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SOUTH Australia has entered its second day of wide-ranging and comprehensive restrictions as the state grapples with a new surge of coronavirus cases.

from an average of 70 tests per day in recent weeks to 274 on Tuesday as South Australia was thrust into alert mode due to a COVID-19 cluster emerging in Adelaide.

The rise in testing preceded Wednesday's historic lockdown measures announced by

Mount Gambier's testing site jumped Premier Steven Marshall, which has closed schools, pubs, cafes and workplaces, while weddings, funerals and outdoor sport have been banned for at least six days.

Supermarkets and bottle shops will remain open, but people are restricted one visit per day per household.

Exercise has been banned and individuals who leave their premises to undertake essential activities must wear a mask when outside.

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Supermarkets stripped bare

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A LIMESTONE Coast supermarket recorded its busiest day in its seven decade history on Wednesday as a surge of people flocked to stock up on supplies for the six-day lockdown.

Despite assurances by state authorities supermarkets would remain open throughout South Australia's snap lockdown, Millicent store Foster's Foodland was stripped of toilet paper, flour and bread shortly after the wideranging restrictions were announced.

The Kentish Place supermarket smashed an unenviable record set during the first wave of coronavirus, with customers lined up from the checkout to the back of the store to make last-minute purchases ahead of lockdown.

Foster's Foodland manager David Foster said staff were caught off guard when shoppers descended to the store shortly after a press conference outlining the lockdown.

He said the five-hour period from the announcement until the store's closure at 6pm was the busiest in Foster's 73-year history.

"At 1pm we were quiet and at 1.15pm it was total chaos," he said.

"I have never seen anything like it before in my life.

"We had no warning and no time to think about it - it just happened.

"I don't like seeing customers lined up three deep at the checkout, let alone lined up to the back of the shop at every aisle.

"It was the busiest day we have ever had in the history of our business."

Hundreds of people stood in line both inside and outside supermarkets across the region on Wednesday afternoon to buy supplies, with staff restricting entry to ensure customers adhered to social distancing measures.

According to one Woolworths Millicent customer, the store provided patrons with a free bottle of water upon entry after long wait

times in temperatures of up to 29 degrees.

Following widespread panic buying, Woolworths reinstated purchase limits on key products including toilet paper, flour, meat and bread, with Coles undertaking the same measure earlier in the week.

Woolworths supermarkets South Australian general manager Karl Weber encouraged customers to continue shopping as they normally would and only buy what they need.

"As an essential service, our supermarkets will remain open to support our customers' food and grocery needs," he said.

"We have plenty of stock, which will continue to flow to stores from our distribution centres."

However, Mr Foster said he was reluctant to establish product limits and hoped stock levels could be easily maintained without enforcing restrictions on customers.

"I think it will be better this time because it is only isolated in our state, so products won't be going to the eastern states first," he said.

"But it depends on how widely the restrictions affect things like warehouses and distribution. "My customers might come in and buy a few packets of toilet paper because they live out at Furner, or they will come in and buy a carton of milk every day, so it is really hard to restrict.

"I know the customers and they do it all the time so it is really hard to stand at the checkout and say that person can have three toilet paper packets and that person cant.

"We will have restrictions if it seems excessive, like if someone comes in and has bought 12 hand sanitisers we will probably say you can't do that."

Mr Foster thanked customers for their patience and praised staff members, many of whom were called into work after the panic buying started to try and meet the increased demand.

On the checkout to help out was Shearer's Cook Cafe principal owner Melissa Armfield, who left her store during the supermarket rush to provide assistance to staff and pack the bags of customers.

"Ms Armfield's cafe, located next door to Foster's Foodland, is one of hundreds of businesses which have been forced to close for at least six days as part of the directive.

The cafe was open until late on Wednesday to sell its remaining stock before the mandatory shutdown, with a number of residents stopping in after their grocery shop.

Ms Armfield hoped the lockdown would be short-lived and said while a minimal amount of stock was lost, it was "better than losing your life"

"It's probably not going to be for months if everybody does the right thing," she said.

"We will be fine, we will get out on the other side and it will be all good.

"We didn't lose much stock, but there might be an issue when we get out of lockdown to get stock back in because of deliveries.

"We get a lot of our stuff from Foster's and when people panic but last time, it was an issue just to get basics."

Santa to stay away during lockdown

THE highly-anticipated Santa's Boulevard will not go ahead this weekend due to South Australia's strict lockdown.

Organised in lieu of the traditional Mount Gambier Christmas Parade, the event - to be held Saturday and Sunday night at Blue Lake Sports Park - would have created a drivethrough festive display for Limestone Coast residents.

Sponsored by NF McDonnell and Sons, the modified format planned to be a CO-VID-19 safe replacement for the annual Mount Gambier Christmas Parade.

It was to feature a sea of twinkling lights, decorations, Christmas music and 15 static floats, including the Nutcracker, Teddy Bears Picnic, Mayor's Christmas Appeal Star, Timmy the Express Train, Christmas Stocking, Pirates Rrr Us, Hansel & Gretel, Bill the Steam Shovel, T'was the Night before Xmas, Timber Toy Town revamped as The Enchanted Castle, Parade Queen float, Christmas Tree, Father Christmas (supplied by Mount Gambier Rotary West Club) and Humpty Dumpty (supplied by Lakes Rotary Club).

OneFortyOne had arranged the supply of pine trees which were to placed along the median strip on the boulevard for students from 19 different schools to decorate with a string lights and handmade decorations.

In a statement released Wednesday afternoon, Mount Gambier Mayor Lynette Martin confirmed due to the health control measures, the festive celebration would not go ahead.

While understanding the decision would disappoint some in the community, Ms Martin said Santa's appearance would be rescheduled at a later date when it was deemed safe to do so.

Mayor Martin said although it may disappoint children in the community, restrictions meant Santa was not able to visit the Blue Lake City this weekend.

Santa's appearance will be re-scheduled as soon as it is considered safe to do so.

In light of Wednesday's State Government announcement, Ms Martin urged the public not to panic.

"Whilst this seems an extreme course of action for Mount Gambier, I fully support the State Government's decision which is implemented with an abundance of caution to protect our community," she said.

"I know six days may seem a long time, but this is an important measure to take now to stop the spread of the virus and to keep our community safe.

"In the meantime, please stay calm, stay safe, and take care of each other. I cannot stress enough the importance of following the directions provided by SA Health and the government as we work together through these unpredictable times."

Close contact capacity boost

A NEW \$1.7m system which will increase the capacity to trace close contacts by 150pc is being rolled-out as part of the State Government's response to COVID-19.

Health Minister Stephen Wade said the new system will allow faster contact tracing on a wider scale, allowing people to isolate sooner in the event of an outbreak.

The new Pandemic Contact Tracing Model increases the capacity to trace close contacts by 150pc - up from an approximate capacity of 40 cases to over 100 cases per day.

Mr Wade said the model has the capacity to activate semi-automated systems to manage even higher numbers of cases.

He said the threat of the virus was still "very real" and the government was continually looking to improve its response to safeguard the community.

"A slow response to any potential positive cases could be disastrous for both the public health safety of South Australians and also our economy," he said.

"The goal is that all COVID-19 positive cases and their close contacts are isolated within three days of the first onset of symptoms to stamp out COVID-19 transmission."

Communicable Disease Control Branch COVID-19 Disease Control Branch Systems executive director Professor Katina D'Onise said the new system will allow staff to input case details into a data base that will automatically prioritise high-risk cases and enable a faster response.

"The semi-automated process will enable better decision support for contact tracers and facilitate the collection of higher quality data, sooner," she said.

"Not only are we markedly increasing our capacity to respond to new COVID-19 cases, we are making our response more sustainable over the long-term and more efficient and effective within a pandemic context."

The new contact tracing system is expected to be fully operational next month.

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State locked into recovery

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SOUTH Australia has entered its second day of wide-ranging and comprehensive restrictions as the state grapples with a new surge of coronavirus cases.

Schools, pubs, cafes and workplaces have been closed since Thursday, while weddings, funerals and outdoor sport have been banned for at least six days after Adelaide recorded two new COVID-19 cases on Wednesday afternoon. Victoria yesterday introduced a 48-hour hard border lockdown.

Supermarkets and bottle shops have remained open, but people are restricted one visit per day per household.

Exercise has been banned and individuals who leave their premises to undertake essential activities must wear a mask when outside.

The snap lockdown replaces restrictions imposed on Tuesday after an outbreak in the state's capital, with a cleaner at an Adelaide medi-hotel contracting the virus.

Earlier in the week, around 4000 people in Adelaide were forced into isolation and told to undergo testing as contact tracing revealed a growing list of exposure sites across the metropolitan area.

The Bordertown and Mount Gambier border COVID-19 testing sites were closed on

Wednesday afternoon, with staff moved to Adelaide to support the metropolitan testing response.

In the lead up to the lockdown, Limestone Coast Local Health Network executive director Dr Elaine Pretorius said residents flocked to testing sites across the region, with numbers almost quadrupling at the Mount Gambier Showgrounds site compared to recent averages. "We were doing an average of 70 a day at the Mount Gambier testing site and on Monday it jumped to 180 and on Tuesday it was 274," she said.

While medical supplies and medical services are permitted to remain operational during the lockdown, only critical services are able to be delivered.

Dr Pretorius said hospital authorities were working through "extensive impacts" of the six-day lockdown, which also affects all elective surgeries except cancer treatments and urgent surgery.

"The one thing about COVID-19 has been the emphasis on personal protective equipment, which has been very welcome," she said.

"We have ordered and have a lot of stock at the moment, so we are fine in regards to that.

"The restrictions are a bit of a change to what we have been doing in the past and we are sitting down and looking at how to implement them"

At Wednesday's COVID-19 press conference, the state's Police Commissioner Grant Stevens said he had challenged SA Health on the need for the "restrictions and impositions" on the community.

While conceding the measures will have an impact on every member of the community Comm Stevens said he was "100pc supportive" of the approach being taken.

Comm Stevens said people needed to remain at home for the duration of the lockdown and only leave to obtain medical supplies or receive medical care, obtain essential supplies, organised end of life visits or in an emergency situation.

Emergency workers and individuals providing essential services or undertaking agricultural work are permitted to leave the house

Comm Stevens said the six-day circuit breaker would be followed by a further eight days of restrictions, which would not be as significant.

"Our expectation is people will do the right thing, they will abide by this extreme leave of imposition for a short period of time and let us do our job," he said.

"If you are out and about during these six days, you should have the ability to justify the reason for your travel."

South Australian chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier said the significant restrictions were necessary to combat the "very rapidly" bred strain of coronavirus.

Prof Spurrier said the strain of coronavirus was concerning because of its characteristics, including a short incubation period and asymptomatic carriers. "When somebody gets exposed, it's taking 24 hours or even less for that person to become infectious to others," she said. "The other characteristic of the cases we have seen so far is they have minimal symptoms and sometimes no symptoms, but have been able to pass it on to other people.

"We have a very, very short window of opportunity to close it down and stamp it out.

"If we leave this any longer and if we have people moving around in the community having a lot of contact with people, then we will be in this for the long haul."

From 11.59pm Thursday 19 November, a 'hard border' will be in place for 48 hours before a permit system comes into effect from 11.59pm Saturday 21 November.

Under the hard border, only freight drivers and those with medical or emergency reasons, urgent animal welfare or as authorised by law will be able to pass through the border.

After that, it will be open to emergency and essential service workers, farmers and for care or compassionate reasons.

Supported by the Stand Like Stone Foundation and Mount Gambier City Council, 2020 event organiser Kevin Douglas anyone was welcome to attend the luncheon but numbers at this year's event would likely be strictly capped to 80.

"We want to provide them with the

meal, a smile and somebody to talk to," Mr Douglas said.

"It is all about delivering an enjoyable day for the people who do not have much to look forward to."

THE sprawling MacKillop electorate will expand even larger to encompass Tailem Bend, Lameroo and Pinnaroo at the 2022 State Election as part of a compulsory redistribution.

More than 3300 voters will move from the Hammond and Chaffey electorate into neighbouring MacKillop as a result of slow population rates in the traditionally Liberal stronghold seat.

The change has been adopted by the independent Electoral District Boundaries Commission, despite an objection by the State Liberal Party claiming the shift will unnecessarily displace 35,000 voters.

After each election, the boundary commission is tasked to examine the 47 House of Assembly seats to ensure the number of electors is approximately the same, with a variation of 10pc either way.

The redraw follows declining population rates in MacKillop and slow growth compared to the rest of the state, with the electorate currently below the permissible quota by .8pc.

The additional electors will raise the total number of voters in MacKillop to 26,564 - 1.9pc higher than the permissible quota.

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride previously said the electoral commission's redraw had expanded the district to the upmost limit to increase the number of voters.

"Although I am on the lower side and below the 10pc threshold, the boundaries commission has increased the number of voters by 3000," he said.

"I do think the boundaries commission could have moved the boundaries to include 1400 electors because I still would have been within the permissible range.

MacKillop will now span seven council districts with the inclusion of Southern Mallee District Council along with Wattle Range, Naracoorte Lucindale, Kingston, Robe, Tatiara and Coorong councils.

The district of Mount Gambier will remain the same for the next election, which will be held on March 19, 2022.

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
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Forestry support package call

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SHADOW Forestry Minister Clare Scriven has called on the State Government to provide a support package to the forestry industry following China's export ban on all timber leaving from Portland.

Ms Scriven said last week's announcement will threaten thousands of jobs in the region, with close to five million tonnes of timber exported through Portland each year.

She urged the government to collaborate with the industry and safeguard the sector, warning 1000 jobs could be lost if no action

"The first hit will be the harvest and hauling sector, which is already being affected," Ms Scriven said.

"If this is to continue, 500 jobs will immediately go and could double in a short period of time.

"Protection of local jobs should be a top priority and the industry should receive immediate assistance."

The Labor parliamentarian expressed disappointment the State Budget did not include support for the forestry sector to help deal with potential export bans, which she claimed "have been on the cards for weeks".

"It is vital that the State Government engages with Industry and provides a support package to ensure there are no job losses to the region.

"We don't need to be prescriptive in what a support package would look like, it could be assistance with diversifying the market or providing subsidies so exports can go from Port Adelaide instead of Portland.

"It is really important the government engages with the industry and it is really the industry that can tell the government what is

But Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham struck back, saying Labor has "no credibility" when it comes to forestry following the forward sale of the plantations.

Mr Basham said the State Government was working with industry and the Federal Government to find a way through the "concerning" situation with China.

"South Australians can support the local timber industry and jobs by supporting use of value-added timber products from our sustainably grown plantations," he said.

"The more timber we can process and value-add here rather than exporting as woodchips the greater benefit for the whole state."

DIPLOMATIC RESOLUTION REQUIRED

A GREEN Triangle union official has called for a diplomatic resolution between Australia and China after authorities halted timber exports from Victoria, citing a bug had been found in an earlier shipment.

Hundreds of jobs are currently in limbo as the Chinese Government expands its trade strike to another commodity.

Despite the Federal Government highlighting the effectiveness of fumigation treatments as the issue, union leader Brad Coates has raised concerns with the biosecurity allegation, saying the export block was likely the result of diplomatic woes between Australia and

Shipments of timber logs from Victoria have been suspended as of yesterday following reports of blocks on Australian lobster, meat and wine destined for China.

Mr Coates said the bark beetle was allegedly found in a consignment of logs in a container, but says no containers are exported through the Port of Portland.

"It was supposed to be in reclaimed burnt timber, like salvaged timber," he said

"There wasn't much salvaged timber this year, just from the fires back in January and most of the product that was exported back in February and March.

"It has nothing to do with wood beetles, it has got to do with some diplomacy issues the Australian Government has got.

"There's a lot of political games going on and I think the Australian Government probably needs to have a good look at its diplomacy rather than make comments they did about the Coronavirus.

"It seems ever since then...relations between Australia and China have been pretty

Port of Portland chief executive Greg Tremewen told The Australian the industry was "collateral damage", with the sector of the view "this is a government relations issue, not a biosecurity issue".

Mr Tremewen was contacted for comment.

Agricultural Minister David Littleproud told 2GB Radio there was "some credence" to China's claim, adding the Federal Government suspected the reason was due to the fumigation used on burnt logs.

However, Mr Littleproud said he had not directly spoken with his Chinese counterpart

"We're trying to work, obviously, with industry and our biosecurity specialists just to work through the scientific basis around this

fumigation and increasing our inspections," he said.

"But they did notify us in June that there were some issues and then we continued to ramp up our fumigation."

The Federal Government said the Agriculture Department had notified the industry and the major Victorian exporter and was working with industry on an enhanced treatment and inspection response and will be writing to the General Administration of Customs in China in coming days.

An Australian Forest Products Association spokesperson - the peak body for forest products - said the organisation was working with the department to obtain more details from Chinese officials about the incidents and to address the issues identified.

In a statement, Glenelg Shire mayor Anita Rank said the council was closely monitoring the developments after the announcements and was liaising with relevant agencies.

Cr Rank urged all parties to work cooperatively towards a swift resolution.

"The announcement is of great concern to both the Port of Portland, which exports in excess of 1 million tonnes of logs each year, and to the region's vital timber industries, which account for \$778m gross regional product annually, and underpin some 18,000 direct and indirect jobs across the Green Triangle," she

Mr Coates estimated job losses of up to 1000 in the Green Triangle region, with at least half or more within the South Australian sector, if the blockade continued.

But he said the export half could facilitate discussions to revisit onshore processing to decrease the reliance on exports.

"To set up the capacity to process that volume - which is about one million tonnes a year - you would have to significantly ramp it up," he said.

"That has got to be a long-term strategy.

"It would be great to have a pulp mill here so we can produce our own pulp, but that is probably a three or four year project, which would would need approval for."

South Australian Timber Processors Association chair David Quill said a halt on exports could be beneficial to the state's small processors facing log supply insecurity.

"They haven't got the faintest idea when the restrictions will be lifted so I see it as a golden opportunity to satisfy some aspects of the domestic market," he said.

Timber ban Australian value-add opportunity

A SOUTH Australian Senator has called on to encourage diversification to the domestic Federal and State governments to encourage the state's forestry industry to reduce dependency on China and diversify to the domestic market.

Federal crossbencher Rex Patrick said the China timber ban on exports leaving the Port of Portland was an opportunity to address log supply issues and facilitate the expansion of Green Triangle sawmills.

Mr Patrick said trade diversification was key in enabling the industry to mitigate economic and job losses throughout restriction not been able to obtain fibre to process on trade and urged the Federal Government because suppliers "were obsessed with ex-

"What's happening now with China imposing punitive bans on our timber exports could actually be hugely beneficial to Australia if we play our cards right," he said.

"There's a great opportunity for local sawmills to expand using South Australian forestry product, value adding and employing

Mr Patrick said he had been working with South Australian sawmills which had

porting logs to China".

He claimed both State and Federal governments had been encouraging timber exports, allowing China to create jobs and make money from value-adding.

'The Australian Government needs to abandon its 'competitive advantage' extremism and start recognising the playing field is not even," he said.

"Governments impose necessary require ments on Aussie businesses such as minimum wages, superannuation, minimum safety standards and environmental standards and then they suggest that countries without these requirements are much more efficient and cost effective than us."

Mr Patrick said the "improper" trade actions by China should provide the Australian Government with a catalyst to focus on domestic value-adding.

'Current trade disruptions with China, be they related to meat, barley, lobster or timber, are not isolated incidents," he said.

"They are a deliberate pattern of punitive measures with the Chinese Communist government putting politics ahead of fair trade.

"Governments need to recognise that and adjust trade and industry policies ac-

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Bogged, Naked for wellbeing

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MENTAL health advocates Mary O'Brien and Ben Brooksby were both inspired to drive change in regional communities are firsthand experience with the challenges and barriers faced by rural residents.

The pair continued their advocacy last week at the inaugural Are You Bogged and Naked? event at Penola Football Netball Club, attracting dozens of Limestone Coast residents across multiple sessions.

An initiative of the Penola Wellness Group, event facilitators and guest speakers addressed participants, highlighting the importance of encouraging people in regional communities to speak up if they or someone they knew was experiencing hardship.

A fifth generation farmer, Mr Brooksby established the unique social media movement The Naked Farmer in 2017 with help from Warrawindi Farms Mason Galpin.

Presenting his story to guests, Mr Brooksy said the mental health movement was ignited after he shared an image of himself naked in a truck full of lentils, receiving an overwhelming response from farmers wanting to share their own photos and stories.

This has resulted in a collection of raw images and stories from farmers across the nation, which have been published in a hardcover book released around a fortnight ago.

Mr Brooksby said he experienced anxiety and adverse mental health impacts in his younger years but revealed how the simple social media post turned his life around.

The quirky image originally aimed to showcase how food and fibre was sourced and produced to metropolitan residents but the cause quickly expanded.

"I went through the social media following, which was growing so rapidly, and quickly and realised it wasn't the people from the city but farmers themselves," he said.

"I thought about how I could use social media positively and came up with the idea of creating a space for farmers to go to vent and share stories.

"It gives them a voice where they can dot-



point different challenges throughout different periods."

Championing a similar cause, Queenslandbased agronomist Ms O'Brien started publicly speaking about men's mental health after two men from her district died by suicide almost three years ago.

With some research, Ms O'Brien believed she did not know enough about men's mental health but was motivated to make a difference.

It led to the Are You Bogged Mate? online article written by Ms O'Brien, which went viral globally.

The article used the analogy of being bogged as a way to describe depression and mental health issues faced by those in the agricultural sector.

Ms O'Brien said addressing men's mental health, particularly regional Australia, that inspired her to partner with Mr Brooksby in the Limestone Coast. "The main reason I am here is to normalise it and break down the stigma," Ms O'Brien said.

"It is normal, we all go through this at some stage and everybody does get a bit bogged. "The conversations I have I feel are pretty

powerful and some stay with me forever."

Mr Brooksby said it was not necessarily al

Mr Brooksby said it was not necessarily always about helping yourself, but also others around you.

"If you believe you are one of those people who isn't going to be impacted by mental health, it's 100pc fine, but don't come (to presentations) for you then, come for your mates," he said.

"If you learn those signs and symptoms, know what to say and do, you can be the game changer.

"Statics show one in five Australians are impacted by mental health but I believe at some point in everybody's life, we are all affected."

Ms O'Brien and Mr Brooksby were over-

whelmed with the amount of attendees and believe it is more important than ever to be on the ground connecting with rural communities face-to-face.

Snapper back on line as of February

RECREATIONAL fishers will be allowed to catch two snapper per person per day in South East waters under new bag limits as of February 2021.

The new snapper fishing management arrangements will also allow six snapper per boat, but it will be mandatory to report catches through the Primary Industries and Regions Recreational Fishing App.

The new rules replace the controversial snapper tag trial, which provided 303 residents

from the Limestone Coast, Kangaroo Island and Fleurieu Peninsula with five tags each.

However, the system was marred with one fisherman claiming applicants for the random ballot used the names of their family members - including babies - to bolster their chances of being selected.

A poor return of the tags coupled with recommendations by the Minister's Recreational Fishing Advisory Council and the Snapper Management Advisory Committee has prompted the State Government to axe the system.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham said a total closure on snapper fishing will remain for the Spencer Gulf, West Coast and Gulf St Vincent until January 31, 2023.

"The new management arrangements will make snapper fishing in the South East more accessible for more people, while ensuring stocks remain sustainable," he said.

"Anyone who plans on heading out to catch a snapper will need to download the Recreational Fishing App and is required to report any catches."

A total allowable catch of 26,666kg in South East waters will comprise of 21,600kg for commercial fishers, 2133kg for recreational fishers and 2667kg for charter boats.

The charter boat sector has requested continue to use tags and the State Government has accepted the recommendation.



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Off the wall mural nod

KINGSTON will be the site of South Australia's first augmented reality artwork, with viewers able to use their phone to convert the mural into a three-dimensional animation.

A colourful interactive mural will decorate the external wall of the Kingston Electrical and Renovator Centre after councillors gave the project the green light.

Adelaide-based artist Sarah Boese will complete the maritime and Indigenous inspired work, with the key feature being the blue crane.

The bird is a local Indigenous totem and can be seen leading the way and is accompanied with kite elements which provide a playful element.

The wall will be brought to life with visitors encouraged to scan the mural through an augmented reality app, which will superimpose an animation on the artwork.

Kingston District Council chief executive Nat Traeger said the aim of the project was to create a captivating and interactive artwork that celebrates the culture and identity of council, encourages visitors to stop and enjoy the art experience and engages the community in art and storytelling.

She said the location was chosen due to its expand of white wall, prominent visual location, good access and little pre-site preparation.

"The development of mural artworks within the Kingston Town Centre was identi-

fied a key project in this framework, with a focus on creating iconic works with a significant point of difference," Ms Traeger said.

"The artist attended Kingston in October to undertake engagement sessions with council staff, elected members, community members, arts enthusiasts and students from the

Kingston Community School.

"Participation at the engagement sessions, which were held over two days, was robust and enthusiastic.

"Participants in the engagement sessions are then invited to attend a meeting with the artists to review the three concepts that were developed in accordance with the artists brief for the project.

"A final design was chosen at the meeting, with some suggested adjustments which have subsequently been made and are included as the final design for the project.

The \$30,000 project has been funded through the Federal Government's Bushfire Recovery Program and is expected to be complete next month.



Jet ski ban for Robe town beach

JET SKIS will be forbidden from launching off Robe's Town Beach over the summer months in response to safety concerns for swimmers.

Robe District Council supported a staff recommendation to establish a beach activity zone and exclusion area to improve the use of the area.

Personal water crafts will not be permitted to operate in an area from the old slip way - including town beach to Steve Woolston Road, 200m seaward of the low water mark.

A zone will be created from the third ramp to Boatswain Point.

"Council received feedback about safety concerns associated with motorised vessels, in particular watercraft, creating safety hazards for swimmers and others using the water," a staff report said.

"The new zones will create a positive outcome for our community and make compliance more easily managed by council community safety officers.

"The personal water craft zone is proposed in an area that is more suitable for launching personal water craft and away from the majority of swimming activities."

The zone will apply between sunrise and sunset from December 1 to Easter Monday each year as of next month.

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Better way for Blue Lake path

MOUNT Gambier's scenic Blue Lake walking path returned to two-way foot traffic from Tuesday, scaling back the clockwise direction requirement introduced in April as part of City Council's COVID-19 response.

The easing of the restriction originally preempted Saturday's planned return of Mount Gambier Parkrun, a popular recreational group which attracts dozens of walkers and runners each week to complete a 5km circuit.

However, community sport restrictions reintroduced by the State Government on Monday mean Parkrun events will remain on hold for at least two weeks.

Residents are also reminded to observe the current lockdown requirements, which does not allow exercise outside of the home.

City Council originally introduced the oneway exercise path flow to meet social-distancing requirements, noting the narrow 750m stretch of path along Bay Road made this impossible under two-way traffic.

Under the new changes, this section will remain one-way with foot traffic limited to clockwise travel under further notice with new signage to be installed.

"This narrow section of path provides little to no room to pass oncoming users due to the physical restrictions caused by the guardrail and fence," City Council city infrastructure general manager Nick Serle said.

"Therefore, path users are unable to practise social distancing in this section, so foot traffic remains one-way, clockwise only at this stage."

The return to two-way foot traffic across the lake's eastern side was welcomed by Mount Gambier Parkrun coordinator Phil Ackland, with the 5km course requiring multidirectional use.

Considered one of the most unique Parkrun courses in the world due to its volcanic crater setting, the Blue Lake loop starts at the Apex Lookout on the lake's northern fringe and covers 2.5km in a clockwise direction before participants turn just before reaching the cactus garden, returning along the route anticlockwise.

Mr Ackland said Parkrun had developed an international framework to manage COVID-19 safety requirements, with additional approval sought from South Australian authorities.

"There has certainly been a lot of thought, planning and hard work put into the new environment," Mr Ackland said.

Despite some minor changes to protocols, including shorter public briefings and reduction in potential points of contact, Mr Ackland said when events return, they should look and feel like a typical Parkrun.

Last held on March 14, Mr Ackland highlighted the sense of community created by the social recreational event.

He said while the organisation had "run" in its title, it was a community event aimed at all demographics and abilities.

"A great deal of people just walk it and have no intention of running," Mr Ackland said,

adding others alternated between walking and running or pushed themselves in an allout dash against the clock.

"It is a lot more focused on that social interaction and having a time and place to go meet up with these people or meet new people – that's really what parkrun is mostly about."

Mr Ackland encouraged interested persons to visit the Parkrun Australia website or simply head along on Saturday mornings prior to the 8am sharp start.

Parkrun Australia also endorses events in Naracoorte, Meningie, Hamilton and Port-

History dig unearths treasures

AN archaeological dig at one of Kalangadoo's most historic properties has uncovered important turn of the century relics.

Kalangadoo History Group members got their hands dirty earlier this month, using shovels and hand trowels to sift through soil at one the town's first wheelwright and blacksmith sheds.

The Eliza Street property was the former site of Harry "Paddy" Bilney's blacksmith shop - the first in Kalangadoo - and was built in

Kalangadoo History Group chair Sandra Young said a grid comprising of 24 cells were methodically raked and dug by members, with two metal detectors also used to help find items

"Such metal items as horseshoes, nails, bands from a keg, file, parts of tools and other pieces that have yet to be identified were found," she said.

"Other items included handmade glass bottles and pottery pieces.

'The team were very excited to find the objects and with the grid system, they should be able to get a good picture of the blacksmith

The store was established in 1987 and start-

A purpose-built shed was constructed at the site two years later, with a portion of the shed dismantled and moved to Bilney's shop on Railway Terrace in 1905.

The building that was left was used as a garage for Bilney's truck and remained until

Suicide loss reflected

LIMESTONE Coast residents touched by the grief and heartbreak of suicide gathered together earlier this week to reflect on the loss of a loved one by suicide.

The annual Survivors of Suicide Loss event was held at Mount Gambier's Vansittart Park under the coordination of Standby Support After Suicide

Held Monday, prior to the state lockdown measures, Standby Support After Suicide program coordinator Tracey Wanganeen addressed the importance of the reflection service, which is part of a broader commitment to support people impacted or bereaved by suicide.

Ms Wanganeen said while all COVID-19 restrictions had been imposed to keep people safe, there were potentially negative impacts on people as well.

"Some could create a loss of connection through the inability to visit loved ones, unable to gather to celebrate a special occasion, or more sadly, unable to gather to support each other at funerals," Ms Wanganeen said.

"Some restrictions have caused a loss of employment or a loss of income through reduced employment as employers may have had to close down or limit their usual indus-

"A loss of employment and the role we play in that work can lead to a loss of identity, who are we if not the team leader or reliable member of a workplace where our skills and abilities were valued?'

Rounding out the public service, Christmas baubles were provided by the Longriders Christian Motor Cycle Group to event attendees to write names of those to be remembered

The event was also supported by the Mount Gambier and Districts Suicide Prevention Network, Treasuring Life, Ski for Life and Lifeline.

RV park stays extended

MOTORHOMES and campervans will be able to stay at Kingston RV Park for longer after councillors voted to extend the allowable stay to encourage visitors to the seaside town.

Elected members supported a staff recommendation to extend the stay in the RV area from 24 hours to 36 hours on the payment \$10

COMPTON Primary School and Mount Gambier High School privately honoured the wartime service of Limestone Coast residents this year for Remembrance Day.

School captains from each site attended the Remembrance Day Service at Vansittart Park and later held their own services at the Boer War Memorial and the Air Force graves at Lake Terrace Cemetery, particularly to honour the passing of Charlie Miller, 96, and Tony Braithwaite, 97.

Both late Limestone Coast men served in the Royal Australian Air Force during World War II and frequently visited both schools over many years to speak with stu-

This Boer War Memorial ceremony was to honour the service of men from Mount Gambier and surrounding districts who died while serving in the Boer War in South This war started in 1899 and ended in

Mount Gambier RSL president Bob Sandow refers to Australians who served there as 'the fathers of the Anzacs'.

About 16,000 Australians served in the Boer War and of these 282 were killed in action or died of wounds, 286 died of disease (mainly typhoid as a result of drinking contaminated water) and 38 died as a result of

Mount Gambier residents raised money to erect this memorial which was officially unveiled in 1906 by Lieutenant-Colonel Howland from Mount Gambier who had commanded the 1st South Australian Mounted Rifles in South Africa.

Of the men listed on this memorial, two died of typhoid and the other four were killed in action or died of wounds.

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Women at the helm

ANITA Rank has been reelected for a historic fifth term as Glenelg Shire Council mayor, forming part of an all-female leadership team for the western Victorian local government

The Portland-based councillor and former school teacher, who was first elected to the chamber in 2012, was re-elected at last night's statutory council meeting with Casterton based-councillor Karen Stephens elected deputy mayor.

The re-election makes Cr Rank the first Glenelg Shire councillor to serve as Mayor for five consecutive terms, with the term historically held for only 12 months.

"I am humbled and privileged to be appointed for a fifth term as Mayor of the Glenelg Shire," Cr Rank said.

"There is a great sense of positivity with some new faces in the chamber who will bring along new and fresh ideas for consideration.

Cr Rank said she looked forward to working with the community through the economic recovery process with encouraging tourism within the shire among the top priorities, bolstered through the new GlenelgVIC branding and marketing campaign currently being rolled out across regional Victoria.

The council is also preparing to deliver an unprecedented number of community infrastructure projects over the next months, from recreation upgrades, township beautification and highly anticipated major works such as the Portland Foreshore and Marina upgrades.

"All councillors make a contribution to the community and leave legacies that they should be proud of," she said.

"I thank Robert, Geoff and Alistair for all that they have done to help to shape our Shire, both past, present and future."

Deputy Mayor Cr Karen Stephens similarly expressed enthusiasm for the new-look council and what it will achieve over the next term.

"It is great to see so much diversity in the chamber and I welcome our new council," Cr Stephens said.

"Our focus will be continuing on the good work that we've done in energising our community and supporting the post-COVID recovery process," she said. "There have been many challenges this year, however there are lots of opportunities we can capitalise on and continue to explore.

"Regional Victoria is now well positioned as a safe and highly liveable destination, and council will be taking advantage of the new opportunities that this shift in mindset offers.

Highway plea

WESTERN Victoria MP Bev McCarthur has called on the Andrews Government to co-fund upgrades to the Princes Highway, saying the state of roads costs a company 20pc more in fleet maintenance than anywhere else in Australia. The Liberal MP told parliament the "appalling" state of roads in Victoria's south west cost a major truck company significantly more in maintenance due to the rough and dangerous surfaces. Ms McCarthur said the Commonwealth Government had provided \$60m to upgrade the road between Port Fairy and Warrnambool contingent on a 20pc contribution from the Victorian Government. She called on Victorian Treasuer Tim Pallas to address the issue in the State Budget.

Waste change

ROBE'S Waste Transfer Station will change its operating hours from six hour-long sessions to three sessions from 10am to noon following community feedback. Councillors voted to change from the current one hour per day from Sunday to Friday to opening for two hours on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday as of 2021. A staff report said community members found one hour was not enough time for customers to undertake multiple trips and the facility often remained open longer to accommodate people doing second trips. The report said opening and closing six times per week for six hours of service was inefficient and takes as long to open, close and manage the waste than it is open each day.

Heywood pumped for new track

THE rise in popularity of pump tracks continue across the Limestone Coast and levels - from three year olds on balance bikes, western Victoria with a new modular design to be constructed at Heywood Skate Park.

The Glenelg Shire Council-led project has been realised through the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program and aims to enhance the popular skate park precinct.

The new customised modular track will be the first of its kind for the local government area and will replace the existing dirt BMX track, instead offering a continuous loop of bumps and turns for bikes, scooters, skateboarders and rollerbladers.

Glenelg Shire assets director Edith Farrell said the project would create a new drawcard

"This new pump track will be a great recreational addition for the Heywood community in the heart of the township," she said.


"The track will cater for all ages and skill to youth and even adults - ensuring all sections of the community can enjoy the benefits of this new recreational offering.

Emma going above for Beyond

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FOR much of 2020, distance has negatively impacted Emma Donald's life as she grapples with COVID-19 border restrictions preventing her from visiting her Limestone Coast family.

Now the Ballarat resident is using distance as a motivator to not only combat her own personal challenges through positive action, but to support mental health and wellbeing support organisation Beyond Blue.

Ms Donald – an avid runner – has set her sights on her first marathon and will aim to cover the 42.2km distance twice as part of her fundraiser.

It will be a major achievement for the 41-year-old mother of two who was born and raised in Millicent to Bill and Anna Mullan.

A cross country competitor while attending Tenison Woods College, Ms Donald rediscovered her passion for running to support her physical and mental wellbeing.

Running has become a key element in Ms Donald's management of her own mental health challenges including anxiety and depression, a catalyst for the Beyond Blue fundraiser, while her family has also sadly been bereaved by suicide.

"As an overthinker, I realised running made me not think of anything but running," Ms Donald said.

Ms Donald said the impacts were particularly prevalent over the winter months.

She revealed COVID-19 restrictions had added to her seasonal depression, with lock-down measures, home-schooling requirements and the inability to see her Limestone Coast family affecting her wellbeing.

"We would generally come home once a month or my mum, dad or sister would come visit," Ms Donald said.

"It has been hell. Because we are a close family, it has been really hard.

"They have still got to do things together and you can feel all alone."

While the December 1 border reopening has been thrown into limbo as South Australia battles a surge in new coronavirus cases, Ms Donald remained hopeful she would be home



for Christmas.

"Things are definitely looking up in Victoria and we haven't known one person who has had the virus," Ms Donald said.

"I feel like in some ways COVID has stolen a year of life from me."

However, before a reunion can occur, there is running to be done and Ms Donald will tackle her first marathon on Saturday, using the repurposed Skipton rail trail as her course.

If successful, it will be the first time Ms Donald has surpassed the 42.2km marathon mark, besting her previous record of 32kms.

"I'm not after a time as such but ideally I would like to do six-minute kilometres – any-

thing under five hours really," she said.

Having completed several half marathons throughout her life, Ms Donald believes a marathon was an achievable feat, hence the desire to run two.

"That's where the challenge and mental strength will come from," she said.

Ms Donald will not be alone throughout her challenge with several friends planning to run by her side, while plenty of support will come from husband Chris and daughters Annabelle, 11, and Charlie, 9.

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
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Station facelift complete

A REVAMPED terracotta roof, fresh coat of paint and significant waterproofing measures are among external improvements to the Mount Gambier Railway Station building.

The heritage-listed building's exterior has undergone a significant facelift ordered by Mount Gambier City Council, which spent \$630,000 renovating the 102-year-old structure.

Works included roof, verandah and guttering replacements, an exterior repaint, significant waterproofing, basement and drainage repairs, new heritage-look chimneys, asbestos removal, structural repairs to walls, new metal louvres to gables and the replacement of windows and window sills.

The recent works followed the transfer of building ownership from the State Government to council, with the building remaining idle throughout the Railways Lands precinct development, carried out between 2013 and 2015.

Council city infrastructure general manager Nick Serle said there was strong connection in the design plans to preserve various historical elements that linked the importance of Mount Gambier's railway history, although at the time no funding was allocated.

"The railway station building is one of the last remaining features of the Railway

Lands for council to restore," Mr Serle said.

"At the time of the first stage of redevelopment, council believed the project to be

worthy of separate consideration."

Council engaged architect and local heritage adviser Richard Woods, who has in-depth knowledge on the preservation of railway station buildings.

"Thanks to Richard's valuable knowledge and input, the iconic building has now been

returned to its former glory," Mr Serle said.

The restoration and adaptive re-use

design report developed by Mr Woods provided the design framework for council to restore the building while retaining the historical rail significance and consider any future use opportunities.

"With the change of responsibility for the site that occurred once the original use of the land was no longer, there was a lot of deferred maintenance," Mr Woods said. "Given the redevelopment of the surrounding site it became even more obvious that the station building was waiting for attention.

"Council has now taken the opportunity to restore this jewel and capitalise on the fantastic work they've done in the area."

A standout feature of the renovation includes the reinstatement of the tiled roof, which required fitting of extra timber battens to support weight.

In its original state, the gabled roof was covered with Eureka tiles from Ballarat as a unique design element, but in 1955 these were replaced with a metal roof decking.

"The federation-style tiled roof is quite a special feature and from an architect's point of view it is quite complex," Mr Woods said

"It has been a big project to return it to original condition and it is now clean and inviting from the exterior."

The next steps in the makeover include refurbishment of the exterior toilets located within the building.

"Richard has developed some great plans for the exterior toilets and this portion of works will be considered as part of the 2021/2022 budget," Mr Serle said.

Mr Serle said council had not identified any potential future uses for the site and interior renovations were yet to be considered by council.

Victims of crime levy increase

FINES and court costs will increase January 1, 2021 as the State Government announces a 50pc increase to the Victims of Crime Levy.

The levy will increase from \$60 to \$90 for fines, \$160 to \$250 for summary court offences and \$260 to \$390 for indictable court

The government expects to net an additional \$9.2m in the next financial year and estimates the measure will raise \$34.2m over the next four years.

The Victims of Crime Levy is in addition to penalties, fines and court costs and was developed to compensate people who are injured by a crime.

Treasurer Rob Lucas said the state's \$159m Victims of Crime fund was a "balancing item in the budget".

The government will also require the upfront payment of vehicle clamping and impound fees at the time of release and estimates it will raise \$1.5m a year.

Infrastructure grants open in Wattle Range

WATTLE Range community and sporting groups are encouraged to apply for grants of up to \$50,000 for infrastructure projects under council's Community Infrastructure Grants Program.

Eligible groups can apply for funding to help with infrastructure projects that supports recreational sport and cultural activities.

New infrastructure, upgrades of improvements to existing facilities or infrastructure that improves accessibility of community facilities to increase use and

promote inclusion are eligible for funding.

Grants of up to \$50,000 are awarded on a dollar for dollar basis, with priority give to shovel ready projects and where applicants can contribute 50pc of the total cost, including a 25pc cash contribution.

Applications are currently open and will close on December 2.

Penola woman's culinary legacy

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A DIVERSE collection of rare or popular cookbooks used by Penola resident Kate Spencer will be preserved by the Australian Culinary Archive to ensure the recipes and culinary history remains.

Ms Spencer was contacted by Powerhouse Museum to be part of its Australian Culinary Archive following recent media coverage on

The archive will be a national first, gathering important Australian food industry history from iconic chefs, producers, writers and restaurateurs.

Ms Spencer's well-used and loved collection will be part of generous commitments from cooking greats such as Stephanie Alexander, Maggie Beer, Margaret Fulton, Peter Gilmore and many more.

The collection will date back to 1968 and will include a comprehensive stockpile of written materials, reviews and restaurant de-

Ms Spencer has had a decorated culinary history, starting her cooking journey under the guidance of the best at Le Cordon Bleu in

She has since travelled across the world

running restaurants and kitchens and establishing her last restaurant - Mistress Kate's - in one of Penola's National Trust buildings.

The 82 year old began building her own empire in England before she made the bold decision to drop everything and move to Australia, aged 43.

Over the past four decades, Ms Spencer has collected a significant collection of iconic culinary history but with no family, she was worried all may be lost in the rubbish.

Ms Spencer said she was personally contacted by the museum and had been communicating with culinary consultant Julie Gibbs regarding what contribution she could make.

"I am absolutely thrilled to be included and to think they would be thrown away was horrifying," she said.

"As I don't have a family, it is lovely to think they will all be kept.'

Ms Spencer said she had asked several people whether they were interesting in inheriting her life's work but many found the responsibility understandably daunting.

"It will all be alongside some of the best cooking greats in Australia which is quite a feather in my cap," she said.

Ms Spencer said to be acknowledged while still alive was a privilege in itself.

"It makes all those years of washing up at midnight worth it," she said.

"These cookbooks are much splattered, used and loved, but are getting very tatty, a bit

"They are little treasures actually and I still use them and the recipes are still relevant today to when they were printed."

Some of her favourite cookbooks include a rare 72-edition Le Cordon Bleu series, which was only published in Britain for a short period of time and an original edition of The Constance Spry Cookery Book.

Reflecting on her commitment over the years, Ms Spencer said the hospitality industry was a gruelling trade but if someone were to do it properly, it was a way of earning a living.

"I have said to a lot of young people, if you can cook, then you will never be short of a job," she said.

"Or if you are just a good kitchen hand with efficiency, good temper and can be relied on, it will take you far."

Ms Spencer said as she was ageing and fighting a degenerative illness, the museum approached her at the perfect time.

"I will hopefully stay as well as possible still

Anthony (Tony) William Hodgens Born June 13, 1932 – Died August 14, 2020 (aged 88)

ANTHONY William Hodgens – known to most as Tony – will be remembered as an absolute gentleman who loved his football.

Tony passed away on August 14 this year, aged 88, after a vibrant life in which he excelled as a sportsperson and community man but his greatest legacy is as a husband, father and grandfather.

Born in Riverton Hospital on June 13, 1932, Tony was the youngest and fifth child of Henry Leo Hodgens and Gertrude Louise Hodgens (nee Parbs) of Tothill Creek, who were farmers.

The family moved to Saddleworth after the death of Henry on January 29, 1935.

Tony attended Saddleworth Primary School from 1935 to 1945, graduating to Riverton High School (1946-48) and gained an intermediate certificate by passing six subjects (English, French, Physics, bookkeeping, and Maths 1 and 2).

His work life started on March 1, 1949 at the Savings Bank of South Australia head office on Adelaide's King William Street.

After serving at Norwood and Marryatville branches, Tony was transferred to Millicent in February 1955.

It was soon after that Tony met and formed a relationship with Jennifer Anne Grigg, the only child of Doris Elizabeth Grigg (nee Walker) and Richard (Dick) William Grigg of Millicent.

The couple wed on October 11, 1958 in Mount Gambier, welcoming their first child Mark Anthony Hodgens into the world on April 28, 1960 at Millicent's Thyne Memorial Hospital.

The couple's second child Penelope Anne Hodgens was born at Henley Beach Hospital on February 21, 1963 but sadly died on September 15, 1963 at Woodville's Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

In the midst of starting their family, Tony was transferred back to Adelaide for work in September 1961 and subsequently served at Allenby Gardens before being appointed to a Mount Gambier-based regional manager position in 1966.

Promoted to branch accountant the same year, Tony worked in Mount Gambier before returning to Saddleworth in 1968 to take on his first branch manager role.

A year later he was transferred to Renmark where he served for seven years before returning to Millicent in 1976.

Wishing to live in Millicent permanently, Tony resigned from the then-State Bank of South Australia following 35 years of service.

In November 1984 Tony was appointed secretary/manager of Boneham Cottage Homes Inc, a position he held until his retirement in December 1996.

It was during this time he became a grandfather, with Alice Emily and Jake Anthony Hodgens arriving on February 1, 1986 and April 17, 1987 respectively.

Tony was also a step-grandfather to Timothy Bates.

Outside of family and work, Tony became a South Australian Justice of the Peace on July 24, 1986 and served in this role for 11 years.

He was also a Lions Club of Renmark member in the early 1970s and transferred to the Millicent Lions in 1976, serving terms as secretary and treasurer before resigning in 1980.

While there were many changes throughout Tony's life, one constant was his love of sport.

Playing A Grade football for Saddleworth in the 1947-48 seasons, Tony took a year off before returning to the field where he was selected in the Mid North league representative side, named best on ground in a clash with rival league Yorke Peninsula.

Tony joined Magill Football Club in 1951 and played in a losing side in the Norwood association's grand final, a pain he again felt in 1952 as a Saddleworth player – although he finished third in the league's Mail Medal count.

A stint with Norwood in 1953 was backed up with just one game in 1954 before he again donned the Saddleworth guernsey, losing another grand final but this time claiming the Mail Medal.

Premiership success finally arrived for Tony in 1955 as part of Millicent Football Club, also earning selection in the South East Boarders interleague team.

More premiership glory came the Saints way in 1956 and Tony starred in the season decider, booting eight goals from centre half forward.

That same year he played in the South East country zone team in Adelaide and the South East Boarders.

Tony remained a pivotal player for Milli-

cent in the 1957-58 seasons, winning the club best and fairest both years. In 1959 Tony coached Mount Burr to its in-

augural premiership and was named captaincoach of the Mid South East interleague team. Tony returned to Millicent Football Club in 1960 in what was his final year of football be-

fore moving back to Adelaide.

His sporting prowess did not end on the football field, also playing cricket across the state – including in the Millicent and District Cricket Association representative side – and was an A Grade table tennis player, finishing

Tony also played pennant bowls for both the Renmark and Millicent bowls clubs.

runner-up in the state novice championship

He never lost his passion for football and rarely missed a televised game and over the last year or two he enjoyed the South Australia National Football League (SANFL) and his beloved Redlegs.

The dedicated Adelaide fan hoped to live to see another Crows premiership but unfortunately the club collected the wooden spoon in season 2020.


Throughout his life, Tony was held in high regard within the community and remained devoted and meticulous with his work and life in general.

He was quite social in his younger days and used to board in the Top Pub (The George), known as Nenkies in those days, having a beer and catch up with his football mates on a regular basis.

Jennifer and Tony continued to keep in touch with Renmark friends and holidayed together before he became a homebody in his later years, enjoying spending time with his wife.

Tony was devoted and caring, with his main concerns during his last weeks of life for the well-being of his wife Jennifer.

His family has expressed its pride in having him as a husband, father and grandfather.







Youth can plug the gap

YOUNG people across the Limestone Coast and western Victoria are being encouraged to take a domestic gap year to work in the agriculutre sector this harvest season as part of national farmer support package.

The Federal Government will invest \$16.3m in temporary Youth Allowance and AB-STUDY eligibility changes to incentivise people to take up seasonal farm work over summer.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said the electorate's agriculture sector faced unprecedented pressure on labour supply as a result of CO-VID-19" said Tony Pasin.

"Under changes to the Youth Allowance and AB-STUDY criteria, a person who earns \$15,000 through employment in the agricultural sector in regional Australia between November 30, 2020 and December 31, 2021, whose parents have a combined income of less than \$160,000 a year (plus \$10,000 for each child), will be considered as independent for the purpose of Youth Allowance or AB-STUDY," Mr Pasin said.

"This will significantly reduce the time needed for a young person to gain 'independent' status and claim Youth Allowance or ABSTUDY faster than under the existing criteria," he said.

"These changes will support critical food production in Barker so that farm produce does not go to waste and will help ensure the agricultural sector continues to play a key role in our local community's economic recovery."

The government will also invest a further \$9m in the Seasonal Worker Programme to ensure employers can meet critical seasonal labour needs.

The funding aims to ensure the program has the resources to accommodate significant growth and ensure appropriate oversight is in place to protect the welfare of workers.

These measures build on others already introduced to fill labour shortages in the agriculture sector since the onset of COVID-19, including providing visa extensions to allow temporary visa holders wishing to work in agriculture and for agriculture workers to stay with one employer for a longer period as well as providing Relocation Assistance to help cover the costs of relocation for employment for eligible Australians and visa holders.

eading into summer, the thought of having a backyard swimming pool to cool some steam and lounge away is a timely one.

An alternative to in-ground pools, above ground pools, have become increasingly popular due to their versatility. Being cheaper and faster to install when compared to in-ground pools, above ground pools are also quite modular, which gives you the flexibility to resize according to your needs.

You will need to make sure that the site in your backyard is flat and levelled before placing an above ground pool (unless you want a real shallow end on one side and real deep end on the other).

The majority of above ground pools have been designed for easy DIY installation, making it straightforward to put into your home. As above ground pools aren't fixtures, you can simply take them with you wherever you go.

Most above ground pools are made from steel or resin and often have a vinyl interior. Depending on the model, you may have one that tolerates freshwater or one that does well with chlorinated saltwater. Some above ground pool packages come supplied with everything needed to set up a working pool, from pumps to filters and even ladders and decks.



Portable pools

Those with restricted space in your backyard won't have to miss out on having a pool thanks to the portable pool. It's versatile and suitable for most gardens, so long as you have flat ground and access to water.

The range of sizes and shapes make portable pools fantastic for pool parties and for families with kids. Plus, they're also easy to put away when not in use.

Inflatable pools

If you like the idea of using a pool once in a while, a backyard inflatable pool is your solution. You won't have to worry about storage nor having a fixed pool in your backyard.

Inflatable pools are often made from durable plastic that can last for a long time. They come with cartridge filter pumps that keep the water clean and safe from bacteria.

Kids' pools

For those who only want to buy a pool



just for the young ones, getting a kids pool is your best option. Specifically made for kids, the design means shallow water that provides enough space for splashing, some paddling, and having a good time.





As fuel costs seem to be up and down almost on a daily basis and there's the continuing anxiety about Covid-19 quite a few people are moving down in car size and price. Kia Rio is one of those that appeal to them so we've just spent a week in one to get a feel for it.

Significant upgrades of the popular Kia small car, with a strong emphasis on technology and infotainment are intended to give it an even better position in this hard-fought sales arena.

STYLING

The updated Rio has a refreshed front design that, of course retains the car's iconic 'tigernose' grille along with a lower, wider front bumper and distinctive new foglight housings.

Two new exterior colours are also introduced for the GT-Line Perennial Grey (also available on Sport trim) and Sporty Blue, bringing the total number of colours to six for the S trim, seven for Sport and six for the GT-Line. Our test car had the Sporty Blue, which seems sure to appeal because blue is one of the fashionable shades of the moment.

INTERIOR

Kia Rio Sport and GT-Line models have a new 4.2-inch colour cluster displaying all the important driver information in one central location.

INFOTAINMENT

There's a strong emphasis on infotainment in this midlife change, which makes sense as the Rio is aimed at younger buyers who are more interested in sound output than exhaust notes and snappy handling. It now has a larger 8-inch audio-visual multimedia unit that in the original model.

We found sound quality to be pretty good and we had less trouble picking up distant radio stations than in many other test cars. Of course signals vary from day to day, in fact minute to minute, so accurate comparisons are not possible.

There's now wireless Android Auto and Apple CarPlay connection, eliminating the previ-

ous need for cable connection.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

Power comes from a 1.0-litre three-cylinder turbo-petrol unit. It peaks at 88kW and there's 172Nm from 1500rpm to 4000rpm. Meaning that top torque is likely to be always under the right foot of the typical person who choses cars in this class.

Drive is to the front wheels via a sevenspeed double-clutch automatic. While a manual is offered on the others in the Rio range the GT-Line doesn't have have this option.

SAFETY

All important safety items are there in every Rio variant. Autonomous Emergency Braking (car, pedestrian, cyclist). The Sport and GT-Line will gain Forward Collision Warning; Lane Keeping Assist; Driver Attention Alert (where driver steering inputs and patterns are monitored using cameras and sensors with an audio/visual warning issued if careless driving

is detected) and High Beam Assist.

The GT-Line models have full climate control, there's a clever Automatic Window Defogger which operates whenever the climate control system is on.

DRIVING

There's good engine response in Sport and turbo lag isn't overlong. We found it way too slow to react in Normal and Eco modes, to the extent we had it in Sport for virtually our entire week. A bonus of Sport is that there's rather a nice engine note.

The auto was generally in the right gear almost all of the time and was happy to change down when it sensed more grunt was needed.

Fuel consumption around town was higher than expected at eight to nine litres per hundred kilometres, but see our note about using the Sport mode most of the time.

Good steering feel and quick response will please keen drivers. Kia's use of Australian and



Korean suspension tuners has proven excellent over the years and seems to make each new model, or even a facelifted one just that little bit better.

The semi-sport seats have side bolsters but are rather narrow, I fitted but anyone broader in the beam wouldn't have been happy - test before you buy. They are a bit too firm and I'm not sure I would like to do long country trips, to be fair it's a city car.

Room in the back seat isn't bad in the back for a car of this size. You will probably need to share leg space if someone tall is back there.

The Korean company's 7-Year Warranty, 7-Year Capped Price Servicing and 7-Year Roadside Assist package really impresses potential buyers.

SUMMING UP

Kia Rio GT-Line is not a full-on sports model but it provides the sort of driving feel Aussies love at a very modest price.

BRAND NEW MAZDA BT-50

A brand new Mazda BT-50 has been released in Australia.

The term 'brand new' is used willy-nilly by sales and marketing people - but in this case the BT-50 really is brand new.

For many years the Mazda BT-50 was been designed and manufactured in partnership with Ford, which calls its model the Ranger.

That's now changed and new BT-50 is a

collaboration with Isuzu, which makes the D-MAX pickup.

That's important because these days Isu-

That's important because these days Isuzu is purely a truck maker, not a car company. So the emphasis is on ruggedness rather than just passenger use.

The brand new Mazda BT-50 is built in the Isuzu factory in Bangkok. We have toured that factory in the past and were impressed by the attitude and standard of work from the people there.

The BT-50 uses the same steering and suspension as the Isuzu D-MAX. Mazda says it's happy with the ride and handling and that if any changes are made these would be carried out with in conjunction with Isuzu.

It goes without saying that the new BT-50 has Mazda's Kodo very successful frontal styling. We feel it's a nice combination of toughness in its lines.

At this stage only the BT-50 four-door pickup is coming Downunder as buyers are gobbling up pickup trucks as soon as they get off the ships. Other variants will come later and include a two-door.

A large touchscreen infotainment system offers Android Auto and wireless Apple CarPlay. Power comes from a 3.0-litre turbodiesel four-cylinder engine. With 140kW of power and 450Nm it has up to 3500kg towing capacity and up to a 1000kg payload.

Mazda says it's offering best-in-class safety and that the new Mazda BT-50, brings features to the segment to meet tougher safety standards. The local Mazda people are currently talking to ANCAP about this and hope to gain a five star rating.

Adaptive cruise control, autonomous emergency braking, lane departure warning, blind spot monitoring and rear cross traffic alert are standard equipment. The latter is particularly useful as these are long vehicles and you have to reverse a fair way before you can see vehicles coming across your path.

We have yet to see the new Mazda BT-50 in the metal as Covid-19 meant that the launch was done over the internet. We have arranged to borrow a Mazda BT-50 for a week's road test and will get back to you with our thoughts.



The general advice is all unnecessary travel should not occur, plus a significant numbers of trail run event registrations come from Adelaide.

From a community perspective, it has been deemed logical to not increase the risk to the Limestone Coast community to have people travel from COVID hotspots to the region for such an event.

Consideration was given to deferring the event, but it became problematic for the trail run to be held in December.

The statement said the community's safety is of paramount importance and remains the priority of council.

On The Lure GREYHOUND RACING

IT has been a while now since those heady days of early 2015 when rookie trainer Ben Boers of Portland won the Mount Gambier Cup with his giveaway greyhound Lots Of Yap.

Actually, that win, with trainer and dog virtual unknowns at the time, still has to be one of best stories to come out of the 40 cups to have been run at Glenburnie and Lake Terrace East.

Lots Of Yap's success, after gaining a run from box one in the final as a reserve, set the scene for further involvement from Boers and bis wife Lipping

It also opened up the prospect of down the track breeding with the cup winner.

The bloodlines stacked up pretty well.

Her sire was Premier Fantasy, the 2004 Irish Greyhound of the Year and her dam Have A Yap, a winner of 37 races including the 2012 Group 1 Waterloo Cup in New Zealand.

Lots Of Yap's first litter had been a while coming, a "mix up" first time around ensuring Boers ticked all the boxes when she next came in season.

As far as sires were concerned, he had been talking Nitro Burst - the 2008 Group 1 Vic Peters Classic winner at Wentworth Park - for a quite a while.

Ultimately, that was the dog he settled on.

In May 2018 Lots Of Yap's first mating resulted in two dogs and five bitches, the litter later being reared at Portland by Andy Graham who received three bitches as payment.

They later raced as Bay Me, Rose Bay and See Nitro.

Six members of the litter have now won races, with three of them - Bay Me, See Nitro and the Boers' trained Nitro Yap - contesting last week's Winning Post Supplies Feature Grade 5 final over 400 metres at Tara Raceway.

It was Bay Me who led all the way from box three, chased throughout by Nitro Yap but

hanging on to win by a half length in 23.22 seconds.

Making it a trifecta for the litter was See Nitro who worked home well to finish a further 23/4 lengths back.

Lots Of Yap is yet to have a second litter, Boers saying on Friday she was due in season next month but he would have to speak further with Graham before any decision was made on her breeding future.

"At the moment we're just not in a position to rear pups," he said.

"Maybe Andy would be interested if we can come to an agreement over the choice of sire.

"Perhaps a sire such as Zambora Brockie, who is attracting plenty of support at the moment, could be an option because he's a son of Nitro Burst."

Lots Of Yap currently sits in third spot on the Tara Raceway Leading Dams' list with 17 wins, a fair effort given that the border closure saw the litter restricted to racing only in Victoria for much of the year.

Winning score for Ton Eighty

FORMER Victorian greyhound Ton Eighty, in Mount Gambier with trainer Tracie Price after falling foul of Sandown Park stewards last month, did not put a foot wrong when having his second start at Tara Raceway last week.

He certainly improved on his first-up fourth of the previous week when leading all the way in the Greyhound-Data.com Mixed Stake over 512 metres to defeat kennelmate Wan Chai by seven lengths in 30.05 seconds.

Previously a winner at Warragul and Geelong, Ton Eighty is owned by the Odds And Evens Syndicate which comprises Gary and Phil Micallef, the brothers several years ago associated with Price through their bitch Lyon Rose.

Lyon Rose, a daughter of Razldazl Jayfkay and New Year's Punch, won races at Mount Gambier and Strathalbyn for Price.

In fact, she represented Strathalbyn in the 2016 SA Country Cup.

Ton Eighty is a continuation of the line, being by Barcia Bale out of Sweet Barbados, herself a winner of 11 races and \$60,000 in stakemoney and also a daughter of New Year's Punch.

Price said the idea of getting the black dog over to Mount Gambier was to take advantage of Tara Raceway's finish-on-lure.

"This track is one of very few in Australia that uses the FOL and it has turned around the fortunes of many greyhounds in the past," he said.

Another dog to recently enter Price's Compton kennels is Credent who led all the way on debut to defeat kennelmate Youngs Lane by six lengths in the 277-metre Williams Crane Hire Maiden Stake in the good time of 16.27 seconds.

By Allen Deed, the winner is out of the unraced Flitter - a member of the handy Cosmic Rumble x Indigo Gem litter - and was bred and is owned by Janet Cottrell who runs the Casbrakay Kennels at Pearcedale with Dave Knocker.

According to Price, Credent, a November 2018 whelping, had broken-in really well but had not been really sure of things once hitting the race track.

"Janet and Dave suggested he have a stint over here behind the FOL and I was really pleased with his effort today," he said.

GOTY battle heats up at Tara Raceway

FROM a Mount Gambier Greyhound of the Year point of view it was a case of local owner Michael Robinson and Glencoe trainer Dean Fennell gaining some extra breathing room after Perseverance won her first race in two months.

Perseverance, despite a quieter second half to the year, still held a one-point lead over Dyna Carnie in the GOTY when she lined up from box seven in last week's 512-metre Rock's Tavern Stake.

With Exciting Times looking to make every post a winner as he opened up a handy break down the back straight, Perseverance was required to dig deep before getting up for a three-quarters of a length win in 30.37 seconds.

The daughter of Dyna Double One and Miss Freelove had briefly hit the front in the GOTY in May before taking over again in July and leading the way ever since.

The 4, 2, 1 points scoring system now gave her a handy five points lead.

Dyna Carnie, raced by leading SA owners Tim Aloisi and Matt Lehman and trained at Allendale East by David Peckham, is twice the age of Perseverance and has raced twice as many times in a career that began three years ago with a win at The Meadows in Vic-

By Kelsos Fusileer out of Xylia Allen, Dyna Carnie was the GOTY leader for a couple of weeks in February and then for a five-week period during April and May.

He needed a win in last week's Winmore Greyhound Kennels Open Stake over 400 metres to remain in touch.

But he also set himself a fair task, slowly away from box seven before finishing over the top of kennelmate High Kings and winning by a length in 23.36 seconds.

So still there remains one point separating the GOTY leaders.

Perseverance and Dyna Carnie's wins last week also have them well placed to gain a spot in the Tara Trackstar No. 2, a one-off race which will be run over 512 metres in early January for the best performed greyhounds at Tara Raceway between July and December.

Other greyhounds in contention - although there will be considerably more by the end of next month - include Elle Limes, Black Spring, Saint Maddie, Tandiki and Falcon Heavy.

Past winners of the Trackstar have been the Peckham-trained pair Flash Jackie and Dyna Naitch and Steve Bartholomew's Galactic Athena.

Robinson, a Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club life member, has enjoyed a terrific year with four locally-bred greyhounds that were purchased as pups from Compton breeders Tracie and Karen Price.

Perseverance has won 10 races this year at Tara Raceway while her litter sister Vossy has won on six occasions.

IT has not come as a shock to South Australian racing fans to see jockey Jamie Kah do so well since transferring to Victoria earlier this year.

Kah has a cult following in this state, and the 24 year old is now recognised nationwide as one of the best riders in the land.

To say she has taken Victorian racing by storm is an understatement, as she is currently nine wins clear at the top of the Melbourne jockeys premiership leaving the likes of Damien Oliver and Craig Williams in her wake

It was back in 2012 when Kah started her riding career and former Mount Gambier bookmaker Ian Humphries has vivid memories (nightmares, really) of the first occasion she was riding.

"It was at Clare on Easter Saturday, a non-TAB meeting in those days and I was fielding at the meeting and noticed an apprentice by the name of J. Kah down to ride two horses for Strathalbyn trainer John Macmillan," Humphries recalled earlier this week.

"I did not know whether J. Kah was a male or female but I soon learned as both horses were very heavily backed and duly won."

Kah then started riding on the Limestone Coast circuit and it was Millicent trainer Ian "Ned" Walker who snapped up her services with her two kilogram claim.

"I had met her and she seemed a real nice girl, and we told her that we had a handy horse down here and Jamie mentioned she would be keen to ride her," Walker explained.

That horse was Lionhearted Girl who won a race here at Glenburnie in November 2012 over 1400 metres with Kah in the saddle by a massive 10 lengths.

"When she came back to scale, Jamie told me 'I'm not getting off that horse again' and we went on to have a lot of success," Walker said.



His talent was on show early after starting par, birdie, eagle, but tree trouble on the 14th


almost brought him undone.





Members from the six teams playing on the day were present in the morning ceremony, with the welcome to country conducted by Auntie Michelle.

Auntie Michelle said it was nice to see so many people take part in what she said was an important part of the NAIDOC Week activities and the Boandik tribe.

"The Boandik tribe is the tribe that was around this area," she said.

"But I guess with NAIDOC week and just being part of it is really important.

"To see the cricket association take on this and being really respectful of us doing a welcome to country I think is really great."

To have the welcome held at Frew Park was another important part of the day.

Auntie Michelle said it was an important part of the region for Aboriginal people.

"Frew Park was one of the areas of our encampments," she said.

"This is where they all got sent when they couldn't go to the hotels to drink and couldn't stay in town.

"It is very special and is nice to see the respect we are getting."

That respect spilled over when the cricketers became involved to recite words in the original language of the region.

"It was good to see them all get involved when I said always was, always will be Boandik country," Auntie Michelle said.

"It is important people realise that and as I say, respect is really important."

Auntie Michelle said she was born in Berrin - Mount Gambier - and currently lives at Port MacDonnell which is known as Ngaranga, so has strong connections to the region.

"I am born and bred here," she said.

"We have really strong cultural connections to country.

"I do a lot of workshops in schools, I teach out at the Uni doing the Aboriginal pathways and I teach at the prison.

"I am pretty much involved with community and this week with NAIDOC Week it has been amazing."

For many years now the Aboriginal community across the country has been able to

utilise sporting fields to share their culture.

Auntie Michelle said the attitudes of people across the board has changed for better in her experience.

"I found when I first came down here I would do a welcome to country and people would put their heads down and walk away," she said.

"That is not happening so much now.

"This is the first time here for me and we would like to see more of community come and support it because they all love sport."

That change has also flowed through to the wider community, not just the sporting arena.

"I retired back here six years ago but I have never been busier," Auntie Michelle said.

"I have found the schools, the education department are very respectful, I have good connections there.

"I work at Pangula Mannamurna as a cultural mentor and have strong connections there with the Aboriginal corporations and I work closely with Barrandies.

"Places like the CFS ask me to their meetings to do a welcome there.

"Places where you would not normally be

"I find people are starting to be more responsible."
