NEWLY elected Premier of South Australia, Peter Malinauskas assured the Limestone Coast community he would deliver over \$100m of pre-election promises during a whirlwind visit to the region on Wednesday.

LABOR Legislative Council member Clare Scriven was yesterday officially sworn into the new State Cabinet, making her the first female Minister from the South East.

Ms Scriven was sworn in as the Minister for Forestry, Regional Development and Primary Industries.

Ms Scriven was also the first female Parliamentary representative from the Limestone Coast when she was elected to the Legislative Council four years ago.

Raised in Mount Gambier, Ms Scriven returned to the region after working in Adelaide for a number of years as the State manager of the Australian Forest Products Association.

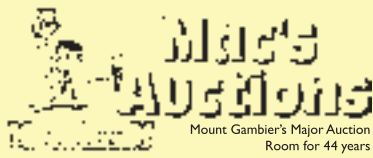
The mother of six has spent the past four years in Labor's Shadow Cabinet with two years as the Shadow Minister for Industry and

Skills and more recently as the Shadow Minister for Forestry, Primary Industries and Regional Development.

She was also the Deputy Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Council.

Speaking with The Border Watch, Ms Scriven said she was excited for the opportunity to be a part of the Cabinet with her portfolio reflecting her passions.

“It had not occurred to me that I would be the first female cabinet minister from the area and I believe that is because I have an expectation that women will form roughly half the positions and want that to be considered normal and not out of the ordinary.”

“It is important that the cabinet represents our society and community and it makes sense to me to have an even mix of both men and women.”

She said there were a number of priorities which were brought to her attention during her time as Shadow Minister, including bio-security, the progress of the Labor Government's forestry commitment to the South East and a master plan for the forestry industry going forward.

“There are so many important things - I am really eager to get into government briefings so I am able to start taking action straight away,” Ms Scriven said.

She said her experience in the forestry industry was also an advantage for her new portfolio, allowing her to understand the needs and wants of the industry as well as the opportunities which exist for the region.

“This also includes other aspects of my portfolio including regional development and

primary industries,” Ms Scriven said.

Newly inducted South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas, who visited Mount Gambier on Wednesday, said he was proud to have the first South East female Cabinet Minister sworn into his government and mentioned it was important to have this representation.

“Clare Scriven is a person of integrity and works hard and on that alone she deserves to be in Cabinet and this is an important milestone,” Mr Malinauskas said.

“I want to ensure we have regional representation in our Cabinet and Clare lives in Port MacDonnell and remains passionate about the community.”

“If I am serious about representation for the Limestone Coast I want to make sure I have that representation in my government.”

“We pre-selected our team on who was best for the job and we have a lot of capable women which means there will also be a lot of front-bench women too,” he said.

“The State Government, under my leadership, wants to earn the trust of the people in the South East and we have begun that journey by acknowledging the mistakes of the past, having policies that eclipse any attempts made by the previous Marshall Government and now I am ensuring I am delivering on those promises while also endorsing the first female minister from the South East.

“We want the people of the Limestone Coast to take note that I am serious about this, on my second full day as Premier I toured the region even though my Cabinet had not been sworn in which I think shows I am serious about the community and determined to earn their trust.”

McBride throws hat in ring

RE-ELECTED Member for MacKillop Nick McBride has put his name forward to become the possible new leader of the Liberal Party after the party's defeat in the State election last Saturday.

Mr McBride celebrated his successful election for a second term last weekend but labelled the win as "bittersweet" with the Liberal Party now in Opposition following a resounding win by the Labor party on Saturday.

Mr McBride, as at Wednesday with more than 60 per cent of the votes counted, had 71.9 per cent of the vote on a two party preferred basis and 61.6 per cent first preference votes with him ahead in each of the MacKillop electorate's 33 polling places.

His next closest opponent was Labor's Mark Braes with 28.1 percent of the vote on a two party preferred basis and 20.7 per cent first preference votes.

They were followed by One Nation's Pam Giehr with 8 per cent, Dayle Baker of Family First with 5 per cent, and Jonathon Pietzsch of the Nationals with 4.8 per cent.

With his hat in the ring to replace Steven Marshall as the new leader of the Parliamentary wing of the Liberal Party, Mr McBride will compete for the position with former Environment Minister David Spiers and former Police Minister Vincent Tarzia.

Mr McBride said he had put his hand up for the Liberal leader's position after recognising problems within the Liberal Party.

"The Liberal Party spent 16 years in Opposition and now I know why," Mr McBride said.

"There are flaws in how the Liberal Party runs its elections and that is shown by having one term in government and then back into Opposition."

Mr McBride said, if he was elected Leader of the Liberal Party, he would first organise a shadow cabinet and ensure responsibilities were clear.

"I will work out an effective communication strategy and operate as a strong, unified team which will last a long time, not just in Opposition or one term," he said.

"Communication needs to take place so when we try and represent the people of South

Australia and we get it wrong we are able to listen enough to make the changes required."

Mr McBride also confirmed he would remain a Liberal member in the coming term despite threatening to become an independent member late last year.

He said there were now opportunities for the Liberal Party to rebuild and he was no longer considering becoming an independent.

"It is better to be inside the camp and try and fix what I strongly believe in than out of the camp trying to blow it up," he said.

"That is my over-arching decision as to why I stayed with the Liberal Party and we never got the power to change the direction of the government or the emergency act.

"Constituent concerns went straight to Parliament and to the former Premier Steven Marshall and were never wasted."

If Mr McBride does not secure the top-spot for the Liberal Party, he said he would not rule out putting his hand up to become a shadow minister.

"If presented with the opportunity I would put my hand up for a shadow ministership and make sure the leadership I believe in and the changes I want to happen are changed," he said.

"A couple of profiles do catch my eye, including primary industries and regional development but I would play my part where it was needed."

Mr McBride said if he "sensed more smoke and mirrors" within the Liberal Party he would remain cautious in the coming term, however he appreciated the confidence shown within the MacKillop electorate.

"Thank you for your ongoing support, it is a privilege to be in this role, and I look forward to representing you as your State Government Member for MacKillop," he said of his constituents.

"I did not expect the full swing against our party and thought the election was going to be close, possibly a hung Parliament, but that was because I did not believe the polls leading up to the election.

"I was mind-blown at the results, and it has taken a couple of days to digest, but it will be a mammoth job to turn it around and show we are a force to be reckoned with and could form a government at the next election."

Member for Mount Gambier re-elected easily

RE-ELECTED last Saturday as Member for Mount Gambier, Troy Bell has vowed to work with the new Labor Government to secure more than \$100m in pre-election promises made by Labor for the region.

Mr Bell easily secured his second term as an independent member of State Parliament, winning each of the 14 polling booths in the Mount Gambier electorate.

As of Wednesday morning, more than 50 per cent of the votes had been counted and Mr Bell had 62.7 per cent of the vote on a two party preferred basis with 43.8 per cent of first preference votes.

Behind him was Liberal candidate Ben Hood who had 37.3 per cent of the vote on a two party preferred basis with 29.3 per cent of first preference votes while Labor's Katherine Davies was at 21.4 per cent of first preference votes with Family First candidate Peter Heaven at 5.5 per cent.

With a landslide win to Labor in the elec-

tion, Mr Bell's previously touted position as 'Kingmaker' in a wrongly forecast hung parliament did not eventuate, but Mr Bell assured the Mount Gambier community he would continue to advocate for the extensive pre-election promises made by the Labor Party for the region.

"I received a phone call from the State's new Premier Malinauskas at about 10pm on election night and he assured me all pre-election promises were locked in," Mr Bell said.

"Now we need to work together to implement those promises for the betterment of our region.

"We are lucky here in Mount Gambier that Labor has committed very strongly to this region and sometimes securing the funding is the easy part but implementing the strategies and making sure the right people are in the right position is the hard part."

Following the commitments made by the new Premier, Mr Bell said he was eager to work with each of the new cabinet ministers responsible for the commitments.

"People need to understand the commitments won't all be delivered within the first 90 days as some of these are longer term commitments," he said.

"The benefit of having an independent as a local member is that regardless of who gets into government, independents are able to work with the government."

Mr Bell also commented on the South East political representation within Parliament, stating the region was beginning to develop "real political clout" with Labor MLC Clare Scriven sworn in yesterday as a Minister in the new State Government along with former Mount Gambier resident Kyam Maher, while former Naracoorte resident Lucy Hood secured the seat of Adelaide and Member for MacKillop Nick McBride has nominated himself as the possible new leader of the Liberal Party in the parliament to replace ousted former Premier Steven Marshall whose own seat of Dunstan was in doubt at the time of publication.

Mr Bell said the continued rise in independent members throughout the region

was a reflection on the Marshall-led Liberal Government.

"It think it is a reflection that the Marshall Government ignored the regions and I really don't think it was a Liberal Government at all, it was Marshall's Government," he said.

"As an independent the ideal position to be in is to have both parties commit then you sit back and see who wins and work with them to honor the commitment.

"The top priorities for me are housing for all initiatives and making sure we have emergency, social and affordable housing for our community and there is a lot of work that needs to be done in that space.

"The other opportunity is an economic opportunity in tourism and we need to change our focus from a drive through city to a destination city."

Mr Bell said he was humbled to be re-elected stating the community had shown faith in him throughout his previous term and that he would now work to repay that faith.

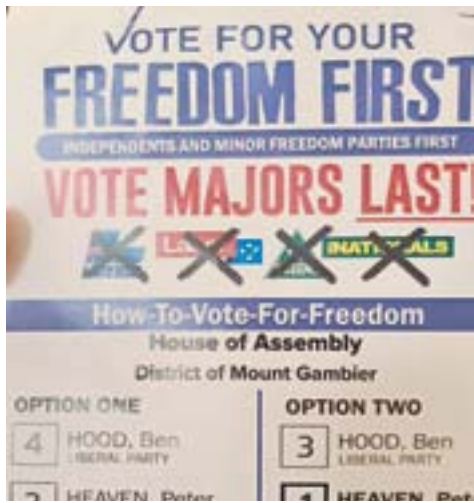

Unregistered vote cards draw protest

COMPLAINTS have been received by the Electoral Commission of South Australia (ECSA) about unregistered how-to-vote cards handed out on election day by a local group, Limestone Coast Pro-Choice.

According to the ECSA, a how-to-vote card is prepared by a party, group or independent candidate and indicates how it wants electors to record their preferences while voting.

There are two types of how-to-vote cards; those lodged with the ECSA for display in polling booths and early voting centres, and those made by a person who intends to distribute the card during the election period.

A person must also not distribute the cards during the election period unless it was substantially the same as a card lodged for these reasons.

According to the ECSA, the cards handed out by the Limestone Coast Pro-Choice group members did not comply with the South Australian Electoral Act.

Pro-Choice committee member Maddy Fry said the committee was aware the how-to-vote cards handed out by members on Saturday were unregistered.

"We were simply local community members and not a registered political party from the information we gathered," Ms Fry said.

"We were not able to register the cards as they [the group] were not affiliated with a party."

Ms Fry said the cards did not do this due to the ECSA "wanting the how-to-vote cards to endorse one party".

"If we did that we would be dictating just like the rest of them," she said.

"The cards do not meet the criteria because they are not formal how-to-vote cards, they are

information sheets for the local community.

"Election materials are created by parties to get the party into government, election material is promotional material with the intention to get an individual a job."

She said the cards were created after concerns from the community about the election and queries about how to vote on the day.

"This is when we came up with the idea of creating the information sheets to hand out," Ms Fry said.

"We knew the how-to-vote cards were unregistered however we never looked at what criteria was required as we are not a political party and not endorsing anyone.

"We were focused on ensuring these sheets had the information that our local community had expressed they needed."

The maximum penalty is a \$5000 fine if found guilty for producing illegal how-to-vote cards.

Mr Malinauskas began the tour with a short visit to the Mount Gambier and District Hospital where he assured the community he would remain committed to the \$52.7m upgrades to the health care system within the region including an \$8m upgrade to the Mount Gambier Emergency Department.

Other promises included providing extra mental health and drug and alcohol detox beds and recruiting an additional 24 paramedics and ambulance officers for the region.

Mr Malinauskas also visited NF McDonnell and Sons timbermill where he also reaffirmed his commitment to a pre-election promise of \$24m towards the timber industry.

During a press conference hosted at the local hospital, the newly inducted Premier said both health and the timber industry were important to the region and the pre-election promises would go ahead.

"The forestry industry has a lot of growth to be realised - now more than ever Australians have realised the value of structural timber," Mr Malinauskas said.

"The value of wood product and fibre which is produced here in the Green Triangle in a way that nowhere else in Australia is capable of.

"The forestry industry is a very valuable

one economically because it is so labor intensive, people see trees in the ground and think that because there is such a long return to that investment that there's not much labor demand associated with it which couldn't be further than the truth, what really matters is the way that wood fibre is used."

Mr Malinauskas also apologised to South East residents for the sale of the forests under the previous Labor Government.

"I think selling the forests was wrong but we cannot go back in time, we can only go forward," he said.

"What we see is a lot of investment in productivity in this part of the region and this part of our State to realise that potential from the forestry industry."

Mr Malinauskas also spoke on the importance of water retention within the region and vowed to work alongside the forestry industry and the Limestone Coast Landscape Board with plans to retain drainage water for future use.

"We want to be a government which provides these industries with the resources they need," he said.

"This is an opportunity that we cannot let go, we need to make sure industries have the resources they need and I have spent a lot of time when I was Leader of the Opposition to understand these opportunities."

Mr Malinauskas also acknowledged the two Limestone Coast MP's, Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell and Member for MacKillop Nick McBride for endorsing the Labor Party's pre-election promises.

"I think the people in this community and regional South Australia value honesty," he said.

"My interest is not in who represents Mount Gambier, my interest is in realising the potential that exists around this great community.

"I think part of our State has been neglected by previous governments...as I said prior to the election, I am going to deliver."

Better for life

Covid cases rising

RECENT increases in Covid-19 case numbers has put additional pressure on hospitals according to the Premier, but no elective surgeries have been cancelled in the Limestone Coast.

In a press conference this week Premier Peter Malinauskas said the hospital system had begun cancelling overnight elective surgeries to help ease pressure on the system.

"I have been formally advised by the chief executive officer of Health that last week was one of the toughest weeks that South Australia has ever experienced in respect to hospital pressure," Mr Malinauskas said.

SA Health confirmed there had been no elective surgeries cancelled in the region, and would continue on as scheduled at this time.

As of Wednesday, there were 584 active Covid cases in the Limestone Coast area, and 26,431 active cases across the whole state.

Mount Gambier hospital is currently fluctuating between one and three admitted Covid-19 patients in the Covid ward.

State commissioned modelling by the University of Adelaide has indicated daily cases state-wide could reach 8000 a day in April.

This would be well above the current recorded highest daily case numbers in South Australia, which at time of print was 5679 on January 14 this year.

"The reason we have tough restrictions is because our hospital system is under extraordinary strain," Mr Malinauskas said.

"I have directed SA Health to rapidly de-

velop a plan for urgent additional hospital preparedness in preparation for rises in Covid cases.

"What you will see in that modelling is case numbers, even with current policy setting, will escalate in a rather significant way."

When visiting the Mount Gambier Hospital on Wednesday, Mr Malinauskas said had been impressed with the thoughtfulness of local staff.

"I think the local hospital here and the local health network have put a lot of time and energy into preparing for the worst, (I've) seen that with some of the facilities here,"

Mr Malinauskas said.

"I congratulate the Limestone Coast Local Health Network and the board for their hard work and have every confidence that everybody working within the system is doing everything they can to account for possibilities."

The Limestone Coast Local Health Network (LCLHN) have said the local system would not be cancelling any elective surgeries at this stage.

"As we move towards business as usual post Covid-19, we have been able to gradually resume services and amend restrictions in line with our current Recovery Phase 3 protocols across the Limestone Coast Local Health Network," a LCLHN representative said.

"This includes restarting elective surgery, community service programs and outreach programs and re-opening the Penola Hospital Emergency Department."

Previously using a Co-STAT rating to indicate the response to Covid, the local health network has since moved onto a recovery rating system, currently at Level 3 of 5 levels.

"We will continue to closely monitor and assess the Covid-19 situation as it develops," a LCLHN representative said.

"While we do have known Covid cases in our region, we would like to reassure the community that each of our health sites have protocols and plans in place for responding to Covid."

"As we expect Covid-19 cases to continue to increase, we remind people to remain vigilant and continue to follow health advice and good hygiene practices so we can protect ourselves and each other."

Emergency service looking for recruits

VOLUNTEERS are being called for by the Mount Gambier State Emergency Services (SES) following the Covid-19 pandemic impacting recruitment numbers last year.

The annual recruitment program helps current SES workers search for new volunteers, enabling them to learn a variety of skills.

Manager of the South East operations support unit Kimberley Paxon said recruitment efforts last year became challenging due to the pandemic.

Ms Paxon said despite the difficulties, the local unit was still able to secure a small number of recruits.

"Usually in Mount Gambier we get about 10 to 15 new recruits a year but with Covid it did slow down a bit," Ms Paxon said.

"We have information sessions advertised on social media to let people know we are looking for volunteers to sign up."

Ms Paxon said the public was beginning to realise how emergency services have helped with fires and other operations, which could encourage more people to volunteer for their local emergency response teams.

"We're looking for as many members as possible because there are a lot of positions to fill," she said.

"A lot of people see the SES as a storm response, which a majority of it is, but we also offer training in chains of operations, land search, communications, first aid and rescue operations, as well as a variety of administrative jobs."

She added there is no age limit to who can volunteer, mentioning there is one member in a group still serving the community in their late 80s.

Volunteers may choose how much time is dedicated to the service, Ms Paxton said even as little as an hour a day would be welcomed.

"We have a few training sessions through-

out the week so we can be fairly flexible," Ms Paxon said.

"I believe it has been made very clear how much we are doing for the community when situations occur, so we believe everyone has something to offer when giving back to the community."

Support for mine leases

GRANT District Council has provided 'in principle' support to an application for a limestone mining lease outside Mount Gambier for more than 100 years supply of limestone.

Property owner Sandybridge Holdings currently runs a sand and limestone quarry west of Mount Gambier in Compton, and is seeking to expand limestone production to a further 10 pits.

According to a report tabled at council's meeting on Monday, each new pit will have an average expected lifespan of 17 years and should provide enough capacity for the company's next 100 years of operations.

However, with eight residential properties within 400m of the mine, council was aware of some concerns about potential impacts from the mine, with residents worried about air quality, noise, litter, groundwater, native vegetation and visual impacts on the area.

The council report indicated that many of these impacts would be managed by the company and relevant authorities directly.

In mid-January, the Department for Energy and Mining requested a response from council on the matter, with councillors voting on Monday night to provide 'in principle' support for the application, highlighting the need to minimise potential impacts on nearby residents.

While councillors raised concerns about potential impacts from the mine, they found no grounds for objections at this stage.

Roads priority

THE RAA is calling on the future Federal Government to commit to long-term investment in South Australia's road network including the Riddoch and Dukes highways.

The \$7.6 billion dollar investment the RAA is seeking would be over 25-years for projects such as the Augusta, Sturt and Dukes highway duplication, which would help reduce heavy vehicle traffic on the South Eastern freeway.

RAA senior manager of safety and infrastructure Charles Mountain said planning needs to happen now before expected increased use of the Dukes Highway.

"For the South East region, the Dukes Highway duplication is something that we have identified we think is a worthy consideration," Mr Mountain said.

"We recognise this is a long-term project, but it is ultimately going to be required to ensure the safe and efficient movement of people and freight between states.

"This is an opportunity to start to look at progressively rolling this out."

Duplication of the Dukes Highway is the best way to save lives on that road, according to Mr Mountain.

"A lot of people have had crashes on there, and lost their lives on that road, despite the improvements that have been made progressively," he said.

"Full duplication, that particularly includes protection between opposing lines of traffic, means the likelihood of head-on cases is almost totally eliminated."

Mr Mountain said the RAA found that the Riddoch Highway is in need of additional overtaking lanes, which they suggest should be part of the investment.

"The Riddoch Highway was mentioned as part of our overtaking lane package for some additional lanes," he said.

"We still think there are some more that need to be installed, particularly around Keith, to improve safety on what is becoming a busier and busier corridor."

Regular road maintenance is also high on the RAA's agenda, with Mr Mountain hoping recent focus and investment is continued.

"We need to see that level of investment into ensuring the network can be maintained at an appropriate level of safety and efficiency," he said.

"It is particularly important in the regional areas where road users almost totally rely on their road network to get to and from business, and for tourism as well."

Naomi leads the charge

A COMPTON woman has raised seven times her initial goal for the Cancer Council Foundation following a successful walk-a-thon last weekend.

Naomi Moreland hosted a March Charge event where she walked 60 laps of the Tantanoola football oval, raising \$7247 for the Foundation.

The March Charge encourages participants to walk a selected number of kilometres throughout the month while fundraising. At the start of the month, Ms Moreland committed to walking a total of 200km and set an original fundraising goal of \$1000. After her challenges were decided, she thought a walk-a-thon would aid the cause to a larger scale which pushed her to ask for the Tantanoola Football Club's assistance.

"I approached the club to ask if I could use their grounds for the event and it just snowballed from there," she said.

"We had businesses donating raffles, food, products and sometimes even their services." She added she had lost three of her family members to different forms of cancer, including her father, mother and father-in-law.

"My mother passed away at the age of 57 from lung cancer despite having never smoked in her life," Ms Moreland said.

"A few years later, my father lost the battle to bowel cancer and five years ago; my father-in-law to esophageal cancer."

She also added her husband had been a victim of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, until he was given an 'all clear' after treatment had succeeded against the disease.

"We've seen the advancement in treatment over the years and what Cancer Council is able to do now so I like to be able to give something back," she said.

Ms Moreland said she found the March Charge through a post on social media and knew it would be something she would be capable of. Ms Moreland was unsure of what attendance would be like until the day came around. The turnout was larger than she expected with some attendees in particular dressing up in costumes to keep morale high for the day.

"In the end we had a really good attendance and it was so nice to see everyone tell their story of how cancer has touched their lives as well," she said. Ms Moreland thanked the Tantanoola Football Club for allowing her to use its facilities as well as a large number of local businesses which supported her on the day. Fundraising for March is ongoing and anyone willing to contribute is invited to visit the March Charge website.

EDITOR'S COMMENT

NO doubt the Liberal Party leadership woke up on Sunday morning asking themselves – what happened?

The one-term government was soundly defeated by Labor.

While there was a small decrease in the two-party preferred vote margin, MacKillop Liberal MP Nick McBride romped it in and so did Mount Gambier independent MP Troy Bell with an increased margin.

While Mr McBride is a Liberal, he has shown a level of independence in his role in his criticism of his former government.

His honesty earned him votes.

To the contrary, his honesty also reinforced the disunity the Liberal Party is famous for – particularly threatening to leave the Liberal Party. Elected to government in 2018 with a majority, within four years the Liberals' hold dwindled down to a minority.

The infighting within the Liberal Party has cost it government this year, and in the past. The Liberal Party finds it hard to understand that 'disunity is death' in politics.

Former Liberal and now independent Troy Bell has used his position well.

His freedom to criticise government as an independent has worked well for him and possibly the electorate.

While Troy Bell will not hold the title of 'Kingmaker', the possibility of him becoming one, from what was widely expected to be a much closer election result, led the Labor Party to make the pledges it has.

The Liberal Party did not make any election pledges for the Limestone Coast.

It's now up to our new Premier Peter Malinauskas to deliver.

However, government is only kept accountable by a strong Opposition.

The Liberal Party needs to move from a resounding defeat and demonstrate true unity in a manner that serves our communities rather than self-interest.



Coonawarra speed

ON a recent visit to Coonawarra's magnificent wine route I was appalled by the 110km/h speed zone that applies along this tourist section of the Riddoch Highway.

Our trip to the region was marred by angry motorists and truck drivers almost forcing us off the road as we slowed to enter wine drive-ways.

The speed limit needs to be reduced to 80km/h along the Coonawarra section for the sake of safety and for the benefit of local tourism.

I have been told there have been fatalities that have occurred here yet the State Government and Department of Infrastructure and

Transport have done nothing to reduce the speed limit to 80km/h.

Little or no funding is required to change speed limit signs between Coonawarra and the Penola bypass.

In August 2020, State Premier Steve Marshall visited the new Penola town bypass (which incidentally has a reduced speed limit of 100km/h) and he spoke of how the town detour has made Penola's main street much safer.

But that's where the safety issue stops, it appears the State Government is not concerned about the dangers for the many tourists and locals, just up the road in the Coonawarra wine region.

This issue needs to be addressed immediately by local tourism bodies, wineries and the South Australian State Government, before deaths or serious injuries occur.

sent a range of different industries and come from varied levels of experiences within our community," Ms Neumann said.

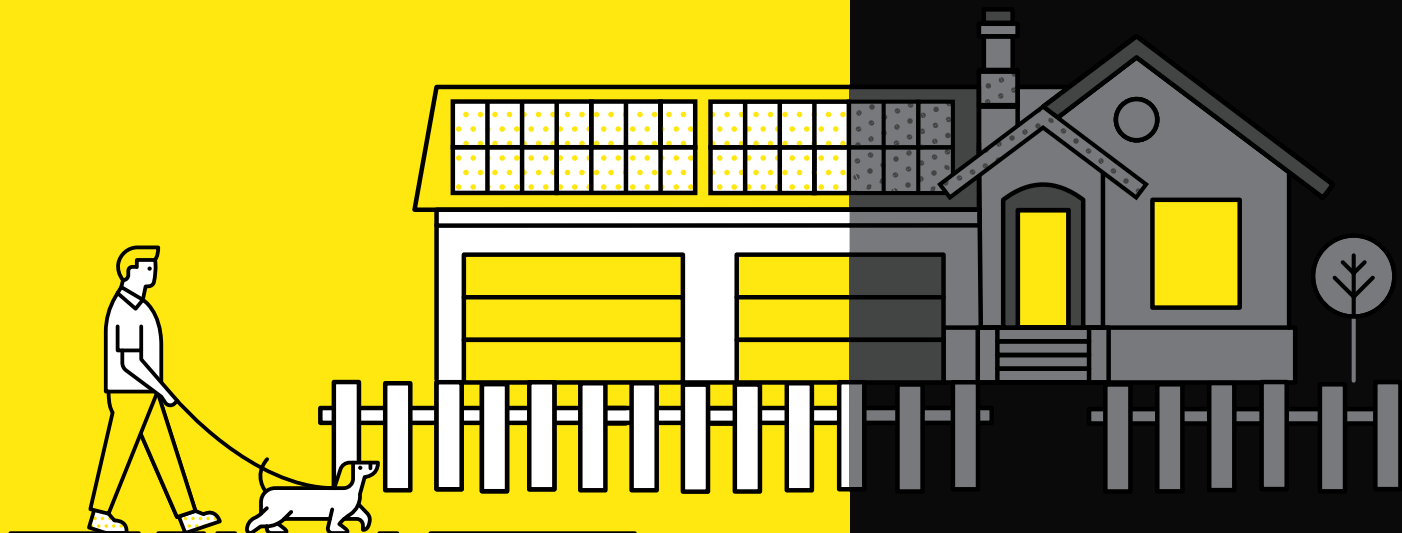
"One thing they all do have in common is their passion to see Mount Gambier keep growing, to be a thriving community and an attractive place to invest, do business and live."

Limiting the strain on roads

PENOLA forestry company Merrett Logging will continue to replace their B-Double freight trucks with A-Double trucks to limit the strain on local roads.

The A-Double trucks allow for almost 36m of freight length - almost 10m more than a B-Double - with both trailers the same size compared to a B-Double which allows for a maximum of 26m of freight with the first trailer shorter than the second.

Adam Merrett said the replacement process had been underway for the company over a number of years, with its fourth A-double truck on its way.

He said the shift in types of trucks allowed for the same amount of freight to be transported with less trucks.

"There is more technology available now for trucks and our trailers including cameras which is safer for our operators to use," Mr Merrett said.

He said the A-Doubles would help keep trucks away from the main street of Penola, "which keeps it safer for residents and drivers."

Mr Merrett said the company was in the process of seeking approval for its new A-doubles to use Robe Road to access the industrial area via Ellen Street.

"The Department of Infrastructure and Transport have been taking videos of our new A-Doubles which can take up to 91 tonnes gross on the vehicle," he said.

According to Mr Merrett, A-Doubles prevent corners being cut while driving and were better suited for general public road use while also having less impact.

"The idea behind this is to allow the roads to last longer by distributing the weight more evenly," he said.

"For every two A-Doubles on the road it replaces about three B-Doubles. This is a step forward and has a major

positive financial impact on the business as it is more viable to put the A-Doubles on the road."

Museum performance soon

FOR the first time since the Covid-19 pandemic began, Millicent's popular interactive theatre 'Murder at the Museum' will be performed on Saturday, April 2.

With a plot written two years ago, the performance was shelved due to the pandemic but a large cast of local actors are pleased to finally be able to pull their costumes out of storage ready to entertain once again.

In the past, 'Murder at the Museum' has been so popular that sessions have sold out and organisers for the event this year have made provision for several showings of the performance during the night with the first showing at 5.30pm and the last at 8pm.

The fictional plot this year centres around Millicent's infamous ship, the Geltwood, during a voyage of which a dastardly deed is perpetrated upon Lord Formley, a wealthy property owner with plenty of characters associated with him who would have a motive to cause his demise.

As performance goes proceed around the rooms of the museum, they will learn from actors in period costume about the motives of each of them and performance goes are able to ask questions of the characters during the performance and clues are given to thicken the plot.

At the end of the event, performance goes are asked to guess which of the characters was the fictional murderer and the first correct entry drawn from a barrel wins a four course dinner for two at Mayura Station Tasting Room.

Tickets are \$10 each with children under 15 years free if accompanied by an adult.

Feathery visitor off to Japan

A FEATHERED visitor to Millicent left this month on a long journey to the northern hemisphere.

After being resident at Millicent's Lake McIntyre during the spring and summer, a handful of rarely seen Latham's Snipe have left the picturesque bird haven on their annual migration to Japan for their breeding season.

Keen photographer and member of the Millicent Field Naturalists and Lake McIntyre Management Committee, Rosey Pounsett said the birds had been annual visitors to Lake McIntyre since at least 1991 which is when record keeping began for birds at the lake.

"They visit Lake McIntyre during the spring and summer and can be seen resting along the banks of the islands, feeding on the mud flats, and if you are lucky enough, you may be able to spot one from either of the bird hides," Ms Pounsett said.

"The birds are very shy and like to remain close to cover such as long grass or reeds.

"They are very well camouflaged, and it sometimes takes time and patience to see them."

Also known as a Japanese Snipe, due to them coming from Japan to Australia for our summer, the Latham's Snipe is called the Australian Snipe in Japan for the reverse reason, ie the Japanese see them as coming from Australia for their summer.

"The longest recorded non-stop journey

for a Latham's Snipe is 7,000 kilometres from Japan to Australia over the Pacific Ocean," Ms Pounsett said.

"The average speed for the journey was just over 95 kilometres an hour, an incredible feat for a bird weighing only 150 to 200 grams."

Once hunted in their thousands, the Latham's Snipe is now protected and in 2014, the Latham's Snipe Project was begun by a group of passionate ornithologists to better understand the ecology of the snipe and their use of wetlands, in response to a housing development proposal on an important Latham's Snipe wetland in Port Fairy, south-west Victoria.

The focus areas for the project were Port Fairy, the Jerrabomberra wetlands in Canberra, breeding areas in Hokkaido Japan, and the migration routes along the East Asian-Australian Flyway.

The Millicent Field Naturalists, together with the Lake McIntyre Management Committee, take part in the annual snipe survey conducted by the Latham's Snipe Project, with 2015 being the best year when 29 snipe were recorded at Lake McIntyre.

The Lake McIntyre Management Committee has installed a large sign about the Latham's Snipe and its migration under the roof of the second barbecue shelter at the lake, so next time you visit the lake, take some time to have a look.

SHEENA Wood wanted to create a safe space for anyone requiring mobility equipment in the Limestone Coast to find it, free of judgement, and nine years later her customers are thankful.

Aiming to fill a rental gap for mobility equipment in Mount Gambier, her business Equipt Mobility was born.

“When you go away, you do not realise what you need to take with you and how hard it is to find at the other end if you cannot take it with you,” Ms Wood said.

“I originally predominantly wanted to do hire, so people could come in on their holidays and find what they needed.”

However, Ms Wood’s reputation soon had customers asking for her to expand into more products.

“A lot of my customers that I had wanted me to start selling continence products because of all of the knowledge I have got,” Ms Wood said.

“It went from this small little thing to this huge thing, we had to build on and expand the store.

“All the stock you can see in the store is what people have asked for, I have grown the store to what customers and the area have wanted.”

After nine years Ms Wood credits the success of the store to building a safe and accepting place for those in the community to visit.

“A lot of people do not mind talking to me because of my disability, where they may be embarrassed to go up to someone in the pharmacy, they feel a little bit more at ease talking to me,” she said.

“I try to make it as comfortable as we can and accommodate everyone.”

With limited options in the region, many of the store’s customers travel from Kingston, Keith and even Casterton.

“We get a wide range, it is not just Mount Gambier,” Ms Wood said.

“We send a lot of stock to Adelaide on freight for our customers who have relocated.”

From her experience finding the right career path for her, Ms Wood said she has been proud the store has offered employment op-

portunities to others in the disability community.

“A big goal of mine through doing this has been employing others with disabilities to give them the confidence and the awareness that there are things that you can still do,” she said.

“I found it difficult to choose a career growing up because of my limitations.

“I did a traineeship out of school in admin, but I found I enjoyed the retail side of things.

“We work with them and their limitations, we have had staff with all sorts of intellectual and physical disabilities here.”

There is no chance of Ms Wood going anywhere anytime soon, clearly just as passionate about her work and the store as when it was first established.

“I work six days a week here, I am always thinking about the store it is like my second home.”

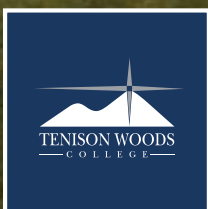

THE 42nd South East Field Days has been labeled a success by the Lucindale Lions Club and Field Days Committee.

Up to 22,000 people were estimated to have attended the two day event which was held last weekend following a two year Covid-19 induced hiatus.

Committee member Kim Corrigan said the event organisers could not have hoped for it to be better and there were no real expectations due to the previous cancellations.

“We were just hoping to get back on track and hold a field days,” Ms Corrigan said.

“It is such a vital event to the Limestone Coast as it is one of the largest in the area.

“Seeing people back on this wonderful site was absolutely magical.”

Ms Corrigan said most of the operating costs were covered by exhibitors during the event although there was a lower number of exhibitors compared to previous years.

“Our exhibitors were down roughly by 100 this year and we may have had about 450 this year but in usual years we get around 550 to 590,” she said.

“The Lions Club puts some of the profits aside to run future events but the rest of it goes to a variety of charity organisations.”

Due to the extensive break in annual Field Days, Ms Corrigan said the Lions Club suffered an extreme loss of about \$150,000 in 2020.

“We incurred a lot of expenses previously because of the cost to set everything up and the simple fact no one was coming through the gates.”

Other changes in the Field Days this year

included an additional 45 volunteers rostered on as Covid marshals.

“It was run differently in the sense we had very strict restrictions until most of them fell away so we were then able to run it as an un-

vaccinated event,” she said.

“We need to see what happens next year, whether we have restrictions on us again and if we do it certainly will be a lot easier to control it next time around.

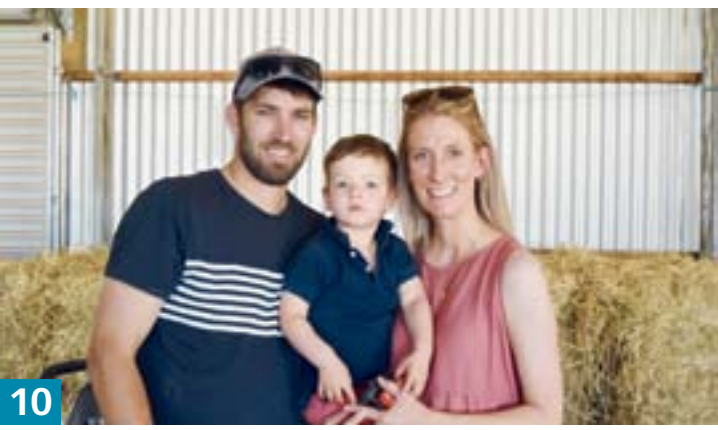

FRINGELAND will lift-off this evening at the Mount Gambier Showgrounds with a night of entertainment for all ages.

Dairy vote due to close next week

DAIRY farmers have until March 31 to cast their vote in the 2022 Dairy Poll.

The poll is an opportunity for dairy farmers to determine the level of investment in the industry's future.

The four voting options, determined by the independent Levy Poll Advisory Committee, include the recommended 20 per cent increase in the dairy service levy.

According to Dairy Australia, additional investment will deliver tangible benefits to dairy farmers in important areas for the industry including tackling labour shortages,

enhancing the regional service offering to farmers, addressing high priority issues around climate and bolstering policy support. The voting process is being independently administered by Link Market Services.

Dairy farmers can cast their vote online or by using a voting ballot returned by email, fax or regular post.

The outcome of the vote will be announced shortly after the poll closes.

While the dairy service levy is reviewed at least every five years, it has not changed since 2012.

Alternative protein offers opportunities

A NEW roadmap by CSIRO, Australia's national science agency, shows how Australia can serve up a wider range of high quality protein products to feed the world's growing population and help capture a \$13 billion market opportunity for all types of protein.

Released this week, the report 'Protein: A roadmap for unlocking technology-led growth opportunities for Australia' also outlines how Australia could create up to 10,000 jobs and become a global leader.

With an expected two billion extra people on the planet to feed by 2050, coupled with changing tastes and dietary preferences, the world is going to need to produce more protein, more sustainably and from more sources.

The report says growth opportunities include new plant-based products, turning lesser cuts of red meat into value-added protein powders and nutraceuticals, developing higher-protein and better tasting legume crops, creating a new sustainable industry in Australian white-flesh fish, and exploring non-traditional forms of protein like cultivated meat and edible insects.

CSIRO Chief Executive, Dr Larry Marshall, said Australia's strong history and global reputation in agriculture and food present a big opportunity for future growth.

"As protein demand grows and new consumer trends emerge, solutions from science can help create new markets and complement our existing, globally competitive traditional markets," Dr Marshall said.

"This will help shift Australia's reputation from being the world's food bowl of commodities to becoming a global delicatessen of unique higher value exports.

"CSIRO's Future Protein Mission recognises the scale of this challenge and brings together a wide network of partners with the latest innovative technology to seize this opportunity for a resilient and sustainable food system.

"We can supercharge growth in our traditional protein industries by harnessing technologies like digital traceability and integrity systems that enhance the premium status of Australian red meat, and grow new complementary protein markets through techniques like precision fermentation to generate a suite of new Australian products."

The roadmap highlights how protein demand can only be met by bringing together animal, plant and non-traditional protein production systems.

The roadmap was developed in consultation with key stakeholders in government, industry and the research sector across Australia's agriculture, food and innovation system.

NEXT-GEN FORD RAPTOR

BY EWAN KENNEDY,

THE Next-Generation Ford Ranger Raptor has arrived. Ford tells us it's; "Designed and engineered to dominate in the desert, master the mountains and rule everywhere in between, the second-generation Ranger Raptor raises the off-road performance bar as a pick-up built for true enthusiasts."

It is powered by a new 3.0-litre V6 Twin Turbo EcoBoost engine producing up to 292kW at 5650rpm and 583Nm of torque at 3500rpm tuned by Ford Performance.

Raptor's anti-lag system – available in Baja2 mode – keeps the turbochargers spinning for up to three seconds after the driver backs off the throttle, allowing for faster resumption of acceleration out of corners or between gears when the driver gets back on the accelerator.

Mated to a 10-speed automatic transmission with each gear programmed with its own boost profile. An electronically controlled active valve exhaust system amplifies the engine note in four selectable drive modes (Quiet, Normal, Sport and Baja2).

Drivers can choose their preferred engine sound by pressing a button on the steering wheel, or by selecting a drive mode that uses one of the following settings:

- Quiet – Designed to prioritise low-volume over performance. Great for keeping the peace with neighbours on early mornings.
- Normal – Intended for everyday use, this profile offers an exhaust note with presence while not being too loud for street use. This profile is applied by default to Normal, Slippery, Mud/Ruts, and Rock Crawl modes.
- Sport – Offers a louder and more aggressive note, for when you want to shake things up a little.
- Baja2 – This is the most aggressive of the exhaust profiles in both volume and note and is intended for off-road use only.

The suspension has lightweight aluminium upper and lower control arms, long-travel front and rear suspension and refined Watt's link equipped coil-spring rear suspension have been designed to deliver more control across rough terrain.

Next-generation FOX 2.5-inch Live Valve Internal Bypass shock absorbers are filled with Teflon-infused oil that reduces friction by around 50 percent compared to those on the previous Raptor.

While the suspension hardware is from



LOGIC: Everything designed for the Next-Generation Raptor is there for a reason according to Ford.

FOX, the tuning and development work was carried out by Ford Performance using a mixture of computer-aided engineering (CAE) and real-world testing.

In addition to working with the drive modes, the system works in the background to prepare the Ranger Raptor for different conditions.

As the shocks compress, different zones within the bypass system give exactly the amount of support needed for the travel being used, and work in reverse as the shocks rebound to full height.

To provide protection against severe bottom outs, FOX's Bottom-Out Control provides maximum damping force in the last 25 percent of shock travel. The system can stiffen the rear dampers to prevent Raptor from squatting under hard acceleration.

Made from 2.3mm-thick high-strength steel, the front bash plate is almost double the size of the standard Ranger bash plate.

This bash plate, combined with the engine under shield and transfer case shield, provides protection for key components like the radiator, steering system, front cross member, engine sump and front differential.

For the first time, Ranger Raptor gets an advanced permanent four-wheel drive system with an all-new electronically controlled on-demand two-speed transfer case, combined with front and rear locking differentials.

On-road

- Sport – more responsive for spirited on-road driving; and
- Slippery – for more confident driving on slippery or uneven surfaces.

tion Raptor is there for a reason," said Dave Dewitt, Ranger Raptor Exterior Design Manager.

"We're communicating what Raptor can do just by the way it looks."

The cabin features jet fighter-inspired sports seats front and rear. They are said to be not only more comfortable but also more supportive during spirited cornering.

Code Orange accents on the instrument panel, trim and seats are enhanced by Raptor's ambient lighting, which illuminates the interior in an amber glow. A leather sports steering wheel with thumb swells, on-centre marking and cast magnesium paddle shifters completes the picture.

Next-Generation Ranger Raptor has a fully digital cabin, with high resolution 12.4-inch digital cluster and 12-inch centre touchscreen incorporating Ford's SYNC 4A5 connectivity and entertainment system, which offers both Apple and Android6 wireless smartphone connectivity. Compatible smartphones can be wirelessly charged via a pad at the base of the centre console. Ford said: "A Bang & Olufsen sound system provides the soundtrack to your next adventure."

MG SET FOR POWER PLAY

SWITCHED-ON advocates of renewable energy generally agree that the 'crossover point' when the cost of producing electric cars becomes the same as that of internal combustion engine vehicles will be 2026... maybe earlier.

In the meantime, automobile manufacturers repeatedly put their money where their mouth is with full EVs and fossil fuel/electric hybrids.

One such maker is MG, the erstwhile British sports car icon now in the hands of the Chinese, and powering.

Indeed, MG is producing both hybrid and straight electric cars, with the latter ZS Essence, at \$44,990 driveaway, being the second most popular non-commercial EV in Australia, after the tearaway Teslas.

The company is already making its way with the ZS all-electric small SUV and mid-size petrol / electric hybrid, the HS, selling for \$47,990 driveaway, \$8000 above its non-hybrid counterpart. The PHEV, recently re-named HS +EV, is the subject of this test.

A seven-year/unlimited kilometre warranty covers the car and lithium-ion battery, while roadside assistance goes the same distance in time.

Scheduled servicing comes around every 12 months or 20,000 kilometres.

STYLING

The MG HS +EV ploughs mainly a lone SUV furrow, its nearest rival, the Mitsubishi Outlander PHEV, being the next cheapest model, selling for \$47,990, plus on-road costs.

The kit-out is considerable.

Based on the top-of-the-range petrol-powered HS Essence and Essence X, it includes panoramic sunroof and 360-degree view camera.

The HS +EV also incorporates a dynamic LED strip turn signal a la Audi / VW, often an indicator of the premium status of a vehicle, while the overall look sticks generally to the mid-size SUV script.

Fancy, chrome grille highlights follow the cues set by traditional 'stars' of the SUV segment, while in profile, curved lines link up with a neat and tidy rear end.

INTERIOR

Standard features are dual zone air-conditioning climate control, leather-wrapped three-spoke sports-style steering wheel and gear-shift lever, alloy pedals, leather accented upholstery, power adjustable front seats – six-way for the driver and four-way the passenger – with manual lumbar support for the driver. The driver's side also is heated.

Soft-touch surfaces with contrasting stitching add a touch of prestige, not anathema to the traditional MG sports car enthusiast. There's no shortage of occupant space and storage is ample, with bottle holders in each door. Up front are two USB ports and a phone tray at the base of the centre stack, cupholders with roll-top cover and a good-size centre console bin.

The back seat is spacious with good leg and headroom. Occupants get air vents and two USB ports, as well as a fold-down armrest with cupholders. Luggage space adds up to 463 litres, or 1275 litres with the second-row seat-backs folded.

There's a power tailgate for loading convenience, however, the 'spare wheel' is limited to a puncture repair kit.

INFOTAINMENT

The touchscreen is a carry-over from other HS variants, while a new 12.3-inch digital instrument cluster, replaces the partially digital cluster of the petrol models.

Paddle shifters are also absent, as is the Super Sport button.

Satellite navigation is there, also Apple CarPlay and Android Auto smartphone integration and a trip computer.

The audio system is a six-speaker outfit lacking DAB digital radio.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

MG HS PHEV power is the result of a combined 1.5-litre turbo-petrol engine, putting out 189 kW of power and 250 Nm of torque and an electric motor attached to the front axle producing 90 kW and 230 Nm.

Combined this adds up to 189 kW and 370 Nm.

The lithium-ion battery, charging the electric motor, has a 16.6 kWh capacity. Power is put to ground via a six-speed automatic transmission.

SAFETY

The HS +EV has a top five-star safety rating based on testing from 2019 and like all models comes with MG's Pilot suite of safety gear.

Included are autonomous emergency braking, lane keeping assist, lane departure warning, adaptive cruise control, rear cross-traffic alert, blind spot monitoring, traffic jam assist, traffic sign recognition, plus automatic high beam.

Also, on hand are, front, front side and side curtain airbags, plus reversing camera and rear parking sensors.

DRIVING

How does the MG HS +EV hybrid system work? When the battery charging the electric motor drops below a critical level, the petrol engine comes into operation, powering the car and helping to recharge the battery.

In EV mode, MG says, the car will travel on electricity alone for 63 kilometres before the petrol engine kicks in. There are variables: how the car is driven and the intensity of climate-control cooling or heating.

Combined fuel consumption is put by the maker at 7.3 litres per 100 kilometres and 1.7 litres per 100 in the Plus EV mode.

Being the height of a sub-tropical mid-summer, with cabin comfort on high cooling, best figure the test car recorded was 5.9 litres per 100 kilometres.

The hybrid is relatively quiet and smooth in operation, with only a low turbo whistle from the petrol motor, a whirr in EV mode and a nominal note when shifting between systems.

Ride is relatively smooth in most road conditions, but with weight concentrated up front steering can be somewhat heavy. The brake pedal needs firm handling too.

As far as battery charging is concerned, the HS EV comes only with a Type 2 AC (slow) plug, with the maker claiming five hours to fully charge the battery from a 7-kW fixed home wall charger.

SUMMARY

With petrol prices soaring, anything that relies less on that stuff for getting around is worth a look. Without the initial expense of going fully electric, plus suffering bouts of 'range anxiety', the MG HS plug-in electric vehicle could be something to consider.

MITSUBISHI OUTLANDER RECEIVES 5-STAR SAFETY RATING

ANCAP has given all 2.5-litre petrol variants of the Mitsubishi Outlander a 5-star safety rating, saying it meets the required thresholds across all four key areas of assessment.

The Mitsubishi Outlander performed well in adult occupant protection tests, with full marks awarded in the side impact and oblique pole tests. Protection offered in the frontal offset (MPDB) and full width tests showed mostly adequate to good results, with some marginal readings recorded.

The Outlander is fitted with a centre air-bag, designed to reduce occupant to occupant injury in side impact crashes, however it did not meet ANCAP's coverage requirements, and a penalty was applied.



SAFETY RATING: Mitsubishi Outlander given 5-star approval.

It performed well in the assessment area of Child Occupant Protection (COP), with the highest score (92%) awarded under ANCAP's 2020-2022 protocols.

Full points were awarded for the protection offered to child occupants in both dynamic tests, with high scores achieved in the

other areas of this assessment.

"The new Outlander offers an excellent safety package and is a comprehensive offering," said ANCAP Chief Executive Officer, Carla Hoorweg.

"Mitsubishi have clearly prioritised the safety of both vehicle occupants and other road users in the new Outlander, and should be applauded for this 5-star result."

The Outlander also scored well in ANCAP's Vulnerable Road User assessment, with the highest score (81%) achieved to date in the Medium SUV category - equaling the second highest score across all vehicle categories.

The Mitsubishi Outlander is fitted with an autonomous emergency braking (AEB) system capable of reacting to both pedestrians and cyclists, with collisions avoided or mitigated in most scenarios.

Good scores were also achieved by the Outlander in ANCAP's Safety Assist area of assessment, with the AEB system capable of reacting to other stationary, braking, and slowing vehicles, and testing of the Junction Assist system fitted showed the Outlander brakes to avoid crashes when turning across the path of an oncoming vehicle.

Full points were awarded for tests of the Outlander's lane support system (LSS), including emergency lane keeping and lane keep assist.

"ANCAP exists to encourage manufacturers to improve their products with every new model generation released," Ms Hoorweg said.

"By providing consumers with the highest level of safety available at the time, manufacturers provide immediate safety benefits as well as sustained road safety benefits for future owners and other road users."

Teen star a class act

Evie Macdonald, the star of ABC high school drama *First Day*, is wise beyond her years. **Siobhan Duck** speaks with the actress about the show's impact

At just 16, Evie Macdonald has a self-assurance, maturity and poise which belies her age. In many ways it's understandable because, when someone spends their formative years fighting simply to be themselves, they are forced to grow up pretty fast.

Although always outgoing, the teenager (who was assigned male at birth) says her self-confidence has only grown since transitioning several years ago.

Macdonald didn't agonise over her gender identity. Just as she understood that her eyes were blue, Macdonald knew, and never questioned, that she is a girl. It was just others who proved harder to convince.

"There wasn't a point in my life where I was like: 'I'm a girl'," she says.

"I always knew. I had grown up knowing it my entire life. My subconscious was always Evie. I have always been here. I was just dressed differently and called by different names.

"So, when I got to transition, people would ask my parents if they noticed any changes or if I was a different person. But they just said I was the exact same kid, only happier."

The teenager stars in the acclaimed ABC drama *First Day*. The series, which is aimed at children, tweens and teens, follows a shy trans girl named Hannah (Macdonald) as she navigates all the usual high school dramas.

Now in its second season, Macdonald hopes the series will continue to demystify what it is like to be a trans person, building greater understanding and empathy.

While the bubbly and extroverted Macdonald's personality is very different to her character's reserved nature, the actress can identify with some of her struggles.

"I mean, some of the rules that Hannah had were very similar to me," she explains.

"Things like, no sleepovers when no one knows you are trans. I was okay with that growing up, because it meant that I wasn't going to be put into a bad position.

"So [it brings up] some of those old memories with my parents as they were trying to help me transition."

Although they have always been hugely supportive of their daughter, Macdonald's parents were initially resistant to her transitioning.

"I fought with my parents for years about it," she says.

"They didn't understand what it was. There was no information. There was no research. There was barely anything for them to look at. Back then, when you searched up the word transgender it came up with drag queens and that's not what it was."

Support system: *First Day's* second season sees Hannah (Evie Macdonald) navigate a new school year alongside friends Olivia (Elena Liu) and Nat (Nandini Rajagopal).



Her parents have come a long way since their initial reactions. In fact, it was Macdonald's mum who saw the casting call for *First Day* and encouraged her to audition.

Although she realised that putting herself out there in such a public role could open her up to trolling, Macdonald felt the opportunity to be a role model for other trans kids outweighed any potential backlash.

"There's always going to be negativity in the world, but I think if I impacted one person's life in a positive way then it's worth it," she says.

"I've actually had countless messages [about the show]."

"It's been really overwhelming. I have had a great deal of support and it's been really amazing."

Like many trans kids struggling with their identity, Macdonald faced playground bullying. Most of it, she says, borne out of ignorance.

"At the end of the day, what does their opinion matter?" she says.

"I am happy, and knowledge is power. And if I ever speak to anyone who is against others being gay or trans, I explain it to them in detail of what it is like, and they often come out realising that what they have been saying is really unkind."

Even now, as an out and proud trans person Macdonald still has to stare down bullies who hide behind fake social media profiles.

"A lot of men have a really big problem seeing me as a real girl," she says with a sigh.

"And I always say to them: 'OK, define what a real woman is then.' They'll usually say stuff like: 'Oh you can't have babies; you don't get a period and your boobs are fake.' 'Let's go through this', I will say to them: 'Not all women can reproduce. Some people can't get their period because they have issues with their menstrual cycle. Does that make them any less

woman? Oh, and another thing, my boobs are real!'"

Macdonald believes her own journey would have been far easier had she grown up seeing people like herself on the TV.

"There were no shows or movies about being trans and I think the thing that fascinated me most was probably *The Little Mermaid* because she went through that change," she reflects.

"I was just drawn to so many things about [Ariel]."

Certainly, there have been big inroads made in trans representation in entertainment in recent years including Laverne Cox's star-making turn in *Orange is the New Black*, the compelling drama *Pose*, which followed the evolution of ball culture in New York and Hunter Schafer's poignant portrayal of the trans teen Jules in Foxtel's teen drama *Euphoria*.

Closer to home, trans advocate and actress Georgie Stone made history when she joined the cast of *Neighbours*.

"There is definitely still a way to go but having that trans representation on TV is so important because it's showing people that we are just normal people," she says.

"We deserve to be in TV series and not be just based around: 'Oh my god, she's the trans girl!' and all that."

"It needs to be shown that we're normal people because that's what we are. I don't go around my day, every day to everyone pointing it [her gender] out. Because at the end of the day, all my classmates, my friends, they know I am just me."

MARITIME CONSTRUCTIONS

MAINTENANCE DREDGING AT PORT MACDONNELL HARBOUR

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) has engaged Maritime Constructions (MC) to undertake maintenance dredging of sand and seagrass in the Port MacDonnell Harbour.

MC will be on site from late March to early July (weather permitting) to undertake these works and may be conducted up to 24 hours, 7 days a week. Dredge safety information signage will be erected onsite, and all vessels are encouraged to contact the dredge on VHF 14 prior to arrival and departure from the harbour to assist in safe navigation.

The discharge pipeline connected to the stern of the dredge will typically rest on the seabed during dredging operations. However, the discharge pipeline may be floated at certain times to facilitate for dredge movements. In these instances, a SECURITE warning will be issued on VHF channel 16.

At various stages during the works, civil plant and machinery will be present at the eastern boat ramp lane and the beaches to the east of the Port MacDonnell Jetty. When machinery is present at the boat ramp, the eastern lane will be closed temporarily. When machinery is present along the eastern beaches, access to these beaches may be altered or closed. MC asks to please follow MC crew instruction and installed signage when works are present in these areas to ensure the safety of both MC crew and the Port MacDonnell community.

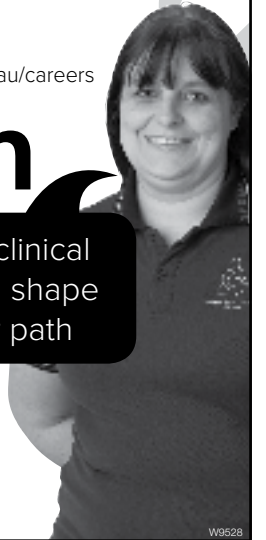

Fish on the bite in a productive weekend

on the water
FISHING

IT was a productive weekend for anglers across the South East, with boats on the water, fishos lining the beaches and plenty of fish caught.

The offshore scene was again excellent.

Countless numbers of shark were caught by bottom bouncers in any depth from 50 metres through to the shelf at 450 metres, with a good mix of gummy and school shark, with many released.

The reef fish have been excellent, with more snapper and nannygai boated in the 30-60-metre line, along with a few blue morwong and terakhi.

There has not been any more tuna news yet, but the signs of bait and marine life out there are amazing, so it should not be long.

The surf fishos did well this week along the local beaches.

Piccininni and Paradise produced some nice fish in the surf, with gummy shark, snapper and elephant fish beached.

There are a few mullo way about the place

but most have still been a little on the smaller side.

The snapper fishing off the beach has been excellent, with some nice fish coming from Factory Bay, Orwell Rocks, Nene Valley and Blackfellows Caves.

The fishos targeting the snapper have been picking up a few whiting as by-catch on the bigger rigs, which is a welcome sight.

While we are talking whiting, there has been some more cracking fish caught this week along the Limestone Coast.

From Cape Jaffa down to Port MacDonnell, it has been a belter of a season.

The fish have been good size, the numbers have been excellent and the distribution has been great.

Land-based or out in the boat, everyone seems to be catching their fair share.

Fish to 50cm have been boated but most are still those 35-45cm models that are perfect for the table.

Gar fishos this week have enjoyed the calmer weather and the fish have been good.

The usual spots such as Hutt Bay, Cape Douglas and Livingstons Bay are all fishing quite well still and I have also seen some

more nice fish from the Port MacDonnell breakwater, Pelican Point and Gerloff Bay.

The usual by-catch species are still mixed in around most spots, so do not be surprised if a few extras come around.

There have been a few reasonable snapper and whiting which have taken a liking to fishos gar baits and you know about it when you hook one of those on such light gear.

A few fishos have been burlying the shallows in Red Rock and Lighthouse Bays this week and getting some nice mullet.

The old mullet is a great fish to catch and they are pretty good on the plate.

A bit of burley and tuna oil is generally enough to bring the mullet in, then a small sinker and a couple of little long shank hooks baited with some cockles is all you will need for a feed.

There have been plenty of fishos hitting the freshwater and having a look for reddie this week.

Mill Swamp has been popular but the fish have not been huge.

The odd bigger fish around 40cm has been caught but there are plenty of tiddlers between them.

There have been some nice fish from Lake Edward this week.

The Kayakers have done well trolling little minnows, while the land-based guys have done well flicking vibes and spinners.

There has been some more nice fish from the Glenelg River.

The mullo way are starting to bite a bit better now and we are seeing more caught.

Dakota Caines boated a nice 4kg fish on Saturday on a live mullet and a bag of nice bream too.

The putters are still boating some nice fish down in the estuary, with the poles area seeming to be the most productive.

The bream have been spread out fairly well.

I have heard of fish from up as high as the Pines Landing and down as far as the estuary, so I do not think it matters where you pull up, you will find the fish.

The forecast for the coming weekend looks to be a little breezy, but definitely fishable for most.

Hopefully it stays as forecast and we see a few fish.

Until next week, safe fishing.

It was unusual for Pestka not to complete the night in a season in which he rarely finished off the podium.

In fact, it was an accident in front of the Stark car on a restart which caught Pestka out as the cars in front had not even reached the starting cone, clipped wheels and rolled, leaving the new champion with nowhere to go.

However, the title had been secured by that stage so the real damage was minimised.

For Pestka and crew chief James Stark the title was something the team had hoped to claim this season and was a welcome result after the last two interrupted years of racing.

"It is something we have wanted to win since we started racing the SRA," Pestka said.

"It is something we set a goal on to do the whole series, so it was nice to win it."

Pestka said while it was nice to win the series, it was disappointing not to finish the night.

"We have been up there every round really," he said.

"I think we only finished off the podium

three times and it is the second B Main I have ever had to do with the Starks.

"I still thought we could get a good result and I think we could have.

"It was probably one of the most disappointing nights of the year really."

The added bonus was being the first South Australian team to win the title, which Stark said was something special.

"To be the first SA team and driver combination to ever do it in the history of the series is pretty special to us," he said.

"It is probably the biggest domestic series in Australia, so it is good to go down in the history books as the first SA winner."

Likewise, to simply claim the title itself was a special moment for the team, after previous attempts has failed.

"It is definitely a big achievement from Daniel, myself, dad and everyone involved," Stark said.

"We have both run second in it before so it kind of gave us a bit of closure.

"When Daniel finished second with another

er team and we finished second with another driver, it came down to the last night.

"We had things go wrong on the night which didn't go our way, so finally we can tick it off the bucket list."

The logistics involved with completing a season are huge for any team but possibly moreso for a South Australian based outfit. Stark estimated the team would have covered some 10,000 kilometres, with travel times to meetings anything from three hours to around 10 hours.

Apart from the initial Covid restrictions, which saw the opening round cancelled, other issues also came into play, with tyre shortages a major problem throughout the series.

"The whole sport had massive tyre shortages," Stark said.

"We were pretty lucky, we got onto it early enough and got through.

"A couple of blokes helped me out with a tyre here and there, which of course has cost me favours as well.

"But without that we might not have had the tyres we needed to get the results.

"I am certainly thankful for everyone who has helped us out."

For the remainder of the current speedway season, the Stark team will head to Murray Bridge this weekend to contest the Australian 360 Sprintcar title, contest the Easter Sprintcar Trail, before possibly heading to Sydney, then Brisbane for the Australian 410 Sprintcar title.

Much of that will depend on fuel prices and tyre availability. Further ahead the team hopes to contest the next World Series Sprintcar season, should it go ahead. That decision will need to wait until later in the year when announcements are forthcoming.

"World Series is something we have been working towards for the last couple of years but it hasn't gone ahead," Stark said.

"Now we have ticked the SRA off, that is the next level we will be looking at.

"It will depend on funding, tyres, fuel ... there are a lot of 'what ifs' at the moment.

"Everything looks positive to try to attack that if it goes ahead.

"We will just take that how it comes over the next six months and see where it all ends up."

Stunning scene, tough run

From then on he was never in any danger of defeat, eventually running out an 8¾ length winner over Tapering Off in 34.80 seconds.

Giant's Flash, who ran a 512-metre track record of 29.19 seconds in January this year, was yesterday just outside the middle-dis-

tance track record of 34.79 seconds which had been run by the David Peckham trained Pirate's Curse on April 21, 2019.

Owned by the Garry Comans-managed Giant Crows Syndicate, Giant's Flash was the third leg of a running quartet of winners for Compton trainer Tracie Price who at the previous Category 2 meeting had led in a record-breaking seven winners.

Making up yesterday's quartet were Starlight Millie, Rhonda Lily and another Mount Gambier Cup contender in Victory Chase who led all the way in the Gambier Vets Stake (512m).

He defeated kennelmate and perennial placegetter Smokey River by 2¾ lengths in 29.66 seconds.

In the final event, the Hyland Fox Mixed Stake (512m), Moorak trainer Jason Newman's cup hopeful in Departure Gate led all the way and held out the strong finishing

Whole Way to win by a length in 29.71 seconds.

With the cup in mind and having a look at the track prior to the first race was Adele's Entity, the daughter of Fernando Bale x Zara's Entity running 29.90 seconds for Ettrick trainer Adrien Chevalier.

Gotcha Laz's trainer, Lindsay Brookes of Koroit, is now giving consideration to The Commersh Masters (305m), a one-off event that will be run for greyhounds 3¾ years and older, on cup day - Sunday, April 10.

Out of the winner's circle since last September, the son of Fernando Bale x Sisco Sizzle came in for heavy backing in last Sunday's Exchange Printers Masters (305m) on the back of a quick recent trial at Tara Raceway.

Having his first start at the track, Gotcha Laz overcame some mid-race interference before running out a 1¾ length winner over

Charley Davidson in 18.22 seconds.

Meanwhile, the Allendale East-based Peckham was successful at Murray Bridge last Sunday night with Denzell Bale in the \$4000 Murray Bridge Cup Consolation (455m).

Lining up for start number 106, the son of Barcia Bale x Houston Bale brought up his 19th win when leading all the way to defeat Don't Tell Bluey by a length in a time of 25.49 seconds.

Previously trained in Victoria, Denzell Bale joined Peckham's kennels in October last year, before being purchased by the trainer from leading SA owner Tim Aloisi.

Peckham, who has won three Mount Gambier Cup Consolations in recent times with Blitz And Bolt (2017), Silent Jacko (2020) and last year with Sunset Milo, said a start in the Mount Gambier Cup with Denzell Bale was still under consideration.

THREE cup meetings for the four-legged variety in Mount Gambier in the space of nine days.

It has never occurred before and is hard to believe but it will all happen in early April.

The Mount Gambier Gold Cup for the gallops is next Friday (April 1), followed the next night by the Mount Gambier Pacing Gold Cup, with the Mount Gambier Cup for the greyhounds on Sunday, April 10.

So, all of a sudden we have a big week of social frivolity starting in the middle of next week with the cocktail party for the Mount Gambier Racing Club at The Commodore On The Park on Wednesday, March 30.

Then, just up the road on Thursday night is the calcutta for the Mount Gambier Gold Cup (gallops) at the Gambier Hotel.

Mount Gambier cup day on Friday, April 1 at Glenburnie will be a much smaller version of what this city has become accustomed to over the years.

Tickets, at this stage, are limited to 1,000 patrons, a far cry from the previous normal of around 3,500 people for cup day and a mere memory from the halcyon days when nearly 10,000 people reportedly packed Glenburnie.

Many people are asking why the club did not submit a management plan for 2,000 or even 3,000 people, especially as there were 2,500 at the Kangaroo Island cup meeting last month and nearly 2,000 for Port Lincoln cup day a few weeks ago.

It seems the risk and cost factor in these trying financial times was paramount in the decision.

"A management plan enabling more than 1,000 people to attend would also require a significant number of COVID marshals and other resources and, as a small club with limited staff and volunteers, we unfortunately would not be able to meet the required ratio," Mount Gambier Racing Club general manager Brett Watson stated.

"Even with a smaller crowd, we hope to see the city gripped with racing fever and embracing the week's festivities just like the good old days, so come along and enjoy a day trackside with entertainment, local food and wine, fashion and, of course, top quality racing."

It will be a case of first in and best dressed to get a ticket and they can be purchased online via moshtix.

On cup day, racegoers will be able to have access to the Pirate Life Beer Garden or a fully catered package in the traditional Staf's Marquee which includes a three-course meal and drinks package.

Those wishing to not drive to the cup can avail themselves of free buses departing from Jens Hotel half an hour prior to the first race.

The buses will then return to Jens Hotel half an hour after the last race.

Race fields for the Mount Gambier cup (gallops and harness racing) will be published in next Friday's edition of The Border Watch.

Changes To The Cup Itself

For the first time in living history, the Mount Gambier cup (gallops) will not be run over the traditional 2400 metres.

In a move to attract a better quality of horse and also increased numbers, the cup will be run over 2050 metres.

The early tip for the cup is Farooq to be ridden by Jacob Opperman.

Originally, the time-honoured Blue Lake Handicap (1550 metres) was going to be deleted from Mount Gambier cup day and moved to another date on the club's calendar.

"It is back on the program next Friday as Racing SA are keen to have three open-company races (the Volcano, the Blue Lake and the Mount Gambier cup) on the cup-day program," Mount Gambier Racing Club president Peter George stated.

Big Loss For Local Racing

Limestone Coast racing will be the poorer following the recent resignation of Penola Racing Club committeeman/life member/track curator Rob Lepley.

For 33 years, Lepley has been part and parcel of the Penola club and is regarded as one of the best and most experienced administrators in the region.

"I did have one year off when I was involved in an official capacity with junior football," Lepley said.

"I have become disillusioned with the stewards in recent times in regards to instructions as to management and their assessment of the Penola track.

"It was my intention to give it all away at some time in the future but everything has been brought forward."

The affable Lepley will not be completely

lost to local racing as he is still working as a barrier stall attendant on race days.

"I was going to give that away too, but they are short of staff at present due to some having Covid and I will not see them stuck," he said.

Lepley is a former president of the Penola club as well and was heavily involved with Limestone Coast Thoroughbred Racing.

In my opinion, local racing can ill afford to lose the expertise of R. J. Lepley.

Females Dominated The Day

Racing at Penola last Friday was dominated by female jockeys who won six of the seven races.

A double to Kayla Crowther has seen her edge past fellow Adelaide jockey Dominic Tourneur at the top of the Limestone Coast premierships ladder, while one winner to Darryl Dodson (Big Sue) has further increased his lead for the trainer's title.

Two Mount Gambier trainers had success, with Richard Nicholson chalking up his fourth local winner of the season with an all-the-way win by Olatunji (\$11-\$14) in the BM 68 handicap.

Former Queensland galloper Eagles Forever (\$6-\$5) won his first local race at start number 12 for the Richard Wilson stable in the 0-54 handicap.

Punters who follow the Phillip Stokes stable when he rarely sends a galloper to race in the Limestone Coast were smiling after Ginger Creek (\$3.20-\$2.40 fav.) took out the 1400-metre maiden.

Bordertown co-trainers Jimmy and Lisa Dodgson seem to have unearthed a handy middle distance type with Enbarr (\$5-\$7) who made it successive victories in the 1700-metre BM 68 handicap.

New Tab Up And Running

Mount Gambier's newest TAB at the RSL in Sturt Street was given the blessing of approval last Saturday.

Although the agency had opened a week earlier, it was officially opened on the weekend with around 40 people present.

"The TAB representative who attended was more than impressed with the set up and the turnover on the day," RSL Bar and Bistro manager Mark Lane said.

"Two more television screens for racing and other sports will be installed in the near future."

work rate with both bat and ball will certainly put her in contention for league trophies.

Coach Hannah Taylor also has the luxury of Montanna Millard as a back up should the White bats get on top of Jones, which could prove vital in a seven-innings match.

Leonie McCallum and Bec Von Duve have been as solid as rocks on the infield corners for United all year and combined with Sarah Thomson at short, Codie Jackway at second and Hannah Taylor behind the plate, it is an impressive infield to contend with.

But White also boasts an impressive fielding lineup, with the likes of Rachel Bagshaw at short stop, Maddy Sutherland at third and Maddy Bowd prowling at second.

Alli Kreplins and Billie Jones will share the pitching duties as they have all year, with the right/left combination proving effective last week in their tight win against Warriors Blue.

The outfield for White also includes the experienced trio of Jo Hopgood, Kate Altschwager and Linda Dodds, with Brandi Miller in the mix as a utility player.

Sam Brown will lead the side behind the plate and provides a vast amount of experience and calm for her team, evidenced by a crucial out in the semi-final which ultimately changed the course of the game in her team's favour.

Batting will be key and whoever does it better will likely walk away with the premiership.

White will need to keep the ball on the ground and away from Millard at centre field.

They will also need to improve on their conversion of runners in scoring position if they are to upset United.

United will not need to change much from their winning formula of two weeks ago, but will need to manage their nerves and stay

loose against a White side that has nothing to lose.

For club president Jo Hopgood, it is a win-win situation regardless of the outcome.

"It was an incredible feeling to win last week and get both our sides into the grand final," she said.

"We have worked incredibly hard over the past five years on improving the culture, coaching and people-first focus of our club.

"After so many years of being the big improvers, it is finally our chance to claim that elusive premiership."

Indeed, for many players it will be their first taste of premiership glory, regardless of the victor, so a red-hot contest is guaranteed and one not to be missed.

Weekend over far too early

ROUND 2 of the Australian Superbike Championships (ASBK) did not end the way Furner motorcycle racer Dallas Skeer would have hoped.

The plan going into the event at Queensland Raceway was to grab some extra points after a DNF in the the second race in Round 1.

Skeer had never raced at the Queensland venue, with a steep learning curve from practice, to qualifying, then onto the first race.

Unfortunately, as he headed into the fast turn two on lap seven, at around 120kph, a combination of bumps, a dirty surface and the extra urge to make up positions saw him lose the front end and slide off the track.

With extensive damage to the bike, his weekend was done.

"It was one of the worst weekends we have had," Skeer said.

"I started seventh, then fell back to ninth off the line.

"By lap four I got back up to fifth and was charging through pretty well.

"There are a few bumps at turn one and I went a little bit wide coming out of that.

"I tipped into turn two a bit late, slightly off line and was pushing to try to catch the front guys and get a gap to those behind me.

"I lost the front on the dirty part of the track and slid for a while.

"I am totally fine but the front end of the bike is damaged a fair bit."

Skeer said while sliding along the track a myriad of thoughts ran through his mind.

He planned to pick the bike up and continue but on seeing the damage, that was not going to happen.

He said anything that could have come off the front end did, leaving a big repair bill and more importantly, a tight time frame to have the repairs completed or the spare bike prepared to race.

It was a disappointment for the young rac-

er, as throughout his career crashes have been kept to a minimum.

"I don't crash too often," Skeer said.

"But we are at that level now where you are on the edge, riding 100pc all the time, so it is going to happen."

With the next round at Goulburn just a few weeks away, Skeer said he may struggle to prepare his second bike in time.

Parts are hard to come by at the moment, with even a small air sensor not in stock at Yamaha, with no time frame regarding the parts needed being available.

"We hope to have the spare bike ready for Goulburn," Skeer said.

"We really should have two bikes now, then

we wouldn't be in this situation.

"We bought the spare bike brand new from Yamaha and have to build it up ourselves, so it is a bit of a job."

Now sitting down in 17th place in the championship, Skeer's focus has shifted.

He originally had no real plans to contest the South Australian Road Race Championships, instead concentrating on the ASBK season.

However, he will now look to contest the SA titles, with the first round - the Easter Cup - at McNamara Park, then onto Tailem Bend to decide the title.

"My next focus will be doing the SA titles and winning that," Skeer said.

"I won it a few years ago and I think there will be some quick guys in there.

"We want to do the best we can in the ASBK as well but with just four rounds left, there isn't enough time to close the gap to the front."

At the end of the day the weekend was certainly a setback for Skeer but he has lost none of his desire to race at the pointy end of the field.

"It is disheartening putting in all the effort and crashing out but we still have to keep at it," he said.

"We have had a few setbacks but will come back stronger."

Top seniors head to Attamurra

PETER Senior's name can be found on all the top golfing trophies in Australia.

Now in the twilight of his illustrious career, the 62-year-old will look to add the MG Plasterers South Australian PGA Seniors Championship to his CV when he tees it up against some of Australia's best at the Mount Gambier Golf Club next week.

Senior, who became the oldest winner of the Australian Open when he prevailed by one shot in near-impossible conditions at the Lakes course in Sydney in 2012 at age 53, will have the honour of leading the field off at 12.30pm on Monday.

The Queenslander had claimed his other Australian Open title back in 1989, the same year he also won his first Australian PGA crown.

He went on to win that trophy two more times - in 2003 and 2010 - as well as claiming the Australian Masters in 1991, 1995 and 2015.

While Senior is a legend of Australian Golf, he will have plenty of other talented players to contend with in the 36-hole event, part of the national SPArms Legends Tour.

Among those will be 2005 PGA Tour win-

ner Peter Lonard, 1991 British Open runner-up Mike Harwood and a host of other winners on the Australian Tour including Brad Burns, Tim Elliott, Glenn Joyner and David Diaz. Lonard will arguably be the man to beat, with Mount Gambier Golf Club professional John Martin saying the 54-year-old was still a force to be reckoned with.

"He is still young enough and fit enough to play as good as he ever has," Martin said.

An incredible ball striker, Lonard has won the Australian PGA Championship three times and the Australian Open and Australian Masters twice each.

He scored his sole win on the US PGA Tour in the MCI Heritage Tournament at Hilton Head in 2005 and has had plenty of experience in golf's four majors.

He played in those events a total of 26 times, making the cut at the US Open five times from five appearances and at the Open Championship seven times from eight visits.

Lonard just missed out on a win in the Legends Tour in January when he was beaten in a five-hole play-off in the Australian PGA Seniors Championship at the Richmond Golf Club by Guy Wall.

The win earned Wall a five-year exemption on the Tour, and he will be among 54 professionals teeing it up at the Attamurra layout.

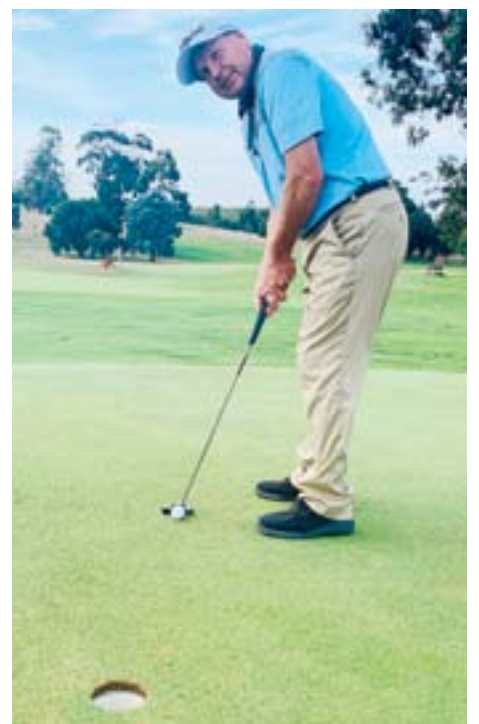
With the prizemoney for next week's tournament at \$27,500, that will give the winner a crucial two-year exemption on the Tour which consists of about 50 one, two and three-day events a year in Australia, New Zealand and Fiji.

Martin, who has won four of the one-day events, said the tournament was a fantastic opportunity for golf players and fans to have an up-close look at some of Australia's best senior golfers.

"It would be an understatement to say this is the best opportunity golf fans in the region will have to watch players of this calibre," Martin said.

Entry to the event is free and play gets underway on Monday from 12.30pm when sponsors and leading amateurs will join the professionals to get the tournament started.

The professionals will be seeded for Tuesday's final 18 holes depending on their scores from the opening round, with the first groups hitting off from 8.30am and the leading group getting away about 10am.

THE Mount Gambier Pioneers headed to Millicent on the weekend for two pre-season games, with the men claiming one win and one loss.
