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Anzac Day city service

THOUSANDS of people are expected to attend Anzac Day services in Mount Gambier on Monday, according to local Returned and Services League (RSL) president Bob Sandow.

Mr Sandow is pictured at the soldiers memorial in Vansittart Park which will be the focus of the Dawn Service followed by a gunfire breakfast at the RSL.

At 9am a service will be held at the Boer War memorial on Bay Road, and an Airmen's service will be held at the Lake Terrace Cemetery.

The traditional march down Commercial Street will begin at the Old Town Hall at 10am for the march to Vansittart Park for the mid morning service.

Mr Sandow said the RSL was encouraging veterans from modern conflicts, including Afghanistan and Iraq, to lead the march this year.

"We feel they have been a little left behind and I am trying to encourage them to come forward and lead us," Mr Sandow said.

New help in mind

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ADULTS across the Limestone Coast will have easier access to mental health services following the announcement of a Federal Government program being rolled-out in Mount Gambier.

Announced this week by the Federal Member for Barker Tony Pasin, \$3.4m will be provided over the next four years to fund a free-to-low cost mental health service in Mount Gambier.

Known as Head to Health, the service will provide access to mental health support for people over the age of 25.

The local Primary Health Network is expected to consult with the community to determine where the Head to Health service will be based in Mount Gambier.

It will be one of 24 satellite services across the nation and the need for the service in Mount Gambier was brought to the attention of Minister for Health Greg Hunt through a

petition which had more than 2500 signatures.

The Head to Health service will complement the work of headspace Mount Gambier which currently services people between the ages of 12 and 25.

Close contact rules part of meeting talks

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AS other states start to relax close contact rules, the Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce is hopeful similar changes will be made in South Australia.

Businesses in the region are still struggling to keep enough staff out of quarantine to stay open, with some missing full days of business due to staffing shortages.

President of the local chamber Hayley Neumann said members had expressed concerns with the rules as they stand.

"It has had a huge impact on staff shortages," Ms Neumann said.

"Businesses have had to close doors early, or not open at all, because close contact rules have meant partners are basically stuck at home for a week."

As they currently stand, anyone that is a household member or intimate partner of a person with Covid-19 during their infectious period is automatically a contact.

In South Australia individuals who have had close interaction with an infected Covid-19 positive person for four or more hours without a mask indoors, also become close contacts.

"It is an ongoing problem," Ms Neumann said.

"We have of course had a lot more cases and it has just exploded down here.

"Until cases come down we are going to continue to see it [staff shortages], unless they change the rules."

Both New South Wales and Victoria this week announced that household contacts of Covid-19 cases will no longer be required to isolate, coming into effect from today.

Household contacts in both states will be required to wear masks indoors, avoid sensitive settings and undertake negative rapid testing to avoid isolation.

Close contact rules will be on the agenda of the South Australian Emergency Management Council meeting next week.

Premier Peter Malinauskas has previously expressed his preference for South Australia's rules to be in line with other state's regulations.

College reaffirmed

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THE South Australian Government has reaffirmed an election commitment to build a \$35m technical college in Mount Gambier by 2026.

In a visit to the region this week, Education Minister Blair Boyer reaffirmed the commitment while visiting education facilities and meeting with local stakeholders.

The college will enable students in Years 10 to 12 to undertake apprenticeship training while also finishing their South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE).

"These technical colleges are a way to make sure all those kids are job-ready and apprentice ready," Mr Boyer said.

"There will be a high standard of apprentices for those employers because we do see a big problem across the last four years, lots of commencement, lots of people starting training, but not many people finishing training.

"It bridges the gaps between schools, vocational education and employers."

One of five centres promised around the state, the facility will be built by 2026.

Originally slated to be at Mount Gambier High School, Mr Boyer indicated that the location would be considered in the planning stage.

"We are looking at location, the initial com-

mitment we made was at Mount Gambier High School; it will be subject first of all to space and where we can put it," Mr Boyer said.

"We want to make sure it is at a location in Mount Gambier where everyone is attracted to use it.

"We will take advice on where it is best to build, it will be delivered, I just want it to be delivered in the best spot."

A round table education meeting, hosted by Barker MP Tony Pasin and attended by Regional Education Commissioner Fiona Nash, earlier this year highlighted some problems with a lack of integration between local industry and education.

Mr Boyer said that the relevant stakeholders would have input into the planning of the facility.

"The commitment we made when we were talking about the technical colleges is that it would be in partnership with TAFE but also with industry training providers," he said.

"This is not going to be just a TAFE thing, and that is more important in the South East given the forestry industry.

"We cannot bury our heads in the sand, we need to be open to other training providers that provide the skills that people need to work in the forestry sector, and make sure that is a part of our technical college as well."

As it currently stands there are limited lo-

cal training options within the region, forcing employers to send workers interstate, or even internationally to New Zealand.

"We should be the centre of excellence here for the forestry industry and timber," Mr Boyer said.

"I think we can achieve that, and we have got money here, committed on the table to make it happen."

Before the election, \$5 million was committed to Mount Gambier TAFE, and Mr Boyer said that money will hopefully start to be spent soon.

"They have already started work here on what the upgrade might look like," he said.

"This upgrade we want complete in this term of government and we will work to start as soon as we possibly can.

"I just want to make sure that we get that bit of work done first on what is needed here long term and make sure that the \$5 million is spent for the benefit of Mount Gambier and the South East community going forward.

"We do not want this to be a story of how \$5 million of taxpayer money was not spent how it could have been."

Mr Boyer took a tour of the Mount Gambier TAFE campus on Wednesday with staff.

"It is always really important for politicians to come to regional areas and talk to people who are doing the work," he said.

UAP's Craig Kelly to visit Mount Gambier

LEADER of the United Australia Party (UAP) Craig Kelly will be visiting Mount Gambier next week.

In conjunction with local UAP candidate for Barker David Swiggs, Mr Kelly will hold a public event at Jens Hotel on Wednesday at 1pm.

Mr Swiggs said the occasion was a chance for supporters to be able to connect directly with their leader.

"This is a great opportunity for all our local UAP supporters to meet with Craig Kelly and hear first-hand, the great work the United Australia Party has been doing in it's compre-

hensive plan to save our country and put Australia first, for all Australians," Mr Swiggs said.

Mr Kelly represented the Liberal Party from 2010 to 2021, before becoming an independent and then joining UAP in 2021.

This will be his first official visit to the region.

Supporting the announcement, headspace manager Tarsh Barelds said it would give people living in the Limestone Coast an opportunity to access more face-to-face services.

"This announcement is going to have huge benefits to the community and gives an option for adult mental health support," Ms Barelds said.

"It is also going to have a lot more impact if young adults know there is a place to go."

She said staff at headspace had noticed when a client transitioned out of the service but still needed extra support it was difficult to identify free or low cost services.

"We have an acute service around here but

there is a gap between affordability and private psychological services," Ms Barelds said.

"Not everyone can afford private services even with incentives, especially if they need a top up or specialist care so it will be fantastic to have a streamlined approach where we can transfer somebody carefully across to other services seamlessly."

Mr Pasin said the Head to Health services would be similar to headspace and labelled it as a massive investment into the region.

"This will be the only Head to Health service to be announced for the Barker region and it's aim is to service both Mount Gambier and the Limestone Coast," Mr Pasin said.

"Mount Gambier was chosen due to having the largest population in Barker and it is an

important service for the region."

He said it was a logical choice but the success was due to the petition.

"This petition showed a really strong message to the Minister for Health that Mount Gambier wanted this facility and when an opportunity presents itself, you have to take it," Mr Pasin said.

"This facility will quickly become synonymous with mental illness.

"If a young person is feeling unwell, they are able to come to headspace and know they will get the support they need.

"Head to Health will work exactly the same but for people aged over 25 who currently don't have a service like this available to them."

Family reunion pays tribute to RSL icon

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MORE than 60 members of the Ashenden family will be visiting the region to commemorate Anzac Day, and pay tribute to their family's service history.

They will be remembering Stirling Ashenden, who passed away 20 years ago this month, and his service in the Second World War along with his four brothers.

The five brothers all served in the 2/27th Battalion and all made it home safely.

Stirling served as president of the Mount Gambier Returned and Services League (RSL) in 1975 and 1978 to 1980, and was made a life member.

He and his wife Dulcie had 11 children, all raised in Mount Gambier.

Stirling would have turned 100 this month and his family has taken the opportunity to organise a get-together over an important date for the family, Anzac Day, to reflect on his legacy.

His daughter Joan Ashenden, who is traveling from Perth to attend, said Anzac Day is a special day for the family.

"With Dad being a life member of the RSL, and being 20 years since he has gone, one of my brothers was in the forces for three years, and I have a nephew in the Navy for 20 years," Ms Ashenden said.

"My brother Graham will also be turning 80, so there are many reasons for us to be together."

Stirling was heavily involved in the RSL all his life, visiting all returned soldiers and attending the club weekly.

"He would be absolutely stoked, he really believed in the RSL and what they did," Ms Ashenden said.

"His family was a very important part of his life.

"He would be over the moon, both Mum and Dad were very family orientated.

"We have over 60 people that are acknowledging them."

Over two years in the making, the event will bring family members from as far away as Brisbane and Perth back to the region.

"It will be the first time some of the cousins will be meeting each other," Ms Ashenden said.

"We will probably take over Mount Gambier.

"My eldest brother at 80, and the latest edition is only four weeks old, there are a lot of us!"

The family will attend the march on Anzac

Day, and some may take part.

"My brother said 'we have got to go to the RSL on a Friday night because that is what we always did growing up'.

"Sunday we have got one of the rooms at the RSL, we have organised historical photographs to bring along."

Graham Ashenden is the only one of the 11 children that still lives in Mount Gambier, and is looking forward to seeing his family.

"It should be good," he said.

"I am getting on so it will be a good chance to see everyone."

Graham said he gets emotional when discussing his parents, but did say he thought it was a lovely occasion and that his father would have been chuffed.

Service at the Bay for Anzac

PORT MacDonnell's Anzac Day Service will be go ahead next Monday, saved from cancellation following the closure of the local branch of the Returned and Services League (RSL).

The event, traditionally organised by the local RSL, faced uncertainty after the branch closed but has been saved by a group of locals and the Grant District Council.

Organiser Reverend Murray Earl said the new group has worked well together to keep the event alive.

"It has been a commitment by local people, the local Uniting Church, the mayor and individuals," Mr Murray said.

"Everybody has been committed to it; it is part of the Port MacDonnell ethos.

"The expectation is that we remember the veterans of days past and present.

"It is part of Port MacDonnell's commitment to the national Anzac Day celebrations and commemorations."

Mr Murray said that he hoped the town would turn out for the event like previous Anzac Days.

"Everybody is very welcome," he said.

"Following the Dawn Service there is going to be a breakfast in the centre of town.

"And of course this year Ukraine is on our mind."

Working group member Richard Ferguson said he and the team were grateful to the RSL for handling previous events so well.

"It's an extremely important ceremony for the local community and is always well attended," Mr Ferguson said.

"Families get up in the dark and come together, no matter the weather, to honour and remember the first landing on Gallipoli at dawn.

"It is a very touching moment when the sun comes up over the sea."

The Service will be held at the Port MacDonnell War Memorial, Corner of Charles Street and Sea Parade, at 6.15 am.

The event has traditionally been well attended by the Port MacDonnell community, with attendance numbers reaching the hundreds.

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Barker's Labor man

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MARK Braes has been announced as the Labor candidate for Barker, running back-to-back campaigns for State and Federal government.

Mr Braes unsuccessfully contested the seat of MacKillop in the South Australian election in March, but that has not dissuaded him from politics.

The Federal seat of Barker has never elected a Labor member and has been held by the Liberal party since 1944.

Incumbent Liberal Tony Pasin has held the seat since 2014.

Admitting that running a Federal campaign so soon after his State campaign would be tiring, Mr Braes said he still wanted to step up to make sure Labor was represented.

"I found that [the state campaign] a really enjoyable experience, a challenge, very different to local government," he said.

"I was tired afterwards.

"I am hoping I will be exhausted on the 21st of May.

"If I am not exhausted I have done something wrong.

"It is important there are other people running for the other parties."

Mr Braes comes from a legal background, working as a lawyer before transitioning to mediation.

He served as Wattle Range Council Mayor from 2006 to 2010.

Nowadays Mr Braes runs Braes Mediation Solutions based in Millicent.

"I have been a Labor man all my life," Mr Braes said.

"My personal story about Labor and my involvement goes back to growing up in Broken Hill as a young man and being proud of the history and tradition of that great city in terms of unionism.

"What excited me about the Federal campaign is, in part, because I believe our community would be better off with a Labor government."

Mr Braes said he would be promoting a policy lead campaign, keeping things friendly with his rivals.

"I have known Tony [Pasin] for a considerable time," he said.

"I am confident that whenever our paths cross and whenever there are public forums that we will have some respectful debates around policies."

When asked what he thought his chances of winning the seat were, Mr Braes said he would rather focus on the campaign than the outcome.

"My job is to get out there, meet people, promote what Labor is about," he said.

"This is a fantastic part of the nation; I love living here.

"In terms of my chances, I will just do my best and we will see where the figures fall on the night."

Mr Braes said his main policy concerns going into the election were aged care, child-care, cost of living and providing support for regional communities.

He joins Mr Pasin, Greens candidate Rosa Hillam and United Australia Party candidate David Swiggs who have already announced their candidacy for Barker.

Labor senator and Shadow Minister for Tourism and Sport Don Farrell joined Mr Braes in Mount Gambier to launch his campaign this week.

Mr Farrell will be seeking to secure another term in the Senate next month, and was quick to make the connection between the State Labor Party's renewed interest in the region and

the Federal campaign.

"The people down here have been impressed by the attention of the State Labor Party," Mr Farrell said.

"There is a bit of a mood change down here that people for the first time are saying 'look Labor is interested in us after all'.

"I think Peter [Malinauskas] is right, we have not paid enough attention to what is a strongly growing and expanding part of South Australia."

After a convincing victory in State Government, Mr Farrell said he was hopeful South Australians would see a benefit in showing the same support Federally.

"I think you will find the combination of a State and Federal Labor government will be good for tourism in this area," he said.

"You will find Labor very strongly committed to spending in the regions, and this is a crucial area.

"State and Federal Labor together can do a whole lot of good work for this region."

No party for McBride

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MACKILLOP MP Nick McBride lost his bid to be leader of the Opposition, receiving one vote on Tuesday.

Parliamentary members of SA Liberal voted this week on who would be leading the party following the resignation of former premier and leader Steven Marshall after the Liberal's defeat at the March State election.

The vote was won by former Minister for Environment and Water, David Speirs, with 18 votes followed by former Speaker, Josh Teague, with five votes, and Nick McBride with one.

Mr McBride said he was not disappointed by the result.

"It did not surprise me at all, and it is fine," Mr McBride said.

In September of last year, Mr McBride threatened to become an Independent but has ruled out the possibility following the vote.

"There is no thought of it, I will be a loyal team member," Mr McBride said.

"I will fall behind and support the new team with all my ability.

"I will try and make sure we are back in government as soon as possible rather than the wilderness for two, or three, or four terms.

"I am excited for the new team that has been elected."

Last week Mr McBride expressed concerns to The Border Watch that the SA Liberal Party had lost its traditional roots.

When asked if Mr McBride thought Mr Speirs was the right person for the job, he said his opinion was not what mattered.

"What is really important is that the majority of the team does," he said.

"Even if I did have other views it does not matter.

"It is a strong leadership team, it is a new leadership team.

"I am obviously going to get right behind the whole team now, and head in a direction that represents the views of Liberals and conservative voters.

"Hopefully we are a force at the next election, that can pick up marginal seats and marginal voters."

Former Education Minister John Gardner was elected deputy opposition leader; Mr McBride did not contest the position.

National Party selects Barker candidate

TINTINARA farmer Jonathan Pietzsch has been announced as the Barker candidate for the SA Nationals in the coming Federal election.

After unsuccessfully running for the State seat of MacKillop in the South Australian election last month, Mr Pietzsch said for his Federal campaign he planned to concentrate on listening to locals, pushing for improved funding for regional health and look at ways to address the regional housing crisis while also finding pathways to increase the supply of skilled workers in regional areas.

"As someone who lives in a rural community, I understand the issues and know what needs to be done to help regional communities thrive," Mr Pietzsch said.

"South Australia needs dedicated Regional Representation in the Federal Parliament to be the voice for regional South Australia, a voice that has been missing for too long."

He said it was no coincidence the National Party seats around the nation had billions of dollars invested into local development and nation building projects including those on the Eastern Coast.

"We are proud of our record of delivering for local communities - improving roads, supporting jobs and businesses through drought and taking practical measures to reduce the pressures caused by increased prices," Mr Pietzsch said.

"Only the Nationals understand regional Australia."

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Timber funding chance

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THE Federal Government has announced \$112.9m to enable timber processors to adopt new technologies.

Grants of up to \$5m will be available through the scheme.

The grants aim to accelerate the adoption of new wood processing technologies in the nation's manufacturing and processing businesses which will maximise log recovery, processing of smaller diameter logs and the creation of new wood products.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin encouraged local timber businesses to apply for the nationwide grant.

Mr Pasin said engineered wood products could be stronger than steel and used for housing and in construction projects.

"It is often said that engineered wood products are the concrete and steel of the century and the point is I want to see those products produced here in Australia rather than imported from overseas," Mr Pasin said.

"This is a co-investment fund and is about encouraging other businesses such as Borg Manufacturing to apply and invest in their plant and equipment so we can have more of those engineered wood products and sequester more carbon, create more jobs and support the timber industry more generally."

Borg Manufacturing general manager Greg

Kenny said the announcement was exciting for the industry.

"Investment in state-of-the-art equipment is expensive and the current investment is

welcome," Mr Kenny said.

"We need the right scaling and forest in this region to support the expansion that is taking place already but there is a potential outcome."

He said it was pleasing to have the Federal Government recognise the importance of the industry, specifically for the engineered wood product industry.

Moorak preschool opened

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MOORAK has celebrated the official opening of a new \$1.8m preschool in the heart of the community after five years of planning.

The new Moorak Preschool building was officially opened last week by South East education director Adam Box and Moorak Primary School and Preschool principal Peter Mitchinson.

Funded by the State Government, the new preschool building is co-located with the primary school and includes activity areas, a withdrawal space, kitchen, administrative support areas and toilet amenities, along with new outdoor features such as a play area, bike path, sensory trail and kitchen garden.

The previous preschool building was big enough for only 25 students while the new facility is capable of having more than 40.

Mr Mitchinson said despite the maximum capacity of the new building being higher, the preschool preferred to maintain student numbers at about 33 reflecting the small, close-knit community.

He said the new facility had exceeded the expectations of staff, students and community members, and he thanked all involved.

"I am amazed at what we have accomplished here and I know this facility is going to make such an impact on the lives of the young children," Mr Mitchinson said.

"The community, our teachers and students have done such an amazing job over the years to be able to get to this point."

Moorak Preschool lead educator Lauren Baudinette said the students loved the new area and enjoyed the new opportunities.

"The centre allows students to engage in meaningful ways and the collaboration and different experiences here is something we were not able to offer in our previous space," Ms Baudinette said.

"The parents are coming in here every day and they have been amazed with the space available for our preschool children and playgroup families that come in as well."

She said the children had responded well to the new area, especially the new outdoor play spaces and having the opportunity to roll down hills and go through a tunnel.

"The kids just absolutely love it," Ms Baudinette said.

"The swings are also very popular and all these activities have been designed to promote playful literacy and numeracy skills and help the children reach their milestones."

Grant council wants details on Covid-19 'herd immunity'

GRANT District Council passed a motion this week to write to relevant health authorities and enquire if current Covid-19 regulations are based on the most up-to-date scientific knowledge about herd immunity post-Covid infection.

The motion on notice, moved by Councillor Gavin Clarke, was prompted by what he claimed was an oversight by health authorities to properly recognise the benefits of post-infection protection, when an individual has caught and recovered from the virus, which he viewed as more effective than vaccinations.

The conclusions drawn were based on Cr Clarke's personal research he had undertaken online.

Council chief executive Darryl Whicker explained in the meeting that the council could choose to enquire and advocate about health policy, but did not have any power to alter regulations themselves.

Councillor Brad Mann indicated that the motion could go further in future, and referenced personal concerns he had about keeping his job due to his vaccination status.

The motion that the council write to relevant government health staff and ministers enquiring on current health policy around people who have recovered from the coronavirus, thereby offering the broadest herd immunity, to return to work regardless of their vaccination status, was passed by a majority of members.

Following the meeting, Cr Clarke said that while he was happy the motion had passed, he believed there was a lot of work still to be done.

When asked about natural immunity following a Covid-19 infection, SA Health said that the best defence is still vaccinations.

"People who have had Covid-19 and recovered should still be vaccinated, as reinfection is possible and vaccination provides greater protection," an SA Health spokesperson said.

"The protection gained from having Covid-19 varies from person to person, and there is not yet data to determine how long any natural immunity will last.

"Getting vaccinated against Covid-19 remains the best way to protect yourself, your loved ones and the community from Covid-19."

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Fantasy fair

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MOUNT Gambier will take a step back in time this weekend for its first ever Fantasy Medieval Fair.

Event organiser Talie Teakle said there is a large community of medieval fairs across Australia but one has never been held in Mount Gambier.

"We got together and reached out to the community and within 48 hours of announcing the date we could have booked the whole weekend," Ms Teakle said.

"This is our first year having this event in the local area and the community is just so into supporting Mount Gambier's first fair."

The event will include many historic activities such as full body armour combat, longbow archery, re-enactments and horse jousting.

Ms Teakle said the organisers did not think they would be able to set up an event such as horse jousting in the first year and said they were "incredibly lucky" to have Australian champion jousting on the program of events.

"There were some things we weren't expecting to have which fell into our laps," she said.

"The horse jousting could be one of the highlights because no one in Mount Gambier has ever seen a spectacle like this."

Ms Teakle added there are two professional combat arenas available for spectators to either watch competitions between South Australian and Victorian competitors or one with a variety of unique spectacles.

Some events held in the second arena include gladiator fights, Viking battles and maypole dancing.

"One arena has the SA Scorpions who are full bodied armour fighters and will face off in some competitions against Victorian teams," she said.

There will be a marketplace in the centre of the grounds which will sell medieval themed wares, as well as a number of local demonstrations and products.

"There are about 20 different stalls from all across Australia with some very medieval themed wares including a lot of local stalls," Ms Teakle said.

There will also be some demonstrations for activities such as hand weaving and clay pottery.

"It's something so different from other events that we have in the area," Ms Harfield said.

"The fairs I've attended in Adelaide have been so much fun and it will be great to spend time with my friends from out of town that are travelling down specifically for the fair."

Ms Harfield added the various crafts and re-enactment groups would be more than enough to keep her entertained for the entire weekend.

She said she was particularly keen for the come-and-try archery event as well as the open Dungeons and Dragons sessions having never participated in either.

"Hopefully there will be lots of people in fantasy and medieval dress that will make the showgrounds come alive and give the event a wonderful atmosphere," Ms Harfield said.

Mount Gambier's first Fantasy Medieval Fair will begin tomorrow at 10am at the Mount Gambier Showgrounds.

The event will also be held on Sunday with both days concluding at 4pm.

Tickets can only be purchased online on the Medieval Fair's website and will not be available at the gate during the event.

Council needs to paw in park funds

DOG owners have been avoiding Hastings Cunningham Reserve's dog park due to its deteriorating state, according to City Councillor Frank Morello.

A notice of motion by Cr Morello, tabled at the Mount Gambier City Council's meeting last night, said dog owners have complained about the lack of defined paths, proliferation of weeds, thin bark coverage on the ground, loose dirt and a bee-infested tree - causing frequent users to visit more suitable grassed areas including the Blue Lake Sports Park.

Cr Morello's motion, which was adopted at the meeting, asked that council engage with dog park users to seek their views on how the dog park facilities should be managed and maintained.

"As a popular community asset, the much-loved site should be maintained to the highest possible standard," the notice of motion from Cr Morello read.

Elected members questioned whether the issues could be rectified immediately with the council's general manager city infrastructure Barbara Cernovskis saying general maintenance had been put in place at the facility for other issues such as broken locks.

Ms Cernovskis suggested elected members engage in conversations with members of the public about both maintenance and capital works for the area.

Speaking to The Border Watch about the issue, dog owner and trainer Karen Brooksby said the facilities were not just the responsibility of council, but also of those who used the facility.

Ms Brooksby said better shaded areas and more seating could be installed by council, however owners also needed to respect the facilities to make it worthwhile.

"I am not sure if council could afford it but they could also change some of the paths in the area so it isn't gravel," Ms Brooksby said.

"However I do think the improvement could also be with the dog owners and not

just up to council."

Calling the two off-leash enclosures within the dog park "fantastic", Ms Brooksby said the community and dog owners needed to be more aware of the benefits the park brings to Mount Gambier.

"What we have here is an enclosed, safe area and it is important for dog owners and handlers to make sure their responsibility is to be mindful of other people when they are entering the facility," she said.

"There has been a lot of time where dogs in the park have rushed the gates and not all dogs who enter the area are confident.

"I have been rushed myself when I have entered the park with my dog Bella and all the dogs got inside the gate, it can be quite scary."

Aware some dog owners avoided the park all together due to untrained dogs using the park, Ms Brooksby said there was no excuse for poor behaviour.

"There are a lot of dog trainers around Mount Gambier and it doesn't take much when you get a puppy or a dog to spend a few months training it and doing some work with it," she said.

"It results in a happier dog and a better sociable dog in public and it doesn't take long for things to escalate and there could be more people in the community who use the park's services who could step up and be a bit more mindful and appreciative.

"It is also about dog owners respecting the boundaries of the dogs, just as we would respect our own boundaries."

She said it was also important for those using the parks to pick up after themselves and their furry friends with the disposable waste bags now installed inside the gates.

"This is a fantastic step by council because it makes it easier for owners who should be more accountable, but unfortunately many are not," she said.

"The facilities here are great and I don't think it is fair for council to foot the bill for things that could also be negligent on the public's behalf.

"The park is a service provided to the community and people need to do the right thing."

Mural underway to celebrate female art

A NEW collaborative mural will be placed in Heriot Street to celebrate Mount Gambier women.

The up-and-coming artwork will feature 10 self-portraits by local female artists in an alternative approach to street art.

The project will be placed on the wall facing Heriot Street of the Nourish Nook building between the existing doorways and windows.

Artist April Hague said the mural developed from a desire to break out of the typical mode of mural painting and as a desire to celebrate local artists, in particular women artists.

"This project is entirely different from my own or other collaborations I have done," Ms Hague said.

"I have been able to work in a team with other local artists on a shared project and the artwork will be quite unique as is the project itself."

Ms Hague worked alongside fellow artist Jane Van Eeten to design the project after

receiving funding from Mount Gambier City Council's Creative Arts Fund.

"We all came together to work as a team and create a semi-permanent public artwork celebrating diversity and the strength of our local arts community," she said.

"Mount Gambier has a thriving arts community, where local council and residents alike value the contributions of artists and the activation of public areas through the creation of public artworks.

"I think the public enjoy the way art can bring an area to life and become an attraction for visitors from afar."

Ms Hague and her fellow artists hoped the women involved would experience an improved sense of belonging and empowerment within a supportive artistic community through the establishment of a cultural identity as a group.

"This in turn had the potential to greatly improve wellbeing for us all," she said.

"The project is built on the creation of a forum for fostering collaborative ways of working, sharing, cultural exchange and friendship

as well as rich learning."

Through the project, Ms Hague said they had been able to form connections with other local creatives such as local photographer Kate Hill.

Project members also worked alongside Leigh Howlett who worked on a web presence for the work which is linked via QR codes on the mural itself.

"This is an important aspect of the work in that it gives the viewer options to interact with the art itself and find out more about the women in the images," Ms Hague said.

Ms Hague and her fellow artists participated in a six day workshop to create the artworks from conceptualisation to completion with the artists selecting their best self-portrait for inclusion in the public artwork.

Other artists involved with the project include Jennie Matthews, Bianca Richardson, Sally O'Connor, Angela Hann, Stephanie Yoannidis, Anne Miles and Julia Reader.

Artists began work last last year and plan to complete the mural next month with an unveiling scheduled for May or early June.

Focused on forestry

FOREST industries make a huge contribution to the South Australian economy, generating around \$3b per year.

Forestry is, of course, a major employer in the Limestone Coast region and the fact that it is a truly renewable, climate-friendly option is becoming better known.

We want the industry to thrive, which means getting the future policy settings right to grow the trees to meet the market demand for timber, achieve a sustainable water policy that meets the needs of all water users, and investing in research and a skilled workforce.

Today I will be meeting with forest industry stakeholders to discuss the implementation of the election commitments made to the industry.

I am glad that Premier Peter Malinauskas agreed that the industry was so important that it deserved its own dedicated portfolio and made visiting Mount Gambier one of his first priorities as Premier.

I am also proud that Mount Gambier will be home to a new \$15m Centre for Excellence to create a long-term forestry research and development capability.

Getting water policy right is crucial to supporting all water users in our region, and essential to our ability to plant more trees.

Having experts closer to industry will help water management, which is why a hydrologist and an ecologist from the Department of Environment and Water will be assigned to posts based in the Limestone Coast.

The future of the industry will rely on a skilled workforce, and we will invest an additional \$5m in the Mt Gambier TAFE so it can provide courses to address critical trade shortages.

These are just some of the things we are working on.

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More support for amputees

OUR new and latest report reveals clearly that amputation has become "Australia's forgotten disability".

Every three hours somebody in Australia loses a lower limb because of the growing rate of diabetes.

Our report reveals, by 2050, there will be over 300,000 amputees in Australia.

This is enough people to fill most of a city the size of Canberra.

The report, prepared by KPMG, highlights that by 2050 the number of amputees in Australia will have – in essence – doubled.

Males make up 72 per cent of all amputations.

The report reveals the actual costs to Australia's health system of amputation will skyrocket from the current figure of \$350m to a massive \$7.8b in 2050.

We believe Federal and State Governments have their heads in the sand when it comes to this issue.

Many people who experience amputation have to deal with depression and anxiety.

In some cases they are also dealing with post-traumatic stress disorder.

We are working hard to raise the profile of this issue because it is just not being talked about enough.

It is time to fund more resources and information for carers of amputees.

It is time to fund a desperately needed campaign to develop men's health awareness.

We need an education campaign for our Indigenous community (which is deeply affected by the issue).

We need an amputation registry.

What is alarming is that Type 2 Diabetes now accounts for 43 per cent of lower limb amputations.

It is also shameful that 8.9 per cent of the total amputees in Australia are Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders - that's close to one in 10.

What is very clear is that unless government investment and measures are actually put in place, the issues are simply going to get bigger.

We want people impacted by amputation to reach out and get more help.

A NEW toilet will be installed in the Community Garden at the Old Mount Gambier Gaol, enabling members to spend more time in the garden.

Installation of the toilet facilities has been made possible by a \$20,000 grant from the Federal Government's Stronger Communities Program.

President of the garden community, Ben Ransom said the onsite bathrooms have been a long time coming.

"That has always been something the committee has rallied around for quite some time now," Mr Ransom said.

"I know members had been starting to talk about it 10 to 15 years ago to try and do something."

The group have been given access to toilets at the nearby Reidy Park Primary School but Mr Ransom said it has not been the most convenient arrangement.

"It is some distance to walk over to get to them, and during school hours it is not appropriate for us to be going through," Mr Ransom said.

"We had done a bit of fundraising ourselves and we raised a little bit of money, but nothing that was going to come close to paying for what we really needed there."

"We have started to put some plans together; we resurrected some old plans that we had from some time ago and we are just trying to speak to some builders."

Mr Ransom, who has been president of the garden group for the last three years, said the 58 members enjoy the sense of community the group provides.

"I initially got involved with my son, he was only a one-year-old at the time, and I thought it could be something we could do together on the weekends," he said.

"It is a great community meeting space; it is always great to bump into the other members and chat to them."

"It does bring together quite a diverse part of the community."

"There are a lot of African and Burmese members and they like to grow their zea mays plants; it is something from their culture and it

not always easy to grow in their homes."

Mr Ransom's favourite part of the community is the garden itself.

"It is really relaxing to have an area to go that is not home where you have got fresh produce," he said.

"There are always things to do to occupy your time; there is an orchard so in the summertime you can get fresh fruit."

The garden has individual plots of land for members to grow what they like, along with shared fruit orchards and produce.

The community also has accessible plots raised from the ground for any potential members with special needs that make ground plots difficult.

Federal Member for Barker Tony Pasin said community organisations have been facing challenges and was pleased they had received the grant.

"Community groups, like the Old Mount Gambier Gaol Community Garden, contribute so much to our local community, making them better places to live, work and raise a family," Mr Pasin said.

Useful waste

FOLLOWING months of research into the waste management behaviour of residents, the City of Mount Gambier recently launched a waste education campaign focused on reducing organic waste ending up in landfill.

Developed in conjunction with experienced creative agency Paper Moose, the campaign encourages local residents to use the kerbside bin system appropriately and dispose of all organic matter via the Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) bin.

Hundreds of tonnes of food and garden waste is thrown into the city's household general waste bins and dumped at Caroline Landfill each year creating methane and leachate which pollutes the environment.

City of Mount Gambier environmental sustainability officer Aaron Izzard said sending the organics to landfill is a waste of resources as it can be composted and returned to local farms for further use.

"The focus of the campaign initially is to educate the community about the best way to dispose of this waste," Mr Izzard said.

FOGO will be used throughout the campaign to emphasise residents should put food and garden waste into this bin and to create a clear distinction between the general waste bin and the larger green bin, previously known as the green waste or organics bin.

Council currently offers the FOGO service to all residents who already receive kerbside

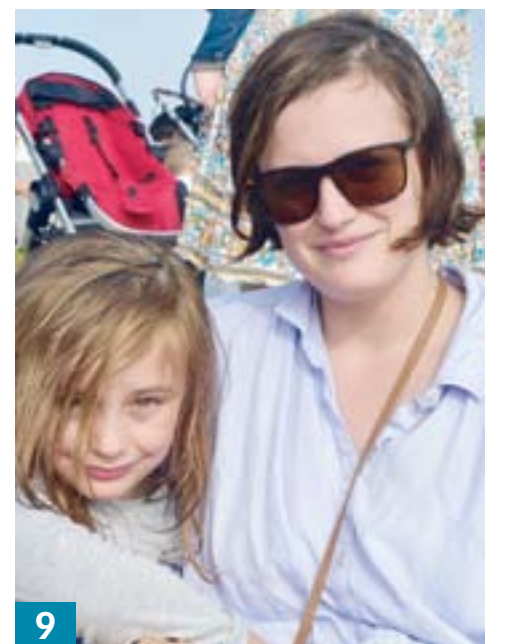
BEACHPORT'S annual duck race and Easter markets attracted large crowds last Saturday.

Dairy farmers levy outcome

FARMERS have voted to keep the mandatory dairy levy as is after an independent committee recommended otherwise.

The levy is currently paid to Dairy Australia on the amount of fat (2.8683 cents per kilogram) and protein (6.9914 cents per kilogram) in the milk.

Earlier this year the levy was reviewed by an independent committee which made a suggestion to increase it by 20 per cent.

The recommendation was then put to the vote of farmers as to whether it should remain the same or rise by either 15, 20 or 25 per cent.

Dairy Australia was notified that 64 per cent of farmers wanted no change to the current levy.

Funds raised from the levy go towards research and development into the industry across a multitude of different areas.

South East dairy farmer Don Stoll said the choice was made on a national scale, making it clear what farmers across Australia wanted.

"The research funding goes into everything [dairy related] and there are farmers who have felt they have not gotten their money's worth out of the levy in regards to research which is why they have voted for the zero per cent increase," Mr Stoll said.

"That is why the result was what the result was and is also the general feedback from farmers."

He said it was important the levy was



reviewed every four years due to constant change within the industry.

"It has been hard for farmers over the past few years as well which probably explains why at the last review they chose to keep it

the same," Mr Stoll said.

"We are in another economic climate and I see the importance of the levy going into research and development but the research has to be spread pretty wide because of the

nature of dairy in Australia.

"Every area is chasing different results and it is hard for one thing to fit everyone."

There has been no change to the Dairy Levy since 2012.

Grain trade access from India deal

AUSTRALIAN grain producers have welcomed initial moves to deliver tariff reductions for improved access to markets in India for Australian grain.

Outcomes for the Australian grains industry in the recently announced Interim Australia-India Economic Cooperation and Trade Agreement (IA-ECTA) include zero percent tariffs on oats and barley meaning India will not apply tariffs on these Australian commodities.

Other outcomes include tariff cuts for up to 150,000 tonnes of Australian lentils, and the phasing out of tariffs over seven years for a range of crop products including beans (broad, adzuki, kidney and split), oils (safflower, sesame, linseed, sunflower, palm and poppy) and crude low acid canola, olive and palm oils.

Grain Producers Australia chair Barry

Large said the Australian Government's announcement of outcomes from the IA-ECTA were a good starting point with positive signals for Australian grains.

However, Mr Large said the government needed to continue pushing to remove trade barriers in the comprehensive negotiations, to ensure Australian grain producers realise the market's significant potential benefits, given major grains such as chickpeas and wheat missed out in the interim deal.

"We acknowledge these initial outcomes for the Australian grains industry in the IA-ECTA," Mr Large said.

"We understand this initial deal will have entry into force in the second half of 2022 and comes with the intention for Australia and India to finalise a comprehensive agreement by the end of the year to secure even broader outcomes," he said.

"Reducing tariffs and other trade barriers for Australian grains such as chickpeas will not only open up better opportunities for Australian growers, it can also deliver real benefits for 1.3 million Indian consumers who can access our high-quality products in their daily diets."

Grain Producers SA chief executive officer Brad Perry welcomed any tariff reductions for the grain industry noting the Indian market can be challenging to access for agricultural commodities, particularly pulse legumes, which play a major role in South Australian crop rotations.

"South Australian growers welcome the opportunity to contribute more of our grains to help put food on household tables around the world and further assist with food security," Mr Perry said.

Numbers were small in Mount Gambier as agents yarded 254 head of live-weight and open auction cattle.

These sold to the usual field of trade and processor buyers along with feeder and restocker orders.

Quality was mixed with some good weights and condition spread amongst the pens as the market sold to a mainly dearer trend.

Yearling steers to the trade ranged from 450c to 600c with similar heifers making from 460c to 610c/kg.

Feeders operated on steers from 552c to 610c and on the heifers from 515c to 606c/kg with restocker activity over both sexes from 560c to 608c/kg.

Grown steers and bullocks returned from 455c to 492c to the trade with feeders active from 466c to 484c/kg.

Grown heifers attracted the trade from 420c to 500c with feeders operating from 463c to 524c/kg.

Heavy cows ranged from 325c to 385c

with lighter types making from 320c to 328c as feeders sought cows from 255c to 400c/kg with a small offering of bulls ranging from 250c to 320c/kg.

Numbers remained steady as agents yarded only 155 head of liveweight and open auction cattle.

These sold to the usual field of trade and

processor buyers along with feeder and restocker interest.

Buyer activity was limited with the small offering on a mixed quality run over the pens with pricing ranging from firm to a little better in places.

Yearling cattle all went to feed on or restocker orders with steers making from 480c to 616c/kg and the heifer portion returned from 482c to 590c/kg.

Grown steers attracted trade interest to 510c with feeders active here from 500c to 510c/kg.

Grown heifers to the trade made from 370c to 492c with feeders operating from 390c to 475c/kg.

Heavy cows made from 350c to 363c with lighter types mainly to feed on making from 320c to 328c/kg. Bulls ranged from 320c to 380c/kg.

FOX control timing right

AUTUMN is a good time to begin fox control with the Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LCLB) encouraging landholders to source fox baits from the LCLB now.

The LCLB said reducing fox numbers prior to peak lambing season can improve lamb survival and the agricultural bottom line.

"Foxes are estimated to cost the Australian economy up to \$227 million a year and fox predation can result in up to 30 per cent of lamb loss," LCLB Landscape Officer Lizzie Doyle said.

"Fox baiting is recommended twice a year, in spring and in autumn to reduce the fox population on your property."

LCLB Landscape Officers are located across the region and can help landholders control foxes on their property through advice such as best practice control methods, timing of control, the supply of 1080 fox baits, PAPP fox baits, canid pest ejector capsules, and provide trap hire.

"We can also provide support for landholders to organise neighbourhood coordinated fox control programs," Ms Doyle said.

The toolbox for effective fox control in-

cludes baiting, ground shooting and fumigation of dens.

Other options may include using guard animals, trapping and exclusion fencing.

"Most effective control occurs if multiple methods are used in a coordinated neighbourhood approach as it helps to reduce the fox population while limiting the potential baiting impacts in the community," Ms Doyle said.

"It is essential to adhere to directions for use, and this includes a mandatory requirement to notify neighbours of baiting programs and specific distance requirements to assist with safety especially for dogs.

"Foxes are a declared pest animal under the Landscape South Australia Act 2019 and the LC Landscape Board is committed to reducing the impact of foxes to native wildlife and agriculture."

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GLENBURNIE LIVESTOCK REPORT 20/4/22

A very small post Easter market this week with only 252 yarded. Three consecutive short weeks due to public holidays has slowed the numbers of prime cattle being yarded. Good quality cattle still met strong demand with processors, feedlotters and restockers all active, this helping to keep prices fully firm on pre-Easter rates. Numbers are expected to rise next week.

BULLS: Sold at 9am by Jordy Heinrich. A small yarding of bulls sold to a top of 320c per kg.

BULLOCKS: Drafted & Presented by Auctioneer Andrew Whan & Liam Durcan. Quality was good for the small yarding of bullocks with processors and heavy feeders operating. The best heavy steers making 440-494c per kg. The few cross-bred types making 300-363c per kg.

YEARLING & VEALERS: Drafted & Presented by Auctioneer Peter Creek and Scott Miller. Feedlotters dominated the young cattle sale, but domestic trade buyers were active where quality suited. The feedlot competition pushed the price of heavy heifers up 15-20c per kg at 460c to a top of 550c per kg. Trade heifers 480-530c per kg. The odd vealer sold to 600c per kg. Restockers were active on the 280-350kg weaners at 530-608c per kg.

COWS: Drafted & Presented by Auctioneer Andrew Whan and Jordan Heinrich. 101 cows yarded with some good quality pens of Angus cows offered. Cow prices were fully firm on pre-Easter rates. The best medium/heavy beef cows 330-370c per kg. Light beef cows 260-315c per kg.

SHEEP & LAMBS: Drafted & Presented by Auctioneer Liam Durcan & Scott Miller. A small and mixed quality yarding of sheep and lambs. With limited numbers of lambs suitable for the trade, these lambs sold from \$160-\$180 to be from \$7.20 to \$7.60 per kg. Restockers handled the majority of the secondary lambs with the better types making from \$145- 156 and the light weight types from \$64-122. A small number of sheep made from \$70-\$145.

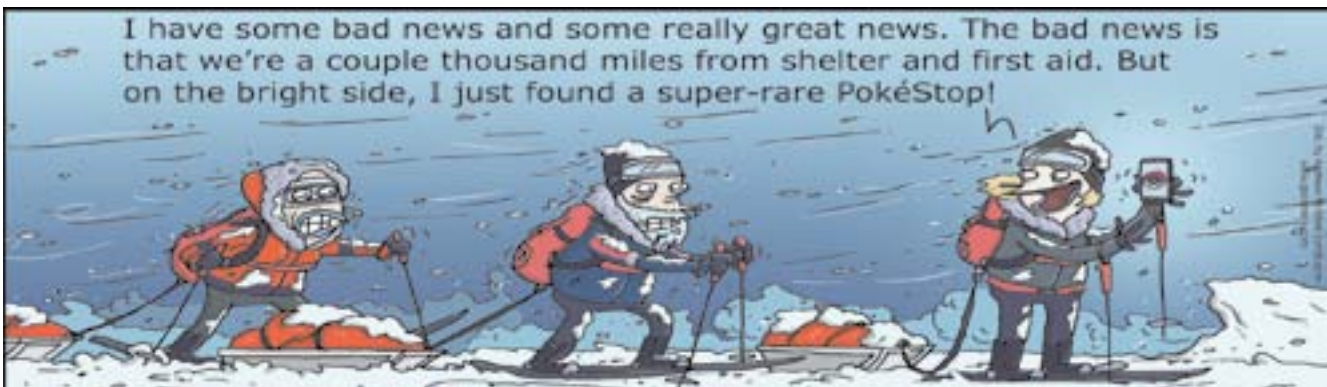

Making waves

Sean Keenan catches a break in the surf-culture drama series **Barons**

Turning the tide

ABC drama *Barons* imagines a fierce rivalry in Australia's 1970s surf culture. Sean Keenan, who plays boardshorts entrepreneur Bill "Trotter" Dwyer, explains to **Siobhan Duck** why his work always takes him back to the beach

You could be forgiven for thinking that Sean Keenan has it written into his contract that there must be at least one surfing scene in every movie or TV series that he does.

In fact, that couldn't be further from the truth for the one-time *Puberty Blues* star - despite what his resumé might imply.

"Playing a surfer, I have actually started to approach with a bit of reticence because I've played surfers before," he laughs.

That's no understatement. Keenan's very first role, which he secured while still in school, was playing a "surf rat" in the kids' TV series *Lockie Leonard*. On the big screen, he was hanging 10 in the 2013 Sam Worthington-led *Drift* and in last year's acclaimed movie *Nitram*.

And then, of course, there was the show he really made a big splash in - *Puberty Blues* - where he played the emotionally conflicted son of Rodger Corser.

Despite his hesitations to return to the water again onscreen, Keenan says new ABC drama, *Barons*, was too good to refuse. The series, which (like *Puberty Blues*) is set in the 1970s, is a fictional account of the rise of Aussie surf labels such as Billabong and Quiksilver.

Keenan plays Bill "Trotter" Dwyer, an entrepreneur hoping to turn his passion for chasing waves into big bucks with his own boardshorts line.

"I read the script, really early on, before COVID hit," he explains.

"And I just loved the world. I loved the fun. And I loved the kind of exploration of this story that I felt hadn't been told.

"You know, I had a basic idea of the surf brands and how it started in Australia, but it's just a story that

hadn't been brought to the screen. I loved that it had such a footing in reality and what happened to these real characters, but that it was fictional as well, so it had freedom to go in different places."

Although he was born in the 1990s, working on both *Puberty Blues* and now *Barons* has given Keenan a unique understanding and appreciation for 1970s culture and its challenges.

Barons, he says, isn't a white-washed account of the era but a series that offers some insight into varying perspectives and experiences of those from different genders, races and sexual orientation.

"It's an interesting era," he says.

"It was a time of such social change and also big steps in social awareness.

"And, also in looking back now, we see this beautiful naivety. Even with the exploration of a surf brand starting up, it's kind of [a] wild idea that you can make billions of dollars from surfing, because money and consumerism is, like, the antithesis of that sort of [surfing] ideology.

"So, it was this time of great change, excitement, and freedom and experimentation. And I think that's why I'm fascinated by that time."

While he can take or leave some of the '70s fashion, Keenan has a particular passion for the era's music because, for almost every character he plays, Keenan develops a playlist to listen to before filming, to help get into his character's headspace.

While Keenan says there are plans already afoot at the ABC for a second season of *Barons*, he is quick to shoot down any suggestion *Puberty Blues* is making a comeback.

Last year, rumours began circulating the John Edwards drama, based on Kathy Lette's iconic novel, would return after actor Ed Oxenbould teased on TikTok that season three was coming.

"Look, Ed Oxenbould is a lovely man and also a really great internet troll," Keenan laughs.

"He just wanted to stir some s--- up! It just so happened we were shooting [*Barons*] at the same time and we're driving '70s cars. It was a completely different story with completely different themes [but people assumed we were filming *Puberty Blues*]."

Keenan had a ball on the relaxed *Barons* set. Between scenes, he and his castmates would head out into the ocean to surf before racing back to the beach for the next take, dripping wet, their hair still tousled with sand and surf.

"There just happened to be really good surf the whole time we shot, so we were taking it in turns to go out and surf and then come in, towel off, and shoot," he says.

"I think that [spontaneity] was the nature of how we were shooting as well. There was a lot of handheld [camera work]. A lot of it was done on the fly. That was kind of the energy of the show."

Another drawcard of [the project for Keenan] was the cast, which features an impressive line-up of up-and-coming and established actors such as Lincoln Younes, Vivienne Awosoga, Hunter Page-Lochard and Kick Gurry.

The cast became so tight-knit that there were plans afoot for a "pub-hopping, surfing" road trip together, until COVID scuppered their holiday. Keenan had hoped to introduce his castmates to some authentic surfie experiences.

"It would've been fun," he says.

Thankfully, the pandemic did not derail filming as well.

"It was so nice [shooting] because everyone was locked up at home and we were able to go to set and hang out," Keenan says.

"Just to be in a group of people was a privilege."

will transform unsightly sheds or garages. It's quicker and easier than you might expect too - just a few hours over a day or two and your dumping grounds will be transformed," she says.

"Start with a thorough declutter. Clear out the shed or garage of anything you no longer need or use, then organise the rest into proper storage. Prep the surface of your garage door or shed - if it's damaged or old, this stage will probably take longer than the actual painting.

"When it comes to choosing colour, think about what you'd like to achieve. Do you want your shed or garage to blend into the background or make a statement? Muted greens will add freshness to a tired exterior and they harmonise beautifully with plants and foliage. Tone-on-tone combinations are popular right now; consider soft green for walls, a richer shade for the shed door and white with a hint of green for trims. Complete the look by painting shelving and planters in a tonal green."

For garage doors, the colour expert said it is important to pay attention to the colours and finishes of surrounding walls. Matte black, charcoal, navy and stone can work well against red brick, natural stone and timber.

For an exposed area such as the

garage or shed, it's crucial to choose a paint that can withstand the elements. Dulux Weathershield is weather-resistant and provides a tough, long-lasting finish. Renovation issues

RENOVATING a property means you will need to have a great team of trusted tradies behind you.

Non-structural walls can generally be moved easily, but you'll still need



an onsite review and report from a structural engineer before you start demolition. Preparation is the key to success and avoiding little, or big, surprises later in a renovation.

Over time a building will "settle" and in some cases non-structural walls may be taking some load. Knowing this is important, because if you go ahead and remove what you think is a non-structural wall without professional advice, you risk damage to the building, and especially to the space



above where you're working.

Remember your walls are holding up the ceiling, which includes a lot of weight, so structural engineering is important, even if it feels frustrating, as it ensures all that weight is evenly distributed and safe.

Renovation works done without the right advice, or the right checks and balances, can cause damage to other properties and you can easily end up liable for any repairs. This can range from cracks in plaster or masonry

walls, through to tiles popping off walls or wooden floor boards lifting due to vibration or concrete slab floors sagging when walls are removed.

Making your home beautiful starts with foundations and planning, including an understanding of the structural impacts, even before you think about the finishes and features of those beautiful rooms.

Putter turns fortunes

FORMER champion footballer Barry Brook would be the first to admit when it comes to golf, putting is not his strength.

But after years of spending regular time practicing on the putting green, maybe he has finally unlocked the secret, because twice in his past four rounds at the Mount Gambier Golf Club, Brook has finished on top of the leaderboard.

After taking out the Thursday stableford competition two weeks ago with 40 points, he followed up in Saturday's par round at the Attamura layout, shooting a remarkable +7, two better than anyone else in the 108-strong field.

"That was a really satisfying win," the 78-year-old, a member of the all-conquering North Gambier side that captured the inaugural Western Border Football League premiership back in 1964, said.

"The putter hasn't been co-operative for a long time, but I'm really enjoying my golf at the moment."

Saturday's victory was built on an incredible front nine, making the turn at +7 thanks to seven pars and two bogeys for a two-over par 38 off the stick.

Not content with that, the 16-handicapper proceeded to pick up two more shots thanks to pars on the 11th and 12th, moving to an almost-unbeatable +9.

Unfortunately he found the greenside bunker on 13, leading to his first lost hole of the day and dropped back to +6 after repeating that on the 14th and 15th.

"I thought that was a bit more realistic," Brook said, although two more halves and a final plus for the day on the tough par-four 17th saw him get back to +7.

That was enough to take out B Grade from Brad Von Duve who played in the morning and must have thought his +5 had a good chance of holding up.

In A Grade it was Tim Kenny who took the honours, posting a +4 from his eight handicap to finish one clear of Archy Arch.

Kenny struggled on the opening nine with -2, but a one-under par 35 on the inward nine saw him pick up six shots, almost identical to Arch who opened with -3 before also having +6 on the second nine.

It was a tough day for the C Graders, Jack Peacock winning with a +1, three better than runner-up Peter Baker who finished down in 44th place overall.

Meanwhile on Thursday it was Gordon Bignell who broke back into the winner's list with a 43-point haul, two better than runner-up Kym Sutherland.

Bignell raised more than a few eyebrows back in early December when he shot a staggering 48 points, the start of a hot run that saw his handicap slashed from 15 to nine in the matter of a few weeks.

After those rounds dropped off his handicap scores he drifted back out to 12 but he made light work of that on Thursday.

A superb first nine saw him shoot a two-

under par 34 which earned him 26 points.

After opening with a one-point bogey, he picked up four-point birdies on the second, fourth, seventh and ninth holes, all coming after excellent approach shots and one-putt greens.

At that stage he was eyeing off another 48-point haul but had to be content with just 43 after adding only 17 more on a back nine that included four one-point holes.

Sutherland had his best round for some time, shooting 41/40 for 41 points, one ahead of Peter Edwards on 40.

Top scores in ideal championship conditions

ON a perfect day for golf, 40 women participated in the the first round of the Mount Gambier Golf Club's A, B and C Grade championship qualifying rounds, with D Grade playing a stableford competition.

The best nett score of the day and the winner was newcomer Rosalie Hunt.

However, there was no further red ink from then on and he added another couple of pars on the 13th and last hole as well as a birdie on the 15th, needing only 40 strokes on the inward nine, in what was a well-deserved win.

In A Grade it was the impressive Brett Perryman who is never far away from the winner's circle and returned a superb round of nett 66 for the grade win.

After starting with successive pars, Perryman failed to capitalise on the reachable par 5 third hole, making a complete botch of it with a double-bogey 7.

He quickly made up for that with a birdie on the fifth, then finished the front nine with four successive pars for a 37.

After opening the back nine with a birdie, it was a bit of an up-and-down nine from there, mixing bogeys with a birdie on the 17th to return another 37.

Former Western Border football star full forward Jarrod Ryan took second with his nett 67.

Ryan had a purple patch through the middle part of his front nine with four pars and a birdie on the difficult fourth hole for a 38.

Stunning weather continues for anglers

A MASSIVE long weekend of fishing right across the South East was enjoyed by both on and offshore anglers this Easter break, with a power of fish caught.

It is hard to deny the biggest news this week has been the cracking start to the tuna season.

The fish have been unreal so far, with fish to 150kg boated.

The most productive "barrel zone" has been the 35-70m areas and between trolling skirted lures or live baiting, there is an option for most fishos to get amongst them.

Young Sambo Whan boated a pending SA junior record fishing with his father and grandpa on Good Friday - a 75kg fish on 24kg line.

As I reported last week, there is plenty of anglers opting for the catch and release option which is also encouraging to see.

If you do wish to target a big fish to eat, make sure you have plenty of ice and the means to look after it once captured.

There is nothing more disheartening to most anglers than hearing of, or seeing these

incredible animals getting wasted.

In other offshore news, there has been another smorgasbord of delicious bottom fish boated.

The charter guys have found some excellent sharks this week and a near 50/50 split down the middle for gummy and school sharks is just what we like to see.

Other tasty reefies have included Tassie trumpeter, snapper, flathead and blue morwong, just to name a few.

Those fishing wide have found some cracking blue eye and hapuka over the shelf which is right on time.

The inshore crew fishing the shallow reef and kelp beds have done well this week and the conditions have been almost as good as they get.

Steve and Alex Lamb have been into some nice sharks in the mornings, with a few to 15kg coming aboard.

There are still plenty of snapper, whiting and other swimmers down there for punters to try their hands at and I am even still hearing of some nice crays both on the rod or in the drop nets.

The surf fishos have been loving this weather.

It is really quite amazing to get such nice

weather for the Easter break, so why not enjoy it.

There are still some nice sharks coming from the Piccininni and Browns Beach areas, with a few decent fish to 8kg amongst them.

It is not unusual to pick up elephant shark, salmon, snapper and Mulloway this time of year, so do not put all the surf gear away just yet.

I have not heard a heap of news from the Coorong this week but it would expect gummy and bronze whalers along just about the whole length, plus there should still be the odd mulloway sniffing around with them.

Whiting anglers are still finding great numbers of solid fish right along the Lime-stone Coast and the success does not seem to be coming from any specific areas more than others.

There has been some fantastic fish from the eastern end of the Port MacDonnell breakwater, Cape Douglas and Carpenter Rocks.

Things could be slowing down a little to what we have had for the last few months but I doubt you will hear anyone complain.

There has been some chunky gar caught this week in Livingston's Bay and Cape Douglas by the waders.

The size has been impressive and the numbers are on the improve, so here's hoping we are in for another cracking season.

The fishing is getting better in the Glenelg River every time I put pen to paper.

The mulloway have started to fire up in a more substantial way this last few weeks, with more bigger fish consistently caught now.

I know of half a dozen or so Mulloway in the 90cm range over the last week from up around the Sandy Waterholes and The Caves area, while there are schools popping up everywhere down the bottom half of the river containing fish of varying sizes.

Trolling live mullet is still the most productive way for the bigger fish but I have seen a few nice ones caught on trolled lures and cut baits.

The next weeks forecast could be a bit breezy but I think it is going to be fishable for the most part.

If you are heading offshore make sure you keep an eye on the weather.

I am heading off up north for a weeks of barra fishing in central Queensland, so next week you will have one of Craig's reports and it is his fault if they are not biting.

Until next week, safe fishing.

Louie the pick of the litter

IT has now been eight years since Newcomb breeder-trainer Mick Vaughan mated Eily McMahon with English sire Westmead Osprey.

Eily McMahon, a dead-set stayer, raced on 80 occasions for 15 wins with her only litter producing Vaughan's more than handy bitch Eily West who raced on 88 occasions for 16 wins and \$50,000 in stakemoney.

Actually, her last win had been at Mount Gambier back in July 2018 when she defeated the Captain Abbott trained Blonde Barbados over 400 metres.

For the first time in more than three years, Vaughan was back at Tara Raceway last Sunday, this time with That's Life, Louie and Petula - members of Eily West's February 2020 litter by My Redeemer.

That's Life kicked off the day with a second placing behind Mrs. Cameron in the Greg Martlew Autos Maiden Stake over 305 metres.

But it was Louie who made the trip worthwhile when displaying plenty of early pace before finishing strongly to defeat odds-on favourite Correlate by two lengths in the Rocks Tavern Stake (400m).

To date, this has been Eily West's first and only mating with Vaughan doing pretty well with the resultant litter of five which he bred and reared in his Geelong suburbia backyard.

"It's Only Money is certainly the pick of the litter," he said.

"From 12 starts he's won seven races, including a heat of the Group 1 Silver Chief at The Meadows back in December.

"I've been involved with greyhounds for 45 years and I reckon potentially he's my best.

"Another littermate in Town Rocker is also going pretty well, having won four races over 500 metres at Bendigo."

Vaughan, 65, said he was now considering a second litter with the eight-year-old Eily West.

Plenty of run in reserve for Lubbock Lad

FOLLOWING the recent 400-metre Fast Forward heats at Tara Raceway's Thursday time-graded meeting, it appeared likely the consistent Lubbock Lad would miss a place in the \$1400 final which was run last Thursday.

The 1-4 wins final field in these recently-introduced once-a-month events comprises the eight greyhounds that run the fastest times in the heats, regardless of their finishing position.

So when Lubbock Lad was narrowly beaten in his heat - the Gambier Vets Stake - by Jeff Guy's War Of Words in 23.56 seconds he ended up as the first reserve in the final.

But, as luck would have it - well, for 24-year-old Terang owner-trainer Chris-

tian Roberts anyway - War Of Words was scratched from the final and Lubbock Lad took his place in box four.

The black dog quickly rounded up the early leader Striking Holly before running away to a four-length win in a quick 22.99 seconds.

By Aston Dee Bee out of Louisiana Lil, a winner of nine races and \$26,000 in stake-money, Lubbock Lad was picked up by Roberts as a giveaway after four unplaced runs at Geelong in December last year.

Mark Roberts, who stood in for his son at Tara Raceway last Thursday, said the dog had been a model of consistency since being taken over by Christian.

"He hasn't been out of a place in his 14 starts for him - three wins in Mount Gambier plus 11 minor placings here, Warrnambool and Geelong," he said.

Roberts said his son had received a solid

grounding in greyhound racing at an early age after catching at Geelong race meetings.

Meanwhile, in the following race, the Klaassens Contractors Stake (512m), another giveaway greyhound in Saint Ellie finally broke through for her second win for Hamilton trainer Tony Harding.

Not that there is anything wrong with her breeding, the 30 kilogram bitch being by Banjo Boy out of Strongbeth, an eight-race winner and a litter sister to Zambora Brockie, a winner of 31 races and more than \$500,000 in stakemoney.

While it took only a month or so for her to win her maiden for Harding at Warrnambool over 390 metres, that had been back in July 2020.

The second win was proving far more elusive.

In fact, when Saint Ellie lined up from box one in last Thursday's 1-4 wins 512-metre

event, her record stood at one win from 108 starts.

But on the back of minor placings at her past three starts, this was going to be her day.

After an early tussle with Arby's Phoebe, she ran away in the home straight for a two-length win in a personal-best time of 30.20 seconds. For Harding, while Saint Ellie's last win had been almost two years ago, he was still full of praise for the four-year-old.

"Look, you only have to look at the form guide to see how consistent she's been of late and that she had been knocking on the door," he said.

"What I really like about her, though, is that she always tries."

It has been a good month at Tara Raceway for the 76-year-old trainer.

Saint Ellie was his fourth winner and followed on from Peshurst Lass and Flatty Hunter (twice).

Sunday's program of racing kicks off with the Albion Hotel Kelpie Country Classic to be raced on a McPherson Street, Bahgallah Road, Casterton/Dartmoor Road circuit.

The feature race on Sunday is the Victorian 100km Road Championship.

Harley Davidson brand has left its mark on the young rider.

"My favourite part about the bike is just the power and the torque, getting out of the corners," Morrison said.

"When I first rode the Harley a few weeks

ago, I remember thinking there were 10 bikes backed up behind me.

"I looked back and it was just me riding around the track by myself.

"It is louder and heavier and just sick.

"I love it."

Season finalised with big night of racing

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PERFECT conditions graced the Borderline Speedway on Saturday night for Round 2 of the annual Sprintcar Easter Trail.

The series kicked off Friday night at Avalon Speedway and was set to culminate on Sunday night at Warrnambool but the final night was rained out.

However, there were no such issues at the Borderline Speedway, with a strong field and a big crowd in attendance.

Fans were entertained by not just the Sprintcars, but Super Rods and Late Models as well.

The roar of V8 engines echoed throughout the night, with all three categories providing a real speedway experience for the fans on the hill.

In the main event, Australia 1 Jamie Veal claimed the honours, despite starting out of sixth position for the Sprintcar A Main feature race.

He was followed home by Troy Little and Marcus Dumesny.

Daniel Pestka was the best of the Limestone Coast competitors, crossing the line in sixth position in the Port MacDonnell based Starks race car.

Glen Sutherland finished 10th, just one position ahead of Scott Enderl.

Little showed his pace early, with a quick time of 11.756 seconds in group one qualifying, with Veal down in fourth place.

In group two Tim Hutchins set the pace with his time of 11.856, just ahead of Dumesny.

That left David Murcott to claim the group three round with a time of 11.638.

Little continued his hot pace in heat one, crossing the line ahead of Ryan Jones and Veal.

Dumesny claimed heat two and the three drivers looked tough to beat.

In heat four Dumesny and Little could not make inroads into the top three, while in heat five Veal fought his way up to third.

Enderl and Sutherland worked their way through the B Main to qualify for the big show, while Little started on the front row alongside Murcott, with Dumesny in third and Veal down in sixth.

At the end of the A Main feature, Murcott failed to finish, while Veal showed his class and claimed the win.

In a bit of a twist, due to a driver dislocating his knee while climbing into his Sprintcar in the pits, which caused a delay while waiting for an ambulance to arrive, the fireworks were underway prior to the A Main feature.

For Borderline Speedway president Cary

Jennings it was a top night of racing to end what he said was a good overall season.

"We started on time, the crowd was good and we finished maybe a bit behind time but that was okay," he said.

"The racing was good in all classes and there were only two incidents in the final where two drivers came together.

"In the final of the Late Models there an incident but the rest of the night we didn't see any other cars get damaged.

"It was only at finals time when the pressure was on there were a few extra incidents."

Jennings said while the crowd numbers were still down on previous season due to the Covid effect, he said each meeting there saw improvement.

"We can only hope the future brings good crowds back to our speedway," he said.

"But overall the season has been good."

In typical style, while the season has just finished, the work continues for Jennings and his crew, with next season already on the radar.

"Next season we will plan for another big one," he said.

"We have a National title for the Junior Sedans and possibly a couple of State titles.

"We will see what the next month brings before we finalise our next season."

Both riders showed Jamie Banks a clean pair of heels, with an 11-second gap from Skeer to the third-placed rider.

In the SA Supersport championship, Ty Lynch was in a class of his own, claiming three leg wins to secure 75 points for the title fight.

Carberry claimed two seconds and a third place, while Skeer finished with a second and two thirds.

The SA Superbike championship saw Ted Collins in top form as he claimed two wins for round honours on his 1000cc Yamaha, ahead of Banks on a 1000cc Yamaha, with William Strugnell rounding out the podium aboard a 1000cc Suzuki.

The National BEARS challenge produced some stunning machinery on track, specifically in the F4 category where a gaggle of Harley Davidsons were trumped by a lone Laverda for the round honours.

Matthew Edwards rode his 1000cc Laverda to good effect, with three wins to set the scene

Overall it was another successful race meeting, with plenty of interest ahead in the remaining SA title races for the season.

Tuning in: Development almost complete

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IT was a tough weekend of racing for Furner motorcycle rider Dallas Skeer at McNamara Park.

Skeer competed in Round 1 of the SA Road Race Supersport championships, along with the Easter Cup feature event.

He faced plenty of opposition in both categories but finished with solid results, considering the rain which descended on the circuit on Sunday.

Skeer finished third on points in the SA championship for the round, then backed that performance up with a second place in the Easter Cup feature race.

Declan Carberry claimed the Easter Cup, while Ty Lynch won the championship round, from Carberry and Skeer.

The Easter Cup result was impressive considering the top two riders were aboard 600cc machines and accounted for the fast Jamie Banks and William Strugnell aboard a pair of 1000cc bikes.

For Skeer it was more about a shake down for his new 600cc Yamaha, which he built up recently after accident damage at the recent Australian Superbike Series round.

Having given the new bike a run on Fri-

day, he chose to ride his older Suzuki at McNamara Park.

Considering the wet conditions, it was a good call, although Skeer certainly showed his pace as the rain continued to fall.

"I don't really like racing in the rain," Skeer said.

"It was hard to start with because we only have one bike and we had to swap the wheels for the wet, which is not a two-minute job.

"We usually have two bikes and we just jump on the other one if it is wet, so we put the wets in hoping it would be wet.

"I am not a fan of the wet ... I don't enjoy riding in it because you have to hold yourself back.

"You don't have much grip and just have to feel your way around until it starts to slide."

Skeer said it was a disappointing result overall, on a weekend he had hoped for better results.

"It wasn't ideal because I expected to be at the front," he said.

"I wanted to win there and I know I can against those boys.

"It definitely made it harder going back to the Suzuki.

"When you are going that quick a change

in bike and the way it handles really makes a difference."

Skeer noted himself, Carberry and Lynch were all faster than the 1000cc Superbikes, something he said had not happened before, showing the pace of the smaller machinery.

He paid respect to Carberry, who he has raced against over many years at McNamara Park.

"I am a few years older than Declan so I have always coached him up through the classes," Skeer said.

"Now he is in front of me in the wet but I think I have him covered in the dry.

"We are good mates off the track and on the track we respect each other.

"We know we can race comfortable and close together and nothing is going to happen."

This weekend Skeer heads to Wakefield Park at Goulburn for Round 3 of the Supersport series.

After he damaged his Yamaha race bike in Round 2, he has been busy building the new bike, which he tested at McNamara Park.

Skeer said he now has most of the parts to complete the damaged bike, which should give him two bikes for the remainder of the ASBK season.

"We are waiting on one foot peg and a throttle cable to finish the bike, so we will definitely have two bikes there," he said.

"I did one session on the new bike on Friday, about eight laps and everything went well.

"I only really changed a few of the lever positions, so it is ready to rock and roll in Wakefield."

As an added bonus for Round 3, Wakefield Park is a track Skeer enjoys to race at.

"It will be the first track we go to this year which I actually enjoy," he said.

"I should be at the front - last time I was there I was fourth quickest. I have high hopes to fight at the front for a podium finish."

With the championship out of reach, Skeer said the remainder of the series was simply about developing the Yamahas to ensure good results in 2023.

"We will just take it round by round and try to be on the podium," he said.

"We have our package nearly complete with the two bikes, so we will go hard at it and not really look at the championship because I am too far out of it.

"We just want to fight for podiums and get our bike set up really well at each track for next year."
