## Lining up to vote

EARLY and postal voting this year has increased across the State, with at least 20 per cent of people in the Limestone Coast opting not to vote in person on election day.

Statistics collected but the South Australian Electoral Commission (SAEC) indicate as of last Saturday 4910 early votes had been lodged in Mount Gambier, and 1901 for MacKillop.

At the same point in time, 1689 postal vote applications had been lodged in Mount Gambier, and 3595 in MacKillop with no postal votes yet returned.

# Show me the money

IF the major parties want Independent MP Troy Bell's support to form a minority government, they will have to strike a deal with the MP worth \$100m for the seat of

Mount Gambier and at this stage Labor is the only party to have made the pledges which could make it a front-runner to secure his support.

When the Mount Gambier MP was asked by The Border Watch this week if he had done any deals with any of the major parties, he

said: "absolutely not - there's no deal."

Dubbed as a possible 'Kingmaker' if re-elected, Mr Bell may be called upon to decide which party will form government if neither of the major parties wins the majority of seats in Parliament after the State election tomorrow.

Mr Bell said while he has not spoken to any of the major parties about a deal to secure his support, the former Liberal has not ruled out supporting Labor.

On forming a possible alliance with Labor, Mr Bell said: "It will be difficult."

# Bell: no deal in place

Admitting that it would be difficult for him to gain wide-spread community endorsement to anoint Peter Malinauskas as the next South Australian Premier, Mr Bell said he wants the best outcome for the electorate of Mount Gambier.

“My natural allegiance is perhaps towards the Liberal Party but what I will say is that I will deliver the best deal I possibly can for this community,” Mr Bell said.

He said he was seeking commitments from both major parties in the lead-up to election day.

“I want to assure readers that I will negotiate the best deal I possibly can for my community before and after the election on Saturday.”

Mr Bell referred to his ‘Future Mount Gambier’ document which he released in August last year.

The document contains his wish list for the seat of Mount Gambier, seeking more than \$100m to achieve aims outlined in the document.

During the election campaign, the Labor Party has committed almost \$100m in funding to the seat of Mount Gambier while the Liberal Party has not announced any new future funding commitments for the seat.

Big ticket items promised by Labor include: a \$35m technical college, \$24m for health services and a further \$24m for forestry.

Labor Leader Peter Malinauskas has visited Mount Gambier twice during the official election period while Premier Steven Marshall visited the neighbouring seat of MacKillop travelling to Coonawarra.

Last month, Primary Industries Minister David Basham visited the city and announced \$2.7m for the Mount Gambier saleyards but said: “This is not an election promise, the funding is already in the budget to be spent so

it is money that is there”.

In an open letter to the Premier this week, Mr Bell said: “If you think a \$2.7m election commitment is going to cut it for the State’s second largest city, then I think you have underestimated the intelligence of my community.”

“If you are hedging your bets and think that you can promise next to nothing and then come calling after the election to secure my support, then you have seriously underesti-

mated my intelligence.”

He called on the Premier to at least match the Labor Party’s commitment to Mount Gambier.

“In total, close to \$100m [has been] promised to the seat of Mount Gambier [from Labor] versus your party [Liberal] \$2.7m.”

He said: “Come on Steven the clock is ticking” and concluded the letter with “Tick, Tock”.

# Early votes

For Mount Gambier, postal and early votes are accounting for just under 22 per cent of the total votes already, and 21 per cent of votes in MacKillop.

The high turnout of early voters means many people in the electorate have made candidate decisions prior to some announcements being made by political candidates.

A representative from the SAEC said early voting and postal vote numbers Statewide are already higher than the 2018 election.

“For early voting, we are seeing a rate of approximately double compared to the 2018 State Election,” the SAEC representative said.

“There was 120,468 early votes undertaken in the 2018 State Election and there’s been 86,728 early votes to date this election.

“And 149, 670 postal vote applications have been received so far – that compares to 80,000 applications in 2018.”

# Labor's cray pot promise

ON the eve of the State election, Labor has pledged to slash crayfish licence fees for commercial fishermen if the party is elected tomorrow.

The industry has been significantly impacted since the start of the pandemic by ongoing Chinese imposed trade sanctions, previously their biggest market, and to help ease pressures, Labor has promised to halve fees for the next year.

Beachport fisherman Craig 'Slim' Reilly said the election pledge would be welcomed by the crayfishing community.

"I think it will be a fantastic thing to take a bit of pressure off," Mr Reilly said.

"It would be well received for sure."

While Mr Reilly leases his crayfishing licence, he said the drop-in fees would hopefully have a flow-on effect for others in the industry.

"I pay for it in one-way, shape or form through the lease," Mr Reilly said.

"We always seem to be having to pay this and pay that and never get anything on the other end of it, especially the way things have been."

Based on current Rock Lobster Cost Recovery Statements for 2021-22, this will save the industry just under \$2.6 million in 2022-23.

SA Labor Leader Peter Malinauskas said the industry has not been well supported over the past two years.

"This fee relief will come at a critical time for an industry still struggling to deal with the double impacts of Covid and the Chinese trade bans," Mr Malinauskas said.

"This relief will buy them time to develop new markets that are prepared to pay top dollar for our premium local produce."

Shadow Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development and Mount Gambier MLC Clare Scriven said the cut in fees would help provide some relief.

"The industry has told us that the hefty licence fees they face at a time the industry is being impacted by trade sanctions is not sustainable and Labor has listened," Ms Scriven said.

"It is hardly the fault of our highly regarded local industry that they have been suddenly caught up in a trade spat between national Governments.

"This fee relief for one year will buy time for them to develop other markets, and the review of cost recovery will ensure that fees are sustainable for the industry going forward."

# High Court allows Bell trial

IN an untimely blow to Independent Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell's election campaign, Australia's High Court is allowing legal proceedings against the MP to progress.

In the High Court, Mr Bell's legal team argued that the Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC) had acted outside its powers in investigating and referring matters to the South Australian Director for Public Prosecutions (DPP).

The matter at hand is related to allegations that Mr Bell had misappropriated funds when working at an independent

learning centre, prior to entering Parliament.

As a result of an undertaking by the DPP to the High Court, the DPP has agreed that the ICAC will not have any further involvement in the trial.

In a statement earlier this week Mr Bell said: "I'm delighted with the comments made by the High Court today.

"The High court has made it plain that every prosecution needs to be investigated by police and not the ICAC.

"It's not just a victory for me but for all those that have been subject to the ICAC.

"From the outset I have been concerned about the manner in which I have been investigated and prosecuted.

"The High Court today has confirmed that I was investigated unfairly.

"By extracting the undertaking from the Director of Public Prosecutions that the High Court secured, no one will again be investigated in the way I was."

In December Mr Bell was also charged with alleged deception regarding country member allowance claims, of which he denies any wrong doing.

# Man charged with murder

MILLICENT man, Cody Edwards, 25, appeared in court on Tuesday charged with murder following the death of a 26-year-old mother, Synamin Bell, in a domestic incident in Millicent last Saturday night.

Now in custody, Edwards appeared in the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court via an on-line video link for one count of murder.

Edwards did not apply for bail.

Police prosecutors sought a long period of time before the next court date to collate all the evidence, which they indicated included fingerprints, DNA, blood splatter, shoe marks and mobile phone evidence.

A court date was set for December 19 at the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court.

The incident occurred at a house in Poole Street, Millicent, and both Ms Bell and Edwards were from Millicent.

Police allege that just after 11pm on Saturday, patrols were called to the house after reports of an assault.

Officer in charge of Limestone Coast Police, Superintendent Campbell Hill told a press conference on Sunday that police called to the incident apprehended Edwards outside the house and arrested him before entering the house where they discovered Ms Bell's body.

Edwards was taken to Mount Gambier Police Station following his arrest to be interviewed by detectives and he was subsequently charged with murder.

Supt Hill said Major Crime detectives and forensic officers flew from Adelaide on Sunday morning, and the house where the incident occurred would be the focus of their investigations for a number of days.

He said Edwards and Ms Bell were known to one another but he would not confirm what their relationship was.

The cause of death of Ms Bell, or other details of the murder, was also not revealed except to say some evidence had been seized for further analysis.

"Out of respect for the families involved I am not going to go into detail at this stage," said Supt Hill.

"Police have to piece together the chronology of how this has occurred... we have to pull together all the evidence," he said.

"We understand there are people who may have been contacted by the accused in relation to this and we appeal to anyone who has any information in relation to either the accused male or deceased female in relation to this matter to contact Crimestoppers or police.

"We are keen to build that picture in terms of the nature of the relationship between these two people and certainly build more of a picture of what happened leading up to the events of last night [Saturday].

"There are impacted family and friends of the victim and likewise the accused also has family and friends also working through processing this as well," Supt Hill said revealing that the woman was the mother of an undisclosed number of small children who were not at the Poole Street house at the time of the incident.

"This is a tragic circumstance... a shocking situation... it will have an impact on this small town.

"It has reverberated across the town and Limestone Coast this morning [Sunday].

"We have a group of people who are now working through the shock and grief of what has occurred.

"Our thoughts go out to the family... it is a tragedy... it is devastating.

"It is one of the gut-wrenching parts knowing that there are children waking up this morning [Sunday], and their mother has died."

# Fuel prices tipped to climb

WITH fuel prices sky-rocketing above \$2 a litre, locals say they are feeling the pinch.

International pressure from Russia's war on Ukraine has put pressure on oil prices worldwide, and the Limestone Coast is starting to feel the pinch.

Local resident Marion Keillor said prices had been "horrible".

"We live 21 kilometres out of town, and we do not get rebates or anything on it," Ms Keillor said.

"It is a big expense at the moment, and living where we do we have no choice but to drive everywhere."

Raelene Grills said she was worried about the high cost of fuel making other items more expensive.

"Prices are absolutely ridiculous," Ms Grills said.

"I am only on a pension, so small changes make a big difference."

Fuel prices in Mount Gambier are currently more than 20 cents per litre lower than prices in Adelaide, but the RAA has warned prices here may start to match those in metropolitan areas.

Fuel expert and RAA Senior Manager of Mobility and Automotive Policy, Mark Borlace, said now is the time to buy before it goes higher.

"My advice would be that everyone should be filling up now," Mr Borlace said.

"There is probably going to be some more price pressure over the next two or three weeks."

As at Wednesday, unleaded 91 fuel prices in Adelaide averaged at about \$2.21 per litre, \$2.06 in Mount Gambier, \$2.10 in Penola.

When fuel prices rise Mr Borlace said it affects those in the regions more than those in Adelaide.

"Regional people get hit a bit harder, as on average they travel an extra 15 per cent in distance each year, just from the nature of living in the regions," Mr Borlace said.

"If you have two cars in your driveway, then petrol is probably the biggest energy bill in the house."

"To see that bill double in the last 12 months has got to be a hit on everybody."

"It is important that people still use an app to find the best fuel prices in Mount Gambier, as we are still seeing a four or five-cent difference in the market."

While prices are hard to predict, Mr Borlace said that the community should get a clearer picture of ongoing prices.

"In the next two or three weeks we will start to see some of the longer-term effects," he said.

"A couple of things come into play, once oil gets over \$80 a barrel, there are some oil fields in the world that become profitable."

"They may be able to fill in that supply gap."

"There could also be a reaction, people will start using their cars less."

Mr Borlace said it was a good time to be an electric car owner.

"The only benefit to this is that maybe it will accelerate the uptake of electric vehicles, as running costs would not have increased for them," Mr Borlace said.

However, even electric car owners will start to experience some flow on effects soon, as airlines and supermarkets are expected to pass increased costs onto consumers.

## No city visit by Premier

PREMIER Steven Marshall did not travel an extra 50kms to visit Mount Gambier while in the Limestone Coast recently.

Mr Marshall visited the MacKillop electorate, mainly in the Naracoorte and Coonawarra regions.

Accompanied by Member for MacKillop Nick McBride, Mr Marshall attended a clearing sale at Glenroy, Coomandook Area School and the Coonawarra region.

Mount Gambier Liberal candidate Ben Hood defended the Premier not visiting Mount Gambier, stating he had prior commitments back in Adelaide.

Questioned at a recent candidates debate in Mount Gambier, Mr Hood said he welcomed the Premier to visit Mount Gambier in the future.

"He [the Premier] apologised he could not make it to Mount Gambier this time as he did have pressing engagements in Adelaide he needed to get back to," Mr Hood said.

"Every time I speak to the Premier I extend the invitation to come to Mount Gambier." Mr Marshall has visited the region about four times during his term with the most recent being last October.

Leader of the Opposition, Peter Malinauskas has visited the region about eight times over four years.

# Holden on to the dream

MOUNT Gambier's Holdens of Age Car Club has two new life members.

Don 'Poppa' Lockwood and Bronwyn Johnston were recently presented with life memberships by club President Roger Johnston assisted by Vice President and life member David Johnston along with club member Leni Buhse who travelled from Adelaide especially for the occasion.

It was Mr Buhse who first introduced Mr Lockwood to the club after he purchased his 1954 FJ Holden from a local police officer in 2007.

A retired mechanic, Mr Lockwood said he had been looking for an FJ as a project car for awhile because he had fond memories growing up with one in Mount Gambier.

A self confessed 'bit of a lad' back then, Mr Lockwood said he'd had a couple of bingles with his FJ from his younger years, including rolling it, but he'd long wanted to own another.

Local knowledge led him to a 'barn find' with the car stored unused in a shed for a number of years.

"Everything was on it, nothing was missing, it was a complete car," said Mr Lockwood.

Having purchased the car, he was looking for guidance as to how to restore it and Mr Buhse led him towards the Holdens of Age Car Club and eight years later Mr Lockwood completed the restoration and customisation of his FJ driving it for the first time on the road on Australia Day 2015.

Mr Lockwood painted his car blue to remind him of the FJ from his youth and it soon took on the name of Smurf as the shade of blue reflects that of the blue comic character of that name from the 1980's.

"Poppa Smurf is the name of the car but it

sort of rubbed off onto me so people call me Poppa now too," said Mr Lockwood.

Mr Lockwood's life membership recognised his continued participation and attendance at local and away club event with his car seen at many car displays, along with Don's co-driver Bob Widdison.

The latest event the pair attended in the blue FJ was at Horsham and Minyip in Victoria last weekend.

Mr Lockwood said the car prompts much

admiration and many stories of FJ's from reminiscing older people.

"It makes me happy when Bob and I see the smile on people's faces," Mr Lockwood said.

Bronwyn Johnston joined the Holdens of Age Club in 2003 as the girlfriend of her now husband, David, after the pair met at a Holden event in Shepparton.

She became a member in her own right in 2007 and has attended most meetings since.

Currently serving as the club's treasurer, a

position she has held for 10 years, she has previously served as assistant treasurer and club captain.

Formed in April 1999, the Mount Gambier Holdens of Age Car Club is for Holden vehicles that are at least 21 years old.

With nearly every model of old Holden represented among its membership of about 48, the club meets at 7.30pm on the last Wednesday of each month at the South Aussie Hotel and club runs are also held once a month.

## Lift in patient transport scheme funding

ACCOMMODATION rebates should be improved under the Patient Assistance Transport Scheme (PATS) according to a Mount Gambier resident who received a rebate of just \$44 after spending \$2000 on accommodation in Adelaide following a kidney transplant.

Transplant recipient Danielle Horton spent two weeks in Adelaide's central business district after receiving the transplant due to needing daily medical check-ups but was only eligible for a rebate on one night of her accommodation due to her specialist not filling out a section on a form.

She now has to reapply for the full rebate.

Under the current scheme, accommodation rebates are \$44 per approved night or \$88 if an approved carer is with the patient.

Travel costs are also included in the rebate system with patients currently able to receive 16 cents per kilometre.

The Liberal State Government has recent-

ly announced, if re-elected, it would double the rate to 32 cents per kilometre.

Ms Horton said despite the announcement being a positive for patients using the system, more needed to be done to support

people in need.

"I have been using PATS on my health journey, especially since I have had dialysis and the transplant," Ms Horton said.

"I had to use it more then because of all the travel and accommodation as after my transplant I wasn't able to drive for six weeks and a lot of the time we had to stay close to the hospital in Adelaide for further tests."

She said, despite needing the service, her recent encounter did not end positively with her being rejected for carers payments and accommodation.

"This is because my specialist forgot to tick one box that said I needed a carer," Ms Horton said.

"I even pleaded with them in an email asking if I could get the rebate but it was denied again."

Left feeling angry and disappointed with the scheme, she said the real cost came down to accommodation rather than fuel.

"On the pricing of \$44 per night, if approved, the only thing we would be able to afford is a backpacker which is not ideal after a transplant," Ms Horton said.

Minister for Health Stephen Wade said although there had been no changes to the accommodation rebate of PATS, cheap accommodation charities such as the Cancer Centre and others were available for patients.

"These services provide contemporary accommodation for those travelling but also provide support services for those in need," Mr Wade said.

"As for other health issues outside cancer there are a number of non-governmental organisations which provide city-based accommodations for others.

"We appreciate that PATS does not cover everything for all patients travelling and ensure we continue to supply services in the country so more patients can get those services closer to home."

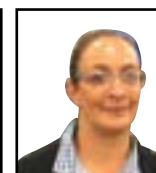

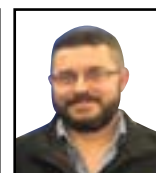

# Residents call for bus help

CURRENT local bus services are not fit for service, according to community groups in Mount Gambier.

The bus network operates three major routes, with an additional city centre line on weekends.

However, a lack of weekend buses as well as gaps in coverage has made it difficult for residents to easily access bus services.

Terry Walters, chairman of the residents' committee at Hallmont Estate said many of the elderly residents do not drive and are left with few transport options.

"Our nearest bus stop is about 800 metres away; it is too far for most people at Hallmont," Mr Walters said.

"We have our own minibus for residents, which I help with, and we take people into town twice a week because people have no other options."

The minibus required the residents' committee to raise funds that would have otherwise been used on improvements to the estate.

"The bus we bought is a newer one, and we had to spend over \$30,000 on it," Mr Walters said.

"It is all volunteer-run, but there is only a limited pool of people who can help us with it."

Migrant Resource Centre Mount Gambier manager Anelia Blackie said large gaps in the bus network included some of the more affordable housing areas, resulting in newly settled refugees being forced into more expensive housing so they can attend mandatory English language classes.

"Because of the limitations with public transport, we are basically forced to put peo-

ple in the area around TAFE because they cannot get there from the other side of town," Ms Blackie said.

"The eastern side of town is more affordable for them, but they will not be able to get to where they need to go."

Ms Blackie said the bus service can be difficult for new residents to navigate, especially newly settled refugees, with confusing loops and unreliable timings.

"Imagine you come to a country where you cannot speak English, and you cannot read maps," Ms Blackie said.

"What we do is go to a family's house and a bilingual worker who can speak their language

will go with them to walk to the bus station, get on the bus, and we show them how to take up to three busses they may need on the trip."

Ms Blackie said the government should be looking into on-demand bus services, such as in Mount Barker or the Barossa, to implement in Mount Gambier.

For local resident Paul Manfrin, who is vision impaired, the lack of decent public transport is incredibly frustrating.

"Bus services haven't changed here for 30 years, even though the city has obviously expanded over the decades," Mr Manfrin said.

"I rely on public transport to get myself to and from work because it is extremely impor-

tant for me to maintain my independence as much as I can, but it is really challenging with such an inadequate bus service."

South Australia's peak bus and coach industry association, Bus SA is urgently calling for increased funding for bus services.

An independent report created by the Institute of Transport and Logistics Studies investigated the regional public transport spend in each state of Australia and found residents in regional SA who rely completely on bus services are among some of the most poorly serviced anywhere in Australia.

Bus SA spokesperson Jared Kent said the report clearly showed that South Australia's regions don't enjoy even the most basic of regular, accessible bus services people need to allow them to plan their working and social lives with certainty, or the freedom of access that their city counterparts have.

Mr Kent said compared to other states around Australia, the current spend per capita in regional South Australia is woefully inadequate.

"For example, if you look at the per capita regional spend in New South Wales it's \$439 per head and in Western Australia it is \$133 per head. And yet, in regional SA our current spend is a paltry \$40 per head," Mr Kent said.

"Looking closer to home, the difference in the spend between metro Adelaide and regional South Australia is staggering with \$273 per head for metro and just \$40 for regional SA.

"That's a huge discrepancy.

"Currently, we have the ridiculous situation in Mount Gambier for example, where despite the fact that it is the second largest city in South Australia, the bus services only run in one direction, over a very limited footprint with absolutely no services on the weekend.

"How usable is that?"

## 5G coming to Nangwarry

NANGWARRY will soon have 5G, but Penola has been left waiting.

Telstra has confirmed plans to connect Nangwarry in the coming months to 5G, the current fastest mobile coverage that can outpace some NBN connections.

While Telstra has already made 5G available in Mount Gambier, Millicent, Naracoorte, Robe, Kingston, Keith and Bordertown, the company has been unable to give a timeframe for when it will be rolled out in Penola.

Telstra's national public affairs manager Chris Marks said decisions on 5G rollouts are made with more considerations than just population.

"A number of different factors are taken into account when planning site upgrades," Mr Marks said.

"These include what technology is currently in place, the number of mobile sites serving an area, site usage and load, build complexity and other site build schedules amongst other things.

"Telstra plans its national build schedule in two-month increments and any future upgrades to Penola, Beachport or Southend have not yet been planned."

The 5G rollout first started in 2019, but

regional areas have had to wait longer to get coverage.

Coverage is only focussed on townships due to the short ranged-nature of 5G, with 4G still the main connection option when on the road.

Wattle Range council Mayor Des Noll said he welcomed any increase in service to the area.

"In today's world of communication, it is no longer a luxury to have complete service coverage, it is an essential requirement," Mr Noll said.

"Customers in the Wattle Range Council area, such as Nangwarry, and other rural communities rely on communication services for their businesses, emergency situations, employment and keeping in contact with family."

Mr Noll said he hoped Penola, Beachport and Southend would be looked at for coverage soon.

"This service must be provided to all communities within the Wattle Range Council area and beyond at the earliest opportunity," Mr Noll said.

"I look forward to Telstra continuing to upgrade and introduce new services that will benefit our communities."

## Trees to be removed

DESPITE some community opposition, cypress trees in a row along Clarke Street in Penola will be removed and replaced by new advanced tree plantings, possibly in commemoration of Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee this year.

The decision was made at Wattle Range Council's monthly meeting last week when elected members considered the results of community consultation about the proposal.

Removing the row of cypress trees was proposed as part of developing parklands in that area as a start point for the Penola/Coonawarra Rail Trail which is under construction.

Community consultation about removing the trees resulted in 14 comments; six of them in favour of removing the trees, eight of them against the proposal.

A report tabled at the council meeting outlined the public comments received with those in favour of removing the trees looking forward to the area being enhanced.

Some described the trees as "an eyesore and a danger of falling on vehicles or people".

Comments supporting the retention of the trees described them as a good windbreak and a visual screen of a nearby industrial estate, and believed they still had plenty of life left in them and could be enhanced if cared for.

Cr Dean Burrows advocated keeping the trees and maintaining them to enhance their appearance.

"Pruning and trimming these trees would make them more attractive," he said adding that he had heard that removing some cypress trees in a row was successful in allowing the remaining trees to thrive.

"I think the best option would be to knock them over and plant anew with some advanced trees," Cr Kevin McGrath said.

"There used to be similar trees in Beachport and it really opened the streetscape when they were cut down."

While Cr Chris Brodie said he had been a part of thinning out cypress trees successfully in the past, he believed removing the cypress trees would enhance other trees on the site.

"My viewpoint has been to get rid of these because there are two beautiful plane trees there," he said.

"Take the trees down and make a really classy show there," said Cr John Drew adding that advanced trees could be planted that would become established quickly, a sentiment echoed by Cr Peter Dunicliff.

"If they come down and we planted trees on there it would look so much better... beauty

is in the eye of the beholder but I think Cypress are a weed, a better quality tree would enhance the area," Cr Dunicliff said.

With an earlier discussion mentioning a fund available for trees to be planted to commemorate the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, Cr Dale Price suggested the parklands might provide the opportunity to tap into the fund.

"There is a real opportunity to have a great park setting by getting some advanced trees in there," he said.

Chief executive officer Ben Gower said the tree planting fund for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee was a Federal Government program offering between \$2,500 and \$20,000 per project and he suggested he could begin the process through MP for Barker, Tony Pasin.

However, Cr Deb Agnew was concerned that, while the number of responses during the community consultation on the subject were low and that the difference between for and against was only two, that the majority was not being listened to.

"We ask a question and then we don't like the answer," she said.

"The majority wanted to keep the trees," Cr Burrow said agreeing with Cr Agnew.

The eventual vote on a motion to remove the cypress trees and replace them with new trees was taken on a show of hands.

However, the result was unclear to the extent that a division was called which requires councillors to have their names recorded in minutes as to which way they voted.

Crs Brodie, Drew, Dunicliff, McGrath, Muhovics and Price voted for the motion.

Crs Agnew, Burrows, Cox and Neagle voted against.

## Land use plan comments end

Drafted by Adelaide planning consultants, Holmes Dyer, the report remains open for public comment until 5pm next Wednesday.

Holmes Dyer representatives said the report sets out some key ideas on how the Wattle Range region should develop, whether it be future land use, environmental protection, or community infrastructure and services such as walking and cycling facilities, parks, health-care or education.

"We spoke to around 60 people across the four sessions in Millicent, Penola and Beachport," Stephen Holmes of Holmes Dyer said.

"This has really helped us to build a picture of what areas we need to examine more closely in the next phase where we prepare a draft report."

Mr Holmes encouraged landowners and residents to provide their thoughts on the Opportunities and Constraints report, to ensure it is based on sound information.

"We remain keen to hear from the community and encourage everyone to either complete the survey on the council website, or to email us directly at engagement@holmesdyer.com.au if they have any questions," Stephen said.

After the close of this phase of community consultation next Wednesday, feedback received will be presented in the draft 25-Year Strategic Land Use Plan, which council will seek further comment and input on from the community before it is adopted.

# Libs attack Labor plan

THE Liberal Party has hit back at Labor's forestry policy by highlighting what it had done in the past four years while in government.

Forestry Minister David Basham said the Liberal Government had always recognised the importance of the forest and wood products sector, "Which is why we have invested more than \$50 million towards the industry

since coming to government and delivered on our election commitment to establish the Forest Industry Advisory Council of South Australia (FIACSA).

"This is in stark contrast to SA Labor who sold off and sold out the forestry industry in the South East," Mr Basham said.

"They've also wasted the industry's time by conducting a parliamentary inquiry which received 33 submissions and interviewed more than 40 people to return a report with just one recommendation – to re-establish the committee under the new parliament.

"I welcome Labor's new found interest in South Australia's forestry sector but their election commitments pale in comparison to what the Marshall Liberal Government has delivered and in fact replicates much of what we've already done."

He said South Australia's \$2.3b forest and wood products sector is an important economic driver for the state, particularly in the Green Triangle region which is one of Australia's premier softwood timber producing regions.

"As South Australia continues its strong economic recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic the forestry and wood product industries will play a key role in driving growth and creating jobs," Mr Basham said.

"We will continue to work with the industry to achieve this, our Wood Encouragement Policy is currently out for targeted consultation, we are investing to expand farm forestry across the State and look forward to working with landholders in the South East to take part in our inaugural \$1 million Carbon Farming pilot program."

## Factory concern raised

GRANT District Council has had a special meeting to discuss the possible impacts of a pellet plant planned to be built near the Mount Gambier airport.

The special council meeting, requested by Grant Mayor Richard Sage, directly followed the regular council meeting last week.

Mr Sage raised concerns about what the planned Altus Pellet Plant could mean for any future expansion of the Mount Gambier Airport, which is managed by the council.

Initial communication between the council and the State Commission Assessment Panel indicated that the panel had not referred to the Civic Aviation Safety Authority (CASA) during the development application process on the plant.

Although there are no current expansion plans for the Mount Gambier Airport, Mr Sage wanted to further investigate if the pellet plant's establishment could limit any expansions of the airport facilities into the future.

Council chief executive Darryl Whicker indicated that contact had already been made with the relevant authorities to ensure these questions would be answered.

Mr Whicker also indicated he would request in writing confirmation from the pellet plant owners that there would be no environmental impacts from the plant.

# Work starts at Tenison

CONSTRUCTION of a new junior school is underway at Tenison Woods College.

Earth works have begun on the two-storey centre which is expected to be completed in time for the 2023 school year and will be occupied by students from Years 1 to 6.

The \$16 million build will complete the college's MacKillop Junior School Learning Com-

munity after a new Reception space was occupied by students and staff at the beginning of last year.

Using local sub-contractors, Adelaide based Edge Architects and Mossop Construction and Interiors built the new Reception space and are also responsible for the construction of the new facility now taking shape on the school grounds.

The new building will feature 24 general learning studios, and two specially designed creative STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Mathematics) spaces on each level along with breakout areas, teacher preparation spaces, meeting rooms, amenities and outdoor breakout and nature play spaces.

Principal David Meziniec said the design of the new facility had been undertaken in collaboration with the community.

"I am delighted that the building design was a result of thorough research and collaboration within the College community," he said.

"Staff, students, board members and parents had the opportunity to provide insight and ideas during the planning stages which began in 2019.

"Design and technology, ecology and sustainability as well as innovation and entrepreneurship will feature as foundational experiences for students in the new building."

Head of the College's junior school, Francesca Dickson said the construction had already provided entertainment for students.

"Our students are so excited, watching the junior school building being constructed right in front of their eyes," Ms Dickson said.

"Each day students see the construction site, noticing the progress and asking many questions about their new junior school.

"This building is more than just a building to us; this will be the heart beat of our junior school."

# Not all roses look like one

WE all have a precise idea of how a rose should look like... their velvety petals, the shape of the flowers, and mainly the thorns on the stems but sometimes, it's hard to recognise a rose as a rose, and the thorns are probably the only element that could convince us.

With the hundreds of rose varieties we grow, we often see plants that certainly don't look like roses.

Many of these unusual varieties are quite old, like these three that we love because they are very different and unique.

#### Rosa Watsoniana

Also called "The Bamboo Rose", it will certainly be a conversation piece in your garden.

Bred in Japan in 1870, this unique plant has long narrow leaflets disguising itself as bamboo, and small delicate white flowers with little to no fragrance giving way to small red hips.

#### R. Sericea Pteracantha

It's a wild, native Eastern rose that is mainly grown as an ornamental plant for its large flat, translucent red young thorns, and introduced in Europe around 1900.

The flowers appear only once a year and are small and white with four to eight petals and a light, sweet fragrance.

It produces attractive red hips in autumn and winter.

#### Viridiflora

Also called "The Green Rose", because the petals of its small flowers are entirely replaced by numerous green sepals giving the effect of a green, rosette form rose.

It's a unique garden curiosity, flowering in

flushes and large clusters throughout the season, originally from China and introduced in Europe in 1855.

#### Single Flower Roses

More similar to a rose, but still quite far from the classic flower shape we are used to, are the so-called "Single Flowers", with only five large and very thin petals, so delicate that we wouldn't use them in a bouquet or flower arrangement, as they look perfect left on the plant.

Some varieties from the old fashioned Rugosa family belong to this group, and they are ideal plants for hedges and sandy soil: they're strong and vigorous, with very good foliage and usually many thorns as well.

Rugosa Alba has got pure white flowers with a silky texture and strong fragrance; Rugspin is scarlet crimson with glossy dark green foliage; Scabrosa has dark pink/purple blooms with medium green foliage; Frau Dagmar Hartopp displays gently cupped single flowers of a light pink tone, with an intense fragrance and dark, glossy foliage; and Delicata has light pink/mauve and very fragrant flowers, surrounded by mint-like leaves.

Single Flowers and Double Flowers (with a few more petals) have been very trendy in the last few years and some beautiful new varieties have been released by awarded British breeder Chris Warner.

Among his interesting varieties we can certainly mention Bright as a Button, Eyes for You, Eye Shadow, Golden Eye, Eye of the Tiger, and For your Eyes only, with delicate colourful petals that open out wide, showing off the stamens.

# Crops succeed through 2021

WHILE recent autumn rains have brought welcome relief, rainfall for 2021 was below average for the South East.

According to the Bureau of Meteorology's Annual Climate Summary for South Australia, Mount Gambier's annual average rainfall is 713mm.

This average was measured and calculated over a period at the Mount Gambier Aerodrome from 1942 through to 2022.

The 2021 total of Mount Gambier's rainfall was 689.8mm.

Despite this drier than average result, South East farmers have not struggled as usually expected in a dry year.

Agronomist at Elders in Mount Gambier, Sophie Schulz said the area had a wet growing season last year, with most rainfall falling in two months.

"Between June and July we had 400ml of rain in six weeks, so it was a lot in a short period of time," Ms Schulz said.

"We did have some crops drown, so moisture did have an effect but it has been a good year in general to wrap it up.

"There were some crops which were re-sown, some were washed out and some struggled because of the moisture which led to low yields," Ms Schulz said.

She added a rain event currently would not

be beneficial for the current crop season as it would lead to false germination of clovers followed by dry weather.

"It depends what farming system you're into, in pasture you'll need a wet winter to carry the feed through the spring, but in a cropping sense you'll need well-drained soils free

of waterlogging," she said.

Regardless of the adverse effects of the unpredictable weather and the drier than average spring season, Ms Schulz said the yields reached record highs across the region.

She added the commodity prices have been better than ever.

"We probably had a drier spring than we were anticipating, so we finished up in the pasture a little bit earlier than we normally would," she said.

"The crops have had record yields throughout the region for sure, so in terms of if anything was adversely affected I would say not really."

# Sheep elite meet

AS members of a group focused on premium meat sheep production, South East Poll Dorset breeders joined with others from across Australia for the annual conference of Meat Elite Australia recently.

Held at Moama in New South Wales, the conference included Glencoe's Dale and Ruth Price of Majardah Rams with Mr Price being the Chairperson of Meat Elite Australia for more than 10 years.

Phil and Sharon Clothier, of Woolumbbool Sheep Stud near Naracoorte, were also in attendance with a total of 16 Poll Dorset breeders from four States taking part, representing the top 10 per cent of Poll Dorset breeders in Australia.

Mr Price said the group is at the forefront of improving the excellent eating qualities of lamb as a source of protein and culinary pleasure.

"Members of Meat Elite have focused their attention on identifying and breeding superior sheep for the commercial lamb producers for some years," he said.

"With participation in progeny testing, in-flock genomic testing and MLA (Meat and Livestock Australia) sponsored superior eating quality testing programs, the members' flocks have provided leading genetics to other breeders and their commercial clients."

Mr Price said the group often have guests who challenge the group's progress and at the recent conference Director of the Gundagai Meat Company (GMC), Will Barton spoke

about his company's efforts to identify superior carcasses with a grid that rewards producers for delivering lamb with ideal yields and intramuscular fat.

"Carcasses with superior attributes are identified using DEXA and an IMF probe achieving highly accurate results," Mr Price said.

"Meat Elite members were particularly impressed with the comprehensive carcass feedback producers receive from GMC.

"The quality of feedback, once replicated by other processors, will significantly influence breeding programs across the industry."

Conference keynote speaker, Dr Alex Ball spoke about similar initiatives in other industries such as the beef and fishing sectors.

Drawing on consultancy experience to government, the corporate sector and as a breeder and farmer, Dr Ball challenged members to continue their engagement in research and development.

He also touched on the challenges faced by meat producing industries by pseudo meat products and how best breeders and producers can meet these challenges.

Peta Bradley, newly appointed Sheep Genetics Manager, supported by Dr Daniel Brown, of the Animal Genetics and Breeding Unit of the University of New England, provided a current perspective on their service delivery to the sheep industry and an insight on promoting genetic gain reinforcing Dr Ball's comments.

At the conference, Meat Elite members committed their next research project to identifying the next generation of superior eating quality sires for the Australian industry.

## Rural report

STRONG commodity prices and good seasonal conditions across much of the state have buoyed sentiment among South Australian farmers, as the sector looks to the year ahead.

The latest quarterly Rabobank Rural Confidence Survey, released this week, found South Australian farmer confidence has stabilised after a significant softening at the end of 2021, with 25 per cent of those surveyed expecting agribusiness conditions will improve in the coming 12 months.

A further 51 per cent are expecting conditions to remain stable, while 20 per cent are concerned they will decline.

This compares with 26 per cent of SA farmers who had a positive outlook last quarter and 15 per cent with a pessimistic view.

Rising commodity prices were cited by 91 per cent as the reason for their optimistic outlook, while 38 per cent credited good seasonal conditions for their positive view.

Rabobank regional manager for South Australia Roger Matthews said the stabilised confidence levels seen in the latest survey were understandable with farmer

sentiment being buoyed by current strong commodity prices and good seasonal conditions across much of the state.

"Many South Australian farmers are currently thinking 'how much better can it get?'" he said.

"Good summer rainfall over South Australia's pastoral areas has been positively received by beef producers and we are now starting to see flood waters make their way into the Lake Eyre system."

Mr Matthews said while much of South Australia had enjoyed an above-average harvest and good crop yields last year, the ongoing impact of the state missing out on solid spring rainfall in grain-growing regions, such as the Mallee, had tempered confidence going into the new year.

The latest survey found confidence within the state's beef sector remains strong with 68 per cent of beef producers expecting agribusiness conditions to improve or stay the same in the year ahead.

South Australian sheep producers are also upbeat with 86 per cent of the sector ex-

pecting conditions to improve or remain the same.

"A strong sheep market, combined with a good season, has given sheep producers a very positive outlook," Mr Matthews said.

Mr Matthews noted though that the drier-than-usual summer in the south east of South Australia will have impacted livestock producers.

The state's grain growers were less optimistic.

While a combined 51 per cent expect conditions will improve or remain the same in the coming 12 months, 41 per cent of grain growers are anticipating agribusiness conditions will worsen.

Mr Matthews said the cost and availability of farm inputs was driving concern among grain growers, with 76 per cent of grain growers citing rising input prices for their negative outlook.

"We have already seen grain growers making significant investments in inputs last November/December for the season ahead.

Growers are paying up front to ensure they can secure access for key inputs, particularly fertiliser," he said.

## Eco law reforms

FARMERS will benefit from a \$128.5 million Federal Budget reform package for environmental law as it gives them greater certainty in what they do on their land, according to Federal Minister for Agriculture and Northern Australia, David Littleproud.

Mr Littleproud said this week that changes to the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act removes inefficient regulation and gives farmers new ways to grow and create more jobs in rural and regional Australia.

"Modernising the environmental offsets policy with a revised calculator will deliver greater transparency and more flexibility, and there will be dedicated support to assist farmers understand the requirements," he said.

"Clear and consistent environmental offsetting arrangements also provides confidence for developers and better environmental outcomes.

"We are reviewing the plants and animals that are protected making sure we provide clearer data to reduce complexity and uncertainty for farmers to enable sustainable development.

"And delivering an accelerated regional planning scheme in up to ten regions supports pre-approved activities, fast tracking developments, providing greater investor confidence and ensuring strong environmental protections.

"These changes will cut red tape while providing more certainty for agriculture and the jobs it creates into the future."

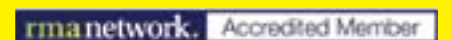

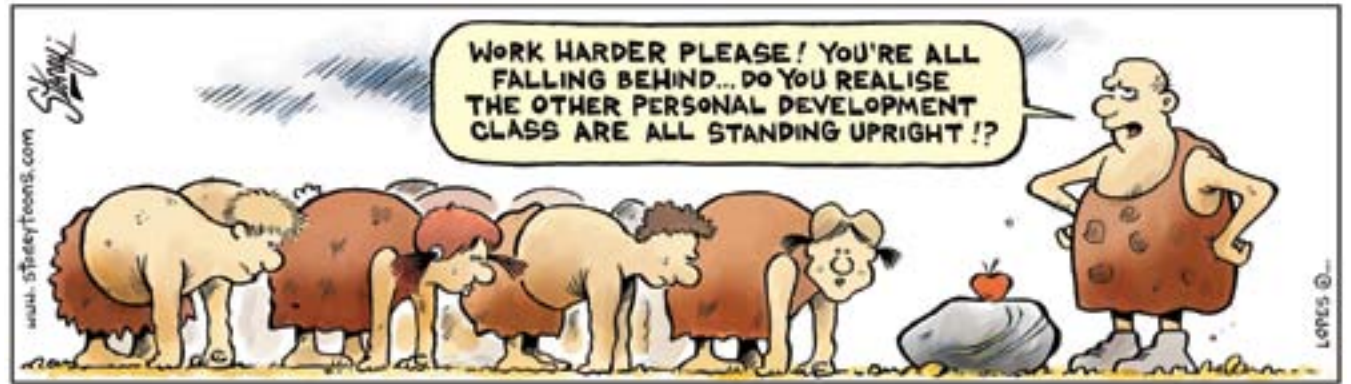

## Line in the sand

Controversial reality series *Byron Baes* follows a group of artists, influencers and entrepreneurs navigating life and love in the coastal town. Nathan Favro, who stars in the show, breaks down the hype with **Siobhan Duck**

**Y**ou can blame Chris and Liam Hemsworth. Or Matt Damon, perhaps. Even Nicole Kidman has played a part. When Hollywood's A-list rolled into town – the Hemsworths now calling it home, Damon flying in for regular family holidays and Kidman to film *Nine Perfect Strangers* – they put Byron Bay on the world map as the place to be seen. Suddenly anyone who's anyone (and everyone in between) wanted to call Byron home and, as the pandemic tightened its grip, people from all over Australia traded in suburban lockdowns for seaside bliss. With so many beautiful people now in the one place, it's little wonder that the good folks at Netflix saw Byron as the perfect place to dip its toe into the reality TV scene with its Aussie answer to *The Hills*.

*Byron Baes* follows 13 of the young people in the NSW coastal haven's influencer community. Some of them are long-time residents while two moved to Byron specifically to film the series.

While Netflix viewers can't wait to get a better look at the scenic township that Hemsworth now calls home, there was fierce opposition from some locals who feared it would make their township seem tacky.

*Byron Baes* star Nathan Favro – who viewers may remember from *The Bachelorette* and *Bachelor in Paradise* – is nonplussed by the controversy.

"No one actually said anything to me but definitely a few of, like, my surfing buddies were at the paddle out [protest]," he shrugs.

"But, like, honestly, I was expecting a paddle out from day dot. The funny part is there's a paddle out for anything [new in Byron]."

"Like, we've never had traffic lights in Byron before and people here are really proud of that. So, when we they put traffic lights in, paddle out! Then a roundabout? Paddle out! Chris Hemsworth buys a house in Byron? Paddle out.

"Honestly, it's like: 'You guys need to go to work or else you're not going to be able to afford that room with all the rising house prices.'"

Favro says while the initial marketing of *Byron Baes* put a lot of locals offside, it also got people

talking, generating huge interest in the show in the process.

"They've definitely ruffled some feathers," he laughs.

"But the best part about that is whether people love it or hate it, or love to hate it, or hate to love it: everyone's going to watch it now."

Favro's relaxed attitude to the hoopla surrounding *Baes* may have something to do with the fact this isn't his first reality rodeo. In fact, he has weathered both the good and bad side of the genre.

He's the first to admit he didn't come off too well when he was courting Ali Oetjen on the 2018 season of *The Bachelorette* and copped abuse for his behaviour.

Favro blames a mixture of naivety, immaturity and bad editing for becoming the series villain.

"It was a bit of a nightmare for me because I was younger and I don't think I was really totally ready for it mentally," he says of his time in the *Bachelorette* mansion.

"I was youngest person that ever go on that show in Australia at least."

It was a different story when he did *Bachelor in Paradise*, where he suddenly found himself a series favourite.

"What was funny about it was I went from being the full villain, like, the up-myself jerk [in *The Bachelorette*] to *Bachelor in Paradise* where they gave me the hashtag Nice Guy Nathan," he laughs.

"I mean, how do you flip from being the absolute worst to the absolute best?"

"I think I even did an Instagram post about it when *Bachelor in Paradise* came out where I was like: 'I was me when you hated me, and I was me when you loved me. I have been there the whole time.'"

Although he has no regrets about doing either show, Favro says the experience put him off ever doing another network television show. A global streaming giant like Netflix, he says is a different prospect altogether and an opportunity too good to refuse.

Favro doesn't see *Byron Baes* as his shot at redemption. Nor did he go into it behaving differently for

the cameras this time. But he thinks it will give people a more authentic sense of who he is.

"*The Bachelorette* and *Bachelor in Paradise* are very different formats [to *Baes*] in terms of editing," he says.

"I guess they have a character picked out for you sometimes, and they go ahead and get that from you no matter what you say or do."

"On *Byron Baes* it's different. I have just been myself the whole time but, with this format, you know that they're not necessarily looking for specific characters. You know why? Because they don't need to do that because they came to Byron because there was already such a diverse, crazy, outrageous bunch of characters that they didn't need to [edit them for drama]. They ended up with characters that they didn't even know existed."

And there are characters aplenty in *Byron Baes*, including Kyle Sandliand's former personal assistant, Alex Reid (who is every bit as acid-tongued as his former boss), Australia's most followed influencer, Jade Kevin Foster (who moved from the Gold Coast to film the series) and the crystal-obsessed Hannah Brauer.

And with the global reach of Netflix behind this eclectic crew, the *Baes* cast could soon find themselves joining the ranks of Byron's many internationally famous residents.

Certainly, the series can only further consolidate Byron's reputation as a playground for the rich and famous.

Favro sees that as a win for Byron rather than a drawback. After all, he says, Byron is a place where hippies, surfers and uber-famous celebrities live side-by-side.

And that makes for some great TV with classic moments.

"I think there are 11 billionaires in Australia and five of them live in Byron," he says.

"Where else do you find a little surfy town with billionaires walking around? It's just crazy how much of a diverse crowd it's attracted, but I love it."

“Adding blue and black accents also helps break up all of the tonality within the room, providing the dining area with a related identity to the open plan living area.”

When applying colours from the Dulux Colour Forecast, Leech says to start with a tonal palette to build from and connect your main furniture pieces.

“To add an edge to the interior, select some smaller statement pieces that feature bold colours and interesting finishes, such as natural stone and coloured glass, to provide contrast, however, still compliment and harmonise your overall colour scheme,” Leech says.

“Highlight bold colour in artwork and soft furnishings, and don’t forget to add versatility to the scheme with some additional hues, the way we have, by adding blue, black and cream.”

Warmth can also be created using texture. Leech recommends adding soft furnishings with textured fabric and tactile finishes in the Flourish palette, to help bring a polished and customised look to the space – think

dining room seating, living room sofas and cushions, or even statement occasional chairs.

According to Lucena-Orr, there are so many colour and scheming options in the Flourish palette, each creating a dramatically different effect, so don’t be afraid to explore the range and test out different concepts before you commit to a look.

“If you want a more contrasting ambiance, look at a warmer main colour and simply use a cool combination of decor items in colours such as Dulux Kenepuru Sound,

Benang or Dark Door. If you want to create a much moodier space, reverse the scheme and use these bold hues as the main colour(s) and add the warmth in your accents to balance.

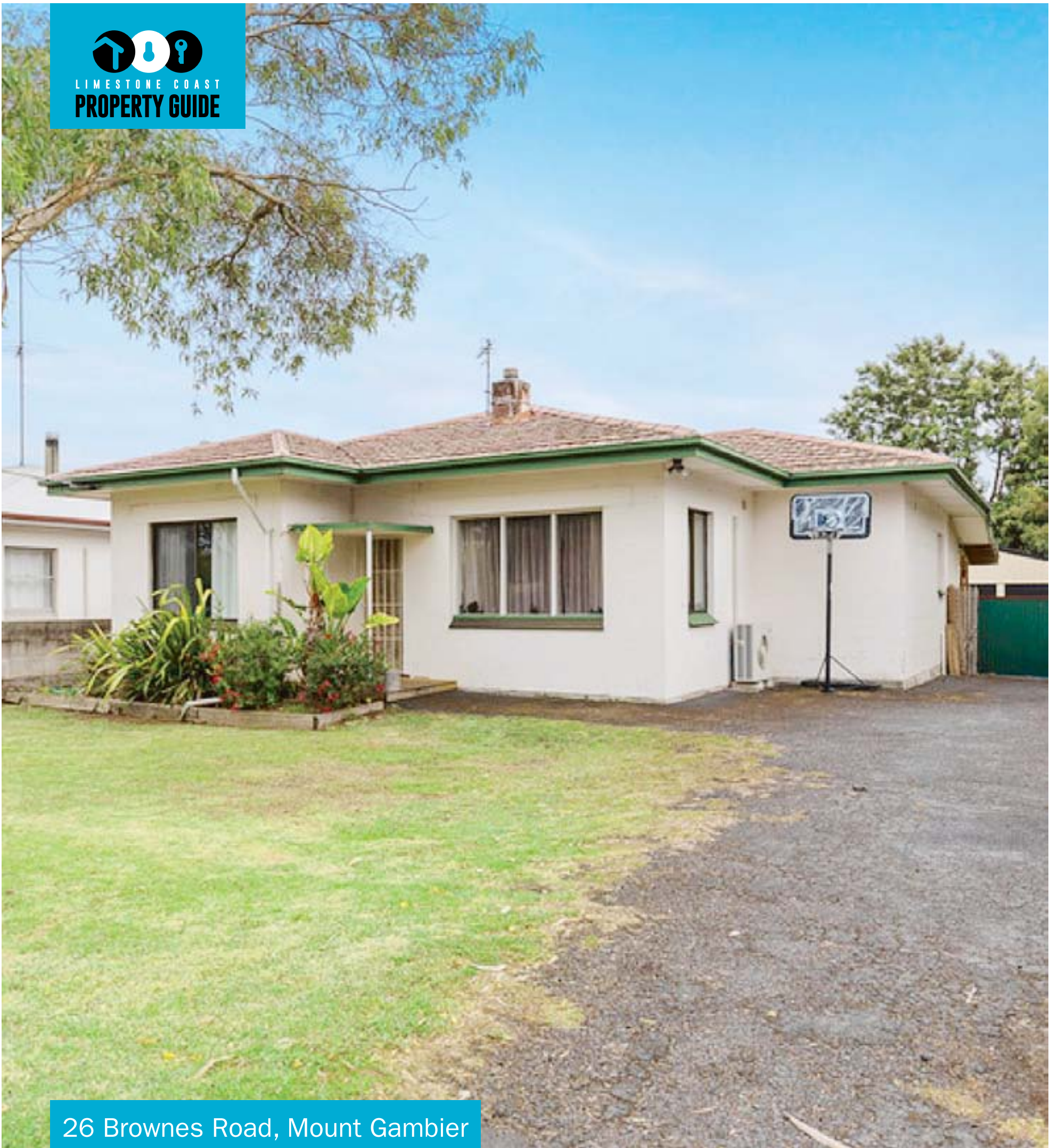
“The old saying ‘change is as good as a holiday’ comes to mind here.

Saturday night saw a one-sided affair, as South claimed a huge win over the Millicent/Federals boys.

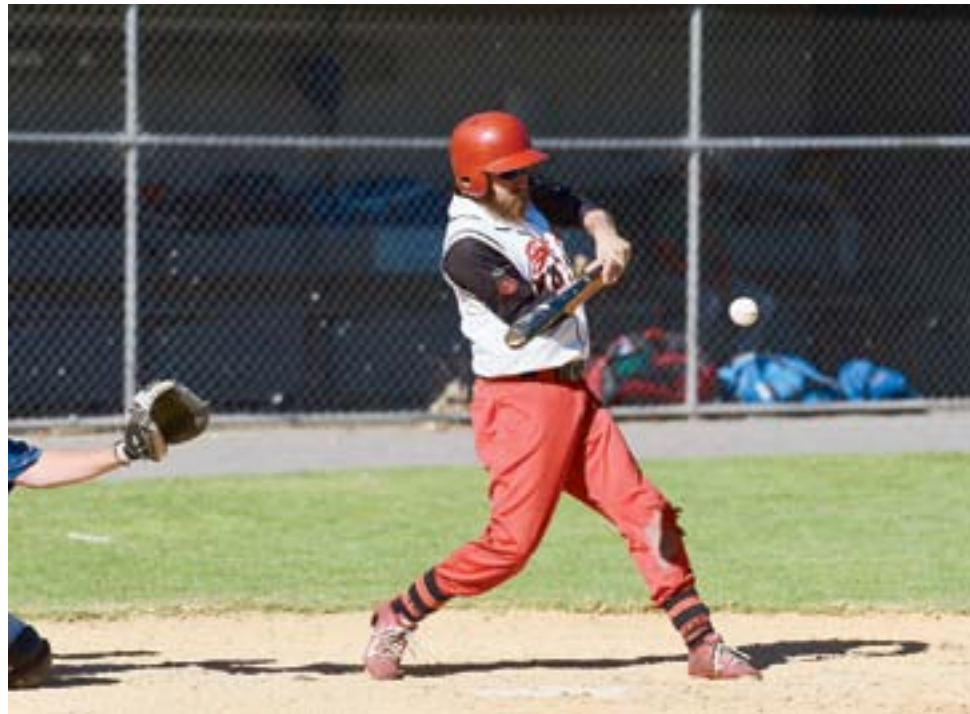
It was all South as Millicent/Federals did not manage to get a run across the plate.

# Conditions favour anglers

UNREAL conditions for the long weekend were taken advantage of by anglers right across the South East and with so many options on the table, there were plenty of fish caught.

The offshore fishos found some fabulous fish off Port MacDonnell.

It was great to see the trailer boats back on the water and making the most of the fine weather.

The boys on Port MacDonnell Fishing Charters put their clients onto some nice fish, with a nice mixed bag of snapper, nannygai, gummy and school sharks and even a few more Tassie trumpeter.

The Southerly Fishing Charters crew managed several nice sharks over the weekend, along with a mixed bag of tasty bottom fish.

Tony Bell from Grumpy Charters continued his good run of snapper and whiting, with some of the whiting nudging the 50cm mark and one of the better snapper up over 3kg.

There were even a few crays to 2kg on the snapper baits to really boost the catch.

Deep sea fishing has been excellent week.

Blue eye trevalla, pink ling, blue grenadier and ocean perch have all made an appearance and just across the border at Portland, there have been some cracking makos over the shelf, so if that is more your thing, now is the time.

The inshore fishing has been excellent right along the coast over the long weekend, with whiting, snapper and sharks all on the list for boaties.

The snapper numbers have been unbelievable - it does not seem to matter where you stop for the snaps, they are everywhere.

Green Point, Danger Point, Factory Bay, Orwell Rocks and even the edges of the Port MacDonnell breakwater have produced fish over the last few weeks and through the weekend.

I am hearing of fish to 70cm being boated by anglers, but some guys may have to fish through 20 or more smaller fish just to find a legal one which is a great sign too.

The whiting have been equally as spread out, with some of the bigger fish even taking a pilchard and a pair of 4/0 hooks meant for a snapper.

The Port MacDonnell breakwater has fished well, with quite a few fishos managing their limits in the hour before dark.

There is not a secret spot in there better than the rest, just keep on the move until you find the fish.

There have been some nice fish further west of the bay too - Cape Douglas, Nene Valley, Pelican Point and Carpenter Rocks have all fished well, so it does not make a huge difference where you stop - just find the sand holes on the edge of the weed line and you are in with a good shot.

Surf fishos made the most of the good weather this weekend and a fair whack of

them headed onto the beach somewhere.

The South East Amateur Surf Fishing Club had their annual long weekend Coorong Comp for its members and there were some nice fish beached.

Darren Humpries took home the honours with a nice gummy shark of just under 10kg, followed up by Scotty Attiwell with a 5kg gummy.

The conditions were fabulous for the guys up there and judging by the videos I saw from the weekend, there was plenty of banter and good times had.

There have been more nice fish caught locally over the weekend, with snapper and gummy shark making up the bulk of reports.

Piccininni, Browns Beach and Factory Bay were all productive and I have also heard of a few whispers of some good school shark from in the Canunda National Park somewhere, so that is also worth a look.

The gar numbers have been impressive once again, thanks largely to the easing winds allowing many anglers back into their favourite spots.

The bigger fish seem to be a bit more prolific now and guys are getting hold of a few more.

The usual haunts around Cape Douglas, Livingstons Bay and Pelican Point have all been productive and for the guys back to the east, the Petrified Forrest, Port Mac breakwater and Racecourse Bay have been the go-to areas.

I am hearing of some bigger tommy ruff and mullet mixed in with the gar as well, so you never know your luck.

There have been some nice fish caught in the Glenelg River over the weekend by the boaties.

The bream and perch numbers seem to be getting bigger and better by the week.

Lure fishos have found good numbers on the sand flats of the estuary using 2.5-inch grub-style soft plastics or shallow-running bibbed minnows.

The upper reaches are fishing well also, with the weapon of choice the plastics on a slightly heavier jig head, or cranka crabs.

The mulloway have been on the chew again but they seem to be a bit smaller than the last couple of weeks.

There is still the odd legal fish mixed in with them, but the average size has been a bit down.

Not to worry though, we are catching them and that is what matters.

Estuary perch have been right through the river but the best ones I have seen have come from up above Wilsons Hall on hard-bodies thrown around the sticks.

Fish in the high 40's have been caught, so some really nice ones among them.

This weekend looks like another very fishable one.

Warm weather again and easing winds should be perfect for most fishos to hit the water and hopefully get into a few fish.

Until next week, safe fishing.

# Price is on the money

"I RECKON if we can get through the first two races then it's going to be a big day," said Compton greyhound trainer Tracie Price prior to the running of last Sunday's 11-race program at Mount Gambier's Tara Raceway.

That is how the day panned out for the track's leading trainer after Charley Davidson and Warby's Delight won the first two races - the Exchange Printers Stake Masters (305 metres) and the Metal Worx Maiden Stake (305m).

By Barcia Bale x Oriental Jewel, Charley Davidson brought up his sixth win this year at the track for the Matt Papst-managed MMBSD Syndicate when leading all the way to defeat kennelmate Victory Chase in 17.55 seconds.

Gaining a start as a reserve, Warby's Delight, a son of Walk Hard and Wolfpack, was a clear last early but never left the rails and finished too strongly for kennelmate Glasgow Lass in 17.98 seconds.

Five more winners on the day would follow, with Price's total breaking the previous record of six which he had held, along with David Peckham of Allendale East.

Coleraine owner Bob Wombwell, currently not in the best of health, received a boost when Price brought up his third successive winner for the day with Gold Comet in the Williams Crane Hire Maiden/One Win Stake (400m).

Also bred by the trainer, the son of Mepunga Blazer x Miss Freeloove was never in any danger of defeat when leading all the way for a seven-length win over Lektra Sammy in a personal best time of 23.36 seconds.

Then it was Whole Way who took his 600 metre performance record at the track to four wins and three minor placings from seven starts when successful in the Todd's Photographics Mixed Stake.

Raced by Adelaide owners Michael Cerauolo and Daniella Madalinski, the black son of Spring Gun and Springvale Hope chased Departure Gate for much of the journey before finishing strongly in the straight for a one-length win in 34.91 seconds.

But Price's day was always going to end up focusing on Banjo Bert, Giant's Flash and Minnie Banjo - all members of the Banjo Boy x Nevada Flame litter and raced by the Garry Comans-managed Giant Crows Syndicate.

Banjo Boy, reputedly the quickest of the litter at breaking-in, brought up his first Tara Raceway win when leading all the way

in the Klaassens Contractors Stake (400m) to defeat Aston Stella in 23.07 seconds.

Kennelmate Right Way, raced in the same interests as his litter brother Whole Way, certainly threw down the gauntlet to Giant's Flash in the Progreyhoundtips.com Mixed Stake when leading for much of the 512 metre journey.

However, in the home straight it was Giant's Flash who finished the stronger, eventually winning by 2½ lengths in 29.55 seconds.

While Minnie Banjo had to withstand plenty of pressure from Aston Dijon and Worms Are Biting in the Rocks Tavern Open Stake (400m), in the end she had a half-length to spare on the line in 23.05 seconds.

So ended another memorable day for Team Price - a record-breaking seven winners which included a litter treble.

As is always the case after a big day or a big win, Price was quick to pay tribute to his team.

"Look, it's a big job out here," he said.

"We have 26 greyhounds in work and all told around 60 on the property.

"It's certainly a team effort.

"Karen, my wife, reckons she has plenty to put up with and, believe me, she has.

"My son, Ben, is out here every day and I can't speak highly enough of Kevin Patzel

whose attention to detail and reliability is outstanding.

"Also, Moesha Canala is a great help at the track on race days.

"We have terrific owners, some having benefited from Tara Raceway's finish-on-lure which has helped to turn around the fortunes of their greyhounds."

For all his success at Tara Raceway, Price is still yet to win a Mount Gambier Cup.

The closest he has so far come has been a third placing with Suzy's Moment behind Banger Harvey in the 2011 cup final.

But following last Sunday's performances, he looks to have a strong line-up for next month's Group 3 Carlin & Gazzard MG Mount Gambier Cup (512m), heats of which will be run on Sunday, April 3.

"Another one in the mix, but still awaiting clearance is Chuck Rocks, a litter brother to Angle Park 730 metre record holder Frankie Boy, Price said.

"And Kayla Cottrell, of Pearcedale, may bring Compton Amy back after her big win over 545 metres at Ballarat the other night."

For sure, a Mount Gambier Cup win would certainly add to a year that, prior to last Sunday, had already resulted in six winners at the January 30 meeting as well as track records to Minnie Banjo and Giant's Flash over 400 metres and 512 metres respectively.

LEADING Naracoorte trainer Greg Scholefield achieved the perfect result when he took two pacers to race at Gawler last Sunday.

Not only did the pair win, they won the two feature races of the season for the Gawler club.

Exciting three-year-old Jaws of Lincoln (\$1.20 fav.) remains unbeaten this campaign from three starts after the easiest of wins in the \$8000 Gawler derby over 2070 metres.

It was an easy watch for the youngster's backers when he won by 11 metres and returned the excellent mile rate of 1.55.5.

"I'm unsure whether Jaws of Lincoln will go to the Mount Gambier derby as I am a bit concerned as to whether he will handle the tighter track," Scholefield stated.

Half an hour later, Gaita Pullicino also had the drive on the stablemate Stratofortress (\$4) in the \$9000 Gawler pacing cup over 2550 metres.

The much travelled Stratofortress had taken in plenty of the Victorian countryside in the past month, with runs at Mildura, Horsham and a last-start second in the Boort cup.

Pulliciano made her move at the bell from mid-field and Stratofortress ran to the lead as the cup field left the back straight the final time and was not headed thereafter.

"He's a typical Art Major type, getting tougher as he gets older," Scholefield added.

Scholefield only has three horses in work and they all won in the space of 24 hours.

At Horsham the following day, Don't Need An Excuse (\$4.40) made it two wins from as many starts for Scholefield with an all-the-way win in the NR 56-66 pace with Kerry Manning in the sulky.

A former New Zealander, Don't Need An Excuse is thriving in Scholefield's small stable environment.

"A few trainers had a go at training him before he came to me and I believe it helps that my wife and I can give our small team a bit more attention than what the bigger city stables can offer," Scholefield said.

"Don't Need An Excuse has owners in Mount Gambier and he may be eligible for the Mount Gambier cup on April 2."

"Kate has a couple of good bruises under her chin and a massive bruise on her upper

left arm, and will be resting for a few days," her husband Kane Post said.

White will need to regroup and stay focussed if they are to beat Warriors Blue this week, who will be riding high after a dramatic win against Wanderers.

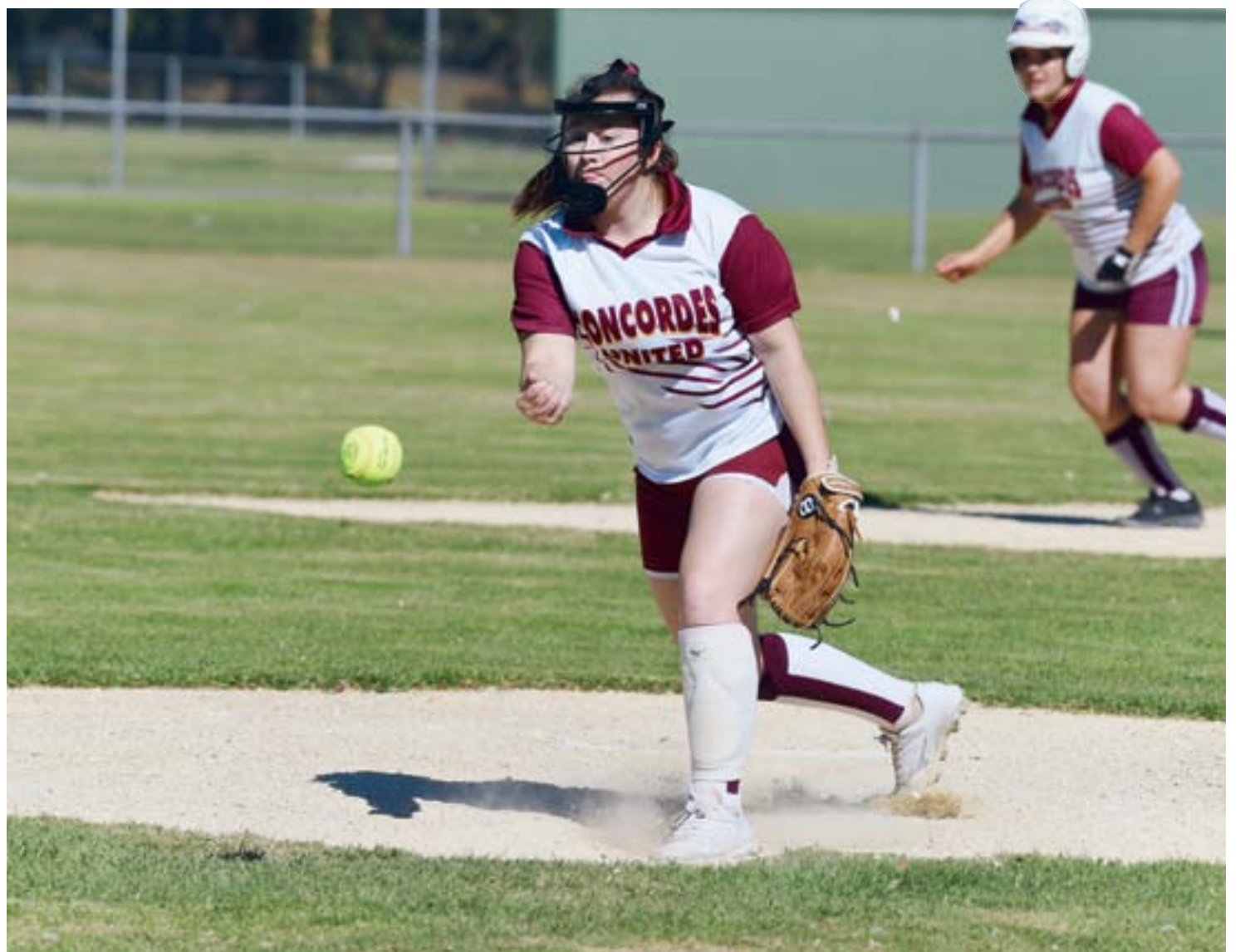
In that game Wanderers won the toss and chose to face the Warriors Blue batting line up in the top of the first innings and the latter were clinical, scoring three.

"And to have George Kidman batting at eight, there is no excuse not to make 200 every time we bat.

"It was a really pleasing result."

After a hot weekend of cricket, with a premiership flag in their possession, Smith said it was certainly time to celebrate.

"I reckon we will consume a couple of beers over the next couple of days," he said.

"You never know what is around the corner in life, so we will enjoy it while we can."

The side has become one of the bench-

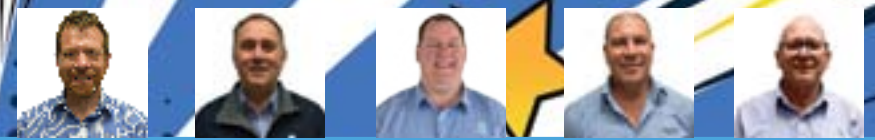
marks of the competition in recent years but its clash against East Gambier in the 2021-22 grand final was almost a must-win scenario.
