## Timberlink's \$63m timber plant starts

CONSTRUCTION has begun on a \$63m state-of-the-art timber plant at Tarpeena.

Co-located with Timberlink's existing recently expanded and upgraded mill, the first sod on the construction site for the new facility was turned on Wednesday by Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, David Basham recognising a \$2m grant for the project from the State Government's Regional Growth Fund.

Expected to revolutionise South Australia's timber manufacturing industry, the new NeXTimber mill is expected to begin processing by September next year.

It will be Australia's first combined Cross Laminated Timber (CLT) and Glue Laminated Timber (GLT) manufacturing plant which will provide an alternative for steel and concrete in mid and high-rise construction.

# SA's booming town

MILLICENT has recorded the highest increase in property prices last year in regional South Australia with a whopping 34.21 per cent gain according to the latest figures released by the Valuer General.

The town's median price of homes sold last year rose to \$255,000 from \$190,000 in 2020.

Elders' Millicent Residential and Lifestyle Sales Consultant, Kerry Smith said the most

demand for properties in Millicent and district came from interstate people.

"People from Victoria and New South Wales are the biggest group, and a few from Adelaide," Ms Smith said adding that some were families but most were middle age and above.

"I think, with the Covid situation, people have reassessed their lifestyles and decided to move out of the cities.

"We are half way between Adelaide and Melbourne and we have good services, and groundwater; many people have never heard of a bore before.

"People are surprised by what we have to offer.

"They sell up in the city, buy something here and still put a bit of cash away.

"I think it will stay the same if interest rates stay low - we're still reasonably priced compared to the city."

Ms Smith said while housing represented the majority of sales, commercial property was also selling.

"We still have some actual businesses on the market but a lot of interstate people are buying into commercial property," she said.

"It's great to see the shops filling up and the street looking fuller."

Ms Smith said listings of properties for sale had dropped to just a handful when usually there would be more than 100.

Some properties had sold which had previously been sitting on their listings for up to four years, others had sold above their asking price, some people are knocking on resident's doors asking if they will sell and making them an offer, and some are selling before expressions of interest periods have ended.

# Libs promise saleyard funds

THE State Liberal Government has matched the Opposition's commitment of \$2.7m towards the upgrade of the Mount Gambier saleyards.

Expecting to cost about \$11m, the Grant District Council has welcomed the support from both political parties.

Previously, the government committed \$850,000 to the project which was increased this week by \$1.85m.

The project is expected to improve the facility by building roofs, solar power, softfalls, water captures and more modern technology for online sales and auctions.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham made the increased funding announcement during a whirlwind visit to the South East.

Last year, council was unsuccessful in securing the funding from the Building Better Regions Fund and planned to re-apply for the next round.

Speaking to The Border Watch, Mr Basham said the announcement made by the Opposition last week was a "nothing commitment" and meant nothing in the long term.

"The issue with Labor's announcement is their funding commitment means nothing," he said.

"They are not the government in power and the money had to be on the table by the current government.

"This is not an election promise, the funding is already in the budget to be spent so it is money that is there."

Mr Basham said he was happy to announce the increase in funding, labelling it as a "wonderful opportunity".

"This project will bring the area up to world-class standards," he said.

"It was important we get the funding on the table by this week because it needed to be there for the Building Better Regions Fund."

Despite the tight timelines, Mr Basham also encouraged the Federal Government to remain on board and provide its section of funding.

Grant District Council chief executive Darryl Whicker said council was feeling more comfortable and confident in its re-application for round six of the funding program and hoped it was successful.

"The Building Better Regions Fund requires three tiers of government funding and we are very pleased the State Government has come on board," Mr Whicker said.

"We are also pleased by the announcement made by Labor last week because it puts us in a great position to lodge the application."

Mr Whicker said elected members believed the council was positioned well with the current application to receive the funding.

Mount Gambier Liberal Candidate Ben

Hood said he had previously sought a commitment in Adelaide when he met with Premier Steven Marshall and Treasurer Rob Lucas.

"This ongoing commitment from the government shows great support for our livestock industry and it is going to be fantastic for our region," Mr Hood said.

"It shows how vital the project is for the region for primary productions and sets up the saleyards to be at the forefront of livestock sales as we go forward."

## Work begins on new state-of-the-art mill in Tarpeena

It is expected the new plant will create more than 180 jobs during construction and on-going and will significantly increase Australian production capability reducing the need to import from overseas.

Creating interest from the timber industry across the globe, the new world class timber manufacturing facility is expected to showcase the best of leading technology.

Timberlink chief executive officer Ian Tyson said he was pleased the project had reached this point.

"It is not just about investing in the sawmill but investing in this highly valued business which has tremendous potential," Mr Tyson said.

"People are now getting the scope of the

size and importance of this investment.

"They are also now understanding what this means for the community and the whole of the building industry of Australia."

Mr Tyson said there would also be a number of long-term benefits for the South East and Green Triangle Region.

"This is a new market for us and allows us all to not just rely on the housing market to be successful," he said.

"We now have new commercial markets and infrastructure markets which opens up a whole new dimension as to where timber is going."

Mr Tyson said the company would continue to put Australian-made timber first.

"We are an Australian manufacturer and

we are committed to here and the forests here," he said.

"This will add a lot of value to the market and grow the size of the market that timber is going into."

Minister Basham said it was a fantastic investment for the region.

"This gives us an opportunity to change the way people build using timber," Mr Basham said.

"It gives a bigger range and better opportunity to have timber in markets it hasn't been in before."

Mr Basham said he had spoken with builders from across the State and confirmed their excitement about the new technology being available soon.

"Using this building technique and this timber, builders are happy to use this instead of traditional concrete builds," Mr Basham said.

"They are looking forward to the new build and locking the carbon into the building as well which ticks all the boxes."

Grant District Council Tarpeena representative Shirley Little also took part in the sod-turning ceremony and said she was pleased to represent the council.

"This is a very exciting project for Tarpeena and our wider community to be part of," Cr Little said.

"We all look forward to seeing the progress of the plant and the jobs and economic benefits that will flow from Timberlink's investment."

# Council starts fire recovery

MOUNT Gambier City Council held a special council meeting on Tuesday night to discuss the emergency response process following the Crater Lakes fire.

Recommendations relating to budget expenditure, procurement and road and land management were endorsed, enabling the chief executive officer and council officers to progress with early assessment and recovery activities in the area affected by the recent fire.

All expenditure for immediate response to the fire and recovery activities, including road closures, assessment expertise and safety related materials and contractors required during the response and recovery process was approved by elected members.

It comes following council beginning its recovery plan for the Crater Lakes precinct.

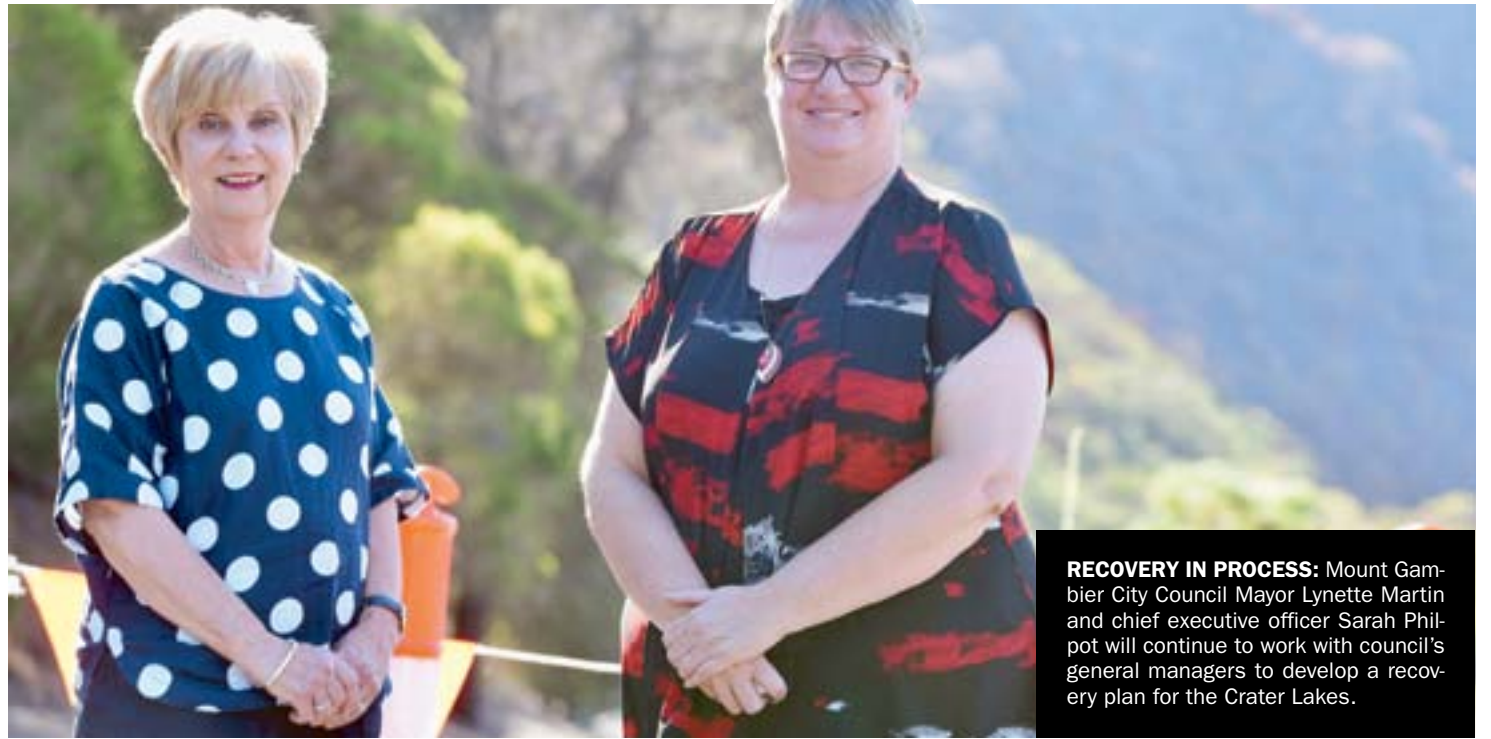
More than 125 firefighters attended the fire in mid-January with 20 trucks from the Country Fire Service (CFS) and Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS).

The fire burnt almost 50 hectares at the popular tourist attraction.

The area was handed back into the control of council just days after the fire was extinguished.

Council chief executive officer Sarah Philpot said some areas had been reopened while others remained closed after being monitored by council workers and the MFS.

"We will continue to make assessments about the burnt areas and those areas less affected but still have a risk of hot spots or fall-

ing debris," Ms Philpot said.

"Council is confident we are taking the right steps and safety precautions."

Moving forward, council employees are expected to work alongside the MFS and Police to develop a recovery program for the popular area.

"The recovery program will work in stages with the first stage being the assessment process and immediate risk while also under-

standing the impacts of the fire and access issues," the chief executive said.

"We are also continuing to understand the situation and get as much information as we can."

Looking to the future, Ms Philpot said council would examine damaged trails, the fire breaks and vegetation destroyed by the blaze and what would be done to rectify it.

"Long term we will look at what trails we

will rebuild and whether they will be the same or slightly different," she said.

"We will also look at the heritage areas such as the Centenary Tower and consider how we bring the site back to its former beauty.

"Some of these stages of the recovery plan will be long term and others are immediate but we need the public to understand that safety is key and encourage people to keep out of the unsafe areas."

## Millicent records largest growth in regional SA

"The high demand has driven the prices up, definitely," she said.

"When the pandemic began I thought I would be looking for a new job, as I thought real estate would crash but quite the opposite has happened.

"In my 20 plus years of being in real estate, this is nothing like we have seen before."

Des Noll, Mayor of Wattle Range Council, welcomed the news of Millicent's top rank on the Valuer General's report.

"I'm actually not surprised because when we look at what's happening in the Limestone Coast and, more importantly, locally in Millicent, there are a lot of houses being built and a lot of land being subdivided and developed which is good economically for the community," said Mayor Noll.

"I would suggest that Covid has had a fair part in this where people have decided to come to regional South Australia and a lot of people have travelled between Melbourne

and Adelaide and think Millicent to be the perfect place to be positioned if they have family living in Adelaide or family living in Melbourne.

"People who have arrived have identified Millicent as having sufficient services and we are a very well connected community so that people have had a good response when they have visited Millicent, so they have decided to purchase homes and stay.

"People have been able to sell their residences in metropolitan areas, come to a community such as Millicent where house prices are lower, they have invested in real estate in this area and they have had extra disposable cash to live their retirement lifestyle.

"I think that has been a big plus and now we are seeing the local house prices rise and pushing the boundaries in terms of prices, but people are still coming and that's pretty exciting for our community in terms of economic development and future planning," he said.

According to the Valuer General's data, Mount Gambier's house prices increased by 15.12 per cent with a median value of \$335,000 up from \$291,000 in 2020.

Naracoorte had an increase of 14.89 per cent with a median price of \$258,500, up from \$225,000 in 2020.

Real Estate Institute of South Australia chief executive, Barry Money said that the results continued to demonstrate the outstanding growth trajectory of the South Australian regional real estate market.

Mr Money said towns which have seen the largest growth over a 12 month period were Millicent and Victor Harbor at 26.44 per cent.

He said top selling towns in terms of recorded sales over the December quarter were Mount Gambier, Murray Bridge and Victor Harbor.

"The total volume of sales this quarter approached 8,000 which is an extraordinary result for South Australia," Mr Money said.

# Boost for bookings

COVID-19 vaccine boosters are now easier to book in the Limestone Coast, with shorter waiting periods for appointments than a month ago.

In early January, locals booking in would have waited five weeks to secure an appointment at one of the Limestone Coast Local Health Network sites in Mount Gambier, but same week appointments now appear to be available for those seeking boosters.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network (LCLHN) executive director of medical services Dr Elaine Pretorius said the extra slots can be attributed to staff levels improving.

"Staff are coming back from leave, we had some people off because they had Covid or were close contacts," Dr Pretorius said.

"Our staffing has improved, our vaccination supply is good so that means that we can open more spots."

There were 51,640 total doses administered in the Limestone Coast in 2021, and in 2022 over 10,000 vaccine doses have gone into arms already.

Of those, 6955 were boosters, and 1672 were doses for five to 11-year-olds.

"That is a number we are very proud of, and I think the community should be proud, it is a marvellous effort," Dr Pretorius said.

"The uptake has been fantastic for the boosters, we have been pretty busy,"

"I think that in general people from the Limestone Coast have really worked very well with us, and as you can see from our numbers that is a really impressive amount."

With more availability, now is the time to book according to Dr Pretorius.

"I am encouraging anyone who is eligible

for their booster to book in," she said.

"For mums and dads who are still a bit hesitant about getting their children vaccinated I would encourage them to consider the vaccine.

"We have seen how effective it has been in reducing hospitalisations and I think we should continue this way."

Dr Pretorius said Covid-19 cases in the region have settled, and she is hopeful numbers will continue to decline.

The network will also move into a recovery plan, which will allow for services that were originally on hold to be restarted.

"The first of that is the elective surgery re-summing next week, so we will be back in full swing of elective surgery as of Monday," Dr Pretorius said.

President of the Rural Doctors Association

of Australia (RDAA), Dr Megan Belot, said that getting your third dose was the best line of defence against the Omicron variant.

"The percentage of the population that is double vaxxed is outstanding," Dr Belot said.

"But when it comes to the third dose, rural doctors are keen to see the numbers go up for their communities and are concerned demand has been plateauing.

"That means, however, that appointments are available!"

According to SA Health as of Wednesday boosters have been administered to 62.6 per cent of eligible South Australians and 46.1 per cent of South Australians aged 16 and over.

Neither SA Health or the national Department of Health could provide data on booster vaccination rates by LGA or Local Health Network region, despite providing similar statistics for first and second doses.

# Early poll gives Bell the lead

INDEPENDENT MP Troy Bell stands to win the seat of Mount Gambier in a landslide at the State election next month, according to recent polling conducted by the South Australian Forest Products Association.

With Labor outpolling the Liberal Party in primary votes and the independent rating higher than the two major parties, Mr Bell would win the seat with an eight per cent margin.

The poll results show Labor candidate Katherine Davies is preferred over Liberal candidate Ben Hood by almost three percentage points.

Out of the 402 respondents to the poll, Ms Davies received 22.5 per cent of the primary votes with Mr Hood receiving 20.2 per cent.

Mr Bell received 35.7 per cent of the primary vote.

After preferences are distributed, on a two candidate preferred basis, according to the poll Mr Bell would finish with 58 per cent of the final vote with Ms Davies at 42 per cent.

A positive sign for the Liberal Party was that 40.8 per cent of those polled believed the Liberal Party was the preferred party to lead the State's economic recovery out of the Covid-19 pandemic, with Labor polling second at 26.1 per cent.

Responding to the poll, Mr Bell said he would not take the results too seriously and would instead focus on the up-and-coming election.

"These polls are a guide only and there is only one poll that matters which will be held on March 19," Mr Bell said.

Ms Davies also said she would focus on the election.

"Labor has wholeheartedly thrown its support behind our region, and I look forward to continuing to share that message," Ms Davies said.

Mr Hood said with less than 40 days to the election, his sole focus would remain with his local campaign.

"I am not quiet about how much I love Mount Gambier and am 100 per cent focused on delivering better outcomes for the community in Mount Gambier," Mr Hood said.

The polling states that the margin for error could be plus or minus 4.85 per cent.

The State election will be held on March 19.

# Princes Highway upgrades could finally happen

THE South East section of the Princes Highway may finally see some upgrades later this year.

The Princes Highway Corridor Upgrade, which was announced in 2020, has so far only focused on upgrades within a 150km radius of Adelaide, with no works undertaken or officially announced in the South East.

The Limestone Coast region has been identified as needing every type of upgrade listed in the project, including safety barrier installations, additional and extended overtaking lanes, audio tactile line markings, new and upgraded rest areas, and pavement resealing and rehabilitation.

In 2018 the Federal Government in the Princes Highway Corridor Strategy identified priority locations where additional overtaking lanes were needed across the three states the highway passes through.

Of the 16 identified, four were in the Limestone Coast.

Transport Minister Corey Wingard did not respond to questions on how the project has been prioritised, but said works may begin on the Princes Highway in the Limestone Coast later this year.

"Subject to approvals, works are expected to commence in the second half of 2022, with completion expected early 2024, weather permitting," Mr Wingard said.

"Included in our massive investment is \$250 million for the Princes Highway Corridor Program which will see targeted upgrades including road widening and shoulder sealing.


"The program was recently bolstered with an additional \$20 million in funding taking the total to \$270 million.

"As part of that program, approximately \$135 million in works will be carried out between Meningie and the South Australian border."



Mr Wingard said that the previous Labor government caused a massive backlog of works needed around South Australia.

"Our regional roads were neglected for years by the former Labor government who refused to invest in vital road safety and regional infrastructure projects," he said


"We inherited a \$750 million maintenance backlog that is being worked through with our \$373 million in vital road maintenance and upgrade works."

MORE than \$10,000 will be donated to Country Fire Service (CFS) crews who attended the recent Crater Lakes blaze after a series of fundraisers held at a local golf club.

Recently, residents of Mount Gambier observed the work of fire services as they battled a fire for three days at the popular reservation area.

Affected areas remain closed with Mount Gambier City Council continuing its recovery program.

Limestone Coast band Suburban Henry were already scheduled to perform at the Blue Lake Golf Links last weekend, with owner and operator Bill Burley deciding to transform the event into a fundraiser.

The popular golf club was one of many areas of concern while the fire was active with CFS crews back burning around the building to save the infrastructure.

Speaking with The Border Watch, golf club operator Bill Burley said there were about 200 people at the outdoor event, in line with Covid-19 regulations.

"All of the funds went to the local crews who helped with the blaze because the extent they go to in order to help us and the Limestone Coast is massive," Mr Burley said.

"We want the funds to go as far as possible so we wanted to keep it to those who helped us."

In addition to the musical event, Mr Burley will also host a trivia night tonight and a golf day scheduled for the end of the month.

"We have already sold out at the trivia night and there are 20 teams lined up for the golf day with all holes also sponsored," he said.

"I never expected the kind of community

# Doubts over Covid voting

QUESTIONS remain for how Mount Gambier residents stuck in quarantine will vote on election day.

As it currently stands, voters can apply for a postal vote with the Electoral Commission accepting applications until March 17, two days before the election.

It is unclear how voters who learn of a Covid-19 infection or close contact status after this date would be able to vote.

With a history of close results, the votes of a few in Mount Gambier can sway an election.

As of Wednesday, 211 people in Mount Gambier were classed by SA Health as being active cases of Covid-19.

This does not include anyone currently in mandatory isolation due to being a close contact.

If 211 people did not vote in the State elections in Mount Gambier in either 1997 or 2010, it may have changed the outcome of the election.

Former Mount Gambier MP Don Pegler won his seat by 161 votes in 2010, a number lower than the amount of people in the electorate currently stuck in home isolation.

He is stressing the importance of every vote counting in an election.

"All those people who may not be able to vote, should have the opportunity to vote somehow," Mr Pegler said.

"It is one of the important things in democracy that everyone who has the right to vote, does vote."

Mr Pegler said there are other alternatives to phone voting, but any system needed to be secure.

"There should be a system if somebody is in lockdown, they should be able to put their vote in an envelope and an officer from the electoral commission pick that up," he said.

"It has to have the right rules in place so people cannot cheat or vote twice, but all that can be done."

A proposed Electoral (Assisted Voting) Bill 2022 that would allow South Australians in

quarantine on election day to vote over the phone could not be passed due to the lower house not being recalled to vote on the matter.

A majority of South Australian MPs gathered this week in protest at parliament house, in an attempt to convince Premier Stephen Marshall to recall parliament to no avail.

The current MP for Mount Gambier Independent Troy Bell said phone voting legislation was in the public interest.

"People should not be denied the right to vote due to party politics over the pandemic and a police commissioner should never have the powers to exclude people from their democratic right to vote," Mr Bell said.

"The Bill just expands the current process which is already used for vision impaired people, who are able to vote by telephone, so the mechanisms are already in place.

"Even South Australians working in Antarctica can vote by telephone so why shouldn't people forced into isolation have the same right?"

## Glenburnie sheds destroyed

A FIRE near Glenburnie on Monday destroyed two sheds and impacted 81 hectares of grass and forest land.

The fire in the vicinity Fairbanks and Miles roads was contained by five Country Fire Service (CFS) crews, numerous forest industry crews, farm fire units and four aerial bombers.

No-one was injured.

The cause of the fire is unknown but police are investigating and ask anyone travelling on Fairbanks Road around 1.30pm on Monday to call Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 so police can build an accurate picture of who was in the area at the time and if they have any dash cam footage.

## China says no to local meat

CHINA will no longer be accepting any meat from Teys Australia's Naracoorte facility.

The ban follows national media coverage of the abattoir after it asked asymptomatic covid-positive staff to return to work.

The company confirmed that meat from the Naracoorte processing facility has been suspended from exporting products to China.

"Teys will work closely with the Australian export market regulatory bodies to achieve reinstatement of the facility's access to China," Teys general manager of corporate and industry affairs John Langbridge said.

"Teys' Naracoorte facility operates in full compliance with all State and Federal, food safety, occupational health and safety and market access regulations, and continues to operate as normal."

Mr Langbridge said that stopping exports to China would not significantly impact the facility.

"The Naracoorte plant exported over the previous calendar year about five per cent of its production to China," he said.

"The plant will continue to operate normally, there will be no decrease in throughput, the product will go to different markets.

"We are disappointed that the plant has had its access to China suspended but we will move on."

It is the latest location to be added by China to their list of suspended meat processing facilities, which includes eight other Australian abattoirs.

Federal Member for Barker Tony Pasin said the ban would have a big impact on the industry.

"As an important export market for the Australian meat industry, the decision taken by China to suspend beef imports from the Teys Australia Naracoorte facility is extremely disappointing," he said.

"The suspension is not only going to have impacts for employees at Teys Naracoorte, but this decision will also impact Australian beef producers."

Mr Pasin said the blame for the ban lies with the Australian Council of Trade Unions (ACTU).

"While my colleague Dan Tehan, Trade Minister is continuing to work with Chinese authorities to have export licences reinstated as a priority, recent union activity surrounding the management of Covid cases at Teys has damaged the company's standing domestically and internationally," he said.

"As a result, the fall-out from this suspension can be attributed squarely to the ACTU's alarmism.

"Put simply, any Teys employee, livestock producer, stock agent or truck driver who loses income as a result of this suspension has the ACTU to blame.

"Little wonder union membership in the meat industry is at historic lows."

But ACTU President Michele O'Neil said the union was simply responding to legitimate concerns raised by workers.

"The situation was so dangerous that SafeWork SA refused to allow their inspectors to visit the facility," Ms O'Neil said.

"These workers stood up and demanded to be safe in their workplaces.

"The agreement that was reached allowed workers to keep their jobs and business to remain functioning as usual - beneficial to both workers and Teys.

"Politicians taking potshots in the media in the aftermath is political point scoring at the expense of the communities they are meant to represent."

# Bleby's trees now cleared

"WE would have planted this one after Ash Wednesday," former District Forester Michael Bleby reminisced as he and his wife Doris sat on a tree stump near the summit of Mount Burr for a photo shoot with The Border Watch last weekend.

The stump was of a recently felled 'Pinus Radiata' pine - one of millions Mr Bleby was responsible for planting in the region after the 1983 Ash Wednesday bushfires.

Next Wednesday will mark the 39th anniversary of the bushfires which caused the loss of 14 lives in the South East along with close to 100 houses destroyed and almost 300,000 sheep, cattle and other farm animals killed with the blazes engulfing 150,000 hectares of farming land.

The fires also burned through 20,500 hectares of plantation forest, including 18,500 hectares of then State Government Woods and Forests (W&F) Department reserves in the South East.

"W&F lost a quarter of its estate across the State that day," Mr Bleby said.

"I did quite a bit of soul searching as 12 years of my professional work to establish forests were all burnt - in just one day."

At the time of Ash Wednesday, Mr Bleby was a District Forester at Mount Crawford in the Mount Lofty Ranges and he recorded

his memories in a book, launched last year, called 'Forestry Tales'.

"I recall experiencing for the first time absolute silence in the middle of the forest," he wrote after the fire had burnt the Mount Crawford reserve.

"I seemed to be the only living thing for miles.

"I was surrounded by totally scorched earth, no organic matter, no foliage anywhere, no sound of the wind, no wildlife, no birds - just an eerie and total silence."

Three months after Ash Wednesday, Mr Bleby was transferred to Mount Burr as District Forester with the task of replanting the forests.

"It was a case of rubbing out the forests and starting again," Mr Bleby said.

Salvage of the burnt logs was the first task and Mrs Bleby recalled she and their three children - John, Susan and Tim - hearing the regular sounds of tree felling when they were living at the W&F headquarters near Mount Burr.

"You would hear thud, thud as the trees came down in the forest," she said.

Back then, tree felling involved men with chainsaws and Mr Bleby said teams came from across Australia including Tasmania, and also from New Zealand, with some companies from that time continuing to operate in the region's timber industry today.

"Apcel [Kimberly Clark Australia]

couldn't take any scorched pulp wood after the fire due to the discolouration it would cause to the tissue so the timber mills were processing the logs as fast as they could.

"They doubled their intake and went like the clappers, but because of the sheer amount of timber we had to look at storage options for many of the burnt logs.

"With water immersion one way to preserve the logs, half the logs went into Lake Bonney and we stored the other half in above ground areas at Mount Gambier and Penola where sprinklers spread water over the logs."

With the logs cleared from the burnt forest, the wastage was pushed up into mounds and burnt and then the scorched earth had to be revived, as the fires had drawn many nutrients out of the soil.

Using aircraft, clover and vetch were sown to enable the nitrogen gathering legumes to put nutrients back into the soil, while the control of weeds, and bracken fern, was fine tuned.

Then the process of replanting began.

"To provide for timber supply in the future over a number of years, it was decided that the replanting effort would take place over 10 years," Mr Bleby said.

"We started in 1983 and the last areas were actually finished in 1995.

"About 40 planters worked throughout each winter planting seedlings and the

Glencoe nursery had to go into over-drive to supply enough as they normally produced three million seedlings a year, but we needed five million."

Replanting the forests allowed for a total rethink, with a redesign dividing the plantation into more manageable blocks, around which were constructed new and better roads, while airstrips were also built to allow herbicide and fertilizer to be applied from the air.

"It was a big logistical effort but I had competent people getting on with the job," Mr Bleby said.

Mr Bleby said the silver lining of the fires was a better forest, with improved genetics and enhanced management techniques.

"People came from all over the world to see what we were doing here," he said.

Retiring from the industry in 2009, Mr Bleby said being a forester had fulfilled the Strathalbyn born boy's desire for an outdoors lifestyle.

"Forestry is a satisfying career to be involved in; it teaches long term thinking and planning to grow a crop you are not going to see the benefits of for decades, for the next generation," he said.

Mr Bleby still maintains a keen interest in forestry matters, between a busy schedule of community activities that he and Mrs Bleby are involved in the Millicent district which they still call home.

## EDITOR'S COMMENT

RECENTLY there is clear evidence that local government is far more democratic than our State Government.

It only takes a mayor, a handful of councillors or a council chief executive to call an extraordinary meeting of council but the majority of State MP's can't recall Parliament.

To state the obvious, the majority of MP's represent the majority of South Australians and, in any democracy, the majority view must be respected.

Only the government can recall Parliament but so far it has refused to do so.

The issue at hand is that the majority of politicians want Parliament to resume to allow them to determine how those who are in State sanctioned forced isolation because of Covid-19 can vote in the upcoming State election.

This week, in Mount Gambier there are about 200 people with Covid-19 and an unknown number of close contacts also in mandatory isolation.

That number people, or should I say votes, could not only decide who wins the seat of Mount Gambier, it could also result in a change of government - depending on who wins the seat.

The Covid-19 mandatory isolation direction is not a direction from the democratically elected parliament but rather the State Coordinator appointed under the Emergency Management Act, in this case the Police Commissioner Grant Stevens.

The intent of the Emergency Management Act is to deal with short-term major emergencies, like flood or fire, not a drawn-out pandemic and certainly not to inadvertently prevent our citizens from voting.

It would be a blight on the rights of individuals not to be able to cast a vote and a blight on a government to allow this to happen.

Election results can be challenged in the Court of Disputed Returns and the Liberal Party has a history of taking this avenue.

The irony might be that the Liberal Party may take this course if it is unsuccessful in regaining the seat of Mount Gambier by a handful of votes.

## Shed fire near Mount Burr

A SHED was destroyed near the Mount Burr forestry depot at Rocky Camp on Monday morning.

Country Fire Service (CFS) brigades were called from Mount Burr, Millicent and Mount McIntyre to fight the blaze at about 11am.

The fire extended beyond the shed into grass around the property.

The fire did not enter the nearby pine plantations although, as a precautionary measure, Forestry SA crews attended.

A fire bomber aircraft was also summoned to the fire but was not required.

Crews took about four hours to extinguish the fire although it reignited later that day and crews returned.

The shed and its contents were destroyed, causing about \$150,000 damage.

The cause of the fire is currently unknown but is under investigation.

Another shed caught fire on Acacia Drive, Millicent, just after 2pm on Tuesday.

Thirty CFS fire fighters including six trucks and one bulkwater carrier attended.

The fire spread to a nearby grass paddock but was quickly contained with assistance from four drops by a fire bomber aircraft along with support from farm fire units.

About \$100,000 of damage occurred but there were no injuries.

The fire burnt nine hectares and no other assets were threatened.

## Unmarked graves named

UNMARKED graves in the old section of Millicent's cemetery are being identified with name-plates as part of a South East Family History Group (SEFHG) project.

The Millicent based SEFHG is providing the name-plates, undertaking research to identify who is buried in the unmarked graves, and installing the name-plates while also enhancing the graves, many of which were nothing more than bare earth to begin with.

Led by SEFHG President, Noel Boyle, the project began a number of years ago when a small band of volunteers began cleaning up the old section of the cemetery during monthly working bees.

While that work concentrated mainly on straightening headstones, uncovering buried railings and topping marked graves with gravel provided by Wattle Range Council, the group in more recent months has also begun delineating unmarked graves by installing borders around them with limestone ashlar, many of which have been donated for the project.

The next natural step was to put names to those graves.

Mr Boyle said the name-plates include the name and the year of birth and death of the interred person and, if possible, the maiden name of married women, along with the plot number.

He said 35 name-plates had been installed in the last 12 months with another 10 to be installed in the next month.

"There are a lot of unmarked graves in the cemetery and we want to try and give a name to them all," said Mr Boyle.

"It's about unearthing the history of these plots and recording that history," he said.

With burials in the old section of the Millicent cemetery dating back as far as 1877, Mr Boyle said there were a variety of reasons why plots were not named.

"Money, or the lack of it back then, meant some families couldn't afford to pay for a headstone, other people did not have any family to do that for them, or they moved away

from the area," he said.

With the name-plates that the SEFHG are installing costing \$30, Mr Boyle said it was an affordable way to mark the graves.

"If there are any people who know they have a relative in an unmarked grave in the cemetery and would like to pay for a plaque, we would encourage them to approach us and we'll help to put together a name-plate."

# \$1m dredging works for Port MacDonnell

PORT MacDonnell's harbor will be dredged in the coming months following years of advocacy from local and State government representatives.

The harbour is home to a number of commercial and recreational fishermen with Grant District Council welcoming the State's commitment to the operation.

Funded through the State Government the dredging is expected to cost more than \$1m for the six-week operation.

Grant District Council will also provide in-kind support to the dredging through drying out and disposing of the seaweed taken from the area.

Following the completion of the dredging, it is expected boats of all sizes will have better access to the water and the nearby fuel pump.

For years, boat owners and operators have only been able to access the fuel pump during high tide.

Grant District Council Port MacDonnell representative Gillian Clayfield said it had been several years since dredging to this extent had occurred and thoroughly supported the process.

"When boats are in shallow water all the muck gets into the filters and can damage the motors," Cr Clayfield said.

"Last time it was dredged it was only done around the boat ramp where the fishermen could get fuel so they were only able to get fuel during a high tide.

"The extent of the dredging that is planned will be great for the region because it has been an ongoing issue because the harbour is very shallow."

Cr Clayfield said many believe the area remained shallow due to excess seaweed, however it was also an issue of sand build up due to the flow of water.

"What usually happens is the material which is going to be removed is often returned in some form," she said.

"The seaweed previously removed was transferred down to Racecourse Bay which caused a huge outcry.

"This time the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has agreed to remove the material from the water which will then be dried out and disposed of in a council facility."

She said, with the annual Tuna Fishing Competition to be held soon, the dredging would be a great benefit to many.

"The fishing industry has a huge financial impact on Port MacDonnell and the Limestone Coast and having this area more accessible and dredged will attract a lot more boats," Cr Clayfield said.

Mount Gambier Independent MP Troy Bell has been helping since 2015 to advocate for the dredging and is happy with the results of

the long campaign.

"It has been a long journey and well over five years," Mr Bell said.

"The biggest challenge of the campaign was the EPA approval to dredge and transfer of the waste but we are grateful it is going ahead."

Mr Bell said the aim of the dredging was to make a safe workplace for recreational and commercial fishers who use the harbour.

"It is unbelievable that it has been allowed to get into this state without immediate action," he said.

"Fishermen pay large fees each year and I believe these fees should go towards safe work environments for that industry.

"This harbour needs rigorous maintenance each year that is scheduled and adhered to."

Due to the dredging, half of the Port MacDonnell boat ramp will be out of action to assist with the operation.

## The sky has limits for drone flying

FLYING drones has become a popular hobby, mainly serving the purpose of recreational photography and aiding researchers with land and sea projects.

Unfortunately, on some rare occasions, drones can also cause problems for emergency services, as allegedly occurred when water bombing aircraft had to be temporarily grounded during Mount Gambier's recent Crater Lakes fire.

Mount Gambier drone enthusiast, Charles Prime said the features included in drones have changed dramatically over the 15 years he has been involved with this technology.

"Drones are more commercially available now," he said.

"Back when I started we had to build our own drones with little toy helicopters but now you can just buy one from a toy store basically.

"Drones take excellent photos and they can serve the community through searches for people and vehicles.

"They're used in agriculture for crop analysis but there are a lot of purposes for them other than just taking photos."

Mr Prime said there are more purpose-built drones being manufactured for specific jobs, with features such as an external cage for pipeline inspections and other related activities.

Some drones are especially built to be sent over steep surfaces such as cliffs to check the stability of a cliff face, a much less dangerous alternative to a human researcher taking the same risk.

Mr Prime recommended the safest way to

start with a drone is to inspect the Civil Aviation Safety Authority's (CASA) website for some rules into drone safety and privacy, as well downloading certain apps to keep track of suitable flight paths.

"There are multiple apps endorsed by CASA on where you can fly your drone safely, so run the app every time you are flying a drone to make sure the location is safe, even if you have flown there before," he said.

"It just saves a lot of headache and it could even save you from an embarrassing fine as well."

Some of the rules include keeping a minimum distance of 30 metres away from all other pedestrians in any direction, drones must not be flown higher than 120 metres, drones cannot interfere with emergency services such as firefighting services, and they can only be flown within a direct line of sight to the pilot.

## Energy grants awarded

TWO community groups in the Limestone Coast have received funding through the Federal Government's Powering Communities Program to help lower energy costs.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said energy bills are often one of the biggest overheads for not-for-profit organisations.

"By helping to reduce power bills, the grants will ease the financial pressure organisations face so they can better focus on meeting the needs of our local community," Mr Pasin said.

"I recognise the great work that many community groups across Barker do and know that many have done it tough during COVID19. This program will help them to do what they do best, which is serve and support the community," Mr Pasin said.

Naracoorte Masonic Centre received a grant of \$5,284 to install a 3kw solar system.

The centre's Treasurer Barry Dunn said this grant will enable the Naracoorte Masonic Centre, known as the Naracoorte Lodge, to increase their donations to any charity or organisation in need, by saving electricity costs running the Lodge.

"We are involved with the Freemasons Foundation of South Australia which donate dollar for dollar as well as the Naracoorte Community Network who help anyone or any organisation in need," Mr Dunn said.

Allendale East Public Hall Committee received a grant of \$5,284 to complete an energy upgrade project.

"The Allendale East Public Hall will be replacing the existing lighting in the main Hall area, kitchen, toilet areas, storeroom, cloak room and outside lighting and replace with more energy efficient LEDs. They will also replace all existing high energy consuming wall heaters in the main Hall area and kitchen/catering area, with more energy efficient wall heating.

Allendale East Public Hall President Richard Ferguson said: "Without grants like this our public hall would struggle to stay alive for our small regional community.

"Our committee works hard to fundraise all year round and this boost will enable us to upgrade lighting and reduce our energy costs.

"The hall represents generations of families coming together to celebrate and share the good and bad times of rural life. We value having our hall and wish to keep it going for this and future generations," Mr Ferguson said.

# A country practice

PREGNANT women in the Limestone Coast will be delivered easier access to specialist care, thanks to a new initiative bringing young doctors to the country for on the job training.

It's seen 28 year old Dr Jacinta Clark start work at Mount Gambier Hospital this week, as an obstetric and gynaecology service registrar.

"The title is a bit of a mouthful," Dr Clark said with a laugh.

"The really exciting thing is that junior doctors who are not yet in specialist training, can now work, learn, and serve the community,

"I'll be on the delivery roster at Mount Gambier, and that will take some of the load off these rural GPs who are working really, really hard."

Dr Clark said the hospital is, in fact, expecting twins - as a second young doctor is joining her.

She hopes an immediate benefit is that Covid-19 induced delays for treating non urgent gynaecological problems are cut.

Patience has always been a virtue in country medicine.

Regional communities around Australia often face long delays attracting staff.

"When you talk about getting doctors to work in the country, one of the things that makes that more difficult is that you can't train," Dr Clark said.

"If you are looking at a training pro-

gram, such as for me becoming a gynaecologist, you can't go rural because you need to train in the city, so this is a great opportunity"

"I'm really passionate about women's health, I'm really passionate about equality for rural patients."

That passion wasn't learnt in medical school - Jacinta Clark grew up the Limestone Coast.

"My mum and grandparents are from Robe... my mum and dad actually met in Robe," she said.

"We've lived in Mount Gambier for the past 23 years, so I did my primary schooling, all my high schooling, I did one of my placement years in medical school at Mount Gambier hospital, so yeah, this has been home for as long as I can remember."

Helping others find their 'place' is also one of Dr Clark's passions - it drives her voluntary work for The Pinnacle Foundation.

"We're a charity that supports disadvantaged LGBTQI kids to complete their Uni or TAFE courses", she said.

"It's not only financial support, the important thing is we match the scholar with a mentor already working in their chosen field of study."

Jacinta Clark is the Foundation's scholar liaison.

Mostly that involves catching up for coffee and a chat, but sometimes it's solving an unexpected life crisis

"I had a call in the middle of the night

from one of our scholars on country placement", she said.

"The ceiling in his house had caved in, he was on duty the next morning and he needed help to find a new place quickly."

Dr Clark received a scholarship during her final year, when like all young doctors, she worked long days.

"The support and mentoring, I was so grateful for that", Dr Clark said.

"But I can't lie, the money was great too!"

"I bought text books for the first time... and who wants instant noodles every night, if they can avoid it."

Delivering babies, and helping disadvantaged young people sounds like a prescription for exhaustion, but not to Dr Clark.

"Oh well, it's just that I like doing tangible things to help people," she said.

## Rural doctor support

SOUTH Australians living in regional areas will benefit from a landmark agreement between the State Government and regional doctors.

The agreement includes the Government investing an estimated \$188 million over two years - a more than 20 percent increase in funding - to help attract and retain GP services in regional South Australia and ensure the continuity of high quality rural hospital services.

Premier Steven Marshall welcomed the agreement as the most significant investment in rural GPs in a generation.

"The agreement is a tangible demonstration of the State Liberal Government's commitment to delivering better health services, closer to home for regional South Australians," Premier Marshall said.

"This agreement will help us deliver that goal.

"GPs are key partners in ensuring high quality health care services can continue to be delivered in regional South Australia, and we welcome this landmark agreement.

"Over the years, the remuneration of GPs working in rural South Australia has fallen significantly behind other jurisdictions making it harder to recruit and retain GPs in regional and remote locations.

"This investment is a generational change for regional health in South Australia, with the

total value of the payments under the agreement projected to increase by over 20 percent."

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Stephen Wade said the new agreement will significantly boost a range of State Government strategies to attract and retain rural GPs.

"South Australia faces many challenges in recruiting, training and developing the health professionals needed to deliver health services in rural areas, and that's exactly why we are already investing \$20 million into our Rural Health Workforce Strategy," Minister Wade said.

"Significantly, it is those living in and requiring health care in regional South Australia that will benefit the most from this investment.

"We are doing everything we can to ensure the highest quality health care is available to all South Australians no matter where they live.

Key benefits of the agreement include a sign-up bonus of up to \$50,000 for a doctor to work in the more remote areas of the State, and the capacity for doctors to work for a sessional (hourly) rate for hospital work or to remain with a fee-for-service structure.

The agreement is the result of several months of work between the Rural Support Service, Rural Doctors Association (RDASA) and the Australian Medical Association South Australia (AMASA) in consultation with regional Local Health Networks.

UNIVERSITIES across Mount Gambier have welcomed its share in \$60m to continue its regional and rural medical health training in South Australia.

Announced by the Federal Government, the investment will further support university students undertaking training in regional areas across the state.

Those receiving the funding included Flinders University and University of South Australia with students able to travel to Mount Gambier to participate in the program.

The funding supports students who complete regional placements including support for accommodation, professional support and enabling rural placement to remain manageable and affordable.

Mount Gambier University of South Australia regional manager Ian McKay said the funding provides a positive role in supporting health services in regional areas.

"The continuation of the funding for our university's department of rural health is appreciated and certainly important for regional communities," Mr McKay said.

"It is important that we have students doing placements in regional communities because a student that comes out to a regional

community often loves it and when they graduate some of them come back and work in those communities.

"Government support for regional areas is important and it is a valuable support that is being provided for these departments."

Flinders University Dean Robyn Aitken also supported the ongoing funding, stating it also supported academics and clinicians who have the opportunity to work in regional rather than metropolitan areas.

"These are medically supported, allied health and nursing students who are able to learn hands-on in the area," Ms Aitken said.

"We work closely with the Limestone

Coast Local Health Network and staff at both Flinders and health services to ensure the support is available for those studying medicine."

The university Dean said an evaluation of the program from 2020 showed there was also a greater economic impact in the regional areas.

"This means for every dollar spent on the program there was another dollar being spent in the region," Ms Aitken said.

"One third of students who participate will work in a regional area ten years down the track."

She also thanked the broader community for its ongoing support for students involved in the program.

"We have found the community makes the students feel very welcome and supported in many ways," Ms Aitken said.

"There are a number of students who enjoy the program and come back after their study is complete."

# Weed management trials

SOUTHERN grain growers could be changing their weed management practices after results from nearly five years' worth of trials indicate a triple threat strategy, that counters traditional methods, could produce optimal results.

Last week, the Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC) released a video summarising results from trials conducted by the University of Adelaide on weed management across the southern grain growing region.

The trials investigated the most effective ways to minimise the impact of weeds on crop yields in varying rainfall zones and suppress weeds throughout the growing season to reduce their seedset.

University of Adelaide's Associate Professor of Agronomy and Weed Science, Dr Gurjeet Gill said one of the most interesting results of the trial showed that current weed populations can cause more damage to crop yields if sowing is delayed, which has been a common management practice for weed control across the southern grain growing region.

"Commonly, southern growers have opted to delay sowing allowing a knockdown spray but our trial results have emphasised that this can backfire," he said.

"Weeds have evolved to have later dormancy, meaning there could be very minimal weed growth at sowing and more weeds emerging anywhere from a month to six weeks after rains.

"These later emerging weeds can compete more aggressively with late sown crops as their vigour slows down in the cooler months and significantly impact yields."

As well as sowing earlier, Dr Gill said the trials revealed a higher seeding rate paired with optimal herbicide management also proved most effective when developing good crop

competition against weeds and suppressing their seedbank throughout the season.

"Our results showed that when you double the crop seed density from 100 to 200 plants per square metre, you can potentially halve the seed set of ryegrass."

"Even for growers in lower rainfall zones, who traditionally worry about higher seed rates impacting the quality of grain, results showed that the denser seed rates didn't have a negative impact on yield or quality."

Dr Gill said in both wheat and canola trials,

results showed the non-chemical approaches to weed management of timely sowing and denser crop populations, paired with effective herbicide application was the triple strategy to managing weeds.

"These cultural practices proved to be extremely valuable in preserving yields when integrated with effective pre-emergent herbicides," he said.

GRDC Manager Weeds, Jason Emms, said this project highlighted the importance of continuing to assess management strategies

to ensure they were effective against the ever-evolving nature of weeds.

"GRDC is committed to investing in research to look at new ways for growers to manage weeds to help improve their profitability," he said.

"An integrated approach to weed management, using cultural and chemical practices, is critical when it comes to tackling weeds and preserving crop yields."

# 2022 HYUNDAI I20N

THE i20 N is Hyundai's first light hot hatch. We are assured it can run with its N stablemates, "delivering its speed and performance with a fun personality that turns every trip into a Special Stage" according to Hyundai.

At this stage the i20 N is offered in a single grade, we have queried the Australian importer about other grades, but were told that's all they will divulge at this time. In any case the single grade is well specified and the major emphasis is on high performance - which is exactly what lovers of hot cars are looking for.

Important features include Launch Control, an auto rev-matching function for the manual transmission, and a three-mode stability control system as is used in other Hyundai N cars.

By the way the 'N' designation indicates both Hyundai's Namyang Research and Development Center in South Korea.

It was also the famed Nurburgring Ring in Germany where many cars are unofficially tested to their limit in a wide variety of road conditions.

Nurburgring Ring is a public road so if you happen to be in Germany you may care to have a fang there. Just keep an eye on your mirrors in case something very quick suddenly come up behind you...

## STYLING

Hyundai i20 is a neat looking small car even in its standard format. Changes to upgrade it to the N include a different grille inspired by the WRC models, a rear spoiler, built-in rear diffuser and a large single exhaust.

The lower areas are finished in red.

The 18-inch alloys are in grey matte with N-branded centre caps.

The i20 N is offered in a range of ten colours including two shades of red.

## INTERIOR

Performance Blue highlights throughout the cabin make a statement.

The interior plastics and surfaces are rather hard to the touch, but keep in mind this isn't a luxury car. A variety of textures visually make it look more a little further upmarket.

A leather/cloth combination upholstery that's of a reasonable quality.

Keep in mind that this is a budget priced car. But may we suggest you check this for yourself when doing your checks on which car you're considering buying.

A cubby under the centre stack is big enough for to hold a large phone.

There are cupholders between the front seats and a small cubby under the front-centre armrest.

There are bottle holders in the front and rear doors.



Take a family hatchback add sporting looks more power, and you get the Hyundai i20 N.

## INFOTAINMENT

There are twin 10.25 inch displays, one for instruments, the other for the infotainment touchscreen.

The displays are excellent and can be read with a minimum of distraction for the driver.

As seems to happen all too often, the DAB+ digital radio drops out more often than not.

To the extent I found myself giving up.

Instead listening to the Bose seven-speaker sound system which produces decent sound.

More speakers would be welcome, but I guess this is a car built down to a relatively low price.

Apple CarPlay and Android Auto (wired) and satellite navigation are standard.

There's a Qi wireless charger.

## ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The Hyundai i20 N is powered by a 1.6-litre four-cylinder turbo-petrol. Power is 150kW between 5500 and 6000rpm.

Peak torque is 275Nm from 1750 to 4500rpm.

An overboost function increases maximum torque to 304Nm under full throttle between 2000 and 4000rpm.

The only transmission is a six-speed manual transmission - Yippee it's set up for real drivers!

It powers the front wheels by way of a sporting Torsen mechanical limited-slip diff.

Upgrades to handle the extra power and torque of the 'N' include a reinforced clutch, improved friction materials and redesigned synchros.

## SAFETY

As we went to press the latest Hyundai i20 range hadn't been crash tested by either AN-CAP or Euro NCAP.

- Automatic emergency braking with pedestrian detection
- Driver inattention monitoring
- Lane-keep assist
- Lane following assist
- Blind-spot monitoring

- Intelligent speed limit assist

## DRIVING

It's all about fun, and plenty of it. Though based on a standard city and suburban car the guys and gals at Namyang and at Hyundai Australia have done an excellent job of giving the i20 N a genuinely sporting flair.

The firmer ride and tyre noise on coarse-chip roads are certainly what you expect in a sporting car, which is fine for the driver but may not appeal to passenger, especially during long trips.

The six-speed manual is easy to use. In our test car the clutch didn't start to engage till the pedal was almost all the way up.

After a while this was no longer an irritation. Gearing is low and at 110km/h in sixth in top gear the engine is at nearly 3000rpm.

It doesn't sound overly busy - even though it is. On typical European motorway speeds of 140 to 160km/h it's going to sound very busy.

And if you're lucky enough to be driving on unrestricted sections of German autobahn the engine is going to spend a lot of time at 6000rpm.

Don't know if that would be doing the fuel consumption at lot of good.

But who cares, smile and enjoy the ride!

The i20 N's powertrain is Euro 6-certified and has fuel-saving idle stop/start technology.

Fuel use is quoted as 6.9L/100km on the combined cycle. During our test period covering over 450 kilometres we used nine to eleven litres per hundred around town, dropping to six to seven litres on the open road.

The 2022 Hyundai i20 N is covered by a five-year, unlimited-kilometre warranty.

Servicing is required every 12 months or 10,000km, whichever comes first.

## SUMMING UP

You get a lot of sporting driving in this highly modified Hyundai i20 N and those who need/want a family car with plenty of get up and go at a relatively modest price should certainly add it to their shopping list.

# 2022 SUBARU BRZ: FIRST DETAILS

SUBARU has advised us that its all-new BRZ will have more power, greater handling precision and a stand-out design.

A powerful new 2.4-litre, naturally-aspirated Boxer engine fitted with both direct and port fuel-injection systems brings improved performance.

It has 174 kilowatts of power and 250 Newton metres of torque.

With an automatic transmission, power is up 27 kilowatts over the outgoing model and torque by 45 Newton metres.

For manual, power is increased by 22kW and torque by 38Nm.

It will have six-speed, close-ratio manual or performance-oriented six-speed automatic with paddle shifters.

There's a Torsen limited-slip differential.

Two model variants, BRZ Coupe and BRZ Coupe S are available, both have LED headlights with automatic height adjustment,



Subaru BRZ looks good in photos, we suspect it may be even better in the metal.

Vehicle Dynamics Control, 18-inch alloy wheels and dual-zone air-conditioning.

Active Sound Control will enhance engine sound inside the cabin for a more engaging driving experience.

A new 7-inch, customisable digital instrument cluster puts the tachometer at its centre and features a digital speedometer readout.

An 8-inch central touchscreen is used to operate of key systems: Apple CarPlay and

Android Auto connectivity, digital radio and satellite navigation.

The cabin is finished in sporty black upholstery and a leather-wrapped steering wheel and gearshift.

BRZ Coupe's sports seats are cloth-trimmed while Coupe S seats are finished in a combination of Ultrasuede and leather-accented trim.

Driver and front passenger seats are heated in the Coupe S.

The coupe's body has approximately 60 per cent more front lateral bending rigidity and approximately 50 per cent more torsional stiffness than its predecessor.

Aluminium has been used for the bonnet, front guards and roof skin, helping to keep the car's weight low.

New BRZ's has electrically-assisted rack and pinion steering.

It has independent MacPherson front struts and double rear wishbone suspension.

The 18-inch alloy wheels sit inside low-profile Michelin Pilot Sport 4 tyres.

Braking is by large, ventilated front and rear disc brakes.

Commenting on the 2022 BRZ, Subaru Australia Managing Director Blair Read said, "the compact sports coupe has generated an impressive amount of pre-launch interest, with the first allocation of 500 vehicles already exhausted.

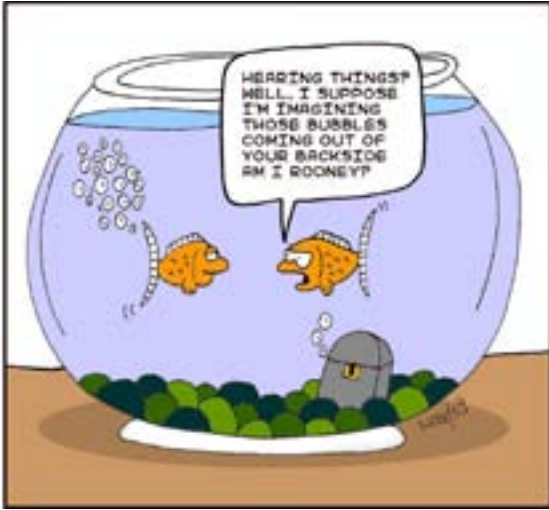

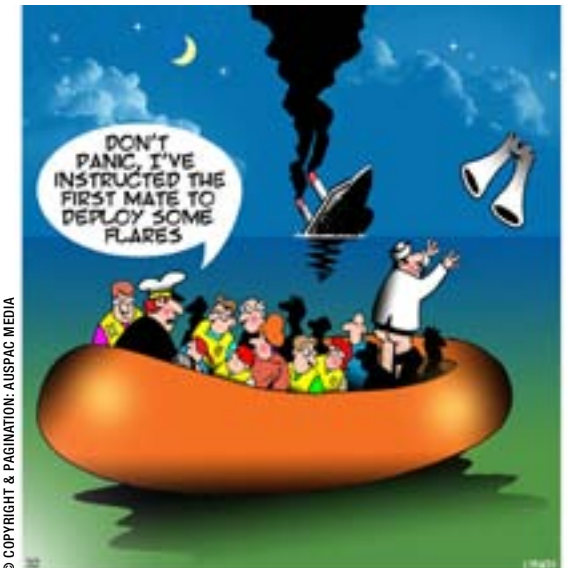

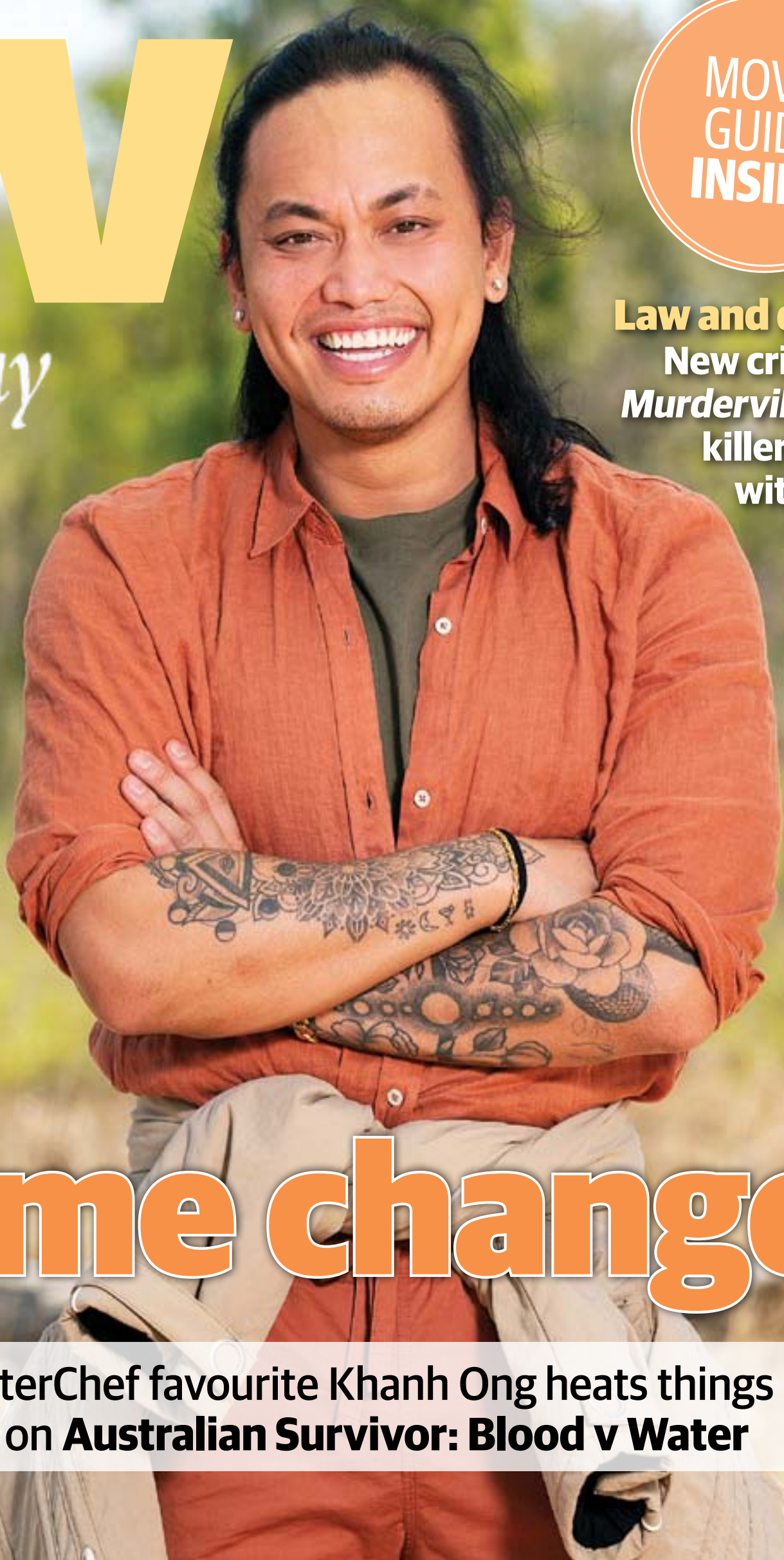

# Recipe for success

The new season of *Australian Survivor* has kicked off – contestant and *MasterChef* favourite Khanh Ong tells **Danielle McGrane** why this time it's a family affair.

**K**hanh Ong is very choosy about which reality shows he agrees to take part in. Audiences were first introduced to him via *MasterChef* where he made it to the season 10 semi-finals, and he went back for more in 2020 on *MasterChef Australia: Back To Win*.

But aside from the reality cooking show, there was really only one other TV series he would consider.

"Last year I was offered multiple different shows and I was basically gunning for *Survivor*," Ong said.

"For me it's a bucket list moment. I've always wanted to do it. It looks hard and I wanted to challenge myself, that's why I really wanted to go."

The restaurateur had specific reasons for choosing *Survivor*.

"If I were to do any show it had to be a show that gave me something," he said.

"I didn't want to just be there on TV just to speak, I wanted to have a new experience in my life and *Survivor* is exactly that, it challenges you. So I was super keen to do it."

Ong was called up to take part in the latest season of the survival show, and this one has a bit of a twist.

"I thought it was going to be a solo season and then I was told that it's not a solo season and [asked], if I had someone in mind, who would I want to do this with?" he said.

It's titled *Australian Survivor: Blood v Water* so the contestants were encouraged to bring a family member.

For Khanh, that was his sister Amy, but she took a little bit of convincing.

"My little sister is my best friend," he said.

"Once I got the call that this could be happening they asked me who I'd like to do it with and I said 'Amy' and she said 'Absolutely not!'"

"My little sister doesn't like being in the public eye, she's a little bit more reserved than I am so she was really scared to be on camera. But I think it only took about a week for me to convince her. I said 'Amy, this is going to be a once-in-a-lifetime experience,' and she totally understood and realised she'd probably regret it if she didn't do it. I'm so proud of her for doing it because I knew it was out of her comfort zone."

It turns out, she enjoyed it more than she thought she would.

"Amy loved it," Ong said.

"She came off the show and said 'OK, this is addictive' and I said 'I told you'. You don't know the cameras are there. And she was so beautiful. A lot of people loved her. She's a ball of fun."

For Ong, taking part was a no-brainer, he has been a fan of the show from its inception.

"I like that it looks challenging, I like that it puts strain on the body, the conditions are hard," he said.

"There's challenges and then there's a mental game as well."

You're living on rations and that's really interesting to me, I want to know how far I can push myself."

With the *Australian* show taking place in the Queensland Outback, Ong's background in food, and interest in foraging, were something of an advantage.

"Before *MasterChef* I used to forage," he said.

"I would go away on weekends and look for mushrooms or herbs and different berries and things like that. So I was really keen to get dropped in a location where there was bush food around me."

"I'm no expert but I do know what I'm looking out for."

So while Khanh entered without a game plan, he was certainly going to take charge of the food.

"I know that you're supposed to go into *Survivor* with a strategy or some sort of play in your mind, but for me there were so many variables this season – I wasn't going in as someone who was unknown so that was going to be harder," he said.

"I was going in with a loved one so there's that emotional side that would make it really difficult but it was still an individual game. I thought 'There's nothing I can do here. I'm just going to go in and just be me'."

"So I definitely took charge of the cooking. I was up poking beans at 3am making sure they were ready for breakfast, then going back to bed and waking up again to dehydrate the rice."

The whole experience was more challenging than he could have ever imagined, even though he and Amy tried their best to prepare before they went in.

"We learned how to make fires using sticks and using flint – all different types of methods just so we were ready in case it had to happen," he recalled.

"Aside from that it was just more mentally getting ready to be cut off from the world."

While the experience was really challenging, Ong relished the break from the everyday grind.

"I didn't have to work, I wasn't flat out, I didn't have my phone to check emails all the time," he said.

"So it wasn't a holiday, but it was a nice little break to do something different where I could concentrate on one thing."

While he always wanted to be a contestant on *Survivor*, it's a very different prospect watching it on TV and then taking part in real life.

"Everything was so hard," he said.

"I knew it was going to be difficult but it was so much harder than I expected. But I don't do things by halves so I was there to work."

Khanh says that the experience has changed him. While the series unfolds, the audience might notice his evolution on screen.

"I think I've come off more appreciative of everything we have," he said.

"Being out there and having things restricted shows us that we have so much at our fingertips and sometimes you take that for granted because there's no struggle. But out there you're working for every meal."

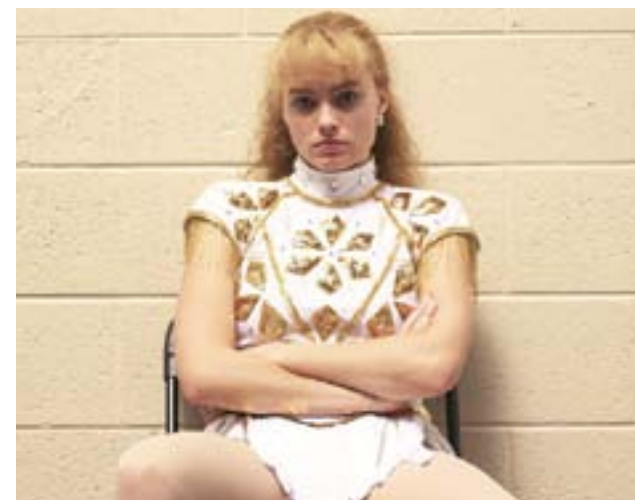

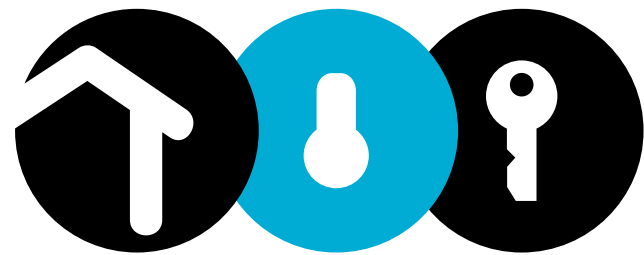

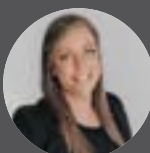

## Key 2 The Past // The Customs House, Port MacDonnell

A renowned piece of this seaside town's history, The Customs House at Port MacDonnell has fulfilled many purposes since its construction.

When Port MacDonnell was officially declared a port on the 4th of April 1860, the need for a building to serve the flourishing port was established. Taking three years to complete, this building's construction began in 1863 having been designed by Mr Francis Reynolds for £2605. Once built, Captain Edward French opened a shipping agency and warehouses leaving Port MacDonnell to prosper with increased good, £27,000 worth moved through the port in just three months. The major exports were wool and wheat with other goods including potatoes, flour, wattle bark, hay, hides and tallow. In this time, The Customs House was used as a Court House, Post Office, Police station and held telegraph and Customs offices. The Post Office had a telephone switch board of twelve lines and alphabetically marked mail pigeon holes. For the Telegraph office, telegrams were sent by Morse code to Mount Gambier before being telephones through to this Port MacDonnell office for delivery. There were prison cells and stables built at the building's rear for the purposes of the Police station, with the stables having since been demolished.

The 1870s, Port MacDonnell was most fortunate in revenue from customs, with the only other port gaining better numbers being Port Adelaide. During the years 1876 to 1879, £604,946 worth of goods were exported while £263,961 were imported. Additions and alterations were made in 1874 and 1938, further in the Police station moving to the new Charles Street station in 1958. Within it's time, The Customs House has had many owners, being used in many different capacities such as a restaurant, accommodation and a private residence.

The Customs House is considered one of the most important buildings to be built in Port MacDonnell due to its grand scale. Steeped in history, this building's presence indicates the fierce confidence held in the town to become a significant port facility. The Key 2 this building's past is in its uniqueness being the only one of its kind in South Australia with the building as a reminder of the busy trading port's history.

# Pandemic drives demand

**C**OASTAL and outer suburban homes are maintaining their popularity among Australian homebuyers thanks to Covid, as shown by new data from realestate.com.au.

In an attempt to escape metropolitan city lockdowns in states such as Victoria and New South Wales, homebuyers are becoming increasingly interested in houses and units further from CBDs and closer to coastal and beachside areas.

Senior economist at realestate.com.au, Eleanor Creagh, says that coronavirus has impacted homebuyers' decisions considerably.

"Covid is seeing an ongoing reassessment in lifestyle. Many people no longer need to live in close proximity to their place of work due to the shift towards remote work or hybrid work structures," Ms Creagh says.

Remote workplace arrangements as a result of the pandemic, coupled with the idea of a tree or sea change, are fuelling a fierce real estate market.

"Buyers are escaping lockdowns and looking for more space, perhaps a home office or a garden, and lifestyle perks like scenic coastline, beaches or quiet countryside."

With many Australians spending most of their time at home for the majority of the last two years, there has also been an increase in demand for homes with more space, features and amenities.

Demand for homes has only increased thanks to extremely low interest rates. Listings on realestate.com.au have experienced an almost 50

per cent increase in views per listing compared to the same time last year.

"The market's remained pretty hot. Prices have continued to appreciate. There are still people looking to get into the market with the prospect of continued capital growth," says Ms Creagh.

Grant Smith, property director at Century 21, believes that lifestyle and space are at the top of many homebuyers' priority lists.

"So long as our international borders are closed, and to some degree national borders, people are

going to be very lifestyle conscious and putting their money (and what they would perhaps use as holiday funds) back into their own family home to ensure there's the comfort of living," Mr Smith says.

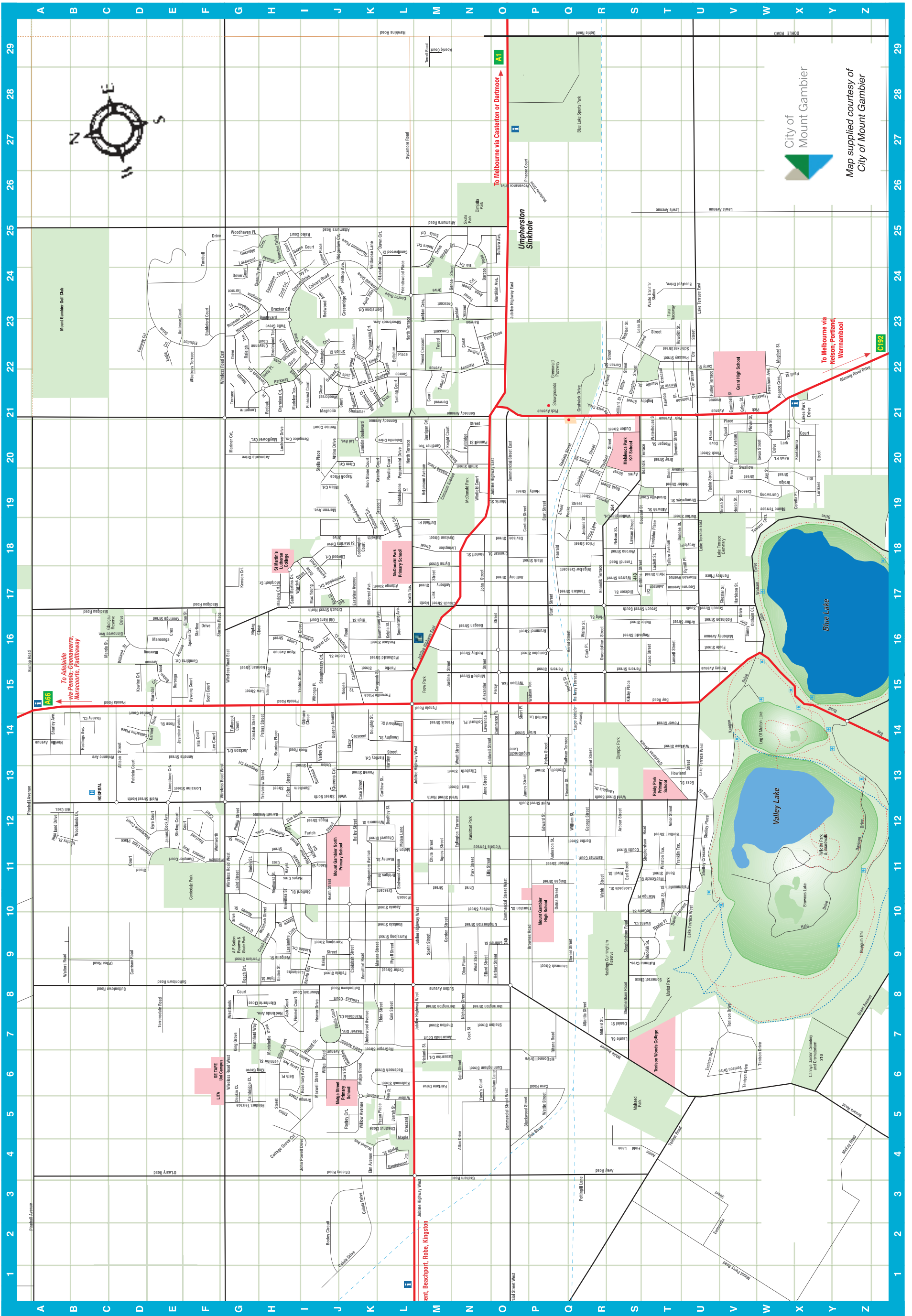
A highly-engaged buyer is someone who is likely close to making a purchase, based on their activity on realestate.com.au.

Realestate.com.au has analysed site users based on their activity online, classifying people who are close to making a purchase as a 'highly-engaged buyer.'

As measured by the number of highly-engaged buyers, the top five most in-demand suburbs in South Australia for houses are Prospect (18,951), Happy Valley (18,461), Morphett Vale (18,245), Magill (18,100) and Mount Barker (17,133).

South Australia's most in-demand suburb for units is Adelaide (23,651), way ahead of the remaining top five, consisting of Glenelg (8366), Glenelg North (7534), North Adelaide (7373), and Magill (6132).

Enter *Murderville* – a new crime-based improv series that throws celebrity guests in the deep end each episode, partnering with homicide detective Terry Seattle (Will Arnett) on his latest case. They step onto the set without a script, with no clue as to what the crime is, and learn the information as the audience does. The other players, from forensic investigators to suspects know their parts and help the action move along.

Arnett, as the noirish Seattle, spends his time bossing the stars around, commanding the likes of *The Hangover's* Ken Jeong, Sharon Stone, *Schitt's Creek's* Annie Murphy, Marshawn Lynch, Kumail Nanjiani and Conan O'Brien into hilariously compromising situations. Seeing their reactions to the bizarre material is the most delightful part of the series, and there's plenty for them to take in – guest detectives are responsible for deciphering all the clues, interrogating the suspects, and naming the killer.

An adaptation of the UK's *Murder in Successville* (streaming, Amazon Prime Video), which ran for three seasons and won a BAFTA Award, *Murderville* is the perfectly silly, ridiculous viewing we didn't know we needed.

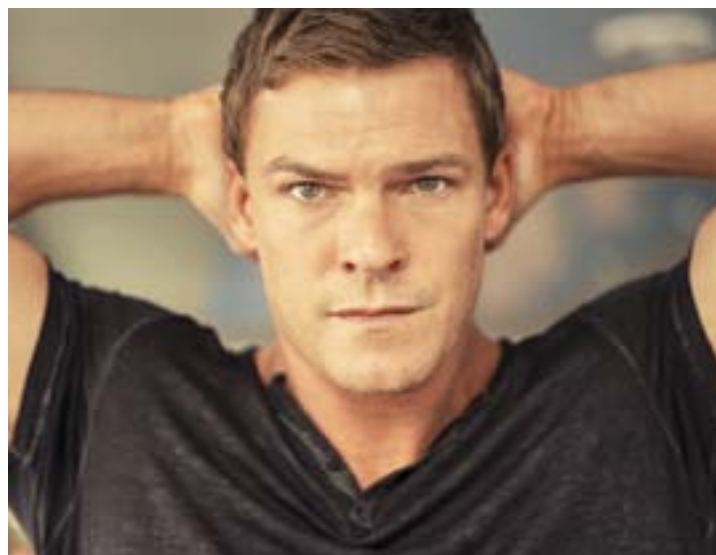

## Inspired by Heysen

LOCAL Mount Gambier artist Nita Von Stanke continues to showcase her skill and enjoyment for painting and art.

Her specialised acrylic style brings techniques derived from realism, as well as inspiration from the late Sir Hans Heysen, a world-renowned Australian landscape painter.

Ms Von Stanke found the time to talk to The Border Watch about her beginnings and inspirations for work.

"I've always enjoyed drawing and anything to do with art ever since I was a kid," Ms Von Stanke said.

"When I left school, I started going to a well-known artist in the Riverland called Garry Duncan and I went to him for about three months."

After her time with Mr Duncan as a mentor, Ms Von Stanke moved to Mount Gambier in 1983 in order to pursue a career in sport.

At the same time, she also studied art at TAFE for 12 months before her sports career became a priority.

It was not until 26 years later, in 2009, when Ms Von Stanke decided to take up art full-time.

Her medium mainly included acrylic on canvas or paper, with one of her creations said to have taken about 102 hours to complete.

"I dabble in collages and abstract stuff and have done a little bit of watercolour, but mostly acrylic because I find oils take too long to dry and I get impatient," she said.

The avid artist said she classified herself as a realist painter despite the genre being one of her major challenges.

Despite having a large collection of unique

artworks, Ms Von Stanke's personal favourite was a collage and charcoal portrait of her son which hangs in her living room.

"I did a painting for a friend for his 60th birthday but, because of the pandemic, I just have not been able to give it to him," she said.

Throughout her extensive art career, Ms Von Stanke has also been the highlight of a number of art exhibitions across the State.

One highlight for the artist was her first solo exhibition held in Adelaide several years ago.

"I would like to do another solo exhibition one day, but time wise at the moment it's just not possible," she said.

Gaining most of her inspiration from photo-

graphs of landscapes, Ms Von Stanke said she was greatly inspired by her great-uncle who was also an artist.

"To anyone who feels a little bit unsure about getting into art I always say just give it a go and keep practicing," Ms Von Stanke said.

Enjoying giving encouragement, the artist was never interested in teaching yet continues to guide beginner artists if they ask.

"I can go out into my studio and just paint all day if I wanted to, or if I could, and forget about everything," she said.

"If people are struggling with life or have issues then art is definitely mentally beneficial."

## Generations in Jazz goes online

GENERATIONS in Jazz (GIJ) will be delayed by five weeks and go online to ensure the nationally recognised music education event is able to proceed after a two year hiatus due to Covid-19.

Originally planned for May 6 to 8, GIJ will now be held on June 15 to 17 to accommodate a new-look hybrid model which will be named 'GIJ Improvised'.

GIJ board chair Peter Roberts said the board met recently to make the challenging decision to adapt the traditional structure to give certainty to schools that an event would be delivered.

Mr Roberts said it was not a permanent change, with plans to return to the traditional format next year if Covid rules allowed.

"We are extremely excited to share this new look digital, virtual and live platform which will open the door to potentially sharing our event with a new global audience, bringing invaluable exposure to our event and indeed the region, whilst importantly supporting and enhancing the jazz music curriculum across the nation," Mr Roberts said.

"GIJ Improvised is taking an innovative approach to Generations in Jazz, ensuring thousands of students across Australia have the opportunity to perform and record the 2022 GIJ Set Pieces and have some of the world's best jazz educators and performers adjudicate their work."

Mr Roberts said planning with ever-changing pandemic influences, especially with the Omicron variant, has had a major influence on decision-making for the program.

"The board felt it imperative to give certainty to the schools, offering an extended time frame to prepare while compensating for the delayed start to school terms and the restrictions on commencement of rehearsals," Mr Roberts said.

GIJ Improvised will host the traditional aspects of the event, including the City of Mount Gambier National Stage Band Awards, ANZ

Vocal Ensemble Awards and the GIJ Small Jazz Combo Awards.

Mr Roberts said the new format has made it possible for the international composers of the Division 1 and Division 2 Set Pieces, Bob Mintzer and John Clayton respectively, to be available to adjudicate the bands in those Divisions; a significant coup for the students, music directors and GIJ.

The longstanding James Morrison Jazz Scholarship and the GIJ Vocal Scholarship format will remain, with finalists selected and travelling to Mount Gambier for their adjudication performances.

The GIJ Gala concert, traditionally held on the Saturday night of the May event, will be held on Thursday June 16 at the Sir Robert Helpmann Theatre with public tickets to be released based on Covid-19 guidelines at the time.

The concert will include James Morrison among other special guest artists due to be announced over the coming weeks.

Schools will have access to the live streamed concert which will include the an-

nouncement of place-getters from the awards and scholarships.

Mr Roberts said that while the hybrid event was not the board's favoured structure, preferring the traditional 'big top' celebration, there was agreement that the event could not be cancelled for a third consecutive year.

"The most important underlying objective for the board is to maintain the significant role GIJ plays in school music education programs," he said.

"This hybrid format has the potential to give the opportunity to many more schools who have not participated in GIJ previously" he said.

"We appreciate the variables will be different for our city and the region in 2022 with participants not travelling and the reduced economic stimulus to our businesses and accommodation providers, but we remain committed to seeing the event return live in a traditional format in future years when the pandemic is behind us."

He said 3500 participants from 80 schools had already registered for the event.

## Display for art awards

PRIZES of up to \$1500 are on offer for Limestone Coast artists in the South East Arts Society's Open Arts Awards.

Launched recently by the South East Arts Society, there will be 22 opportunities for artists to secure up to \$350 for each of the eight major media categories.

This will include video and digital in addition to the traditional oils, acrylics, water-colours, textiles and three dimensional.

Vice president of the art society, Julianne Woodruff said the competition would bring opportunities for artists across the nation with interstate entries also welcome.

"This competition is a chance for everybody and anybody to showcase all sorts of different mediums," Ms Woodruff said.

"Having the opportunity to showcase it at the Riddoch is not something emerging artists always have and it is also an opportunity for them to sell their work."

She said tourists would also be able to observe local art on a much larger scale compared to normal.

"We will be having workshops for people to learn how to put their work on for exhibition as well," she said.

Entries are open for all artists including interstate artists, with the art society working harder each year to increase the prize money through sponsorship.

"We also have sections for primary school and high school artists so we are encouraging them to enter as well," Mr Woodruff said.

"There are a lot of categories available for every type of artist."

Since its announcement artists have shown a keen interest in the competition with entry forms to be available at the Riddoch Arts and Cultural Centre or online at the art society website.

An exhibition showcasing the artwork will be on display at the Riddoch throughout April and early May.

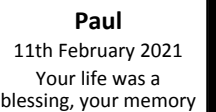

# Anglers cast winning lines

FISHING

A PLEASANT weekend across the Limestone Coast saw plenty of anglers wetting a line, with some nice fish caught right across the South East.

The sea was fishable, but uncomfortable for some of the smaller trailer boats, but the bigger vessels managed to head out and find some nice fish.

The shark fishing has again been excellent.

Great numbers and big fish have greeted most anglers and the distribution has been unreal.

Gummy shark to 20kg have been boated in as close as 20 metres of water by fishos just trying new ground, through to our usual haunts in 60-100m and beyond.

The guys targeting flathead late last week have reported some nice fish and decent numbers in 90-110m south of Port MacDonnell and there has been a handful of other species boated out there too.

Some nice snapper, knifejaw and even a few silver dory have hit the deck which are all tasty on the table.

The inshore fishos have done well again with the snapper and whiting.

It is not only the boaties in on the action, the land-based guys are holding their own on both fronts.

The fish have again been so well spread out that there is not one spot better than another.

The boaties have found the fish in Danger Point, Racecourse Bay and Port MacDonnell breakwater, while the land-based guys are fishing Cape Douglas, Nene Valley, Blackfellows Caves and Carpenter Rocks.

Some of the fish caught have been up over the 50cm mark which are absolute crackers.

Snapper to 60cm have been landed off the beach by a few lucky anglers and slightly bigger models from the boats, so we are spoilt for options at the moment.

Gar anglers are smiling again after a couple of weeks of quiet fishing.

The numbers along with the size are both impressive again, so now is a great time to grab the gear and head down in search of these tasty fish.

The gar are another fish which suit both boat and beach fishos, it all depends on what you prefer.

The land-based guys will fish Cape Douglas and Livingstons Bay and do well, while the boat guys will target the same areas, just out a bit wider.

As normal, a bunch of gents under a float and a constant burley trail is all you need to take home arguably one of the tastiest things to come out of our oceans.

A few anglers from here have headed to Portland in recent weeks to have a crack off the Lee breakwater, so over the weekend Wayne

Little and myself thought we would head over and have a bit of a go.

Chatting to a few of the locals while over there it seems they catch all sorts off there, from whiting, mullet and squid along the first half, to snapper, kingfish, sharks and even tuna on in the deeper water towards the end.

We ended up with a mixed bag of gummy shark, snapper, whiting, coota and a selection of throwbacks which made for a great morning on the water.

The Glenelg River has fired up quite well this week, with bream, estuary perch and smaller mulloway all making an appearance.

There has not been a hot spot as such, just keep on the move until you find where they are at.

The bait anglers are doing well on white-bait, pilchard and crab, while lure fishos have found success with cranka crabs, 2.5 inch grubs in natural colours and zman slim swims.

The bigger mulloway have been elusive so

far, but a couple of anglers have hooked some nice fish on live and dead baits, so things are definitely starting to happen.

Looking forward to the weekend we should see fabulous weather, light winds and flat seas, everything we could want in the South East.

I have no doubt there will be plenty of boats on the water and hopefully plenty of fish caught.

Until next week, safe fishing.

He was not thinking about winning after his first six holes which netted just 11 points.

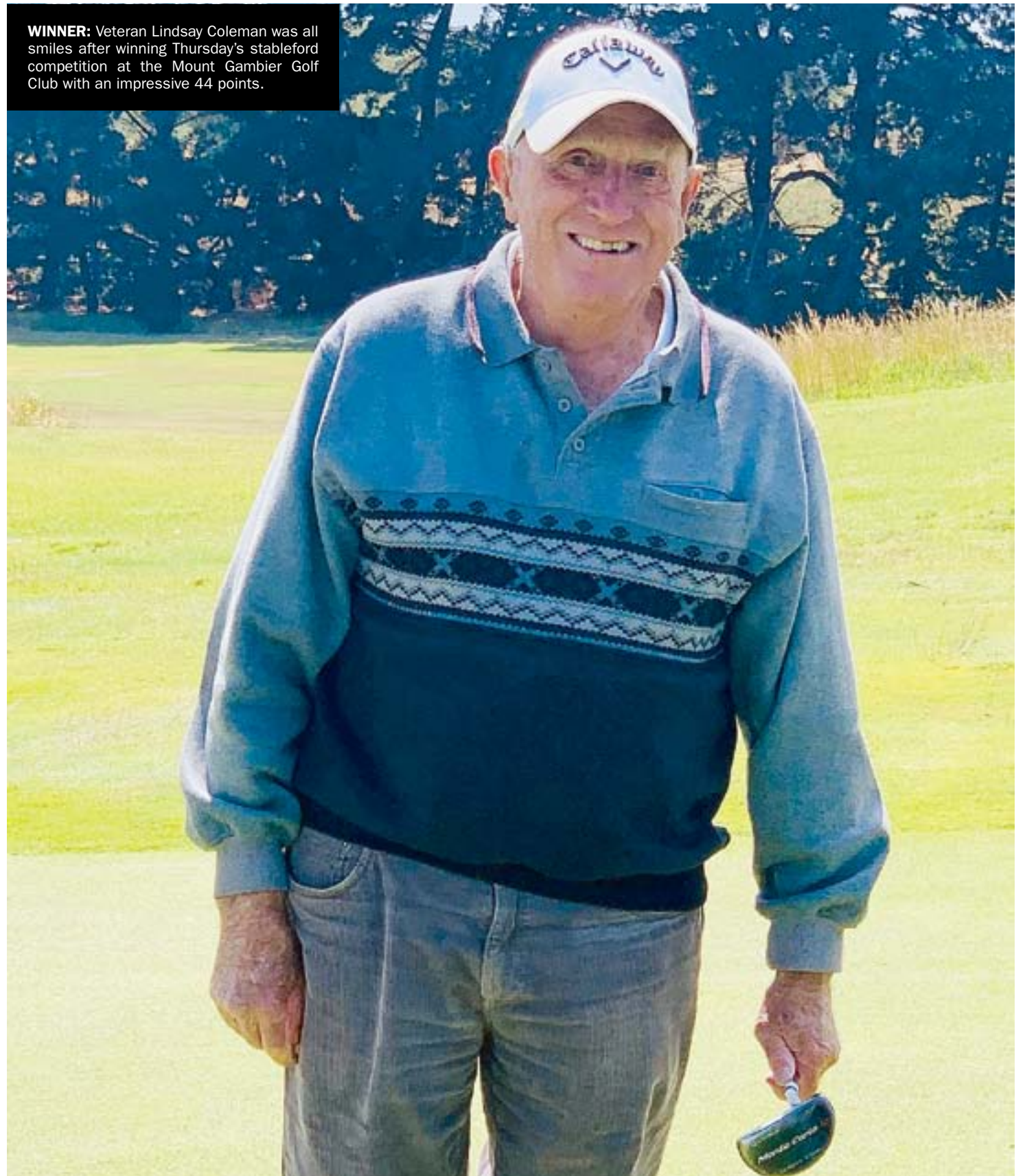
But three consecutive three-pointers to finish the front nine took him up to 20 and that was a sign of things to come on the back nine.

# Third Tara record falls in a fortnight

IT was the Tracie Price trained Giant's Flash who started it all.

He stepped out at Tara Raceway for the first time at a Thursday time-graded meeting on January 20 and promptly set about lowering the long-standing 512-metre record to 29.19 seconds.

Then, three days later, the Phil Lenehan owned and trained Lektra Gal became the third track record holder for the 305-metre distance - after Aston Olenka and Arctic Bear had run 17.49 seconds and 17.35 seconds respectively - when clocking 17.28 seconds.

Last Sunday, Minnie Banjo not only strung together her seventh consecutive win since joining Price's Compton kennels in December but also broke Almighty Stripe's 400-metre track record when running 22.42 seconds.

By Banjo Boy out of Navada Flame, she is

a litter sister to Giant's Flash and raced in the same interests - the Garry Comans-managed Giant Crows Syndicate.

The 400-metre Tara Raceway record has come down considerably since the Richard Clayfield trained Slipper's Might became the first dog to break the 23-seconds barrier with a run of 22.93 seconds on March 28, 2014.

At the end of January 2015, Island's Oyster (Peter Franklin) ran 22.83 seconds which was equalled 12 months later by Cryer's Ricky (Tom Cryer).

A fortnight later Cryer's Ricky lowered the record to 22.78 seconds, a time that stood for almost four years until Dyna Carnie (David Peckham) ran 22.74 seconds on January 5, 2020.

Then, on October 22, 2020, Almighty Stripe (Tim Richards) clocked 22.68 seconds before lowering that time to 22.55 seconds on April 4, 2021.

Meanwhile, the 2021 Ian Badger Leading Trainer award and the 2021 Greyhound of the Year award will be presented at Tara Raceway's

meeting on Sunday afternoon.

Named after the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club's inaugural leading trainer of 1978, the leading trainer award has been won for the third consecutive year by David Peckham of Allendale East.

He finished the year at Tara Raceway with 148 wins, 107 seconds and 102 thirds for a total of 908 points.

The Greyhound of the Year was won by Edenhope-based Cap Abbott's Another Pick, a white and blue daughter of Unlawful Entry and Proud Fantasy.

Another Pick won 12 races at Tara Raceway and accumulated 15 minor placings for a total of 72 points.

This is the second time in three years one of the long-time trainer's greyhounds has won the award - Black Spring successful in 2019.

Another Pick has commenced 2022 in fine style, winning the Bartholomew Pick 6 Stake (400m) at last Sunday's Category 2 meeting in 23.15 seconds.

# Cup win comes to fruition

JUST over 12 months ago there was a degree of confidence in the Peter Hardacre stable in regards to winning the 2021 Naracoorte cup.

The then five-year-old gelding Sebonna had shown some staying promise and had just won a BM 64 race at Bordertown over 1550 metres in January.

However, last minute plans for an attack on the Naracoorte cup were then thrown out the window when an injury sidelined Sebonna for nearly six months.

A year later, the dream of winning a Naracoorte cup came true in no uncertain manner when Sebonna stylishly won the \$31,800 event last Sunday.

The ever-improving stayer had the right credentials going into the race with three wins from his past six starts, including success in the Bordertown cup last December.

Backed with great confidence last Sunday (\$3.40-\$2.80 fav.), Sebonna always travelled well in the box seat behind the leader Shock Alert, and his big entourage of owners (members of the Mount Gambier club) cheered him home loudly in the concluding stages.

Just as excited was jockey Kayla Crowther who had her first ride on the gelding and won her first country cup at a TAB meeting.

"We have had a lot of little issues along the way with him however the plan all along was to tackle the Naracoorte cup this year," trainer Peter Hardacre commented.

"It was an amazing steer by Kayla and we will now look at the Mount Gambier cup on April 1, but he will need another run or two prior to that."

The Naracoorte cup was the fourth of seven legs of the 2021-22 Limestone Coast cups series and Sebonna has already built up an almost unbeatable lead for the award which offers monetary rewards to both the trainer and owners.

## EXTRA INPUT REWARDED

Naracoorte racing club president Glen Hamlyn would have slept well last Sunday night.

Hamlyn had just overseen his first Naracoorte cup as president and everything, including the weather, went according to script.

Around 170 people enjoyed the outdoor setting for the club's calcutta last Saturday night and a good sized crowd turned up for the cup day meeting the following day.

With plenty of shade in the 32 degree heat, the public were well catered for and the locals were happy when Naracoorte trainer Sue Murphy supplied two of the eight winners.

Led by the livewire, enthusiastic Hamlyn, the committee really put in a big effort to make it a special cup day and they were duly rewarded.

The Naracoorte cup had only seven runners (four starters the previous year) which continues to be a concern.

It was a field made up entirely of Limestone Coast runners and nobody could bemoan the quality as all seven runners had winning credentials.

One cannot help but think the Naracoorte club suffered in the programming for the cup, as the previous week the Strathalbyn cup was worth - for the first time - in excess of \$100,000 (over the same distance) and you were not going to attract too many horses from around Adelaide to Naracoorte a week later.

The four nominations received for the Naracoorte cup from that area around Adelaide did not accept and raced in a \$54,750 race over 2250 metres at Morphettville Parks last Saturday.

## SEEKING YOUR VOTE

Virtually out of nowhere, the All Star Mile in Melbourne in March has become a feature race on the racing calendar.

It started in 2019 and is the one race in Australia where voting by the general public can help a horse get a start in the richest mile race in the world (\$5 million).

The 10 horses with the most votes will make the final field and two local owners are hoping a mare they have a share in can make the final cut for the race to be run at Flemington on March 19.

Glencoe's Barry Shephard (well known in the local greyhound industry) and Phil Booth (racing enthusiast who is very partial to a beer

Kayla Crowther rode a double on the program, her second leg winner (Mighty Mabel

giving trainer Darryl Dodson his second winner in a week.

The Dodson trained Gypsy Crown - also ridden by Crowther - won first up in a 1000-metre BM 58 handicap at Murray Bridge the previous Wednesday as a \$20 chance.

Just when the Jamie Opperman trained West Cliff was being touted as a maiden performer for life, the five-year-old gelding came up trumps at start number 13 at Warrnambool last week.

Ridden by apprentice Alana Kelly, the win by West Cliff (\$4.60-10) proved a windfall for his connections as there was an \$8,800 Victorian bonus on top of the first prize of \$13,750.

Victorian trainer Louise Cooper will always remember the win by Bomber's Kiss in the final event at Naracoorte on Sunday as it was her first winner as a trainer.

As a jockey, Cooper (nee Bant) had a terrible fall on the home turn at Edenhope in 2012, leaving her paralysed from her chest down and confined to a wheelchair for the rest of her life.

"It's a massive thrill to train my first winner as I only got my trainer's licence in late November last year," the Hamilton-based Cooper said post race.

"We've only got the one horse in work because Matt (husband and co-trainer) is so

busy on the farm."

Veteran driver Bill Drury took a heavy tumble in a race at Stawell trots last month, but any aches and pains quickly disappeared after the first race at Terang last week.

The Drury trained and driven Your A Shocker drew the pole and led all the way in the maiden pace.

Drury must have a big fan club this side of the border as Your A Shocker paid \$14 for the win in South Australia and \$28 in Victoria.

Harness racing in the South East continues to struggle for horse numbers with only three races at the Greenwald Paceway last Tuesday night.

It makes it hard for the general public to get enthusiastic and attend when there are so few races and a very late start (9.10pm).

The most impressive winner was the Kevin Von Duve trained Springfield Affair (\$5-\$3.20), a 30-metre winner of the NR 52-59 pace to give driver Mark Phillips his fourth winner of the year.

The Victorian visitor Abbey Fields (\$12) and Sunshineinparadise (\$15) made it a night for non-favourites by winning, the latter being the first non-leader to win here this year.

"To finish it with a few overs to spare was really good," DeJong said.

"Then the way Sam (Willis) finished it with a nice shot over cover, he was definitely up and about after that."

# Season finished for Lakers

THE 2021-22 Country Basketball League season is over for the Mount Gambier Lakers women, after a semi-final loss to Portland Coasters at the Icehouse on Saturday night.

Lakers coach Bryan Green said while it was a disappointing way to finish the season, he was still pleased overall.

He said Saturday night Portland was simply too strong.

"I could make lots of excuses but at the end of the day Portland was too good for us," Green said.

"They had a good game plan, didn't let us get into any rhythm and we paid the price.

"It is disappointing but it was a pretty good season.

"I have no complaints."

It was clear the game turned in the third stanza, as Portland took control.

Green had few answers.

"They came out really well in the third term," he said.

"I think we were still in the change rooms for the first four or five minutes and it really cost us.

"I probably should have called a time out earlier that we did but I had faith in the girls they could turn it around.

"But it didn't happen."

Green said Maddy Wormald had drained a couple of three-point bombs in the final term which closed to margin to around five and kept the Lakers in the game.

But the side was simply unable to continue the pressure.

"There were some girls who were really flat and they couldn't do anything," Green said.

"That is the legacy of Covid.

"I haven't had it but they tell me they struggle to breath and have no energy, which doesn't help.

"But I said to the girls before and after the game I have always found winning a knock-out final is a lot harder than winning a final."

Despite the early exit from the finals, Green said overall he was pleased with how the season panned out.

It allowed younger players to take the floor and show what they were capable of.

"It was a really good season," Green said.

"We played four 15-year-olds ... Maddy was the assistant coach and the only one over 21.

"Everybody else is 21 and down to 15 so that is exceptional really."

Green said a combination of the Pioneers women's program and the Limestone Coast Academy had helped rekindle the interest in women's basketball in the region, with the younger players able to see a pathway ahead.

Over the course of the season plenty of players stood up when it mattered but one showed consistency.

"I thought throughout the whole season Olivia was our most consistent player," he said.

"She even missed a game or two Covid related but I think she was by far the most consistent."
