Saleyards splurge

THE District Council of Grant's bid for federal funding for the redevelopment of the Mount Gambier saleyards has been boosted with the Labor Party pledging \$2.7m, placing pressure on the State Liberal Government to match the commitment.

Today, the State Opposition announced that it would provide \$2.7m towards a redevelopment of the saleyards if elected to government next month.

Last year, the Grant council was unsuccessful with its application to the Federal Government to secure funding for the redevelopment which is believed to worth about \$11m.

Care risks exposed

BOANDIK Lodge in Mount Gambier has been labelled as posing an "immediate and severe risk" to the safety, health or well-being of its residents following a Covid-19 outbreak in the

The Federal Government's Aged Care Qual-

ity and Safety Commission (ACQSC), established after the Royal Commission into Aged Care, issued a notice to Boandik Lodge Inc last month stating it had "identified that there is an immediate and severe risk to the safety, health or well-being of care recipients to whom the approved provider is providing care".

The notice comes amid revelations this week that a resident of Boandik Lodge died in Mount Gambier hospital from Covid-19.

An advisor to assist in returning the facility to full compliance, as required by the notice from ACQSC, was appointed at Boandik Lodge's expense on January 23 and the residents and relatives were notified on January 25.

Until the compliance issues are addressed, a sanction has been placed on the facility that it will not be eligible to receive Commowealth subsidies for any new care recipients until

The notice requires Boandik Lodge Inc to provide, at its expense, training for its officers, employees and agents... and to demonstrate that it has provided that training.

Details on the notice reveal that the failures which led to the sanction being imposed were in the areas of personal and clinical care, and human resources.

Police continue fire probe

POLICE are continuing their investigation into the Crater Lakes fire which has been deemed as suspicious.

In a statement issued last week, Police also warned drone operators about the dangers of flying their drones near fire areas.

During the fire, a member of the public flew a drone in the vicinity of the fire resulting in air support having to be grounded for over 30 minutes, which hampered firefighting efforts.

"This act was not only reckless in consideration of the pilots who work in incredibly dangerous conditions, but selfish in the impact this could have had of the ongoing spread of the fire," Inspector Karmen Conway, acting officer in charge of the Limestone Coast Local Service Area said.

"Those with drones are reminded that there are strict rules when flying drones and these are legislated under Commonwealth Law.

"Critically, in this instance there was a 5nm (9.2km) exclusion zone for all unauthorised aircraft around the fire grounds.

"It is strongly advised that if you are going to use a drone, you know where and when you can operate the device.

"We thank the community for providing SAPOL information in regards to concerns relative to the use of the drone.

"All leads provided thus far have been investigated and at this time the investigation is ongoing," Inspector Conway said.

Training required by the notice "should include, but not be limited to, management of infection prevention and control, correct usage of PPE [personal protective equipment], identification and action to assist clinically deteriorating residents and human resources".

The facility must also participate in regular teleconferences with the Commission and ensure a regular written report is prepared and provided to enable the Commission to monitor its progress.

Boandik Lodge chief executive officer Gillian McGinty said there were a "number of details" regarding the decision including insufficient staff numbers due to Covidpositive cases but she would not comment on specific details.

"One of the reasons was due to the large number of staff testing positive and managing a large outbreak, which I think we are all learning at this stage," she said.

"What we would do now if there were another outbreak is completely different to what we would do in the future because of what we have learnt over the past few weeks.

"It is very disappointing that we haven't been found to meet the standards but we now need to improve on our processes and move forward," she said.

About 22 residents and 37 staff tested positive throughout the Covid-19 outbreak with Ms McGinty hoping the facility would be Covid-free by the end of the week.

"We have cleared our residents who had Covid and are just waiting on the final testing results to come through," Ms McGinty said. "Hopefully we will be able to declare the outbreak over and get back to some form of normality."

Remembering Crater fires from childhood

IT has been 78 years since the last Crater Lakes fire with long-term Mount Gambier resident, Dorothy Koop, remembering the ordeal.

When she was just four years old, Ms Koop recalled seeing the devastation from the fire which was started by a bullet ricochet at the old rifle range on January 21, 1944.

It was reported in The Border Watch the next day that the fire started at around 4 o'clock the evening before with about 30 volunteers helping to extinguish the blaze.

By 2.30 the following morning, the fire was under control.

"I remember my father, Thomas, coming home after fighting the fire and he was covered in soot and dirt," Ms Koop said.

'He came home to milk the cows because Mum had the two kids at the time, and once he was done he went back to the fire to help."

Ms Koop said she also remembered her mother and father speaking about how devastating the fire was with volunteers using sand and buckets to fight the fire.

"It was very different to how they deal with

fires today," she said.

"They had to use sand and buckets because they didn't have the equipment we have now."

Remembering seeing the area after the fire for the first time, Ms Koop said it was "scarred and black" with everything burnt down.

"The entire area was burnt, so it was a bigger fire than this time, but I am looking forward to watching the vegetation grow back,"

"It was amazing to watch last time."

As for the fire last week, Ms Koop said she followed the incident extensively on social

"I sent photos to my sons who don't live here anymore and they couldn't believe it,"

'Some of the photos people took were brilliant and especially at night-time."

Ms Koop congratulated volunteers on their efforts to stamp out the fire and said the modern technology for fighting fires was a blessing.

"It is so much easier for firefighters these days with the trucks and equipment because we have the technology to fight fires properly,"

"There was nothing like that when my dad was fighting fires back in the day."

Following the recent devastation of the Crater Lakes, the area is now back under control of Mount Gambier City Council which is urging people to stay away from the area until the council advises it is safe.

The cause of the fire is still being investigated by police with anyone with any information encouraged to call CrimeStoppers on

The application, through the Building Better Regions Fund, requires a contribution from council and the State

Grant council is expected to submit a further application to the Federal Government this month.

The State Liberal Government is yet to commit any funding.

Labor Leader Peter Malinauskas said: "...the Limestone Coast has huge potential in terms of growing its economic

"The major upgrade of the saleyards could provide an increase of an estimated 20 to 30 per cent of weekly fat market

"Increased sales mean more opportunities for primary producers and local

"Add all that up, and it means more jobs.'

The saleyards are the largest cattle livestock exchange facility in the Limestone Coast, and a significant contributor to the region's agricultural economy.

The District Council of Grant proposal for funding from all three tiers of government at the saleyards is for work that includes, 300mm soft fall flooring, the replacement of concrete slabs on the buyers' walkways, constructing a roof over its cattle yards and loading ramps, increasing the size of selling pens, installing solar panels, a new, modern rainwater harvesting and watering system, and an audio-visual system to allow online sales.

Owned and operated by the District Council of Grant since it opened in 1977, the Mount Gambier and Districts Saleyards will also receive several other upgrades to improve accessibility and safety at the yards, and more efficient systems to safely increase the amount of cattle that can fit in the yard at any one

Over the financial years 2014/15 to 2019/20 the average value of livestock transactions through the facility was \$118.6m per annum, while in 2019/20 transactions rose to nearly \$123 mil-

Labor said 70 per cent of beef production in Australia is exported, and this saleyard is supporting South Australia's efforts to expand its meat production footprint.

Shadow Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said the saleyards are a major economic contributor for the region, and this funding will ensure that footprint only grows.

"Local primary producers and businesses have had many challenges in recent years, an investment in them and their work is ultimately an investment in the future of our State," she said.

Call to keep reporting Covid 19

WITH the number of reported active Covid-19 cases dropping in the Limestone Coast, the region's top health official has reminded residents of the obligation to report any positive case, including those revealed by a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) taken at home.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network Executive Director of Medical Services, Dr Elaine Pretorius said: "While we have seen the number of positive Covid-19 cases drop recently in South Australia, we would like to remind members of the community to follow health advice and the process for reporting a positive Covid-19 test result.

"You must report your positive result within 24 hours through the online form on the SA Health website if you get your test from a designated RAT Collection Point, from a retail outlet, from your workplace or any other means.

"You can also report negative and invalid results, which help give SA Health a more accurate picture of Covid-19 rates in South Australia.

"It is important we keep track of our Covid-19 rates in our community so we can continue to actively respond to Covid-19 and manage the way we deliver care in our health facilities.

"If you don't have a mobile phone with internet access, you can report your positive result by calling the SA Covid-19 Information Line on 1800 253 787.

"You should get a PCR test as soon as you develop any Covid-19 symptoms and are not a close contact.

"If you test positive to a RAT, this is considered a case.

"You do not need to get a PCR test confirm your result, however you are required to report your result within 24 hours, isolate for 10 days from the day you had a positive result, and notify your close contacts that you have tested positive."

MacKillop contender

FORMER Wattle Range Mayor, Mark Braes will contest the upcoming State election as the Labor party's candidate in MacKillop.

After nine years away from the region, Mr Braes returned in May last year to live in Millicent and was announced last month as the Labor Party's candidate for the safe Liberal seat of MacKillop which is held by incumbent Nick McBride.

Mr Braes was Mayor of Wattle Range Council for four years until 2010 and also held leadership roles locally in Regional Development and Natural Resources Management.

Prior to his return to Millicent, Mr Braes spent four years working in Adelaide for the Workers Compensation Tribunal and then worked in mediation services for five years in his birth place of Broken Hill.

He has now set up his own local mediation business based in Millicent, called Braes Me-

diation Solutions.

"I felt I needed to get back involved," Mr Braes told The Border Watch when he was seen at Wattle Range Council's Australia Day Awards ceremony where he was in attendance on behalf on Labor MLC Clare Scriven.

"Health is front of mind," he said adding that Labor Leader, Peter Malinauskas recently visited the Limestone Coast to announce more than \$52 million in pledges for the region's health system.

"But that money is only spent if you elect a Labor Government and I will be reminding people in MacKillop of that," Mr Braes said.

He said people had asked him why he would put himself forward as a Labor candidate in such a safe Liberal seat as MacKillop.

"One reporter asked 'Why, you are only going to lose, but for me winning is not always the motivation," Mr Braes said.

"I am about ensuring that in every political contest there is a genuine contest.

"I'm about telling people why Labor will make for a better society and to point out the deficits of the current government.

"It's the first time I have been preselected as a candidate and I intend to give it my best

Mr Braes said he intended to get himself out into the community to talk with people.

"I will be moving around the electorate and listening to people and will be letting people know where they can see me," he said.

Mr Braes is the second candidate to announce their intention to compete with Nick McBride for the seat of MacKillop with President of the SA Nationals, Tintinara farmer, Jonathan Pietzch announcing his candidacy

QR code retail relief

QR CODE check-ins are no longer required for retail customers in South Australia.

Taking effect last Saturday, the removal of QR code check-ins was one of the Covid-19 restrictions to be eased by the State Government

As a result QR check-ins are no longer be needed for general retail, but would remain in use at high-risk locations such as aged care and health facilities.

Owner of Mount Gambier fashion shop Redgum Country, Wendy Richardson is hopeful the change will lead to more people in her stores

"I think it will help retail a lot," she said.

"People have been reluctant; they would prefer not to go out to places while QR codes were in use. "I think it will help the traffic flow a bit better.

"It will also be a lot easier on the staff, they will not have to do that extra job of checking that everyone is checking in." Ms Richardson said while most customers have embraced the change, some have been looking for the QR code unaware of the update.

"I have had to tell them they do not need to do it anymore," she said.

Capacity limits for hospitality venues have also been doubled from $25\ \text{to}\ 50\ \text{per}$ cent.

Ms Richardson said she is hopeful that if more people go out for meals or events it will mean more business. "Hopefully it will help with confidence, and people will start to go back to cafes and restaurants," she said.

"If people go out they may be happy to purchase something new to wear.

"We definitely have had more traffic flow now the weddings and special occasions are coming back in the last week."

Robe records lowest Covid case numbers

IRONICALLY, Robe currently has the lowest number of active Covid-19 cases in the Limestone Coast after the seaside town became the epi-centre of the virus's spread throughout the region after the Christmas/New Year period.

As at Wednesday this week there were 3,513 total confirmed positive cases from across the Limestone Coast since the pandemic began, and most of these have occurred since the last festive season.

As people have recovered the numbers have reduced but new cases continue to be reported and the number of active cases total 551 across the Limestone Coast as of Wednesday.

The highest number of active cases is recorded in the City of Mount Gambier area with 229 cases, followed by Tatiara with 117 cases, Grant District Council area with 70 cases, Naracoorte/Lucindale council area with 60 cases, Wattle Range Council area with 54, Kingston with 11 and Robe with 10.

ACROSS SA, as of Wednesday, there were 1723 new cases, 18741 active cases and 108,804 total confirmed cases.

There were 233 patients in hospital and 21 of them in intensive care units as of Wednesday.

During the pandemic there have been 121 deaths across the

Bay festival put on hold another year

THE popular Bay Escape celebrations have been put off for another year due to ongoing concerns surrounding Covid-19.

Deciding to cancel the 2022 event recently, the festival committee said it was a disappointing decision which had to be made.

Speaking on behalf of the committee, Ryan Donovan said it seemed like the best decision for the community.

"It was not an easy decision to make," Mr Donovan said.

"There is a lot that goes into putting the event on and the ongoing changes makes it tricky to gamble on the future."

The family friendly event had been successful for a number of decades with the last festival held in 2020 mere months before the pandemic hit the nation.

"Just after we held the 2020 festival things started getting tricky," he said.

"Back then we had around 4000 to 5000 people coming through the gates across the day."

Mr Donovan said the committee decided against hosting the event due to logistical difficulties such as monitoring QR code check ins and funneling people through one gate at a time.

"It is disappointing to cancel twice especially as we went through a lot of rebranding in 2020, but we also received a lot of positive feedback that year which is great," he said.

"Not being able to build on that has been frustrating but we are hoping to make it bigger and better next year as it has given us more time to plan."

Wanting to build the festival up, Mr Donovan said it would take time and effort but would be worth it in the end.

"The community has shown disappointment that it has been cancelled again but I

think by now they are mostly used to it and accepting that events are still being cancelled," he said.

"People are disappointed but not surprised."

Community members who wish to help in running the 2023 Bay Escape festival are able to register an expression of interest by contacting the committee.

Police car rammed

AN offender tried to escape police in Mount Gambier this week, with a police officer still in the car.

Police reported that the incident began just after 9.30am on Tuesday when police sighted a stolen BMW sedan with two occupants on Pick Avenue.

The car had allegedly been involved in a petrol drive off at Nangwarry a short time earlier and in metropolitan Adelaide the day prior.

Police attempted to stop the driver however he refused and sped off onto the incorrect side of Jubilee Highway.

Patrols then found the car stalled on Wireless Road East where police approached and attempted to arrest the driver.

The accused was able to start the car and drove off with an officer inside the front passenger area.

He then crashed into a police vehicle before leaving the road and crashing into a tree.

The driver, a 34-year-old man from Kilburn, has been charged with illegal use of a car, aggravated drive dangerously to evade police, two counts of drive in a manner dangerous, acts to endanger life, four counts of driving unlicensed, two counts of make off without payment and possess firearm without licence and possess unregistered firearm after police located a gel blaster in the car.

He was refused bail and appeared in the Mt Gambier Magistrates Court on Wednesday.

Indoor skating call

THERE have been fresh calls for an indoor skating rink following the release of Mount Gambier City Council's Sport, Recreation and Open Space strategy.

Officially endorsed at the January council meeting, elected members discussed the new document which specifies potential improvements to a number of outdoor areas across the Blue Lake City.

The document suggests high priority strategic recommendations for the popular Railway Lands precinct including a newly developed skate park, three-by-three basketball court, ping pong tables and other components.

However, avid roller skaters have expressed the need for an indoor rink rather than another outdoor park due to ongoing issues surrounding litter and broken glass in the area.

Roller skating teacher Kylie Bamford said due to the ongoing issues across the Railway Lands it could make it difficult for people to practice their skills without risking injury.

"At the moment we use the old hospital grounds and sometimes the Railway Lands but unfortunately we can encounter rubbish or broken glass which makes it really dangerous if anyone falls," Ms Bamford said.

"This type of sport is better learnt indoors and places such as the new Wulanda Recreation Centre which would be great for indoor roller skating."

Ms Bamford congratulated council on its attempt to improve outdoor areas, yet believed the Railway Lands would benefit from other improvements.

"I feel the Railway Lands is better suited to its beautiful landscape area with more art sculptures and ponds to make the centre of

the town stronger for tourism," she said.

"Whereas other skate parks could benefit from upgrades and shelter from the winter weather."

Mount Gambier City Council general manager for city growth Tim Coote said those interested in providing different ideas were able to do so through the council's Have Your Say website.

"Those who have ideas are also welcome to have a good read and a look at the strategy and read the recommendations that are coming from the strategy document," Mr Coote said.

"Council is interested in looking at ideas which are inline with the strategy and if someone has good ideas they should present them.

"We are happy to consider all ideas, however indoor facilities come with other constraints and considerations which is the benefit of having this document because when plans do come along we are able to align it with our strategic focus."

ELECTION campaigns usually have at least two contenders showering our communities with promises.

With only six weeks until we go to the polls, it seems to be a one-way campaign.

In recent months the Labor Party has made pledges worth tens of millions of dollars for the Limestone Coast.

These pledges of funding range from a new technical school, health services including the Mount Gambier, Keith and Naracoorte hospitals - and today the Mount Gambier saleyards.

Whether correctly or not, Labor has traditionally been seen by the voters as the party with a strong-hold on health and education.

On the other hand, primary industries, particularly farming, is the other end of the pendulum for Labor - it's not Labor's

Tourism's mixed bag

TOURISM outlook numbers across the State hit their lowest point since 2010 at the end of last year, but local accommodation providers are still optimistic about the future.

The latest tourism industry data from the Tourism Industry Council of South Australia (TiCSA) shows business outlook has deteriorated to the second-lowest level since 2010, after further restrictions and uncertainty leaves businesses struggling to stay afloat.

The survey undertaken by 370 businesses across the State for the October to December 2021 quarter suggested that the constantly changing environment and lack of support still posed a threat to the tourism industry.

Michael Kosch, director of Mount Gambier accommodation businesses The Commodore and The Henty, said the outlook seemed bleak last year.

"I would say our numbers through that period up until the borders reopened were terrible," Mr Kosch said.

"They were very down through that period." However, since the borders reopened, Mr Koch said business has grown again.

"We had a very good January, our January was more than 10 per cent better than last year," he said.

"Even better than January in 2020 or 2019.

"I am actually quite optimistic about the future.

"I think we are through the worst of it."

While a busy summer was welcome news, Mr Kosch said it would not cover losses from 2021 which were felt strongly in the region.

"The Limestone Coast has suffered significantly compared to other tourist regions," he said.

"We are fortunately, but unfortunately located so close to the Victorian border that we get smashed by not having that market segment which is traditionally 55 to 60 per cent of our business.

"The Great Ocean Road is a really big tourism drawcard that keeps people on the road between Adelaide and Melbourne."

Mr Kosch said accommodation numbers are improving, it is a different outlook for restaurants attached to the businesses.

"The capacity restrictions are not the issue, it is the public confidence that they are not prepared to go out," he said.

"They are too concerned about getting covid or being a close contact.

"Businesses cannot make money at 50 per cent density.

"We need some government confidence and reassurance provided to people so they can go out and live their lives, visit the local pubs or restaurants."

TiCSA Chief Executive Officer, Shaun de Bruyn said that these results show a desperate need for industry assistance.

"Last quarter's Barometer reinforces that now, more than ever, our tourism industry needs support to survive, and then recover, from the effects of the pandemic," Mr De Bruyn said.

"A staggering \$2.3 billion has been wiped off the value of our visitor economy since the start of the pandemic.

"As such, we continue to push for further restart and recovery funding for tourism businesses here in SA."

Offering further Support

ADDITIONAL cash grants of up to \$22,000, more 'Great State' vouchers, and Adelaide CBD dining out vouchers, are key features of the latest State Government funded business support package for hospitality and tourism businesses, gyms and other businesses impacted by Covid-19 restrictions.

Announced this week, the cash grants will be automatically paid to previous recipients of the Tourism, Hospitality and Gym Grant and the Business Hardship Grant, paid by the State Government in January this year.

For other businesses that meet the turnover decline criteria between 10 January and 30 January 2022 – 30 per cent turnover decline for the Tourism, Hospitality and Gym Grant and those impacted by the one person per seven square metre density restrictions, and 50 per cent turnover reduction for all others – the grants will be application based.

Accommodation and Tours and Experiences of the Great State voucher scheme are another key element of this businesses support package, and 160,000 vouchers will be up for grabs across accommodation, tours and experiences – equating to more than half of the total number of vouchers issued in the scheme to date.

Automatic payments are expected to start today.

From Penola, Samantha Freeman will be teaching physical education at MHS to mark the beginning of her teaching career after finishing her studies last year.

Teaching Japanese part time at MHS will be Monika Lenart.

Mr Watson said these staff joined a great

"The great staff has been a drawcard for me to take this job and also, being a local, I feel it is important to give to the area you live in and have a vested interest in for its future," he said.

"I'm looking forward to the year and what challenges it may bring."

Future residential allotments

VACANT land along Fifth Street in Millicent may become available for future residential allotments if Wattle Range Council's aim to purchase the land freehold from the State Government is realised.

At council's meeting recently, elected members agreed to a staff recommendation to consult residents about removing the land's classification as 'community which, if the public are in agreeance, will allow the State Government to release the land as freehold for purchase by council at an agreed purchase price of \$71,500.

Currently the land is Crown Land under the care and control of council and contains community facilities including the Road Safety School, Lions Den, Men's Shed and Craft Centre.

These facilities would be protected to continue their activities as normal under the proposal for purchase by Council.

The proposal would allow council to divide the triangular piece of land so that the community facilities were included on one allotment, while the remaining vacant land, which covers about 2.8 hectares, could be sold by council for potential residential allotments.

The existing adjacent Belt Road walking track would be unaffected by the proposal.

The State Government first approached council to ascertain its interest in purchasing the land in 2020 and work has under been underway ever since to progress the

"Council's future intent for the land is to undertake a realignment of the boundaries to enable all of the Community Hub assets to be located on one land parcel to simplify future land administration of these assets," said a staff report to council's meeting last

"In respect to the balance of the land there is potential for this land to be subdi-

vided from the community hub assets area (without impacting the Belt Road linear reserve) to encourage expansion of residential allotments which is in short supply in the Millicent township currently."

Queen Mother's gardener

MANY South Easterners know him as the knowledgeable voice often heard on a Saturday morning local radio gardening show,

or the chap among masses of plants helping customers at one of Mount Gambier's plant nurseries.

But the Queen Mother knew him too.

He is Gardenarium owner, Calum Haygarth who began his career in the Queen Mother's employ at the Castle of Mey on the north coast of Scotland.

Born at Thurso in Caithness County, Calum grew up with the imposing 450 year old castle being a part of the every day scenery and its owner, the Queen Mother, being a twice a year

The Queen Mother had purchased the castle in 1952 following the death that year of her husband, King George, and her daughter Elizabeth becoming the new monarch.

It had been used as an officers' rest home during the Second World War and fallen into disrepair.

The Queen Mother restored the castle and used it as a holiday home each August and October until her death in 2002.

Built in one of the most inhospitable places in the United Kingdom, the Castle of Mey is known for its garden surrounded by high walls which shield the plants within from relentless

Calum was to become one of the Castle staff tending this protected garden.

With a long line of green thumbs in his family, Calum had a passion for gardening but it was his family's other skills that gave Calum a link to the Royal Family.

His grandmother was a dressmaker and haberdasher whose customers included the Queen Mother, and Calum said his grandmother sometimes would have her lunch at the Castle sitting on the Queen Mother's bed which was adorned with her handiwork.

Also, his father's gunsmith business had a Royal Warrant to supply the Royal Family with firearms and crossbows for pheasant shooting and Calum recalled, as a boy, going to the castle to deliver guns.

Calum's brother continues this business

This association made his family confident enough to encourage Calum, then 16 years old, to write a letter to the Queen Mother ask-

ing for a job.

He wrote the letter, and got a job - simple

For the next 18 months, Calum worked in the garden at the Castle of Mey, tending to its 30 acres of parklands, high hedges, orchards, and vegetable and herb plots which supplied the Castle's kitchen.

"I'd get a list from the cook in the morning and, armed with a wooden wheelbarrow, I'd collect everything that was on the list and bring it back - all the Castle needed in fruit and vegetables, cut flowers and indoor plants came from the garden," Calum said.

Another one of Calum's tasks involved raising and lowering the Castle flag which sounds simple enough except the flag pole was on the highest tower of the castle and would require him to climb up the pole, hauling a large and heavy flag with him - not a job for the faint hearted.

Thankfully the flag was only flown when the Queen Mother was in residence which, Calum recalled, were the most exciting times.

"The Family would come from Balmoral and sail up while their entourage in cars would come overland to meet them.

"It was quite a big thing for Thurso.

"There were always lots of security officers when she (the Queen Mother) was in residence," Calum said, recalling an incident where the Queen Mother, in her familiar blue raincoat, walked from the Castle to the nearby ocean with her dogs, without alerting security officers, for which she was 'told off' on her re-

He recalled having spoken with the Queen Mother and found her very amicable.

"I was nervous the first time - I mean, what do you say to the Queen Mother - but she'd talk to you like normal," Calum said.

"The Queen Mother would come into the garden with her corgis and she had a favourite bench she sat on in the rose garden.

"She did love her roses and often sat on that bench in the 'Shell Garden' and would have a chat with the staff.'

On one of these occasions, the Queen Mother presented Calum with a book on Caithness County, which he treasures to this

His stint at the Castle proved to be a launch pad for him and he climbed as high as he could on the horticultural ladder, completing a degree in horticulture at the University of Birmingham majoring in landscape design.

And, at the age of just 18, he won a gold medal at the the world's top flower show, the Royal Chelsea Flower Show in England.

Pursuing his career further meant leaving England on horticultural exchanges, the first being to Australia 33 years ago when he was 20 years old, then to the United States of America, on to Canada and back to London.

He returned to Australia almost 30 years ago to work at Conboy's Nursery in Mount Gambier and he has remained in the city ever since although in more recent years as the owner of Gardenarium which he operates with his wife Sandra.

Stakeholder committee

A NEW committee has been formed to advise Wattle Range Council on the operational management and long-term planning of the Millicent saleyards.

To be made up of representatives of stock agents, vendors, carriers, stock contractors and elected members of council, the committee came into being following a motion successfully put to council's meeting last month by Deputy Mayor, Moira Neagle.

During debate on the motion, Cr Neagle said the committee would be in line with the \$689,000 commitment that was made by council in December to fund immediate maintenance needs at the saleyards.

"To have a formal forum would make the best use of the funds and guide the maintenance of our saleyards," Cr Neagle said.

Cr Neagle also attempted to move a motion to include a statement, that outlines the ongoing provision of the saleyards asset for community use, in the Wattle Range Council Strategic Plan with an appropriate allocation of funds for its maintenance and renewal in the long-term financial plan.

However, Cr Neagle withdrew her motion as it was considered inappropriate to commit future councils to funding, with Council elections due this November.

"I would prefer to have a long term commitment to the saleyards and that is the problem that there has not been a commit-



ment," she said.

Cr Dale Price said the issue with the saleyards has been the reducing number of cattle being sold at the Millicent saleyards.

"People are voting with their feet and sending stock elsewhere," he said.

"But I think that the Section 41 committee will be useful for getting advice flowing both

THE National Farmers Federation (NFF) has welcomed a shot in the arm for the sector's goal to reach \$100 billion in farm gate output by 2030 with the Government significantly bolstering investment in the traceability of Australian agricultural products.

NFF chief executive Tony Mahar said \$64.8 million to expand and streamline traceability, as announced by Federal Agriculture Minister David Littleproud this week, would deliver multi-pronged benefits to farmers.

"The more confidence our international customers have in our farm products and how they are sustainably produced, the more they will be willing to pay and the more they will buy," Mr Mahar said.

"Importers increasingly want to better understand the process behind the product; the paddock to plate story, and to be assured that what they are buying has been grown and produced in a way that meets community expectations.

The increased funding will help farmers more effectively and efficiently demonstrate their biosecurity and production credentials through the harmonisation of reporting frameworks.







Hungry for romance

Australian-made rom-com series Wolf Like Me is a love story with a surprising twist that reflects how scary a new relationship can be,

writes Lauren Mitchell

■inding love isn't easy these days. It can get pretty complicated when we all bring our own set of baggage to a new relationship.

That's where Wolf Like Me, a fresh and subversive romantic comedy series from *Little Monsters* writer-director Abe Forsythe,

The show, a genre-defying and heartfelt drama produced by Jodi Matterson (Nine Perfect Strangers), Bruna Papandrea (Big Little Lies) and Steve Hutensky (The Dry) is based on Forsythe's own life experiences as a 40-something single parent.

Josh Gad stars as Gary, a widowed dad living in Adelaide who's been very unsuccessful in his attempts to find love again, mostly because his focus is always on connecting with his 11-year-old daughter Emma (Ariel Donoghue).

When Mary (Isla Fisher), a dynamic and mysterious stranger, crashes into their car, she forms a sudden and strong bond with anxiety-stricken Emma that leaves Gary speechless.

Several coincidences and chance meetings later, it becomes clear that something between Mary and Gary is meant to be, but Mary has a complicated history of her own and is wary of bringing someone into her life.

A romantic lead role isn't where viewers would usually find Gad, a Broadway star who's known for his work on comedy series Avenue 5 and The Comedians and - perhaps most famously - as the voice of snowman Olaf in Frozen, which is exactly why Forsythe cast him as Gary.

"I worked with Josh on my last movie, so I got to know him really well, and I knew what a fantastic actor he is, but also what a great father he is. too." Forsythe told journalist Berge Garabedian.

"Just knowing that I hadn't seen him play something like that before dramatically, he's such a great actor.

"I'm a big believer that in order to be good at comedy, you have to be dramatically sound as an actor. These aren't the roles that you would be expecting to see them in, and a big [part] of this story is about subverting expectations and to not judge a book by its cover."

For Fisher, it's likewise a welcome departure from the ditzy love interest roles like Wedding Crashers and Confessions of a Shopaholic that she's typically cast in.

"The idea of playing, you know, in a sort-of genre-bending piece, is obviously something I've never been offered before," Fisher told Stan's Renee Bargh.

"I loved how beautiful these characters were, how flawed

Playing opposite Gad sweetened the deal for the Australian actress,



who jumped at the chance to work alongside her friend.

"I knew that we'd have a great time, and obviously when you play in a love story, you need to know the chemistry's there and I felt secure that I could pull that bit off," she said.

That chemistry between Mary and Gary is evident from their first encounter, and continues off-screen.

"I came on board after Isla, and quite a big part of the reason why I wanted to do it was because I had been obsessed with Isla for years," Gad confessed to Bargh.

"I had wanted to work with her forever - we were actually looking at another project together. And, then this one sort of happened and I read

the script and just fell in love with it, tell in love with the idea of working with her, with Abe [Forsythe] again, after Little Monsters, and it was just, it was easy.'

The third and final piece of the casting puzzle was Donoghue, who portrays Gary's daughter Emma with vulnerability, but also a wisdom beyond her years. Forsythe went through an extensive process to find the right actor for the role.

"She's got a face that, you put the camera on her, and it's saying so much without doing practically anything," the filmmaker said.

"It's kind of scary, actually, how much the camera picks up and how little she does, particularly because she's only 12 years old."

Forsythe directed the trio to play Wolf Like Me straight, as an earnest love story, but there is a piquant twist hidden in plain sight that brings plenty of comedy to the situation. It's a secret best kept under lock and key for viewers, but helps make sense of celebrated comedy-horror filmmaker Forsythe's sudden and surprising move into romance

"The more seriously and dramatically they play the material, the funnier it becomes once you realise what they're actually dealing with," Forsythe said.

However, it takes some time for the twist to be revealed, allowing Mary and Gary to explore their newfound bond and the incredible set of circumstances they find themselves in.

"For me, to be honest it was about withholding it for as long as possible," Forsythe said.

"At the end of the day, it's meant to be something scary, but I think that there's something quite beautiful about it, as well."

While it turns out that Mary and Gary's relationship has some pretty uncommon and extreme hurdles in their way, the series still shows a remarkably relatable courtship process.

"I think it's a drama about the obstacles, or the baggage, we overcome to enjoy a romantic relationship and feel vulnerable and safe, having intimacy with another person," Fisher said.

"It's about putting your fears aside and jumping into the unknown when it seems unbelievably fraught with danger, and chaos, and all of those things," Gad added.

"These two, from their first chance encounter, it's like fate is putting out a hand and reaching in and forcing them together to allow both of them to come out of their shells."

Here are some painting tips and tricks to help you achieve these looks in your own home:

- 1: Sand all dressed timber.
- 2: For timber surfaces, fill nail holes with a flexible, exterior wood-filler.
- 3: Ensure filled/putty surface is sound by conducting an adhesion test.
- 4. Test the adhesion on all previously painted surfaces by cutting a small 'X' through the existing paint with a sharp blade, press cellulose tape firmly across the cut and then rip off the tape. If the paint comes off, it is unsound and should be removed.

- fuelled a new level of public interest in celebrity's lives.

Pam & Tommy, a new Disney+ series, tells the story of the couple's whirlwind '90s marriage, the unauthorised release of their intimate moments and ensuing legal drama.

It stars an unrecognisable Lily James (Mamma Mia! Here We Go Again) and Sebastian Stan (Captain America: The Winter Soldier). With the help of special-effects prosthetics, makeup, fake tattoos and piercings, it's hard to distinguish the actors from their real-life counterparts.

The tape - which was stolen by scorned handyman Rand Gauthier (Seth Rogen) and distributed quietly in bootleg-VHS form for two years before landing on the internet - made a cultural hero out of Lee, while Anderson became the punchline of jokes around the world, shamed and constantly objectified.

The double standard in their treatment is a poignant takeaway from this series, which succeeds in its attempts to redeem Anderson's humanity and earn sympathy for the actress in telling her side of the story, but curiously does so without the real Anderson's approval.







Two exhibitions at Riddoch

TWO new exhibitions will open at the Riddoch Arts and Cultural Centre on Saturday.

'Curious Minds: Women of the South East' will present the work of three iconic women of the region, known for their independent spirit and enduring art legacy, while 'Petrichor' will showcase video work by artist Georgia Button.

'Curious Minds' will feature an extensive selection of works from the Riddoch Collection by iconic local artists including Cathleen Edkins, Iris Fram and Lorry Humphreys.

"Born between 1915 and 1930, these three women not only lived through World War II, but also witnessed the beginnings of the 21st century," Riddoch Arts and Cultural Team Leader Curatorial Serena Wong said.

"Iris Frame, on the other hand, created wonderful characters and stories that described local natural and social phenomena around her, with a colourful and chaotic energy, while Lorry's work in the Riddoch Collection is driven by abstraction and use of colour and line in bold ways," Ms Wong said.

Georgia Button is a South Australian based multidisciplinary artist, working primarily with video, sound and installation.

Her exhibition 'Petrichor' is named after the word that described the smell of rain after a period of warm dry weather, drawing on her experience of growing up on a farm in the mid-north region of South Australia.

"Petrichor is immersive, meditative work that reflects on what it means to come from generations of farmers," Ms Wong said

"Taking an intimate look at seemingly mundane or everyday scenes, it is a poetic and thoughtful narrative about the ground we stand on and how we live and interact with it."

'Curious Minds' will be at the Riddoch Centre until March 27 while 'Petrichor' will be on display until April 3.



Fisho's treat

JAMIE COATES

on the water

VERY fishable weather greeted anglers over the past weekend, and it was great to see so many fishos hitting the water.

There was a great mix of fish boated, so we've got a bit to get through.

The offshore fishing has continued to impress again this week with some fabulous shark captures being reported.

School and gummy shark have both been on the menu this week, and in a real mixture of depths.

Fish have come from as close as five metres around the kelp, through to 100m and beyond.

There's some serious fish in with them too, a few of the gummy's have been well over 20kg, and some of the schoolies pushing 30kg.

It's not all sharks out there though, the reef fish have been excellent too.

We've seen some real mixed bags, everything from hapuka, blue eye and pink ling over the shelf, through to blue morwong, snapper, nannygai, terakhi and knifejaw from the 50mt line and beyond.

Still no tuna news for the locals here, but like last week, Portland and Victor Harbour either side of us are still producing some great fish, some nudging 30kgs.

We've heard of plenty of bait and signs of life out there, so I'm sure it's only a matter of time until we hear of fish caught here.

Surf fishos have enjoyed the calm seas and nice weather over the past week by putting the hours in on the beach.

The fishing has been fairly rewarding for most, with plenty of anglers taking a feed home.

The gummies have been the main target for most anglers along the South Eastern beaches, and snapper a very close second.

It's always great fun chasing snapper off the beach, even better when some are cracking the 60cm mark.

There haven't been any real hot spots, but I have had reports from Piccininni, Paradise and Blackfellows Caves.

There have been a few anglers fishing through Canunda recently and the salmon fishing has been pretty good for this time of year.

Usually we'd expect bigger numbers of salmon during the cooler months, but it's great to see them here now.

As the sun sets down that way, we're seeing some nice sharks caught, and fresh salmon fillet seems to be the number one bait for them.

Channel and Whale Rock have been the pick of spots for the shark in the evenings, but I have heard of fish as far south as the old drain.

If you're new to the area, the beaches of Canunda are a very treacherous place with many vehicles being lost to the seas down there.

The best bet is to keep your cars off the beach and up nice and high, and head in with a couple of vehicles.

A little bit of stir late last week was just what

the whiting fishos had hoped for, and judging by the reports I've heard from the weekend and earlier this week, it's what the whiting needed too.

The fishing has been phenomenal right across the South East.

There have been fish caught from down at Danger and Green Point, all the way through to Racecourse Bay and Port MacDonnell, Cape Douglas and into Carpenter Rocks.

The size and numbers have been very impressive and it's great to see them bounce back after what plenty would call a few tough years.

The land based and boat fishos have again shared in the success with just as many and as big coming from the beaches.

There has also been some cracking silver trevally caught by the land and boat fishos, with some near enough to 2kg.

If you've ever hooked a big trevally in the shallows you'd know that they're a serious string puller and unreal fun on the light tackle.

While we're talking shallows, the gar seems to have picked back up again after a patch where they were difficult to get a handle on.

The numbers and size is a talking point again with many fishos describing the fish as "winter" gar, which is typically a bit chunkier.

They're spread out again which is great for anglers, if you head to your favourite spot you should manage a nice feed.

The Glenelg River has picked up tenfold over the last week or so for bream and estuary perch fishos.

I'm hearing of boaties and jetty dwellers all catching some excellent numbers of fish, and very spread out too.

Fishos on the sand flats of the estuary using soft plastics have done very well on the bream, the dawn and dusk fishos have found the biggest and the most fish, but the 9 til 5ers have still managed some nice fish during the day.

Heading up river we're seeing some nice fish on plastics from Nelson all the way up to Sapling Creek and even higher.

The tip at the moment from the guys catching plenty is don't waste too much time in one particular area if you're not catching fish.

Often a move of 30 or 40 metres up or down a bank can mean the difference between 3 fish in a session, or 30 fish.

There are not any secret weapons at the moment down there, just a natural coloured 2.5 inch to 3 inch minnow or grub on as light of a jig head as you can cast accurately, and you'll be right on the money. Mulloway news is still very patchy, but fishos are seeing encouraging signs of life on their sounders.

Typical mulloway hangouts such as deeper ledges, rock walls and mud flats are all starting to show fish more consistently now, so if you trust your sounder and put the time in, I think

The weekend at this stage looks like it could be a bit breezy in the afternoons, but the swell is down again and the sun should be out.

I think we'll see some more great fish caught.

Only track record holder Nellie Noodles has run faster than Whole Way over the 732 metre journey at Tara Raceway.

The son of Spring Gun x Springvale

Hope took the drop back to 512 metres in his stride in the Klaassens Contractors

Raced by Daniella Madalinski and Michael Ceravolo, Whole Way led all the way from box one, eventually running out an 8¾ length winner over Lily Pad in 29.62 seconds which was easily the best of the day.

Come the Greg Martlew Autos Open Stake (400 m) and Price had 512 metre track record holder Giant's Flash's litter sister Minnie Banjo also lining up for her sixth consecutive success after four local wins and one at Angle Park

Raced by Garry Harding's Giant Crows Syndicate, the daughter of Banjo Boy x Navada Flame soon found the front before running away to a four length win over Lily's Lad in a best of day 22.69 seconds.

Price trained greyhounds ran the trifecta in the grade five final, Compton Ruby finding the front down the back and holding on to defeat a fast finishing Starlight Dusty and the early leader Right Way in a time of 29.85 seconds.

An unheard of seven winners looked a distinct possibility after odds on favourite Rhonda Lily found the front early before being run down by Jason Newman's Locked who scored by 2¾ lengths in a quick 34.93 seconds in the Trackside Meats Mixed Stake (600m).

Price's last record winning day of six winners had been on Sunday, September 20, 2015 when Roma's Moment, Whatta Moment, Mellow And Black, Fear The Rascal, Pam's Boy and Who's Doing What had been successful.

Zambora Jay, after displaying brilliant early pace in his heat, was always going to be hard to beat when drawing box one in the final.

That's how it turned out, the fawn son of Orson Allen x Crazy Jo Jo opening up a handy break early over Sugar Freak before holding on to win by a length in 17.63 sec-

Aston Olenna defeated Sianna Magic by two lengths in 17.49 seconds in the inaugural event last year.

The winner is trained at Koroit by Peter

Rasmussen, SA's leading trainer, picked up a race of his own last Sunday when Express Speed led all the way in the Gambier Vets Stake (512m) to defeat Tapering Off by three lengths in 29.89 seconds.

Track passes initial test

IT was like a belated Christmas present and local trainers welcomed with open arms the opportunity to use the main track at Glenburnie last Tuesday morning for track work.

Forty one horses worked on two designated strips of the course proper, and to the delight of all concerned - especially track manager David Shepherdson - the track passed with flying colours.

"It was the best scenario you could get and they just glided over it," Shepherdson stated.

"There was no major damage and it was just beautiful."

Official trials will be conducted at Glenburnie next Friday morning in front of Racing SA officials and, if the expected all clear is given, racing will resume at Glenburnie on Wednesday, February 23.

TOUGH TITAN BACK TO HIS BEST

The jury was out to decide as to whether the Bordertown trained galloper Territory Titan was going to regain his old winning form this year.

After all, the six year old gelding had not won a race since March last year at Morphettville, and his two runs this campaign had not inspired punters to rally to his cause with unplaced efforts at Bordertown and Murray Bridge during January.

Territory Titan had really put trainer Jimmy Dodgson on the map since the galloper arrived from the Northern Territory in the autumn of 2019.

At his first start for the stable, Territory Titan won his maiden here at Mount Gambier on June 16, 2019 after being backed from 60/1 into 30/1.

Since then, he has won eight races including four in succession in the winter of 2020 ,and one of his best efforts was a fourth in the Listed \$150,000 Golden Mile at Bendigo in March, 2021 when he led until the final stages at 40/1.

Last Saturday, the money trail suggested Territory Titan was fit and ready to produce his best in the 1600 metre BM 82 handicap at Morphettville.

Backed from \$10 into \$5, Territory Titan raced at the girth of the leader - and favourite - Tradewind until the 500 metre mark where he quickly assumed control and went on to win with plenty to spare by

nearly two lengths for jockey Anna Jordsjo.

"It's pleasing that he could return to his old form on a good surface," Jimmy Dodgson said earlier this week.

"I was a bit worried on Saturday as the first four winners all came from last and he always races up near the lead.

"When he came to us, he had not won a cent in prize money on the dirt tracks in the Northern Territory and now he has won almost \$240,000."

That win gave the new training combination of James and Lisa Dodgson their first city success since joining forces in December

Already the pair have made their mark on South Australian racing with three winners, two seconds and a third from 10 starters

Their first runner was Shock Alert, second in the Bordertown cup to Sebonna on December 12, and that horse gave them their first winner, also at Bordertown on January 5.

"It was always planned that Lisa and I would go into partnership at some stage," Dodgson added.

"Lisa used to ride track work at Lindsay Park and she does all the track work for our stable. "We will look at keeping Territory Titan at races over a mile and there is a BM 78 race over that distance in Adelaide on February 12."

GETTING THE REWARD

To own a galloper that has won four races from a dozen starts is a good start in anyone's language.

When three of those wins have been at city level in Adelaide (the other was at Gawler), it makes life even sweeter.

That is the statistics for the Peter Hardacre trained Spin The Reward after he got the chocolates in the 1100 metre BM68 handicap at Morphettville last Saturday.

He is rapidly becoming a first up specialist as his last two victories have been at the start of new campaigns.

Last Saturday, the locally owned sprinter resumed from a two month spell and, as usual, was nearer last than first as the field headed for the judge at the top of the straight.

The money was on the mark too, backed from \$3.60 into \$2.80 favourite, and the race panned out perfectly for regular rider Ryan Hurdle with plenty of speed up front.

Even so, it was still a hard watch for punters who supported Spin The Reward as the four year old gelding needed the entire Morphettville straight to put his nose in front and score by a long head.

PLENTY FOR EVERYONE

All the hype starts tomorrow night at the Naracoorte racecourse with the calcutta where Sam Hayes will be the guest speaker.

AFTER striking the best form of his life in recent weeks, it seemed only a matter of time before Mount Gambier Golf Club member Patrick O'Donnell finally achieved his goal of shooting a round of even par 72 or better at

That was all she wrote and the scorers weren't bothered again as the game was completed with Centrals winning four runs to


