Ukrainian war fears

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UKRAINIAN born Teresa Lawrence sits in her Mount Gambier home each night, fearful for her family in Kyiv, Ukraine's capital city currently besieged by invading Russian forces.

"My stomach is twisted watching what is happening in Ukraine," the 87 year old told The Border Watch this week.

"I am just going day-to-day hoping it will all be okay."

With her elderly cousin, Valintin, living in a fifth-storey apartment in Kyiv, Ms Lawrence said she lived in fear for him and said the conflict in her home country was a "terrifying situation".

She said she had spoken with him recently and he expressed concern about the conflict saying he never imagined it would happen.

"My family in Ukraine are very worried, Valintin is too old to evacuate and they also have no car so it is difficult for them," she said.

"I am fearful that one day I will call him and will not be able to get into contact with him and I will have nobody to turn to."

ALP fracking 'risk'

A LEAKED recording of Opposition Leader Peter Malinauskas, obtained by The Border Watch, has cast doubts about the future of the fracking moratorium that currently applies in

the Limestone Coast if Labor was elected.

Speaking at a South Australian Chamber of Mines and Energy function recently in Adelaide, Mr Malinauskas criticised the Liberal Government for restricting mining activities.

"What I say to you is - name me the only government in South Australia that has introduced a moratorium in terms of the mining

industry - there is only one and it ain't the Labor Party," Mr Malinauskas said.

"In 16 years we were in government, not once was there a moratorium introduced but the conservative side of politics under Steven Marshall's leadership did that - consciously and willingly.

"So, there is only one party in government

that has introduced a moratorium on this industry over a parcel of land."

Premier Steven Marshall, while visiting the region this week, reaffirmed his commitment to maintain the 10-year moratorium on fracking in the South East if returned to government at the State election on March 19.

**DANGEROUS DRIVER
REPORTED AT TANTANOOLA**

A DRIVER was reported for dangerous driving at Tantanoola and police are appealing for any witnesses to come forward.

About 9.15am on Monday, February 21, a white Holden Commodore sedan was forced to leave the Princes Highway at Tantanoola to avoid a head-on collision with an oncoming vehicle.

The blue 2002 Mitsubishi Lancer was allegedly on the wrong side of the road on a section of the highway with a sweeping bend and double overtaking lines.

The near miss was captured on dash-cam and brought to the attention of police.

Following inquiries, a 52-year-old Millicent man was reported for driving in a manner dangerous to other road users. His vehicle was impounded for 28 days and he will be summonsed to appear in the Millicent Magistrates Court at a later date.

The Mitsubishi was seen on the footage to pull back onto the correct side of the road between three other vehicles. Police are appealing for these drivers or anyone else who witnessed this incident to come forward - contact the Millicent Police Station or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

"The only way to guarantee that the moratorium on fracking will remain in place until at least November 2028 is to vote Liberal at the coming election," Mr Marshall said.

"A vote for anyone else opens up the possibility of electing a Labor Government which will axe the ban on fracking in the South East as soon as possible."

"I'm proud the Liberal Party represents and listens to concerns of South Australia's primary producers.

"Peter Malinauskas presents a genuine risk to the communities of the South East if elected.

"The return of a Liberal Government is the only way to guarantee that the rights of the communities of the South East are respected."

Independent Member for Mount Gambier, Troy Bell said it was disappointing to hear Mr Malinauskas's comments.

"This is why we needed legislation to enshrine the 10-year ban on fracking," Mr Bell said.

"Any alteration to this agreement has to be passed by both Houses of Parliament - that's why I fought so hard against the Liberals who just wanted to give instruction to the department rather than locking it away in legislation."

He said he didn't trust either party to maintain the moratorium for a 10-year period and believes it is important to have independents in Parliament.

"My position is not negotiable and I will not support any party that is going to reverse the moratorium."

Mr Malinauskas was contacted for comment.

**Early voting
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Mastheads return to towns

MILLICENT'S South Eastern Times and Penola's Pennant newspapers will be relaunched later this month as part of The Border Watch stable.

Made possible by a grant awarded this week by the Facebook (Meta) News Fund, which is administered by the Walkley Foundation, the relaunched South Eastern Times and Penola Pennant will be published every Thursday with the first editions on March 31.

Managing Editor of The Border Watch, Peter Gandolfi thanked Facebook (Meta) and the Walkley Foundation for enabling the return of the local newspapers.

"The Millicent and Penola newspapers have a long history in both townships and provided local news and documented the region for many years," Mr Gandolfi said.

"It's a privilege to have the opportunity to be a part of bringing these important mastheads back to their local communities so that they can resume their role in delivering grassroots news, advocating for them and recording for history the events of these towns and surrounding areas for many years to come."

Both Mr Gandolfi and his wife Kathy began their careers in newspapers at the South Eastern Times in the 1980s with Peter photographing sport and Kathy undertaking her journalism cadetship at the paper under the supervision of then editor, the late Bob Chewings.

With The South Eastern Times and The Penola Pennant covering the area of the Wattle Range Council, Mayor Des Noll said the return of the newspapers displayed confidence by a local business in the community.

"Local people have wanted to get back to the SE Times, they have wanted to get back to the Penola Pennant; I know the community will be enthusiastic in supporting this as the towns will get their own voice again," Mr Noll said.

"It's a real confidence booster for the com-

munity that a local business is confident enough in Millicent and Penola to invest and expand to support our community.

"Throughout the Wattle Range Council area, local businesses have been investing in the community's future and this is a part of that.

"It is a positive for the continued economic growth of these communities which have been expanding with new people coming here.

"I have had a long association with the local paper since I moved here in 1986; it's been a part of my journey in Millicent.

"Over that time the paper employed local people and it will continue to do so," he said.

"There is nothing more refreshing than sitting down and reading both the SE Times and

the Penola Pennant to keep connected."

After being closed by the former owners of The Border Watch in August 2020 as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic, the newspapers were purchased by TBW Today Pty Ltd, which includes Peter and Kathy Gandolfi among its owners, and The Border Watch was relaunched in October 2020 after being closed for two months.

Since then The Border Watch has incorporated The South Eastern Times and The Penola Pennant with one page devoted to each in its weekly publication.

Relaunching the individual papers will revive a history which began in 1891 for The South Eastern Times and 1946 for The Penola Pennant.

They will be joined by four other news-

papers around Australia which will be relaunched as part of the first round of the Facebook (Meta) News Fund grants which handed out a total of \$5 million shared by 54 news organisations and independent journalists across Australia.

The Walkley Foundation, which administers the fund, said regional journalism was in a well-documented state of flux and was facing unprecedented funding challenges, which the Covid-19 pandemic had magnified.

More than 227 print or digital news mastheads had either closed or reduced services since January 2019, according to the Public Interest Journalism Initiative's Australian Newsroom Mapping Project.

Some 155 of these were the result of a contraction in a rural or regional area.

As a result, 33 local government areas, or six per cent of Australia's total municipalities, were without a local print or digital news outlet.

Chief Executive Officer of the Walkley Foundation, Shona Martyn, said the impact of the Facebook (Meta) Australian News Fund on Australian journalism would be profound.

"Money is going directly to the projects across Australia that our judges considered the most worthy during a rigorous arms-length assessment process," she said.

"The two judging panels were looking for real need, creativity and detailed plans that could be guaranteed to deliver."

"As part of our investment in Australian news, we wanted to ensure that smaller, regional, rural and digital newsrooms were supported," said Andrew Hunter, News Partnerships Lead for Meta Australia.

"Crucially for the future viability of regional public interest journalism, the funding will enable four seasoned media investors to establish or relaunch print or digital mastheads in regions where a news outlet permanently closed during the Covid-19 pandemic."

The Border Watch awarded 'Best Newspaper'

THE Border Watch has been named 'Best Newspaper' in country South Australia for 2021.

Announced in Adelaide last Friday at Country Press SA's annual awards night, the accolade is for a newspaper with a circulation of more than 4000 papers.

"This year The Border Watch was placed first in the award, with consistently engaging clean, bold headlines, picture and a main story with a couple of lead-in stories on the front page," the judge commented.

"Also on the front page was a very soft line underneath the paper banner pointing to regular sections within the paper without making the front page messy.

"The Border Watch produce weekly, a consistently clean newspaper with most sto-

ries having a bold headline to alert the reader as well as a picture relating to the story."

The local news and sport received praise from the judge.

"Local general news is well covered and the sports section outstanding," according to the judge.

"There is also consistent space throughout the publication and body type size of editorial does not change."

Local part owner and managing editor of The Border Watch, Peter Gandolfi said the acknowledgement is a testament to the quality work our editorial and advertising team produce each week.

"We pride ourselves as providing the best coverage of local news and events," Mr Gandolfi said.

"For more than 160 years The Border Watch has reported on issues that matter to our community."

He said plans for The Border Watch stable of papers will further strengthen its ability to serve the local community.

The Border Watch also took home second place for best photo that wasn't hard news with a picture of Meg the Italian Greyhound.

"What isn't there to like about this photo! And the headline 'Look at Me' said it all," the judge stated.

"Nicely framed, and presented on the front page, Meg the Italian greyhound is an instant hit, and doesn't she know it."

The Border Watch was also gained second place for best front page for the edition in which Meg the Greyhound appeared.

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A life story of courage

"I rang recently and they seemed alright but they were in a hurry to get to the pharmacy before anything happened so they would be able to get medication."

She said she also had family members who lived closer to the Ukrainian-Russian border, whom she had not been able to contact recently and was worried for their safety too.

"I think [Vladimir] Putin is unhinged; I think he is like Hitler and is a mental case and is continuing to be a street hooligan," she said.

"Putin is so ruthless and I am afraid he is prepared to go nuclear or use poison of some sort.

"Ukrainians just want to live and work hard while Russians seem to enjoy hunting and want to live on someone else's efforts.

"They are always looking for someone to conquer and use and abuse then go conquer somebody else."

While Ms Lawrence is experiencing the current Ukraine-Russian conflict from afar, she knows first hand what living through a war is like having spent some of her childhood as a prisoner with her family during the Second World War.

At the time, Ms Lawrence and her extended family were living on farmland near the eastern Ukraine city of Slovyansk when the Russian army took her father and uncle.

"We never saw them again after that," said Ms Lawrence.

"The fighting continued, going back and forth between the Russians and the Germans.

"My mother and I were taken by the Germans and put on a cattle truck on our way to Germany where we stayed on a farm for a number of years.

"I feel ashamed to say this but those were some of the best times of my life, on the farm as a prisoner of war."

Staying on the farm between the ages of seven and 10, Ms Lawrence said it was a wonderful area to live in, and when the war ended her mother wished to stay.

"My mother wanted to stay on the farm to

work because she didn't want to go back to the Russians," she said.

"Even though I was so young at the time, I understood what was happening and when the end of the war came in 1945, it was the British soldiers who occupied our part of Germany.

"They came in Jeeps and there were Spitfires [aeroplanes] zooming down and we were all just waiting."

Collected with the other prisoners, Ms Lawrence and her mother were then taken to a camp facility awaiting resettlement.

"My mother didn't want to go back to Ukraine and she always had a special term for the Russians - cursed cholera - and she continued to call them that until she died at 99 years-old," she said.

"We were put into a Ukrainian camp but the other prisoners were mostly from the western side and we were forced to speak Russian which was the only language we spoke.

"This made the other prisoners think we were Russian spies coming to take them back to Ukraine and they refused to let us into the camp."

Ms Lawrence and her mother were moved from camp to camp between 1945 and 1949 before being accepted into Australia.

"I ended up in Mount Gambier after marrying my second husband who needed a cooler climate after he began to fall ill and we decided on living here because his son lived here at the time and we thought it would be good to move closer to family," she said.

Since moving to Australia, Ms Lawrence has returned to Ukraine twice to visit her family there, with the most recent being in 2016.

"So much had changed and I was able to visit my father and uncle's graves and get to know the rest of my family in Ukraine," she said.

Surprise ballot entry

A SURPRISE candidate for the seat of Mount Gambier was announced this week as nominations for the State election closed on Monday.

Peter Heaven has thrown his hat into the ring as a candidate for Family First.

Random ballot draws on Monday determined the order for ballot papers for the up-

coming State election. The ballot for the seat of Mount Gambier will list Ben Hood first representing the Liberal Party, followed by Peter Heaven for Family First, Katherine Davies for Labor and Independent incumbent candidate Troy Bell in the last position on the ballot paper.

The ballot order for the seat of MacKillop

will have Nick McBride on top representing the Liberal Party, Mark Braes representing Labor in second position, Dayle Baker representing Family First, Jonathan Pietzsch representing the Nationals and Pam Giehr representing Pauline Hanson's One Nation taking the bottom position on the ballot paper.

Question put to election candidates

OVER the next two weeks The Border Watch will be asking a series of questions of the candidates for the seats of Mount Gambier

and MacKillop.

For this week, the candidates were asked: "In your view, what are the most important

issues in the electorate and how will you address them if elected/re-elected?"

All candidates were approached to supply a

written 200 word answer.

The following are the responses received by print deadline.

Liberal candidate Ben Hood

THE most important issues facing Mount Gambier are Housing and Health.

In housing, there are no quick fixes, we simply need more housing stock.

The Liberal Government's Housing Plan has five key strategies to deliver 20,000 affordable housing solutions.

This is backed by a \$500m-plus investment to spark investment, innovation and removing barriers but more needs to be done in the regions to incentivise private investment in housing.

In health, I will continue to advocate for the Limestone Coast Local Health Network's \$70m Mount Gambier hospital expansion and investments in mental health

services like Head to Health.

We need to ensure more specialists view Mount Gambier as a viable place to practice by increasing the available day surgery theatre times so our community aren't forced to drive to Victoria for the care they need.

To increase services and address housing in our region, we need to convince North Terrace that Mount Gambier is worth it. To date, I haven't seen a Member for Mount Gambier able to do that.

If elected within a Liberal government, I'll be at the table, banging on it every single day to ensure we get the services we deserve as the State's second largest city.

Labor candidate Mark Braes

PROVIDING a sustained recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic and addressing the clear deficit in health and road infrastructure are the most important issues for the communities of the MacKillop electorate.

Small and family businesses have done it tough during the pandemic.

They are the backbone of regional communities, provide local jobs and need our support.

Labor is committed to appointing a cross border commissioner and called for the State Government to establish a new \$200m support fund, waiving liquor licensing and providing meaningful tourism vouchers.

There is a deficit in health infrastructure in the communities of MacKillop.

The \$52.7m investment a Malinauskas Labor Government will make in Limestone Coast Health will substantially improve health outcomes.

An upgrade to the Naracoorte hospital, a 7-year funding agreement with the Keith Hospital, more ambulances and paramedics and greater mental health and drug rehabilitation support are substantial investments in our health for the future.

This is essential to sustaining economic development and the livability of our communities.

The maintained standards of the State roads in our communities are poor.

If elected in March I will advocate strongly for an improvement of the condition and maintenance of road infrastructure.

Independent candidate Troy Bell

A LACK of affordable housing is one of the biggest issues for our city.

I believe everyone has a fundamental right to safe and secure housing.

Real estate prices have skyrocketed, pricing many out of the market and making rental properties unaffordable, and a lack of housing options limits our city's future growth.

I'm working on this issue with agencies and local leaders and it requires a coordinated approach across all levels of government.

My Future Mount Gambier & District plan lays out several key initiatives, including low cost housing for all new estates, stamp duty initiatives for first home buyers, priority maintenance for public housing, more emergency and crisis accommodation and short-term

housing for skilled workers.

Mental health and suicide are also important issues for our community.

I believe regular visits to your counsellor or mental health professional should become as common as visiting your GP, however the services must be there when they are needed.

Retention and recruitment strategies to attract those skilled mental health workers are key.

Other initiatives laid out in the plan are a first responder program trial, no-cost walk in community hub to refer onto existing services, subsidised counselling sessions, early intervention programs, funded in conjunction with NGOs and community organisations.

Liberal candidate Nick McBride

I AM passionate about my electorate.

I have worked hard over the past four years to listen – and advocate on behalf of my community to my Government about the issues that matter to them.

Roads, particularly road maintenance and upgrades, poor mobile phone coverage, the shortage of affordable housing, upgrades to hospitals, improved medical care with more doctors and paramedics, access to mental health and palliative care are all issues that have been raised by my constituents. I am not afraid of pushing the boundaries to advocate for my community.

If re-elected I will keep listening and ad-

vocating for what residents in MacKillop want and need through connections with Local, State and Federal Government.

This region is vitally important to the economic success of the state. We inject billions into the economy, through agriculture, forestry, fishing and tourism. We need to have the infrastructure that enables these businesses to grow and be competitive, not just locally, but internationally as well.

We also want to keep encouraging people to move to the regions, but with that, comes the challenge of accessing housing and providing hospitals, schools and transport corridors that can manage increased population.

Labor candidate Katherine Davies

ACCESS to services is the biggest issue facing Mount Gambier.

Having a Hospital that is well resourced in Mount Gambier is a huge priority as we are the major provider in the South East.

That is why an elected Malinauskas Labor Government will not go ahead with the Liberal's \$662m basketball stadium in Adelaide. Instead, that money will be spent on the health system, and not just health in Adelaide.

Labor's \$24m investment into the Mount Gambier hospital includes an \$8m upgrade to the emergency department, as well as funding six more mental health beds and

two drug and alcohol detox beds.

An elected Labor Government will also work with the Rural Doctors' Association of SA to ensure the shortage of staff is being properly addressed as well as creating laws around nurse ratios.

Housing is also a significant issue in the South East. From my conversations and forums conducted by Nat Cook (Shadow Minister for Human Services) there is a lack of affordable and social housing in the region.

If I am elected, I will work closely with Nat Cook and Clare Scriven (Shadow Minister Regional Development) to ensure any housing policy addresses the regions.

One Nation candidate Pam Giehr

IN my view, crises in health and housing require immediate attention in MacKillop and South Australia.

Roads and other infrastructure are always important, especially in regional areas like MacKillop, but they don't put a roof over someone's head and they don't ensure access to quality medical care for vulnerable people.

We need to do better for vulnerable people in our communities.

If I'm elected to represent the people of MacKillop, a priority will be to get more health services, funding and staff for the electorate.

Many of our communities are too far away from Adelaide to ask them to travel there for specialist medical services. We need

these services here.

One Nation will also be advocating for a smarter health system which utilises technology to more efficiently manage bed availability, relieving ambulance ramping.

I'll be a strong advocate for One Nation's policy to increase housing supply and reduce housing costs.

We believe home ownership should be within reach of every working Australian.

We'll ban foreign ownership of residential property to increase the supply of housing available to Australians, and eliminate stamp duty for purchases up to a value of \$600,000 for first home buyers and up to a value of \$400,000 for people seeking to downsize.

'The old girl' gets a facelift

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"SHE was a beauty," said retired Regimental Sergeant Major Geoff Baker last week when he and three colleagues of the 1st Armoured Regiment Association gave a facelift to the army tank which is on permanent display at Mount Gambier's Returned and Services League (RSL) Bowling Club on Jubilee Highway.

Now living at Seaford, Adelaide, Mr Baker was crew commander for that actual tank in the 1980's, something he discovered by accident during a return visit to Mount Gambier which was his home-town as a boy growing up.

"I was back in the Mount with my wife and we were walking down the street and she said, 'look, there is a tank like you had,'" said Mr Baker.

"I thought, wouldn't it be great if it was my old tank, and as it turned out - it was."

Despite the chances being slim as Australia had about 100 Leopard tanks during their service, Mr Baker checked the serial number, painted on the exterior of the machine, and immediately recognised that 29395 was indeed his tank.

"I practically slept with her for two years," Mr Baker said as he prepared to give the 46 year old tank a new coat of paint thanks to help from Mount Gambier's RSL, Bunnings who donated the paint and tools through Taubmans Paint, and Paxford Canvas who made, fitted and donated a new cover for the tank, while the local Woolworths made sure the men were fed during their working bees last week.

Mr Baker said the tank's name when it was in service was Coldstream but the repainting last week gave he and his colleagues the opportunity to rename it in line with the tradition of squadrons naming tanks with the letter of the squadron it belonged to - be it A, B or C.

As the tank was with C Squadron, and as the tank is now in Mount Gambier which was Mr Baker's home town, it was decided to rename the tank Crater City.

Mr Baker went to school at Mount Gambier's Reidy Park and North primary schools

and then Tech School, now known as Grant High School.

As was common in those days, he finished school on the Friday and began work the following Monday as an apprentice mechanic with the highways department.

He left Mount Gambier when he was 17 years old and moved to Naracoorte where he was called up for national service in 1972 after which he joined the regular army with whom he served for 34 years.

Being a mechanic, it was natural fit for him to be allocated to the 1st Armoured Regiment based at Puckapunyal's army facility in central Victoria and later Mr Baker moved to Darwin with the brigade there.

He also had non-corps postings in Kapooka near Wagga Wagga and Tamworth in New South Wales, and in Sydney.

Mr Baker said while the tank was made in 1976, his association with it was in 1983 and 1984 when he was posted back to the 1st Armoured Regiment at Puckapunyal as a troop sergeant to C Squadron.

"I was issued 29395 so it was basically my tank for two years," Mr Baker said.

During that time, the tank and its crew, with Mr Baker as the crew commander, participated in training exercises, including a major one in 1983.

"My squadron loaded all our tanks and support vehicles on the HMAS Tobruk and sailed from Melbourne to Shoalwater Bay near Rockhampton in Queensland for an eight week exercise, including a dawn attack at Sabina Point."

The tank stayed with the regiment for its entire life, never firing a shot in anger.

Replaced by the American Abrams tanks, the Leopard tanks were retired from service in 2007 and donated by the Commonwealth Government to RSLs for display in towns around Australia.

Three of Mr Baker's 1st Armoured Regiment colleagues helped him repaint Mount Gambier's Leopard.

They included Roger Martlew, of Millicent, who was a 20 year old when he served as a gunner on a Centurion tank - the forerunner to the Leopard - in the Vietnam War and has vivid memories of his tank being blown up in

his first two weeks of service, suffering bad burns but thankfully surviving and having to return to serve out the rest of his 15 month tour.

Richard James, of Naracoorte, was a tank driver on Centurions and was a driver during tank trials to determine whether Australia selected the American or German tank.

Mark Reid, of Adelaide, was a crewman on Centurion tanks in 1972 and later was a commander on the Leopard tank

after its introduction.

Despite or perhaps because of their experiences, the men obviously maintain a strong bond, meeting regularly through their shared association, and with Mount Gambier's Leopard being a familiar reminder of that period in their lives, they gladly gave up their time to give it a fresh lick of paint.

"It's a brilliant idea to paint the old girl - give her a face-lift - and get together at the same time," they said.

Could trains return?

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TRAINS were once a popular way to get from Mount Gambier to Adelaide but, after the rise of car and bus travel, trains stopped in the 1990s.

However, the South Australian Regional Rail Alliance (SARRA) wants to bring it back, along with services to other regional centres like Port Pirie, Leigh Creek, Burra and the Yorke Peninsula.

SARRA's convenor, Paul Henley said if trains were reimplemented in regional areas, people would use them.

"As a long-time resident of the Mid North, I am all too well aware of the wealth contributed to the State's economy by regional SA," Mr Henley said.

"Over the years, however, our politicians have turned their backs on regional SA.

"This plainly is not good enough and must be reversed."

With growing populations in regional areas, Mr Henley said now was the time to reinvest in train infrastructure in the regions.

"As a result of Covid concerns, South Australians are also increasingly moving to regional SA where there are jobs going begging," he said.

"The acceleration of this development must be a priority of the incoming government – and must be built on a 'backbone' rail transport infrastructure - not more buses.

"It needs to be noted by all politicians that one three-car train set can carry up to 240 passengers which would otherwise require five

buses to carry the same number of commuters."

Deputy Chair of Regional Development Australia Limestone Coast Alan Richardson is less optimistic about the return of passenger services.

"Passenger rail is not being talked about at this stage," Mr Richardson said.

"Maybe in the long-term future, but at this stage, it is just freight that makes sense economically.

"Even the Melbourne to Adelaide line, the Overlander, is struggling to break even."

However, Mr Richardson believes that the return of freight is a strong possibility.

"It is important to emphasise the rail will

not be going into the centre of Mount Gambier, there would be a terminal at the saleyards."

"The proposal is to open up the train line between Mount Gambier and Portland."

Mr Richardson said the focus on road infrastructure in Australia has been at the cost of railway infrastructure.

"One of the issues in Australia is that we do not do a good job of running railways," Mr Richardson said.

"Australia does not get how to run it, you have to go to Germany, Japan, or North America to see how to run it properly.

"We need to learn it, they have been inefficient in the past, but they do not need to be in future."

Upgrading the Princes

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FURTHER details on planned upgrades for the Princes Highway in the Limestone Coast have been released.

The SA Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) has outlined the 430km section of the highway between Meningie and the Victorian border will have 20 planned upgrades, including:

- Four overtaking lane extensions between Millicent and Mount Gambier.
- Three junction upgrades - one between Millicent and Mount Gambier, and two north of Millicent.
- Four roundabout upgrades in Mount Gambier.
- One rest area upgrade between Millicent and Mount Gambier.
- Three overtaking lanes - one north of Millicent, and two close to the border.

A majority of the upgrades, 17 of 20 announced for the South Eastern section, will be completed on the section of the highway between the border and 50km north of Millicent.

DIT said that construction is scheduled from mid-2022 to late 2023, but have not provided details on when exact timings or arrangements for local traffic while roadworks are underway.

Shoulder sealing and audio-tactile line marking have also been included on the list of planned upgrades, but information on where exactly they will take place has not been provided by DIT.

The \$190 million in funding for the Princes Highway Corridor Upgrade was provided by both the Federal and State Governments.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin welcomed the update but said there is more work yet to be done.

"The Princes Highway is a freight route of national significance connecting key regional industries such as tourism, timber, forestry and agriculture to domestic markets and major ports," he said.

"The Morrison Government is investing heavily in road infrastructure across the nation including here in Barker where I have made improving our road network a high priority."

A WhatsApp group to help businesses communicate about potential threats was also discussed, but no one volunteered to help run the idea, so will not be implemented at this stage.

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Candidate Mix and Mingle

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BETTER support for local businesses following the Covid-19 pandemic will be a top priority for the Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce leading up to the State election on March 19.

A reduction in payroll tax, city growth and a plan for the future of Mount Gambier's business community will also be top of the list.

The concerns will be brought to the State candidate's attention at a Mix and Mingle event organised by the Chamber to be held next week.

Chamber of Commerce president Hayley Neumann said businesses had discussed a range of issues throughout the past 12 months to bring to the table for the current State candidates. The event will be at the Jens Hotel next Thursday beginning at 5.30pm.

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

Land options considered

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PROPOSED rezoning in Penola has been supported by real estate agents due to limited available residential and industrial land.

The support comes following Wattle Range Council launching for community consultation a draft 25 year Strategic Land Use Plan for the council area, including Penola.

Rezoning within and around Penola are among the proposals floated for consideration in the draft document developed by Adelaide based planning consultants, Holmes Dyer.

TDC Livestock and Property director Mark DeGaris supports the draft plan's proposals for Penola's future.

"Penola has a very limited space to expand, so having a look at land parcels which are available close-by to work out whether we need to rezone or not to accommodate growth in the future is a great idea," Mr DeGaris said.

"There are not many residential areas left in town and where there are, there are developments on the way already.

"The rezoning of rural land is always contentious and I suppose that is what the report is recommending," Mr DeGaris said.

"We are limited in where we can expand and the report has picked some obvious spots."

In regards to industrial expansion, Mr DeGaris said space was quickly becoming sparse

with the opportunity to expand past the western side of the bypass a possibility.

"I don't see why we can't expand the industrial area outside of the bypass as long as there is access for trucks," he said.

"There is the problem that it would then go onto private land so whether the landowners want to rent or sell or not ... but if we were to rezone and expand we would have to do so towards the east and west because there are all the vineyards to the north."

Mr DeGaris said despite the potential for rezoning and increased developments across Penola, he believed any expansion would be controlled.

"We are seeing a lot of people moving to Penola from the cities but I don't think we will be expanding by the hundreds of building lots like they do there," he said.

"Over the last five or six years we have seen an increase in people buying to build a home such as the allotments opposite Penola High School, however once again we are not talking about hundreds of allotments so it doesn't create a huge expansion area."

A community consultation session on council's draft 25 year Strategic Land Use Plan will be held on Tuesday at Rymill Hall from 6pm until 8pm. Bookings are required for these sessions.

The draft plan is available on Council's website.

Written submissions on the draft plan will be received until March 23.

More doctors needed

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ONE general practitioner per 1000 patients in Penola is not enough according to Penola and District Medical Support Group representative, Bill Murray.

Mr Murray said the area needed a minimum of five full time general practitioners to treat all residents.

It comes following a statement that the current number of doctors compared to population in the Penola area was sufficient.

The statement was made in a draft 25 year Strategic Land Use Plan, developed for Wattle Range Council by Adelaide based planning consultants Holmes Dyer.

It stated that one doctor per 1000 people was the standard, and 125 aged care places per 1000 people over the age of 70.

Despite this, the document also stated that, given the district's ageing population, medical facilities would have increased importance.

"Penola has three doctors within the Penola Doctors clinic, sufficient by these metrics to service approximately 3000 people," the document stated.

"When considering Nangwarry, Kangadoo and Coonawarra and the additional services at the Penola War Memorial Hospital, this is roughly sufficient."

According to the Australian Medical Association, throughout the 2017-2018 financial year, outer regional communities had 93 general practitioners to every 100,000 residents.

This is compared to 103.5 per 100,000 people in the major cities.

Mr Murray said that with 34.8 per cent of the town's population expected to be aged 65 to 79 by 2026, the need for medical support was dire.

"I think the one doctor to 1000 patients is a large rate, especially when compared to the city," Mr Murray said.

"In the city, patients also have specialists that are around them which means clients virtually have an instant reply to their needs.

"We have seen an increase in diabetes and heart problems recently and there is

generally one good heart specialist that comes to Naracoorte once a month but we need to have extra people on the ground."

He said due to the industrial work surrounding the Penola and district area, more doctors were also in need due to after hours callouts.

"We have a lot of people working late into the night which does mean a number of accidents," Mr Murray said.

"Our three doctors are on-call a lot of the time and we can't expect them to be.

"If there is an accident in the early hours of the morning, then the doctors would have to come in, assess the situation and then work a full day as a general practitioner as well."

He said these issues were putting immense pressure on the doctors, making it difficult to keep them in the area.

"A lot of doctors move on because they're profession is not family friendly," Mr Murray said.

"The other part of it too is that country doctors need to be paid more because they are looking after our ageing community.

"It is also difficult to get nurses, and carers for Pinchunga Aged Care, which is just as important as getting doctors and it is the whole system that needs upgrading, not just doctors."

Reduce speed for Coonawarra

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THERE have been fresh calls for a reduction in the speed limit along the Coonawarra strip on the Riddoch Highway.

Sue Bellwether of Bellwether Wines has made the call after finding relief in traffic conditions due to roadworks underway outside the cellar door slowing traffic down.

Ms Bellwether said the reduction in the speed limit allows entering and exiting the cellar door safer for guests and staff members.

"I do think the speed limit along the Coonawarra strip should be reduced to 80km but anything less than 110km would be great," Ms Bellwether said.

"Safety is a major concern with regards to people turning off the highway into cellar doors and although I appreciate it is a major truck thoroughfare and has implications for freight and transport, I think it would also increase their safety."

She said options such as reducing the speed limit during certain times of the day would also be a viable option for businesses or having the 100km speed limit on the Penola bypass extended.

"We have clients who are concerned about entering and exiting the cellar door onto the highway, and an increasing number of cyclists which is a bit scary for them and others using the road."

Ms Bellwether said she could not think of another compact winery region other than Coonawarra and encouraged further turning

lanes or overtaking lanes.

"More customers are coming from the southern direction than the northern direction and there are more people staying in Penola and due to this I think it is important we have safe entrances to all cellar doors in Coonawarra," Ms Bellwether said.

"This time of the year we also have vintage traffic too, not just tourism, as it is still an agricultural region and harvesters and other heavy machinery are moving about.

"The highway has become a pretty busy road and more upgrades are needed to enhance the safety of customers and cyclists alike."

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Don't build on scrub

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AT least four members of the Millicent Field Naturalists will make their voices heard at a public meeting in Millicent next Wednesday with concerns that Wattle Range Council's draft 25 Year Strategic Land Use Plan identifies a nature reserve off Matheson Road as potential future residential land.

After collectively putting many years, and a considerable array of government grants, into removing weeds and re-establishing native plants in the 16 acre reserve, Pat Muhovics, Rosey Pounsett and Noel and Sheila Boyle will ensure the public meeting knows that they believe the land should be kept as a nature reserve and recorded as such in the plan when it is finalised.

The land was originally set aside in the 1880's as a cemetery for what was then the separate town of Millicent North.

Never used for its intended purpose, the piece of Crown Land has had the attention of these four members of the Millicent Field Naturalists for about 40 years.

While three are nearby Matheson Road residents, the fourth lives elsewhere in the town but all have the same message, and that is that the land is worth keeping as a reserve and should not be used to build houses on.

Over the years they have been compiling lists of the plants, birds and animals identified on the reserve.

The list includes 56 native plant species including seven species of orchids, and the small grass tree (*Xanthorrhoea minor*) and green pussy tails (*Ptilotus macrocephalus*) both of which are rare species in the Millicent area.

Almost 70 species of birds have been sighted along with various spiders, frogs, ringtail and brushtail possums, short beaked echidnas, swamp wallabies and red-necked wallabies, the latter of whose numbers are declining in its range.

Reptiles include the Eastern Brown snake, and various lizards and skinks, along with a wide array of native insects including stick insects, grasshoppers, dragonflies, ants and native bees.

"It's the only piece of remnant native vegetation left in Millicent," said Mrs Muhovics.

"There is a good diversity of the origi-

nal vegetation of the area, due to the change in soils over the block - we've even found muntries here which you're more likely to find closer to the sea - and an array of native animals call this place home."

Mrs Pounsett said it was important as a corridor for wildlife to access other areas, particularly birds travelling between other reserves in the area like Lake McIntyre, Rotary Park, and Belt Road walking trail.

"This reserve enhances what we have here in Millicent already and from a tourism point of view boosts our eco-tourism attractions," she said.

Mr and Mrs Boyle said when they visited other towns, they looked for walking trails and other natural areas.

"With these sorts of reserves, people are more likely to stay another day," said Mrs Boyle.

The four intended to make it clear to the consultants that changing the reserve's status to residential was not what Millicent wanted.

"Millicent is going to need green areas and the size of this block makes it unique so we need to conserve it," said Mrs Muhovics.

"There are so many other options for resi-

dential use; I think people will realise this reserve is significant and we will do whatever it takes to save it."

"This is a 25 year plan for the council; we are determined that for the next 25 years it remains as a reserve in this plan," said Mrs Pounsett.

The four encouraged Millicent residents to read the draft land use plan, make submissions and participate in the public consultation sessions to ensure the plan has what the community wants in it.

A public meeting to discuss the draft land use plan will be conducted by Adelaide based planning consultants, Holmes Dyer, who has been engaged to develop the plan for Wattle Range Council.

The meeting in Millicent will be held at the Civic and Arts Centre next Wednesday from 6pm to 8pm, with an opportunity to talk one on one with the consultants earlier in the day at the Millicent Library from 11am to 2pm.

Other sessions will also be held in Penola next Tuesday, and at Beachport next Thursday. Bookings are required for these sessions.

Written submissions will be received until March 23.

Telco providers hit the roads

MORE than 120 locals took the opportunity to chat with representatives from Telstra, Optus and NBN last week, when Wattle Range Council hosted a Telecommunications Roadshow across the district.

Among those who dropped in to discuss concerns were business owners, retirees, new homeowners with NBN issues, farmers with limited services, emergency service personnel, schoolteachers, and stock agents.

Many appreciated the opportunity to meet face to face with their telco, rather than having to spend extended wait times on the phone.

"A lot of those who came along were pleased to have issues that they have been dealing with for a long time resolved," Council's Director Development, Emma Clay said.

"It was great to see that we had over 40 people come along each day, with the providers indicating that it is one of the best supported roadshows they had attended.

"Representatives from the NBN were helpful in assisting locals with their queries, many about new connections or improving existing connections, but some with just general NBN questions.

"Both Optus and Telstra were able to speak with customers, not just about their telecommunications accounts, but also news of upcoming infrastructure aimed at closing the coverage gap and providing enhanced connectivity across the entire region.

"Representatives brought with them new technology, boosters, mapping programs and some unparalleled expertise, in order to showcase the solutions on offer."

Mayor Des Noll attended the session in Penola and said: "We thank the Telcos for visiting our area and investing time and resources into the Roadshow. It was a great opportunity to meet face to face and raise our queries and concerns".

Ms Clay encouraged residents to keep an eye out for future opportunities.

"Whilst we acknowledge that there are some instances where there are inadequate telecommunication services, the Roadshow did prove to be useful for many," Ms Clay said.

"All three organisations are keen to visit again, with the possibility of a similar event to be hosted by Council in the next six to twelve months.

"In the meantime, they will all be represented at the Lucindale Field Days this month, so be sure to call in and catch up if you are having any issues" she concluded.

Office build costs review

ARCHITECTS for the proposed new Wattle Range Council office building have been asked to reduce the scope of the project after initial cost estimates for the project came in above a limit set by elected members.

The cost blow out was reported to elected members at Council's February meeting by Council's Project Manager, Muni Krishna.

Mr Krishna reported that project timelines would be impacted by the need to develop revised plans and that a revised cost estimate would be presented back to Council.

Later, Chief Executive Officer Ben Gower told The Border Watch that construction of the proposed administration building was not included in Council's budget beyond the cost of seeking plans and costings, but elected members had set a limit of \$5.5 million for construction as part of considering the project.

Mr Gower said the limit was lower than any previous estimate received for the building when the matter of finding a location for it was debated, but elected members had asked that quality be a primary driver for the project.

Mr Gower said this had led to the cost blow out.

Mr Gower would not reveal the level of the cost estimate except to say it was "significantly north" of the limit set by elected members.

He said the process had begun of stripping back the plans for the proposed new building to match the limit.

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It was all go 70 years ago

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SEVENTY years ago, Mount Gambier became the first town in regional South Australia to have traffic lights but some residents didn't think it was necessary, as discovered by Mount Gambier History Group member and volunteer researcher Norma Werner recently.

Researching stories for inclusion in the group's recently released summer newsletter, Norma stumbled across a report in *The Border Watch* about the lights at the city's main corner being turned on for the first time in November 1951.

"There's three of us that put together the newsletter - I look for articles that I think are going to be interesting; a first of, or unusual thing is what attracts my eye," said Ms Werner.

"I found this story saying the lights were the first in regional South Australia so I did some extra research through Trove [the National Library of Australia's electronic collection of newspapers and gazettes] which is a fantastic source of information that is easy to navigate.

"It is hard to believe now that some people back then were not in favour of the lights being installed, and it was interesting to read about the confusion around the amber lights - which can still be a problem today," she said.

Ms Werner wrote in her newsletter article that Mount Gambier's main corner traffic lights were a topic of discussion among ratepayers and at Council meetings for several years before a detailed plan was submitted to council by the engineer in January 1951.

"The cost of the traffic lights was shown at 700 pounds; 120 pounds for installation, with an additional 580 pounds for rounding the corners, kerbing, moving power lines etc.

"Some ratepayers were not convinced that the lights would be of any benefit.

"Some seemed to think that policemen handled the traffic quite adequately, saying that Perth, Western Australia, which had many narrow streets at the time, did not find it necessary to install lights and policemen there handled the traffic just fine, and we should do the same.

"One retired police officer, Mr PW Lindsay insisted the lights in Commercial Street were a move in the right direction.

"He claimed directing traffic at the main intersection was an awkward job for a police officer and that he should know because he had the buttons swiped from his uniform as vehicles passed.

"Mr HV Richter, after returning from a tour of Victorian towns, seemed to think money would be wasted by erecting traffic lights at the main corner.

"He didn't think the lights would solve the traffic problem and a policeman would still be needed to regulate them and see that they are obeyed.

"He suggested stop signs instead.

"Having said that, the majority of ratepayers looked upon the lights as a solution to help ease the congestion of Mount Gambier's busi-

est corner and most welcomed them.

"And who wouldn't be excited at the prospect of erecting the first traffic lights for regional South Australia."

The lights were turned on by then Mayor, Mr JH Marks, on November 30, 1951.

"Four policemen were on duty that day, directing traffic during the opening ceremony but they were there to assist drivers to understand the new setup and to put drivers on the right track.

"The Mayor turned the switch which brought the lights into operation and, as they began to change at 30 second intervals, Mount Gambier's traffic moved under the direction of traffic lights for the first time.

"Dr JRL Willis drove the first car across the intersection while the first pedestrian to cross was alderman AR McDonald.

"In the following months there was a little confusion as to how to use the lights," wrote Ms Werner.

"Police had to give warnings to motorists and pedestrians to follow the correct procedure when the lights were amber but, overall, the lights had done a magnificent job at controlling the flow of traffic."

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
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Labor promises specialists

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THE Labor Party has announced health-based election promise of dispatching 10 additional specialist doctors in regional areas, labelling Mount Gambier as a priority area.

During its official campaign launch last week, the Opposition announced the \$10m promise.

According to Shadow Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton, Mount Gambier will be of top priority for the doctors to be implemented.

The doctors stationed in regional hospitals will be full time employees and permanently working in the region.

The funding will be additional to the \$52.7m health package already announced for the Limestone Coast.

"Clearly Mount Gambier is one of the areas we are trying to target for some of these doc-

tors to come to," Mr Picton said.

"The Mount Gambier hospital is the biggest country hospital in South Australia and its needs are significant and growing."

Mr Picton said he wanted to ensure residents were not traveling to Adelaide continuously for medical treatment and were able to receive it closer to home.

"We would work with local hospital networks and identify where those needs are before recruiting people to fill those roles," he said.

"Clearly we want to continue working with those local areas to make sure we can get the best bang for our buck to make sure they are also the right specialists for those areas."

He said the decision was made due to ongoing callouts for more stationed specialists with a number of regional hospitals reliant on fly-in-fly-out specialists.

"Fly-in-fly-out specialists are more expensive to the taxpayers in the end," he said.

"This is something we have been talking to regional communities about and they have identified the need for access when they need them.

"Mount Gambier is a priority due to a number of factors such as it being the second largest city of the state and there being a significant effort to get back and forth from Adelaide."

The callout came less than a week after a deputation was made by a concerned community member at the Mount Gambier City Council meeting.

Dirk Verschure spoke to elected members during its February meeting, expressing concern after his wife had to travel to Adelaide for an Magnetic resonance imaging (MRI).

Mr Verschure stated his wife needed a specialist for the ten-minute procedure due to her having a pacemaker.

"We have a population of around 30,000 people and no specialists," Mr Verschure said.

"We need to advertise and promote and do it ourselves."

He told elected members waiting times at general practitioners and the hospital were also "not right" and claimed the health system in the region needed to be reviewed and reassessed before encouraging the council to further advocate on behalf of the Blue Lake city.

Speaking on the issue, Minister for Health and Wellbeing Stephen Wade said the Liberal Government was "very keen" to increase the resident specialists in the region.

"It is important for people to have services closer to home and if it is available it will most likely be in a timely way but also reduces costs for travel," Mr Wade said.

"We are certainly happy to support resident services so people don't have to make that trip to Adelaide or other metropolitan areas to get the care they need."

He said general practitioners who further develop their skills by taking on additional training would also assist the problem, allowing hospitals to increase capacity for the local services.

Substance misuse group now stand alone

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A LONG term strategy of the Substance Misuse Limestone Coast (SMLC) will come to fruition in the coming months as the advocacy organisation becomes its own legal entity.

Now in its sixth year, the SMLC will soon be classified as a not-for-profit organisation rather than an advocacy organisation with project officer Sophie Bouchier stating it was a fantastic achievement.

The drug and alcohol support organisation is funded through the Federal Government with its funding due to end in 2022.

During its time within the organisation, the Limestone Coast Local Government Association (LCLGA) has assisted it with administrative and human resources costs.

"Part of our long term strategy was that we have always wanted to be our own legal entity, our own stand-alone agency," Ms Bouchier said.

"It has been part of our funding agreement with the Commonwealth Department of Health as well and it feels great to know we are officially in the process of doing so."

By moving onto its own legal entity, the SMLC would now be able to "hold onto" its own money and be officially registered as a not-for-profit organisation, allowing future expansions to occur.

"The steps that we have taken to get to this point have been heavily evidence-based," Ms Bouchier said.

"The work we do is for education around the drug and alcohol sector and advocating for that sector and health promotion.

"Our board is highly skilled and without them this would never have happened."

The project manager said many board members had been working within the drug and alcohol support industry for a long time and looked forward to the SMLC's future.

"We are really excited to come up to those

final steps of the initiative as it is a sense of accomplishment and success," she said.

"The federal funding we receive will remain critical regardless of whether we are our own entity or not and it remains critical that our state and federal members continue to advocate on our behalf."

Despite the change, Ms Bouchier said the face of the organisation would remain the same as well as its services.

"We may have the opportunity to expand and it is in our strategic plan for this year to finalise that and become our own agency which is pretty exciting," she said.



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New ambo trainees

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THREE graduate trainee paramedics will be allocated to the Limestone Coast following an announcement made by the Liberal Government.

The government announced 14 graduates would be spread across 11 sites within regional South Australia, with Millicent receiving two trainee paramedics and Naracoorte receiving one.

The trainees are part of an ongoing Graduate Paramedic Pathways (GPP) program where they will fill current vacancies within rosters at the allocated sites.

Committing to a four-year contract, the trainees will also study a first-year diploma with Central Queensland University then undertake a university-based paramedic degree.

"We chose Naracoorte and Millicent because there were a range of sites with different needs and these areas had vacancies in their rosters," Minister for Health and Wellbeing Stephen Wade said.

"They will be working as paramedics on the road as full-time trainee paramedics who will manage their education parallel with working on the road."

Ambulance Employee Association member Cody Scholes said it was great that some of the vacancies were able to be filled by the trainee paramedics but there still needed to be additional staff on the road.

"We as a union support the paramedic pathways program because we want more ambulances officers into the paramedic roles," Mr Scholes said.

"However rosters are still short and even in Mount Gambier there is a shortage in rosters because to work with these trainees there needs to be paramedics which means those crews are now getting split up."

He said, due to shortages within the region, available workers would not have a consistent

skill-set due to some of the crew still being trainees, volunteers or a mix.

"The GPP system can also make it confusing for the patients because if they call an ambulance one day for a problem and they do something for the patient and the same problem happens again the next day the patient will get a different skill set which can really set them back," Mr Scholes said.

"It also creates long waits and sometimes we have seen that the long waits for ambulances either allows the patient's symptoms to be resolved or they deteriorate and their families take them to hospital themselves."

Shadow Minister for Health Chris Picton said, while welcoming the new staff into the

region, the graduate program was a "band aid solution" which would not address the overall problem.

"All staff going into ambulance services are welcome but this won't address the problem," Mr Picton said.

"These staff will fill vacancies and are not additional staff or paramedics on the road."

Mr Picton said he believed the community would be "appalled" by the announcement and said there was nothing from the Liberal Government for additional resources.

"This solution is a drop in the ocean compared to the ambulances needed in the region," he said.

Cycling fundraiser for sick children

FORMER Mount Gambier resident Cameron Maher will ride from Melbourne to Adelaide next week to raise funds for the Ronald McDonald House.

Mr Maher, who now resides in Adelaide, will travel with a number of other cyclists to Melbourne on Saturday before making the 1000km trip back.

One of 15 cyclists hoping to raise \$250,000 for those in need, Mr Maher said the challenge and fundraising aspect drew him in.

"I have been cycling for about 25-years on and off and have not done the ride from Melbourne to Adelaide before so when I saw this and that it was a fundraiser it ticked all the boxes," Mr Maher said.

"We will go along the coast which is a bit challenging and spend one night in Mount Gambier."

Looking forward to returning, Mr Maher said growing up in the country gave him a personal insight into the positive effects the Ronald McDonald house brought to families in need.

"You realise a lot of health services are needed for health services and the families of sick children and having regional parents being able to stay close to their sick children is important," he said.

"It was a no-brainer to join in and after hearing people using the service before I decided I really wanted to do this."

The event will run from March 6-12.

Volunteer for meals

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THERE have been fresh calls for volunteers for the Mount Gambier Meals on Wheels with adept volunteer Ella Childs and branch support officer Joanne Burford calling for support.

Elderly volunteers of the not-for-profit organisation have expressed concern about serving within the community following a continuous string of positive Covid-19 cases.

Each day, volunteers produce and serve about 120 meals which are delivered to community members in need.

Ms Childs, who has been volunteering for the organisation for about 38 years, said the reason for the concern was due to ongoing health issues leaving some volunteers vulnerable or a large number retiring from the service.

"As a volunteer it is a big change from when I started where everything was so different," Ms Childs said.

"We have veered so far from the beginning, we now have to adapt to everything with health regulations but the way we go into people's homes and the way we are greeted is done in the same way."

Since the beginning of the local branch, students from Grant High School and St Martins Lutheran College have also assisted with the organisation.

"A lot of students used to come down during the school holidays and they loved it," she said.

"They learn so many skills, especially for people who have never been in the kitchen, even if they're new they have to put themselves out there and tell themselves they can do it."

Supporting Ms Childs comments, Ms Burford said it was not always about supplying meals but also socialising with those in the community.

Ms Burford added the organisation gave volunteers a sense of purpose and a greater role in the community.

"The whole understanding of how a commercial kitchen runs from prepping, right through to the cooking process is great," Ms Burford said.

"It's all important things volunteers are learning in terms of working skills, as well as life skills including working as a team and contributing to the community."

"If anyone does have a few hours to spare they can come in once a week or maybe even once a fortnight as there is a lot of satisfaction when they work in the kitchen and see those meals being sent out."

Volunteers are able to work in varying forms including delivery, office and kitchen work.

Art evolves over lifetime

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SINCE she could pick up a pencil, Mount Gambier artist and sculptor Julianne Woodruff has evolved her specialised area of expertise from paints and pencils to the art of clay.

From studying at an art college in Warrnambool, Ms Woodruff has continued to learn and grow her skills ever since her first year of attendance more than 40 years ago.

Speaking to The Border Watch, she revealed how her love for pottery eventually took over her interest as an art medium.

"I got frustrated with painting so I ended up running into the pottery room and it took over," Ms Woodruff said.

She added pottery could be time consuming and explained the process of how pottery goes through a long-winded process to be considered complete.

"With painting, it might take a few days or a few weeks to finish off - with clay it can take around half a day to build the base of a sculpture," Ms Woodruff said.

"Once you're finished with paintings, you send them to get framed and you are done with it, whereas with clay, you have to wait a few weeks for it to become bone dry after being put in the kiln."

She said it was sometimes like Christmas morning whenever the kiln was opened to see the results, mentioning pottery could sometimes be a game of chance.

"You open the kiln and there are all these reactions you could have, no matter how experienced you might be, you never know what you are going to get," she said.

Ms Woodruff said she liked to keep the first sculpture from a batch of creations to serve as a progress check to improve future techniques.

"It's a good reference to come back to and see what you have made and how it's progressed," she said.

Ms Woodruff had since established a profession in selling her work, with some custom-

ers said to have asked for pottery lessons.

"Anywhere I went people were asking me for lessons, but there is no way I can fit anyone in my workshop," she said.

"I had three enquiries recently and I keep saying I just need a proper space to work in."

Ms Woodruff has been supplying galleries with her work for over 20 years and said money can be made from the artform.

She added most people would be able to pick up sculpting quickly due to its easy going nature.

"Clay is therapeutic and everyone seems to enjoy it, it's kind of like going back to kindergarten and playing with plasticine," she said.

"It's a good tactile thing that almost anyone can sit down and do because you are constantly learning."

Country Arts award up for grabs

APPLICATIONS for Country Arts South Australia's Visual Arts Professional Development award, Breaking Ground, have opened for 2023.

The winner will receive \$10,000 to develop work for a solo exhibition to be held at a gallery in Adelaide.

An additional \$5000 mentorship opportunity will also be available.

The exhibition will be held during the 2023 South Australian Living Artists (SALA) festival.

Country Arts SA chief executive Anthony Peluso said Breaking Ground was a premier professional development opportunity and had become a distinguished award.

"The stellar list of previous recipients confirms we have incredible artists in our state

who are eager to keep growing, evolving and strengthening their practice," Mr Peluso said.

"Having an exhibition in Adelaide during the SALA Festival creates new connections and opportunities which catapults their careers." Since Breaking Ground's launch in 2012, SALA and Country Arts SA have collaborated for artists to exhibit alongside some of the state's best contemporary visual artists.

Funding museum display

BORDERTOWN'S District Agricultural Museum has received \$3000 to install a new collection of photographs within the gallery display space.

The share is part of the Federal Government's Culture, Heritage and Arts Regional Tourism program with the South East town being successful in the first round.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said the funds would help rebuild the local economy through the development of collections or exhibits, improved facilities for visitors and the digitisation of local heritage collections for future generations.

Book on rickshaw adventures

MOUNT Gambier author Adam Branford will launch his latest book 'Cows, Curries and Chaos: An Indian Odyssey on Three Wheels' early next week.

The book explores Mr Branford's experience after travelling close to 3000km across the Indian Subcontinent in a three-wheeled rickshaw.

Mr Branford signed up for the challenge in 2015 alongside two friends, with their destinations varying from the deserts of Western Rajasthan to the Himalayas in Nepal.

The Rickshaw Run - which was the name of the challenge Mr Branford and his friends participated in- required entrants to cross some of the most dangerous roads.

"Entrants are required to cross the entire Indian Subcontinent completely unassisted, with no mechanical support, no maps provided or accommodation, but with one guarantee - that you will break down," Mr Branford said.

Mr Branford said there were plenty of challenges across the journey, some of which he thought posed a risk to his life.

"At the time I vowed never to return, but I did - that's another book," Mr Branford said.

During the launch event, the avid author will share his experiences of difficulties including potholes, gut-wrenching curries, wayward

cows and many more before emerging to the finish line.

Our volcanic history explained by expert

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THE city of Mount Gambier is built around the complex of a dormant volcano, consisting of four lake-filled maars which includes the Leg of Mutton Lake, Brownes Lake, the Valley Lake and the Blue Lake.

The Hunga Tonga Hunga Ha'apai eruption off the east coast of Australia recently caused tsunamis with damages extending to New Zealand, Fiji and parts of South America.

It has been identified as the largest volcanic explosion in history caught on satellite.

These explosions can have devastating effects on surrounding areas, particularly if one is surrounded by a nearby city.

Some of the first eruptions in the local area were large enough to create Mount Gambier's Blue Lake, which can be compared to the recent development in the South Pacific.

Ian Lewis, a hydrogeologist and veteran cave diver, said a modern day eruption for Mount Gambier should not happen for another 5000 years as most volcanoes have a dormant lifespan of about 10,000 years.

"There are quite a large number of craters in the area, but the two biggest ones were the Blue Lake, which originally had two separate craters," he said.

"When we did some underwater sounding for the area, it showed there was a step in the floor suggesting one massive explosion along with a smaller explosion combined both craters."

Most volcanoes in South Australia can be found in the lower South East such as Mount Schank and the older mountain ranges of Mount Burr and Mount Muirhead.

Mr Lewis said the Tonga explosion can be compared to the origins of Mount Gambier's main attraction in terms of crater size and damage to the land.

"The cause of the Tonga explosion was the result of magma and water colliding after plates from the Earth's crust rubbed together, whereas these inland ones come up every now and then from what is called a hotspot," he said.

The hotspots such as Mount Gambier and the Victorian mountain ranges are more predictable with a rough estimated time until the next eruption, while underwater volcanoes are said to be more erratic.

"The volcanoes from Colac, Hamilton, Warrnambool and here in Mount Gambier are some of the newest volcanoes, which indicates Australia is moving slowly over a warm spot, so about every 10,000 years a new vol-

cano is formed," Mr Lewis said.

Early warning signs of volcanoes can include earth tremors which can be detected by devices known as seismometers which measure forces in the Earth.

Mr Lewis said there are also ways of measuring the chemistry of the gases and the smoke which gives an indication of the type of magma development and the intensity of a build-up.

"If a volcano were to erupt in the inland area, ash and chemicals would be launched into the air and carried with the wind, most likely raining down on the nearby city," he said.

"In the case of the Tonga volcano, one thing which could be suggested is to flee to the other side of the island away from the mountains because the waves usually can't reach to that extent."

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PREPARATIONS for the Beachport Crayfish Festival next month are in full swing, with the event planning committee hopeful the event will increase tourism to the town.

To be held this weekend, the festival will include live entertainment, a market day, workshops, kids activities, a crayfish cook-off by local police and, of course, crayfish themed food.

Heather Burdon, a Beachport resident on the festival's planning committee, said the festival would give locals an opportunity to show off their town and celebrate the major industry that supports it.

"The community in general are very proud of the town and what we have got here, and want to show it off," Ms Burdon said.

"Feedback I have had recently from people staying from out of town is about how friendly Beachport is, the community and shop owners; everyone is welcoming and helpful."

Ms Burdon said the group has been impressed by the community's interest in the event.

"It will hopefully bring a lot of money into the town for the local businesses," Ms Burdon said.

The festival has offered local volunteer groups the opportunity to work at the festival and make money for their clubs.

Ms Burdon said it was important to the committee that money spent on the event stayed within the community.

"Just getting together as volunteers helps strengthen the community," Ms Burdon said.

"We even have a bus of Lions Club ladies and men coming from Mount Gambier to volunteer.

"And the local Beachport Lions are always amazing."

Shuttle buses from Mount Gambier, Millicent and Robe have been arranged to encourage residents in the region to make their way to Beachport for the event.

Potential money back for wine bottles

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RECYCLING businesses in the Limestone Coast are hopeful that proposed changes by the State Government to expand the container deposit scheme will be implemented.

The potential inclusion of wine and spirit bottles, along with milk cartons, in the refund scheme has been flagged by the government as part of a review process into the Container Deposit Scheme.

As part of a consultation process the State Government asked for submissions into the proposed changes which closed late last year, with the Environmental Protection Authority confirming that 255 submissions had been received.

Penola Recyclables manager Anne-Marie Williams said she was hopeful the suggested changes will be implemented.

"One of the major changes that will impact our area is the inclusion of all beverage containers, except milk, up to three litres," she said.

"This will include wine bottles; these currently bring a small amount of money to the business after overheads have been deducted.

"Everyone is encouraged to bring in their wine/spirit bottles as this money has been currently used by our facility to sponsor junior netball and football clubs and other charity organisations in our wider community."

Not only would new inclusions mean more money back for recyclers but will make sorting through containers much easier for staff.

"Inclusion of all beverage containers and less sorting will allow a quicker turnaround for the customer and more incentive to recycle at a licensed local SA Container Deposit Scheme [businesses] who support the local community," Ms Williams said.

"With more support hopefully 20 cents deposit return will be implemented in the new few years to further entice recycling."

Global trade

THE Russia Ukraine conflict will have large ramifications for global and Australian grains and oilseeds markets, and particularly wheat, according to agribusiness banking specialist Rabobank's Agricultural Analyst, Dennis Voznesenski said in summarising his recently released report, 'When Black Sea wheat is caught in conflict'.

The report compared the current Ukraine-Russia conflict with 1914 when access to Black Sea exports was last lost.

"The Black Sea region accounts for 34 per cent of global wheat exports, and a full-scale conflict between Russia and Ukraine will see exports out of the region grind to a halt, at least in the short term, due to blockages to shipping and the high cost or lack of availability of insurance for vessels," Mr Voznesenski said.

"If sanctions are implemented on Russian wheat exports, it will cause long-term structural changes to wheat flows.

"Global wheat prices have already risen 21 per cent since February 1 this year and - in the very short term - prices could rise another five to 10 per cent.

"If conflict continues into July, when the Black Sea harvest begins, and sanctions on Russia are implemented, global prices could rise another 61 per cent from current levels."

Mr Voznesenski said Australian wheat exports will experience increased demand if Black Sea exports are unavailable.

"While farmgate prices will benefit - they will likely not see the full upward impact of the global price rise due to Australia's recent large harvest, limits on our export capacity and the positive grains outlook for the coming Australian season," Mr Voznesenski said.

"Assuming a full-scale conflict, with a virtual halt to Black Sea exports - and that basis (the difference between Australian and US wheat prices) remains constant - local Kwinana Free-In-Store APW (Australian Premium White) prices could rise from A\$367 per tonne currently to A\$425 per tonne in the near term.

"If Black Sea wheat is unavailable by July, whether due to continued conflict or sanctions on Russian wheat exports, prices could rise significantly higher.

"In order for Australian wheat prices to more closely follow higher global prices, Australia would need to increase our export capacity.

"Assuming the Turkish Straits, the only passageway between the Black Sea and the Mediterranean, remain open, we could see governments in certain large importing nations, such as Iran or China, ignore western sanctions imposed on Russian exports, and still procure grain.

"In the short term, this would not prevent the expected high pricing, but would fundamentally change global wheat flows into the future.

"Globally, the conflict could see both a change in trade flows and use of wheat.

"About 160 million metric tonnes of the world's wheat (20 per cent) is used for feed and this is where substitution is likely to occur to compensate for a potential 60 million metric tonnes of wheat exports annually no longer coming out of the Black Sea region.

"China's hunger for 50 million to 60 million metric tonnes of grain imports annually, largely for feed, could potentially shift from its current origins of South and North America and instead be supplied by Russia's 45 million to 50 million metric tonnes of grain export surplus.

"The last time the world lost access to all Black Sea wheat exports - in October 1914, during World War One, when the Ottoman empire blockaded wheat supplies from Russia reaching allies, the UK and France - Chicago wholesale wheat prices rose 45 per cent from October 1914 to February 1915.

"There are two main differences now that indicate the impacts on wheat markets could be more severe this time around.

"Firstly, the world's reliance on Black Sea wheat is now higher and, secondly, wheat stocks in other (non-Black Sea) export regions are far lower compared with the average coming into this crisis than they were in October 1914."

Mr Voznesenski said the Russia Ukraine conflict was also likely to disrupt canola and feed markets, including barley.

"Ukraine is the third-largest exporter of canola in the world after Australia and Canada, while, together, Russia and Ukraine are the largest producers and exporters of sunflower seeds and sunflower oil," Mr Voznesenski said.

"On the feed side, the Ukraine crisis is also adding upward pressure to corn prices, with 15 million metric tonnes of Ukrainian corn (seven per cent of world trade) still left unexported this season - a season when Ukraine was meant to account for 17 per cent of global corn exports.

"If those supplies are unavailable, they will support Australian feed barley prices."

More than words

Producer **Bruna Papandrea** turns yet another bestseller into a small-screen hit with Netflix thriller **Pieces of Her**

Screen queen



Australian film producer Bruna Papandrea is behind some of the biggest book-to-screen adaptations of the past decade. She tells **Siobhan Duck** how her latest series, *Pieces of Her*, came to be.

People are forever asking Bruna Papandrea which book she's reading in bed. And the answer often surprises, because the acclaimed producer, famous for bringing novels such as *Big Little Lies*, *Nine Perfect Strangers*, *Gone Girl* and *The Dry* to the screen, doesn't spend her downtime poring over the latest best-seller.

"I tend to read non-fiction or a book about parenting because I don't have time really [to read anything else] and obviously I get sent so much material," Papandrea says, with a laugh.

"I'm lucky to be getting great books [for work to consider for adaptation], that I would have read anyway. So that's good news. But when I am reading them, I'm always thinking as I'm reading it, can I see it [on screen]?"

Reading *Pieces of Her* by Karin Slaughter was a particularly visceral experience for Papandrea. And she knew within a few pages that the thrilling story of a mother and a daughter whose lives are upended by a mass shooting at a diner would make brilliant television.

"Karin writes so cinematically," she explains.

"The second I read that diner scene I knew this was a series.

I could see it. I want to watch a series where you think this is one thing going in, and then it totally turns itself on its head.

"The good thing about TV is that novelists are really open to expanding on their book, because it's a lot of story to fill out eight hours of TV. And Karin has been brilliant. We have been very faithful to her book, but we do have to expand.

"It's different to something like *The Dry*, which was also a critically acclaimed book that works perfectly as a movie. There, you don't really have to add anything."

When casting the central role of Laura in *Pieces of Her*, there was just one name that instantly came to mind as she was reading the novel: Toni Collette.

The character of Laura – a woman on the run from her past with some pretty bad-ass survival skills – is unlike anything the *Muriel's Wedding* star has done before. But Papandrea says Collette's ability to seamlessly shift gears between emotional family drama and espionage-style thrills made her the perfect fit for the part.

"So, I could see her in the role, but I understand how busy talented actresses are," Papandrea says.

"And you never want to get too invested [in who you see in the role]

because then when they're not available it just leads to heartbreak.

"But as we were talking about it, her name just kept coming up. So, it was thrilling for me when she said yes to doing it. Not just because she's so right for the role but because I've always wanted to work with her."

After casting Collette, Papandrea needed to find someone who would be equally believable as her daughter, Andy. She found that person in Melbourne-born actor Bella Heathcote (*Fifty Shades Darker*, *Boom*).

The Netflix drama also sees Papandrea reunited with her old friend David Wenham. The *SeaChange* actor starred in *Better Than Sex*, the very first film she produced back in 2000.

"I keep joking to David all the time that 'Oh my God, it took you 25 years to work with me again!'," she says.

"And now that I have, I just want to work with him again and again because he was a great actor back then and he's even better now."

Although the lead cast is overwhelmingly comprised of Aussies, *Pieces of Her* was originally meant to shoot in Canada. When the pandemic tightened its grip overseas, production shifted

to NSW, where Papandrea had just finished filming the Nicole Kidman-helmed series *Nine Perfect Strangers*.

As such, there are some familiar faces who pop up in the series including three former *Water Rats* stars: Catherine McClements, Colin Friels and Aaron Jeffery.

Like so many of Papandrea's projects, *Pieces of Her* challenges outdated ideas about what a female-centric drama looks like. Yes, it's a story about the strained relationship between a mother and daughter but this is more like *The Bourne Identity* than *Steel Magnolias*.

Papandrea's commitment to spotlighting women's work on screen and behind the scenes is the reason she founded her television and film company Made Up Stories.

Through Made Up Stories Papandrea has already brought *The Undoing*, *Tell Me Your Secrets* and *Nine Perfect Strangers* to TV. Now, in addition to *Pieces of Her*, Papandrea has *The Luckiest Girl Alive* starring Mila Kunis and *Anatomy of a Scandal* with Sienna Miller set to drop on Netflix later this year. And the anthology series

Roar, featuring frequent collaborator Kidman, alongside Merritt Wever and Cynthia Erivo, will premiere on Apple TV+ in April.

The next glass ceiling she's set to smash is in the depths of space. That's right, Papandrea is trying her hand at sci-fi, optioning the Christopher Paolini book *To Sleep in a Sea of Stars*.

"It's not just about making stuff with women in it but about making stuff that we haven't traditionally seen enough women in," she says.

"If you had two men at the centre [of *Pieces of Her*] – and there has been many father-and-son stories like this – they wouldn't put it in a box.

"My hope is that people don't just see it as a show for women. The genre transcends that because every man that I've shown it to has loved it. So, we shouldn't just limit this to women. I want everyone to watch it."


SULLY

Seasonal spruce up

AS the warmer months and the summer festive season draw to a close, you may notice that your outdoor area is looking a little worse for wear. Perhaps the deck is a bit dull or your paved entertaining area is a bit shabby - now is the time to get on top of refreshing these outdoor areas.

Refresh paved areas

Visit your local hardware store and find a paver or concrete cleaner suitable for your pavers at home. You can use a brush and a bit of elbow grease, but for best results, a pressure cleaner should be used to blast away dirt, mold, grime and other nasties.

Pick the first of a few sunny days to clean your pavers and then let them dry for a day or two. You can also purchase paints or sealants for your pavers to keep their colour vibrant and clean, and extend the longevity of the outdoor area. Refilling gravel or sand in between pavers or around your entertaining area will also keep it looking polished and fresh.

Stain or paint your deck

If your deck and railings are looking a bit dull or shabby, you may need to recoat them with either a stain or paint. When deciding on the colour and finish, it is important to consider the products previously used on the timber. Oil-based stains will sink into the timber and fade



away with time, as opposed to acrylic or water-based stains that sit on the surface and peel or flake away.

Preparation is key when restaining or painting a deck - the surface must be clean and stripped back of any previous product or dirt to ensure a pristine, lasting finish. Scrub or pressure clean your deck, or use a timber stripper to remove past products. The type of stain you use will determine the application method, but your local hardware experts will be able to advise you on the tools and techniques required to get your desired result.

Install an outdoor awning

Whether you're upgrading your existing awning or installing a completely new setup, outdoor blinds and awnings are

practical and attractive ways to maintain sun safety for your family and your outdoor area.


Replacing an existing awning will likely be more straightforward than installing a new one, as all you have to do is safely remove it, measure the size of the awning, decide on a colour, density and style, then purchase and install it.

If you are installing a brand new outdoor blind or awning, you may have a little more work on your hands. To begin, you should decide the style of awning or blind you'd like - it may be a fixed awning, or perhaps a retractable or roll-up blinds. You then need to measure the size of the space to be covered, and decide on a density of material for your



blind if it is a fabric blind, such as those available for purchase from Coolaroo. Depending on the thickness and density of the material, more or less light and UV rays will be able to get through.

You're then up for a trip to your local hardware store to select a colour and appropriate size of blind or awning, and all the required fittings and fixtures. It is likely that you'll need some power tools such as an impact driver or drill, so if you don't already own one, consider purchasing one or borrowing one from a friend or family member. The instructions included in the blinds should be fairly straightforward, and the blind company will often have a video-tutorial available should you face any difficulties.





What soil is good for roses?

MARCH is the time to prepare your garden beds for the planting of new roses, but before doing that, it's very important to know what type of soil you have.

1. Check the pH

Roses like a loam consistency that is free draining and has a pH of 6.5 – 7.

2. Sandy or Clay?

Just do this simple water holding test; dig a hole in your garden 30cm x 30cm x 30cm and fill with water.

You are aiming for the water to drain in approximately 15 minutes.

Any sooner and your soil is too sandy.

Any longer than 30 minutes and your soil is clay.

Sandy Soil; add organic matter like well-aged compost, manures and organic fertiliser, and water more regularly.

We recommend Rugosa Roses for coastal gardens.

Clay Soil; add Gypsum to the top of the soil and let soak down into the soil layers to improve drainage.

You will need to repeat it annually.

3. Acidic or Alkaline?

If your soil is too acidic – with pH lower than 6.5 - you will need to add lime or dolomite to your soil.

If it's too alkaline – with pH higher than 7.5 - you will need to add sulphur to your soil.

4. What else you need to add

If your garden bed doesn't need any alterations, then you can add well aged compost, bird or animal manure and Seamungus (plus watering) to increase the microbe activity in your soil.

By having the perfect environment for your rose, you are preparing for a successful root take with healthy growth and beautiful roses.

5. What to avoid

Do not build up your garden bed with Potting Mix!

Potting Mix is too airy and is not suitable for your garden bed – it should only go in pots.

Garden soil should only be in the garden and not used in pots as it is too heavy, holds too much water and you will never be able to get the rose out.





Tuna finally in news

FISHING

IT was a better-than-expected weekend which met anglers across the Limestone Coast recently and other than a bit of rain about the place, the fishing conditions were fabulous.

There was plenty caught from right around the South East.

It has been a long time coming but we finally have some tuna news.

Jase Fulham from Port MacDonnell Fishing Charters found a patch of 10-15kg fish for his clients on board on Saturday, which are the first fish caught locally and a nice addition to their bag of shark, terakhi and knifejaw to take home.

They backed it up with some more fish on Sunday of around the same size, so it is safe to say now that our Port MacDonnell tuna season has kicked off.

There has been plenty of bottom fish caught this week by the boaties offshore, so between gummy and school shark, snapper, nannygai and terakhi, there has been plenty to keep them busy.

Inshore we are still seeing fabulous numbers of snapper right along the coast and the size has been mixed, which is great to see.

Some boaties have been letting go 20 or more under size snapper before they find a legal one, so that just goes to show how healthy our snapper fishery really is down here.

Some of the bigger fish I have heard of this week have nudged the 60cm mark, with plenty between 50cm and 55cm boated.

There is plenty of other species knocking around in the same spots as the snaps, such as pike, salmon, whiting, squid and a few sharks,

so if you can get a bait through the snapper, you never know what might pop up next.

Speaking of whiting, we have had a dream season so far.

I know I keep banging on about how good they have been, but how good have they been?

Numbers, size, distribution - they are all excellent.

The fishing inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater has been fairly consistent for both land-based and boat anglers.

The boaties are fishing the Hammonds Drain area and to the east of the jetty, while land-based fishos are doing well off the Hammonds Drain spit and the jetty.

Other spots worth wetting a line are Carpenter Rocks, Blackfellows Caves and Racecourse Bay.

Gar have been in good supply yet again this week, with the usual haunts around Livingstons and Cape Douglas both producing nice fish.

As with the whiting, the waders and the boaties are sharing in the success and both the previously mentioned spots have great options.

Chunky gar we usually see in the cooler months are kicking around most places now, so getting a decent feed has not been too tricky at all.

As per the last few reports, there has been some good numbers of tommy ruff and mullet about in the same spots, so grab yourself a nice mixed bag of some of the best bread-and-butter fish we have on offer.

There have still been some great captures of squid this week, despite being so late in the season.

Livingstons is the pick for boaties locally,

but the Port MacDonnell jetty is still holding its own for the land-based guys.

Those north of us have done well on the Cape Jaffa jetty, or off Pinks Beach in Kingston out off the boats just drifting over the weed beds.

Old faithful black and white jigs have been the standouts for those I have spoken to, but I am sure other colours will be worth a crack.

The Glenelg River is starting to produce some better mulloway and more consistently.

I have heard of a handful of nice mulloway caught down in the township of Nelson from the bridge and lower.

The trollers in the putters have managed some nice fish around the poles area, while pilchard and squid are working under the bridge for the dead bait fishos.

The bream are in good numbers it seems and they are quite well spread out.

There are plenty of fish down on the sand flats of the estuary for the boaties and land-based, and they are eating soft plastics and baits nicely.

Up the river we are seeing some nice bream and perch caught on lures around the Donovans and Dry Creek areas, with diving minnows in most brands doing the trick.

The high reaches of Dartmoor and beyond have been fishing well for those in the know.

Matty Bell fished last week and landed a fish that lots of river fishos chase their whole lives - an Aussie bass over 50cm.

There are not a lot of bass in the Glenelg and even less over that 50cm mark, so to land one, on a top water lure - that is a mean feat.

The week ahead looks very fishable for the most part, so I am expecting a big report and plenty of pictures from these next few days.

Until next week, safe fishing.

MENINGIE greyhound trainer Tim Richards' outstanding run at Mount Gambier's Tara Raceway over the past 12 months continued last Sunday when He's All Purpose scored a dominant win in the 512-metre Carlin & Gazzard MG Summer Classic.

A year ago the Richards-trained Justice For All had scored a big win in the Summer Classic in race record time of 29.59 seconds.

He's All Purpose was just as impressive after rounding up tearaway leader Moth Rocks down the back straight and going on to an eight lengths win.

Filling the minor placings were Phil Lenehan's promising youngsters Moth Rocks and Lektra Rhino who worked home well in a time of 30.62 seconds on what was most definitely a rain-affected track.

By Aston Dee Bee out of Purpose Driven, a multiple 731 metres winner at Angle Park, He's All Purpose was picked up as a pup by Richards in a two-for-two rearing deal with Meningie breeder Cameron Butcher.

Whelped in February 2020, the black dog first drew attention to himself at Tara Raceway when winning a heat of the SA Country Cup (512m) last September in 29.69 seconds.

The following month he became the first Mount Gambier representative to win the restructured Country Cup at Angle Park on Adelaide Cup night when defeating Barbados Express and Sudden Force.

In November, Crush Your Enemy - also a winner last Sunday over 600 metres - won the time-honoured Newman McDonnell Memorial (512m).

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WHEN Penola-born Caitlin Jones headed to the Middle East last month, I am sure she never expected to make the impact she has already made.

The blonde-haired jockey originally went across to ride - and care for - two horses (Parsifal and He's A Balter) for the Will Clarcken stable in Dubai.

Recently Jones received a phone call from Saudi Arabia racing officials inviting her to compete in the International Jockeys Challenge at the Saudi Cup meeting at Riyadh last Friday night.

Not only did Jones compete (along with fellow Australian jockey Glen Boss and other leading world riders), she won the Challenge with a winner and a second from the four races.

Boss made a one-off return to the saddle after officially retiring last November.

"Will Clarcken gave me the all clear to go and it was less than a two hour flight to get there from Dubai," an ecstatic Jones told the media post race.

"It was a spectacular experience and definitely one of my greatest achievements as, apart from the trophy, there was a cash incentive of \$30,000.

"I doubt whether I will be bringing the trophy home on the plane, as it is so big that I will have to pay for excess luggage.

"As for the \$30,000, that will go towards my farm."

Jones has never lacked confidence when interviewed and her bubbly personality made her a magnificent ambassador for Australia on the night.

MIRACLE MILE START

Australia's premier sprint race for harness racing, the Group 1 Miracle Mile, will be run tomorrow night at Menangle (NSW).

It is an invitation race and local owners (and breeders) Des and Heather Glynn have every right to be over the moon with their pacer Majestic Cruiser making the final field.

Majestic Cruiser competed in the Inter Dominion series late last year (finishing sixth in the final) and has had three runs this current campaign for a first-up win (at Menangle), a seventh and a last-start second.

Then, last October following thirds in the Herbert Power handicap at Caulfield and the Geelong Cup, the Sue Murphy trained performer was denied a start in the Melbourne Cup due to injury.

Last Saturday, Hasta La War was an odds-on chance for the Lord Reims Stakes at Morphettville for his final run prior to the Adelaide Cup.

"Sue inspected him on Saturday morning, could see he was not right and scratched him straight away," part owner Ron Brighton stated on Monday.

"A subsequent vet inspection has revealed he has done a tendon, not the same one as before, and it will mean another 12 months off the scene."

Hasta La War has had only 20 starts for seven wins and six placings, and will be a seven-year-old when he returns to racing

It has resulted in a spin-off for the non-tab clubs of Ceduna and Lock at their recent meetings with above average field sizes.

Bilney sends message

THREE-TIME winner Darren Bilney may not have shot the best score of the day, but he certainly sent a message to the rest of the hopefuls in the first round of qualifying for The Barn Club Championship at the Mount Gambier Golf Club on Saturday.

After missing last year's event, Bilney was satisfied with his round of two-over par 74, one behind Kevin Cook who unfortunately could not nominate for the event because he will not be here for round two of qualifying this weekend.

With the top eight players after the two rounds set to move through to the match-play phase of the competition, Bilney said his strategy was about just trying to get through rather than trying to shoot three-or-four under par first up.

"I'll start thinking about it a bit more seriously once I get through qualifying," he said matter-of-factly.

On Saturday he found himself in at least half-a-dozen bunkers, although he did manage to get up-and-down from three of them.

He actually did even better than that on the par-five 15th, holing his shot from the green-side bunker for an eagle to get his round back on track after a disastrous double-bogey six on the par-four 13th.

After missing the fairway right, his approach shot over trees finished just short of the green, but he needed another four to get down.

That compounded bogeys on both of the par-threes on the back nine - the 10th and 16th - each time finding the bunker off the tee and ending up with fours.

He ended up shooting 38 on the back nine, two worse than his even-par 36 on the front nine.

His round began with a regulation birdie on the par-five first hole, electing to play safe with a three-iron off the tee, followed by a six-iron onto the green and two putts.

He gave that shot back after bogeying the par-four third, but picked up a second birdie

for the day on the par-four fourth hole when he bombed his drive to about 20m short of the green and had no trouble getting up-and-down for three.

Also well placed after the opening round of qualifying were Nic Moretti and Richard Gosling who both shot 75s, while last year's finalists Hayden Schroder and Setio Prajogo-Shanahan were just one shot back with 76 apiece.

In A Reserve it was Bryan Pink who fired a round of 79 to sit three strokes clear of Moryn Sullivan and Stephen Easterbrook.

The big surprises in that grade were the scores turned in by big hitters Matthew Bowering (92) and Jason Mann (99) who will need to shoot super rounds this week to make it through qualifying.

In B Grade it was recent winner Matt McCallum who topped the scoresheet with an 86, two shots clear of Ian Ewert, Levi Morton and Jon Clayton.

Rob McLellan led the way in C Grade with a 92, one shot ahead of Kev Lennon with Nicholas Morony one further back on 94.

In D Grade in was youngster Zac Shanks who shot a terrific 90 off his 24 handicap, a score that would have seen him not only lead the way in C Grade, but also sit comfortably in the top eight in B Grade.

Meanwhile last Thursday's stableford competition was taken out by Dane Handreck who signed for 44 points to spread-eagle the field and win by five points.

Coincidentally his only other win since taking up the game last year came in July when he also signed for 44 points, that time finishing seven clear of his nearest opposition.

This time he split his round 23/21, the highlight for the day being a four-point birdie on the par-four ninth hole and his only blemish being a wipe on the par-five 15th.

Runner-up was David Pike on 39 points, while Peter Ewer, the previous week's winner, came in with 38 despite wiping the eighth and 11th holes.

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Great weekend of racing

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THE Borderline Speedway has for many years held the reputation of one of the best oval tracks in the country, previously awarded such and loved by many visiting drivers.

Of course the main attraction was the racing which produced in spades.

High speeds were regularly recorded through all classes, with some standout performances such as youngster Roc Hughes.

Cooper said from the feedback she had received, the Borderline Speedway would rate in the top five tracks in the country for the karts.

"Everyone is asking when we are coming back," she said.

"They have asked if we can have all our Australian titles there or other events.

More locally Borderline Speedway president Cary Jennings was just as pleased with the weekend.

Mixed bag at Phillip Island

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FURNER motorcycle racer Dallas Skeer kicked off his Australian Superbike season with mixed results at Phillip Island on the weekend.

Having changed from his usual Suzuki to a Yamaha to contest the 600 Supersport category and on a track which has not been among his favourites, it was a steep learning curve for the young racer.

A big positive was his pace straight away on the new machine, which resulted in a sixth place for the opening race.

The negative for the weekend was a mechanical DNF in the second race after a struggle to get the Yamaha off the line, resulting in a burnt out clutch and a retirement.

In the end he finished in 14th place overall for the round, with a few things to work on before the next outing at Queensland Raceway.

Despite the DNF, Skeer said he was pleased with the performance of the bike.

"I had the pace to be in the mix for fourth or fifth in the first race," he said.

"In a last lap-battle I came sixth by point one of a second."

A poor start saw Skeer held up by backmarkers before he could work his way to a more competitive position on track.

He said the Yamaha was a lot harder to get off the line than his old Suzuki, which resulted in the mechanical issue in the second race.

However, he said the performance of the bike was impressive, which he was able adjust to and utilise to set his fastest time around the iconic Phillip Island circuit.

"I'm pretty at home with the bike now," Skeer said.

"It is noticeably quicker out of the corners which is what we needed from Suzuki and couldn't get.

"It is set up well and I can't fault anything on it really.

"We have had a few dramas with the clutch and need to get that sorted but other than that I feel at home."

It was just the fifth time Skeer had ridden the bike.

He had previously taken it to Tailem Bend, then onto McNamara Park for practice, along with a test at Phillip Island before the opening round.

He said he felt comfortable on the bike after his first ride at Tailem Bend, then was close to lap-record time at McNamara Park.

As a result Skeer managed to shave half a second off his previous best time at Phillip Island, an impressive feat considering the nature of the circuit.

It is certainly not for the faint-hearted, with some exciting sections of track designed for those who have the confidence to push their machinery to the limit.

Skeer said he now has that confidence to push hard on the fast sections where he previously struggled.

"I used to struggle to put the Suzuki where I wanted," he said.

"I was always running wide at Phillip Island, couldn't get the apex and struggled to hold the right line.

"The Yamaha holds its line well and I can put it where I want.

"It is quite responsive to what I do on the bike, especially in the change of direction.

"I was able to fully commit to the corners ... turn one you are down one gear from 260kph and tip in.

"You are still tucked in as you tip in and go down a gear, then roll back on it and flat in fifth.

"You have to commit and I had plenty of confidence in the bike and the Pirelli tyres."

Another issue Skeer faced was the extra power of the Yamaha, which resulted in rear grip issues.

However, he said all other riders had similar issues, which he would simply have to come to terms with.

"I never had grip issues with the Suzuki but the Yamaha is doing 500 revs more and pulling harder," he said.

"It wanted to spin the rear up a bit easier which was a challenge, because at Phillip Island you have to get on it hard to get a good run out of the corners.

"The biggest one was out of Siberia.

"Getting good runs around there at the back of the track is where you can lose time if you

don't get on the throttle early enough.

"Getting on the throttle half a second earlier means you can gain a second in time.

"There is no other track in Australia like it ... it is all about getting that run."

Clearly, on a new bike and at a track he has never felt comfortable, Skeer was always going to face some issues.

However, he said now he feels far more comfortable at the circuit and looks forward to another run there later in the season.

"I felt the most comfortable I ever have around there," Skeer said.

"It is the first time I have felt confident all the way around the track.

"For example, turn three you are flat in fifth gear and tip in, so it is good to have that confidence.

"I am coming to terms with it more which I have to, so hopefully when we go back there after more development with the bike we can drop another second and be right in the mix."

Skeer faces further challenges in the next round, with a run at Queensland Raceway, a circuit he has never raced on.

However, with the extra performance of the Yamaha he is confident of a strong finish, despite the DNF on the weekend.

"I didn't have the pace to battle for the win which is where I want to be," Skeer said.

"Coming into Phillip Island I knew I would struggle but the shorter tracks for the rest of the year should be good.

"On the podium for the championship is where we want to be.


"Ideally it would be good to win this year and go back-to-back next year in the Supersport class but we haven't got off to the best start.

"It is a bit frustrating because I used to get good starts and make up a few positions off the line but now I'm losing a couple of spots.

"But we will get that sorted and come back fighting at Queensland."

The All Star Series heads to Mount Gambier on the back of four weekends straight through Victoria and New South Wales.


"Mount Gambier has always been one of our favourite tracks and after missing out running there last season due to Covid, we are rapt to be back," promoter Mandy Searle said.
