Culture bombshell

AN explosive recording of a Grant District Council meeting has revealed a number of allegations relating to Mayor Richard Sage's behaviour towards the organisation's staff, with one elected member referring to the treatment of employees as "disgraceful".

After a 19-month campaign, the recording of a meeting held in February 2019 to address

code of conduct issues has been publicly released.

The two-hour meeting was called partly in response to claims staff members were "harassed and in some cases bullied, disrespected and unsupported" in interactions with Mr Sage.

At the meeting, which despite being open to the public appears to be intentionally held privately due to a number of references to the

media and its coverage of the internal issues, councillors supported engaging an independent mediator and consultant to undertake a cultural review.

However, staff received notice a second cultural review will be undertaken by council after the initial investigation was not fully actioned.

An email sent by Grant District Council chief executive Darryl Whicker told staff a cultural engagement program would be undertaken following the failings of the previous review.

"This review left staff feeling disillusioned and dissatisfied knowing that their input was not fully documented, taken on board or therefore actioned," Mr Whicker wrote.

"As chief executive officer, I am genuinely sorry for what happened and wish to make a personal commitment to you that I, my management team, and the elected members acknowledge the failings of the previous review."

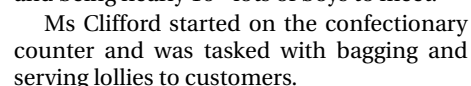

Success in fashion

A MOUNT Gambier event with a focus on ending fast fashion and promoting sustainability has been named South Australia's community event of the year in the state's 2021 Australia Day awards.

Recycled Runway committee members were thrust into the spotlight with a visit to Government House in Adelaide last week where they received the award from South Australian Governor Hieu Van Le AC.

The event has also been named Mount Gambier City Council's 2021 community event of the year.

Since its inception eight years ago, Recycled Runway has evolved into a standout social event for the Limestone Coast while promoting the impacts of textile waste, one of the largest contributors to landfill.

The Anglican Church initiative encourages people to recycle, reuse and repurpose second-hand clothing while raising funds for ac.care and the Uplift Project.

Held mid-year annually, participating aspiring designers purchase a bag of secondhand clothing from the Anglican Church Belltower Opportunity Shop and are tasked to recreate a new outfit from materials to be displayed in a fashion show-type event.

Involving an art deco theme, last year's event

proved difficult with COVID-19, but just weeks before event deadline, restrictions eased and the anticipated showcase was able to continue.

Practicing what it preaches, food was served in compostable containers, drinks were provided in glassware sourced from second-hand stores and decor was either made from reusable items or loaned from generous businesses.

2020 saw the introduction of many new event aspects including the Ashlee Lauren Sustainable Fashion Scholarship, with recipient Liza Mutch set to undertake a fashion sustainability course with mentorship from Ashlee Kalantarian – head designer and founder of Ashlee Lauren designs, now rebranded to A'el Esté.

Overall, \$7000 was raised and donated last year, the most in event history.

In 2019, Recycled Runway won the Best Recycled Resources entry in the 60th Mount Gambier Christmas Parade which was its second award over two years.

No stranger to accolades, the event also formed part of the City Council's winning entry in the 2019 KESAB Sustainable Communities - Tidy Towns awards.

Committee members said they were overwhelmed with the award, with event manager Leanne Dunn adding they would be focusing on expanding the event's reach nationally.

Ms Dunn said what she liked most about the showcase was it included all walks of life and it appealed to many different people.

"Founder Trudy-Anne Doyle has a strong passion for sustainability and lives and breathes it," she said.

"There are people involved like event judge Keith Hamilton who are just passionate about fashion, meticulous with how a garment is put together, the techniques used and how the garment is made.

"And then there are the people behind the event who can't sew a button to save their life, but are passionate about the community."

Involved since event inception, Mr Hamilton said he had seen a substantial journey with amazing growth.

"We have seen some great budding young designers and it is a real thinking challenge," he said.

"As a judge, it is not just about doing an amazing job, but how they've thought about things.

"The event is especially important for the sustainability of clothing and fashion because everybody knows about not wearing the same thing twice."

There are plans to adopt more mentorship opportunities for participants.

The next event, scheduled for August 28, has also progressed with the theme Out of Africa decided.

COVID help hits \$1m

MOUNT Gambier City Council's COVID-19 response has exceeded \$1m with rate relief, honouring sponsorship payments and an employee program among the key initiatives.

A report tabled at this month's council meeting outlined council's response with Mount Gambier Mayor Lynette Martin labelling the million-dollar spend an investment in the community.

Since April last year, council has directed \$174,673 to rate relief, waived \$162,500 in rent, allocated \$350,000 to development funding, paid out \$250,000 in sponsorships, given \$1000 to a business campaign boost and injected \$200,000 to the bulky waste trial.

The report also outline the council's COVID-19 Employee Program, launched in May last year and resulted in 21 people being employed, as well as an additional three trainees.

As of January 14, council still employed three people under the temporary scheme.

Over 750 hours of labour were donated by council to various not-for-profit organisations including Meals on Wheels, Foodbank Limestone Coast and Spare ya Change 4 Kids through its Corporate Volunteering Program, which council has endorsed as an ongoing strategy to be used when necessary.

Ms Martin said she was proud with the way council responded to COVID-19.

"We provided assistance to our community to safe guard their health and lead the city to a strong and sustainable recovery," she said.

"Of course this comes as a cost to council. It is an investment to our community."

Cr Sonya Meziniec said the report was valuable as it showed council stepped up quickly.

"It is good to reflect quite some way down that process to see what been done in summary and I think it is extremely useful because we did do a lot of good work and stepped up," she said.

"If an emergency was to happen again, we have some information we can use."

Man charged with murder

A FORMER Naracoorte man has been refused bail after he was charged with the murder of his friend in Perth in the early hours of Sunday morning.

Nathan Cherrington, 23 appeared in Joondalup Court on Monday accused of stabbing the 24-year-old man in a drug-fuelled rage.

According to 9News, a shirtless Cherrington knocked on a neighbour's door on Sunday morning and asked them to call police.

WA Police said police were called to the Kallaroo residence about 2.50am on January 17 and when officers arrived just before 3am, the man was found deceased.

Cherrington was taken into custody at the scene.

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Council cans rail land project

PLANS to develop the Millicent Railway Lands has been mothballed as Wattle Range Council estimates potential investigation costs will hit \$450,000 to address soil contamination issues at the site.

At Tuesday night's meeting, elected members backed a staff recommendation to no longer pursue council's action to procure, rehabilitate and develop the railway lands precinct, with officers warning almost \$100,000 has been spent on reports of the site, saying the expenditure was a "only the start of the likely cost".

According to engineering services director Peter Halton, an initial assessment detailed a number of potential soil contamination present at the State Government-owned sites and further identified the potential for groundwater contamination.

Mr Halton said officers had become in-

creasingly concerned with costs and timeframes to meet the council's endorsed plan to develop the site and questioned "whether council still has an appetite for this project".

He said council was still some way from finalising the project and raised a long-term liability with ground water contamination and the time frame required to complete the project.

"Officers are very concerned that the remainder of the site is likely to identify some major challenges and timeframes and costs of the detailed investigation and are likely to be significantly greater than the estimate," he said.

"Officers think the better option is to allow the state to consider the selling [the land] and council get out of the way of this proposal and allow the market to determine if this is viable. "In terms of the rail corridor... council could consider a licence with the State Government similar to that being considered for the Coonawarra Rail Trail."

Mr Halton said the potential remediation

costs have been identified to be in the order of \$450,000, but said the report detailed a number of exclusions to the estimated costs - including a purchase price - which will not be known until a detailed investigation and auditing is complete.

He said council has appointed an auditor to complete a third-party assessment and had directed additional ground water testing and water sampling of the drain to establish if this is impacting on ground water results, which had been completed at an additional cost of \$10,850.

"It should be noted that the auditor has made further recommendations to allow the final sign off of the document," Mr Halton said.

"However these are on hold as the officer is concerned that council is on a slippery slope to major cost and time blowouts and also transferring long-term liabilities to council should it proceed with the strategic action."

Councillor Dean Burrow expressed disappointment council had undertaken extensive

investigative efforts and placed the final transfer of land on hold.

"We have spent a lot of money to find out that government land is contaminated," he said.

"To me, it seems terrible that the State Government has left Millicent with polluted land in the middle of town.

"I think they should be responsible and clean it up as it is an eyesore."

But Corcoran Ward councillor Graham Slarks said he did not believe funds were wasted on investigating the site, praising staff for their efforts.

"I think the money has been well spent and I think has progressed the site," he said. "If we hadn't done anything, they land would sit there for the next 20 to 30 years. "If we are to fix up the railway corridor, that could attract developers to look at the old soccer field land. "If we do nothing, it is just going to sit there and it is an unattractive hole in the town."

A laser focus on corella flocks

MOUNT Gambier City Council is investigating the use of lasers at Blue Lake Sports Park to combat damage caused by flocks of corellas.

During this month's council meeting, councillor Christian Greco questioned what actions council was taking to mitigate grass damage at council-owned sporting venues.

Cr Greco said clubs and groups which use Blue Lake Sports Park had raised the issue, as well as other venues.

Council infrastructure general manager Nick Serle said each summer the species caused issues in the city and discussions continued on how to prevent damage.

A "pepper spray" has been developed by a local supplier, which Mr Serle said didn't harm the birds, and has been successfully implemented at BLSP baseball grounds.

Mr Serle said a cricket pitch, placed late last year, was damaged and council had supplied information on how to buy the spray and apply it to the association.

"I went and had a look at the pitch ear-

lier today and it's in quite good condition," he said.

Mr Serle said the pepper spray did not have the same impact on synthetic turf and Blue Lake Sports park hockey facilities were experiencing issues, with council exploring lasers as a protection device.

"Hopefully the laser bird scarer will work there and will actually be something council can provide," Mr Serle said.

"We have gas gun scarers, but the birds get used to that and have them available to clubs, but perhaps if this laser scarer works, council may be able to purchase some in the future and have them available to the clubs."

Firies fought to save own land

APPROXIMATELY 90pc of the landscape destroyed in Avenue-Blackford fire is owned by Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers, with losses ranging from \$50,000 to \$107,000, according to Lucindale CFS group officer Patrick Ross.

But the blaze, which destroyed one house and several properties, could have been worse if not for a drain located roughly 24km from Lucindale, which acted as a natural fire barrier.

Mr Ross explained the impact of the blaze to Premier Steven Marshall, Emergency Services Minister Vincent Tarzia and CFS chief officer Mark Jones during a tour of the five-ravaged Avenue, Blackford and Lucindale area last week.

He told Mr Marshall the fire - which has police say is not suspicious - could have spread as much as 50,000ha but was contained to 14,000ha as a result of good firefighting, centre pivot irrigation systems and natural firebreaks.

"I had one appliance out there which was near a massive firefront," Mr Ross said.

"The fallback position was a drain called Jacky White Drain and when the fire moved, it hit the drain which was actually a natural firebreak for 13km.

"If that wasn't there, the fire would be across that landscape at the same time which would have taken it from 14,000ha to 50,000ha. "That was incredibly valuable on the day."

Mr Ross said ground crews were extremely lucky to have the Lucindale airstrip nearby, with water bombers dropping 101 loads on the fire during the fire.

"These guys are of the average age of 70 and they worked their butts off," he said.

Mr Marshall praised emergency service volunteers for their efforts to combat the fires, saying the blaze "could have gone horribly wrong".

"You look at things and they can go one of two ways," he said. "Thankfully in this case it has been very quickly contained.

"Now the recovery begins, but I think there's already been significant moves in that direction and it's fantastic to have the two local councils working together and I know [Naracoorte Lucindale mayor] Erika Vickery is very grateful for the work that Kay and her team are providing in terms of that experience at the Keilira fire."

However, Mr Marshall said the State Government would not be providing financial assistance to primary producers affected by the fires.

Ms Vickery, who joined the tour along with Ms Rasheed, Member for MacKillop Nick McBride and Member for Barker Tony Pasin, said the tight-knit community had rallied together to assist in the clean up in the aftermath.

"The community has been very strong and busy cleaning up and helping each other, so there's been a lot of work done for neighbours and different organisations assisting in any way they possibly can," she said.

"It is very typical of Lucindale who really rally well around each other and support each other really well."

She said council will host a community meeting on January 27 at 6.30pm at the Lucindale Hall with elected members, emergency services, Lucindale Lions Club members and BlazeAid to discuss the recovery.

"It is to touch base with CFS, SAPOL, other organisations that have offered assistance and also the community so that we can get some communications happening between all the agencies and those that are affected or impacted by the bushfires," she said.

Ms Vickery said BlazeAid were scheduled to establish a camp at Yakka Park next week to help farmers with fencing requirements.

"The community has been very strong and busy cleaning up and helping each other, so there's been a lot of work done for neighbours and different organisations assisting in any way they possibly can. "It is very typical of Lucindale who really rally well around each other and support each other really well." Council will open the Lucindale Waste Transfer Station tomorrow (Saturday) to allow landowners and residents from fire-affected properties to dispose of hard waste at no cost.

Mr Tarzia commended the efforts of CFS volunteers and farm firefighters in battling the blaze, saying the delivery of 26 new trucks across the state's regional fleet and 55 thermal imaging cameras has significantly boosted the capabilities of brigades.

"It was a privilege to meet the dedicated CFS volunteers and farm firefighting unit members during my visit to the Blackford fireground with the Premier and local member Nick McBride last week," he said.

"The community acted quickly and were the reason no lives were lost during the blaze. "I commend them for their efforts in such difficult conditions." Mr Tarzia said automatic vehicle location trials, which will provide real-time vehicle tracking during bushfires and enhanced situational intelligence on firegrounds.

Adelaide Crows players Tex Walker, Darcy Fogarty, Lachlan Sholl, Kieran Strachan and Jackson Hateley will attend a meet and greet for Avenue and Lucindale community members tonight, followed by a kick the football event at the Lucindale Oval on Saturday morning.

A major fundraising event has been scheduled for February 6 with proceeds to be donated to individuals affected by the fire.

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Pump track for Lucindale

CYCLISTS, scooter riders and skateboarders will soon be able to roll on a new track after Naracoorte Lucindale Council approved funding for the Lucindale skatepark and pump track project.

At Tuesday night's meeting, elected members supported a staff recommendation to allocate up to \$185,000 for the project, identified by the Lucindale Masterplan - Centenary Park Working Group as a top priority.

The funding, received by council as part of the Federal Government's Local Road and Community Infrastructure Program, will upgrade and renew the town's existing skatepark and facilitate the installation of a new pump track at Centenary Park.

In a staff report, Naracoorte Lucindale Council chief executive Trevor Smart said a cost estimate of \$170,000 would appear reasonable based on council's contract for skate park modification and pump track construction in Naracoorte.

Mr Smart said there was an opportunity to engage the same company that had been awarded the contract for Naracoorte's Market Square to undertake Lucindale works.

Elected members backed Mr Smart's recommendation to approve direct engagement with the company rather than going to tender subject to design and costs.

In addition to the skatepark and pump track project, some tree removal will need to occur to combat dropping leaves and branches on the existing skatepark area and to provide space for the pump track.

Tree removal is estimated to cost \$13,600, which will be funded as part of council's allocation.

Riding a tourism wave

WITH global travel ruled out due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Limestone Coast's premier wine region is urging visitors to soak up the best of their own backyard through a new regional tourism strategy.

The Coonawarra Vignerons Association's Swap California for Coonawarra is promoting the district's food, wine, history and cultural experiences to domestic travellers across the nation, hoping to capitalise on waves of interstate and intrastate visitors.

Association acting executive officer Heidi Eldridge said the strategy added a fresh perspective to 2021 and tied in well with a South Australian Tourism Commission campaign, which will launch soon.

While unique in their own right, Ms Eldridge said the Coonawarra and Limestone Coast region had comparable features to California's climate.

"Its main grape variety is cabernet, it is close to the coast and we always acknowledge here Coonawarra's climate is heavily influenced by the near vicinity of coastal towns," Ms Eldridge said.

"We thought if we were looking at a region which is similar to us, that would be one to compare and entice visitors to think twice about, instead of going overseas, to why not spend it in our own country or state to really bring it all home."

Ms Eldridge said feedback from wineries indicated this summer holiday period has been busier than ever for some operators.

"There has been a phenomenal amount of people who have come from intrastate, there's still those people travelling from the metropolitan areas and just getting away to really take in without the congestion," Ms Eldridge said.

"The borders being back open has also seen the return of Victorian travellers and residents just over the border who would usually be doing day trips and outings.

"Accommodation providers have been well

and truly booked out, cellar doors have been seeing remarkable sales and guests have been booking wine tastings."

Ms Eldridge said visitors were predominantly from South Australia and Victoria with a small number of other interstate visitors.

"A lot of the visitation is coming across from coastal areas and day tripping to Coonawarra," she said.

"There has been a whole spectrum of people who are either camping, glamping, caravanning or staying in bed and breakfasts or accommodation.

"It is on par, if not better than normal and January is typically the busiest season, aside from Easter, and people are saying it will be busy past January."

Ms Eldridge said numbers showed people were keen to explore again and were appreci-

ating the Limestone Coast's hidden treasures.

"Our region is isolated to some extent, it is not crowded, there is not too many people around and we have space for people to spread out on the lawns and enjoy themselves," she said.

"People are actively wanting to discover their backyard more and this is where it ties in with swapping California for Coonawarra.

"We very much acknowledge the fact people can't travel overseas and I think there will be a bit of hesitation even once things do get back up and running again, that people are not necessarily going to be wanting to visit the United States or Europe."

Ms Eldridge said high tourism numbers were a positive and hoped if Coonawarra was benefitting, other parts of the Limestone Coast would too.

Big barrel proposal funded

PADTHAWAY could be the site of Australia's next 'big thing' as an industry-led push to develop a Big Barrel tourist attraction has been endorsed by Tatiara District Council.

At last week's meeting, elected members supported the Padthaway Grape Growers Association's request for funding a feasibility study for a giant wine barrel to the amount of up to \$12,500.

According to the town's peak vignerons association, the tourist attraction would help tell and promote the wine zone's history and stimulate increased visitation to the 4052ha area.

A staff report said the feasibility study will consider construction and ongoing main-

tenance costs, location, grant and funding opportunities and the potential value to the economy and businesses in the council area.

"While the detailed value proposition will be developed through the feasibility study, the Infrastructure and Transport Department estimates between 1500 and 1800 vehicles travel along the Riddoch Highway every day," the report said.

"Many of these vehicles will be transport or local travellers, but even if a small percentage of visiting travellers can be enticed to stop for a while or 'stay another day', this will have a significant positive impact on the local economy."

Robe mayor Nunan declines top job

ROBE District Council mayor Alison Nunan will not contest presidency of the Limestone Coast Local Government Association after being nominated for the position by a neighbouring council.

Wattle Range elected members supported a motion by Councillor Kevin McGrath nominating Ms Nunan for the role at Tuesday night's council meeting, after Cr Sharon Cox said it was "time we had have a new person as president".

"She has got a good business sense, has a lot of experience in this region and I think the workload for the Robe Council is certainly not as much as here, Naracoorte or Grant," Cr McGrath said.

"I am sure she can fill the position quite well."

Councillor Moira Neagle supported the nomination, saying Ms Nunan was capable and personable and "makes a point of interacting with all and sundry" at the region's local government association meetings.

Ms Nunan told The Border Watch she has contacted Wattle Range to thank the council for the nomination, but will not be standing.

Long-standing Limestone Coast Local Government Association president Erika Vickery said the position of chair was often voted following nominations from the floor at the association's annual general meeting.

"I don't think the other councils are actually considering it as a recommendation," she said.

"It is not usual for it to go through councils, it is something we do each year because the constitution says you need to do it.

"The nominations come from the floor and you vote from the board that are present, which is the usual process.

"It is unusual you wouldn't check who would like to stand.

"I have spoken to Alison... it is unusual, but it is also interesting."

Councillor Peter Dunncliff suggested Wattle Range mayor Des Noll run for the position, with Mr Noll declining the nomination.

A second recommendation by Cr McGrath nominating Kingston District Council mayor Kay Rasheed was unanimously backed by elected members after a suggestion to endorse Mount Gambier City Council mayor Lynette Martin was withdrawn.

Councillor John Drew initially moved to nominate Ms Martin saying previous leaders represented smaller councils leading to "the tail wagging the dog".

While agreeing with Cr Drew, Councillor Dale Price said he was conscious of "some of the ins and outs that are happening in the City Council", adding "her attention might be turned to the internal workings of council."



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Second cultural review slated

GRANT District Council will undertake a “cultural engagement program” after an investigation undertaken in April 2019, in which staff described the organisation’s culture as “toxic” and a place “gripped by infighting”, was not fully actioned.

An email sent from Grant District Council chief executive Darryl Whicker to staff members this week said a cultural engagement program will be undertaken by Adelaide-based firm Newberry Paterson to help the organisation prosper.

In the email - viewed by *The Border Watch* - Mr Whicker apologised and acknowledged what he described as failings of the previous review and assured staff that both elected members and the management team was committed to undertaking the program.

“This review left staff feeling disillusioned

and dissatisfied knowing that their input was not fully documented, taken on board or therefore actioned,” Mr Whicker wrote.

“As chief executive officer, I am genuinely sorry for what happened and wish to make a personal commitment to you that I, my management team, and the elected members acknowledge the failings of the previous review.

“But be assured that as a collective we are committed to undertaking this program, listening to our staff, and working with you to make the District Council of Grant a great place to work.”

The initial review followed the two-hour meeting held in February 2019 where councillors and staff detailed alleged verbal abuse towards council employees by mayor Richard Sage.

At the meeting, elected members voted to establish a cultural panel consisting of three councillors and engage an independent consultant to undertake a review of council’s cul-

ture. The previous review, compiled by AME Recruitment, alleged multiple incidents of staff being left in tears following interactions with the mayor.

The report revealed staff wanted to prohibit the mayor from being involved in operational matters, including approaching officers “directly with requests or demands”.

While staff recognised the mayor’s “dedication and passion” to the Grant district community, the report revealed that his method and approach with the workforce did the “greatest damage”.

“It is clear that some of the issues with the mayor are not new, his engagement, combative and entitled style has not altered significantly over the past few years.

“What has changed is that previous CEOs were better at actively managing the ‘fall-out’ from the mayor, better at protecting staff and better at keeping the conflict confidential.”

Every respondent who participated in the cultural review was “clear” that either Mr Sage or former chief executive officer David Singe, who was terminated shortly after the release of the review, should be removed.

Among the key recommendations was completely remove Mr Sage’s access to council offices and officers, ensure Mr Sage’s diary is made available to the elected body and prohibit Mr Sage from dealing with operational issues.

Mr Whicker told *The Border Watch* council was a public authority and the organisation’s culture, values, leadership and behaviours needed to align to best practice and adherence to legislation.

“This along with continuous improvement is what our cultural engagement is about,” he said.

“It is also to ensure our organisation is the best it can be in the delivery of services to our community.”

Grant District Council secret tape revealed

A COUNCIL meeting called to address code of conduct issues within Grant District Council was partly in response to claims staff members were “harassed” and in some cases “bullied, disrespected and unsupported” in interactions with mayor Richard Sage.

The recording, obtained under the Freedom of Information Act, reveals a number of allegations relating to Mr Sage’s behaviour towards council staff, including “abusing” former chief executive officer David Singe and other employees.

Held in February 2019, the meeting was called to address code of conduct matters following a hazard report lodged with council regarding alleged behaviours towards staff.

After protracted efforts by *The Border Watch* for almost two years to access the recording, including two appeals to the State’s Ombudsman, Grant District Council publicly released the document last week.

During the two-hour meeting, former Councillor Jody Elliot - who resigned last year due to COVID-19 - told the chamber that staff members had been “publicly chastised” by Mr Sage.

“Elected members are receiving consistent feedback from a range of sources that staff at the council are feeling harassed and in some cases bullied, disrespected and unsupported by elected members in relation to their intersections with the mayor,” she said. “Sources claim that some staff are considering resignation or lodging complaints.”

Both elected members and staff raised concerns with the behaviour of the mayor towards council employees during the meeting, including an incident where Mr Sage accused the then executive assistant - who resigned from the position in December - of altering meeting minutes, despite not having evidence to back up the claim.

Councillor Barry Kuhl, who along with Cr Elliot and deputy mayor Gill Clayfield called the meeting, said Mr Sage’s treatment of staff while in council meetings had been “disgraceful”.

“To accuse her of altering minutes with no proof is just not on in my books,” he said.

“I went to the state of actually sending [the former executive assistant] flowers after the meeting the other week because I just felt that disappointed in the way she was treated.

“And it has got to change or I’ll be gone.

“I actually thought about not standing at the last election and right now I am deciding whether I resign or not because I’m sick of it.”

Cr Kuhl’s sentiments were echoed by Mount Gambier Regional Airport manager Ian Fritsch who said he was “greatly” upset with the mayor’s behaviour to the former executive assistant.

Mr Fritsch said staff had been attending

council’s bi-weekly meetings to provide support to colleagues and mitigate against potential harassment.

“I wouldn’t like my wife to come to a meeting and be treated like that,” he said.

“I think that’s appalling.

“In the last few months, some of the older councillors would realise there’s a lot more of the council staff that turn up to council meetings and that wasn’t the norm.

“There’s a reason we all do that and it’s to support [the executive assistant]... or whoever the other person is so they are not left in here alone and don’t feel unsupported by their workmates.

“They don’t come to listen to you talk... they are here to support our work colleagues who don’t deserve to be treated how they are treated.”

Councillor Megan Dukalskis asked Mr Sage whether he had anything to say, to which he replied “I didn’t realise I was causing that much angst”.

Deputy mayor and meeting chair Gill Clayfield claimed Mr Sage had reduced a staff member to tears following stock thefts at the Mount Gambier and District Saleyards.

“I have been told you went to the saleyards and blew [the staff member] up,” she said.

When Mr Sage questioned what he had said to the staff member to upset them, Ms Clayfield replied “apparently he was in tears”.

Mr Sage said he was disappointed with the thefts, which he said had not been recorded on video because the machine had been unplugged.

He also said he was not aware of the thefts until he had read about it in the media.

“I agree with you Richard, we should have known,” Cr Clayfield said.

“But you still shouldn’t have gone out there to yell at [the staff member].”

Mr Singe told the chamber incidents involving the mayor also included “rude comments” to council’s economic development advisor while in the chamber and “attacking” and “abusing” the director of planning and environment.

“There are other episodes so I make the point as chief executive officer that this is not just about the executive assistant - everything about that is true - but it’s not the end of the story by any means,” he said.

“The staff have met and the staff said they have had enough.

“They are not prepared to accept it individually or collectively.”

In response to a question about the communication breakdown with Mr Sage, Mr Singe acknowledged the importance of working in collaboration with the mayor but would not work together with “someone who abused me”.

“Why should I talk to anyone who goes far beyond the bounds?” Mr Singe said.

“I don’t trust you, and nor do the staff. And they made it clear at the meeting on Tuesday they’ve had enough.”

Environmental Services director Leith McEvoy said the issues were long-standing and predated the election of the new council.

“It goes back to Graham Maxwell’s two months with us last year and back to Trevor Smart leaving us over a 12 month period,” he said. “Trevor didn’t really want to leave DC Grant, [but] Naracoorte came along at the right time and he knew there were issues between him and Richard.

“[Trevor] didn’t really involve the staff, Trevor probably kept it to himself a bit more so than say what David has, David is a bit more open about the circumstances.

“Trevor took a lot, I think, away with him and took it personally.”

At the meeting, which despite being open to the public appears to be intentionally held privately due to a number of references to the media and its coverage of the internal issues, councillors supported engaging an independent mediator and consultant to review the organisation.

Completed in April 2019, the review recommended Mr Sage’s access to council offices and officers be completely removed and backed prohibiting the mayor from meeting any council officer other than the chief executive officer on a one-on-one basis.

The 14-page review also recommended all public external communication by either the chief executive or mayor Sage to be reviewed and approved by the deputy mayor prior to its release. However, a leaked email has revealed a second cultural review will be undertaken by an independent human resources firm following staff concerns its recommendations were not fully actioned.

Mayor Richard Sage was contacted for comment.

Phone tower opposed by Robe residents

FOR the last nine months, a small group of Robe ratepayers has been attempting to negotiate with Optus on behalf of the Robe community, asking them to move a proposed communications tower 100m further south to be further away from homes and vastly less visible to everyone.

A petition was attempted in the middle of the COVID-19 restrictions making it difficult, but even then 100pc of residents approached agreed with the suggestion to move the tower - only two didn't sign due to conflict of interest.

Without fail, every resident told of the tower and its site have asked "Why there? There are acres of land further away, go to the other side of the oval?" and "if Telstra can operate from the industrial area why can't Optus?" or words to that effect.

Last year the Optus chief executive had a write-up in the Weekend Australian, extolling the virtues of Optus and how the company

wanted to work with the people and communities, and be competitive with Telstra. At this stage from Robe residents' point of view, Optus is not in the running at all.

A Robe ratepayers meeting was held and 100pc of the attendees agreed that the tower should be moved.

The community is not saying "no" to Optus, it's understood they are an essential service, all that is being asked is for the tower to be moved 100m further away.

The Robe Football Club, whose oval the tower is to be built on, has also asked that Optus move it and have written a letter to the Robe District Council to that effect.

Letters have been sent to the CEO of Optus, the Ombudsman, the State CEO of Optus, local and federal ministers and communications authorities.

And what have Optus done about this?

Apart from the compulsory attendance at

the initial hearing at the Robe Golf Club in July - nothing.

There has been no explanation or reason, and scant acknowledgement that there is even an appeal with them.

The Robe community queries have been to all intents and purposes, ignored.

The silence has been deafening.

We are not important.

It is only because legal advice and representation has been taken that Optus have had to delay the construction of the tower.

This attitude of big multinational companies stinks.

They will override and ignore anything which doesn't suit them, even if it is only moving a building 100m.

If Optus could give a reason why moving the site of the tower won't work we may understand, but we have had no response - just deathly silence.

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City rewards top citizens

HEALTH advocacy and helping others are key traits among this year's Mount Gambier City Council Australia Day award recipients.

Dulcie Hoggan and the late Pamela Moulden have jointly been named the city's citizen of the year for their advocacy to government for a statewide lymphoedema compression garment subsidy to offset the costs associated with treating the condition, which developed during cancer therapy.

Ms Hoggan and Ms Moulden worked with Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell to campaign for a South Australian subsidy, with the federal and state governments announcing a joint \$4.5m commitment in July last year, as well as working to establish a scheme in South Australia with a focus on delivering better services closer to home.

Ms Moulden bravely fought breast cancer for five years but sadly passed away on April 13, 2020.

The inaugural Active Citizenship award will be presented to The South East Junction coordinator Nel Jans.

After immigrating to Australia from the Netherlands in 2008, Ms Jans and her husband John made Mount Gambier their home.

Ms Jans has been the not-for-profit organisation's coordinator since 2010 and when Country Health SA withdrew funding for the position in 2012, she continued in the role as a volunteer, providing up to 40 hours of her time each week.

Since then, Nel has led the organisation, which provides mental health support and services across the Limestone Coast.

Mount Gambier's senior citizen of the year is Alan "Woody" Warden, a Scout leader in Mount Gambier and Millicent for 34 years, acting as a role model and mentor to thousands of young people in the community.

The former boilermaker would often take

unpaid leave from work to attend scouting jamborees in Sydney, Adelaide, Elmore and a Special Needs Camp in Victoria.

Ms Monger has been involved with community groups and causes such as Variety Club for Kids, donating 40 centimetres of her hair to the Hair with Heart program, the Australian Red Cross, Mil Lel Tennis Club and the

Rotary Club of Mount Gambier West.

Beachport stalwart awarded

WHEN former dairy farmer Rhonda Burleigh and her husband relocated to Beachport after selling their Victorian property, the active citizen decided against an early retirement.

“Right from the start, I decided I was not going to sit around and do nothing,” she said.

“We didn’t know anyone before coming to Beachport and had no relatives here, so the only way I thought we would meet people was if we got out and were involved in the community.”

The community stalwart’s 17 years of service to Beachport has been acknowledged by Wattle Range Council, with Ms Burleigh announced as Kintore Ward’s 2021 Citizen of the Year.

Since moving to the coastal town permanently in 2004, Ms Burleigh has volunteered her time to a number of educational, sporting and tourism endeavours.

After almost two decades, the 71-year-old has recently stepped down as a volunteer at the Beachport Visitor Information Centre, but continues to remain busy through her involvement at the town’s museum and bowling club.

Ms Burleigh’s first position on her arrival to the region was as a sports trainer at the Hatherleigh Football and Netball Club, a position she retained for eight years.

“I had come from a netball background where I played, coached, umpired, but training was a very vigorous job, especially as I was in my 50s,” she said.

“It was great fun and I really loved working with the juniors and the under 14s and 17s.

“They became sort of my family as we didn’t have any relatives down here.”

She quickly became involved with the Beachport’s popular VacsWim program, using

her decade-long experience from volunteering in Victoria to teach children water knowledge.

The long-time educator continued her teaching career in the region, providing assistance to Beachport Primary School students and offering private tuition for children.

Ms Burleigh also helped with Book Week celebrations and was instrumental in rolling out the Jack Attack bowling program - a fast-paced version of the traditional form of lawn bowls - to primary school students.

“Working with the kids was very special,” she said.

“The Jack Attack program was for year three to seven students Beachport Primary School students and then we expanded it to

include Kangaroo Inn Area School students which was great.”

Despite an extensive resume, Ms Burleigh cites her involvement at the award-winning Beachport Old Wool and Grain Store Museum as her proudest achievement.

“I don’t know what it was about the museum, but it got me,” she said.

“When I first arrived I thought the museum made Beachport, but in my heart I thought lacked information about Beachport’s history.

“My first job was to research the history of the Rivoli Bay railway line to Mount Gambier, which was very important to the development of Beachport.

“Around 2008, Hazel Watson wanted to make a 1920 schools exhibit so we got some big

blackboards from Kangaroo Inn Area School and created a classroom from that area.

“We introduced the first touch screen so people who might not be able to climb up the stairs were able to read about the history of the town.

“Just recently we have researched and installed four panes about the history of Mr Bevilacqua, who was an important figure in Beachport and whose name is still on the museum building.”

While Ms Burleigh continued her community involvement, husband Ted was persistent in his efforts to lure her to the Beachport Bowling Club.

“In 2010, eventually I did and I was offered the cleaning position, which I had experience in from when I worked at the hotel,” she said.

“Two years later, someone nominated me as secretary and I have been on the committee ever since.” “We have done a lot of things at the bowling club, we have hosted a number of birthdays and wakes alike, raised a lot of money and won a lot of awards.

“In 2019, we received a grant towards installing solar panels at the club which was a very long battle.”

Ms Burleigh said her extensive efforts - which also include Meals on Wheels and helping to design the town’s mosaic works - aimed to make the town a better place for tourists and residents.

“Beachport is a great community and has been a nice place for us to spend these years of our life,” she said.

“My next goal is to get Wattle Range Council to fix the bowling club and then hand over the facility to the club.

“I also have more plans for exhibits at the museum.

“I am a proud 71-year-old and will keep going for as long as my health will let me.”

Millicent youth a cut above

WHEN the darkness of depression descended on Millicent teenager Frazer Johnson, he found comfort in the most unusual of ways - growing a mullet.

"I was in a really bad place mentally and I felt as if I was running around in circles," he said.

"I saw an ad come up on my Instagram for a mental health fundraiser where you grew a mullet and thought to myself I'd do it because what's the worst that could happen.

"I filmed a video and explained my feelings and why I was doing it which got thousands of views.

"At first I felt sick to my stomach, but after seeing all the support and people reaching out, I was blown away."

The iconic "business in the front, party at the back" hairstyle was a defining symbol of the 18-year-old's recovery and a broader campaign to raise funds and awareness for the Black Dog Institute's Mullets for Mental Health campaign.

Frazer's modest goal of \$5000 was quickly smashed within days of the campaign going live, with businesses, individuals and teammates at the Mount Burr Football Club rallying around the cause.

The Millicent High School student mobilised friends, family and the broader community to embrace the mullet, raising almost \$13,000 for mental health research.

"The support from the community was unbelievable and I had so many people reach out to me and tell me their stories," he said.

"I was working at Foster's Foodland at the time and people would hand me \$50 notes.

"One day people had given me so much money, I actually had to empty my pockets in the car.

"Surreal is the word to describe it."

During August's campaign, Millicent and district residents noticed an increase in the number of young people sporting the haircut as a number of Frazer's friends joined the mullet renaissance.

In August, the 'More than a Mullet' team took to Can Hill at the Mount Burr Football Oval to chop off the sides and let the back grow wild as part of the fundraising event, raising more than \$2136 on the day.

The teams' final \$12,832 tally placed the

group of young men in the top 20 for total raised by a team.

"All of that money is going towards mental health research, which will help prevent and treat disorders," Frazer said.

"I have done mental health first aid and I know what Black Dog Institute has done and seen the great resources available for people, especially blokes.

"Hopefully the money can help break down the barriers and provide more help to the people who need it."

Frazer's extraordinary efforts has resulted in the horticulture trainee receiving Wattle Range Council's Young Citizen of the Year for Corcoran Ward, which will be presented at the Millicent Australia Day celebrations next week.

"I can't take full credit for raising the money because the boys did heaps and the community did heaps," he said.

"The only thing I can claim I did was stepping up and saying enough is enough."

"I think it shows it only takes one person to start the conversation."

Frazer - who has made a full mental health recovery - hoped his cathartic experience would encourage other community members to seek help when experiencing depression or anxiety.

"I'm all good now - actually, I am on top of the world," he said.

"My problem was I would worry about things that I couldn't control.

"I have grounded myself a lot more and just looking at things week to week.

"I can prepare for the future and learn for the past, but the goal is to live in the now."

THE importance of a safe and supportive school environment and strong student representation was the catalyst for Josh Kellock joining the Kangaroo Inn Area School's student representative council.

"Because Kangaroo Inn is such a small school, it is really important for people to look out for each other and for the staff to interact with the students," he said.

"I was involved in SRC for quite a few years and I would do school tours to show people around the school. We also started multiage groups where we would help students familiarise themselves with each other, teachers and the principal.

"It was important to make people feel comfortable and get the younger kids involved so they were able to enjoy school like we did."

Josh's service to the school community and his broader community involvement has been rewarded with the recent graduate receiving Wattle Range Council's Young Citizen of the Year for Kintore Ward.

"I was a bit shocked when I got the call from the mayor," he said. "You don't do things to get awards, so it was pretty unexpected."

"We didn't get to organise many events which was disappointing, but we still split into groups once a week in the morning to help get people comfortable with each other," he said.

Throughout his schooling, Josh has been an active participant in a number of school-based activities including in Kangaroo Inn's renowned agricultural program.

In Year 7, Josh started training goats before moving to cattle handling, travelling to Adelaide to participate in the school competition in the Royal Adelaide Show.

When not on the farm or at school Josh can be found on the coast, where he currently serves as a Surf Life Saving volunteer and provides beach patrol along Robe's Long Beach over an eight week period each year.

"Mum grew up on the coast and her brother used to surf, so she signed me up to nippers when I was eight," he said.

"After nippers I decided to continue and ended up getting involved in the beach patrols. We set up the flags at the front beach so swimmers can be safe and patrol the beach to help anyone who needed it.

"It is good to make your presence known and I just like being at the beach because it is good fun."

Currently, Josh is working on his parents' farm and hopes to be accepted into a flying school.

"My dad used to fly planes on an outback station and I have always wanted to fly," he said. "My long-term plan is to start a business to do outback tours in planes, maybe somewhere like Wilpena Pound. That is definitely the dream."

A STRONG-WILLED Penola youth who used her personal challenges to become a role model for her peers has been named the township's 2021 Wattle Range Council young citizen of the year.

Ebonie Moulton, 18, will receive the Australia Day honour for her dedication to community programs, which support the district's young people.

Graduating from Penola High School last year, the charismatic and down-to-earth student was the site's Year 12 Dux and acted as the student representative committee president, having been involved in school leadership since Year 8, as well as serving as sports captain.

Ms Moulton's story came to light through a podcast on Best Version Of You - hosted by Imogene Ryan and Renna Wetherall - agreeing to the interview in an effort to help others understand they were not alone with their individual challenges.

Ms Moulton said she was nervous about the podcast but knew if she opened up, she may provide an insight for others facing life obstacles.

The teenager completely leapt out of her comfort zone, speaking about body image, battles with eating disorders and also her broader life.

"I am very passionate about self love and the way that I gain self love myself is through sharing my own battles and helping other people. I just took a chance and did it and it's probably one of the most rewarding things I have done," she said.

"Lots of people don't know I went through what I did and it is such a rewarding feeling knowing I helped people through similar circumstances I went through.

"It honestly helped me too, but I just wanted to spread awareness that there are many people out there who are in the same boat and it's not scary to speak up and get help."

Achieving a perfect score in art during Year 12 and having her artwork Salvation displayed during the South Australian Certificate of Education Art Show, Ms Moulton said she had always had a passion for all things creative.

The young budding artist's style is mostly contemporary with a speciality in realistic portraits, but she has recently leaned towards abstract techniques.

Ms Moulton said she shared her work online and it had began to gain attraction, believing it had helped others.

"As I have grown older, rather than just drawing, I have started to draw how I'm feeling and what others may be feeling so they can resonate with it," she said.

"My mum was very artsy and I have an artistic family in terms of music and everything, so that might be where I picked it up.

"It was always just a side hobby, but I went through a bit of a dark phase in Year 9 and 10 and it was a way of dealing with things and helped expressed how I felt."

Ms Moulton said she was shocked to have been awarded the title and thought she may have been nominated for her empathy and effort to help improve people's own opinions of themselves.

"In Year 8, I did a speech on standards of women and another in Year 10 about expectations we go through as high school students and needing to know what you want to do as soon as you leave school," she said.

"I started doing public speaking which I have never done before and I realised it was something I really enjoyed doing. A lot of the topics I could express how I felt."

Ms Moulton was also involved in various school projects and began to develop a school zen room, which will be taken over by the next SRC president.

Having a gap year, Ms Moulton plans to move to Queensland in June and will continue working before heading to university.

Council stalls
saleyards call

A DECISION on whether to continue operating the Millicent Saleyards has been deferred until next month, with Wattle Range Council voting to discuss the long-running issue behind closed doors before committing to its future.

At Tuesday night's monthly meeting, council deputy mayor Moira Neagle submitted a notice of motion recommending council continue to fund the facility for the next five years.

The council-owned facility was initially slated to close on June 30, 2020 after declining throughput had made the facility unviable.

But elected members vote to give the long-running facility a 12-month lifeline through to the end of this financial year in an attempt to improve numbers.

In an impassioned five minute speech, Cr Neagle urged elected members to support the multi-part motion, which also included allocating funds in its forward budgets, to continue to maintain the saleyards to an operational standard.

A condition report identifying works required over the next five years has set the cost of necessary upgrades as \$524,415 noting the ageing infrastructure did not have a proper maintenance straight to ensure compliance and longevity.

However, Cr Neagle said the report was an "indictment on previous councils" which "uncovers the fact that maintenance has not been adequate to sustain the sales for years, possibly decades."

Cr Neagle said smaller producers were highly supportive of the retention of the yards and commercial buyers indicted the Millicent facility was integral to their supply of high-quality stock.

She said financial numbers should not be the sole determining factor in addressing the decision, with council spending hundreds of thousands of dollars on other public assets "which are used either infrequently or by a very small cohort".

A staff report showed annual financial losses have decreased in the past three financial years, with 2019/20 recording a loss of \$101,839, \$135,323 in 2018/19 and \$180,163 in 2017/18.

The report outlined cattle throughput had increased to 10,256 in 2019/20 and grossed \$13.6m over the 23 sale days.

Comparatively, cattle throughput for 2018/19 was 8206 resulting in \$9.1m worth of gross sales, 8509 cattle passed through in 2017/18, contributing to \$10.1m in gross sales.

Staff outlined a number of key initiatives undertaken in the past 12 months, including changing the sale day from Thursday to Wednesday during the winter period to follow the Mount Gambier sale held on Wednesday morning.

"As stock numbers decline during the winter period, sales are much shorter which enables agents and buyers to participate in two sales in the one day," the report said. "As a result, Millicent sale days in comparison to previous years has recorded greater number through the facility and significantly better prices."

"This is a direct result of having more buyers attending the Wednesday sales during the winter period." However, the changes and numbers did little to persuade Penola-based Councillor Rick Paltridge to retain the facility, who labelled the saleyards as "an absolute waste of money".

He questioned the legitimacy of the figures, telling the chamber there was "so much misinformation" and said the yards were beyond the point of being able to be redeemed.

Cr Paltridge moved a motion to allow councillors to discuss the facility at council's upcoming informal gathering and revisit Cr Neagle's motion at the February meeting.

Numbers rise at Glenburnie

MOUNT GAMBIER CATTLE - WEDNESDAY 1894 (92)

NUMBERS rose slightly as agents yarded 1894 head.

These sold to a smaller field of trade and processor buyers with feeders and restockers active across the offering.

MOUNT GAMBIER SHEEP - WEDNESDAY 4165 (-1666)

NUMBERS eased as agents yarded 3775 lambs and 390 sheep to total 4165 head overall.

These sold to the usual field of trade and processor buyers with a number of restockers present and active over the offering.

Quality was mixed this week ranging from light weight store merino lambs from a fire-affected property near Lucindale to well shorn heavy and extra heavy pens with something in between to suit all buyers.

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Good drop

SOUTH Australia recorded a 12pc reduction in water main incidents in 2020 compared to the previous year, with an increase in favourable weather conditions and infrastructure investment touted as reasons for the decrease.

SA Water had 3639 water main leaks and breaks reported across its 27,000km network in 2020, down from 4139 in 2019 and below the annual average for the past 10 years.

Regional water main incidents dropped from 2086 in 2019 to 1834 in 2020.

These figures include everything from major breaks to minor pipe leaks, damp patches and trickles on the road.

SA Water capital delivery senior manager Peter Seltsikas said the weather's impact on South Australia's reactive clay soils remains the key stress on the state's underground pressurised water pipes, and therefore the main influence behind the number of water main breaks.

"Similar to 2017, we saw relatively mild transitions between seasons, resulting in more stable levels of moisture in the soils and therefore fewer water main breaks," Mr Seltsikas said.

SA Water installed around 36kms of new water mains across the state last year, with \$155m to be invested in infrastructure to 2024.

TOYOTA LEADS INDUSTRY IN 2020

TOYOTA has led the Australian automotive industry to a better-than-expected sales total of 916,968 new vehicles for 2020.

The industry tally includes a record 54,335 Toyota hybrids, propelling electrified vehicles to more than five per cent of the annual national market for the first time.

Despite the toughest economic conditions experienced in a generation, Toyota’s overall tally of 204,801 customer deliveries came within just 965 sales or 0.5 per cent of its total from the previous year.

Market share of 22.3 per cent was Toyota’s strongest result since 2008 – a rise of 3 points.

Toyota became the first automotive company to take a clean sweep as the best-selling brand, while also having the top-selling vehicle in every major category – overall (HiLux), passenger car (Corolla), sports-utility vehicle (RAV4) and light-commercial vehicle (HiLux).

It was the best-selling brand for the 24th time, including the past 18 years in a row – and the top seller in every state and territory.

Toyota dealers sold more than 200,000 vehicles for the ninth year in a row and for the 16th time in the past 17 years.

For the third year in a row, customers bought twice as many vehicles from Toyota than from any other make.

HiLux (45,176 sales) was Australia’s best-selling vehicle for the fifth year in a row. It was also the country’s most popular commercial vehicle for the 23rd year straight.

The versatile workhorse has now been the sales leader in Western Australia for 13 years, Queensland for 14 years and the Northern Territory for 20 years.

RAV4 was Australia’s best-selling SUV with a record 38,537 buyers. It was also the most popular hybrid with 26,400 or almost 70 per cent of its total demand.

Toyota’s legendary Corolla was the best-

selling passenger car for the 8th year in a row. Stablemate Camry has now been the most popular mid-size car for a consecutive period that now spans 27 years.

Other Toyota vehicles that led their segments were LandCruiser Prado, LandCruiser wagon, Coaster, HiAce van and HiAce bus.

Toyota Australia President and CEO Matthew Callachor said the industry and Toyota results were remarkable in the circumstanc-

es and expected to improve in 2021.

AT long last we have a weekend forecast to look forward to.

We will still have a little bit of breeze around, but finally we will see the return of some warmer weather just in time for the Kingston Surf Fishing Competition.

There have been some reasonable fish caught this week, even if the offshore news has been a little on the quiet side.

But that was largely due to conditions.

Late last week six or more metres of swell battered the coastline and with the wind on top of that, no one hit the water.

Later in the weekend it settled enough to allow a few guys on the water and there were some nice sharks and bottom fish caught.

Gummy sharks made up the bulk of the news, but some nice nannygai, flathead and knifejaw also hit the deck.

Up around Kingston and Cape Jaffa a few anglers got stuck into a school of kingfish.

They were all of nice size and took a variety of trolled lures.

It would be great to see them come down our way before popping up in Portland.

Hopefully someone can find them.

The surf news is a lot like the offshore news, a bit light on but there are a few catches to report.

The Coorong has been virtually unfishable this week with the big seas and wind, but that should keep things pretty even for anglers heading up there this week.

Warm days, easing winds and smaller tides will be favourable for anglers in this weekend's competition and hopefully we see the fish spread out right along the Coorong, plus some nice big ones weighed.

Local news has been less than average too, but a few guys got a trip in before the weather turned really bad.

Piccininni through to Browns Beach has produced a handful of gummy shark this week, but the size has been a bit on the smaller end of the scale.

There are also a few mullet sniffing around but the size is not there just yet.

The local jetties have all fished excellent this week.

I have seen some great numbers of tommy ruff, mackerel, trevally and salmon trout.

The last time we had mackerel in numbers like we are seeing now, we had an excellent run on the bigger mullet down along Green and Danger Points.

Now I do not want to jinx it at all, but I have my fingers crossed.

The squid fishing off the Port MacDonnell Jetty has been excellent these past few weeks.

We have seen anglers regularly catching 10 or more in a session, which has not happened for a number of years.

The sizes are mixed, there are plenty of little guys in there, but there are also some jumbos too.

The Glenelg River has produced more nice bream and estuary perch this week.

Lure fishos down the bottom end have

found good numbers of fish on cranka crabs and natural coloured soft plastics fished deep along the rock walls.

Gordon Jeffrey has been picking up some nice bream and perch land-based from down around Nelson on the fly rod, using one of his custom tied flies.

Mullet reports have been a little bit quiet, but there are whispers of a few fish from around the Hutchessons area over the last few evenings.

I am yet to see any pictures, but the size

was apparently on the up.

The Glenelg River Angling Club has a competition on this weekend down there, so hopefully we hear a bit of mullet news from them.

With warm weather forecast for the weekend, it is great to see people out and about getting organised nice and early for the weekend.

If you are heading up to Kingston this weekend, best of luck and I hope to see one of our customers bring the boat home.

Less than three weeks ago, the Min-bool teenager got the all clear from stewards to ride at metropolitan class level and he duly rode his first winner at Murray Bridge last Saturday.

And what better way to achieve the goal than aboard a Limestone Coast trained galloper.

That was on the Sue Murphy trained Farooq in the \$52,250 BM 78 handicap to make it three wins for Opperman from four rides on Murphy-trained horses in the past month.

In what can only be described as a peach of a ride, Opperman rode the gelding perfectly to score by four lengths.

"Dad and I had figured out that there would be plenty of pace from the Grant Young trained pair and that I would try and follow the favourite Stan The Caddy throughout and everything worked out well," Opperman told The Border Watch this week.

It worked out so well that Farooq (\$6.50) dashed past Stan The Caddy and the two leaders in the blink of an eye at the 500 metres and from there on it was a procession.

It turned out to be a memorable occasion.

"The whole family, including my grandparents, made the trip to Murray Bridge for the day," Opperman said.

"My next aim is to ride a winner at Morphettville when racing returns there in the next few weeks."

The success of the Murphy/Opperman combination has come about due to Opperman riding track work for her at Naracoorte for some time.

"I have known her for most of my life and I go to Naracoorte once a week to work her horses," Opperman said.

Trainer Sue Murphy was also chuffed with the efforts of both Opperman and Farooq.

"I told Jacob to try and get Farooq to settle and not to stir him up as he is a big horse and he needs plenty of room, and he did that to perfection," Murphy stated.

Will Farooq be headed towards a hometown Naracoorte Cup in just over a fortnight's time?

"Naracoorte is a tight track which does not suit Farooq and now that he's measured up to city company this campaign he will be aimed at the Birthday Cup at Morphettville, the day prior to the Naracoorte cup," Murphy said.

"From there he may go to the Lord Reims, also at Morphettville, over 2500 metres later in February."

The Murphy stable is low flying at present with six winners in the past three weeks.

So, what has happened to Hasta La War, her stable star last year who was one of the favourites for the Adelaide Cup last March before succumbing to injury.

"He will have another scan in a week's time and hopefully be ready to race in about six weeks," Murphy said.

BORDERTOWN MOVED TO MID WEEK

EARLY initiative by Thoroughbred Racing SA officials has resulted in Sunday's race meeting set down for Bordertown being rescheduled.

With a temperature of 43 degrees predicted for Bordertown on Sunday, the meeting has wisely been transferred to next Wednesday, January 27.

It is the Summer Cup meeting which has been part of Limestone Coast racing since 2004 and is normally run at Mount Gambier.

The biggest crowd to ever attend a Summer Cup fixture was at Mount Gambier in 2009 when 1,400 people saw the Sam Turner trained Fraaclease take out the feature race.

"I then lived in the Barossa Valley at Angaston for some years and have been here at Melrose for the past 12 years.

"Charlton trialled super at Oakbank eight days prior to Penola and I was very confident about his chances, even though he had done nothing at six previous first-up runs."

Victory in the Coonawarra Vignerons Cup went to Skillful Steps (\$4.20-\$3.40 fav.), trained at Morphettville by Richard and Chantelle Jolly and part owned by Mount Gambier Racing Club life member and former president Ian Perryman.

Perry also reminded participants the monthly checking of greyhounds at Tara Raceway by Craig Finlayson would commence on Tuesday, January 26.

COMPTON trainer Tracie Price boasts a fair record in recent times in the long-running Sims Feature Maiden (512 metres) - Benara Cosmic successful in 2014 and Rocketline again last year.

The series, which has undergone a few minor name changes over the years, is now known as the Sims Family Memorial, run in memory of Col and Val Sims and their son Ian.

It is probably fair to say Price and his wife Karen would not have gone into last Sunday's final at Tara Raceway with Compton Pete and Compton Brett with any degree of confidence.

After all, Compton Pete had won his roughhouse heat the previous week in 30.69 seconds, certainly considerably slower than Apache Jakit and Noir Star's 30.15 seconds and 30.19 seconds when running the quinella in the other heat.

Compton Brett, on the other hand, had scraped into the final after running 7½

lengths fourth in the faster of the two heats.

In fact, after eight starts he had yet to run a place, Price saying bad box manners had been holding him back.

He was not kidding.

The big black dog once again made a mess of the start from box eight in the final.

In fact, Compton Pete was no better, the pair's first splits of 4.71 seconds and 4.72 seconds resulting in the kennelmates tailing the field the first time past the post.

But after finding an early spot on the rails, Compton Brett was able to rail through down the back straight and take the lead.

A boiloover was looming.

Meanwhile, out wide, Compton Pete was keeping out of trouble and making ground.

In the run home, the Price-trained pair fought out the finish, Compton Brett, a \$34 chance and probably the longest-priced winner of a Sims Feature Maiden, winning by 2¼ lengths in 30.43 seconds.

By Brett Lee, at one time dubbed the world's fastest greyhound, the WA-bred

Compton Brett is out of My Nakita, a winner of seven races at Cannington and Mandurah for more than \$32,000 in stake-money.

My Nakita is by the Irish super sire Spiral Nikita out of Winsome Bluebird, a member of a terrific litter which included Miata, Sure As and Deville.

Compton Brett and two of his littermates were transported as pups from WA to Compton and reared by Price on a two-for-one basis.

While last Sunday's feature win was a good start to the year for Price, there is promise of plenty more to come for the early leader in the 2021 Ian Badger Leading Trainer award.

"We've got quite a few pups to be broken-in out of litters that we've bred, including My Redeemer x Headline, along with Miss Freeloove, Who's Doing What and Flying Flutter (all by Mepunga Blazer)," he said.

These days it is pretty big business out at the Compton kennels; predominantly a family operation and perhaps not all that different to the successful Sims family operation all those years ago.

"Kalangadoo has been amazing to me."

"They ring up now to see how everything is going here - that is the care they have for their people."

Of course Ayton and Forbes still had to sell their plan to the Casterton Sandford committee, which was anything but an easy task but in the end it was a decisive outcome.

"It was tough to get people on board to stay in the Western Border but we got through the vote," Ayton said.

"The worst case scenario is this COVID might happen for another year, which would hurt us."

"If we were in the South West league (last year) we would have missed out on footy anyway."

"We can't change our whole history because of the COVID scare."

Ayton praised the work of outgoing president Nathan Fidler, who he said along with the whole committee had worked hard through a tough time to ensure the future of the club.

He said the WBFL had been understanding and president Michael Summers had worked well with the club through all the issues it faced.

Ayton and Forbes now have a huge task to ensure the club remains relevant in the WBFL, with netball also a big focus.

A senior coach has not yet been announced but Ayton and Forbes are in talks, with a decision pending.

"That is the biggest decision we have to make and we can't afford to mess it up," he said.

"It might be someone in-house who de-

serves an opportunity, or it may someone we are talking to at the moment."

"We are not panicking."

For Forbes it was an easy decision to take on the vice-president's role, with his passion for the club clear.

Having grown up in the region and played his junior football at Casterton, he said he was 100pc behind the club whichever way the vote had gone and his desire to keep the club afloat was never in doubt.

"It was a pretty easy decision really."

"As in any small community town, footy is the heartbeat of the town."

"You walk past someone in the street and they want to talk about the footy."

"There are some unanswered questions about COVID and other things as well," he said.

"But I'm a firm believer in jumping each hurdle as it comes."

"There is no point stressing about things you can't control."

"For me it is about getting things in place internally and if two months down the track one of the governments says the borders are closed, we work through that and work out what is best for the club."

In the end Forbes said one pleasing factor of the whole scenario was the vote to remain in the Western Border league was not really close, but more one-sided to remain as is.

ANY doubts about the future of Casterton Sandford in the Western Border football league and netball association were put to rest this week, with the club voting to keep the status quo.
