"IT will be great for tourism," said Mount Gambier electric car owner, Brett Mashado in reaction to news that Mount Gambier will be among several Limestone Coast towns to receive new electric vehicle (EV) charging stations as part of a \$12m project funded by the State Government.

Four new charging stations will be installed in Mount Gambier along with two in Beachport, four in Robe, three in Naracoorte, three in Kingston and one new station in both Bordertown and Keith.

These Limestone Coast towns will be among 140 sites across 52 rural, regional and metropolitan locations to receive a total of 536 new EV charging stations throughout the State with three quarters of the new charge points to be located in regional South Australia.

The proud owner of a 2015 Nissan Leaf electric car, Mr Mashado said while the new charging stations would not affect him, as he charges his car at home, he can see it being a boon for tourism in the regions.

"It may attract people from the capital cities with electric cars to say 'let's go exploring the regions'," he said explaining that many people with EV's experience 'range anxiety' due to the current paucity of charging stations posing the risk that EV drivers may be stranded with a flat battery if they venture too far from their known charging points.

Health vs freedom

THE State's leading health organisation has said Covid-19 boosters were about health and not freedom after a regional MP stated there was a "vaccination fatigue".

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride ad-

dressed mayors from across the region last week, stating residents were deterred from receiving their third Covid shot due to a "lack of benefits".

"If you are double vaccinated and you are a close contact it lands you a seven day isolation and ten days if you get the virus and people are questioning why they need another jab in the arm if nothing changes," Mr McBride said.

He said people were looking forward to "getting out of" the pandemic as quickly as possible and encouraged Premier Steven Marshall to act as fast as possible.

"The rules may change and we may need a third jab to get into an airplane or an event but

people are really looking to get out of this as fast as we can and I am hoping to encourage the Premier to move as fast as he possibly can to make that happen.

"People are questioning why they should get another vaccination if nothing is going to

State Australian Medical Association vice president John Williams told The Border Watch there was evidence of vaccination fatigue with residents tired of needing extra Covid boosters.

"I do hear that people have continued to do the right thing such as get their boosters, wear masks and check in where necessary but are now looking to get on with life," Mr Williams said.

"I feel the same myself and it would be great if we could just get on with life but the reality is that we can't and we can't ignore the risk of the Omicron variant."

Mr Williams said booster vaccinations were not about a matter of freedom but more about maintaining the functionality of the health system.

"Receiving a booster shot is about health and safety and people feel more free when they feel safe," he said.

"We have the freedom because we have

a great health system and advice in the first place."

Mr Williams said the uptake of booster

shots had been a bit slow but further encouraged South Australians to receive their third dose.

"The evidence shows it is far safer to have

a third shot and we greatly know it improves things, especially for those who have Astra-Zeneca and a Pfizer booster," he said.

"South Australia has done so well and that is because of our great health care system and advice that has been given as well as the government that has followed that advice."





Future of servos questioned

AMPOL Millicent Pines service station may be closed, demolished, and sold if a development application goes to plan, despite other sites in the region waiting far longer.

The application, lodged on January 20, is requesting the decommissioning and demolition of all buildings on 218 and 220 Mount Gambier Road, Millicent, which includes the petrol station.

The company confirmed the plans this week.

"Subject to approval of the development application, the Ampol site at 220 Mount Gambier Road, Millicent, will undergo demolition and remediation works to prepare the land for sale," a company spokesperson said.

The site is listed on the Environmental Protection Act (EPA) contamination index, for storage of listed substances.

"Pending approval of the development application, the demolition will include the removal of all infrastructure, and the remediation works will address the contaminated soil," the Ampol spokesperson said.

"It is expected that the works will be completed in the next 12 months."

Meanwhile, other sites in the region have been sitting closed and dormant for months.

An Ampol spokesperson confirmed that sites at Church Street in Penola and Commercial Street West and East in Mount Gambier would begin demolition and remediation works in the next 12 months but did not clarify how works were being prioritised.

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell said he is hopeful a different arrangement could be made to fix the "eye sore" the empty lots cause in Mount Gambier.

"These are prime locations in our town,

and people's first impressions are of an overgrown disused site," Mr Bell said.

"There are weeds, they are fenced up, it is really a poor representation of our community.

"I am trying to work through what can be done in terms of working with Ampol or Caltex regarding these sites...one thought I had was a partnership with the Mount Gambier City Council.

"If the sites were opened up so they could be used for parking, or as electric car charging stations, Council's contribution would be to help maintain the site until they are decommissioned."

Ampol is not under any obligation to make use of the sites.

"I guess their motivation is different to ours," he said.

"Ours is to ensure that our main street is a vibrant active place, and the owners of those sites, their motivation could be to develop it, or get the best price they can for it, but there may not be a concern around timelines."

Mr Bell confirmed he is yet to have direct discussions with Ampol on the matter.

With the new network to have no more than 250kms between charging points, this removes that 'range anxiety' for many EV

"I can't think of any negatives for having this new charging infrastructure," Mr Mashado said.

"It's much better than SA Power networks putting up more power poles and it encourages more people to buy an electric car.

"We bought this [their Nissan Leaf] so we were not dirtying the air; that was the aim," he said adding that he and his wife Gilda had purchased the car second hand about a year ago and had clocked up 8,000kms doing around town errands including picking up their children from school.

"At school pick up, I sit in the line up with 60 or so cars all running, including four wheel drives with diesel pouring out their exhausts," Mr Mashado said.

"Nothing is coming out of our car, not even noise; the noisiest thing is the air conditioner."

As Mr Mashado has solar panels installed at his home, he plugs his car into a normal household power point in his garage and charges the car during the day using solar power ensuring the vehicle is completely sustainably powered.

"I haven't spent anything on it, not fuel, nothing," he said calculating that he would have saved about \$1000 already in petrol costs.

"About 95 per cent of the time, we use this

[the Nissan Leaf] and while we use a normal car for longer drives currently, I would definitely look at another electric car in the future; I wouldn't go back to a petrol car."

Installation and operation of the new charging stations - the first Statewide rapid EV charging network in Australia - will be undertaken by South Australian motorists association, the RAA, after it was awarded the \$12.4 million State Government grant.

The RAA said the exact locations of the sites for charging points were yet to be confirmed but would including shopping centre car parks, holiday accommodation, hotels, camping grounds and on highway rest stops.

Construction of the network is expected to begin in the middle of this year and take two years to complete.

Support luncheon cancelled

MAJOR regional fundraising event, the Limestone Coast Support Homeless People Luncheon, has been cancelled for this year after continual postponements since 2020 due to Covid-19 restrictions.

Event committee chairman Barry Stafford said ongoing restrictions meant proceeding on the rescheduled date of April 8 this year was not practical due to uncertainties regarding venue capacity, interstate travel and potential isolation for participants if someone attended and later tested positive to Covid-19.

"The impact of the Omicron Covid-19 variant, including continued restrictions on trade and hospitality venues, has forced our hand," he said.

"This would have been the fifth time we would have had to postpone the luncheon and it is with greater disappointment that we have instead decided to not schedule a new date and instead cancel for 2022.

"This is sad not only for the committee, regular sponsors and guests, but for ac.care, which relied on the fundraising to support the organisation's local services to individuals and families experiencing or at risk of homelessness."

Luncheon ticketholders will be contacted by the committee and offered refunds.

MP supports pledge

LIBERAL Member for MacKillop Nick McBride has welcomed the Labor Party's pledge of a \$52.7m funding package for Limestone Coast health.

Announced during a recent whirlwind visit to the region by Leader of the Opposition, Peter Malinauskas, the pledge includes \$9.75m for a seven-year funding agreement with the Keith and District Hospital and \$8m to upgrade the Naracoorte Hospital, both of which are in Mr McBride's electorate.

Speaking last Friday at a Limestone Coast Local Government Association meeting in Mount Gambier, the local MP said Labor's funding pledge covered some "very important areas"

"I welcome the Labor Party's announcement and encourage my government to match the funding prior to the March election," Mr McBride said.

"I wasn't going to run around and say 'don't spend money' on the Limestone Coast.

"I would like to see more money spent on regional health and the likes of our hospitals and service upgrades, particularly palliative care."

Mr McBride also spoke on hospital ramping and the outcome of recent submissions on the issue.

"What is really fascinating coming out of the submissions is the bottleneck beyond the emergency department and there being no way for patients to move beyond the emergency department," he said.

"What is also really interesting is the ambulance association recognised 20,000 shifts of overtime per annum and they are saying there are not enough people.

"If you are in business and paying penalty



rates and double time, you are actually spending more money than employing more people to do the job."

He said the money was there but the problem was not being solved and it was also a matter of looking at who is responsible for patients moving through the emergency department whether it be the State or Federal government to fund the beds.

Minister for Health Stephen Wade has previously been reported as saying the Opposition's health funding announcement was

"nothing but spin".

"In fact this represents less than half of what the Liberal Government is already investing in capital works alone," Mr Wade said.

"You only need to look back at recent history to see which party was delivering more for regions.

"We are outspending Labor on regional health five to one and the Liberal Government has already committed more than \$200m to regional health infrastructure."

The grass is always greener

THE Metropolitan Fire Services (MFS) was called to the Blue Lake Pumping Station to free a trapped wallaby recently.

The young wallaby found herself stuck between two bars after trying to flee the area with concerned members of the community calling local wildlife rescuers to the scene.

Mount Gambier wildlife carer, Julia Dangerfield tried to free the animal herself, yet soon realised it was a job outside her capabilities.

"I ended up having to get the MFS to come down and free the wallaby from the bars," Ms Dangerfield said.

"What had happened was the wallaby may have been spooked and tried to escape through the bars before getting stuck."

Ms Dangerfield said a wallaby's rib cage was able to compress to fit through

tight places, but when they squeeze past, their rib cage often expands again and the animal becomes stuck between their ribs and pelvis.

"When we called the MFS we were hoping they would be able to bend the bars enough so we could get the wallaby out." she said.

"It was quite funny because when the MFS workers went to go get their tools, someone stayed behind to try and bend the bars which ended up snapping."

The wallaby was soon freed and checked by vets with the only injuries being slight bruising on the abdomen.

"Often we find wallabies stuck in farming fencing or residential fencing and it usually happens because they are spooked by a dog or something similar," Ms Dangerfield said.

"This was the first time I had ever been called to a wallaby getting stuck in the fence at the pumping station.

"But it seems to always be the wallabies that end up in this sort of trouble."

Covid voting

SOUTH Australians in isolation will be able to collect voting papers for the upcoming State election at Covid-19 testing stations or Rapid Antigen collection points.

In a first for the State, 22 PCR testing stations and Rapid Antigen Testing (RAT) collections points locations across South Australia, including in Mount Gambier, Millicent, Naracoorte, Kingston and Bordertown, will double as ballot collection points allowing close contacts and Covid-19 impacted individuals to vote safely.

If South Australians are Covid-positive, a close contact, or have Covid symptoms between Thursday, March 17, and election day on Saturday, March 19, they will be eligible to register online and will be invited to pick up a voting pack at a PCR testing site or RAT collection site.

Under the updated Emergency Management Act, Covid-19 impacted individuals will have permission to leave home to collect their ballot papers and post their completed ballots while still in isolation.

Independent for Mount Gambier Troy Bell last week participated in a sit-in at parliament calling for the Premier to reinstate parliament, in order to pass a proposed Electoral (Assisted Voting) Bill 2022 that would allow South Australians in quarantine on election day to vote over the phone.

Mr Bell said he was relieved that provisions had been made to allow people to vote, but was concerned about the toll forcing ill people out of their homes could have on their health.

"My only concern is those who are in home quarantine but are actually ill, being able to get out and vote," Mr Bell said.

"When in my mind an extension to the telephone voting system, which is used already

for the vision-impaired or blind voters, could have been extended.

"It is a solution, but it will come at an expense."

Mr Bell said the planning around voting while living with Covid should have begun earlier.

"I think it is a testament to the independents who raised this issue and sought to get clarity from the Government around it," Mr Bell said.

"Up until last week there was no urgency or no talk on how those who could not do a postal vote were going to vote."

The changes to the electoral voting system have been made through updates to the Emergency Management Act, a move Mr Bell was critical of.

"I am very firm that these decisions should always be made by parliament, and not by a police commissioner under an emergency management act."

"It is a bad precedent to set, and it is one that I do not endorse."

Electoral Commissioner, Mick Sherry, said the Electoral Commission has worked in consultation with SA Health, SA Pathology, SAFE-COM and SA Police to come up with the solution

"We have every confidence that South Australians can vote safely in the 2022 State election," Mr Sherry said.

"Allowing PCR and RAT sites to double as voting pack collection points will allow South Australians who are in isolation or have Covid-19 the opportunity to safely cast their vote this State election," he said.

Voters being allowed to leave isolation to collect and post their ballot papers so they can exercise their right to vote will be part of the approved directions.

Students filling classrooms

STUDENTS in the Limestone Coast have returned to school this week, after many were required to undertake remote learning since the term started.

Pre-school, Reception and Years 7, 8 and 12 have been in school for two weeks, with all other levels returning to the physical classroom this week.

Limestone Coast education director Adam Box said the adjustment this week back to inschool classes went as expected.

"The transition to full schooling seems to have gone really well so far," Mr Box said.

"I think it is important that the community and parents know that the schools and kindergartens are doing as much as they possibly can to follow the guidelines set by SA Health and the Education Department.

"At all times they are trying to minimise any Covid-19 issues.

"Their number one job is to teach kids, so

that is where their priority is, but at the same time they are working extra hard to be vigilant around Covid processes."

Mr Box said the Limestone Coast education team has been actively working to ensure enough substitute teachers are available for any staff shortages due to positive cases or close contact status.

"It has been a focus of ours, making sure we are accessing enough relief staff to work with schools," Mr Box said.

"So far we have been successful in being able to manage, but we will be monitoring the situation over the next couple of weeks."

Limestone Coast Local Health Network (LCLHN) executive director of medical services, Dr Elaine Pretorius, said last week a small spike in Covid-19 cases is possible.

"There might be a bit of an uptick [in Covid cases] when children come back to school, and we have seen some infections in schools," Ms Pretorius said.

"But hopefully we will be able to keep it at the current rates."

City council opening up Lakes area for public in planned stages

THE Mount Gambier council opened Davison Drive, the Valley Lake Conservation Park, playground and picnic areas and Freemans Landing for public use after a fire that burned 50 hectares of grass and scrub in the Crater Lakes precinct last month.

Assessment continues and other areas of the precinct will be reopened to the public once they are deemed safe.

The Valley Lake itself is closed for recre-

ational use until further notice.

Recreational activities are not permitted on the Valley Lake as ongoing water quality assessment continues.

Council estimated about 400,000 litres of water was removed from the Valley Lake as a result of firefighting efforts, reducing the level of the lake by about 120mm.

The lake will be reopened for activities

once assessments are complete.

An arborist and engineers will continue to undertake additional assessment work in the area surrounding Brownes Lake and Centenary Tower in the coming weeks.

"Brownes Lake, Centenary Tower and the pines area are expected to remain closed for some time and Council will assess these areas when it is safe to do so," council chief executive Sarah Philpott said. "There are currently safety issues and considerations regarding the stability of the slope at Haig Drive.

"The fire destroyed vegetation and erosion is already occurring which means that landslides could happen on the slope during a wet weather event.

"Council will engage a geotechnical consultant to provide a stability assessment in the area"

Are safe seats good for voters?

WITH both a State and Federal election on the horizon public attention will begin to turn to politics, with politicians vying for attention and votes

But does being in a 'safe seat' electorate change how a region may be treated?

Clement Macintyre, Emeritus Professor in the department of politics and international relations at Adelaide University, says that it does.

Safe seats are defined as a parliamentary seat that has traditionally been retained with a large majority in elections, and Mr Macintyre says we have two in the Limestone Coast.

The State electorate of MacKillop, and the Federal seat of Barker can both be considered safe seats according to Mr Macintyre, while Mount Gambier, which was once also a Liberal stronghold, has become a conservative leaning seat that can swing between independents and Liberal.

"MacKillop is a rock-solid Liberal seat," he said.

"For the last 50 years Mount Gambier has been a reasonably safe Liberal seat, but it has a recent tradition of returning independent members."

Mr Macintyre said that safe seats generally do not demand the same level of attention in an election fight as marginal or swinging seats.

"The parties tend to go into an election thinking which ones we do not have to worry about, in other words what are we certainly going to win, and what are we certainly going to lose," he said.

"They are less likely to show up with a big loud announcement and election promises to try and win over the wavering voters in a safe seat.

"Normally a seat like Mount Gambier and MacKillop at a State level, or Barker at a Federal, would have very few resources spent on it."

In practice this could mean more resources promised for a seat such as Mount Gambier that has the potential to return an independent.

"The Liberal party can be confident that a Labor candidate is not going to win that seat," Mr Macintyre said.

"They would obviously prefer to win it

themselves then have an independent as independents are unpredictable, and do not always support the legislation that you want."

Mr Macintyre is predicting that the South Australian election will be close, perhaps close enough that neither major party wins a majority, putting significant power into the hands of independents.

"Just as we saw in 2002 and 2004 it will mean the independents suddenly become critical to the formation of a government," he said.

"Then suddenly Mount Gambier, if it returns an independent, could become of great interest to the major parties."

"If you imagine a scenario with 23 Liberal members, 23 Labor members, and Troy Bell, you can imagine both leaders in Peter Malinauskas and Steven Marshall would be knocking on Troy Bell's door and talking about what they could possibly do for Mount Gambier to convince him to support their side of politics."

City's iconic landmarks to receive dual naming

THE Cave Gardens will be one of six iconic local landmarks to receive dual naming in line with traditional language

Part of an ongoing project between Mount Gambier City Council, the Bunganditj Language Reclamation Committee and Burrandies Aboriginal Corporation, the ongoing project plans to revitalise the traditional language of the Boandik peoples.

The Bunganditj language - which is the traditional language of the Boandik peoples - will be used to provide a dual name for Umpherston Sinkhole, Leg of Mutton Lake, Brownes Lake, Valley Lake and the Blue Lake with both the traditional and the European place names to be used on signage.

Following the decision made by council this week, the Umpherston Sinkhole will also have the Bunganditj name of Balumbul which means buttercup flower.

The Cave Garden will have Thugi which means bullfrogs.

The Leg of Mutton Lake will also be known as Yatton Loo, the Blue Lake will also be WarWar which means crow country, Brownes Lake will have the dual name of Kroweratwari which means emu tracks while the Valley Lake

will have Ketla Malpi which means sacred being used," she said. talking tree.

Language Reclamation Committee member and Boandik elder Aunty Michelle Jacquelin-Furr said the dual naming of the areas was a positive step towards reconciliation.

"This project has been going on for a while but we have been talking about it for much longer than that," Aunty Michelle said.

"It only came into fruition last year when the council said they really wanted to get it up and running.

"We worked out what the names were for specific and important cultural areas and worked from there.'

Aunty Michelle said the project allowed reclamation of the traditional language with other Boandik elders hoping the community would accept the dual naming process.

"It is important for the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people living here because it gives us a sense of pride in knowing that we are being recognised here and the language is

"The project tells us that we are being respected and hopefully the European names will be the secondary names and people will just use the Bunganditj names."

Labelling the project as an "important step forward" Aunty Michelle said the next dual naming she would like to see was the traditional name for Mount Gambier, Berrin, on welcome signs outside the township.

"As we travel around Australia and go to other areas we see these languages being used and it is nice to think that may be the future here as well," she said.

"This project is important for respect for the Aboriginal people here in Mount Gambier and is the beginning of our healing journey; to see the language revived and being used is really significant in the healing process."

Council's Dual Naming Policy also includes acknowledgement, celebration and preservation of cultural practices, traditional sites and significant places.

TRAINEES and apprentices are in demand as Group Training Employment (GTE) hits a record number of students in the region.

The company, which provides apprentice and trainee management services to businesses, trains only in the Limestone Coast.

General Manager of GTE Training, Greg Megaw, said the demand is like nothing he has seen in his 20 years at

'The mixture of not a lot of Covid issues, a lot of infrastructure projects, as well as government funding, has made it that we have had record numbers of apprentices and trainees," Mr Megaw

"Back in 2010 we got up to around 250 consistently for a 12-month period, and we have consistently been hitting over 300 for the last six to eight months.

Mr Megaw is hopeful that more people in training will be a lift for the

"It has been really positive, there have been lots of opportunities for the community," he said.

We have even had more opportunities than we can fill at times."

While the company supports students across a range of specialties, their traditional focus has been construction which has seen high demand.

'Overall traineeships and apprenticeships have proportionally gone up," Mr Megaw said.

"We have always been strong in construction and that continues to happen, but we are starting to look more into the aged care and some other areas.

The Boosting Apprenticeship Commencements program, which provides wage subsidies for businesses and group training organisations will run out at the end of next month, and Mr Megaw said the business is expecting a bit of a drop off after that.

"Most people that were seriously putting on an apprentice, will probably do it before the end of March," he said.

"Anyone taking on a trainee after that will be paying twice as much as they would pay now.

"I do think that things will decline slightly, unless the government brings out some other form of funding."

Aquifer study to store water underway

INVESTIGATIONS will begin into the feasibility of sourcing excess water from the Limestone Coast's drainage network and storing it beneath the ground in the region's aquifer for later use by primary industries.

Announced to regional mayors during a presentation at a Limestone Coast Local Government Association (LCLGA) meeting in Mount Gambier last Friday, a feasibility study into the proposal will be led by the Limestone Coast Landscape Board in partnership with the Primary Producers Sustainable Water Group.

In-line with the Landscape Board's 'Making Every Drop Count' focus, the study will explore the proposal as a potential new way to achieve water security and sustainability in the Limestone Coast.

Project manager Glen Harrington told the LCLGA the study would include an assessment of the region's drainage network, working closely with the South East Water Conservation and Drainage Board, before researching the potential for aquifer storage.

"Most of these drainage networks are dry throughout summer," Mr Harrington said.

"After we look at managing an aquifer

storage we will start saying we know where the water will be available and know what stakeholders also think about the project and whether it is feasible.

"We know there is not much water flow from interstate but we know that closer to the coast that is where most of the discharge is happening," Mr Harrington said.

The larger drains in the Lower South East have better drainage each year and better water quality including Bool lagoon."

Mr Harrington said the proposal involves taking surplus water from ground surface such as storm-water, drainage or local roof

runoffs - and pump it underground to aquifers from where it could be extracted at a later date when water is needed; when rain-

'The methodology has potential; if there is water available take that water and store it underground," Mr Harrington said.

"Everyone in the community I have spoken to says there is so much water flowing out to sea every year and that it is just a waste."

Local potato farmer and a member of the Primary Producers Sustainable Water Group, Terry Buckley said the study would provide an understanding of potential additional water for use in the region. "This project investigates what resource

is available in the drainage network, understanding its quality, quantity, frequency and what can be sustainably harnessed," Mr Buckley said.

"If this study reveals that it is viable to utilise this drainage water to recharge the aquifer, and subsequently if the aquifer proves to be robust enough to allow extra extraction, it could provide significant new water resources for our region.'

The feasibility study includes consultation with industry, community and environmental stakeholders

Workers needed for vintage

WINERIES may be calling for city workers to come to the region with international workers difficult to come by as vintage season approaches.

Warmer weather and plenty of rain from last winter has set up Limestone Coast wineries for another good vintage.

Due to international borders remaining closed until February 21, Patrick of Coonawarra director and winemaker Luke Tocaciu said companies may now look to city workers to fill the gaps.

"We have seen this difficulty for the last two years and there have been challenges to get workers from pruners right through to pickers," Mr Tocaciu said.

"Due to the difficulties with international workers at the moment, we do have a mixture of contractors for labor hire for picking and hand picking which has been a challenge

"We will try and entice some workers from the cities as well and when it gets really busy we are going to try and get some farmers to come and work the tractors for us when they have finished harvesting themselves.

Mr Tocaciu said, despite the difficulties facing the industry, the weather from the previous winter and the continuing warm weather this summer allowed for a great vintage season.

"We have had some interesting weather and some really good rainfall during winter last year which has set us up well for the season," he said.

"The water has stayed in the ground which really lets the vines take off once there is a bit of nice weather around and it

is really good for the roots."

Despite a cold spring season delaying flowering, Mr Tocaciu said the quick, warmer weather fixed it up quite nicely.

"For good development of the grapes we need nice, calm and warm weather which happened around the end of November and from there it has been quite warm," he said.

"Vintage is looking a bit lighter than last season but we have similar conditions and the vineyards look really good with crop levels.

"We are looking at less crop than last year but it is still around average which is good.

"Generally if we have a large vintage the year before, the following year is smaller,

"However this year looks nice and consistent.

PENOLA firefighters have had a busy summer period so far with volunteers attending 26 callouts since the beginning of December.

Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers for Penola have attended all major fires and road accidents within the region, including the recent Crater Lakes Fire at Mount Gambier and the Coles fire which burnt around 3,800 hect-

Penola CFS captain Peter Robinson said they were expecting more callouts throughout the coming months as total fire ban days become more regular.

"The Coles fire was one of our most intense fires we have seen this year so far," Mr Robin-

"There were a lot of crews from everywhere including the Adelaide Hills and Victoria as

Mr Robinson said the increase in callouts also left the local brigade in need for more vol-

He said volunteers were able to help in a range of ways from radio transmission to directing traffic at an accident.

"I have been involved with the CFS for around 20 years and know there is a job here for everybody," Mr Robinson said.

'We also cover a range of other incidents including pet rescue and trees on the road so people are able to assist with that.

"A great example of this was the Coles fire where the first two days were very intense and then it went to volunteers just making sure there was water on everything.'

Mr Robinson said following the recent fires across the region, many community members had shown an interest in volunteering.

"Fires always bring people out of the woods and they say they want to volunteer," he said.

"Over the course of time we might only get two out of the five long-term because some people just lose interest, but it is better than nothing.'

He said fires such as the recent Crater Lakes fire were the odd occasion where a full community were able to observe the work volunteers put into protecting the area.

"These fires are a wake up call for a lot of people because they don't think that fires like that can happen in town until its right in their face," he said.

Planning tomorrow's towns

A DRAFT Strategic Land Use Plan, aimed in part at addressing shortages in residential and industrial land in the Wattle Range Council area, has been released for public comment.

Released at Council's meeting last week, the plan details a 25 year vision for the use of land in and around all the towns in the council area.

As part of the \$110,000 project, the draft plan was compiled for council by Adelaide consultants Holmes Dyer.

Council's Director of Development Services, Emma Clay told the council meeting that the plan had been prompted by the need to find suitable residential and industrial land along with a transition to a new planning code.

"The 25 year plan is about how we grow and where we grow," said Ms Clay.

"This report details the pros and cons for sprawling as opposed to intense developmentwould we rather see the urban areas intensified or allow them to spread with possible impact on farming land."

In a report tabled at the council meeting with the draft plan, Ms Clay said: "In recent years, the demand for housing has steadily increased across the Wattle Range region, particularly in the main service centre of Millicent as well as the townships of Penola and Beachport.

"Demand, coupled with inappropriate zoning that restricts the supply of housing, has re-

sulted in scarcity of suitable residential land.

"Council is also under pressure to facilitate the provision of suitably located land for industrial uses in both Beachport and Southend.

"Without a coherent strategy, growth of townships and settlements in the council area has been haphazard and fragmented.

"The transition from the Development Act 1993 to the Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016 has also resulted in some zoning anomalies within our region.

"Council now faces several challenges including interface issues; inadequate power, water, and general infrastructure; unequal access to services as well as emerging environmental risks from flood inundation, rising sea levels, coastal erosion and bushfire.

"The plan will provide a 25-year strategic

roadmap for land use planning with integrated consideration of infrastructure, servicing, community facilities, transport and all other factors which go into making liveable and thriving communities.

"The plan will also be used to initiate future amendments to the Planning and Design Codes which may include zone changes in some areas."

In September last year, the consultants began the process of putting the plan together by spending three days touring the area, meeting with council staff and holding an elected member information gathering workshop.

The consultants also interviewed key stakeholders.

A further workshop with councillors was held in December.

Ms Clay told the council meeting that the report produced thus far would become the basis of community consultation for the plan.

"The community will be consulted on thoroughly with two rounds of consultation," she

The consultants will conduct these consultation sessions with feedback incorporated into the plan which will then be re-released for public comment prior to its adoption.

The first round of community consultation sessions is expected to be held soon

The decision was made at the January meeting of council, at which elected members awarded more than \$11,000 to eight organisations across the district from the second round of the funding program.

Successful second round applicants included:

- South Eastern Fishermen's Association
 \$1,517.50 for the purchase of a defibrillator to be installed at the Beachport boatyard;
- Nangwarry Museum & Community Hall Inc. - \$2,000 to install a new air-conditioning unit;
- Mount Burr Trails Inc. \$616.50 for trail signage, promotional materials and seating;
- Penola PA & H Society \$828 to purchase umbrellas for outdoor tables;
- Beachport Surf Life Saving \$1,900 to

install a cover over existing storage containers;

- Rivoli Bay Sailing Club \$1,600 to paint clubrooms;
- Millicent Croquet Club \$1,235 to erect a shelter; and
- Penola Amateur Swim Club \$2,000 to purchase new lane ropes.

Following consideration of these applications it was noted that funds of \$32,000 remained uncommitted and Council resolved to offer a third round of financial assistance grants to Wattle Range community and sporting groups. Funds are available on a dollar-for-dollar basis up to \$2,000 and Mayor Des Noll said council supports applications for all sorts of projects, from minor equipment purchases, right up to larger infrastructure installations or event support. "Now is the time to put your hand out and seek some much-needed assistance in ensuring your club is getting the support it needs." he said.

Applications for this additional round of funding close on February 28.

Burr trees cut down

TREE removal, scheduled as part of the Wattle Range Council undertaking upgrades to service roads 2 and 4 in Mount Burr, began last week.

After consultation with the Mount Burr community, the trees removed will be limited to only those essential to allow the service road upgrades to go ahead.

CREDIT where credit is due.

The two major political parties love trading blows on a regular basis.

Ask each of them and they will tell you that the other has never come up with a

Usually, the one-liner cliches are thrown out dispelling the virtues of the opposing camp's idea.

But not MacKillop Liberal Government backbencher Nick McBride who has thrown his weight behind Labor's health pledge to the region and has called on his own side of politics to match funding for our health system here in the Limestone

As you could imagine, the Liberal Party in Adelaide would be furious at Mr Mc-Bride's comments.

His comments would alienate himself from the Liberal Party leadership and create a political wedge within the Liberal Party ranks.

So does it matter?

Probably not.

It's well known within Liberal Party circles that Mr McBride already has a strained relationship with the Premier - so he has nothing new there.

On the other hand - there would not be a reasonably minded person in the region that would not support additional funding for upgrades to our health system - so no votes lost for Mr McBride locally, in fact, probably a nett gain.

Fairly simple local politics.

Although, looking at the bigger picture, Mr McBride needs to recognise that it's his own team that is lacking in pledging additional funding to the Limestone Coast for health services.

Mr McBride's honesty is to be commended but he needs to take that fight to

He would only be preaching to the converted locally; it's the Adelaide-based politicians that need salvation.

With the election officially starting this week, with the Writs being issued this coming Saturday, we can be confident that before March 19 there will be plenty of debate about health services in our region.

Petition delivered

DURING Mental Health Awareness month in October last year I wrote an opinion piece for The Border Watch about the 'shadow pandemic' and the need to improve mental health services for our community.

In that piece, I spoke about the Federal Government's 'Head to Health' initiative rolling out across the country and suggested that the Limestone Coast should be included in the

Since then, the Limestone Coast community has shown its support for that proposal.

I returned to Federal Parliament last week armed with almost 3000 signatures collected over the past couple of months and presented that petition to the Minister for Health, Greg Hunt, requesting that Mount Gambier be chosen as one of the locations around the country to become home to a 'Head to Health' satellite centre to service the mental health needs of the local community.

Accompanying the petition were a number of letters of support from Limestone Coast community organisations.

Much like the push for a Mount Gambier Headspace facility that I championed in 2016, as a community we are again working together to ensure we put the strongest possible case forward to the Federal Government for a Head to Health facility in Mount Gambier.

I'm doing my best to argue this case on behalf of my community because, sadly, I know that one in five Australians and nearly half of all adults will experience a mental or behavioural condition in their lifetimes. Over 65,000 Australians make an attempt on their lives each year, and for each life lost to suicide, the impacts are felt by up to 135 people, including family members, work colleagues, friends and

Giving the community the services required to tackle their individual mental health issues when they arise will make for a happier,

healthier Limestone Coast community and the flow on benefits of that are immeasurable.

I had an extremely productive meeting with the Minister, and I am told that the locations for the satellite Head to Health facilities will be announced shortly.

Old roads past their life

SOME roads in the region are more than 10 years past their normal life span, according to State Member of Parliament for MacKillop, Nick McBride.

Speaking at the January meeting of Wattle Range Council, Mr McBride was invited to address the elected members on a number of issues including roads.

He referred to a meeting which he hosted in Naracoorte last November with the Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Corey Wingard (via electronic means), along with representatives from the Department of Infrastructure and Transport, government road construction contractor Fulton Hogan and representatives from each of the region's councils.

The meeting followed Wattle Range Council advocating for change after receiving numerous complaints from the public, mostly relating to the sealed arterial road network that is managed by the State Government, including writing to the Premier and the Minister.

"The meeting has got traction right to the top," Mr McBride said adding he had run into the Premier not long after the meeting in the halls of Parliament House and the Premier had stopped and spoken about the roads in the South East saying he had just had a meeting and the Premier acknowledged that "there are a lot of old roads that need a lot of money".

"I thought that was excellent feedback," Mr McBride told the Council meeting.

Mr McBride said that he understood the life of a road was about 40 years.

"Some of ours are at 57 years," he said indicating that they were past their normal life.

During Mr McBride's 40 minute presentation to the public meeting, he answered a number of questions from councillors.

One of them was from council's Deputy Mayor, Moira Neagle who asked of the Liberal MP a question related the safe nature of the MacKillop seat.

"I had the unfortunate need to be in Adelaide and I could not get over the amount of road works going on there and I thought, it would be good to live in a swinging seat," she said, asking for a response.

In responding, Mr McBride asked members of the media present, of which there were



three, to "put down their pens" indicating that he did not wish his response to be reported.

The representative of The Border Watch did put down her pen during the answer given by Mr McBride and in the following days asked for an official answer from Mr McBride's office

The official written answer provided by Mr McBride read as follows:

"Maintaining and fixing our road network is a high priority for me," Mr McBride wrote.

"I understand that my Government faces challenges from MP's across the State, who wish to see as much money as possible spent in upgrading roads in their electorate.

"It is my view that maintaining a safe road network is a necessity, regardless of if the electorate is a safe Liberal seat.

"I have had recent discussions with Local Government representatives and the Transport Minister highlighting the decline in the condition of roads in MacKillop.

"After shining a light on the issue the Transport Minister is more aware of the maintenance backlog in the area and Government is working on solving this issue.

"I have, and will continue to have, honest discussions with the Transport Minister and the Premier in an effort to secure as much funding as possible for my region's roads."

Minister Wingard, in a letter tabled at Wattle Range Council's December meeting responded to a letter from Mayor Des Noll about the condition of the roads in the South East.

The letter referred to several projects being undertaken and more recent information provided by the Department advised that bridge barrier replacement work was completed in July 2020 at several locations on Clay Wells Road between Robe to Penola.

Shoulder sealing on the 55km section of Clay Wells Road between the Southern Ports Highway and Callendale Road, along with the upgrade of safety barriers at six bridges and the installation of auto tactile line marking, was completed in early 2021.

The Department also advised that a southbound overtaking lane will be constructed on the Riddoch Highway between Edenhope Road and Coonawarra with these works expected to begin this year and expected to be completed next year.

Also this year, safety barrier upgrades will be undertaken on Mount Burr Road.

"Mile Hill Road, Kangaroo Flat Road, Overland Track, Mount Burr Road and Southern Ports Highway are all currently included in the Department's resurfacing program for 2022-23, with timing to be determined," said the Department spokesperson.

Dancing with destiny

Angie Kent is a contestant on the news series *Dancing with the Stars: All Stars.* She tells **Danielle McGrane** why she's decided to return to the dancefloor.

ngie Kent doesn't shy away from a challenge, that's why she's taking part in *Dancing with the Stars: All Stars*, despite the tough competition.

"When I first saw the line-up I just thought 'Oh my God, Courtney Act,' she's just everything," Kent said.

"Who can go up against Courtney Act? That's royalty right there."

Kent will be taking part in the show alongside Act and a host of celebrities who have come back for another chance at glory, including Cameron Daddo, Bridie Carter, Kylie Gillies and Grant Denyer, to name a few.

While the competition will be high, the real challenge according to Kent is mastering the steps.

"It's so hard to do ballroom dancing, I don't think people realise how hard it is," she said.

"There's so much to it. You've got to position your feet, your arms and your head for different dances – there's so much to remember and then on top of that you're learning all the steps as well. So it's quite hardcore."

Kent took part in *Dancing with* the Stars in early 2020, and was voted out after a dance dedicated to her late grandmother.

She's hoping to last a bit longer this time and has put a lot of work into preparing for the show.

"We had four weeks of rehearsals and in that time you had to learn every single dance for the entire show, so in that time I learnt six dances in four weeks," she said.

It helped that she's been reunited with dancer/choreographer Julian Caillon, who she partnered with the first time she took part.

"Julian was my first partner and then I got to have him again which was great because we already had such a nice friendship from the two years before, so we didn't have to go through that awkward 'getting to know you' stage again, which was helpful," she said.

Caillon is also in charge of choreographing the pair's routines. "Julian does it all," Kent said.

"They're amazing, all the professional dancers on the show do all the choreography and they are incredible."

Caillon should also be well versed on what dances Kent is most comfortable with from their first outing.

"My favourite style would probably have to be the cha cha or the tango," she said.

"I feel like you can show off your personality more when you've got a cha cha or a tango number whereas the other slower ones are all about technique and emotion which can be quite hard when you're not a professional and you're a bag of nerves."

Kent is a darling of the reality TV world. She was first introduced



to the Australian public through *Gogglebox*, which she appeared in alongside her friend Yvie Jones.

After that, she took part in I'm a Celebrity... Get Me out of Here! before becoming the Bachelorette. Reality TV has kept Kent very busy, but she also realises it probably took its toll on her when she first took part in Dancing with the Stars.

"I wanted to come back and do this show again because the first time I did it Yvie and I had just got off *Gogglebox*, then we got thrown into the African jungle, then I was the Bachelorette and then I was offered *Dancing with the Stars* and I was so exhausted," she said.

"I kind of felt like I had to do Dancing because I was on this roll, but I just wasn't myself."

At the time, Kent had just finished being on *The Bachelorette*.

"I had a new relationship in the public eye," she said.

"I was so tired and I just didn't get to give it my all."

But now, the timing felt right for a return to *Dancing with the Stars*.

"So I thought 'two years have passed, I'm in such a better headspace. I'm going to go back this time and I'm going to have fun and not feel like I have to do it, but instead I want to do it," she said.

"I was more myself this time, more rested and ready to enjoy the adventure and not be so tired."

While she hasn't been doing back-to-back reality TV shows, Kent has kept herself busy over the last two years. She released a memoir – If You Don't Laugh You'll Cry – landed a role in an upcoming horror film, The Possessed, and is enmeshed in the world of podcasting.

"I've got a couple of podcasts with Nova [that] I'm loving, and I was in my first movie, which I loved doing, so I've been keeping myself nice and busy," she said.

"When opportunities come up I go with whatever serves me in the moment. I really love writing and podcasting."

But she's unlikely to turn up as a competitor on another reality TV show, at least not for a while.

"I feel like I've had enough of reality," she said.

"Dancing with the Stars was a good one to do because I really wanted to do it for myself and it's so much fun to learn but I think I'm past competitive reality TV. I'm pooped."

Although, she's not closed the door to the genre completely.

"Never say never, but I won't be doing any love-based reality TV shows, I'll tell you that much," Kent said.

"Anything to do with matters of the heart can be quite tough on one's soul if you're a sensitive soul, and I am a sensitive soul."

She does however have a strong connection with her original reality TV partner, Yvie Jones, and the pair have found new ways to continue to work together.

"Yvie and I have our podcast
- Two Girls, One Pod. We're
loving doing that together. We're
back together since we stopped
Gogglebox at the end of 2018," she
said.

"And if *Gogglebox* ever wanted us to come back and do a special season we would probably be open to it, but there's no talk of that."

The luxury lifestyle is very often free to those who can afford it, and very expensive to those who can't. But in 2013, one woman challenged that notion, pretending to be a German heiress and stealing the hearts – and money – of Manhattan's social elite.

Living as Instagram-famous socialite Anna Delvey, rumoured to have a fortune of more than US\$60 million, the young woman conned wealthy New Yorkers, banks and hotels out of tens of thousands over a four-year period – she was even on the verge of a deal worth tens of millions at the time of her 2017 arrest.

This glamorous, lavish series from production powerhouse Shonda Rhimes (*Grey's Anatomy*, *Scandal, Bridgerton*) goes inside exactly how Anna Sorokin (Julia Garner), a 20-something Russian-born conwoman, managed to pull off her daring fraud.

The 10-episode "semi-fictional" account of this implausible true-crime story charts the efforts of New York Magazine journalist Vivian Kent (Veep's Anna Chlumsky) – a reporter working to salvage her career – to get to know the real Anna. However, the harder she tries, the more attached she becomes, with Sorokin's simultaneously charming and contemptuous allure plain to see.

Ozark star Garner spent time with the real Sorokin, visiting her in prison to try and understand the enigmatic grifter and perfect her distinctive, hard-to-place accent, a move which pays off in spades. Garner's Anna is confident, aloof and incredibly entertaining as she runs rings around a who's who of New York.

"The Homemade Jam Micro Music Festival sessions were a great success and shoppers were surprised and excited to encounter musicians playing in spaces such as the Lifeline Op Shop and Spot on Fishing Tackle on a Saturday morning," Ms Hart said.

A dedicated professional development program presented by music industry professionals from Music SA and the Australasian Performing Right Association Limited and Australasian Mechanical Copyright Owners Society (APRA AMCOS) on topics that empower musicians, business owners and curators to grow their business, performance and event skills will take place on March 5 and 6 at the Riddoch Arts and Cultural Centre.

"The industry round table will take place on the evening of Tuesday March 8 where we will ask local industry stakeholders to consider what does a thriving live music scene look like and how do we realistically achieve that vision," Ms Hart said.

The feedback gathered from the discussions will be used to help formulate a Live Music Action Plan for Mount Gambier.

Kingston street art in running for award

A KINGSTON mural has been shortlisted for an Australian Street Art Award in the Best External Mural category.

'Wind Dance' by Sarah Boese is an augmented reality mural which means it is not just a static mural but with the use of an mobile phone application (app) a scan of the mural will bring the artwork to life.

'Wind Dance' was commissioned by Kingston District Council in the wake of the Keilira bushfire which burned more than 25,000 hectares in the Kingston area at the end of 2019.

The mural commemorates the disaster and captures the personality of Kingston through a number of themes.

The artwork has also increased visitation and tourism for the community.

Ms Boese said inspiration for the mural came from a lot of community consultation including with school children.

"It took me ten nights in total to put the mural together and because augmented reality was part of the brief I had to incorporate that into the work somehow," Ms Boese said.

The Adelaide-based artist worked closely

with animators to bring the mural to life where she painted and supplied two-dimensional elements to make the mural move. "The community response was very good and a lot of residents were excited about the mural." she said. "They had fun at the unveiling which was great because it meant the mural was well received."

Enjoying working in the country town, Ms Boese said she had not been to the Limestone Coast since she was a child.

"I used to go camping in Robe but haven't been to the area in years," she said.

"When I was putting the mural together people would come and have a chat and there were a lot of nice and supportive comments which was wonderful."

Speaking on the award nomination, the artist said it was sweet the mural had been shortlisted for State-wide acknowledgement.

"I am hoping the nomination will lead to more traction for Kingston, especially if it wins," Ms Boese said.

"It would be great for the town and seeing as though I have never won a competition for my murals it would be a wonderful compliment"

The award winners will be announced during an online presentation on March 5.

"When I was 16 or 17 and didn't know how to express myself I started writing poetry which gave me a sense of community and connection," Gloria said.


"I do hope that people who come along to the workshop are able to learn a new avenue about themselves and feel safe to do so and be creative while also enjoying that creativity."

Kalangadoo rose grower

Cayenne

The velvety red colour of Cayenne's large, slightly double flowers makes this small shrub rose an eye-catcher. With its very even dense bushy growth – 100cm high x 70cm wide - this extremely healthy compact plant is ideal for mass planting or low hedges.

Deano

It's a classic Hybrid Tea rose, with large blooms in a very soft pink with darker, decorative centres. The flowers are borne mostly solitarily, but some small clusters also occur.

It's a beautiful Australian rose, bred by Richard Walsh. Growing up to 130cm high x 60-70cm wide.

Suitable for garden display, cut flowers or exhibition, it's a healthy and vigorous bush.

It was named in honour of Dean Stringer, a well-respected Australian rosarian.

Impala

Named after an African antelope because like its animal name sake this rose is tough and busy, Impala's strength lies in its ability to repeat flower quickly.

The neat and dense bush is always covered in buds and blooms, with glossy green disease resistant leaves as a base to the clusters of flowers.

Each smallish bud is of a classical pointed shape of intense apricot which softens to lighter shades similar to the colouring of the Impala.

A single mature plant would stand out as a focal point, planted in groups or as a demarcating border or hedge, it will be the highlight in a garden - it grows up to 80-100cm high.

Chameleor

As its name suggests, the colours of Chameleon shift as this miniature rose ages - from yellow through to pinks and reds.

Growing en-masse up to 70cm high, this incredibly healthy and hardy bush gives the effect of a bright rainbow rose.

Snow Kiss

With blooms slightly larger than the classic

miniature rose, this compact healthy bush is covered in masses of double flowers that contrast nicely with the dark green foliage.

Snow Kiss grows up to 40cm high and it's perfect for pots and small gardens.

My Little Angel

It's an exceptionally healthy miniature awash with a sea of small mauve blooms that flower late into winter.

Nearly evergreen, you will not be disappointed with the tough growing ability of this beauty, $40 \, \text{cm}$ high x $40 \, \text{cm}$ wide.







"I reckon I left about five shots out there so hopefully I can get down to about 10, or maybe even single figures."


"We love each other's company and I'm having a bit of a purple patch of form at the moment which makes it even more enjoyable," Turnbull said.

Price sets sights on Group 3 cup with track record holders

COMPTON-BASED leading greyhound trainer Tracie Price, still chasing his first Mount Gambier Cup, looks set to play a major role in this year's inaugural Group 3 event.

Another four winners - Zoe's Way, Starlight Dusty, Giant's Flash and Rhonda Lily - at last Sunday's Tara Raceway Category 2 meeting marked the return of the 512-metre track record holder Giant's Flash.

The son of Banjo Boy x Navada Flame defeated Phil Lenehan's Summer Classic contender Lektra Rhino by four lengths in the Klaassens Contractors Stake (512m) in 29.39

seconds - three lengths outside the record.

Later, Price said he hoped to have his strongest-ever Mount Gambier Cup line-up which could also include Giant's Flash's litter sister Minnie Banjo, the 400-metre record holder at Tara Raceway.

"Look, she's very fast early and after a recent post-to-post trial here I'd be surprised if she can't run out a pretty quick 512 metres," he said.

From a Mount Gambier Cup point of view, Worrolong part-owner and trainer Steve Bartholomew was also more than happy with Mary Bridget's win in the Progreyhoundtips. com Stake (512m).

Having her first run over the distance since the end of October, the brindle bitch was always travelling like a winner, eventually running away with four lengths to spare over Rotate in 29.70 seconds.

"I thought she did the job pretty well and there should be further improvement yet," said Bartholomew, who trained Galactic Athena, winner of the 2019 Mount Gambier Cup.

"We'll continue to monitor her progress, but at this stage we have the cup in mind."

Greyhound Racing SA's announcement last week that the Mount Gambier Cup (512m) had been elevated to Group 3 status corresponded nicely with the news that Carlin & Gazzard MG, through sales manager Adrian Jones, had finalised a major sponsorship deal.

As part of the deal, the long-time local award-winning new and used car dealership will sponsor the Mount Gambier Cup, the final of which will be run on Sunday, April 10.

Run continuously since 1981, the cup assumed Listed status in 2018 and carried first prizemoney of \$15,000.

The elevation to Group 3 status will see winning connections receive \$25,000.

The Murray Bridge Cup final (455m), which will be run on Sunday, March 20, will also assume Group 3 status.

The two clubs will now come into line with the Gawler Greyhound Racing Club which runs its Group 3 Gawler Cup in November.

The two bonuses that had previously been in place for the Murray Bridge and Mount Gambier Cups will continue - a \$5000 bonus if the same greyhound is successful and a \$5000 trainer bonus if the same trainer wins both cups (not necessarily with the same greyhound).

Local racing set for return

FOLLOWING a break of more than 20 months, racing is set to resume at Glenburnie next Wednesday, February 23.

Six official trials were conducted last Friday and, to the satisfaction of all concerned, the course proper received the much awaited tick of approval from jockeys and racing officials.

In attendance from Adelaide were Racing SA Chief Operations Officer Vaughn Lynch and chairman of stewards Johann Petzer.

The six jockeys to put the gallopers to the test were locals Kaye Walters and Geoff O'Loughlin along with four from Adelaide (Anna Jordsjo, Emily Finnegan, Alice Lindsay and Eran Boyd).

"It's onwards and upwards for racing to proceed next Wednesday at Mount Gambier," Lynch told The Border Watch.

"The track was presented perfectly, the jockeys reported a good coverage of grass and the horses hardly marked it."

Mount Gambier racing club CEO Brett Watson was pleased with the return.

"By the time we race next Wednesday, horses will have worked on the course proper on three different occasions," he said.

"We are looking forward to welcoming everybody back to the races next Wednesday and we have already taken several luncheon bookings."

If Mount Gambier Racing Club officials are expecting the public to swarm back to Glenburnie after the prolonged absence, then they may be in for a shock.

Here's hoping they do arrive in droves as the facilities at Glenburnie for the members and public are second to none for a rural racecourse.

However, crowds so far this season at meetings in the Limestone Coast, with the odd exception, have been poor.

In that period the Posts have been in the winner's stall on seven occasions, four of those in country Victoria.

Their latest success was at Werribee last Sunday when the consistent performer Melissa Kate (\$7.50) finally broke through to win her second race at start number 25.

Two recent thirds at Warrnambool and Donald showed Melissa Kate (named after Wayne Walters' two daughters) was close to another victory.

Not that the win was achieved easily at Werribee as the five-year-old mare only won by a nose for jockey Kate Walters.

That also continued the winning spree for Walters who has won eight races since Christmas, six of them for the Post stable.

HALIDON NO LONGER A RACING VENUE

As it has turned out, last year's annual race meeting in September at Halidon for the Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club was the last time - according to Racing SA - the club will race at the track in the scrub between Tailem Bend and Loxton.

In its wisdom, Racing SA opted to close Halidon as a venue, but there was a backlash against the decision from most in the racing industry.

The decision was reviewed by the board of Racing SA last month and they have stood by their original decision to close the track.

The Mindarie-Halidon Racing Club has been offered the opportunity to stage its meeting at Murray Bridge, 100 kilometres away

In my opinion it is a howler of a decision by Racing SA and a nail in the coffin of country racing in SA to cease racing at Halidon.

It was one of the truly great country race meetings in South Australia, if not Australia,

as I witnessed last year when crowd capacity was reached (how often do you see that these days?) and people were turned away.

A dejected Mindarie-Halidon racing secretary Krystina Durdin said the club had received a letter from Racing SA advising of the latest decision but that no official reasons were outlined as to why the track was closed.

LET THE CAT OUT OF THE BAG

It has been a much quieter start for the local racing season for Naracoorte trainer Sue Murphy and, as we enter the second half of the season, Murphy sits in fifth spot on the premiership ladder with seven wins but only two wins behind the leader Darryl Dodson.

Murphy bounced back into winning form with a double on Naracoorte cup day last Sunday week and Wimmera racing journalist Josh Miller let the cat out of the bag for punters to back one of her winners, Hi Smokey.

Murphy slipped over the border to the Horsham jump outs and Hi Smokey caught the eye with an all-the-way win, easily beating proven Melbourne gallopers Flying Mascot and Lunar Fox.

Thankfully, the final Tuesday night meeting of the season for local harness racing is next Tuesday, February 22 before returning to mainly Friday night fixtures.

A WARM and calm weekend across the South East spurred plenty of anglers into hitting the water in search of a few fish.

The ocean and river guys did well, so there is plenty to report from all angles.

The offshore crew found good numbers of blue eye and gemfish in the deeper water over the shelf, along with a mixed bag of ocean perch and mixed sharks.

In a bit closer we are still seeing the great run of shark continue.

I have seen gummy and school shark both over 20kg this week and the numbers have been brilliant.

I know of some crews who have caught and released more than 20 sharks in a session over the last couple of weeks, so get stuck into them while you can.

The reef fish out there have also been in good numbers this week.

Snapper, terakhi, knifejaw and flathead just to name a few have all been excellent.

There is still no tuna news anywhere locally yet, but now there are plenty of fishos talking about it, so I reckon we will see anglers out having a crack very soon.

In shore fishing has been excellent again for most. $\protect\$

The snapper, the whiting and even the squid have all been in great numbers and they are well spread out.

Whiting to 50cm, snapper to 65cm and big kilo-plus squid have been boated this week and it really does not look like slowing down any time soon.

The hot spots so far have been Danger Point, Racecourse Bay, Port MacDonnell breakwater and Carpenter Rocks.

The land-based guys targeting the same species have found their success at Deep Creek, Nene Valley and Carpenter Rocks.

It is great to see so many people getting down and having a crack off the beach and it makes it even better when you can take home a feed of delicious fresh fish. The surf fishos have had a busy weekend across the South East with the South East Amateur Surf Fishing Club holding a competition, with plenty of fish caught.

The winner was Ryan Crute with a nice gummy shark and second place went to Graeme Ploenges with a nice snapper.

There has been news from all over the place this week - fish from the other side of the Glenelg River by anglers who do not mind walking into the beach, through to Piccininni, Browns Beach and Carpenter Rocks.

There has been a handful of salmon this week in varying sizes from under-size through to a couple of kilos.

Baits are still the best bet, but if you find a concentrated school of them, by all means throw a lure around.

The gar numbers are again pretty good, with more and more fishos reporting those bigger fish.

There have been fish from Livingstons Bay, Cape Douglas and the Petrified Forrest to name some of the more common areas, but lots of the smaller and lesser-fished bays are also worth a look.

As per normal, mullet, tommy ruff and silver trevally have all been in good numbers in the same spots, so mix it up a bit.

The Glenelg River is starting to produce a few more fish now.

The mulloway news has been pretty light on, but there have been some nice fish from this last week.

The Isle of Bags and Simsons area on the river have been the hot spots for mulloway, but you know what they are like - there today and gone the next.

The bream and estuary perch have been


in good numbers and they have come from right down the front on the sand flats, to the way upper reaches and in the sticks.

Regardless of your favourite style of fishing, you should manage a few.

The forecast for the coming weekend looks like the wind will be staying light, but the swell increasing.

Participants will benefit from the best junior coaches in the league and will have the opportunity to learn everything from the basic skills for beginners through to match play and more advanced drills for those that have had some previous experience.

Hookin2Hockey is just \$35 for five sessions, which will be run on Friday nights from 5-6pm on the turf at Blue Lake Sports Park.

Hockey SA and LSEHA hope to break down the perception that hockey is an expensive sport.

"With the use of sports vouchers, most kids can play a whole season of Under 12's for as little as \$10-\$20, with no weekly match fees, no spectator fees and with clubs providing full uniforms as well," league president Lochie Nisbet said.

Hot on his trail was Sean Day, father of Legend of the Lakes champion Dan Day.

Dan was in attendance to watch his father compete in the immaculate Subaru WRX 22B and he did not disappoint.

Sean Day was embroiled in a tight battle with Limestone Coast driver Nicholas Cagney in a Mitsubishi EVO.

The pair were separated by less than a second, with Day's time of 3:25.60 was enough to claim second place from Cagney with 3:26.11.

Just like the Legends of the Lakes Hill Climb, Twin Peaks has grown in popularity.

Height said that is partly due to the format with the two separate courses.

"Everyone who enters loves it," he said.

"There is nowhere else they race where you do one course, then line straight up for the second course.

"One course is technical and the other one is a higher horsepower course so you get two variables of the race on one day, straight after the other."

The weather provides another variable, along with sand blowing onto the courses from the beach.

It all adds up to a challenging and entertaining event.

And of course the times have tumbled, with drivers learning the course and their respective intricacies, reaching speeds well over 150kph.

"Last year's winner, his time on the second course, which is the fastest course was 52 seconds," Height said.

"This year they were down to 48 seconds, which is really fast."

Overall Height was pleased with the event, with its own unique setting as a major drawcard.

"You sit back and look over the ocean and relax," he said.

"It is a great view and a friendly atmosphere."

Sports Park pitch ravaged

BLUE Lake Sports Park is still under attack, with ravenous corellas wreaking havoc around the picturesque venue.

In good news, baseball returned to Diamond 1 on the weekend, after the recent attacks had rendered the main venue unplayable

Games had been transferred to other venues, including Diamond 3 at BLSP, which appeared virtually untouched.

Volunteers rallied to ensure play could return in a timely fashion to Diamond 1, with sand utilised to patch the outfield.

Division 1 double-headers were played on both Saturday and Sunday to put the grass to the test and it came up trumps.

However, other locations at BLSP have also suffered.

While there is ample time before hockey kicks off in the region, the main water-based field has also been under attack.

While the synthetic turf may not appear too tasty, it has not been left by the corellas, with extensive damage to marking lines around the field

The cost of repairs could be in the vicinity of \$25,000, with suggestions the surface is currently unsafe for play.

The South Gambier football oval was also affected somewhat but the Limestone Coast women's Football League has still been able to utilise the ground.

A recent story in The Border Watch suggested the corella problem on cricket's main turf wicket suggested the South Gambier club was on top, with roughly-fashioned scarecrows and plastic hoses resembling snakes helping deter the hirds

However, just a few weeks down the track the corellas have again wreaked havoc, with the pitch destroyed and now unplayable for the remainder of the season.

Mount Gambier and District Cricket Association president George Kidman said he has been told to forget about the venue for the remainder of the season.

As a result a Barber Shield Round 10 home game for South over the next two weeks has been moved to North Sportsman's home venue of Marist Park.

Kidman said a big flock of birds must have moved in and even driving around the ground trying to move them on did not work.

The corellas clearly discovered the scarecrows and snakes were not real and no threat, before moving onto the wicket and devouring the grass cover.

It is the second year in a row the wicket has been attacked, with last season's incident able to be repaired to finish the season.

This time there is no chance of play until next summer, with Round 10 the final minor round before finals and the damage to the wicket too extensive.

Kidman said the association would work with council to see what could be done moving forward.
