Trade deal to help meat sales to India

SHEEP farmers form one of many industries set to benefit from a new trade agreement with India.

Clinic closure plan

THE new State Government has revealed previously undisclosed information about the former government's plans to close Covid-19 vaccination clinics.

Premier Peter Malinauskas announced on Tuesday he was "stunned" to find out the previous State Government had planned to close eight clinics in the coming weeks with all but

two state-run facilities expected to shut - including in Mount Gambier.

Instead, Mr Malinauskas announced a two month extension for the clinics which would cost an extra \$637,000.

The Mount Gambier vaccination clinic was originally scheduled to close on May 1 but this will now be extended to June 30.

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell has expressed shock and disappointment to find out the former government nor SA Health had

communicated with him or the community about the previously planned closure.

"The important point to make here is that things work best when there is open and clear communication," Mr Bell said.

"Communities can now prepare for what is coming and if you close a vaccination centre down, logic would tell you other places that are delivering those practices will have increased traffic."

He said other health care centres distribut-

ing Covid vaccinations needed to be aware of the potential increase and have the time allowed to increase staff and resources appropriately.

Labelling it as disappointing for the previous State Government and the Health Department not to have clear lines of communication, Mr Bell said he welcomed the announcement of an extra eight weeks.

Budget boost for aged-care

BOANDIK Lodge chief executive Gillian McGinty this week said she was pleased that both Federal political parties have committed to providing more resources to the aged-care sector.

Last week the Federal Government handed down a Budget which includes a multi-billion dollar investment into the industry including \$17.7b to improve the system, another 80,000 new home care packages, an additional \$10 per resident per day to enhance the viability and sustainability of the sector and more than 33,000 new training places for personal carers.

In its Budget Reply, the Opposition made a commitment to the industry for 24-hour registered nurses on site, pay rises for aged care workers, better food for residents among other initiatives.

Speaking with The Border Watch, Ms McGinty said she was glad to have commitments from both parties with many of the commitments coming from recommendations made by the Royal Commission into Aged Care.

She said a concern in the aged care industry was a shortage of staff and the unavailability of experienced and registered nurses who would remain committed to working and staying in the industry.

"We get a lot of people who come into aged care to gain experience and then move on and go into other areas, which is fine and people learning about looking after the older generation is great, but at the moment we need some stability in our nursing staff," Ms McGinty said.

"These days there are lots of opportunities for employment and a really low unemployment rate so people can move between jobs really easily.

"People like to try different things which is the nature of people and what they are looking for so it is difficult to retain staff for long periods of time."

As for wage increases, Ms McGinty said staff working in aged care were on a low wage but increases were dependent on funding for the industry.

"I think the low wage is a barrier for people wanting to work in aged care; it is a job you have to commit to and that you have to be passionate about," she said.

"You can earn just as much working in an area where you can just come to work and go home without having any of that commitment and passion."

Free Trade Agreement opens doors to India

The move could help boost sales for the industry enabling growth in a large market.

Dale Price, a Glencoe sheep meat producer, said local farmers should welcome the news.

"India is such a big market with a growing middle class, it has the potential to be a very attractive market for Australian producers," Mr Price said.

"The real value is also that it is an alternative to our reliance on China."

Mr Price, who has visited India three times on farming tours, said there is a natural synergy between the two nations.

Over the last five years, Australia has exported 111 tonnes of sheep meat to India.

The majority of the trade has been premium cuts.

"That [type of cut] will change," Mr Price said.

"One of the issues we face in terms of supplying India with meat is the availability of refrigeration.

"When we have been there, we have seen animals processed and consumed on the same day, and that is because there is really limited refrigeration available.

"But enterprising Australian companies can set up those kinds of facilities in India to ensure good supply chains."

It may be a while before the local industry starts to see the benefits of the new agreement.

"I suspect it will probably take 12 months or more for any real impact," Mr Price said.

"A lot of it will depend on the ability to deliver, with current shipping restrictions

having an impact.

"There is a market, there is a growing middle class, we have the product, and we just need to look at logistics in terms of supply."

Australian Meat Industry Council board director Roger Fletcher said the council has welcomed the news.

"This focus will undoubtedly continue, with Australian sheep meat helping meet the ongoing import demand in India for quality product servicing 5-star catering and high-end retail segments," he said.

"The agreement fits well with Australia's diversified portfolio of export markets, whereby our industry carefully matches specific cuts with market segments and cuisines.

"The removal of the tariff will go a long way to providing more certainty for this trade – especially as the majority of other global sheep meat customers are paying significantly less duty when importing Australian lamb and mutton."

Bonnie Skinner, from the Sheep Producers Australia executive office, said the agreement was a great opportunity for those in the industry.

"For Australian producers and exporters, the agreement will enable our industry to be better placed to help supply some of the demand in India for high-quality sheep meat," she said.

"The Australian lamb industry has a long history of producing safe, quality lamb for customers around the world.

"Securing this agreement signals a new chapter in our bilateral relations and an opportunity for us to work collaboratively for years to come."

Worker shortage solution

PENSIONERS and business owners have supported fresh calls to overhaul restrictions surrounding senior pensioner tax to allow pensioners to work more in paid employment.

According to Australian Super, to receive the maximum Age Pension payment, fortnightly income needs to be under \$180 if the pensioner is single or \$320 a fortnight if they are a couple which lives together or apart due to ill health. For every dollar earned over this limit, the pension will then be reduced by 50c for a single person and 50c per couple.

Mount Gambier pensioner and volunteer Margaret Hogg has had to stop working while on a pension due to health issues but said if there were less restrictions she would have worked more hours per week and longer.

Ms Hogg said she and her husband had to be careful with the amount of work they completed each fortnight to prevent their pensions being affected too much.

"When I was working we were able to pick up a bit of cleaning work and milking cows, things like that to just supplement a bit of extra money," Ms Hogg said.

"Most people I speak to in regards to this have the extra money going towards a holiday or just helping their family and I firmly believe if pensioners are able to work without it really affecting their pension, they should be able to."

She said by not having the extra income it made it difficult for pensioners both physically and mentally as it prevented them from leaving their homes.

"It is bad for people who don't feel involved in the community and extra work does help keep them motivated," Ms Hogg said.

"Having their pensions affected by their wages so quickly and so often can also deter pensioners from working in the first place."

Zema Estate owner Nick Zema said he had hired a number of pensioners during the busy vintage seasons over the years and would hire them for longer if the restrictions were eased.

He said pensioners were usually hired for tractor driving or pruning throughout the year, but found it hard to keep them on the roster for more than one day at a time.

"Retired farmers and pensioners are great for pruning and tractor driving and we have hired a number of pensioners before which works quite well," Mr Zema said.

"If they were able to work longer hours or

more days that would help us out a lot because we can utilise their skills more whereas if they can only work a certain amount of time it is not feasible for us."

He said the ideal number of days for pensioners to work during vintage time would be between three to four days a week, rather than the average of one.

"There are great skills out there that are being underutilized because of these restrictions and I think it is deterring pensioners because there is a lot of red tape holding them back which is an issue," he said.

Ms Hogg and Mr Zema's comments were backed by National Seniors Australia chief advocate Ian Henschke who labeled the system "outdated and clumsy".

"The current system prevents pensioners from working and we have designed a system that actively discourages people from working," Mr Henschke said.

"A lot of pensioners also don't like dealing with Centrelink on a fortnightly basis and by allowing the pensioners to work extra hours, it will not cost the Government money, it is good for the pensioner and the economy."

"What a responsible Government should do is communicate with communities about planned actions being taken and then people can move forward and work with the government for the next round of booster shots or those who haven't gotten vaccinated at this stage," he said.

"If the clinic had been closed in May, it would have put pressure on other providers delivering that service which means clear communication is so important.

"We are coming into peak season, everyone knows that and it doesn't make sense you would close a facility coming into peak season."

Mr Bell said with Covid cases increasing, venues distributing vaccinations may have increased traffic in the near future.

"I don't think the State Government needs to provide these resources forever but clear communication and a timeline as well as support where it is necessary should be in place," he said.

Mr Bell added if other providers were being overrun, looking at other options would need to happen.

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton reassured the community the vaccination clinic would remain open until June 30 to enable people in need to receive Covid vaccinations.

"We urge people over 65 years of age and vulnerable people to get your fourth vaccination as of now to protect from Covid as we head into winter," Mr Picton said.

"We are also calling for children aged five to 11 years to get their first and second jabs."

Pasin calls for vax inquiry

MEMBER for Barker Tony Pasin has called for an inquiry into the reversal of mandatory vaccines for teachers and transport workers within South Australia despite an increase in Covid-19 numbers.

The backflip decision was announced last week and allowed about 204 teaching staff to come back to work while mandates remained in healthcare, aged or disability care, firefighters and forensic science staff.

Mr Pasin made the demand for the inquiry wanting to know the science behind the decision.

Speaking with 5AA Radio, Mr Pasin said the vaccine mandates, first implemented last year, were an attempt to “drive up vaccination rates by mandating them by stealth”.

He also claimed he was not sure the change was due to worker shortages and he wanted to “get to the bottom” of why the decision was made.

“I am struggling to understand the science

that must be behind this decision and I think it is important we have a Commission of Inquiry to get to the bottom of how this decision was made in the first place,” Mr Pasin said.

“I am very pleased [the mandates] are lifted but I don't think they should have been there in the first place.”

Mr Pasin said he remained supportive of

mandated vaccinations for people working in health care services, yet he could not justify extending it to teachers, transport workers or contractors on school grounds.

South Australia Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said the call for the inquiry was “good for getting a headline” yet was not going to change the State Government's support from public health officials.

“We are constantly reviewing the situation within the State; we have set up the Emergency Management Council which meets on a weekly basis to look at all elements of Covid responses,” Mr Picton said.

“I certainly back the health professionals judgements over a politician who is searching for a headline and we here in South Australia now have a limited range of mandates which are consistent with the National Cabinet's decision and supported by the Federal Liberal Government.

“Perhaps Mr Pasin should be raising his concern with his own Government with the inconsistency between what he is saying and what is being said from Canberra.”

Speaking on Mr Pasin's comments about the mandated vaccinations being used to increase the vaccination numbers earlier in the pandemic, Mr Picton said there was no evidence behind the statement and that the decisions were made assessing the occupations where there was a key risk to the community.

“We need to make sure we are protecting staff but also those receiving care in those environments, and by making sure there are vaccinated staff, it allows us to make sure we reduce the potential spread and that everyone is kept safe,” he said.

“We will be continuing to take advice from the experts and people such as Mr Pasin will try to get headlines but I believe our chief health officer Nicola Spurrier and Police Commissioner Grant Stevens have served South Australia well.”

Mr Picton said there was strong evidence of the ethics and safety behind vaccinations for Covid and encouraged those needing vaccinations or boosters to step forward.

Mr Pasin was contacted by The Border Watch for comment.

Donovans shack improvements on the way

GLENELG River shacks at Donovans may no longer be considered ‘dry shacks’ with Grant District Council supporting a major project.

At council's meeting this week, elected members unanimously agreed to pursue both waterway and walkway renovations at the popular tourist attraction which would allow for shower and toilet facilities for the shacks.

The council's decision came following concerns surrounding the destruction of the walkway along the shacks with the Department of Environment and Water needing to reconstruct the area after only 12 months following failures due to rising river levels.

With the renovation of the walkway once again in the pipeline, both elected members and Glenelg River Shack Association members seized the opportunity to also include wastewater services to be installed at the same time.

Association member Brett Orr addressed elected members at the council meeting, stating the commitment from both bodies was welcome within the Donovans community.

“The association believes this is an amazing opportunity to build an asset that draws in the community and eco-tourists alike,” Mr Orr said.

“We believe this opportunity for care and control needs the input of the shack community, council and department to come together and agree on the best design for the walkway so that all parties can agree on the

best design for the walkway.

“I would urge council to take a proactive step to clearly outline the non-negotiables of the walkway upgrade so care and control is realised and can seek to build the vision for the generations to come.”

Mr Orr said it was a positive step for the shacks to be connected to the local wastewater scheme, stating no lessee would opt for a dry shack and the community believed this option was not consistent with holiday accommodation purposes or ratepayers needs.

“The only future for the shacks in the long term is to connect to the community waste management scheme or another that meets

the SA Health requirements and be levied the same as the ratepayers in the shire,” Mr Orr said.

Grant District Council acting chief executive Leith McEvoy said the next step for the project was for council and the department to come up with designs and budget estimates before presenting the findings to elected members for approval.

“The Local Government Association is also very supportive of this project and state it is sitting at the top of their priority list,” Mr McEvoy said.


“The intent is for the shacks to be connected together rather than individually


and, although they may have to have their own holding tank and pump, it will help get the wastewater up into the area near the new Donovans toilet facility.”

Mr McEvoy said the system was expected to go underwater at some stage due to the rise in the river and that the pipes would need to be protected.

Other visions for the future of the area include floating pontoon jetties between each removed shack for the use of anglers, kayakers and the general public.

Currently the area has only one jetty dedicated to public use for angling.

Smart water fountain reaches milestone

INSTALLED less than a year ago, the Blue Lake smart drinking fountain has reached a significant milestone.

Supplying fresh water for outdoor enthusiasts, the fountain - one of many installed across Mount Gambier - has exceeded 10,000 sips and refills for locals and visitors to the popular tourist attraction.

First placed at the Blue Lake in August of last year the SA Water initiative to make tap water more accessible in the community has now provided 4300 litres of water to people walking past.

SA Water senior management of media Joshua Zugajev said the drinking fountain was a smart drinking fountain which tracks the number of uses by the number of times the button had been pressed.

The fountain also tracks the volume of water used.

Mr Zugajev said the use of the fountain was a fantastic outcome for the initiative with the particular location chosen due to it having high foot traffic.

"It is hard for us to predict how popular a drinking fountain will be but we knew this was a well used area which would allow for it to gain maximum use," Mr Zugajev said.

"It was all about us putting the fountains in locations where they will provide the best services to the community."

He said the fountains also provided environmental benefits by allowing someone who accesses the fountains to either refill their water bottles.

"A single use plastic water bottle needs up to 250ml of crude oil and three litres of water to be made," Mr Zugajev said.

"Having this fountain available is a really substantial benefit to us all acting on ways to make small habits to switch out single use plastic for a more sustainable option."

Pleased with the initial response, he said

it showed the community had embraced the fountains and the project was a good decision.

"The fountains encourage everyone to think about how they can benefit from using more sustainable options for drinking water and putting aside single use water bottles," Mr Zugajev said.

"There are also health benefits for it as well as hip-pocket benefits."

Mount Gambier residents and regular Blue Lake walkers Zena Appleby and Michelle Hommelhoff said the water fountain was a fantastic addition to the walking trail and they had seen a large number of people using it, especially in the summer.

"It is a good idea for those who forgot their water bottles and good for dogs especially on hot days," Ms Appleby said.

"Having free water in the summer time while you are walking is fantastic and having it used so much shows the importance it has.

"We walk the lake every day and see tourists, walkers and even people in their caravans use it a lot."

The fountain is one of 70 installed across the state with a number being around Mount Gambier.

Street chaos from works

COINCIDENCE has caused two separate sections of Mount Gambier's Commercial Street West to be under roadworks at the same time, with the Department of Infrastructure and Trade (DIT) apologising for a lack of communication on the matter.

The department began works around the intersection of Commercial Street and Bay Road on Saturday morning.

A DIT spokesperson has apologised for the lack of communication ahead of the roadworks.

"While the Council and some community members were notified, the department acknowledges that further communication with nearby businesses should have been undertaken before works commenced," a spokesperson said.

"The Department apologises for this and will ensure that suitable consultation is undertaken before any subsequent works in the area."

The ongoing works will include the replacement of signals, wiring and traffic poles, as well as asphalt, line marking and surface reinstatements.

Roadworks are expected to be completed

by the end of April.

Mount Gambier City Council began their scheduled resealing of Commercial Street West between Wehl Street North and Elizabeth Street the following day, Sunday, and these works were completed on Tuesday.

Council's general manager for city infrastructure Barbara Cernovskis said the timing had been a coincidence.

"We had chosen a time that would be the least disruptive to businesses and the community, which is Sunday," she said.

"We had nothing to do with any other road works that happened on Commercial Street over the weekend.

"That was all DIT, we have no control over that and do not get advised of that ourselves."

City Council first announced their resealing works in February, and Ms Cernovskis said they had been communicated thoroughly with the community.

"We have advertised extensively," she said.

"We have got it on our website, we have used our social media, and the team has hand-delivered flyers to the affected businesses.

"That is part of our normal process."

Covid-19 case numbers rise

ACTIVE Covid-19 cases have risen about 12 per cent over the last week in the Limestone Coast, with 1333 active cases across the region as of Thursday.

The Mount Gambier local government area has averaged about 115 new cases a day over the last week.

SA Pathology has confirmed additional staff have been placed to help with any extra demand on testing centres.

"As predicted by SA Health modelling, there has been a significant increase in cases during the past few weeks which has meant more people were required to take a PCR test or a

Rapid Antigen Test (RAT)," a SA Pathology representative said.

"To help manage this demand SA Pathology is increasing staff as necessary and will continue to monitor the situation as we approach winter.

"For close contacts, RATs are readily available as an alternative to the PCR test via drive-through collection sites."

On Wednesday statewide new Covid-19 cases hit a record high of 5784. Modelling from the University of Adelaide released on Tuesday predicted that cases would likely peak at around 5500 a day before declining.

Life saving device for park

A NEW defibrillation machine has been installed at the Frew Park building thanks to the Lions Club of Blue Lake City Lioness Club's fundraising efforts over Christmas.

Raising more than \$2200 from its annual Christmas wrapping appeal, volunteers were able to purchase the life-saving machine which was installed at Frew Park earlier this week.

Club president Beryl Mahoney said the idea for the donation came after she attended a team leadership training event at the building.

"I found out the closest defibrillation machine was at the service station," Ms Mahoney said.

"I took this information back to the club and they thought it would be a fantastic idea to donate a machine and that it would be great for the community."

Ms Mahoney said donating a defibrillation machine was not something the club had done before but was happy they had the opportunity to do so.

"We feel great now the machine is installed and it is good to see the community's money going to something that is needed," she said.

Sunset Kitchen - which uses the premises on a regular basis - was but one of many community groups thankful for the donation.

President Maree Thompson thanked the Lioness Club for the donation, stating it was an asset to the well used building.

"We are hoping we will never have to use the machine but having it here will allow us to help people in need while we are waiting for the ambulance," Ms Thompson said.

"It will be a real asset during the cricket

season as well.

Frew Park gets used quite a lot between the community and community groups even just with people walking around the oval on the weekends."

Ms Thompson said the machine would provide peace of mind for community groups including Sunset Kitchen with many clients being of different ages.

"I was surprised there was not a machine here beforehand and when the Lioness Club offered to donate one we were really pleased because you never know what is going to happen."

Lioness Club member and fundraising organiser Wil Cousins said the most recent gift wrapping appeal had been a large success with the annual event bringing attention from the community across the board.

"We also host a raffle and when people tell us they never win raffles, we tell them that their money is going straight into the community which we see as a win," Ms Cousins said.

"We sit at Mount Gambier Central for two weeks, on two hour shifts each for seven days a week for a gold coin donation but people typically put more than that into the donation box which we think is fantastic. We have been doing it for such a long time now and people know we are there and come back each year."

The machine will also service other clubs such as the Toy Library, the Mount Gambier Cricket Association and Days for Girls.

Empty shops filling

INTEREST in commercial buildings is growing in Mount Gambier, according to city real estate agents.

There are fewer empty commercial buildings around Mount Gambier than two to three years ago, with investment strong in the region.

Herbert Commercial business manager Matt Kain, and senior leasing and sales consultant Shae Landon, say they have seen increased interest in both sales and lease listings.

"We only have one recent [lease] listing that has no applications," Ms Landon said.

"That is a very good indication of the interest that we have got of new business in town, as well as existing business."

It is welcome news to Mr Kain who said the commercial market has improved over the last two years.

"We have had a lot of vacancies prior to this period," Mr Kain said.

"There is not another commercial property we have on the books at all, where we would have had ten to twelve 18 months to two years ago.

"The Mount Gambier main street [Commercial Street] has been transforming, and we are coming to the end of that."

The increase in interest, Mr Kain said, has been caused by movement from cities to regional areas, and businesses that have needed to expand to larger premises.

"It does not matter who you are, supplies cannot be obtained in the old timeframe of 'order today, get it this week', so they are stockpiling and upgrading their storage capacity," he said.

"From little businesses to big multinational companies, they are seeking larger industrial shed storage facilities, and there is a shortage of industrial land."

The high leasing rate has also meant there are more people investing in the region.

"There has never been a lot of commercial property available to purchase, but there are more buyers than there are properties more so now," Mr Kain said.

"The investment into regions is allowing an injection of funds where longstanding properties that have not had much money spent on them in a long time are being seen as a development opportunity."

With the city's growth, Ms Landon said business confidence has started to bounce back after the Covid-19 pandemic.

"We are seeing a lot of small businesses and start-up businesses to be more confident in the market to start exploring and investigating opportunities," she said.

"We are also seeing interest from some of those larger retail brands and chains," she said.

Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce president Hayley Neumann said she is not as convinced that there has been strong movement in business occupancy rates.

"There are still quite a few empty shop fronts," she said.

"Whether you look at marketplace, cen-

tral or down the main street, you can still see empty shops."

Ms Neumann said there may be a limited amount of lease listings, but there are empty properties sitting due to absentee landlords.

"They [owners] do not live here and are happy for it to sit empty," she said.

"They do not want to spend the money on it to get it up to scratch to be leased."

Ms Landon and Mr Kain disagreed with the notion that properties fit to be leased were not being listed.

"There are often complexities that no one really knows what is happening within the ownership of that building," Ms Landon said.

"They may visually be absentee, but you do not know what is going on inside," Mr Kain said.

"As a general rule people do not want to have an asset there costing them money with no return, but there are circumstances that will create that scenario but not very often."

More flights from airline

QANTAS Airways has expanded services into Mount Gambier Airport, despite the airline cancelling some flights recently.

Qantas confirmed that from April flights from Mount Gambier to Adelaide have increased from five to seven services each week, as well as three return flights from Mount Gambier to Melbourne.

While visiting Mount Gambier airport, The Border Watch heard multiple reports of cancelled Qantas flights from the airport, around a month ahead of flights.

Chris Coffey arrived in Mount Gambier last week from Western Australia to visit her son, and regularly makes the trip to see her family.

"I am happy that they have flights, but unfortunately my [return] flight that has been booked back [to Adelaide] has been cancelled by Qantas," Ms Coffey said.

"They changed it to the flight the day before, but I cannot get here...my connecting flight to Perth would still be the same day so I would have to spend the night in Adelaide."

Qantas declined to comment on flight cancellations. Until March last year, Regional Express (REX) was the only commercial airline at Mount Gambier airport.

The airline operates 14 weekly flights between Mount Gambier and Melbourne, and 17 return flights to Adelaide.

A REX spokesperson confirmed that the airline was still rebuilding after the Covid-19 pandemic, which saw 85,000 total passengers in 2019 drop to 13,000 in the first 12 months of the pandemic.

Frequent users of the airport are hopeful the added competition will have an impact on pricing.

"Hopefully it will bring prices down a bit," Mount Gambier resident John Simpson said.

"I fly most months, and it is more expensive here than many other airports."

New ambo's coming but not for a while yet

WHILE the new State Government says it will honour its pre-election pledge for new ambulance officers for the South East, it could another two years before they arrive.

The government made a pre-election promise to employ an additional 24 paramedic and ambulance officers within the region but may not be until 2024.

Health Minister Chris Picton said work behind the scenes was occurring however, the ambulance officers would be recruited in the coming years.

"A key part of our policy is to make sure we

can address what is significant demand that ambulances have been facing and make sure people in the Limestone Coast have access to the service they need," Mr Picton said.

"Year by year there will be additional ambulances set to start and we do have timeframes for the Limestone Coast. We are now undertaking the detailed work in terms of recruitment of South Australian Ambulance Service to make sure we can meet those timeframes, we are also looking at paramedics and the opportunity to scale this up because we now have double the number of people in Flinders

University who are able to get jobs."

Mr Picton said across the State the targets were expected to be met with the government scheduling to ensure they are able to train the extra staff and get them into the job sooner.

"We are unable to just click our fingers and get it done; it will be a four year effort but we have started immediately, have set out schedules of additional demand, areas of great need and we are certainly committed to getting the additional ambulance officers in the Limestone Coast as we know there is high pressure in the area," he said.

A life pretty as a picture

OBITUARY

Prominent Mount Gambier citizen Evelyn Arthur died peacefully on March 30, a few weeks short of her 97th birthday.

Born on May 5, 1925, in the locality of Blackbank on the England/Scotland border, not far from Gretna Green, Evelyn attended Carlisle and County High School and then moved to Edinburgh where she qualified as a dietician.

She had a sliding door moment in Carlisle in 1945 when a grumpy bus driver caused her to miss her bus back to Blackbank and, to pass the time while waiting for the next bus, she went to visit the Browns, a family she knew.

It was there that she first met Eric (Ric) Arthur from Mount Gambier.

Ric was stationed in the UK with the RAAF in Bomber Command and was being billeted by the Browns on R&R leave from his squadron.

When they met their lives changed in an instant.

A few years later, after working in London for a while, at Ric's request she bravely took a boat and came out to Australia to visit him in Mount Gambier, and to see whether she would like to stay in Australia and marry him.

Mount Gambier was a long way from the sophistication of London and Edinburgh and, as Ric drove Evelyn into town for the first time, she said she half expected to see tumble weeds rolling down the main street and horses tied up at hitching rails.

To Ric's great delight, and Mount Gambier's good fortune, she decided to stay and never regretted it.

Together with Ric, she threw herself into the local community, built an architecturally unique home on Bay Road, raised four children, made lifelong friends and became one of Mount Gambier's most avid supporters.

Initially she worked at the Arthur Studio photographic business, where she hand coloured wedding and portrait photographs with oil paints in the 1950s and 60s before colour photography became affordable. Many of the photos she hand coloured found prized and valued positions on the walls and mantelpieces in homes across the South East and Western Districts.

In the 1970s she started working at Reidy Park Primary School. As one of the first teacher aides in South Australia, she bucked the trend of teaching using the "whole language method" that was in vogue at the time, instead using phonics to teach two generations of children to read, and thereby leaving an indelible mark on these children, now adults with children of their own.

After retiring she continued to volunteer at

Reidy Park, assisting children with reading difficulties, well into her 80s. Her final few years were spent at St. Mary's Boardik, where she enjoyed the caring community and made the most of the many social activities on offer.

An annual book prize in Evelyn's name, for the most improved reader in Years 1 and 2, has been established at Reidy Park Primary School.

Evelyn's funeral was held yesterday at Carinya Gardens Cemetery.

She leaves four children, eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Influenced by his own emotions, Mr Sundstrom said he felt "very sad" when he was creating the painting.

"I was asked to put my emotions into a painting and used two brushes at the same time with so many different colours and it just appeared from there," he said.

"Once I was finished, it had such a large amount of emotion put into it that I actually put it into a cupboard for two weeks before I could bring it out."

Speaking on the benefit of painting, Mr Sundstrom said it had helped him with his mental health and provided mindfulness.

"I have achieved some great paintings that I have given away since beginning and even had an auction last year for Baptist Care's Christmas Appeal," Mr Sundstrom said.

"That was a wonderful thing to do and it raised quite a bit of money for the children."

Now a member of the SEAS, he said having community support only encouraged him to continue his work with a number of other paintings in the works already.

"I also have a few ideas for next year's competition," he said.

"I thought I was out of my league with the other great artists and the work they have put in because some days I can have a canvas sitting on the table and nothing happens until I am inspired and other days I don't do any painting at all."

Mr Sundstrom also received second prize for the Mixed Media Award.

DEBBIE Coppleman is a familiar face at the Meals on Wheels office in Mount Gambier.

She originally started volunteering with deliveries, then preparing meals in the kitchen and now handles office work.

Her routine includes talking to clients, preparing menus, and ensuring meals are made and delivered.

There are 140 clients who receive meals on weekdays.

The O'Halloran Terrace kitchen fires up early each morning, and volunteers prepare the food which is then cooked, dished, checked, put into hot boxes and delivered by a two-person driver and delivery team assigned to the various rounds for clients.

"They receive a hot meal from a choice of two, soup and a sweet," Ms Coppleman said.

Ms Coppleman was initially a Meals on Wheels client before deciding to volunteer for the organisation.

"I actually happened to use Meals on Wheels when I had an operation.

"I cannot work and I thought there is no better place to give back to," she said.

"They helped me out.

"I just love the aspect of what we do.

"We keep the elderly and vulnerable people in their homes," Ms Coppleman said.

Without volunteers, services such as Meals on Wheels would not operate.

"We do need a few more people to help out in the kitchen and some delivery drivers.

"Covid has been tough on us," Ms Coppleman said.

Currently, volunteers are unable to enter clients' homes so instead they deliver meals to the door with a cheery hello and make sure they are alright from a distance.

She says one of her former delivery clients pops in to say hi.

Ms Coppleman says the best thing she likes about volunteering is helping the senior community.

"They really love it and need our help," she said.

"It's a good cause.

"One day we are all going to be in the same shoes, so if someone can help us stay in our

own homes, rather than being put in a nursing home," Ms Coppleman said.

Jo Burford is the branch support coordinator, responsible for Mount Gambier, Millicent, Beachport and Naracoorte.

Each branch operates independently.

Ms Burford enjoys working with her Meals on Wheels colleagues, the variety in the job and making sure of the clients' well-being.

"Mostly, I look after compliance and au-

diting and ensure requirements are met," Ms Burford said.

Ms Burford said the organisation is always looking for people to help out with different roles and commitment levels on offer to suit any volunteer.

"If you can help, the organisation would love to hear from you," she said.

New Ranger put to the test

DISGUISED Ford prototype cars were spotted earlier this week in Mount Gambier.

The Border Watch received reports that the cars were being tested in the Limestone Coast's sand dunes and beaches.

It is understood that the Ranger Raptor and Everest travelled from Robe, through Little Dip Conservation Park, and then to Canunda National Park.

The Ranger was a left-hand-drive and going through its final stages of testing ready for the overseas market. The team of four engineers spent Monday evening in Mount Gambier.

Earlier this year Ford released details and images of both vehicles.

While covered in camouflaged decals, the effort to disguise the car was rather subtle given the decals had 'Ranger' printed on them.

Motor vehicle companies often use vaguely disguised prototypes to attract public attention in the final stages of development to build excitement about a new model car.

The new Ford Ranger is expected to go on sale mid-year and, despite pricing not being released yet, dealers have reported that deposits are already being taken for the four-wheel-drive.

Barry Maney Ford dealer principal Barry Stafford said the Ranger was designed and engineered in Australia.

"It is the most exciting launch I have ever been involved in," Mr Stafford said.

"The forward orders for the new Ranger have been unprecedented; we have never seen such strong interest in a model in the 28 years I have been involved with Ford."

Seaweed causes problems with dredging at Port Mac

MAJOR dredging works kicked off in Port MacDonnell last week with seaweed and organic material proving more difficult to remove than originally planned.

The major works are being conducted by Maritime Constructions through the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) and will be ongoing 24 hours a day for three to four months.

The works will remove the significant accumulation of sandy materials and seaweed in the harbour entrance and mooring grounds which has caused difficulties for professional fishermen.

Maritime Constructions environmental and projects manager Simon Spencer said that the dredging works had two major aspects, removing the seaweed wrack from the channel, and the sand from around the moorings.

The initial dredging concept of the seaweed was complicated due to the presence of fine silts that caused screen blockages.

"We have now had to modify the method, but have proven our ability to recover the seaweed in bulk and now have some new engi-

neering solutions proposed," Mr Spencer said.

"The challenge is to separate the seaweed from the water and we believe we can achieve this now on a larger scale.

"And, in the meantime, we have moved onto the sand dredging component...so we can move on and keep being productive.

"It is a challenging project but it is nothing we are unfamiliar with."

Mr Spencer said he was hopeful the problem will not cause any delays in the schedule.

"It is early days, we are expecting to be on site for three or four months.

"Some days will be productive, and we will advance quite quickly and other days not so much due to working around moorings and fishing vessels.

"We are also expecting to have some weather delays inside that timeline.

"It is important we that we work within our EPA licence requirements and will be continually monitoring water quality."

With the work being the first dredging project in the bay since 2006, Mr Spencer said it could not be estimated how long before dredging will need to occur again.

"The sand dredging will have a fairly long-

term impact...I expect it would be good for five years," he said.

"However, it is uncertain in terms of the organic and seaweed inside the channel once dredged how long before they return due to a range of influences from inside and outside the harbour."

Sand removed from the bay will be placed onto Port MacDonnell beaches and should only have a short-term effect.

The sand discharge will be grey during dredging due to the time spent in water, likely with an initial odour.

The sand will return to its natural colour as it dries within 12 to 24 hours.

"The beach will probably be slightly taller in its height due to the extra sand on the beach," Mr Spencer said.

"But we are expecting heavy wave action will disperse it naturally along the beach, and it is unlikely for there to be long term visible changes in beach shape or profile."

Deputy Mayor for Grant District Council and Port MacDonnell resident Gill Clayfield said the harbour's conditions had been disrupting the professional fishermen.

"A lot of the fishermen could only fill their boats with fuel in the wharf on a high tide, and

some could only get to their moorings on a high tide," Ms Clayfield said.

"It even impacts the large recreational boats; I think it will make a huge difference.

"The fishing industry is going through a slump at the moment because of the trouble with China, but it is a multi-million-dollar industry that the whole Limestone Coast benefits from not just Port MacDonnell."

A long process to get to this point, Ms Clayfield said the community is relieved it is finally happening.

"They have been trying for over two years to get this to happen, but they had to meet the requirements of the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA)," she said.

"It has been a really connected process, everyone has been kept informed all the way."

Ms Clayfield said residents will need to be prepared that beaches may look different for a while but will return to normal.

"I live on the beachfront, I believe the sand is going to come along in front of my house, but it is not going to be there long term," she said.

"If it is going to fix the problem for a large number of years, a little bit of work on the beach in front of us is hardly going to matter."

Old-school custom sled

THE Majestic Vanners put on an impressive car show at the Valley Lakes recently, with vans being the main attraction.

However, one car which stood out from the crowd was a far cry from anything van-related.

The show included vehicles of special interest and the Dodge known affectionately as 'The Sled' was certainly one of those.

Owned by Mount Gambier's Tyrone Mustey for the last 21 years, the 1956 Dodge has undergone major custom work to create what is seen today.

Originally a four-door vehicle, the Dodge has been cut and tucked in all sorts of places, now a classy two-door coupe.

A stand-out is the flame paint work, which was completed locally by Mark Fry, along with much of the panel work.

The Dodge runs a small-block 350 cubic inch Chevrolet motor, with a turbo 350 transmission and a Mustang eight-inch diff, completed by the owner.

Tyrone said he purchased the car "just up the road" from where he lived and drove it home.

The car was in original condition, with black paint, red leather interior and a bit of rust.

From there the work began in earnest.

"It took three months just to do the changes to the body," he said.

"When I bought the car I got spare front guards, spare front doors, bonnet and boot.

"The only parts that have not been changed are the bonnet and boot.

"We de-scun the doors and made the new doors 150mm longer.

"We tried to make it look like a factory-

produced two door."

While the car looks the part now, it took many years to create the finished product.

"The car was flat black for the first 15 years," Tyrone said.

"I couldn't afford to do all the body work and paint it at the time, so we didn't do the current paint job until 2015.

"Mark Fry (Custom Chassis Panel and Paint) did the panel work and chassis change on the front - it runs a HZ Holden front chassis graft.

"Mark did the paint and his son Taylor was 18 at the time and did all the pin striping."

As for the flame paint job, Tyrone said that was as much Mark's creativity as his own desire.

"Every 50s custom has a pretty wild flame job on it," he said.

"I gave Mark a pretty loose hand - I told him I didn't want the flames to start at the front of the car and I didn't want yellow and white at the front.

"He started masking up and I just kept popping in to have a look.

"He has the forethought to see the finished job.

"I am stoked with the outcome."

The interior was completed in Adelaide but Tyrone said if he was to do the car today, he would use Taylor, who has now set up a shop in town, churning out work "equal to anything in the world".

While Tyrone said he had been offered "pretty good money" for the Dodge, he noted it is not up for sale but will be passed down through the family.

He also accepted the car may not appeal to everyone.

"It is not everyone's cup of tea," he said.

"It is very individual."

Race day at McNamara Park

THE human-powered-vehicles returned to the Limestone Coast recently as competitors took on the McNamara Park circuit in the first race of the 2022 UniSA Australian HPV series.

From lights out, riders were tested, as they pedalled to the max and the vehicles were pushed to their limits across the 2.4km track.

Schools in the region were out in full force and raced alongside some of the the state's best HPV teams.

Australian International Pedal Prix CEO Marcus Lacey was delighted with the series to be back underway for 2022.

"The fact we were able to get on the track this weekend, after what's happened in the last two years with COVID, is a real big plus for us," he said.

"We normally have a really good contingent of school teams as that goes back to our roots of when we started, and many of the community teams are students that have continued with us after they have finished school."

Millicent High School HPV Team took part with RIPT Reloaded for the first race of the series.

The team finished the race in 55th position and 28th in their category.

RIPT Reloaded completed 93 laps across the eight hours.

Mount Gambier High School finished the day in 67th position, 10th in their category.

They completed 55 laps on the day, with a best lap time of four minutes, 28 seconds.

The race came down to the wire, as the Wattle Racing entry, Gonyah, provided close competition for Aurora.

However, the defending champions ultimately proved too strong and held on to win by three laps at the completion of the eight hours.

A total of 71 entries took part in the first race at Mount Gambier in what was a great success for the HPV series, after the last two years were ravaged by Covid-19, which resulted in numerous events being cancelled.

Round two of the HPV series will take place on Saturday, May 26 at Tailem Bend where upwards of 180 entrants are expected to take the grid.

Visa benefits

VIETNAMESE workers will likely be the first cohort of Ag Visa holders working on farms with the Federal Government confirming the south east nation as the first country to partner on the Visa.

National Farmers Federation (NFF) chief executive Tony Mahar said the development was hugely positive news for the agriculture sector.

"The partnership with Vietnam signals the practical beginning of the Ag Visa, an initiative led by the NFF," Mr Mahar said.

"Vietnamese Ag Visa holders will certainly be welcomed arrivals to farms and regional communities across Australia."

Mr Mahar said a significant amount of Australian grain, beef and horticulture products was exported to Vietnam and it was a great continuation of that relationship to have Vietnamese Ag Visa holders working on Australian farms.

The Ag Visa, announced by Minister for Agriculture David Littleproud in September last year, will widen the recruitment opportunities for an uncapped number of low to highly skilled workers.

The concept was conceived by the NFF and

its members in 2016 to address the sector's dire workforce challenges, which have been made worse by Covid travel restrictions.

The Ag Visa, designed to meet the labour requirements of farmers, will allow family farmers, which make up the lion's share of Australian agriculture, to recruit the workers with the skills they need, for the time they need them.

Crucially, only accredited farmers will be able to access the Visa.

"From the inception of the visa, the NFF has prioritised measures to ensure workers have a positive experience on farm," Mr Mahar said.

Mr Mahar said Australian agriculture and the growth of the regions was being curtailed by an inadequate farm workforce.

"During the tough economic times of the past two years, farmers have continued to put food on supermarket shelves, support jobs and contribute significantly to the nation's GDP.

"The Ag Visa is a key part of a suite of measures needed to address agriculture's workforce shortage and to ensure our sector meets its \$100-billion-by-2030 target."

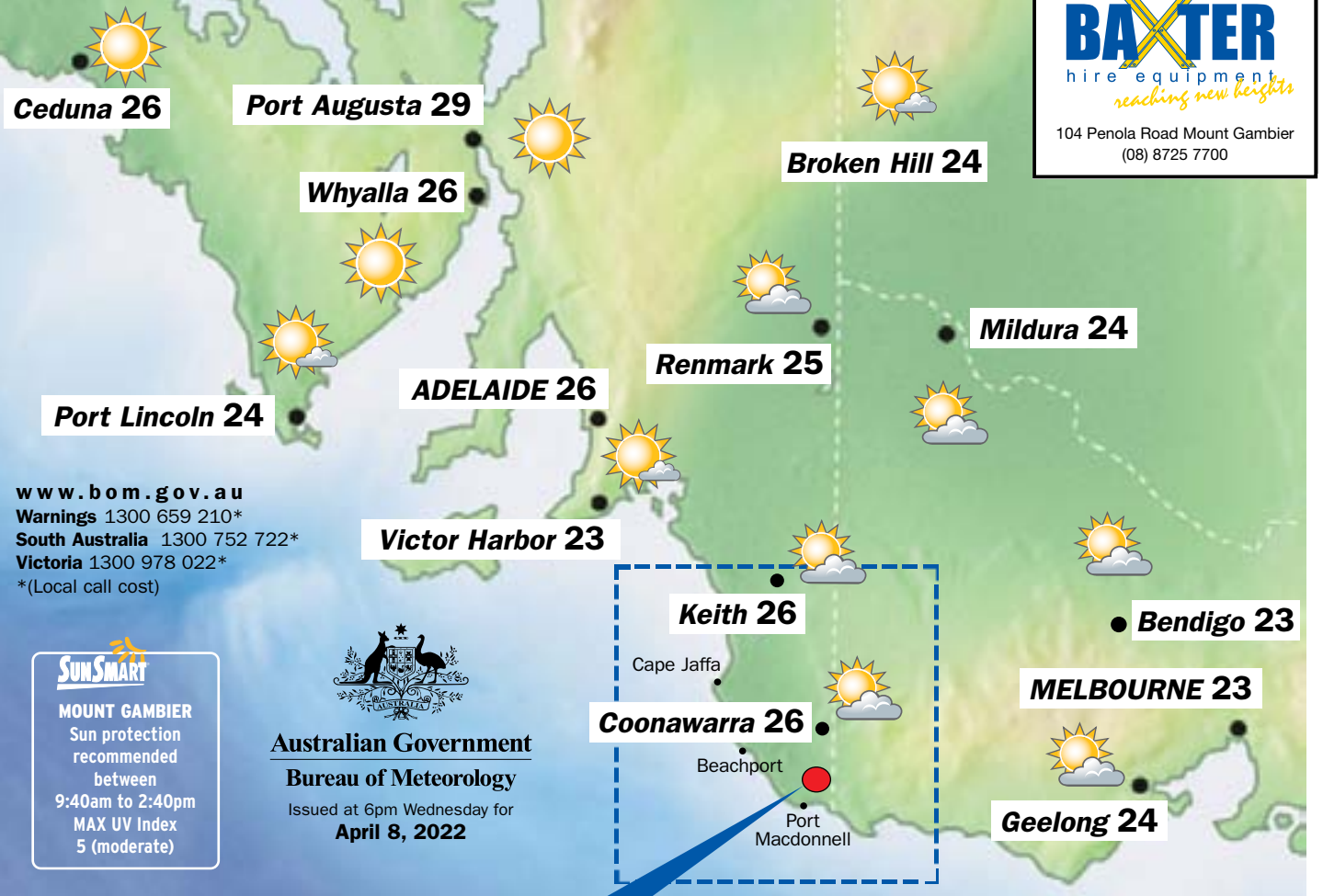

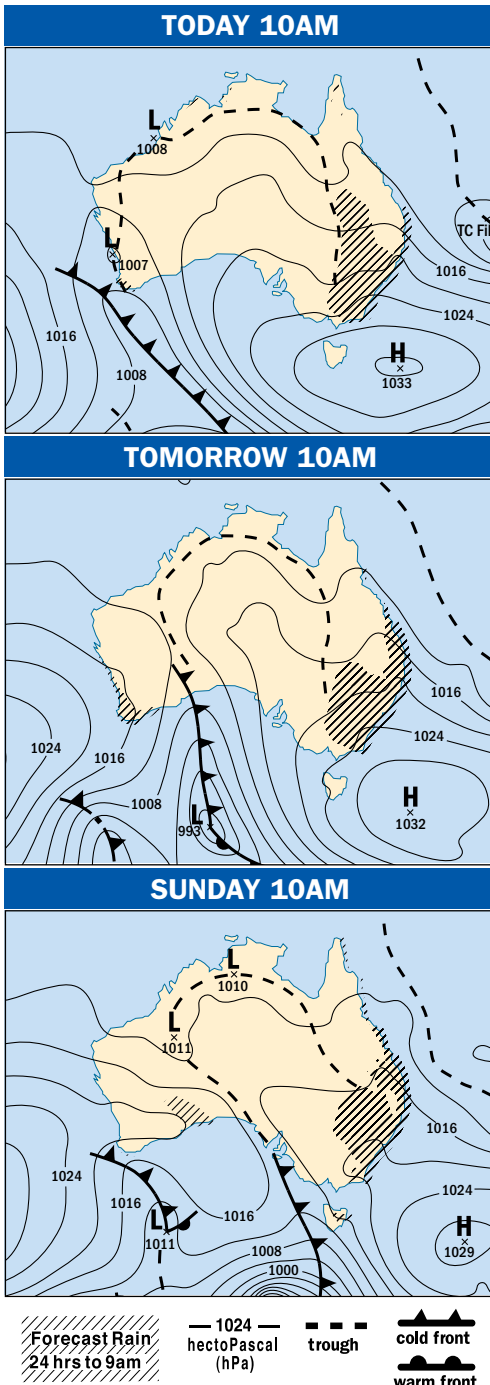

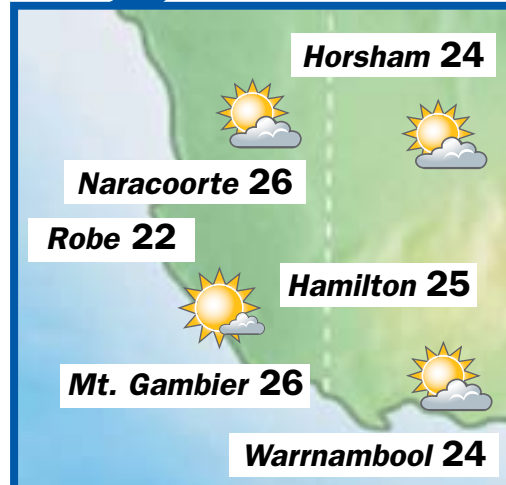

JEEP ON ROUGH TRAIL

MARQUE MOTORING

HAVING not ridden the Rubicon Trail, I could be wrong, but I would be loath to tackle the rock-strewn passage in the Sierra Nevada, rated a ten in difficulty, in the Jeep Compass Trailhawk, which the maker says has tamed the track and earned its Trail Rated tag.

This small-to-medium sport utility vehicle, the flagship of the Compass range, was tweaked last year and is a solitary 'bird', being one of the few diesel-powered compact SUVs around.

One of four Compass models (three petrol powered) that come to market starting at \$39,950, plus on-road costs, the diesel Trailhawk sells for \$52,650.

Premium paint adds \$645, while a Premium Package, including twin-pane panoramic sunroof, ventilated and heated front seats, heated steering wheel and Alpine nine-speaker Premium Audio adds a further \$3950 to the price, putting the vehicle close to prestige car territory.

In keeping with its Trail Rated status, the robust Compass Trailhawk comes with off-road kit including underbody skid plates, 180 Amp alternator, two front red tow hooks, reversible material / rubber cargo area mat, low-range gearing, hill hold and terrain mode selector.

Subject heavily to the designer's pen, the Jeep Compass has been refreshed across the range.

In keeping with its Trail Rated off-road performance the Trailhawk has taken on a unique grille treatment, coloured foglamp bezels, prominent skid plate and stand-alone 17-inch alloy wheels.

Functionality comes to the fore with bumpers, foglamps, and camera radar housed in a higher position for greater protection off road.

This is further enhanced by full LED daytime running lights, high and low beam, plus fog lamps, having doubled in brightness over the old Xenon headlamps.

The rear has followed suit by being given

a more modern, bolder look via its sleek tail-lights.

For many years Jeeps were not known for stylish refinements and easily accessible control systems.

The Compass sets the new standard in this field with a more functional use of space and convenience.

A higher central tunnel offers almost five litres of storage under the armrest and an additional 2.4-litre compartment, next to the new gear lever, with space to take a mini-tablet.

Convenience extends to the rear, with a new automatic tailgate operated by means of a kicking motion under the bumper providing access to the cargo area.

Rubber mats front and centre, plus a rubber / material double-sided mat in the luggage area stand owners in good stead for carting all the kit needed when making the best of

the great outdoors.

The Compass debuts the latest generation Jeep Uconnect with its 10.1-inch-high-definition touchscreen with TomTom navigation incorporated.

Upgrades include voice recognition, woken by the phrase 'Hey Jeep', to control settings and program the air-conditioning and change radio via voice commands.

Wireless smartphone charging is available across the Compass range via a pad in front of the gearshift.

The Compass Trailhawk is powered by a 2.0-litre four-cylinder turbo-diesel engine producing 125 kW and 350 Nm and paired with a nine-speed automatic transmission and four-wheel drive.

Jeep claims combined fuel consumption of 6.9 litres per 100 kilometres and CO2 emissions of 181 g/km.

New advanced driver systems, such as traffic sign recognition, intelligent speed assist, combining the above with adaptive cruise control, drowsy driver alert and automatic braking with pedestrian and cyclist recognition.

Carried over are forward collision warning, lane sense departure warning, electronic stability control with electronic roll mitigation.

Front, side and curtain airbags stay standard across the Compass range.

Keyless entry was debatable, failing to respond to the key fob button on several occasions.

The mystery was solved when a message on the instrument screen announced the key fob battery was low.

Totally out of order on such a new vehicle.

The Trailhawk was slow to respond to the gas pedal and once or twice on an incline, even with foot flat to the boards, the transmission was reluctant to change up and move on smoothly.

Jeep rates the fuel consumption at 6.9 litres per 100 kilometres on the combined urban / highway cycle.

On test it was more like 8.3 litres per 100km on a combination of city and country driving.

As for lane keeping assist, Active Lane Manager in Jeep speak, was heavy handed and rived the steering wheel, causing the Compass to come to heel at the slightest shift from lane centre.

Opt out, and the system can be disengaged.

Flat firm seats would be far from welcoming on an extended run.

Parking manoeuvres are kept well in the picture with the car's 360-degree camera views.

Extra ground clearance and increased approach and departure angles go some way to validating the small SUV's Jeep Trail Rating.

The Compass Trailhawk would pass for a good-looking boulevard cruising SUV, or on unsealed dirt or in snow, but I retain some doubts, due to its lack of muscle, as to its handling of serious off-road obstacles such as boulders or logs.

KIA EV-6 GT-LINE

THE Kia EV6 is an impressive piece of engineering which not only reduces harmful emissions but also provides a quiet, spacious interior and high levels of comfort and clever technology.

The EV6 comes in three variants. Air RWD, GT-Line RWD or AWD.

The Kia EV6 and Hyundai Ioniq 5 are South Korean cousins under the skin.

While their overall shape is similar, there are noticeable styling differences.

The EV6 has a taller rear hatch topped by a strip of LED brake lights that loop right along then merge into the turn indicators.

The Kia has a neat frontal look with a hint of a 'radiator grille' in its shape.

It seems that the public still prefer to have a car that looks like a conventional car.

It remains to be seen how the stylists will overcome this and give us a car which is unashamedly electric.

The Air comes with 19-inch machined alloy wheels and GT-Line with 20-inch ones.

There's a high-class look both in the dashboard and the trim.

The seats are large and comfortable and there's good legroom front and rear.

Two 12.3-inch screens within a unit stretch two-thirds of the way across the top of the dashboard.

The left-hand one is a touchscreen for control of the infotainment features.

The right-hand screen has a digital instrument cluster.

There's wired Apple CarPlay and Android Auto in all models together with satellite

navigation and DAB digital radio.

The Air comes with a six-speaker sound system while the GT-Line has a 14-speaker Meridian Premium unit with a sub-woofer.

Sound output is excellent, all the more so because it doesn't have to compete with the noise from an engine.

It's easy to tune into radio, but as is often the way in our home area DAB+ can frequently cut in and out.

The entry-level Air has a single-motor and rear-wheel drive while the higher-spec GT-Line comes with the choice of RWD also with a single motor or an AWD with dual motors, one at each axle.

The RWD models have combined system output of 168 kW and 350 Nm with zero to 100 km/h in 7.3 seconds.

The Air has a claimed range of 528 kilometres and the GT-Line 504 km.

The GT-Line AWD has 230 kW and 605 Nm and 0-100 km/h in just 5.2 seconds.

The Type 2 charge port is located at the driver's side rear of the car.

The fastest charge time (10-80 kW), through a 350 kW DC Fast Charger, is listed at 18 minutes with a 50 kW DC unit getting the same charge in 73 minutes.

The EV6 has seven airbags; enhanced ABS brakes; multi collision braking; blind spot collision warning and avoidance; rear cross traffic warning and avoidance; safe exit warning; driver inattention alert; intelligent speed limit assist; safe exit warning, as well as autonomous emergency braking included with cyclists and pedestrians.

The GT-Line also has reverse parking collision avoidance; surround view monitor; blind spot view monitor; and child-proof rear door locks.

Range was given as 484 km when we picked it up in Brisbane and it had 98 per cent change. It had been sitting 'idling' for about 10 minutes before we started our test by driving home to the Gold Coast.

So, the computer had decided that our speed of zero km/h was taken into account.

The estimated range was therefore 484 km not the official 508 km.

This eventually balanced out and we could have done close to the official 508 km by the end of our 428 km week's test drive.

Apart from the obvious environmental benefits of owning an electric vehicle the drive experience runs a close second.

We love the silent running and the overall luxury feeling which the EV6 provides in spades.

Then there's the instant torque when you hit the 'throttle' and feel your back pressed against the seat.

The EV6 has been put through the Australian Ride and Handling Program without the

physical presence of Korean engineers, unable to travel because of Covid19 restrictions, but in regular communication throughout with their Australian counterparts.

As is the norm in electric vehicles the EV6 uses regenerative braking to contribute to battery charging.

Two modes are available, Normal during routine driving and Sport for more dynamic use.

The degree of intervention can be controlled through steering wheel paddles and including the option of an Intelligent Pedal, or i-Pedal, mode which allows the vehicle to slow to a stop without applying the foot brake.

Another feature is Smart Regenerative Braking which adjusts the braking level depending upon forward traffic flow.

The EV6 gets the industry-leading Kia seven-year, unlimited kilometre warranty.

The battery is covered for the same period rather than the eight years provided by most of its competitors for their batteries.

WILD 2022 FORD RANGER

AUSTRALIAN specifications of the next generation Ford Ranger have been announced.

It's highly regarded here as it has been specifically designed and developed for this country to suit our Aussie drivers, particularly in ride and handling.

Ford Ranger and Everest program manager Pritika Maharaj said whether a customer's priority is fuel economy, refinement, towing or hauling, the powertrains chosen for Next-Gen Ranger will provide customers with compelling performance and capability.

The highlight is the addition of Ford's proven 3.0-litre V6 turbo-diesel, which is being offered on both Ranger and the Everest SUV.

"We're offering this engine specifically because some customers told us they wanted more power and torque for towing and extreme off-roading," Mr Maharaj said.

Ford engineers treated the 3.0-litre V6 turbo-diesel like a brand-new engine, resulting in 184 kW of power at 3,250 rpm and 600Nm of torque from 1,750-2,250 rpm in both Ranger and Everest.

"We did a lot of application calibration and validation work in both the US and Australia to make sure it would meet the needs of Ranger and Everest customers," he said.

"The 3.0-litre V6 turbo-diesel delivers.

"When you drive a Ranger with the V6 turbo-diesel, it feels like a much bigger truck.

"It feels strong in the sense that it's got plenty of power and torque, which is exactly what our customers told us they wanted."

In addition to the 3.0-litre V6 turbo-diesel, the Ranger will also offer the Single-Turbo 2.0-litre and the Bi-Turbo 2.0-litre inline four-cylinder diesels.

The bi-turbo makes 154 kW at 3,750 rpm and 500 Nm from 1,750-2,000.

It has a bypass system that determines the optimum operating mode, meaning the turbochargers can operate in series (at lower engine speeds for enhanced torque and responsiveness) or the smaller turbo can be bypassed allowing the larger turbocharger to deliver high power.

The Single-Turbo diesel has 125 kW at 3,500 rpm and 405 Nm from 1,750-2,500 rpm.

Transmission choices include a 10-speed auto that's available on the 3.0-litre V6 turbo-diesel and 2.0-litre Bi-Turbo engines.



BIGGER AND BADDER: The 2022 Ford Ranger Wildtrak looks like a much bigger truck, which buyers will love.

The current six-speed automatic transmission available on Ranger will continue with the 2.0L Single-Turbo.

"Our customers told us that one of the reasons they love Ranger is because it's one of the best vehicles on the road for ride comfort and car-like performance. So, retaining that and balancing it with off-road performance has been key throughout the development of Next-Generation Ranger," said dynamic experiences supervisor Rob Hugo.

A 50mm track and wheelbase increase for Next-Gen Ranger has improved vehicle stability on- and off-road, said Hugo. It has also improved the unladen front approach angle and unladen rear departure angle.

The track increases the width of Next-Gen Ranger's tray which now fits a Euro pallet.

The rear dampers were moved outboard of the springs which makes for a more controlled ride whether the vehicle is laden or not.

"The outboard dampers have allowed us to tune a more controlled ride whether the vehicle is carrying a heavy load or not and solve a common complaint of pickups with inboard mounted dampers that they can bounce or skip when unladen," Mr Hugo said.

There is more storage space inside of the Ranger; under-seat storage on Super and Double Cab models retractable drink holders on Wildtrak and Raptor.

There is also room under the bonnet for an optional second battery.

The Wildtrak can be fitted with an optional

auxiliary switch bank (standard on Raptor) making it easier to install accessories like driving lights, a winch and more.

Moulded slots in the bedliner allow you to fit dividers to customise the tray, allowing you to store gear and stop it from sliding around.

Ford is offering two four-wheel drive systems for Next-Gen Ranger.

The base four-wheel drive is a 'part-time' system with a two-speed electronic shift-on-the-fly transfer case offering 2H, 4H and 4L as modes of operation.

Next-Gen Ranger is also available with an on-demand four-wheel drive system (2H, 4A, 4H, and 4L) which allows Ranger to be driven in four-wheel drive on high-traction surfaces via its 4A automatic mode.

When selected, the system continuously distributes power between the front and rear axles for optimum performance in all on-road conditions.

The Ranger continues to be offered with an electronic rear differential lock which can be activated via the SYNC 4A13 screen.

A differential lock allows both wheels on a specific axle to turn at the same speed providing additional traction when you're off-roading.

The latest Ranger will offer up to six, depending on the variant.

The modes are: Normal, Eco, Tow/Haul (auto only), Slippery for on-road, and Mud/Ruts and Sand for use off-road.

These modes adjust everything from the

gearshift to throttle response, traction and stability controls, ABS and more.

"These selectable drive modes are a very simple way of getting advanced traction to the wheels the way it needs to be delivered without having to be an expert," Mr Hugo said.

Tow/Haul mode is a brand-new drive mode and is designed for those towing or carrying a heavy load in their Ranger. Selecting Tow/Haul mode optimises the gear shift timing to maintain power when climbing up a hill or deliver the right amount of engine braking when you're travelling down a hill.

The latest Ranger continues with a maximum braked towing capacity of 3,500 kg with a 350 kg tow ball download limit.

Next-Gen Ranger, depending on the model, now has an integrated trailer brake controller, trailer connection checklist and trailer light check to simplify the process of hooking up your trailer.

Driver assistance technology allow for drivers to programme the size of their trailer for added coverage of their blind spots.

In addition to the selectable drive modes, the Ranger boasts a dedicated off-road screen on the SYNC 4A13 infotainment system.

At the press of a button, owners can access the off-road screen, which shows driveline and diff lock settings, steering angle, vehicle pitch and roll angles.

Prices will be announced in mid-April when orders can be made.

Delivery is expected in June.

VOLKSWAGEN-PORSCHE 914

WHEN introduced in 1969 the mid-engined Volkswagen-Porsche 914 showed that the traditional British roadsters from MG and Triumph had rested on their laurels for too long and were now hopelessly outmoded. Breaking into the American market had long been the key to success for any sports car with sales success in the USA virtually guaranteeing a profitable production run.

By the end of the 1960s Porsche and Jensen both planned to add cars to the list and both would do so in conjunction with another well-known name.

Volkswagen and Porsche have always been closely linked, with Porsche supplying engineering know-how and Volkswagen supplying componentry for Porsche's early cars.

When the six-cylinder 911 of 1963 took Porsche upmarket, the need for a cheaper car was obvious. But even the four-cylinder 912, which quickly became the most popular Porsche, was twice the price of the MGs and Triumphs that were snapped up by eager buyers.

Coincidentally VW was wrestling with the problem of slow sales for the Type 34 Karmann Ghia coupe.

A solution soon evolved.

Porsche would design a new VW sports car using bodies built by Karmann.

Porsche could then buy bodies from Karmann at cost, fit their own engine and create a cut-price Porsche.

Mid-engined designs were taking over on sportscar racing - led by Porsche's own 904 - so it was decided that the Volkswagen 411 engine to be used in the new 914 would be mounted ahead of the rear axle line. Also, suspension would be by 911-style struts and torsion bars at the front with coils and trailing arms at the rear.

To ensure that the new design was distinct from both existing ranges an outside design consultant with little car design experience was employed to develop the new car design.

The new car was launched at the Frankfurt Motor Show in 1969.

In Europe the Targa-topped two-seater was sold as a VW-Porsche while in the US it was known only as a Porsche.

Two versions were marketed: the 914/4 which used the 60 kilowatt, 1679cc VW type 4 engine and the 914/6 with the mildest of Porsche's 2.00-litre flat sixes, generating 82 kilowatts.

The 914/6 lasted only until 1972 when it was replaced by a four-cylinder car - often referred to as the 914SC - fitted with a 2.00-litre version of the VW air-cooled all-alloy 1971cc flat four engine with single camshaft and overhead valves and Bosch electronic fuel injection and a five-speed manual gear-

box driving the rear wheels.

The injected engine fired easily and idled with a Beetle-like beat but its forceful top end response was quite something.

It could be fitted with optional Comfort and Sports packages which included alloy wheels, front and rear anti-roll bars, driving lamps, a centre console and chrome bumper casings.

Unusually it was designed to be serviced

from underneath with major jobs requiring removal of the complete engine, but fortunately this was a relatively straightforward process.

In the US, where price mattered less, the 914 sold reasonably well but in Europe where it lacked a clear identity it never sold as well as its makers had hoped.

Between 1969 and 1975, 118,900 914s were built.

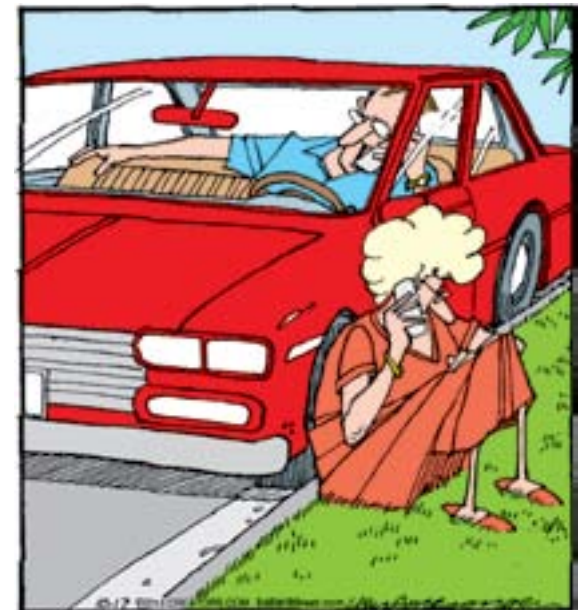

Agents on the money

The first season of *Luxe Listings Sydney* took the world by storm with its lavish homes and uber-wealthy clients. **Siobhan Duck** finds out what buyers' agent Simon Cohen and new cast member, property agent Monika Tu, have in store for the second instalment

There's no place like home. Especially when said home comes with a climate-controlled room dedicated to eating, storing and serving gourmet cheese; has real gold floors and walls or has been decorated entirely with custom-made Fendi furniture and homewares.

These are just some of the more extravagant and outlandish features of the multi-million-dollar properties being bought and sold every day by the elite team of real estate experts of *Luxe Listings Sydney*.

With its unique blend of eye-popping real estate porn and workplace drama, the Prime Video series has proved a huge hit with viewers and turned buyers' agent Simon Cohen into an overnight celebrity.

Of course, Cohen is no stranger to the glittering world of the rich and famous and he has been clinching deals for some of Sydney's most powerful people for years.

It has been an adjustment, however, for Cohen to suddenly find himself the one making people around him starstruck.

That being said, his newfound celebrity hasn't suddenly meant Cohen can go home to the same sort of digs as his uber-wealthy clients.

"You won't find any Fendi in my home - sorry Fendi!" he laughs.

"I've seen it all really, so going home to my own home is very realistic.

"I mean, I have to remind myself that my house, when compared to the rest of the world, I'm very lucky.

"But compared to the people I deal with, we're definitely not on the same level."

While he doesn't watch any reality television himself, preferring to unwind in front of a juicy scripted drama such as *Ozark* or *Inventing Anna* after a hard day of wheeling and dealing, Cohen says he can understand the appeal of *Luxe Listings Sydney*.

"First thing, and I think everyone says this, but the property porn is pretty epic," he says.

"I mean, Sydney is undoubtedly one of the most exquisite cities in the world, and it really showcases Sydney's beauty and what is amazing about living in Sydney.

"Visually, it's a phenomenal show. I think it's also funny. I think it's lovable and I think people get sucked into a world that is exciting. I mean, real estate is a very exciting world. Couple that with beautiful properties and a great city and ridiculous prices."

While his peers were dreaming of growing up to become doctors, astronauts or sports stars, Cohen has wanted to be in real estate for as long as he can remember.

And not just any old real estate - Cohen has always had his eye set on the top end of town.

"I grew up in the North Shore of Sydney, across the bridge, far away and I just had this passion for real estate," he says.

"At one stage when I couldn't drive, I was too young, I'd make my dad drive around Point Piper and Vaucluse to look at all the houses. It was my favourite thing to do.

"My grandmother in South Africa was a real estate agent. And so, whenever we used to go there, I used to do open homes with her. And so, it was my passion."

The first house Cohen sold went under the hammer for \$9.8 million. But since then, he has also dealt with homes that have sold for more than \$50 million.

With his reputation and track record in the high-end real estate market, it's little wonder that Prime Video sought him, together with his good friends and colleagues Gavin Rubinstein and D'Leanne Lewis out for *Luxe Listings*.

"I know it looks very easy in the show, but we've worked very hard to get to where we are - it's a cutthroat industry," he explains.

"And you don't want to do a TV show that paints you in the wrong picture or ruins it all.

"We all decided that Amazon [Prime Video] would make it classy and do it properly.

"We all decided that we'd do it together."

This season, the core trio of real estate gurus are joined by the glamorous and flamboyant property agent and buyer Monika Tu.

Unlike Cohen, Tu didn't grow up in her native China longing to buy and sell high-end homes. Tu began her career in IT, until, with her natural

flair for sales, she made the switch to real estate with her second husband 13 years ago.

Tu says she now loves spending her days touring beautiful homes. She also enjoys the thrill of a sale, and last year she sold a luxury waterfront property with views of the Sydney Harbour Bridge for \$45 million.

"We're providing a service, so we have to stay grounded," she explains.

"I [have] never been jealous [of a client's amazing home]. I love to hear about and to understand other people's achievements. So that's become my inspiration, or my motivation, to work harder and to be successful. Then hopefully one day I can afford a house like that too."

Tu's services are now so in demand with international buyers that she doesn't have time to personally oversee any transactions that are worth less than \$13 million.

"I do have a team to service people who want property for \$5 to \$8 million but my cheapest is about \$13 million," she says.

"I am still very humble though. I work seven days a week and it's never enough time."

After watching the first season of *Luxe Listings Sydney*, Tu knew what she was getting herself into when she joined the show. She said her motivation wasn't fame or to promote her business.

"I want to be an inspiration or maybe motivation to work harder," she says.

"I am a Chinese woman who couldn't speak proper English when I came here. I worked hard and see what I have done. I wish [to] be an inspiration to whoever wants to be in the real estate, or whatever, industry - anything's possible."

Making wallpaper work

EVERYTHING old is new again, and that includes home DIY projects. The latest one to make a comeback? Wallpapering!

No longer just a daggy pastime, wallpapering is enjoying a resurgence. It adds personality and quiriness and is a quick way to liven up a space. It's also a great way to show off your taste and style, as today's wallpaper comes in hundreds of patterns and colours.

Choose your print

Get papering

There are plenty of specific tutorials online; however there are a few key things to keep in mind when you get stuck in. Firstly, the wallpaper you choose will provide instructions as to

what adhesive to use. It's important to use the right one so that your wallpaper sticks to the surface correctly. Measure the space to work out how much you'll need, but always order an extra two or four rolls - accidents happen! Additionally, it's vital to start with a smooth wall, so break out the sandpaper and get scrubbing. And when you get to the end, don't panic if you see bubbles - there are ways to fix them and get a nice smooth finish without having to tear the whole thing down.

Not just for walls

It might sound strange given the name, but wallpaper isn't just for walls

anymore. Nowadays, designers are experimenting with papering all kinds of surfaces, like kitchen appliances, to add interest or, conversely, to hide that bland metal cover and help it better blend with the aesthetic of the room. If you're into restoration, or just trying to bring new life to that tired old desk or chest of drawers, wallpaper just might be the answer. Many a plain wooden furniture item has taken on new purpose after being decorated with strips of colours and patterns. This style of wallpapering often works well with the shabby chic style - but don't be afraid to branch out and do it your way!

poolside at a luxury hotel.

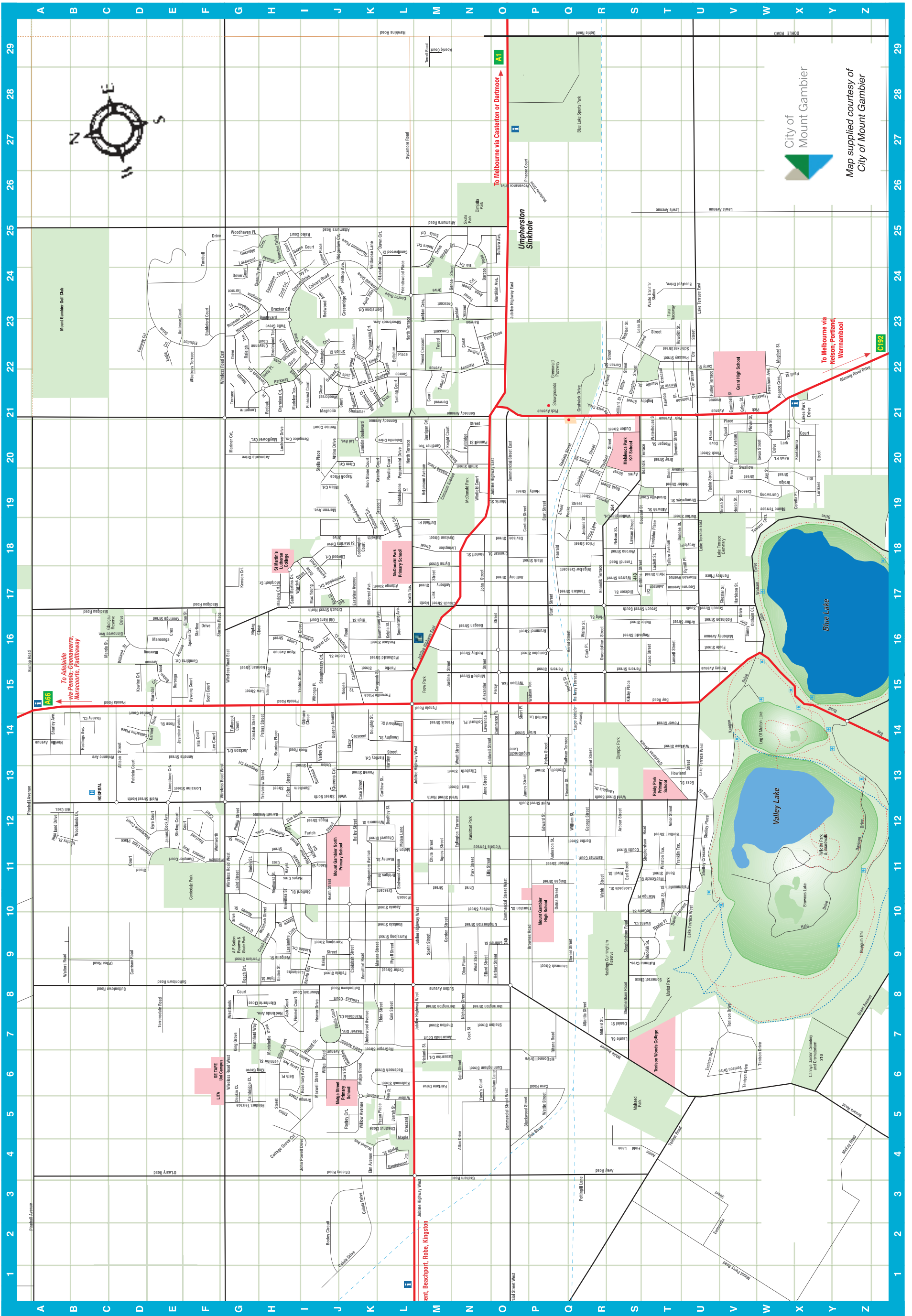

1. Sand all dressed timber.
2. For timber surfaces, fill nail holes with a flexible, exterior wood-filler.
3. Ensure filled/putty surface is sound by conducting an adhesion test.
4. Test the adhesion on all previously painted surfaces by cutting a small 'X' through the existing paint with a sharp blade, press cellulose tape firmly across the cut and then rip off the tape. If the paint comes off, it is unsound and should be removed.

Fast start to series at SEAC

THE South Eastern Automobile Club kicked off its 2022 McPherson Mechanical Autocross series with Round 1 on Sunday at SEAC Park.

Track conditions presented dry and dusty, with a loose surface for the 36 entrants to contend with.

Heat 1 proved to be a handful and series coordinator Dale Cagney wasted no time posting the fastest time in his Mitsubishi Evo, clocking a 1:43.25-second run.

Jayden Edwards put all his Speedway experience to the test in his Commodore and came home with a quick 1:49.06-second lap for second place.

Dion Becker pushed hard in his Falcon XR6 and started the day well with a 1:50.53 run, good enough to head Geoff Wilson with a 1:50.93 in the Peugeot.

Fourth place went to Ryan Poel at 1:51.53 in the Subaru Impreza, ahead of Gary Brown.

Track conditions improved slightly for Heat 2, providing some extra grip in crucial spots.

Cagney repeated his earlier run to top the list with a 1:43.50, followed by Edwards at 1:48.56.

Wilson found a bit more (1:49.65) to hold off Poel (1:50.12), ahead of Becker (1:50.72) to round out the top five.

Now on a roll, Cagney claimed Heat 3 with his 1:42.44-second run again at the top of the list, while Edwards improved on his earlier runs to post a quick 1:47.27-second time, good enough to pip Wilson's 1:47.47.

Becker dug deep and pushed hard for a 1:47.87 seconds, ahead of Poel's Subaru (1:48.62).

After a short break Heat 4 got underway on a track which showed substantial improvement.

Cagney put in a blinder to head the field with a quick 1:41.47-second lap, while Wilson cranked the Peugeot up a notch and used

the improved grip level to get home with a 1:45.41-second lap, to head Edwards, Poel and Becker.

With the dust easing, Heat 5 commenced and a hard-charging Cagney made it five from five, pushing the Evo around a grippy track for his last run, posting his best time of 1:41.31 seconds.

Another who found grip at the end of the day, Wilson pushed the Peugeot around the layout for his best time at 1:45.25 seconds.

Edwards had to settle for third on points in the last run, with a 1:45.91 run, while Poel, hopping from the timing desk to the steering wheel all day, found enough in the Subaru to post a 1:47.07-second lap for fourth.

Becker locked in the points for fifth with his

last outing at 1:48.34 seconds.

Bilney's commanding win

DARREN Bilney dominated the 2022 The Barn Steakhouse Club Championship at the Mount Gambier Golf Club to claim his sixth title and move to within two wins of all-time leader Chris Lovelock.

What shaped up as a potential battle royale against defending champion and four-time winner Hayden Schroder turned into a one-sided affair, the match ending after 29 holes with Bilney leading 8-and-7.

On a perfect day weather-wise, Schroder was unable to get his game going, winning just four holes while his opponent won 12.

Bilney had moved to two-up through the first nine holes and was one-under par at that point.

Schroder needed to produce his best on the second nine to get back into the contest but dropped more shots on the 11th and 12th holes before producing a superb birdie on the par 4 13th to get back to three-down.

Unfortunately he could not repeat that effort, dropping shots on the 15th, 16th and 17th holes, with bogeys that saw him finish the first 18 holes at six-down.

From that point it was just a matter of Bilney not making any bad errors to keep his stranglehold on the game.

He extended his lead to +7 after a birdie on the first hole of the second round, then produced the shot of the day on the 342m par 4 fourth, hitting his drive to within five metres of the green to set up an easy birdie and extend the margin to +8.

Schroder did his best to stay in the match but despite wins on the seventh and 10th holes his title defence was over after the par 5 11th was shared with birdies.

Bilney, who was five-under par off the stick when the game ended, said he felt "pretty good" about claiming the title for the sixth time.

"Obviously Schrodes didn't play his best but I thought I did everything I needed to do," he said.

"I hit some good drives, hit good irons all day and putted pretty well."

Schroder on the other hand was philosophical about the way the match turned out.

"I just wanted to come out and play to my handicap but I was a long way off that," he said.

"I didn't capitalise on his bad shots and I didn't feel good over the putter all day."

Surprisingly that match was not the most one-sided of the day.

In A Reserve, Tony Revill produced his worst round for a long time, eventually losing

to Bryan Pink 11-and-9.

Revill took 15 holes to notch his first par of the day, by which time the contest was effectively over, Pink adding the trophy to his previous wins in C Grade and B Grade (2).

The B Grade championship went to relative newcomer Matthew McCallum, the former East Gambier Football Club premiership player proving too good for Jon Clayton, running out a 7-and-5 winner.

McCallum, who played some golf as a teenager but only returned to the game competitively last year, said his approach shots were the key to his win, while apart from a chip-in birdie on the second hole of the first round, Clayton's chipping proved his nemesis all day.

The C Grade final was a see-sawing battle between two of the most talented young players at the club and in the end it was 11-year-old Blake Schroder who backed up his D Grade win last year by beating 14-year-old Zac Shanks 2-up in a match that went the full 36 holes.

Schroder was quickly out of the blocks, leading by four after four holes, but Shanks, who drove superbly all day, got back to square a couple of times before they reached the final hole with Schroder holding a one-shot lead.

Unfortunately Shanks saved his worst drive of the day for that moment, a bogey from Schroder enough to claim his second club championship win.

While Schroder's dad Hayden was unable to make it two wins for the family on the day, he did win the monthly medal the previous day, shooting a four-under par 68 to finish on net 67, one ahead of Paul Reade and Matt Knowles.

Playing off a one handicap, Schroder shot 34 for each nine, the highlight being an eagle three on the par 5 first hole.

Reade also had his best Saturday round for some time, taking second on a count-back from Knowles, who ruined his chances of a win with a double-bogey on the par 3 16th hole.

B Grade went to the in-form Ian Ewart, who returned a net 73 to finish one shot ahead of Andrew Birks.

In C Grade a count-back was needed, with Craig Torney getting the nod over Flynn Davison after they finished with net 71s.

Meanwhile Thursday's stableford competition was taken out by John Shirley who signed for 39 points, two ahead of Chris Lynch.

On an exceptionally windy day, they were the only players to beat their handicap in the 87-strong field.

However, in the end the weight of supply and the clinical ball movement of the Saints was overwhelming and they powered to a 52-goal victory.

An Under 16 carnival was recently held between the two associations and Fleetwood said there are plans in place for another meeting later in the season.

Bonus beckons Vic trainer

LEADING Victorian greyhound trainer Angela Langton's big day at Tara Raceway last Sunday now has her well placed to collect a Greyhound Racing SA Murray Bridge Cup/ Mount Gambier Cup bonus.

GRSA linked the incentive-based bonuses when the Murray Bridge Cup was first run in 2019 in a bid to entice owners and trainers to then support the Mount Gambier Cup, which is run several weeks later.

The bonuses include \$5000 if the same greyhound can win both cups.

In addition, there is also a \$5000 bonus if the same trainer is able to win both cups (SA or interstate or different dogs).

The Anakie-based Langton won last month's 455-metre Murray Bridge Cup with box-eight runner Weblec Ranger, who has drawn box eight again in Sunday's Carlin & Gazzard MG Mount Gambier Cup final over 512 metres.

Raced by the Weblang Syndicate, which includes Murray Bridge Greyhound Racing Club president Neville Loechel and Jeff Weber, the son of Kinloch Brae and Weblec Rose also drew box eight in last Sunday's sixth and final heat.

Weblec Ranger chased Quinlan Bale throughout, eventually going down by a length in 29.60 seconds.

However, his second placing was quick enough to gain him a start on Sunday and he is one of four finalists for Langton.

Box eight runner Keep It Black gave Langton her first finalist when settling in third spot behind Midnight Blast in the second heat, before finishing strongly to grab second spot in 29.54 seconds.

Raced by the Champagne Partners Syndicate, which comprises Langton and her mother Sue Smith, Keep It Black is by Fernando Bale out of former smart bitch Ar Noveau.

Later in the day, litter brother Keep It Blue - raced in the same interests - carved out a best-of-day 29.52 seconds.

Chasing the speedy Rio Hato until the home turn, he then took up the running before going on to a 2¾ length win over Rhonda Lily.

Langton's other finalist is Blazing Times, also raced by the Champagne Partners Syndicate.

Despite using plenty of the track, the son of Mepunga Blazer x Times Square got up to defeat Moth Rocks by a head in 29.83 seconds.

It was certainly a luckless day for Toolong owner-trainer Phil Lenehan and his three Zambora Brockie x Lektra Viki littermates in Lektra Rhino, Moth Rocks and Toolong Tiger.

Avalon trainer Daniel Gibbons also did not have much luck with his well-fancied pair of Titan Blazer and McKeon Bale but things turned

around in the final heat with Quinlan Bale.

The June 2020 son of Feral Franky and Ethla Allen was having only his fifth race start and will go into the final as the youngest dog in the race.

There are three local greyhounds through to the final - Departure Gate, Midnight Blast and Whole Way.

The box draw certainly has not done them too many favours and their Victorian opposition should be better after having seen the track.

Departure Gate, currently leading in the Mount Gambier Greyhound of the Year, is trained at Moorak by Jason Newman who will rug up his first Mount Gambier Cup finalist after having led in his first winner in mid-2020.

The Champagne Partners Syndicate certainly holds a fair amount of sway over the cup field, Smith and Langton also having bred Departure Gate.

The Nineofus Syndicate and Allendale East trainer David Peckham will hope Midnight Blast can finally deliver them a Mount Gambier Cup.

As will Compton-based Tracie Price, trainer of Whole Way, who, as a \$61 chance, caused one of the biggest upsets in Mount Gambier Cup history when winning his heat.

Meanwhile, it is fair to say the Mount Gambier Cup has certainly come a fair way since its first running back in 1981 out at Glenburnie.

Greyhound racing in Mount Gambier had been operational for only two years when Joan Cruise and Newman McDonnell's Tara Topar (Luska Dubh x Front Rank) defeated Cindy's Range and Autumn Print in a time of 29.83 seconds for the 479-metre event.

This year marks the 42nd consecutive running of the Mount Gambier Cup.

The event was granted Group Listed status in 2018 and carried total prizemoney of \$22,000

when won by Brian Weis' Xtreme Caution.

The following year Steve Bartholomew's Galactic Athena was successful.

In 2020, the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club staved off cancellation due to Covid, with the cup eventually conducted at the end of August.

While still run as a Listed event, prizemoney was decreased - and again in 2021.

But a joint push for Group 3 status resulted in the Murray Bridge Greyhound Racing Club and the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club having their cups granted Group 3 status as from 2022.

Total prizemoney is now \$36,000, a far cry from that Monday afternoon in May 1981 when the Mount Gambier Cup final was run on the Adelaide Cup public holiday.

There was certainly less prizemoney back in those days when on-course bookmakers operated and there was no off-course betting.

But this was still one weekend not to be missed, with the cup heats and supporting events run on the Saturday afternoon.

On the Saturday night was the social function where a steward from Adelaide would attend and oversee the drawing of all events for the Monday meeting.

Leading into the weekend was the traditional Calcutta.

Apparently, Tara Topar was purchased by a bookmaker for \$100.

On-course bookmaker Darren Guthridge will be fielding at Sunday's Mount Gambier Cup final in conjunction with the TAB.

Incidentally, Guthridge is the son of Kevin, trainer of Cindy's Range who finished second behind Tara Topar in that inaugural cup.

Tissues and hankies needed

SUCCESS and recognition for locals on their hometown cup day can become quite emotional affairs as we saw at Glenburnie last Friday.

The surprise packet was trainer Michael O'Leary who was reduced to tears at a presentation ceremony when it was announced that the area where trainers gather at track work and on race days is now officially known as the Michael O'Leary stand.

Everything was going well with Trevor White's speech at the cup presentation until emotion took over mid-way through.

The thrill of finally winning a Mount Gambier gold cup as an owner was not lost on the club's elder statesman, life member, former club president and long-serving committee-man, Trevor Little.

"It's a case of third time lucky," a teary Little explained, referring to being beaten twice previously in the cup with Grey Louie and Imperial Cross over 20 years ago.

But being emotional and deliriously happy is what sport is all about and adds to the excitement of a local cup day.

The Mount Gambier Racing Club also honoured the late Ken Gazzard last Friday by naming its committee room in his honour.

HORSES FOR COURSES

Mount Gambier cup day was a classic example of horses for courses, with local stables winning six of the eight races.

Leading the way was Peter Hardacre with three winners and two of those were runs of the day.

His maiden winner The Big Kahuna is destined for bigger things after being posted three wide all the way in the 1800-metre maiden.

Super impressive was stablemate Spin The Reward who thrashed his rivals in the Volcano handicap, and his time of 1.10.41 was only 0.3

of a second outside the track record.

A coming winner from Friday is Disco Tilmorn on her fast finishing second to Chill With Teejay in the 1200-metre BM 58 handicap.

The atmosphere always goes through the roof when a Richard Wilson trained galloper wins, as was the case after Eagles Forever made it successive victories in the 1550-metre BM 58 handicap.

To top off the day for the locals, Our Ellie Rose (\$5-\$8) won the final race for Bob and Kane Post.

DREAM CAME TRUE UNEXPECTEDLY

When you are involved with a \$31 chance in any race, you are hopeful rather than expecting a victory.

That was the scenario going into last Friday's \$54,750 Mount Gambier gallop's gold cup for the connections of the locally trained Clever Man.

On paper, his lead-up form was good, with two recent seconds (at Mount Gambier and Bordertown) but that was in restricted grade and the five-year-old gelding was taking on open company for the first time in the cup.

Dreams do come true as we all saw when Clever Man, perfectly ridden by Paul Gatt, speared between runners near the dog leg to take out the feature race in near record time to the absolute delight - and shock - of his many owners.

It gave veteran trainer Trevor White his first home town cup and it was the pinnacle of his long career.

What's more, Clever Man is the only horse in his stable at present and White had to go back nearly 50 years to remember his next best efforts.

"I won some nice races with Lucky Blaze back in the 1970's including a win in Adelaide," White recalled.

"It's a great thrill to win your home town cup, especially when you don't expect it but I knew he would run to the best of his ability.

"We paid \$20,000 for him from NSW and he repaid us during his first preparation last year.

"The original plan was to jump Clever Man and I will keep schooling him, but for now we are all poking along having a bit of fun with him."

Plans are now for Clever Man to contest a BM 72 handicap here at Mount Gambier on April 27 over the cup distance of 2050 metres before a possible tilt at the Casterton cup in mid May.

PATIENCE REWARDED WITH CLASSIC DRIVE

Winning a Mount Gambier pacing gold cup requires at least two strong attributes.

You need a pacer that can run a strong 2590 metres as that distance is rarely run these days at the Greenwald Paceway.

Secondly, it certainly helps to have a driver who can show patience in the long distance race.

After the prelude a fortnight ago and with the scratching on cup day of the probable favourite Don't Need An Excuse, it looked as though the prelude winner Royal Speech almost had the cup at his mercy.

The cup field was no stronger than the heat, yet Royal Speech was at very backable odds (\$1.95-\$2.40 fav.) after the money arrived for Sea Lover (\$5.50-\$2.70).

Driver Jayson Finnis certainly did his bit to win his first home town cup by not panicking with Royal Speech when the initial 500 metres of the race resembled more of a sprint race with four pacers looking for the early supremacy.

In what was a masterly drive, Finnis angled Royal Speech in behind the speedsters and did not make his final charge until the 400 metre mark.

From then on the race was as good as over with trainer Barry Finnis chalking up his second local victory since Paris To Berlin saluted in 2014, as Royal Speech comfortably beat Ter-

ror The Christian by five metres in track record time.

In his 13 years of driving, Finnis has achieved plenty with a handful of local driver's premierships and a smorgasbord of winners (including feature races) at metropolitan level.

"I've finally won one (gold cup) and I was so happy as the race has a bit of history for our family, with my grandfather (Doug Finnis) having trained and driven cup winners nearly 40 years ago," Finnis stated.

"Dad (Barry) drove a cup winner (Carbon Gold) and has now trained two cup winners, and it was another cup success for owners/grandparents Peter and Lesley Medhurst."

The cup victory completed a double for Barry and Jayson Finnis, having won the opening race with True Blue Rose.

By modern day standards, the attendance was good considering that the club lost two other feature races on the night (the Mount Gambier Derby & Mount Gambier trotter's cup) due to insufficient entries.

STABLING AVAILABLE

The Victor Harbor harness racing club races only twice a year these days, during the Christmas period and on Easter Sunday.

Local stables have supported the coastal club very well over the years, and club president Lynton Bishop hopes that will continue on Sunday week (April 17) for Victor Harbor cup and derby day.

It's a long haul to Victor Harbor towing a float and stabling is available for trainers wishing to stay overnight (contact Bishop; 0423626322).

Local harness racing continues tonight at the Greenwald Paceway with heats of the Border cup as the feature.
