Fire season's on doorstep

A SENIOR Country Fire Service officer has urged the Limestone Coast community to act fast and ensure they are prepared for this year's fire danger season - which starts December 1 - following last year's devastating bushfires across the nation.

With the mercury forecast to climb into the mid-30s today, CFS regional commander John Probert has urged the region's residents to update their bushfire plans and check all maintained equipment to prepare for the unknown.

The Upper South East fire danger season started on November 15 with the Lower South East officially launching December 1, but Mr Probert said CFS service volunteers were already doing everything they could to make sure they were prepared.

"All our crews are prepared and ready. We have undertaken maintenance drills and all our fire trucks have been serviced to be ready to get on the road," he said.

"Now we are looking at the community to make sure they are prepared, which includes making sure they have their bushfire action plans written and practiced, have identified where they should go if there was to be a catastrophic day and that they have their properties cleaned up ready for the fire season.

"I think last fire season was a wake up call for people, it was the worst year we have ever had."

Mr Probert put the onus on the community to play its role in preparing for a bushfire event.

"It is not only about the fire services being ready, but as a whole community, we need to take ownership of it. Communities need to work together to increase their resilience," he said.

"People should be making sure their wa-

ter supplies and pumps are working, have removed all the firewood from the side of the house, their properties are cleared up and any fires which they may be burning are well and truly out ahead of the day.

"People shouldn't be attempting any activities which may pose a risk to the greater community, for example, lighting up fires or going out into the paddock slashing on days where if a fire starts, we are going to have difficulty controlling it."

Mr Probert said strike teams had already been sent out to fight fires just north of Mount Gambier in recent weeks and were already out on the ground this year.

"I would also assume in the Upper South East earlier specifically, farm fire units are also being organised to assist CFS crews as well," he said.

"The outlook for this year is average, but last year was horrendous," he said.

"We are very hopeful we won't have a year like last year, but all we need is a few hot days in a row and a day with a hot strong northerly wind and we can have another Ash Wednesday.

"Even though they are still calling the expected fire season average, we could still have very large fires across the landscape and people need to be quite aware of that."

Although crews were prepared as possible, Mr Probert said there was a demand for more volunteers, especially in the region's coastal communities.

"One thing people do need to understand is you do not need to be six-foot-tall and two axe handles across the shoulders to be a firefighter," he said.

"Everybody can play their part, it is certainly not gender specific either."

THE 2020 NF McDonnell and Sons Santa's Boulevard drive-through Christmas display will light up Blue Lake Sports Park and the faces of hundreds of Limestone Coast children tonight and tomorrow.

\$1.1m fire safety boost

NEW fire detection technology and the upgrade of fire-spotting towers across the Limestone Coast forestry estate will be funded as part of a \$1.1m State Government investment.

The investment will see the fire-tower network staffed, as well as the continuation maintenance work to address issues with the ageing tower infrastructure, some of which are 80 years old.

Extra funding will also be delivered for additional fuel reduction burns and the maintenance of firefighting equipment.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham said the funding spend would be done in consultation with the forestry industry to ensure the most effective and innovative use of the funds.

"The government will sit down with the forest industry to discuss and agree on the most effective spend, including consideration of new and emerging technologies for fire risk mitigation," he said.

"A state-of-the-art camera system trial has been underway at The Bluff (near Glencoe) for several months already.

"Another site, south of Penola, will now be commissioned by ForestrySA.

"In time, a network of cameras could potentially utilise artificial intelligence to increase the accuracy of detection.

"We need to further understand how this camera technology can be best utilised for our local conditions."

The fire detection cameras scan a 360-degree radius from towers and di-

rectly transmit data to a regional fire control centre.

The cameras look for smoke from the critical early stages of a fire.

While the technology will not be fully proven for the approaching fire season, early findings indicate that fire detection can be carried out more safely and efficiently.

Mr Basham said although the government-owned ForestrySA has not had commercial forestry responsibilities in the region since 2015, the business has had a vital role in delivering community fire protection.

ForestrySA chief executive Julian Speed said work was underway preparing for the upcoming season.

He said details of all projects within the \$1.1m commitment will be confirmed with the industry prior to roll out and discussions will start immediately.

"ForestrySA will staff the fire towers for the upcoming season and works are underway to provide maintenance to towers, some of which are 80 years old," Mr Speed said.

"By having strong partnerships, we can build on the existing work being done by industry to prevent and detect forest fires, ultimately protecting the wider community as well as the valuable timber assets."

The announcement follows the government's \$100m spend ahead of the upcoming fire danger season, including \$97.5m for the state's emergency services sector.

Caves trail steams ahead

COONAWARRA'S abandoned railway line will be transformed into a world-class cycling and walking trail, with plans to ultimately link Penola and Naracoorte together with a shared use path.

At this month's Wattle Range Council meeting, elected members referred the proposal to revitalise 16km of disused rail line to be funded with a grant received under Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

The cabinet to caves recreational trail expected to cost \$800,000 and will also link to the Saint Mary MacKillop-inspired Aussie Camino pilgrimage route, which runs from Portland to Penola.

It follows Naracoorte Lucindale Council's \$200,000 allocation towards the development of a rail trail linking the Naracoorte township with the World Heritage listed Naracoorte caves.

After years of discussion, residents and long-time trail proponents Deb Paschke and Wendy Hollick are thrilled council will develop the unproductive railway line into a public asset.

The pair said the development of the trail presented opportunities to boost the region's tourism economy, support existing and new businesses to meet the demand of users and attract new visitors to the region.

Ms Hollick said increased visitation had the potential of facilitating new businesses and innovative tourism ventures in proximity to the trail, including bicycle hire and repair, accommodation, cafes and multi-day tours.

"There is a lot of potential to develop the trail for tourism for people who might want to ride or walk the trail over a few days and build the economy around it," she said.

"Tours can be developed for people to stay in a hotel for two nights and then you could stay two nights in a shearing shed and two nights at a cabin in Robe.

"Some people will ride the entire trail, but there will be some people who might only want to do a part of it.

"Buses could pick these travellers up and

deliver them where they need to be.

"There are all of these job opportunities the trail can create along the way just by value-adding."

The development of interpretive signage about the region's history, Indigenous culture, ecology and the environment was also floated as potential drawcards to encourage visitors to extend their stay.

"People might come to Mount Gambier because they know the Blue Lake, but have only booked their accommodation for one night and by the time they have discovered what is here, they have to go," Ms Paschke said.

"If they are going to do the rail trail, it might take them three or four days and they have an opportunity to stay longer and explore other parts of the region.

"A series of trails would be fantastic be-

cause we could package and promote it as a region, which will help the entire Limestone Coast."

In addition to the quantifiable benefits, Ms Paschke said one of the most significant benefits will be improved health outcomes within the community as a result of increased physical activity.

"We are told we need to go out and exercise more, but there's no way known you are going to be enthusiastic about riding or walking on the Riddoch Highway," she said.

"There's a move to get back to nature and if users can continue to Naracoorte, there are opportunities to go to the Naracoorte Caves or Bool Lagoon.

"Just because we live in the regions, doesn't mean we shouldn't have the same facilities as people in the city have."

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower said while council had yet to obtain access to the land, he was confident the State Government will support providing care and control for the project.

He said the government was likely to make a contribution to the project due to the regional nature and tourism benefits.

"We have been waiting for years for the funding to come and we are right in the sweet spot," he said.

"The Federal funding will help us get the basic gravel done, but because the land is still owned by the Transport Department and there are contamination issues, we might have to seal it.

"South Australian Tourism Commission are right behind us and really keen to see this project go ahead and we are in discussions about seeking some additional funding.

"COVID-19 has brought this opportunity for us because there is a renewed bush to get outdoors in the fresh air and get healthy.

"It also fits in perfectly with the Marshall Government's election commitment to establish a bike trail which will eventually link Adelaide and Melbourne."

Street car parks make way for loading

MOUNT Gambier City Council has given the green light for the removal of 24 parking spaces on Ferrers and Compton Street to establish a loading zone as part of the new Coles development.

Elected members supported a staff recommendation to remove the car parks and establish three no standing zones on Ferrers Street and two no standing zones and a loading zone on Compton Street.

A staff report said a GLG Developments had made a request to remove the car park spaces on Compton Street as part of the new development.

The report said the proposed parking alterations will allow safe navigation of traffic, particularly delivery vehicles.

"Council should take into consideration that the new Coles site will provide 325 new

off-street car parking spaces as part of their development," the report said.

"Before the development of ALDI, Coles and She's Apples, the existing number of car parks in the area were 587 spaces.

"After the new development of Aldi, Coles and She's Apples, there will be a total of 615 car parking spaces."

In traffic impact statements for Ferrers

and Compton streets, council's general manager city infrastructure Nick Serle said the the proposed changes will not have negative impacts on traffic management or road safety and was therefore considered appropriate for the area.

The report noted a decrease in on street parking from 119 to 95, with the bulk coming from Compton and Ferrers streets.

Voluntary euthanasia divides

THE region's parliamentarians are fiercely divided on South Australia's proposed voluntary euthanasia laws, with Liberal MP Nick McBride saying any move to legalise assisted dying for terminally ill should be expanded to include existential suffering.

But Labor parliamentarian Clare Scriven has strongly denounced the euthanasia bill, which will be introduced into the state's Upper House next week, flagging the potential for assisted dying to replace palliative care.

Shadow frontbencher and vehement supporter of euthanasia Kyam Maher tabled the Voluntary Assisted Dying Bill on Wednesday, which is modelled on Victoria's historic and controversial laws.

Under Mr Maher's proposal, terminally ill patients wanting to access euthanasia will need to follow a three-step request process involving approval from two independent medical experts.

Individuals must be an adult of sound mind and will apply to people whose life expectancy is six months or less.

Furthermore, only the person wanting to access voluntary assisted dying can initiate discussions with health workers and the patient must self-administer the drug.

Labor and Liberal party members have been allowed a conscience vote on the legislation, enabling MPs to vote according to their own moral, religious or social beliefs.

While the bill is expected to be supported by a majority in the Legislative Council Ms Scriven will vote against it, raising concerns about the impact euthanasia would have on the state's health system.

"Professionals who have been involved in palliative care in some jurisdictions have said the push to properly fund and provide palliative care tends to get diluted when there's the option of euthanasia," she said.

"Having the existence of euthanasia legislation can easily make people feel it is a duty to ask for because maybe they are costing the health system too much.

"If you don't provide good end of life care, more people are likely to request euthanasia and if people are requesting euthanasia, there's less need to provide good quality end of life care."

Lethal medication has been used to end the lives of 124 terminally ill Victorians since euthanasia laws came into effect in June 2019.

Mr McBride confirmed he will vote in support of the bill following its passage to the Lower House, but hoped amendments to expand the eligibility criteria were passed in the Legislative Council.

The Member for MacKillop said the death

of a relative had an impact on his thinking and his understanding of the need for law reform.

"I am very supportive of voluntary euthanasia," he said.

"My personal opinion of Kyam Maher's bill is that it does not go far enough and should also include people who have no quality of life and no prospects of independence."

Mr McBride recently addressed a forum hosted by voluntary assisted dying support group A Peaceful End, telling the crowd of his support for euthanasia.

A Peaceful End convenor Angie Miller said the forum indicated strong support for the establishment of a voluntary dying scheme in South Australia.

"We had some people there who were quite ill and it was really sad because Mount Gambier is so close to Victoria which has voluntary euthanasia, but in South Australia people don't have the same rights," she said.

"People who are terminally ill worry about their health deteriorating, they know they are going to suffer and it causes them huge anxiety.

"A lot of people want piece of mind of how they are going to die, they don't want to suffer and they don't want their families to go through the trauma of watching them in pain."

Ms Miller said her father Robert repeatedly asked for help to end his life after her was diagnosed with stage four bladder cancer in 2017.

She described her father's final months as traumatic and said he had "zero quality of life".

"The last time the bill was introduced to parliament, it got knocked back by one vote," Ms Miller said. "If not for one vote, my dad would not have had to suffer.

"After learning all these things, it just made

me more and more angry and more and more determined to get it through."

The new bill will be the 16th time parliament has considered legalising voluntary assisted dying, with the most recent attempt defeated by one vote in 2016.

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell was among 23 parliamentarians, including former MacKillop MP Mitch Williams, who voted down the bill in its committee and final stage.

However, Mr Bell said he will support the bill in its new form, which has strict provisions for access and dispensing the lethal medication.

"I want to strike the right balance between compassionate end of life care and protecting the most vulnerable people in my community," he said.

"With the legislation based on the Victorian model, I am comfortable that those safeguards are in place."

But Ms Scriven believed it was "very premature" to claim the legislation was working well in Victoria given it has been in place for more than a year.

"We haven't really seen that work its way through to see how good or back that legislation really is," she said.

"When you consider that this is quite a considerable change, it is not an appropriate time frame to make an informed assessment."

\$10,000 for coastal war tribute facelift

PORT MacDonnell's war memorial garden will soon receive a major facelift following a \$10,000 boost to install a head stone in black granite at the site.

The Port Macdonnell and District Returned and Services League sub-branch received the green light to beautify the memorial area and garden, located at the corner of Sea Parade.

Sub-branch representative Jan Cullen-Habner addressed Grant District Council at

Monday night's meeting seeking funding for the project.

Ms Cullen-Habner also sought council support to remove the soldier's plaques from under the trees on Sea Parade and moved to the memorial area.

"Most of the time they are covered in pine needles and when people pull in on an angle, they drive on them because they don't realise our boys' plaques are there," she said.

"We would like them transported down

to the corner where we have our memorial so that they are safe, they are one and it is all uniform."

Ms Cullen-Habner urged council to move the war mine on the grassed Custom House lawn to the memorial site.

"We are looking to have a headstone placed slightly in front of the bomb, which has the three badges - army, navy and airforce - and just three words, Lest We Forget," she said.

"It will beautify the area and pay respect to the women and men we have lost over the years.

"I hope as a community, we can do this and do the boys and women proud."

Councillors indicated support for the project, but moved into confidence to discuss the financial implications.

A motion move by Councillor Gavin Clarke to allocate a maximum \$10,000 towards the project was supported by elected members.

Easing the restrictions

SOUTH Australia's Transition Committee will meet this morning to discuss the potential easing of some COVID-19 restrictions from Tuesday.

Scaling back current restrictions to pre-Parafield cluster levels has been mooted by Premier Steven Marshall, who remained adamant the earliest changes would occur on Tuesday - 14 days after they were initially tightened on November 17.

It comes as health authorities issued an urgent health warning on Wednesday night

urging anyone who attended Adelaide's Woodville High School on Monday to self isolate - along with the people in their household - after a female student tested positive to coronavirus.

Earlier in the day South Australia's Chief Public Health Officer Professor Nicola Spurrier had announced no new COVID-19 cases for the state.

Yesterday's figures were not known at the time of print but updates will continue to be posted via The Border Watch Facebook page

and www.borderwatch.com.au.

Prior to Wednesday night's urgent health plea, Premier Steven Marshall said authorities had their eyes firmly fixed on Tuesday to return the state to conditions prior to the Parafield cluster.

Among the restrictions expected to be eased on December 1 include bans on stand-up drinking, and density caps on private and public gatherings and venues.

South Australia is also hoping to lift its border restrictions with Victoria on December 1.

Police Commissioner Grant Stevens said South Australia did not "want to take our foot off the brake too quickly".

"People are doing a good job, we're just asking for their help to make sure we get over this current hump and move back to where we want to be."

The government is also working to introduce QR scanning technology to help the hospitality sector transition to eased restrictions.

Medi-hotel will reopen to the public

MOUNT Gambier's Southgate Motel will cease operations as a medi-hotel on November 29, ahead of the foreshadowed December 1 relaxation of quarantine requirements for those entering South Australia from Victoria.

The medi-hotel, which has been operational since August, has safely quarantined 204 people since it was instated, recording zero positive COVID-19 cases during that time.

The Limestone Coast Local Health Network said the model proprietors should be congratulated for recognising the importance of establishing a medi-hotel in the region, easing the travel burden for those needing to quarantine locally and ensuring the risk of a potential community outbreak could be safely managed.

The Southgate Motel will reopen to the community on November 30.

Meanwhile, Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce president Hayley Neumann praised the Limestone Coast community for how quickly it responded to the lockdown requirements, expressing gratitude businesses could reopen earlier than expected.

"I'm sure there are some very frustrated business owners though that missed out on several days trade, sold stock cheaply to clear fridges or even had food lost," Ms Neumann said.

"We all now need to patiently wait until Sunday and Monday when we can all go and support our local shops.

"They'll need time to get organised, roster staff and order stock but I'm sure their all excited to get back to business.

"More than ever we need to get out their to our local businesses, restaurants, cafes and shops - they all need us there spending our local dollar."

Liberal MP lashes out over lockdown

LIBERAL MP Nick McBride struck out at his government's hard lockdown this week, stating it was an overreaction to one person and a thorough investigation should have been done before the snap announcement.

Mr McBride said the state's drastic six-day COVID-19 lockdown, which was lifted early after it was revealed a pizza bar worker had lied about his employment activities, had paralysed the state's already vulnerable small business sector.

Cafes, restaurants, pubs, schools, retail stores and shopping centres across the state were quickly forced to shut down last week to combat what was considered a highly contagious outbreak of coronavirus.

The Member for MacKillop claimed authorities had "overreacted" to the pizza worker's original claim, in which he told contact tracers he had only bought food there when was actually an employee who had worked multiple shifts.

Authorities believed the man, who has been identified as a 36-year-old Spanish national in the country on a graduate visa, had contracted a highly contagious strain of COVID-19 due to the short period of exposure.

At a press conference on Friday, Premier Steven Marshall revealed police in-

vestigations established the man had lied to contact tracers and the stay at home order was to be repealed.

While Mr Marshall and Police Commissioner Grant Stevens defended the decision to enter a lockdown, Mr McBride told Radio ABC it had "absolutely broken and bruised" small businesses across the state.

He said the snap lockdown had exacerbated the challenge for MacKillop businesses and residents to rebuild following months of border closures and travel restrictions.

"We have a real health outcome here where they have overreacted in the last seven days to one person which they did not do a thorough investigation enough to get clarity about what has gone on there," Mr McBride said.

"To lock down the state and to put the state into more pain... is just a total negative to recovering where we have come from [and] beggars belief.

"They should have never taken the word of one person because 10pc of society do not fall in behind the law.

"People should be considered on their merits but they need to have good, good clarity if they are going to lock down the state for six days because something might not line up.

Mr McBride also lashed the highly-credentialed Transition Committee, which includes Comm Stevens, chief public health officer Professor Nicola Spurrier

and chief executives from the Trade, Treasury and Health departments, claiming decisions had not been made based on the state's economy.

"We need to consider both the health outcomes and the economic outcomes and I think that balance has been missed," he said.

"All these people making these decisions, locking down our state do not suffer one day lost wages, no loss of income... and they have no relationship with the small business sector they have basically hung out to dry again because of this tough lockdown which has turned out to be a mistake."

At a press conference held Monday afternoon, Mr Marshall said authorities "did not rely on just a single person's evidence".

"There was very good advice and detail presented by Nicola Spurrier yesterday on exactly the kind of catastrophic situation that we faced, with a 99pc confidence that we were heading for an epidemic in South Australia and we would have cases numbering 100 around mid-December," he said.

"The people of South Australia worked with SA Health, SA Police and the government to avoid an absolute disaster.

"I am quite aware of people that have different opinions but I just say listen to the expert health advice, that's what we have been doing and it has kept South Australia safe and our economy strong since."

Council rescinds panel plan

MOUNT Gambier City Council has rescinded a motion to continue with its own Council Assessment Panel after a move to withdraw from the proposed Regional Assessment Panel was narrowly supported at last month's council meeting.

At the November meeting, Councillor Sonya Mezinec moved to repeal a resolution passed at last month's meeting to withdraw from the Regional Assessment Panel, incorporating Grant, Wattle Range and Robe district councils.

Cr Mezinec's motion, which was supported

by a majority of elected members, also revoked parts of a resolution passed in July authorising the chief executive to "finalise any administrative arrangements necessary" to reach agreement with the councils and approach the Minister to seek the establishment of a Regional Assessment Panel.

The inclusion of a City Council elected member on the Regional Assessment Panel was also revoked.

In a rationale, Cr Mezinec said an internal memo provided to all members on November 6 outlined "concerns relating to the resolved decision of council in relation to participation in a Regional Assessment Panel.

City Council told The Border Watch as the

motion to withdraw from the Regional Assessment Panel was conflicting with an existing motion of council and was not brought by written notice.

The November council minutes show Cr Paul Jenner - who is a member of the Council Assessment Panel - disclosed a material conflict of interest in the item and did not participate in the discussion.

However, at the October meeting, Cr Jenner did not vacate the meeting for the discussion of establishing a memorandum of understanding with the three southern Limestone Coast councils.

Further, Cr Jenner rejected the motion which would have endorsed the memoran-

dum of understanding and moved an amendment - which was supported by a divided council - to continue with its own Council Assessment Panel.

Cr Jenner also moved an amendment to a motion at the July council meeting to include an elected member on the Regional Assessment Panel, but did not disclose any conflict of interest.

Under the Local Government Act, council members must leave the meeting room and not participate in debate or vote on matters in which they have a personal interest in.

City Council told The Border Watch declaring a conflict of interest was a matter of responsibility for the individual elected member.

Veterans act over war medal threat

THE Mount Gambier RSL has launched a petition against a threat to strip medals from special forces soldiers following the recently released Afghan war crimes report.

Around 3000 soldiers who served with the special operation missions in Afghanistan stand have their citations revoked following a four-year inquiry into alleged war crimes.

Defence Force chief Angus Campbell said some individuals will lose citations as a result of the inquiry and conceded it will be a "hard blow".

However, veterans are urging the Federal Government not to revoke the meritorious unit citation or the return of medals from those who have served or been killed in action.

The investigation found Australian special forces found evidence of 23 incidents in which 39 Afghan nationals were unlawfully killed, mostly between 2009 and 2013.

The report also found allegations that junior soldiers were required by their patrol commanders to shoot a prisoner to achieve a first kill, in a practice that was known as "bleeding".

But Mount Gambier veterans said the actions of a few should not tarnish the reputations of the many, with the petition calling for an end to the "trial by media".

"The trial by media, not just aimed at these persons deemed responsible for the unlawful killings but at the Army and Special Forces as a whole is reprehensible," the petition says.

"All communication on the matter until fully resolve should be kept confidential as is the right of the innocent until proven otherwise".

Community members are encouraged to sign the petition, which can be viewed at the Mount Gambier RSL.

EDITOR'S COMMENT

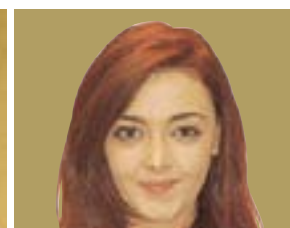

Toy Run delivers festive cheer

THE popular Limestone Coast Toy Run will hit the road Saturday to support the region's disadvantaged youth with organisers only accepting monetary contributions to reduce unnecessary handling and mitigate COVID-19 risks.

Instead, organisers will use the donations to purchase gifts specifically for each child registered through the charity initiative, which is coordinated by Baptist Care SA.

Last year's event drew a generous response from regional businesses and community members, with over 500 gifts distributed to over 350 less fortunate children through 16 schools and support agencies.

A convoy of motorcycles and classic vehicles will venture out on Saturday and travel the region before culminating with a parade through Mount Gambier.

Participant Sam Swinden recalled growing up as a Melbourne "street kid" and said he could relate to children who received little at Christmas.

"It is always nice to get something at Christmas when your parents are struggling with money," Mr Swinden said.

"It is really important the community backs their children, they are the most important things in the world if you ask me."

Mr Swinden said the event was also a social outlet which brought together broad cross-sections of the community.

"It involves a broad bunch of people and a

heap of different genres, different strokes and different folks," he said.

"You will get guys talking to you all day about your car or bike."

Preparing for her Toy Run, Velicea Doman believed similar charity events should be held more often.

"I think this type of event should be held more often, rather than just during Christmas, you don't always have to give gifts, but you can raise money for other causes which give gifts all year round," she said.

The Toy Run comprises several different routes and meeting points, with the Millicent to Naracoorte convey leaving the Millicent Skatepark on Ridge Terrace at 8am.

The Mount Gambier to Naracoorte route will leave at 8am from the former Bunnings

Mount Gambier car park.

The Naracoorte to Mount Gambier route will leave at 10am from the soccer club on Sports Centre Drive.

The main run through Mount Gambier to The Rail will leave the former Bunnings site at 12.30pm.

The event will culminate with a show and shine at The Rail.

Abortion bill rejected

LABOR parliamentarian Clare Scriven has rejected the narrative that abortion liberates women, saying pregnancy termination does not allow society cater for the needs of women to be able to survive financially and socially as mothers.

In a 30 minute speech in parliament, Ms Scriven criticised a proposal to reform South Australia's abortion law and questioned whether abortion was "limiting real choices" for women.

A bill to reform South Australia's abortion law has been introduced to parliament which if passed, will move pregnancy terminations from criminal legislation to be treated as a health issue.

Ms Scriven argued the decriminalisation of women was largely symbolic as no-one had been prosecuted for 50 years for procuring an abortion.

The Labor frontbencher told the Legislative Council women had been "abandoned to their autonomy in the abortion decision", claiming the implicit message of abortion as an option is "don't bother us with your problems".

Ms Scriven said although the popular narrative said abortion was a free choice that frees women, women are pressured to have an abortion if their circumstances are difficult.

"Opening up abortion further means that more than likely many more women will experience those negative impacts because the issues around full information, the issues around pressure to abort, the issues around not providing true options to women will all continue because the narrative will say, 'Abortion fixes your problem. Now go away,'" she said.

"Abortion is easier for everyone else around her, because they do not need to address the actual problem - support for girls with babies in the educational institution.

"The problem that needs to be addressed is that students with babies are not given support for their education, and they will never be given that support while abortion is presented as their solution.

"There should be a greater focus on measures to end discrimination against women in

benefits, housing, work or education."

Currently, South Australians up to 23 weeks pregnant can have an early medication or surgical abortion if two doctors agree that a woman's physical and/or mental health endangered by pregnancy or for serious foetal abnormality.

Under the proposed laws, an abortion can be performed by one doctor up to 22 weeks and six days gestation in contrast.

"However, we are told that this is basically current practice, so clearly there are already methods to circumvent the laws," Ms Scriven said.

"If they are currently circumventing, it is to be expected that the laws will be further circumvented in the future if they are expanded."

Ms Scriven also raised the prospect of late-term terminations, with the bill allowing abortions to be performed with the approval of two doctors who consider it "medically appropriate".

"We find it hard to imagine that there might be medical practitioners who will not do the right thing, but this fails to learn the lessons of history," she said.

However, Liberal MP Michelle Lensink, who introduced the bill to parliament, said the proposed law will not make it easier to obtain a late-term abortion due to health law governing the decision-making of health professionals.

"Doctors must act ethically and if they do not, they lose their right to practice," she said.

"The advice I have received is that obstetricians will not terminate a healthy foetus which is capable of being viable - which is generally considered at 24 weeks - unless there is a risk to the mother's life.

"These circumstances are rare and extreme and would already, in existing practice, involve a multidisciplinary team providing advice to the woman and her family".

Ms Lensink said the reforms included in the Termination of Pregnancy Bill had been based on recommendations by the South Australian Law Reform Institute.

She said the changes were consistent with current clinical practice and in line with recommendations by the state's Health Department.

The bill is expected to be voted on next week and if passed will progress to the Lower House for discussion.

Power outage sparks shutdown

MILLICENT experienced a second involuntary shut down on Sunday when power to businesses and residences was lost after a storm knocked out a transmission tower.

Thousands of customers were affected by power outages across the Limestone Coast, including more than 7000 across Millicent and district.

The outage was reported at 1.15pm, with SA Power Networks initially estimating power would be restore at 1.30am on Monday.

Cafes, pubs, service stations and Millicent IGA - the sole supermarket open in the town on a Sunday - closed their doors shortly after the outage, which also affected Tantanoola and parts of Port MacDonnell.

Some businesses reopened when power was restored at 2.35pm.

A SA Power Networks spokesperson said identified the fault to a Beachport transmission tower, which is believed to be related to the storm activity.

Debate adjournment request "bizarre"

GREENS MLC Mark Parnell has labelled an attempt by Labor parliamentarian Clare Scriven to adjourn debate on decriminalising abortion as "bizarre" and "offensive".

Ms Scriven and Liberal MLC Nicola Centofanti urged parliament not to debate the Termination of Pregnancy Bill on November 11, saying it risked politicising Remembrance Day.

In a joint letter to Human Services Minister Michelle Lensink, the pair said debating the bill "does not have regard to the importance and solemnity of [Remembrance] Day."

The debate was moved to November 12, but a bill making it an offence to protest with-

in 150 metres of an abortion clinic.

While discussing safe access zones around abortions, Mr Parnell said it was both odd and offensive the bill was inappropriate to debate on Remembrance Day.

"My view is that it is very poor form to somehow invoke the memory of people who have died in the service of their nation in a partisan way and to say that those people would not have liked the bill and therefore it is not proper for us to debate it on Remembrance Day," he said.

"It is a bizarre concept and I find it offensive."

Labor MP lashes Scriven

A CHANGE proposed by upper house and conservative MLC Clare Scriven relating to safe access zones around abortion clinics has been labelled as "illogical" by Labor colleague Irene Pnevmatikos.

In an uncharacteristic Labor Party move, Ms Pnevmatikos took aim at her Legislative Council colleague and factional foe during debate regarding safe access zone around abortion clinics, which passed the upper house 14 votes to 7.

Ms Pnevmatikos objected to a change put forward by Ms Scriven to delete "protected premises" and replace it with "boundary of the property on which the protected premises are situated".

"The current bill's interpretation would be that the safe access zone begins at the perimeter of the premises where an abortion is being legally performed and applies to any public area located within a 150-metre radius," she said.

"Very straightforward, I would have thought."

Ms Pnevmatikos also criticised amendments by Liberal's Dennis Hood and Nicola Centofanti, saying both were unnecessary burdens to the bill.

"The double standard presented by some members is laughable," she said.

"I have never seen so much resistance

to women and workers' rights as has been displayed by members throughout this debate."

Without directly mentioning names, Ms Pnevmatikos said some members viewed the debate as "an opportunity to once again slow progression on reform that is far overdue" and "make decisions prejudiced by their own views on abortion and women".

"Watching these debates, it is extremely obvious who uses these issues to stop progress on abortion reform and stall progress on reproductive rights," she said.

"Some members are ignorant of the fact that we all know that they are anti-abortion.

"These members use these false claims as a facade to hide from being outrightly anti-abortion."

Ms Pnevmatikos, who is associated with Labor's left faction, told The Border Watch her comments were in reference to comments made by the members of parliament opposing the establishment of safe access zones.

She did not explicitly name the members, but said all opposing debates can be viewed by accessing parliamentary transcripts.

"It is a conscious vote and at the end of the day, the bill has passed and each individual can justify their views and arguments," she said.

"I relied on the experts science and advice."

Retailers reject 24/7

MILLICENT'S unique trading hour regime was relaxed during the state's three-day lockdown, allowing the town's two regulated supermarkets to trade around the clock.

But neither Woolworths Millicent or Foster's Foodland opened its doors beyond the usual hours of 9pm on Thursday, 6pm on Friday and 5pm on Saturday, with both retailers saying the existing hours were appropriate.

Under state legislation, supermarkets larger than 400 square metres and shops larger than 200 square metres are unable to open in Millicent on specific days, including Sundays and public holidays.

Ahead of the Thursday lockdown, Treasurer Rob Lucas granted supermarkets across suburban Adelaide permission to trade extended hours under a 14-day exemption to help support spatial distancing measures.

The exemption was expanded to Millicent - which is the only regional town in the state which also restricts the opening hours of large stores - as part of South Australia Police's COVID-19 direction.

Despite expanding trading hours across South Australia, long-time deregulation proponents Woolworths continued to operate its usual hours in Millicent.

In a statement, a Woolworths spokesperson said the current trading hours for Millicent were "appropriate to meet the needs of the community at this time".

Foster's Foodland manager Dave Foster said staff at the Kentish Place supermarket were exhausted following the snap lockdown and said he did not believe expanding hours would provide benefits to the business or consumers.

Mr Foster, who is vehemently opposed to

any change to the shop trading hours, believed COVID-19 had changed consumer behaviour.

"Before coronavirus our busiest time would be after 5pm and that's when everyone would do their shopping," he said.

"It has really changed since April and now we see people coming in throughout the day.

"If Woolworths had opened we might have considered opening as well, but our staff needed a break."

The two supermarkets along with Target Country - which is also regulated - have been granted exemptions to trade on Sunday during December formal application by the Millicent Business Community Association.

Millicent residents have voted overwhelmingly in favour of retaining the current shop

trading hours, with a 2017 council-run poll finding 72pc of respondents support the town's rare regulated shopping regime.

Waste voucher review

WATTLE Range Council will review its waste voucher system - including the number of vouchers issued to each property - to ensure it is fit for purpose.

Each year, all ratepayers are issued with 12 large trailer vouchers to use at council's Millicent, Beachport and Penola Waste Transfer Stations and Resource Recovery Centres, located at Furner and Glencoe.

In a staff report, council officers recommended a review of the system be undertaken, with consideration given to the number of vouchers, whether those in residential areas need as many vouchers as rural areas, separate vouchers for landfill and recycling and whether council should be subsidising waste disposal for businesses.

Council will also consider how to encourage greater diversion from landfill.

Community consultation will be undertaken, with the results expected to be presented to council for consideration as part of next year's budget process.

The voucher system was introduced in January 2017 and each voucher entitles the holder to dispose of up to a heaped tandem trailer of segregated waste and recycling.

For a single bag of rubbish, up to 240L wheelie bin, a voucher can be stamped up to four times and on the fifth bag/bin the voucher will be collected by the attendant.

Funding for regional projects

A NEW emergency department, extra operating theatres and more acute beds will be constructed at the Warrnambool Base Hospital as part of a \$384.2m major redevelopment as part of Victoria's 2020/21 state budget.

Stage two of the upgrade includes construction of a four-level clinical tower which will house the emergency department and operating theatres.

The current three operating theatres will increase to six and emergency cubicles will expand from 19 to 38. The building will also contain a 32-bed inpatient unit, a paediatric unit, a 12-chair dialysis unit and centralised sterilising and pathology departments.

A new Regional Logistics Distribution Cen-

tre will also be established as part of Victoria's big-spending state budget.

Treasurer Tim Pallas said the budget delivered an unprecedented investment to rebuild the state and respond to "some of the deep cracks in our economy". He highlighted Victoria's "broken" mental health system, unemployment and housing insecurity as priority areas, announcing a \$49b spend over the next four years to support Victoria recover from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Regional Victoria will receive more than \$8b for regional jobs and infrastructure, with funding for hospital upgrades, jobs, social housing, transport and schools.

"This is a budget for our time – acknowl-

edging the incredible damage that's been done by this global pandemic, but also making a commitment to rebuild our state stronger and fairer," Mr Pallas said.

Thousands of housing units will be constructed as part of the government's \$6m housing build fund to create jobs and tackle homelessness in the state.

Around 12,000 social and affordable housing blocks are expected to be established and will increase the state's social housing supply by 10pc in four years. A quarter of the funding will be annexed for regional Victoria, with a guaranteed spend of at least \$25m for Warrnambool and \$15m for Horsham.

A safety upgrade for the Wando Bridge,

near the South Australian-Victorian border and upgrades on the Henty Highway will be funded under a \$4m transport investment.

The government will invest \$5.9m towards Portland's economic diversification to support the economy and crucial jobs.

The Grampians will receive a boost, with additional trails slated for the Grampians Peaks Trail, increased visitor facilities at MacKenzie Falls and \$5.8m for the Brambuk Cultural Centre in Halls Gap. More than \$47.5m has been earmarked to construct additional visitor infrastructure along the Great Ocean Road, including a signature coastal walking trail along the coastline and hinterland from Fairhaven to Skenes Creek, with up to five new swing suspension bridges.

Council ticks off new staff spend

A BUDGET variation of almost \$130,000 has been approved by Wattle Range Council to employ four additional staff members to address an employee shortage and help existing workers transition to a new software system.

Two staff members will be added to council's project team, while two additional apprentices will join council's parks and gardens and mechanical services team.

Council chief executive Ben Gower made the request in a staff report, saying the COVID-19 lockdown and hard border restrictions had impacted the roll out of the \$300,000 local government software system.

"In the original project plan it was planned that Datascape staff would attend on site and undertake an intensive transition workshop over a week," he said.

"Unfortunately, with the hard border closures and requirements to self-isolate for 14 days these sessions were moved to online

"Teams" meetings, which has significantly protracted these workshop sessions."

Mr Gower said as a result of delays the project plan had been shortened to eight months, but conceded the revised timing would have a significant impact on current staff and the ability to continue their day to day work.

He recommended council hire two full-time staff members for 15 months, with one assigned to the project team to help with project transition delivery and the other assigned to council's finance team.

"The cost for the additional two personnel over the 15-month period is \$208,000," Mr Gower said.

"A budget variance of \$85,000 is requested for 2020/21 and the remainder will be allocated as part of the 2021/22 budget process."

Mr Gower also sought support for a \$41,000 budget amendment to hire a horticultural apprentice and mechanical apprentice, say-

ing council staff had currently been working overtime to address a heightened demand for mowing, slashing and gardening.

"The employment of a trainee will help address these overtime hours and assist in addressing several ongoing customer requests associated with maintenance requests that have not been able to be actioned such as clearing paths along coastal tracks," he said.

"Currently, council has an apprentice mechanic who has seven months remaining on his tenure.

"The employment of a new apprentice will also go part way to immediately addressing a workload issue with the team leader mechanical services currently supporting the construction team whilst the team leader in that area is taking long service leave."

Elected members also supported a budget variation of \$39,000 for a new software system to operate in tandem with the local government enterprise system.

Millicent Library work back on track

BUDGETED upgrades for the Millicent Library's air conditioning system will go back to the drawing board, with Wattle Range Council recommending an entire roof replacement as a priority.

Council allocated \$40,000 for the first of a number of stages to replace air conditioning united of the roof of the facility, but following detailed scoping of the project determined the staged approach over a number of years was not the best strategy.

A staff report said council had managed a number of leaks in the library for a number of years due to the location of the box gutters inside the building, the condition of the roof and the location of the air conditioning units.

The report said the existing air conditioners are approaching the end of life, resulting in significant leaks in the roof over the Children's Library.

Officers recommended the complete re-roofing of the Millicent Library and replacement of all air conditioners over the next 18 months.

"This ensures that all leaks can be addressed in a single event, minimising further damage to the building and limiting the impacts on library services," the report said.

Staff expected a considerable saving to council by completing the works in a single project rather than tendering, mobilising contractors and equipment every year.

Council will request for tender and seek submissions to undertake the work, with a report due to be brought back to council for consideration early next year.

"In the Limestone Coast, it is important because we are part of a smaller pocket and they (charity foundations) tend to miss out on some of the bigger rounds of funding," Ms Kerr said.

"Each year, the needs of the community change and sub funds are a nimble way to help with whatever those needs are."

Ms Barr said the ability to contribute to the sector was an honour.

Border Rd budget variation

WATTLE Range Council has approved a \$1.4m budget allocation to upgrade the unsealed section of Border Road near Penola to a sealed standard and upgrade a number of intersections across the district.

Elected members supported co-funding the Border Road and Dergolm-Casterton Road \$4m infrastructure project with the Federal Government and neighbouring Victorian councils to boost safety along the freight route.

Council will contribute \$1m to the road, which straddles the South Australian-Victorian border, in conjunction with a \$2m Federal grant and \$125,000 from the West Wimmera Shire Council.

A \$875,000 contribution has been sought from Glenelg Shire Council, with Wattle Range staff saying a commitment had not been finalised, but an officer would continue to pursue funding.

Council will also spend \$1.8m to upgrade seven regionally important intersections and address major pavement failure issue, poor sight lines and expanding the road width.

Two intersections along Glencoe's Kennedy Road will be upgraded as part of the funding, in addition to the Wandilo Forest/Kangaroo Flat road intersection, Penola's South Terrace and Riddoch Highway intersection and the Diagonal/Clay Wells and Rifle Range/Clay Wells roads intersection.

Border Road/Casterton-Penola Road intersection will also receive a makeover, with staff recommending the route be promoted as a more efficient transport route than using the Dergholm Penola Road and travelling through Penola.

Council noted as all seven intersections were located between local and main roads, staff would seek a State Government contribution to the project.

Ten pin bowling at Kaboom Entertainment followed with some top scores and even a few strikes which earned the bowlers prizes.

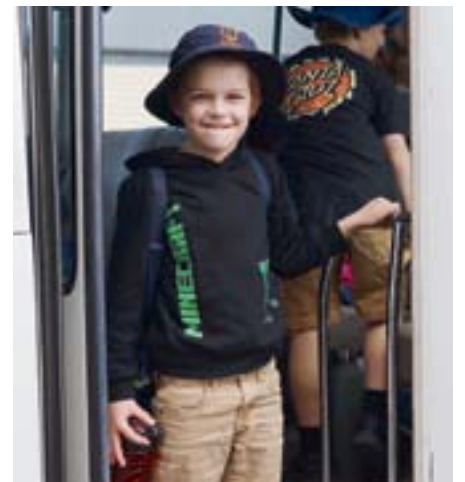
Students arrived back at school at around 4.30pm for an afternoon snack and school games.

Cr Rank said the two projects followed on from the proposed Casterton Community Garden - highlighting the range of major projects earmarked as part of the Island Park overhaul.

The pump track and basketball court will be positioned opposite each other, adjacent to the Casterton Caravan Park.

Fantastic plastic recycle initiative

KILOS of plastic waste is being recycled by an innovative Tenison Woods College program as the site adopts a range of new measures to help meet an ambitious goal for a greener future.

A range of new futuristic sustainability measures have been implemented by the education facility in an effort to become a zero waste school by 2025.

Among the new strategies include an onsite plastic recycling depot, which has already processed, shredded and melted approximately 500kg of material so far.

After strenuous testing, students have started creating large and small gardening pots, Christmas decorations, chopping boards and most recently sheets of colourful plastic thanks to a sheet press machine donated by DMK Engineering.

When the zero waste goal was set, college sustainability coordinator Tom Linnell said the school did not know what it would look like or how it would get there, but Project Recology was considered the first step in the right direction.

"We thought about how we could get to that point as a school and we knew it would have to come through our young people and their learning," Mr Linnell said.

"We embarked on our journey and discovered the Precious Plastic mission ... It has taken a lot of help and guidance from the community.

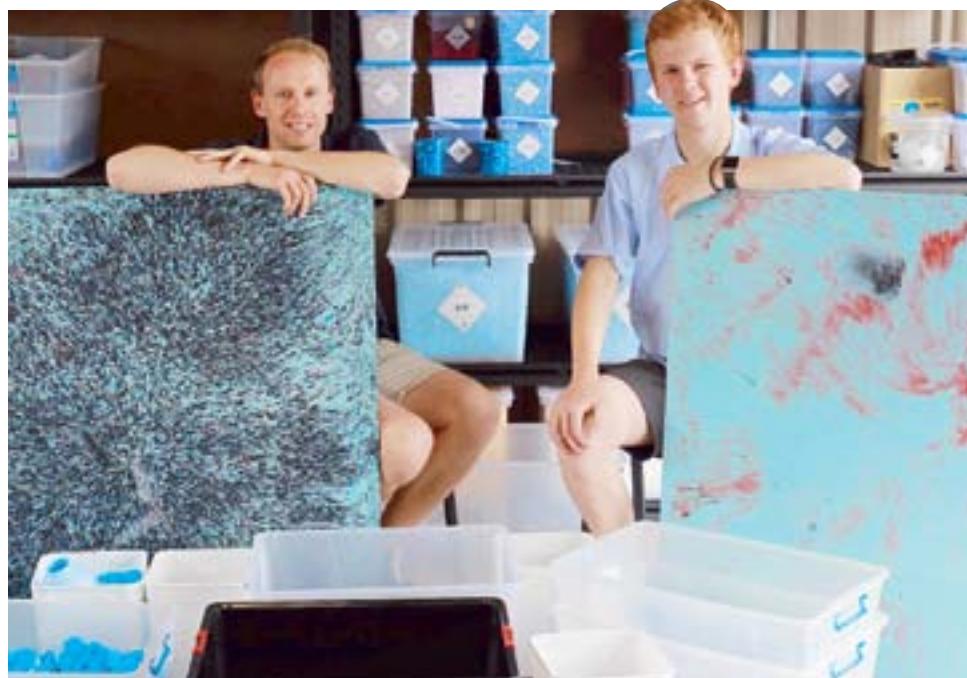
"Almost every aspect of what we are doing involves community donation or volunteer work."

After securing \$20,000 through the Federal Government's Communities Environments Program, Mr Linnell said himself and Year 12 suitability leader Lachie Price transformed a site groundskeeper shed into Project Recology's home base.

"We now have the machines, young people's enthusiasm and the streams of plastic, the ball is in the students' court as to what we do next," Mr Linnell said.

"The last few months, we have been prototyping a few things to help young people ponder what could be done.

"What we want, is for the thought of waste going in the bin and it no longer being a problem, to be changed. We want people to think about where it goes next and if it could be processed into something of value."

Mr Linnell said the creation of large sheets of plastic was a game changer for the school, which could be virtually made into anything with some creativity.

"This really becomes a Lego kit which you can build whatever you want out of," he said.

"The goal is to show them (students) what we can do and they decide."

The project has been tasked to develop a feature wall to be hung vertically across from the school's boardroom.

Two new subjects Fantastic Plastic and Precious Plastic will be introduced into the Year 8 and 9 school curriculum next year, which will involve aspects of establishing a business and marketing products students make from plastic.

Mr Linnell said it was all about a circular economy and understanding humans were contributing to the growing issue of plastic waste.

"It is unless you start to think about how to become a solution maker, things won't change," he said.

"At the end of the day, it will be up to the

young people as to whether they want to drive and make change.

"The global plastic problem, it will be make or break in the next 10 years."

From a student perspective, Mr Price said he believed the college was fronteering the sector, but other schools may be looking to adopt similar ideas.

"In a way, it is eye-opening to see all the alternative ways we can recycle plastics and what can be done," Mr Price said.

"I had no idea we could be making the stuff we are now."

Mr Linnell said the end goal was to involve as many organisations, schools and community members as possible to grow and make a larger change.

"The stuff we are doing is not hard, we don't own this stuff, the goal would be for it to be copied elsewhere because that's the bigger solution," he said.

"We would love to see local businesses and organisations connect with the school and see if they can be involved."

Two hurt

TWO Mount Gambier men were seriously injured after a single car crash on the city's outskirts over the weekend.

Just before midnight on Saturday, a Range Rover travelling at high speed in an easterly direction on Bishop Road at Mount Gambier, failed to negotiate a bend at the junction of Kennedy Avenue.

The car subsequently drove up a two-metre embankment and through a fence before becoming airborne for about 20 metres.

The vehicle nose-dived into the ground before tumbling end on end and coming to rest.

The vehicle was destroyed beyond recognition.

The driver, a 25-year-old man, and the passenger, a 22-year-old man, both from Mount Gambier, were extracted from the vehicle and taken to Mount Gambier Hospital where they were treated for serious but non life threatening injuries.

Limestone Coast Local Service Area officer in charge Superintendent Phil Hoff said he could not understand how no lives were lost.

"How no lives were lost in this crash is beyond me," he said.

"Speed is an obvious factor and it appears that the occupants were not wearing seat belts.

"We are in National Road Safety Week and we're confronted with one of the worst collisions in the Limestone Coast this year. It is beyond belief," he said.

CANNABIS COOKIES

SIX women were taken to hospital after consuming cannabis over the weekend in Millicent.

Police and ambulance personnel were called to an address in Millicent around 9.30pm on Saturday after reports five women aged in their late teens to mid 20s were unconscious in the home.

A sixth woman, who was ill, called for assistance.

Information obtained at the scene was that the women had all consumed cannabis cookies.

They were all conveyed to Millicent Hospital where they were treated.

The women were issued with cautions for failing to comply with a direction under the Emergency Management Act.

Police searched the home of a 24-year-old local man where they located cannabis and associated equipment.

A 24-year-old Millicent man was reported for supplying a controlled drug.

Limestone Coast Local Service Area officer in charge Superintendent Phil Hoff said the situation was seriously concerning.

"When five people lose consciousness because of something they've consumed it is alarming," he said.

"Our priority was to establish if these cookies had been further distributed to ensure no-one else was at risk, thankfully it appears not.

"Illicit substances are illicit for a reason. This is a timely message to the community to make better choices. Our investigations continue which will include a scientific analysis of the items seized."

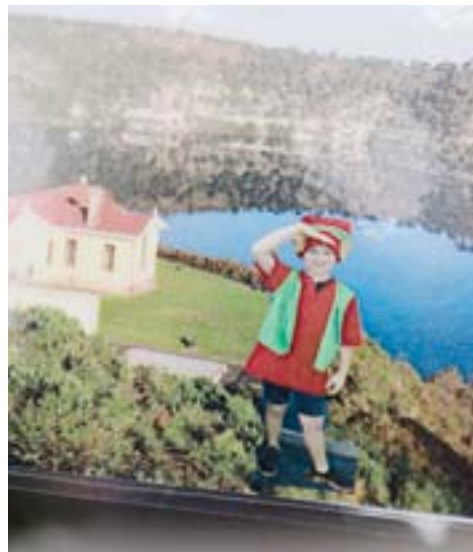
"We were thinking creatively, something new for people to have a look at and hopefully smile about."

Sowing seeds to dairy success

AS a stayer in an industry plagued by its fair share of challenges, Limestone Coast dairy farmer James Mann is assembling the pieces of the puzzle for an efficient, sustainable business.

For James and his wife Robyn, who built their 20 million litre per year Donovans Dairy from the ground-up, this 'jigsaw' boils down to understanding their profit drivers and demanding a value proposition from every investment, whether that be a new machinery or acquiring more land.

Investment in land has underpinned their expansion from 120 to 2300 milking cows in the region, while judicious investments in machinery has taken their business to the next level.

Mr Mann believes in outsourcing to the experts and relies on contractors for most of his cropping program including sowing, silage and around 40pc of hay mowing.

When it comes to activities which bolster the profit drivers of an intensive livestock business - fertiliser and feed - he keeps it in-house and relies on his John Deere fleet.

The most used machine, a 6175M Tractor, clocked up 3300 hours in the first 14 months.

Fruit fly warning for south west Vic

RE Victoria is encouraging south-west residents to check their gardens and orchards for maggots, to support efforts to monitor for fruit flies in the region.

The department has warned the south-west region was at greater risk of fruit flies spreading from interstate after recent Mediterranean fruit fly outbreaks in South Australia's metropolitan area.

Mediterranean fruit fly is an exotic species to Victoria and is a significant threat to the state's multi-million-dollar fruit and vegetable industries.

"Fruit fly maggots are often found in the centre of the fruit. The maggots are five to 10mm long and creamy-white in colour," Agriculture Victoria domestic quarantine senior project officer Lavinia Zirnsak said.

"Fruit flies are usually active from September to May, so now is the time to keep a look out in your garden or on your farm to see if they are present," Ms Zirnsak said.

Ms Zirnsak said anyone who reports a suspect fruit fly infestation within the region would receive a free collection kit from Agriculture Victoria with instructions for submitting a sample for testing.

"It's as simple as placing the maggot infested piece of fruit or vegetable into a sealed plastic bag and sending it to our laboratory for identification, and then the sender will be notified of the result," she said.

Ms Zirnsak said it was important to follow good garden hygiene such as regularly monitoring for presence in your garden, picking fruit and vegetables as they ripen and disposing of unwanted fruit and scraps carefully.

"Other control methods include protecting trees, plants and produce through netting, gazebos and bags, baiting and trapping and using insecticide control," Ms Zirnsak said.

The 6M also has the tick of approval from staff, who requested "a tractor just like the one we already have" when it came time to replace an older 6155M Tractor.

Another 6175M Tractor will soon join the ranks and with features such as front and rear PTOs for greater mowing capacity, Mr Mann is confident it will keep the entire team happy.

It is a recipe for success with Mr Mann entrenched in Australia's dairy sector as chair of Dairy Australia and has notched up 30 years in the industry.

However, a hint of an accent gives away his United Kingdom origins.

He was raised on a mixed farm at Bawdsey, England, and came to Australia in the mid-1980s to study at Marcus Oldham College, Victoria.

In 1989, two years after James graduated from Marcus Oldham, he and Robyn purchased their first property, at Numurkah, near Shepparton, in Victoria.

They sold it nine years later to trade up to a more sizeable holding over the South Australian border at Wye, south-east of Mount Gambier.

This 600-hectare beef and sheep property was soon transformed and before long they were up and running.

They built a dairy and were milking just three months after they moved, expanding the dairy herd from the 400 cows brought over from Numurkah to 1200 head in the first year.

The Manns now farm 1700 hectares, including 10 centre pivots over 480 hectares of predominately perennial ryegrass and white clover, 40-50 hectares of corn for pasture renovation and silage production, dryland hay

and silage production.

In addition to dairying, the livestock side of the business includes opportunistic cattle trading, composite ewes, and finishing Friesian bull calves off as two-year-old steers.

A contract with Lion Dairy & Drinks, and their proximity to milk processors on both sides of the border, enables them to direct product as required.

It took a lot of 'sweat-equity', plus a good relationship with the bank, but ask Mr Mann what drove this growth and the answer is simple: "I like to make things happen - I like to see a plan come together."

MOUNT GAMBIER CATTLE - WEDNESDAY 1573 (-20)

NUMBERS eased a little as agents yarded 1573 head.

These sold to the usual array of trade and processor buyers with feeder and restocker orders present and active across the offering.

Quality was generally good with the high-light being some outstanding vealer calves as the market sold from firm to a slightly easier trend.

Vealer steers to the trade held firm in price with these making from 413c to 460c with similar heifers selling from 383c to 451c/kg.

Feeder orders sourced steers from 413c to 429c and heifers from 382c to 388c while restockers were active on steers which sold from 430c to 442c/kg.

Yearling steers to the trade were small in number, easing up to 4c as they made from 358c to 393c whilst the heifer equivalents sold from 345c to 384c/kg.

Feeder orders were active on yearling steers making from 374c to 433c whilst the heifers sold from 374c to 388c/kg.

Grown steers and bullocks eased by 4c to 8c as they sold from 323c to 395c to the trade, whilst feeders saw sales from 352c to 421c/kg.

Grown heifers made from 301c to 389c to the trade as feeder buyers purchased from 316c to 387c as manufacturing steers made from 270c to 325c/kg.

Heavy cows held firm as they sold from 280c to 323c to the trade as the lighter types were making from 210c to 272c with restocker activity to a top of 270c and feeders purchased to 286c/kg.

Bulls sold from 260c to 315c/kg.

NARACOORTE CATTLE - 1608 (36)

NUMBERS rose slightly as agents yarded 1608 head of liveweight and open auction cattle.

These sold to the usual array of trade and processor buyers along with feeder and restocker orders.

Quality was generally good across the offering as the market sold to easier rates this week.

Vealers eased 10c to 15c as steers to the trade ranged from 425c to 440c, with similar heifers returning from 395c to 432c/kg.

Feeders sought steers from 378c to 439c, and heifers from 395c to 426c/kg.

Restockers turned steers back to paddock from 440c to 445c/kg.

Yearling steers to the trade made from 385c to 430c, with the heifer portion ranging from 313c to 405c/kg.

Feeder steers sold from 384c to 427c, with the feeder heifers ranging from 336c to 420c, as restockers sourced steers from 367c to 400c/kg.



Grown steers and bullocks lost up to 20c as they ranged from 338c to 385c to the trade, with feeder activity from 358c to 399c/kg.

Grown heifers returned from 300c to 390c to the trade, with feeder active here from 330c to also 390c/kg.

MOUNT GAMBIER SHEEP - WEDNESDAY 10,589 (-146)

NUMBERS eased slightly as agents yarded 10,021 lambs and 568 sheep to total 10,589 head overall.

These sold to the usual array of trade and processor buyers with a small group of active restockers present in the market.

Quality was generally good as agents presented a large number of heavy lambs with great weights and freshness in the skin however demand from the buying group wasn't as strong as the previous

week as the market sold to mainly softer trends.

Light lambs to the trade sold from \$112 to \$143 with the light weight 2 and 3 score trade types selling from \$140 to \$150/head.

Restockers turned light lambs back out from \$48 to \$134, whilst those with more conditioning sold from \$142 to \$158/head.

Trade weight 3 score lambs made from \$146 to \$171 to range from firm to \$3/head easier.

Heavy lambs sold from \$164 to \$190 to be \$4/head softer in price as most lambs returned vendors from 720c to 750c/kg cwt.

The extra heavy export weighted selection sold from \$189 to a market high of \$232/head.

Hoggets sold from \$170 to \$195/head.

Light ewes made from \$120 to \$138/head. Heavy ewes made from \$150 to a high of \$244/head to the trade.

A line of 4 1/2 year old composite ewes with a full skin were returned to the paddock from \$175 to \$214/head.

Wethers sold to \$194 whilst Rams sold to a top of \$80/head.

Manufacturing steers sold to 330c/kg.

as a number of these sought lambs from 20 to 22kg to pay up to \$168/head for lambs to grow on including an order from Ballarat who sourced a large

number.

This pushed the light trade and trade lambs along with these remaining firm in price on last week's rates while lambs outside of this category fell in price by up to \$6/head.

The trade purchases averaged around the 720c/kg cwt with the lighter lambs whilst restocker interest saw sales from 750c to 780c with some sales making to 800c/kg cwt.

Light lambs to the trade sold from \$50 to \$145 with the light weight trade 2 and 3 score selection making from \$138 to \$154/head.

Restockers sourced lighter weights from \$60 to \$135 and paid from \$147 to \$168/head for those with more conditioning.

Trade weight 3 score lambs returned from \$148 to \$177 as the heavy pens sold from \$163 to \$198, whilst the few extra heavy weight lambs returned from \$192 to the market high of \$231/head.

Hoggets made from \$121 to \$204/head.

Light ewes made from \$90 to \$124/head whilst medium weight ewes sold from \$126 to \$156 as the heavy pens were making from \$154 to \$236/head.

UPDATED HYUNDAI I30N

HYUNDAI Motor has unveiled details of the updated i30 N that will reach Australia in the first half of 2021.

Major features are a new wet-type eight-speed dual-clutch automatic and advanced driver assistance and safety features.

Changes to the outer front bumper corners incorporate air curtains to significantly improve the airflow and reduce turbulence into the wheel housing.

The new i30 hatchback N features an updated tail but the rear of the i30 Fastback N remains unchanged. Two large exhaust pipes are integrated into the lower bumper diffuser.

It will be offered in seven exterior colours, including Performance Blue, which is exclusive to Hyundai N models.

The five-double-spoke 19-inch forged alloy wheels are 14.4 kg lighter than the current 19-inch casted alloy wheels. Their dark satin grey matte finish, contrasting with the N-specific red brake callipers with N logo.

The gripping the road are high-performance Pirelli P-Zero tyres, developed especially for the i30 N.

Inside, an analogue cluster includes features such as the active variable LED red zone, which varies according to engine oil temperature. The shift timing indicator, suggests to the driver the best time to switch gears.

New to this model are seatbelts with Performance Blue accents. The interior comes in one-tone Black with full cloth or artificial suede and leather seats.

For the first time, the i30 N has the option of N Light Seats which have pronounced bolsters for lateral support. N Light Seats are made of premium leather and Alcantara materials and have Performance Blue stitching and an illuminated N logo on an integrated headrest.

With the Performance Package, 2.0-litre turbocharged engine now delivers 206kW, an increase of 4kW over the original i30 N. The maximum torque for the Performance Package has been increased by 39 Nm to 392 Nm. Peak torque is produced from 1950-4600 rpm.

It's offered with a six-speed manual or six-speed dual-clutch auto.

The zero to 100 km/h figures is now 5.9 secs, a significant reduction of 0.2 seconds. It also lets owners claim it as a five-second car. (OK, the maths are wrong, but it's there's no rounding-down in the boasting stakes.)

As with its predecessor, the new i30 N is equipped with a range of high-performance driving features including rev matching, launch control and a rear stiffness bar.



Changes to the shape of the Hyundai i30 N improve aerodynamics.

The N DCT enables three new N performance functions: N Grin Shift, N Power Shift and N Track Sense Shift.

N Grin Shift releases maximum power of the engine and transmission for 20 seconds. To activate, the driver pushes a button on the steering wheel, and a countdown begins on the cluster showing the remaining seconds for this function.

N Power Shift engages when the car accelerates with more than 90 percent of throttle, thereby mitigating any reduction in torque by using upshifts to deliver maximum power to the wheels.

Finally, N Track Sense Shift recognises when the road conditions are optimal for dynamic driving, for example on a racetrack, and activates automatically.

With the Performance Package drivers benefit from the N Corner Carving Differential, an Electronically Controlled Limited Slip Differential.

Additionally for the Performance Package, the front brake disc size has been increased from 345mm to 360mm for a better braking performance.

The new i30 N features a Performance Driving Data System to monitor and improve the



driver's track skills, with updated graphics for even more ease of use. This feature saves and displays driving data, including information on power, torque, turbo boost. It also includes a lap and acceleration timer, which comes in handy on the track.

The new Hyundai i30 N will reach Australia in the first half of 2021, details of the model line-up and pricing will be given closer to the launch.

FORD Puma is a small SUV that's as much a tall hatchback as a would-be off-road vehicle.

This type of vehicle is becoming ever more popular because of the extra interior space, also due to older folks being able to get in and out of the higher seating position.

Puma is powered by a 1.0-litre Eco-Boost turbo-petrol three-cylinder engine that produces up to 92kW and 170Nm.

Power is sent to the front wheels by way of a seven-speed dual-clutch automatic. There's no AWD version.

The base Puma rides on 17-inch alloy wheels. It has LED headlights, a chromed grille, black window surrounds.

It has an 8.0-inch touchscreen Sync3 multimedia system, satellite navigation, remote smartphone connectivity, Apple CarPlay and Android Auto support, a seven-speaker sound system, digital radio, Bluetooth connectivity, two USB ports, wireless smartphone charging, cloth trim and a leather-trimmed steering wheel.

Puma ST-Line has sports suspension, a matte-black mesh grille insert, side skirts, body-colour wheelarches, and a larger rear spoiler.

There's a 12.3-inch digital instruments, sports seats, Race Red stitching, a flat-bottom steering wheel with paddle-shifters and metallic pedals.

Puma ST-Line V has 18-inch alloys, chromed exterior trim, darkened rear glass, a hands-free power-operated tailgate and keyless entry.

There's a leather-accented upholstery and grey stitching. Entertainment comes from a 10-speaker B&O Play sound system.

Ford Puma has host of high-tech safety features: autonomous emergency braking with pedestrian detection, lane-keep assist, traffic sign recognition, inattentive driver warning, tyre pressure monitoring, a reversing camera and rear parking sensors.

WHAT a funny old week it has been in the fishing scene.

First we were all getting pretty revved up for a near-perfect weekend forecast and next thing we were not allowed to leave the house.

Luckily for us Sunday was very fishable once the restrictions were eased and there were some nice fish caught.

The offshore scene fished well for most, with some mixed bags from varying depths.

Sharks, morwong, latchet fish, knife jaw and flathead were all caught, just to name a few.

Tim Carrison fished Blackfellows Caves on Sunday with the metal jigs in 100-150mt of water and came home with a nice feed of gummy shark, queen snapper and latchets, all taken on jigs.

We are hearing of plenty of snapper caught this week, which is encouraging to see.

Let's hope they are still in close in February when we are allowed to target them again.

Surf fishos along the Coorong the past few days and prior to the lockdown have had some absolutely cracking sessions.

I know of mulloway from just legal - through to one "horse" at 65lb caught - and everything in between.

There have been some great shark caught up there too.

Gummies and schoolies have made up the majority of numbers, but there have also been a few chunky bronzies caught too.

Locally our surf fishing has been pretty decent.

Zac Currie fished a couple of hours down at Browns Beach Sunday afternoon and took

home a nice gummy of around 6kg.

There have been plenty of salmon caught along most of our surf beaches this week which has been excellent fresh bait for shark fishos.

Shane Smith landed a solid 30kg bronzie at the back of Beachport and lost a couple of others.

The whiting fishing has remained fairly good despite the crystal clear conditions and

flat seas this week.

The Port MacDonnell breakwater has been arguably our most productive area so far, with plenty of nice bags of fish being boated.

Jesse Davies and Joe Dunwell boated 10 crackers just prior to the shutdown, meaning plenty of fresh fish for days.

Other areas producing nice fish are Hutt Bay, Cape Douglas, Nene Valley and Carpenter Rocks.

They are all fishing well for boat and land-based anglers.

Tommy ruff and silver trevally are still in excellent numbers in the same sort of areas, so that makes for some good fun and very tasty bycatch.

Squid anglers are still into some good fish.

Livingstons, Blackfellows Caves and inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater are all producing solid fish in the South East, while Beachport, Jaffa and Kingston SE up the top have been the go-to spots for those a little more north.

Guys fishing baited jigs under floats are still fishing very well and picking up the odd cuttlefish too, so do not be surprised if you see a few of those prehistoric looking beauties about.

The Glenelg River has been abuzz with activity since the easing of restrictions.

We have seen anglers landing excellent numbers of bream and estuary perch on baits and lures, and a few smaller mulloway starting to turn up too.

Hopefully in the coming weeks we see things start firing up down there just in time for the Christmas break.

The South East Amateur Surf Fishing Club kicks off its summer season this weekend, so good luck to all the fellas and I cannot wait to see some pictures.

It is an exciting time of year where we see some great fish from the beaches, the weather is nice and the days are longer.

The forecast for the remainder of the week looks to be improving weather wise, but the wind and swell still looks a bit iffy for offshore anglers.

Keep an eye on it and I am sure we will find somewhere to wet a line.

ORIGINALLY this article was planned for The Border Watch back in early April as part of the promotion for a Bourne Kennels Mount Gambier Cup that ultimately was not conducted in its traditional timeslot.

In fact, for the first time in 40 years, there was a fair chance there would not be a Mount Gambier Cup.

Eventually, though, the cup was programmed for August 30.

The only trouble was by then The Border Watch had ceased publication.

So, in a week when not a lot happened at Tara Raceway due to the three-day lockdown, maybe it is a good time for the article to finally see the light of day for Allen and Ros Williams and Bronny Nicholson.

By the time the 2012 Mount Gambier Cup came around, long-time local greyhound trainer Allen Williams, by his own reckoning, had provided something like 10 cup finalists.

When his smart pup Don't Panic, a daughter of Premier Fantasy and Keep Token, came out on heats day and defeated Dare Devil by six lengths in a best-of-day 30.02 seconds, then surely this was going to be Williams' year.

Besides, in the previous heat, Don't Panic's half-sister Keep Looking had narrowly defeated Rouse Flyer - two runners for Williams and certainly giving him a great chance in the following week's 512-metre final.

As he had often said, though: "They don't give the cup away, you have to earn it."

Don't Panic went into the final as an odds-on favourite but had no luck in the race won by Kevin Mugavin's Rich Shiraz.

Fast forward six months and Williams renewed a long association with Lewiston trainer Don Turner when litter brothers Lika Gem and Colville joined his Tarpeena kennels.

By year's end the pair had collectively won nine races at Tara Raceway.

In fact, at the final meeting of the year Lika Gem defeated Kiss Me Donkey in the 512-metre Christmas Cup, while Colville got up a by a whisker over Galactic Rumball, subsequently the dam of 2019 Mount Gambier Cup winner Galactic Athena.

With the 2013 Trackside Meats Mount Gambier Cup set to be run in March, Williams held high hopes for the Collide x Pampered brothers, although perhaps with a leaning towards his Christmas Cup winner.

And while Lika Gem failed to make the final after finishing third to Crymelon Talon, all was not lost.

Two races later Colville chased the seemingly luckless Kiss Me Donkey, finishing hard for a head win and a spot in the final.

As luck would have it, Colville drew the one in the Friday final.

Not a bad box for the trainer considering a \$4000 first prize was up for grabs.

Also, he had purchased the dog for \$70 at the Calcutta which promised a \$3000 payout to the winner.

The day was always going to belong to Colville, though, who led throughout to defeat Cassie Billington's Ima Shoop Star and the David Peckham trained Baurna Paddy in a time of 30.40 seconds.

"I'd had my share of success over the years," Williams said this week.

"But winning that Mount Gambier Cup was the greatest thrill I ever experienced in greyhound racing.

"It's every local trainer's ambition to win

the cup and I have to say there was no prouder person than me when Colville's name appeared on the Tara Raceway Mount Gambier Cup honour board."

As an aside, shortly after Colville won the cup, Williams went out and purchased a Toyota Coaster,

spotted recently in the driveway of Allen and Ros Williams' Mount Gambier home.

McDonnell memorial rescheduled

WITH no racing at Tara Raceway last week, the time-honoured Newman McDonnell Memorial will now be conducted next month.

Two strong 512-metre heats for grade five greyhounds had highlighted the 12-race program which failed to materialise after the state went into lock-down.

The memorial, won last year by the Kevin Mugavin owned and trained Spring Value, will now be run on Thursday, December 24 (heats) with the final a week later.

Speaking this week on behalf of the McDonnell family, Margaret Considine said she was delighted the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club would be able to stage the event in 2020.

"It was certainly disappointing that the heats couldn't be run last week as planned," she said.

"But it's been a tough year for everyone and we're so pleased the club has been able to slot the memorial in and continue its unbroken run of 35 years."

Meanwhile, racing returned this week to Tara Raceway with some modifications in place due to current SA restrictions.

All race meetings and trial sessions are restricted to essential persons only which means not even owners are able to attend.

Greyhound Racing SA requires all participants (including trainers, catchers, staff, etc.) to wear a mask when at any race track.

This includes the car park, kennel house and clubrooms.

The wearing of masks replaces the

planned temperature testing that had previously been advised.

GRSA will revise the requirement of wearing masks in two weeks.

"Understanding masks are not a government requirement but only recommended, as an industry we want to be seen by government and the public to be going above and beyond any Covid requirements to ensure we continue racing during this pandemic," GRSA Risk and Compliance Manager Derek Kordick said.

Quick thinking saves meetings

SPORTING administrators in all areas are often under attack for decisions they make - or do not make - in relation to their respective sport.

On this occasion, praise of the highest order is in order for racing and harness racing administrators in South Australia for saving several meetings in the past week.

Two of those were here in the Limestone Coast which enabled Naracoorte races and Mount Gambier trots to go ahead after both meetings at one stage seemed destined for the scrap heap.

When South Australia was placed under lock down last week for six days, all racing and harness racing in that period in this state was called off, the first time it has occurred since COVID-19 became part of our lives back in March.

However, when that lock down decision was suddenly overturned as from last Sunday, excellent initiative by administrators of both codes saw meetings quickly reinstated.

The Naracoorte race meeting, originally for last Friday, was moved to last Tuesday while the Mount Gambier harness meeting was reinstated in its original slot of Tuesday night.

In what is believed to be a first for South Australian racing, we are currently in the middle of six consecutive days of racing.

After Naracoorte on Tuesday, we had Morphettville Parks on Wednesday (moved from last Saturday), Balaklava yesterday, Port Lincoln today, Morphettville tomorrow and Strathalbyn on Sunday.

Local owners and trainers were thrilled to have the Naracoorte gallops meeting reinstated, not just for the horses involved in the seven-race program but also for the two trials after the final event.

There are plenty of horses in work in the Limestone Coast at present as shown by three recent trials at Penola when 23 horses went around.

Seven of the 11 horses in those two Naracoorte trials on Tuesday are currently unraced and all would have benefited enormously from the experience.

Horse numbers are also improving for harness racing in the region with four races last Tuesday night, an increase of one from the three previous meetings this season.

KAIN FOLLOWING IN FATHER'S FOOTSTEPS

EARLIER this week we saw a changing of the guard at the top of Limestone Coast Thoroughbred Racing.

After two years as president, John O'Connor stepped aside at Tuesday night's AGM allowing vice president Justin Kain from Penola to take the top role.

O'Connor is back as president of the Mount Gambier Racing Club for the next 12

months and his departure from the LCTR presidency quelled any thoughts of a conflict of interest.

At 46 years of age, Justin Kain is one of the younger administrators to take over the top job.

Not that Kain lacks any racing administration experience, far from it, as he was president of the Penola club for four years over a decade ago and returned to the role of vice president of the club a couple of years ago.

Martin Miles, who was in his late 30's when he became president of South East District Racing Association (now LCTR) in 1998, welcomed Kain's appointment.

"It is good to have a bit of youth at the top of administration roles in racing and I wish Justin well," the Bordertown based Miles said.

Kain will follow in the footsteps of his late father Brendan who was a key administrator in local racing as president of the Millicent Racing Club and then as SEDRA president during the late 1980's.

"I am looking forward to LCTR working closely with Thoroughbred Racing SA," Kain told The Border Watch.

One area that Kain is keen to work on is getting more younger people involved in racing administration.

"We have plenty of young owners in racing at present and we need some of those, the likes of retired footballers and netballers, to see what's involved in running a racing club," he said.

BEAUTY IN THE EYE OF THE BEHOLDER

HEXHAM Racing Club in far northern England recently publicly boasted of having the most scenic racecourse in England.

As one of about a dozen racetracks in the British Isles I have been to, it came as a bit of a surprise to me as England - with its beautiful green, rolling countryside - is home to some very picturesque racecourses.

For starters, I consider Royal Ascot, southwest of London, to be a racecourse of beauty more so than Hexham but as the old saying goes, 'beauty is in the eye of the beholder'.

Easily the number one racecourse in the world for beauty I have been to is the French track Chantilly, a short drive north of Paris.

Surrounded by dense forest, the beautifully manicured course has a huge, majestic chateau towering over the runners as they leave the back straight.

Here in Australia, our big and barren land does not generally lend itself to scenic racecourse settings.

In South Australia, I can think of a handful of tracks that are appealing to the eye.

Oakbank, with its picnic setting in the Adelaide Hills, undulating track and abundance of trees next to the Onkaparinga river has to be up there with the best we can offer.

The background ocean setting of Proper Bay gives Port Lincoln plenty of appeal and, for desert and rugged beauty, Port Augusta comes into consideration.

On a sunny, calm winter's day, the background setting of the Flinders Ranges looks absolutely magnificent in the late afternoon as they stretch northwards from Port Augusta.

Here in the Limestone Coast, Penola is the standout, enclosed by the Coonawarra vineyards, with its antique grandstand and majestic gum trees surrounding what was once a swamp in the middle of the racecourse.

Victorian tracks have, in my opinion, much more to offer when it comes to beauty.

None more so than nearby Casterton which is a hidden gem in the midst of winter with its river valley setting surrounded by green rolling hills, helped by a natural amphitheatre for public viewing.

Kyneton, on the banks of the Campaspe River and surrounded by trees, is always highly spoken of, while two racecourses that come to mind are up in the Victorian alps.

Dederang in the Kiewa valley is surrounded by mountain peaks, but it was difficult to appreciate its beauty the day I was there as it was a sweltering 44 degrees.

In the far north east, crowds at Towong (near Corryong) are cooled in summer by numerous elm trees and the nearby alps make for a beautiful setting from the old, well-preserved grandstand.

Terang, with its abundance of trees and spacious lawns, is the perfect spot for a picnic in the shade and to relax.

PLUNGES MISFIRED

A GRIM day for most punters with only one favourite (Crypto Currency in the final race) scoring at Naracoorte on Tuesday on a track upgraded from a Soft 6 to a Good 4.

Four of the seven winners were at double-figure odds and a couple of hefty plunges misfired to make it a great day for bookmakers.

The Bob and Kane Post trained Allgo, having his first start in South Australia, was backed from \$23 to \$3.60 favourite in the opening race and only beat one runner home.

Another favourite, Looking Around in race three, was heavily supported from \$8 into \$3.20 and also missed the placings.

Bordertown trainer Scott Irlam had two runners in race four and the betting suggested the wrong horse won.

The winner Wonaeamirri, eased from \$8 to \$21, with the well supported stablemate Liberty Power (\$34-\$13) running a close fourth.

Giggion returned to winning form in the feature race, the BM 72, to break a two-month drought for winners in the Limestone Coast for co-trainers Sue and Jason Jaensch.

Claudia Lions took riding honours with a double and Naracoorte trainer Sue Murphy moved from third to top spot on the Limestone Coast trainer's premiership with the victory by O'Mizzna (\$13).

The black bookers from Naracoorte are Lady Dee Dee (slowly away, then circled field to lead and just pipped) and Thanasi (badly blocked for a run in the final 200 metres).

ALL WELL FANCIED

IT was a different tale at the local harness meeting on Tuesday night when all four winners were popular with punters.

Congo Line (\$1.35 fav.) had no trouble making it a hat trick of wins in the opening race and returned the fastest mile rate of the night (1.58.5)

Burning Hot and Tiffs Pet Rocks were both \$3.50 chances in winning their races then Hughie Junior (\$1.30 fav.) made it successive victories following a recent Horsham win.

It was a well-deserved win for the Steve Fennell trained Tiffs Pet Rocks after an unlucky second when specked at huge odds in Adelaide the previous start.

COMING UP

PENOLA race next Friday (December 4) followed by another Tuesday evening harness meeting here at Mount Gambier on December 8.

Hopefully, by this time next week, COVID crowd restrictions at sporting events will have been lifted allowing the public to attend both of those meetings.

Positive outcome for one sport

ONE positive to come out of the COVID-19 restrictions in 2020 has been golf.

During the shutdowns this year golf has continued on in a social format.

Competitions have not been allowed at all times but people have flocked to the sport, which has provided the chance for some form of recreation.

The most recent lockdown of all sports again affected golf, with courses closed in line with other businesses in South Australia.

However, now the restrictions have been eased, once more people can play, but only socially.

Both the Blue Lake Golf Club and Mount Gambier Golf Club have seen increases in playing numbers in 2020, with some discovering the sport for the first time, while others have reacquainted themselves and continued on once the restrictions were previously lifted.

Currently community sport is not allowed

until December 1, but according to Blue Lake's Bill Burley, golf has not suffered as some other sports have.

"Golf has been lucky all the way through it," he said.

"Now we don't want to do the wrong thing because we don't want it taken away from us.

"Unfortunately we can't have organised competitions - last night we were going to have a Movember ambrose tournament but we couldn't do it - but people can still come and play."

Burley said golf is seen as a recreational activity but there are certain rules which still apply.

"Flags have to stay in the holes, the rakes in the bunkers have to be out and we have foam at the bottom of the holes so the ball sits at the top," he said.

"They are like local rules while all this is in place."

The one other benefit is the increase in membership which carried over once the initial restrictions for sport were lifted.

People discovered golf, or maybe renewed their acquaintance while other major sports were not allowed and continued to play.

Burley said those increases are evidenced by the boost in membership and playing numbers when competition has been allowed.

"We have over 300 members now which is our biggest base ever," he said.

"The figures are incredible - we have over 100 playing on a Saturday where we used to have 70 or 80.

"We have over 50 or 60 on a Tuesday where we used to have 30 or 40."

Burley said those numbers have also had an effect on equipment availability.

He said many companies were short on supply due to the extra demand.

Mount Gambier golf president Trent Eitzen reported similar increases at the Attamurra course.

"Our membership has swollen quite significantly," he said.

"Our winter season is normally our weaker

season but we have had fields on a Saturday up to 180 people, which is a very good summer season.

"In a lot of ways we have done very well as far as membership and participation."

Eitzen said one of the bigger issues faced by the club was the delivery of services at the clubhouse, which has seen staff laid off over the course of the pandemic.

However, from a purely sporting point of view, the membership has increased and more people are playing golf.

"On Sunday we had a very social day observing social distancing, with people out who would normally not go near the place on a Sunday," Eitzen said.

"The members have embraced the rules we have had to work with and as much as it has been an inconvenience, it has brought out a lot of good attitudes saying 'it is what it is, let's get on with it'."

With around 500 members on the book, some new to the game and others returning, it appears golf is set for a continued resurgence as the coronavirus pandemic runs its course.

Shutdown bites as cricket loses round

Limestone Coast's best swing

LAST week's three-day COVID-19 lockdown in South Australia meant no golf competitions at clubs across the Limestone Coast.

But the pandemic had already forced the cancellation of one major event - the annual SA Country versus Victoria Country championship which had been scheduled for the Penola Golf Club.

That meant a rare weekend off for one of the Limestone Coast's best players and a regular member of the SA Country team for many years, Mount Gambier Golf Club champion Darren Bilney.

Gordon Clark took the opportunity to talk to the 42-year-old father of two about his golfing journey.

Q: How did you get started in golf?

A: Dad was on the council at Port MacDonnell when I was a kid and also on the committee that set up the nine-hole golf course. I just started having a hit with him now and then - I was given some hand-me-down clubs from a family friend from Horsham.

Q: At what point did you realise you had a talent for the game?

A: I started playing competitions a bit when I was about eight. There were only three or four juniors at the Bay and I won a couple of junior championships there. Then when I was 13 I won the A Grade club championship.

Q: Who were your biggest influences early on?

A: I used to come up to Attamurra on the weekend because Neil Richardson ran a junior coaching program. I did that for a while, so it was Neil and also Cyril Price who took me under his wing and helped me. I never really had a lot of lessons though.

Q: Did you play any other sports?

A: I played junior footy at Port Mac and then when I was about 13 or 14 we moved to Compton. It was too far to get to Attamurra so I didn't play any golf for about 10 years. From when I was about 20 I played reserves footy for South for three or four years.

Q: What was the first set of clubs you got?

A: As I said I started off with hand-me-downs, but once I got okay Mum bought me a second-hand set of Tommy Armour 845s. They were fantastic - they lasted me all through juniors and I used them when I started back playing at 23 or 24.

Q: How did your handicap progress?

A: I think my first one was in the mid-30s, but once I took the game up again it got down to two or three pretty quickly. My big advantage was that I was always pretty long off the tee.

Q: When did you break par for the first time?

A: I couldn't be sure to be honest, but I do remember I shot three-under in the Wayne Scutter Memorial at Blue Lake the first time I won it.

Q: Did you ever think about turning professional?

A: It was never really an option for me because I had that long time off. Having said that when I got down to a plus three (handicap) you sort of think about it. But there are a lot of players who got to plus four or five, even six, then turned pro but didn't make it on tour.

Q: What's the best score you've ever shot?

A: I'm not certain, but I do remember I shot 65 at Attamurra in a Thursday comp about 10 years ago. I think I've still got the course record at Blue Lake.

Q: What are some of your career highlights?

A: Apart from winning club championships and events like the Wayne Scutter Memorial and the Robe Open and Robe Village Classic, I would say playing for the SA Country side against Victoria. They've got some really good players over there but we've managed to beat them a few times. One of the biggest highlights was definitely making the national final of the Holden Scramble in Queensland. We had Richie Dean, James Dean and Darren Coxon in our team - to get into the final we

shot a net 48 3/4 at Riverside in Adelaide which was a qualifying record.

Q: How much do you practice?

A: A lot of people think I practice all the time, but I don't really. I might go to the driving range once a week and hit 30 or 40 balls - split between my pitching wedge, six-iron and driver.

Q: What clubs are you using at the moment?

A: I've got a Taylor Made M5 driver, a Taylor Made R15 three-wood and a set of Titleist irons. I use a Scotty Cameron putter.

Q: What's the best advice you could give someone who wants to improve their game?

A: You've got to get the basics right. Nearly

every player is good at one part of the game but if you're going to be good you've got to have at least three of the four covered (driving, iron play, chipping and putting). It's also important, especially for kids, not to put too much pressure on yourself and don't hold on to mistakes - move straight on to the next shot.

Q: Finally, what's on your golfing bucket list?

A: I'd love to see Brooks Koepka or Henrik Stenson play. And if I could play any course in the world, it would definitely be St Andrew's. Augusta looks incredible but I just like the idea of links courses.

Crauford keeps on trucking

IT is a long way from the Gold Coast to the dirt roads of South Australia's Yorke Peninsula but that is where former Mount Burr premiership player Henry Crauford now finds himself.

Rather than kicking a football around he is carting bulk grain in a two-trailer road train for Maitland Freight and seems to be enjoying the experience.

Crauford was picked up by Essendon in the pre-season supplemental selection period but never had a chance to play much football, being locked in a hub for the 2020 AFL season, with practice games the only opportunities which presented.

Having waited for the club to decide his fate, with list numbers reduced by the AFL, Crauford was told would not be needed in 2021.

But far from being deterred, Crauford said he would still like to have another try at league football, with the SANFL the logical choice.

"I love footy so I will have another crack at it," he said.

"I have spent the last couple of months with (Essendon) saying I should be right, then with a few weeks to go they said they don't have room for me.

"They went from 44 list numbers to 38 I think which was a bit of a bummer.

"But I will keep playing footy regardless. "I reckon I will have a go at SANFL probably."

Crauford was also unable to make his league debut at Norwood, with rib injuries preventing him playing at the top level in 2019.

In a way he has a score to settle.

"I didn't play any VFL either so I still haven't played league football," Crauford said.

"I have been up here for two years and haven't had a crack.

"It would be nice to at least play a few games."

Crauford said the whole AFL experience was interesting, with the COVID-19 pandemic changing the whole structure.

He found himself playing 15-a-side games with players from other clubs such as Richmond and Carlton mixed in.

While there was plenty of help available to develop his game, having not played since the SANFL reserves grand final it was a tough scenario, considering he went to Melbourne with the hope to play AFL football.

"We stayed at the hub at the RACV Royal Pines on the Gold Coast," Crauford said.

"It doesn't sound that tough and it wasn't - we got looked after pretty well.

"It doesn't sound too bad sitting by the pool but after a couple of weeks I was get-

ting a bit tired of it."

For now Crauford has returned to his roots, driving trucks and enjoying life.

He carts barley, wheat and lentils around the peninsula which was meant to be a short-term option but he certainly seems to like where he is currently at.

"The plan was I was going to be here for another week then head back over to Melbourne," Crauford said.

"Now that has all fallen in a heap I will probably stay here for a couple of months, maybe until Christmas, then go home and work out what I will do with footy."

In fact, Crauford said football was one of the last things on his mind at the moment.

"I'm having a ball doing this," he said.

"I don't really want to think about football - I just want to chill out and have a bit fun up here."

The current job harks back to the family business, with Crauford's father owning a freight company.

He grew up around trucks and said it is like slotting back in at home - but a bit warmer.

The company he works for recently featured on a McDonalds television advertisement, with a dog and a Kenworth truck the two heroes of the video clip.

The company, the truck and the location seem to sit well with the big ruckman.

"I am working for them for the next cou-

ple of months driving this big Kenworth around and I love it," he said.

"We are flat out at the moment, driving from Port Wakefield and Ardrossan, cruising over to Dublin south of Port Wakefield to the silos.

"Port Victoria is a nice place - they have a good pub that makes nice pizzas.

"Every Sunday when we get a chance we go there and all the farmers go there and we have a few beers and a pizza.

"They are small country towns, big wide paddocks, dirt roads everywhere, it's cool - I like it up here."

One issue Crauford does now face is finding suitable work so he can again face his football dreams.

"I can stay up here and do this as long as I like but I can't play SANFL and keep driving this truck, which is a bit of a bummer," he said.

"They might get a bit mad if I pull a road train up on the Norwood Parade."

Crauford described the recent years chasing football as a whirlwind, from school, an apprenticeship, Mount Burr football to Adelaide, on to the Gold Coast and now back down to South Australia.

"I just pack everything in the back of the Holden ute and keep moving my life around," he said.

"It would be nice to have a decent crack at league football, so hopefully I get another chance one day."

Close inks new deal at the Cattery

FORMER Limestone Coast footballer Brad Close is set to continue in the AFL as a Cat, after Geelong this week announced they have signed him on for another season.

The ex-North Gambier footballer played eight games for the Cats in season 2020 and booted his first goal in dramatic style in his debut game against the Fremantle Dockers.

In atrocious conditions, in the first min-

ute of play, Close took a mark inside the 50-metre arc and went back to slot the goal.

Jubilant followed as he joined just a handful of players to achieve the feat in their debut games.

In fact, only seven players have scored a major quicker on debut than Close.

In his short AFL career to date there was no shortage of praise for the small forward

from commentators calling the games.

Close was listed as an emergency throughout the Cats' finals campaign but did not manage to take the field.

Geelong general manager of football Simon Lloyd said Close played well as a forward and the club believed he had a good future at AFL level.

"He will continue to develop his game

through his strong drive and professionalism and we look forward to seeing Brad further enhance his game in 2021," he said.

Close will line up alongside ex-GWS forward Jeremy Cameron in 2021.

The former Giant hails from Dartmoor and has strong family ties to the Limestone Coast.

Tough call: Fight on hold

DWYERS Boxing Gym had to make the tough call last week to postpone its championships for the second time this year due to the COVID-19 restrictions recently placed on the state.

The South Australian government closed down all sport last week until December 1 and despite the December 5 date for the championships falling outside the time frame, the gym stated the health and safety of the community took precedence.

Gym owner Sam Dwyer said it was a disappointing outcome but in the middle of a pandemic it was hard to plan the event.

"The first time around was a bit of a surprise - we weren't prepared for it," he said.

"This time with everything going on there were a whole bunch of contingent factor, which is why we left it so late to postpone."

One of those factors was whether or not the Victorian boxers could cross the border to compete in an event touted as SA v Victoria.

"It looked for a few days like we could get the fighters across the border," Dwyer said.

"Then obviously to be able to run the event safely was a factor.

"I thought we were in the clear and I don't think anyone really expected this to happen."

The championships have not been cancelled, but simply postponed, which leaves a window for early next year to run the night.

That will depend largely on Boxing SA as to space on the 2021 calendar, but Dwyer is hopeful it can go ahead early in the year.

"Because it is a Boxing SA sanctioned event we have to wait for them to do their calendar," he said.

"They will want to do state titles and

they have events from this year such as club championships they have to organise.

"Hopefully we can do it in the first or early

in the second quarter."

While the Victorian fighters may still be stifled by border restrictions, Dwyer said that

Passion for wings fuels speedway desire

A PASSION for all things with wings led Mount Gambier speedway driver Ryan Harry to the ranks of the Formula 500 category.

Harry was formerly driving a Datsun Sunny in the Junior Sedans class, but now at 19 years of age decided to step up to something which fueled his desires to run fast on the clay ovals in the region.

It was a logical step to take considering the budget required to run a sprint car and a good learning opportunity after his stint in the sedans.

Harry used his hard-earned cash to pay for the car and is keen to extract as much fun out of it as he can.

"I have always liked things with wings," he said.

"Sprint cars was a bit out of the budget and this came up in Adelaide so I bought it."

His first taste behind the wheel in race conditions saw the young driver head up to Murray Bridge, with a few teething problems, but nothing which concerned Harry too much.

"We had a few issues which didn't go quite our way," he said.

"The first heat we snapped a chain and broke a few things, then we got it back out for the final and had a good solid run.

"I started keeping up with some quicker cars which was good.

"Now I'm just keen to get out and do some laps to get used to the car and go from there."

With the recent coronavirus lockdowns in the state his next opportunity - at home at the Borderline Speedway - would have happened this weekend.

Unfortunately that meeting was cancelled so Harry will have to wait to put his experience back into action.

However, that first race meeting gave the young driver the chance to try some different things with the car, which the Datsun did not have available.

That in itself threw up plenty of challenges, as the car runs a fuel injected Yamaha 600cc motorcycle engine, with chain drive to the rear axle and some adjustments to play around with in order to run fast.

Harry said the whole car is much different to drive and the required a bit of extra input to extract the most out of it on the track.

"Compared to the Datsun it is a lot different," he said.

"There is a lot less room for a start and the motor is right next to you.

"The way the cars are set up is a lot different and the steering is a lot more responsive.

"Obviously they are a lot quicker too."

The wings on the Formula 500s work as they do on a sprint car.

The faster you drive, the better they hang on, with the down force and side force working to keep the car upright.

Harry said he noticed that during the first meeting.

"At the start I was fairly cautious, then as I got a bit more comfortable I was driving it harder," he said.

"Because of the wings it doesn't feel like you are going to go over as much because you have that force pushing up against the wings."

Harry said his mother and father are "pretty excited" about his latest venture, with the small family team working together to keep the car on track.

However, the majority of car set up is up to Harry himself.

"Most of the work I have done myself," he said.

"I followed Formula 500 around for a couple of seasons with a couple of mates before

I bought this and learnt a heap about the car setups.

"I have been teaching mum and dad as we go.

"Compared to the Datsun there are so many things you can change setup-wise to make the car better.

"It is a big learning curve for us.

"The car is very quick so we just have to make the right choices with the suspension - half a turn in the wrong corner can change the whole car.

"I have it fairly under control but as I get quicker I will keep learning more things and keep making the car better to suit me."

With sprint cars out of the budget and plenty to learn for the young driver, it appears his choice to run a Formula 500 is a wise one.

While Harry said he would love to drive a sprint car at some stage if the opportunity arose, for now he is happy running around in his Formula 500, with a couple of simple goals in mind.

"I just want to be competitive really and mix it up with the quick guys," he said.

"And have some fun really.

"I will probably run in this for a while - it is pretty much what I wanted to do."
