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THE Millicent RSL as the site for Wattle Range's proposed new council office could again be in play as elected members flagged a motion to reconsider the former netball courts as the location of the \$5.5m facility.

Despite preliminary design work moving ahead at the North Terrace and Williams Road corner site, elected members raised concerns about the location at last week's informal gathering, claiming the decision was rushed.

Councillors also floated purchasing vacant shops in George Street, moving the Millicent skate park and Apex Park as preferred sites for the proposed council office, saying the current location was too far from Millicent's central business district.

Elected members discussed the council office for more than an hour, with a motion to reverse the decision likely to be tabled at next week's full council meeting.

Meanwhile, council will also consider the future of Millicent Saleyards next week, with the livestock selling facility at risk of closing in June unless an extension to operate is granted.

Uni changes tune



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THE University of South Australia is phasing out its music programs offered through the James Morrison Academy after ending its partnership with the jazz school.

After just six years, the university announced it will discontinue its undergraduate and postgraduate program offerings at the Mount Gambier campus, which is headed by jazz musician James Morrison

UniSA did not address questions relating to why the program would no longer be offered and enrolment numbers at the facility.

Current third year students will complete bachelor degrees as planned and a small number of undergraduate and post-graduate private students will continue to study at the facility, housed at Mount Gambier's Old Town

Mr Morrison did not believe changes to the performance-based campus would have any impact on the annual Generations in Jazz festival, stating "Mount Gambier is the home of

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A duty: RSL's call to retain hall

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MILLICENT Returned and Services League (RSL) vice-president Bruce Clayson is pleading with Wattle Range Council to consider the town's late veterans following renewed discussions on demolishing the RSL Hall to construct a \$5.5m council office.

Mr Clayson, who was recently awarded Wattle Range Council's Corcoran Ward Citizen of the Year citation, addressed elected members at last week's informal gathering to oppose any prospective demolition fo the hall.

"The Department of Veteran Affairs, council and the RSL have put huge amounts of money into the structure and the thought is beyond me to consider that site be pulled down and reused," he said.

"I cannot see the rationale why council is considering this as a site as I thought the site had been decided on previously."

A push to reconsider the site as the location for the new council office elicited a emotional response from Mr Clayson, who told the chamber he had been called up for National Service in December 1967 as part of the mandatory military service scheme while in the third year of a motor vehicle apprenticeship. Due to be married in 1970, Mr Clayson said he opted to undertake six years of part-time service with the Citizen Military Forces, now

known as the Army Reserve.

"I donned the uniform, swore on the Bible to serve Queen and country and be available for overseas duty if required," he said.

"During that five and a half years training, I learned how to kill people, do weapon training, map reading , jungle warfare, drill and how to take orders.

"Labor won the election and abolished National Service and we were all sent home, end of story."

Mr Clayson said he was approached by former Millicent RSL president Syd Pelling to join the sub-branch in 1993 and has since held a number of executive roles, including president He believed the hall, which was erected as a war memorial in 1956, should be retained to honour the legacy of the town's veterans.

"I became very good friends with a World War II veteran Henry Hawke, who was treasurer at the RSL sub-branch for 13 years," he said.

"I am sure people like Syd Pelling, Bill Werchon, Ralph Bowman and Henry Hawke would not have been thought about what is being discussed today.

"I think it should be left as a shrine to the ex-servicemen and women who served our country to preserve what we have today."

However Councillor Dale Price was undeterred by Mr Clayson's plea, saying the RSL had forfeited its agreement with council on at least two occasions, reverting ownership of the land and building to council.

"The RSL, its people and Bruce fought on my behalf for freedom of speech and that is what we are exercising," he said.

"The RSL had the lease and the building and at least on two occasions, it was forfeited.

"Council has actually maintained that facility and allowed - without agreement - the RSL to use that building.

"It has now become a symbol of preciousness and it needs to be balanced by the fact that in the past, members have allowed it to lapse."

Council will continue its discussion on the site of the proposed staff office at next week's meeting.

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Councillors also floated purchasing vacant shops in George Street, moving the Millicent skate park and Apex Park as preferred sites for the proposed council office, saying the current location was too far from Millicent's central business district.

Elected members discussed the council office for more than an hour, with a motion to reverse the decision likely to be tabled at next week's full council meeting.

At the December monthly meeting, Councillor Dale Price raised a series of questions relating to the conditions of ownership between council and the Millicent Returned and Services (RSL) sub branch hall.

At last week's meeting, council chief executive Ben Gower told elected members although council had sought legal advice about the RSL Hall, it was received "a couple of business days before the meeting where the decision was made".

Mr Gower said following the expiry of a lease in 2006, council entered into a licence to occupy agreement with the RSL subbranch, which did not provide exclusivity to the club.

Cr Price said expressed concern elected members had not received the information about the agreement prior to the October council meeting.

"I am uncomfortable with that decision because I think we made it in haste and we had actually sought that information," he said.

"This is a significant decision which I think is better taken at leisure than haste.

"I still think the building needs to be somewhere near the CBD in Millicent.

"Council offers one of the largest workforce in the district and to have that workforce and their potential spending close to the Millicent CBD must have an economic benefit to the community.

"Because of the information that became available, I indicted to Ben I was prepared to put a rescind motion on the table... because I think significant information wasn't considered at the time when it should have been."

Cr Deb Agnew agreed the decision was rushed and backed Cr Price's concerns the former netball court site was too far from Millicent's main street precinct.

"I believe people won't walk, talk and spend money in the centre of town," she said.

"They are not likely to just zip out for a coffee from that site.

"You can argue about this, but there's a lot of research that has been done.

"We are not going to be right in the middle, but we are going to be closer if we think abut where we might place this new council office."

However Cr Kevin McGrath rebuked claims the decision had been rushed, saying council had discussed the issue for more than six months.

"It's not as if it just come up that night," he said.

"We have been going backwards and forward on this for months.

"We had to draw the line somewhere."

At the October council meeting, Cr Mc-Grath moved a motion to proceed with the formal netball courts for the site of the building, which was narrowly supported by a majority of councillors.

However, councillors Rick Paltridge and Moira Neagle said the vote - which was won by six votes to five - did not demonstrate overwhelming support for the site.

Cr Neagle said Cr McGrath's motion "caught us a bit off guard", saying the result "was not a clear decision one way".

"To revisit it because of that vote is worth considering," she said.

Cr Paltridge who along with Cr's Neagle.

Cr Paltridge, who along with Cr's Neagle, Agnew, Price and Dean Burrow voted against the motion, said he was "very uncomfortable" with what he termed as a close vote.

"Okay democracy rules and I know 50pc

plus one and all of that, but at the end of the day six to five is really difficult to sell," Cr Paltridge said.

"I think we have got to have a far more concrete conclusion or the vote has got to be eight to three, nine to two - that is going to be a lot easier for us to go out there with confidence and continue this process through."

Cr Dennis Muhovics asked what would happen if a six to five vote was reached on the RSL Hall, asking councillors to justify what would be an acceptable voting scheme.

"If you are saying six to five isn't a real result, what if you get six to five the other way?," Cr Muhovics said.

"Is that a result?"

Despite Wattle Range mayor Des Noll urging councillors to consider the results of the community consultation, which showed 39pc of respondents preferred the former netball court site, Cr Graham Slarks said he would push hard for an office in the main street.

But Mr Gower said the main street posed a number of challenges for council, including the need to purchase multiple buildings and increases of property values as a result.

Cr John Drew said he agreed with an earlier suggestion made by Cr Peter Dunnicliff to relocate the current skate park.

"When you think about it, it's not such a bad spot," he said.

"The critical issues for me are the closeness to the centre of town, I think it is important and and that is the only site that is acceptable."

\$90k a cause for relief

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A 5000L tank, a fire pump, coastal accommodation packages, heifers, signed AFL merchandise and a surfboard are among the 124 lots of items worth more than \$90,000 to be auctioned to support Lucindale and Avenue Range families affected by the recent fires.

Businesses and individuals from across the region as as far afield as Adelaide have donated goods, services and vouchers to help generate much-needed funds for bushfire relief.

More than 120 lots comprising of items ranging from wine, machinery, framed prints and beauty products will be auctioned at the event, which will be held at the Lucindale Country Club tomorrow night.

Event coordinator Amanda Carter said the event was developed following an overwhelming response to a call for auction items during the Adelaide Crows meet and greet session held late last month.

"We were contacted by Darcy Fogarty who used to live in Lucindale about bringing some Crows players down to show support for the community and those affected by the fires," she said.

"On the poster we released, we asked people for fundraising ideas or if they wanted to donate items for an auction and it just exploded.

"Before the Crows came down on January 22, we already had \$35,000 worth of contributions and we decided to do the auction over two nights.

"We ended up getting more than \$90,000 and there are still people who want to donate but we can't accept because we already have too many items."

Ms Carter said organisers were overwhelmed by the generosity of the community, with businesses and individuals digging deep to support families affected by the fire.

"There has been a lot of people donating accomodation, some for overnight and others for longer stays," she said.

"Limestone Coast Motorcycles and Small Engines have donated a fire pump, Mini Jum-

buk donated a king size quilt which is just fantastic and we have had donations of a chainsaw and a signed North Melbourne jumper.

"Heards Menswear in Naracoorte have donated gift basket full of items and there are a lot of gift vouchers for hotels and meals across the region as well."

The blaze, which SA Police deemed as nonsuspicious, burned through 17,000ha of land, claimed three structures including a residential property and killed thousands of stock.

However Ms Carter said the community was buoyed by the generosity, comradeship and outpouring of support in the recovery.

"The support for our little town has just been amazing and it is coming from everywhere," she said. "People from Kingston, Naracoorte, Mount Gambier, Penola, Robe and all around the region have been so gener-

"A group of Robe businesses put together a hamper of vouchers and goods including artwork, wine, food and accommodation which is valued at \$3000.

"We had a man drive all the way from Mount Gambier to Lucindale because he

wanted to make a donation.

"Lucindale is such a small town and things like this help people who have been affected by the fire know that there is support and there is help out there."

Organisers have engaged the assistance of Lucindale businesses to help collate the hundreds of items for auction, with Castec Rural Supplies manager Daniel McCarthy sourcing donations from suppliers and organisations.

The donations include a 5000 litre tank from Bushmans worth \$1000, creo posts from OneFortyOne, two 500ml Marks-Min worth \$900 from Boehringer Ingelheim and two soil test worth \$280 from Fertitech.

Mr McCarthy said the Lucindale Castec branch had donated a Engel 40 litre fridge, while the broader Castec group had contributed a \$5000 inshore gift voucher for the auction.

"The Castec group and our boss likes to give back to the community, locally we support the football club and the Lucindale Cricket Club, and we were keen to support this as well," he said.

"We called a few of our suppliers and asked if they wanted to help and everyone has been very generous.

"Zoetis have donated 15 litres of Startect which is worth around \$1400, Nufarm have given us 20 packs of 20 litre Crucial and Elenco have contributed an Zolvix Plus esky filled with assorted products. "Elders Naracoorte have also contacted their suppliers and sourced items for the auction as well."

The event will start at 6pm and meals and beverages will be available to purchase, with all proceeds raised at the auction to go to families affected by the fires.

Robe band Axis will entertain the crowd and COVID-19 measures will be in place.

Coronavirus restrictions in Victoria

VICTORIA has reintroduced mandatory mask rules, reduced the number of people allowed in homes and stopped an increase on the number of people allowed in offices after an Australian Open quarantine support worker tested positive to coronavirus.

Premier Daniel Andrews announced the restrictions - which include a 15 person cap on gatherings and compulsory face masks in all indoor functions - in a late night press conference on Wednesday night.

Mr Andrews said the infected person last worked at the Grand Hyatt Hotel on January 29 and was tested at the end of his shift, returning a negative result.

In the days following his last shift, the 26-year-old developed symptoms and got tested, returning a positive result late on Wednesday.

Authorities have directed individuals who have been at eight Melbourne locations at certain times and days to get tested and isolate for 14 days.

Exposure sites include Kmart stores in Keysborough and Brandon Park, Coles Springvale, Bunnings Springvale, the Melbourne Golf Academy, Club Noble in Noble Park, Aces Sporting Club in Keysborough, Northpoint Cafe in Brighton.

Mr Andrews said the man was a Country Fire Authority volunteer and had attended a social function in his capacity as a volunteer firefighter.

He said the case had been identified relatively early and authorities had received extensive information about exposure sites.

"This is one case," he said.

"There's no reason for people to panic or be alarmed.

"We know what to do."

Blue Lake back to two-way traffic

MOUNT Gambier's iconic Blue Lake no longer has directional restrictions on pedestrian traffic with the popular exercise walking path completely returned to two-way activity.

Mount Gambier City Council removed restrictions this week originally introduced in response to COVID-19, with users still encouraged to social distance where possible.

In response to community concern, council implemented a one-way, clockwise only foot traffic directive around the Blue Lake ex-

ercise path in April 2020.

In November 2020, council reviewed the directive and reinstated two-way pedestrian traffic around the Blue Lake footpath on John Watson Drive.

The 750-metre Bay Road section remained one way due to the narrow path against the road barrier, which makes physical distancing difficult.

Council city infrastructure general man-

ager Nick Serle said council had a greater understanding of COVID-19 and transmitting it in the open air was less probable than first thought.

"We have taken on board feedback from the community and reassessed the directive once again and will open the Blue Lake walking path back up for use in both directions from Wednesday, February 3," Mr Serle said.

"We have had no active cases of COVID-19 in the region for many months now, but it is

still important to maintain physical distancing principles where possible when using the Blue Lake exercise path."





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Support for saleyards upgrade

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GRANT District Council has supported an in principle funding contribution of \$2.7m towards a multi-million dollar upgrade of the Mount Gambier and District Saleyards if two State Government grants are unsuccessful.

Elected members voted to contribute an additional \$850,000 towards the \$5m major infrastructure project to progress a Federal Government grant application.

A staff report said council had applied for \$850,000 - 17 per cent of the total project cost - under the State Government's Regional Growth Fund last year, but had yet to be informed if successful.

The report said council had applied for the same amount under another State Government funding stream, with guidelines indicting applicants will be notified on final decisions in late March.

According to the report, guidelines for the Federal Government's Building Better Regions Fund - which close on March 5 - indicate that a project must be investment ready, with applicants having confirmed funding contributions from all sources to be eligible.



ADDITIONAL FUNDS PLEDGED: Grant District Council will increase its contribution towards a transformational project at the Mount Gambier and District Saleyards to \$2.7m if two State Government grants are unsuccessful.

"The implication of this eligibility requirement is that council will need to demonstrate in the Building Better Regions Fund application that they are prepared to fund the full funding partner contribution of \$2.7m if applications for state funding are unsuccessful," the report said.

The report said enquires have been made with the Local Government Authority to obtain current prices on borrowings, with indicative rates between 2.15pc to 2.50pc a year on debenture loans confirming \$100,000 a year will be self-servicing based on the estimated 70,000 cattle processed each year through the facility.

In October, councillors basked the project plan which includes a 13,600m2 cattle roof, holding pen reconfigurations and the installation of solar panels at the Glenburnie site. ??

If funding is secured, the project will also comprise of the provision of soft flooring throughout the cattle selling area to reduce foot soreness and maintenance labour requirements, security cameras and lighting and a new sprinkler system to help suppress

AV, audio and networking is also earmarked for the facility, which council hopes will facilitate online sales.

Other inclusions are replacing the concrete slabs on the buyer's walkways, a trough watering system, soft flooring, security cameras and LED lighting and a toilet at the weighbridge.

According to the report, the roof – which is estimated to cost \$2.7m – will improve conditions for workers and safeguard against inclement weather.

The project will also include the re-roofing of the old calf shed and the raising of the Brian Collins and Bob Cranwell roofs to enable more selling pens in the busy season.

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MORE than 75,000 doughnuts have rolled off the production line since Mount Gambier's regional Krispy Kreme Hot Light Factory opened in December.

The OTR Mount Gambier East and Krispy Kreme site launched late last year and its unique Blue Lake doughnut remains in its top five sellers, complemented with the sale of the iconic Molonys Blue Lake Lemonade at the site.

An estimated 1400 people have also experienced the Hot Light doughnut feature at the Ramsay Avenue site, which employs 50 people across the two operations.

OTR Mount Gambier store manager Sonia Langenberg said the grand opening was overwhelming but the new team was finding its feet.

Ms Langenberg previously managed the Portland site and moved to the Limestone Coast to take on the role.

"It is a lot of absorb in the first little while and we have had a couple of little teething problems, but other than that it is business as usual for us," Ms Langenberg said.

"It is just great for Mount Gambier too, to have such a high end offer.

"You often see stores like this in the cities, but the country doesn't always get the nice stores and now Mount Gambier has a few also

with Coles, Aldi and other developments."

Ms Langenberg said people had embraced the combined OTR and Krispy Kreme service and the 24/7 site was extremely busy.

"We are already seeing some regular cycles with different shifts and tradies which come through fairly regularly," she said.

"More and more truck drivers are also us-

ing our facilities with our truck lounge as well which has everything set up for them.

"Christmas Day was massive and you wouldn't think people would eat hotdogs and pies, but they do."

Krispy Kreme retail manager Simon Burchell said the site had opened with a big bang, praising the community for its support.

"We have a steady stream of regular clients who the team look forward to seeing, and it has certainly exceeded our expectations so far," he said.

Mount Gambier City Council elected members discussed the opening during last month's meeting and Councillor Christian Greco labelled the site an enormous economy boost.

"Whilst yes it is a service station and a donut shop, to this town it was a big injection into the local economy with the input of what the build cost was and they are also employing 50 locals, a lot of them being young people in their first jobs," Cr Greco said.

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THE University of South Australia is phasing out its music programs offered through the James Morrison Academy after ending its partnership with the jazz school.

After just six years, the university announced it will discontinue its undergraduate and postgraduate program offerings at the Mount Gambier campus, which is headed by jazz musician James Morrison.

In a statement, a UniSA spokesperson the programs in music offered through the academy were being "phased out", but said all current students were expected to complete their studies this year.

However, UniSA did not address questions relating to why the program would no longer be offered and enrolment numbers at the facility, simply stating "all other questions about James Morrison Academy should be directed to James Morrison Academy".

Mr Morrison said the tertiary education landscape had changed dramatically due to the COVID-19 pandemic, with multi-billion dollar revenue losses from the collapse in international student enrolments forcing many institutions to review and discontinue a number of humanities, arts and language courses.

He said due to the university's decision to phase out the programs offered at the campus, the academy had not been allocated any new diploma or bachelor seats, resulting in no new student intake for 2021.

"The James Morrison Academy and UniSA partnership has been an exciting development in music education, helping many young people who love music realise their goals and ambitions," he said.

"In the coming months we will be continuing discussions with key stakeholders including the City of Mount Gambier, the Education Department, other university and pathway providers and members of the music industry to look at the different ways we can continue and in what form that might be in the future."

The jazz great said current third year students would complete bachelor degrees as planned and a small number of undergraduate and post-graduate private students would continue to study at the facility.

"It's very sad to have to turn away all those who wanted to begin new studies with us at James Morrison Academy in 2021, but this situation is out of our control and we are aware that many people have suffered greatly due to the pandemic, so we are just grateful to be able to continue as we are," Mr Morrison said

While the facility will remain at its current site at the Old Town Hall, Mr Morrison

said there was "many exciting plans for creative projects at the former WIN site and James Morrison Academy may certainly be involved".

The dedicated jazz school offered a threeyear Bachelor of Music but stopped accepting enrolments for the program in 2020, with one-year diploma and honours courses still offered.

Mr Morrison told The Age in 2019 it was due to a change in federal funding arrangements.

The academy was opened in March 2015 with the help of a \$500,000 grant from the State Government, with then Premier Jay Weatherill saying Mr Morrison had forecast an annual intake of 70 students, "building to a potential student body of up to 200 students by 2020".

At the academy's opening event, UniSA vice chancellor David Lloyd dubbed Mount Gambier the "undisputed jazz learning capital of the world", telling the crowd "the academy will do for Mount Gambier what country music did for Tamworth".

"The James Morrison Academy is of great importance to the provision of music education locally and nationally and it is a partnership we hope to build on into the future," he

"We are looking forward to working together with James and the state and local governments to ensure its great success."

Students at the James Morrison Academy of Music are enrolled as full registered students of UniSA, but attend classes at the campus situated in Mount Gambier's Old Town Hall building.

Faculty are employed directly by the academy and curriculum is created by teaching staff.

Under the partnership with UniSA, students are able to apply for a HECS-HELP loan to pay for tuition.

"Mount Gambier is the home of this event and I don't imagine whatever the future holds for James Morrison Academy having any effect on Generations in Jazz."

Lions prove life-savers

PATIENTS with hereditary pancreatitis no longer have to undergo a pancreas removal, have it flown to Melbourne to have islet cells removed, and have those cells flown back to Adelaide for their life changing transplant following a donation from Lions Australia.

The Lions Club of Mount Gambier, Naracoorte and Kingston were among a number of clubs throughout the C2 District contributing to the islet auto-transplant treatment, which is used to manage severe insulin-dependent (type 1) diabetes.

The technique is a modification of an islet transplant procedures in which groups of cells in the pancreas are isolated from a deceased donor pancreas.

In chronic pancreatitis, the patient's own cells are used which eliminate the risk of tissue rejection. While patients in South Australia could receive the life changing surgery, the processed involved the patient having their pancreas removed in Adelaide before it was packed and flown to Melbourne to extract the

Once the cells were removed, the islets were stored in Melbourne before being flown back to Adelaide for transplant due to the lack



of a special storage facility.

The three Limestone Coast clubs responded to a call to contribute to a storage facility, joining with other clubs throughout the Lions' C2 District to raise \$15,000, which was matched with a grant from the Australian Lions Foundation

Green Point's access probed

GRANT District Council will await information from the Environment and Water Department before making a decision on the future management of the unmade road reserve at

Opponents and proponents of Green Point access addressed elected members on Monday night, with members of the South East Amateur Fishing Club, the Feast family and Country Fire Service Port Macdonnell brigade captain Rodney Virgo presenting to council.

Recreational anglers and beach goers have been able to access Green Point beach for more than 100 years largely in partnership between council and the Feast family.

Access to Green Point is via a councilowned unmade road reserve, but does not lead to a beach access gate and is made unaccessible due to an adjacent sand dune. Entry has historically been permitted by the Feast family, with motorists crossing the private farm to access the private gate onto the beach.

Property owner Morgan Feast told the chamber the family had "no joy" in allowing beach users access to the property and called for council to close the road or allow the family to purchase it, citing biosecurity concerns and a series of behavioural incidents from

But Mr Virgo said the development of the unmade road would reduce the likelihood of trespassing and work towards addressing biosecurity hazards and concerns by the Feast

Mr Virgo said he had discussed the issue with other CFS members and said the development of the road would provide emergency services with a safer option in accessing the beach in the future.

Grant District mayor Richard Sage told the chamber council had discussed the issue with State Government agencies to discuss native vegetation issues and an investigation was ongoing to determine whether beach access can be permitted at the end of the unmade road.

"We are expecting a list of questions back from native vegetations, if there are any permissions and if we can do it in the first place,"

Snapper back on line

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THE Limestone Coast will be the only area in South Australia anglers can target snapper, with new bag and boat limits coming into effect this week.

A bag limit of two snapper per person and a boat limit of six snapper when three or more people are fishing on the boat will apply under new arrangements for South East waters. Snapper catches must be reported via the SA Fishing app or by calling Fishwatch on 1800

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell has praised the State Government for overturning the former control measures for snapper fishing, which comprised of a tagged system providing just 303 anglers from the Limestone Coast, Murray Bridge and Kangaroo Island areas a limited number of tags to catch the species in South East waters.

Mr Bell, who was vehemently opposed to the management system, tabled a petition in parliament with almost 400 signatures to axe the snapper tag system and implement a bag limit for the fishery.

At the time, the independent MP said a report used to justify the current snapper management scheme, which found South Australia's snapper stocks were "decimated", did not consider the unique marine environment in the region.

Mr Bell told The Border Watch he was pleased the government considered the science - which showed snapper stocks in South East waters come from Victoria - and reversed

"Our snapper stocks come from Port Phillip Bay and migrate west, but the studies they were relying on was up in the gulf regions," he

"The government was also worried the closures in the gulf would mean the fishers who

would normally target snapper in those areas would come to the Limestone Coast and decimate the fishery here.

"The issue with that is you can't get out on the water most days. "If people want to drive down 400km and drop a line in the water, I think that's great, but there will be some days they come down where they can't go out."

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham said of the five snapper tags distributed to the 606 anglers across the state just 452 snapper were caught in the South East.

Mr Basham said this year's recreational allocation of 1077 snapper until June 30, 2021 was more than double the actual recreational catch from last year.

If the recreational allocation of snapper is caught before June 30, the recreational snapper fishery will be closed.

\$120,000 to continue Wyomi campaign

KINGSTON District Council will undertake area, including constructing a rock seawall an additional sand nourishment campaign along Wyomi Beach this year after receiving a \$120,000 State Government grant.

The funding will accompany a contribution from council and aims to replenish lost material to maintain the protection buffer until a long-term strategy has been deter-

Council says a significant loss of sand dune has occurred at the site over a number of years, which ultimately threaten private property and damaged council infrastructure. Since 2016, council has implemented longer term strategies to defend the erosion and installing sandbags to combat further

According to council, sand nourishment will provide a soft protection strategy in an effort to reduce any further reactive damage which hard options can often trigger.

"While sand nourishment may not have been council's original strategy or preferred approach, sand nourishment is the preferred option of the Coast Protection Board for erosion protection and is seen across many beaches in South Australia due to a number of benefits it provides," council said. "At Wyomi, this natural northern sand movement becomes particularly important, as the sand placed on the southern end of the rockwall will naturally mobilise north to replenish the beach immediately in front of the wall.

"This helps to ensure that the wall is not undermined or eroded. Sand will drift and replenish areas further to the north such as the Sailing Club, where erosion has been seen over the past few years."

The latest grant follows an earlier State Government contribution of \$105,000 for continuing the protection project, which facilitated the installation of geotextile sand bags to the northern and southern section of the rock seawall competed in 2018.

Our support critical during transitions

YOUNG people aged between between 12 to 14 and 18 to 21 are feeling increasingly isolated, according to new research by headspace National Youth Mental Health Foundation.

The findings - revealing a substantial uplift since the data was last recorded in 2018 - come as young people in these critical age groups enter into major transition periods in their lives with the return of school, study and work.

Headspace clinical practice executive director Vikki Ryall said young people in these age groups may need additional support from parents and carers, as the impacts of COVID-19 are still keenly felt.

"We know transition periods can be a time of high risk for young people," Ms Ryall said. "The move to secondary school from primary or from school into further study or the workforce can feel quite daunting for young people in any instance and COVID has now added extra complexity. It's likely that 2020 caused major disruptions to their year with these young people feeling disconnected from newly formed friendships or new ways of life."

Ms Ryall said the usual support structures that schools, workplaces, and further education have in place were compromised during 2020 due to COVID, leaving young people with fewer opportunities to access support when needed.

"We encourage family members to check in with their young person, seek positive and helpful support to help them get through these difficult or unexpected stages," Ms Bareld said.

IT IS the final photograph of father and son captured shortly before Duncan Craw tragically died while snorkeling off the Port MacDonnell coast, a cherished possession for young Levi - who turns three today.

The Craw family is still coming to grips with last month's tragedy, which they believe was the result of a medical episode, and have vowed to return to the reef where Duncan was last seen, waving to his high school sweetheart from the calm ocean.

A memorial gathering was held Sunday for the much-loved 32 year old as donations for Taylia and Levi surpassed \$50,000 to help support the young family's future.

Taylia's brother Bret Trigg spoke fondly of his brother in law, with the family buoyed by the strength of Levi, who "knows his daddy is in heaven".

"Having the support of the community all over Warrnambool, all over Australia and New Zealand, has helped get us through and we're so grateful for all the donations that have come in for Levi," Mr Trigg said.

"Duncan's biggest gift to our family was Levi and the love he gave Taylia," he said.

"He's not here anymore but that love we felt is never, ever going to end."

Mr Trigg said the family would always be 'coastal kids' and Levi would feel an extra connection to the water, knowing his father is there with him.

Police investigators are carrying out forensic testing of remains found near Port Mac-Donnell on January 26.

The discovery followed speculation Mr Craw had died as a result of a great white shark attack, however the family believes Duncan was at peace before the animal arrived.

"Tay didn't see a struggle in the water and there was no big disturbance to the surface, or birds flying around, so we believe Duncan had a medical episode first before the shark came," Mr Trigg said.

"His own dad passed away from a heart attack in his early 40s and so it's always been in Duncan's mind that something similar could happen to him.

"He'd had a health check just three weeks ago and was healthy, but it's one of those things that is hard to predict, especially for someone young.

"Because of the conditions and that there was no big disturbance, we believe it's most likely he passed away in the water before the shark came along."

Mr Trigg said the family may never know what happened but the last thing it wanted was for people to be fearful of the ocean.



Donation backlog overwhelms site

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 $ABACKLOG of stock \ has \ resulted \ in \ Life line$ South East introducing an alternative sale outlet at its Mount Gambier warehouse.

Garage style sales have started each Tuesday and Wednesday morning at the not-for-profit organisation's depot due to an accumulation of secondhand clothing and items throughout the COVID-19 pan-

Secondhand items not purchased by consumers after a six to eight-week period will be available at the new service for a discounted price.

Warehouse operations supervisor Chris Hastie said volunteers had only just started processing stock from Christmas two years ago due to a mammoth increase in quality donations.

Ms Hastie said despite reducing donation bin numbers across Mount Gambier from 21 down to 14, they were receiving more stock than they ever had before.

"Our shop in the main street has become very successful and we are just getting so much stock that is coming back from there and other shops which has sat and hasn't sold," she said.

"Rather than just sending it to waste or to third world, we thought it was an ideal opportunity for us to set something up and give it another whirl.

"We try to absolutely limit the amount of stock we are sending to waste and try to recycle as much as possible, whether its clothing, bric-a-brac, cardboard and anv-

After items are sorted by around 25 volunteers, an approximate total of 40-60 wool bales are directed from the warehouse to third world countries each month.

"The idea is just to try and get it through so it can be reused and we don't have to dispose of it," Ms Hastie said.

"It is also an opportunity for those that

can't afford clothing and items at a higher

Ms Hastie said when COVID-19 first struck and opportunity stores closed across the Limestone Coast, it was seen as an opportunity to get ahead.

"The actual reverse happened. We had more stock come in then we expected which may be because some people have been home more than usual and have taken the time to have a clean out," she

"We have only just started opening up stock we received in Christmas 2019 and the stock we have gotten in this year has been bailed and we get to that once we have finished this.'

In the past five years, Ms Hastie said item quality had also increased, but if items were not suitable to sell, they are cut into rags for sale.

The public is encouraged to visit the warehouse from 9am until 12pm Tuesday and Wednesday mornings.

Funds sought for crater lakes plan

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A PROPOSED Mount Gambier City Council crater lakes precinct report could "free up the shackles" for activity in the high-profile

Council will seek State Government funding to help develop a new Crater Lakes Activation Precinct Plan, which will help guide a vision for the iconic site's future. The plan is expected to cost up to \$100,000.

Development of a new plan will build on the Crater Lakes Area (Volcanic Complex) Conservation Management Plan, introduced in 2004, which guides council and the community in relation to the use and management of the crater

Mayor Lynette Martin said the area was of significant environment and social value to the community, which enabled the community to perform a strong sense of place and identity.

"Culturally, the crater lakes area is of significant value to the Boandik people," Ms Martin said. "The area contains a number of state heritage places that are individually identi-

Councillor Steve Perryman sought clarification to make sure the new plan did not disregard or lessen the previous report's heritage values. City infrastructure manager Nick Serle said the new documentation would co-exist with pre-existing policies.

"It absolutely has to respect the work which was done previously in terms of the values which are held by many different groups in the community for that area, heritage being one of them," Mr Serle said.

Cr Perryman said he sensed the community had moved a long way since 2004 and if council was to run the same process again, a much different outcome would arise.

'There has been numerous suggestions and ideas over the last 10 years or so, not necessarily wholesale commercialisation, but freeing up the shackles on activity in that area for a whole lot of reasons," he said. A funding submission is expected to be made this month.


"The beauty of a donation to Stand Like Stone is that 100 per cent stays local and supports this region forever."

Doubt over saleyards future

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THE future of the Millicent Saleyards hangs in the balance as Wattle Range Council continues to consider extending the operations of the facility for another five years or close the facility in June.

The council-owned facility was originally slated to close last year due to declining throughput, but elected members voted to give the saleyards a 12-month lifeline through to the end of this financial year in an attempt to improve numbers.

Councillor Moira Neagle's sought support to continue to operate the facility until June 30, 2025 at the January meeting, but the decision was deferred with elected members moving a motion to discuss the saleyards at an informal gathering.

At last week's informal gathering, council chief executive Ben Gower urged councillors to consider implementing a threshold based on cattle numbers as opposed to a stagnant date to quantify the continuation of the facility.

"I would prefer and recommend you actually look at cattle sold aa the trigger for us to review the ongoing future of the saleyards rather than plucking a date," he said.

"It might be the number of cattle drops below 7500 per annum and that would be the trigger for us to bring it back to you for a decision.

"Because what happens when you put an arbitrary date, is for all the best reasons, ev-

eryone manages a budget to that date so you don't take a long-term investment view and we end up with a death of 1000 cuts and you end up with a \$500,000 maintenance bill.

"We have always said the number one focus has got to be cattle number sold, that's what secures the future of the saleyards and its ongoing viability."

Mr Gower told elected members and the public gallery there had been a gradual increase in cattle throughput at the saleyards.

"We had data in the consultants report and there was an average of about 8pc decline year on year for about 20 years - it was declining for a long time," he said.

"Most importantly, the decline was arrested.

"When we brought it into the public eye and started talking about it, the community starting to use the facility a bit more and realise what its importance is."

Annual losses have decreased in the past financial years, with 2019/20 recording a loss

of \$101,839, \$135,323 in 2018/19 and \$180,163 in 2017/18. The council chief said cattle sold increased from 8206 in 2018/19 to 10,266 in 2019/20, with the number of sale days rising from 19 to 23.

He said total gross sales had increased from \$9.1m in 2018/19 to \$13.6m, attributing the increase to a number of initiatives including stronger community support and the change of market day.

Cr Neagle - who along with husband John is also a cattle producer - told the chamber 750 head of cattle at the last sale, with one vendor making \$160,000 from sales.

"There was another vendor with 21 head of cattle and there was John and I with five cattle, so we have a whole range of types of vendors and we give them an option," she said.

"Our five cattle could go over the hooks, they could get pinged for fat content... but putting them in the yards where that's an option, we can get a good price.

The stock on offer - and I have heard this straight from the mouths of buyers - is quality stock."

At the January meeting, a condition report identified more than \$500,000 was required for necessary upgrades at the sale yards, noting there was no strategy to ensure compliance and longevity. But councillors have questioned the need to undertake all upgrades, with Cr Kevin McGrath saying council maintenance on the facility had been minimal.

Millicent Saleyard in doubt

"Sure enough there is some work to be done, but look at some of the figures for maintenance over the last three years," Cr McGrath said. There are figures for \$13,000, \$19,000, \$5000 - some people spend that on their house."

Cr Dean Burrow said while the report was "terrible", he suggested a majority of the upgrades slated by consultants as necessary was superficial.

Corcoran Ward councillor John Drew said a balance needed to be found between the ongoing and capital costs of the facility and the impact on Wattle Range ratepayers.

"There is a burden I feel comfortable with and there is a burden I don't feel comfortable with and I don't know where that sits," he said.

However, Penola-based Rick Paltridge said subsiding the facility was "putting off

the inevitable" and "serving a small area of Wattle Range and the ratepayers".

"For every year the sale yards continues, it is not just the farmer who is losing money, it is the ratepayer whose council rates have to prop those up," he said.

"Over the whole number of ratepayers, everyone has to share that burden.

"If we want the saleyards, spend the money and then we have to be prepared to hear the arguments against that from ratepayers who have never been to the saleyards in their life.

"I know that stock are going past Millicent to Glenburnie from Kingston and further afield and if the yards here are so attractive, why are those cattle going straight through?"

Elected members are expected to make a decision on the saleyards at Tuesday night's council meeting.

A FARMER has called on Wattle Range Council to "stop wasting money" on temporary fixes for the Millicent Saleyards and make a defini-

tive decision on the future of the facility. Elected members are expected to decide whether to continue subsidising the councilowned facility or permanently close the saleyards in June at next week's monthly meeting.

At last week's informal gathering, resident Ryan Jellesma said users of the yard were keen to keep them running and required certainty from council amid concerns about its viability and a potential \$500,000 repair bill.

"The question needs to be do we want to have a saleyards or do we not want to have a saleyards and if the answer is no, then shut it down, end of story," he said.

"If the answer is yes, you need to start fixing it.

"Give them a budget and a long-term plan to work with because the saleyards has had short budgets all the time and can't fix anything.

"Either give them funding to run the saleyards and make it the good asset it is to both the community and the council, otherwise you are going to waste even more money by not fixing it properly."

Mr Jellesma said the fortnightly prime market not only provided an economic benefit for

smaller producers, but also an important social outing for users.

"You don't realise how isolated we are and the sales provide people with an opportunity to come to down and now it is at risk of getting taken away," he said.

"You wouldn't shut the swimming lake and you wouldn't even have the discussion as council, but maybe we aren't as important as towns people are.

"We aren't silly out there on farms and if there is more money to be made elsewhere, I guarantee right now you would have no cattle going through the Millicent Saleyards at all.

"No one is out there to lose money."







Post-fire farmer support

FARMERS and other primary producers impacted by the recent Blackford fire can access wellbeing and financial support through South Australia's free Family and Business Support (FaBS) Program.

Livestock deaths caused by the January blaze have exceeded 7600 - 7236 sheep and 371 cattle - with Primary Industries and Regions South Australia (PIRSA) appointing FaBS mentor Robyn Cain to help affected farmers, farming families and regional businesses from the Blackford and Lucindale communities.

The program provides free, informal, confidential and independent advice.

PIRSA state commander Mehdi Doroudi said if producers felt overwhelmed and unsure where to start in the recovery process, the FaBS program was a good place to start.

"The FaBS mentors work closely with service providers and can connect you to services including financial counsellors, local health networks, emotional wellbeing and counselling services, government and non-government assistance, community organisations and donations," Prof Doroudi said.

"PIRSA is still undertaking an impact assessment of the Blackford fireground and as a result it will take some time for a full picture of the agricultural impacts to be ascertained."

Soil testing: Why is it critical?

This is the second of a series of articles being prepared by Gambier Seeds for The Border Watch. These will feature in the On The Land section during 2021. The focus of these articles will be to optimise productivity from on farm pasture and forage bases. At Gambier Seeds we believe pastures and pasture renovation are an investment, not only in your farm production and profitability, but in its future.

FERTILISER is one of the top three costs for most grazing enterprises.

Optimal pasture growth can only be delivered where soil conditions and nutrient levels are optimised.

Compared with pasture species selection, breeding programs or animal health programs, there is very little work put into farm fertiliser programs on grazing properties.

The opportunity to change this exists, and has existed for many years, yet it is not under-

The answer is to undertake a regular and comprehensive soil testing program, which is in turn used to create a fertiliser program, which is then carried out.

This is the answer to optimising your fertiliser dollar spend, but also to achieving production goals for your farm.

Sounds simple? It is.

Sound expensive? It actually is not really, and certainly isn't in the medium to long term, or where production isn't meeting enterprise goals on your farm.

There are few who do not soil test.

However, testing is usually only undertaken on paddocks to be cropped or renovated, or randomly over sections of the farm.

This information delivers value, but it is only relevant to the paddock or section that was tested.

It is dangerous to assume this information as a basis for decision making to be applied on a larger scale across other areas of the farm.

I recommend a program of soil testing every paddock (grazing/cropping paddocks - not holding paddocks or yards) every three years.

For this program we use a "basic" soil test to check for the major nutrients and assess pH and Ec.

Where we intend to renovate or crop, we undertake a comprehensive test in the year of beginning the program.

By undertaking full farm testing at the one time, a complete and accurate picture of the farm soil nutrient status is compiled.

From this we can determine a fertiliser program or soil conditioner application program.

This methodology not only identify issues or problem areas, it also highlights the nutrient status of paddocks that are performing well and identify "base levels" that are currently working well for us on our farm under our management style.

These show us base levels we should be tar-

This aspect is forgotten in most testing regimes where tests are usually only undertaken on paddocks with visual issues.



RIGHT MIX: A blended pasture fertiliser product - knowing the status of your paddocks through soil testing, allows for products to be blended in the right ratios to exactly meet the individual paddock needs.

Other advantages of adopting this full farm testing approach on a regular basis are:

- Ability to compare paddocks of similar soil types with one another.
- Ability to identify and correct declining nutrient levels before problems are encoun-
- There are multiple results to show trends across your farm and soil types, but also over time as you repeat the tests.
- Ability to avoid any "outlier results" which can occur from single tests of paddocks where there are no comparisons to confirm results which may be unexpected.

Compared with single or random testing, the full farm "basic" testing price tag will be higher - but it is only once every three years (as a guide - may vary on advice)

Also, you need to balance the testing cost as a percentage of your fertiliser spend over the

Frecheville enters the canon

EVERY actor dreams of appearing in a major film or theatre production. With it comes the possibility of fame and a pathway to secure employment. But more than that, to appear in a great film, one that takes a hold of the public's imagination and enters the cinematic canon to be watched and re-watched for decades to come, is surely the mountain-top for any creative artist dedicated to the craft of film

James Frecheville, a 29-year-old actor from Melbourne, can claim to have struck magic twice already in his short career with his small but crucial performance in this year's remarkable Eric Bana-headlined film The Dry, which comes some 10 years after his breakout performance in the now-canonical Australian crime film Animal Kingdom.

The Border Watch was lucky enough to speak at length with Frecheville in a wideranging conversation about his latest role in The Dry, why the film has been so well received by the public and critics alike and how he successfully navigates the tough and precarious world of acting.

The Dry

THE Dry is based on the debut novel by Jane Harper and Frecheville credits the popularity of the book in part for the film's astonishing

"I think it's a combination of the success of Jane's book, and it having a sort of preestablished place in people's heads. But also, last year was pretty terrible, on many fronts. And I think people just are eternally optimistic. I think people are really excited to get out of the house and do something that they were nostalgic about. Which sounds insane, to say that you're nostalgic about going to the cinema, but nobody had any of it, for such a long time," he said.

With critical acclaim and domestic box office receipts breaching \$10 million, The Dry is the hit film for the month of January and suggests that there remains in people an entrenched desire to retain the full cinema experience, even in an age characterised by isolated online streaming.

"It's all about a shared, disruption-free experience," Frecheville said.

"Being a part of a community, whether you know anybody or not, just in that kind of setting, it's pretty important."

Locked in a darkened space before a massive screen, cinema-goers are treated to an entrancing mystery film that unfurls carefully around two shocking events events separated by decades. The film has about it the smack of greatness. Though ostensibly a police procedural, it builds to become a haunting meditation on the power of memory and the majesty of friendship, precisely acted, written and

photographed across the desolate beauty of regional Victoria.

"It's looks great and the film's great, and it's as simple as that," Frecheville says.

Frecheville plays the role of Jamie Sullivan, a gruff young farmer struggling to keep his farm afloat while also looking after his grandmother.

Like the film itself, there is a degree of manipulation involved in how the audience perceives Sullivan, a product of Mr Frecheville's acting abilities and the careful planning of director Robert Connolly. Sullivan appears to us in a certain light at the beginning of the film, and then our perception of him shifts and changes as the film progresses.

"The trick wasn't really up to me," Frecheville said.

"That's in the coverage, that's in the editing and the sound, and most of that falls on to Rob. What I tried to focus on was taking as much from the script and from the book as I could to find something to anchor the idea of Jamie Sullivan around. There was a part in the book where it said that he had his fists stuffed under his armpits. And I kind of thought that was interesting, just because, like many people within the film, they've all got secrets.

"He just had a pretty high guard. It's not really a nice place to live. But, you know, he's not one to complain."

Initially, Frecheville auditioned for the role of Sergeant Greg Raco, played by Keir O'Donnell.

"I wasn't right for that part, but my name got thrown into the hat for Jamie Sullivan, and that was it."

Asked whether he can sense a film's potential for greatness from the script alone, he responds by saying that while a script may be redolent of something, it is always difficult to know how a film will turn out given the medium's tendency to morph and shift across the multiple stages of the creative process.


"You do get a sense. A good script should convey imagery and thought. And then, you're on set, and things change constantly. It's just blueprints layered on blueprints until the edit, at which it could even change quite violently again. Sometimes I've seen that with films that I've done where the tone of what you thought you were being involved in just becomes completely different."

Breakout

TEN years before he would take on the role of Jamie Sullivan, Frecheville auditioned as a high schooler for the seminal role of Joshua Cody in David Michod's operatic Animal Kingdom. Listed by Quentin Tarantino as one of his favourite films of the decade, it has since become the source material for a popular television show set in Southern California and is regularly listed by critics as one of Australia's greatest films.

Animal Kingdom

Frecheville's stunning performance as an impressionable young man thrown suddenly into a dangerous world and then trying, in his limited way, to extricate himself from an escalating hurricane of violence anchors the film and imbues it with a complex moral code. The film isn't nihilistic, but it's brutally jaundiced about human nature and the reach of justice in this world.

The Dry, by contrast, offers a somewhat more hopeful view about the possibility of securing justice, despite the shocking acts of violence that open and close the film and the shadow of abuse that permeates the story. A degree of clarity, at least, is granted to the audience by the end of the film, whereas Animal Kingdom leaves us in a more troubled state. We are as unsure of Frecheville's Cody at the

end of the film as we are at the beginning. His method of closing out the story is as much a recognition of terrible failure as it is an act of brute righteousness.

FRECHEVILLE lists Wake in Fright, Bad Boy Bubby, Chopper, Two Hands, Babe, Happy Feet and Mad Max as some of his favourite Australian films.

"Australia makes great films. I just hope that the frequency of telling Australian stories can kind of speed up the more the borders open up."

He is optimistic about the future of the Australian film industry.

"People need stories. I'm interested with what sort of emerging technologies can start

making different sorts of stories possible. It seems to me that the Australian industry is just absolutely booming. In the sense that a lot of international productions are coming there because they know that people work well and that it's suitable to make big movies on a sort of world-class level."

What's more, alongside Australia's world-class human capital and technological sophistication, our relative success in containing the virus also makes us an increasingly attractive destination for film production. This year will see a number of major Hollywood productions shoot in Australia, including the Liam Neeson-helmed action blockbuster Blacklight.

From LA to the UK

FRECHEVILLE spoke to us from Wales

via Zoom, 'trapped' in Britain's extended lockdown restrictions.

"My partner and I came up here for Christmas and then Boris Johnson put the lockdown issue out, so we're now sort of up here for series two of lockdown, because we were up here most of last year as well."

When not in lockdown, Frecheville lives in London, having moved there from Los Angeles for a change in scene.

"I spent a lot of time in Los Angeles and ultimately wanted to try out a different setting. I didn't really want to spend all of my twenties there. And Europe's great and I've got a lot of friends in London. And I have a very soft spot for Ireland."

Asked whether he thinks the deep friend-ships that anchor The Dry are still possible in the age of Zoom, Mr Frecheville replies: "I think it's too early to say. I think sustaining deep friendships is easy. In a way, not much has changed for the way that I sustain my friendships, because I've got friends in all these different places."

"But I'm just optimistic that things will get better. I can't really see us holding into a sort of new lockdown paradigm for the next 10 years. And thinking that a whole new generation of kids never go to school. I'm more optimistic than that. But maybe not, maybe this virus just keeps mutating forever and ever."

A Natural Optimist

THOUGH The Dry and Animal Kingdom are perhaps his most widely-known contributions, Frecheville has appeared in an impressive roster of well-received films in a career that now spans more than 10 years. In 2018, he took on the lead role of Feeney in Black 47, an historical drama set in a famine-ravaged 19th century Ireland and in 2015, he appeared alongside Billy Crudup in the critically acclaimed Stanford Prison Experiment.

In regards to his own creative future, he hopes at some point to pursue writing and directing in addition to acting.

"But when I was writing when I was younger, it wasn't ready or suitable enough to sort of get it to a point where it was fleshed out and out there," he said.

"And tonally it's quite different from my acting work. I'm kind of into a bit surreal, madcap comedy, sort of insane stuff. But yeah I'd totally want to explore that. But it's just slowly slowly catchy monkey, is my idea the older I get, because I'm still learning a lot.

"I came into it having done youth theatre. Animal Kingdom was a baptism by fire. And ever since then I've just sort of been a journeyman. I haven't gone to a school. I didn't go to university. I've sort of gone all in on this trade, and I'm just learning as much as I can. Seems to be working, somewhat."

The acting trade has a well-established patina of glamour, full of red carpets and flashing cameras. For many though, it's a tough and precarious way to make a living, and Frecheville knows both sides of the coin; the struggle involved in simply making one's way in the trade, and also its possibility for grandeur and genuine achievement.

"I've been living by the skin of my teeth for years, it feels like. There's nothing stable about it, but there's also much victory and revelries as well," he said.

For other young Australians who love cinema and hope one day to be involved in something permanent, Mr Frecheville has some advice.

"Be bold. Find like-minded people. Team up and make things. No one is going to sort of hand it to you. It's always a great tip to be active. If you want to be an actor, start finding some friends that want to be actors and write silly movies and make them. And keep it fun, I'd say, because you don't want a learning experience to be too serious or hard-core. I think consume as much media as you can. If you want to learn how to do things technically, you could watch a film and then watch it right back immediately after you've finished watching it the first time and pick it apart. Just be bold and be active, that's what I'd say."

The Dry is playing now in cinemas and Animal Kingdom is streaming on Stan.

Racing enthusiast and former newspaper editor **KEITH KRATZMANN** reflects on the career of turf legend Bernborough after a Christmas gift brought up some old memories.

The mighty Bernborough

UNDOUBTEDLY the greatest weight carrying racehorse of all time amassing 15 successive victories in just one year was the Queensland galloper Bernborough.

The tragic circumstance was that in his 19th start in 1946, the constant weight plus three serious checks in the Caulfield Cup ultimately led to his breaking his front fetlock never to race again where the plan was to take the superstar to gallop against the best gallopers in the United States.

The legendary book on Bernborough, which was difficult to obtain, came into the hands of my daughter Maree Kratzmann who saw second hand books of both Bernborough and Don Bradman (the greatest cricket legend) in a second hand SVDP shop in Gladstone.

The Christmas present was a real delight as one had the opportunity to not only in 1946 as a 12 year-old boy to have my Dad take me to see the great Bernborough while in December of the same year, my older late brother Arthur surprised me by travelling to Brisbane from the Kingaroy rail station to attend the Australian-England test where Bradman was still batting past his century followed by the longest cricket six hit over the grandstand (a record that still stands) by Keith Miller.

Bernborough's performances which were not in the days of television screens had racing followers tuned into radio broadcasts and if you visited the movies, Bernborough was often on movie theatre screens with the Cinesound News right throughout the nation.

The book "The Story Behind The Legend" was compiled and written by Bill Sigley in conjunction with regular jockey Athol George Mulley.

The total contents comprised 242 pages which was printed at the time by Boolorong Publications when the company was based at Bowen Hills (Brisbane).

There were no tote facilities in this era so all transactions were made with bookmakers on the respective tracks plus other operators with no licence were considered illegal.

"I was fortunate enough at 12 years-old with my late father to catch a tram in the Brisbane suburb of Toowong which travelled to the gates of the Doomben racetrack.

"The cheapest area was to cross the racecourse (known as The Flat) which with my late Dad, cost us only one shilling.

"Before the race was run, Bernborough paraded down the straight and many said he could not win because of having to lump 10st 3lb over just a sprint course.

"When the field reached the home turn, Bernborough was second last and then as he commenced his run, the outstanding commentator in the late Keith Noud said "He's coming like a tornado" and duly had the race won at the 50 metre mark".

The following week, trainer Harry Plant accepted with Bernborough from his sprint win to the Doomben Cup where over the 11 furlong course he carried 10st 10lb to victory.

Bernborough's achievements in just some nine months along the eastern seaboard are honoured at Eagle Farm with a museum of his outstanding record.

Apart from his Doomben victories, Bernborough in earlier Victorian starts of 1946 achieved what was regarded as the impossible in taking out the six furlong (1200 metres) Newmarket where over the final 200 metre sprint he clocked a magic 10 seconds, a record which still stands to this day.

The champion is the only galloper to ever start in a Newmarket at 4/9 on while as it was the largest spring race of all time, the race attracted a crowd of 45,000.

One of the turf's most colourful figures was Azzalin Romano who paid 2,600 guineas for the great champion. The threesome of Romano, trainer Harry Plant and Benborough got what was called a bargain price well ahead of a prospective owner who came late for at the auction where he was supposed to have an offer of over 4,000 guineas.

After his sensational Doomben wins and weight carrying records Bernborough was then transported by freight ship across bumpy waves from Brisbane to Sydney to contest the feature races before his departure to Melbourne for the weight for age events and the anticipated Caulfield-Melbourne Cup double.

Following his Sydney success, Bernborough was then earmarked for the 1946 Caulfield Cup where he was asked at the time to carry a mammoth weight over a mile and a half (or 12 furlongs).

At this time, rumours were also floating that Bernborough would later travel by ship to North America.

In the Caulfield Cup and apart from giving away up to three stone by some runners, he suffered three checks in running which kept him at the rear of the field until he had to pull wide in the straight and finish fifth.

Mulley denied any suggestions that he had of not winning the race, but what occurred was three checks in the race which seemed a target by other jockeys in creating the Queenslander with a troublesome run.

It's interesting to note that two bookmakers

were betting 3/1 each way about Bernborough while other prices were basically just 6/4. During the same meeting, Bernborough was quoted at 6/4 to win the forthcoming Melbourne Cup even with his massive weight over the gruelling two miles.

However, connections of the stable decided to take Mulley away from his long standing record where they secured Billy Briscoe as the new rider in the forthcoming weight for age Mackinnon Stakes where weight was only 9st 3lb. Coming to the turn, Briscoe gave the champion a feeler and he was ready for a withgring run.

Judging the time to be right, he gave Bernborough rein on the turn, and the race favourite closed quickly on Flight, and the mare's owner Brian Crowley was thinking, 'It's second again for us'.

Then, a loud noise, like a sharp clap of thunder, or a gunshot, rolled over Flemington. Bernborough faltered and veered off course towards the middle of the track.

The noise was so loud that Briscoe thought for a second that Bernborough had been shot, and Jack O'Sullivan on Flight later told Bill Ahern 'I heard a sharp crack behind me just before we entered the straight'. The noise had been heard three furlongs away in the sand, and in the press box Bill Ahern and 'Cardigan' thought for a moment that some 'crank' had shot the champion.

Bernborough's near foreleg crumbled beneath him and only Briscoe's skill stopped him from falling. The intelligent bay tried to save

himself. He spread his hindlegs, and skidded to a halt, leaving the course, people still believing that he was taken away to be destroyed. A stunned silence, then cries of horror.... Bernborough standing on three legs, his injured near foreleg held high off the ground.

As Bernborough left the course, people still believed that he was to be destroyed. However veterinarians were able to place the sesamoid bone in position and re-bandage the fore leg. This later resulted in Bernborough travelling by ship to the United States for stud duties.

He was then taken by train to Lexington in Kentucky, the home breeding capital of America.

By 1975, Bernborough's 13 crops of 267 foals had produced 245 race starters of which 189 had won 1334 races.

Bernborough has never been forgotten by race followers like yours truly and those still in the age group of the 80's and 90's of his rise to fame via the early years of his association with the Darling Downs.

A statue of Bernborough is seen by thousands of racing folk and tourists where it graces the entry to the headquarters of the Jondaryan Shire Council at Oakey.

The greatest five gallopers of all time in the hearts of former racing identities in their respective era are Phar Lap, Bernborough, Carbine, Peter Pan, Tulloch and Kingston Town.

A BREEZY weekend along the coast put a halt to many anglers' plans, but the dedicated few who do not mind a bit of stir still managed to hit the water and get into some fish.

The offshore fishos found some nice shark and bottom species over the last week or so, the boys from Southerly Fishing Charters put their clients onto some nice fish including sharks, flathead, nannygai and terakhi.

I am still to hear of the first Port MacDonnell tuna for the season, but it can not be much longer away.

The fishing in around the shallow kelp beds is about to get a whole lot more interesting now the snapper season is finally open again.

There have already been a few nice fish caught that I have seen and remember you have to report all your snapper catches on the SA fishing app, or by calling fishwatch.

It is a bit of a pain the way the system has been created but hopefully it means we can continue to bring a few home for the table.

There has been some nice shark caught in the last few weeks down there, gummies predominately, but the odd schoolie and bronzie

It is from about now onwards we start to see the schools of mulloway turning up along

Fishing the kelp the way we usually would for shark and snapper is how we target mulloway and get plenty of burley on the go too.

There is often a mix of sizes down there anything from 50cm to 50lb could be caught,

The whiting numbers this week have remained excellent again.

The usual spots such as the Port MacDonnell breakwater, Cape Douglas and Carpenter Rocks have all produced some nice fish, while some of the lesser fished areas such as Danger Point, Blackfellows Caves and even up as far as Southend have all been fishing well.

There are still plenty of silver trevally, salmon trout, mullet and snapper mixed in with our whiting, so you never know what you might take home.

The garfish have been great again this week and the size and numbers have both continued to impress right along the region.

The swell has not really slowed them down at all - it just seems to have pushed them to the more protected bays.

As has been the case for the last several weeks, mullet and tommy ruff will be found with them in good numbers in most areas too. so they will add a bit of variety to the bag.

"XTREME Rush went straight to the front from box four, with the other first starter Wilbur Deeds doing the chasing, then working home well to be beaten 2½ lengths and looking a coming winner for Koroit owner-trainer Garry Anders."

So reads a report on the Tara Raceway meeting of October 29, 2017.

Now, after a further 127 starts, Wilbur Deeds has won 21 races and run 49 minor placings for prizemoney \$10 short of \$65,000.

Bred by Anders, the son of Oaks Road x Mepunga Lana is now a rising six-year-old and bounced back to win city races after a hock injury kept him off the scene for three months way back in 2018.

Back at Tara Raceway for last week's Tara Raceway time-graded meeting, Wilbur Deeds took on a tidy field in the 400-metre Williams Crane Hire Stake for five-plus wins greybounds

The August 2015 whelping was equal to the task, quickly taking the lead off Another Pick before holding out Queue The Music for a win in a best of day 23.03 seconds.

Then the veteran chaser backed up again on Sunday in the South Eastern Hotel Stake over 400 metres, shrugging off a determined Saint Charlotte turning for home before running out a three-quarters of a length winner in 23.08 seconds.

Anders is now hoping the Masters events, programmed to be run on Sundays over 305 metres for greyhounds 3¾ years and older, will take off at Tara Raceway.

With priority going the way of the oldest greyhounds nominated, the wonderfully durable Wilbur Deeds certainly will not have any trouble gaining a start.

At the other end of the scale, as far as back-

Half a century later and it is true to say they have well and truly passed that test.



HE only started playing golf in September and has not had a lesson yet, but Mitchell Broome has already won two Saturday tournaments at the Mount Gambier Golf Club.

The first of those came in just his third competition round back in October, compiling a stunning 45 stableford points when playing off a 35 handicap.

"That was my best ever score off the stick (93) so I was pretty happy," he said.

"I only started playing golf because my mates were all playing.


"I thought it would be boring but I'm enjoying it heaps ... although it can be very frustrating."

After Jacques grabbed his spare arrows the match continued.



"It sounds unrealistic at the moment but with time it could be done."

Originally Yoannidis was not going to apply for the position with the national squad. But he said with encouragement he did

and was glad he made the decision.

"I put in an application because I was encouraged to and then Bridgette messaged me and asked if I got an email to say I was in," he said.

"I am excited about it.

"I know a lot of the shooters who made the top two squads.

"Hopefully shooting with them and being around them helps push me up a bit.

"Me and Bridgette have come up through this together ... she has had a few more opportunities with World Cups and stuff.

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Duo aims high

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TWO Mount Gambier shooters have been named in a group of 54 athletes to make the Australia national Shooting Squad.

Bridgette McKinnon and Doyle Yoannidis were among the large contingent of up-and-comping shooters named in the three-tiered training structure.

Both were selected in the Pathways Squad for shotgun, which provides training to athletes who are considered capable of achieving national team selection based on their performances in domestic competition and demonstrated commitment to becoming a high-performance

McKinnon and Yoannidis were both surprised with their selections, although both have competed at high levels in re-

McKinnon said she was excited about

the opportunity to train with the national coach and some of Australia's best competitors, which she hoped would improve her consistency.

"I hope to get a lot more consistent scores so I can compete at a high level consistently," she said.

"At the moment I will shoot one competition really well and the next one won't be as good.

"Even just competing against the other shooters at the Shooting Australia competitions really brings you up."

At just 22 years of age McKinnon has been competing for around six years, with international experience under her belt.

She said she began with local club competition, before her coach intro-duced her to the ISSF system, which she said improved her shooting greatly.

"I feel since I started I have come quite far," she said.

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
