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# Forestry tales shared

FERAL animal management, coordinating with the Australian Army and finding illegal marijuana operations in public forests are among the little known tasks in the everyday life of a forester.

After a career spanning 40 years, Millicent resident Michael Bleby has put pen to paper to provide an insight into the interesting incidents, people and everyday events that were not necessarily directly concerning the business of tree growing, but were nonetheless a part of forestry work.

Mr Bleby has culminated the most interesting incidents, people and everyday events into a collection of short stories - titled Forest-

ry Tales - with a book launch scheduled next month.

"I originally wrote it for my family to capture some of the more interesting stories of my career into a book and I was encouraged by the interest by others in these yarns," he said.

"Some of the stories have already been published in the Institute of Foresters Society newsletter or the Australian Forest History Society, such as my Ash Wednesday story.

"Others have been talks that I have given such as fire towers and dealing with aircraft.

"In Mount Crawford we had feral goats on the part of the land I was managing and we had to eliminate it.

"There's a chapter on collaring kangaroos to mark them before the days of radio track-

ing, which was always very interesting."

Mr Bleby said the work of an operational forester in managing large tracts of government land revolved around the establishment, maintenance, protection and harvesting of the plantation forest.

"That also included dealing with the police," he said.

"The phone might ring and it would be the police or one of the forest workers who had found some marijuana in the forest.

"There is also a chapter on the army as the army used to use the forest a lot for their exercises and another chapter on Christmas trees and some of the characters we used to meet when we sold to them."

The book will be launched on February 7 at the Millicent Public Library at 2pm.



## City cyclist station launched

CYCLISTS can now access a bike pump and maintenance station at Mount Gambier Railway Lands, the first of its kind in the city.

Conveniently located along the popular Rail Trail shared path, the station includes retractable tools such as hex keys,

screwdrivers, wrenches and tyre levers.

A bike stand is also included to hoist the bike above ground level, allowing pedals and wheels to spin freely while repairs are undertaken. The station - an initiative of Vibrant Mount Gambier - includes an instructional label demonstrating how the

maintenance station can be used and includes a QR code that links to online bike maintenance videos.

The bike pump and maintenance station are located along the Rail Trail around halfway between the Railway Station building and Bay Road.

## Gastro cases impacting on child care

LIMESTONE Coast families are urged to be vigilant due to increased reports of gastroenteritis outbreaks in child care settings in South Australia in the last two months.

Four outbreaks were reported in November and 17 in December across South Australia although authorities believe this may be an underrepresentation as gastroenteritis and norovirus infections are not notifiable conditions the state.

Health authorities believe the clinical presentation of short-lived vomiting and diarrhoea among children in most of these outbreaks is consistent with norovirus infection but most of the outbreaks have not been clinically tested.

Viral gastroenteritis is highly infectious and is spread through contamination of hands, objects or food with infected faeces or vomit.

The virus is then taken in by the mouth and may also be spread through coughing and sneezing.

Symptoms of viral gastroenteritis include nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, fever, abdominal pain, headache and muscle aches.

Symptoms usually take two to three days to develop and usually last between one or two days, sometimes longer.

Thorough hand hygiene after going to the toilet, before eating or preparing food, changing nappies or contacting someone who is unwell is advised.

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# Fire-ravaged district feels loss

LIVESTOCK losses as a result of Monday's Blackford-Avenue bushfire are expected to climb in coming days as the communities affected count the "heartbreaking loss" of thousands of sheep and swathes of pasture.

Almost 6200 sheep and 11 cattle have died as a result of fire, which destroyed more than 14,174ha, one house and several buildings across the Blackford, Lucindale and Avenue Range areas.

Lucindale Lions Club and Country Fire Service member Peter Corrigan said farmers had started the grisly task of burying and euthanising stock on properties after fires tore through properties, scrub and fencing.

Mr Corrigan said recovery efforts were underway, with the Lucindale Lions establishing a fund for residents Chris and Neil Watts - whose house was destroyed in the blaze - while donations, deliveries and requests for hay were being coordinated by community members.

"We are all a bit worn out at the moment," he said.

"Wednesday was a bit of a reality check as there are a lot of livestock being buried and to deal with that side of it is heartbreaking. "Everyone is very tired, but in typical Lucindale style everyone has rallied together and get it done.

"We have lots and lots of volunteers and lots and lots of people who are putting time, machinery, fuel and drivers in to help, which is Lucindale being Lucindale.

"People's generosity is just absolutely phenomenal."

Across the region, businesses and community groups have quickly responded to the bushfire recovery with the Mount Gambier Hay Run organising a convoy to deliver fodder on Saturday.

Elders Millicent quickly mobilised to coordinate agistment and hay for those affected, while volunteer-based organisation Blaze Aid is currently seeking a site to establish a base camp to help rebuild thousands of destroyed fencing.

Tantanoola-based Roundwood Solutions has donated a truck load of non-toxic, non-flammable wood fencing product to BlazeAid ahead to kick start construction.

Mr Corrigan praised the Limestone Coast community and individuals across the state for their support, urging donations of hay and funds.

"Hay is definitely the main thing we need," he said.

"We are about to start racing hay from all over the state and probably interstate as well at this stage.

"We have set up a depot for hay at the South East Field Days site where we will stockpile it and distribute it from there so farmers don't have a b-double turn up at their back door.

"At the moment it is early days and we need to get the fire under control and make sure there are no hot spots and burning trees to the

community is safe.

"It is great for people to want to help but we got to let the fires do their job as well."

Mr Corrigan was among the large cohort of residents who battled the blaze along with 200 Country Fire Service and Environment and Water firefighters, 45 trucks, farm fire units and local forestry companies.

Six waterbombing aircraft conducted 101 drops across the fire ground and four observation planes assisted emergency service personnel at the height of the blaze

Although the blaze was contained on Tuesday afternoon, the Country Fire Service (CFS) believe parts of the fire will continue to burn for the next 10 days within containment lines.

Police said the cause of the fire, which is believed to have started in a paddock near the south eastern end of Mount Scott Conservation Park, was undetermined but not suspicious.

Primary Industries and Regions South Australia (PIRSA) staff assisted farmers on the ground in the immediate aftermath of the fire and said teams were continuing initial property assessments and addressing animal welfare needs.

Agricultural and Animal Services State Commander Mehdi Doroudi said contact was being made with approximately 70 properties

which have stock registered with the department, but said "it will take some time... to obtain a full picture of the agricultural impacts from the fire."

"As a result, the confirmed livestock losses to date are 6174 sheep and 11 cattle, however we know this number will increase in coming days as assessments continue," he said.

"A 24-hour hotline number - 1800 255 556 - has been activate for any primary producer and animal owners seeking urgent assistance and information.

"We also have officers available to assist with assessment of injured and burnt livestock."

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride, who also battled the fires, described horrific scenes of "cooked" livestock on Lucindale's outskirts.

"About 5km short of Lucindale, cows were on the road which had been all burnt," he said.

"There was one which was still breathing, but it had been totally cooked.

"At one stage there was a paddock surrounded by fire with around 200 heifers standing in the corner, even though the gate was open.

"It is devastating for farmers who have to deal with the loss of stock as well as having to put them down."

Naracoorte Lucindale Council and Kingston District Council leaders met earlier this week to coordinate a locally-led recovery and understand the damage from the fire.

In a joint statement, Naracoorte Lucindale mayor Erika Vickery and Kingston mayor Kay Rasheed said council will provide support and resources to impacted property owners where possible through the recovery process.

Ms Rasheed, whose council area was affected by the Keilira bushfire last summer, said staff and elected members knew the challenges of the long and arduous recovery process and was committed to a joint recovery process.

Deliveries, donations and requests for hay are being coordinated by Tania Smith (0428 675 058), Erin McWaters (0427 325 546) and Sam Graetz (0430 135 582).

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# Down: Lights out for 50 hours

KINGSTON residents and businesses were forced to throw away thousands of perishable items this week and shower at the town's caravan park following a two-day power outage sparked by the Blackford fire.

The town's main supply line - a 33,000 volt line linking the Naracoorte substation to Kin-craig, Lucindale and Kingston - was destroyed on Monday afternoon when the fire swept the through the area.

Petrol stations and supermarkets and banks were in the dark for more than 24 hours, but a SA Power Networks generator was brought in to power the Kingston Soldiers' Memorial Hospital and Lighthouse Lodge aged care centre.

Power was restored to around half of the town by Tuesday afternoon, with more than 2000 customers without power until 7pm on Wednesday.

SA Power Networks manager corporate affairs Paul Roberts said crews tried to restore the fault after it was reported on 2.15pm on Monday, but were told to leave the area when the fire was at its peak.

"We returned the next day and restored power to Lucindale and subsequently gained entry to the fire ground where we found 700m of the main supply line had been damaged," he said.

"We started working on it late Tuesday and Wednesday to restring that section.

"When the fire started, we mobilised one of our very large mobile generators to Kingston and by midnight Wednesday, we provided power to hold of the customers of Kingston with that supply with our main focus being the hospital, service stations, food outlets and supermarkets so people could get food and other items they might need.

"The generators was not able to supply the whole area because it is a big load, but we were able to provide 50pc of the town's power."

The town's main street was quiet on Tuesday morning, with a handful of stores opening for cash transactions only.

Motorists hoping to fuel up in Kingston either travelled to Robe or Millicent or remained in town as service stations waited for generators to be transported on site.

Kingston District Council allocated street bins for residents and businesses to dispose of spoil waste from fridges and freezers and offered free use of the council-owned caravan park's bathroom facilities for people affected.

Mr Roberts said crews have mobilised from across the state to help restore power to 3110 households and businesses affected by the outage. "A large contingent of crews have been brought in from Murray Bridge, Bordertown and Adelaide to assist in the restoration and are supported by operations managers, asset inspectors and generation technicians," he said.

"18 feet has come off the main line in the fire vicinity, so we have had to patrol each of those lines through an inch by inch patrol and confirm whether they were damaged.

"We have around 1000km of line in and around the fire area which also need to be inspected and the additional crews will support that."

Mr Roberts praised the Kingston and district community for their patience and heeding a request to turn off solar inverters to mitigate potential instability issues with generation.

"There seems to have been a really positive response to that request and that has really helped in ensuring that community continues to have supply from the generator that we

brought down from Adelaide," he said.

"The people of Kingston have been receiving numerous updates about progress and we have had an incredibly positive response from those customers to that service.

"I recommend other customers who are not registered to register with us, which you can either do online or by calling us on our 13 12 61 number."

## Quick response to Millicent fire

TWO water bombers deployed to a Millicent grassfire on Wednesday afternoon were quickly stood down after reports of a large grass fire turned out to be a small vehicle fire.

Country Fire Service (CFS) personnel were called to the incident, located on the outskirts of Millicent, just before 4pm on Wednesday.

The alarm was heightened following a report the blaze, which started on grassed private property, was encroaching on houses.

CFS crews from Millicent and Mount Burr quickly arrived on scene and contained the fire before Tantanoola and Rendelsham teams arrived on site.

The aerial bombers circled the site before being released from the incident at 4.15pm.

## Fight the bite warning

SOUTH Australia's health authority has warned residents to avoid exposure to mosquitoes, following the detection of the potentially deadly Murray Valley Encephalitis Virus and Kunjin virus during routine monitoring.

A sentinel chicken, one of five chickens in a surveillance flock based near Meningie, has tested positive to both Murray Valley Encephalitis Virus (MVEv) and Kunjin virus.

The Department for Health and Wellbeing's acting executive director of health protection and licensing services Dr Fay Jenkins said detection of MVEv and Kunjin virus was a strong reminder for all South Australians to be vigilant in their fight against mosquito bites.

"Many people infected with MVEv are asymptomatic or have mild symptoms such as fever, headache and nausea," Dr Jenkins said.

"Although only a few people who become infected with MVEv will develop more serious symptoms which may include confusion, headaches, neck stiffness, tremors, drowsiness and seizures, for those who do, it can be very serious and is fatal in about 20pc of cases.

"For those who survive, about 40pc of people will suffer permanent neurological damage."

There is no vaccine and no cure for mosquito borne diseases transmitted in South Australia, and the only way of preventing disease is to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes.

As part of SA Health and local council's mosquito borne disease monitoring program, six flocks of sentinel chickens are maintained in strategic locations along the Murray River in South Australia and are routinely tested for viruses spread by mosquitoes.

Chickens provide a good indicator of the risk of mosquito borne diseases in the community, as they readily produce antibodies to viruses which can also infect humans without developing symptoms of those diseases.

These chickens cannot pass the infection on to humans.

# Hay Run will help

A CONVOY of trucks will deliver tonnes of livestock feed to farmers impacted by the Lucindale bushfire this weekend.

Over 40 trucks from across the state will deliver hundreds of hay bales to the Lucindale district on Saturday as part of this year's Mount Gambier Hay Run.

After Monday's Blackford-Avenue fire shook the region earlier this week, event team member Adam Smith spoke with Australian Livestock Association chief executive officer Andrew Curtis and an idea to help quickly progressed into reality.

The charity drive follows last year's inaugural event which saw 550 tonnes of fodder donated to farmers impacted by bushfires in Kangaroo Island, as well as two trips to Keilira and a visit to New South Wales.

Mr Smith said people from across the state were donating time and supplies, with three to four trucks from Tumby Bay, a road train from Blyth, 17 trucks from Victoria and 20 from Mount Gambier already committed to step-

ping in and helping out.

More than an additional 10 trucks Naracoorte and Lucindale will also be moving donated supplies, with all to be directed to the South East Field Days venue for farmers to collect in their own time.

"We have such awesome support here in the community and we're going to have the stock there landed three days after everything has happened," Mr Smith said.

"You can't do it without the people supporting you.

"Everyone wants to be involved and it's a whole community effort."

Mr Smith said the drive was important as some people had lost their entire feed supply and many hay stacks in the Lucindale district had been burnt.

"Some are still burning...Some of them are still recovering from the fires last year and it happened on almost the exact same day a year ago," he said.

"We are all so grateful to be able to contribute. If we don't have farmers, we have nothing. They are the backbone of our country."

Reflecting fondly on the memories of a large fence sign which outlined the community's thanks when arriving in Keilira last year, Mr Smith said there was already talks of a second run planned in another month to six weeks time.

Loads have already begun to be delivered, but the truck convoy will leave Mount Gambier at 8am on Saturday to drive through to Naracoorte to meet others at 9.30am and then leave all together to Lucindale.

## Quick thinking pays off

COMMUNITY vigilance and preparedness played a key role in containing a grass fire at Rocky Camp last week.

Teagle Excavations quarry supervisor Bruce Teagle was the first to sound the alarm after noticing smoke around 10.40am on January 7, spurring his staff into action.

The Country Fire Service volunteers, four aircraft and OneFortyOne forestry fire units all responded to the incident but it was quick work on-site by Teagle workers that helped bring it under control quickly.

"We sent one of the workers down there to open a gate while we brought a loader down," Teagle Excavations operations manager Derek Joyce said.

"We called OFO and the fire brigades and mobilised three water trucks down there," Mr Joyce said.

"We had it pretty much contained when they arrived."

Mr Joyce said the Millicent business always kept a water truck on standby and it is able to mobilise bulldozers and excavators to fires.

"The boys did a good job moving pretty quickly," Mr Joyce said.

## Prison for drug crimes

A COUPLE who attempted to transport more than \$5000 worth of methylamphetamine from Melbourne and sell it from a Mount Gambier hotel have been sentenced.

Narissa Kym Williams, 37, and Vishal Prakesh, 44, appeared in the District Court of South Australia before Judge Geraldine Davison, pleading guilty to one count of trafficking a controlled drug, namely methylamphetamine.

The maximum penalty for the offending is a \$50,000 fine or imprisonment for 10 years or both with Williams and Prakesh entitled to a reduction of up to 10pc on account of entering guilty pleas.

The charges stem from an incident on May 8, 2019 when police received information relating to a suspected drug activity occurring at a Mount Gambier hotel.

A search warrant was executed and the police attended at a room in the hotel where both defendants were located.

A plastic tub containing 5.21g of crystal powder that contained 3.67g of methylamphetamine with a purity of 70pc was located inside a King Gee boot, along with two sets of digital scales, several Ziploc bags, a glass ice pipe, a notebook that contained a list of names with dollar amounts and two mobile phones.

Williams claimed ownership of the boot but denied knowledge of the plastic tub inside the boot.

An analysis of both mobile phones revealed text messages consistent with trafficking methylamphetamine that were sent and received in the days prior and on the date of the police search.

An outgoing message on May 5 at 3.50am outlined the transportation of \$5500 worth of methylamphetamine from Melbourne, which was planned to be sold in Mount Gambier.

It was revealed in court both defendants had extensive history of similar offending and had been convicted on numerous occasions.

Prakesh was sentenced to four years imprisonment, which was reduced to two years, 11 months and 10 days due in part to time spent in custody and home detention. A non-parole period of 18 months was set.

Williams received three years, six months and 13 days imprisonment with a non-parole period of 21 months, which was suspended upon her entering into a three-year good behaviour bond.

Williams was ordered to submit to drug testing and must be assessed to participate in suitable psychological counselling and drug and alcohol counselling.

# Self-drive on the rise

SELF-DRIVE journeys are on the rise in the Limestone Coast as interstate tourists eschew air travel and the hit region's road and sand tracks in hordes.

Four-wheel drive numbers have boomed this summer, with tourism heads noting increases in motorists undertaking beach journeys across the region's coastline.

Vehicle movement throughout the Little Dip Conservation Park has increased almost 6pc this holiday season, with more than 9000 vehicles traversing the 21.5km stretch from Nora Creina to Robe.

Robe District Council chief executive James Holyman said initial observations showed an increase in visitation numbers to the popular tourist town, with hundreds of would-be overnight visitors forced to stay outside of Robe as a result of no accommodation.

"We know that a lot of people who came to Robe couldn't find accommodation and have stayed at Wright's Bay, which is still part of our council area, and come to Robe for day trips," he said.

"The number of people travelling through Little Dip is higher than last year - we had 8500 go through the park last year and 9000 in 2021.

"While only guessing, but I think the due to COVID-19 and the risk of travelling interstate with constant border changes and no overseas travel, people are making choices to come to the Limestone Coast."

Wattle Range Council tourism events officer Tamara North said between New Years Day and January 4, the Beachport Visitor Information Centre fielded 129 inquires relating to beach and sand four wheel driving.

Ms North noted a significant increase in 4WD groups - namely Victorians - throughout the region.

In response to the growing popularity of four-wheel driving and to ensure motorists are safe, Wattle Range has developed an information pack to help guide tourists across off-road tracks.

"We have had some maps made to encourage people to stay on the tracks and don't get lost," Ms North said.

"Beachport has always been a popular destination for 4WD groups, but we are definitely seeing a lot more visitors this year.

"The main people coming are definitely Victorians who might normally travel to New South Wales or other parts of the country, but are not able to because of border restrictions.

"We always see the 4WD groups in summer, but there are a lot more people travelling with family and friends who just want to do 4WD at the moment."

The Beachport Old Wool and Grain Store Museum has been among the beneficiaries of the road trip renaissance, with visitors taking to the Railway Terrace facility to gain an insight into the town's whaling and fishing history.

Museum secretary Elaine Donaldson said volunteers had noticed an increase of tourists to the facility as well as the second-hand shop, co-located in the building.

"Numbers are definitely up and we are finding a different kind of clientele come through," she said.

"There are a lot of people who normally go to Robe who have never been to Beachport come through.

"We are also getting people visit who are from the area, but have never been to the museum come in."

The Robe tourist run-off has also resulted in gains in Kingston, with Kingston Fore-shore Caravan Park manager Kristy Vanstone pleased with strong occupancy rates following cancellations in 2020 due to COVID.

"I think there are different crowds here this year, usually the people who would have been in other areas have to Kingston which has been really good," she said. "It has been tough

up until Christmas because of the border closures and we missed out on tourists over Easter, which is usually very busy for us.

"I thought the new border closures would affect the Victorian and South Australian borders, but we just got more and more Victorians over here which is such an important part of our tourism.

"We expect to be busy up until the long weekend and the Surf Fishing Competition before it quietening down when school goes back."

Limestone Coast Local Government Association executive officer Tony Wright welcomed the increase in self-drive holiday makers, saying the region was well placed to continue capitalising in the post-COVID space.

"Self-drive is a big market for us so it is pleasing to see those numbers up," he said.

"It sounds like most regional areas in South Australia with coastal locations have done very well with tourism.

"There seems to be some very good visitation from Adelaide residents to regional areas such as Victor Harbour and for us we get a double whammy of tourists from Adelaide and western Victoria.

"We think we are well-placed to be a focus of self-drive holiday makers, particularly in the COVID environment as people will take more contained holidays."

# Border checks return

BORDER checkpoints returned to several locations along the South Australia-Victoria this week with police returning to monitor traffic entering the state via Nelson and Glenelg River Road.

South Australia Police has reopened six screening sites across the state in response to the recent Queensland outbreak with Assistant Police Commissioner Linda Williams stating police would monitor incoming traffic to the state.

"We're determined to increase our border checkpoints, particularly at the South East - we're increasing and opening up six border checkpoints," she said.

"We'll open up the border checkpoints at Marla and Marree (in the state's north) because we know that people will transit through those routes returning to South Australia.

"This will enhance our ability to give them information and the need to quarantine if they have been in the Greater Brisbane Area and it will also allow us to be able to track people's

movements in and out of the state should it be required."

Asst Comm Williams said police had taken advice from SA Health and compliance checks would continue to be conducted to ensure people across the state had been self-quarantining correctly.

"People are taking a very common sense approach and people have been very compliant. They have taken their own social obligations very seriously so we are very pleased with the level of responsibility we have been seeing," she said.

Victoria has also established a new permit system for all domestic travel into the state, which will require any visitor to register online before entering.

Each individual must complete a separate cross-border travel registration form although people do not need to apply if they already have a current essential traveller number from SAPOL.

South Australia borders with regional New South Wales opened yesterday but tough re-

strictions still remain for people in high-community transmission zones including Greater Sydney, Wollongong, the Central Coast and Blue Mountains.

Those permitted to travel into South Australia from New South Wales will still need to be COVID-19 tested on day one, five and 12 of arrival in the state but will not need to self-isolate while awaiting results - unless they have symptoms.

Since January 9, Queensland visitors have had to self-quarantine for 14 days upon arriving into the state while also being tested on days one, five and 12.

On Wednesday, it was also announced masks are mandatory at all times while on an airplane or at any airport in South Australia, including people working at the airport.

Two new cases were recorded in South Australia on Wednesday, bringing the state's total to 590, with a total of 12 active cases across the state, all overseas acquired.

## Inmate murder connection

A MOUNT Gambier Prison inmate has become the fourth man charged in connection with the murder of Murray Bridge man Oliver Todd.

The 33 year old was arrested on Wednesday and was scheduled to appear in Adelaide Magistrates Court yesterday alongside two co-accused.

About 10am Wednesday 11 December 2019, Murray Bridge resident Oliver Todd was reported missing from his home around 10am on December 11, 2019, with the 47-year-old's body found at Jervois later that day.

A 30-year-old man and a 49-year-old man, both from Murray Bridge, were arrested and charged with murder the following day.

Major Crime Detectives also arrested a 41-year-old Murray Bridge man in connection with the murder last year.

He was charged with impeding an investigation and two counts of providing a false statement to police.

## Senior manager moves in

MOUNT Gambier City Council has filled one of the vacancies on its senior executive team.

Darren Barber started in his role as shared services general manager this week, making the move to the Blue Lake city after serving as Southern Grampians Shire organisational development manager.

## Bushfire re-ignites memories

now here's a thought

ON Monday, I was in Penola having lunch with friends.

When we emerged from the cafe, we were immediately confronted by the distinct smell of bushfire smoke.

Instantaneously I was back in our Ash Wednesday of 1983.

Monday was a similar day in terms of weather: very hot with a strong wind blowing relentlessly.

We were going to have a drive to look at some local sites but I was already anxious.

I told my friends that I needed to head for home and I couldn't simply go on a drive and maintain a relaxed attitude.

I had to get away and I needed to be at home.

On the way, I could clearly see the huge clouds of smoke.

I was a young teacher at Millicent High School on that day in 1983.

The smell, the smoke, the flames and the fear-filled students are all still firmly imprinted on my brain.

One of my sons had just purchased that morning the newly released book, *Black Summer*, edited by Michael Rowland.

It is a collection of stories written by ABC journalists who were on the ground reporting on the bushfires in 2019/20.

The book includes a number of terrifying photos.

The absolute fear people must have experienced standing in sea water to stay safe whilst their towns were consumed by the inferno. Having been a teacher for a few decades, I saw that such scenes would impact upon children in significant ways, possibly for the rest of their lives.

I could recall the unsettling consequences after our bushfires decades earlier.

By early January, smoke from the Australian bushfires had drifted as far as South America.

My concern with bushfires is that we, here, may have grown too complacent about bushfires: the fear and long term consequences of such major disasters.

# Region stands united

OUR region has sadly witnessed a sobering reminder of the destructive force generated by bushfires this week.

Firefighting units were on high alert Monday as the region experienced some of the most volatile weather conditions so far this fire danger season.

Searing heat and strong winds fanned what started as a small grass fire near Mount Scott Conservation Park turned into a devastating wall of flames, which tore across farmland and

left little in its wake.

Water-bombing aircraft supported dozens of volunteer firefighters on the ground, who also received support from forestry assets and farm units.

Additional resources also arrived from other South Australian regions and Victoria, providing relief to local units.

The bravery and selflessness of these people in the face of danger should not be understated.

## Objection to council office plan

I have put pen to paper to write to you with absolute disbelief at what the Wattle Range Council is trying to ship through with the hope that no one will complain.

The absolute lack of care and the complete lack of respect to the people of the Wattle Range Council in spending that proposed amount of \$6m on a new office block, to me, goes to show the selfishness and disrespect to the ratepayers of Wattle Range Council.

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# Program for empowerment

A LIMESTONE Coast community empowerment program aimed at inspiring and supporting females has opened scholarship applications.

The Herself project is aimed at bettering the future of women who have been disempowered by individual circumstances.

Spanning over four months, the program involves various aspects of mentoring to help clarify personal purpose, articulate ambition and discover strengths with 10 scholarships worth \$3000 each available.

Scholarships are open to all females living in the Limestone Coast region who can attend a 2.5 hour weekly session with course commencement to be determined once a cohort has been selected.

Applications are also open for approximately 20 program mentors, which will be partnered with participants to encourage and affirm them through the journey.

Mentors will be provided with training in exchange for volunteering an hour a week to meet with their matched participant for the 16-week process.

Skilled community members have also been encouraged to be part of the project by donating their services, skills and talents towards the various topical workshops, ranging from financial workshops to personal styling.

Program founder Belinda Tilley said the project delivered an adapted version of the I-Myself coaching framework, which she founded almost three years ago.

"When I-Myself was first launched, I was involved with some work in the domestic violence sector and women in other areas and I just realised so often, we hit something which takes the wind out of your sails which has ex-

treme impact on self worth," Ms Tilley said.

"This program is something which can help women and particularly people who have gone through something of hardship.

"Anybody out there who is going through something out of the ordinary, whatever stage of life you are at, it is always good to stop and re-evaluate one's thinking and lifestyle habits."

Ms Tilley said the Herself project was about recalibrating to "be the best version of yourself possible".

"It is a bit of self reflection and recalibration, discussing values, what is important, what you are saying to yourself regularly, life

purposes and whether it has slipped away or not," she said.

"It does from time to time, you get busy, burnt out, involved in life and it is good to just stop and recalibrate sometimes.

"We want to focus on specifically recalibrating self-opinion, because if you think you're a failure, you are unlikely to succeed. The voice that usually speaks the loudest is our own."

Ms Tilley said the program aimed to not rescue but empower participants to identify and recognise their own uniqueness and worth.

"As we have seen with the COVID-19 pan-


demie, we need a lot more in our resilience banks and unexpected things happen and will continue to happen," she said.

# Deep community roots recognised

SUE Zwar is known by some as the "rose lady" of the Penola and Coonawarra area but this title will soon be challenged with the district's Australia Day citizen of the year set to replace it on January 26.

Wattle Range Council has named Ms Zwar the 2020 Australia Day Penola citizen of the year for her outstanding contribution to the community over the past four decades.

Ms Zwar moved to Coonawarra with her partner John and two daughters in 1976 and almost instantly became involved with various not-for-profit organisations and groups.

"I was sort of on my own, didn't know a soul in Penola, so therefore you join whatever you're asked to, just to get to know people which was how I started volunteer work," she said.

Ms Zwar first joined the Penola Lutheran Church and has been the women's fellowship president or secretary every year apart from her first.

Her passion for roses began shortly after stepping foot in friend and Penola resident Susie Kidman's garden and she is now a proud National Heritage Rose and National Heritage Trust Penola branch member, as well as a South Australian Rose Society life member.

"I always said she was the culprit which made me love heritage roses to start with," she said.

"Some people call me the rose lady, I have never done horticulture or anything like that, it is just self taught.

"Once you get the rose bug, it is pretty hard to shake."

With support from the Pinchunga gardening group, Ms Zwar helped plant over 200 roses across the health care facility as a day time volunteer.

When a freak tornado ripped through Penola in 2010, Ms Zwar also coordinated

the planting of another 200-odd roses across the township, which she continues to help maintain.

# Beachport Vacswim hits record

THE Beachport Vacswim program reached record numbers during its one-week program, with 325 young swimmers participating in this year's water safety program.

Last year's record of 276 school-aged children - which was an increase of 25pc from 2018 - was easily broken as hordes of Limestone Coast residents and holiday makers descended on Beachport during the summer holidays.

Millicent youngster Alirah Bowman was among the return participants to the town's foreshore for the annual program, starting this year as a level five swimmer. As well as boosting her pre-existing swimming skills, Alirah said she learnt about waves and currents, hazards on the beach and responding to the help signal.

"It is good to do Vacswim in Beachport because you get to swim in the ocean with real waves," she said.

"It is good to learn different things every day.

"You also get to meet new people because a lot of the people come from Beachport and Robe."

Instructor in charge Julie Moran attributed the increased numbers to a boost in holiday makers and the staggered Vacswim starts across the region, with lessons at the Millicent Swimming Lake, Penola Swimming Pool and Nangwarry Pool running successively.

"We have huge numbers across the board, but in our older levels we have 15 level 10's, which is the biggest group we have ever had," she said.

"There are 23 participants in level nine and 28 in level eight.

"I think this year there has definitely been an increase in interested people who want to swim and having Millicent Vacswim run earlier in the month might have encouraged people to enrol in Beachport.

"There are a lot more families in Beachport this year as well and people who would

normally be away are spending time at the beach."

Ms Moran said a number of supervising staff, comprising of 10 instructors and five assistant instructors, had been recruited from the Beachport Surf Live Saving Club.

She noted an increase in volunteer numbers from last year, with nine people providing assistance to the hundreds of swimmers.

Vacswim is a South Australian government-funded program for school age children aged between five and 13 years aimed at providing fundamental water safety, survival skills and basic stroke skills.

BACKYARD green thumbs across the region will challenge for bragging rights in the 2021 Penola and Coonawarra Summer Tomato Growing Competition.

Kilos of fresh, plump and juicy tomatoes are expected to accumulate for the seventh time at the highly-anticipated annual contest.

Food and wine lovers Susie Kidman, Melissa Innes and Paul Stone have been announced as event judges and will analyse the texture, taste, skin thickness and aroma of entered produce, with highest points awarded the William Wilson Perpetual Trophy.

Coonawarra resident and event coordinator Maria Weinberg said the competition was a fun way to involve the community and raise funds for the Coonawarra Community Club, while also recognising the significant legacy and impact Scottish gardener William Wilson had on the region.

Mr Wilson settled in Petticoat Lane in 1861 and developed a productive orchard and market garden, generously sharing his

horticultural knowledge with other settlers including pastoralist John Riddoch.

Ms Weinberg said Mr Wilson had significant influence on Mr Riddoch's decision in establishing a fruit-growing colony, which made Penola and Coonawarra what it is today.

"John Riddoch was a friend of his and looked over the fence at his produce and thought they were the best fruit and vegetables ever seen," Ms Weinberg said.

"William Wilson, who is considerably unheard of, was probably the impetus for John Riddoch establishing a fruit colony."

Ms Weinberg said many people in the region were backyard gardeners and the competition may be of interest to the community.

Entries cost \$20 and close March 5, with forms available at Meek's Butcher, the Coonawarra Store or the Coonawarra Community Club.

Judging will take place on March 12 from 5.30pm at the Coonawarra Community Hall with nibbles and margaritas available on the night.

## From ashes to intriguing art

KINGSTON District Council has officially launched South Australia's first augmented reality public mural, titled Wind Dance.

A year on from the devastating Keilira fires, council has finalised the tourism drawcard, which was created by artist Sarah Boese and funded by the Regional Tourism Bushfire Recovery Program, a Federal Government bushfire recovery initiative.

Council received the funding in the wake of the Keilira bushfire, which was started by dry lightning in late December 2019.

The mural was officially opened by Australian Country Music Singer Adam Brand and Mayor Kay Rasheed at a free community concert at the Crown Inn Hotel on January 8.

Project founder and council chief executive Nat Traeger said a strong tourism sector had many benefits including job creation, investment, and community growth.

"We sought funding with the intent of stimulating our local economy through innovation and having a point of difference," Ms Traeger said.

"We wanted to create an experience that is unique to Kingston and provides a new tourism offering to draw people into our main street precinct," she said.

Kingston Mayor Kay Rasheed said council was immediately drawn to the possibility of augmenting a public artwork because it had not yet been done in South Australia.

"We first saw the augmented reality concept whilst developing our new Public Art

Framework, and we were interested in pursuing the idea of having something in our town," Ms Rasheed said.

"The project will capitalise on the growth of both art tourism and the world of augmented reality and we are excited to see this literally come to life.

"The static mural is fantastic in itself, but this added dimension is immersive and quite spectacular.

Visitors can download the free EyeJack app on their device to see the huge mural brought to life, with a digital layer projected on the real work.

Not only has augmented reality been incorporated in the public artwork, the ex-

perience is heightened by backing sound.

"The piece really comes to life in both sight and sound and is providing joy and surprise from both kids and adults as they give it a go," Ms Rasheed said.

"The mural has added a great vibrancy to the street and already we are seeing people downloading the app, pointing at the QR code and taking photos.

"Council is committed to creating a thriving destination that encourages tourism and lifestyle living and this new tourist attraction is certainly a testament to that."

Artist Sarah Boese was selected by council to develop the artwork, which included direct community engagement in-line

with council's recently adopted Public Art Framework.

Ms Boese completed the work in December, and it was augmented through a partnership with Adelaide company JumpGateVR and EyeJack.

"Wind Dance is designed to capture the personality of Kingston and features themes that acknowledge nature, Aboriginal culture and coastal lifestyle," Ms Boese said.

"The heron, a spiritual totem that is important to the Meintangk people, is a symbol of determination, resilience and tranquility," she explained.

"The circular patterns tie in with the local Aboriginal practice of weaving and pay respect to their deep connection with the land.

"Smoke drifts through the artwork reminding us of the devastating bushfire that occurred in the region in December 2019 and native spider orchids represent regrowth and healing."

Ms Boese said the soaring fish reflected family activities and summers by the beach and was inspired by Kingston's popular kite festival.

"Represented as kites, the fish attached to a string remind us that whilst we are connected to nature, we can't always control it," she said.

"Instead, we can embrace and respect the delicate natural cycles of our environment."

# Artist reads into book to inspire

A BOOK telling the story of a sole occupant living in a bay of sinking islands inspired Penola resident Anne Miller to paint in unfamiliar territory, leading to a prestigious Port Fairy art award win.

Ms Miller won this year's Biblio Art Prize for her piece titled Watermen, based on novel Wolfe Island by Lucy Treloar.

Established in 2009, the Biblio Art Prize entered its 12th year in 2020 and is a competitive exhibition originally established as a way of giving surplus vintage books a new life.

Organised by Port Fairy's Blarney Books and Art, this year's artists were randomly allocated an Australian non-fiction novel to use as inspiration for artwork.

Over 250 entries were received and Ms Miller was announced as the winner during an online presentation, receiving a trophy and \$2000.

The 68 year old settled in Penola with her husband Leigh around 18 months ago and has spent the last 30 years of her life painting.

Mostly self-taught, in the past four to five years Ms Miller said she had started to adapt a more abstract style, especially since relocating from Adelaide.

To win the Biblio Art Prize, Ms Miller said she drew inspiration from the book's storyline, the landscape and the main character's interests.

The artwork depicts a dark and stormy Chesapeake Bay, where the novel is set, and main character Kitty's artwork of two watermen figures, formed from multi-coloured tin cans and cattle skulls.

"The book is set in real life at Chesapeake Bay and the islands are sinking...It was a thought provoking book," Ms Miller said.

"The book and the painting to a certain

extent is attributed to climate change.

"The island was just rock and it used to be productive with cattle, growing vegetables and also a community. It then became a scary place, which I think is indicative of the position we are in in the world at this very moment."

Ms Miller said she painted using ink, a technique she had not used before.

"It was very much linked to the book and I think that had a bit of an influence on judging," she said.

"It was quirky enough to stand out anyway, but that's not why I painted it, it really was a response to the book."

Ms Miller said she loved living in Penola and had found her groove.

"My image of retirement was to go to the shops and take half an hour longer than I planned because I ran into someone I knew and chatted to and it happens all the time here," she said.

"We are both really involved in the community, I work at the op shop, Leigh belongs to the CFS, we've joined the Coonawarra Choir, Leigh occasionally goes to the Penola Ukulele Group and we sometimes have sessions at home too.

"It is a really welcoming and wonderful place to live, as I'm sure is the same with many country towns, but this one happens to be the best."

Ms Miller encouraged people to remember anybody could be an artist if they put their mind to it.

"Everyone has creativity somewhere but unfortunately fear of failure comes into it more than it ever should," she said.

"It is a way of using the other side of your brain whether it be art of music.

"It is also a way of being acceptable, whether your art is good or not, you get with a bunch of artists and you feel as though you are home."

# Renovation to pasture

*THIS is the first of a series of articles being prepared by Gambier Seeds for The Border Watch.*

*The focus of these articles will be to optimise productivity from on farm pasture and forage bases.*

*At Gambier Seeds we believe that pastures and pasture renovation are an investment not only in your farm production and profitability but in its future.*



**ACT NOW:** Late spring and early summer are good times for reviewing the pasture base.

PASTURE renovation is an ongoing process on most farms.

On intensive farms, pasture renovation occurs on a continuous rolling cycle, with many renovating between 10 and 15pc of the farm area every year, always as part of a targeted and strategic plan.

In these situations, renovation is not seen as a cost, rather an investment.

Pasture renovation is only expensive if it is not successful.

It is critical that pasture renovation is undertaken as a process, not a spur of the moment decision.

It should involve several steps, all of which are critical to the success of the program.

Late spring and early summer are good times for reviewing the pasture base.

Most of the species present are in seed and quite visible, utilisation of paddocks and feed grown is also evident as are any areas with poor density.

However, just looking at and assessing pastures at this time should not be the basis for setting the renovation program.

In many cases the paddock with the least amount of cover may actually be one of your better performing paddocks.

Your renovation programme should commence well before this time and should span a full production year.

**Step 1 – What**

THE first step is to identify what is lacking within the pasture and forage base that may be limiting your enterprise mix.

Identifying and addressing this deficit will be the most profitable operation to be undertaken.

**Step 2 – Where**

IF the answer to the first question is a lack of performance from the pasture base, then the next step is to identify where this is occurring.

At a paddock or grazing area level.

**Step 3 – Why**

IDENTIFY why there is a lack of productivity from the area identified.

If the answer is that there are weeds invading the pasture, there is a fertility issue limiting performance or insect damage or waterlogging have lowered density, then just renovating the paddock will not address these issues or deliver a production increase.

It will also set the renovation program up for failure before it can commence.

For example, weed control or a desired soil fertility increase may require a cropping phase to be undertaken either over the summer or winter preceding the actual pasture seeding phase.

Also, addressing these issues may lead to a production increase in the existing pasture, potentially negating a full renovation requirement.

**Step 4 – Making the plan**

AT THIS point you formulate the plan and strategy to address and rectify the limiting factors.

As part of this plan the timeframe required to ensure the limitation is fully addressed must also be identified and built into the process.

Failure to fully to address these issues or undertake the process correctly, will compromise the result making the process not only ineffective but also expensive.

It will also slow down the time taken for the chosen option to reach its optimum production level which further adds cost to your enterprise. For many this is not new information.

However, it is critical to carrying out successful pasture renovation.

## Sheep numbers ease

### MOUNT GAMBIER SHEEP - WEDNESDAY 5831 (-340)

NUMBERS eased slightly as agents yarded 5407 lambs and 424 sheep to total 5831 head overall.

These sold to the usual field of trade and processor buyers with a number of active restockers also participating in the market.

Quality improved on the week before with more conditioning throughout the offering as lamb pricing took a small fall of \$3 to \$5/head.

Light lambs were small in number as these sold from \$143 to \$160 to the trade as restockers competed strongly here to take lambs back home from \$128 to \$161/head.

Trade weight 3 score lambs made from \$158 to \$185/head with most lambs sales selling from 770c to 820c/kg cwt.

Heavy lambs made from \$180 to \$220 as the extra heavy pens returned vendors from \$210 to the market high of \$260/head.

Hoggets sold from \$130 to \$190/head. The light sheep made from \$120 to \$140/head.

Heavy sheep sold from \$150 to \$170 with wethers also making to \$170/head.

### NARACOORTE SHEEP - TUESDAY 11,493 (3843)

NUMBERS lifted as agents yarded 9674 lambs and 1819 sheep to total 11,493 head overall.

These sold to the usual array of trade and processor buyers with a number of active restockers also present.

Quality was very good as agents presented an excellent run of heavy and extra heavy lambs with outstanding quality pen after pen.

However the buying group pulled rates back on the previous sale with both sheep and lambs easing in price with the heavy end of the lamb market falling \$15 to \$20/head.

Light lambs to the trade made from \$93 to \$151 with the light weight trade 2 and 3 score selection selling from \$146 to \$160/head.

Restockers turned a range of weights back out from \$70 to \$155/head.

Trade weight 3 score lambs sold from \$148 to \$190/head to return from 800c to 830c/kg cwt.

Heavy lambs sold from \$170 to \$221 as the extra heavy pens made from \$208 to the market high of \$250/head.

Hoggets sold from \$140 to \$195/head. Light sheep returned from \$88 to \$112/head.

Medium weighted sheep sold from \$118 to \$146 to be \$10 easier while the heavy types were selling from \$150 to \$215 to be \$15 to \$20/head cheaper than last week.

Light wethers sold from \$100 to \$112 with the heavier pens making from \$172 to \$193/head.

### HAMILTON SHEEP - TUESDAY 27,695

AGENTS yarded 27,695 lambs at Hamilton this week an increase of 6517.

The offering of lambs ranged from plain to very good and displayed a similar weight

to last week's sale, more shorn lambs are now appearing on the market and displayed some excellent quality especially in the top end and apart for some exceptional pens, the woolly lambs are showing signs of dryness.

There was not a full contingent of processors as well as restockers and those in attendance were not always fully active.

Restocking competition came from the Mallee, Horsham, Bendigo, south-east South Australia and local areas in a sale that was \$10 to \$15 cheaper for most trade lambs with the very good trade lambs 17 to 20kg being \$15/head dearer.

Lambs back to the paddock firm to \$10/head dearer and strongly sort after.

The top shorn lamb made \$254 and the woolly lambs to a top \$240, whilst feeders and restockers paid to \$192/head.

Light 12 to 18kg lambs on offer made from \$150 to \$179/head, averaging from 850c to 1300c/kg cwt.

The light trade weight lambs 18 to 22kg sold from \$115 to \$195/head, to average from 800c to 860c/kg cwt.

The medium trade weight lambs 22 to 25kg made from \$170 to \$220/head, to average from 820c and 860c/kg cwt.

Heavy trade weight lambs 26 to 30kg and over made up to \$254/head, to average from 790c to 840c/kg cwt.

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## Ag survey launched

THE western Victorian community is invited to share its views on the state's biosecurity through an Agriculture Victoria online survey.

The Understanding Victoria's Biosecurity System Survey seeks to understand attitudes and knowledge of Victoria's biosecurity system to improve how the state prepares for and meets future biosecurity challenges.

Biosecurity services executive director Katherine Clift said farmers, businesses, industry groups and community members were invited to contribute.

"The agriculture sector contributes over \$14b to the Victorian economy, supporting essential food supply both here in Australia and overseas, and providing thousands of jobs," Dr Clift said.

In 2020, six farms tested positive for three different strains of avian influenza in Victoria.

This was the largest avian influenza outbreak recorded in Australia and the most significant biosecurity event in Victoria for the last 20 years, highlighting the importance of a strong biosecurity system.

"Timely, effective response is critical to rapid eradication of the disease, minimising the impacts on the poultry industry and maintaining the trust and confidence of consumers and trading partners," Dr Clift said.

Over the past 20 years, Australia has responded to biosecurity incursions, including Varroa mite, citrus canker and equine influenza as well as prepared for threats such as foot and mouth disease and African swine fever, all of which can have a significant economic impact.

"Managing biosecurity risks is increasingly challenging, as international and interstate migration, climate change, tourism and increased movement of goods all contribute to the risk of new incursions," Dr Clift said.

Dr Clift said government, industry and the community needed to work together to prepare for, and respond to, current and future biosecurity risks.

"Everyone has a part to play in protecting Victoria from the impacts of pests and diseases," she said.

The results from the survey will be published online and will inform the development of future biosecurity initiatives.

It is open for submissions until February 11.

## Cattle sell well

# Works at Portland Foreshore

GROUND has been broken on the multi-million dollar Portland Foreshore Redevelopment.

A sod turning ceremony this week marked the start of the popular recreational precinct's overhaul.

Glenelg Shire Council's \$6.5m upgrade, part funded by the Victorian and Federal Government, will also include foreshore erosion protection and lighting for community safety.

Victorian Regional Development Minister Mary-Anne Thomas visited the foreshore earlier this week, joining Glenelg Shire mayor Anita Rank in turning the sod to start the Portland Foreshore Redevelopment project.

Ms Thomas said the State Government had invested \$3m towards the project from the \$2.7b Building Works fund, established in response to the economic impacts of coronavirus.

She said the package was designed to provide immediate benefit to communities across the state and was aimed at creating jobs.

"We know just how challenging the past year has been for small regional communities that thrive on visitors coming to the region - that's why we're backing projects like this one that create jobs and make these communities even better places to live, work and visit," Ms Thomas said.

"Once complete, the foreshore will be a wonderful place for the community to enjoy and for tourists to come visit."

The project also includes construction of new accessible boardwalk pathways from the Trawler Wharf to Nuns Beach, connecting popular community spaces.

Works on the connecting pathways are already underway, with the southern end of the foreshore area progressing.

Glenelg Shire Mayor Cr Anita Rank said

turning the sod was the start of one of the biggest and most anticipated projects in Glenelg Shire Council history.

"This redevelopment will make Portland's foreshore a better, safer and more accessible place for our community to connect and enjoy recreational activities," Cr Rank said.

"Above all the redevelopment will ensure our 'jewel in the crown' foreshore area can reach its fullest potential, offering a unique and inviting visitor experience for all."

The redevelopment is expected to be completed by late 2021.

FISHING

A WARM weekend across the South East was welcomed by locals and tourists and plenty made their way to the water to throw a rod in, with some great fish caught.

The offshore scene has been fairly busy this last week.

We have seen the weather settle enough to allow us back out deep and plenty of boaties have taken advantage.

There were some great shark caught over the weekend.

Noel Doody boated a nice gummy at 24kg, along with a couple of others in the 60-metre area.

There were some nice flathead caught out at 100m by the drifters using a mixture of baits and jigs.

We have seen mainly sand flathead, but there is the odd tiger being boated too.

Knifejaw, terakhi and latchet fish have been in good numbers around the same areas, so expect a few of those guys.

There still is not any local tuna news to report, but the Portland guys are catching some nice 30kg and bigger fish in fairly close on the north shore, with even a few solid kingfish mixed in.


It will not be long - they will turn the corner shortly.

Surf fishos are already chomping at the bit in preparation for next weekend's Annual Kingston SE Surf Fishing Competition.

There have been some encouraging reports from up that way over the last week or so.

Shark, mullet, salmon and even snapper and flathead has been caught.

Blokes are not saying too much as to where

they are catching them at the moment being so close to the comp, but just drive until you find some reasonable water.

You only have to have a bait in the water to be a chance.

The local surf fishing has been fairly good apart from the weed.

I have heard a few reports this week that it has been particularly bad in some areas, while other spots have been virtually weed free.

There have been a few nice gummy shark caught locally, a couple bumping the 10kg mark, also a handful of mullet, but most

have been undersize.

There are still some pretty good numbers of salmon around, which has been great for those catching fresh bait.

Whiting numbers have been excellent again this week.

Most anglers have taken the opportunity when the wind has dropped to wet a line and they have found some great fish.

Cape Douglas and Red Rock Bay have been the best bet for landbased fishos, while the boaties have done well inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater, Racecourse Bay and

down around Danger Point.

There has also been some thumping silver trevally caught in the same areas as the whiting which have kept anglers hands full.

There are still good numbers of garfish, squid and tommy ruff caught in Livingstons Bay of late, which is encouraging to see as we head into the warmer months.

Get the burley trails going, which should bring on the gar and tommies, then hopefully the squid will not be far behind them.

Trolling for snook in Livingstons is also great fun and something you can do all year round.

Small metal lures of soft plastics are excellent - just find three or so metres of water and you are set.

There have been some nice fish from the Glenelg River this week.

I have seen some nice mullet and bream catches from all over the place.

The Glenelg River Angling Club had its first fishing competition of the 2021 season over the weekend and it was great to see plenty of people come and have a crack.

Paul Bingham won the men's section with a nice mullet of 75cm and young Aidan Minge won the juniors with a 65cm mullet.

Plenty of bream were caught too, with most taken on prawns.

There have been some nice perch caught up river on soft plastics.

Anglers have taken advantage of the calm mornings and found some nice fish.

The week ahead looks a bit cooler than the last one and hopefully the wind and swell both back off a bit too.

We are all itching to get down and get back into the fish.

Until next week, safe fishing.

HOT weather issues resulted in the abandonment of the final five races at Tara Raceway last Sunday but for Lewiston husband and wife greyhound training team, Clint and Shelley Trengove, it was a case of turning on the heat.

With only six races decided, Clint Trengove was successful with Apache Jakit and It's A Louie, while Shelley's Hello I'm Jade ran a quick time to win over the 400-metre journey.

Apache Jakit, owned by Tom Price Bush Chaplain John Dihm, became the first of the Cosmic Chief x Champagne Shot litter to win when leading all the way in the first heat of the Sims Family Memorial over 512 metres.

Going into the series with four minor placings at Angle Park and Gawler to his name, the white and brindle dog carved out a handy 30.15 seconds when holding off the locally-

trained Noir Star who worked home well for a half-length second for David Peckham.

It's A Louie, who won his maiden at Broken Hill back in September last year, brought up his fourth win when leading all the way from box eight in the 400-metre Winningformula.net.au Juvenile to defeat Open Throttle by a couple of lengths in a quick 22.99 seconds.

For the blue son of Worm Burner x Batty Allen it was his second win in the space of a week after he had won at Angle Park the previous Monday over 388 metres.

At Warrnambool last Monday litter brother Black Heel High scored a big win over 390 metres for Parwan trainer Wade Green.

Hello I'm Jade, having her 120th start, brought up win number 17 when taking over the running off the back from Saint Charlotte before going on to a 1¼ lengths win in 22.82 seconds.

This was the fastest 400-metre time run at the track since Almighty Stripe's 22.78 seconds on November 5.

The four-year-old daughter of Magic Sprite x Typhoon Monelli ran a quick 29.83 seconds in a grade-five 512-metre heat back in October at Tara Raceway.

She narrowly defeated Buddy Guy who turned the tables the following week in the final with a win that was equally as tight.

Meanwhile, the Tracie Price trained Compton Pete - a son of Peter Rocket and 2014 Winter Classic winner Stylish Moment - came from last to first to win the second heat of the Sims Family Memorial in a time of 30.69 seconds.

Compton Pete is owned by Karen Price, wife of the trainer who will be chasing consecutive Sims Memorial wins after Rocketline was successful in 2020 in 30.16 seconds.

The Sims name is synonymous with greyhound coursing and track racing in the South East.

Col Sims, ably assisted by his wife Val and son Ian, had great success with coursing greyhounds and quickly adapted to mechanical lure racing when introduced at Glenburnie in 1979.

Col Sims was on the committee of the South East Greyhound Racing Club when racing commenced at Glenburnie and was the first life member of the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing and Coursing Club Inc.

He won the final Mount Gambier Cup run at Glenburnie in 1996 with Colin Ian, a dog whose name is emblazoned on Col Sims' headstone at Carinya Gardens in Mount Gambier.

One of the casualties of last Sunday's abandoned races was the Tara Trackstar, a one-off 512-metre event run for the leading greyhounds at Tara Raceway between July and December 2020.

However, following consultation with the trainers - Tracie Price, Jason Newman, Dean Fennell and David Peckham - the race will now be run at Sunday's meeting.

Participants are reminded the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club's Annual General Meeting will be held at Tara Raceway, Lake Terrace East, Mount Gambier, on Sunday at the conclusion of kennelling.

WINNING races at Murray Bridge for the Sue and Jason Jaensch stable in future will be like winning a race at Naracoorte for them.

Sue and her husband Bruce recently purchased a five acre property near Murray Bridge to complement their large, established home base at Cadgee Park, north east of Naracoorte.

What better way to help celebrate the occasion than to have a winner at Murray Bridge last Saturday with their proven middle distance performer Von Costa Glass.

The nine-year-old gelding chalked up career win number 10 (six of those have been in city class races) with a last stride-victory in the 1800-metre BM 82 handicap.

It would have been an injustice had Von Costa Glass (\$11-\$8.50) not won as he was disappointed for a run between the 400 and 200-metre mark.

Aaron Lynch, better known as a jumps jockey, then had to switch across heels to produce Von Costa Glass with a last-to-first surge to take his career earnings to \$322,075.

The nine-year-old gelding is raced by long serving stable clients Col Richardson and Ron Brighton and it will not surprise to see Von Costa Glass line up in next month's Naracoorte cup over 2000 metres.

"Ronnie desperately wants Von Costa Glass to start in the Naracoorte cup but, with the weight he will get, where do you get an experienced four-kilogram claiming apprentice to ride him?" Sue Jaensch told The Border Watch earlier this week.

"His best form has been on wet tracks and it's only been this campaign that he has shown he can handle firm going."

As for the establishment of another stable at Murray Bridge, Sue sees it as a natural progression, especially with son Jason now as a co trainer.

"Even before COVID, we were on the road nearly every weekend with our horses and Bruce and I thought 'this is ridiculous', and the opportunity came up to buy Barry Kluske's old racing setup which is only four kilometres from the Murray Bridge racecourse," she said.

"Cadgee Park will always be our main base which will be run by Jason and his new wife Larissa, with Bruce and myself at Murray Bridge, which will make it a lot easier for all involved."

### LUCK FINALLY CHANGED

THE new year saw a change of fortune for the Jeff Searle stable at Bordertown following a frustrating run of placings by his horses.

The unlucky Fenceline and Persian Honey had been in the placings in the past month without winning and it was stablemate Good Girl Bella who broke Searle's run of outs with the easiest of wins at Stawell last Friday.

Putting top Horsham jockey Dean Yendall in the saddle helped the cause no end and Good Girl Bella was easily the best backed runner in the 1600-metre BM 58 handicap.

Yendall made it look easy as Good Girl Bella (\$6.50-\$3.40) led all the way for a simple three-length victory.

"He (Yendall) can dominate a race and he summed up the race well by deciding to take her straight to the lead," Searle stated.

"She had trialled well at Bordertown three days prior against good company and that gave us confidence.

"Some of the owners had a good win off her but nothing like the betting fluctuations suggested."

Meanwhile, Searle's stable star Wings Of Pastrami is having a spell after failing to win from five starts during the spring.

Wings Of Pastrami had a stellar season in her first year of racing as a three year old, winning four races (three of those in the city) but her best effort last campaign was a second at Morphettville.

"There is nothing wrong with her but she didn't spell that well during the winter and she did take on some of the better company during the spring," Searle said.

"She will be in the paddock for another 2-3 weeks before coming back to race in the autumn."

TWENTY seven years after starting out as a trainer, Sue Murphy last week chalked up her 500th winner, all from her Naracoorte base.

That averages out to nearly 20 winners a year, an excellent performance for a country trainer in anyone's language.

Consistent performer Longmire achieved the milestone for Murphy when making it back-to-back wins in the 1200-metre BM 64 handicap at Bordertown last week.

Victorian born Murphy was brought up around horses and raised in the Dergholm/Poolajelo area, just over the Victorian border and was asked if she could recall her first winner.

"Do I ever, it was Brisk Bacon at Mount Gambier, ridden by Phil Leinert, in 1994," Murphy quickly replied.

Murphy learned the trade from Penola mentor Robin Finlay but finding out her biggest thrill as a trainer was a harder question.

Was it Gunner Tom winning the Wangoom handicap at Warrnambool at 25/1, Cumbria winning the 2003 Christmas handicap at Cheltenham or perhaps Naseeb bolting in the Edenhope Cup last March?

"I enjoy every win, whether it be big or small and if you don't get an adrenaline rush every time you go to the races as a trainer, you may as well give it away," Murphy said.

### STEPPING STONE FOR PRICE

THE Limestone Coast has again shown why it is a proven nursery for jockeys embarking on their career.

Last week's Bordertown meeting saw four-kilogram claiming apprentice Ben Price ride his first winner on the Travis Doudle trained Spanish Heirloom in the 1000-metre maiden.

Price is the son of veteran Adelaide rider Simon Price and the younger brother of Will who is riding successfully in Victoria as he undertakes his apprenticeship.

It was an excellent night for local stables at Globe Derby Park last Saturday night with two winners.

The David Drury trained and driven Jackka Ted scored an overdue win when heavily

backed to win the 1800-metre NR 60-71 pace.

Crunched late in betting from \$1.90 into \$1.45 favourite, Jackka Ted gave his backers no reason for concern at any stage with an all-the-way victory.

The Greg Scholefield trained Emain Macha made it a hat trick of wins in the free for all to also lead all the way and justify his \$1.20 price.

The win made Scholefield's day as it was also his 72nd birthday.


"He (Emain Macha) is moving better than I am, but I've got a few years on him," Scholefield quipped.

"I've just bought a new set of clubs so I'll keep playing when I can and then get back into it after the footy season," Lewis said.

Nathan had some consolation by taking second place behind his brother in C Grade, while Jayden Eldridge took out A Grade with 39 points, one ahead of Thomas Madigan.

Leigh McManus claimed top spot in B Grade with 38 points, Peter Berkefeld continuing his form revival in second place with 36.

Meanwhile a player who has lived next to the course for a few years but only began playing about two years ago, has been soaking up a win he had almost conceded would never happen.

Playing off a 30 handicap, veteran Bob Tonkin compiled 43 points to take out last Thursday's stableford competition from Sarina visitor Ben Maxwell and John Sandery who both finished on 41.

"I was staying with a mate at Twin Waters on the Sunshine Coast - we were playing a

round there and I thought to myself, 'I'm living on a golf course, why don't I play?'" Tonkin said.

After buying a set of clubs and having some lessons after he got back home, he was on his way, although he soon realised how difficult and frustrating golf can be.

But with some helpful advice from fellow player Kym Sutherland, the drought finally broke last week when he set the foundation for that elusive win with a 24-point haul on the front nine.

That included four-point pars on the second and seventh holes, the latter coming courtesy of a chip in.

His back nine was not quite as productive, but a further 19 points was good enough for 43 in total and a round of 95 off the stick.

"That was my best round by a mile - at least I know I can do it now," Tonkin said.

While Tonkin took out the major prize, the round of the day was turned in by Shane Brook who had a 74 off the stick for 38 points.

A double bogey on the par-three sixth hole cost him the chance of shooting a par round.

In fact, an impressive drive on Sunday at Warrnambool saw the young driver win the B Main feature, transfer into the A Main where he started 19th, finished eighth and received the hard charger award.

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
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
