Hub privatisation

MOUNT Gambier City Council's plans to privatise the operation of the Wulanda recreation hub are well advanced and existing businesses are concerned that the playing field won't be level as ratepayers may be subsidising it.

Council chief executive Sarah Philpott revealed to The Border Watch last week that council was in the process of finalising a contract with a private operator for the \$57.5m facility.

Mount Gambier privately owned sporting facilities are concerned that the private operation of the hub will result in unfair competition.

Squashbrook Fitness and Leisure owner Simon Brook said he was concerned about the recent development due to an already flooded

"I believe the original recommendation was not to put a fitness facility into the centre, however that has changed," Mr Brook said.

"I think that is done to try and find a way to fund the massive losses that will come from running a large aquatic facility.'

Council has previously estimated that the running cost of the hub would be \$1.4m each year. Mr Brook said, despite the community originally "screaming" for an indoor pool facility, the centre has now developed into a large community centre.







Pioneers remain hub loyal

AFTER calling the Icehouse home for 34 seasons, the Mount Gambier Pioneers remain committed to transferring their games to the city's up-and-coming sporting centre.

The \$57.5m Wulanda Recreation and Convention Centre will be the new home for the basketball giants with president of the club Tom Kosch remaining firm on the transfer.

Mr Kosch said the club was excited to be transferred to the new facility and players were happy for the opportunity to play in front of 1500 spectators.

It comes following a question presented to Mount Gambier City Council during this month's meeting by Cr Paul Jenner.

Cr Jenner questioned whether there was an expected signed guarantee between council and sporting associations to use the facility.

He also questioned costs associated directly with sporting associations and costs for the community to enter the facility.

Council's chief executive officer Sarah Philpott said discussions regarding the costs for the centre would come to fruition once an agreement had been made with the centre's operator.

Mr Kosch said despite the controversy regarding the hub, the Pioneers would move to the newly developed centre and hoped it would also entice state-wide teams for pre-season.

"The Pioneers hold an important position in our region in regards to basketball and we are hoping to work with whichever party operates the centre," Mr Kosch said.

"We are also happy to negotiate the leasing of the facility for when we need it as ideally we would use it for team training, individual training and home games.



"We would also love to have some Friday and Saturday night games throughout the coming season."

He said in regards to revenue, the club would also be willing to work with whatever revenue streams would become available.

"Ticketing is important to us as it is the lifeblood of our basketball club as well as sponsorship," he said.

"We do need to be able to maintain our rev-

enue streams as best as we can and although we don't have any concerns around sponsorship I do think the opportunity of playing at the centre will be a positive step forward."

Mr Kosch said the club was also hoping to know about pricing sooner rather than later to allow for future plans to be put in place.

"We are also willing to work with whoever we need to so we can understand the costs associated with the facility," he said. "Playing at the centre will provide better access for people because of its location and the extra seating will allow us to provide cheaper ticketing and allow those who usually wouldn't be able to come to do so."

Despite the eagerness, council has not yet disclosed any further information regarding the opening of the centre nor the entry prices due to discussions remaining in place with a potential operator.

"There is already a big market presence of private enterprise in our industry so it is a bit concerning that the council's centre will also be privately operated," he said.

He said there are government requirements that council facilities are required not to unfairly impact private businesses.

"If the centre runs at a loss, council can just extract more funds from its constituents whereas, if we run at a loss, we go out of business, so I don't think we are on a level playing field at all."

Mr Brook said the private operation of the facility reflected a "lack of regard" for existing operators, especially for private enterprises across Mount Gambier.

"There will be a commercial rent arrangement for someone to come in and manage their facility, we don't know what that will look like and we don't know what will happen when they have decided on someone," he said.

"We do want to know what kind of facilities they are actually going to install and what they are going to charge because then, and only then, will we understand exactly what we are up against.'

Owner and operator of SwimSkool Mount Gambier, Vivienne Peate said there was also going to be an impact on her business as well.

"Obviously with a new facility there will be an impact on my business but how big of an impact is an unknown quantity until the facility is up and running," Ms Peate said.

"I haven't been contacted by the council with regards to the impact the centre will have on my business and I think the council would say that it doesn't have to do so.'

Ms Peate said she was not surprised to find out council had been speaking with private operators and it was her assumption that would happen from the beginning.

"All I can do is run my business to the best of my ability and offer the best product I can, whether it be swimming lessons, aqua aerobics, lap swimming or more and hope my customers remain loyal," she said.

Elected members discussed the management and operation of the centre in confidence during this week's monthly meeting.

Ms Philpott said council was in the final stages of negotiating a contract with an operator for the centre.

"This is expected to be concluded early in the new year and follows an extensive tender process and this information is in confidence due to its commercial nature," Ms Philpott

"Details regarding the operating model and entry fees associated with the centre are not available at this point in time and fees will be discussed further following the announcement of an operator for the facility."

ST MARTIN's Lutheran College student Agnes Doyle is one step closer to becoming a doctor after receiving the highest Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) score in the South East of 97.85.

Following the release of the much anticipated South Australian Certificate of Education results earlier this week, Ms Doyle said she was over the moon with her results after putting in her maximum effort throughout the year.

"I am so surprised with being the top score in the South East, and I wasn't expecting this outcome," Ms Doyle said.

"I thought my scores were good but there were tonnes of people in the region doing SACE and I was so happy to find out everyone in the region got really close scores which I thought was cool.

"Our scores here shows that regional kids can do well with their scores too which I think is great."

Ms Doyle said she had applied for a number of universities, including some in New

South Wales and Victoria.

"I don't know what my first preference will be, I am hoping to stay in Adelaide because I know the area, I am familiar with it and it isn't too city like," she said.

"However I want to keep all my options open for now."

As for the future, Ms Doyle said she was hoping to become a doctor and would study

medicine after a gap year in 2022.

"I am obviously very happy and proud of my results as I have put in as much work as possible to achieve as best as I can," Ms Doyle

"I am very proud of myself for really pushing myself this year and am really happy with the results."

Looking forward, Agnes said she was in-

tending to have a gap year before heading to the big city and studying medicine.

"I think being a doctor and working in that industry will be super challenging but it is also very interesting," she said.

"I believe it would be something that I am up to and would like to do as it is also very rewarding which I think there is a good balance of in the industry."

She said the competitive yet supportive school year has helped her further her education and achieve her scores.

"As for next year's Year 12 students, I think they should remember to manage stress as best as possible because I don't think I did and despite getting a good result, it still made it difficult," Ms Doyle said.

"If students are not stressing, they will probably get the best results they can get, so it is really important for them to go into exams with a level head.

"But it is also about enjoying the year with their friends because it may be the last time you see some of them for a long time."

REPRESENTING a record, 15,644 students across the State completed their South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) this year.

In the South East, Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) scores remained high for yet another year with St Martin's Lutheran College student Agnes Doyle taking out the top spot.

Agnes received 97.85 and said she wished to continue studying to become a doctor following a gap year.

Closely following Agnes at the college was

Jemima Puust who received 97.45 and Drew Baker with 90.35.

Mount Gambier High School's highest scoring student was Sarah Dally with 97.30.

Other high scorers at Mount Gambier High were Alana Menzel with 96.95 and Angel Aguinaldo with 96.45.

Ms Dally said she was shocked to see her score on Monday morning and was pleased with the results.

"I am very happy with my results, it has been a big year but now I am looking forward to having a gap year and travelling between Mount Gambier and Adelaide for training," Ms Dally said.

"I have a traineeship here at Mount Gambier High School doing the health and physical education position.

"As for university, I have applied to do a double degree in psychology and sport."

Grant High School's highest scoring student and second highest for the South East was Angus Langsmith with 97.55.

"I was in the car when I received a call from the school," Mr Langsmith said.

"They told me my results and I was shocked, I did pretty well throughout the year but didn't think I would get this high."

As for the future, Mr Langsmith said he would continue his traineeship with Water Solve Irrigation throughout his gap year before attending Adelaide University to study agricultural science.

"I have been looking forward to going to university, getting out and trying something different," he said. Other Grant students who scored highly included Rachael Kelly with 95.2 and Wil Scanlon with 94.9.

Tenison Woods College had eight students who scored over 90.

Highest of them was Tess Wight with 95.45 who said receiving the top score was not something she had expected at all.

"I went into this year doing my best and receiving the top score was a nice way of having my efforts recognised," Ms Wight said.

"I moved up to Adelaide soon after exams with my brother and am hoping to get into Flinders University.

"I had medicine as my first preference but that can be hard to get into so I might have to get into my second preference which is paramedicine. "I would be happy either way."

Other Tenison Woods students who scored in the 90's were Lachlan Clements with 95, Hayley Pearson with 94.40, Mykaela Thiele with 94.30, Alice Circelli with 94.15, Rajvi Purswani with 92.75, Charlotte Oliver with 92.35, and Isabella Kenny with 92.20.

Millicent High School's top scorer was Jemma Hayward with 81.8.

"I was happy because it was higher than a guaranteed entry into nursing," Jemma said.

"I was very surprised, it was a good morning."

While Ms Hayward will be beginning her studies in nursing next year, pursuing midwifery is the long-term plan.

"I have wanted to be a midwife since I was in year eight," she said.

"But the ATAR to get in is really high, so I will make a start in nursing first."

Kingston Community School student William Edwards received a high score of just below 95.

Bordertown High School student Lili Jaensch also received between 90-95.

Naracoorte High School also recorded a high score of 96.10.

Lucindale Area School's top student received a raw score of 89.2.

Kangaroo Inn Area School did not disclose their top scores, but principal Annie Matthews said she was proud of the outstanding effort the Year 12 students made in their studies.

Lobster on the menu

LOBSTER is on the menu this Christmas, as seafood stores in the Limestone Coast take their holiday orders.

Beachport, Port Macdonnell and Robe shopfronts are gearing up for the holiday rush, with some even offering online ordering for

Ferguson Australia is a seafood company established in the South East, operating across the state with exports around the world, their division Five Star Seafood runs a shopfront in Port Macdonnell selling local lobster.

Owner Andrew Ferguson said that at the current prices, more people may be able to enjoy a cray this holiday.

"We are hoping to see the demand increase for local lobster in the lead up to Christmas, Mr Ferguson said.

"At the moment, our concentration really is on the local market because we are expecting that to be strong at this time of year.

An underperforming prawn season nationally could mean that more people will be opting for lobster over the standard Christmas

"The price is not all that different now, so we are hoping more people may just go for the lobster," she said.

"It has become a lot more affordable, even when you are comparing the prices to something like steak."

But Limestone lobster has not always been available to the Limestone Coast locals, with some of the stores opening their doors for the first time in the last year.

A falling demand for exported Southern Rock Lobster lead fishers and businesses to turn their sights to a more local market.



Mr Ferguson said while exports have slowed, having the flexibility to sell lobster locally has been a silver lining.

"The marketplace is a completely different place to what it used to be," he said.

"It is good to see more of a local market.

"We offer some different types of seafood and lobster products as well, such as portioned lobster with butter ready to bar-

Ferguson Australia currently is selling their lobsters online, \$78 a kilogram for a whole cooked fresh or frozen lobster, and \$75 a kilogram for a whole live lobster.

Sky Seafoods in Robe currently has their cooked lobster for sale at \$65 for a lobster less

than one kilogram, \$75 for a lobster at one to one and a half kilograms.

The Lobster Pot in Beachport has been taking Christmas pre-orders, extending working hours to cater for the holiday demand.

The opening of the store in 2019 gave locals the opportunity to buy crayfish that was caught in Rivoli Bay for the first time.

No public holiday for Xmas Day

A FAILED attempt to have Christmas Day declared a public holiday has left its proponent, Mount Gambier MP Troy Bell, frustrated and disappointed for workers and employers.

In South Australian Parliament recently, Mr Bell attempted to gain an amendment to the Holidays Act in South Australia which declares that when Christmas Day falls on a Saturday the following Monday will be a public holiday instead of Christmas Day itself.

Under the Act, public holidays for the Christmas period this year are from 7pm to midnight on Christmas Eve (Friday, December 24) and then on Sunday (December 26) for Boxing Day, Monday (December 27) as the substitute day for Christmas Day and again on Tuesday (December 28) for Proclamation Day, but not Christmas Day itself.

Mr Bell's compromise was for the five hours of public holiday on Christmas Eve to be scrapped as a trade-off for Christmas Day to be declared a public holiday.

He said his amendment had the support of the Liberals but when unions rallied against the trade-off calling instead for the retention of Christmas Eve as a public holiday and the addition of Christmas Day as a public holiday, Mr Bell's proposal failed to gain the support of Labor and the Greens.

Mr Bell said the compromise would have only applied when Christmas Day fell on a Saturday, which only occurs once every 10 years.

"I think everyone who works on Christmas Day deserves to be paid penalty rates," said Mr Bell.

"If the unions gave up five hours on Christmas Eve, they would have gained 24 hours on Christmas Day, a net gain of 19 hours.

"They already get three and a half days as public holidays - I was proposing they have four full days - but they wanted four and a half days.

"In absolute good faith I tried to negotiate this compromise; I am frustrated and disappointed that the unions could not see that this was a fair and reasonable compromise.

"It's dead in the water now, Parliament has risen so there is no chance of any changes now - Christmas Day will not be a public holiday."

Crime prevention group for business

MOUNT Gambier police held their first Neighbourhood Watch meeting this week for businesses, following concerns about the prevalence of shoplifting.

Held on Wednesday night, business owners, managers and community members were invited to attend the discussions at the Italo Australian Club.

Following the discussions, the group of 11 business representatives in attended decided not to set up a formal Neighbourhood Watch program at this stage, but to continue informal discussions next year.

An informal group will negate paperwork and formalised roles while still being able to have consultations with local police, but will not have access to formalised support from a dedicated team in Adelaide.

Those present expressed their desire to formalise the group next year, after more interest from the business community was generated.

Neighbourhood Police Officer Constable Chelsea McKinnon said the meeting was set up to help facilitate a discussion between business and local police on strategies to curb

"I am hoping to link everyone in and keep everyone in the loop about what is going on for us," Cst McKinnon said. The meeting discussed the possibility of creating a private Facebook or WhatsApp group for business owners and managers to easily exchange information when incidents happen, or to share prevention tactics.

"For example, is someone did try to attempt to steal something from a store, they could get on the WhatsApp and share that information," Cst McKinnon said.

At the meeting, local business owners expressed a desire to learn more about prevention tactics, as well as education on the appropriate way to interact with shoplifters.

Police present at the meeting warned about inappropriate use of social media, such as publicly sharing images or videos online.

Cst McKinnon said as far as she was aware shoplifting was no more prevalent in Mount Gambier than other areas of the State. Intersport owner David Jones was one of

the business owners who voiced his support for starting the program and was in attendance on Wednesday.

"Shoplifting is very much a concern, at this time of year it can be huge," Mr Jones said.

"We try to tell our staff to be vigilant and watch people, but there is only so much you can do.

"It puts a lot of pressure on the staff as well." Mr Jones indicated he had caught people attempting to shoplift in the last week. Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce President Hayley Neumann said she had received concerns from members about whether local police have done enough to help curb the problem of shoplifting and are looking for a more proactive solution.

An earlier meeting on the topic helped prompt the new program, after a crime and safety meeting organised by the chamber was attended by 40 business stakeholders from throughout the community.

"There had been some shoplifting around town, and businesses were putting videos and information on social media about it," Ms Neumann said.

"We were concerned that there could be implications for the shop owners for doing that.

"We wanted to come together to discuss a solution, and while we had that meeting, SAPOL advised they were looking at having a Neighbourhood Watch program."

Ms Neumann said she is hopeful the meeting will lead to a more cohesive approach to the issue.

"Hopefully businesses have some resources against shoplifting, and a way to communicate to other businesses in the area," Ms Neumann said.

"It will hopefully help us keep an eye out for each other." $\!\!\!$

The next meeting will be held in February.

EDITOR'S COMMENT

THE privatisation of the management of the Wulanda Recreational Hub by the Mount Gambier City Council raises a number of questions regarding how council will ensure that private businesses are not adversely affected.

The public has been kept in the dark as council's deliberations regarding the private operation of the hub have been held in confidence.

The Local Government Act allows councils to hold discussions in confidence and the vast majority are justified.

Last week, council chief executive Sarah Philpott revealed to The Border Watch that council was in private discussions with a possible private operator of the hub.

By law, the justification for confidentiality is that the privacy reasons of the matter discussed in secret must outweigh the public interest to know what's being discussed.

Looking in from the outside, we know that council is considering the business model for the hub.

It's questionable on how a business model for a ratepayer owned facility can remain secret.

The hub's shareholders are the ratepayers of Mount Gambier and some of these shareholders will face competition from the private operators of the Wulanda recreational centre.

There are obvious questions like; will the private operator be paying a commercial rent, pay rates, electricity, all wages associated with the hub, to name a few costs that all other businesses pay.

A level playing field is required by law as South Australian legislation requires 'competitive neutrality'.

The principles of competitive neutrality are designed to prevent councils providing any net advantage, through its control, over a private business operating in the same market. Full transparency on any private sector involvement in the hub is essential.

We know from past comments from council that the hub is expected to cost about \$1.4m each year to operate.

It will be interesting to see what the private operator will be contributing.

Councillors decide to fly Aboriginal flag permanently

WATTLE Range Council will fly the Aboriginal flag outside its current Millicent office following a decision at its monthly meeting on Tuesday night.

The decision was made after representatives of Burrandies Aboriginal Corporation addressed the meeting and presented an Aboriginal Flag and a Torres Strait Islander Flag to Mayor Des Noll.

The deputation followed a debate on the subject at Council's November meeting which was prompted by an email from a member of the community asking why the Aboriginal Flag was not flown by Council.

At that meeting the email was received and

noted following a discussion which revolved around the subject being addressed in the future with the provision of additional flag poles to accommodate the Aboriginal and other flags at the proposed new Council offices.

On Tuesday night Burrandies Chief Executive Officer Robyn Campbell acknowledged that the Wattle Range Council flies the flag only during NAIDOC and Reconciliation Week and believed it was the only Council in the area that does not fly the Aboriginal flag permanently.

"I believe all councils in the Adelaide area also fly the flag," she said.

"The oldest boomerang in Australia was found at Wyrie Swamp here - so there is a significant connection.

"We have received numerous complaints

from the community and request Council to fly the flag," she said.

Mayor Des Noll submitted and moved a motion for Council to fly the Aboriginal Flag daily during business hours.

"If I were of Aboriginal descent, I would be extremely hurt and feeling excluded by my community with my people's flag not being flown and recognised by local government," said Mayor Noll.

Several councillors expressed surprise at the Mayor's argument as the Council had not decided it would not fly the flag.

"Last month I talked about having five flag poles - it was not that we did not want to fly it - just that it was a timing thing," said Cr Dale Price.

"I am a bit perturbed by the language be-

ing used, we do want to recognise Aboriginal contribution and we wanted to tie it in with the new offices."

Cr Price said maybe it was time to consider a new national flag.

"I have put a lot of thought into this and to some extent we need a new national flag that encompasses everyone," he said.

"I have no idea of the design but I think a new national flag that represents modern Australia is perhaps needed."

Mayor Noll's motion was carried with a majority vote.

Council has two poles outside its Millicent office which fly the Australian Flag and the Wattle Range Flag.

The Aboriginal Flag will take the place of the Wattle Range Flag.

More time for capsule

MORE time has been allowed for entries to a time capsule that is now expected to be resealed in April.

Originally created for Millicent's 125 celebrations 26 years ago, the time capsule was opened during Millicent's recent 150th celebrations when its contents were found to be in perfect condition.

Currently in the town's library, the time capsule was going to be resealed last weekend but this will now be delayed until April to give individuals and organisations further time to prepare new stories - be it family history or histories of local organisations and other information - for inclusion in the time capsule.

It is then expected to be resealed and stored until the town's 175th anniversary in the year 2045.



Councillor's paper bill cut

MOUNT Gambier City Council has decided not to reimburse \$12.70 to a councillor to cover the cost of printing a meeting agenda while on holidays.

Cr Paul Jenner made the formal request for reimbursement at council's meeting this week after attending a spur-of-the-moment virtual council meeting in July this year during a Covid-19 lockdown.

At the time of the meeting, Cr Jenner was on holidays and had submitted an apology for the meeting.

However, upon discovering that the meeting was to be held virtually, he requested to join the meeting and printed the agenda costing him \$12.70.

According to Council chief executive officer Sarah Philpott, Cr Jenner only had access to his mobile phone to read the agenda.

She said council's virtual attendance policy states the elected member must be both seen and heard to officially attend the meeting and that it was not possible for Cr Jenner to attend the meeting in this manner while reading the agenda on his phone at the same time.

Ms Philpott said this was the reason why Cr Jenner had to print the agenda and, due to the virtual attendance policy, she was not able to determine whether he should receive reimbursement.

"This is why Cr Jenner has chosen to present the matter to elected members," Ms Philpott said.

Cr Max Bruins said the reimbursement should not be paid due to elected members being provided with a laptop and allowances.

Each Mount Gambier City councillor receives an annual allowance of more than \$17,000.

Cr Christian Greco questioned why the matter was even being debated, with a majority of councillors agreeing with him.

Cr Frank Morello said the initial cost should be covered by Cr Jenner's yearly printing allowance while Cr Kate Amoroso reiterated the fact Cr Jenner had only a small device to read the agenda from.

The motion for Cr Jenner to be reimbursed the \$12.70 was lost with only Cr Amoroso voting for it.

Declaring a conflict of interest, Cr Jenner was not present for the discussion nor the decision surrounding the agenda item.

Mount Gambier airport expansion allowing for hangars

THERE is more room for growth at Mount Gambier airport, as recently completed taxiway upgrades will allow for more hangars to be built.

Completed last month, the project is part of the final stages in a busy time for the airport which has seen large renovations over the past three years.

Private plane owners lease land from the airport to build hangars along the taxiway, giving them easy access to use the runways.

Mount Gambier Airport Manager Ian Frit-

sch said the taxiway surpassed their original plans.

"Because of the grant we were able to bi-

tumise and weatherproof it, originally it was just going to be gravel," Mr Fritsch said.

"It will mean a better facility for those that use it."

And there may be more using it than originally planned, with demand for hangar spots far outweighing what was anticipated.

"We only thought it would be one for a while, but we have another one with three more still to go in," Mr Fritsch said. Grant District Council executive officer

Darrly Whicker said the upgrade will allow for the facility to continue to grow.

"A taxiway to enable transport from aeroplanes on hangars, that was achieved

through federal and state government funding," Mr Whicker said.

"They were installed to help the continued growth of the airport, and we have had good take up in interest in people developing hangars as a result.

"What it enables is ongoing growth of the airport, to attract more tenants and commercial operators to be able to build a hangar.

"You need that type of infrastructure set up, if you are going to attract people."

The upgrade was originally budgeted to be paid by council, but due to unplanned money coming in from grants, it will mean that other updates to the airport can now be brought forward.

Just over \$44,000 will likely be reallocated from the taxiway budget to the Airside Line Marking updates, as current markings are no longer in line with the most up to date standards.

"It is part of our preventative maintenance schedule, but the lines faded a little

bit early and there was a new manual of standards that was released," Mr Whicker said.

"Whilst we are currently compliant, if we start the painting we will need to come to the new standard."

Painting the runways and providing parking for the Royal Flying Doctor Service will be the priority over summer.


But the improvements may keep coming, with Mr Fritsch flagging hopes to add a freight section to the airport in future.

Shifting sand at Southend

AT a cost of \$40,000, work to replace sand eroded from Southend's foreshore is now complete allowing the beach to be reopened.

The beach was closed to the public following a strong storm in July which caused major erosion of the frontal dune at Southend.

Undertaken by Wattle Range Council, with the support of local contractor Bowman Earthmoving, the sand replacement work was funded by the Coastal Protection Board. Mayor Des Noll said: "It is wonderful that we have been able to address this issue prior to the busy summer period.

"These beaches are so important to both the community and tourists, so we are pleased to be able to undertake these works. "I would like to thank the Coastal Protection Board for allocating funds to allow Council to address this issue for the community.

"We acknowledge that this is only a short term solution and that we will require further decisions and a significant financial commitment to address the longer term issues of coastal erosion.

"In the interim, we are pleased that we have been able to reinstate this small but important section of our coastline," he added.

The next step will be for Council to discuss longer term solutions for coastal erosion with the communities of both Southend and Beachport that were recommended in a recent study of our local coastal environment.

MOUNT Gambier's In Home Hospice Care program is looking for male volunteers to help its clients, 75 per cent of whom are men.

The not-for-profit organisation was established last year with a \$149,000 grant from the State Government and, at the end of November, it was reported that volunteers had given 170 hours of their time to those in need.

Trained volunteers started to provide care in mid-August to local clients who made the decision to receive care and treatment at home rather than at a hospital.

Hospice care volunteer Craig Ferguson said he decided to join the program due to a personal friend needing palliative care in hospital.

"I had a friend who was in hospital and went through the process of dying," Mr Ferguson said. "I could see what palliative and inhome hospice care did for her and I could see what the family members needed as well."

Mr Ferguson added it was satisfying knowing he was able to assist those in need.

He said the idea of more men volunteering for the service would be a positive step forward and reminded the community it was available to all.

Fellow volunteer Kathy Griffen said despite her client being a female, she was also supporting her patient's husband.

"He is in need of male companionship and it is hard for the two of them," Ms Griffen said.

She said volunteers needed to be able to play it by ear, with patients constantly changing plans due to health issues.

Hospice manager Ms Sandi Elliott said three men trained in its initial group and community members interested are encouraged to contact the centre.

Petrol price crackdown

A BLITZ on rural fuel retailers will ensure petrol stations in South Australia's most loved holiday spots are complying with the state's real time petrol price monitoring trial in the lead up to Christmas.

Minister Josh Teague said Compliance and Enforcement Officers from Consumer and Business Services (CBS) would be undertaking spot checks, with a focus on regional areas.

"This blitz comes as South Australian consumers face high prices at the pump, just as families get set to pack up the car and head away for Christmas holidays," he said.

"Officers will be conducting unannounced inspections at petrol stations across the state, including popular holiday locations like the Eyre and Yorke Peninsulas, Limestone Coast and the South East," he said.

Minister Teague said motorists should consult a real-time fuel price app to make sure they're getting the best deal.

"Every dollar counts at this time of the year. Using an app that uses real-time data can help you hunt down a bargain at the bowser," he

"There are a range of apps available to help motorists choose the cheapest option such as Fuel Price Australia, PetrolSpy, MotorMouth, Pumped, SA Bowser: Should I Fuel? or the RAA App

"These apps use our real-time fuel price data, so you can rest assured knowing you're getting the most up to date price information," he said.

Consumer and Business Services Commissioner Dini Soulio said inspectors had con-

ducted more than 500 checks on service stations in both regional and metropolitan areas since the start of the scheme in March.

"Petrol stations have had plenty of time to get used to the new reporting system," Commissioner Soulio said.

"With Christmas just around the corner, we are now cracking down on those who aren't complying.

"CBS has issued three expiation notices, and more than 80 complaints have resulted in CBS issuing warnings to retailers following the detection of a suspected breach.

"Of these warnings, 25 complaints related to retailers in rural areas - so this issue isn't just restricted to metropolitan service stations," he said.

Commissioner Soulio said the public had played an important role in keeping fuel retailers accountable.

"CBS has received more than 440 complaints since the scheme kicked off - and 108 of those relate to rural retailers," he said.


"We're very thankful to South Australians across the state for continuing to raise issues of non-compliance with us," he said.

The SA Fuel Pricing Information Scheme requires retailers to update their price information to a central aggregator within half an hour of posting it. Those who fail to comply could face penalties up to \$10,000.



AdBlue supplies on the way

NATIONAL Farmers Federation Chief Executive Tony Mahar says the Federal Government and suppliers have provided advice that there is sufficient supplies of the diesel additive, AdBlue.

"The NFF issued a mayday call to Government after concerns were raised about an Ad-Blue shortage due to a limited supply of urea," Mr Mahar said.

"We understood there was already up to six weeks of AdBlue on hand in Australia, and we have been assured new supply has been secured from a wide range of sources including Indonesia and the Middle East. Local supplies are also being boosted.

"This now must be business-as-usual in terms of AdBlue supplies on hand, noting its very short shelf life.

Greater certainty around supply is a relief to farmers who are harvesting a record winter grain crop and to the greater supply chain, which is operating at full capacity ahead of Christmas.

Mr Mahar said the AdBlue concerns had reiterated the need for an industry-government advisory board on critical supply chains (beyond the AdBlue issue) and the imperative to invest in the development of improved domestic manufacturing capabilities for key inputs such as fertiliser and chemical.

"For the past 18 months, farmers have been on a rollercoaster of angst fueled by uncertainty of access to the plant protection products, fertilisers and machinery they need to get the job done.

"We cannot leave these issues to chance anymore, we need our best and brightest from industry and government to anticipate and scenario plan for any potential imminent or future supply chain disruptions and build contingencies to ensure our industries and the Australian economy can withstand such headwinds."

Mr Mahar also noted the 'tremendous'

news today that Incitec Pivot Fertilisers (Incitec Pivot) had acquired a majority stake in Australian Bio Fert Pty Ltd (ABF) and would build Australia's first largescale plant to develop and deliver a new category of sustainable fertilisers for Australian farmers.

"This is just the sort of development Australian agriculture needs more of to reduce our dependency on imported inputs. The NFF congratulates Incitec Pivot, under the leadership of President Stephan Titze, on its vision, investment and commitment to advancing

the interests of Australian farmers."

'We hope, aided by the Government's Modern Manufacturing Fund, to see a whole lot more home-grown manufacturing ventures established, ideally in regional Australia," Mr Mahar said



PALISADE ALLROUNDER

BY DEREK OGDEN, **MARQUE MOTORING**

BELIEVE it or not, there are some people who wish to maximise vehicle seating capacity without being held hostage to the LCV-like people mover or rugged off-roader.

These folk need look no farther than the Hyundai Palisade, a sports utility vehicle capable of carrying up to seven or eight people.

Now, with a name in the origins of a paling fence or line of lofty cliffs, the Palisade, for 2022, is taking up more ground by the addition of a third variant – the Elite – dividing the entry-level Palisade from the range-topping Palisade Highlander.

All siblings come with petrol, or diesel power in two- or all-wheel drive.

Available as a seven or eight-seater, the Elite features a 10.25-inch touchscreen multimedia unit with satellite navigation and 12-speaker Infinity Premium sound, heated front seats a single panel glass sunroof, rear privacy glass, a power tailgate and wireless smart phone charging. LED lights are positioned front and rear and 20-inch alloy wheels complete the look.

The entry-level Palisade 3.8 GDi petrol 2WD is priced at \$55,000, plus on-road costs, the similar Elite chipping in at \$61,500, while the range-topping Highlander 2.2 CRDi diesel AWD sells for \$75,000.

On test was the Palisade Highlander 3.8-litre GDi, four-cylinder petrol, eight-speed automatic, front-wheel drive, eight-seater SUV.

Despite old-style design, side on, the Palisade carries its almost five-metre length well, with wagon-like proportions doing nothing to trouble, or excite, the discerning eye.

New to the big SUV are body-coloured bumpers, with 20-inch so-called Calligraphy alloy wheels fitting in nicely. Oh, and there is a full-size spare under the rear.

INTERIOR

In eight-seat configuration, the Palisade has plenty of room up front. While the third row, which is sold as a three-seater, falls short of adult dimensions, it is relatively easy to gain access, the second row sliding forward up to

However, seat backs in the second and third row need quite a tug to raise or lower manually. And both back rows in eight-seat versions have a 60:40 split, so it's not as easy to carry long items when the outer seats are in use.

Boot volume is 311 litres with all three rows in position, which increases to 704 litres with two rows in use. Towing capacity of 2200 kg is nothing to write home about.

Seven USB ports, four 12V sockets and up

In addition to the previous beige and burgundy surroundings, the Highlander now offers optional black Nappa leather without a price increase.

INFOTAINMENT

Palisade has an Infinity premium audio system, access to Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, plus wireless smartphone charging, and seven USB points scattered around the cabin.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The Palisade upgrade continues with the choice of a 3.8-litre V6 petrol engine, with two-wheel drive, or 2.2-litre turbo-diesel, with all-wheel drive. Both are mated with an eightspeed automatic.

SAFETY

Advanced safety technology includes radar cruise control with stop-start, lane-keeping assist, rear cross-traffic alert, and blind zone warning with intervention.

There are stress minimising cooling air vents for all three rows and head protection comes from curtain airbags covering all three rows of seats. There are three IsoFix child seat positions, meaning five seats nominally could be fitted, but it would be a squeeze.

DRIVING

With such a big vehicle, fuel consumption becomes increasingly linked to the loads being carried. Hyundai says 10.7 litres per 100 kilometres is the average for the Palisade in the combined urban / highway cycle.

With all eight seating positions taken, the test vehicle tipped petrol consumption over 12 litres per 100 kilometres in a mix of town and country conditions.

While other eight-seat SUVs are based on a heavy-duty four-wheel-drive 'ladder frame' chassis, the Hyundai Palisade is built like a car.

That means its centre of gravity is lower and steering and suspension should be more like the average passenger vehicle. Travelling in stop-start city low-speed conditions, this is

Sharp cornering at speed is a different matter. The big unit needs a deal of due care and attention to keep it on the not-so straight and narrow. A lesson soon learnt.

Turning circle, at 11.8 metres, for a vehicle of this length, is surprisingly taut and the width (a tad under two metres) means the car can handle the average shopping centre parking spot with room to spare. The backside, however, does tend to stick out into the aisle.

Drive modes - Comfort, day-to-day driving, eco fuel saver, sport spices up things, and smart switches on to algorithms turned to the driver's most recent behaviour patterns.

All Palisades are covered by Hyundai iCare, the company's leading customer care program, offering owners a lifetime service plan, five-year unlimited kilometre warranty, complimentary roadside assist for 12 months on



new vehicles, 1500 km complimentary first service, a dedicated Customer Care Centre and myHyundai, an exclusive website.

Customers using Hyundai servicing also receive roadside assistance for up to 10 years, 10 years of sat nav updates and more.

Drama close to home

As Five Bedrooms returns for a third season, actress Katie Robertson talks to **Danielle McGrane** about what her character Ainsley has gone through and what's special about this show.

here's been a lot of life imitating art with the show Five Bedrooms.
Take actress Katie Robertson for example.
As season one of the show ended, she realised she had more than a little in common with her character Ainsley.

"I actually fell pregnant at the end of series one so when we were filming the episode where Ainsley finds out that she's pregnant and tells Lachlan [Hugh Sheridan], that same week I found out that I was pregnant," Robertson said.

Luckily, the real-life timing worked out well for the actress.

"We finished filming, which was good because I was starting to feel sick and then I had a year off so I managed to have my son George, and then we went back and started filming season two when he was about 11 weeks old," she said.

For most of the season, Robertson was able to bring George on set to take care of him while he was still a small baby.

"I was lucky that Kat [Stewart, her co-star] had paved the way before me because she had both her children while she was filming Offspring," Robertson said.

"She just came to me with all the advice that she had figured out so I had a lot of support from her.

"And the whole production wanted it to work for me so they scheduled breaks every three hours. We had a little nursery set up in one of the trailers and he became this set baby. At lunch time I'd say 'Where's George?' and he'd be in the make-up bus with the girls or with the caterer. He just became a part of the crew."

Robertson has really been tested emotionally on *Five Bedrooms*. In season two, her character Ainsley goes through a stillbirth and the actress felt those scenes were one of the greatest challenges of her career.

"It doesn't get much more harrowing than that," Robertson said.

"But it was written so beautifully. I remember different members of the crew would walk out of the trucks at lunchtime and have tears down their faces, everyone was so instantly affected by reading this episode so it felt like this privilege."

As a new mother, she accessed a lot of real emotion to film those scenes.

"I think having George, my emotions were so raw and everything was on the surface so as an actor I was so open." she said.

"I could go into work, do what I needed to do and then go home and cuddle my healthy, happy baby. I was really careful to not take home anything that wasn't mine, that was Ainsley's story and so many



other women's stories, so my job was to tell that story as well as I could and then go home and be really grateful for what I had."

In season three, Ainsley is in a much better and stronger place than she was in the first season. She's in a relationship with Simmo (Johnny Carr) and is a more confident version of the character we first met.

"Ainsley has what she thought she always wanted, which is that big love and romance," Robertson said.

"She really was searching for that, and she's found that, but it maybe isn't quite what she expected. And particularly since she lost her baby Evie I think a lot of her dreams have changed and evolved.

"Old Ainsley had this really optimistic and idyllic view of the world and I think those rosecoloured glasses have been shattered through everything she's been through and I think she's dealing with that."

But she's come a long way, not just because of what she's gone through but because of the people around her – her four housemates played by Kat Stewart, Doris Younane, Stephen Peacocke, and Roy Joseph.

"If you look at Ainsley in season three compared to where she was in season one, it's such an evolution and a maturing," the actress said.

"I think that evolution is down to several factors. There's the The whole concept of the show is that these five people who barely know each other buy a house together. It's a great premise for a show, but also a novel way of navigating a tough housing market.

"I think it's really relevant," Robertson said.

loss and the grief that she's been through, there's no way that hasn't affected her world view on a cellular level so that's there. But also these people who are in her life, and them showing up for her and their influence. I think she feels the most comfortable in herself that she ever has."

"My husband and I are trying to buy a house and we've realised we've been priced out of most areas we'd want to buy in. So I think it's a very real option for first home buyers to get into the market. It's a really valid way to go. Is it that far a jump from renting and having a house share with other people?"

While Robertson hasn't bought a house with her castmates, she says there is a sense of kismet to their casting

"What I love about this show is that they're totally different people and we are also in real life," she said.

"We're so different and at such different stages in our lives yet there's just something that bonds us. There's a real respect and genuine enjoyment of each other's company. I think it was luck and the casting people got it right in our case. Because it could also go so badly."

But she's hopeful that there are many more seasons of *Five Bedrooms* to come.

"I really feel we are not done with these people," she said.

"We've just got so much scope and there's so many more stories that these characters can explore that I think are relevant, but also just funny and entertaining. We're just hitting our stride now and the writing just gets better each season."

Having won the Best Actress Oscar as Queen Anne in The Favourite, and both a Golden Globe and Emmy for her turn as Queen Elizabeth II in Netflix's The Crown, you'd be forgiven for thinking there wasn't much ground left for immensely talented Olivia Colman to cover. Bob 'Bongo' Starkie Skyhooks show live

THE guitarist with one of Australia's most loved bands, Skyhooks, will be entertaining the audience at the Sir Robert Helpmann Theatre on January 29.

Bob 'Bongo' Starkie will keep up the Skyhooks' music alive while he performs the classic 70's tunes.

Mr Starkie was inducted alongside his band mates into the ARIA Hall of Fame in 1992, cementing Skyhooks' legacy as one of Australia's finest acts ever.

Skyhooks formed in Melbourne in '73, acquiring their flamboyant lead singer Graeme 'Shirley' Strachan a year later, the

band would end up touring and recording for nearly 30 years.

Now as a celebration of Skyhooks' legacy, Mr Starkie has put together a new band with the intention of keeping the group's music alive.

After sold out shows in Melbourne, Adelaide and Sydney, Mr Starkie's Skyhooks show hits Whyalla in January delivering all of Skyhooks' hits, plus some rarities.

This occasion will mark the first time in almost 40 years, since Mr Starkie last performed in Mount Gambier with Skyhooks.

New exhibition hits Port Mac

CHRISSY Pudney's most recent artworks of 2021 will be showcased at the Port MacDonnell Community Complex until early next year.

Ms Pudney's primary intention in the new work is to explore the potential of sourcing items and materials which have already exhausted a purpose.

This includes beach debris, ghost ropes and bailing twine which have all featured in the creations.

Many of the pieces exude an air of both beauty and sadness with human-created rubbish both accidentally and deliberately finding its way into waterways and oceans.

Ms Pudney combs the beaches for the marine litter with only a small portion of what she finds making it to the final artwork.

"It is such a feeling of satisfaction after the process of gathering, cleaning, sorting and creating," Ms Pudney said.

This exhibition is the culmination of periods of work throughout the past twelve months, both here in the Limestone Coast as well as on her travels to Queensland and back.

She also has featured a collection of new ceramic pieces created whilst camping in the Central Highlands of Queensland.



Surf fishos had a fair bit of wind to contend with on Saturday evening, but those who fished through it managed a feed.

Snapper from the beach have been excellent this season and being able to take one home for a feed has been nice too.

There is still the requirement to log your catch with PIRSA but the process is quite simple.

There has been a handful of gummy shark

caught this week off the beaches and they have been spread out from Piccinninni through to Browns Beach, Nene Valley, Carpenter Rocks and Canunda.

Salmon have been in fairly good supply again this week.

Fish to a couple of kilos have been landed by lure and bait fishos across the Limestone Coast, so it is great to see anglers still targeting them in the warmer weather.

I have seen some stonking fish again this week, some of the bigger examples over 55cm, which is an absolute beast of a King George, but also many of those perfect eaters, the 38-45cm fish that we love down here.

There has not been any secret this year - they are right where they should be.

Sand holes on the edges of weed beds any-

where along the coast have been productive and the land-based guys are also getting in on the action.

Off the rocks at Blackfellows Caves, or along the beach at Carpenter Rocks, you will not be far from the action.

Garfish have been back on the menu this week

Some nice fish from Cape Douglas and Livingstons Bay have put a smile back on the faces of anglers again.

Size is still impressive and even if the numbers appear to be down, the size makes up for it.

There have been some nice gar caught inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater too boaties and the jetty fishos - just get some burley happening and they will pop up.

There have been a few nice mulloway caught in the Glenelg River this week.

The hot spots have been the bottom of Taylors Straight and up at the Rose Caves but keep the sounder on and see where they are.

The Glenelg River Angling Club held its last competition before the Christmas break over the weekend and although there were no mulloway caught by club members, there were plenty of bream and some nice perch.

Youngster Evie Cram picked up her first bream over the weekend and the smile on her face in the picture tells the story of how proud she is.

Hopefully we see the fish start to spread out a bit more over the coming weeks so we can all get down and have a crack.

Looking forward to this weekend, it looks like it is going to be fishable early, before wind and swell picks up on Saturday afternoon.

Hopefully it is not as bad as the forecast reads, but we will wait and see.

At home under the roof the Blues enjoyed the conditions where they played Port Mac-Donnell and were able to secure an 86-62 win.



"Later named Bungaloo Sunset, she did finally get it together at Tara Raceway though and eventually won seven races.

"As it turned out, the 2015 Christmas Cup was won by Fear The Rascal, also a son of Fear Zafonic out of Shannah's Star - a litter sister to

"I figured Bungaloo Sunset might be worth a litter.

"So after much pedigree study I came up with the lightly-raced stud dog called Pure Titanium who won six races and still has relatively few pups on the ground."

Later, Little whelped the litter in June 2019 and reared the pups at Kongorong before breaking them in at Tara Raceway.

"I have to say, they've turned out to be a bit of mixed bunch," he said.

"Bungaloo Anne has now won 11 races at Tara Raceway this year and has been by far the most successful.

"And a win in this week's Christmas Cup final with Bungaloo Anne would certainly cap off a terrific year for us.'

Meanwhile, Little reports he will soon commence breaking-in 22-race winner Springvale

Alysa's first litter for the syndicate.

Whelped in October 2020, the three dogs and three bitches are by Fabregas.

Early Christmas present

THE time for receiving Christmas presents is still just over a week away but try telling that to some members of the Mount Gambier club on Penola Road.

Their Christmas gift came early for 18 of its members last Sunday afternoon when the locally-owned and trained Sebonna won the biggest race of his career so far.

Sebonna (\$3.60-\$4-\$3.70) won the \$31,800 Bordertown Cup over 2000 metres to make it six wins from 16 starts since joining the Yahl stable of Peter Hardacre in early 2020.

That solid winning strike rate is a far cry from the gelding's first start for Hardacre at Penola in April last year when Sebonna stayed in the barrier stalls and took no part in the race.

The now-promising stayer was formerly trained in New South Wales by Kim Waugh, wife of former Aussie star cricketer Mark Waugh.

"I went to a Melbourne Cup luncheon at the club a few years ago and Peter Burchell came up with the idea for some members of the club to become involved with racing a horse," Hardacre explained.

"In the early days when he stayed in the barriers, we wondered what we had here as he was petrified of the riders and very anxious.

"He has always had a bit of quality about him and we were hopeful of him running a big race in this year's Naracoorte Cup back in February but he hurt a leg in the week leading up to the race."

Regular rider Karl Zechner had the mount at Bordertown and a near-perfect ride saw Sebonna power to the lead at the furlong pole and win running away with 1.8 lengths to spare.

"The Bordertown Cup win qualifies Sebonna for a start in the \$102,250 final of the Southern Speed series to be run over 2,000 metres at Morphettville on Boxing Day," Hardacre added.

"That will determine his immediate racing future and, should he measure up, Sebonna will continue racing in Adelaide.

"Short of that, he will return to the South East and be aimed at some local cups such as the Coonawarra Cup at Penola next month and then the Naracoorte Cup in early February."

Zechner can be expected to retain the ride on Boxing Day but a new jockey will have to be found for Sebonna in the new year.

While the South African born jockey has had increasing success here, he is relocating to Queensland for family reasons.

Zechner ended the day at Bordertown in a blaze of glory by riding the last two winners, including a ride-of-the-day effort aboard But Beautiful.

It was a memorable day for the five owners of Sebonna who made the trip north as they were feted by Bordertown officials after the cup and celebrations are tipped to continue tonight at the Mount Gambier club when the cup trophy goes on display.

CUP FIELDS A WORRY

While nothing can be taken away from Sebonna's splendid victory in the Bordertown Cup, the size of our open class cup fields continue to be a worry for local racing administrators.

Three scratchings on race morning meant only five horses fronted the starter in the Bordertown Cup.

Back in February, the Naracoorte Cup had just four runners and recent Mount Gambier cups (if you can recall back that far) have been very light on numbers also.

Sebonna upset the chances of a home town cup victory with Tatiara trained gallopers (Shock Alert and Wings Of Pastrami) filling the placings.

It was not all doom and gloom for the locals as Bordertown trainer Jeff Searle started cup day in a blaze of glory, winning the opening two races with Wonaeamirri and Saint Kitts.

Apart from Hardacre, fellow Mount Gambier trainers Lee Creek (Star Jan) and Richard Nicholson (Deforce) had success on the eightrace card.

There were a couple of local winners on Stawell cup day last Sunday, with the Bill Drury trained and David Drury driven Noosa Beach (\$7.50) winning the opening event.

Bill Drury had a drive in the race but was dislodged when Your A Shocker fell in the score up behind the mobile.

Your A Shocker was a late scratching and Drury fortunately escaped serious injury.

Then the promising pacer Steele (\$1.50)

fav.) from the Steve Fennell stable had no trouble leading all the way in the NR 52 pace over 785 metres.

In a vote of confidence for the future of harness racing, Fennell is branching out to become a full-time harness trainer.


Buckland continued to ride strongly on the return leg, powering to the finish line in a time of 21:45.

A CHANGE of date for the upcoming Triple Crown event, which includes the Borderline Speedway, was this week announced.

The Triple Crown features the SA Speedcar Title, Wingless Sprints Summer Slam and Formula 500 Dash for Cash series at the Borderline Speedway, Simpson Speedway and Premier Speedway.

The Borderline Speedway was set to host night two of the series on Saturday, January 8, which has now been changed to Friday, January 7.

The event will then head to Simpson on the Saturday night, culminating at Premier Speedway on Sunday night.

With uncertain border restrictions still affecting cross-border activity to some extent, the decision was made to ensure teams could compete at all three events without the need to isolate, should the restrictions be increased in the near future.

Borderline Speedway president Cary Jen-

nings said a similar change was implemented last season with a positive outcome.

"We had it last year and ran on the Friday instead of Saturday and it worked out all right," he said.

"Because of the border restrictions the Wingless Sprints asked to look at changing it again, so after many discussions we did to try to help those Victorians."

Likewise Jennings said he is hopeful the border restrictions will not disrupt the upcoming Sprintcar Speedweek, with the Borderline Speedway leg to be held on December 28.

"We hope the border stays open and those Sprintcar drivers can get here," he said.

The disruptions have also taken a toll at the national level, with the Australian Sprintcar Championship, which was to be held at the Perth Motorplex in February 2022, postponed.

The ongoing border restrictions and uncertainty for competitors and spectators to travel were the major mitigating factors in the decision

The next Australian Championship will now be held at the same venue but in 2023.
