part of our Ag 2030 plan to help the agriculture sector work towards its \$100 billion goal by 2030."

Firearm licences now featured on app

FIREARMS licence holders, will now be able to view their licences digitally on the mySA GOV app.

Members of the public can currently access driver's licences, proof of age, and boat licences and a number of other licences and digital passes on the app.

Firearm licencees will be able to view their valid licences such as individual, dealer and collector under the same account.

There are also a number of other security features on the app.

Firearms licences can be validated by another app user by scanning the barcode (the

same functionality as offered by drivers and other licences).

This will be a particularly useful feature for firearm dealers to perform with licencees.

The standard mySA GOV security feature of "shaking" the phone to show an overlay of the date and time over the licence photo is also available which verifies that the user is displaying the licence through the app rather than a screenshot.

In addition, the app is encrypted and protected by a mandatory PIN with optional fingerprint security making it a secure and convenient feature for firearms licencees.

Those with a valid firearms licence will be able to add their licence to the app.

Additionally, if an existing licence that a user has added already to the app is suspended or cancelled an error message will appear on the bottom of the licence.

This will ensure that the barcode cannot be validated.

Officer in Charge Firearms Branch, Superintendent Billy Thompson says this additional feature on the mySA GOV app has been through user testing experience to determine that the feature is simple to use and he is confident that this provides an extra layer of protection and convenience for the handling and storing of licences.

"Physical firearms licences will still be issued, however digital firearms licences will now be another means of providing evidence of firearms licence status.

The mySA GOV app provides a secure and easy platform to store licence information online.

It also allows for real-time information so any changes to a licence will be reflected on the digital version the next time the user accesses the app," Superintendent Thompson said.

Superintendent Thompson also said that the new feature will assist police and other authorised officers when validating firearms licences.

"The quick and easy nature of the app means that firearms licencees will be able to

quickly and conveniently provide evidence of the legitimacy of their firearms licence," Superintendent Thompson said.

A MOUNTAIN OF A CAR

EVEREST, the highest mountain on Earth, is subject to constant change at the hands of the forces of nature. Similarly, the eponymous Ford sports utility vehicle has had several updates since its introduction to Australia in 2016.

Everything about the sports utility vehicle – radiator grille, rear end, guards and wheels, even badging – was designed to make the SUV appear as big as possible.

At close to five metres long, more than two metres wide and almost two metres tall, the dimensions also made for a spacious and versatile cabin capable of carrying up to seven occupants and gear in relative comfort.

The seven-seat 4WD wagon came in three variants – Ambiente, Trend and Titanium – priced from \$54,990, plus on-road costs, topping out with the Titanium at \$22,000 later. The mid-range Trend cost \$60,990.

The MY19 upgrade took on a new-generation powertrain, which included a bi-turbo, four-cylinder diesel engine, mated with a 10-speed automatic transmission; and a raft of the latest safety systems and convenience features, as well as a five-year unlimited kilometre warranty and further service benefits.

The Trend bi-turbo enjoyed only a small rise in pricing over the preceding single-turbo model. Now, in front of a completely redesign for 2022, the Everest, sports a new grille and premium technology, with the Trend 2.0-litre four-wheel drive, on test, leading the way at \$62,390, plus on-roads.

STYLING

Ford Everest's rugged appearance have all variants holding ground with any rival. The Trend scores features such as 18-inch alloy wheels and running boards, while the square shaped rear of many traditional SUVs is replaced by Everest's sculpted tail lamps, with integrated LED lighting.

Trend is further switched on with HID headlamps with auto levelling function, LED day-time running lights, plus hands-free power lift tailgate.

INTERIOR

The cabin is a genuine seven-seater. Flexible second-row seats have 60 / 40 split, and power-fold third-row seats with 50 / 50 split, can be folded flat, providing 2010 litres of versatile cargo space with a class-leading payload of up to 750 kg.

Joining the features for Trend are leather accented seat trim (third-row occupants miss out), leather trimmed gear lever and eight-way power driver's seat with manual lumbar support.

Boot space in the seven-seater is a claimed 249 litres with all seats up and in use; 876 litres with the third-row seats down; and 1796 litres with the second row down.

INFOTAINMENT

Standard Trend features include Ford's SYNC 3 multimedia system with Apple CarPlay and

Android Auto, an 8.0-inch full-colour touchscreen and 10-speaker audio system,

The high resolution 8-inch colour touchscreen in the Interior Command Centre is one of the easiest on the market to view and operate. The up-to-date design of the instrumentation cluster, which incorporates dual 4-inch colour screens, is a competent companion.

An AM/FM/CD audio system with DAB+ digital and 10 speakers is augmented by AUX/iPod/ USB/SD card input ports. Voice control works with simple commands for many vehicle and convenience systems and emergency assistance connects drivers with emergency responders in a serious collision.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The bi-turbo diesel engine in the Everest Trend is puts out maximum power of 157 kW at 3750 rpm and top torque of 500 Nm between 1750 and 2500 revolutions.

The package adds a ten-speed automatic transmission and has the option of rear or four-wheel drive.

SAFETY

With a five-star safety rating the Trend pre-collision assist and pedestrian detection with the autonomous emergency braking system and traffic sign recognition.

There are seven airbags, including driver's knee airbag. Dynamic stability control with roll stability control, ABS anti-skid brakes with electronic brake force distribution, traction control and emergency brake assist are con-

stantly active when on the move.

Parking is made easy with the use of a rear-view camera, plus audible sensors front and rear.

DRIVING

The bi-turbo diesel motor, which pumps out 157 kW of power and a fat 500 Nm of torque (10 kW and 30 Nm more than its predecessor), pushing the big SUV to new heights.

Overtaking on the highway, for example, is only a matter of easing the accelerator pedal forward and the power needed is presented smoothly, making the sometimes ticklish manoeuvre a breeze.

Gone is the fiddly old-style ignition key; replaced by push-button engine start / stop and new gear shifter.

Fuel consumption topped 12 litres per 100 kilometres in mixed traffic conditions and 6.5 litres per 100 kilometres on the open road.

Unique five-spoke 18-inch alloy wheels and sleek side panels emphasise on-road character, while generous ground clearance (225 mm) and 800 mm wading depth get the Everest ready for anything off the bitumen.

Shortcomings – short being the operative word – rest with the rear seats, the third row, when in use, offers little head room for an adult making more than short journeys a chore. Getting in and out is quite a step up too.

However, occupants have the advantage of dual zone climate control and more than 30 stowage spots totalling 48 litres (the glovebox

can take a 16-inch laptop), while sound insulating materials and active noise cancellation technology make for a quiet cabin.

SUMMARY

Despite no longer being an Australian vehicle manufacturer, Ford maintains a large cohort of designers and engineers Downunder This goes a long way to giving Aussies what they want in the Everest range, a fact destined to be emphasised with the release of an all-new model next year.



Escape to the country

In the new drama series *Under the Vines* Rebecca Gibney stars as a Sydney socialite who inherits a vineyard, but all is not what it seems. The actress tells **Danielle McGrane** about the joys of filming this charming show.

Rebecca Gibney felt really at home in her latest role. After years of working in Australia, the actress made one request for her new show *Under the Vines*: could it be made in New Zealand?

"Our lovely creator Erin [White] started this show in South Australia, and when I said I really want to be closer to home this year because of COVID and because it's my son's final year of exams, she got on a plane and did a tour of Central Otago and they found a vineyard," Gibney said.

"We've run-down the house and the art department has done things to it, but it was very much there, like a set just waiting for us to get there."

The decision to film in New Zealand really paid off - the vineyard was perfect for the show and they managed to film while the country was in a COVID-free period.

"We were at level one which is nothing. So we filmed from February to April and it was like COVID didn't exist," she said.

"There was no social distancing, we didn't have masks, we ate together, it was beautiful. It was summer. And you can see it when you watch the show you can actually go 'Wow, this is like pre-COVID times', because it was COVID wasn't here."

It all adds to the fantasy, because this show is all about escapism.

The story centres around a vineyard in New Zealand.

Gibney's character, Sydney socialite Daisy, has inherited it from her stepfather. Little does she know, he's also bequeathed it to his nephew Louis, played by British actor Charles Edwards.

The vineyard itself has seen better days so in order to sell it, the pair have to work together to get it ship shape.

Louis is a dour British lawyer while Daisy is breezy and, by Gibney's own description, a bit "ditzy".

"They're a total odd couple, they've got nothing in common," Gibney said.

"They're polar opposites and I think that's probably why it works. Their relationship continues to evolve over the course of the series."

Edwards, who is known for his work in TV shows such as *The Crown* and *Downton Abbey*, very quickly became a great on-screen partner to Gibney.

"It's probably the first time in a long time that I've walked onto a set with another actor and we've instantly just hit it off," she said.

"We were making stuff up and by the end of it we were in sync, we knew exactly what the other

one was going to say or was thinking. It was just a joy, he's so joyous to work with."

In fact, she even brought him home to meet her family.

"He came and spent five days with the family over Easter and hung out with the dogs and helped my son Zach with his short film so it was just a joy, it was wonderful," she said.

"And Charlie adored New Zealand, the only thing was his partner couldn't come out because of COVID, but he absolutely loved it."

The actress takes pride in putting her country on the map and showcasing it in this series.

"Where we filmed, it's not what you'd imagine because there's all these rocky outcrops and it's quite harsh, but then you come to these beautiful green valleys," she said.

"The thing about New Zealand that I think a lot of people don't realise is that you can drive for about 10 minutes and the

countryside will alter completely. You'll go from these incredible mountains to amazing plains and river valleys. It's phenomenal."

While the story takes place close to home, the character couldn't be further from Gibney herself.

"She's a little bit ditzy, she's a bit flaky," she said.

"I think she thinks she's happy, it's only when it's pointed out to her that she's not happy that she realises she's actually not that happy."

"The first thing we see of her is that she's getting a face lift because she thinks that's going to fix everything. But it's not going to fix it, she actually has to come to terms with stuff and come to terms with ageing. Daisy does not want to age, she wants to be the female version of Peter Pan."

She's also a little bit delusional when it comes to what life on this vineyard is going to be like.

"I think Daisy thinks it's going to be like that movie *Under the Tuscan Sun* and it's going to be all big hats and dresses and it's going to be fabulous," she said.

"But when she finds out about what you have to do to run a vineyard... well it's just phenomenally hard - the harvest, and frost fighting."

However, Daisy does manage to look fabulous and sashays onto the vineyard in one particularly memorable white suit.

"Some of her wardrobe was actually my own clothes," Gibney said.

"That white suit I inherited from a fashion shoot. It's a Carla Zampatti and I never wear it. It sits in a wardrobe with a lot of stuff that I inherit from beautiful shoots and they never get used. So I actually said to the creator, 'I've got half the wardrobe. I've got it because I never wear it. I live on

30 acres where I'm always in gumboots or jeans."

Gibney has brought so much of herself to this role. And while she loved being back on home soil, she's still happy to travel for other shows including the recent *Back to the Rafters* and her stint in *Celebrity MasterChef*.

"I'll keep going back. I love Australia and my best friends in the world live there," she said.

But for the meantime, she wants to take the audience on a journey to her beautiful country in *Under the Vines*.

"I just think it's joyous and heartfelt," she said.

"It's a show to sit down and have a glass of wine and escape for 45 minutes into another world, because that's what it is."

Make sure your balcony is up to scratch to ensure your friends and family's safety this festive season.

Maintain your balcony

WITH summer now here, South Australians with balconies are being urged to make sure they are safe, before welcoming friends and family to visit.

Building and construction experts are warning homeowners to regularly check and maintain any balconies at their properties as more people visit over the warmer months. Balconies can be a serious safety risk if not properly built and looked after. Before having visitors come to your home, it is important to ensure that your balcony is structurally sound and can safely hold the weight of your guests.

It is important to be aware of the load capacity or total mass your deck or balcony is designed to carry.

If your balcony is overloaded with weight, and combined with poor maintenance or damage, there is a risk of further damage to your home as well as injury to your family and friends.

Timber balconies can be impacted by insect attack and decay while concrete balconies can be made unsafe when concrete cracks and flakes, or when reinforcement corrodes, often due to moisture.

Balustrades are often made of

various materials such as concrete, steel or timber and need to comply with building regulations and standards. Simple things such as re-tensioning tension wire balustrades, checking and tightening fixings and treating signs of corrosion greatly improve the long term safety of balustrades.

Homeowners should look for signs of wear and tear or moisture ingress due to poorly installed or deteriorated waterproofing treatments on their balconies.

Warning signs to check for include:

- puddles of water at the base of posts
- puddles of water on the deck or balcony surface
- rotting or loose balustrades and loose or rusted brackets and bolts
- cracked concrete or signs of leaning
- cracked or weak mortar in brick structures
- dislodged brickwork or masonry

A correctly designed and maintained balcony should take these risk factors into account, but owners and tenants are urged to carry out visual inspections yearly to protect themselves and their guests. Most well-maintained timber balconies should




last for at least 20 years, and a well-maintained concrete balcony should last for 40 to 50 years.

Anyone wanting to replace or build a new balcony or deck must make sure it is designed and constructed

legally, which means applying for a building permit and having the balcony appropriately designed.



Roses lasting longer inside

WE love summer season, with all the colours and fragrances that fill our gardens.

Many people ask us what they can do to enjoy their roses inside the house as well and to make their cut roses last longer. By following a few simple tips your roses and flowers arrangements should look great in a vase for at least a week, sometime even more.

1. Cut your roses from plants that have been well watered the days before. Stressed plants will produce flowers that lose their petals more quickly.
2. As soon as you cut the roses - ideally before the sun's first rays have struck the plant - put them into a full bucket of water. Leave them to soak up as much water as possible over six hours.
3. If you're trying to make rosebuds open up more quickly, add one tablespoon of sugar into every litre of water.
4. Fill the water in your vase always to the very top, and then change the water daily. This will prevent bacteria building up in the water.
5. You may also be able to track down a professional preservative called Chrysal, to prevent bacteria building up in the water. It's possible to source this online as well as from florists, and it's well worth the trouble of buying a small container to keep on hand.



Bee-line to the coast as boaties, anglers enjoy fabulous weather

FISHING

THE weekend across the Limestone Coast was absolutely fabulous weather-wise.

The sun shone and the wind was light, so plenty of anglers made their way to the coast.

There are lots of reports coming through to me already from the weekend, which is always a good sign.

Offshore anglers made the most of the weather late last week and headed out in search of bottom fish.

Most did very well.

I saw some nice gummy and school shark caught from the 60-100m depths, along with some terakhi, snapper and big leatherjackets.

We are still waiting for a spell of really good weather so we can hit the shelf and chase blue eye and hapuka and it looks like from next weekend, we should be good to go.

Surf fishos have found some nice fish over the past few weeks.

Gummy sharks have been awesome locally along Piccininni and Browns Beach, while

school shark nudging that 20kg mark have been on fire up around the Beachport area.

There has been some nice salmon caught this week.

Along Carpenter Rocks and into Canunda NP there are fish to 2kg being caught - and after dark.

I am hearing chit chat of a few school sharks in around the same areas.

There has been a bit of everything this week.

I have seen snapper, whiting, elephant shark and even a couple of smaller mulloway landed recently, so there is plenty on offer right along the South East beaches.

Speaking of whiting, what a season so far.

I have heard countless stories of fishos finding both big fish and big numbers in all the usual hot spots.

That being said, it is not just the hot spots that have been producing.

Plenty of anglers have fished reefy and broken bottom for snapper and sharks and picked up the odd cracker whiting - most of those bigger fish are well over the 50cm mark.

The average size for the breakwater fish

has been great this year too, with plenty of those solid samples over the 40cm mark.

There has been some nice fish caught land-based this week, with Cape Douglas, Nene Valley and Blackfellows Caves all fishing well.

There have been a few good reports from further up too.

Beachport, Robe, Cape Jaffa and Kingston are all fishing well in the sand holes out the front of each town.

Squid numbers are steady again this week.

Boaties have found nice fish from the Port MacDonnell breakwater through to Livingstons Bay.

The jetty fishos have done well from the Port MacDonnell jetty of an evening and a few have come from down on the Beachport jetty too.

The shimano flashboost squid jigs have still been the most consistent, but the other quality jigs out there are still picking up their fair share too.

Adrian Finch flicked a few jigs around in Kingston over the weekend and found a nice mixed bag of calamari and cuttlefish on a few

of his home made custom jigs, a great effort out of the kayak.

Garfishos have started getting a few more fish this week after a bit of a quiet spell.

Cape Douglas and Livingstons have fished well for both land-based and boaties.

Other land based areas worth having a crack at the moment have been the Petrified Forest at Port MacDonnell, the sheltered side of Blackfellows Caves and in around Carpenter Rocks.

With the calmer weather on the way, plenty of anglers are starting to gear up for a bit of sweep fishing.

Sweep are reef dwellers, so getting near them when there is a bit of swell on is hard and can be quite dangerous.

The rig to use is very similar to what you would use chasing whiting, although I know some guys who will use a float to keep baits up and out of the weed.

Whatever works for you is the best way.

On the table, sweep are fabulous and on the hook, they are even better.

They never say die and are tough fighters.

Until next week, safe fishing.

'No jab, no play' Covid policy soon

AS of January 2022, a 'no jab, no play' policy will be implemented by Bowls SA for competitions across the state.

In response to the South Australian Government's recently implemented Covid-Ready Plan and following extensive consultation with associations, clubs and players across the State, the Bowls SA Board endorsed the policy.

It comes into effect from Monday, January 10, 2022 and will make it a mandatory requirement for anyone involved in the delivery and participation of all association pennant competitions and Bowls SA events, including State events and training courses, to be fully vaccinated.

However, the mandating of a no jab, no play policy for individual clubs is a decision which is up to each club and how they wish to proceed.

Bowls SA Caretaker CEO Taryn Sexton said the decision was not made lightly.

She said the policy had been discussed extensively in recent weeks.

"Following discussions with associations and the feedback we received from our State-wide survey, it was clear to see that there was a strong preference for such policy to be put in place," Sexton said.

"We embrace the opportunity to be a leader in the South Australian sporting community and show how much we value the health and safety of our players and volunteers, who are mostly part of a very vulnerable demographic."

Finally Kimmy breaks clear

MORTLAKE trainer Peter Crawley would have hoped for another 732-metre event at Tara Raceway last Sunday for his dour stayer Mick's Kimmy.

But as things turned out he was happy enough to settle for being able to cross the border for a second consecutive week and gain a start with his daughter of Barcia Bale x Mick's Angel in the Swallow Drive Meats Mixed Stake over 600 metres.

Subsequently, after being handy throughout from box one in the five-dog field, the fawn bitch finished too strongly for Tracie Price's long odds-on Whole Way when winning by 2 3/4 lengths in 35.32 seconds.

The comment Mick's Kimmy was a much better dog than her three wins from 72 starts was not lost on Crawley who previously had enjoyed success at Tara Raceway with Zuma Creek and Bomber Creek and who, in 2016, had reached the final of the Mount Gambier Cup with Fluke Of Fantasy.

"The fact that we haven't been able to get over here on a regular basis for close to two years certainly hasn't helped her cause," he said.

"Today's win was actually Mick's Kimmy's first anywhere this year.

"Her last win had been in December 2020 when she was successful over 512 metres at Tara Raceway."

For Crawley, who has had the July 2018 whelping in his kennels since she was 10 months old, the win continued a 10-year successful relationship he has enjoyed with Victo-

rian owner Faye Craig.

"Faye also owns Mick's Kimmy's dam Mick's Angel who raced against many of the top stayers including Fanta Bale, Rippin' Sam, Bogie Bekim and Burn One Down," he said.

"She eventually won 12 races and something like \$85,000 in stakemoney."

Mick's Angel actually won her last race at Tara Raceway - on Mount Gambier Cup day in March 2018 - when she defeated Cryer's Plugger over 732 metres for Hopper's Crossing trainer Allen Meyer.

When Meyer was later asked what had prompted him to venture to the Mount Gambier track for the first time he replied he had been tired of getting his head kicked in on Melbourne tracks by Fanta Bale.

Mick's Kimmy's win was the second leg of a double for Crawley after Cryptic Signal had been successful in the previous race.

This was his best day at the local track since Drogheda County and Easter Orchid won on December 22 two years ago.

A \$23 chance after having been out of the winner's circle since July, Cryptic Signal led all the way to defeat Simba by 1 1/2 lengths in a personal best time of 23.24 seconds in the Gordon Refrigeration Stake (400m).

The son of Barcia Bale x Pink Shoelaces' racing career kicked off at Tara Raceway 12 months ago when the 36 kilograms brindle dog was successful over the now-defunct 277 metres distance in 16.34 seconds.

Off is by Fernando Bale out of Made First who raced on 100 occasions for 10 wins, 30 minor placings and \$40,000 in stakemoney.



DOWN here in the South East, we have been aware for some time of the deeds of young Jacob Opperman since he started his riding career in April last year.

His talents received further accolades following the awards night for the South Australian Apprentice Academy held in Adelaide on Monday night.

Opperman was crowned Dux of the Academy as a result of his incredible 2020-21 racing season which was highlighted by his five winners at Morphettville on June 12 and the success he had on the Lee Creek trained Royal Mile.

That puts him up in the lofty heights of previous winners such as Jamie Kah and Dwayne Dunn who went on to become household names in racing.

To top off the night, the 18 year old also received gongs for the best winning strike rate and also the most winners in the calendar year by an apprentice in South Australia.

CREAM OF THE CROP

Success for the Alyce Finnis stable shows no signs of abating, with the Mil Lel based trainer claiming her biggest triumph last Saturday night.

That was at Globe Derby Park in Adelaide in the Group 2 \$50,000 final of the Southern Cross series for two-year-old colts and geldings.

While it came as no surprise the Finnis stable won the feature event, it was the outsider of her two runners in the race who came up trumps.

It was generally considered by punters there were only three main chances in the race following the two heats the previous week, namely the Finnis trained Art Jester (\$2.15 fav.), the Naracoorte trained Jawsoflincoln (\$3.20) and the Adelaide youngster Cobber (\$5).

The rest were all \$10 or better, including the Finnis trained Ever Hoping who had run third in his heat, beaten just over two metres.

Husband/driver/stable spokesman Jayson Finnis had the choice of drives and opted for Art Jester who had drawn the pole, while Adelaide reinsman Wayne Hill was entrusted with the drive behind Ever Hoping.

"Both had worked very well during the week running similar times, and I chose

Art Jester as he had drawn the pole and I hoped to get a good run in behind the leaders," Jayson Finnis told The Border Watch on Monday.

"Art Jester has the quicker sprint while Ever Hoping is more dour.

"We were looking for a driver for our other runner and I got Wayne Hill who had been trying for 20 years to win a Southern Cross series final."

While Finnis got the run he desired for the first lap and a half with Art Jester, things went pear shaped thereafter.

Jawsoflincoln set a scorching pace out in front but compounded quickly with 600 metres remaining and dropped out, momentarily dragging Art Jester back with him.

Enjoying life back in the running line mid-field was Ever Hoping and Hill timed his run to perfection in the final half lap.

As much as \$20 was bet about Ever Hoping, and he prevailed narrowly over another runner at double figures (Major Lincoln) with Art Jester using the sprint lane to grab third spot in the final few strides.

"I knew with 100 metres that victory was out of reach for Art Jester and I looked across and could see that Ever Hoping was going to get up and win," Finnis added.

For a young country trainer to have first and third in a Group 2 final is quite remarkable and, not surprisingly, celebrations went on in Adelaide until the early hours of Sunday morning.

As for the immediate future for Ever

Hoping and Art Jester, "we are working that out at the very moment," Jayson Finnis confided.

"We may even look at the possibility of going to Shepparton next week (Tuesday, December 14) for heats of the Vicbred series."

BORDERTOWN FIRST CAB OFF THE RANK

The summer period will see four cups run in the Limestone Coast and half of those are at Bordertown.

Our northern club kicks off the major cups for this season down here on Sunday with the Bordertown Cup program and will also host the Summer Cup in late January.

Penola stages the time-honoured Coonawarra Vignerons Cup meeting on Thursday, January 13 then it is Naracoorte Cup day on Sunday, February 6.

It will be good to have a local race meeting this Sunday with a crowd and plenty of atmosphere, as attendances at Limestone Coast meetings so far this season have been poor since Covid-19 restrictions were lifted.

Perhaps our clubs can learn something from western Victorian clubs, with last weekend a classic example.

Stawell raced last Saturday and attracted nearly 2,000 people (it was not cup day), while the Penola meeting last Friday would have been lucky to lure 300 people.

Even allowing for hot conditions this Sunday, Bordertown officials will be hopeful of a 1,000-strong crowd as the younger generation normally support Bordertown cup day very well.

While there are no standouts among the nominations for the Bordertown Cup, it has attracted an even field.

The Tatiara faithful will bank on the local stayer Wings Of Pastrami giving trainer Jeff Searle his first home-town cup success since Border Rain won it in successive years (1998-99).

If Wings Of Pastrami can return to the form she showed as a three year old (including a win at Flemington), then the Bordertown Cup is hers for the taking.

The Belinda O'Loughlin trained Runbro has burst on the local staying scene with two easy wins recently and he will be one of the favoured runners should O'Loughlin back him up from last Friday's Penola meeting.

Well accustomed to winning local cups is the Jaensch stable and Bronski (a Nara-

coorte Cup winner in 2020) has good recent form with a last-start win at Gawler to his credit.

Trainer Peter Hardacre is yet to win a Bordertown Cup and has the Mount Gambier owned Sebonna nominated, a winner of two of his last three starts and could improve on his last-start fourth in the Clare Cup where he appeared to struggle to handle the undulating circuit.

DRURY LED THE WAY

Last Friday night's local harness meeting was dominated by driver/trainer David Drury with two out of the three winners.

It was easy pickings for Drury in the opening event when Sweet American defied a betting drift (\$2.80-\$4.60) to lead all the way while the heavily-backed favourite Burning Hot (\$2.80-\$1.90) missed the placings.

Drury's double was achieved in much harder fashion in the NR 40 pace when Forever Bettor (\$2.90-\$4.20) had a short half head to spare from Smart Play.

The Stylist won first-up last campaign and repeated the dose for trainer Terry Glynn when driver Jason Glynn used the sprint lane effectively to narrowly pip the favourite Noosa Beach in the final race.

NEW LEADERS

A treble to apprentice Jacob Opperman and a double to trainer Michael O'Leary were the highlights from racing at Penola last Friday.

As a result, both have catapulted to the top of their respective Limestone Coast premiership leaders, Opperman moving from third and O'Leary leapfrogging from fifth.

The Lee Creek trained Wild Willy (\$3.70-\$4.80) continues to dominate local racing this season and his win in the 1300-metre BM 68 handicap was his fourth on Limestone Coast tracks this season.

O'Leary's first winner Four Outlaws (\$7-\$11) was responsible for a remarkable turnaround in form, as the gelding was a long and distant last at Hamilton the previous start.

"He swallowed his tongue at Hamilton and his run there was best forgotten," O'Leary explained.

Eye catching efforts came from Damascus Moment, an easy five-length winner of the 1100-metre BM 62 handicap and the promising Picaroon (\$2.10-\$1.50 fav.) who had the Class 2 handicap won a long way from the judge.

WHILE traditionally par round competition is often not the most favoured event to play in, there might be a new-found love among at least 20 of the players who fronted the starter on Saturday at the Blue Lake Golf Club.

They all scored better than their handicap, with Justin Ploenges the best with his outstanding +9 a clear winner.

The 17-handicapper did not set the world on fire early, opening with four halved holes before his first plus on the easy par 3 fifth hole.

This opened the gates with another three pluses to see out the front nine.

He also managed to add an astonishing five more pluses from his 38 off-the-stick to be a runaway winner by four in the Jens Hotel sponsored event.

A count-back was required first off in A Grade to separate the smooth-swinging Steve Jelly and the hard-working John Millhouse after both finished on +2.

Jelly, who is in hot form at the moment and has reaped the rewards of a textbook style, held on for the win thanks to his much-improved back nine of +3.

Having wiped two holes on the front nine, Jelly could be excused for feeling a bit wobbly with -1 to his name.

It did not take long for his game to settle into a good rhythm, reeling off birdies on the 11th and the 15th holes to go along with his four pars to finish +2.

Millhouse tried valiantly to extend his recent birthday celebrations but could not quite catch Jelly.

An up-and-down day saw Millhouse turn square with his handicap, with some impressive golf over the back nine.

Playing off a handicap of six in par competition can be like trying to paint between the lines for Tim Bates with just the slightest hiccup having dire results.

Bates opened with four straight pars to give him a boost but a disappointing bogey on the fifth hole, as well as further bogeys on the seventh, eighth and ninth undid some of that good work, seeing Bates turn square with his handicap.

With some halved holes through his inward nine, Bates added a his only birdie for the day on the 17th to finish +1 to round out the podium.

Normally in par golf a score of +5 should be enough for an outright win but for club secretary Stephen Smith he had to survive a count-back to just take the win in B Grade.

Smith had just one wipe on the front nine for a +2 and after a birdie on the 11th hole he

would have been eyeing off an outright win.

Unfortunately, he gave that straight back on the 13th hole but claimed the win with three pluses over the last five holes.

Former club captain Matt Jennings was on target early with birdies on the second and fifth holes, for +4 after five holes.

While he could not maintain that momentum he still turned with +3.

The halfway break must have agreed with him as he opened par, par birdie on the back nine to set up a tilt at the main prize.

A couple of those pluses were wiped off his scorecard through the closing nine holes but a +2 was enough to see him finish in a count-back.

Graham Burke is one of those quiet, unassuming golfers who often slips under the radar but he turns in a good round of golf each time he steps onto the course.

Having seen his handicap creep under 18, Burke was going along quietly but then exploded towards the end of his outward nine with four pluses over the last five holes to turn +3.

While he could not quite match that over the back nine, it was a clear example of what sort of golfer he is capable of.

The good scores continued in C Grade with Mario Mancuso building a winning

score of +5 thanks to his regular pars through the round.

Mancuso is one of golf's gentlemen who lets his game do the talking and on Saturday he certainly did that, with runs of successive pars leading to splits of +2 and +3 to take the win.

A break from golf and a holiday in the Apple Isle did Alan Stewart the world of good, coming back refreshed and eager.

It certainly showed early, opening with four straight pluses including a birdie on the second hole.

Fatigue got to him at the end of both nines, giving shots back, but he still had an admirable day with +3 for second place.

A name which features regularly in the prize list, Ken Milsop, took third place thanks to his +2 on the front nine.

His round was highlighted by birdies on the fifth and 15th holes to finish with splits of +2 and zero.

While it was mainly B and C Grade players who made up the list of ball winners, all players managed to take home a prize, including David Gould, David Johnston, Barry Humphries, Richard Evans, Simun Lalich, David McKenzie, Trevor Gartside, Cory Davis, Robert Martland and Martin Markiewicz.

Monthly Medal wraps up

MOUNT Gambier Golf Club member Patrick O'Donnell is in the best form of his life at age 49.

He followed rounds of 73 and 74 off the stick on consecutive Thursdays, neither of them quite good enough to win, with another one-over par round of 73 to finally claim victory in Saturday's monthly medal with a score of net 67.

Playing off a six handicap, O'Donnell, who started playing at age eight and has never shot an even-par round of 72 at Attamura, said the only thing he could put his finger on for the purple patch was his putting.

"I changed my putter a few months ago, tried a slightly different grip and I've been consciously trying to hit my putts with softer hands," he said.

"But apart from that I really don't know it's happened.

"I'm definitely playing my best golf ever."

On Saturday he was one-over par after his first three holes following a par, bogey, par start, but made a timely birdie on the par 4 fourth hole.

The long hitter needed only a 52 degree gap wedge for his approach shot, making no mistake with the flat stick from about 10 feet.

The rest of the front nine was solid without being spectacular, making the turn at one over par 37 after making bogey on the par five seventh and pars on the other four holes.

His back nine did not get off to the start he wanted, missing a par putt from less than four feet on the par 3 10th hole and then having to take a penalty drop on the par 5 11th after spraying his second shot into the hazard off the right side of the fairway.

Those two bogeys saw him drift out to three-over par, but he bounced back with birdies on the 12th and 14th holes, the latter after a difficult downhill putt from about 25 feet.

Four pars on the way in saw him finish three shots clear at the top of the leaderboard,

the only player to shoot under 70 net among the 118 strong field.

That gave him the final monthly medal for 2021 and victory in A Grade from Trent Eitzen, who took second spot on a count-back from Ross Bond.

Tony McGregor won B Grade with a net 70, one shot ahead of John Miles and in C Grade Peter Jones signed for a net 71, one clear of Neil McKay.

Meanwhile in Thursday's stableford competition Gordon Bignell had everyone talking after posting a blistering 48 points, one better than the previous best score of the year recorded by Ben Maxwell back in February.

Playing off a 15 handicap, Bignell shot an even-par 36 off the stick on the front nine for 26 points.

The highlight was a four-point birdie on the third hole after hitting his approach to about four feet.

The remaining holes on the front were not perfect, but he managed to get up and down for pars on the fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth holes, leaving his playing partners in awe of his recovery work around the greens.

It was hard to match those heroics on the back nine, his 22 points pedestrian by comparison.

But that still equated to a fantastic three-over par 75 off the stick, not quite the best score he has ever posted, but certainly the best for a long time.

His 48 points was six better than runner-up Roger Gulin, who was ahead of Bignell after the first nine thanks to an amazing 27 points.

Not surprisingly he could not keep up that pace, managing just 15 more on the back nine.

Other noteworthy efforts were turned in by O'Donnell whose 74 off the stick was the best round of the day (for 39 points), while 95-year-old Neil Richardson continued his good run in recent weeks with another 39 points to finish in the top 10.



Change of pace and ride for racer Skeer

CHANGE is on the horizon for Furner motorcycle racer Dallas Skeer.

Skeer has competed in the Australian Superbike Championships as part of the Australian Supersport category on his trusty Suzuki 600cc machine but a new Yamaha R6 now sits pride of place in his shed ready for next year's season.

It came on the back of a tough weekend at The Bend Motorsport Park, where bike issues had Skeer behind the eightball from the outset.

A coolant leak forced Skeer into the pits during practice on Friday, which the team attempted to fix by a change of radiator from the spare bike.

However, once back on track the issue persisted, with a blown head gasket the culprit.

It was a disappointing start to the final round of the championship.

"We didn't get much track time on Friday," Skeer said.

"I had some lap times in my head I knew I had to get to be competitive, so we were a fair bit off the pace on Saturday for qualifying.

"We ended up qualifying in 11th which was the worst qualifying since my first season in the class.

"We knew then we had a bit of work to do."

Despite the setbacks, Skeer was on the pace, with an eight place in the opening race, before backing up for sixth in the final race.

It meant a fifth place overall for the season, with just three rounds run, which Skeer was pleased with, all things considered.

However, even on track bike issues contin-

ued, which helped the final decision to change manufacturers.

"We struggled with position but showed we had some pace," Skeer said.

"I couldn't quite get the bike to go where I wanted to on track - we had a few handling issues so we just rode to what we could to finish the year off.

"It would have been good to be in the top five where we usually are but we are happy we stayed on the bike and we didn't do anything we didn't need to."

Doing what he needed to do was enough to set some fast laps, with his best a 1.56:778, his fastest lap around The Bend.

"It is a hard lap to get a quick lap around The Bend because there are so many corners and you have to get them all right," Skeer said.

"If we had a good setup I know I could have gone quicker but that is two seconds quicker than last time I was there two years ago.

"That would have put me on the podium last time I was there."

As for the change of manufacturer, Skeer said it was simply required to remain competitive and push for a championship.

He said the Suzuki was older technology, while the Yamahas had recently been upgraded and were the fastest in the competition.

"We were looking to maybe do some state title rounds, do a few wild card ASBK rounds or buy Yamahas," Skeer said.

"But if you wanted to buy a Yamaha 600 it would have to be a second hand one because they aren't bringing any new ones in until February."

That all changed on Sunday afternoon when an offer was made on a championship-winning team bike.

It was the second bike in the team that won the championship and has completed just two laps which should provide everything Skeer needs to have a serious tilt at the championship next year.

"This has everything you want on it ... there is nothing we need to do at all," he said.

"Just sitting on it I fell more comfortable so this should give me the ability to win."

Having ridden the same model bike previously, Skeer knows what to expect.

Now it is a matter of seat time on the new machine and the hope Covid-19 will not affect the season as much as it did this year.

"I have ridden one before around Mac Park and the engine is definitely quicker than what we have," Skeer said.

"The last couple of years the development of the Yamahas have really come forward.

"We have shown I can be top four fighting for podiums, so this will get me there.

"We will do as many laps we can at Mac Park but others as well like Winton, Tailem Bend and other tracks we will be racing at.

"We will do as many laps as we can, get familiar with the bike and see how we go."

Time is on Skeer's side, with the opening round of next season set down for late February, 2022.

Rather than just sit back and wait, Skeer is keen to prepare and look to capitalise on a competitive piece of machinery.

"I have high expectations for next year," he said.

"I know the bike is capable and I have proved I can be competitive.

"I am looking forward to the first round at Phillip Island next year."

Further Pioneers sign-ons

IN another confidence building signing for the OneFortyOne Pioneers 21-year-old centre, Olivia Wormald has committed for a further year.

This important signing comes on the heels of OneFortyOne recently committing to continue as major sponsor of the Pioneers women's program for another two years.

Head coach Matt Sutton was happy with the news Wormald was returning for the 2022 season.

"Olivia has been an important part of our basketball community since joining us in 2019," Sutton said.

"Liv will have an important role in our group in the new season, she has been working hard on further developing her game to be ready for season 2022."

In 2021, Wormald averaged just under 17 minutes court time each game but shot over 52 percent from the field with almost three rebounds a game.

Success continues at Murray Bridge

DANIEL Pestka added to his recent Sprintcar success on the weekend with a win in the A Main feature at Murray Bridge Speedway.

Driving the Stark's car out of Port MacDonnell, Pestka had to hold off some tough opposition in the Dare to Double event, as he greeted the chequered flag ahead of Matt Egel and Brad Keller.

In fact, it was almost like a who's who of the sport in the state, with Ryan Jones in fourth, followed by Steven Lines, Glen Sutherland, Mark Caruso and Lisa Walker.

The Dare to Double option was not taken by either of the front row drivers in the feature race and with such a tough field, it was not unexpected.

In order to take advantage of the option, the pole driver - Keller - would have to start at the back of the field and finish second or better to claim the extra prize money.

Keller did not take the option so that left the call to Pestka from second place.

He also passed and the race went on as per the original starting grid.

Pestka said he was pleased with the result, with 410 Sprintcar races hard to win at the

Murray Bridge venue.

He also faced other issues throughout the night, with a lack of brakes almost derailing his run.

"We ended up losing brakes in the first heat so we were under the pump to get going for the second one," Pestka said.

"It was good to get the win because there were a few good cars there.

"South Australia is pretty good for that and any one of the top drivers could have won."

Out of the box the car was on the pace, with Pestka setting the fourth-fastest time in the time trials.

From there he managed a second place in his first heat, despite the lack of brakes.

In his second heat Pestka started out of seventh and worked his way up to second behind Sutherland in what was an inspired first lap.

"The second heat was what really won me the night," he said.

"I got a good start and got around most of the cars before the first turn really.

"I almost had Glen but not quite and as the race went on he got going."

With 30 laps to run in the A Main feature race, another good start was imperative, which Pestka achieved with style from the

front row of the grid.

"I started off two, got the lead straight away then led from there," he said.

"I did a good job in traffic luckily which is not always easy for me.

"The lapped cars were up high on the track so I just had to dive-bomb them.

"Matt Egel was right there really - not within attacking distance - but if I was held up he would have been on me."

Pestka prevailed and chalked up another win for the Limestone Coast team in what is shaping up as a successful season already.

The next outing will see the team cross the Victorian border to compete in Max's Race at Warrnambool on December 18.

As the team continues to gel and with the improvement in the car, it is one meeting Pestka looks forward to.

"James (Stark) is doing a better job with the car each week really," he said.

"We aren't changing that much at the moment, just getting the little things better, the shocks really.

"I can feel the little things at the moment which means we are pretty close.

"The car is a bit better than what it was last time at Warrnambool at Easter, so I am keen to get back there."

Club president Cary Jennings said it was disappointing but there was little that could be done.

"A lot of Victorians can't cross the border because of the restrictions - they have to isolate until a negative test comes back," he said.

"Because of our location, that could be anywhere from 12 to 18 hours, so if they come on a Saturday, they can't race.

"There is one driver coming over on Friday so he can race and a couple out of Portland.

"We have lost probably 16-17 drivers from Victoria due to the Covid restrictions.

"It is a very difficult time for people trying to organise events."

Despite the disappointment, the meeting is set to go ahead, with the speedway fraternity rallying to ensure an entertaining night of racing.

Support categories will now include Classic Hot Rods and Formula 500s, along with a handful of Street Stocks from the Limestone coast region.

The Wingless Sprints will certainly go ahead and with 35 drivers, there is sure to be plenty of action.

"The likes of Rory Button, Kirby Hillier and Mitchell Broome would think they can get on the podium and they are a chance," Jennings said.

"They will all do three heats, a B main and an A Main.

"SA 1 and former Australia 1 Joel Chadwick will be here and Rory Button has won the Australian title before, so he will be keen to take a state title home."

The Classic Heavy Hot Rods will include some of the old speedway cars of yesteryear.

Jennings said they were basically old Chevrolets and Fords which raced from 1956 through to 1990 before regulations changed.

They range from Renmark-based to Mount Gambier, with three entrants from the Blue Lake city to provide some local interest.

The Street Stocks and Formula 500s will not boast full fields but Jennings said they would provide plenty of action for spectators on the hill.

Jennings said the night showcased the desire of committee members and competitors to see speedway continue unabated through the remainder of the pandemic.

"There are a couple of committee members who push hard and a couple of drivers have rallied around," he said.

"This could be part of the future - we don't know what Christmas is going to bring or the Kings Challenge.

"I am proud of our club members and the speedway community, to ensure the patrons who come to support us each meeting have something entertaining to watch.

"Even though Covid has affected us and we might not have a lot of people in each group, they will put on some racing we can be proud of.

"I think we will have a real good night of racing."

Racing will kick off as usual at 5pm.
