Saleyards lifeline

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LIVESTOCK agent John Chay has welcomed Wattle Range Council's decision to keep the Millicent Saleyards operational, but warned "we have not won the war" due to the imposition of a number of conditions for its retention.

After two years of uncertainty, the council-owned cattle selling facility was saved from permanent closure after elected members backed a motion to keep the gates open conditional on the yards maintaining a yearly throughput of 8500.

At Tuesday night's council meeting, elected members resumed discussion on a motion by cattle producer and Councillor Moira Neagle to continue the operations of the facility until 2025, develop a management plan for the facility and consider recurrent funding for capital upgrades.

But Penola-based Rick Paltridge - who has been a vocal opponent of continuing the saleyards - told the chamber he had spoken to "numerous people around the region" including stock agents, truck drivers, meat buyers and farmers who he claimed believed the saleyards should be closed down.

Arsenic alarm at Bay

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PORT MacDonnell residents and businesses located near the town's former boat yard site are being told not to use groundwater after increased levels of arsenic were detected in

an onsite well.

At last week's council meeting, elected members heard arsenic levels in a well on the north-western boundary of the Sea Parade site have increased from 17 micrograms per litre in 2013 and 14 micrograms per litre in 2018 to 179 micrograms per litre in 2020.

Arsenic levels in a well on the south-western boundary of the site have reduced from 418 micrograms per litre in 2013 to 86 micrograms per litre in 2018 to 30 micrograms per litre in 2020.

A groundwater monitoring report tabled at the meeting said the current levels of arsenic

at both wells were above the national water quality guidelines for drinking water, with the north-western boundary well also exceeding the primary industries, irrigation and general water use on a long-term level.

Coming to grips with new wall

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INDIVIDUALS and groups will flex their muscles and find balance through rock climbing following the installation of an indoor artificial climbing wall at the Noorla Yo-Long Blue Light Outdoor Adventure facility.

Constructed by Millicent Community Learning Centre students, the newest addition to the life skill adventure training facility was officially launched by South Australian Assistant Police Commissioner Ian Parrott at an event on Tuesday.

Students from the Millicent Community Learning Centre and Millicent primary schools joined dignitaries from SA Police, including Limestone Coast police officer in charge Superintendent Phil Hoff, Inspector Campbell Hill, Mount Gambier MP Troy Bell, Member for MacKillop Nick McBride and Limestone Coast mayors for the opening.

Noorla Yo-Long management committee chair and SA Police Sergeant Andy Stott praised the collaborative efforts of students, business and donors - including children's charity Cops For Kids, Variety SA, Rotary Club of Mount Gambier Lakes and Naracoorte, Lucindale and Millicent Lions club - in supporting the project.

Sgt Stott said the long-awaited project would complement the existing outdoor activities, including ground-level initiatives, high ropes and caving.

"For the majority of who you live in the Limestone Coast, you know we have the luxury of sometimes having four seasons in any one particular day.

"We have schools and other groups who visit here to participate when it is raining or inclement weather we were limited to what we can do with those groups.

"For several years as a management committee we have talked about this day."

Assistant Commissioner Parrott said approximately 50,000 people had participated in the SAPOL facilitated education program since the Rendelsham facility was opened in 1998.

"That is a massive amount of people and has included youth groups and schools and

anyone who has been involved deserves to be congratulated," he said.

"A couple of principles that we rely on is collaborative partnerships and prevention first.

"In general this facility, and the new addition today, goes to the heart of those principles in terms of working with the community, working with our young people and hopefully being a positive influence on them and their lives and paths forward."

The purpose-built wall features seven different routes of varying levels of difficulty from beginner to more challenging climbs, which are colour-coded by holds.

Millicent Community Learning Centre manager Gemma Winterborn said the 18 month project provided students with practical construction skills and strengthened re-

lationships with police and the broader community.

"We have a connection with the community and this project allowed students with police and see them in a different light," she said.

"It also taught them about teamwork the importance of working together.

"It is great for the students to see such a big project like this can be achieved which will benefit the entire community."

Millicent Community Learning Centre graduate Mitchell Gurney was among the cohort of students who built the wall and faced a fear of heights during the on-site construction of the floor to ceiling project.

"We had to do a Working at Heights course before we could get on the scissor lift," he said.

"Trying to find the guts to get on the scissor lift was the hardest part for me, but I kept calm and tried to do the job to the best standard I could.

"It was a huge project and we made everything, so we had to measure a lot to make sure everything would fit."

Newbery Park and St Anthony's Catholic Primary School students were among the first to trial the stoneface, with St Anthony's school captain Ella Matthews conquering the five of the seven peaks.

"I have done rock climbing before in Adelaide but it is good to have one here," Ella said.

"All the walls are different and some are harder than others because they have little rocks and are spaced out more than others.

"It is a lot of fun."

Main Corner trees removed

SEVERAL troublesome trees have been removed from Mount Gambier's Main Corner, with recent damage caused by strong winds the catalyst for action.

City Council ordered removal of the oriental plane trees along the western fringe of the Main Corner precinct following an incident last month where a branch was dislodged and fell across the footpath and car parks.

Council infrastructure general manager Nick Serle said the trees had been an ongoing concern due to the impact of strong winds in the area.

"We use the same species of trees elsewhere but that area just seems to cop the

wind a lot more," Mr Serle said.

"A number have also been removed over the years along the Commercial Street frontage," he said.

Mr Serle said the wind damage was significant and the pruning required would mean the trees would likely never return to an attractive state and would continue to drop limbs.

The senior council officer said elected members would have an expectation the trees would be replaced, foreshadowing the potential planting of trees nearby in an alternate, protected location to avoid similar issues arising.

SA Governor to visit Lucindale

SOUTH Australian Governor Hieu Van Le will tour the fire-affected Lucindale community during an official tour of the region later this month.

Mr Le's February 20 itinerary will include opening the Children's Museum at the Sheep's Back Museum in Naracoorte before spending the afternoon at Lucindale to view the fire recovery efforts from January's devastating Blackford-Avenue Range fire.

He is scheduled to have lunch at Yakka Park with volunteers and community members involved in the fire fighting and recovery efforts and will then travel to Avenue Range to visit affected landholders.

After visiting Lucindale, he will return to Naracoorte to officially launch the Nara-

coorte Migrant Resource Centre and Limestone Coast Multicultural Network before enjoying dinner at Pearl Continental Australia with invited guests.

Mr Le last visited the area in 2019 where he attended a community morning tea and toured local businesses, farms, wineries and tourist attractions.

Naracoorte Lucindale mayor Erika Vickery said it was an honour to be hosting another local visit by Mr Le and to showcase the region's richness and diversity as well as its resilience in the wake of the Blackford-Avenue Range fire.

Rail history turned into city eyesore

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A LACK of routine maintenance at the old Mount Gambier roundhouse site has left the city's National Trust SA branch frustrated as towering grass and overgrown weeds suffocate what remains of the historic site.

The building was demolished in November 2018 by order of former Transport Planning and Infrastructure Minister Stephan Knoll with little but a concrete slab remaining.

The land remains in State Government's hands, with Mount Gambier City Council engaged in discussions over a potential transfer of disused surplus rail land in the township for community purposes.

A Department for Infrastructure and Transport spokesperson said the land continued to be maintained by the state, consistent with its disused railway corridor status.

Mount Gambier National Trust SA branch chair Nathan Woodruff said the untamed block was disappointing given it was adjacent to the high-profile rail trail.

"We are frustrated as we had big plans for

the old roundhouse site and we had everything in place to revamp, rebuild and restore and really make it an iconic site at the rail trail," Mr Woodruff said.

"We would have loved to have had that opportunity and unfortunately the roundhouse has been knocked down. The excuse was it was unsightly and needed to be tidied up.

"But, you come down here now and it is just a stack of weeds."

Mr Woodruff said the trail was used by children, families and visitors and it would look a lot neater if it was maintained at a better standard.

"You have the centre of the rail trail where it looks nice and neat, but then it tapers off once you move from there," he said.

"We have been pretty fortunate this year with the summer that it hasn't really dried off too much, but it wouldn't take much now for it to be a massive fire hazard right next to houses and Mount Gambier High School.

"It just looks untidy. It would be quite easy to knock all the weeds down and put a focus on the turntable."

Mr Woodruff said if National Trust SA

gained ownership or leased the land, it planned to transform the area into a community asset.

"We are hoping to start a conversation and we don't want to annoy them with problems, we are just prepared to be part of the solution and put in work to make it happen," he said.

"They did promise us it would be restored and have signage and it be a great display, but nothing has happened.

"There is a lot of potential to do something which is part of the rail trail, there's some interesting history of Mount Gambier's railways which has a great potential for tourists."

Mr Woodruff said hoped a solution could be found soon.

"It hurts me to see it like this when we had everything in place to manage the whole site with the roundhouse remaining," he said.

"There was such a massive footprint with huge potential there and now it's just a slab of concrete.

"A weekend with whipper snippers would make it look a lot better."

Virus lockdown

SOUTH Australia has effectively locked out people who have been in the Greater Melbourne on or after February 4 in response to an emerging COVID-19 cluster in Victoria.

Regional Victorians can enter South Australia without restrictions, provided they have not been in the Greater Melbourne area any time on or after 12.01am yesterday.

Exemptions apply for essential travellers, returning SA residents, genuine relocations and people escaping domestic violence with approval prior to entry.

People who have been at the Holiday Inn (Airport), 10/14 Centre Road, Melbourne Airport or are a close contact or a person at the hotel on or after 12.01am Wednesday, January 27 must contact SA Health immediately and quarantine (at a place determined by an authorised officer) for 14 days, receiving COVID-19 tests on days one, five and 12.

People in South Australia prior to 12.01am Thursday, February 11 who have been in the Greater Melbourne area must continue to comply with their instructions under the previous COVID-19 directions.

Requirements do not change for these people.

They must have immediately received a COVID-19 test and self-quarantined until they received a negative test result.

They must then get tested again on day five and day 12.

People who were in South Australia prior to 12.01am Thursday, February 11, who have been at a 'public exposure site' as defined on the Victoria Government website must continue to comply with their instructions under the previous COVID-19 directions.

Requirements do not change for these people.

They must continue with their 14-day quarantine and testing regime with COVID-19 tests on days one, five and 12.

People are permitted to transit through Melbourne Airport providing they have been in a low community transmission zone for 14 days, have only been in the airport for two hours or less and have worn a face mask for the entirety of the transit time, including during the flight.

People who have been in any Greater Melbourne Area are not permitted to enter an aged care facility without prior approval from SA Health.

All other travellers from Victoria are permitted to enter the facility.

A person who has entered SA and completed 14 days of quarantine is free to move around South Australia and also enter a Residential Aged Care Facility.

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New peaks at National Parks

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A SURGING domestic tourism market prompted Limestone Coast national parks to mobilise additional staff to cater to increased demand, with the Naracoorte Caves experiencing a 32pc increase of visitors this holiday season.

Preliminary data placing a 25pc rise of visitation numbers at the World Heritage site has been smashed as final figures reveal an increase of 5300 people in the period from Boxing Day to the end of January from the 2019/20 summer peak.

The Tantanoola Caves also attracted significantly higher numbers than initially forecast, recording a 33pc increase - 2000 visitors - compared to the same period 12 months ago.

National Parks and Wildlife Limestone Coast manager Nick McIntyre said the strong figures at the geological attractions corresponded with high demand across the region's coastal sites, with data showing a 36pc increase in camping at Canunda National Park this year.

More than 2301 campers flocked to the Coorong in 2020 - an increase of 46pc from last year.

"We know it was incredibly busy in the Little Dip Conservation Park, Beachport and Canunda area in that peak summer period and people in towns have reported ad hoc that they were very busy, revenue for a lot of shops and sales were very healthy," Mr McIntyre said.

"We had an incredibly good year coming into 2019/20 before COVID hit, we were already up at eight to 10pc at our commercial sites but this year the peak season has been absolutely phenomenal.

"We had to limit some of the tour places and slightly decrease numbers to get social distancing on tours and brought on additional capacity and casual staff through the summer peak season so to get those results are incredibly good.

"The feedback we have received from various travel advisor sites show the caves are great guided experiences with informed guides, really good facilities and amenities, in the case of Naracoorte where we have a cafe there is great food and at Tantanoola, a really picturesque cave hosted by really friendly and accommodating staff.

"They are very pretty and highly decorated caves with a wonderful story which involves

interpretation around science, cave formation and management of caves."

Border closures and international travel bans kept South Australians closer to home, with almost half - 47pc - of visitors to both sites originating from Adelaide, a quarter hailing from Melbourne, regional Victorians made up 13pc and 11pc of visitors were intrastate travellers.

Travellers from New South Wales, Queensland, Tasmania, Western Australia, Northern Territory and ACT comprised just 4pc of visitors.

"Other states usually feature quite strongly and internationals, but these percentages would be a larger portion of visitors to the site," he said.

"However those areas in Victoria where restrictions weren't in place and people in South Australia were keen to travel and visit all these

wonderful sites and locations we have in our region."

Naracoorte Lucindale Council tourism and events coordinator Vicki Modistach said similar data was replicated at the town's visitor tourism information centre, but noted an increase in longer stay tourists.

"Our actual visitors were pretty much on par with last year, but the amount of people staying for two nights or longer has doubled," she said.

"Normally, people might come down for a day trip and be in and out of the town, but we are finding people are staying longer and want to see everything.

"They want to look at the museum and visit Mini Jumbuk and where in the past they would have spent an hour in town, they might spend seven or eight hours in Naracoorte and then go to the beach or to Mount Gambier."

Limestone Coast Local Government Association chair and Naracoorte Lucindale mayor Erika Vickery partially credited the South Australian Tourism Commission for the strong intrastate travel numbers, saying the organisation was pushing regional travel as part of a new campaign.


"It is not surprising 58pc of visitors are from regional South Australia or Adelaide as I know the commission has been working hard to encourage travel to the regions," she said.

"I know the caravan park has been very, very busy and it is only anecdotal, but I have heard most of our accommodation has been well booked throughout the holiday period."

Ms Vickery the region's seven councils recently endorsed a five-year Destination Tourism and Marketing Plan, which would help local government continue the momentum into the future.

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Millicent Saleyards saved

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LIVESTOCK agent John Chay has welcomed Wattle Range Council's decision to keep the Millicent Saleyards operational, but warned "we have not won the war" due to the imposition of a number of conditions for its retention.

After two years of uncertainty, the council-owned cattle selling facility was saved from permanent closure after elected members backed a motion to keep the gates open conditional on the yards maintaining a yearly throughput of 8500.

At Tuesday night's council meeting, elected members resumed discussion on a motion by cattle producer and Councillor Moira Neagle to continue the operations of the facility until 2025, develop a management plan for the facility and consider recurrent funding for capital upgrades.

But ahead of the discussion, Cr Neagle supported the provision of an annual allocation of funds and changed the timeframe to a threshold dependent on an average of 8500 cattle passing through the yards each year, saying "it was not changing the intent, but changing the means of the intent."

"I have set the bar at 8500 head throughput per year because that was the low point of 2017," she said. "Who knows what will happen to cattle prices over the coming years and the methods of sale.

"One buyer said more end users want grass-

fed meat as opposed to grain or feedlot meat, people are increasing discerning about the journey of the meat they are prepared to put on their barbecue.

"As producers our selling options may change, selling stock at saleyards helps set a price of meat across the industry.

"This is a significant fact of cattle production and their sale."

Mr Chay raised concerns with the implementation of a static threshold, saying the seasonal conditions was an important driver influencing the movement of stock.

"Last year we did 10,500, this year we will have around about the same numbers again but our industry is seasonal," he said.

"Right now, there are people who have sold and haven't bought back in which is going to af-

fect numbers in the calendar year.

"Every year is different and with the restocking its the north at the moment, it is almost unviable for people to buy so they are selling."

Mr Chay was joined by around 20 stock agents and saleyard supporters at this week's meeting, with attendees spilling into the Millicent Civic and Arts Centre to listen to whether council would retain the site or close the facility permanently in June.

Cr Neagle said the groundswell of support for the retention of the facility was not only demonstrated through petitions, letters and meetings, but also through increased throughputs and the increase in vendors using the yards since the saleyards was slated for closure.

But Penola-based Rick Paltridge - who has been a vocal opponent of continuing the saleyards - told the chamber he had spoken to "numerous people around the region" including stock agents, truck drivers, meat buyers and farmers who he claimed believed the saleyards should be closed down.

"If you have a look at the long-term trends, [the saleyards] are unsustainable," he said.

"Over the last nine years, losses have been \$1.167m - think about that - now add onto those figures the report and the sale manager report figures... the least worst scenario is we spend another \$300,000 over the next three years. We all sympathise with the closure of a number of businesses in Millicent... I appreciate you don't want to lose your saleyards as well.

"But these are Millicent's yards only and they

are not used by the bulk of the council area.

"This chamber has a responsibility to all ratepayers and we can show we can make financial and business decisions for everyone, not just voices that certainly have a conflict of interest in arguing a case to prop the yards up."

During the 30-minute suspension of standing orders Councillor Dale Price said the yards were currently tracking to lose \$100,000 each year.

Cr Price told the chamber he had sought information from other saleyards which could be applied to Millicent, but moved to discuss it in confidence because of the commercial sensitivities. Following a 15 minute discussion behind closed doors, councillors sought to extend free debate on the facility but Wattle Range mayor Des Noll used his casting vote to reject the request.

A further amendment to the original motion requires council staff to negotiate with agents for industry comparable fees for access to the saleyards.

"We pay to operate an office at the saleyards and I think when they kicked us out, Cr Price put it to them that in other areas that price is a lot higher," Mr Chay said.

"I am gathering information about Naracorte and Mount Gambier, but I don't believe it is too much more than what we already pay as I think it might be \$2500 in the Mount - we pay \$1000 in Millicent.

"We will see what they come up with when we sit down with staff to negotiate."

Arsenic levels in a well on the south-western boundary of the site have reduced from 418 micrograms per litre in 2013 to 86 micrograms per litre in 2018 to 30 micrograms per litre in 2020.

A groundwater monitoring report tabled at the meeting said the current levels of arsenic at both wells were above the national water quality guidelines for drinking water, with the north-western boundary well also exceeding the primary industries, irrigation and general water use on a long-term level.

According to the report, undertaken by I&D Contracting last year, the well also exceeds the water quality guidelines primary industries - aquaculture and human consumption of aquatic foods for fresh water and salt water.

The arsenic in both wells are present mostly as dissolved arsenic, as arsenic acid, which council described as "good as it is the less toxic type".

"At the time of undertaking this work the EPA did not see a need for soil sampling, with groundwater being the main concern," a staff report said.

"As the arsenic has gone up in one of the bores, council will need to lodge a Section 83 Notification with the EPA.

"This notification will let people know not to use the groundwater in the area."

In November 2019, council backed a staff recommendation to temporarily seal the old boatyard site to enable it to be used for parking and events while waiting future development, subject to the EPA's approval.

A report commissioned in 2011 found the site would require remediation for it to

be suitable for open space/recreational use, with the removal of contaminated surface soils costing approximately \$250,000.

"Current management of covering the surface of the site with gravel would appear appropriate," a staff report said.

A further report will now be prepared for council consideration in relation whether or not council proceed to seal the site.

The company was first commissioned by council to undertake groundwater monitoring at the old boat yard in 2013, with Grant requesting a re-sampling of the groundwater monitoring wells at the site in 2018 to assess if any changes have occurred as per EPA requirements.

The I&D report ruled out suggestions the site may have been used in the past as a sheep dip, which often contained arsenic, saying an "old cray fisherman recently reported that arsenic was also used in the past associated with the zinc blocks that were attached to the hull or motor as a sacrificial device to prevent corrosion".

In 2002, an elevated level of tributyltin - a toxic chemical previously used in bottom paint to prevent the growth of marine or-

ganisms on the hulls of ships - was found in the north-western corner of the site, but has since been found to be below the laboratory level of reporting and water quality guidelines.

"As groundwater direction is likely to be in the south - towards the ocean - the current results indicate that any tributyltin contamination possibly still present in the northern part of the site does not appear to have spread significantly," the report said.

A separate site groundwater management plan prepared by Tierra Environment states groundwater shall not be extracted or used on site due to observed concentrations of arsenic and tributyltin in groundwater wells on the site.

"It is understood that the EPA has informed property owners and occupiers in the vicinity of the site that site contamination of groundwater exists beyond the site boundaries and what action can be taken to prevent exposure," the report said.

Grant District Council were unable to comment prior to deadline.

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Covid vaccine uncertain start

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THE first stage of the Commonwealth's coronavirus vaccination program will be ready to be rolled out at the Mount Gambier Hospital for high-risk, priority people with the Blue Lake City selected as one of South Australia's nine COVID-19 vaccination hubs.

But only the state's primary hub at the Royal Adelaide Hospital will open when the vaccination supplies arrives into South Australia, with authorities unable to provide an estimate when the eight other hubs will be open.

The Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine is the first COVID-19 vaccine to receive Federal regulatory approval in Australia, which entails two doses at least three weeks apart.

According to the Federal Government, the first doses of the vaccine are expected to arrive and be rolled out in mid-to-late February and will be available in phases, prioritising groups based on expert medical and public health advice.

Quarantine and border workers, frontline health care workers and aged care and disability staff and residents will receive the first vaccination, with the government expecting

up to 1.4m doses to be administered as part of phase 1a.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said provisional approval of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine by the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) was an important moment for the nation.

"The approval of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine comes after rigorous and independent assessment by the TGA, which shows it meets Australian standards for safety, quality and efficacy," Mr Pasin said, stating the announcement added confidence to the nation's vaccine strategy.

Up to 14.8 million people will be vaccinated under phase 1b, including elderly adults aged 70 years and over, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people over the age of 55, other health care workers, younger adults with an underlying medical condition, including those with a disability, and critical and high risk workers including defence, police, fire, emergency services and meat processing.

Phase 2b will be rolled out to the balance of the adult population and a catch up of any unvaccinated Australian from previous phases, with up to 16m doses to be administered.

If the vaccines are approved for young peo-

ple, individuals under the age of 16 will receive doses under phase 3.

Further roll-out of other vaccines, including the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine, will depend on the Commonwealth's regulatory approval, volume and timing of doses becoming available.

The State Government has responsibility under the National COVID-19 Vaccination Policy for identifying and establishing the vaccination sites.

Health Minister Stephen Wade acknowledged while there will be "road bumps" given the scale and complexity of the operation, the State Government was determined to ensure the safe, efficient and timely delivery of vaccines in a prioritised manner.

"The Commonwealth Government is supplying the vaccines to the clinics," he said. "Their current advice on supply schedules means that the primary hub at the Royal Adelaide Hospital will open first when the vaccination supplies first arrives into South Australia and be the only hub open initially.

"The remaining sites will be opened as further supplies arrive in South Australia."

SA Health did not address questions relating to when the Mount Gambier hub will be

operational, what frontline health care workers will be eligible to receive the vaccine and how many clinics will be established in the Limestone Coast.

In a statement, SA Health said "the hubs are key sites for the initial implementation of the vaccine program" and "additional clinics will be established around the state for future stages of the vaccination roll out".

The Labor Opposition has urged the State Government to open more Covid-19 vaccination sites sooner, saying other states had announced multiple vaccination sites that will be operational when vaccinations begin.

Shadow Health Minister Chris Picton said Labor had put forward proposals to the State Government for the COVID-19 vaccine roll-out, including the establishment of multiple dedicated vaccination sites.

"We want to see as many people vaccinated as possible," he said.

"If other states will have multiple sites ready to go from day one, surely we can do the same here in South Australia?"

"We are already behind the other states when it comes to announcing our sites and nobody wants South Australia to fall behind when it comes to vaccination rates."

Medicos are moving in

THREE general practitioner registrars have started their vocational training this week in the Limestone Coast.

Based in Millicent, Mount Gambier and Naracoorte respectively, the registrars will work alongside and under the guidance of experienced GP supervisors to deliver primary healthcare services over the next six months and potentially beyond.

South Australia's sole regional GP training organisation GPEX supports training for the trio, as well two other Mount Gambier-based registrars and over 430 others around the state, with 125 regional placements, a 16pc increase on 2020.

GPEX chief executive Stephanie Clota expected this year's GP registrars were expected to play a key role in South Australia's roll-out of the coronavirus vaccine.

"The Federal Government has indicated GPs will play a key role delivering the COVID-19 vaccine in 2021, placing our registrars at the frontline of South Australia's ongoing pandemic response," Ms Clota said.

"GPEX registrars account for around one-quarter of South Australia's rural medical workforce so this vaccine support will be particularly critical in regional and remote locations."

"Amid the well documented shortage of doctors, our registrars are an important component of South Australia's rural health workforce and we understand that the placement and distribution of these doctors really matters to the communities we serve.

Ms Clota said GPEX was exploring different models of training, including roving registrars and remote supervision models, to create positive experiences while addressing critical workforce needs.

"Our research shows that positive exposure to General Practice and quality placement experiences play a key role in attracting and retaining rural GPs," she said.

"For every 10-week increase in rural training duration, graduates are 35pc more likely to practise rurally.

"We continue to work collaboratively with the profession, colleges, government and other stakeholders to provide a supported and clear pathway to the speciality of General Practice for South Australia's next generation of GPs and rural GPs."

\$7m school build takes shape

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WORKS continue to progress on Grant High School's \$7m redevelopment to support the transition of Year 7 education next year with construction on track to be completed in 2021.

Key features include three new classrooms, science lab, art room, performing arts facility, canteen and a student courtyard hub.

Currently, internal walls, first-fix plumbing and electrical work is being installed with external stone to be added.

Additional funding has also been allocated to refurbish a second fit-for-purpose special options classroom.

School principal Fleur Roachock said the fresh facelift and new facilities were ex-

citing and students and staff were looking forward to completion.

"We should have plenty of room for Year 7 students, which is the main thing we are concerned about at this point," Ms Roachock said.

"We will have much better areas to teach music and drama in and more spaces designated, so it means we won't have so many noisy things happening in the one space.

"We have some students doing some classes in odd spots at the moment so it will be nice to get that back to normal."

Juggling the school environment with construction, Ms Roachock said a reduction in some sheltered areas could hinder students as winter approaches.

"I think the whole school is looking forward to having the canteen back and some extra outside shelter. When we go into win-

ter down the track is going to be tricky," she said.

"We are getting a feel for what it will look like, even though I haven't been in there yet.

"It is just going to make the school look fabulous, it is nice to see these cosmetic changes in facilities and reflecting who we want to be."

With open spaces and classrooms, Ms Roachock said the upgrade would complement the site's successful learning environment.

"We see teachers using the open spaces to plan and kids watch that and it becomes more collaborative," she said.

"There will be plenty of room there for those types of things to happen too."

"We are here to provide a good education in all areas and we try hard to not specialise in one particular area."

Auction brings results

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LIMESTONE Coast residents opened their hearts and wallets in aid of the Lucindale-Avenue Range bushfire, raising more than \$190,000 for fire-affected families at Saturday night's mega-auction.

Machinery, accommodation packages, vouchers and labour hire were among the 160 lots valued at \$100,000 auctioned at the event to generate funds for bushfire relief.

The incredible figure from the auction brings the total fundraising effort to almost \$210,000 - including an event held in Lucindale last month featuring Adelaide Crows players - with all funds raised to be distributed to families affected by the January fire.

Mega-auction coordinator Amanda Carter said event organisers were overwhelmed by the strong attendance and generosity at the event, with attendees bidding on a range of items including a pure wool floor rug, framed prints, signed AFL memorabilia and live animals.

"We had no idea we would raise that much, it completely blew our expectations out of the water," she said.

"Before the auction we were wondering if we would be able to get enough people on the night because we had so many items to get through.

"Organisers Georgie McKay and Greg Fish-

er have put a lot of hours into the event and words can't describe how we are feeling.

"We would have had close to 400 people come to the club throughout the night, which is a really great effort for our little town."

Ms Carter praised the generous donors from across the region and as far as Adelaide who donated items, goods and services to be auctioned at the event.

"To have \$100,000 worth of items donated and to end up with nearly \$190,000 is just absolutely mind-blowing," she said.

"We continued to get donations up until a couple of days before the auction. Limestone Coast Motorcycle and Small Engines donated a log splitter worth more than \$5000 which we also auctioned off.

"We also auctioned off one of our local single farmers which was a lot of fun and for a great cause.

"Most items doubled what they were worth and people were more than happy to bid generously.

"The community of Robe has been absolutely sensational, they put together a massive basket of items and services with \$3000 and a lot of other communities have also been very generous."

The funds will be distributed to families in need by the Naracoorte Lucindale Council, which has continued to help with enquiries about the fire recovery efforts and capture requests for support from the community.

Naracoorte Lucindale mayor Erika Vickery praised organisers and attendees for supporting the fundraising effort.

"It was just fantastic and the items that were donated by the businesses and individuals were really good practical items and of high value," she said.

"People really rallied behind the event and those who were bidding on the night were so generous and had a real humility - they wanted to get on with it and raise as much as they could."

Ms Vickery said council was continuing to provide assistance to individuals and families affected by the recent fire, primarily by connecting offers of help with those who need assistance.

"The coordination between those donating and who need is it going through council and we still urge people who need help to contact council, but we recognised that this will be an ongoing and long-term recovery," she said.

"There are absolutely acres of land and kilometres of fences that have been destroyed and being down at Avenue Range this week, you can see the fencing contractors are very busy and the BlazeAid volunteers are working very hard.

"We have also been working quite closely with Kingston District Council whose experience from the Keilira fires has been invaluable in helping our response and recovery."

A safer Ramsay Avenue

MOUNT Gambier City Council will install traffic channeling devices and extend a public car park to improve safety on Ramsay Avenue.

Two lane angled slow points will be constructed on the curved road outside Akuna Kindergarten.

Line marking and signage outlining parking restrictions will be installed, while the council-owned car park next to the kindergarten will be extended by 15 spaces.

"Ramsay Avenue is a busy road for businesses and the surrounding residential area and is used as a thoroughfare to and from Jubilee Highway East," council infrastructure general manager Nick Serle said.

"The extension of the car park will ease parking issues in the area and provide a safe drop off and pick up areas for the kindergarten."

The project was triggered by community feedback.

Construction will start in the coming months.

Council office site hold

A BID to reconsider the former netball courts as the location of Wattle Range Council's \$5.5m new office has been shelved, despite elected members claiming the initial decision was rushed.

During a four-hour informal gathering held last week, Councillor Dale Price flagged a rescission motion after expressing concern elected members had not received information relating to the Millicent RSL Hall.

Cr Price's comments the decision was rushed were backed by a number of councillors, while others raised concerns the North Terrace and Williams Road corner site was too far from the central business district.

Council chief executive Ben Gower said, in the absence of a motion, staff were continuing to move forward with the design phase at the netball court site.

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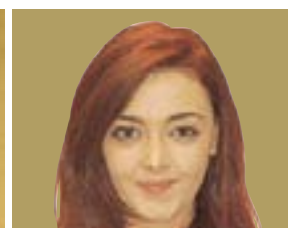

Students exploring history

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NANGWARRY Primary School students will undertake a special study this year, researching the facility's rich and diverse history as it reaches a significant milestone.

This year marks 50 years since the primary and preschool site was founded on February 7, 1971.

Celebrations kickstarted last week with a formal cake-cutting ceremony by Wattle Range Council Mayor Des Noll, which coincided with the 2021 school captains announcement.

As a whole-school research project in 1986, students researched and released the Nangwarry's Tree of Life: A short history of Nangwarry publication, which outlines the Whitford Crescent establishment's history as well as the surrounding township, former scholars, staff and other information.

The 2021 cohort will complete a student-driven enquiry to freshen and update the booklet, which is expected to be finalised this year.

School principal Erica Hurley said the project would be beneficial for students to learn and retain information themselves.

"This school would have played a vital role when the Nangwarry community was bigger," Ms Hurley said.

"There wouldn't have been as easy access to transport with cars and people did not drive 30km to school, they looked local and lived local.

"There were shops here, a doctor's clinic and the kids will research this all the way through and form a timeline."

Ms Hurley said it was easy to identify student wellbeing had always been at the centre of learning throughout the site's history.

"Because we are a small school, we are able to nurture students' learning and wellbeing, that sense of community is very strong because of the size," she said.

"We offer multiple opportunities for student engagement across multiple areas and always strive to do so."

The education facility also features a newly refurbished preschool with enrolments still open for 2021.

The primary school building is undergoing large renovations, which are expected to be complete by the end of the year.

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ENSURING Reidy Park Primary School remains a safe and optimal learning space for students is the key priority for the site's new principal.

Former Hampton Park Primary School assistant principal Craig Scerri started his new role last month after moving from Melbourne's Cranbourne East with his wife and three children.

Mr Scerri has secured a five-year contract and hopes to help students achieve a high level of academic success.

The new headmaster said moving to a regional area and raising his children in a country community was one of the many reasons he applied for the position.

"Last year with COVID-19, it was a very different year for us and we were locked down for a long time. I began looking at jobs all over the place," he said.

"I saw Mount Gambier wasn't too far away and the prices of houses were also appealing.

"Being a larger regional centre, there is access to a lot of facilities and everything you need is here too."

Having not visited South Australia since a young age, Mr Scerri said the close proximity to the coast, wine and various camping spots was appealing.

"I was originally a city boy, but in high school I moved to South Gippsland and spent some time, which was when I had that taste of rural living," he said.

"Having my own kids, I was interested in providing that opportunity for them too."

Stepping up from an assistant principal role, Mr Scerri felt lucky as he had already had background and experience to help continue developing leadership skills.

"The ultimate accountability is the biggest difference...I actually think the biggest challenge is the change in curriculum and things are much more different than I thought they were going to be, but it's just about slowly getting my head around it.

"The staff and community have been so supportive and I couldn't feel more welcome."

Mr Scerri said he would make sure children were provided with the best learning environment possible.

"Students are the centre of what we do, but there's so much in their life we don't have control over and one thing we can control is the quality of lessons and teaching," he said.

"It is about ensuring this place is their safe place and they are comfortable and no matter what they are facing in their lives."

The site is in its initial planning stages of a \$5m refurbishment.

Well on pathway to school success

"Overall, I hope to do well in school to represent my Indigenous community, get accepted into a university course and find an enjoyable and satisfying career path."

As the first person in his immediate family to attend a private school, Jakobe will use the funds to support his transition from Heywood Secondary College to Portland's Bayview College, covering costs such as school fees, technology and uniform purchases.

His ultimate goal is to study Sports Science or a related degree after secondary school.

PJ's scholarship will contribute towards his Certificate III in Business at South West TAFE, which he is currently completing as part of his employment at Gunditj Mirring Aboriginal Corporation.

"This will be a great and helpful scholarship and will help me get the help needed to complete my Certificate, including tutoring," he said.

Glenelg Shire Mayor Cr Anita Rank said research showed only two of 10 Aboriginal students within shire remained in school to complete Year 12 study.

"These grants are an important catalyst to create change and reverse this trend," Cr Rank said.

At-risk outreach helpers call

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VOLUNTEERS are being sought to provide information and help for at-risk women and children facing violent and abusive situations at a new safety up in Mount Gambier.

The Haven - Mount Gambier will focus on supporting Limestone Coast women and is designed to be a safe welcoming space to access services and support for individuals experiencing domestic, family or sexual violence or safety issues.

The service, which has been rolled out in Murray Bridge and Gawler, will be staffed by volunteers who will undergo an extensive training and skill development program in preparation of the role and will be supported daily by Women's Information Service volunteer coordinators.

Limestone Coast Domestic Violence Service safety hub project officer Sonya Mezinac said approximately 20 women have expressed an interest in volunteering at The Haven, which is scheduled to open by May.

Ms Mezinac said she was buoyed by the initial response and encouraged individuals to consider volunteering to help women across the Limestone Coast receive support and access to specialist domestic, family and sexual violence services, as well as assistance with housing and legal matters.

"There will be a range of online, Zoom and telephone services available at the hub, the Legal Services Commission of South Australia and the Women's Working Centre, which provides free and confidential help with work issues will also have Zoom meetings with women," she said.

"We are in the process of coordinating a service expo for volunteers so they can meet the variety of services that provide help and get a better understanding of what they do."

The volunteers will be trained to do on the

spot referrals, help people access council and also provide practical support.

The Women's Information Service outreach program will be operated in partnership with Mount Gambier City Council through its library and will feature a safe drop in space, phone and computer access and one-on-one

support from volunteers.

"Locating The Haven - Mount Gambier in the library is a good fit for this Women's Information Service outreach service," Ms Mezinac said.

"The Mount Gambier Library is more than a library.

"It is a community centre where people gather for many different reasons besides reading and borrowing books."

Centrecare Limestone Coast Domestic Violence Service manager Susie Smith hoped the space will facilitate women to build confidence and courage to disclose information about their private lives and identify potential abusive behaviours before it escalates.

"The facility is a gateway which will provide women options and give them information to allow them to unpack the situation which will increase their power and awareness," she said.

"But it is not just about domestic violence, women will be able to go in there for whatever reason they want whether they need legal help or to access counselling. ?

"It is about volunteers having an antenna to help women who haven't had the chance to identify problematic behaviours in their relationship see the red flag."

Truck drivers to keep eyes peeled

GREEN Triangle truck drivers and operators will be among the first in Australia to gather critical road safety data to help address issues in the road network.

Professional drivers will be able to provide an honest assessment of the roads they drive on using TruckSpot, which allows drivers to drop a "spot" directly onto a map and add a description to highlight both positive and negative issues of the road network.

The project - which is targeting the Green Triangle and Gippsland regions - is an initiative of Safe Freight Networks Australia and comes after more than a decade of discussions with drivers about regular near-misses, some caused by poorly designed or executed road infrastructure.

Safe Freight Networks Australia project officer John Ernst has previously worked with CrowdSpot in South Gippsland to identify issues with cyclists and clash points with trucks, using the platform to now assist truck drivers and transport operators.

"The data provided can inform road infrastructure decisions into the future and I anticipate some issues, such as poor sight lines at

intersections, can be fixed by road owners in their regular maintenance scheduling whereas other problems may require significant investment," Mr Ernst said.

"We want to get away from the old way of deciding on where road safety infrastructure funding should be spent and target it to areas where professional drivers are seeing the problems."

Mr Ernst said currently some funds were only available if a road death had occurred but believed truck drivers had often identified those hot spots for decades.

"By allowing drivers to have an easy-to-use method of identifying the issues we hope to get ahead of the curve and not wait till there is a death before we act," he said.

The website is now live and is accessible for all truck drivers and transport operators for three months.

After this period a heatmap will be available to highlight the danger points on the road network. This, along with a State of Our Roads report, will be available free for road users.

Bat count call out

CITIZEN scientists are being called upon to help conduct two nocturnal bat and insect surveys in the Limestone Coast.

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board has partnered with Nature Glenelg Trust for the project, which will be held tonight and tomorrow night at locations near Glencoe and Wrattonbully respectively.

Of the almost 100 species of bats in Australia, 16 varieties live in the Limestone Coast with the survey aimed at raising awareness of how widespread, diverse, and abundant bats are in the region.

The research project will determine what bat species are currently present in the Limestone Coast as well as the diversity of insect species.

Participants will receive training and be involved in both the capture and identification of insect and bats, assisted by UV light trapping for insects and harp trapping of bats.

Due to the nocturnal nature of the project (sunset to midnight) and the sensitivities of working with live bats, the project is not suitable for youths aged under 14.

The key is to communicate

FCAI RELEASES 2020 SALES

THE Federal Chamber of Automotive Industries (FCAI), the peak body for the automotive industry in Australia, has released new vehicle sales figures for the calendar year 2020.

A total of 916,968 vehicles were sold across the period, down 13.7 per cent on the calendar year 2019 when 1,062,867 vehicles were sold. The decline of 13.7 per cent was not unexpected and is attributed to the financial impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

However, the new vehicle market in Australia is now showing positive signs of growth. December 2020 recorded 95,652 sales, a 13.5 per cent increase over the same period in December 2019 when 84,239 were sold. This result follows a similar upturn in November 2020, when sales of 95,205 vehicles, a 12.4 per cent gain over November 2019, were recorded.

FCAI chief executive, Tony Weber, said signs of the recovery of the new vehicle market were welcomed by automotive brands.

"COVID-19 has brought a health crisis and a corresponding economic crisis to the world during 2020," Mr Weber said.

"And along with the rest of Australia, automotive brands and their dealer networks have found the last twelve months an extremely challenging period.

"The automotive industry in Australia accounts for more than 60,000 employees, with over 4,000 dealerships across the country. The contribution made by these businesses is critically important to the economic wellbeing of communities across Australia.

"It is therefore with great relief that the industry, along with the general economy, is finally noting some positive signs within the market."

During the year, Australia's love of the SUV and the great Aussie ute continued, with yet another increase in share for these two popular segments.

SUVs claimed 49.6 per cent of the market during 2020, an increase from 45.5 per cent market share in 2019. A total of 454,701 SUVs were sold during the year, down 5.9 per cent on the full year 2019.

Light Commercial Vehicles continued to enjoy strong popularity in 2020, claiming a 22.4 per cent market share. A total of 205,597 vehicles sold, down 8.9 per cent on the full year 2019.

Passenger vehicle numbers totalled 222,103 vehicles, for 24.2 per cent of the mar-



ket in 2020. Total Passenger vehicles sold were down 29.7 per cent on the full year 2019. The highest-selling brand for the year was Toyota, with impressive 204,801 vehicles sold for 22.3 per cent market share. In second place were Mazda (85,640 sales for 9.3 per cent market share), Hyundai (64,807 sales for 7.1 per cent market share), Ford (59,601 sales for 6.5 per cent market share), and Mitsubishi (58,335 sales for 6.4 per cent market share).

It's interesting to note that out of the top ten vehicles for the year, seven of them were either SUVs or LCVs. The top-selling vehicle for the year was the Toyota HiLux with 45,176 sales, Ford Ranger with 40,973 sales, Toyota

RAV4 with 38,537 sales, Toyota Corolla with 25,882 sales, Toyota Landcruiser with 25,142 sales, Mazda CX-5 with 21,979 sales, Hyundai i30 with 20,734 sales, Mitsubishi Triton with 18,136 sales, Toyota Prado with 18,034 sales and Kia Cerato with 17,559 sales.

Tania Phillips' Sticky Onion and Cheese Pizza Pull Apart Recipe

Prep: 10 mins
Cook: 15 mins
Serves: 6

Ingredients

- 1 brown onion
- 1 red onion, peeled
- 2 tbs olive oil
- 1 tbs brown sugar
- 2/3 cup pizza sauce or tomato paste
- 2x 270g packet garlic bread slices
- 125g sliced pepperoni
- 1/2 cup pitted kalamata olives
- 2 cups grated pizza cheese
- Dressed rocket or baby spinach, to serve, optional

Method

1. Preheat oven 200C fan forced.
2. Peel, halve and thinly slice the onions. Place onto a microwave-safe plate. Cover with damp paper towel. Microwave on High/100 per cent for 3 minutes.
3. Heat oil in a medium frying pan over medium heat. Drain the onions then add to the pan, sprinkle over the sugar. Cook, stirring for 10 minutes until light golden and sticky. Stir in the pizza sauce.
4. Lightly grease two baking trays. Arrange one pack of garlic bread, buttered side up on each tray.
5. Spread onion mixture evenly over top of each bread slice. Top pizzas with pepperoni, olives, then cheese.

6. Bake for 15 minutes, swapping the trays over after 10 minutes or until cheese is melted and bread is crisp. Serve topped with rocket or baby spinach if you like.

Tip: Make ahead - you can make the pizzas to the end step 3 up to eight hours ahead. Cover and place on the fridge. Remove from the fridge 10 minutes before cooking to allow the trays to come back to room temperature.

Variations: Replace the pepperoni with shaved ham and olives with chopped fresh pineapple; replace the pepperoni with 600g sliced fresh mushrooms sauteed in olive oil until soft and increase olives to 1 cup.

FISHING

A BREEZY weekend made the fishing a bit difficult for boaties over the weekend but the forecast of a few ripper days this week has softened the blow a little bit.

Late last week there was an opportunity for offshore anglers to hit the water and a number of them took the chance.

The 60-100m line has fished well again for those targeting flathead and sharks.

Gummy shark have made up the bulk of the numbers, but school shark are still sniffing around too.

Nannygai, terakhi and blue morwong were also caught last week, so there is a real mixed bag out there at the moment.

A few anglers have had some decent mako sharks cruising around the boats out there this week but I have not heard of one landed just yet.

Every week I write this report I am expecting to talk of tuna captures but we still have not seen one off Port MacDonnell.

Surely we can only be a matter of days away.

Snapper fishos have had a cracker start to the season.

Lots of solid fish have been caught so far and it is encouraging to see.

They have been well spread out from what I have heard - I know of fish from Carpenter Rocks, through Livingston's Bay, off the beach at Nene Valley and into the usual haunts from Orwell's Rocks through to Green Point.

There have been plenty of other species mixed in, with big whiting, mackerel, sharks, squid and even crayfish all regularly caught and a welcomed by catch.

Whiting fishos have been into some nice fish again this week after the stir.

The Port MacDonnell breakwater has probably been the most productive and there have been some nice bags of fish from that area.

Land based anglers have found their fair share from the Port MacDonnell jetty and others have found theirs off the beaches around Carpenter Rocks and Cape Douglas.

There is still plenty of mullet and salmon trout being caught with the whiting, so an op-

portunity for a mixed bag is definitely there.

Garfish anglers have been getting stuck into some nice fish this week.

The waders have probably had the upper hand with the wind, but those in the protected areas have still managed a nice feed.

The usual hot spots such as Livingstons, Cape Douglas and Hutt Bay produced some nice gar and tommies over the last week and with the upcoming forecast, I can not see that changing too much.

The evenings down on the Port MacDonnell jetty have been great for those chasing a feed of tommy ruff.

Under the lights, throw in a burley float with a bunch of gents underneath and you are just about guaranteed.

You can expect to find mackerel, salmon trout and the odd gar there too.

While you are chasing the tommies, pop a squid jig out the back on a float.

There are some excellent numbers getting caught down there at the moment and who doesn't love fresh calamari rings.

The Glenelg River has fished reasonably well this week.

I have seen a few decent fish caught but they have been spread out.

Neville Issacson boated a couple of legal mulloway down stream from Donovans on the weekend, with a handful of bream mixed in.

Nathan and Rachel Leggett fished Sunday afternoon just up from Dry Creek and boated 30 or more bream, keeping four of the bigger ones for a feed and a nice 80cm mulloway.

Not bad for a couple of hours on the water.

Eli Johnson fished under the bridge and found some nice bream and estuary perch, then got busted off on the big gear by something.

There have been more nice fish caught up-stream this week too.

Ben Jeffrey and Craig Turner threw cranks crabs for a few hours on Sunday and found good numbers of both perch and bream around the rock walls.

This weekend looks like it could be a good one.

The wind is down and the swell looks fishable so far, so let's just hope the weather man has got it right.

Until next week, safe fishing.

'Right age and right quality'

ACCORDING to Allendale East trainer David Peckham, Aston Olenna, winner of the recent Razza Racing Feature Maiden over 305 metres at Tara Raceway, is likely to be set for the forthcoming 512-metre Summer Classic, a series for dogs and bitches whelped on or after January 1, 2019.

"He's the right age (January 2019) and I reckon of the right quality," Peckham said after the fawn dog had raced at Murray Bridge last Friday.

"I was happy enough with his second in a heat at the Bridge over 395 metres, considering it was first look at the track.

"He looked a bit lost so I'm hoping he'll be improved by the run when he tackles the grade six final up there today.

"After that there's only a bit over a week before the Summer Classic heats in Mount Gambier."

Peckham will be chasing consecutive classic wins with the 36-kilogram son of Aston Bolero x Aston Selena after Sweet On Me defeated Bay Me and Call Me Billy in last year's event.

The final will be run on Sunday, February 28.

Also in the kennel and of classic age is

Noir Star, a March 2019 daughter of Rippin' Sam x Vicki Keeping.

Owned by Carl Margariti, this is the maiden dog that clocked a quick 29.74 seconds last month in a maiden/one win (512m) when running second to Spring Driven.

But Noir Star, with \$825 in earnings, broke her maiden status at Tara Raceway last Sunday when Peckham opted to run her against seasoned kennelmate Rajasthan, a winner of more than \$400,000, in the South Eastern Hotel Mixed Stake (600m).

Having her first crack at the middle-distance journey, Noir Star was giving early leader Rajasthan a fair start down the back before finishing strongly in the run home to get up by a neck in 35.64 seconds.

Not that it was perhaps all that surprising she ran out a strong 600 metres given her dam Vicki Keeping won three races at Richmond over 618 metres and 717 metres and one over 720 metres at Wentworth Park.

However, Noir Star is no certainty to tackle the Summer Classic.

"At this stage I'd prefer to keep her at 600 metres if I can," Peckham said.

"Obviously if there are no middle-distance races available to her then the classic will be the second option."

Meanwhile, Rajasthan has run his last race at Tara Raceway and returned this week to his Adelaide part-owner Tim Aloisi.

The rising five-year-old drew box four in a 515-metre heat of a Masters series at Angle Park last night.

From a Summer Classic point of view there was little to come out of last Sunday's meeting, with perhaps the exception of Cap Abbott's Another Pick in the Klaassens Contractors Grade final (512m).

With little 512-metre form featuring in her previous 27 starts, the daughter of Unlawful Entry and Proud Fantasy displayed plenty of early pace from box seven, leading until down the back straight where Stevick took over.

But Another Pick, a February 2019 whelping, battled on well, eventually finishing 2¼ lengths third behind Stevick and Slick Fernando in a personal time of 30.02 seconds.

That would make her more than competitive in the age-restricted classic.

The grade five final was originally planned to be run as a heats and final series.

However, a lack of nominations resulted in the one-off final being run.

Greyhound Racing SA racing manager Shaun Mathieson said the controlling body's policy on standard heats and final events was to run a straight-out final with added prizemoney if there were insufficient nominations for at least two heats.

Compton trainer Tracie Price, who

kicked the year off well with nine winners in January before following up with another three at February's first meeting last Thursday, said he was currently weighing up his options as far as the Summer Classic was concerned.

"Yes, we've got quite a few early 2019 youngsters at the moment," he said.

"Now it's a matter of working out which of them will be best suited to the conditions of the race."

Following the Summer Classic will be the Michelle Niele Memorial Dual Distance Challenge, heats over 512 metres to be run on Sunday, March 7 and the 600-metre final on Sunday, March 14.

As far as Michelle Niele was concerned, cystic fibrosis had been with her for all of her 23 years. But she still developed a love of greyhounds which she co-trained with her father Michael.

Michelle died in November 2019, her father later making contact with the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club regarding the running of a race in his daughter's memory.

After all, he said, she had always enjoyed her trips to Mount Gambier with their greyhounds.

With COVID-19 and all that went with it, the Michelle Niele Memorial has been a while coming.

It should be worth the wait, though.

New year brought some luck

WITH the pandemic affecting all of us in some way, 2020 could not end quick enough.

That was the case also for the plethora of owners of the five-year-old mare Good Girl Bella but for another reason.

Good Girl Bella won a race here at Mount Gambier in 2019 but could only manage one placing from nine runs during 2020.

Her three starts at the end of 2020 left her mainly Tatiara based owners wondering when, and if, Good Girl Bella would ever win another race.

A fourth at Naracoorte followed by a sixth at Bordertown and Naracoorte gave them little reason for enthusiasm as we approached the new year.

But glorious times awaited the owners sooner than they could ever have imagined when the Jeff Searle trained galloper led all the way to score in a 1600-metre BM 58 at Stawell on January 8.

Then the mare made a one act affair of a 1600-metre BM 64 race at Murray Bridge on January 21, bursting clear to win by more than seven lengths for apprentice Sophie Logan.

That victory heralded a trip to the big smoke and Searle can take credit for placing her brilliantly in a race over 1600 metres for non-metropolitan winners at Morphettville last Saturday.

In the days prior to the race, as much as \$9 was offered about her winning chances and an avalanche of money saw her go to the barrier as a solid \$4.60 third favourite.

The soft conditions were not a factor, Logan again had the ride and Good Girl Bella finished the race off powerfully to score by nearly a length.

So, what has caused the massive turnaround which has seen Good Girl Bella rattle up a hat-trick of wins in the space of four weeks?

"She has always shown us that she has ability and she needed time as she was slow at maturing," Searle stated.

"Everything went wrong for her during 2020 with a foot abscess for which she required penicillin, then she had a cold and on top of that she was always tying up in her action.

"I knew it would take a few runs for her to come good this time in work as she was too fat and her last run at Naracoorte before she started her winning streak was not as bad as it looked as she raced three wide throughout and was entitled to drop out."

Her multitude of more than 20 owners

include people involved with the Mundulla and Bordertown football clubs and also a police officer in Alice Springs.

Many of those raced the former good galloper Tilly Lad who is now retired at Millicent.

As for Good Girl Bella, she will head to either Murray Bridge or back to Morphettville for her next assignment.

On the same program, local apprentice Jacob Opperman rode his first winner at Morphettville and it came about somewhat fortuitously.

Three Melbourne jockeys who were due to ride in Adelaide could not make the trip due to a late change in COVID-19 restrictions.

One of those was apprentice Campbell Rawiller who Opperman replaced on the Patrick Payne trained Ididitforlove (\$2.90) and he rode the gelding perfectly for a half-length win.

That win may open a few more doors for the teenager as Melbourne based Payne is regarded as one of the leading trainers in Australia and he regularly sends horses to Adelaide to compete.

APPLICATION KNOCKED BACK

FOR over a decade trainer Wayne Walters was based here in Mount Gambier, training several cup winners in the region in that period.

When he opted to move his stable to Sale around five years ago, he was one of the biggest trainers here in the Limestone Coast with around 30 horses in work.

During the past year there have been speculations about Walters returning to Glenburnie.

Just recently, the Mount Gambier Racing Club did receive such an application from Walters.

It was discussed at committee level and the application has been refused, one of the reasons cited as the Mount Gambier club does not want a repetition of what has happened at Sale.

Calls and accompanying messages to the CEO of the Sale Turf Club have not been returned at the time of going to press.

SURVIVED A PROTEST FOR INITIAL WIN

WE have seen how female jockeys and trainers have made a huge impact on Australian racing, especially in the past decade and now the fairer sex are making their mark as new trainers here in this region.

Naracoorte's Yasmin Black started her training career back in August and has already chalked up 2.5 winners (one was a dead heat).

Last Friday at Warrnambool, Vanessa Hutchinson - a person who has been part and parcel of local racing for decades - notched her first winner after also taking out her trainer's licence earlier this season.

Hutchinson originally made her mark on South East racing as a jockey, riding 403 winners - including 11 in Adelaide - last century.

Since then she has remained heavily involved with the Darren Kolpin stable and, more recently, as foreperson for the Michael O'Leary stable.

The five-year-old mare Halo's Quest (\$3.20), raced by the local Stutley family, gave Hutchinson her first official winner by taking out the 1700-metre maiden.

But the thrill of that first win was briefly put on hold when Jarrod Lorensini, rider of the runner-up Yensir, fired in a protest alleging interference near the 200-metre mark.

The protest was thrown out that quickly by stewards it must have bordered on being frivolous.

"She (Halo's Quest) doesn't handle turns well and I told Dean (Yendall, jockey) to have her near the lead at the top of the straight before making her run," Hutchinson said.

"It will be either to Penola or back to Warrnambool for her next run."

Hutchinson also trains the handy galloper Jester Halo, an acceptor in Adelaide tomorrow and has two others currently in work at her stables adjacent to the Glenburnie racecourse.

CLASS PREVAILED IN CUP

TRAINER Sue Jaensch won her sixth hometown cup and co-trainer/son Jason his first when Von Costa Glass won last Sunday's Naracoorte Cup.

In a field of only four which was embar-

rassing for the Naracoorte club and Limestone Coast racing, class prevailed when Von Costa Glass (\$1.90-\$2.15) gave apprentice Will Price his first cup winner and a personal best of three winners for the day.

Price has only recently commenced his career and there was speculation he may be a victim of circumstances with his inexperience should it turn into a tactical race, as can often happen in small fields when it is not uncommon for the outsider to win.

The teenage hoop made sure it was a truly run cup by commencing Von Costa Glass' run at the 700 metres and, despite racing four wide, Von Costa Glass proved too good for Dyagilev and his stablemate Bronski.

Limestone Coast trainers dominated the day, winning all eight races, with Michael O'Leary and the Jaensch stable each recording winning doubles.

Mount Gambier trainers won half of the program and three of those winners were the medium of heavy backing.

Both of O'Leary's winners, Four Outlaws (\$5.50-\$2.70 fav.) and Bossy Britches (\$4.20-\$2.50 fav.), were poor results for bookmakers.

Then the Jamie Opperman trained Rohlon Drunk was backed from \$7 into \$4.40 favourite before winning his third race at Naracoorte at his first run back from a three-month spell.

The small cup field came out of left field as there were 17 initial nominations for the race and normally one would expect at least 10 or a dozen to accept.

However it fell away to seven runners at acceptance time followed by three more scratchings on race day.

Despite ideal conditions, the cup day attendance was well below par.

Former Naracoorte Racing Club secretary Tammy Pretlove bypassed cup day and instead headed to Ararat on Sunday.

It proved worthwhile when Fergie, a five-year-old mare who Pretlove trains, won the 1100-metre 0-58 handicap.

NUMBERS GRADUALLY INCREASING

HORSE numbers continue to gradually increase for local racing which is a positive sign with the Mount Gambier Gold Cup only four weeks away (Saturday, March 13).

In the closest finish of the evening last Tuesday, the Graeme Howard trained Burning Hot reversed the tables on She Will Wantano from their previous clash to win his first race this year after four consecutive seconds.

Veteran driver Kevin Brough used the sprint lane to advantage to get Julius Shadow home for a first up win in the feature race, the Reg Hinton memorial.

Long wait for monthly prize

THE Blue Lake Golf Club held its annual presentation night last week where all the award winners were presented with their trophy's or certificates won over the previous year.

Meanwhile, Stephen Smith waited a day to collect his own prize as winner in the monthly par competition.

The most solid of constructions always start with a good foundation and Smith laid that early, opening with three successive pars for a +2 start.

The talented B Grade golfer who was instrumental in getting the driving range complex to where it is today, only found trouble on the signature par 3 fifth hole, which he scrubbed.

Another par on the ninth saw him turn with a +3.

He soon found trouble on the opening hole of the back nine with a nil points but that was only a momentary blip as he went on to construct a score of +4 on the back nine to take the win.

The threat of slipping back a grade was enough impetus for A Grader David Dowie to get his game back into form and he almost needed a shopping trolley to carry all the pluses he gained in his round.

The more, the better

WHEN is too much golf nowhere near enough?
When you are Gianni Giurastante.

The 23-year-old shearer from Millicent started playing the game just 19 months ago, on a handicap of 36.

But after winning Saturday's monthly medal at the Mount Gambier Golf Club with a superb net 64 from his 10 handicap, he saw another three strokes disappear and he will be off seven next time out.

Club professional John Martin said that level of improvement in the relatively short timeframe was, "as good as I've seen".

But Giurastante said he hoped the transition to a single-figure handicap was just the first step in the golfing journey he has put no limits on.

"I just love the game," he said.

"I'm going to move to Adelaide soon ... I really want to make something out of it."

Outside of the recent shearing season he has either played or practiced almost every day since he took up the game.

That includes Saturdays at Attamurra, at least two other competitions in the region during the week and even regular weekly trips to golf clubs in Adelaide to test himself out.

Last Saturday he started his round on the 10th hole and shot 36 off the stick on the back nine, with five pars, two birdies and two bogeys.

He was still on track to shoot an even par 72 after compensating for a bogey on the second hole with a birdie on the third.

But that possibility ended after a bogey on the fourth and a double on the par-three sixth after finding the greenside bunker with his tee shot.

He grabbed one shot back with a birdie on the par-four ninth hole to finish with 74 off the stick.

"I was driving it well, my irons were good and the pace of the greens meant you could attack the pins," Giurastante said.

As it turned out his net 64 was only just good enough, with newcomer David Pick one shot behind.

The former top cricketer for the Yahl club, who only hung up his bat after taking up golf in November, was desperately unlucky not to win his first monthly medal.

Playing off a 17 handicap, he was on track

to break 80 off the stick before making a quadruple-bogey eight on the 17th hole.

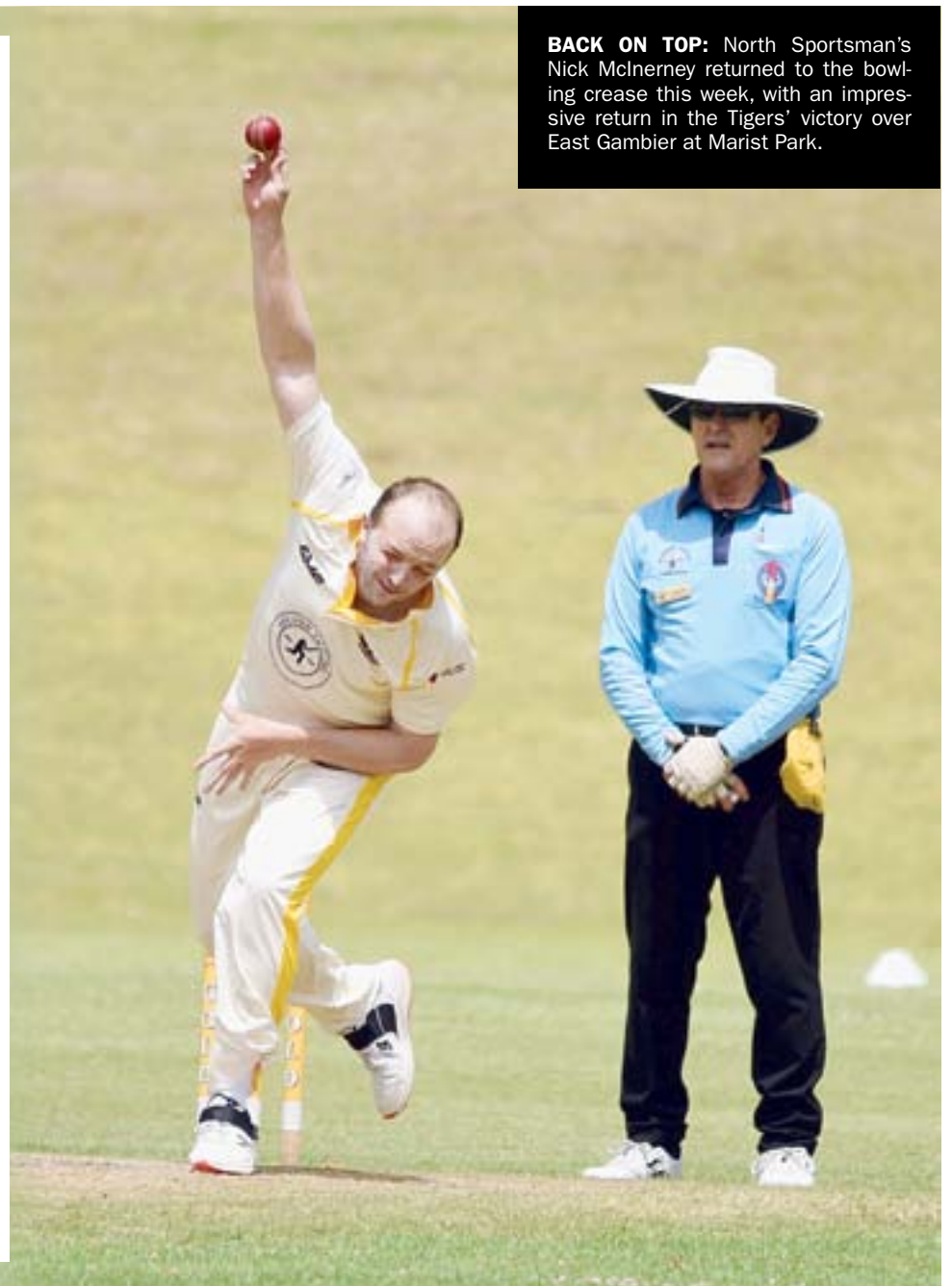
The side was bundled out for just 137 runs in the 63rd over.
