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Business suffering

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THERE is no denying it is a tough time to be a hospitality business owner.

The impacts of the community spread of Covid-19, further restrictions and staff shortages are being felt by almost every industry, with many businesses across the South East having to limit opening hours, or close entirely.

Police to check for breaches

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POLICE are investigating possible breaches of Covid-19 restrictions at Robe venues after reports of rules being flouted and an explosion of cases of the disease in the South East, many of which are believed to have stemmed from New Year's celebrations in the seaside town.

In reply to questions from The Border Watch earlier this week, a SAPOL spokesperson said: "Police are aware of community speculation and concerns regarding allegations of behaviour which may have contravened the public activities directions in Robe on New Year's Eve".

"No breaches were identified during New Year's Eve, however recent information received from the public is being investigated to determine if any breaches have occurred."

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Covid scrutiny call

THE pressure on our ailing health system, lack of public communication and the impact on businesses due to Covid-19, has resulted in the majority of the State's MP's signing a petition calling on the Premier to recall Parliament before the State election.

Mount Gambier Independent Troy Bell is one of 25 out of 47 politicians in Parliament's

Lower House who have signed the petition.

Critical of the State Government's handling of the re-opening of the State, the 25 MPs want Parliament to resume prior to the State election due in March.

The MP's want the Premier to recall Parliament to sit on February 8, 9 and 10.

The petition, titled "Parliament must sit again", was signed by Labor and independent members of Parliament, and it's covering letter states that: "We are deeply concerned that the Government has not adequately planned

for the new variants in its Covid reopening plans."

"Families and individuals are fearful for their safety and confused by unclear messages," the letter to the Premier said.

"Businesses are facing extraordinary economic hardship.

"Retail and stock distribution chains are facing worker shortages.

"Allied health professionals, including ambulance officers, general practitioners, chemist, nurses and community care providers, are

under unacceptable pressure.

"The circumstances now facing our State require Parliament to sit to assist in managing the Covid-19 crisis and to provide parliamentary oversight.


The letter to the Premier also states that: "Certain members who have requested an urgent briefing have had no response".

In support of the petition, Mr Bell said he had concerns about how the State Government has handled its response to Omicron.

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Pressure on health service

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THE number of patients with Covid-19 at the Mount Gambier Hospital is fluctuating between six and nine, according to Limestone Coast Local Health Network (LCLHN) governing board chair Grant King.

“We have capacity for more, [but] we would be hopeful that we do not get too many more,” Mr King said.

“There are also people being managed in their homes through the community response team.”

While Mr King said the hospital's Covid ward is well within its capacity, with flexibility to add further beds, there would come a point where help from metropolitan hospitals would be needed.

On Wednesday, Premier Steven Marshall announced Covid patient capacity in Adelaide hospitals would be increased by 500 beds.

“Overall the State is working as a State, and I think it should as a single system,” he said.

“The metro should be supporting the regions, and the regions should be supporting the metro; we are all as one and we need to work that way.

“More beds in Adelaide is good for the whole of the State...metropolitan hospitals have their capacity increased to basically take the bulk of the load.”

Mount Gambier Hospital is the only one in the Limestone Coast taking in Covid positive patients, to limit any risk to the aged care facilities attached to all other hospitals in the region.

Like many other industries, staff shortages are also impacting the LCLHN with Mr King estimating around 70 staff members are currently not working due to being a close contact, or Covid positive themselves.

“Take 70 people out of our staff, that is about five per cent of the total workforce, so it is not an insignificant number,” he said.

“I think yes we have to acknowledge that people are under pressure but managing.”

Mr King said the LCLHN may need further support and backup by the State if the situation worsens.

“Our people have done a wonderful job, but it is relentless,” he said.

“There is a lot of hard work being done on the front line, and community members appreciate that.”

Health facilities in the region are subject to Covid Status (CoSTAT) levels, which Mr King said is in response to the severity of presentations across the community.

CoSTAT 1 is the lowest level, and CoSTAT 5 is the highest.

The LCLHN is currently subject to CoSTAT 4 protocols.

“CoSTAT 1 is basically no community transmission and pretty much business as usual but

we are being careful none-the-less,” Mr King said.

“CoSTAT 5 [is] where there would be potentially overwhelming community transmission, significant presentations and inpatients, and a need to be very focused and careful about how we go.”

Mr King said the CoSTAT level may be elevated to level 5 if case numbers continue to increase.

“If we do reach a peak then that might mean that we will need to go to another level, which simply means that we will be much more focused in terms of what we do and how we treat people,” he said.

“I think we have planned as well as we can, I think we are managing as well as we can and hopefully it will not get too much worse.”

While Covid case numbers in the Limestone Coast continue to increase, there are fears positive cases are slipping through the reporting cracks, leading to inaccuracy.

“I think it is reasonable to assume that not everybody with a symptom has been tested, therefore it is quite possible that there are people in the community that are not counted in those numbers,” Mr King said.

Those in the region attempting to be tested have been subject to long wait times for PCR tests and no reliable source to buy rapid antigen tests (RATs).

When stock arrives, RATs will be available

free to concession card holders and symptomatic close contacts but anyone else needing a test will be paying for it themselves.

“I think if the RAT tests are going to be an important part of managing this disease they ought to be available to people,” Mr King said.

“I can recall the Federal Government saying at some stage that we are all in this together, and in my view that means if we are all in this together than we ought to all be able to access services at the same and equal level.”

Local pharmacies and supermarkets are hoping to have RATs back in stock within a fortnight.

Mr King is encouraging the community to keep appropriate social distancing and hygiene practices front of mind.

“It is sort of back to the community now to be a bit careful,” he said.

“Look after our own hygiene, wear our masks, be very aware of the social circumstances we have put ourselves in, and back off a bit until we get over this hump.”

As of Thursday there were 1675 active cases registered within Limestone Coast Local Government Areas (LGAs) according to SA Health's Covid-19 Heatmap.

This is just under a 183 per cent increase in case numbers from the previous Thursday on January 6.

“My big concern is around schools returning and the likelihood that schools will not have the support they need to keep teachers, support staff and students safe during a peak period for Omicron,” Mr Bell said.

“There's a whole range of things we should be looking at to make sure we give our kids the best protection that we can.

“The environment has changed.

“We are going to have the perfect storm of teachers and students in confined spaces of the classrooms.

“Looking at the case numbers, I think we are going to come into a second wave of Covid and it's going to hit right at the time school is going back.”

Mr Bell said his biggest criticism has been the communication to the public by the State Government and SA Health.

“As independents, we have been asking for briefings on the Covid response and we passed legislation to ensure that briefings would occur but until today we have had only one briefing,” he said.

“What infuriates me is that as Independents we hold the balance of power and we committed to SA Health that whatever resources they wanted we would ensure the government delivered and we were told repeatedly that they had everything under control with

enough resources and I don't believe that to be the case – it's very frustrating.”

Mr Bell said: “We need to recall Parliament to hold the government to account and question it over its handling of the Covid -19 response so far.”

Opposition Leader Peter Malinauskas, who has also signed the petition, said the Parliament has an important function to play when it comes to public policy oversight.

“It's particularly true when we live in a time when Government is utilising extraordinary powers that are largely unprecedented in our

lifetimes,” Mr Malinauskas said.

“If the Government is going to deploy extraordinary authority of power – that needs to be scrutinised – that is the job of the Parliament.”

Mr Malinauskas said the State Government had not prepared the State well for the border openings.

“Failing to plan is a plan to fail and that's exactly what has occurred in this instance,” he said.

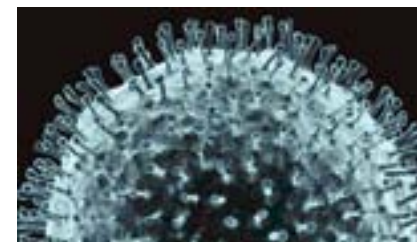

Numbers growing

COVID-19 cases in the Limestone Coast have more than doubled over the last week.

As of Thursday there were 1675 active cases, and 1683 total cases registered within Limestone Coast Local Government Areas (LGAs) according to SA Health's Covid-19 Heatmap.

The Naracoorte Lucindale Council area had the highest number of active cases at 432, followed by Mount Gambier at 415, Robe at 203, Wattle Range at 196, Grant at 180, Tatiara at 177 and Kingston at 72.

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Abattoir workers infected

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ABATTOIR workers at Teys Australia near Naracoorte have been asked to return to work even if they are Covid-19 positive.

To meet demand, the business received permission from SA Health to allow asymptomatic Covid positive essential workers back into work.

SA Health confirmed on Tuesday that close to 140 positive cases are linked to the site, with testing still underway.

As concern grows on food and supermarket shortages, hold ups at the facility impact more than just Teys.

The abattoir processes a large amount of cattle from the greater Limestone Coast and many farmers have contracts directly with the organisation.

Neil Quirk, a stock and station agent working at O'Connor and Graney, said the effects are already being felt.

"We are having stock booked in being cancelled," Mr Quirk said.

"Our numbers are down a bit this week and it might be because of this.

"Teys were not buying in the market last week.

"It could be another one week, or two weeks or three weeks depending on when the staff come back."

Teys was missing from O'Connor and Graney stock sales both this week and last week which Mr Quirk said was highly unusual.

He said this was the first time the pandemic had really impacted the industry.

"We have been really lucky for nearly two years now that we have not been interrupted or disrupted at all with Covid," Mr Quirk said.

"We have had a market every week.

"This has had a bit of a hiccup on price and stock going to the abattoir.

"People are saying we are going to run out of meat or fruit and vegetables.

"[The meat shortage] is because the abattoirs are not processing the meat."

Fellow livestock agent and director at Miller Whan and John Livestock and Real Estate, Andrew Whan said there is a flow on effect to the whole industry from any delays.

"We have stock that has been pushed back for a week or two, there are delays all away along the system," Mr Whan said.

"It is a very concerning issue for everyone in the industry, we need to get the workers back in the plant.

"It is not just them up there [Naracoorte], it is a national issue."

Mr Whan said that even the abattoir working below capacity has a big impact.

"Even if they are going slow, it has a three-fold effect," he said.

"Their product is not going out, they are not killing the product which will affect the cattle market, and if people have got them in the paddock to sell to them on a contracted price, they cannot send them.

"It jams up all the way along, we are all concerned about it."

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride said he was in agreement with the move.

"I am supportive of Teys working with SA

Health to keep the business functioning," Mr McBride said.

"Many businesses are bearing the brunt of staff absences due to Covid infection or staff being required to isolate as close contacts."

"Unfortunately Teys, like many other businesses across the Limestone Coast, is facing challenges in maintaining its workforce.

"Staff shortages associated with Covid-19 and the impacts of restrictions are limiting production.

"I am aware that Teys representatives are doing their utmost to manage Covid in their workplace.

"I am aware that SA Health and Teys are working closely to enable their important production line to keep running while protecting the health of their workers and the wider community."

SA Health confirmed that they have team members on the ground to help monitor the situation.

"SA Health has sent a Covid rapid response team to the abattoir in Naracoorte to test all relevant staff," a SA Health spokesperson said.

"We are working closely with management to ensure the business can continue to operate safely and continue food production at the site."

SA Health said allowing Covid-19 positive workers back into the workplace is due to them being "essential" for keeping food production going.

"To ensure food security, SA Health has allowed a small group of critical staff, who have tested positive and are asymptomatic, to continue to work in an isolated area away from others," the spokesperson said.

"These workers must remain at home and isolate when they are not at work until they are cleared from Covid."

Teys Australia was contacted for comment.

Police Covid breach investigation in Robe

Social media posts, tagged as Robe, showed large groups of people singing, dancing and in close contact, and The Border Watch has spoken with people who attended Robe venues on New Year's Eve collaborating a view that Robe was a super spreader for the virus in that period.

A Limestone Coast resident, who did not wish to be named, told The Border Watch this week that he had attended a Robe venue on New Year's Eve and he had later tested positive for Covid-19 and was isolating at home and absent from his work because of it.

At the venue he attended he said people were seated outside while the sun was up but once it became dark and a disc jockey (DJ) became the entertainment the crowd of "hundreds" danced and celebrated in close contact without masks on including the tradi-

tional New Year's kissing at midnight.

While security had been stringent outside the venue, the resident said nobody had tried to stop the after dark activities inside the venue.

The double vaccinated resident said he did not get any symptoms but decided to get tested when one of his friends, who attended the venue with him on New Year's Eve, fell ill with Covid.

"I did not get a text message saying I needed to get a test, one of the other blokes I was with got crook," he said.

On January 6, The Caledonian Inn and pizza restaurant The Project, both in Robe, were listed by SA Health as Covid-19 exposure sites making Robe one of only three towns outside of Adelaide with such a listing.

The Project exposure was from 8pm on

Thursday, December 30 to 1am on Friday, December 31.

The Caledonian Inn exposure was from 9.30pm on Friday, December 31 to 12.30am on Saturday, January 1.

On the same day the exposure sites were listed, SA Health set up a pop-up Covid-19 testing station at the Robe Football Club.

As at Wednesday this week, 480 tests were undertaken at the Robe testing station and it will remain open until noon next Monday.

"We encourage people in Robe who develop any symptoms of Covid-19, no matter how mild, to get a Covid-19 PCR test and isolate until the results are known and your symptoms have resolved," said the statement from SA Health.

As at December 29, SA Health figures showed that the South East had 25 confirmed positive cases with 17 active at that time.

Of that, Robe had none.

In the space of a fortnight, as at Thursday this week, Robe had 203 cases and, with SA Health only recording cases against the residential addresses of each person confirmed with Covid-19, this number does not include visitors to the town.

The number recorded represents more than 10 per cent of the town's resident population. The New Year's events at Robe are also believed to be a major source of an explosion in case numbers across the South East with 1675 cases recorded as at Thursday this week, up from just 17 active cases on December 29.

On ABC Radio earlier this week, Limestone Coast Health Network executive director of medical services, Dr Elaine Pretorius predicted a second spike in Covid-19 cases could be expected as a result of the Robe outbreak.

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Election bid

FORMER chief executive of the Independent Retailers Association, Colin Shearing has launched a bid to be elected as an independent to the Upper House in the upcoming State election.

Mr Shearing, of Adelaide, has long been an outspoken advocate for small businesses in South Australia and is a strong opponent of the deregulation of shop trading hours.

While Mr Shearing supports Millicent's restricted shopping hours, he said he had no plans to change Mount Gambier's trading hours which are deregulated.

During a recent visit to the city, he said there is no need to change trading hours in Mount Gambier.

"Trading hours have been designed to help tourism and so we went through the process, and we think the balance is really good."

Mr Shearing said there was an opportunity for the Millicent community to change its restricted trading hours.

"They put this to a vote a few years ago... they didn't want a change - that may have changed since, I don't know but at the end of the day, I'd put it back to the people through a vote again."

"It was very clear that that community didn't want it four to five years ago - that may have changed, and we'd look at that."

"I wouldn't make any changes now however, if we get a voice in Parliament and the community came back to me asking to reconsider what's going on [with shop trading hours] in Millicent - that would have to be a community driven exercise."

"I don't have a problem with that because it's about the people of South Australia and it's about the people of that community."

"So that's the way we'd go - I wouldn't see it another way."

Mr Shearing said his motto is "to defend small businesses".

"Small business needs a voice," he said.

"There are 143,000 small businesses across the State, employing half a million people," he said.

"Covid-19 is the elephant in the room and the State Government's plan to reopen the borders has failed."

"If the plan was to open up [the borders] on the 23rd [November] and create chaos - that's what we have seen - we are more confused today than what we were 12 months ago," Mr Shearing said.

He says his chance of being elected are "really good".

"Business people lack trust in political parties - we're not a party - we're independents and small business operators ourselves," Mr Shearing said.

Unusual weather hits region

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MOUNT Gambier and surrounds were hit by summer hail last week, and the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) said there could be more on the way this season.

Last Thursday a thunderstorm with large hailstones made its way through the region, with 1.4mm of rain recorded.

Senior meteorologist at BOM South Australia Simon Timcke said that type of storm certainty does not occur everyday in the South East.

"That particular day we had a low-pressure system moving across and it was pretty warm," Mr Timcke said.

"It was dragging some very warm air down from the north-east which was left over from tropical ex-cyclone Seth."

"That part of the country ended up with a pretty tropical airmass, warm, moist and quite unstable."

"I was not surprised to see that there was a bit of hail around, they [clouds] were very tall and had a lot of vertical development to them."

Mr Timcke said the worst of it appeared to hit on the Victorian side of the border.

Further storms could be expected this week, but likely to be calm again going into the weekend, but to keep a lookout at the sky.

"At the very least you will see some pretty spectacular clouds around the place," Mr Timcke said.

BOM predicts that the La Niña climate driver, which is currently being observed, will likely remain until early autumn.

La Niña is associated with increased rainfall, cooler temperatures and a higher rate of tropical cyclones.

Capacity limits hurting cafes

For hospitality businesses it is just the latest disappointment in what was meant to be a period when things were starting to recover.

Many of the staff at Metro Bakery and Cafe have been forced into isolation and owner Toni Vorenas has been running short staffed for the last two weeks.

"Normally on a day like today we would have six staff out the front and three out the back," Ms Vorenas said.

"Today we did it with three staff for both."

Ms Vorenas said the business is already closing early each day, and it would only take one more staff member to become a close contact to force her to temporarily shut the business.

With no clear path out of current restrictions, Ms Vorenas said she and her staff are unsure on what the future holds, and it is starting to take a toll.

"Everyone is so Covid weary," she said.

"We said to ourselves this is it, this is the year we will be really creative and get back to it, and this happens."

"As the manager and the owner, there is that real need to balance staying open and protecting your staff."

Staff have been keeping in touch through group messages, making sure staff currently at home in isolation feel they are still part of the team.

Ms Vorenas said she is always aware of how reliant her staff are on their wages in times like these.

"Behind every staff member is a whole family," she said.

"Two years ago we stood down our staff and shut this place down for eight weeks and just

ran our smaller store in order to survive.

"It was the hardest thing I have ever done, and the thought of 'what if we have to do that again?' is awful."

Her experience is similar to that of many business owners, weighing up giving staff enough hours and keeping them and the community safe.

"Being at 25 per cent capacity, at some point you need to reduce your staff significantly," she said.

"A lot of businesses are having to make a lot of hard decisions."

By January hospitality businesses across the State were expecting to be back to full capacity, but the highly contagious Covid-19 variant Omicron derailed original plans.

It has been almost two years since Metro was allowed to operate at full capacity, and Ms Vorenas said the focus is still on just treading water, not making a profit.

"The bottom line has been irrelevant for two years, it has all been about survival," she said.

"We have not been at capacity since the pandemic started."

"I have lost track of how many times my staff have asked me if there will be a lockdown, but in my mind I think we are already locked down."

Ms Vorenas said a lack of communication from the Government on what may be around the corner has been frustrating.

"I think I am actually angry," she said.

"I feel like we do not have information, how long are we at 25 per cent capacity? What will happen next week?"

"We have to ask ourselves the question at what point is it no longer viable to be open."

"It is a long time to be in survival mode."

Preschool gets a lift

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A NEW preschool building at Moorak Primary School was craned into place this week as part of a \$1.8 million project funded by the SA Government.

Pre-fabricated in Adelaide, the six modules making up the new pre-school arrived on semi-trailers and were individually craned into place and joined together to create the new building.

The process was watched with excited anticipation by Moorak Primary School Principal Peter Mitchinson and preschool teacher, Lauren Baudinette along with several community members keen to see the major transformation take place.

For Mr Mitchinson it was the final stage of nearly five years of work that was prompted by growing numbers at the preschool.

"We were going to extend the old one but instead of spending money on refurbishing the old one which could become over-crowded again very quickly, we decided it would be more effective to get a new one that will see the preschool through the long term," said Mr Mitchinson.

"This is a creation of the community - the culmination of lots of hard work from many members of the school community, and the Department for Education."

Mr Mitchinson said the architect visited the school and spoke with children to help develop the preschool's design.

The pre-school is located on a site that was

occupied by a house originally built to accommodate the adjoining primary school's Head Master but it had been unused for some time.

Mr Mitchinson said the removal of the old house and using the site for the new preschool ensured that the primary school's oval was retained in its entirety, and the creation of a playground and other outside areas around the preschool is also part of the project.

Preschool teacher, Lauren Baudinette said 18 children were expected to begin their schooling life at the new preschool this year and the building would be able to cater for the future with a capacity for 33 children.

"The new building will provide increased educational opportunities for the children," said Ms Baudinette.

"We're looking forward to being in it."

Meals in high demand during pandemic times

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SINCE Covid-19 has reared its head across the region, meals for the vulnerable have been in higher demand than usual.

Mount Gambier Meals on Wheels have experienced current clients asking for an increase in meals throughout the week due to less community engagement and the meat supply issues gripping the State.

Regional branch support officer Lisa Fewins said despite the current difficulties faced throughout the region, clients and volunteers remained in high spirits.

"Although we have had to increase our protective process and can no longer enter houses unless it is deemed necessary for those with a disability or unable to come to the door, everyone is still smiling," Ms Fewins said.

"We still make sure our clients can be heard

or even seen through the door or at the door while socially distant and we make sure we are able to have a conversation as well."

She said clients have also had to put a small table out the front of their homes for volunteers to put the meals on for them to collect to further reduce contact.

"Although it is difficult, we are finding our clients are coping quite well with the current circumstances," Ms Fewins said.

"Some of our clients are a bit worried about going out and about and are getting others to do their shopping for them and taking other measures but overall they are in high spirits."

In the case of a lockdown or a Covid-positive volunteer, the branch volunteer said the organisation was stocked with frozen meals available to be heated up on demand.

"This means we will still be able to provide the service in an emergency because at the

moment it is really a day-by-day case because we never know what is going to happen," Ms Fewins said.

"All of our volunteers have to be fully vaccinated and most are now due for their booster shots as well which is great.

"However, we are never really sure who can come in each day and although we have a fantastic group here we don't know or control what our volunteers do in their spare time."

She said the situation was concerning due to the increase in cases across the Lower South East.

"It is strange because people we know are contracting the virus now and we have never really had that before," Ms Fewins said.

The organisation is also looking for volunteers to assist in the kitchen and with deliveries, with those interested encouraged to contact Mount Gambier Meals on Wheels for further information.

Rents soar for tenants

PROSPECTIVE tenants are offering to pay above the listed price for rental properties across Mount Gambier in a bid to secure a roof over their head.

A rental shortage in the South East has people searching for a place to rent sometimes up against 100 others applying for the same property.

Gebhardt's Real Estate property manager Sharyn Ferguson said although applicants were offering above the listed price, it was ultimately up to the landlord as to who to accept as a tenant for their properties.

"We can submit applications to the landlords but at the end of the day it is totally up to them whether they accept it or not," Ms Ferguson said.

"At the moment there is a huge demand for rentals and not enough properties out there available for people."

The property manager said earlier this week was the first time in a while where no rental properties were listed.

"We ended up having one unit listed not long afterwards and within 24 hours there were up to 30 applicants."

Ms Ferguson said the shortage was caused by people moving out of the city and into the region to escape the Covid-19 pandemic.

"There are also people investing in properties here who live as far away as Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria," she said.

"They are buying here locally and then leasing them out but it is still not enough in comparison to the demand we are seeing."

People were also applying for houses which they would not be able to afford in a desperate attempt to have a roof over their heads.

"People are doing this because they are just applying for anything that comes up and not realising whether they can actually afford it or not," Ms Ferguson said.

"We also have a duty of care as well and we need to work within their income as to what they can afford."

"We cannot place them into a property they cannot afford, or if we think they would come into financial difficulties later down the track."

"It does make the decisions we make very difficult because we want to help people out but in some circumstances we just can't."

"This issue has been ongoing for a long period of time now and we simply cannot see a light at the end of the tunnel just yet and do not know if prices will drop or what will happen," Ms Ferguson said.

Boandik restrictions

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BOANDIK Lodge Aged Care facilities have implemented further restrictions on visitors after two residents tested positive for Covid-19 last weekend.

The Lakes Terrace facility will no longer allow visitors at all with other sites restricted to two visitors per day.

The two residents received positive rapid antigen tests on Sunday evening with the entire facility going into lockdown.

Boandik chief executive Gillian McGinty said residents were now isolating and SA Health staff Adelaide would perform PCR tests on all residents and staff.

"We had family advise us they were unwell and had been into the Covid testing station," Ms McGinty said.

"We did a precautionary test with the resident and the other resident they had been in contact with.

"Both had returned positive."

She said testing was conducted across the

sites throughout the week with staff having accommodation available if they felt it was too risky.

"There has been a lot of community transmission in Mount Gambier and a lot of people who come in as visitors and staff," Ms McGinty said.

"Whilst we have been cautious and open to reminding people not to come visit if they are unwell, there are a lot of people who are also asymptomatic and not aware they are spreading it."

The chief executive said the reopening of the aged care facility would be determined on the results from SA Health after testing had been conducted.

"It is usually 10 days from the first infectious case and if we are able to keep it to just those residents that is when we will be looking at reopening, however all residents remain in isolation in the area that is affected," she said.

"Residents seem okay for the moment and we have organised telephone calls and video calls with family members while others are opting to do window visits to keep in contact.

"We are planning on keeping open communication with everyone to make sure all family members and members of the community are aware of what is going on."



Tree closes Bay Road

BAY Road, between Lake Terrace and John Watson Drive, was closed from 9:00am to about 3:30pm on Tuesday and again for the first half of Wednesday.

Mount Gambier City Council General Manager City Infrastructure Barbara Cernovskis said the closure enabled contractors to safely remove a tree that was identified as a safety issue due to its lack of structural integrity.

Video calls to help mental health

WEEKLY video calls will help connect those in isolation in an effort to reduce ongoing depression and anxiety.

As Covid-19 continues to spread throughout the Limestone Coast community, a mental health awareness group has initiated a weekly meeting, using video calls, for those finding it difficult in isolation.

Lifeboat South East will kickstart the initiative in the coming weeks to further connect those needing socialisation during Covid.

Committee volunteer Dennis Chapman said the ongoing Covid outbreak across the region has caused anxiety for residents.

"Due to Covid, people are in isolation or afraid to go out into larger events, so having these weekly zoom meetings can help people stay connected," Mr Chapman said.

"If people are feeling a bit isolated for whatever reason, they are able to contact us through social media and let us know.

"Some people may just want to listen and some may even want to remain anonymous all of which is perfectly fine."

Mr Chapman said people may wish to join with or without their camera or microphone

on for privacy reasons.

"Some people may just want to listen, and some people may also just want to stay anonymous," he said.

"It is more the connection to help with the isolation and if there are any other issues we can assist them."

He said the not-for-profit organisation had discovered people in isolation struggle mentally with the idea of "seeing the same four walls" each day.

"Also not being able to leave the house is hard because we are generally very active and can go wherever we want," Mr Chapman said.

"This does bring on a lot of anxiety and potentially depression because it is the feeling of being trapped and not being able to go anywhere."

Those wishing to become involved are able to receive the code and password each week by contacting Lifeboat SE on social media.

The meetings will be held every Tuesday from 6pm with the monthly meeting held at the Mount Gambier City Hall also open from 6pm on the first Tuesday of each month.

Win Network outages in South East blamed on fibre optic cut

THE WIN Network was off-air earlier this week in the Limestone Coast after a fibre cutting mishap.

The station was off the television airways on Monday due to a Telstra fibre being mistakenly cut.

Telstra technicians were used to rectify

the problem that resulted in outages across the South East, affecting all WIN free-to-air channels including Nine, 9Go!, 9Gem and 9Life.

The network coverage was back up and running by Tuesday with no further interruptions expected.

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Less visitors to the region

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VISITOR numbers to the Penola and Coonawarra region are starting to drop after remaining steady over the Christmas and New Year period.

A total of 279 people were officially recorded between Boxing Day and the New Year by the Penola Coonawarra Visitor Information Centre, a drop from 488 at the same time in 2020.

It comes following the official opening of the South Australian-Victorian border with interstate travellers able to come to the region.

According to data recorded by the information centre, 153 Victorians came to the region within the time period in addition to 35 locals and 75 South Australians.

There were also nine visitors from New South Wales, three from Queensland and two from Western Australia and the Northern Territory.

Wattle Range Council tourism events officer Tamara North said businesses and locals were hoping visitor numbers would increase as cross-border travel becomes easier and the community adapts to living with Covid.

"The drop in numbers between 2021 and 2022 is due to ongoing uncertainties around Covid-19 and a continued downturn in visitors attending information centres," Ms North said.

Must At Coonawarra owner Cate Cooper said bookings were in high demand for her accommodation business up until this week.

She said it was "looking patchy" for the up-and-coming weeks with many visitors cancelling following a Covid outbreak in Robe.

"Cancellations are coming through quite fast," Ms Cooper said.

"They were coming through the entire time but it was easier to fill it back up.

"We are usually busy right up to Australia Day but at the moment we have heaps of space, especially with the Vignerons Cup marquee event being cancelled."

Ms Cooper said herself and a number of staff had noticed it was becoming less busy around town due to people heading back to work and remaining cautious of Covid.

She said businesses were hoping visitor numbers would pick back up around Easter time, yet it was difficult to tell due to the uncertainty surrounding the Covid situation.

Consultants plan highway crossing

HOW Penola's new rail trail will access Father Woods Park, 20kms north of Penola, is a question Wattle Range Council is hoping will be answered by a consultant's report, expected next month, after the same consultant cast doubts on options already being considered.

Following the Catholic community declining a proposal to relocate to Penola the main attraction in the park, being large carved timber statues of Father Tenison Woods and Saint Mary MacKillop, council considered a report at its December meeting from Tonkin Consulting aimed at selecting from three locations proposed for the rail trail to cross the Riddoch Highway to access the park.

The locations considered by the report were via an unmade road reserve through farming property 'Churinga Park', Penola hundred line, or Glenroy Bool Lagoon Road, and the consultant's report preferred them in that order with hazard mitigation measures.

At the meeting, Limestone Ridge Estate owner, George Kidman addressed the councillors where a petition he had collected was tabled.

The petition contained 80 names and requested 'Do not cross the Riddoch Highway at Father Woods Tree for the Rail Trail' which is the 'Churinga Park' crossing option.

Mr Kidman's property, Limestone Ridge Estate, is on the northern boundary of Father Woods Park.

"I am not anti-trail, I am all for it," he said.

"Bike riding, exercise, walking, tourism - it ticks all the boxes.

"But I am anti it crossing the highway."

Mr Kidman's presentation to Council included photographs and videos shown on a large screen of caravans parked on the side of the Riddoch Highway near the Father Woods Park with trucks and cars going past.

"People are not parking in the car park [in Father Woods Park].

"You can't see - it is an awful feeling trying to get out of there."

Mr Kidman said since the carved statues were erected in 2010, visitation to the park had increased.

He believed that with new infrastructure proposed for the park, including toilets and picnic facilities, that visitation would increase further.

"The traffic will go up and so will the Riddoch Highway - it is getting busier and busier by the year."

The report from Tonkin Consulting also cast doubts over the locations being considered saying: "The crossing of pedestrians and cyclists across the Riddoch Highway creates a very high risk of serious and catastrophic incidents occurring."

The report suggested eliminating the hazard by either removing the link between the rail trail and Father Woods Park, or provide an overpass such as a bridge, or an underpass such as a culvert.

"Whilst low in cost, discontinuing the linkage would potentially remove an important pilgrimage or tourism drawcard to the region," said the report.

"Construction of an overpass could be highly cost prohibitive to Council.

"Likewise, it may be cost prohibitive for an underpass however recent projects in both SA and Victoria indicates this option is more cost favourable than an over pass ... These are often associated with dairies and cattle farms to allow for safe stock movement across roads."

Council chief executive officer, Ben Gower said Tonkin Consulting has now been asked whether there would be a better crossing point that hasn't already been considered.

"We previously asked them to evaluate the three locations, but we had not asked them where the optimum crossing point is," Mr Gower said.

Mr Gower said work on the rail trail would continue but that the route to access Father Woods Park would be put on hold until the new report was considered.

Mr Gower predicted that report may be ready for consideration at Council's February meeting.

Off leash proposals

OFF leash exercise spaces for dogs in Millicent, Penola and Beachport have been proposed to prevent sports grounds being used for dog exercising.

The proposal will be released for public comment following a report considered at Wattle Range Council's December meeting.

"General Inspectors regularly receive complaints in relation to dog owners allowing their dog to run freely on sporting grounds and the waste associated with this practice," said Council's Senior General Inspector, Tim Wilson in the report.

The proposed dog off-leash areas were chosen as they are currently already being used to exercise dogs and are located in areas that have minimal use by other members of the public.

The proposed locations are:

Millicent

- McLaughlin Park, a grassed area west of the Millicent United Soccer Club-rooms
- Millicent Dog Park, near Millicent's Visitor Information Centre (already fenced)
- Belt Road walking track (northern end only) from Park Terrace to Saleyards Road
- Bolton Oval, southern end, south of the drain

Penola

- Greenrise Recreational Reserve walking trail (not including the cemetery)
- McCorquindale Park, north of main football oval

Beachport

- Lagoon, McCourt Street only
- Surf Beach from outlet to 100m from surf beach carpark

The proposal includes allowing the areas to be used on a trial basis initially before making the areas official under the Council's dog bylaws.

The proposal is being released for public comment in February for further consideration by Council in March.

Mr Wilson reported that there were 3,350 registered dogs in the Council's area as of early December and that a \$210 fine applies for not disposing of dog faeces suitably.

Pawing over plans

NEW additions at Millicent's dog park are aimed at providing some interest for its four legged clients.

Behind Millicent's museum, the dog park has been taking shape over the last few months and will continue to develop this year.

A flat fenced area, the park is designed to allow owners to exercise their dogs off their leash in a safe, contained environment and it now has some added interest to entertain dogs including a sand pit, a tunnel, ramp and

some trees, while landscaping on the outside has also enhanced the amenity.

Wattle Range Council built the dog park next to the museum's large parking area near Towers Road with the target being travellers who use the parking area as it is large enough to accommodate caravans and provides a dump point.

"It's more aimed at travellers who park at the museum, empty their vans and then they can give their dogs a bit of a run around too," said Council's Senior General Inspector Tim Wilson.

"But we're finding local residents are using it for their dogs too, more than we expected really."

After Mr Wilson spoke with some of these residents, ideas for the park's improvement are coming to fruition with more planned.

"It's a relatively small area so we don't want to fill it up too much but there will be a small shelter and bench added to the park to give owners an area where they can sit and watch their dogs," Mr Wilson said.

Council's big spend up on road network

ALMOST \$5 million is planned to be spent on roads under the jurisdiction of Wattle Range Council as part of a record \$12 million works program for the current financial year.

Roads are part of more than 150 projects which form the Council's works program which was detailed in a report to Council's December meeting.

The report showed resheeting work has already been completed on several unsealed roads in the Council area, including Bakers Road and Pinchgut Road in the Millicent area, and Peach Tree Road and Picaninny Lane in the Thornlea area.

Resheeting work is also underway on Shell Grit Road near Millicent and Reedy Lagoon Road in the Wattle Range area.

Other unsealed roads scheduled to be resheeted include Agars, Cases and Dow roads at Glencoe; Andrews Street and Smiths Lane at Rendelsham; Bateman's Lane in the Wattle Range area; Botts Road at Tri Hi; Carthew, Poonada, Stony, Whitty and Considine roads at Tantanoola; Cullens Road at Southend; McArthurs Summer Track at Furner; Roden Lane and Winter Road at Penola; Rogers Road at Kalangadoo; and Sunnymeade Road at Mount McIntyre.

A 120 metre section of Wattle Road to Hakea Drive in the rural living areas of Millicent will be upgraded from a sand track to a gravel road.

Some unsealed township roads will be sealed, Millicent's Lake McIntyre's car park and internal roadway is planned to be sealed, and Beachport's BMX track has been resurfaced.

Other sealed roads that are being resealed under the program include Millicent's Academy Drive, French Street, History Avenue, Seventh Street, Second Street and Science Avenue; Beachport's Fifth and Corigliano Streets; Kalangadoo's Eliza and John streets, Factory Road and North-East Terrace; and Penola's Bowden, Young, Portland and Arthur Streets.

Resealing work is also proposed for Delaneys Road near Millicent; Poonada, Whitefield and Burchard roads near Tantanoola, Maaoupe Road near Penola and the Old Kalangadoo-Penola Road.

Other works already completed under the program include footpaths at Kentish Place in Millicent, Somerville Street and the Millicent Road entrance in Beachport, and on Eyre Street at Southend.

Footpath work is also underway on Ridge Terrace in Millicent and Eliza Street in Southend.

Kerb and gutter work has been completed on Church and Portland streets in Penola; on Mount Gambier Road at Banks Street and Enderby Lane in Millicent.

Similar work is also underway on Mullin, Alleyne and Bonshor streets in Millicent.

Sand dune adventures

A DRIVE through sand dunes and along a beach can be a lot of fun but it can also be perilous, ending in disaster for some.

Cars have rolled and even been washed out to sea.

Four-wheel-drive enthusiast and team member at the Mount Gambier Off-Road Centre, Darren Goetze said people need to be well prepared before heading out into the sand dunes.

“One of the first things to do is drop your tyre pressures - a good starting point is about 18 psi,” Darren said.

“People often think letting your tyres down only widens the tyre footprint, but it actually lengthens the tyre more than widens.”

He said if you're really stuck you could go lower but as soon as you are out of a bog get them back to 18 psi and then back to normal road pressure when you exit the dunes and return to road conditions as higher speeds can heat up the tyre too much and result in a blow-out or rolling a tyre off its rim.

Darren said the age-old argument on whether chunky or smooth tyres are better on sand is irrelevant today.

“Tyre pressures are what matters,” he said adding that modern tyres work well on sand whatever their tread.

Another good rule to follow is to always have a friend nearby when hitting the sand dunes or beach.

“Go with other people particularly if you are new to it - get involved with a local four-wheel-drive club or go with some friends or family so at least if you get in trouble, you have another vehicle to help you get out,” said Darren.

If you have ever tried pushing a four-wheel-drive out of a bog - forget it - that's where good recovery gear comes into play.

“At a bare minimum, a couple of rated shackles to attach your vehicle to a recovery vehicle safely, and a good snatch strap... and don't forget a long-handled shovel,” Darren said.

“For sand work these are the three bare minimums.

“An extension strap or a second snatch strap can also come in handy because snatch straps are normally only about 10 metres long so having that extra length is useful in sand.

“Traction boards can be added to any recovery kit - they are very, very handy especially in sand.”

Darren said to expect the unexpected so bringing water and food is always a good idea.

It's also wise to take any daily medication you may need.

Darren said while taking a mobile may be useful for calling for help, even Canunda National Park has phone black spots throughout it, so a UHF radio will add that little bit of security.

Looking after the environment is important and Darren recommends always sticking to the marked tracks.

“Stick to the tracks and the post markers, clean up after yourself and don't drive on vegetation.”

Darren said be aware of other vehicles coming the opposite way - particularly motorbikes.

“That's where a sand flag comes in handy so they can see you before the crest of a dune,” he said.

This brings up the topic of driving up a sand dune.

“Always drive straight up a dune, not on an angle.

“If you can't make it over the dune, reverse straight back.

“Whatever you do, don't try to turn around as your vehicle could roll.”

Darren recommends driving on remote beaches should not be done alone.

“Browns Bay, Long Beach at Robe or even the run from Southend to Beachport is worth the drive for someone new to beach driving,” Darren said.

“The beaches are open and you can pick your times to suit the tides.

“Down here the beaches are notorious – people have lost their cars down here,” he said.

“People have got stuck and haven’t been able to get it [their car] out before the high tide comes in - it ends up washed away – bye bye car.

“You really need to know what you’re do-

ing, so if you are inexperienced just stay off the beaches because they can be very soft.”

Darren said our coastline is a four-wheel-drive destination that many locals take for granted.

“So many people visit the region to drive the sand dunes and beaches,” he said.

“Victorians are not allowed to drive on their beaches so many of them come to Canunda, Beachport and Robe during holidays.”

In summary Darren said: “Keep an ear out for your UHF radio, have a sand flag on your vehicle and have your basic recovery gear is a good start.”



Stuck on the beach

AS a cadet journalist, Tyler Redway would have never expected to find himself digging out a bogged four-wheel-drive vehicle on a beach at Canunda.

Yet there he was doing just that recently and, with great gusto, Tyler grabbed a traction board and started digging out a stranded local person bogged to the belly of his four-wheel-drive.

The call for the beach rescue came while on assignment in Canunda National Park.

We met the stranded driver earlier in the day while we were both parked, letting air out of our tyres, at the beginning of the track into Canunda National Park.

Given we had two vehicles in our group, including Darren from the Off Road Centre, we made our way back to Number 2 Rocks and there, bogged to the belly, was my school colleague’s four-wheel-drive in the middle of a very soft beach.

With lots of digging, a winch, two snatch straps and an extension rope, we were able to free the bogged Nissan.

Tyler got a new office nickname of Doug and The Border Watch has chosen not to name the bogged local for the obvious reason - the embarrassment.

Growth funding for farmers

COLLABORATION between South Australian farmers and technology providers will characterise a new \$3.35 million AgTech Growth Fund.

The AgTech Growth Fund is specifically designed to find solutions to on-farm problems by accelerating the development of new technology.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham said \$800,000 of grant funds available this year, and \$850,000 in each of the following three years, will be a significant boost to the AgTech industry.

Minister Basham said the AgTech Growth Fund was the first of its kind in Australia.

"Our farmers are some of the most innovative in the world but the adoption of AgTech has not happened as widely as needed if we are to see dramatic growth in productivity and profitability.

"Farmers face many challenges such as tough seasons and global market disruptions but these challenges can motivate industry to innovate and the AgTech Growth Fund will invest up to \$3.35 million to develop technology to do things better on farm and through the agriculture supply chain.

"The potential return on fully realising the adoption of AgTech is estimated at \$2.6 billion per annum in extra agriculture gross value of production in South Australia and unlocking this growth is what this fund is all about.

"We have mapped out a pathway for the growth of AgTech in this State, setting up a key advisory group, formulating a Strategic Plan, and then providing practical support to link up technology providers with our agricultural communities to solve real farm problems.

"The Government has supported development of AgTech demonstration farms, AgTech field days and tours, launched ThinLab Loxton and new AgTech start-up hubs in the South East and Eyre Peninsula, and hosted AdvanceAg – a conference designed to ensure agribusiness and AgTech developers build productive collaborations.

"AgTech has an important role to play in progressing the Government's Growth State initiative to boost industry and jobs in regional South Australia."

To be eligible, applicants must be South Australian-based and proposing outcomes that deliver results to the state's agricultural sector.

The AgTech Growth Fund will provide grants of up to \$100,000 on a 50:50 contribution basis to collaborative private sector projects that address a specific primary production industry challenge.

The AgTech Growth Fund is a key component of the \$5.2 million AgTech Revolution Program detailed in the State Budget.

New fire fighting helicopter

THE Green Triangle's timber plantation companies have invested in additional aerial firefighting capacity in the region to protect its plantation estate, natural environment and broader community this fire season.

A B2 Squirrel helicopter has been engaged by the Green Triangle Fire Alliance (GTFA), supporting more than 300 trained plantation industry fire fighters working on the ground across the Green Triangle this summer.

The helicopter has been contracted through the Victorian Government and forms part of the Victorian aerial fleet.

The GTFA's nine forest grower member companies are providing funding for it to be positioned at the Casterton airfield.

GTFA General Manager Anthony Walsh said the helicopter's 1000 litre bucket could draw water from a variety of sources close to the fire line.

"This helicopter is highly complementary to the fixed wing fire bombers that operate in the region," Mr Walsh said.

"While the fixed wing bombers carry a greater load, the advantage of a helicopter is that it can find water in close proximity to a fire which supports very short turnaround times.

"The helicopter has already been deployed twice, including providing valuable support at the recent Poolaijelo fire.

"Other aircraft may leave the region to attend fires elsewhere across the state, but this helicopter will remain at its Casterton base for the 14-week service period until the end of March."

Mr Walsh said that while operation of the helicopter was currently restricted to Victoria, discussions were continuing with the South Australian Country Fire Service (CFS) to enable operation in the Limestone Coast region.

"We are extremely grateful for the support from the Victorian Department of Environment Land Water and Planning (DELWP) and the Country Fire Authority (CFA) to establish the service," he said.

"We remain hopeful that the same level of protection being offered to our Victorian based estate will soon extend to South Australia to enable operation across the entire Green Triangle plantation estate."

The helicopter extends the industry's ex-

tensive investment in fire suppression resources.

The Green Triangle plantation industry collectively has 100 fire appliances with trained fire fighters on standby, ready to rapidly respond to fires throughout the fire season.

"This helicopter provides a further layer of support to our Forest Industry Brigades that work tirelessly over the summer months to not only defend our forest estate, but to protect our broader communities," Mr Walsh said.

Actor **Dimitrius Schuster-Koloamatangi** learnt a lot about New Zealand's history making Paramount+ series **The Panthers**

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History hits home

New series *The Panthers* recounts the rise of The Polynesian Panther movement in New Zealand in the 1970s. Actor Dimitrius Schuster-Koloamatangi tells **Danielle McGrane** about this important revolutionary moment in history and why it meant so much to him to be a part of this show.

When Dimitrius Schuster-Koloamatangi landed a role in *The Panthers*, he didn't realise it would have such personal resonance for him. But for his family, this slice of New Zealand's history felt very close to home.

The series follows the rise of revolutionary movement The Polynesian Panthers, formed to fight racial injustice particularly towards Pasifika people in New Zealand in the 1970s.

"It's a true event but if I'm being honest, before I jumped on *The Panthers* I didn't know too much about it," Schuster-Koloamatangi said.

"It's not really talked about or taught about in school. I knew about the Panthers and I knew what they stood for, but I didn't really know the details of what went on or the stories behind them. Getting to research and learn about it on the show was great."

When he spoke about it with his family, he also realised he had more of a link to this piece of New Zealand's history than he knew, including the dawn raids on illegal overstayers that unfairly targeted Pasifika people.

"I ended up going home and talking about it with my parents and then my Dad who lived here during that time said 'Oh I remember this. We used to get treated like that,' and he experienced the dawn raids," Schuster-Koloamatangi said.

"Some of his family were targeted in the dawn raids and people he knew."

It was a special show for the young actor to be cast in, for all his family.

"My parents were really supportive of this show," he said.

"My dad got quite emotional, especially when the series came out here in New Zealand and he was watching it. He said 'I remember those days', and it brought back a lot of memories he pushed away. So they loved it."

Now, Australians will get a chance to see this series about the group of revolutionaries.

The Polynesian Panthers were formed by a group of Polynesian students and street gangsters and were inspired by the Black Panther movement in America. They were led by Tongan student Will 'Ilohia, known as 'The Professor of the Streets', who is played in the series by Schuster-Koloamatangi.

"Will 'Ilohia was on set, he helped me with my character

development so I was getting my information right from the source," the actor said.

"I think he's about 70 and he's still on that same buzz he was on back in the day, trying to fight for Polynesians and for Tongans and really on the frontline. He's such a motivating guy, just being in his presence is inspirational considering what he's done for the Polynesian community and he's a real humble dude."

The young actor was really inspired by 'Ilohia's personality, and wanted to inject some of that realism into his portrayal.

"I was just trying to get that confidence that he had and cheeky swagger, there were a whole lot of different aspects to his character," he said.

"I also got to talk to all the other Polynesian Panthers as well because a lot of them were on set, and I got their view on Will. Because Will has his view on himself and what he was like as a young 'un but people who knew him at the time shared their stories and just gave me a broader idea of how to play him.

A lot of them knew Will personally, or grew up and knew of him, so it was really good."

Making the series had quite a profound effect on Schuster-Koloamatangi.

"I found it quite emotional filming this, it was really emotional doing the scenes and just knowing how much the story means to a lot of people and a lot of people who I know as well, like my family - my dad for instance, my aunties and uncles who lived here during that time," he said.

"I would just be on set with goosebumps. There was even a scene where I had to cry and after we shot that scene I just went to the costume truck and just broke down because all the emotion was hitting me at once."

It's a huge part for Schuster-Koloamatangi, truly the role of a lifetime. It's even more impressive considering he had just started out on his acting career when he landed the part.

"I had been in one thing before this, in 2019, and that's where I met the producer on *The Panthers*, and then he hit me up to come and audition for it," he said.

"Acting was always my dream, that's why I was just blessed to be at the right place at the right time."

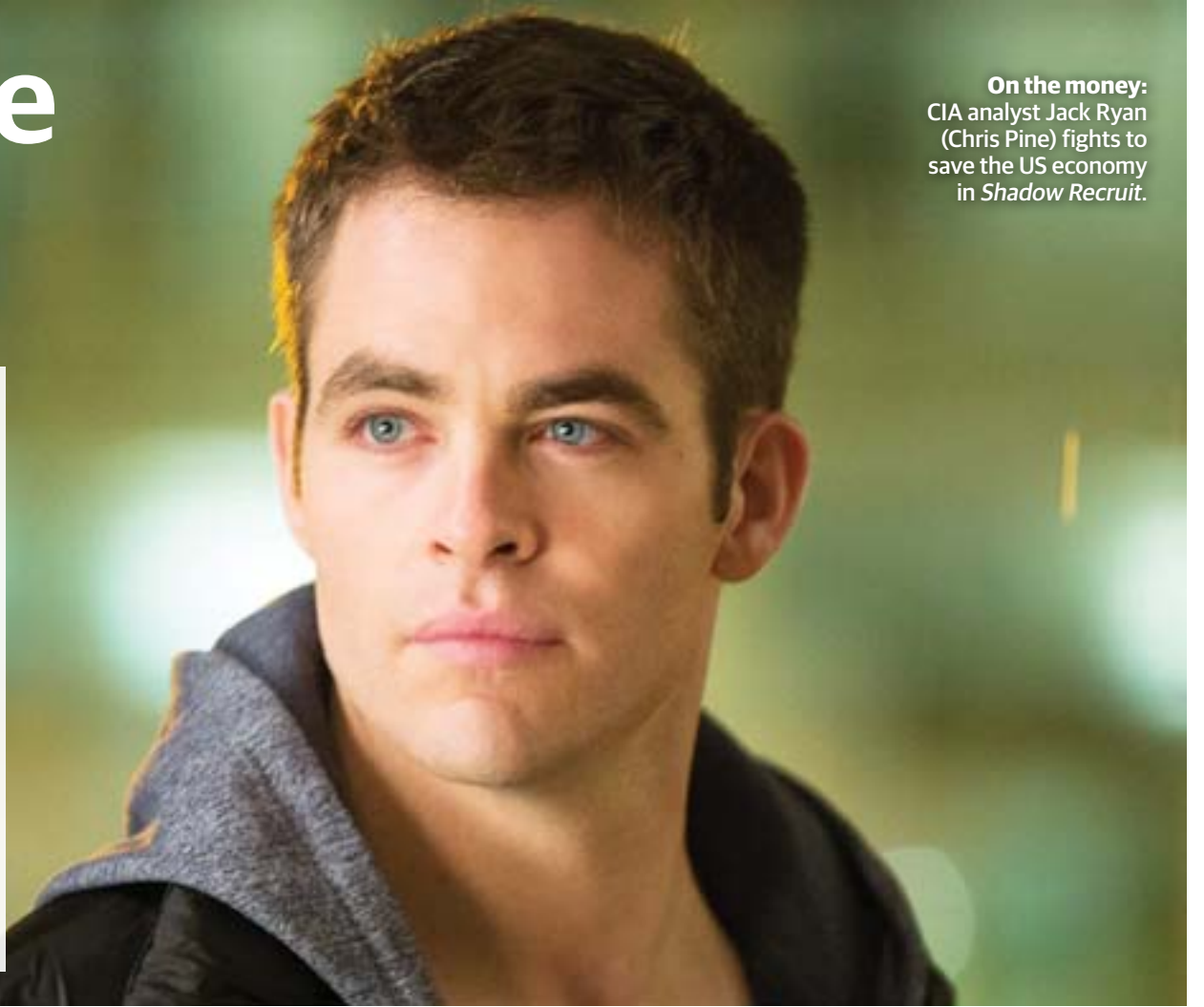

The character of Jack Ryan, from the novels by Tom Clancy, is well-known to film audiences, portrayed by a range of actors including Alec Baldwin, Harrison Ford and Ben Affleck in movies such as *The Hunt for Red October*, *Patriot Games* and *The Sum of All Fears*. Adapted from Tom Clancy's 1984 thriller, this political thriller faithfully portrays the good/evil East/West dichotomies of the Cold War era. Sean Connery (pictured) is splendid as Marko Ramius, a respected Russian naval captain who sparks a game of underwater cat-and-mouse with the Soviet Navy and an CIA analyst Jack Ryan (Alec Baldwin) when he goes under the radar in a new, impossible-to-detect sub. Frank display

AN internationally travelled exhibition about Anne Frank, a young Jewish girl who diarised her life in Nazi occupied Holland prior to her death in a concentration camp in 1945, is currently showing at the Millicent Gallery.

The exhibition, titled 'Let Me Be Myself - The Life Story of Anne Frank' will be at the Gallery, which is part of the Millicent Public Library building, until February 6.

Janice Nitschke, Council's Manager Libraries and Cultural Services, said it was a major achievement for the Millicent Gallery to secure the renowned travelling exhibition.

"It will be the first international exhibition hosted by the Millicent Gallery since its inception some 30 years ago," said Ms Nitschke.

The exhibition had its world premiere in 2015 in Canberra and since then it was introduced worldwide in several countries.

The exhibition details the life story of Anne Frank from her birth in Frankfurt in 1929 to her death in the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in 1945.

The exhibition connects the personal story of the Frank family with the important historical events of that time: the rise of the national socialists, the isolation and discrimination of the Jewish population, eventually escalating in the Holocaust.

The connection between the personal story of Anne Frank and the historical context shows the consequences the anti-Jewish measures had on one particular person.

Let Me Be Myself also highlights the contemporary relevance of Anne Frank's story - addressing subjects like prejudice, exclusion and discrimination.

As an added interest there is a movie accompanying the exhibition and a tour of Anne's home on virtual reality goggles.

The Millicent Gallery is open Tuesday to Thursday 9am to 5.30pm, Friday 9am to 8pm, Saturday 9am to noon, and Sunday 2pm to 4pm.

Comedic act shines light on mental wellbeing

A COMEDY event which hoped to shine a light on mental wellbeing in a new and innovative way has been postponed due to ongoing Covid-19 uncertainty.

Australia's very own Beautiful Bogan, Marc Ryan, was due to come to Mount Gambier later this month to put on an entertaining show with organisers making the tough decision earlier this week.

Mr Ryan is known across the country for his comedic response to mental health with his shows based on his own life experience.

"As someone who lives with mental illness, I really feel like I can use my comedy to reduce the stigma around it," Mr Ryan said.

"My whole aim now is to normalise the conversation around mental illness and make sure those who are struggling aren't alone."

Since beginning his comedic act, Mr Ryan said he had received an overwhelming positive response from the audience.

"I get this fantastic response because I really believe that we are - as a community - looking for people who are brave enough to

be vulnerable about mental illness because it is all about realising we aren't alone in this world," he said.

Mr Ryan said he decided to take the path of comedic acts to break down the stigma because of his enjoyment of storytelling.

"Naturally when I started performing, storytelling mental illnesses was the genre I focused on because essentially we can relate to human failure," he said.

"I find that when someone stands on stage and admits to failure it is both hilarious and relatable."

Hosted by Mount Gambier's StandBy Support After Suicide organiser Tracey Wanganeen, the event came to fruition after she met Mr Ryan at a previous event.

"We were both guest speakers and I was lucky enough to have a bit of a chat with him," Ms Wanganeen said.

"I really wanted to organise something positive for the men around the region because three quarters of our suicide rate are consistently male."

"It is about trying to talk to the male demographic in a way that would bring them along and appeal to them."

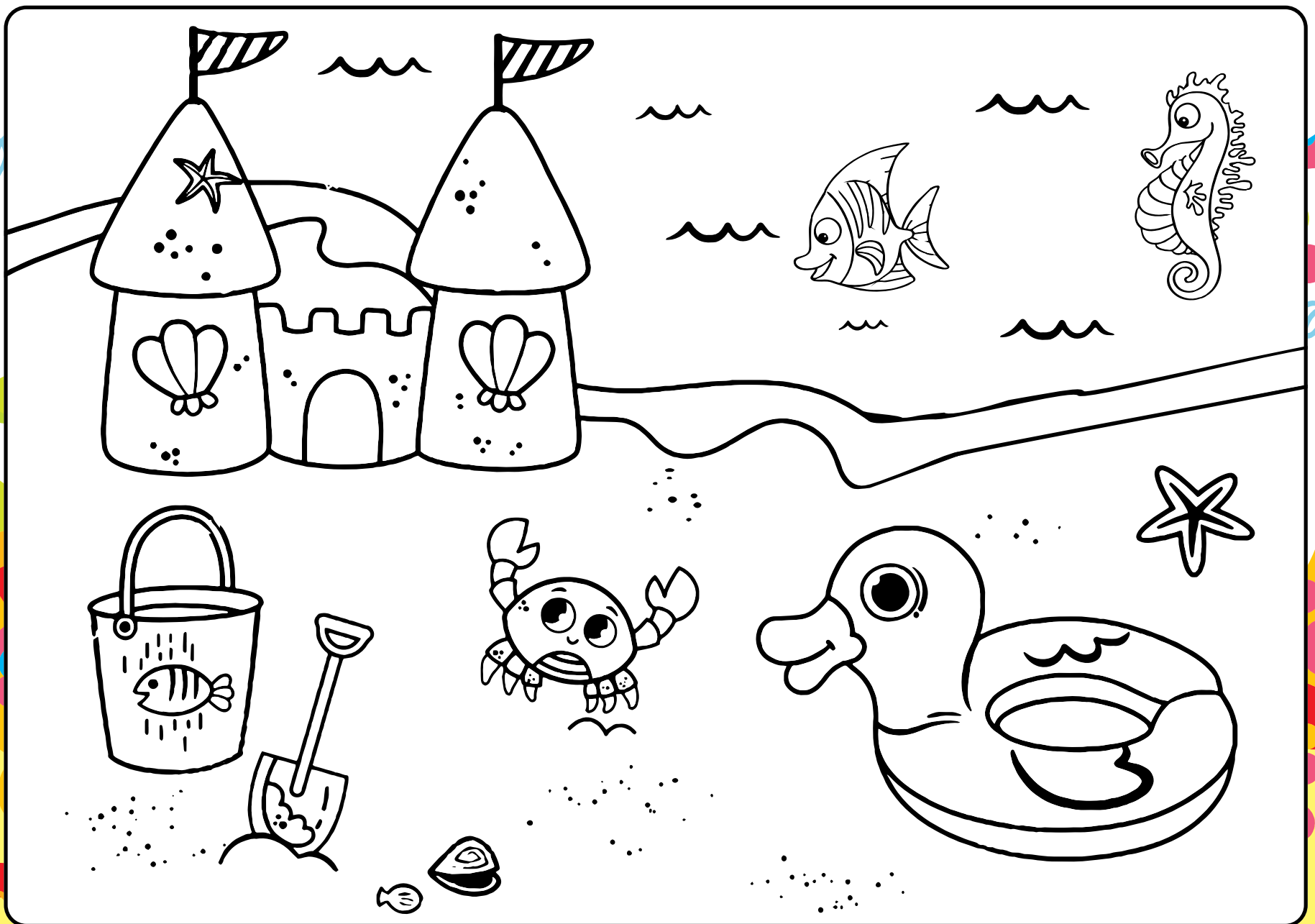

Rookie trainer lands a win

IT was only 12 months ago that Branhholme owner-trainer Laughlan McLean was at Tara Raceway with his first greyhound – Granny Said Go.

While she ran a few placings, he soon opted to move her on to another kennel in order to spend more time with a black dog pup by Aston Dee Bee that he had purchased from NSW.

The pup, whelped in May 2020 and now racing as Diego, made his debut over 305 metres at the Mount Gambier track last Sunday.

In a dashing display, he soon rounded up the Progryhoundtips.com Maiden Stake field, before racing away for a 5¼ lengths win in 18.12 seconds.

For McLean this was his first win, the 36-year-old attributing much of the success to his mentor – well known greyhound man Phil Lenehan of Toolong.

“It was purely by chance that one night, prior to becoming actively involved, I bumped into Phil at the Warrnambool dogs.

“He’s been a tremendous help ever since,” said McLean.

“When I told him I was looking for a pup he suggested I give serious consideration to Aston Dee Bee as a sire.

“Later, I purchased Diego as a pup through an advertisement posted on Greyhound Data.

“Since then it’s been a real hands-on exercise” he said.

He came down by road from Sydney and I picked him up at Geelong. Then I reared and broke-in Diego myself prior to taking on the training.”

Diego’s dam is eight-race NSW winner It’s A Shame, a daughter of Collision x Ritza Rita, and a litter sister to Rita’s Boy who won 24 races and \$140,000 in stake money.

And McLean will soon be making another trip to Geelong, to pick up a pup from It’s A Shame’s second litter, this time by Ritza Lenny.

The Tara Raceway Bartholomew Pick 6 \$500 jackpot was shared last Sunday when Kevin Jones and Steve Patzel – both regular contestants – successfully picked the winners of the six nominated races.

The Pick 6 was last won in April 2019 when Patzel’s brother, Kevin, selected School Report, Black Spring, Wanchai Express, China Catch ‘Em, Ben Nevis and Lektra Brandy.

Sponsored by Steve and Lee Bartholomew,

who add \$10 to the pool each week, the Pick 6 is a long-running free competition that requires on-course patrons to select the winners of races three through to eight.

Three short-priced winners in the form of Charley Davidson (\$1.45), Departure Gate (\$1.75) and Mini Banjo (\$2.00) would have seen a few players still in the mix at the half-way mark.

After a stirring battle in the home straight, finally the Pick 6 had once again been won.

In the Rock’s Tavern Stake (305 metres) Charley Davidson continued his recent stranglehold on Masters events at Tara Raceway last Sunday when winning his third consecutive race for greyhounds 3¼ years and over.

Having his 100th start, the son of Barcia Bale x Oriental Jewel brought up his 19th win, much to the delight of three of his Horsham-based owners – Matt, Shannon and Dyllan – members of the Matt Moose Bazza Shannon Dyllan Syndicate and on track for the race.

Charley Davidson has been in the syndicate’s ownership since June 2020 when Horsham trainer Bill Hartigan took over the black dog.

In September last year he was transferred to Tracie Price’s Compton kennels.

And another former Horsham greyhound in Minnie Banjo – now also trained by Price – brought up her fifth consecutive win when defeating Aston Dijon by eight lengths in the Hyland Fox Mixed Stake (400 m).

Laharum-based Garry Harding, part-owner and former trainer of the daughter of Banjo Boy x Navada Flame, watched on with considerable interest as Minnie Banjo carved out a winning time of 22.62 seconds – only a length outside Almighty Stripe’s track record.

With Attuned and Right Way also winning on Sunday, it was the second consecutive week that Price has trained four winners.

Another greyhound to run near-record time at the meeting was Departure Gate, trained at Moorak by Jason Newman who has also started the year off well with doubles at both Sunday meetings.

Departure Gate’s win over Starlight Dusty in the Commercial Hotel Mixed Stake (600 m) in 34.89 seconds was only 1½ lengths outside Pirate’s Curse’s track record of 34.79 seconds.

Jones' chance of a lifetime

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IT'S a big journey from riding winners at picnic race meetings in country Victoria such as Woolamai, to riding in front of royalty at the Dubai World Cup carnival.

However, that's the remarkable situation that Penola born jockey Caitlin Jones could find herself in as she prepares for six weeks in the Middle East.

Jones has had her highs and lows as a jockey and spent some of her apprenticeship here in the Limestone Coast with trainer Michael O'Leary.

With 274 winners to her credit, Jones is currently based in Adelaide and rides track work at Morphettville for the big stables of Richard and Chantelle Jolly, Will Clarken, Phillip Stokes and Ryan Balfour.

Clarken has been given the green light to take three horses (He's A Balter, Parsifal and Second Slip) to race in Dubai in the next couple of months.

Should the venture be successful, the aim is to then gain an invitation to the world's richest race meeting, the Dubai World Cup meeting on March 26 where \$42 million in stakemoney is on offer.

The three gallopers will be the first Australian entrants to compete in Dubai since 2019, and Clarken has selected Jones to be the stable rider for him in Dubai.

"I will ride at Penola (Thursday) and Murray Bridge (Saturday) before flying out next week," an excited Jones told The Border Watch earlier this week.

"It's a once in a lifetime thing and to be invited to be part of Will Clarken's team going to Dubai is a dream come true and it's going to be an experience to remember."

Jones has ridden overseas previously but only in track work while on a visit to England and Ireland.

SIDELINED INDEFINITELY

Jockey Dean Yendall is very popular with punters but his name will not be seen in form guides for quite some time.

Yendall was all set to win a race at Terang on December 20 when Saintly Robe was well clear with 60 metres to run.

The galloper veered to the left, hitting the running rail and dislodged Yendall who suffered neck injuries and was airlifted to the Alfred hospital in Melbourne.

47 year old Yendall, who has ridden around 2,600 winners including success at Group 1 level on six occasions, is now back home at Horsham. His neck and back are in a brace and he will be out of the saddle for

an indefinite period.

Meanwhile, the good run for local apprentice Jacob Opperman continued last weekend with a double at the city meeting at Gawler on Saturday.

He had some luck as both were late pick up rides when apprentice Angus Chung was unavailable, and made the most of it by winning aboard Kungka Maru (\$3.70 fav.) and Great Leveller (\$2.90 fav.) in successive races.

A treble seemed almost certain until his mount Tully's Gold was pipped on the post in the final event.

MADE IT FIVE IN A ROW

Following four successive wins on country Victorian tracks, it seemed only a matter of time before local trainer Steve Fennell headed to the city with the talented pacer Steele.

That occurred last Saturday evening when Steele made his South Australian debut at Globe Derby Park in the NR 58-69 pace over 1800 metres.

A smart drive by claiming reinsperson Samantha Pascoe enabled Steele (\$1.85 fav.) to have the run of the race behind the leader Ykikafil, and the only worry was when Ykikafil started to give ground on the home turn.

Pascoe seized the brief opportunity to ease Steele to the outside and the hot favourite quickly put paid to his rivals to win in a breeze by 7.5 metres in quick time (1.56.7).

It has been a huge seven months for Fennell at Globe Derby Park with 10 win-

ners in that period (Van Mara 8; Catch The Shark 1; Steele 1).

BONUS A BIG BOOST

Racing at bordertown last week was on a soft 5 surface initially before a track upgrade to a good 4 following race three.

Being the middle of summer with very little recent rain, the Bordertown club were under strict instructions from Racing SA officialdom prior to the meeting to produce a track with some give in it, and those instructions were heeded to perfectly.

The six mainly Naracoorte based owners of Maracourt in the 1100 metre maiden had a windfall in more ways than one when the Michael O'Leary trained performer put up a big effort to score on debut.

Ridden by Caitlin Jones, Maracourt had good backing (\$7.50-\$5) and came from near last at the 400 metres to win by half a length.

On top of the \$10,625 first prize, the owners also picked up another \$7,600 as Maracourt was qualified for the Racing Rewards SA bonus attached to the race.

Rider Karl Zechner is on the verge of moving to Queensland and took riding honours for the day with a winning double.

Despite a massive betting drift, Dexter You Devil (\$3.80-\$7) proved far too good for his rivals in the feature race, the BM 72 handicap over 1550 metres, beating the well backed Star Jan (\$8.50-\$4.60).

Ridden by his trainer Shayne Cahill, Dexter You Devil lugged the massive impost of 65 kilograms at only his second run

this campaign and is clearly on target to win his third successive Port Lincoln cup in early March.

"He carries weight well and needed a confidence booster following his unplaced run first up," Cahill stated.

Shock Alert stood out as the bet of the day in the 2000 metre BM 58 handicap following recent seconds in the Bordertown cup and in a \$100,000 race in Adelaide, and duly obliged.

A warm \$2.20 favourite, Shock Alert led all the way to give new apprentice Stacey Callow her third career win and first in the Limestone Coast, and it was the first winner for the new training combination of Jimmy and Lisa Dodgson.

"Stacey rated her beautifully out in front and, after a few niggles, he (Shock Alert) is building a good amount of confidence," Jimmy Dodgson said post race.

Punters got a shock when Dabay (\$16-\$21) won the 1200 metre BM 64 handicap, as did his trainer Sharon Hayes.

"It was a bit of a surprise as he has never settled last and run home strongly like that before," the Western Flat mentor stated.

For winning jockey Anna Jordsjo, who replaced Jacob Opperman who could not make the weight, it was her first ride for the Hayes stable and resulted in Dabay's second win from three starts this campaign.

The long established combination of trainer Richard Nicholson and jockey Jeff Maund united to win the final event with Deforce (\$12) who defied his big odds to comfortably lead all the way.

FINNIS PAIR DOMINATE AGAIN

Earlier this year, Australian harness racing authorities altered the racing season from what we have been accustomed to over the years.

Normally, the Australian harness racing season went from October 1 until September 30, but it has been moved to the calendar year (January 1-December 31).

It means that the harness racing season for the Mount Gambier club which commenced on October 13, 2020 was extended until December 31, 2021.

No surprises in regards to the winners of the trainer and driver premierships with Glencoe trainer Barry Finnis (15 wins) a clear winner, ahead of Graeme Howard and David Drury on 10 wins each.

And, it is yet another driver's title to Jayson Finnis (21 wins), well clear of David Drury (12) and Mark Phillips (10).

The next local harness meeting is a week away on Friday night, January 21.

A Day tough to beat

Council's Manager Operations and Engineering, Abdullah Mahmud said Council has sprayed the baseball diamonds to deter African Black Beetle grubs which were attracting corellas as a food source.

"The mowing specs have also been altered from a reel mower to a gang mower which will allow the grass to grow slightly longer with deeper roots meaning the corellas will not be able to easily uproot the turf," Mr Mahmud said.

Council has also delivered sand to assist the baseball league to fill the holes that the corellas created in the diamonds.

"Council has been very helpful," Mr Rundle said.

"Next Monday our committee will meet at the diamond being repaired and see how it's looking with the hope that we will be able to resume the normal game schedule next Friday."
