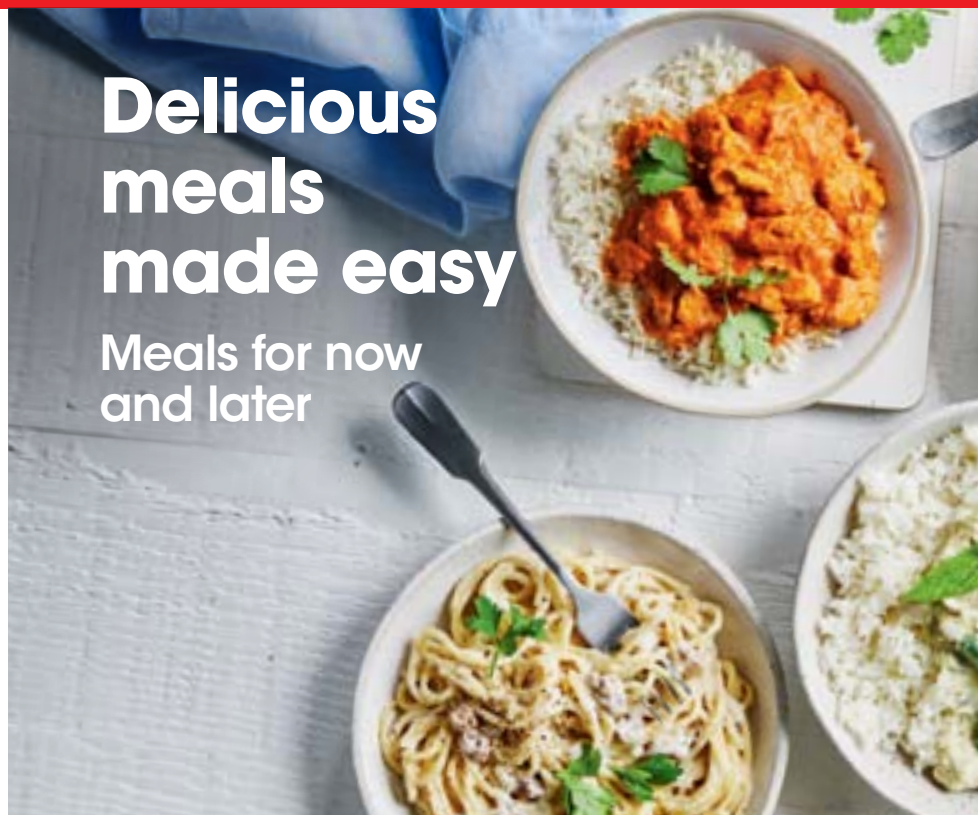

## Forestry sale plan

A FORESTRY plantation spanning two states will be marketed for sale in what is poised to be the largest forestry deal in more than a decade.

Forestry investment giant Global Forest Partners LP has put its Green Triangle Forest Products softwood business - which has a freehold land area of almost 25,000ha - up for sale.

The company is currently owned by investment funds, which are advised by US-headquartered Global Forest Partners LP, and managed in Mount Gambier.

Resolute Advisory has been engaged by the company to run a competitive auction process for the plantation in what is shaping up to be the biggest sale in the region since the privatisation of the South Australian in 2012.

Resolute Advisory managing director Michail Lagogiannis did not outline the rationale of the sale beyond saying investors who have been involved in the business had been there for a long time and "decided to realise their investment and exit".

# 'Hell to pay', Bell warns State

MEMBER for Mount Gambier Troy Bell's frustration over lingering COVID-19 restrictions blew up into anger this week, with the independent warning the State Government "will have hell to pay" if density restrictions are not reversed.

Anger poured off the crossbench as the independent MP told the chamber some businesses will not survive the new year if the one person per four square metre ruling was not immediately overturned.

Although majority of restrictions imposed during the South Australian lockdown have been lifted, the indoor gathering density remains at one person per four square metres.

The relaxation of the density requirement is planned for December 14, but Mr Bell urged the government to immediately revert to the one person per two square metre or risk widespread closures and job losses.

A visibly enraged Mr Bell described the restrictions as being implemented "by stealth" and said had resulted in a devastating cascading effect where bookings have been cancelled.

"[Victorian Premier] Dan Andrews saw the

difference in Victoria between regional Victoria and metro areas of that state," he said.

"Yet this government has imposed the same restrictions for the COVID-19 cluster on the Mount Gambier business community.

"The government need to understand that they are not on JobKeeper, that they are suffering, that their people are not employed.

"There is no safety net for them; they are hurting.

"If they do not make this change I tell you what, this government is going to have hell to pay come the next state election because businesses will go under."

Mr Bell said the proposed date was too late for the region's hospitality and business sector, who have expressed concerns they will not survive the Christmas period.

"There is no guarantee that 14 December is going to be the date when things return to the one person per two square metres," he said.

"I fear that we cannot delay in making a decision that, if this one person per four square metres is not immediately overturned, we are going to see businesses particularly in the hospitality and restaurant sector of the Limestone Coast not being able to survive past Christmas."

Mr Bell urged the government to pressure

the highly-credentialed Transition Committee to reinstate the post-lockdown density requirements and provide businesses with a change to survive during the Summer months.

"The Christmas period... is when you make your money in hospitality and entertainment," Mr Bell said.

"The rest of the time in Mount Gambier the weather is not as favourable for making money in the hospitality sector.

"You make money over the three-month period.

"For the other nine months, you break even, or in some months you make a loss.

"If this is taken away from them, I am very fearful of what is going to happen to my hospitality and restaurant sector in Mount Gambier."

Mr Bell's backlash against the restrictions follows outcry from Liberal MP Nick McBride on his government's hard lockdown, who last week said the snap closure had exacerbated the challenge for businesses to rebuild following months of closure and restrictions.

He lashed the Transition Committee for not balancing health and economic outcomes in the decision to shut down the state.

"All these people making this decisions, locking down our state do not suffer one day

lost wages, no loss of income... and they have no relationship with the small business sector," Mr McBride said.

"They have basically been hung out to dry again because of this tough lockdown which has turned out to be a mistake."

During the lockdown, Mount Gambier mayor Lynette Martin told Sky News although the hard lockdown "did seem an overreaction", the community "seemed very happy to be compliant".

The former Chamber of Commerce chair acknowledged the restrictions had resulted in an economic cost to business, but the early end to the lockdown would ensure businesses were back to a better space sooner.

"Throughout the whole pandemic, we have followed the instructions of the Federal and State Government, health and SAPOL, so we were happy to follow the latest restrictions," she said.

"Yes it does seem an overreaction given we are some 450km from Adelaide, but you just never know when someone could land here and expose us.

"We have had a really good outcome from the pandemic, we have only had three positive cases in the early stages and the community seemed very happy to be compliant."

## Struggling city business says 'let us play'

TREEHOUSE Adventure Centre owners Stewart Owen and David Walker are frustrated, confused and losing tens of thousands of dollars due to State Government-imposed COVID-19 business restriction, with the indoor playground sitting dormant for the second time this year.

The Mount Gambier children's entertainment complex was forced to close in March for three months just days after launching the revamped Penola Road site, which has now remained closed since the latest restrictions came into effect on November 16.

Mr Walker estimates around \$30,000 to \$40,000 of income had been lost in the last fortnight, expecting that figure to climb as the peak summer holiday period starts.

While the business had hoped to open as restrictions eased on Tuesday, Mr Walker said those hopes were dashed Monday night when the COVID-19 management

plan arrived, outlining their facility was unable to operate.

While the cafe portion of the business can continue under health guidelines, the play equipment remains off-limits, which Mr Walker labelled as an insult.

"It is pretty devastating to be honest, especially so close to Christmas," Mr Walker said.

"We were under the impression we would be recommencing trading from Tuesday to find out at 9pm the night before, we were not allowed to resume.

"You look at how many cases are coming in - we are being penalised for that. I don't see how they (State Government) can justify it."

Also operating Kaboom Family Entertainment bowling alley, Mr Walker said the duo had invested a significant amount of money into the region's entertainment sector and were committed to serving the community.

"As much as I don't like to be selfish,

we are well away from Adelaide and not anywhere near the Parafield Cluster and I think the government really needs to step it up and answer as to why our industry is being singled out," Mr Walker said.

"It is no different to coming to a facility like this than attending school. Kids have contact in school, they sit on top of one another and no one has control over what they do.

"We clean our facility, we've followed the guidelines set this year through SA Health and we are still not able to trade.

"If anyone else tells me to ring the COVID-19 hotline, I think I am just going to pull my hair out because they do not know what's going on."

With ambitious plans to expand put on hold, Mr Walker thanked the community for their support and hoped things would return to normal as soon as possible.

Kaboom Family Entertainment bowling alley has resumed trading at a 50pc capacity due to being classified as a sporting facility.

## Agricultural shows boost

LIMESTONE Coast agricultural shows and field days cancelled in 2020 due to COVID-19 will share in almost \$215,000 in Federal Funding to boost hopes they can go ahead next year.

The Mount Gambier Agricultural and Horticultural Society and the South East Field Days Lucindale will receive \$70,000 each to help ensure the event can bounce back in 2021.

The Millicent Agricultural, Horticultural and Pastoral Society and the Naracoorte Pastoral and Agricultural Society will receive \$15,000 each, \$10,000 will flow to the Keith and Tintinara District Show Society, while almost \$8000 has been allocated to the Penola Show.

Across the region, Kingstons will receive close to \$9000, Bordertown Spring Festival and Show and Mil Lel Show has been allocated \$5800 and the Coonalpyn Show will receive \$6400.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said the first payments under the Supporting Agricultural Shows and Field Days program will roll out before Christmas.

"Two months ago, the government launched this package to reimburse eligible costs for shows and field days who had to cancel because of COVID-19," Mr Pasin said.

"The government is keen to ensure show societies and field day organisers are in the best shape possible to continue in 2021.

"These events bring our families and farmers together, build community spirit and help bridge the divide between country and city."

Mr Pasin said shows and field days were uniquely Australian and provide huge economic spin-offs for local communities as well as opportunities for the businesses and services who exhibit.

"They also help to maintain our farmers' competitive edge by providing an outlet for new ideas, new technologies and new ways of working to be shared," Mr Pasin said.

"I am very pleased events in my electorate of Barker are able to access this funding to help get them through this tough period and out the other side in a sound position to help them with their planning for 2021.

"Next year is looking so much brighter and I know this support will be fantastic boost for our volunteers, families and school kids."

LOOKING local won't just help you beat unprecedented demand on the nation's postal service this month but importantly deliver a economic boost to Limestone Coast retailers following a year full of closures, restrictions and hardship.

The Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce is urging all Limestone Coast residents to support their local community and purchase Christmas gifts and supplies to end 2020 on a high.

It comes as Australia Post prepares to deliver an estimated 7.5 million more parcels across the nation this month compared to the same time last year.

While understanding of the freedom of choice, Mount Gambier Chamber of Commerce president Hayley Neumann encouraged people to shop in the Limestone Coast where possible this year.

"We have so many amazing places to shop. Every dollar you spend here in town plays a huge role in the economy and sometimes is unique to the rest of Australia as well," Ms Neumann said.

"Each dollar is spread far and wide, our retailers provide support to the community in many ways so it is time to give back to them.

"If we want them around, we need to shop in them. We don't want them to leave. Let's support them and keep them going."

Ms Neumann said there was always going to be the pressure of online shopping, but online stores did not have the same amount of outgoing costs as storefronts.

"They are able to offer a bigger discount that unfortunately the bricks and mortar stores can't give," she said.

"They can give some, but not as much. But, if you buy online, your dollar is gone from the community so let's shop here.

"Instead of buying online, there's nothing wrong with buying a physical gift and shipping it off. You know exactly what you're getting and what you're gifting.

"Buy it here, wrap and fill it with love, then send it off to your friends and relatives."

DJ Interiors store owner Christine Try said she had noticed Christmas shopping had started slightly earlier this year and had seen

many people out and about.

"A lot of people are taking advantage of the good weather and are getting in early because of the COVID-19 restrictions and knowing the postal services may be a bit under pressure," Ms Try said.

"All stores in town have so much to offer and you are really helping the local economy, whether it is buying a card or something more expensive.

"Anything you can do to help in whatever shop really helps the business community in Mount Gambier."

Australia Post offices, including Kingston and Robe, are offering extended trading hours

to offer customers more choice and convenience ahead of Christmas.

For national delivery, Australia Post South Australia and Western Australia general manager Donna Vecchio said she encouraged people wanting to ship gifts to family and friends to do so no later than December 12 or before December 19 through Express Post for items to be received in time before Christmas.

Ms Vecchio said traditionally the next few months were the organisation's busiest period of the year and she expected it would break records.

"The onset of the pandemic brought with

it an unprecedented demand for parcels and we have had periods where we've been experiencing delays but with the easing of restrictions in Victoria we've seen a lot of improvement," she said.

"While the vast majority of parcels are arriving on time, given these are our busiest times ever, there may be some delays and we're asking customers for their patience as our dedicated people work tirelessly to get their letters and parcels to them.

"We're encouraging our customers to send their presents as early as they can, so their letters and parcels have the best chance of arriving in time for Christmas."

Forestry investment giant Global Forest Partners LP has put its Green Triangle Forest Products softwood business - which has a freehold land area of almost 25,000ha - up for sale.

The company is currently owned by investment funds, which are advised by US-headquartered Global Forest Partners LP, and managed in Mount Gambier.

Resolute Advisory has been engaged by the company to run a competitive auction process for the planation in what is shaping up to be the biggest sale in the region since the privatisation of the South Australian in 2012.

Resolute Advisory managing director Michail Lagogiannis said the primarily domestic-focussed forestry operation generated strong cash flows and predominately supplies well-established customers in the region.

Mr Lagogiannis did not outline the rationale of the sale beyond saying investors who have been involved in the business had been there for a long time and "decided to realise

their investment and exit".

He said there was no relation between China's ban on timber and the sale, with moves to divest the estate well advanced before the suspension of wood from Victoria.

"Exports make up less than 15pc of the business and are probably shrinking now given the China development," Mr Lagogiannis said.

"Green Triangle Forest Product is very much focused on supplying the very high quality sawmills and other customers who are local.

"The Chinese ban is quite a recent development and this decision has been coming for a while - it is not related to that."

Mr Lagogiannis said in addition to generating strong cash flows from the forestry operation, the business also has the potential to generate material rental revenue through a proposed wind farm development.

He said the wind farm development, which is currently in its advanced feasibility stage, was expected to operate in close proximity to the electricity grid and provide key customers with rental requirements.

"You don't need to do anything dramatic to change the businesses performance as it is

already extremely well managed," Mr Lagogiannis said.

"It has a very good management team based in Mount Gambier who have done an excellent job for many years and we think people will be attracted to that."

The company directly and indirectly employs approximately 80 people in the Mount Gambier region.

In a statement the company said it has a strong domestic focus, predominately supplying well-established customers in the region that serve the Australian market.

Green Triangle Forest Products managing director Laurie Hein committed to ensuring the continuation of business through the sale process.

"We appreciate that this may potentially create some uncertainty for those involved with Green Triangle Forest Products," he said. "Green Triangle Forest Products is a high-quality, sustainable business with strong values.

"It will be business as usual for our team throughout this process to ensure we continue to deliver our usual high standards for our customers and other key partners."

## Christmas off at Millicent

THE Millicent Business Community Association (MBCA) has cancelled its planned Christmas event Seasonal Cheer in the Square due to COVID-19.

The event, scheduled for December 18 was established as a substitute to the annual Lights Up in the Domain.

Association chairperson Lee Morgan said that keeping the community safe was the primary concern of the committee, adding it was too risky to have a public event at this time.

Mr Morgan said the committee planned to hold the event at the car park between the Bargain Market and Foster's Foodland, with a crowd limit of 300.

"However, the statewide lockdown meant more uncertainty in regards as to whether we could meet the Covid-19 safe requirements for public gatherings, so the committee took the logical, but difficult step, to cancel the event."

The Millicent Business Community Association will support the Millicent Christmas Lights Spectacular: Business Light Display Competition, with businesses decorating shop windows.

The association's 'Make Millicent Magnificent' Christmas raffle will launch shortly and will provide individuals with an opportunity to win vouchers for local businesses.

The group hoped to bring back the Lights Up Christmas event next year, as well as host the 10th annual Outstanding Business Awards, continue the Millicent Mile event and revive Business at Sunset events.

## Naracoorte hub moves forward

A PROPOSED multi-million dollar, multi-use sporting complex for Naracoorte is one step closer to development after elected members supported a \$50,000 allocation for further design work.

At Tuesday night's meeting, councillors voted in favour of the funding, which will allow council staff to engage consultants to undertake preliminary works at the Stewart Terrace site.

A land survey and geo-technical data work will be undertaken, as well as concept design work including floor plan lay out, 3D modelling, elevation design and functionality of floor space and usage of areas.

The proposed \$20m, eight-year project will include the installation of a multi-use sports stadium, comprising of four netball and basketball courts, five squash courts, combined sports clubrooms for basketball, netball, AFL and tennis, program pool, seating, a canteen and a function space.

The football oval will be upgraded to a regional level facility and include goal post and lighting upgrades, as well as the installation of a new interchange and umpires box.

Upgrades to the basketball, hockey, football, tennis, netball, squash, soccer and angling clubs have been floated as part of the \$20m project, including a major overhaul of the town's ageing basketball stadium.

Under the masterplan, the existing hockey clubrooms will be expanded to include new unisex changerooms and storage while the soccer clubrooms will be redevelopment to provide universally accessible toilets.

## Bordertown health service bolstered

THOUSANDS of Limestone Coast residents and allied health professionals will benefit from a \$2m Community Health Connect Building at Bordertown Memorial Hospital.

The multi-million dollar investment will deliver a newly-built, 500sqm facility to provide a permanent home for community health and replace the ageing existing Community Health Building.

Health and Wellbeing Minister Stephen Wade said the new building will deliver a contemporary facility to deliver community-based health services to Bordertown and surrounding districts.

Mr Wade said the new building will ensure health professionals and specialists travelling from Mount Gambier and other centres have the best possible space to deliver services to the community.

He said the building will be designed and constructed using tradespeople from across the region, with the design phase expected to start mid-2021.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network chief executive officer Ngaire Buchanan said the facility will provide a valuable health asset and allow health services to be delivered in one centralised location.

"Patients will be able to access services such as dietetics, occupational therapy, physiotherapy, podiatry, social work and speech pathology all under one roof in a modern fit-for purpose environment that will continue to encourage good health within the community," she said.

"It is extremely important that we continue to deliver allied health services to our community locally to ensure that residents

do not have to travel long distances to access everyday health care.

"We are looking forward to sharing this exciting project with the community and committed to improving our infrastructure to support and boost allied health services in the region."

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride welcomed the funding, saying the current facility had passed its used by date and was in desperate need of an upgrade.

"Our regional community's deserve high quality care, facilities and services," he said.

# Millicent stalwarts are missed

A STRONG response to a collective trauma session in Millicent has prompted another support activity in the wake of a devastating car crash which claimed the lives of three members of one of the town's most loved families.

The tight-knit community has been left devastated by the tragic loss of beloved stalwarts Ned and Nan Walker and daughter Sue Skeer in a crash on the Princes Highway on Saturday.

In response to the unimaginable tragedy, Red Cross volunteers trained in responding to collective trauma provided a community outreach program at Acky's Deli in George Street, Millicent.

Red Cross Limestone Coast regional services manager David Walshaw said more sessions - including a presence in the town following the funerals - were currently being developed in response to the strong uptake of the community outreach program.

Mr Walshaw said the psychological first aid sessions aimed to help community members affected by the traumatic event feel safe, reduce initial distress, promote flexible coping and encourage adjustment.

He said the support activity was based on the understanding that people affected by the accident will experience a range of physical,

psychological, emotional and behavioural reactions that may interfere with their ability to cope.

"Millicent is only a small community and one of the tragic things about it is that you tend to know everyone, so when they things like this happen, it can really overwhelm us," Mr Walshaw said.

"You can never do it alone, you need that connectedness around you, you need people supporting you, equally you need to be supporting them and that's where that strength in solitary comes.

"For the Red Cross, it was about telling people they are not alone, we are all in this together and we all need each other to help pull our community back together.

"We want people to help support one another through practical ways and through psychological first aid.

"When you go home, make sure you talk about these things with your family and that you have some good supports around you."

Mr Walshaw said distress, anxiety and negative psychosocial reactions were normal, understandable and healthy responses following a traumatic event.

"People are angry, anxious, distressed, or they might have trouble sleeping, and these are all normal reactions.

"That will take some time for it to go away.

"We want to help people understand and manage their emotional reactions and make them understand that what they are experiencing is normal."

Mr Walshaw urged community members to demonstrate empathy for not only those who had died and their families, but also for the five other individuals involved in the accident.

The 16-year-old driver of the other vehicle was charged with death by dangerous driving on Sunday and was bailed to appear in the Mount Gambier Youth Court in February.

"We want to call for kindness and solidarity with those who may be targeted in the wake of that event," Mr Walshaw said.

"But importantly, we want people to stay calm and look out for one another because that is how communities heal.

"We are asking people to look out for those who might be on their own or distressed about it and recognise that is common to have a range of reactions after an event like this."

Mr Walshaw said planning was underway for another session in Beachport in coming days, with the organisation scheduled to provide a presence in the town following the funerals.

"People who have gone to the funeral might be feeling quite distressed about it while on

their way home because these things tend to fade a little before it rekindles again," he said.

"I am asking if we can stand up and support those people heading home."

Tributes are flowing to remember the contribution of the three Millicent identities to the sporting community, all of whom were staunch supporters of Mid South East football and netball league.

The league's Walker Medal for the A Grade best and fairest runner-up was first awarded in 1978 and is in memory of Mr Walker's father Rex, with the Walker family awarding the medal to recipients at the annual presentation night.

Mr Walker started his football career with Mount Burr in 1955 as a 13-year-old playing A Grade, securing his first A Grade premiership in 1959.

In later years the Walkers passionately followed Tantanoola, while Ms Skeer was an integral member of the Hatherleigh Football and Netball Club.

Flags flew at half mast at the Millicent Bowling Club in memory of the trio, while flowers were laid at the Millicent Racing Club to honour the prominent racing identities.

## Foodbank demand in region hits a high

FOODBANK Mount Gambier is working hard to deliver essential items to the region's most vulnerable this festive season despite major disruptions during its busiest time of the year.

The not-for-profit organisation recently entered its peak season, working around the clock to distribute hundreds of kilos of food and a shipment of over 500 Christmas hampers which recently arrived at the warehouse.

The branch has 30 volunteers who help disperse food and items right across the Limestone Coast.

This year alone, the hub has distributed more than 380,000 meals and branch manager Lynne Neshoda said service demand continued to grow.

Ms Neshoda said last month's "circuit-breaker" three-day lockdown had created an extra week of work for the hub and meant Christmas plans had to be put on hold for a short period.

"We had around 110 BHP hampers and

fruit and veg packed on the Wednesday (November 18) which were meant to be distributed on Thursday to schools. We didn't know what to do with them," she said.

"It wasn't necessarily the hampers we worried about, but more so the fruit and veg we had packed.

"We ended up giving away a whole lot more to anyone who visited the hub during lockdown.

"On Monday (November 23), everything went back to normal and we had to repack everything again and reschedule routines for it to all be sent out."

The Mount Gambier branch along with all other South Australia warehouses, were still open during lockdown as Foodbank is considered an essential service.

Ms Neshoda said before lockdown, she planned to also organise a Christmas delivery schedule, but was still trying to find time to organise that process.

"I also had eight pallet bins of fruit and veg due Friday, which still came, but I didn't know where I was going to put it," she said.

"I spent most of my Friday on the phone to different agencies just trying to work

out how we were going to get the food out. Even though we were in lockdown, people were still hungry.

"I just guess we're glad and lucky the state got back up and running again quickly."

Ms Neshoda said Christmas was sometimes the most difficult period for many and even more so this year due to COVID-19.

"We are hearing from a lot of families, they just do not know what they're going to do," she said.

"How can they tell their child they are not going to get anything from Santa, that's pretty tough. There are more and more families who are struggling due to COVID-19, not having work or hit with bigger electricity bills as people are working or spending more time at home.

"Right across the board, numbers are rising, a lot of university students, migrants and many others."

The hub recently announced it had acquired its Cave Road premises after receiving \$200,000 worth of Federal Government funding, \$322,000 from generous community donations and \$29,000 provided by

Foodbank South Australia.

The acquisition meant the building could be upgraded, with development of a new cool room and freezer recently installed to expand its storage space, now having the ability to hold up to 90,000 kilograms of food, as well as renovations including painting and installation of hot water.

"Foodbank needed to acquire the property to be able to further upgrade the infrastructure to support food security activities," Member for Barker Tony Pasin said.

"This funding has helped to make this a reality so the invaluable service can support more people in need.

"Whether it is catastrophic bushfires or the COVID-19 pandemic, Foodbank is always there for people in need and this project will allow for them to expand and help even more Australians."

Foodbank Mount Gambier will be holding its annual Christmas canned food drive at the Mount Gambier Marketplace on Saturday and Coles Mount Gambier will have a drop-off bin at its opening on December 9.

# Police future uncertain

THE regional police review cited by the State Government as determining the future of the Kalangadoo Police Station is complete Police Commissioner Grant Stevens has confirmed, but no decision on the future of the station has been made.

Labor parliamentarian Clare Scriven quizzed Comm Stevens about regional policing and the long-running Kalangadoo issue at a parliamentary committee, with the state's most senior police officer saying the implementation has been delayed because of COVID-19.

Comm Stevens told the committee South Australian Police had undertaken significant work to identify a proposed model ensuring the "appropriate level of service delivery to regional communities" comprising of 54 additional positions.

"It's not a model for approval by government," he said.

"If we were to seek funding for those position then we would submit a business case on that basis, but the manner in which we deploy policing resources in South Australia is at my discretion."

The Kalangadoo Police Station has not been staffed following the departure of the town's sole officer more than four years ago.

Prior to the 2018 state election, then Shadow Police Minister Stephan Knoll committed to retaining the single officer station, saying the Liberal Party had "absolutely no plans to close any police station".

But almost three years since the State Liberals were elected the station remains closed, with patrols from Penola and Millicent responsible for servicing the Kalangadoo area.

Comm Stevens was unable to provide an answer about when a decision on the future of

the station will be made, saying part of the regional policing review was to critically assess the needs and requirements of all country police stations.

He said police were also investigating how to implement the plan by reassessing priorities and reallocating staff, but progress had been hampered by the coronavirus pandemic.

"Given the fact that we are deploying in the order of 450 to 550 extra police to COVID-19 duties, we have simply put that project on the backburner," Comm Stevens said.

Comm Stevens said a report had been released for consultation, but there had been no further activity as a result of SA Police's COVID-19 response.

"Until we know the capacity we have to undertake some of those non-core policing activities and re-divert some of those resources we have dedicated to COVID-19, it's not possible to speculate when we could commence that work again," he said.

"We do as much as we can to maintain a focus on traditional policing activi-

ties and ensuring that we are positioned to maintain the high level of service we provide to the South Australian community, but there are some concessions that must be made because of our significant commitment to COVID."

Ms Scriven told The Border Watch it was disappointing the Liberals had not honoured the pre-election pledge to retain a permanent police presence at Kalangadoo.

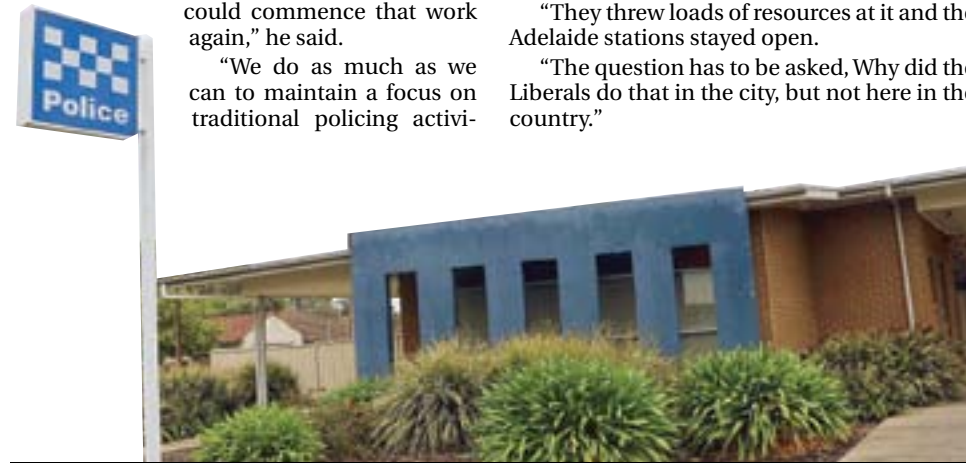
"Reopening Kalangadoo Police Station was a clear Liberal promise, independent of the ongoing Country Policing Review which is yet to make any recommendations," she said.

"It is a promise they knew they couldn't keep and have no intention of keeping.

"The Commissioner has confirmed that 'the manner in which [he] deploys [sic] policing resources in South Australia is at [his] discretion.'" "Yet the Liberals bent over backwards to extend the station hours in Adelaide.

"They threw loads of resources at it and the Adelaide stations stayed open.

"The question has to be asked, Why did the Liberals do that in the city, but not here in the country."

## Costs queried

COSTS incurred by Councillor Kate Amoroso to attend a mental health conference in Melbourne has come under the spotlight following a request by an elected member at the November council meeting.

Cr Max Bruins submitted a question on notice seeking information about the total cost to council, including travel, accommodation and attendance, incurred by Cr Amoroso to attend the National Local Government Councillors Mental Health Conference in Melbourne on October 11, 2019.

He cited a resolution passed in September 2019, which elected members supported Cr Amoroso's request to attend the conference, with all associated travel costs - which was revealed to be \$403.15 - to be borne by council.

A second question without notice by Cr Bruins referred to Cr Amoroso's failure to provide a report to council and asked if any attempts had been made to repay the costs associated with her attendance at the conference.

The question was taken on notice, with a response expected to be tabled at the December council meeting.

In the September 2019 report, a staff report noted attendance at the conference in Melbourne would incur airfares, airport transfers and potential accommodation costs for up to two nights.

Staff said costs had not been obtained pending determination by council to support the requests.

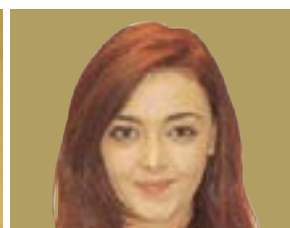

# Tourism hotspot forced to shut

THE former Blue Lake Welcome Centre operator is frustrated and disappointed no "reasonable explanation" has been given as to why Mount Gambier City Council has decided to not extend the business lease at the prominent location.

Aquifer Tours owners and managers Trish and Garry Turner were informed in August by City Council its John Watson Drive business lease would not be renewed, which was subject to a confidential report.

In a statement issued earlier this week, council said the property management agreement ended one month before the 21-year head licence between SA Water and council for the Crown Land site expired on December 31, meaning the local government body had no valid tenure to extend the current tenancy arrangements.

It ends almost 30 years of service to Mount Gambier's tourism sector by the Turners, who closed their doors on November 30 following an outpouring of support from customers, with the positive response leaving them heartbroken and angry.

Launched in 1991, the Turners started their operation in a small hut on the corner of Bay Road and John Watson Drive to cater for tourists, providing tours of the Blue Lake Pump Station and a small hospitality business.

In 2004, the Blue Lake Welcome Centre building was established and opened with the Turners investing \$100,000 as official funding partners.

Mr Turner said it was a tough and strenuous process to have the storefront developed and stakeholders were at odds over the years.

"This situation is an absolute disgrace, there will now be nowhere for people to sit and enjoy a cold drink, people to buy tickets for tours and I just can't believe it," he said.

"I guess I'm also slightly disappointed because we've been working with these bodies for almost three decades and we haven't been given a reasonable explanation.

"It makes me cross as we are funding partners and in a way the component which really made things happen and yet there has been no negotiation or discussion at any level."

Winning dozens of tourism awards over the years, Mr Turner said the public was stamping its feet and people were voluntarily coming out and sharing their opinion on multiple platforms.

"My problem is I feel like I have done a lot of things right...If they had such a problem, come up and see us, we were free to chat seven days a week," he said.

Mr and Ms Turner thanked all visitors and customers over the years and are preparing for a break over the peak tourism season.

Tours plan to continue once COVID-19 restrictions allow.

Council acting chief executive Barbara Cernovskis said given council was yet to secure further tenure over the perimeter area of the Blue Lake beyond December 31, it was not able to offer an extension of the current arrangements.

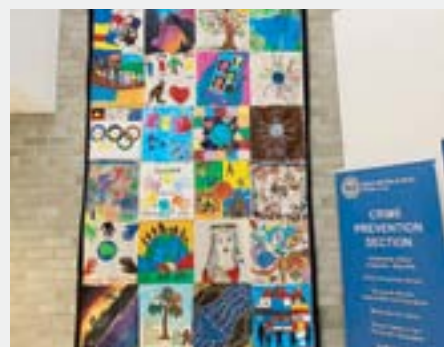
The groups had between October 12 and November 13 to design and finish their artwork.

## Funds released to help region

THE Stand Like Stone Foundation has awarded over \$115,000 in grants for 21 community-led projects that will help support the region.

Projects are varied and include helping with food support and essential personal supplies, through to driver education for regional students and improvements for community facilities in Allendale East, Penola and Naracoorte to name a few.

# Children given reading freedom

THE GIFT of literacy has been received by hundreds of Limestone Coast students across the region through the Books in Homes initiative.

The educational project aims to encourage children to read and build up a home library by allowing them to select and keep books of choice, many from Australian authors and illustrators.

Now in its sixth year, the Mount Gambier Library, Rotary Club of Mount Gambier, Department of Education and Child Development and sole contributor Julian Mattay have provided more than \$26,000, which has purchased more than 3000 books for 800 children.

Melaleuca Park Primary School received this year's final donation of books during a recent celebratory event held at the Cave Gardens.

Library children's services development coordinator Kelly Lynch said the main benefit of Books in Homes was students were able to create a positive association with books and reading.

"The gift of literacy is truly important and I believe it is the most important way of learning and acquiring knowledge, especially for younger kids," Ms Lynch said.

"Young picture books promote an interest in reading and also hopefully en-

courages them to read into the future."

Ms Lynch said reading a physical book was much more beneficial than from a digital device.

"When reading off a device, they are not receiving the same attention as they might with their caregiver and a book.

"You also can't use the imagination as much as if the pictures are right there in front of you, which normally isn't happening on a device.

"A physical book allows the child's brain to develop and use their imagination more so than reading off a device."

Melaleuca Park Primary School teacher Vanessa Maxwell said children reading a digital screen may become distracted with other features.

"Lots of these children do not have books at home and it is something their parents may have not always valued," she said.

"I believe a book is a wonderful experience, they can share it with their families and can sit and listen together.

"They can cuddle up with a story, if you have a device you are more inclined to play the device and not read."

Ms Maxwell said since the Books in Homes program first began, the school had implemented reading into the classroom in many ways.

"The children are all excited they can read those books and are really happy to go home and show their parents," she said.

"We do a lot of author studies, look at books from the same author, look at what is similar with all the books, the pictures, if they're similar of different and much more.

"If they have read them already, in their spare time during class they can always come and revisit them which is also beneficial."

This initiative directly supports the City Council's Charter for Children.

## HomeBuilder scheme granted extension to meet high demand

ELIGIBLE HomeBuilder grant applicants will now have six months to start construction of their new home or renovation from the date of the contract being signed.

A blanket three-month extension has been granted and follows last week's three day lockdown in which housing construction activity was stopped.

South Australian Treasurer Rob Lucas said while he had written to the Federal Government seeking the extension, the Commissioner of State Taxation had exercised power under the First Home and Housing Construction Grants Act 2000 to grant the

blanket extension.

Mr Lucas said the extension will help alleviate pressure on the industry to meet growing demand for the scheme.

"HomeBuilder is a powerful shot in the arm for our state's critical housing and construction sector, which supports thousands of local jobs - from carpenters, plumbers and bricklayers to electricians, architects and other suppliers," he said.

"We know this program is already going gangbusters, with hundreds of applications already received and hundreds more ex-

pected by the end of the year."

HomeBuilder provides eligible owner-occupiers - including first home buyers - with a grant of \$25,000 to build a new home or substantially renovate an existing home.

More than 2330 applications for the \$25,000 HomeBuilder Grant received by the State Government, with Mr Lucas expecting hundreds more by the end of the year.

Under the scheme, contracts must be signed between June 4 and December 31 this year and construction now must start within six months of the contract date.

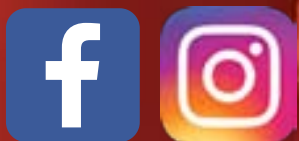

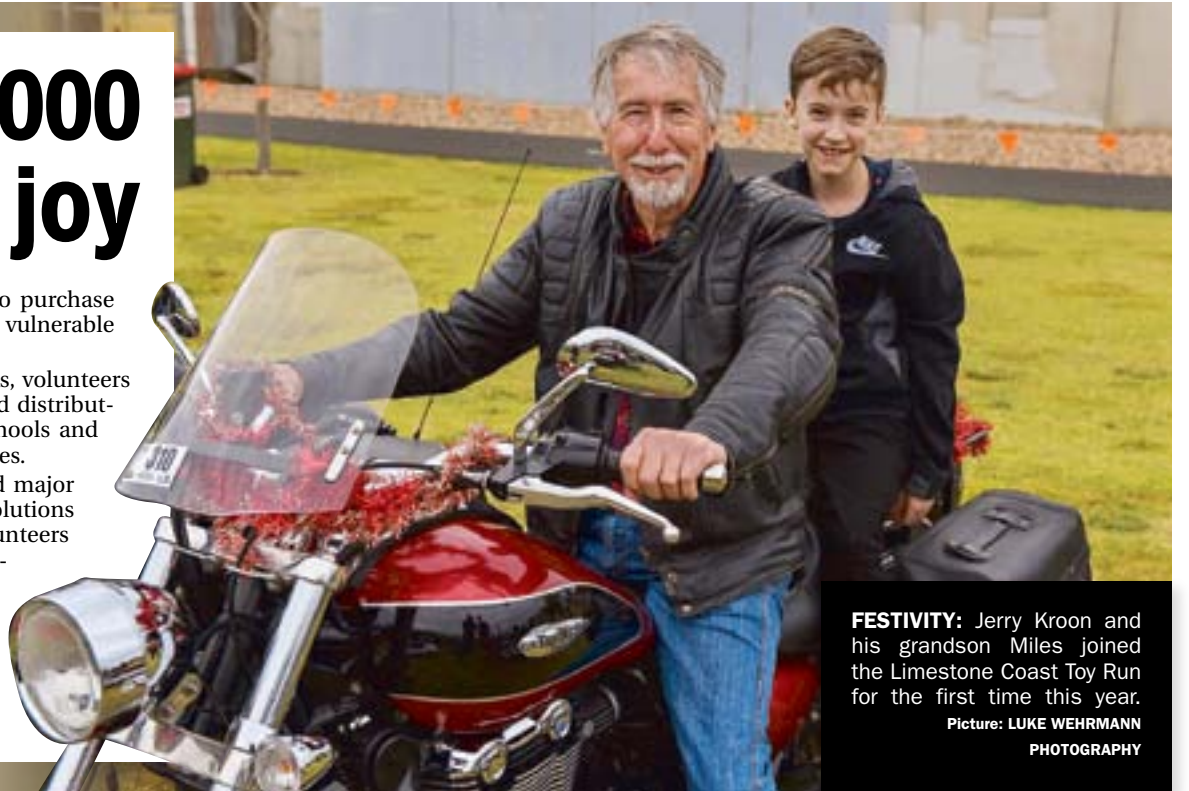

## New heavy vehicle entry

HEAVY vehicle drivers can now choose how they record their work and rest hours, with the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator approving the first Electronic Work Diaries (EWD).

The electronic recording system rollout started Tuesday with the NHVR approving the method as a voluntary alternative to a Written Work Diary, which is used to record a driver's work and rest times.

Federal Member for Barker Tony Pasin said moving to and investing in EWD's was an investment in employee safety and better productivity.

"We know that the transport industry is managing excessive amounts of work diary paperwork and this is resulting in inefficiencies and lower productivity," Mr Pasin said.

"The Morrison-McCormack Government wants to see more freight moving, a safer more productive industry - and less red tape.

"EWD's puts a greater focus on managing driver fatigue, rather than managing the book - that is an important step in improving safety for the trucking and transport industry."

The work diary has been a requirement for fatigue-related heavy vehicles for more than half a century, and today more than 200,000 Written Work Diaries are used by heavy vehicle drivers each year.

The EWD Policy Framework and Standards were developed in association with technology providers, transport operators, police and transport authorities in 2018 and were subject to comprehensive review and consultation.

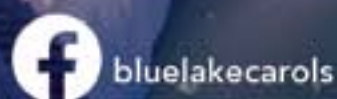
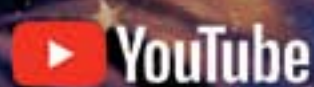

# Intriguing artefact find

A MYSTERIOUS shipwrecked artefact is the latest addition to the Glenelg Shire's Cultural Collection, with an intriguing path ahead for its conservation process.

A wooden "deadeye" is the most recent acquisition, found by local beach combers Carol and Daryll Cram earlier this year.

A deadeye was an item used in the standing and running rigging of traditional sailing ships and is a smallish round thick wooden disc, with one or more holes through it.

The mysterious item was found washed up on Murrell's Beach and is suspected to be dislodged from one of the few shipwrecks located around Cape Nelson and Cape Bridgewater.

Glenelg Shire Arts and Cultural manager Susie Lyons said there were strict guidelines ahead for the preservation of the item.

"We're pleased to welcome this very unique artefact to the Cultural Collection and we hope to preserve this fascinating story for generations to come," she said.

"A conservation plan has been initiated,

with a lengthy and delicate process ahead that requires the slow extraction of water to prevent the cracking of wood and damage due to shrinking.

"However, the first step in the conservation is quite an unusual one, with an X-Ray required to determine the presence of rope and any other hidden features or clues.

"We have recently undertaken the X-Ray thanks to the team at Portland District Health and their new digital machine, which has provided a clearer image of just what the deadeye is comprised of.

"With the X-Ray images now taken, we can provide this to an expert conservation team and ensure we implement a plan to preserve this item as best as possible.

"Following this, we hope to eventually share this artefact and its fascinating story with the community as part of a public exhibition."

The acquired deadeye will be registered under the Glenelg Shire Cultural Collection with the Australasian Underwater Cultural Heritage Database.

## Shire offers temporary free green waste pickup

DISPOSAL of lawn clippings, branches, weeds and overgrown vegetation will become free for Glenelg Shire residents as part of a new temporary initiative.

Council determined at its Tuesday night council meeting it would provide free green waste disposal for residents across all waste management facilities on the weekends of December 5/6 and 12/13.

Glenelg Shire Mayor Cr Anita Rank said council looked to find practical ways to assist property owners leading into the bushfire season.

"We have had an exceptional season in the Glenelg Shire, with high levels of rainfall and sunshine the volume of grass growth has been unparalleled," Cr Rank said.

"As a result, many residents are finding they have more grass and vegetation to clear on their property than previous years ahead of the bushfire season," she said.

Deputy Mayor Cr Karen Stephens, who moved a Notice of Motion to introduce the measure, said the initiative would be available at all shire waste management facilities, during normal operating hours over the two consecutive weekends.

"Whatever corner of the Glenelg Shire you live in there will be a waste management facility nearby, with Portland, Heywood, Casterton, Merino, Dartmoor and Nelson all boasting facilities," she said.

"We hope to see as many households as possible take advantage of this temporary initiative and ensure our community is as best prepared as possible in the event of a bushfire."

Residents will be required to provide personal identification with a Glenelg Shire address and/or Glenelg Shire Rate Notice.

## Ambulance team grows

"My local team at Port MacDonnell are amazing," Ms Williams said.

"Everyone looks out for each other and helps one another when they have any questions about a job or how something works."

"I absolutely love every minute of volunteering with SAAS - everyone at my local station are so friendly and from the day I started I felt like part of the team.

Ms Williams said the Port MacDonnell SAAS team was a family.

"Going into volunteering I had no idea what to expect," Ms Williams said.

"I never knew that volunteering at my local station would be so rewarding. You absolutely get as much out of it as you put in."

"We're all driven by our passion for volunteering and for the community," Ms Gower added.

"We always try to do a lot of social functions to thank our families and each other for the ongoing support."

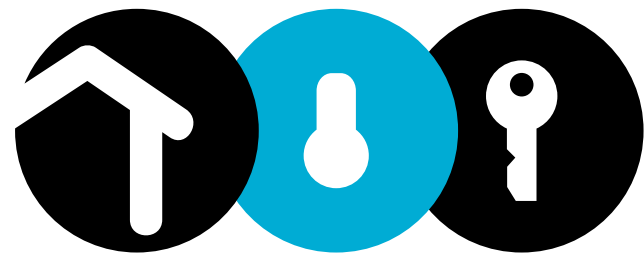

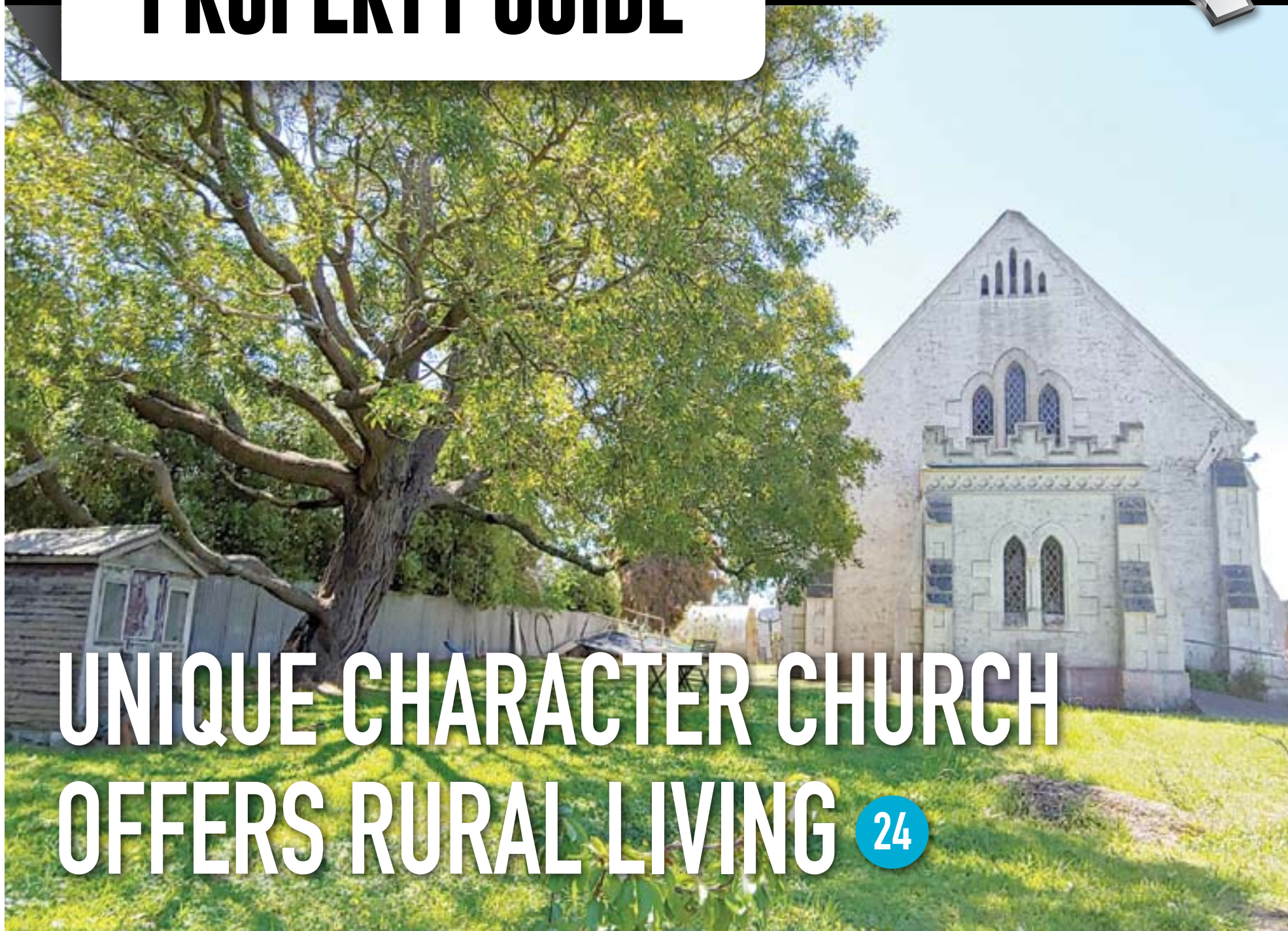

Most above ground pools are made from steel or resin and often have a vinyl interior. Depending on the model, you may have one that tolerates freshwater or one that does well with chlorinated saltwater. Some above ground pool packages come supplied with everything needed to set up a working pool, from pumps to filters and even ladders and decks.

## Portable pools

Those with restricted space in your backyard won't have to miss out on having a pool thanks to the portable pool. It's versatile and suitable for most gardens, so long as you have flat ground and access to water.

The range of sizes and shapes make portable pools fantastic for pool parties and for families with kids. Plus, they're also easy to put away when not in use.

worry about storage nor having a fixed pool in your backyard.

Inflatable pools are often made from durable plastic that can last for a long time. They come with cartridge filter pumps that keep the water clean and safe from bacteria.

## Kids' pools

For those who only want to buy a pool just for the young ones, getting a kids pool is your best option. Specifically made for kids, the design means shallow water that provides enough space for splashing, some paddling, and having a good time.

Some kids pool models are even big enough to cater for the whole family to sit in. It is strongly advised that you supervise your child at all times when in or around a pool, no matter the size.

## Leake family history explored in new book

A NEW book sharing intimate details about the Leake family and Glencoe district will be published following a \$5000 boost from the History Trust of South Australia.

The funds will help authors John Berger and Carol Grbich - both National Trust of SA volunteers - self-publish the historical book *The Accidental Heiress - Journey of a Glencoe squatter's daughter*.

The book revolves around the Leake family, which was one of the first settlers in south-east South Australia in 1844.

The Leake family established the Glencoe Station, which the last remaining part today is the Glencoe Woolshed.

After a nasty court case, Letitia Sarah Leake, the daughter of squatter Edward Leake, became the sole beneficiary to the estate.

Ms Grbich said the engaging, accessible book was about a really fascinating family and had everything - "lust, murder and huge amounts of money".

"We have this beautiful old Woolshed but we didn't really have a lot of information. It was on boards but nobody really read them," Ms Grbich said of the inspiration.

"We thought let's look at the family and see who they were. The further we delved, the more exotic it became," she said.

"We followed it and came across the

young daughter who inherited this huge fortune of about \$25m and we followed her life.

"There was a nasty court case, the family got vicious.

"Very wealthy men were clamoring from all over Australia trying to persuade her to marry them. She left the country, ended up living in Big Manor, in England, and ended up buying land all around the world."

Letitia ended up donating an English estate - Harefield Park - to the Australian Government during World War 1 and it became the first hospital overseas for the ANZACs.

The authors have spent the last two years researching this story with the help from others who started previously and will now publish their work thanks to the South Australian History Fund grant, awarded by the History Trust of South Australia.

Trust chief executive Greg Mackie OAM said the History Trust of SA was dedicated to building the evidence of South Australia's rich and fascinating past and making it accessible to all.

"Supporting the extensive community history network and researchers to explore and present South Australia's unique stories is at the heart of the South Australian History Fund and is a key aspect of the History Trust of South Australia 'giving the past a future - now,'" he said.

The fund supports community and indi-

vidual projects, publications and research that contribute to the knowledge, understanding and sharing of South Australia's rich history, by providing up to \$5000 from a total grant fund of about \$70,000 annually.

The next deadline is mid-2021.

The Asaki tops off the expanded Mazda CX-8 range with technology and safety upgrades.



# CX-8 SPREADS SUV WINGS

THE new Mazda CX-8 is the vehicle for which the phrase 'middle of the road' (or dirt track) was coined. The sports utility vehicle slots in mid-range between the CX-5 and CX-9 with ease while offering diesel power to the mix.

Now with eight variants, the entry-level CX-8 Sport petrol front-wheel drive comes in below 40 grand (just) at \$39,910, plus on-road costs, while the halo is carried by the Asaki diesel all-wheel drive at \$65,440. The latter was the test car.

The latest upgrade for 2020, the second since its entry to the market in 2018, the even-seat SUV has been given added appeal to customers who look no further than the bitumen with a new 2.5-litre efficient Skyactiv-G petrol engine joining the front-wheel drive variants.

The Skyactiv-D 2.2-litre diesel unit has been maintained in all-wheel drive models for those more adventurous owners wishing to go bush. This is made easier by the addition of Mazda's newly developed Off-Road Traction Assist to reduce wheel spin by distributing torque to the tyres with most grip.

The entire MY20 CX-8 model range is backed by a five-year unlimited kilometre warranty and similar term Mazda Premium Roadside Assistance plan.

## STYLING

A refreshed key fob and new nameplate badging are among few changes with the latest Mazda CX-8.

While the whole range - Sport, Touring, GT and Asaki - offers similar looks characteristic of the seven-seat SUV, 19-inch alloy wheels and power automatic tailgate set the Asaki apart.

## INTERIOR

Those familiar with Mazda's layout of controls and instruments will feel at home in the latest CX-8 with minimum changes indoors. Genuine timber trim on doors and dash, and front seat ventilation set the Asaki apart from the rest of the range.

However, one stand-out feature of the test Asaki, not in the most attractive way, was the leather upholstery. The white colour of the test vehicle stuff was an assault on the eyes and would be a bugger to keep clean.

There's no lack of space for occupants with an electric sunroof emphasising the open feeling in the cabin.

Work by engineers has improved noise, vibration and harshness quality by adding more damping material to the roof.

## INFOTAINMENT

As well as the 8-inch full-colour dashboard

display there's a 7-inch multi-information meter and head-up windscreen display. Apple Carplay and Android Auto are standard.

The Asaki also boasts a Bose Premium 273W amplifier and ten speakers, including subwoofer.

## ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The latest 2.5-litre petrol engines are limited to front-wheel drive variants, while the carried-over 2.2-litre four-cylinder twin-turbo-charged diesel motor with i-Stop, mated with a six-speed automatic, transmission serves the rest of the range.

## SAFETY

A top-rate ANCAP safety score comes care of blind spot monitoring, lane departure warning, lane keeping assist, rear cross-traffic alert and traffic sign recognition.

Thrown in are an advanced version of Smart City Brake Support with added nighttime pedestrian protection plus larger eight-inch central dashboard display with bigger icons for easier recognition.

## DRIVING

Compared with many of the modern diesel motors doing the rounds, the carried-over 2.2 litre of the CX-8 Asaki was noisy. The stop / start engine system also was not the best, with a jolt at times when re-engaging.

Fuel consumption claimed by the maker for the 2.2 diesel on the combined urban / highway cycle is 6 litres per 100 kilometres. The test vehicle recorded 8.5 litres per 100 and 4.5 litres per 100, respectively in the suburb and on the open road.

Third row leg room is limited but the middle row can be shoved forward to add space for longer legs.

Getting in and out of the third row has been made easier with the addition of a one-touch switch on the left and right sides of the second-row cushions for the seats to fold down.

Third-row occupants can take advantage of two 2.5A USB power points, making it possible to charge smartphones and other devices from any seat. Parking can be made with confidence thanks to a 360-degree view all-round camera.

At 209 litres, there's cramped cargo room with all seats in operation. With third-row seating ditched space blows out to 742 litres. The Asaki AWD can pull up to 2000 kg and has a 750 kg unbraked towing capacity.

## SUMMING UP

Mazda continues to tweak its extensive SUV cohort with the MY20 CX-8. There's a model to suit most lifestyles and budgets. The range-topping Asaki wants for almost nothing in its segment.

"We've also included a mention of the Penola Acoustic Music Festival, which kicks off next year in March."

Ms Kain said she thought it was important for children to understand how vegetables were grown and where food came from.

"The book focuses on carrots and fennel, the important role that worms play in the soil and the best way to help vegetables grow, while also promoting how volunteering can be fun," she said.

Petticoat Lane, which is maintained by the National Trust SA Penola branch, is a tourist attraction for the community, featuring numerous 19th century cottages and historical links.

# Cattle numbers rise at Glenburnie sale

## MOUNT GAMBIER CATTLE - WEDNESDAY 1849 (276)

NUMBERS climbed as agents yarded 1849 head.

These sold to the usual large field of trade and processor buyers along with feeder orders while the reintroduction of vendors has led to an increase in restocker support.

Quality was generally good across the offering with some large weights among the bullock pens however the market followed trends seen across other sales this week to sell to cheaper rates with some large falls in most areas.

Vealers were generally of good quality however falls here of 15c to 25c were seen as steers to the trade made from 332c to a high of 440c with similar heifers returning from 328c to 432c/kg as all of the heifer offering went to the trade.

Feeder orders operated on steers from 363c to 431c as restockers were active from 413c to 429c/kg.

Yearling steers to the trade fell by over 30c as they sold from 306c to 376c with similar heifers returning from 338c to 386c/kg.

Feeders sought steers from 306c to 415c and heifers made from 340c to 420c as restockers turned steers back out up to 385c/kg. Grown steers and bullocks eased by 10c to 15c as the heavier types sold from 295c to 356c with the lighter selection making up to 380c/kg.

Feeder orders operated here from 326c to 378c/kg.

Grown heifers to the trade made from 280c to 375c with feeders active from 358c to 371c as manufacturing steers returned from 220c to 308c/kg.

Heavy cows to the trade sold from 268c to 292c/kg.

The lighter types made from 205c to 267c with cows to feed selling from 245c to 258c as restockers sought supply from 255c to 278c/kg.

Bulls sold from 262c to 286c/kg.

## NARACOORTE CATTLE - TUESDAY 1270 (-338)

NUMBERS fell away as agents yarded 1270 head.

These sold to a larger field of trade and processor buyers with an extra Victorian trade buyer on the rail along with the usual feeder and restocker orders.

Quality wasn't as good this week and when combined with less demand from the buying group it led to a cheaper market with falls of 10c to 20c/kg common across the market.

Vealer numbers were small as steers to the trade sold from 412c to 418c with restocker support making from 385c to 441c/kg.

NUMBERS rose as agents yarded 12,742 lambs and 244 sheep to total 12,986 head overall.

These sold to the usual field of trade and processor buyers along with a number of active restockers looking for lambs to turn back out to the paddock.

## \$5m dairy fund open

# All steam ahead for a classic

FOR more than 40 years anglers have flocked to Kingston for the annual surf fishing competition.

Next year will be no different as registrations will open on January 1 for the 42nd instalment of the Kingston SE Lions Club event.

Registration points are scattered throughout the South East.

Big numbers are expected at next years competition, despite the COVID-19 pandemic.

In South Australia fishing has been one of few recreational activities which have not be adversely effected by the coronavirus outbreak.

Fishing chairman Lyle Griffin said the coronavirus restrictions had been taken into account and all was set for a big weekend, providing no adverse changes take place between now and then.

With that in mind and people starved of recreational activities, he said they expect a bumper field.

"The last couple of years we have had around 800 to 1000 fishing," Griffin said.

"There are quite a few people who reckon we might get a big entry - we are still working on the same amount - but you don't really know how many will sign up.

"I would be very surprised if we don't get up around the 900 mark."

Social distancing should not be a problem on the beach, with 87 kilometres to fish.

"The only problem we would have is back at the Lions Park for the weigh in," Griffin said.

"Most people are pretty good now, so if we can just spread them out on the lawn we should be right.

"When they weigh all the fish on Sunday morning everyone comes in to have a look, so we will have to police that to make sure everyone keeps moving.

"A lot of it is common sense really.

"The rules will change before then probably but we have the report from the health department and so far we are right."

With a prize pool up to \$25,000 it is no wonder so many anglers try their luck, apart from the chance to relax on the beach for a weekend of fishing.

This year's major prize for the biggest mulloway is a Clark 415 Magnum aluminium

boat with a flat carpeted floor and trailer, a Mercury 25hp four-stroke motor, safety gear, plus registration for both boat and trailer.

The package is valued at \$15,000 and is certainly worth the effort of wetting a line with a couple of mates.

Griffin has been in charge of the competition for around 12 years, with the highlight for him a bumper field of around 1200 anglers.

"If we average around 800 to 900 we have had a good weekend," he said.

"One year we had 1300 on our 40th anniversary, where we raffled off a lucky prize of a camper trailer.

"Everyone who registered had a ticket in the draw so it was a big field."

But fishing is a lot about luck as well as technique.

Griffin said sometime you have big weekends on the fish but sometimes they just don't bit.

"One year we didn't have enough fish to fill the trophies we had," he said.

"Our 40th anniversary we had a lot of fish.

"It is the luck of the draw.

"They are getting a lot of fish up there now so we will see what happens."

Griffin said early reports suggest anglers are keen.

"I dropped a poster down to Spot On Fishing in Mount Gambier and people were asking when registrations opened," he said.

"There is a lot of interest this year."

Registrations can be made at Spot On Fishing, Mount Gambier, Denton Sportswear, Millicent, Kingston Caltex Roadhouse, Mitre 10, Murray Bridge, Aqua Steel Industries, Naracorte, Swampy's Marine and Tackle, Kingston, Coorong Hotel Motel, Policeman Point, Mitre 10, Keith and Moors Thrifty-Link, Bordertown until January 22 at noon, then at the main registration centre in the Kingston Information Bay, Policeman Point and Kingston Caltex Roadhouse.

Online options are available for those who can not get into one of the physical outlets, but must be made two weeks before the start of the competition.

The senior section of the competition offers 20 prizes for mulloway and other scale fish, which includes the Clark tinny, along with 10 prizes for shark.

A junior section for anglers under 14 years of age has 10 prizes on offer.

All prizes are judged by weight.

Although there were no shark or mulloway landed, the anglers did manage some nice salmon and whiting between.

Garry Lawes took home the chocolates in the senior division and young Levi Hunter took out the juniors.

In other surf fishing news, there were some excellent fish caught last week from the Cororong.

Jake Holmes and crew headed up over the weekend and managed some nice mulloway between them.

The fish seem to be fairly spread out at the moment.

I know of some great fishing from just above the granites, through the 28, 32 and up to the fence.

It is an ever-changing place and a gutter can move virtually overnight, so knowing what you are looking for is definitely a big advantage.

A few anglers have been fishing Wrights Bay over the last few weeks.

There has been some big fish caught there around this time of year for the last several seasons, so it would not surprise me if we see some 50+ pound mulloway from that area.

The whiting fishos made the most of the stirred conditions last week.

I saw some nice fish caught from the inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater by the boaties fishing the sand holes.

Several have been over 40cm which is excellent to see.

I am still hearing of plenty of little whiting in there too which is encouraging, but fish

through them and you will find a nice feed.

Blackfellows Caves has fished well for the land-based angler, with some nice fish taken.

There are plenty of trevally, salmon trout, mullet and bream around in the same spots, so do not be surprised if you see a few of those around too.

The Port MacDonnell jetty has been fairly busy most nights recently.

We have seen some good squid numbers of an evening and around the lights has been excellent for tommy ruff, garfish and trevally.

The daytime has seen a few nice whiting caught in the sand holes you can reach, so that is a great option for the kids too.

Over the border I have had a few reports from guys fishing in Rocklands and catching some nice fish.

Trolling small stumpjumpers, Tassie devils or chatterbaits has been very effective for

those targeting trout, redfin and yellowbelly.

A few cod have been caught, but nothing legal just yet.

If you have never been to Rocklands before, it can be a bit overwhelming.

It is such a huge body of water and so many spots to fish, but the best advice I can give is to trust your sounder.

Keep on the search for fish and once you find them, often you will end up getting multiple from the one school.

I have seen a few nice catches of yabbies over the last week or so, but fishos have been very secretive with their locations.

Lake Cockatoo just north of Naracoorte is always a popular and productive area, but with the dwindling water level, it is becoming increasingly difficult to fish.

Throwing on your waders and going for a stroll is probably the easiest way, or head out in a kayak.

There are some nice reports from Victoria too but like most yabby hunters, they keep locations close to their chest.

The Glenelg River has fished fairly consistently this week, with plenty of bream and estuary perch caught.

Glenelg River gurus, Ben and Kahne Jeffrey boated some excellent fish between them over the weekend, with the cranka crab being their weapon of choice again this week.

Al Winterfield boated a dozen nice bream up river over the weekend and a couple of undersize mulloway.

It is good to see the fish spreading out a bit more now, hopefully in time for the silly season.

Looking forward to the weekend which looks a bit breezy at this stage, so we might be a bit restricted on what we can get up to.

Lucky we are spoilt for choice here in the South East.

Until next week, safe fishing.

# Dyna Carnie heads GOTY

GREYHOUND RACING

A SECOND placing behind Raw Luxury in last week's 400-metre Bourne Kennels Open Stake has resulted in Dyna Carnie picking up two valuable points and regaining the lead in the 2020 Mount Gambier Greyhound of the Year.

Owned by Tim Aloisi and Matt Lehman and trained at Allendale East by David Peckham, Dyna Carnie this year at Tara Raceway has recorded 12 wins, four seconds and three thirds for a total of 59 points, one clear of Perseverance.

Perseverance, who was unplaced behind Saint Maddie in the 512-metre Trakside Meats Open Stake, has accumulated 10 wins, seven seconds and four thirds for local owner Michael Robinson and Glencoe trainer Dean Fennell.

Peckham, yet to train a GOTY but owner of the 1988 winner Canunda Miss who was trained by his father Allen, said Dyna Carnie, a rising five-year-old, was likely to be retired early in the new year.

"With five Category 3 race meetings remaining at Tara Raceway this year I'll be looking to run him over either 400 metres or 512 metres," he said.

"Also, he's guaranteed a start in the 512-metre Tara Trackstar in early January and that may well be his last run.

"With an overall record of 30 wins, 34 minor placings and \$105,000 in stake-

money from 113 starts he's been a terrific dog.

"A win in the GOTY would certainly be a fitting end to his racing career."

Peckham has not ruled out the possibility of using Dyna Carnie as a sire.

The 32-kilogram black dog lacks nothing when it comes to breeding, by US sire Kelsos Fusileer out of Xylia Allen who won 40 races and more than \$740,000 in stake money.

Dyna Carnie and Perseverance's battle for GOTY honours is somewhat reminiscent to that of 2018 when Jeff Guy's Paraphernalia and Nicole Stanley's Oh No Beta battled it out in the final month of the year.

With only two meetings remaining, the pair was level on 61 points.

But in what could only be described as an "error of judgement" on the part of Guy, Paraphernalia was not nominated for the December 16 meeting.

This left the way clear for Oh No Beta who lined up a heat of the Santa Sprint.

Guy dodged a bullet, though, after Oh No Beta ran fifth and was relegated to the bench for the final on December 21.

Paraphernalia was back for that meeting and needed to run only a place to clinch the GOTY - a second placing giving him the award by two points.

For Stanley, it was a case of going desperately close to winning her third successive GOTY after Old Jock and Fiorelli Rose had previously been successful.

## Golly Gumdrops a likely cup contender

COMPTON trainer Tracie Price could well have another Christmas Cup contender on his hands judging by Golly Gumdrops' effort in last week's 512-metre Bartholomew Pick 6 Stake.

In Price's kennels for only a fortnight, the black bitch was having her first start on the track when rounding up Saint Caitlin off the back before going on to a 7¼ lengths win in a best of day time of 29.92 seconds.

The win was the third leg of a treble for Price - his 12th at Tara Raceway this year - after Compton Peggy and Raw Luxury had been successful earlier in the day.

By Worm Burner out of Psychotic Gold, a winner of 18 races and \$76,000 in stake money, Golly Gumdrops is raced by the Rovers Return Syndicate which is managed by leading Adelaide trainer Petar Jovanovic.

Price, who won the 2014 Christmas Cup with Who's Doing What and again the following year with Fear The Rascal, said Golly Gumdrops, a winner of eight races at Angle Park and Gawler prior to relocating to the south-east, appeared to be appreciating a change of track and surroundings.

Local owner Kerry Hawker enjoyed another win with Cadillac Prince, a son of Unlawful Entry and Proud Fantasy she purchased as a pup from Pyramid Hill breeder John Caulfield.

Trained at Edenhope by Cap Abbott, the blue dog settled in third spot mid-race in the Greyhound-Data.com Stake over 512 metres before taking over off the back and eventually running out a 4¾ lengths winner over the consistent High Fly Emma in 30.30 seconds.

This was Cadillac Prince's first success over the 512-metre journey since an operation for cryptorchidism in a bid to rectify his problem in negotiating two-turn tracks.

His other two wins had been over 390 metres at Warrnambool and 400 metres at Tara Raceway.

Speaking after the race, Hawker said Caulfield was closely following the progress of Cadillac Prince and Abbott's Another Pick who is a litter sister.

"John's always on the phone after a win," she said.

"He's genuinely pleased for us and I think that's nice."

A couple of races later, Mauritian Rascal, out of the winner's circle since March, went close to causing a real bolover for Hawker and Abbott when leading for a long way in the 400-metre Greg Martlew Autos Stake before going down by 1¾ lengths to Midnight Daisy in 23.29 seconds.

In the past, Monarto South trainer Tony Hinrichsen had enjoyed plenty of successful days at Tara Raceway.

Last week did not start out that way, though.

In fact, such was the day that Rusty Fury did not even make it to the start in race 11 - the Metal Worx Stake over 400 metres - scratched prior to being placed in the boxes due to illness.

So, as far as Hinrichsen was concerned, it all came down to the final race, the 400-metre South Eastern Hotel Stake and Szubanski Fury, a \$101 winner at Murray Bridge two starts back.

But there was no \$101 on offer for Szubanski Fury in this race.

The brindle bitch jumped at \$2.15 and won like a short-priced favourite should when leading all the way for an 8½ lengths win over Dressed Up in 23.18 seconds.

All of a sudden the drive back to Monarto South had become a little shorter.

## Good news for local greyhound track

IT was good news earlier this week as far as the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club was concerned after Greyhound Racing SA announced it would be accepting nominations from all interstate trainers.

While cutting it fine for yesterday's meeting it meant Victorian trainers could nominate for Tara Raceway providing they made the 9am Monday deadline for nominations.

The accepting of all interstate nomina-

tions will go a long way towards the MGGRC returning to two meetings a week - on Thursdays and Sundays.

GRSA also announced non-essential persons and patrons were now allowed back on

course for all greyhound race meetings and trial sessions in SA and TAB operators have returned to all venues.

In more recent times, Bear Arms started to make a name for herself, especially on rain-affected tracks, with four wins in the past 15 months on local tracks.

Earlier in his career, Ned dabbled in the jumping game and Prince Of Diamonds won five races over the hurdles in this region in the mid 1990's.

You could write a book on what Ned got up to as he ventured through life and he never lacked any front as this following story will illustrate.

Around seven years ago, Ned took a couple of horses to race at the Oakbank carnival over Easter.

He decided to make it a mini holiday by taking quite a few family members along and they camped at the back of the Oakbank racecourse.

I met up with Ned on Easter Saturday at the races and he suggested I meet him in the member's enclosure and join him for a drink in the committee room after race three.

Generally, the only people who go into the committee room are the winning owners after each race who are invited into the inner sanctum by a committee member.

Oakbank, well known for its upper crust hierarchy over the years, have always been very particular as to who congregates in its shrine.

Ned's horse failed to win that day but, true to his word, he was there to usher me past the security personnel into the committee room where, I was surprised to find, all of Ned's camping entourage had already gathered.

We had a drink in the beautiful old room - which must be close to being heritage listed - before I thanked Ned and went to leave.

"Don't rush off, stay and have a couple more," Ned urged.

Curiosity got the better of me and I asked Ned who had invited him into the committee room.

"I invited myself," Ned answered without batting an eyelid, adding "I figured that as I had brought a couple of runners up here to race, plus we are camping out the back for a few days and spending money locally, the least the club could do was shout us all a few drinks."

Ned was not a big punter but seldom did a Walker trained runner go around without Ned having a wager.

He loved bantering with bookmakers and his forthright approach ensured he got the best odds on the planet about his runners.

If his horse was a \$5 chance, Ned would demand - not request - at least \$8 or better from the bookie.

"Because he was such a nice fella, most times he got the odds he wanted," Mount Gambier bookmaker Darren Guthridge confessed.

"He would always have at least \$5 on his horse but if he pulled out a pineapple (\$50 note) you knew he was pretty confident."

The Walker's racing colours flag (white and yellow) has fluttered at half mast on the flagpole at the stables near the Millicent airport since the tragedy.

### TAKING GIANT STRIDES

TO say the Belinda O'Loughlin trained galloper Black Syrah has come a long way in a short space of time is an understatement.

Back in early June the gelding won his maiden at Casterton and last Saturday chalked up his fifth win at start number 11.

That was at his first start in Adelaide after winning in the interim at Gawler, Bordertown and Penola.

The four year old is unbeaten at both runs this time in work, putting the writing on the wall for a promising campaign by coming from last at the 300-metre mark to win in BM 68 grade at Penola four weeks ago.

Taking the next step up to BM 72 grade in the city was another big test for Black Syrah last weekend and he passed with flying colours to take his career earnings to \$71,914.

For his 20 owners around Mount Gambier and up in the Riverland, he has already turned out to be a bargain buy.

"It's looking better all the time," delighted trainer Belinda O'Loughlin told the media post race in reference to the gelding's pur-

chase price of \$12,000 at the Adelaide Magic Millions sales.

"He has a great turn of foot and it was a pretty ride by Caitlin (Jones)."

Black Syrah was always steady in the market at around the \$6 quote and the win gave Jones a winning treble in as many races.

### BACK FROM A SPELL IN STYLE

FORMER Victorian galloper Heir Of Tavistock found the right place to win his first race since joining the Richard Wilson stable earlier this year.

That was at metropolitan level last week on the Morphettville Parks circuit when the five-year-old gelding led from pillar to post in the 1550-metre BM 64 handicap.

Although it was conducted on a Wednesday, the meeting held Saturday status after the meeting was transferred from the previous Saturday due to the COVID lock down.

At his first campaign for Wilson earlier this year, Heir Of Tavistock did not show the form that had seen him win three races in Victoria and, in one run, was a well-beaten \$1.35 favourite in a race at Bordertown.

"When we got him, he had been in work a long time and he had probably had enough racing," Wilson explained.

Heir Of Tavistock won a trial at Penola in October and resumed this current campaign with a fifth in Adelaide followed by a third at Penola last month.

With the benefit of those two runs, Wilson headed to town where, to the delight of his big band of more than 20 owners, Heir Of Tavistock (\$7-\$6.50) delivered the goods.

After being seriously challenged by Exalted Traveller half way up the straight, Heir Of Tavistock rallied strongly for apprentice Jessica Eaton to score by a long neck.

"He will go back to Adelaide for a 1500-metre BM 68 race on December 11," Wilson said.

It has been a good 12 months for Wilson at city level, having won two metropolitan races at Gawler last summer with the ill fated Pickelhaube.

Prior to that, his last city winner was Rocky Camp way back in 2010.

### FLEW THE FLAG FOR THE LOCALS

IT would not be a Southern Cross series each year at Globe Derby without strong input from South East pacers.

Sixteen locals headed to town last Saturday to compete in the heats and one locally trained pacer came home with the spoils.

That was the Kevin Von Duve trained Springfield Affair (\$2.80), who made it three wins from his past five starts in taking out a heat for two-year-old colts and geldings.

A good Gaita Pullicino drive saw Springfield Affair end up in the one-one sit and he finished too strongly for the odds-on favourite Major Reason.

The Andrew Clarke owned Urbadboy, these days trained by Kelvin Barker, looked the goods in winning his heat for three-year-old colts and geldings.

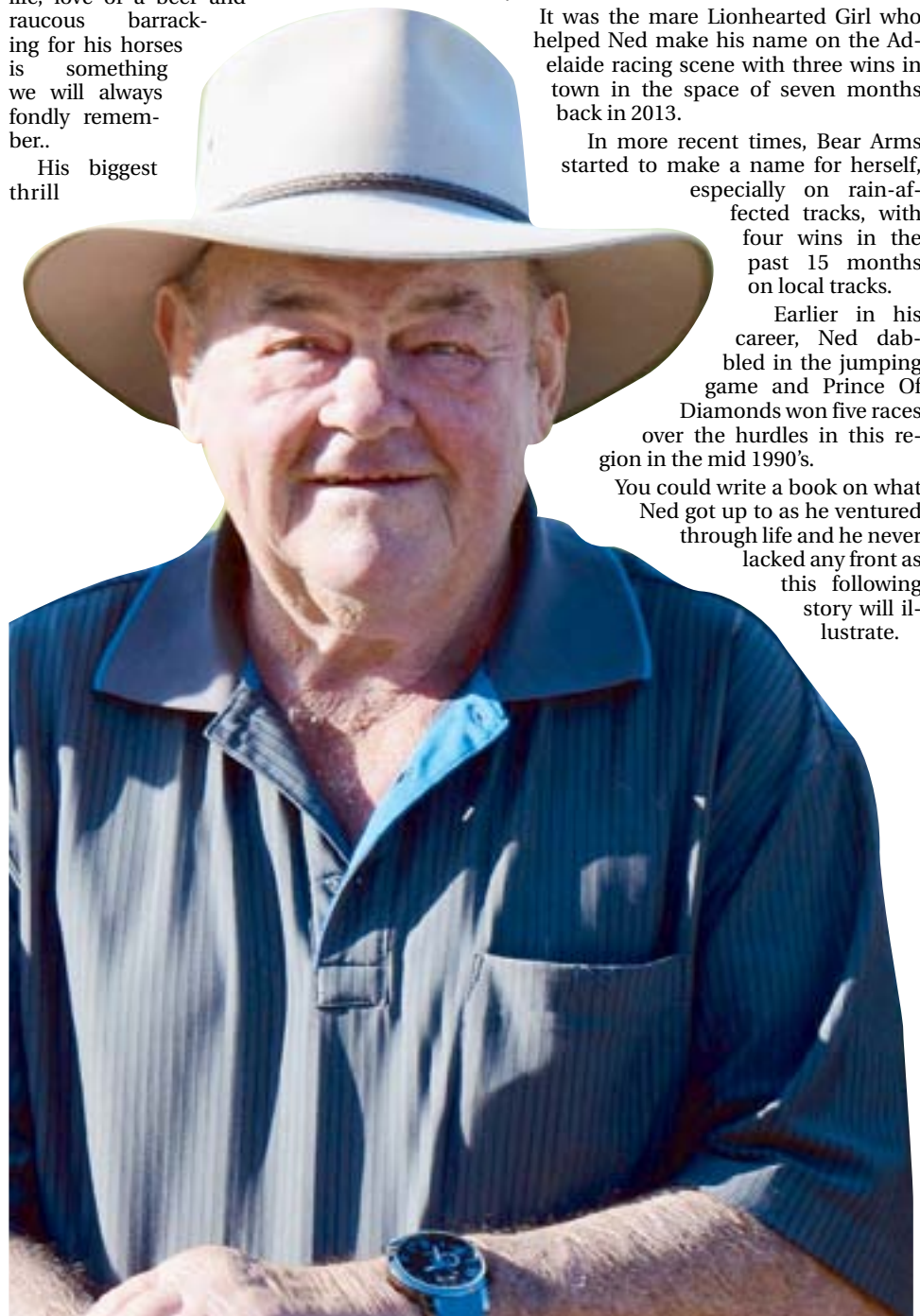
On Monday, Allendale East trainer David Kemp had success at Globe Derby with Star Of Courage (\$1.55 fav.) in the NR47-54 pace.

DISC golfers will descend on the Valley Lakes on Sunday to compete in a virtual national competition.

The Aussie Disc Golf Day pits players from around the country against each other on their own courses.

The day was original planned for the Mount Gambier Disc Golf Club on November 21 but with the COVID-19 restrictions placed on the state it had to be postponed.

The club had up until December 14 to complete the day and now face another challenge.

Rounds will tee off at 12.30pm with a rush to ensure it is done in time but Weyers said he is not too concerned with the time constraints.

"The event has to be two rounds so we will have a mad push to try to fit it in," he said.

"It can be anywhere from two to three hours for a round but because of where we are in the world at the moment you have to make do and work forward.

"We have daylight savings on our side too so you can't complain about that."

SOCCER in the Limestone Coast will take on a new look next season with the news the South East Women's Football Association will be wound up.

The women's game will continue but under the guidance of the Limestone Coast Football Association, which runs the men's competition.

SEWFA was originally established in 2003 by Stuart and Nicky Burch, plus Nigel and Althea Ingel because of a lack of soccer in the city for women.

The change is a disappointing outcome for SEWFA president Frank Wilcox but one he said had to happen.

Wilcox said Football SA preferred one organisation to run the game in the region, rather than the two current entities.

"Ideally there should be just the single association for soccer here in the Mount," he said.

"That has been accepted and agreed on for a fair while.

"My understanding is we were one of the few regions in the country where we had two associations."

Wilcox said while it was disappointing for SEWFA, it was something which was necessary to keep the women on the park.

He said he expected the LCFA to have a women's director on their board, with interest from current SEWFA members to be elected.

He said overall he hoped everything ran smoothly during the transition for the good of women's soccer in the Limestone Coast.

"All the equipment with SEWFA will be used by LCFA for the girls," Wilcox said.

"We have a little bit of money in the bank which will be transferred to the LCFA

secretary and the women's director so it is only used for women's soccer.

"We have tried to do it the right way.

"The most important thing is to keep the girls on the park playing soccer."

LCFA CEO Eric Nieto believes the change is the best option for the sport in the region.

While he expected some extra work, he said much of that would fall on the clubs.

"We will have more registrations and finances to deal with but I think the clubs will incur the extra work with extra players," he said.

"I think the first year we will have a few hiccups and a few teething problems but I am sure in the long run it will be a good asset to the sport."

The LCFA will hold its AGM on Tuesday night where a new position will become available.

"We have changed one of our board positions and will have a women's director and a men's director," Nieto said.

"Our whole aim was to give the women as much exposure and equal rights as the men.

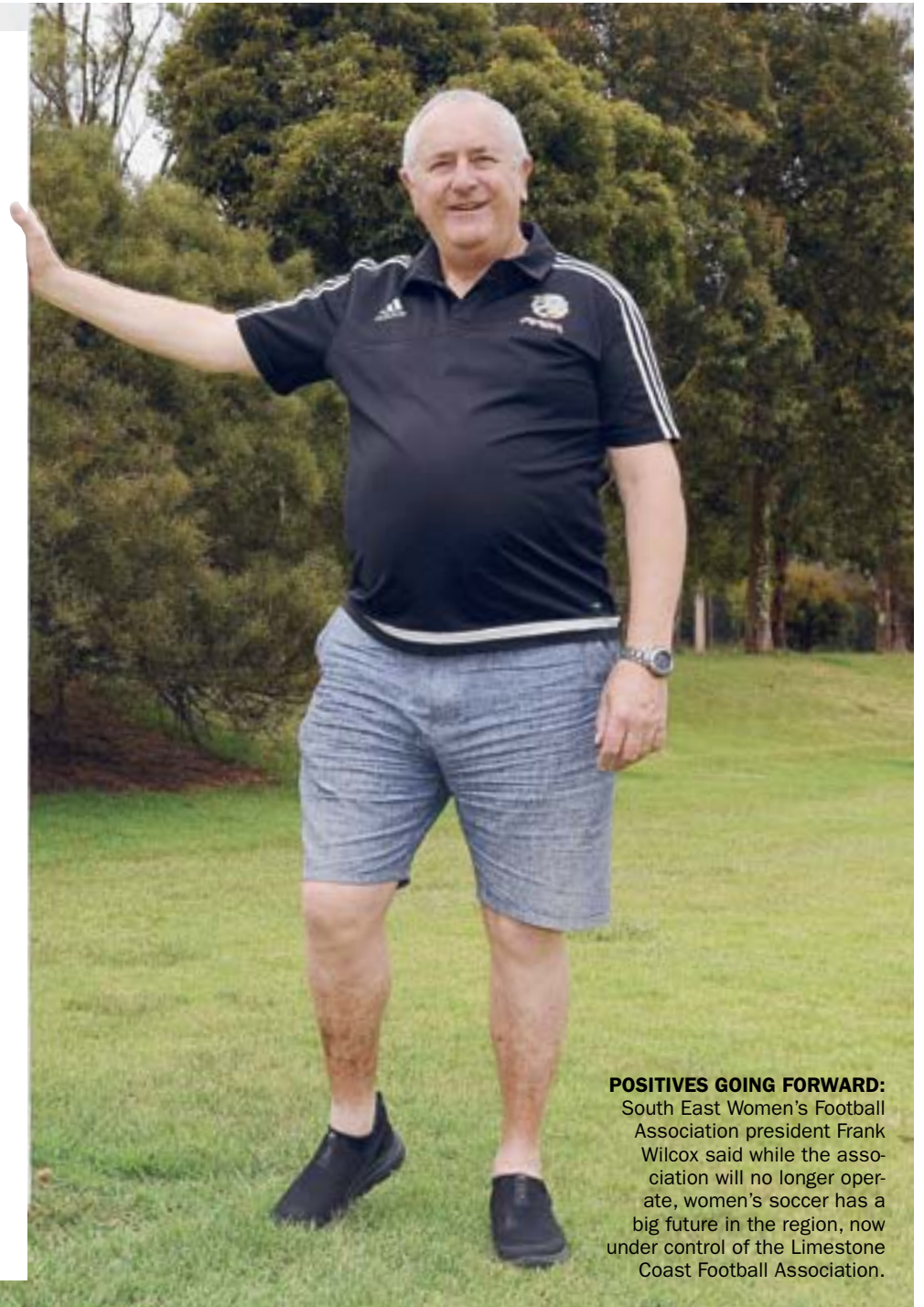
"There will be no difference to us whether you are male or female - everyone will be treated with the same respect."

While it is certainly a shake up for the sport in the region, Nieto said personally he would like to see other changes to become more inclusive.

"We still have the two grounds at Blue Lake Sports Park SEWFA used," he said.

"From my perspective I would like to see some women's games played just before the senior men on a Sunday to get them to be part of the crowd and feel part of the game, not just being isolated out there.

"Our number one priority for the league would be to promote the women."

South will host Tigers and Millicent is home to Centrals.

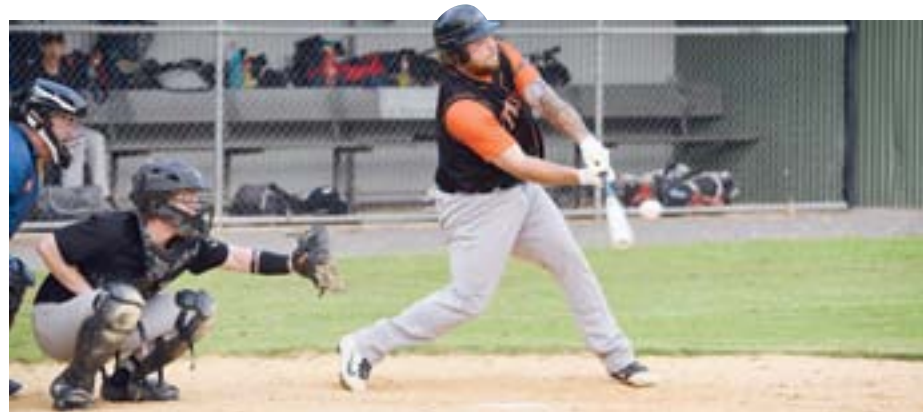
A further round is also scheduled for mid next week.

## Challenge set for Lakes course

THE annual Crank the Crater cycling event is back at the Valley Lakes venue on Sunday.

Organised by the Mount Gambier Cycling Club, the event is touted as a personal challenge to see how fast you can ascend the hill on a human-power bicycle.

The course starts at the Valley Lakes carpark, up to the Centenary Tower carpark.

It covers approximately two kilometres, with an elevation of 86 metres.

Last year's inaugural event saw Nick Kidman set the fastest time overall, with an impressive time of four minutes, 28 seconds.

However, the event is focused on individual efforts, with certificates provided to those who enter to show the time they achieve.

Rather than just including MGCC members, the event is open to all, with a \$5 charge on the day.

MGCC president Dean Zeven said this year's event took a little more planning than initially due to the coronavirus pandemic.

"We had to put in extra things like COVID management plans this year and we haven't really been able to advertise it because we just didn't know if it was going ahead," he said.

"We put all the applications into council early and they approved it all on merit.

"Unless something drastic happens now it will go ahead."

The event is open to all human-powered bikes, whether road, mountain or even BMX.

Electronic or powered bikes are not catered for because Zeven said it would simply defeat the purpose.

The extra challenge this year is for those riders who participated in the inaugural event, with the chance now to better their original times.

"There will be some repeat people from the community and they can try to beat their times," Zeven said.

"But there will be some new ones as well and they will get a fresh time to build on next year.

"I encourage everyone to bring a friend and give it a go - it is not just for us lycra people."

Zeven said it was the ideal opportunity for people to try the climb, with the road closed to traffic throughout the event.

He said last year those who entered certainly enjoyed the challenge, with a good supporter group at the top of the hill to

cheer them on.

"Last year the satisfaction level was right up there," Zeven said.

"People loved it - they loved riding up to a bit of a crowd at the top clapping them across the line and cheering them on."

Zeven described the event as between six and eight minutes of pain, with euphoria at the finish.

Those interested in entering will need to head down to the Valley Lakes car park before the road closes at 8am, or ride their bikes down after that time.

No cars will be allowed through once the road is closed.

Registrations will begin at around 8.30am, with the ride to start at 9am.

The expected finish time is 11am, with the road to reopen at noon.

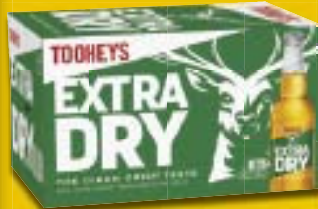
