Council selects new office site

AFTER an hour of debate, three failed amendments and an elected member voting against his own motion, Millicent's former netball precinct has been selected as the site of the new Wattle Range Council chambers.

The long-running issue was resolved by a



Medi-hotel traffic drops

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THE Blue Lake City reportedly saw a sudden increase in flow of visiting traffic last month with Mount Gambier's medi-hotel almost at full capacity for the whole of September.

Currently at 48pc, the site was completely booked-out from September 20, following mostly 90pc capacity for the remainder of the month according to SA Health.

As of 10am on Wednesday, 25 of the 52 onsite rooms were in use with 29 people using the facility to quarantine.

This month, numbers have sat on or below 70pc, fluctuating as people move through the Limestone Coast.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network executive director of medical services Elaine Pretorius said the facility was busy, but had since settled down.

"When we were full, we were thinking we might have to open a second hotel," Ms Pretorius said.

"I think there was this rush with people thinking they should come over when they could.

"It has been a good process, but it is a lot of hard work for those locked up in a medihotel for two weeks."

Ms Pretorius said most people using the facility were relocating for jobs or were essential workers who had to be in South Australia.

"We do not see as many people from Melbourne as such, but more of the regional people," she said.

"When people come across, they have to apply for an exemption and once it is approved, it will say they are excepted to quarantine. They then have to book in and can not cross until they have completed quarantine.

"They are escorted by police to the hotel, swabbed on day one and day 11, have their daily temperature checks and also undergo various types of analysis."

COVID-19 UPDATE

THE Mount Gambier Hospital has slowly reintroduced routine face-to-face components which had previously been restricted due to Covid-19.

Ms Pretorius said for the moment, most

hospital restrictions had not been relaxed however face-to-face education appointments and group sessions had been reinstated and Country Health Connect staff were back in the community providing care.

"One can only do that many Zoom meetings and there is quite a bit of evidence surrounding Zoom meetings being much harder work." she said.

"I think a good balance between face-toface and some quick work-like meetings on Zoom is what we will be striving for in the future.

"There has been a lot of feedback from particular patients which were desperate for some face-to-face visits and appointments."

Ms Pretorius said hospital restrictions remained and were closely aligned with Victorian sites.

"I know Victorian premier Daniel Andrews has been criticised enormously, but he is very conservative and with COVID-19 I think that is good," she said.

"I think if we trust the Victorian roadmap, it will give us some indication and reassurance."

Ms Pretorius said visitation and aged care facility restrictions were strict, but for good reason.

"This will continue until we have an indication from Victoria with how things are going," she said.

"There are plans to perhaps extend visiting hours and to allow more people to visit at the one time."

A challenge Ms Pretorius said Limestone Coast sites were facing was staff not being able to work in more than the one facility. "How long can we sustain people not be-

ing able to move in between the one place," she said.

"At some point you start buckling because you are actually duplicating your staff and we are starting to feel that.

"This will especially be evident when people want to start taking leave and with Christmas coming up."

Hospital visitors are still required to undergo a quick screening process before entering the building, involving a questionnaire and temperature check.

Names and numbers are also now recorded for contact tracing if required.

Ms Pretorius said the site saw approximately 400 visitors each day.

"I was amazed when I heard and I just thought what are all these people doing here?" She said.

RELOCATION OF TEST SITE

MOUNT Gambier Showgrounds has become home to the city's Covid-19 testing site after relocating from the hospital on 22 September.

Since Covid-19 began, the Limestone Coast has recorded approximately 34,000 tests.

Last month, the Mount Gambier hut made 2186 tests, approximately double of July's statistics.

Ms Pretorius said the first week of operation from the site's new facilities was tough for the SA Pathology team, but a structured routine had since been established.

"It is good for us here on-site at Mount Gambier because we do not have the cues of cars and have parking free again. It is just easier to get in and out of the site," she said.

"I think testing is going to be a very large part of our lives for at least the next six to 12 months, so we have to have a long-term solution for the testing.

"SA Pathology have been fantastic throughout it all and the team has to be recognised as I believe they have set us up for the success South Australia has had."

Naracoorte is expected to also move its testing site to the town's old nursing quarters. **REMINDER TO THE PUBLIC**

MS Pretorius said she recognised people were frustrated and possibly felt like things should be over by now.

"In South Australia, we have really been able to do our daily lives quite easily," she said.

"I understand the impacts on the economy and one can not stand unsympathetic for sacrifices people have made.

"We just need to stay a strong for a little bit longer \dots The alternative is too much to bare."


Cross border frustration

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MEMBER for Mount Gambier Troy Bell has fired shots at SA Health and the state's Transition Committee for delays of up to four weeks for exemptions to be approved to cross the border.

In yesterday's sitting of parliament, the in-



dependent MP lambasted the state's health department and the committee about ongoing application issues for South Australian residents attempting to traverse the Victorian border.

Cross-border community members are required to complete online pre-approval to enter South Australia under the existing essential traveller requirements.

Individuals seeking essential traveller status for urgent medical, dental or health treatment, compassionate grounds or to provide health services must apply for an essential traveller health exemption from SA Health before submitting a travel application to police.

Exemption requests are considered by an exemption committee led by South Australia's chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier and authorised officers.

But Mr Bell says the extensive application process has been dogged by bureaucratic delays, with applicants requiring answers are being "shuffled from agency to hotline to person".

Mr Bell told the chamber the lack of regional representation on the state's Transition Committee – comprised of Professor Spurrier Police Commissioner Grant Stevens and chief executives of the Premier, health, treasury and trade departments – was

He said it was "completely unacceptable" decisions impacting regional communities "are being decided by people based in metropolitan areas with no concept of the challenges of living regionally and in a border community."

"It's completely unacceptable that decisions which impact their lives are made by people far removed from their situations," Mr Bell said.

"It's completely unacceptable that regional South Australians living near a border feel they are being treated like numbers by government agencies.

"The majority of our electorate office work in 2020 has been to advocate for people, both Victorians or South Australians, who are frustrated and cannot get any answers from government agencies," he said.

"Their stories are often very difficult.

"There are people who have been referred to homeless services, have lost businesses and relationships, have missed family funerals."

Mr Bell said a man who had applied for an exemption to return permanently from South Australia from Victoria on September 22 was granted permission to enter South Australia this week.

According to Mr Bell, the man had expected to relocate on October 6, but did not receive an answer from SA Health or a timeline as to when his application.

"Finally, he wrote to the South Australian ombudsman requesting a decision," Mr Bell said

"In his letter, the spoke out about the ongoing impact on his mental health, his precarious living and financial situation and also about the frustration of not even getting a response from SA Health.

"We are aware of one young woman who has been waiting five weeks for her exemption to be approved.

Mr Meddle said the contingency was "as per industry standard", but did not answer questions about the cost or the percentage

However, confidential documents viewed by The Border Watch reveal a \$4.2m contingency fee, \$2.6m for project management, cost manager and design and \$40,000 for an opening event which is not included in the final figure.

The single largest expense was a 25pc locality fee, which was not included in council's intermediate \$39.1m design, which documents revealed "as loading on top of the cost of building the hub in a capital city."

In response to a question on why the locality loading was not include in the original cost estimate, Mr Meddle said the fee was deemed unnecessary based on advice at the time.

"The tender process revealed the true cost lowest they have been for many years."

City Council had initially earmarked \$10m for the project, with an expected \$20m contribution from the Federal Government and \$15m from the State Government.

However, the updated figure leaves City Council with a potential shortfall of \$39m against the project cost – the original cost of the \$39.1m facility.

"The council has grants to deliver the project totalling \$25,350,000," the report says.

"This would leave a shortfall of \$31,429,244.50 against the construction cost and potentially \$39,125,750.76 against the project cost, noting that the contingency may not all be used.

"Presuming there is one loan facility at \$37m for 20 years at 2.75pc, the annual cash payment for principal and interest is likely to be in the vicinity of \$2.4m.

Australian-first CT scanner in the Limestone Coast

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LIMESTONE Coast residents requiring heart scans have access to the best imaging equipment in Australia with the Mount Gambier and Districts Health Service housing the nation's first high-end CT scan machine.

The machine is operated by Benson Radiology and can scan up to 60 patients a day for conditions ranging from stroke imaging, cardiac issues and sinus infections.

The powerful machine producers images of the heart and its blood vessels and brings to life 3D models of complex cardiac conditions.

Mount Gambier resident Julie Lomman was one of the first patients to undergo the scan for any underlying cardiac conditions after she found herself out of breath while on a leisurely a walk with a friend.

After visiting her GP, Ms Lomman was referred to a specialist in Adelaide where she underwent an ECG scan.

"The cardiologist saw the images and said I needed to have a CT scan and I thought I would have do another trip to Adelaide," she said.

"I was surprised when she told me I could have the scan done in Mount Gambier because I didn't know we had the machine.

"The stress of having a scan done is enough without the stress of having it in Adelaide.

"You have to drive up which takes you five hours and you probably have to stay overnight in accommodation, which is time consuming and expensive.

"Having the scanner in Mount Gambier takes that all away.'

Featuring a significantly larger gantry bore than other scanners, Ms Lomman described

Ms Lomman said the new machine was patient-friendly and featured a significantly larger gantry bore than other scanners. "People who have claustrophobia don't

need to be worried because you don't go into the machine," she said.

"You slide the bed down and they just get your chest area.

"It is not invasive at all – they do put an IV into your arm because they put the contrast studio Pixar.

Fishermen fined for illegal haul

In December 2019, fisherman Luc Lam and two Victorian men - Raymond Tang and Eric Nguyen - were caught on a boat near Port MacDonnell with illegally caught lob-

The men were not allowed to fish for rock lobster as their pots were not registered with

gally required.

The trio were convicted a ordered to pay fines, levies and prosecution costs totaling \$5799 each.

All three men were banned from rock lobster fishing or being in possession of rock lobster for three years, unless purchased from a fish processor.

In addition Lam, who was the operator

of the boat, was convicted for breaching the value the ability to experience the premium Harbors and Navigation Regulations as the vessel did not have operational navigation lights when returning to port in darkness.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham said the convictions were a timely reassurance for recreational fishers to adhere to the law.

Fire eye in the sky

A CUTTING-EDGE robotic camera will provide an eye-in-the-sky across the Tantanoola district over the 2020/21 fire season in an Australian-first trial of the technology.

The sophisticated FireHawk camera has been installed on the Bluff communication tower, halfway between Millicent and Mount Gambier, capable of providing 360-degree scans and 24-hour surveillance from its vantage point.

The forestry sector has invested in the \$60,000 trial following a State Government decision to suspend use of two fire towers, the Bluff and Penola North, due to safety concerns related to their poor structural condition.

Early results of the trial have shown the camera can detect fire up to 30km away, providing industry with confidence the technology has the potential to significantly enhance fire management this coming fire season.

The technology has been installed by the Green Triangle Fire Alliance, a group representing about 90pc of the region's forest growers, to provide improved protection for its assets and guard the broader community.

The camera's panoramic scan of the landscape is streamed up-to-the minute over a 24-hour cycle and using tailored algorithms, its artificial intelligence sends alerts to fire managers' mobile phones when smoke is first identified, allowing for an immediate ground or aerial response.

The technology is currently used in countries such as Chile and South Africa as a defence to protect forest and agricultural crops.

Green Triangle Fire Alliance chair Laurie Hein said the region's trial had highlighted the potential for a camera system to further augment the existing fire detection systems.

He believes cameras will be commonplace fire management tools in the nearfuture alongside other emerging technologies, such as drones and geostationary satellites.

"This technology is one of the more advanced detection tools we have seen in fire

management in the Green Triangle since the introduction of digital communication tools," he said.

"For the first time we will have 24-hour surveillance, scanning the landscape for a fire threat anywhere within the tower radius, providing immediate data to our network of fire managers.

"We know that early detection is critical in managing and suppressing wildfire and this system has the capability of providing a far greater level of defence than we have ever experienced before."

Green Triangle Forest Industries Hub chair Ian McDonnell said the trial was another key milestone for the forest and timber sector, which was introducing worldbest technologies to protect and support the supply chain.

He said the industry could not see a repeat of last fire season, which destroyed 70,000 hectares of plantation forest nationwide leaving a major gap in domestic supply.

"This new technology will provide a heightened level of response, arming our highly experienced fire spotters with the enhanced ability to spot and coordinate the extinguishing of a fire earlier.

"Instead of climbing the dizzy heights of the fire tower they will be working in the comfort of an air-conditioned office, working alongside forest managers and firefighting personnel to protect not only our

FireHawk project manager Martin Mc-Donald said the camera technology removed the OHS liability for forest growers, who are forced to remove fire spotters from towers in extreme weather conditions, such as high wind or temperature days, as was the case on one extreme fire danger day during the 2019/20 fire season.

"The system will alarm a located fire or smoke sighting and place cross hairs on that location until it is cleared by an operator. If a smoke sighting occurs but then dissipates, the fire can still be located as the system gives accurate initial location data. All images are stored on a database that can be accessed as required," Mr McDonald said.

Uni campus to offer secondary teaching degree

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A SECONDARY education degree will be offered at University of South Australia's Mount Gambier campus from next year, hoping to upskill and retain the region's residents within the high school workforce.

Uni SA will add both a Bachelor of Secondary Education and Bachelor of Social Science to its Mount Gambier course list following extensive consultation with industry stakeholders, aiming to meet any future demand across the education, ageing and disability sectors.

The four-year secondary education degree, which will be limited to mathematics and digital technologies specialisations for 2021, will build on the campus' reputation for producing high-quality primary and early childhood educators.

The move has been welcomed by Limestone Coast education director Adam Box, who lauded the success of the primary education degree program and hoped it could be emulated in the new secondary teaching course.

Conducted over three years, the Bachelor in Social Science will combine some elements with the existing social work faculty.

Both degrees will combine on-campus and online delivery in 2021.

Uni SA regional manager Ian McKay, who is based at the Wireless Road West campus, said the phased introduction of the secondary education degree was important for the campus

and schools across the Limestone Coast and western Victoria.

"Regional secondary schools can often find it challenging to employ specialist teachers and over time having secondary teacher graduates locally will help support the staffing of our regional schools," Mr McKay said.

"We are excited about being able to introduce this degree as it meets an important need within our region"

Mr Box hoped the success of the primary could be emulated by the new course in what he believes will be a positive for the region's school system.

"The thing for the Limestone Coast is our distance from Adelaide means we do need to grow our own a little bit," Mr Box said.

"I think it is important we invest in our people and we have been doing that and the quality coming through has been pleasing.

"The key is they are here training locally and we have been able to retain a large number."

Mr Box said South Australia's transition of Year 7 into secondary school from 2022 was progressing well with several Limestone Coast upper primary and high school teachers undertaking co-planning exercises recently.

"The (Education) Department has got a very good team in the Year 7 to high school space," Mr Box said.

"There is a still a bit of work to do but we still have time."

Wattle Range selects council office site

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AFTER an hour of debate, three failed amendments and an elected member voting against his own motion, Millicent's former netball precinct has been selected as the site of the new Wattle Range Council chambers.

The long-running issue was resolved by a divided council at Tuesday night's monthly meeting, eliminating the existing George Street office Apex Park, Jubilee Park and the Millicent RSL as prospective locations for the new office.

The site – located on the corner of Williams Road and North Terrace - was supported by a divided council at Tuesday night's monthly meeting following a motion by Councillor Peter Dunnicliff to reduce the potential sites to three locations.

Cr Dunnicliff told the chamber a resolution was needed for the issue following months of discussion and community consultation.

"We have done a lot of discussion – too much I think – a lot of community consultation and we have copped a lot of flack," he said

"A lot of people who were quite against the new office block have met with our chief executive, walked through the office and see our point of view."

Penola-based councilor Dean Burrow called for the area around the Millicent RSL Hall to be included as a potential location for the new offices.

"We have an opportunity to build a building with a wow factor and I think there is a lot of opportunity in that area," he said.

"We have had the RSL here at council and I think with a little bit more talking to them, they would accommodation building over the top."

Cr John Drew rejected any development on Jubilee Park, saying it would be "tremendous shame for our district".

"It is our best park and it is highly utilized," he said.

However, Cr Dale Price said he had undertaken independent investigations into the site, with community feedback revealing Jubilee Park was the preferred location.

"I have actually made a point of asking people where they think we should build," he said.

"The feedback I had had is Jubilee Park and from people who had surprised me to have had that opinion."

After more than half an hour of debate, elected members supported reducing the potential locations to the former netball courts, the car park immediately behind the Civic and Arts Centre and Jubilee Park, including the Millicent RSL.

Following the passage of the motion, Cr Dunnicliff sought support for the development of a concept design for the car park area.

Councillors discussed undertaking concept designed for both the car park and Jubilee Park sites, with a majority labelling it as unnecessary.

"I believe hidden underneath all of these questions is a belief we will probably end up at the netball courts," Cr Drew said.

"That is our only real choice and the cheapest.

"I feel is if we have a concept design at all, we will be wasting money."

Cr Graham Slarks vehemently rejected both Jubilee Park and the car park area, telling staff and elected members "common sense would dictate we build on an undeveloped site".

"We have a beautiful, well developed park and we are going to dig it up and put a building on it?," he said.

"I reckon you will have criticism doing

"Last week, the car park was utilized fully for an event we put on at the skate park.

"Putting a building there is going to be a

The development of concept designs was rejected by Cr Drew, Cr Slarks, Cr Sharon Cox, Cr Dennis Muhovics and Cr Kevin McGrath, who then moved to proceed with the former netball courts as the site of the new office.

"We spent a lot of time beating around the bush and I would like to see that site redeveloped," Cr McGrath said.

"I think it would really enhance that end of town and complement the money we are spending on the domain."

Corcoran Ward councilors Drew, Muhovics, Slarks and Cox were joined by Cr's McGrath and Dunnicliff in supporting the netball precinct site.

Council office cost unknown

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THE price of Wattle Range Council's new council office could cost millions, but chief executive Ben Gower will not reveal a ballpark figure until concept designs are finalised.

Council will move ahead with a plan for the development at Millicent's former netball precinct – located on the corner of North Terrace and Williams Road – after a majority of elected members voted in support of the site at this week's meeting.

Earlier this year, council staff outlined total cost estimates for five potential sites ranging from \$8.4m for a new structure at the former Millicent and District Community Club – which had since been sold – to \$5.9m for a structure at Jubilee Park.

A report authored by Mr Gower in June estimated a \$6.8m cost to build at the former netball courts, comprised of \$3.2m for building

construction, \$1.3m for demolition, external works and car parks, \$336,410 for furniture, fittings and equipment and \$1.9m for statutory charges, professional fees and contingency.

In the report, Mr Gower noted the estimates had been produced "based on high level concept plans", but could would not have an accurate estimate of the final build "until a detailed design has been completed and the project is costed against those designs through a competitive tender process".

Speaking to The Border Watch this week, Mr Gower said he had "no idea" of the true build would cost, saying it would be dependent on the site design.

"There's a number you can multiply by 1280 square metres and I have heard that number can vary from \$1500 to \$2500," he said.

"That is just for the building, then you have to fit it out with things like air conditioners, the tiling in the bathrooms.

"But I am not confident with the accuracy of

the numbers and these are from architects and buildors."

Mr Gower said although a car park would have to be constructed at the former netball courts, the site was likely to result in savings due to its geography and existing connection to utilities.

"The beauty of the netball courts is there's very little earthworks required as it's flat and it's level," he said. "There will be a small demolition cost to knock down the old building, but it already has the services such as power, water and sewerage which runs into the site and that keeps the cost down."

The primary Wattle Range Council office was constructed in the 1930s as a school and while it has undergone a number of renovations over the past 90 years, no major work has been undertaken on the facility since 1997.

Mr Gower said the building was structurally unsuitable to be refurbished and had "significant ongoing maintenance problems".

"Due to its limitation in size, council staff are now spread over multiple sites to avoid congestion," he said. "The existing office building is now no longer fit for purpose."

Council's proposed expenditure has attracted some community opposition, with the "Stop Wattle Range Council spending on new office complex" Facebook group attracting more than 500 members.

The group, led by unsuccessful council candidates Ron Buwalda and Nicole Looby-McRostie, urged ratepayers to sign petitions and contact the Local Government Minister in an attempt to stop the project.

Mr Buwalda said while he does not agree with the requirement to build a new complex, the netball court site was best option.

"Why, as a so called responsible council, would you direct the chief executive office to spend money on getting this site surveyed and costing done and then ask the ratepayers if they actually want the building to go ahead?."



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Copped enough

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KALANGADOO stalwarts Kerry Dowdell and Peter Savage say they have "given up hope" on the reinstatement of the town's sole police officer after almost four years without a permanent presence.

The two prominent community members have called for a definitive answer on the future of the single-man station or progress the clean up and sale of the site and the purpose-built police residence.

The pair - who are both recipients of Wattle Range Council's Citizen of the Year Award - say the neglected property has created a habitat overgrown weeds and plants has created a habitat for snakes.

Mr Savage said the untamed front and rear yard of the police residence posed a risk to nearby community members, with snake sightings in the vicinity of the property.

"We have probably given up hope on getting a police officer back because it has been so long, but we wish they would do something about the assets," he said. "There is a family living next door to the police house and they have seen a snake in the yard. What happens if the little kids next door gets bitten by a snake? This is the best house in the street and it is just sitting here, not being used and is now a hazard.

Ms Dowdell echoed Mr Savage's comments, saying residents were fearful of snakes in and around the property.

She said people had expressed interest in purchasing and renting the house - which was built in 2010 – but was unable to as was still owned by SAPOL despite being vacant

"Someone had actually asked about buying it and they were told it wasn't for sale," she said. "It is such as shame because it is a beautiful house and it's

sitting there with no one in it.

"A new family could move in there and it would be a great thing for our community.'

The pair acknowledged it was unlikely a police officer would be reinstated, but urged the State Government to consider staffing

'We have been noticing more police driving through, there definitely has been an increase in police presence," Mr Savage said.

"But having police permanently in Kalangadoo is a better deterrent and stops things happening rather than catch people after they have done something.'


Ahead of the 2018 state election, then Shadow Police Minister Stephan Knoll committed to retaining a permanent police officer in Kalangadoo, saying the Liberal Party had absolutely no plans to close any police

Former Police Minister Corey Wingard previously claimed he did not have the authority to direct the Police Commissioner to keep the station open - despite extending the opening hours of metropolitan police stations against the advice of commissioner Grant Stevens.

Mr Wingard said he was awaiting the completion of a statewide review into regional policing – which has been underway since 2018 - to be finalised before any announcement on the future of the station.

In a letter to Mr Wingard earlier this year, Wattle Range mayor Des Noll requested a definitive response on the position of the Kalangadoo Police Station.

Current Police Minister Vincent Tarzia who replaced Mr Wingard in July this year - responded in September, saying "operational decisions of SAPOL are ultimately

A MOUNT Gambier City Council committee has recommended a \$35,000 boost towards the Apollo Football Club's \$104,000 pitch lighting project.

The People and Place Committee endorsed funding for nine clubs under council's \$100,000 Sport and Recreation Capital Works Program at last week's meeting.

Committee members supported a \$10,000 contribution towards the North Gambier Football Netball Club's netball changeroom and shelter facility, \$14,000 towards the Mount Gambier Harness Racing Club's recording platform and \$12,000 to the Blue Lake BMX Club for the construction of a track perimeter

Funding for the Mount Gambier Bowls Club, Blue Lake Golf Club, the Mount Gambier RSL and District Bowling Club, Mount Gambier Golf Club and the Mount Gambier Swimming Club has also been recommended by the

Since the program's inception in 2010, council has provided approximately \$900,000 in grants to help with new developments.

The recommendation will be discussed by elected members at next week's city council

McDonald Park toilet upgrade

THE AGING McDonald Park toilets will soon be replaced with a new facility after a Mount Gambier City Council committee backed a provisional budget allocation of \$150,000 for the project in next year's budget.

At last month's council meeting, elected members voted in support of a staff recommendation to remove two old toilet blocks at McDonald Park and construct a replacement facility in

A staff report said council had received "several requests" to upgrade the amenities adjacent the netball courts.

The report said staff conducted investigations of the conditions of the existing sewerage systems and building and determined the construction of a new toilet block incorporating male/female and accessible toilet facilities was most appropriate.

However, the report said the budget commitment was not recommended in the current financial year given the "existing budget deficit and significant capital expenditure already committed to projects from the council's asset management plans".


While Ms Jaeschke always held high hopes she would one day lead the practice where she has honed her craft for almost 11 years, that reality has arrived quicker than anticipated.



Reminder to check yourself before its too late

EARLY breast cancer detection through simple checks and regular self-monitoring could save Limestone Coast lives.

Each year, BreastScreen SA provides more than 90,000 free screening mammograms to South Australian women primarily aged 50 to 74.

With October marking Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Limestone Coast acting breast care nurse Chris Nobes said she wanted to remind community members how important routine examination and appointments were for all females.

Beginning her employment around a month ago, Ms Nobes is relieving for nurse Dana Mulraney and has smoothly settled into helping provide service and support to patients and their families.

Ms Nobes said breast checks were an easy task for men and women which only took a few minutes per day.

"It can save us a lot of heartache and sadness," she said.

"We should be encouraging each other and making sure we all do it and it is not anything to be embarrassed about either.

"It should be a part of our lives and we need to teach our young children as soon as we can too.'

The primary role of a breast care nurse is to support people who have breast cancer as well as their families and carers.

They provide information, physical and psychological care and give practical advice to patients and carers about diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation.

Ms Nobes said the role was rewarding as she felt as though she had made a huge difference in people's journey in sometimes the smallest ways.

"It is lovely to help and guide them through and know you have a value to them and their families by just letting them know you are there," she said.

"It can be an unusual situation to be put in sometimes and we can provide a helping hand to guide them in the right direction and just provide reassurance.

"I think many appreciate just having a friendly face to speak to or call and tell them whatever they like without any fear of upsetting anyone.'

Ms Nobes said during her short time of service she could see there was a need for more breast care nurses.

"Unfortunately there is only one fulltime nurse for the whole Limestone Coast region and I can certainly see the need for more," she said.

"I have had phone calls from Kingston, Keith and across the district and I am not able to see them straight away or do not get to travel there at all."

Ms Nobes symptoms can often go unrecognised, but as soon as something was unusual, the individual should approach a general practitioner.

"Being aware of how our breasts feel and what is normal for us is key to knowing when things change," she said.

"In the instance when it does change, you can go and see a general practitioner and get it sorted straight away.

PINK has always played a prominent role in Penola resident Jenny Pahl's wardrobe, but the bright colour now holds a heartfelt meaning for the stage four breast cancer

While helping her husband Jeff with farm work in April, Ms Pahl thought she clumsily pulled a chest muscle.

It was not given a second thought until a week later when an inflamed lump, which she had never noticed beforehand, did not disappear.

Everything changed for Ms Pahl and

her family on 17 April when she was diagnosed with stage four invasive ductal carcinoma breast cancer.

A 3.4cm tumor was found on her chest, 1.1cm on her sternum, another on her main lymph node, which was highlighted as severe cancer, as well as a lump on her lung lining and rib.

Ms Pahl said she was blown away when doctors told her she had a "good" cancer as she did not believe it was possible.

"I just thought, how can you have a good cancer? Cancer is cancer," she said. "You check yourself, but because I have

"Jeff thinks at night I used to breathe with a whistle and in November last year I had what the doctor thought was a 100-day cough and I could not stop coughing, she said.



Cancer awareness push

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ALTHOUGH October is marked as Breast Cancer Awareness Month, it is an every day discussion point for Mount Gambier resident Sharon Tuffnell during her daily line of work.

Breast cancer is Australia's most common cancer affecting women, with an average of 55 people impacted every day.

In 2020, it is predicted 19,998 women and 170 men would be diagnosed with the life-changing disease.

Since establishing her business Bare Necessities Lingerie over 30 years ago, Ms Tufnell has become a passionate spokesperson for breast cancer and all relevant topics.

Although she believed it was great there was a time dedicated to heightened awareness raising, Ms Tufnell said breast cancer did not discriminate and could strike at any time of the year.

"Breast cancer does not unfortunately target just October," she said.

"Ladies are diagnosed with breast cancer sadly every day."

Ms Tufnell said she suggested awareness could be raised not only during October, but every day of the year during routine conversations

Working closely with Limestone Coast breast cancer nurses, Ms Tuffnell said herself and her employees worked with all clients to make sure they were fitted with the best product possible.

"Whether it is post surgical or not, every customer which walks through the doors is treated equally and with care and compassion," she said.

"We work closely with each customer as well as our local breast cancer nurses to make sure we choose the right product for each person."

Ms Tuffnell said having the right fitting bra is important for every woman, not just those who are or have been through cancer treatment

"We do bra fittings all the time ... the first sign a bra does not not fit properly is if it is uncomfortable," she said.

"It is important to be fitted to make sure you are wearing the right size bra and if everybody understood, they would realise why the wire dug into them or their lace scratched them. "It is all about regular fittings,

replacements and how you look after them."

Ms Tuffnell said she recommend all women to be be fitted every 12 months or

"As we all know, we fluctuate. Some ladies may have different sizes when fluctuating as well," she

Amoena recently released its new Adapt Air Breast Forms earlier this year, a redesign of its previous traditional breast form.

Ms Tuffnell said the newer design was possibly more suitable for females with protruding or un-

even scaring.

sign can a d a p t w i t h the injection of air and mould around it," she said. "It forms a much closer contact to the chest wall and it is much less weight.

"It took four years of developing and two years of trial to put them on the market."

Ms Tuffnell said the general feedback was the new form felt more natural and not like an external prosthesis.

Due to Covid-19, Bare Necessities' regular come and try day had to be cancelled due to representatives from Melbourne unable to travel to Mount Gambier.

"Ladies do not have to be due to buy one, but usually they can try it and they know when they are due for their next breast form they can move into it without a problem," she said

Every two year Medicare offer a \$400 rebate for breast form purchases.

Ms Tuffnell said she had positively witnessed breast forms give her clients confidence

"You see ladies come in who are quite often self conscious, wearing a scarf because they want to cover difference," she said.

"Then after they are fitted, they will go out with the scarf over their arm.

"There is also the option of partial breast forms for those who have not had a full vasectomy, which is equally as important."

Ms Tuffnell said Bare Necessities Lingerie offered bra fittings five and a half days a week and encouraged all females to be properly fitted.

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Taste of safari on doorstep

THE Limestone Coast public has the rare opportunity to experience its own touch of safari this summer as a unique Robe agricultural tourism business invites the community for private inspection.

South Australia's only known camel dairy Humpalicious Camel Milk owners TJ and Warrick Hill and their 50 camels moved from Port Germein to the South East just over two years, building the world's first renewably-powered site.

When the lease of their former 200-hectare property ended, Ms Hill said they began investigating other places to settle and stumbled upon a 40ha block of vacant land on the outskirts of Robe.

"We thought about lifestyle, tourism, cool weather and it all seemed to work," she said.

"We have had to start from scratch as there was no water, power and the fencing needed work.

"We have been milking the camels for around a year now and have installed solar and wind which we plan to continue to expand on."

Ms Hill said an aspiration was to become an agricultural-focused tourism business which invited public on-site for behind-thescene tours and exclusive tasting of products.

"From what we know, we are the only camel dairy which has opened up to public because it is so difficult milking camels and it is time-consuming," she said.

"Milking 17 camels takes three hours and you could do 100 cows in that time as they are bred for the machinery.

"Milking camels is quite difficult because they are wild animals and the teet distribution is the almost never the same." With a passion for agriculture, Ms Hill said agritourism was important as she believed many people were disconnected from farming.

"When people walk through these glass doors and see these camels standing calmly right in front of them, they are blown away," she said.

"I think the thing I love about it is about reconnecting and introducing people to large animals and food sources."

Summer tours run from Thursday to Sunday morning with the farm also open in the afternoon for people passing through.

Ms Hill said tours involved walking to the dairy and informal, hands-on experi-

"It is a really great way for kids to learn hands-on and the camels are behind a fence so it is safe for everybody," she said.

"We offer camel walks where people can walk amongst the heard and people can taste the milk through milkshakes, gelato and coffee."


The farm is also planning to provide camel rides.

Ms Hill said the initial project stemmed back to when Mr Hill began involvement with the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) at the age of 20, beginning the first South Australian camel muster with his friend.

"One day they asked whether they (Warrick and best friend Roger) wanted to catch camels and off they went," she said.

Making Robe their new home, Ms Hill said she believed the farm has added a vibe to the Limestone Coast.

Internet now at fingertips

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FREE public wifi across Beachport's city centre is expected to become a tourism drawcard for those visiting the Limestone Coast these summer holidays.

The travelling hotspot has become the latest Wattle Range destination to have wifi technology installed, following Millicent earlier this year and Penola planned next month.

The project, costing approximately \$31,000, was funded as part of council's 2019-20 capital works program with expected ongoing maintenance costs totalling \$1200 annually for the seaside town.

With a main modem based at the township's visitor information centre, signal is expected to reach across Railway Terrace and Beach Road through to the location's main gathering areas including the jetty and waterfront.

Coastal Treasures business owner and nearby seaside resident Robin Cassidy said the ability for tourists and residents to have the internet at their fingertips would be beneficial for the surrounding economy.

"Free wifi is not available much in the country when comparing to metropolitan areas," Ms Cassidy said.

"I understand many people have enough data on their phones, but if the option was there I would say people would use it whenever possible.

"It should be considered a drawcard for those visiting the town."

Ms Cassidy said she hoped the wifi would increase visiting numbers this upcoming holiday season.

"Recently, we have had a lot of South East locals popping through for a visit because they feel quite safe to be out and about," she said.



"We have also had people who live around the area visiting the store who have said they had never been here before, or were happy travelling on day trips or around the state.

"We hope we see more people during the warmer weather as well."

Before Covid-19, Ms Cassidy said she had friends travel overseas who had been required

to download apps before booking into accommodation.

"I think having wifi available offers flexibility for businesses to use it in futuristic ways," she said.

"With the way the world is going, if you need to download an app, I would say people would choose to use the wifi if possible rather

than using data.

"I have wifi in the shop so that is fine with me, but when I am out and about, especially in the cities, I definitely try and use free wifi.

"There are so many things which we search on Google now and I think it great people have the ability to log into free wifi to do that."

Council economic development manager Roger Babolka said the logic behind the installation was to offer the community more services

"We want people to engage with the local community and stay longer," Mr Babolka said.

"It is all about providing a better environment for both locals and tourists."

Mr Babolka said he hoped visitors could use the wifi to search for Beachport attractions, plan their stay and hopefully develop an enjoyable experience while in the district.

"It has proven to work quite well in other areas across Australia," he said.

"We are in a very high profile tourism location across the coastal locations and the Coonawarra region so it is logical to have the facility available.

"It forms part of a broader review across our visitor information centres later last year to make sure we are providing an up-to-date service to tourists."

Mr Babolka said it was not just younger people who were tech savvy, with Grey Nomads as bigger users as the younger generation.

"They are on the road and wifi allows them to make contact with their family while travelling around and it is all good news."

A council marketing scheme to promote the technology, which is expected to include business windows stickers, will be implemented across the district soon.

Green Triangle Electronics has installed technology across all three sites.

Council offers dual free hard waste days

NARACOORTE and Lucindale residents can dispose of hard waste under a free two-day initiative offered by Naracoorte Lucindale

The Naracoorte Waste Transfer Station will accept household hard waste tomorrow at no cost, while Lucindale Waste Transfer Station will offer the same opportunity on 31 October.

Council said the free disposal days were part of its commitment to reduce incidence of illegal dumping.

The items accepted free of charge include furniture, floor coverings and timber offcuts (up to two metres in length), blinds and window coverings, bikes and toys, lawnmowers, TVs and e-waste (place on top of load), along with household quantities of building materials such as bricks, pavers and concrete.

With council preparing for an influx of waste on the two disposal days, residents are urged not to bring items which are accepted free of charge year-round.

This includes batteries, oil and steel such as whitegoods - washing machines, dryers, ovens, stoves and refrigerators and freezers that have been degassed, as well as sheets of iron and guttering, air conditioners, small items of scrap metal and hot water systems.

Waste not accepted free of charge, such as green and putrescible waste, asbestos (appointment only), business or industrial waste, should also be disposed of on other days.

Gas bottles, tyres, car parts, household chemicals, hazardous waste and treated timber are not accepted at council's waste transfer stations.

The free hard waste disposal collections will be held from 8am to 4pm tomorrow (Naracoorte) and October 31 (Lucindale).

Alternatively, residents are also encouraged to reduce landfill and support reuse by hosting a sale during the Garage Sale Trail on No-

Hotel's grand ghostly tales

The Grand Hotel's paranormal past has been reignited on the cusp of the long-standing facility's mammoth milestone birthday.

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THE Millicent-based venue, dubbed as one of South Australia's most haunted hotels, has attracted the attention of several investigators and ghost hunters over its 120 years since establishment.

Celebrating its major anniversary on 12 September this year, a string of historical conspiracies involving several resident spirits have since been associated with the popular venue and have circulated the nation for years.

Ghost Crime Tours paranormal investigators David Hogg and Darren Bacchus are among many who have explored the hotel themselves, deeming it to be one of their favourite investigations of all time.

Visiting in 2016, the experienced examiners have been working on a novel involving a series of ghost stories which will include The Grand Hotel.

Mr Hogg said the book Ghost Crime Tales is expected to launch next month and he believed the hotel's well-known association with past supernatural activity was worthy of a feature

Stories and sightings by visitors and staff have been recounted in both upstairs and downstairs sections of the hotel and involve three main characters.

Mr Hogg said a young boy who plays around the pool and bar table area, a former female publican named Mary and an older welldressed gentleman who leaves a lingering smell of tobacco are the most common stories told.

"We always had the thought of putting together some our favourite stories into a book and getting it out for everybody to read," he said

SPOOKY STORIES: Millicent's Grand Hotel, dubbed one of South Australia's most haunted hotels, celebrated its 120th birthday last month. "We had heard about The Grand Hotel ghost stories for years... Everybody loves a good ghost story from back in the day.

"It is a gorgeous hotel with a tonne of history. There is nothing like being there in person, with the lights off, and waiting for everything to quieten down to see what happens next."

During the late night investigation, Mr

Hogg said they had tremendous success recording large EVP and EMF spikes when exploring several of the establishment's accommodation rooms and service areas.

Hotel manager Leandra Worrell said it was each to their own as to whether they believed the hotel's paranormal history.

"There are just so many stories and it

makes you wonder as to where they all came from," she said.

"There has been a couple of unexplained things, just feelings and thinking there is somebody there, but there is not.

"I think I have grown accustomed to the spooky feeling because the whole time I have been here people have spoken about it."

Since taking on her managing role after the hotel changed ownership hands around four years ago, Ms Worrell said she often attended to the hotel's upstairs level.

"I go upstairs in the accommodation section just about every day now and at first it is a bit eerie," she said.

"The old man is believed to occupy a specific room so whenever I service the room I always say hello as I have been told he is grumny.

"People have told me they have also had usual feelings when they go up there."

The hotel has been investigated on two other occasions since 2016 including most recently by Adelaide Haunted Horizons following an investigation at Robe's Caledonian Inn.

Ms Worrell said since her employment at the hotel, she had invested time into researching the history of the hotel.

"In 1899, a petition was put forward to build another hotel because people felt the other two venues did not provide quality accommodation," she said.

"People in Millicent said they did not want any more hotels as they had enough, and the only reason this was passed was because of the proximity to the railway station and the promise would be grand.

"For a long time it was actually the grandest hotel in the South East."

Shearer shortage

A NATIONAL shearer shortage caused by border shutdowns and travel restrictions is creating unprecedented pressure this spring season across the Limestone Coast's agricultural sector.

Tough interstate and overseas travel bans have generated a huge shearing industry employment gap which regional contractors are struggling to fill.

Fast approaching considerably the busiest time of the year for shearers, South East Shearing co-owner Richard Rees said Australia's reliance on New Zealand was making operations difficult.

Traditionally, Australia relies on approximately 500 New Zealand contractors to help shear between five to seven million sheep annually.

Mr Rees said he was currently employing approximately 70 people across South Australia and Victoria which was around 25pc below average than normal.

"The rest of this year is going to be a struggle," Mr Rees said.

"With New Zealand unable to come in and with the borders still blocked it is just going to make it hard.

"Everyone is crying out for workers and farmers are starting to worry they are not going to get their sheep shorn."

During a seasonal period, Mr Rees said it was usually possibly to move Victorian shearers to South Australia when necessary, which could also not happen during today's current climate.

"The farmers have been good and they understand what is going on at the moment and everyone has to work together," he said.

Mr Rees said he was among many who have had to turn down new work as he did not have the employees available.

"Basically every contractor around South Australia would be the same boat," he said.

"The sheds are not being filled up. There might be a seven stander, but only three or four shearers might be available.

"Everyone is struggling."

Remaining positive, Mr Rees said it had also provided opportunities which were not available previously.

"We have had some workers who have lost their jobs with previously shearing experience who have come back into the industry," he said.

"We have also employed some young kids who are keen to enter the industry and are looking for work.

"Although it is not heaps of staff, we have and are training up a few more."

Mr Rees said although it was not an easy job, the rewards were there if people were to put in the effort.

"If you want to put in the hard yards, you will be rewarded. You also get to see a lot of the country side and are not stuck at the same place," he said.

"We are always willing to put on new workers and those willing to give it a go," he said.

"We need all the help we can get at the





MOUNT GAMBIER CATTLE **WEDNESDAY 659 (38)**

NUMBERS lifted slightly as agents yarded 659 head of live weight and open auction cattle. These sold to another large field of trade and processor buyers with both feeders and restockers active across the offering. Quality was generally good with some spring finish over the pens as some heavy bullocks and cows came forward with great weights and finish as the market ranged from firm to dearer in price. Vealer numbers climbed as steers to the trade ranged from 420c to 440c with feeder activity from 405c to 419c as restockers operated from 450c to 495c/kg. Vealer heifers made from 363c to 422c with both the trade and feeders active on these. Yearling steers lifted by 10c to 15c as the trade was active from 392c to 402c with similar heifers returning from 338c to 396c/kg. Feeder steers ranged from 391c to 420c with the feeder heifers selling from 320c to 402c/kg. Restockers sourced yearling steers from 436c to 450c/kg. Grown steers and bullocks ranged from 352c to 395c to the trade with feeder support from 354c to 410c/kg. Grown heifers to the trade ranged from 310c to 380c with feeder activity here from 346c to 382c as manufacturing steers sold from 291c to 352c/kg. Heavy cows remained firm in price as they ranged from 280c to 328c as the lighter selection returned from 270c to 300c while bulls made from 276c to 310c/kg.

NARACOORTE CATTLE **TUESDAY 866 (222)**

NUMBERS rose as agents yarded 866 head of live weight and open auction cattle. These sold to the usual field of trade and processor buyers with both feeders and restockers active across the offering. Quality was generally good as spring continues as the market ranged from firm to dearer as trade cattle sold to similar rates as the week before while feeder types lifted this week. Vealer numbers were small as steers returned from 401c to 438c with the heifers selling to 420c/kg. Yearling steers to the trade were firm in price as they made from 370c to a high of 440c in an isolated sale as the yearling heifers sold from 319c to 430c/ kg. Feeder cattle lifted by 10c to 20c as steers sold from 374c to 442c as the heifers made from 355c to 425c/kg. Restockers sought supply here paying from 416c to 442c on steers and from 348c to 413c/kg on heifers. Grown steers and bullocks were in short supply as they ranged from 370c to 415c with the grown heifers returning from 268c to $407 \ensuremath{\text{c}}$ as manufacturing steers made up to 330c/kg. Heavy cows were also firm in price as they sold from 285c to 315c with the lighter types to the trade making from 240c to 271c/kg. Feeders were active here paying from 282c to 294c as restockers sought supply to 281c/kg. Heavy bulls sold from 242c to 300c with lighter types selling to 399c/kg.

NARACOORTE SHEEP -**TUESDAY** 23,323 (8868) NUMBERS climbed sharply agents yarded 20,622 lambs 2701 and sheep to total 23,323 head with a rise of nearly 9000 head this week. These sold

to a larger array of trade and processor buyers with an extra Victorian order along with larger number of active restockers who competed strongly for lambs to turn out and grow on. The quality on offer was very good with some superb heavy pens with great weights and finish, as well as being fresh in the skin while an excellent line up of trade types was also presented. Pricing however mainly fell away after the highs of the week before, as both sheep and lamb markets eased by \$10 to \$12/head with more in places. The restocking lambs bucked this trend to lift by \$5 to \$7 with the extra orders providing the competition for these lambs. Light lambs to the trade sold from \$116 to \$142 with the light weight trade 2 and 3 score types returning from \$144 to \$154/head. Restockers were very active as they sought supply paying from \$106 to \$118 on lighter weights and from \$128 to \$150/head for heavier pens. Trade weight 3 score lambs made from \$152 to \$182/head as they sold from mainly from 750c to 780c/ kg cwt. Heavy lambs sold from \$174 to \$214 as the extra heavy pens made from \$204 to the market high of \$243/head. Light old lambs made from \$110 to \$123 with the medium weights returning from \$138 to \$158 as heavy old lambs sold from \$163 to a high of \$198/ head. Hoggets made from \$110 to \$180 with light ewes selling to \$106/head. Medium weighted ewes returned from \$115 to \$145 with the heavier types making from \$134 to a high of \$198/head as most ewes sold from 520c to 580c/kg cwt. Wethers sold from \$175 to \$215 as rams made from \$63 to \$130/head.

Border closure brings new life

South Australia's favourite seaside town has become home for the McLachlan family after they were forced to flee their rural property just hours before imminent border closures.

SUSIE, Andrew and children Angus, 12, and Poppy, 9, made the sudden decision to leave their farm, which neighbours the Victoria-South Australia border, when harsh Covid-19 restrictions were implemented.

With land stretching both sides of the border, the family's home was technically located in Victoria, but their driveway in South Australia, creating a unique situation of logistics and headaches.

Ms McLachlan said there was no viable way they were able to stay at their property as they would be essentially "locked-in" until borders re-opened.

"In the end we arrived home from football in Naracoorte one Saturday morning, packed up and left to move to Robe in four hours," she said.

"It was quite disorientating.

"I think we were incredibly fortunate to have an alternative and a place familiar to us."

Ms McLachlan said if they did not move, they would have been reliant on another party dropping groceries to the property's South Australian side gate.

"That was just not feasible, my mother in law is over 80 and I have two young children." she said.

"A major concern would have been accessing medical treatment and the expenses involved.

"I think there were a few other people who were in the s a m e boat as us."

Ms McLaughlin said she and her family were grateful for the community's support since their relocation.

"The community here is very strong and I think it is just about one of the most beautiful places in the world," she said.

"I think the opportunity for kids to be able to go to the beach, get outside and catch up with friends is important and it is a well-resourced community.

"They have been welcomed so warmly by Robe Primary School and have been very inspirational actually."

For the past two years, Ms McLachlan has been focusing her efforts on a project, founding her business Mindful Nutrients involving a micronutrient blend scientifically proven to boost mood and anxiety.

"I feel like I have a real mission with what I am doing, so there has been this tension as I know I need time to settle into this new life," she said.

> "I know I am dealing with quite a lot, but it is so important to keep progressing with the goals I am setting for my business and the community."

Ms McLachlan said she was remaining positive and considered Covid-19 to be almost a blessing.

"I really believe crisis can actually make you a better person and allows people to contribute more," she said.

"It opens up the understanding of how challenging life can be and you want to make sure, you can do what you can for others.

"It is very easy to get stuck and often people do not want to talk about the things which are hard."

Reflecting on the past two months, Ms McLachlan said she hoped the crisis had changed people's outlook on life.

"I was born with one hand and I probably do not think about things in the way most people do," she said.

"It is important to get to know people and not judge them on the surface.

"There are a lot of lonely people and we can make a difference by change by just saying hello."

Ms McLachlan said her family had settled into Robe nicely and were taking each day as it came.

Drastic Robe greenery slash

ROBE'S city business district has been temporarily stripped bare of greenery with several ageing trees uprooted from pavement after being declared hazardous to the public.

Late last month, seven various longstanding trees were removed from the seaside town's main street by council as part of an urgent works project costing almost \$8000.

A traffic management report completed by Tonkin discovered a traffic line of sight issue which began investigation into the stability of tree structure across Robe.

Robe District Council chief executive officer James Holyman said investigations revealed trees had begun visibly moving, borer was present and many were posing damaging threats to heritage-listed buildings.

"From a community and safety perspective, I think we have done the right thing and we have had a lot of positive feedback about the street feeling more open," he said.

"We did not want to take them out, but we had a couple which were leaning back towards buildings which looked like they were only being held up by the road and curb. "We also had some which had some significant tree borer, so the decision came down to the safety of the community and protection of the private assets ... We would not have done it otherwise."

Mr Holyman said it was always sad to remove historical green life, but he believed people needed to begin developing a mindset around green assets having a set lifespan.

"Trees have a life expectancy and unless you do certain things when installing them, which did not happen in this case, Gum Trees are also not really street trees," he said

"We are going to work with the community to chose some appropriate trees to replace what was taken out.

"It might take some time as even though the curb has been ground down, there could still roots and base of the trees and ground needs to settle.

"We do not want to put something in there and it sinks or inappropriately grows."

The expected timeframe for new greenlife installation is expected to be around six to 12 months.

"There are a lot of considerations as we evaluate our options, but we want to put something in there which is appropriate," Mr Holyman said.

"We have to take into account the coastal conditions we have here, particularly the westerly winds in winter which go straight down that street."

Mr Holyman said although significant green life had been removed from Robe, extensive replanting had already began in other surrounding areas.

"During this year's business planning,

council allocated \$4000 towards greenery in Robe, so there is intention over time to do more," he said.

"We bought 2000 plants which were installed in at Fox and Hooper beaches and we had re-seeded three other city areas.

"Even though these trees were removed, we are replanting in other areas."

'Forever' home for five

SEVEN years after Ben and Jess Peters decided to become foster carers with ac.care, they have legal guardianship of five siblings who have found their "forever home" with the Limestone Coast couple.

Ben and Jess initially welcomed two toddler sisters into their home.

But four weeks later the girls' baby brother

"We did the obvious thing and welcomed him into our home so the three could stay together," Jess explained.

"Back then we never knew they would be with us forever - let alone that another two sisters would later be born and join our family."

The two biological sisters born after their brother joined the Peters household as their family grew to a household of seven.

The couple secured legal guardianship of the five children this year after becoming foster carers in 2013.

"Here we are, a family forever," Jess said following the legal decision for the children, who range in age from three to nine.

"It has been very rewarding to know that we have been able to keep the family together.

"They have such a close bond and growing up together means they have the opportunity to support

each other through life and are sharing experiences and memories in childhood."

The couple, aged in their 30s, have cared for 25 children across respite, emergency, short and long-term care, but are now focused on the five siblings, as well as recently welcoming a sixth child - a baby unrelated to the five siblings - into their long-term care.

Jess said being a foster carer was something she always wanted to do, even as a child.

"By the time I was in my 20s and had met Ben, we made the choice together to start our foster care journey," she said.

"Fostering allows you to give back to your community and make a difference in a little person's future and then, in turn, future gen-

"We do just feel like a normal family though, maybe a little quirkier than the average family, but just a family all the same."

ac.care foster care manager Dani Atkinson praised Jess and Ben for their dedication to foster care and ongoing commitment to the five siblings now under their guardianship, as well as the baby now also in their long-term

"It is a wonderful outcome for those children to remain together in a safe, stable and loving home," Ms Atkinson said.

"We see diverse outcomes for foster care placements, sometimes with carers obtaining guardianship and other situations in which children are reunited with birth families, but our aim is always to provide stability, safety and a caring environment for young people."

The agency supports more than 200 registered foster carer families last financial year to provide safe homes and positive relationships to more than 375 young people across eastern regional South Australia who are unable to live with their birth families.

After its popular restaurant was forced to close momentarily earlier this year due to Covid-19, the Penola-based wine company experimented ways to continue providing wholesome hearty service to the surrounding community.

Insight into past pandemic

A viral pandemic is not new to Australia. Back in 1919, when local communities were still getting over the horror and senseless loss of life associated with World War I, the world was hit by an outbreak of the Spanish Flu. There were similarities with what the country is going through now, evidenced by newspaper reports at the time - the banning of indoor entertainment and the isolation of patients sound all too familiar. This extract from the Health Department pamphlet was published at the time.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT PAMPHLET

A SMALL pamphlet has been issued by the Health Department dealing with signs of the disease, how the patient should be treated, and precautions to be taken to avoid infection.

The following extracts may prove interesting at the present juncture:

SIGNS OF DISEASE

The disease must be deemed to be probably present in every case of fever with headache and pains in the back and limbs. There is usually more or less prostration, frequently with signs of catarrh (excessive mucus build-up) and sometimes other symptoms such as vomiting, diarrhea and bleeding at the nose. Very great prostration, rapid and difficult breathing, altered colour and pains in the chest indicate serious complications.

In every case the patient should be placed in bed and a medical practitioner summoned as speedily as possible.

ISOLATION

By far the most important measure is the isolation of the sick. If the patient is not removed, he or she should be kept in bed in a well-lighted, well-ventilated room. No visitors should be permitted. Only one person in charge of the patient at any time should enter the room, and such person should take all possible precautions. The usual rules should be observed to prevent the disease being carried to others by drinking vessels, spoons, towels etc after time in the sick room. Cases with complications should be kept separate from simple cases.

PREVENTION

Crowds of all kinds should be avoided in streets... trains and indoor gatherings. The disease is largely spread by patients with mild attacks, convalescents and 'carriers' coughing without restraint, so that fine particles are shot into the air. All coughing should be smothered by a handkerchief or rag, which afterwards should be boiled or

burnt. Garsprays inhalations are decidedly useful. A good, simple gargle is made with a flat teaspoonful of boracic acid, one of

common salt and one of bicarbonate of soda, dissolved in a quart of warm water. It should be used

before leaving home and upon returning. It may also serve as a douche for the nostrils. İnoculation with the special vaccine, according to experience in South Africa, probably lessens the liability to attack, and in more decided degree protects from complications. Masks covering the mouth and nose, properly made and properly applied, give a considerable degree of protection. They should be frequently renewed and sterilized by boiling. Those of the simplest, effective make are best. They should be

used by all those brought into contact with patients. There is no reason for any panic. Fear is cowardly and very injurious. Cheerfulness increases resistance and prevents complications.

DUTY OF CITIZENS

With a view to successfully celebrating the visitation the Government has, on the advice of the medical officers, issued a series

of regulations. "There is no reason for any These provide that the occupier of every house wherein any person suffering vents complications." from enza symptoms influenza shall report the occurrence in writing to the Town Clerk

or Shire Clerk of the Municipal District in which the house is, and give the name, age and sex of the patient. The medical officer has also to make a similar report.

ISOLATION OF PATIENT

Every patient is to be isolated at his or her residence, or if such residence is unsuitable in the opinion of the Officer of Health, at any special place provided for the purpose, and every patient treated elsewhere than at a public hospital shall be kept in isolation until the Officer of Health gives consent to his release. It is also provided that every contact shall submit to such treatment or preventative measures (which may include isolation) as the Officer of Health specifies, and for such period as he directs. No person other than the nurse or necessary attendants shall visit any patient in any private house except under conditions specified by the Officer of Health.

Power is also given to the Council to have house-to-house visitation made, in order to ascertain whether any case of influenza exists or whether the regulations are being observed, and the Officer of Health and any other officer authorized by the Council may isolate any house or part of a house wherein there is a patient. The Council may also order the cleaning, purifying, ventilation and disinfecting of houses, schools, churches and other places of assembly by the occupier.

PENALTY FOR NEGLECT

It is provided that any person who fails to comply with the regulations or is guilty of any neglect or disobedience of them is liable to a penalty not exceeding 20 pounds and to a penalty not exceeding five pounds nor less than one pound for each day during which such an offence is continued, besides any cost or expense which may be incurred in remedying the default.

- ½ cup spring onions, sliced
- 1 large handful baby spinach leaves
- 1 cup skim milk
- 2 eggs
- A pinch pepper to taste
- 2 cup wholemeal flour
- 1 tsp baking powder2 tbsp pumpkin seeds
- Low fat cream cheese, to serve

- ${\bf 1. Preheat\ oven\ to\ 180c.}$

RASPBERRY ALMOND MUFFINS

Prep & cook: 50 minutes Serves: 8

Ingredients

- 250g self-raising flour
- 100g ground almonds
- 150g caster sugar
- ½ tsp bicarbonate of soda

- 300mL buttermilk
- Zest of a lemon or orange
- 1 vanilla bean, seeds scraped or 1 tsp of vanilla extract
- 100mL olive or other vegetable oil
- 250g fresh or frozen raspberries, plus extra to top

"If there were people in the area thinking about a wine tour or visit, it is a good time to do it because not only will there be those special tastings, they are offering pairings with cheese and wine, chocolate and wine, cabernet pies, produce platters, wine maker dinners and many optional extras."

Ms Eldridge said the biggest impact Covid-19 had on the event was the structure around hosting events and limited visitation ability due to border closures.

"A lot of the bigger events have fallen away because the restrictions in place currently," she said.

"There was great concern during July when Cellar Dwellers was held and borders were closed, acknowledging the amount of Victorian people who would usually visit.

"With the restrictions changing now, there may have been room for these events to go ahead, but instead there is emphasis on the intimacy and exclusiveness of events and acknowledging people need to book to attend anything which requires seating."

Today, Coonawarra Vignerons will host its Regional Cabernet Decadence event featuring 14 Coonawarra wineries in a tasting which showcased the ageing ability of the region's signature Cabernet Sauvignon variety at Raidis Estate.

Penley Pours with Fodder Feast will be held on 30 October involving a six course dinner paired thoughtfully with wines exclusively from Penley Estate.

On 25 October, the final festival celebration weekend is themed En Primeur (barrel to glass) with wineries offering dedicated barrel to glass tastings.





FRIDAY December 4 was the date allocated tralian Harness Racing Club which races at Globe Derby Park, the headquarters of the sport in this state, with its ongoing financial problems of major proportions.

The number of clubs still racing on their own track in the state has been reduced to just a handful.

One club defying the odds and continuing on is Mount Gambier which has for some time survived on a shoestring budget.

Thanks to an extremely resilient, dedicated army of volunteers, Mount Gambier continues to soldier on.

There is no doubt the covid-19 pandemic is affecting the local club far worse than any other club in SA, simply because of our location next to the Victorian border.

Mount Gambier, unlike the other clubs in South Australia, relies very heavily on Victorian horses, owners and trainers to stage a full meeting.

As with other local sports, current border restrictions are not helping the Mount Gambier club's cause.

Harness racing in Victoria has not been affected to anywhere near the same degree, with full programmes thanks to a much larger pool of horses.

In comparison, there is only a small number of pacers in the Limestone Coast, hence there is no way the Mount Gambier club can currently conduct a six-race program.

For the sake of the sport and its participants, the Mount Gambier and

Port Pirie clubs have opted to co-share six meetings up until the New Year.

Newly elected club president Simon Phillips is confident the Mount Gambier club can weather the storm and eventually return to staging a full program here.

"The situation is improving with the border bubble moved out to 70 kilometres last week, which will now enable Heywood and Portland stables to bring horses across and boost our numbers, Phillips stat-

FIRE STILL IN THE BELLY

Needless to say, syndicate manager Ross Schurgott was more than interested after receiving a text out of the blue last month from Cheryl Sutcliffe informing him of another giveaway they were looking to move on.

"It turns out the dog in question was High Kings and while his recent form had not been anything special, he had won eight provincial races in Victoria including a couple at Sandown Park," Schurgott said.

Anyway, we figured we didn't have much to lose.

He is by Barcia Bale out of the Spiral Nikita bitch Fantastic Blaze who raced on only seven occasions for maiden heat and final wins over 535 metres at Richmond (NSW).

High Kings stepped out for the first time at Tara Raceway last week in the 400-metre JB Irrigation Stake, with Peckham anything but confident after saying the black and white dog had trialled "only fairly" leading up to the race.

However, for all that and despite chasing his first win in six months, High Kings was able to lead all the way from box four, holding out kennelmate Connie's Entity in the run to the line to win by three-quarters of a length in 23.82 seconds.

The win at the nice odds of \$7 was the second leg of a running double for Peckham after Keen One led all the way in the 400-metre Greg Martlew Autos Open Stake - his fifth consecutive win at Tara Raceway after being interspersed with second placings at Angle Park and Murray Bridge.

Keen One's four lengths win over kennelmate Our Man Zed took his overall tally at the local track this year to 10 wins, six seconds and one third for a total of 53 points in the Mount Gambier Greyhound of the Year

He is now only one point behind the lead-

Purchased as a pup by Malcolm Keenan of Tarpeena, the win was the 11th overall - all at Tara Raceway - for the black son of Dyna Villa and Precious Prize.

Challenge for rookie coach

Win-less Saints look to Thomson to turn fortunes around



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THERE are exciting times ahead for former East Gambier player Luke Thomson after he inked a deal as A Grade coach with the Nangwarry Football Club.

The embattled Saints will look to Thomson to help turn their on-field fortunes around after a long 82-game win-less streak in the Mid South Eastern Football League.

Thomson comes from many seasons of senior football with East, along with several coaching gigs at junior level.

The new appointment came sooner than he expected but is one he is excited to take on.

"It is a good opportunity," Thomson told The Border Watch. "I always wanted to coach but didn't expect

it to happen so soon.

"I obviously jumped at the chance when I could."

Thomson said the appointment came after the club looked to fill the senior role and his name popped up.

"They were looking to recruit players and needed a coach as well," he said.

"My name was thrown in there - I have chatted to them in previous years - we had a meeting and went from there."

Thomson said he was confident he was ready to take on the senior role, with experience gained through his junior coaching, along with help along the way from the likes of current East Gambier coach Matt Willson.

"I have played senior footy for a long time and worked pretty close with Willow (Matt Willson)," he said.

"You can learn a lot of blokes like that and it sets you up pretty well.

"I put my hand up to do the coaching at East and did it basically by myself for three years, with a bit of help."

With such a long losing streak to unravel, it would be a daunting task for any coach to take on.

While Thomson said he was nervous, excited and everything in between, he feels he

is ready for the challenge, with a couple of simple plans to improve the Saints' fortunes.

"A club like Nangwarry means you will have to develop your players, which you do in every club anyway," he said.

"I am hoping we will have a reasonable mix of young and old but it is all about that development.

"Not having won a game for 82 games, I don't want to get caught up in just getting good football players if they are not good people.

"Obviously first things first is to get that win on the board but it is all about improvement.

"I believe if you are winning the contested footy and putting the pressure on for four quarters the scoreboard will take care of itself.

"Every team is beatable so the aim is to push teams for four quarters and you never know what will happen.

"A lot of people will look at the wins and losses but to me it is all about setting the standard in pre-season and just rolling through from there."

Thomson played his early football at the now-defunct Tarpeena, just a few kilometres down the road from Nangwarry, before moving to the Bulldogs in the Western Border league.

He said after such a long time in a six-team competition, the variety of the MSEFL was appealing.

"I was fortunate to play Under 18s for East against the Victorian teams," he said.

"The last few years I have been stuck playing the same five teams, so I think Mid South East footy will be good to play against a different team every week.

"You don't get too comfortable playing against the same teams all the time."

Jake McKeon will also make the trek out to Nangwarry with Thomson, but the rookie coach was reluctant to share too much information at this early stage.

However, he said he expected to kick preseason training off early next month to ensure players are ready to hit the ground running in 2021 after a season off due to the covid-19 pandemic.

"Everyone is keen to get back into some training and I think the general feel around the club is quite upbeat."

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IT is a long way from the North American mountains of Whistler to the Crater Lakes of Mount Gambier but for world downhill mountain bike rider Connor Fearon it was home for a recent weekend.

The Adelaide-born rider has tasted plenty of success over the last decade across the globe and was in the Limestone Coast for the annual Inside Line downhill race at Mount Gambier.

He dominated the weekend in the elite men's category, easily claiming the victory.

However, there was more to the weekend than just success.

Fearon attended with partner Shelly lood, also a well-known rider and the pair were impressed with the Valley Lakes course.

Fearon chose not to compete on the world circuit in Europe this year due to the Covid-19 pandemic, with travel restrictions and health concerns his top priorities.

However, he said it did provide the chance to race back home in Australia and enjoy his time while the world struggled with the coronavirus.

Fearon raced in Mount Gambier at the Bluff well over a decade ago, but had never experienced the Valley Lakes course, which he said was impressive.

"Shane and Justin (DeJong) do a really good job of getting the track up and running here," he said.

"In Adelaide we get a lot of funding for

tracks, but a lot of it is still done by volun-

"Without the volunteers we would have a lot less tracks to ride."

Fearon said it was important to have councils on board to help create such venues, rather than "put up the red tape".

"These days councils seem to work with the riders to make places that are fun and safe," he said.

"For the youth getting into the sport it is so good having places like this, especially in Mount Gambier - it is right in the middle of town.

'To have it so accessible where the kids don't need their parents to drive them half an hour out of town to somewhere is great."

Fearon described the Valley Lakes course as the best on the South Australian calendar, steeper and just as technical as any in Adelaide.

Compared to his overseas ventures he said the main difference was the length.

"Overseas they have bigger hills so the tracks are generally a lot longer," Fearon

"At home you will get a minute, a minute and a half that is pretty steep, but overseas it can be up to five or six minutes of the same technicality.

"We do have the same technicality but the tracks just aren't as long because the terrain doesn't lend itself to it.

Fearon rides full time for the Kona factory team, while Flood simply enjoys the challenge in her time off.

A nurse by trade, Flood enjoys the sport. She hails from Bendigo but moved to Adelaide for university, where she met Fearon.

She has also travelled overseas to compete but is also in awe at what is offered here in the Blue Lake city.

"I have never been to Mount Gambier and I am pumped because it is a really cool place," Flood said.

"I couldn't believe how many tracks there are in this little area.

The pair often cross paths as they chase their dreams of riding on the world stage, with one racing in Europe while the other may be in Canada.

Fearon joked it was the prefect relationship, with no excuse needed to go for a ride.

He said his best effort so far was runnerup in a world downhill event by just .04 of

Flood said she has podiumed several along the way, including a broken jaw, back and many others.

In fact, a dislocated elbow thwarted her efforts at Mount Gambier.

Despite those setbacks she said she simply loves the sport and has no plans to slow down.

For Fearon to be riding for a factory team as a full-time job is a dream come true and he plans to enjoy every minute of the ride.

"I do the best when I am having fun," he

"That is obviously the best case, because you don't think about it as a job.

"If I worked nine to five I would be doing this on a weekend anyway.

"To be my job it is just a dream come

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FOR the 15th time the Legend of the Lakes hill climb will light up the Valley Lakes at the end of this month.

What has become a must-do event on the Australian hill climb calendar has been somewhat thwarted in 2020 due to the coronavirus pandemic, but it has not stopped the South Eastern Automobile Club forging ahead.

While border restrictions have depleted the usual field, the event - to run from Friday October 30 to Sunday November 1 - is just 10 short of a full field for Saturday and Sunday, while Friday's group is bigger than ever.

For committee members Kevin Raedel and Peter Lock it is all coming together after plenty of hard work by the club.

While Victorian competitors will probably not be able to compete, there are still 10 on the list should the Covid-19 situation change in the short term, to add to the 130 South Australians keen to take on the iconic volcanic course.

New names have appeared on the list from around Adelaide, with Dan Day back from the state's capital to chase his fifth straight title to equal the current record of consecutive victories set by Mount Gambier's Peter Gazzard.

While Raedel said the time line is tight and it has been "a lot of hard work", Lock said the vast majority of regular competitors were keen to race.

"A lot of people have said 'why didn't you just call it like most people did', but the whole thing was founded on a fair bit of hard work," he said.

"It is popular and every competitor who has been here wanted it to go again.

"Some of the comments we got on Facebook like 'do it and we'll pay double the entry' showed there was a lot of interest out there because there is not much else happening."

The whole weekend will take on a different approach, with free entry for spectators in limited numbers only at the top of the course.

However, a live stream is set to take the race to the masses on either Facebook or through a dedicated website.

As for the competition itself, it will be hard to go past Day again this year.

He has become the unofficial King of the Mountain, although is stil three wins behind Gazzard's total victories.

Day's biggest recent competitor Kevin Mackrell is likely to sit by and watch, unable to cross the border to compete.

Recent times suggest the course record will be hard to beat, but slight changes to the alignment of the track and the inclusion of a further 265 metres of armco fence towards the bottom through the esses may make a slight difference.

Raedel said even a 10th of a second could be the difference between a record or just another fast run. "The changes to track with the new armco fencing will make a huge difference for us - it will save us a lot of time setting up," he said.

"It will also protect the trees, the edge of the road and be good for the whole venue.

"It follows the line nicely now instead of us having to make our own so it might be worth a tenth up the hill."

With times so low, close to six seconds off the original course record, Raedel said it would be nice to see the current record matched this year, if not broken.

But he accepted it would be a big call.

While it may seem a Day victory is a foregone conclusion, there will be no shortage of competition from he likes of Simon Fiel in a fast Subaru and local favourite Damian Brand in his older and very reliable Subaru WRX.

Kier Wilson will tackle the course in a Lamborghini, while several new cars, including Nisan Skylines, Mitsubishi Evos and Subarus are all in the mix.

Street Stock speedway sedans will provide some demonstration runs on Sunday between shootout runs to add to the entertainment.

With the usual class competition as hot as ever all is set for an exciting weekend of racing.



Enjoyment returns to McCorquindale Park

TENNIS is set to kick off in Penola on Friday 16 October, with a new social competition to start at McCorquindale Park.

The competition will run each Friday through the Penola Tennis Group with the focus purely on social play.

Organiser Sam Davidson said the idea of the night came after tennis in the township had dwindled, with the Penola association now defunct, but plenty of interest in the sport.

"The Penola Tennis Group has been around for a while but we revamped it a little bit two seasons ago when the official Penola association folded," he said.

"There was no actual formal competition in place so we decided we would like to trial a social tennis night.

"We are just trying to get players back who would have played competition or anyone else who wants to try the sport." A Wednesday night competition currently exists, but Davidson said this would be a different format and with the amount of interest shown through the community hoped it would be a success.

"We are pretty confident we will get enough people there to get the night going and get a good start to the competition," he said.

"It is all up in the air but from the feedback, people are keen.

"The key message behind it all is strictly social - there is no commitment, just come out and have some fun."

A doubles format will be on offer, with players to register at the start of the night.

Random pairs will be generated by the organisers, with two games to be played.

Davidson said they would cater for singles matches if some players were left with-

out a doubles partner.

He said without a formal competition in Penola, players missed the sport and hoped this could bring them back together.

"This is just a way to get people back out there," he said.

"We are not looking to start up a formal competition - just keep it social at this stage.

"If we need to tweak it over the next few weeks we can." With eight courts at McCorquindale Park

there is a scope to have around 32 players involved.

Davidson said the group would be pleased if that was the case but just hoped it would be embraced by the community.

Players need to register at 5pm, with play expected to finish around 7pm.

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Late start a positive for cricket season



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IT will be full steam ahead for the Mount Gambier and District Cricket Association in the 2020-21 season, with George Kidman back at the helm as president.

A later-than-normal start is a by-product of the covid-19 pandemic but all is set to kick off on 7 November.

According to Kidman there will be little effect on the outcome of the season, with enough time to complete a full season.

"The Hoggies Wines Barber Shield remains the status quo with the six teams, which is fantastic," he said.

"But I think cricket is mirroring regional golf in participation rates.

"It looks like we will have a 15pc increase in that senior male space, so hopefully we have a couple of extra teams in the B and C grades."

Kidman said much of the increase came

from people who simply wanted something to do after such a long time out of sport due

Big news from the association is a new female competition has been formed for Open age women, with more details to come.

The regular Under 16 competition has been changed to an Under 17 format, with the hope to keep more juniors in the game before having to advance to the senior ranks.

"Every sport is losing players in that age group, so we made a change there to see what happens," Kidman said.

Overall Kidman said the changes would be a positive for the sport in the region, considering the usual difficulty to prepare the turf wickets early enough for the A Grade start.

"With good rain through spring it is often hard to get those wickets up to where we need them," he said.

"The reports from Mount Gambier are

very good - Penola is always slightly behind because it is on a football ground but it will be fine.

"There will be some representative junior stuff and some Over 60s cricket played on turf before the November start date, so we are confident they will be ready."

Time will be made up through the season, with games now scheduled on the Adelaide Test weekend, which was previously a bye.

Considering the possible coronavirus restrictions on crowds Kidman said that was the best move.

The season will finish a week later, but again Kidman said it would not be a prob-

"We were fairly early finishing last season," he said.

"We were one of the only associations that actually finished their season."

The changes came about due to the unknown regarding the pandemic with winter sports dates, which saw some cooperation

for the good of sport.

"There was definitely an olive branch put out by Mount Gambier cricket to Mid South East and Western Border (football leagues) in particular," Kidman said.

"While the winter sports were really unable to commit to what they wanted to do, we were able to say to footy and soccer and hockey to have October and we would get going in November.

"They fumbled around for so long with the football but then it was inspiring to see what they finally did.

"It was a fantastic effort in the end for the Limestone Coast Super League to get up and running."

The opening round on November 7 will see the reigning champion North Gambier face East Gambier in a grand final rematch at Scott Park, West Gambier will host South Gambier at Malseed Park and Mil Lel will travel to Penola to take on the hosts at McCorquindale Park.

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A FORMER West Gambier Football Club player who relocated to the Northern Territory for a kick is feeling the bite of his new job and lifestyle.

Over a month ago Jackson Lock spontaneously moved to Darwin to temporarily play division one football for Banks Bulldogs Football

Stepping out of his comfort zone, Lock also decided to take on a new challenge and successfully secured a thrilling labouring position at a crocodile

Lock said he initially wanted to visit Darwin for a week's holiday, but when the Kowree Naracoorte Tatiara Football League was cancelled, where he planned to play for Border Districts, he decided to explore further options.

"I was still keen on having a kick so I contacted one of my friends from Katherine to see whether she knew any clubs nearby which were interested in offering me a game,' he said. "In two days time, I had three clubs call me which was overwhelming.

"I had a think about it and in a week the club had a job organised and asked whether I could get up here as soon as I can."

With a range of other jobs offered, Lock said his short-term career choice kept him on his toes, with one minor accident having the potential to be fatal.

"They asked whether I was interested in working at the crocodile farm which was a bit of a shock," Lock said. "I went and had a look at the farm and started the next day. It has been a bit of an eye-opener.

Lock said safety came first during all hours of the day, as crocodiles were dangerous and could easily kill a human.

"You have to watch yourself a bit because you are in open water majority of the time and are handling live animals," Lock said.

"It was pretty daunting during the first couple of shifts, but now that I am a bit used to it, it does not faze me.

"I have had a few close calls ... You do not realise how fast you can run when you have a crocodile chasing after you at full speed."

Planning on staying for around six months and the whole season, Lock said he thought the experience would be beneficial for his independence and development.

"All I want footy wise is to just play and understand other football clubs and the culture involved," he said. "I think the decision was mainly for independence and to see myself grow as a person.'

Having confidence in his new team, Lock said he hoped to win a few games while playing for a new team and make some long-lasting friends. "If I do like Darwin, I will probably stay for the dry season just to see the bit better weather and the outskirts a bit more."

Securing stellar wins so far, Lock said he was "still seeing stars", breaking his hand during the first game and losing consciousness in the second.

Banks Bulldogs Football Club Division 1 team won the 2018/2019 Northern Territory Football League season.

The club's president is former Mount Gambier player Will Johnson and North Adelaide stalwart Cohen Thiele is the coach.



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
