# Vote on merger

LEGISLATION to hold a plebiscite about investigating a future amalgamation between Grant and Mount Gambier Councils has passed.

The controversial Bill was discussed and voted in on Tuesday, despite correspondence from the District of Grant Council asking that the plebiscite be stopped.

The plebiscite will be conducted in conjunction with the upcoming council elections, with voters being asked "Do you support the examination of an amalgamation of the District Council of Grant and the City of Mount Gambier to form a single council?"

## CFS help needed

MULTIPLE Country Fire Service (CFS) stations in the region are calling out for volunteers ahead of the upcoming bushfire season.

Brigades in Tarpeena, Nangwarry, Yahl and others across the region are making a plea for more volunteers as numbers have dwindled in recent years.

It is not just volunteers that are needed, but community members who can actively respond to emergencies.

CFS Regional Volunteer Officer Damon Whitwell said the decline in numbers was due to a range of factors.

The legislation was introduced only two weeks ago, with Premier Malinauskas saying multiple people raised the idea of amalgamation with him.

Minister for Regional Roads Geoff Brock said the formal results of each plebiscite would be made public on the Electoral Commission website, including the ward results for the District Council of Grant, but reassured the public that positive results across both plebiscites did not mean the councils would be amalgamated.

## Pain at the pump

FUEL prices are set to head back up in the coming weeks as the six-month fuel excise cut comes to an end.

Back in March, the then-federal Liberal Government announced it would halve the fuel excise for six months to combat rising fuel prices.

That cut expired yesterday (Thursday, September 29).

But experts say consumers should not expect to see prices go back up immediately.

RAA senior manager mobility and automotive policy and fuel spokesperson Mark Borlace said the excise is paid when it leaves the terminal gate, not when it is sold at the bowser.

# Schools gear up for contest

GRANT High School and Mount Gambier High School are getting ready to go head-to-head in an annual competition that encourages students to engage in STEM subjects.

The STEM Innovation Experience (STEMIE), run by the University of South Australia, gets schools across the state to take each other on in a range of projects under a central theme.

This year's theme is 'Revolutionary Resources', with each STEM subject - science, technology, engineering and maths - needing different approaches for success.

Both GHS and MGHS will be taking part in the Limestone Coast regional showcase early in term four, competing against schools from Victoria for the first time for a spot in the state finals.

GHS science and STEM promotion coordinator Brianna Lush said this is the first time she has run the school's STEMIE team, but she is backing in the work her students have done.

"I think they're on the right track," she said.

"Definitely heading in the right direction, they've got a good understanding of what their project is and what they have been doing and what they've been working towards."

Ms Lush said Covid and timetabling have been problematic over the course of the year, but the students have worked well to band together and put themselves in a good position.

She also said the competition gets students thinking in different ways and engages them in problem solving.

"We've had a couple of groups that have gone completely up the wrong track for a week or two, and then read something and realised they were supposed to be going in another direction," she said.

said.

"It's a little bit different this year because we've got Victorian schools coming across as well, so there's a little bit of extra pressure."

Ms Henman said her students have been stressing a little bit lately with assignment deadlines piling up at the pointy end of their STEMIE preparation, but it will pay off in the end.

"At the moment, it seems like hard work," she said.

"When they go to present it and they look at what other schools have done as well, they see

all their hard work come to fruition and they get that reward."

MGHS Year 11 student Zeb has been working on the technology and engineering projects within the school's STEMIE team, which he thinks will be very helpful later in life.

"I was already pretty set on what I want to do, I want to be an electrical engineer," he said.

He said it is his first year taking part in STEMIE, but he thinks the school is tracking pretty well for a good performance in the regional showcase.

# Controversial Bill vote

The controversial Bill was discussed and voted in on Tuesday, despite correspondence from the District of Grant Council asking that the plebiscite be stopped.

The plebiscite will be conducted in conjunction with the upcoming council elections, with voters being asked "Do you support the examination of an amalgamation of the District Council of Grant and the City of Mount Gambier to form a single council?"

The legislation was introduced only two weeks ago, with Premier Malinauskas saying multiple people raised the idea of amalgamation with him.

Minister for Regional Roads Geoff Brock said the formal results of each plebiscite would be made public on the Electoral Commission website, including the ward results for the District Council of Grant, but reassured the public that positive results across both plebiscites did not mean the councils would be amalgamated.

He said a simple majority in delivering a positive result, would lead to a comprehensive and independent investigation and community consultation process, conducted dispassionately and without political interest by the Local Government Boundaries Commission.

During the commission's process, communities of both councils would have ample opportunity to comment on their views about possible amalgamation.

Mr Brock said the plebiscite would give the community their chance to have a say.

"It is now for the District Council of Grant and City of Mount Gambier community to become involved by participating in both the

Local Government elections and voting on the plebiscites," he said.

"My message to the people of those two councils is, tell us what you think.

"The government wants to hear from the voters of the two councils to inform its decision on whether to refer the matter to the Boundaries Commission."

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell encouraged all residents to vote on the matter.

"After speaking to people across both electorates, the feedback has been loud and clear – residents want a breakdown of votes in each electorate and also, transparency in the results.

"Some important amendments have been made to the government's initial legislation, which are reflective of this feedback and will ensure the results are independently assessed and published for the public to see.

"There is a lot of confusion around the

outcome of the plebiscite and it's my view the government could have vastly improved their communication to both our community and councils around this point.

"I have been very clear that I do not support forced amalgamations and I encourage residents in both District Council of Grant and City of Mount Gambier to have their say when the ballot hits their mailboxes next month."



# Volunteers in demand

MULTIPLE Country Fire Service (CFS) stations in the region are calling out for volunteers ahead of the upcoming bushfire season.

Brigades in Tarpeena, Nangwarry, Yahl and others across the region are making a plea for more volunteers as numbers have dwindled in recent years.

CFS Regional Volunteer Officer Damon Whitwell said the decline in numbers is due to a range of factors.

"It has been a gradual decline over a number of years," Mr Whitwell said.

"Like a lot of other community organisations there have been impacts around Covid, and other restrictions in the pandemic have taken a bit of a toll as well."

"A lot of the rural brigades, once where there may have been seven or eight farms in a district now it is only half that as farms have gotten bigger, so we do not necessarily have the community members in those smaller rural areas."

It is not just volunteers that are needed, but commu-

nity members who can actively respond to emergencies. Some brigades, such as Yahl, may technically have enough volunteers on the books but would struggle to put together an emergency response team on short notice due to limited availability from its members.

"It varies from brigade to brigade," Mr Whitwell said.

"In some brigades, it is total numbers that are an issue, other brigades it is the amount of people available especially during the daytime becoming a bigger issue for us."

When the CFS is called on to respond to an emergency, they will always be able to provide a team, but if there are not enough at the local brigade, it means one further away will have to be sent instead.

"We may have a delayed response time in getting help out to the community when it is needed," Mr Whitwell said.

"We will always have someone respond, but if we do not have people close, we will have to go to resources further away which can delay our time in getting help to where

it is needed."

Mr Whitwell said volunteers are not being expected to be available at all times, and the position is as flexible as community members need it to be.

"We are a 24/7 emergency service, and we are a full response service, but we are a volunteer service so it is whenever people can help."

"If someone is only available to help during the day, we will happily have them on board, same if they are only available to help on weekends, every little bit helps."

"The commitment can be as much as people are able to make, they do not have to be available 24/7."

"There are some brigades around where people are not able to respond on the initial call and need a bit of notice to get things arranged...they will put their hand up to go out as a relief crew."

"With a prolonged job it gives us the opportunity to keep trucks on the ground by having people who are able to respond and come out on a second shift."

Volunteer numbers

in the larger townships seem to be stable at this stage, according to the CFS, but Mr Whitwell said more volunteers are always appreciated.

"A lot of the brigades closer to the bigger townships are not doing too bad, it is those smaller townships and areas where we are looking for people to help," he said.

"But generally across the whole region, a few extra helping hands never go astray."

The benefits to volunteering, according to Mr Whitwell go beyond helping the community, although that seems to be the major motivating factor for CFS volunteers. Fire training is of course, provided, but further development in road crash rescue, hazmat training, first aid, chainsaw use and leadership coaching is on offer for volunteers.

"There are opportunities to learn not just what people want," he said.

"The CFS is a family-orientated service, we look out for our own. You are essentially joining one big family."

# Glamp the new camp

GLAMPING in the Limestone Coast is set to expand with one tourism operator eyeing an ambitious plan for a famous Port MacDonnell site.

Coonawarra Bush Holiday Park owner Steven Moignard has seen demand for the glamping experience steadily increasing and believes expanding is a "no brainer".

"We get full on all the long weekends, all the school holidays, and all the traditional high season times," he said.

"When you're booked out and people are still calling three or four days before the holidays, you know it's money going to waste if you can't fit them in somewhere."

While looking to add more tents to his site in Coonawarra, Mr Moignard has been working to get approval on a site at Dingley Dell, Port MacDonnell, with big plans for it in the future.

He said he wants to start with around 20 glamping tents, but if all goes well, he wants to see a function centre put on the site as well.

"The plan is to build an \$800,000 architect designed function centre with a stage and we'll have people sitting out on the grass having picnics, literature festivals, food festivals," he said.

"The theme there is going to be the colonial experience."

"These tents and the way we're setting them up is very much like the 1870s with LED lights."

Mr Moignard said he does not know what demand will be like in Port MacDonnell, but he hopes to have at least the tents set up and ready for visitors within the next two years.

# Pain at the bowser

FUEL prices are set to head back up in the coming weeks as the six-month fuel excise cut comes to an end.

Back in March, the then-federal Liberal Government announced it would halve the fuel excise for six months to combat rising fuel prices.

That cut expired yesterday (Thursday, September 29).

RAA senior manager mobility and automotive policy and fuel spokesperson Mark Borlace said consumers should not expect to see prices go back up immediately.

Mr Borlace said the excise is paid when it leaves the terminal gate, not when it is sold at the bowser.

"We don't expect [service stations] to have

a 25 cent increase on the day and we don't expect it probably for a week or two," he said.

"They've got cheap fuel in the tanks, they shouldn't be living on the ignorance of people thinking it's just gone up 25 cents in a day."

"Depending on how quickly each service station sells it, if one sells all their fuel within a week, in a week they're going to have the dear fuel back in their tanks."

He said he expects regional towns to get a little bit more time, predicting up to three weeks before all service stations in town return to pre-cut prices.

"We don't think it'll be dramatic and we don't think it'll be uniform, but probably by two or three weeks it will have flowed through the whole gate," he said.

"Within a fortnight, you'd expect to see the base prices being around \$1.80 or \$1.90."

"They've [servos] had notice of this for six

months, they know that the price is going to come up, so they've had time to strategise what they're going to do with it."

While consumers can expect to see fuel prices eventually go up, Mr Borlace said it might not stay that way in the medium-term.

"It'll be a bit of a hit, probably the equivalent of \$15 it adds to a typical car fill up," he said.

"The only good news is we've had a slow trending down of crude oil prices over the last five months - in fact, it has dropped \$20 in the last month."

"The medium term, the world price spike will continue to trend down slowly."

Mr Borlace advised people to continue using apps to compare fuel prices near them to find the cheapest option to save money where possible.

# Recruitment 'progressing'

SOUTH Australia is slowly getting closer to having its first Cross-Border Commissioner more than three months after legislation for the position passed the state's Upper House.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said the recruitment process for a Commissioner is "progressing".

"It's important that we attract someone with the right experience and calibre for the role, and I'm pleased to confirm we have secured the recruitment company to undertake the recruitment process," Ms Scriven said.

"This will include candidate attraction, application analysis, short listing, reference checking and assisting with panel interviews."

Ms Scriven said the role will be "crucial" in identifying issues and trying to find solutions for both people and businesses living and working in cross-border communities.

"The role description includes strategic leadership, stakeholder management skills, ability to lead negotiations and a strong understanding of cross-border issues, just to name a few," she said.

"I am looking forward to a lot of interest coming in the Commissioner role as advertising is rolled out over the coming weeks, via local, state and national channels.

"I expect to be able to announce the successful applicant towards the end of the year."

Independent Mount Gambier MP Troy Bell said he welcomed the news the recruitment process was progressing after advocating for a Cross-Border Commissioner for six years.

"This is the first of the State Government's election commitments to be honoured and an important one for our community and wider region," he said.

# Trail now open

COUNCIL has reopened the Blue Gum Trail in Mount Gambier's Crater Lake precinct, following the Crater Lakes fire in January this year.

To ensure the safety of trail users, council felled almost 50 pine trees that died in the months following the fire, and to reduce fuel load, much of the timber was mulched and removed from the precinct.

The area is now accessible following significant risk assessments undertaken by consultant engineers since the fire recovery began, and the inspections will continue for some time.

Signage is in place to remind trail users that the area is in fire recovery and not to leave the tracks.

Council requests the public ensure their safety by obeying all signage and avoiding closed areas as they can still pose a risk.

Since the fire, council has enabled a staged reopening of areas where the risk to the public has been reduced.

The crater rim from the stairs to Centenary Tower and the back section of Carinya Gardens Cemetery are the only remaining zones closed to the public.

## LIMESTONE COAST POLICE NEWS

### P-PLATER LOSES LICENCE FOR SPEEDING

A P-PLATER was clocked at more than 150 km/h in the State's South East on Tuesday morning.

Just before 9.30am on Tuesday 27 September, a Limestone Coast Highway Patrol detected a vehicle travelling south on the Riddoch Highway, Naracoorte at 153 km/h.

The driver, a 20-year-old Woodcroft woman, who held a provisional licence, was issued with an infringement notice of \$1850 for speeding plus a further \$491 for breaching the conditions of her provisional licence.

She was also issued with a six-month immediate loss of licence.

### TRAFFIC ARREST AT ROSETOWN

A LIMESTONE Coast man was arrested after allegedly failing to stop for police on Friday night.

About 9.50pm on Friday 23 September, police attempted to pull over an Audi travelling north on the Princes Highway, approaching the township of Kingston SE.

It will be alleged the driver did not stop but instead turned off the car's lights and accelerated to a speed of 130 km/h.

The Audi was located abandoned in First Street, Rosetown a short time later and the alleged driver was arrested leaving the scene in another vehicle.

The 37-year-old man from Kingston SE was charged with failing to stop, driving in a manner dangerous to the public, driving while disqualified, driving unregistered, uninsured and with unassigned plates, unlawful possession and breach of bail.

He was refused police bail and appeared in the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court on Monday 26 September, where he was remanded in custody until 22 November.

## Farmers investing

AN increase in agricultural sector lending activity has led to encouraging signs of farmers wanting to expand and invest in their own businesses.

Australian Bureau of Agricultural and Resource Economics and Sciences (ABARES) executive director Dr Jared Greenville said the increase in debt for farms was no reason to cause concern.

"Because of higher property values, farm business equity has remained steady," Mr Greenville said.

"Higher commodity prices and two record-breaking seasons have meant farmers have higher incomes to pay down their debts in the short term."

Mr Greenville said as a result of this, farm incomes would be less vulnerable to rising interest rates than what they would have been in the 1990s or early 2000s.

"Debt is used by farmers for a range of purposes, including purchasing land, plant and equipment and for providing ongoing working capital," he said.

"The main reason broadacre and dairy

farms borrowed money in 2021 was to fund land purchases.

"That shows Australia's farmers are taking advantage of two record-breaking seasons and are looking to expand and invest in their businesses."

He added all states in Australia had increased signs of lending to the agricultural sector, but found stronger signs in Queensland and New South Wales with 7 per cent.

"However, it's good to keep these figures in context. A high proportion of aggregate debt is held by a small number of very large farm businesses that generate high cash flows to finance debt," Mr Greenville said.

"In 2020-21, 5 per cent of broadacre and dairy farms accounted for around 47 per cent of aggregate debt, whereas nearly 50 per cent of farms had very little or no debt."

## Focus on improving soil

LIMESTONE Coast Landscape Board is encouraging farmers to engage with the new Soil Extension Officer, dedicated to improving soil health for primary production.

Ehsan Sayad has been appointed to the role in the Limestone Coast and is relishing the opportunity to work closely with land managers and primary industry groups to achieve improved soil health and productivity gains in the region.

The role assists land managers with interpretation of soil test results and discussing the latest science to assist making decisions on best practice sustainable land management. The role is part of a new network of Soil Extension Officers across the state – with support and opportunities for collaboration provided by both state and national communities of practice.

This has been made possible by funding from the Australian Government as part of the National Soil Strategy through the National Landcare Program.

Chair of the Limestone Coast Landscape Board Penny Schulz said funding for such

roles was a real boost for South Australia.

"The LC Landscape Board has been pleased to play a lead role in attracting Commonwealth funding for soil health to South Australia," she said.

"Soil health is such a vital component to productivity gains for this state as well as revitalising soils, and the Limestone Coast primary producers have a real opportunity to take advantage of the program and learn as much as they can," she said.

Land managers will be able to access a number of soil extension services. The first of these on offer is a soil sampling and testing activity. Southern Cross University will be conducting soil sampling and testing to successful applications.

Land managers can make initial enquiries of Ehsan at the Limestone Coast Landscape Board on 8429 7550, or enquire and apply directly to Southern Cross University via their website [scu.edu.au/pilot-soils-program](http://scu.edu.au/pilot-soils-program), email [soiltest@scu.edu.au](mailto:soiltest@scu.edu.au) or phone 02 6620 3489. Land managers will be required to share their data under the National Pilot Soil Monitoring and Incentives Program.

# Farm Monitoring from the sky

THE Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LC Landscape Board) will be launching a new project aimed to increase its understanding of where and how resilience can be built into Limestone Coast water resources to support primary production.

In partnership with the Goyder Institute for Water Research, the project will explore whether there are opportunities to manage water from the extensive drainage network in the region to address risks to primary industries and groundwater dependent ecosystems.

The collaborative approach will be led by research teams from the CSIRO, Flinders University and, the University of South Australia.

As the launch of the collaborative partnership begins, the CSIRO will be undertaking a geophysical airborne electromagnetic (AEM) survey over the region's southern coast line, with the data collected being used to understand the extent of inland seawater intrusion.

CSIRO deep earth imaging lead Dr Tim Munday said while the helicopter would be flying as low as 60m above these areas during the survey, the pilots would not fly over farmhouses, sheds, and dwellings, keeping a distance of up to 300m away.

"The signals generated by the helicopter AEM system are weaker than those emitted from mobile phones and TV antennas," Mr Munday said. LC Landscape Board general manager Steve Bourne said Groundwater resources in the area supported support extensive irrigated primary production, social assets and iconic wetlands of regional, national and international significance.

Commencing early October 2022, the geophysical airborne electromagnetic (AEM) survey is expected to take at least 7 days and will utilise a low flying helicopter which will tow a frame slung beneath it in order to conduct the survey. The circular frame carries the AEM equipment which measures changes in conductivity of the ground which will indicate the depth of the water and its salinity.

The survey will run over 1,300 parallel flight lines across the lower Limestone Coast over the localities of Kongorong, Carpenters Rocks, Nene Valley, Blackfellows Cave, Eight Mile Creek, Port MacDonnell, Donovans Landing, Wye and the Glenelg National Park.

The aerial monitoring is also a part of the LC Landscape Board's broader water resource management approach of 'Making Every Drop Count'.

# Singles make waves

New reality series *The Real Love Boat* sends some of Australia's most eligible singles on the romantic voyage of a lifetime. Host Darren McMullen tells **Siobhan Duck** why it isn't all smooth sailing

**D**ARREN McMullen has never been afraid to rock the boat.

Which is why, as host of Channel 10's latest dating series *The Real Love Boat*, McMullen had no interest in going into his high seas TV adventure as Osher Günsberg 2.0.

Unlike Günsberg – who only suavely oversees rose ceremonies on *The Bachelor* and its various spin-offs without getting bogged down in any of the romantic drama – McMullen threw himself wholeheartedly into the whole messy business of looking for love on TV.

"I think it's what makes the show very different," he says of this tumultuous new dating show which sees 12 singles wooing each other whilst cruising the Mediterranean.

"I mean, you'll never see Osher going nuts at one of the Bachelors. It's real and I think people respond to authenticity nowadays more than ever, and I think the great thing about the show is we did make something really different where it wasn't just glitzy and glamorous or a safe description of what a relationship is like. It's warts and all and I like that."

From *The Bachelor* franchise to *Love Island*, *Married at First Sight*, *Farmer Wants a Wife* and *Beauty and the Geek*, there's no shortage of dating shows on the box. As a result, some viewers have understandably become more cynical about the motivations of the contestants. Are they really there to find the one? Or are they simply there to get their 15 minutes of fame and a swag of Instagram followers in the process?

Sensing that viewers might be suffering from dating show fatigue, McMullen wanted *The Real Love Boat* to feel less glossy and manufactured than the rest and so, in addition to showing raw emotion, he also pushed for the bloopers to be left into the final cut.

"We wanted to break that fourth wall and let the audience in on the mistakes, which is why you'll see a cat walking across [the set during a key moment]," he says.

"We had to push for a lot of that stuff to stay in at first, but I think everyone's on the same page now."

The result is a show which feels like it doesn't take itself as seriously as some of its competitors. But make no bones about it, that doesn't mean that the quest for love isn't the real deal. In fact, *The Real Love Boat* has already created genuine matches at sea that have continued once the contestants returned to Australian shores.

McMullen can take some credit for that. Over the course of the show, his role expanded from host to impromptu dating coach and counsellor when he found himself overseeing a dinner for the 12 contestants.

Once he'd taken his place at the table, McMullen found himself interrogating the lovelorn passengers about their motivations.

"I had come straight off *Celebrity Apprentice* and so I was used to getting berated by Lord Sugar every day," he says with a wry laugh.

"I think I brought some of that *Apprentice* energy with me. I was just really going after the contestants, making sure they were all here for the right reasons. Letting them know that I wasn't going to take any s---. I wasn't going to hear any lies."

"I told them that the second I thought they were selling me a

red herring, I would sniff it out. And I would know they're lying. And if they were going to do that, they might as well pack their bags and leave the ship."

"I think the producers rather enjoyed that chat. So, from then on, I did the rest of the Captain's Table [dinners]."

McMullen says the contestants were initially shocked by his tough-love approach to hosting, but believes it eventually forced them to become far more genuine and candid about the process.

"I think a lot of them had just been on autopilot with their answers, saying stuff like: 'I really like this girl, we are meant to be together,'" he says.

"And I would just say: 'I don't even think you believe your own bulls---. You are talking s---! Talk to me like a real person.'

"Why do you deserve to go on this destination date over another this couple? And I don't want to hear your stock-standard answer. So, it kind of threw them off and they then very open and honest answers. I think it just kind of laid down the gauntlet."

McMullen, of course, practiced what he preached on the show. In telling the contestants he expected honesty, he also opened up to them about his own tumultuous romantic history.

"I was vulnerable, and I was open and honest with everybody on there," he says.

"I think they saw me laying myself bare and being really upfront about my past relationships and the situations I've been in, and it gave them permission to do the same."

He suspects now though, that some of the contestants – who are largely in their mid-20s – weren't really mature enough to share the kind of intimacy needed to find their forever person.

It's a situation that McMullen understands all too well, acknowledging that when he was younger, he also made some bad choices that resulted in the breakdown of his relationships.

"But, you know, I try not to be too hard on myself," he says.

"You have to realise you are human and that you have a lot of growth to do and hopefully not make the same mistakes again in the future."


"I think I'm in a place in my life where I can wear my heart on my sleeve and say I've messed a lot of relationships up. Although some of them weren't necessarily a good fit, some of them probably were and, through my own immaturity and my own f---ups essentially, I've kind of killed what could have been a phenomenal relationship."

"I wear that, and I own that and all I can do is learn from those mistakes and be a better person than before."

# Purchasing A Block of Land?

## Purchasing A Block of Land?

- What to look for.
- How to attain the best outcome for your new home.

When contemplating building a new home, the first and most important step in the purchase of a block of land.

If you are considering a new home build your block of land is more important than the actual plan of your home.

We have all looked at a plan and thought this is a great plan, its just perfect for our budget and lifestyle. All ok so far!!

Then comes the difficult part to try and work that plan onto a block of land. The correct way to approach this is to design your home to suit the block you have purchased and not attempt to "squeeze" the plan you like onto the block you have purchased.

## Step 1: Site Assessment and Soil Report

When purchasing your block of land, the most important step is to acquire a site assessment and a soil report. This can be carried out by a qualified engineer and usually costs around \$500-\$600.

This is money well spent as it will give an accurate report on the type of soil which will determine the extent and cost of your home's foundation and concrete floor.

The cost of a "M" classification instead of an "A" or "S" can be anywhere between 15 and 20 thousand

dollars depending on the size of the foundations.

Check with your builder before signing any contracts on land as they will have a "local knowledge" of the types of soils in the Mount Gambier area.

**Do not sign any contract for land until you have at least made a preliminary investigation with a builder.**

The presence of rock and clay is a sure-fire sign that your home will cost up to twenty thousand dollars more to construct because of this type of terrain. Sand and loamy soils achieve the best soil reports as they are generally non-reactive.

## Step 2: Orientation

Generally, east/west facing blocks are considered in my opinion are the best to build on. This is the most important not only for your own comfort but also when calculating the energy rating for your home. All homes in Australia have to reach an energy rating of "6 star" and this is done by facing your home in such a way to utilise the warmth of the sun in winter and the shelter from the extreme heat in summer, especially on West facing windows which attract heat and make your home uncomfortable.

Other ways that a "6 star" energy rating can be attained is to increase the thermal rating of insulation in the walls and ceilings and also to double glaze some or all windows and sliding doors.

This is of course is more costly and that is why you

should have your home designed after your block purchase to maximise the best orientation for your budget and lifestyle.

## Step 3: Extreme sloping/steep blocks

Although a block that you are looking at may seem level enough to build on there are some points you should consider.

1. Check the height of floor level in relation to the street kerbing height to ensure that the driveway is not going to be too steep.
2. The impact of "cut and fill" in relation to height of retaining walls.
3. Engineering will have to be undertaken to address these issues. Potential extra costs can be avoided by talking to your builder and taking some levels prior to buying the land.

## Summary

1. Design your home to suit your land.
2. Do not sign any contracts or pay deposit before receiving a soil report and site assessment.
3. Orientation of your home to acquire the "6 star" energy rating.

# Get ready for summer

**W**ANT your lawn and yard looking their best now the warmer days have returned? Smash through this list in the glorious sunshine and reward yourself with a cold glass of wine and beer and a barbecue.

#### Aerate

Don your aerating sandals. Loosen up your compacted soil and allow water, nutrients and air to get to your lawn's roots.

#### Barbecue

Dust off the cover. Check you've got gas (after your tidy up, you may want to fire your barbie up). Clean the grill and plates. Don't forget to clean the fat catcher.

#### Compaction Bonus.

If you've already aerated, you've taken care of compaction. If not, see aerate.

#### Decks

Clear them and scrub them. If you've got to reseal, then you've got a little more work to do.

#### Dethatch

What's thatch? If your lawn is really spongy, you've got a build-up of thatch. If you can wait (or want to skip a job, because you're keen to prepare your beef for a barbecue), hold off until the end of spring, as this is the best time to dethatch. Mow low to remove the thatch, but always only on warm season grasses.



#### Fertilise

If your soil's consistently above about 14 degrees, then it's time to give your lawn a feed. A slow-release granular fertiliser, such as Lawn Solutions Premium Fertiliser is recommended.

#### Furniture

Knock off the cobwebs. Dampen a rag and wipe off the dust and debris. Your wood furniture may need a reseal.

#### Leaves

Rake up your leaves and place them in your compost.

#### Mower

Now's the time to service or get it serviced. If you're doing it yourself, sharpen the blades and discard your old fuel.

#### Pre-emergent herbicide

If your lawn is free of weeds, good job! To keep it that way, apply a pre-emergent herbicide, such as OxaFert to combat potential infestations of, for example, oxalis or summer weed.

#### Soil

If you've aerated and taken care of compaction, you're almost done. You

can consider using wetting agents or water storage crystals to maximise water efficiency.

#### Top-dress

If your lawn's a little uneven, throw a bit of soil on top. Make sure the leaf blades are still poking through. Top dressing helps to reduce thatch and improves drainage, too. You can delay this task, too, as the best time to top dress is in late spring/early summer.

#### Umbrella

Hopefully you have no more than a little dusting to do here.

#### Weeds

If you've got any, then pull them out by hand. If you don't have any, apply a pre-emergent herbicide so you don't get any!

#### Water


Water your lawn as little as possible and when you do, water deep. Long, infrequent soaks are better than light, frequent applications.

#### Zoysia

If your lawn is beyond repair, then take a look at Sir Grange (Zeon Zoysia). It's great in the shade and drought tolerant too. Or for a more affordable option, consider the ever popular Sir Walter.

# Upgrading 'special roads'

COUNCILS across the Limestone Coast will be looking to get started on road upgrade projects after funding was announced.

The Local Government Association of South Australia (LGA) has announced 23 councils across the state will share in \$16.2 million in grant funding.

These grants form part of the Special Local Roads Program, which pools a portion of councils' federal road funding to better distribute money where it is needed.

Of that funding, City of Mount Gambier has been allocated \$212,000 for work on Pine Hall Avenue, while District Council of Grant has been given \$140,000 for Cafpirco Road.

Naracoorte Lucindale Council, Kingston District Council and Tatiara District Council have also received funds for local road projects.

LGA chief executive Clinton Jury said the program is unique to South Australia.

"[It is] essential for providing our state's

councils with vital funding for projects that they otherwise may not have the capacity to finance on their own," Mr Jury said.

"Through this annual funding round, councils are supported to carry out important upgrades on rural and metropolitan roads across the state, making them safer and better for their communities."

"The LGA is proud to advocate annually on behalf of our member councils to ensure the allocation of program's funds is directed to-

wards projects where this financial assistance will have the greatest impact."

Mr Jury said the program should be beneficial to councils over time, from improving freight routes to reducing congestion in tourist-heavy areas.

"From the Eyre Peninsula to the Limestone Coast, and everywhere in between, this funding will assist councils to deliver improved infrastructure that will make commuting across our great state safer and easier," he said.

# Roses' stamp of approval

AUSTRALIA Post has just released four new collectable stamps dedicated to Australian bred roses.

We are thrilled to say we have been a part of this important project supplying some of the images for the production of two of the stamps and booklets and cards.

These new stamps are now available from participating Post Offices and online.

With thousands of different rose varieties growing around the world and many international breeders releasing new varieties every year, we can certainly say that our country is now showing its talent and is coming out with interesting creations for the Australian market.

Most of the varieties we grow and sell at Wagner's come from breeders based overseas, but since 1880 some Australian passionate rosarians started breeding new roses and we now have an interesting number of good rose varieties made in Australia created to perform well in our specific climate and growing conditions.

To celebrate Australian bred roses, Australia Post selected four popular varieties which we highly suggest as we know they perform very well.

- Dusky Moon, bred by Richard Walsh in 2016: it's a strong growing healthy shrub with cup-shaped, highly fragrant blooms that come in small and large clusters, displaying a dusky mauve colour with a white reverse. Winner of the Silver Medal and the Australian Bred Rose of the Year Trophy at 2020 National Rose Trial Garden of Australia.
- Lady of Australia, bred by Bruce Brundrett in 2016: it's a unique floribunda rose with classical-shaped bright yellow flowers, showing ruffled petals when fully opened, fading to lighter yellow/cream on the outer side and revealing beautiful yellow stamens. Named 'Lady of Australia' to celebrate the wives of the Governors-General of Australia, received a Gold Medal and many other awards at the National Rose Trial Garden of Australia in 2018.

Other well-known and prolific rose breeders were Dr Bruce Chapman, Bob Hamilton (created Black Magic in 1953),



# COVERS NEW GROUND

FOLLOWING the performance upgrade to the i30 and i20, the most recent model to get a booster is the most unlikely – the Kona sports utility vehicle.

Lifted from the underpinnings of the Hyundai i30 hatchback, it's hard to fit it into the pantheon.

For a start, there's no all-wheel drive, so it is a high-riding hot hatch rather than an SUV.

Front-wheel drive only has helped keep the weight down, enabling a claim by the maker of a zero-to-100km/h figure of 5.5 seconds, just a tenth slower than the i30 N hatch.

Two models have come to Australia – Kona N and Kona N Premium – priced from \$48,000 and \$51,000, plus on-road costs respectively.

Metallic paint adds \$595 and matte paint \$1000.

Both are powered by a 2.0-litre turbo-petrol four-cylinder engine, mated with an eight-speed dual-clutch transmission, serving up 206 kW and 392 Nm through the front wheels.

The standard Atlas White Kona N test car turned heads more than once.

The front followed the Hyundai N tradition with the black grille, following the rally team, being based on a chequered flag.

The Hyundai 'H' and performance 'N' were in there for good measure.

Below is another grille, less of a stand-out, while an LED headlamp set-up features on either side capped by strips of LED daytime running lights.

The rear roofline incorporates a discrete spoiler, while the dominating features are twin trumpet-tipped exhausts totally in keeping with the brassy note emanating from them when the engine is fired up.

In profile, the features probably responsible for the onlooker interest mentioned above, are unique 19-inch alloy wheels shod with Pirelli P Zero HN tyres, playing host to bright red brake callipers.

All these captivating aspects of the standard Atlas White Kona N test car exterior were linked by a fine red line skirting the lower body.

The Kona N inside is far from basic.

Sports seats, with a nice line in fabric and contrasting stitching, are bucket-style up front, while the second row can take three grown-ups.

Leg room there is average to skinny depending on the position of the front occupants.

Fancy suede/leather coverings are left to the Premium model.

The steering wheel is the exception, with leather wrapping giving the driver a touch of luxury.

The Kona N Premium also weighs in with auto-dimming rear-view mirror, head-up display, front parking sensors, powered, heated and ventilated front seats, heated steering wheel, glass sunroof and ambient lighting.

The driver has the benefit of a new 10.25-inch digital instrument cluster, while another 10.25-inch display screen in the central dashboard supplies information on vehicle systems and wired Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, plus factory fitted satellite navigation.

Quality audio is served up with DAB+ digital radio being blessed with an eight-speaker harman/kardon sound system.

Wireless phone charging caps off the line-up.

Power is provided by a 2.0-litre turbo-petrol four-cylinder engine putting power to ground, via an eight-speed double clutch automatic transmission, to ground through the front wheels.

Standard equipment includes autonomous emergency braking with detection of the presence of pedestrian or cyclist, adaptive cruise control, blind spot warning, lane keep and lane follow assist, rear cross-traffic alert and auto high beam.

Driving the Kona N was full of ups and downs.

The stiff suspension picking up every blemish in the road, even in Normal drive mode.

The racetrack would be more welcoming.

Gear changes are some of the smoothest, with just a slight nudge between cogs.

Hyundai puts the combined urban/highway fuel (premium unleaded) consumption at 9 litres per 100 kilometres.

The test car came up with more than 11 litres per 100 kilometres in town and 5.9 on the motorway.

Everything worked a treat while going forward but in reverse, the vehicle tended to stutter when setting off on an incline.

Not the best when backing out of the driveway.

Exhaust performance ranges from producing from a peaceful background noise when cruising to a gravelly chorus when called on to get a move on.

'Grin Shift' is hard to take seriously.

Brought into action by the press of a red button on the steering wheel, the throttle response and gear shifts are speeded up for 20 seconds with an accompanying crackle and pop of the engine.

The same sound is on tap all the time in the programmable N Sport+ mode.

The claim to SUV status of the Kona N was put to rest by the lack of luggage room in the back.

Boot space is piddling at 361 litres with

rear seatbacks raised.

A reasonably flat floor, taking 1143 litres, is released when they are folded.

Finally, a trap for the unwary when the tailgate is opened, doubling as shelter from hot sun or rain.

However, in the wet a hollow where the number plate is attached fills with water, which cascades down on the owner when they close the door – a serious design fault.

Somebody said the Kona N looked like a white basketball boot.


However, the Hyundai SUV's sporting pretensions are on the other foot although there are occasions when the hot hatch(ness) sneaks through.







MORE than 120 women sailors will come together on October 1-3 for the first-ever South Australian Women's Keelboat Regatta, offshore from North Haven.

Determined to include as many women sailors as possible, the regatta organisers made several Elliot 7 keelboats available for hire, with try-outs prior to the event, including the morning of Saturday, September 24, for crews - including Port McDonnell - who can not bring their boats from other places.

Competitors range from their teens to 70s and include several Sydney-Hobart and Melbourne-Hobart competitors, with others who have won national championships in smaller boats.

"Make no mistake, women sailors are seriously focused and competitive on the water," 2019 Sydney-Hobart sailor Mary Ann Harvey, skipper of School's Out, said.

"On shore, we're quite different from the men."

"Off-the-water time is for mentoring and exchanging ideas, making new friends, great conversations and a lot of laughter."

SA Cruising Yacht Club will host the regatta, partnering with the Royal South Australian Yacht Club and Port Adelaide Sailing Club in event operations.

Port MacDonnell's Jennifer Jones is one of the women who will be taking part.

Jones has been sailing for five years and is excited for the inaugural regatta in South Australia.

"I am so excited, this wonderful club, the Royal South Australian Yacht Club, they are loaning us a boat to sail," she said.

"Our team is an amazing team, my team comprises of myself and Donna Howard and we are from the Port MacDonnell Sailing Club."

"Myself and Donna are two of five county sailors who are participating in this event, the rest are coming from the city."

Jones and Howard will be joined by Monica Tjung, Maya Ueda and Leah Toms.

The crew all have personalised T-shirts for the regatta.

"The name of our entry is called 'She Sails' and on our T-shirt, we have the slogan 'A woman who believes in herself is unstoppable,'" Jones said.

The team has spent the last two weeks practising in Adelaide before this weekend's big event.

"The boat we are sailing, is a boat that none of us have sailed before, apart from Maya, she

"The weather is looking very good, it is going to be around 20 degrees in Adelaide with lovely flat seas and it is predicted to be between 10 and 15 knots for the entire weekend which is dream weather," she said.

Jones is already excited for what the future holds and her team is already campaigning for next year.

Blockley said she had to be disciplined to stay on track in the lead-up to the competition.


"You're not always motivated to go train for two hours a day but I think it is the discipline that keeps you going," she said.

# City winners keep coming

TURNING 80 years of age nearly six months ago has not stopped local trainer Michael O'Leary from producing winners in the city.

With almost two months of the new season completed, O'Leary has already had two winners at metropolitan level.

Maracourt won for the stable at Murray Bridge in August and Scenic Host, another promising type, delivered the goods in fine fashion at Morphettville Parks last Saturday.

A copybook Jacob Opperman ride enabled Scenic Host (\$4.80) to be within striking distance of the leaders on the home turn in the 1250-metre BM 62 handicap.

The five-year-old mare then put paid to her rivals in no uncertain manner in the final furlong to win impressively by 3.5 lengths.

That was her fourth win from 15 starts and atoned for two recent seconds this campaign at city level.

Our other metropolitan winner last Saturday was in the world of harness racing at Globe Derby Park in Adelaide which saw Naracoorte trainer Greg Scholefield chalk up another city winner.

A late pick up drive for Danielle Hill proved fruitful (after Gaita Pullicino was indisposed) which saw JawsofLincoln (\$1.70 fav.) scoot to the lead in the NR 70 pace from barrier four and romp home by 6.5 metres.

That was the third of four consecutive wins on the program for Hill, this state's number one driver.

## PAYS TO FOLLOW THE FORM

The result of a race held here at Mount Gambier on September 11 has suddenly become a good form reference over the border.

In the 1316-metre BM 68 handicap at Glenburnie, the Daniel Bowman (Warrnambool) trained Atomic Gold (\$1.90 fav.) put up a big effort to beat another Warrnambool galloper, the Tom Dabernig trained Jay Gatsby.

Last Friday, both of those horses went around at different venues in Victoria and both got the chocolates.

At Coleraine, Jay Gatsby was a \$7 chance before scoring a 2.25 length win in the final race with regular jockey Harry Grace in the saddle.

Alert punters could have cashed in very quickly as Atomic Gold raced just 20 minutes later in the final race at Benalla at the opposite end of the state.

That was in a \$100,000 BM 70 event which was a heat of a series being run around Victoria prior to the final being conducted in Melbourne.

Although it was a big step up in class from his Mount Gambier success, Atomic Gold (\$4 fav.) scored by nearly three lengths to well and truly justify the 900 kilometre round trip from Warrnambool for Bowman.

## INTERSTATE RAIDERS

The quality of horses going around at Naracoorte last Sunday may have been questionable, but that was not the case for the jockeys and trainers who supported the meeting.

As has become the norm of late, Victorian jockeys and trainers have had considerable success in the Limestone Coast and that continued at Naracoorte.

Highly respected Horsham jockey Dean Yendall rode at Naracoorte for the first time for many years and finished the day with two winners and two seconds.

Likewise, the Warrnambool based Harry Grace also rode a double as did apprentice Ben Price.

Victorian trainers won five of the eight races and, following three local meetings so far this season, the Tom Dabernig stable holds a slender lead at the top of the train-

er's premiership board.

The Naracoorte club did well to stage the meeting on a track rated a Soft 7, helped by predicted rainfall that did not eventuate in the lead up to Sunday.

Punters who snapped up the \$2 bet early about the Dabernig trained Launch Pad in the 1430-metre BM 68 handicap are still grinning.

Launch Pad, who was looked upon as the star bet of the day, was backed in to start a \$1.60 chance and it was a painless collect for his backers after Yendall was able to easily dictate terms in front.

"It was a good win as she's very small," Dabernig commented.

"She has a good motor but I'm not sure how she will go over more distance in future."

There were plenty of happy punters after the first leg of Yendall's double when the Stephen Lenehan (Horsham) trained Arachnattack was heavily supported from \$6.50 into \$3.40 favourite before winning the 1200-metre BM 54 handicap.

Fellow Warrnambool trainer Adam Chambers had just the one runner for the day and that was in the opening race, the 1000-metre BM 58 handicap.

Glenferrie Girl (\$3.80) was resuming from a spell and was untroubled to lead all the way which came as no surprise to Chambers.

"I thought she would run well today as she has a good first up record," Chambers said post race.

"She has previously run creditable races at Moonee Valley but the 1000 metres is about as far as she goes."

Naracoorte trainer Sue Murphy was the only Limestone Coast mentor to be seen in the winner's stall all day.

It was not hard to back her winner Hi Smokey (\$3.40-\$4.20-\$3.60) as the gelding had raced three times previously at Naracoorte for three wins.

The six-year-old kept his unbeaten status intact with an all the way win to give Price the first leg of his double.

## SPRING IN HER STEP

The first month of spring has been exceptionally good for Caroline trainer Belinda O'Loughlin.

So far in September, O'Loughlin has had six runners for three wins, a second and a third.

O'Loughlin's only runner on Coleraine cup day last Friday was Soobmerged who made it back to back wins in the 1600-metre 0-58 handicap.

Soobmerged always travelled like a winner for Linda Meech who retained the ride after winning on the gelding 10 days earlier at Hamilton.

After sitting in second spot, Soobmerged (\$2.80 fav.) ran to the lead at the top of the straight and was untroubled to score by a long neck.

"I left it up to Linda and she summed up the race very well," O'Loughlin said.

"He (Soobmerged) has got more tricks than a magician and thankfully the penny has finally dropped."

# Peckham pair to rep region

THE Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club looks to be well represented in this year's SA Country Cup final following last Sunday's heat wins at Tara Raceway by Lochinvar Cahill and Midnight Blast – both trained at Allendale East by David Peckham.

Lochinvar Cahill, raced by Peckham in partnership with Kevin Douglas, maintained his unbeaten record at the track over 512 metres when taking over the running from Miers down the back before holding out El Banjo for a one-length win in 29.85 seconds.

By Fernando Bale out of Tears Some, the July 2020 white and black dog has now won six races at Tara Raceway, including last month's Carlin and Gazzard MG Winter Classic.

The Ninefus Syndicate's Midnight Blast went into the second heat having been placed at his past 12 starts.

Another placing looked to be on the cards when the front-running Canya Razor gave them plenty to catch.

But in the run home it was Midnight Blast, a son of Collision and Midnight Starlet, who finished the stronger when gaining the decision by a nose in 29.82 seconds and also bringing up win number six at the track.

For Peckham, this year will be the fourth time he has had a representative in the Country Cup.

In 2014 it was at Strathalbyn with Thanks

Tubby and Bourne Again.

The following year Thanks Tubby represented Mount Gambier at Gawler and in 2020 Dyna Carnie at Angle Park.

Since the SA Country Cup was reintroduced in 2013, Mount Gambier club representatives have been successful on three occasions – Gawler 2013 Moorak Hope (Tracie Price), Strathalbyn 2016 Berry Bling (Nicole Stanley) and Angle Park 2021 He's All Purpose (Tim Richards).

With Lochinvar Cahill and Midnight Blast having previously raced at Angle Park, Peckham said he was now weighing up his options with the pair in the lead-up to the \$7500 final which will be run on Friday, October 7 (Adelaide Cup night).

"Given that they have both been around Angle Park, I'm leaning towards trialling them at Tara Raceway tomorrow morning rather than tackling a 12-hour round trip to trial them at the city track," Peckham said.

The Country Cup will be a six-dog final, with Gawler and Murray Bridge also each providing two representatives.

Gawler ran one 531-metre heat last Friday with the speedy Enthusiastic – trained by Nicole Price – leading all the way to defeat Robyn Mackellar's On The Tequila by 1 1/4 lengths in 30.86 seconds.

At Murray Bridge last Sunday two heats were conducted over 530 metres.

Adrien Chevalier's Run Like Jess won the first heat in 30.17 seconds and Fantastic Faith, trained by Liz Chegia, the second in 30.11 seconds.

# Adelong just keeps on getting better

ADELONG, the 25 kilogram greyhound who turned around her racing career after wearing a one-blinded muzzle, continued on her winning way at Tara Raceway last Sunday for North Bendigo trainer Aaron Blake.

The blue daughter of Fernando Bale and Bonnie Beauty – a winner of 15 races and \$66,000 in stakemoney – had won at the Mount Gambier track the previous week

when tackling the testing 732-metre journey for the first time.

On that occasion she opened a big lead before just hanging on to defeat proven stayer Mick's Kimmy by a quarter of a length in 44.32 seconds.

In last Sunday's Progreyhoundtips.com Stake (732m), Adelong defied all challengers when once again leading all the way, and again defeating Mick's Kimmy, this time by three-quarters of a length when clocking 43.38 seconds.

The race time was interesting, something like 16 lengths quicker than the previous

week and the third fastest 732-metre time run at the track.

Only track record holder Emani Bale (43.10) and Mick's Kimmy (43.22) have run faster.

The significance of the improvement certainly was not lost on her trainer.

"Gee, I can't believe just how much she's found in the space of a week," said Blake, who travelled over with his brother Calum.

"To be honest, I had been in two minds whether to nominate her today given that she had run over the distance last week."

Adelong first appeared at Tara Raceway

in early June.

Since then she has raced at the local track on 10 occasions for seven wins over 400 metres, 512 metres, 600 metres and 732 metres.

Blake, a groundsman at the Bendigo Greyhound Racing Club, said he was now looking at returning to Tara Raceway on Sunday for a 512-metre event as a lead-up to a Bendigo feature race.

"Heats of the Bendigo Spring Cup over 660 metres are programmed for October 7 with the \$10,000 final a week later," he said.

"Being for grade 4/5 greyhounds I reckon this could be a good race for Adelong."

The well known, life long local, is 82-year-old Gloria and Isobel was born in Warrnambool.

Now a spritely 98, and a 50 year resident, Ms Phillips is currently the oldest member of the Mount Gambier Golf Club, Attamurra Road, of which they are both life members.

Commenting on her healthy longevity, Mrs Phillips still maintains her interest in the club.

"So I come out here, a lot of the members are young," she said.

"I think I've outlived friends in my age group and the older members are now in their 80s."

Ms Lennon pursued her sport, school and community interests and raised four children with her husband Pat.

"Five ladies came out herein 1979 and joined up," she said.

"I have enjoyed every minute of it, playing golf and working on the committees."

Over her 43 year membership, she served six presidential terms, was also Vice President and heavily involved with catering to raise funds.

She still organises Melbourne Cup day, but this year it is BYO food.

Pat and Gloria Lennon are perhaps best known for owning and operating the iconic deli on Lake Terrace East for 68 years.

Ms Phillips met her husband in the army and they came to Mount Gambier in the early 1970s to open the former Fletcher Jones clothing factory.

"My husband was a golfer and when we came here, I learned to play golf and I loved it," Isobel said.

After her husband died, she joined the committee and has held numerous positions, including treasurer, president, secretary and captain.

Isobel was on the committee for 31 years, "retiring gracefully" six years ago, but still sponsors the Summer Salva and Medal of Medals tournaments.

"I played golf until I was 92 and I walked the course. I did not get into a cart," Ms Phillips said.

Golfers can choose to negotiate the course in a cart, or walk the fairways.

The Mount Gambier golf club nominated her for the Australian Sports medal.

"I got the medal, instituted by Queen Elizabeth, in 2000," Isobel said.

And she has another claim to fame.

"I had a hole in one in 1983. I could out-talk my husband by saying I had a hole in one and you did not," Isobel said.

During her playing years, she won numer-

Big fields are again expected at McNamara Park, for what has become a popular event on the motor racing calendar.

The weekend will include Round 3 of the South Australian State Championships, plus the usual Master of Mac Park feature races.

Arthur Sisis is back to defend his crown and will start as unbackable favourite to claim yet another victory.

Sisis has had a stranglehold on the title in

recent year's, simply proving too strong on his Yamaha Superbike.

Chasing him will be a host of young guns, all with plenty of experience around the famed circuit.

Dallas Skeer will bring his Yamaha 600cc Supersport machine, with the hope of claiming his class lap record, while Ted Collins will also venture across the border with a 1000cc Superbike and look to push both riders to the limit.

Skeer and Collins cut their teeth racing at McNamara Park and know the circuit well, but both believe Sisis is the one to beat yet again.

Apart from the two-wheel action, the sidecars throw up an interesting tussle.

The father/son duo of David and Stephen Jones have parted ways and will go head-to-head on separate machinery.

That in itself should provide and intriguing battle, with plenty of bragging rights on the line.

Many other categories are included, from pre-modern, to lightweights, Juniors and more.

Friday will see practice for all classes, with qualifying set down for Saturday morning.

Racing will kick off in earnest on Saturday afternoon, which carries through to Sunday and culminates with the feature events later in the day.

The event always provides top-level motorsport action here in the Limestone Coast and with the recently refurbished venue, including the racing surface and the grounds, there are plenty of viewing areas for those attending, with the back of the course now a popular spot.

Full canteen and bar facilities are available all weekend, with entry \$10 per day, \$15 for the weekend and Under 16s free.

## Collins looks for pace

IT will be a welcome return to McNamara Park for Ted Collins, when the Master of Mac Park kicks off this weekend.

A regular at the venue and a member of the Mount Gambier Motorcycle Club, Collins has enjoyed the circuit throughout his career.

However, with the Covid pandemic closing access to Victorians in recent years, the Warrnambool resident missed the venue.

Once border crossings were again allowed, Collins returned to the circuit and more recently began conducting rider training courses through the business he and partner Tayla Relph run – South West Track Days.

That has given him the opportunity to re-acquaint himself with the circuit prior to this year's "Master".

Speaking to The Border Watch this week, Collins said he was excited to get back to the circuit and tackle the coveted event.

"I'm really excited to head to Mac Park," he said.

"With Covid and the border restrictions we had for a while it was hard to come over into South Australia, so it is good to get back.

"At the Easter meeting I hadn't ridden at Mac Park for such a long time it was strange.

"I have been able to come over and do

some ride days now so I am really excited.

"It is always a great race meeting."

Collins will compete on his well-prepared R1 1000cc Yamaha Superbike, on which he currently leads the Victorian and South Australian titles.

"We have had some good help with the bike from Dyno Bike in Melbourne," he said.

"They have been setting up the electronics – that is the thing with these modern Superbikes, the electronics is more important than the suspension or anything like that.

"That is what we have been chasing since we got this bike."

"It is going well."

However, muscling a 1000cc Superbike around McNamara Park is no easy feat and Collins does not expect an easy run, even with the high horsepower.

"I love the 1000, but I think the 600 would be a better bike for Mac Park," he said.

"There probably is a better lap time on a Superbike but it is definitely a lot easier to do it on a 600."

Fellow competitor Dallas Skeer suggested it would be hard to keep up with the Superbikes on his 600cc Yamaha and Collins had his own view on that.

"I think I was a bit the same back when I was on a 600," he said.

the Master."

Regardless of the competition between the two riders, both agree on one thing – everyone will be chasing Arthur Sisis, a rider who has dominated the competition.

For Collins it will be all about development leading up to the next Superbike round.

"I am doing the next round of ASBK at Phillip Island and Arthur has established himself as a front runner in ASBK now," he said.

"He has been racing ASBK all year so I can't expect to beat him, but if I can latch onto the back and try to go with him in the races and pick up the pace a little bit, we can get ready for ASBK next month."

"I am looking forward to it but it is certainly not without its challenges."

Williamson spent a year on the executive committee before taking on the big role.

He said he was pleased Kidman was still involved.

"I would like to thank George for his time as president," Williamson said.

"While he has stepped off from president, he is still on the committee.

"I would also like to thank Ken Fowles for his efforts over many years looking after the league."

"He is also leaving and he has been a long-time servant of the league."

Williamson said he has a few areas he would like the executive to focus on, with one major role which will need to be filled for next year.

"A key area for us will be the turf pitches going forward into next season," he said.

"Gary Ashby has indicated he will no longer prepare the pitches for next year, so as a com-

mittee we will need to have discussions and find a way forward for those wickets.

"That really affects the A Grade and B Grade competitions."

One other major focus may take several years, but Williamson said it was important for the sport into the future.

"I would like to see us discuss ideas around an indoor training facility here and how we might facilitate that, not necessarily in one year or three years but maybe in five years," he said.

"We need to have a long-term view on how we can do that."

"I think it is really important for our junior cricketers in particular, but also for seniors wanting to work on the sport during winter."

"If we want to have juniors going into the

state representative forums, they need to be able to train and we need to attract quality coaches.

"We can only do that if we have good facilities."

"A senior competition is only going to be as good as its junior competition."

"If we can get our juniors up and about, keep them training and interested in the game over winter, it only helps our competition going forward."

The main competitions in the region have been pushed back a week this season to allow the turf pitches to be prepared.

The recent rains and other logistics have not allowed that to happen fully at this stage. But Williamson said the draw can facilitate the changes.

He said with the usual six teams in the A Grade competition, he expected a good season.

"Numbers are looking good across the board," Williamson said.

"We don't have any grades dropping off."

"As always, the juniors at Under 12 and Under 14 levels are looking good, as we have seen in all competitions, the Under 17s is where we lose people, but at this stage that is looking good."

"The women's competition starts on October 9."

"They have an eight-round season with semi-final and grand final, which is encouraging."

Williamson said, as is usually the case, the association is seeking anyone interested in umpiring.

"We are always looking for new umpires, which is a paid position," he said.

"We are about where we left off last season but we are always looking for new ones."

"The more paid professional umpires we can get the better."

"I think it just brings the game forward."

Overall Williamson everything was in place for an entertaining summer of cricket.

The first Barber Shield clash will be a one-day match, with Penola to host North Sportsman's, East Gambier at home to South Gambier and West Gambier to host Mil Lel on October 22.

The association will use both the MyCricket and PlayHQ apps this year.

Results will still be placed on MyCricket, while registrations are to be done through the PlayHQ app until all data is migrated across to the new platform.
