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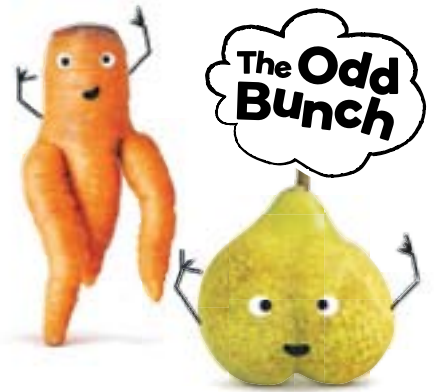


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GUN RESTORATION NOT CHILD'S PLAY: It is almost 30 years since Mount Gambier man Murray Langford completed a full restoration of the city's World War I relic, a 1917 Krupp field gun. For decades it has been a right of passage for children to play on the field gun at its Vansittart Park home but it was removed this week to once again be returned to its former glory. Boat ramp cost blow

KINGSTON District Council has adopted an in principle position not to proceed with the reinstatement of a council-owned boat ramp after an independent report found rate revenue would need to increase by up to 19pc to fund the project.

An independent business case has found reinstatement of Maria Creek as a boat launching facility would cost council \$7.6m for capital works and a further \$626,000 each year in ongoing costs for dredging work and depreciation.

Big water wipeout

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WATER licensing restrictions placed on the forestry industry has shrunk the region's plantation by 20,000ha - the same number of assets lost in Ash Wednesday - a forestry sector stalwart says.

N.F. McDonnell and Sons director Ian McDonnell says the Lower Limestone Coast Water Allocation Plan, which prohibits non-water licence holders from replanting trees, had wiped more than \$200m worth of economic activity from the industry.

The Green Triangle processor said the water restrictions were threatening the livelihood of some silviculture operations and forcing

est growers to investigate alternative markets interstate.

Mr McDonnell said the region was now Australia's largest softwood plantation estate with growing opportunity to deliver the bulk of the nation's timber needs following the loss of significant estate in the 2019/20 bushfires.

But he said the State Government's Water Allocation Plan was not only stifling growth,

but resulting in a net reduction of plantation area.

The industry has commissioned a landmark study into plantation water use in the hope fair and equitable decision-making can be achieved for all water users in the 2023 water review.

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Water cuts hurt forestry

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But he said the State Government's Water Allocation Plan was not only stifling growth, but resulting in a net reduction of plantation area.

"Already we have lost 20,000 hectares over the past five years with more land to be lost in the near future," he said.

"This is the same number of assets lost in the 1983 Ash Wednesday bushfires.

"The difference then was that we had the ability to replant and rebuild our sector.

"Today we stand at a stalemate with land remaining cleared, uncertain whether plantations will ever be re-established."

Mr McDonnell, who is also chair of the Green Triangle Forestry Industries Hub, said a landmark study into plantation water use was underway in an effort to regain access to state-controlled water and stop the growing loss of forestry estate.

He said the sector had invested in extensive research plan to ensure fair and equitable decision-making can be achieved for water users in the 2023 water review.

The research will be undertaken in partnership with UniSA and guided by Forest Research Mount Gambier and will investigate groundwater resource management to better understand groundwater triggers, recharge rates, specific yield and porosity to the aquifer.

Researchers will also examine the direct impact of plantation forests on wetlands, understanding the role of climate change and existing water events and the role of heavy clays to understand plantation areas that may not be accessing groundwater.

"This extensive peer reviewed research, which is the first of its kind ever undertaken for the forest sector, will aid this Water Allocation Plan review process," he said.

"Significant time, resources and investment is being spent to provide a robust evidence base on the truth of plantation water use."

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell supported the research and said future decisions on water allocation needed to be based on science and required collaboration with all affected industries.

"It seems strange that we have all of these drains that drain freshwater off the land not recharging the aquifers and yet we have industry that could use that water that does not have access to it," he said. "We need to be looking after the environment, we need to be looking at our wetlands and the environmental side of things and thinking about whether there are better ways we can use the water that is running off to seas through drains that have been cut there for 125 years.

"Water allocation is one of the biggest issues that we have to address if all industries are going to grow and benefit our region.

"We have to have serious, mature discussions about this and it has got to be done on

the basis of science."

Following changes to the State Government's Water Allocation Plan and the addition of forestry as a water-affecting activity, growers are required to buy water licences for plantations to offset the impact on groundwater reserves.

But the current water licensing system has been criticised as being implemented without a robust socio-economic and environmental analysis of costs and benefits to the environment, industry and the community.

The current provisions dominated a parliamentary inquiry on the timber industry, with a number of witnesses warning without changes to the plan, the state's entire forestry plantation will decrease by 25pc over the next decade.

Construction, Forestry, Maritime, Mining and Energy Union (CFMMEU) Greater Green Triangle District secretary Brad Coates told the committee a socio-economic and environmental analysis would demonstrate plantation forests should not be subject to major water restrictions as the benefits justified its water usage.

"Here in South Australia we have this really restrictive water licensing issue, you go 20 minutes down the road and you can go and plant trees without a water licence," Mr Coates said.

"The way the current water licensing provisions are in place at the moment, there is going to be a loss of around about a quarter of the plantation estate in South Australia within 10 to 15 years.

"Part of those regulations was current plantations if they weren't able to secure the water licence, they can be grown to maturity and harvested, but once they were harvested they couldn't be replanted with trees.

"It's about 25pc which can't be replanted under the current legislation."

The State Government was contacted for comment but did not respond prior to deadline.

Borders open

REVELLERS across the Limestone Coast can get back into the groove with restrictions on dancing while drinking alcohol in pubs and clubs now lifted.

Venues with 200 people or less will be able to re-open dancefloors unrestricted, while a designated area can be allocated in venues with 200 to 1000 patrons to cater for 50 people, providing all COVID-19 rules are followed.

Today also marks just the 19th day since March 13, 2020 that South Australia has no border restrictions for people entering that state from any Australian jurisdiction.

Only people in quarantine from visiting the Greater Melbourne Tier-1 zone must remain isolated for the full 14-day period.

'Not guilty' plea

A MILLICENT man accused of possessing child exploitation material has entered not guilty pleas in court and will stand trial by jury in the District Court.

Matthew Ernest Hann, 53, was scheduled to appear in the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court this week charged with two counts of possession of child exploitation material.

Hann's lawyer advised Magistrate Maria Panagiotidis he was unable to attend the committal hearing, who expressed disappointment the accused did not appear in court.

"I am unhappy about him not being here," Magistrate Panagiotidis said.

Defence for Hann said the matters are contested and entered not guilty pleas for both charges.

Hann's trial is scheduled for the next District Court circuit, scheduled for July 6.

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Lid lifted on recycling plant

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A NEW industry is being forged in Mount Gambier as one man declares his own “war on waste”, recycling used milk bottles and damaged wheelie bins into furniture.

Ecoplas Australia founder Willie van Niekerk is only just scratching the surface of his new plastic recycling business, which he hopes to expand into a factory capable of processing over 100 tonnes of plastic annually with up to 10 employees.

It is a promising outlook by Mr van Niekerk, who currently operates a pilot plant from the Mount Gambier Waste Transfer Centre where over 42,000 milk bottles and numerous bins have already been spared from landfill since October 1 last year.

ABC's War On Waste documentary series inspired Mr van Niekerk to explore production methods using recyclable plastic with picnic tables, bench seats, hose fittings and fence posts among his initial products.

Testing will start in the coming weeks on plastic bricks, suitable for garden beds, retaining walls and children's outdoor play equipment.

Mr van Niekerk currently collects milk bottles from around 30 city businesses, while council now uses the pilot plant to recycle damaged wheelie bins previously destined for landfill.

It has been a leap of faith for the former OneFortyOne senior manager who did not receive much industry insight given it is a small but competitive market.

“I bought the equipment I thought I might need and spent about four months experimenting,” he said.

Despite some “dark days” during testing, Mr van Niekerk achieved his first major goal this month by achieving a sale with delivery of two picnic tables and a bench to Glencoe Central Primary School his first order.

A further two bench seats have since been crafted for a private customer, each containing around 450 milk bottles and two wheelie bins.

Mr van Niekerk said the plastic furniture was comparatively priced against other alternatives, such as wooden items, and retained its shape and colour while being just as sturdy as traditional materials.

The business founder said sales were not only important from a commercial perspective but also within the business' sustainability vision.

“A lot of people think about recycling as, if they put something in their recycling bin, they have recycled,” Mr van Niekerk said.

“What they've done there is sorted, not recycled - even me crushing it down and melting it out is just reprocessed,” he said.

“It is only recycled once someone has bought the final product, then it has done a full cycle.

“My challenge will be to make a product the customers want.”

Mr van Niekerk said the fees associated with transporting recyclable plastics to major depots nationally and internationally were

often cost-ineffective, which contributed to some waste plastics being sent to landfill in its area of origin.

City Council environmental sustainability officer Aaron Izzard said Mr van Niekerk approached the local government body to pitch his concept, with council offering support in the pilot phase by providing space at the waste transfer centre.

Mr Izzard said improving waste practices was a key focus area given council audits had revealed large amounts of recyclable material was unnecessarily dumped at Caroline landfill.

“Plastics is a huge issue and in some cases we haven't had the systems to necessarily deal with them,” Mr Izzard said.

“It is one thing to collect it and send it off but it's another thing to take the responsibility yourself and also create jobs right here in our region,” he said.

“Willie has had some teething issues to work through but if he is successful, he could potentially soak up all of the plastics in the region.

“He has the capacity to work with things that couldn't get recycled, like bottle lids.”

Council has recently launched a small scale recycling system in the Civic Centre foyer, collecting items unable to be recycling through kerbside bins such as bread tags, plastic bottle lids, used toothbrushes and empty toothpaste tubes.

Plastic bottle lids with the number two or four in the triangle recycling symbol will be recycled locally through Ecoplas and Tenison Woods College's Precious Plastic program.

Bread tags will be sorted by St Martin's Lutheran College students for use by Robe-based recycling enterprise Transmutation and the Aussie Bread Tags for Wheelchairs program, while oral care products will be sent to TerraCycle for specialised treatment.

“It is really encouraging and great to see that a circular economy is happening right here in Mount Gambier,” Mr Izzard said.

Meanwhile, South Australia's single-use plastics ban starts Monday, March 1 with the sale, supply and distribution of plastic products such as straws, cutlery and beverage stirrers outlawed.

The government has signalled its intention

to expand the ban to include other items such as polystyrene cups, bowls and plates in early 2022.

HOW MILK BOTTLES BECOME FURNITURE

ECOPLAS Australia collects plastic milk bottles from local businesses and collects damaged wheelie bins from City Council. Trials are also underway on plastic bottle lids.

Milk bottles are stored outside in metal crates to dry out for around one week - “Moisture is problematic to the process,” Mr van Niekerk said.

The plastic material is crushed down into small flakes.

The material is placed into a hopper to dry for a further 90 minutes before being processed through an extruder, heated to 220 degrees celsius.

A plastic ooze created by the machine is then fed into pre-cast moulds before being plunged into water and left to set.

Plastic components are joined using stainless steel screws and then sold.





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Kingston flags impost

KINGSTON District Council has adopted an in principle position not to proceed with the reinstatement of a council-owned boat ramp after an independent report found rate revenue would need to increase by up to 19pc to fund the project.

At last week's meeting, councillors discussed an independent business case for the Maria Creek Boat Launching Facility following the closure of the facility in 2019 due to sand and seagrass build-up.

The report, undertaken by BRM Advisory, found the Maria Creek Community Focus Group preferred hybrid model comprising of a 60m southern breakwater extension, 250m breakwater repairs and 350,000m³ dredging on the southern side and the channel could add up to \$9.6m to council's operating cost base - or an average of 9.3pc - over 10 years.

According to the report, the reinstatement of Maria Creek as a boat launching facility would cost \$7.6m for capital works and a further \$626,000 each year in ongoing costs for dredging work and depreciation.

While the report acknowledges the impact the ongoing closure the facility has on tourism and fishing, it warns ongoing costs "will need to be met either by reducing costs or other services or by raising income from council rates".

Kingston District Council chief executive Nat Traeger said given the preferred pathway had a significant financial impact on council and the community, an information pack and ballot has been distributed to ratepayers to help guide the focus group and elected members in the final decision-making process.

"This is not a community survey, the ballot is either a yes we progress with the model or no, we do nothing," she said.

"Council needs to be comfortable that the community is largely supportive of the choice that is made because it not only affect the

current community but future generations of ratepayers.

"The 15pc range is really dependent on whether the council is able to secure grant funding... and a fair component of the \$7.6m is for the dredging campaign.

"The capital work isn't the biggest problem, it's the ongoing costs of dredging.

"We own a dredge but it is located at Cape Jaffa and there is no way we could use it at Maria Creek because it would create problems at Cape Jaffa so we would have to get in a contractor."

Under the three funding scenarios examining a 100pc, 50pc and 0pc contribution for capital works, the report estimates council would operate in a deficit for the duration of its long term financial plan - including no cash reserves from 2022/23 - and have limited capacity to borrow to funds operations.

Ms Traeger said for council to proceed with the project the maximum increase on rate caps may need to be amended or removed, which would disproportionately affect primary producers where valuation increases have occurred.

She said all funding scenarios only includes ongoing sand and seagrass management, depreciation and interest costs and did not consider principle loan repayments which affect council's cash flow in addition to the required rate revenue increase.

The ratepayer survey will close on March 12.

In the event councils in principle position is supported by the community and the proposed reinstatement of the boat launching facility is not progressed, the alternate options of removing the existing breakwaters or adopting a do nothing approach will be considered.

Cheers to positive changes

TENISON Woods College sustainability coordinator Tom Linnell was awarded the top award at the Premier's Climate Change Council celebration for his innovative work in education.

Mr Linnell was awarded a \$10,000 prize as the overall winner at this week's award ceremony for empowering students to deliver innovative emissions reduction projects linked to learning outcomes.

The college has set targets to be off grid by 2030 and zero waste by 2025, led by the work of Mr Linnell, students and the school board.

A number of projects have been initiated to reach the targets, including an industrial green waste composter, an e-waste reuse market and a student managed plastic recycling enterprise.

Environment and Water Minister David Speirs said Mr Linnell was an example of how an individual can lead by example and create positive change in the community.

"Mr Linnell's achievement in combining practical action and education to tackle climate change and prepare students for the jobs of the future is inspiring," he said.

"We know that tackling climate change is a win-win for our economy and environment, and this work, along with the other projects presented at the awards, really demonstrates this."

Human bones identified: Sad beach find has family in mourning

A FORMER Beachport resident is mourning the loss of her son after a human bone found on Maslin Beach has been confirmed via DNA to be of that of missing man Jesse Corigliano-Quealey.

The 30-year-old man was last seen at an address in the industrial suburb of Lonsdale around lunchtime on Thursday, October 8

after dropping his car at a mechanic.

Mr Corigliano-Quealey was not seen since, with an extensive search of the area by SA Police failing to locate the man and mother Jane Corigliano issuing a plea for information on social media and community groups.

On Tuesday, February 16, a member of the public found a bone while walking on Maslin

Beach before handing it in to police.

The bone has been examined as has been confirmed via DNA as being Mr Corigliano-Quealey's.

A second bone, believed to be a human rib, was found within 50m of the first bone on Wednesday, February 17.

In a statement, SA Police said the out-

come is yet to be determined on the second bone and Forensic Science SA were conducting further analysis on the bone.

Police said Mr Corigliano-Quealey's death was not considered suspicious at this time.

The Southern District Crime Investigation Bureau will prepare a report for the state Coroner.

Park gun in safe hands

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A WORLD War 1 field gun has been removed from Vansittart Park to undergo just its second restoration in over 100 years since it was captured in France during the height of battle.

The German-made 1917 Krupp 77mm field gun was removed from its parkland rotunda on Tuesday with the \$20,000 project funded by Mount Gambier City Council.

Mount Gambier man Murray Langford will complete the restoration, three decades since he last refurbished the weapon following a seven-year campaign to retain it in the city as a public asset.

Captured by Australian forces at Warfusee Abancourt near Amiens, France on August 8, 1918, the war relic was donated to Adelaide City Council before being gifted to the Blue Lake city in 1920 following a concerted push from City Council.

Originally placed in the Cave Gardens, the gun was later moved to Vansittart Park where it remained for six decades before its deteriorating condition became hazardous, with City Council advertising the historical artefact for sale in September 1984.

It triggered a strong response from the Mount Gambier Veteran and Vintage Car Club - led by president Mr Langford at the time - publicly expressing disappointment over the "hasty" decision and offering to complete a full restoration at no cost to council.

"At the time it was to be sold back in 1984, kids would ride their bikes down or walk down and I think every child in Mount Gambier played on it so it meant something to the people," Mr Langford said.

"It's not quite the same today because kids have other things to play on but there are still a lot of people who remember it as a child and now take their kids down to play on it," he said.

"It is also one of the very few things we have here in the Mount to remind us of World War 1 and the people we lost in that war.

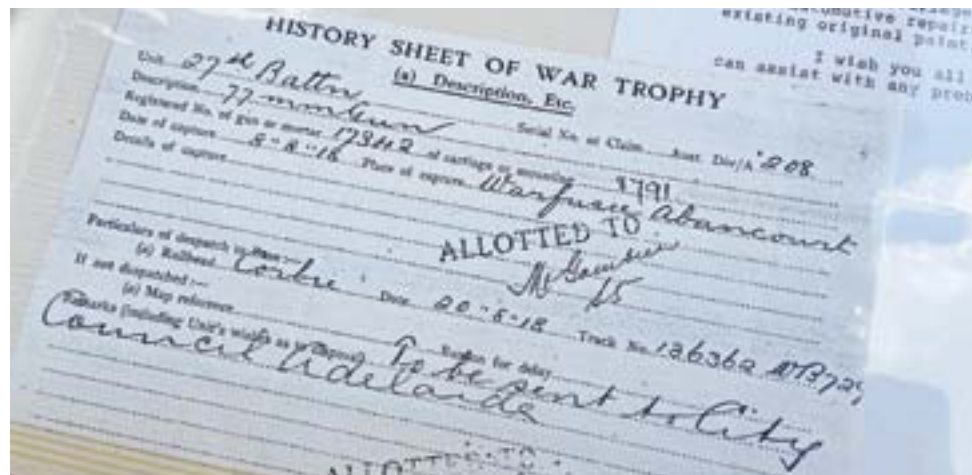
"We thought it was really important to have it there as a memento of the sacrifice that was made."

After taking possession of the gun in late 1984, the car club faced a difficult seven-year campaign to fundraise for the project, struggling to cover the estimated \$15,000 restoration.

Undeterred by several setbacks, Mr Langford continued to champion the project and through community donations totaling \$6000 and more than 2300 hours of donated labour, the gun was returned to Vansittart Park on November 3, 1991 in a new purpose-built rotunda.

"We had people from the Australian War Memorial visit at the time who said it was the best Krupp field gun restoration they had seen in the country outside those in their museum," Mr Langford said.

Mr Langford said while the restoration would be "not quite the same" this time

around, he was relieved project funding had been secured, eliminating many of the obstacles experienced in the 1980s.

Mount Gambier Community RSL president Bob Sandow said Murray Langford had been pivotal in ensuring the war relic remained in ownership of the people of Mount Gambier.

"We owe the restoration of that gun to Murray's foresight and vision," Mr Sandow.

"These things have been earned by somebody's blood and tears," he said.

Council building maintenance coordinator Trevor Pettingill expected the restoration to take a minimum of eight weeks, with the refurbished gun to be returned to the rotunda, which also houses a French mortar.

"We've had it now since the early 1920s - I actually remember as a kid myself - we don't

want to lose that history," Mr Pettingill said.

He urged the community to treat the war relic with the respect it deserves upon its return.

"You can't look it behind doors, we hope the community looks after it."

PARK GUN HISTORY

- **1917** - German weapons manufacturer Krupp builds the 77mm field gun.
- **August 8, 1918** - The Australian Imperial Force 27th Battalion captures the gun at Warfusee Abancourt near Amiens, France. It is shipped to Australia aboard the SS Boral and gifted to Adelaide City Council.
- **1920** - The gun is donated by Adelaide City Council to Mount Gambier City Council and it is placed in the Cave Gardens. It is later moved to Vansittart Park where its condition slowly deteriorates over six decades.
- **September 1984** - After removing the gun from Vansittart Park due to safety concerns regarding its condition, Mount Gambier City Council advertises the war relic for sale.
- **October 1984** - The Mount Gambier Veteran and Vintage Car Club makes a pitch to save the gun, offering to provide all materials, costs and labour associated with a restoration.
- **November 1984** - City Council agrees to the car club's restoration proposal, with work starting in 1985.
- **April 1985** - The club establishes a project funding committee. The Mount Gambier Community RSL (\$500) and council (\$300) are among the first contributors.
- **May 1985** - The car club and RSL disagree over whether a council-led public appeal should be established, with the car club calling for a "personal approach".
- **August 26, 1986** - The car club "desperately" requests \$20,000 from the Australian Bicentennial Authority for the restoration and to construct a shelter to house the relic. The request is denied in October 1986.
- **March 2, 1987** - Mount Gambier Mayor Don McDonnell launches a public appeal to raise \$15,000 for the project.
- **April 1987** - The Australia Army 27th Battalion donates \$200 towards the restoration.
- **May 1991** - Council announces it will build a \$40,000 rotunda to house the war relic at Vansittart Park.
- **November 3, 1991** - Two draught horses are used to move the war relic into place at Vansittart Park in a public ceremony.
- **March 21, 2013** - A heavy storm displaces a tree, which falls on the rotunda and dislodges the roof, causing minor damage to the field gun's armour.

Body found after campervan fire

THE body of an elderly Victorian man has been found inside a campervan which caught fire at Portland on Monday night.

Emergency services responded to reports of a grass fire in shrub land off Cape Nelson Road at around 8pm local time, locating the campervan ablaze.

Subsequent investigations led to an 82-year-old Millgrove man being found deceased in the vehicle.

The circumstances surrounding the

fire are yet to be determined with an arson chemist and fire investigators involved in the investigation.

Police are appealing to anyone who saw an older-model white Toyota campervan - with a distinctive metallic box attached to the back - camping in the Portland or Cape Nelson Road area over the past week to come forward.

Witnesses sought to fatal truck crash

WITNESSES to a fatal truck accident east of Bordertown earlier this month are being asked to come forward.

Detectives from Victoria's Major Collision Investigation Unit and Heavy Vehicle Criminal Investigation Unit believe truck drivers from either South Australia or New South Wales may be able to provide further information on the February 11 incident, including dashcam footage.

A 46-year-old Adelaide man died when his B Double truck died when his vehicle crashed into a stationary B Double truck around

The stationary truck collided with the B Double truck in front of it, with all three trucks catching fire.

The exact cause of the collision is under investigation. It occurred as dozens of vehicles queued at the South Australia-Victoria border at a border checkpoint.

Wreck recalled

IT was early 1951 when Limestone Coast resident Geoff Aslin saw the 100m-long, 3346 tonne freighter Corio shipwrecked roughly 4km from Cape Banks.

"I was about six years old at the time and my Dad had an emergency radio and he received a call about the wreck," Mr Aslin said.

"I remember my parents driving me out to see it.

"There were no roads, just tracks and I can remember having to get out of the car and climb over the dunes.

"When I saw it I couldn't believe how big it was."

On February 26, 1951 - 70 years ago today - the steel cargo ship was lost after running aground on Admella Reef when en route from the Fleurieu Peninsula to Wollongong with a cargo of limestone.

Built by the NSW Government Dockyard in 1919, the steel ship was owned by Huddart, Parker and Co at the time of the loss.

The Corio was wrecked on a rock in about 18 feet water, just 100 yards from where the historic Admella sank in 1859.

"It was really foggy that day, you wouldn't have been able to see very far ahead of you, especially out on the water," Mr Aslin said.

"The captain thought he was right out to sea so when he came in, he came in between where the Admella was wrecked and the coast.

"It hit the reef and ended up not too far off from where the Admella sank."

Although the vessel was just little more than a quarter of a mile offshore, nothing could be done to save the Corio.

According to a report in The Border Watch, the 43 crew members were advised to abandon ship by fisher Fred Von Stanke, but they were "having tea and were not concerned about their dangerous position."

At 9pm, Captain Rasmussen radioed that the ship was taking water and the sea around the Corio was a milky colour caused by some

of the limestone.

Shortly after, 18 men were taken off the ship by the Iron Yampi, a BHP ore freighter which turned and steamed for six hours to the Corio aid after having picked up the SOS signal.

Images from the wreck photographed by Ms Aslin's mother, vessel parts and the Corio's ship log are among the salvaged artefacts that feature in the Port MacDonnell and District Maritime Museum.

Committee members and volunteers are currently working to complete the museum's next display, a wall mural and a three dimensional jetty made from materials from the original structure.

Co-located within the Port MacDonnell Community Complex, the museum is divided into two sections detailing the region's rich maritime history and land life at the turn of the century.

Port MacDonnell and District Maritime committee president Trevor Sheard said further additions to the museum are planned for 2020, including a display early settlement in Port MacDonnell following the town's official designation as a port on April 4, 1860.

Mr Sheard said an audio-visual display of the local shorebirds and the 14,000km migratory flights to the Arctic Circle back to the Limestone Coast and an exhibit celebrating the rock lobster fishing industry was also scheduled for completion this year.

"We recently finished a school exhibit which shows you what a classroom used to look like," he said.

"The students at Allendale East Area School were involved and wrote their thoughts about what they thought school was like back in these days and we have put those letters on display.

"There are a lot of people come through who may have been to the museum years ago and when they come back they comment on the next exhibits.

"We like to change the displays to keep it interesting and help tell some of the stories of the region."

City rate for rubbish

MOUNT Gambier City Council rate notices will feature a dedicated waste service charge (WSC) next financial year under a revised rating structure.

From July 1, a \$200 waste service charge will feature on council notice separate to the fixed charge general rate, which will reduce by \$200.

New council shared services general manager Darren Barber said the charge was cost neutral and would have no bottom-line impact on most ratepayers.

It is proposed the 2021/22 rates charges will be comprised of capital values, the \$200 waste fee and an anticipated 4.5pc combined general rates and service fee charge increase.

According to council, the waste transfer charge will recover costs associated with kerbside bin collections, the Waste Transfer Station, ReUse Market and bulky waste collection.

"The proposed WSC is an environmental decision to make the costs associated with the collection, treatment and disposal of waste visible to ratepayers on their quarterly/annual rates notices," Mr Barber said.

"The WSC will provide council with a tool to become more responsive to waste management related costs and share the costs and benefits with the community."

It is proposed the WSC will be charged on the basis of the service being available to a property.

"It will exclude vacant land and primary production where there is no dwelling on the land and will be charged irrespective if the land owner/occupier is using the service or not," Mr Barber said.

Further details about the WSC and council rates will be released as part of the 2021/22 annual business plan and budget, which will include community consultation over the coming months.

MP abstains from abortion bill

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MEMBER for Mount Gambier Troy Bell has defended abstaining from the final vote of the state's historic and controversial abortion laws despite voting on a number of amendments during the marathon debate.

Parliamentarians were granted a conscience vote on the bill - introduced to the Lower House by Attorney-General Vickie Chapman - which removes abortion from criminal law and allows termination beyond 23 weeks in certain circumstances.

The independent MP raised concerns with the lack of safeguards in the original Termination of Pregnancy Bill ahead of the debate, including preventing abortions being performed due to sex selection and the potential for discrimination against doctors who are conscientious objectors.

In a speech to parliament, Mr Bell he would not support the bill unless changes were made to satisfy his concerns.

Mr Bell backed amendments strengthening the provisions during last week's lengthy debate, but said he was "conflicted" when a proposal to prohibit late-term abortions due to mental health reasons - which he does not support - failed to secure majority support.

"I believe I have stayed true to what I said in my first reading speech because there was many aspects of the bill that I support," he said.

"I support decriminalising it and I support the right to choose, but I couldn't support was using mental health grounds as a reason to abort a baby that is viable outside the womb.

"I think you could have a late-term abortion was when there was a risk to the mother, foetus or severe abnormality that wasn't picked up early.

"Late-term abortions for rape and incest

I agreed with and I voted that way, but being able to use just mental health for a late-term abortion was a step too far."

The long-time mental health advocate said while psychosocial factors was an important part of the decision to terminate a pregnancy up until 22 weeks and six days gestation, he did not believe it should apply beyond the six month mark.

"After 23 weeks - in my mind - that is no longer a foetus, it is a baby," Mr Bell said.

"I am an advocate and I will push as hard as I can for mental health and up to 23 weeks, mental health is a very serious and legitimate factor.

"But after 23 weeks, that baby can survive outside the womb."

While Mr Bell was notably absent from the final vote Member for MacKillop Nick Mc-

Bride did support abortion reform.

Mr McBride - who was one of the only country MPs to back the bill - told parliament he was "very proactive and pro-choice" before acknowledging his views were well-known within the "very conservative" electorate.

The first-term MP supported an proposal to provide an annual report on terminations in South Australia, including information on the age of the pregnant person, the gestational age of the foetus at the time of termination and "other information" including data and statistics, with a review of the act in four years.

In speaking to the amendment, Mr McBride sought a commitment from Attorney-General Vickie Chapman to ensure all abortions are conducted legally and are "tolerable or palatable... to the general population".

Mr McBride told *The Border Watch* he had considered the status of the current law and extensive evidence, research and advice from health professionals prior to the vote.

"I have considered positions strongly advocated to me in relation to right to life and a women's right to make choices about her own body," he said.

"In many discussions I have had on this matter I had expressed my concerns in relation to the allowance of later term terminations.

"In considering all of the information before me I ultimately chose to vote in support of the Bill.

"I was satisfied that there are adequate safeguards in the Bill and professional medical standards in place to ensure that the decision making in relation to terminations is made based on medical evaluation of all circumstances."

The bill will return to the Upper House to receive final approval before the laws change.

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EDITOR'S COMMENT

FOR months Limestone Coast residents have slowly become accustomed to paper straws and cutlery, among other changes, ahead of Monday's ban on single-use plastics in South Australia.

It is a significant step forward in shaping a culture of sustainability among South Australians and limiting unnecessary waste being sent to landfill sites.

Hospitality businesses have felt a majority of the impact of the looming ban but have been given months to source, trial and adopt alternatives to single-use plastics.

It has no doubt triggered thought and action among these businesses and others about how they can provide their service in a more sustainable and environmentally-conscious manner.

In recent months around 30 hospitality businesses and community facilities across Mount Gambier have started to donate their plastic milk cartons to emerging business Ecoplas Australia, a two-man operation recycling plastics into furniture and other fittings.

The self-funded venture had no guarantees from day one - not even existing businesses in the niche industry were willing to share tips and tricks - but Willie van Niekerk was undeterred in his own "war on waste".

This is a major leap for an individual to take in an effort to responsibly dispose of waste but for most, it is the small steps that add up.

Limestone Coast councils are continually being proactive in waste management and surveys continue to highlight waste being incorrectly sorted in kerbside collection bins, sending recyclables to landfill.

Disregarding correct waste disposal practices ultimately hurts the ratepayer as councils are forced to fork out millions of dollars to expand landfill operations and treat waste materials.

City Council ratepayers will now have a clearer snapshot of how their rates are being used to combat waste through a new format to its rating scheme, introducing a designated waste service charge.

The removal of single-use plastics is just the start in South Australia's push toward sustainable practices.

It's one small step toward a much bigger picture - the future of our state.

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Lessons learnt in 'larrikin' past

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IT IS easy to typecast Australian comedian Merrick Watts as a likeable larrikin who always radiated confidence but to do so would disregard the significant transformation he underwent in high school.

Before he became known as one half of the hit duo Merrick and Rosso, Watts was a troublesome teenager involved in drug use, graffiti and vandalism as a Melbourne street gang member.

In the region earlier this month as part of the now-postponed Grapes of Mirth Coonawarra comedy event - a touring business venture founded by the 47 year old - Watts spoke with hundreds of Mount Gambier High School students where he implored them to consider their choices and control their destiny.

Delving deep into his adolescence, Watts recalled how he spiraled out of control while at high school, years before he would make a meteoric rise onto national radio and television.

"I was told I was a failure, I was bound to become a criminal and I would not succeed at anything I attempted," Watts said.

"That was difficult to hear but I didn't believe it, I just made bad choices," he said.

With three arrests and three court appearances as a result of his rebellious streak, as well as expulsion from the high school where his mother worked, it took the blunt confrontation of an art teacher to turn his life around.

"They asked why I was wasting my life? They said I was a talented young man but what I was doing was making other people's lives worse, not better," Watts recalled.

A new relationship with a girl who "hated drugs" also helped to steer Watts towards different choices and in the space of 12 months, he went from failing Year 11 to being offered a Year 12 scholarship into a prestigious arts program.

While Watts did not take the opportunity, he had already made significant in-roads into a fulfilling life.

It was just a couple of years later when at a barbecue that Watts recalls being complimented as a funny guy and great storyteller, triggering his path into "the hardest job in the world" - stand-up comedy.

Sharpening his craft on stage, Watts moved to Sydney where his life-changing partnership with Tim Ross (Ross) became reality.

However, more than two decades later Watts retired from the airwaves and was again faced with a personal crisis.

Launching Grapes Of Mirth to combine a passion for laughs, wine and people, Watts recalled not getting results for his hard work as a small business owner and mentally reached his lowest point since his teenage years.

"It showed me the nothing is permanent - the rise is not permanent but neither are the downs," he said.

Continuing to carve out his business, Watts was given the opportunity to join SAS Australia, completing the grueling specialist military training, which was televised nationally.

"It galvanised me, it gave me back strength in my mind I thought I had lost," Watts said.

"At 46, I was the only person the complete the course that was not an athlete."

Watts credited "mental fitness" as the overwhelming recipe for success throughout the training, imploring the high school audience to consider their own mental mindfulness and meditation strategies.

"Mental focus, mental strength allowed us to do incredible things," Watts said of his SAS experience, also praising rugby icon Nick "Honey Badger" Cummins and AFLW star Sabrina Frederik for completing the course.

Watts spoke of how the trio would meditate each day and how it impacted their mental state, praising its ability to help with decision making and correlating that mindset to the high school environment.

"You always have a choice to make," Watts said, referring to unhealthy friendships and the potential of drug use.

His sentiments were echoed at the assembly by Limestone Coast senior constable Jade Hill, who reiterated the echoing impact choices can have throughout life.

"Don't be fearful of what you will lose (through choices) because what you will gain is so much more," she said.

Year 10 student Amber Thompson said Watts' presentation was inspirational and his celebrity status would likely help his messages resonate with students. Year 11 student Jack O'Connor said the impact of mental strength was a key take-away message.

"He has obviously been down a hard road and then he has turned that around, got strong in the mind and gone on to do what he has done," Jack said, while Year 10 student Alice Tentye also found the presentation thought-invoking.

"If you are heading down the wrong path, you can always turn it around," Alice said.

Speaking after the presentation, Watts said his youth public speaking events had morphed from tales of his career in show business to imparting messages of resilience, mental strength and mental health.

"There is a lot of pressure on kids socially, social media has not helped that," Watts said.

"I see from my own children that it is important they hear from people who have experienced things that they have.

"I try and show them that whatever circumstance they're in, it is in their control to change it.

"If there is one kid who walks away and turns their life in a more positive direction then it was worth me flying here for it."

Watts also urged the entire Limestone Coast community to consider its role in men-

toring youth and also the control each person has over their life.

"I was in trouble at school with the law and things were progressively going down hill for me but I had somebody who saw something in me and who gave me something to think about," he said.

"It changed my life, it absolutely changed my life.

"If you can just help them and guide their direction in a more positive matter, it is worth it."

Grapes of Mirth is yet to announce a revised date for the Coonawarra event at Penley Estate, which was postponed due to impacts of Victoria's recent five-day snap lockdown.

Clean sweep for city estates

MOUNT Gambier City Council has backed a request by residents within Hallmont and Woodlands estates to have the private roads cleaned using council's street sweeper.

Councillor Christian Greco tabled the proposal at last week's monthly meeting, requesting elected members support the periodic use of council's street sweeper in the community estates.

While the estates are private, each property owner is a council ratepayer.

Council allocated \$1800 from its 2020/21 budget to complete the street sweeping before the end of financial year.

A further \$7200 was referred to the 2021/22 budget deliberations for consideration to allow street sweeping in the estates once per quarter next financial year.

Plan to shape Penola

INCREASED outdoor dining, developing a “park and wander” strategy and growing Penola into a regional cycling hub are key considerations in the township’s roadmap for the future.

Wattle Range Council has released the Penola Town Centre Draft Concept Design for public consultation following extensive community consultation to create a vision for future actions and development.

WAX Design has spearheaded development of the blueprint, with around 280 submissions made across community surveys and in-person workshops.

The community can now have its say on the draft concept design, which focuses on six key priorities highlighted during consultation, including improving cycling infrastructure and footpaths, a focus on public art and building facades, as well as street activation measures

on Penola’s town entry statement.

Among the opportunities flagged in the document is promoting Penola as a cycling hub for the Limestone Coast, which would build on existing cycling and rail trail infrastructure and encourage a low-speed environment along Church Street.

Reinforcing a sense of arrival into Penola from the bypass and increased outdoor dining opportunities on Church and Riddoch streets has also been mooted. Integrating local stories, history and narratives in public art is also among the suggested measures.

WAX Design will present a one-hour community presentation on Thursday, March 4 at the Penola Visitor Information Centre from 5.30pm with a question and answer session to follow.

Council has also developed a survey to

gather feedback on the draft.

Wattle Range Mayor Des Noll called on the community to once again support the project. “Community feedback has been an integral part of this project and I thank everyone who has provided their input,” Mr Noll said.

“I encourage the community to read the concept design report, attend the community presentation and complete the survey.”

Council will use the final set of documents to develop shovel ready projects for future budgets and grant opportunities.

Telstra outage cuts off town

A **HARDWARE** fault that needed a specialised part to be ordered and delivered to site has been attributed as the cause of a four day Telstra network outage in Millicent.

Hundreds of residents were unable to make phone calls, send text messages or access the internet from Wednesday to Sunday due to poor mobile coverage.

While some were able to ride the black out, merchants have been left disappointed and out of pocket due to the inability of EFPTOS machines.

Telstra South Australia regional general manager Mark Bolton said the problem occurred at the mobile base station located on the water tower in Salts Street and required the replacement of a piece of specialised technical equipment.

"While there are other Telstra mobile base stations in the area, this site provides the majority of coverage for Millicent," he said.

"Fixed line services and nbn services were not impacted and any triple zero calls would have been diverted to base stations of other carriers located in the town.

"Telstra technicians will continue to monitor the performance of the site to ensure it continues to deliver full coverage to the town."

Millicent Business and Community Association chair Lee Morgan said he was currently in discussions with the business fraternity on the effects and cost of the outage.

"Business and the general community were significantly affected by the lack of mobile services with sim card driven EFTPOS unable to be used, resulting in lost business across the whole of Millicent," he said.

"It is understood that the community could not use their COVID check ins at businesses, or make urgent phone calls, and of course there was no social media if using mobile data.

"Some businesses that were connected via the NBN were less affected, but the whole community was impacted."

Mr Morgan expressed disappointment with Telstra's lack of communication during the out-

age and said some Millicent residents drove to Mount Gambier's Telstra store thinking their mobile phone was not working to be told on arrival a regional fault had been logged.

He said the association will write to Telstra to outline communication options in the event of a fault and list the costs of lost business experienced by retailers.

Mr Bolton encouraged business owners

who believe they have suffered severe financial impact as a result of the unplanned outage to contact Telstra on 13 22 00 and request a compensation pack.

"Customers then supply the details of the impact suffered in writing," he said.

"Each application is assessed by a specialist team and is dealt with on a case by case basis."

Cultures together in park's new pillars

VISITORS to Beachport's Centennial Park will be welcomed by a unique collection of sculptures following the installation of eight limestone pillars representing the convergence of three important cultures.

Beachport Community Art Group members officially launched the public art work earlier this week, which reflects the marine and human connections with the sea in Beachport and the French island of Corsica.

The project, undertaken alongside French sculptor Dume (Dominique) Paolini, comprises of sculptures made from local limestone, reclaimed timber and old jetty sleepers symbolising the rich Aboriginal and Corsican cultures and the vitality of the coastal town.

The sculptures follow an ongoing relationship with Mr Paolini, which has resulted with a "walk of art" transforming the lagoon parkland area and showcasing the talent and creativity of Limestone Coast residents.

Art group members spent more than a year working on their pieces, with some spending three hours a day on a sculpture.

Beachport Community Art Group member Monica Redden's piece includes the phrase "Art and culture define society" in English, Boandik and Corsican in a nod to the three cultures.

"I started on the English side first, then the Corsican and finished with the Boandik and as I continued to carve, I found my skills were getting more refined," she said.

"I think the edges of the Boandik language were a lot sharper and straighter than the English side, which I found interesting as language is always developing."

An official launch was held on Wednesday afternoon, with Boandik elder Aunty Michelle Jacquelin-Furr leading the Welcome to Country before Wattle Range mayor Des Noll addressed the small crowd.

Mr Noll congratulated the artists and Wattle Range Council staff for the transportation and installation of the sculptures in the park.

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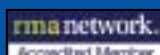

SILVERWARE is ripe for the picking in the 2020/21 Coonawarra and District Tomato Growing Competition with just one week remaining until entries close.

It is expected more than 20 entrants will contest for the coveted William Wilson Perpetual Trophy, which a three-judge panel will award to the best tomato grower with flavour a key factor in scoring.

What started as a friendly competition between Coonawarra families has grown into a major community event, which will culminate with a public celebration and judging evening at Coonawarra Memorial Soldiers Hall on March 12.

Entries must be submitted by March 5 to be considered for the competition's seventh installment, with categories for the largest and prettiest tomatoes also on offer.

The experienced judging panel of Melissa Innes, Paul Stone and Susie Kidman will analyse taste, texture, skin thickness and aroma to score each tomato, with organisers hoping to match last year's entrant tally of 20-plus, which included multiple tomatoes from each contestant.

Among those in the running will be two-time winner and reigning champion Ulrich Grey-Smith, who said the event was a highlight on the Coonawarra township's social calendar and provided "serious competition".

"It is a great community event and one to be involved in," Mr Grey-Smith said.

"There is real community aspect."

Mr Grey-Smith has held onto his competition-winning seeds and hopes to retain his crown this year.

While weather and soil conditions play a key role in the recipe for success, Mr Grey-Smith said the timing of ripening was also important.

"Some come on earlier rather than later and there's always debate about whether we are judging on the right weekend - I think the

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Tough new penalties

PEOPLE caught flouting Australia's biosecurity laws could face fines up to \$1.1m under new legislation introduced to Federal Parliament last week.

The Biosecurity Amendment (Strengthening Penalties) Bill 2021 would give courts access to higher penalties to send a clear message to individuals and companies who put the nation's \$61b agriculture industry and \$1t-plus in environmental assets at risk by contravening the Biosecurity Act 2015.

Federal Agriculture Minister David Littleproud said 14 people had already had their visas cancelled and were forced to leave the country at their own cost due to biosecurity law breaches.

The new legislation aims to increase a number of civil and criminal penalties under the Biosecurity Act to ensure they are appropriate, adequate and fit the crime.

"The amendments focus on individuals and businesses, such as commercial importers and biosecurity industry participants, that have a particular responsibility to know and understand their obligations under the Act and take necessary steps to comply with the law," Mr Littleproud said.

"The new maximum penalties, in some cases up to \$1.1m, reflect the potential gains someone might obtain or seek to obtain through non-compliance with our biosecurity laws, as well as the devastating impact that contraventions may have on Australia's biosecurity status, market access and economy."

Drought support

THE South Australian Government has signed on to the \$100m On-farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme, which supports drought-affected farmers.

Primary and horticultural producers can apply for funding to support important drought-proofing works, including improving water storage on their farms through new tanks, troughs, pipes, pumps and drilling new bores.

Eligible farmers can claim up to 25pc of the eligible infrastructure costs, capped at \$25,000 with the state and federal governments contributing half each. Visit awe.gov.au for more information.

MOUNT GAMBIER SHEEP - WEDNESDAY 2880 (948)

NUMBERS doubled as agents yarded 2466 lambs and 414 sheep to total 2880 head overall.

These sold to the usual field of trade, processor and restocker buyers across a generally good quality offering of mainly heavy lambs where pricing remained strong as most sales were from 800c to 850c/kg cwt with restockers paying above this for lambs to grow on.

Light lambs to the trade sold to \$138 as restockers sourced most lambs in this category as they paid from \$83 to \$127 for lighter types and from \$151 to \$187/head for those with more conditioning.

Trade weight three score lambs made from \$164 to \$185 as the heavy pens sold from \$188 to \$217/head.

The extra heavy selection sold from \$218 to the market high of \$238/head.

Light sheep returned from \$110 to \$138 with the heavy pens making from \$130 to \$182/head.

Rams sold from \$55 to \$80/head.

NARACOORTE CATTLE - TUESDAY 649 (-30)

AGENTS yarded the slightly smaller number of 649 head of live weight and open auction cattle.

These sold to a large field of buyers with the trade, feeders and restockers all present and active however with the small number some had trouble accessing supply.

Quality was mixed at best with the better pens receiving strong demand in another dearer sale.

Yearling steers to the trade sold from 360c to 470c as similar heifers made from 365c to 478c/kg.

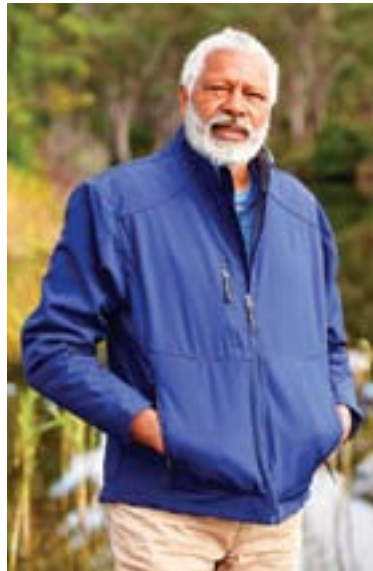


MONDAY UNDER INVESTIGATION NINE, 9pm

Gutsy women defy the 'tags'

A TRIO of gutsy circus women will defy their years and cast off conformist stereotypes in a Naracoorte showcase next month.

Medea will be screened on March 4 from 8.30pm, with Igor Levitt presented from 8.30pm on March 7.

Medea, created for Ivo van Hove's Internationaal Theater Amsterdam, is one of Australian director Simon Stone's most in-demand works.

In this production, a contemporary story, based on that of Debora Green (the American oncologist convicted in 1996 of poisoning her husband with ricin and then killing two of her children in a house fire), is so infused with the distilled essence of the original that it doesn't just retain, it regains its primal impact.

Igor Levit, a 33-year-old Russian-German pianist, has been hailed by the New York Times as "one of the essential artists of our time".

As a prolific 'lockdown' musician, his streamed performances pushed his profile to a peak in 2020 but his uncompromising activism, especially concerning the re-emergence of extreme nationalism, has survived years of "just shut up and play" commentary, and even assassination threats.

Beauty Empowerment is one of four projects to receive funding as part of council's



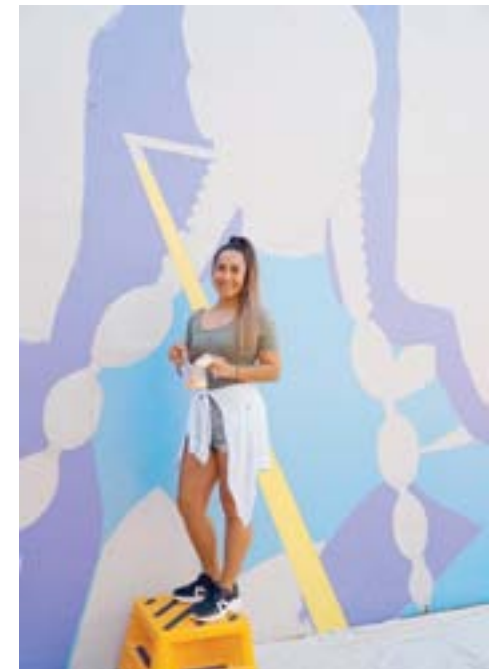

New equipment for club

PENOLA and District Little Athletics Centre has will benefit from the arrival of brand new equipment thanks to a \$2,600 grant from Coles.

Three peat for Marditjali

MARDITJALI withstood a fierce challenge to claim the Millicent High School swimming carnival championship for the third year in a row.

Meintangk's Ryan Simmons was awarded the under 16 male championship shield, winning first in sidestroke and placing second in breaststroke and freestyle.

Jacob Todd of Buandik received the runner up trophy.

Meintangk's Tayla Rowe won the under 16 championship, claiming a first place ribbon in sidestroke and second place for backstroke.

Teammate Amelia Vanderhorst received second place, scoring 11 points.

The under 21 male championship was won by Marditjali's Sam Adie, who scored 12 points and won first place in sidestroke and breaststroke competition.

Runner up was shared by Kynan Dunn, Tom Gray and Jayden Poulish who all received nine points.

Chelsie Hateley gained 21 points for Marditjali after winning first place in sidestroke and second in freestyle, backstroke and breaststroke.

Tower eventually got over the line in a thriller, winning the day by just two points.

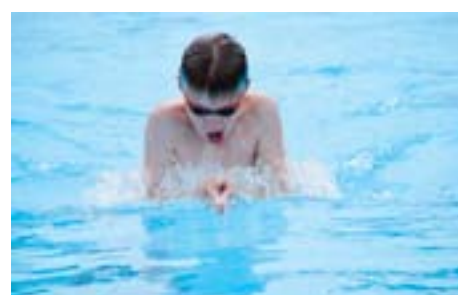

HYUNDAI'S BIG OFFERING

HYUNDAI Palisade is the largest SUV imported to Australia by the South Korean automaker.

It is aimed at those wanting a large vehicle to carry people so leans in the direction of comfort and ease of driving rather than full-on off-road work.

Interestingly, it has a near-twin brother in the latest model Kia Sorento that was introduced in 2020.

Two models are offered, the first simply called Palisade, the other is Highlander.

STYLING

The large grille treatment works well and Palisade looks longer than it really is thanks to the large windows that stretch all the way to the rear.

The shape of the C-pillar gives it a sort-of sleek look when viewed side on.

The slight downward slope of the roof adds to the effect. The tail is squared off, with lights that have a purposeful appearance.

The word Palisade is spread loud and proud in capital letters across the rear.

When you realise that it was initially designed very much with the American market in mind you will understand this.

Guards have a purposeful look that appealed to those to whom we showed the Palisade during our week's road test.

INTERIOR

The cabin carries on with the spacious look created by the exterior.

This is an eight-seater with a two-three-three arrangement.

There is also a seven-seat version with twin bucket seats in the centre row.

This is likely to make it popular with up-market limousine companies as their customers like individual seats (with three squeezed into the rear).

The fit and fitment of the interior is to a high standard.

These days you won't even find upmarket European vehicles with fitment that is better than Hyundai's.

INFOTAINMENT

The large central touchscreen gives easy access to Apple CarPlay and Android Auto.



There is a plethora of ways of connecting as both Palisade models have seven USB ports and four 12V sockets.

ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

Interestingly, both petrol and diesel engines are offered.

A four-cylinder turbo-diesel with a capacity of 2.2 litres drives all four wheels.

It puts out 147 kW, and 440 Nm with a big spread from 1750 to 2750 revs.

This range is where the great majority of drivers will be driving with virtually all the time.

The petrol is a 3.8-litre V6 with 217 kW of power, and 355 Nm of torque at a very high 5200 revs. It drives through the front wheels.

We haven't had a chance to road test a petrol but will hopefully get into one soon and report back to you with your feelings on the torque band.

SAFETY

Palisade has yet to be ANCAP tested.

Crash avoidance features are lane-keeping assistance, rear cross-traffic alert and blind zone warning with intervention.

All have IsoFix child seat positions.

DRIVING

The driver's seat is comfortable and we had no problem getting it adjusted to our needs.

The second-row seats slide forward by up to 220mm for easier access to the third row.

Both rear rows in eight-seat versions have a 60:40 split to let you juggle passenger/cargo

space. The seven-seater isn't as versatile but the comprises are understandable.

The steering is well weighted, responds within a few degrees of movement and gives good feedback.

The turning circle is good for a car of this size, but in tight carparks some backing and filling may be required.

Test this for yourself if you feel you might be parking in areas where this is a problem.

During our testing on hilly country roads the fuel consumption sat in the eight to 10 litres per hundred kilometres range.

Flat easy running saw this down to as little as six to seven litres.

Around town, and in the suburbs, it was about nine to 11 litres.

These are pretty good figures. Visibility all around is good thanks to the large window area and good side mirrors.

SUMMING UP

An impressive vehicle in that it is almost sedan-like in some ways and has plenty of standard equipment. It is not quite as easy to drive as a car but comes pretty close.

Do you have TWO or more pieces of rateable land in the District Council of Grant area that are not adjoining?
Are these pieces of land all used as farm land?
And are these pieces of land owned or occupied by the same person/s?

If you answered "YES" to all of the above questions - you may be eligible to apply to have your farm classified as a "Single Farm Enterprise" for the purposes of the Regional Landscape Levy and Council Rates.

This means that your single farm enterprise would only attract ONE Regional Landscape Levy against all of your land, and only attract ONE Minimum Rate (if applicable).

To allow Council to appropriately set rate levels at its annual budget meeting, applications for Single Farm Enterprise status need to be received by **Friday 26th March 2021** to be applicable for 2021-22 financial year.

If you have previously been granted Single Farm Enterprise status, and your circumstances have not changed, you are not required to re-apply each year.

Tasty catches still a breeze

FISHING

THE warmer weather last week feels like it was ages ago now, but over the weekend was not too bad for those hitting the water, despite a bit of breeze about.

The offshore guys found some nice fish. I saw pictures of excellent mixed bags of reef fish, including blue morwong, nannygai, latched fish, knife jaw and snapper, along with some reasonable shark.

There has still been no tuna to report and you all probably think I am lying when I say they are not far away.

The Portland and Victor Harbor guys are still catching plenty.

We will just have to patiently wait our turn. The Port MacDonnell Offshore Angling Club held its snapper competition over the weekend and it was good to see so many eager anglers on the water.

The fish of the competition went to Phil Lewis with his 2.45kg specimen and the most meritorious was Tony Bell with a 1.34kg fish on 3kg line.

While we are talking snapper, haven't they been awesome?

There has been some great fish caught right along the coast and until they let us know the quota has been caught, we will keep catching them.

Remember if you are targeting snapper, even in shallow water, the release weight is still a requirement to have on board.

The fish have been nice and spread out over the last few weeks, which has allowed everyone a crack at them.

Land based and boat fishos have all shared in the success.

Tegan Podobnik has been landing some great fish the last couple of weeks off the beach around Nene Valley, including her new personal best of 50cm.

The boaties have been into some nice fish from Orwell Rocks, right across to Racecourse Bay, Danger Point and Green Point.

Mixed in with the snapper there has also been some nice big whiting, along with some squid and salmon.

The whiting fishos have been getting some nice fish this week, as the little bit of stir has been just what we needed after things settled a bit too much.

The Port MacDonnell breakwater is still fishing well, with plenty of legal fish between 32cm and 40cm reported, along with the odd bigger fish over 40cm.

Further along the coast the guys fishing Cape Douglas, Hutt Bay and Carpenter Rocks have found some good numbers and while the size has probably been a little bit smaller than usual, they are still cracking fish.

Gar numbers have been excellent again this week.

I know of some excellent catches from Cape Douglas and Livingstons Bay by both the waders and boaties.

The size has been excellent again and we are seeing some of those nice red beakers.

The trick is as simple as always - anchor or fish over your weed beds, burley up steadily and they will come.

You will find mullet, tommy ruff and salm-on trout around the same spot, but the gar will never be too far away.

The Glenelg River has kicked off over the past few weeks.

We are seeing more mullet landed now, including some reasonable fish of 80 or more centimetres.

There were a handful of legal mullet caught and some nice bream bags.

Roger Caines boated a beauty at 43cm in his bag of five and junior Harry Cram caught himself a nice mullet and some big bream.

There have been a few guys trolling live baits down around the estuary this week and a few reasonable fish have been the result.

The next few weeks I would expect things to heat up even more down there, so keep your fingers crossed.

Summer Classic heats right up

GREYHOUND RACING

WITH only a length separating last Sunday's three Summer Classic heat winners at Tara Raceway, this Sunday's final over 512 metres looks set to be one of the best in the age-restricted race's seven-year history.

Setting the time standard, albeit narrowly, was Justice For All who shrugged off Aston Olenna going around the first turn in heat one before running out a 1½ lengths winner over Boombox Hammer in 29.79 seconds.

A further 5½ lengths back in third spot and also into the final was George The First.

Giving away nothing in age, Justice For All is a January 2019 son of Aston Dee Bee out of Molly Be Nimble and is owned and trained at Meningie by Tim Richards.

The win was his third in the space of a few days at Mount Gambier after Molly's Burner - an older half-sister to Justice For All - and Contrail had been successful at the Thursday meeting.

Later, on Sunday, Richards made it another double when Tara Raceway 400-metre record holder Almighty Stripe - a litter brother to Contrail - defeated Aston Hayato by 4¾ lengths in a quick 22.89 seconds.

Bred by Richards, Justice For All's heat win in the classic for dogs and bitches whelped on or after January 1, 2019, took his race record to eight win from 19 starts.

First starter Boombox Hammer, a May 2019 whelping, gained a run as a reserve from box five and ran a terrific race when chasing Justice For All for much of the journey.

In the end he clocked 29.90 seconds himself to give Compton trainer Tracie Price the first of two finalists.

Boombox Hammer, a son of Fernando Bale x Cairnlea Shadow, was actually reared by Price but was returned to the Limestone Coast by Adelaide owner Petar Jovanovic only a fortnight ago with the classic in mind.

According to the trainer, it was a case of one trial and straight in.

Collateral found the front going out of the first turn in the second heat and from then on was never headed.

On the line he had 1¾ lengths to spare over Crush Your Enemy with a further head back to Stella Warning in a time of 29.80 seconds.

Whelped in February 2019, Collateral is by Aussie Infrared out of Velocity Rose and trained for Steve Williams of Velocity Lodge by Price. In fact, the current leading Tara Raceway trainer will be the only local represented in the final.

The black dog went into the race from box one on the back of two quick 400 metres wins.

"I trialled him over 512 metres prior to the classic and said to Steve that I reckoned he had gone well enough to have a go," Price said.

"So he said put him in."

Williams, who is based in Queensland, has in his care approximately 180 greyhounds, ranging from racing dogs to brood bitches, stud dogs, pups and retired racers.

He said Collateral had broken-in well in NSW but appeared to taper off prior to racing and as a result was sent to Adelaide where he won on debut at Gawler before later finding his way down to the Price kennels.

"This is turning out to be a nice little litter," Williams said.

"Patched won at Capalaba the same day as Collateral, while Velocity Comet won a Juvenile at Angle Park the following night."

Their dam, Velocity Rose, was bred in SA and is a litter sister to Jury, a winner of 14 races and \$305,000 in stakemoney.

Two-race winner Crush Your Enemy, a litter brother to Justice For All, ran a big race to give Richards his second runner in the classic final.

With a personal time of 29.92 seconds, it is perhaps a little surprising his last win was in August last year.

Under Study, trained by Don Turner and owned by his wife Gail, found the front down the back in heat three before racing away to an eight lengths win over Don't Forget Kev in 29.87 seconds.

Whelped in January 2019, Under Study is a daughter of Allen Deed x Roxy Rolla.

Turner, who was the third trainer to end the day with two Summer Classic finalists, said litter sister Stella Warning was the pick of the pair.

On track with him was Wayne Verrall who picked up Roxy Rolla back in mid-2016 from NSW.

She later ran fourth in a heat of the 2017 Summer Classic after having won a grade six final at Tara Raceway leading into the classic.

Under Study, who was bred by her trainer, was the second leg of a double for Turner, who earlier in the South Eastern Hotel Stake (512m) had been successful with All Show - his first local winner since Samprass in December 2018.

Purchased last October by Turner from Victoria for an "average" price, All Show has now won a further seven races.

But, according to the trainer, the experience with the son of Barcia Bale x Blue Benzol has had its moments.

"When he came over there had been a couple of failing-to-chase convictions hanging over his head," Turner said.

"And then he copped a marring suspension at Angle Park earlier in the year.

"To be honest, I just hold my breath every time he goes around."

But there were no breathless moments last Sunday.

All Show railed through on the heavily backed leader Tiger Time down the back before running out a two lengths winner over a strong-finishing Slick Fernando in 29.86 seconds.

Turner said he would now look seriously at the Mount Gambier Cup (512m) - to be run in early April - with All Show, a quick 30.68 seconds winner over 531 metres at Gawler in December.

The Lewiston trainer owned the 2013 Mount Gambier Cup winner Colville who was trained locally by Allen Williams.

No racing until at least spring

On The Rails

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THOROUGHBRED racing will not return to Alan Scott Glenburnie racecourse until the spring of this year, at the earliest.

Following a recommendation by track manager David Shepherdson, both Racing SA and the committee of the Mount Gambier racing club have agreed to give the beleaguered track more time before racing can return on the course proper.

The majority of Mount Gambier trainers were present at a meeting on Monday afternoon with Mount Gambier officials along with Nick Redin and Vaughan Lynch from Racing SA.

If racing does not recommence until the end of the year, it will mean the Mount Gambier club will not have hosted a meeting for around 18 months.

It also means there will not be a Mount Gambier cup meeting for the 2020/21 racing season.

"It was David Shepherdson's recommendation that we not do anything to the track until around November this year," Mount Gambier Racing Club president John O'Connor said.

"Believe me, it is a real, real concern that has been ongoing for around 20 years and the best solution at present is to leave it as long as we can.

"Nick Redin and Vaughan Lynch are endeavouring to find ways to improve training facilities here at Glenburnie."

Trainers will continue to use the inner (or steeple track) and the sand track to work their horses.

Meetings scheduled for Mount Gambier will be transferred to other Limestone Coast courses.

The next major meeting to be conducted at Mount Gambier this current season was the Millicent Cup on Sunday, May 30 and, like last year, the Millicent club will have to find another course to race at.

It was discussed during the meeting of installing a fibre, or artificial track.

Local trainer Richard Nicholson, who has had considerable success in the past few seasons, was in attendance and mentioned that trainers are at loggerheads as to the ideal solution for training their horses.

"What I would like to see is a compromise whereby everybody gets a bit of what they want," Nicholson stated, referring to trainers having the option of a permanent grass training track as well as an artificial/fibre track.

One trainer who is already looking at an alternative is our biggest trainer, the Yahl based Peter Hardacre.

"I have invested over a million dollars in this area and I am currently in the process of looking at establishing a satellite stable at Murray Bridge, especially for the winter," Hardacre told The Border Watch.

"I enjoy living in Mount Gambier and my kids are settled in here and I have no intentions of leaving, however a satellite stable much closer to Adelaide and the other provincial tracks is definitely on the cards."

GOT THE CHOCOLATES EARLY

TRAINER Peter Hardacre missed the above meeting with racing officials on Monday and with good reason.

He was busy saddling up four runners at Terang and duly landed the major prize in the opening two events.

Both winners eased in betting to double-figure odds and got the money in different fashion.

The first starter Tahnee Tradition was one of two Hardacre runners in the 1200-metre maiden and was the outsider of the two.

"I actually preferred my other runner Spin The Reward (eighth) on what they had shown in track work", Hardacre admitted post race.

Tahnee Tradition (\$17-\$21) settled in second spot for jockey Jarrod Fry (who went on to ride a double), always travelled well for him and proceeded to win with plenty in hand to defy the big odds.

Financially, it was a great result for her three owners as, on top of first prize of \$12,650, there was also a Super Vobis bonus offered on

the race with an extra \$8,400 going into the coffers.

Hardacre's double was achieved in harder fashion half an hour later when Atomic Texie (\$7-\$10) prevailed narrowly in a close, three-way finish in the other 1200-metre maiden.

The four-year-old gelding had run second on debut at Bordertown nearly four weeks ago and Victorian form experts disregarded that effort.

Atomic Texie led all the way for Horsham jockey Dean Yendall but had to defy some serious challengers over the final 200 metres.

"There is a bit of pigness about him and he has come back much stronger from shin soreness," Hardacre explained.

"He was bred by part owner Lachie Ether-ton who is a horse dentist and a good mate of mine and he, along with some of his fellow owners, are here today."

EXTRA MONTH OF HARNESS RACING

THE local harness racing season was due to close at the end of March but has been extended by Harness Racing SA.

Two meetings, both on Tuesday nights, have been programmed for April 13 and 27.

While that is seemingly good news, it must be remembered the local season commenced a month earlier than normal back in mid October.

With another extra month now tacked on, it is putting pressure on local trainers to keep their pacers in training, some of whom have been in work for over five months.

Horse numbers here this season have been the lowest ever, not helped by the closing of the Victorian border from time to time due to COVID-19.

HARNESS GOLD CUP A FORTNIGHT AWAY

THE tradition of having a calcutta on Gold Cup eve for local harness racing will continue next month.

The next meeting here is the Mount Gambier Gold Cup on Saturday, March 13 and club officials have announced a new location for the cup eve calcutta on the Friday night.

It will be conducted upstairs in the function room of the Commercial Hotel in the Balcony Room.

Calcutta tickets (\$5 each) are available from any club committeemen, the draw will be undertaken at 8pm and meals will be available from 5.30pm.

150/1 WINNER

BORDERTOWN trainer Jimmy Dodgson may have entered the record books as the Limestone Coast trainer with the longest priced winner ever.

At Morphettville last Friday, the Dodgson trained Heavy Rotation was a 150/1 chance with fixed odds when the field jumped in the 1400-metre BM 58 handicap.

It was the Strathalbyn meeting transferred from Wednesday when jockeys refused to ride after race two due to the condition of the track.

Considering Heavy Rotation had won at Naracoorte three starts prior and was dropping back from class two level to a BM 58 on Friday, the filly's odds seemed generous.

"She had a good form line when she raced in and around Sydney before I got her, but I did not back her on Friday, however thankfully my missus did," Dodgson stated.

Not surprisingly, stewards queried the improved effort which Dodgson attributed to her wearing blinkers for the first time and having a stronger rider (Sairyn Fawke).

DOUBLE FOR PHILLIPS

LOCAL driver Mark Phillips is having his best season ever and it continued at the Greenwald Paceway last Tuesday night.

Phillips drove a double to give him six winners for this season thus far, which puts him in second place on the driver's premiership ladder, five wins behind Jayson Finnis.

After an hour later, Phillips was again first past the post when the Steve Fennell trained Shady Rose (\$3.40), having only her second career start, upset a hefty move for the unplaced Murdoch (\$3.40-\$1.90 fav.).

The Finnis stable continues to supply a winner at nearly every local meeting this season and Royal Speech (\$1.80 fav.) obliged on this occasion by making it successive victories in the final event.

The two have proved successful over the years but have now stepped up and built a new F2 sidecar, with its first run this weekend.

The 600cc machine has just been completed and the pair should provide plenty of interest - and going on past performances, a lot of pace.

Several divisions and engine sizes will all have a title to chase, ranging from the 1930s right up to the modern F2 category.

The weekend will also include a sidecar handicap race to honour Laurie Fox, the legend of sidecar handicaps.

Fox was always cagey about his style of handicapping prior to his passing and this weekend's event should honour his legacy.

A unique thing about the meeting is the championship for every eligible division.

P3 sidecars are from the 1930s and 40s, will run their own championship, while P4s and 5s will run by themselves.

The modern era bikes, such as F2 and a few F1 sidecars will also run their own championship.

Apart from the sidecars, around 100 solo

machines from all round Australia will contest the Classic Master of Mac Park Championships.

"Everybody forgot about running the championship - it wasn't a thing any more," he said.

who are unsure if they can come over."

"It is proof of how popular Mac Park is.

"There is a sidecar team coming from Perth - to come all that way shows they are pretty keen."

The solo events have also attracted riders from around the country, including Dave

Keenan from Queensland.

"Davie Keenan is coming to test the track for the Australian Championships in October," Vause said.

"He is an Australian champion on historic bikes and is bringing some nice Yamaha race bikes down."

Vause said with such a big field of sidecars, the Laurie Fox handicap event would provide a spectacle as usual, as the faster riders chase down the older machinery in their quest for victory.

Qualifying will kick off Saturday morning, with racing in the afternoon, culminating on Sunday.

Latest outfit for memorial sidecar title chase

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A NEW outfit for father and son Limestone Coast sidecar racers David and Steven Jones will be officially unveiled this weekend at McNamara Park.

The pair will showcase the F2 machine - based around a GSXR 600cc engine and built by David - at the Laurie Fox Memorial SA State Sidecar Championships, with the hopes of a good performance.

The pair has tasted plenty of success over the years, with their recent exploits on a Period 5 outfit nothing short of impressive.

The step up to the F2 category is nothing either has not experienced before.

David claimed an Australia title aboard an F2 back in 2003, while the pair won Australian titles on the Period 5 machine in 2017 and 2018, along with various other successes.

David has around 30 years of racing behind him, while Steven has competed for the last 20 years, starting out in his father's outfit in the sidecar, before moving up to his own setup.

"We have had some success, mainly due to Steven's riding," David said.

"He actually has the lap record at Mac Park on a modern 1000cc Yamaha he had a

few years ago."

David has been building the bike for the past two years, which he said was ready about 12 months ago but due to the COVID-19 pandemic it is yet to be ridden in anger.

However, somewhere in the vicinity of 10 laps have been completed in testing at McNamara Park and David was pleased with what he saw, with the outfit handling well straight out of the box.

The bike was built loosely based on an English Ryde frame, designed by David with his own "experimental" touches.

"I looked at pictures of this Ryde chassis and made a few changes myself," he said.

"I put a longer swingarm on it out the back to make it track a bit better and I put wider wheels on it.

"They normally run a nine-inch rear and six-inch sidecar wheel but I have made it an 11-inch rear and a nine-inch sidecar, mainly to try to get as much weight over the passenger side as possible so the passenger can basically sit there and not have to work as hard."

The wheels were machined up from billet aluminium by David, which he said saved him a lot of money.

In fact, a complete new outfit from England would cost in the vicinity of \$90,000, where he has spent around \$15,000 on his.

"I must admit their technology is probably a lot more advanced than mine," David said.

David said the main idea to go back up to an F2 sidecar was simply the desire to build one.

"I have always wanted to build an F2 and I thought this was as good an opportunity as any," he said.

"I have spent the last two years building it up - it was actually ready probably 12 months ago, but Mr Covid put a stop to that.

"I bought a lot of stuff from England, like the shockers and a few engine parts and got the boys from Portland Exhaust to make up the exhaust system for me."

Now it is a matter of time in the seat, with a change of rider designated for the new machine.

"We sold both our outfits and bought one - the Period 5 - basically to save costs," David said.

"We were going to swap about with each riding now and then, but I seem to be passenger most of the time.

"Steven is a better rider and faster than me and I don't mind being passenger.

"But this is my bike so I get the handle bars this time.

"Steven has forcefully volunteered to swing for me.

"Dad took seniority for a change."

This weekend is about ironing out any issues which may arise, with one real goal.

"I am not expecting to go out and win races with the new bike," David said.

"I would certainly like to be up the pointy end, but being realistic, if we can run mid-field to top I will be happy.

"If it goes as good as it looks and if we can finish all the races and be sniffing around the front I will be happy."

AHEAD of the start of the 2021 SANFL Statewide Super Women's League season this week, SANFL reports female football participation in South Australia continues to ride a wave of popularity.

Latest figures show female participation remains strong, despite the significant impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, with over 7,300 female club registrations in 2020.

SANFL CEO Darren Chandler said fe-

male participation figures were on par with 2019 - an outstanding result given the challenging environment for community sport last year.

"The high level of female football participation in 2020 was particularly encouraging given that the season was postponed for almost four months, with a number of regional leagues not playing football at all because of the pandemic," he said.

Chandler said at a junior level, female participation rose by 8pc in 2020, with over 2,400 girls taking to the field in SANFL juniors competitions across the metropolitan area.

In a further positive sign for junior female participation growth this year, SANFL had already received registrations for the 2021 National Pharmacies SANFL Juniors season from 1,900 female players - 300 more than at

the same time last year.

"Clearly, the strength and growth of SA's elite Statewide Super Women's League and AFLW are inspirational for the next generation of female footballers," Chandler said.

"We are also extremely proud that our dedicated female talent programs and the Statewide Super Women's League have become a pathway for many aspiring female footballers."
