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Vaccination roll-out starts next week

THE Limestone Coast's first COVID-19 vaccines will be administered from Wednesday following the arrival of a 130,000-dose capacity vaccine freeze at Mount Gambier Hospital yesterday.

Mount Gambier was the first regional South Australian location to receive the \$11,000 storage unit, critical in housing the Pfizer vaccine which requires -70 degree Celsius temperatures.

Frontline healthcare workers will be among the first recipients at the Mount Gambier Hospital vaccine hub, in line with the Federal Government's Phase 1a roll out.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network executive director of medical services Dr Elaine Pretorius (pictured) said the vaccination workforce was ready to safely provide the vaccine to frontline staff once the clinic opens.

Right to die fight

A MOUNT Gambier resident and former nun suffering a terminal illness has voiced her support for voluntary assisted dying, boldly stating she wants to end her own life when her suffering becomes too great.

South Australian parliamentarians will soon debate legalising euthanasia for the 17th time in the last 25 years, with Labor introducing identical bills in the Upper House and the

House of Assembly late last year.

Jane Qualmann, who still identifies as a Catholic, believes euthanasia as the best response to intolerable burdens of pain and unnecessary suffering as her life-limiting illness continues to progress.

The introduced bill is based on the Victorian model, which provides people with incur-

able, advanced and progressive diseases who are expected to die within six months access to voluntary assisted dying.

A report tabled in Victorian Parliament on Wednesday found since the scheme was established in June 2019, 581 people have been assessed for eligibility for euthanasia and 405 permits have been issued.

Voluntary assisted dying advocate and A Peaceful End convener Angie Miller said it was heartbreaking that terminally ill South Australians living just 20 minutes from the Victorian border were unable to access euthanasia due to the state's legal prohibition.

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Current snapper season to close early

THE current recreational snapper fishing season in South East waters will close next week with the set allocation of the popular species snapped up by fishers in just six weeks.

After opening on February 1, the five-month recreational allocation of 1077 snapper has already been reached and will close on Wednesday, March 10 at 11.59pm.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham said following the quick quota catch, daily bag and boat limits will be reduced to three when the fishery reopens on July 1.

"I considered advice from both the Minister's Recreational Fishing Advisory Council and the Snapper Management Advisory Committee and decided to reduce the daily bag limit to one and daily boat limit to three when it reopens on July 1," he said.

"This will allow more recreational fishers to share the opportunity to fish for snapper in the South East.

"The snapper fishery will reopen in the South East on July 1 and the recreational fishing allocation will be 862 snapper," he said.

"The fishery will close on October 31, unless the limit is reached earlier."

Mr Basham said the over catch taken between now and next week's closure will be subtracted from the July to October total allowable catch.

He said this year's allocation allocation of 1077 snapper was more than double the actual recreational catch from last year.

"Around 3000 snapper tags were distributed for the whole of last year, but only 452 snapper were caught in the South East, and following feedback we moved to this year's mandatory reporting system for recreational fishers instead," Mr Basham said.

"We wanted to broaden the experience of catching a snapper in the South East and mandatory reporting via the SA Fishing app has achieved exactly that.

Mandatory reporting will remain unchanged - any snapper catch must be reported via the SA Fishing app or by calling Fishwatch on 1800 065 522.

City ready for jab

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A SPECIALIST freezer required to hold up to 130,000 COVID-19 vaccines arrived at Mount Gambier Hospital yesterday ahead of Wednesday's planned vaccination rollout.

The freezer - the first of its kind in regional South Australia - will be able to store the Pfizer vaccine, which requires a -70 degree Celsius temperature.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network executive director of Medical Services Dr Elaine Pretorius said the freezer's arrival at the vaccination hub was exciting.

"COVID has been my life for the last 18 months or so," Dr Pretorius said.

"I think the scientific advances we have seen in the last 18 months across the world have been astonishing.

"I think being able to have a vaccine - four different vaccines - that are being distributed world wide is just awesome.

"What this (freezer) does is allows us to start vaccinating."

The first doses of the vaccines are to be administered on Wednesday, March 10.

The roll out will progress in different phases, with the initial phase 1a to include frontline workers and others who are most likely to be exposed.

That group includes emergency department staff, workers who are checking people in at the front door of the hospitals and those doing the swabbing at test centres.

Aged care workers and all residents in age care facilities will also be included in the initial roll out.

Frontline workers and age care workers in-line for the first round of vaccinations will be notified to attend their particular site beginning next week.

Teams will attend age care facilities to administer the vaccine to residents.

Unlike the recent requirement to have a flu vaccination in order to visit an age care facility, at this stage it is not the case with the COVID-19 vaccination, so residents can still have visitors.

The Mount Gambier Hospital will distribute the Pfizer vaccine to the various sites in the region, with care needed in the handling of the sensitive vials.

Initially the vaccine needs to be stored at -70 degrees, then defrosted completely before being transported in specially designed containers and kept between two and eight degrees for up to five days.

Once opened the vials must be used within six hours, creating a huge logistical task to ensure no wastage.

Once the first phase is complete, phase 1b will begin, which will include the remainder of the health care workers, then people with dis-

abilities and disability care workers.

Phase 2 includes the elderly and people with comorbidities or chronic diseases which put them at risk.

"Phase 1a and 1b will be done in the hospitals," Dr Pretorius said.

"When phase 2 commences it is likely the GP practices and some community pharmacies will start contributing because the prime minister has undertaken all Australians will be vaccinated by October."

While initially the Pfizer vaccine will be rolled out, Dr Pretorius said she expected the AstraZeneca vaccine to arrive in the coming weeks.

While the vaccines will not provide immunity to the COVID-19 virus, she said it was an important part of the fight against the disease, which would help protect the region as a whole, should an outbreak occur.

"We have seen what COVID can do to the health system," Dr Pretorius said.

"The NHS has almost buckled under the load.

"This means even if we have a bit of an outbreak in the South East we can be comfortable our health system can manage it.

"We have a lot of people visiting from Victoria and Adelaide and more as the borders open, so it means we can be protected and the risk of a sudden big outbreak in the South East is limited."

Lucindale woman to build again after horror incident

A LUCINDALE woman watched helplessly as her home of 17 years burnt to the ground following a domestic violence incident, with the perpetrator losing his life in a vehicle accident less than an hour later.

Kerrie McRae fled her Potts Road home to a neighbouring property after being confronted by a 58-year-old Kingston man on Saturday night, with police called to take a statement following a domestic incident.

Officers noted flames coming from her home around 11pm on Saturday, with the blaze destroying the home despite interventions from emergency services.

The man's body was found around an hour later in the middle of Avenue Range Road following a single car rollover.

Limestone Coast officer in charge Superintendent Phil Hoff said specialist investigators were probing both the vehicle accident and house fire, with the latter being treated as suspicious.

"The deceased person was the person

who attended the house and we believe he was responsible for the fire," Supt Hoff said.

Supt Hoff said the man's death was the matter of a coronial investigation, with the 58-year-old the 17th life lost on South Australian roads this year.

"It does present us with an opportunity to reiterate the need to drive carefully," he said.

"We all must remember the elements of the Fatal Five, including not speeding, wearing a seatbelt and not being affected by drugs or alcohol when at the wheel."

A fundraiser for Ms McRae - a single mother of three - is nearing the \$10,000 mark.

Led by her children Michael, Jack and Tilly, the GoFundMe aims to help support Ms McRae's recovery from the house fire, which also destroyed all her possessions.

Barker MP Pasin seeks fourth term

TONY Pasin will seek a fourth term as the federal Member for Barker after nominating for preselection as the Liberal Party's candidate for the upcoming election.

Preselection for the seat of Barker opened last Thursday and will close at 5pm today (Friday).

As of print deadline, no other nominations had been received for the seat.

Mr Pasin has been preselected unopposed for the seat after ousting sitting MP Patrick Secker after a messy preselection battle in 2012.

At the 2013 election Mr Pasin breezed to victory securing 52.6pc of first preference votes against a field of six candidates.

Barker is the only one of South Australia's remaining original six divisions that has never been held by the Australian Labor Party and is traditionally the safest seat for the Liberal Party.

In 2016, Mr Pasin's margin was slashed

to 4.7pc - making Barker a marginal seat for the first time in seven decades - following a challenge by Nick Xenophon Team candidate James Stacey.

Mr Pasin recorded his highest vote at the 2019 election, gaining a 12pc swing in first preference votes after the collapse of the rebranded Nick Xenophon Team's Centre Alliance.

Factional ally and former Cape Jaffa resident Nicolle Flint announced she will not contest the state's marginal seat of Boothby at the next federal election.

The conservative Liberal MP has previously spoken about the problems faced since entering politics in 2016, including being at the centre of attacks from left-wing lobby groups.

Ms Flint has had her offices repeatedly vandalised with offensive language and told a parliamentary committee being targeted by a male stalker was one of the "scariest experiences of my life".

Ex-nun asks for right to die

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IT is easy for Mount Gambier resident and former nun Jane Qualmann to reconcile the Catholic Church's moral theology which rejects euthanasia and her support for voluntary assisted dying.

Ms Qualmann is suffering through the latter stages of a terminal illness and wants to end her own life when her suffering becomes too great.

It is a dignified end available to Victorians living just 20 minutes away but for South Australians, the right to choose has yet to be legislated.

"God never wanted me to suffer," Ms Qualmann said.

"Jesus suffered on that cross, but he didn't want us to suffer.

"In no way can I ever see a God who loves us, has nurtured us and has got us this far want us to die a horrible death at the hands of someone else who thinks they are God.

"He has given man the intelligence to have palliative care and hospice care, but He has also given man a choice and a conscious."

Last year, the Vatican reiterated its opposition to euthanasia and assisted suicide, labelling it as "intrinsically evil" in "every situation or circumstance".

But Ms Qualmann, who still identifies as a Catholic, believes euthanasia as the best response to intolerable burdens of pain and unnecessary suffering as her life-limiting illness continues to progress.

"I have always supported voluntary assisted dying in general terms, but it wasn't until I was diagnosed as terminal that it really hit that I don't have a choice in this and that is traumatic," she said.

"You choose to have a baby, you choose to get married - all through life you have a choice - except at your death.

"It is my choice how I end my story and any person with a terminal illness will tell you they want to end their story their way.

"They didn't live life to end up suffering and having their families watch them suffer.

"We have wonderful palliative care and hospice care, but if either of those options does not suit the position of someone with a terminal illness, what other choice do we have?"

Parliamentarians will soon debate legalising euthanasia for the 17th time in the last quarter of a century, with Labor introducing identical bills in the Upper House and the House of Assembly late last year.

Labor heavyweight and former Mount Gambier resident Kyam Mayer emotionally remembered watching the painful death of his mother and community stalwart Viv while introducing the landmark proposal to the Legislative Council.

The opposition frontbencher tearfully spoke about Ms Maher, who passed away of pancreatic cancer in 2017, describing her death as "far from the peaceful, dignified end of life she or any other person deserves".

The bill is based on the Victorian model, which provides people with incurable, advanced and progressive diseases who are expected to die within six months access to voluntary assisted dying.

The nine step process requires individuals to ask their doctor for information about voluntary assisted dying before being assessed by two doctors who have completed training in assessing people for voluntary dying to see if requirements are met.

Under the proposed law, a 10-day wait pe-

riod will be implemented between a request and the issuing of a permit.

A report tabled in Victorian Parliament on Wednesday found since the scheme was established in June 2019, 581 people have been assessed for eligibility for euthanasia and 405 permits have been issued.

According to the report, the average age of people able to access the scheme in Victoria is 71 years.

Voluntary assisted dying advocate and A Peaceful End convenor Angie Miller said it was heartbreaking that terminally ill South Australians living just 20 minutes from the Victorian border were unable to access euthanasia due to the state's legal prohibition.

"Jane and I drove to the Victorian border and it is crazy to think that people who live so close to the border don't have the same end of life choices," she said.

"Not one more person is going to die under the voluntary assisted dying bill because it is so strict with its safeguards, but less people are going to suffer.

"At the End of Life Choices committee, SA Police said 10 people had taken their lives as a result of terminal illness since January 2019 and the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federal SA Branch presented evidence which showed jurisdictions where assisted dying legislation has been enacted the palliative care sector has strengthened.

"Part of our campaign is also to increase palliative care funding and in states where voluntary assisted dying is available there is actually an increase in funding as people aren't as afraid to talk about death and it becomes part of a more accepted conversation."

Politicians have been permitted a free vote on the bill when it is debated in coming weeks, allowing individual MPs to vote according to their own personal conscience as opposed to an official party line.

Liberal Member for MacKillop Nick McBride has indicated he will support voluntary assisted dying laws, while Limestone Coast Labor parliamentarian Clare Scriven will vote against the bill in the Upper House.

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell, who voted down the bill during the 2016 debate, has since pledged to support the new proposal which has strict eligibility criteria and provisions for dispensing the lethal medication.

Ms Qualmann praised the independent MP for indicating support for euthanasia, with Mr Bell attributing his change of heart on the controversial issue to the death of a family member due to cancer.

"It takes a lot of courage for him to change

his mind especially in the Limestone Coast where it is a very conservative area," she said.

"I hope Mount Gambier and the Limestone Coast gets right behind him.

"I don't want to suffer and I don't want my family to suffer.

"All I want is a choice."

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Mental health demand is up

HUNDREDS of Limestone Coast residents seeking mental health support are on waiting lists up to 12 months long to see counsellors and psychologist as the sector struggles to meet high demand.

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell says service providers have reported a large increase of clients who are accessing services for the first time in their lives after almost a year of COVID-19 limitations.

"Last year made us very aware of our mental health and perhaps for the first time – that stigma of asking for and accessing help and support is beginning to lift," he said. ?

"But people are having to wait months and months to get that first appointment."

According to Mr Bell, patients waiting for mental health treatments are forced to resort to emergency or crisis services and putting existing services under demand.

"The Mount Gambier Hospital has six dedicated mental health beds which are frequently full and medical beds are used for mental health cases," he said.

"If some of these people were able to access care and support early, they would not be needing crisis care."

The independent MP told parliament volunteer-led initiatives such as Lifeboat, The Junction and the Mount Gambier and suicide prevention networks provided crucial support for vulnerable residents, but required

long-term funding commitment from the State Government.

Mr Bell cited survey results from a study undertaken by Lifeline South East, with more than 95pc of the 1045 participants agreeing the region requires more mental health services and stronger collaboration between existing services.

A majority of respondents (86pc) reported either knowing someone who had or had themselves used local mental health services, but just 53pc said they felt confident they could locate appropriate mental health services in the region.

Almost half of the respondents showed a preference for accessing mental health services information through face-to-face contact

(47pc), with online (29%), and over the phone (15%) the less preferred channels.

He called for the establishment of a central mental health hub to provide a free non-clinical service for people to access face-to-face support, information, and help in navigating local, state and national mental health services.

In a statement, Lifeline Australia recommended the establishment of a central hub focused on needs assessment and information and referral to be located in Mount Gambier.

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OH WHAT A FEELING

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College generates circular economy

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AN AMBITIOUS vision to become one of the nation's top sustainable schools is nearing reality for Tenison Woods College with students driving environmental change on campus.

The college's 1400-strong student united for its Clean Up Australia Day program on Thursday - ahead of Sunday's national conservation exercise - but sustainability goes far beyond one day for the Mount Gambier institution.

Students of varying ages and year levels regularly come together through the expanding Project Recology program, a unique learning tool transforming waste plastics as part of a circular economy.

It is one promising step in the college's larger mission to reduce its environmental footprint and arm youth with knowledge and experiences promoting sustainable practices.

A new Year 9 subject - Precious Plastic - has also been introduced this year, with students focused on rethinking waste, following the process from disposal and sorting through to the design, production, marketing and sale of recycled plastic goods.

From phone holders and jewellery to signage and kitchenware, students continue to transform thousands of recyclable bottle lids and other plastics into new, saleable products.

A \$20,000 federal community environment grant has helped fast-track the college's innovative Project Recology scheme, operated from an old groundskeeper's shed with purpose-made machinery.

College sustainability coordinator Tom Linnell said sustainability was a value-driven ethos, with school initiatives - including an industrial green waste compost program - generating exposure for students to build that value.

"Young people live at such a fast pace and technology is such a key part of their lives and it is very instant," he said.

"A lot of the stuff we are talking about here has very long-term implications.

"This is giving them a way to play a positive part in the future and it has been very exciting for us as a school.

"I think our young people in regional communities have a real opportunity to stake a claim on what the next iteration of recycling and a circular economy can look like."

The students' drive has been matched by

the community with businesses and college families collecting and donating plastics to be repurposed, while support has also flowed from varying tiers of government.

Within the school grounds, Year 12 students and sustainability leaders Daniela Ortiz Kaiser and George Wimshurst are championing the cause among their peers.

Daniela said the introduction of Project Recology had boosted awareness among students about sustainability and waste management.

"It is important young people find out what is happening to our planet and pitch in because it all helps," she said.

George said there had been a notable increase in students wanting to do the right thing and help the school's sustainability profile.

"From looking back at what other students have done in the past, I thought it would be a good idea to step up and take this leadership role on and get younger people involved in waste," he said.

The college's success has been timely as South Australia enters a new era in sustainability with a ban on single-use plastics coming into effect this week.

South Australian environment minister David Speirs said the historic ban - prohibiting drinking straws, stirrers and cutlery from sale, supply or distribution across the state - was protecting the environment for future generations and promoting a circular economy.

"The Marshall Liberal Government is ambitious for this legislation and won't just stop at straws, cutlery and stirrers with expanded polystyrene cups, bowls, plates and clam-shell containers, and oxo-degradable plastic products to be banned in a years' time," Mr Speirs said.

"We will continue to consider more products such as takeaway coffee cups, plastic barrier bags and other takeaway food service items as market demand increases and other sustainable alternatives become available."

Mr Speirs said March 1, 2021 would forever be a proud day for the state and signified a shift away from a single-use, throwaway mindset.

Limestone Coast communities, schools and groups will take part in Clean Up Australia Day activities this weekend.

Educator leads war on waste

A MOUNT Gambier educator has been labelled as an exemplar in demonstrating the difference that one person can make to catalyse wider action after winning the \$10,000 overall prize in the South Australian Climate Leaders Awards.

Tenison Woods College sustainability coordinator Tom Linnell was recognised as the overall winner after winning the Community category for his efforts in integrating waste education into the curriculum as well as diving change in the Limestone Coast.

Mr Linnell was also acknowledged for his work in exploring best practices and innovations in sustainability-related education, studying at both Harvard University and the University of Tasmania and his consultancy on community and sustainability issues for a number of organisations and educational groups.

He said the prize will be used as part of his recently launched sustainability consultancy company Ecothink and look to make uses of information technology in school to drive sustainable change and connect and inform young people through innovative curriculum packages.

"Our first big project at EcoThink is looking to connect a global network of schools together, using an the Internet of Things technology to inform an innovative curriculum aimed to drive behaviour change in educational communities," Mr Linnell said.

"This consultancy project will guide organisations to build resilience for a sustainable future through strengthened community networks, building capacity among teams and mitigating climate related risks."

At last week's award ceremony, Premier's Climate Change Council chair Martin Haese said Mr Linnell work with students and the Tenison Woods College to set a mission to reduce waste and delivering practical projects to progress towards the targets was innovative and inspiring.

Yahl-based timber processor Roundwood Solutions was awarded top honours in the business and industry category for a new carbon-based wood treatment against rot and insect attack.

The Tanapost technology enables full cell treatment throughout all of the post and has fire resistance features, improved feel and handling and is almost odourless.

Mr Haese said as well as being carbon neutral, the company's Tanapost was a great example of a climate smart product.

Tourism operators given funding boost

A MOORAK accommodation provider has received almost \$90,000 to upgrade its existing facility, including the construction of three new glamping tents.

The Pine Country Caravan Park is one of four Limestone Coast businesses to receive grants under the State Government's Tourism Industry Development Fund.

The caravan park received \$88,834 for a \$296,116 accommodation upgrade, which

will also be used to renovate and upgrade 17 existing cabins and existing amenities.

Luxury accommodation provider Aloha Accommodation, located in Robe and Mount Gambier, will receive \$90,000 towards the construction of three self-contained studio apartments.

Mount Gambier-based Apartments on Tolmie was awarded \$20,000 to be used on internal and external renovation of four apartment units, while Hollick Estates will

receive \$20,000 for the refurbishment of the existing Hollick House accommodation.

The Tourism Industry Development fund aims to support and stimulate private sector investment in new and improved regional accommodation and the development of tourism product and experiences.

Grants of between \$20,000 to \$500,000 are available with a maximum 30pc State Government funding of the total project value.

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Limestone Coast rail back on track

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RAIL enthusiasts can relive the golden age of Limestone Coast locomotives following the launch of a model train set depicting the Mount Gambier, Naracoorte and Kingston rail corridors.

Although the railway closed more than two decades ago, the line will reopen on a smaller scale at the Sheep's Back Museum in Naracoorte on Saturday.

Naracoorte man Lindsay Baker spent more than 30 years recreating the Mount Gambier railway line down to the finest detail, including a working South Australian Railways Bluebird railcar visitors can run from the Blue Lake city to Naracoorte.

National Trust South Australia Naracoorte branch chair Graham Brammer said Mr Baker donated the model railway to the museum shortly before his death last year.

Mr Brammer said the model train originally comprised of 20 metres worth of tracks and required a sophisticated logistic effort to transport the set from Mr Brammer's home in Adelaide to Naracoorte.

"The main problem was getting it down here and we had a couple of blokes who helped bring it down in trailers and the South Australian Railway Modellers Association came down to help us assemble it and try and tune it up," he said.

"It is a very big set up and has several me-

tres of track and as far as detail goes it is very realistic.

"Mr Baker has done a really good job in terms of the likelihood and a number of buildings can be seen like the Naracoorte Hotel and the old mill.

"You can see the old Dalgety building, there are trucks and tractors and you can even see little models of women hanging out the washing."

Mr Brammer said the model train set would be a permanent exhibit at the museum and would provide visitors an opportunity to view slices of the region's transport history.

"The National Trust is very grateful for the opportunity to have the model train set and we hope people come in and view the perma-

nent working display," he said.

"Model trains was Mr Baker's passion and hobby and it is a magnificent set up.

"Every time you look at the set, you can see something different."

The model train display will be launched on Saturday, March 6 at 10am, with members of the South Australian Model Railway Association attending the opening.

Another 10 metre mobile train set will be on display in the Naracoorte Historical Vehicle Clubrooms for the day.

Funding boost for roads

THE Riddoch Highway will receive a \$3.6m boost for new road safety upgrades and improvements under the Federal Government's Road Safety Program.

Two sections of the highway from Keith to Mount Gambier are slated for surface treatments, widening the existing narrow sealed shoulders and sealing and widening outside of curves as part of the funding.

A further \$7.2m has been earmarked for the Ngarkat Highway from Pinaroo to Bordertown and \$400,000 has been allocated for the Karoonda Highway.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said the funding provided a much-needed boost to jobs and delivered life-saving upgrades to ensure road users stay safe.

"I am pleased to see a total of \$11,220,000 will be shared across communities in Barker to fund new road safety upgrades and improvements to help reduce the number of fatalities and serious injuries occurring on our roads," Mr Pasin said.

"One death or one serious injury crash on our roads is one too many and that is why this investment is so welcome." The additional works under the Federal Government's \$2b Road Safety Program will start in January 2021 and be finished by mid-2022.

The State Government will provide \$920,000 to the two Riddoch Highway upgrades, \$1.8m towards the Ngarkat Highway and \$100,000 has been allocated to the Karoonda Highway.

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Regional board revisited

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MEMBER for Mount Gambier Troy Bell has renewed calls for an overhaul of TAFE SA to decentralise the vocational education and training provider and establish regional boards of management.

Following almost three years of advocacy, Mr Bell has continued his push to abolish the centrally-operated TAFE SA board and install regional boards across the state to ensure the organisation provides education and training services that meets the needs of country communities.

The independent MP was recently joined by Shadow Education Minister Blair Boyer in a roundtable discussion with Di-Monty Training Solutions managing director Di Ind, Group Training Employment general manager Greg Megaw and other stakeholders to discuss the vocational training needs of regional industry.

Mr Bell said there was a strong desire to return to local boards of management, similar to the regional health structure that has been established, to engage with industry and investigate opportunities to expand training currently offered in the region.

"We have young people who are travelling for training and I firmly believe there are courses that should and could be offered here under a different model," he said.

"I believe that model is a vocational board, with TAFE SA perhaps having a chief executive officer based in the region who is responsible for the campus.

"We have very good staff here, but TAFE SA has been underfunded for a very long time and we want to make sure the training that is offered meets the community and industry needs."

Ms Ind said the region required a mix of public and private training providers as neither was able to satisfy the vocational needs of the Limestone Coast alone, adding solid industry and stakeholder consultation was required to ensure programs were aligned with the needs of local industries, communities and students.

"Having that consolation with industry, understanding where industry is headed and then us being able to match training services to meet those needs will allow us to reduce the gas and have highly qualified staff in our businesses to enable us to grow," Ms Ind said.

"From a private perspective, we consult with industries and organisations all the time about what it is going on.

"We want our intellectual intelligence to stay here locally... and need our young people working so they have a clear pathway to choose careers they are interested in.

"It might not be a job for life, but if we have

the services they need in the region, it can help give them stability and help them stay in the region.

"Vocational training means on-the-job experience, training and teaching and passing on knowledge through a competency-based assessment and training system that actually works."

Labor frontbencher Mr Boyer acknowledged community concerns about the inability to access training in the Limestone Coast and said he was personally interested in the idea of regional boards.

"One thing we all agree on is when you have decision makers from or based in the area where they are making those decisions, you get better outcomes because they are invested in and part of the local community," he said.

"As soon as that is outsourced out of the community, you start to get decisions that don't sit well with the community and I think

that's what we are seeing down here."

However, he stopped short of endorsing the reforms, but said he would raise it with State Labor for consideration during the party's policy development.

Last year, Education Minister John Gardner responded to Mr Bell's questions about TAFE SA and said the organisation was "in the midst of reviewing its structure to improve its business operations."

"This has included an analysis of regional manager positions across the organisation," he said.

"The proposal being considered includes regionally-based positions to respond to local training needs."

TAFE SA chief executive David Coltman said an outcome of the regional management consultation was the establishment of a new educational partnerships team, which will centralise stakeholder relations and provide a one stop contact point for external stakeholders to do business with TAFE SA.

"This team has a strong focus on developing education based partnerships across the regions to support the growth of regional training delivery, undertake community engagement functions and will ensure close collaboration with valued stakeholders in schools, industry, government and the community throughout the state," he said.

"A manager, education partnerships, is based at the Mount Gambier Campus and will continue to work closely with stakeholders across the Limestone Coast to support local education and training in the region.

"Through the new education partnerships team, the local educational staff and regional visits from the TAFE SA Executive team, we will continue to work closely with local communities to ensure we are supporting the skill requirements across the region."

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EDITOR'S COMMENT

BY its own definition, euthanasia literally translates to the good death, or a death without agony.

But the way we die has improved markedly since Ancient Greece, with technological advances and medicine playing a major part in the prolongation of life and patient treatment.

We are fortunate to have high-quality palliative care in the Limestone Coast that meets the needs of patients.

It is essential improvements and funding continue to relieve the complex mixture of physical, emotional and psychological symptoms during the end of life process.

However, a 2016 survey of Australian Medical Association members found two-thirds (67pc) of respondents agreed with a statement that said "there are patients for whom palliative care or other end of life care services cannot adequately alleviate their suffering".

It has been estimated treatment is either ineffective or intolerable for approximately 5pc of palliative care patients.

Death and dying has become increasingly medicalised and thus within the domain of medical professionals who endeavour to keep us alive as long as possible.

South Australia should follow neighbouring jurisdictions that are moving towards options for assisted death with the increasing acceptance it is the individual who should be in control of the end of life process.

Terminally ill people, not the government, or political ideology or religious leaders and their dogma, should make their own end of life decisions and determine how much pain and suffering they should ensure.

Only when you have experienced what some people describe as a "good death" do you start to wonder what qualifies as a bad one.

Weed control crucial

THE Landscape SA Act of 2019 replaced the NRM with Limestone Coast Landscape Board in the south east of South Australia.

I am sure it is not just councillors but those without smart phones and even computers who are not necessarily aware of these changes and confusion surrounding weeds and responsibilities continues.

Outdated information is still being shared.

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board will be sending a letter to all landholders outlining compliance obligations, particularly in road reserves, so watch out for it and make sure you read it.

Boards can charge landholders for spraying declared weeds where they persist through negligence. Weed officers also deal with declared weeds in urban areas.

Tracking and tracing weeds in the Limestone Coast is well underway with the more efficient use of technology and data bases now which can be shared and handed on.

New owners and managers on properties should have a record of such information from previous managers.

Practising machinery hygiene and holding and checking new stock for contamination/elimination is also highly recommended to prevent hours of work and expense further

down the track.

Weed officers are happy to visit and help landholders resolve weed issues and the calibre of these young people is excellent, with the Naracoorte weed officer changing the spray mix to eliminate resistant weeds at Naracoorte Livestock Exchange after years of glyphosate for example.

It was concerning to read of Chilean Needle Grass up near One Tree Hill but it is in other spots as well and seems to be taking years to eradicate.

Texas needlegrass and Serrated Tussock are

also very bad weeds to have in the landscape.

Every ounce of co-operation is needed in tackling these prolific seeders which damage the eyes of animals.

Hopefully changes to the Act will encourage landholder co-operation.

Hopefully there will also be no more cut-backs to funding for Landscape Boards who are also starting to make effective use of drones and who have a huge educative role to play in saving the country billions of dollars.

This group meets weekly and is maintaining a healthy turn-up of farming and town families, even some from Mount Gambier.

The effort Sue has made to keep the play group going is so impressive.

She has organised visits from Centacare's toy library, negotiated with Wattle Range Council to provide adequate facilities at the hall and has set up a group on social media to keep information flowing.

I have nothing but praise for her efforts and the community is responding and very young children are the benefactors.

It is disappointing the Education Department felt no commitment to keep such a vibrant educational group going; in fact, it seemed to act dogmatically to stymie it.

However, Sue's determination is greater and Tant families are the winners.

Youth a focus

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THE newest chapter in the Naracoorte Sheep's Back Museum has opened with the recent debut of the purpose-built Children's Museum.

After almost five years of planning and construction, the new museum provides young visitors with a space specifically dedicated to the educational growth for children through imaginative and physical play.

The facility, housed in a former structure from the Kybybolite Primary School, targets children with a range of hands-on exhibits including a fossil table, an old cash register and lino printing.

The interactive exhibits cover a wide variety of region-specific interests, including native birds and animals, old cameras, board games and household goods and a section dedicated to the World Heritage listed Naracoorte Caves.

Designed by former Naracoorte teacher and artist Rod Bax, the charming museum was the creative product of the National Trust of South Australia Naracoorte Branch in tandem with artists Wayan Dudug, David Archer, Kim Horne, Annabel Hume, Jojo Spook and students from local schools.

National Trust of South Australia Naracoorte Branch volunteer Judy Murdoch said the museum was developed to feature interactive displays designed to be used by children, in contrast to traditional museums that typically have a hands-off policy regarding exhibits.

"Children tend to get dragged around museums with their parents and because the exhibits are not children-friendly, they can easily get bored," she said.

"We found if you want to deliver a significant message to adults in your display, little children are going to be left out of the picture.

"I spoke to a group of young mothers who said they weren't into museums when they were younger because they found it boring, so we thought we would try and engage children by creating a space where they could learn and play.

"We inherited a shelter shed from the Kybybolite school when it closed and I contacted Rod Bax who worked with me at Naracoorte High School about designing a children's museum.

"He started taking his grandchild on tours of other museums to find out what works for children."

Ms Murdoch said exhibits were also de-

veloped in collaboration with schools and community groups, with Naracoorte and Lucindale primary and high school students creating artwork for display.

"We had artists run workshops with groups in schools who have created things for the museum, such as the students creating wire sculptures, making paper mache birds of Bool Lagoon," she said.

"It was important for us to have things kids could interact with in some way or another, as well as make it colourful and appeal to a range of age and wanted to involve kids in building it as far as we were able."

Museum volunteer Lester Keyes said the museum would feature changeable exhibits to respond to the audience and engage children in storytelling.

"We have a lot of items in the back that we are going to change up so children can see something different when they come in," he said.

"There are a lot of different themes, we have an exhibit that shows some of the items that were used in the olden days such as old lights and clocks, washing tub, tongs for curling hair and an old egg cup.

"There is also a lucky dip for kids to pick out items and them match them to creatures from the old times to make it more interactive for kids.

"We also want to do an Aboriginal theme as well somewhere down the track to showcase the traditional culture."

Naracoorte Lucindale mayor Erika Vickery praised all contributors and volunteers for their efforts and said the facility would provide children with a fun and engaging learning experience.

"The children's museum is still a work in progress, but it has been well put together and hands-on interesting displays for children to get involved in history," she said.

"Rather than a museum where you just look and read, it really gives children an opportunity try and lift up one of the irons used in the old days and look at the fossils up close.

"It is a great addition and is really forward thinking to make it interesting for children as well as adults.

"It has been a real collaboration between the National Trust, the artists and the schools and the designs are quite lovely.

"With the students being involved it gives them some ownership as well and the volunteers that have been working on it have done a beautiful job of making it look inviting."

Trade impacts canvassed in region

THE effects of COVID-19 on Limestone Coast trade markets and China's ban on rock lobster, wine and timber imports were canvassed by South Australian Trade and Investment Minister Stephen Patterson during a recent tour of the region.

Mr Patterson met with representatives with rock lobster processors in Port MacDonnell to hear from key stakeholders about key issues as a result of trade barriers before hearing from N.F. McDonnell and Sons about issues affecting the timber industry.

Following a \$2m State Government contribution to Timberlink's new \$59m state-of-the-art timber manufacturing facility, Mr Patterson toured the Tarpeena facility and discussed the expansion plans which is scheduled to be complete by next year.

The minister was joined by MacKillop MP Nick McBride in Coonawarra and met with the Limestone Coast Grape and Wine Council and the Coonawarra Vignerons.

Mr Patterson said a number of initiatives had been established to help industry and business capitalise on opportunities for job creation and economic growth throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, including access to global markets through international trade and investment offices and links to export advisors.

He said the industry-led recovery would also be supported by grants and financial support, including the South Australian Export Accelerator grant for businesses looking to grown into international markets and the Global Expansion Program to support

recently growing South Australian businesses build their export capability and capacity.

Mr McBride said the discussions were productive and provided context for how industries will meet current and future challenges.

\$865k seaside redevelopment nears end

PORT MacDonnell's Waterfront Project is nearing the end of its \$865,000 second stage works, with the construction expected to be completed this month.

The Grant District Council-managed project has progressed at a steady rate to not disrupt the coastal town's peak tourism period with several key pieces expected to be commissioned in March.

New shelters featuring barbecues and seating will be added to the site while several main pieces of play equipment have been im-

pacted by international shipping delays but council remains confident it will not affect the project schedule.

Council has also collaborated with students at Grant High School and the Port MacDonnell Men's Shed on various components of the new play space and these items, together with the repurposed and renovated Liberty Swing, will be installed within the month.

Mimosa Nursery has establishing seedlings and plantings for the final site landscaping and will be ready to plant by the revised

end of March completion date.

Grant District Mayor Richard Sage said he was happy with the progress being made on the project, expressing pride in the engagement of local contractors, community groups and in working with First Nations.

Meanwhile the second stage of power line undergrounding along Sea Parade could be completed as early as July this year with the Power Line Environment Committee confirming work will soon start on the \$405,000 project.

Council will pay one-third of the project cost - \$120,148 plus \$15,000 of in-kind support - a significantly smaller fee than the \$231,000 it had budgeted for.

SA Power Networks will carry out construction to underground the power lines along Sea Parade between Charles and Standish streets, also branching out onto these side streets.

Council spent \$212,608 on stage one works in June last year, around \$20,000 less than its budgeted contribution.

BlazeAid proves invaluable

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BUSHFIRE recovery organisation BlazeAid has saved Avenue Range and Lucindale property owners more than \$100,000 by helping to rebuild fences destroyed by the Blackford fire in January.

Since opening the Lucindale camp in late January, more than 97 volunteers have devoted a collective 602 days to clearing 54km of fences and rebuilding approximately 75km of fence across fire-ravaged properties.

A total of 32 properties have registered for help in the area and three farms have had work completed, with farmers estimating a savings of \$108,360.

But for former Lucindale resident and BlazeAid volunteer Maggie Paltridge, giving the gift of a fence to keep in livestock has been life-changing.

"One of the guys who was severely burnt out was the ambulance driver when my Dad died, so I have a strong connection to Lucindale and want to help the people who have helped me," she said.

"We helped pull down the fence of a farmer who told us it would have taken him a day to do it alone, but with three of us it took a couple of hours and within two days we had fixed the boundary fence.

"It gives the farmer a chance to forget about containment so they can just get on with running the farm."

Ms Paltridge, who lives in Western Australia, planned to visit her mother in Gawler before a grass fire broke out in the Blackford, Avenue Range and Lucindale area on January 11.

The fire burned more than 17,000ha of grass and scrub and destroyed three structures, numerous sheds, thousands of livestock and incurred a significant loss to fencing.

"Some of the stories we heard are just devastating," Ms Paltridge said.

"It is heartbreaking to hear people telling you about having to shoot sheep and burying stock.

"Even a month later, when farmers cows are calving and they find their teats have been

burnt out and they have to put down their cow and calf because they can't feed it is so eye-opening."

Buoyed by a desire to help farmers, landholders and old friends impacted by the bushfire, Ms Paltridge returned to Lucindale for the first time in 35 years to work alongside fencing contractors and reinstate fences of main roads and boundary fences.

"When you drive down the road to Avenue and look out the window, you can see the work you have done and it gives you a real sense of pride," she said.

"At the end of the day, you have achieved something and the person you have done it for is really thankful for what you have done."

Prior to attending the BlazeAid camp, Sydney resident Rowena Kempton had no experience in building fences but quickly learned how to attach droppers on fences and staple wires into posts.

"You don't need any experience and everyone can do it, you don't need to be skilled at all," she said.

"It is easy work, but it is also hard when you are out on the farm all day. "But there's no pressure to complete something and you can do as much as you can and if you don't finish, it's not a problem.

"The camaraderie and rapport among volunteers is really something as well, you work with different people every day and at the end of the day, some people have a beer or a couple of glasses of wine and talk about what they have achieved."

The fellowship among BlazeAid is well-known for return participants, with honour board recipient John Carver and wife Karen undertaking their sixth stint with the voluntary organisation.

The Carvers are among many volunteers who have returned to the Limestone Coast after providing help to property owners in the wake of last year's Keilira bushfire.

"The first BlazeAid we helped out with was in Coonabarabran after the big New South Wales bushfires and we thought we would go because it was right near home - only 2000km

away," he said.

"After that we went to Palmer and the Barossa Valley, Henley Bridge, Kingston and then here.

"My wife helps out in the kitchen and I go out on the farm, but I don't really know why we do it, we just like doing it.

"I was in the CFS for 40 something years and it's just something that you do."

Member for Barker Tony Pasin, who toured the fire ground with South Australian Governor the Honourable Hieu Van Le AC last month, said he was impressed by the sense of optimism and strength of community spirit in the district.

"As I have said before, the road to recovery will be a long on, but I know the Lucindale, Avenue Range and Blackford communities are amongst the most resilient and capable in my electorate and I have every confidence they'll emerge from this disaster better than they came into it," Mr Pasin said.

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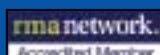

Call for help

AS the ash settles across the Lucindale, Avenue Range and Blackford areas, volunteer organisation BlazeAid are calling for volunteers to provide physical assistance to fire-affected farmers.

Individuals and businesses have rallied to help the broader Lucindale community recover through hay runs and fundraising events, but help is being sought to rebuild hundreds of kilometres of fencing needing to be replaced.

BlazeAid support coordinator and volunteer John Tuckwell said willing hands were wanted to work alongside rural families and fencing contractors to rebuild fences and help rebuild lives.

"A week or so ago, the farmers were very busy with their bull sales and calving and they are only now starting to think about the rest of the farm and the work that needs to be done," he said.

"Most of the farmers are using contractors so they are putting up the posts and our volunteers are going along behind the contractor and clipping all of the batons.

"It is a time saver for the contractor and it is a fiddly job, but we get it done.

"There are a handful of property owners who totally need our help and we have been knocking in some posts."

Mr Tuckwell said a majority of volunteers were "grey nomads" and estimated the average age of participants at the Lucindale camp was in the high 60s.

"Volunteers vary from week to week and some can stay for three days, three weeks or three months," he said.

"There are a group of locals who come in two or three days each week which is tremendous because they have a lot of local knowl-

edge which helps us out a lot.

"At the moment we are a little low on volunteers and we could definitely use some more help.

"People can come for one day or one week and all they need is themselves - we provide morning tea and lunch and all the equipment - all they need are some long pants and sturdy boots."

Established from the ashes of the Black Saturday fires, the not-for-profit organisation has helped hundreds of families across the country rebuild thousands of structures that have been damaged or destroyed after natural disasters.

Mr Tuckwell, who spent an accumulative eight months in BlazeAid camps last year, including one month in Kingston, said volunteers are also sought to help prepare meals and provide support to the camp's operations.

"We are here to help build fences, but we find being on the property and in the community gives farmers a tremendous morale boost," he said.

"The community enjoy having us here and we try to do our bit and support the community by spending money or going to the pub on a Friday night and if there is support needed elsewhere other than fencing, we will help.

"There is a lot of experience within the volunteer group, we have retired farmers and people who are skilled at doing repair work and you don't have to be an expert to help.

"Farmers are an important part of the whole chain and it gives me tremendous satisfaction to be able to help them.

"Seeing the property owner with a smile on their face when you put that fence up is a great feeling."

Grass species moving forward

THIS is the fourth article in a series prepared by Gambier Seeds to feature in The Border Watch this year. The focus of these articles will be to help farmers optimise productivity from their pasture and forage bases.

At Gambier Seeds we believe pastures and pasture renovation are an investment, not only in your farm production and profitability, but in its future.

OVER the past several years, there have been considerable improvements in grass species that have been sown in the Limestone Coast for many years and then largely abandoned.

I refer here to Tall Fescue, Cocksfoot and Phalaris cultivars, and it is time to revisit them. Still reading?

I will readily admit to being of the generation that had me biased against the species from the outset.

The mention of these species to most farmers was enough to make them roll their eyes in disappointment.

I was hit with "I've tried these there is no way I'm going back to them" or "I've come to see you to spray these species out, not put more back in".

I am now, however, well and truly converted, having seen, trialled and used these species myself across several farms over the past six years on both dryland and irrigation.

These newer cultivars of the original species visually bear many similarities and growth habits to their predecessors but they are quite superior in terms of quality and production to their predecessors.

In many situations, the production levels from these cultivars, when established, are equalling or exceeding the production levels expected from Ryegrass-based pastures.

When persistence and stand longevity are factored in, they surpass ryegrass-based pastures in less-than-optimal conditions.

They should be actively considered as an option for your grazing system or for areas on most farms.

The improvements made in the breeding of the current cultivars is such that we are now utilising them under irrigation and seeing significant benefits.

Even in some situations on high production dairy systems.

The key benefits from using deeper rooted perennials in your pasture mixes are:
PERSISTENCE/RESILIENCE: I have found the species to be much more tolerant of a wider range of soil conditions and fertility than modern ryegrass cultivars.

They are more able to tolerate longer drier summers and in irrigated situations, can handle lower quality water and lower input systems than ryegrass-based pastures.

We target these pasture mixes to deliver 10 to 15-year-plus pastures.

We also find these species deliver a longer flatter pasture growth curve with greater production at the "shoulders" of a normal growing season.

GRAZING MANAGEMENT: They are more tolerant of less intensive grazing systems, or in set stocking systems than ryegrass-based pastures.

Optimum production still occurs under rotationally grazed systems.

They are also more suited to systems where high levels of dry matter are carried into late spring and summer, or for fodder conservation systems where hay is considered preferable over silage.

PASTURE MIX AND SYSTEM FLEXIBILITY: We alternate and vary ratios of the species and cultivars used depending on soil types and soil conditions present.

For example, on lighter soils or dryer banks we tend to use Phalaris and cocksfoot mixes, but on deeper and heavier soils with potential for waterlogging we will use Phalaris and tall fescue mixes.

It is our experience that the species adapt and colonise where the conditions best suit them within a paddock.

A key consideration these species and cul-

tivars is that they are much slower to establish and reach full production than ryegrass-based pastures.

This needs to be managed when sowing these as part of your pasture base.

They can be either autumn or spring sown, but it is critical good weed and insect control

is carried out prior to, and during, the establishment phase.

Thriving, rain, hail or shine

THIRTY years of history has shown that Australian Fullblood Wagyu are pretty adaptable at coping with Australia's weather extremes, but as our weather patterns change, it is important they are given every opportunity to continue to thrive.

Anecdotally, there is plenty of evidence to suggest that Wagyu do well in northern Queensland right down to the cooler temperatures of Tasmania.

Mayura Station, located in the Limestone Coast, is home to one of Australia's largest full blood Wagyu herds with over 4000 full-blood Wagyu cattle.

Classified as *Bos taurus*, along with other European breeds such as Angus and Hereford, the assumption is Wagyu are not heat tolerant.

Many of the northern Wagyu pioneers crossed Fullbloods with Brahman in the belief it would enable the cattle to cope with the heat, and there is no doubt that introducing *Bos Indicus* has been beneficial.

However, there is no shortage of Fullblood Wagyu in central to northern Queensland that are performing well.

In Japanese production systems, Wagyu are typically penned and pampered and raised on a grain-based system for much of their lives.

For the early pioneers it was a pleasant surprise to see Wagyu grazing in Queensland's outback and in some cases performing better than the Brahman.

In an article published in 2018, US veterinarian Dr Jimmy Horner observed that: "... most black Wagyu cattle are not impacted by heat stress until ambient temperatures reach 75°F (24 °C) or the "Heat Index" is above 80. Japanese Brown Wagyu (Akaushi) cattle appear to be able to tolerate slightly higher temperatures than black Wagyu, which likely explains the fact that most of these cattle are located primarily in southern Japan which is more tropical than northern regions and temperatures can reach well above 100°F (38°C) with 60% plus relative humidity during summer months..."

Dr Horner readily admits his thoughts are speculative, but did explain that he believed that the extreme variation in Japan's climate could have contributed to this inherent ability as well.

By traversing the ranges of the environmental spectrum in Japan, one can go from a somewhat frigid climate all the way to a more tropical environment such as Kyushu (southern Japan).

The sentiment is echoed by Australian feedlotter specialising in Wagyu, who have noted that Wagyu are more resilient in the heat.

CHANGING WEATHER PATTERNS

MOST generational farmers around the country would be aware that over the years the seasons have changed; droughts bite harder and floods are more inundating.

In 2016 a study was conducted by the Australian Export Grains Innovation Centre to map seasonal rainfall zones and the changes in a 15-year period.

Utilising data from the BoM, the period 1990-1999 in Figure 1a, shows the typical rainfall of the day.

In the period 2000-2015 it is evident that the lower rainfall zones of northern Australia have shifted southward, highlighted by the orange band that now extends into southern Queensland and northern NSW, reducing winter rainfall by as much as 10 to 30pc.

As temperatures increase in the tropics, the further the hot air reaches away from the equator with increased evaporation, clear



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skies and stability.

Termed the Hadley Cell, the high pressure system generated is coincident with subtropical deserts, including Australia's.

A further consequence of this broadening higher pressure is an inability for cold fronts from the south to push further up the continent.

The flow on effects for southern Australia include shorter winter months for rain, and hot and drier summers which impact on pasture and rangelands as well as heat and water stress for livestock.

LONG TERM STRATEGIES TO HELP CATTLE COPE - FEEDLOTS

ACCREDITED feedlots in Australia must abide by the National Feedlot Accreditation Scheme, which outlines the care and management of cattle.

Animal welfare of cattle in the feedlot require that shade be available for hot weather, good drainage for wet weather to avoid foot problems and the use of water spraying to keep dust down.

Professor Richard Eckard, a climate specialist for livestock at University of Melbourne, says that caution should be taken with water spraying as it can raise the level of humidity, if incorrectly applied, within a feedlot environment.

With much of his research surrounding dairy cattle, Dr Eckard believes there are many lessons to be learned from that industry, including monitoring of milk production in cattle as an indication of stress due to weather patterns.

Milk production in dairy cattle decreases noticeably when animals are under heat or cold stress.

"One of the scenarios for the near future in the inland dairy industry is the ratio of cattle in confinement feeding systems com-

pared to grazed pasture," Dr Eckard said.

"Cattle may be sheded more often in sheds that are cooled or equipped with fans, in these hotter inland regions, while irrigation water is reserved for when pasture is best able to utilise it, rather than flood irrigation in the summer months."

According to Dr Eckard, it is not just the day time heat that can cause heat stress, but if it does not cool down sufficiently overnight, cattle struggle to offload the cumulative effects of daytime heat.

An overnight temperature in the order of 21 °C or less will enable cattle to cope better with the heat.

ON-FARM

REPRODUCTION and calving in hot conditions need to be handled with care - minimise time for cattle handling, make sure the insemination process is as efficient as possible and aim for calving to be in the cooler months, away from the extremes of summer (or winter).

When it comes to feed and rations, Dr Horner recommends cattle be fed more rations in the cool of evening, to reduce the metabolic heat load through the heat of the day.

High quality forage or pasture during summer also reduces heat load as they are easier to digest.

SIGNS OF HEAT STRESS

- Bunching or grouping under shade (if it is available)
- Excessive salivation
- Panting
- Open mouth breathing
- Less grazing and eating activity
- Increased water consumption
- Crowding around water resources
- Increased urination
- Refusal to lie down

THE IMAGINE Millicent Arts Group hopes to generate some buzz with a new three-dimensional mural featuring depicting colony of bees on the town's landmark Beehive Corner.

Internationally renowned mural artist Mike Makatron is due to finish the project on the corner of George Street and North Terrace today after starting the mammoth mural on Monday.

"There's a lot of inspiration around and hopefully young people get into it."

Imagine Millicent Arts Group mural project manager Lee Morgan said the project aimed to capture the imagination of visitors and residents and encourage people to explore the town's shopping precinct.

"The Imagine Millicent Arts Group team has been hard-working with strenuous fundraising such as raffles and garden days, assisted by some generous donations from the business community and a community grant from the Wattle Range Council," he said.

"A huge thank you must go to building owner Andrew Pratt from SECO Homes who made a significant investment to get the wall prepared for Mr Makatron's beehive."

Community support key to hall revamp

COMMUNITY support continues to progress the revamp of Allendale East Community Hall.

The privately-owned structure recently had its roof replaced after around \$13,000 was fundraised.

The committee, made up of nine dedicated members, have also started gathering funds to paint and treat the building's exterior.

Stage one is estimated to cost \$5000, with over half already raised through various community fundraisers, including a garage sale, cattle scheme and fashion parade.

A cash donation of \$1870 was also made by the recently disbanded Port MacDonnell Lions Club.

Hall committee president Richard Ferguson said the aim was to maintain the building's high standard so it was attractive to the community and potential hire clientele.

"We have the roof on now which cuts out the water problems and we'll have the exterior walls maintained once painted which will help with the outside of the building," Mr Ferguson said.

"It's an ongoing process, something is always going to break, or we find out we need to do something more."

"I think we have definitely gained a lot in the time we have been going for."

The fundraising process started when the hall was placed on the market to either be sold or demolished in the mid 2000s.

Soon after, community members banded together and purchased the site with donations raised to pay for insurances.

From there, community work and support has helped maintain the building and in 2010 the hall celebrated its centenary.

Mr Ferguson thanked the community for its passion, stating it would not have been possible without the support.

The hall committee has received a \$10,000 Stand Like Stone grant to install disabled toilets and a \$3795 Grant District Council contribution to replace windows on the building's northern side.

VANS ROLL IN: The inaugural Majestic Vanners South Australian State Van Titles will be held this weekend.

A 'VANTASTIC' WEEKEND

THE Limestone Coast will host every car lover's 'vantasy' this week as the inaugural Majestic Vanners South Australian state titles take place.

Mount Gambier will serve as the central meeting point for panel vans, delivery vans, Kombi vans and many more styles from Friday, kicking off three days of cruise events and vehicle displays.

Naracoorte couple Ali and Rod Slotegraaf are spearheading the new event, expecting more than 50 vehicles and around 100 people from across South Australia and Victoria.

The Limestone Coast is home to nine registered 'Vanners' with the Slotegraafs hoping to make the event an annual fixture given its fundraising focus, with the Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) to receive this year's proceeds.

Vans will hit the road Saturday morning, meeting at the Valley Lakes from 10am before

cruising to Port MacDonnell at 10.30am.

Participants will also enjoy a lunch at Mount Gambier Community RSL and dinner at Blue Lake Golf Club from 6pm, with the optional theme 'op shop fashion' adding to the atmosphere.

Sunday ramps up from 8am with vehicles congregating at the Valley Lake, with the official event - including catering, entertainment, a silent auction and raffle - from 10am to 2pm.

South Australian registered vans are eligible for the title event, while a show and shine will also be held to allow Victorian entrants to compete for top honours.

Ms Slotegraaf - who is a health worker - said the event had strict COVID protocols in place for the "vantastic" weekend, with many Victorians eager to dust off their vans and hit the open road.

"The feedback we've had from people is

just enormous - they can't wait to get over here," she said.

"You can feel the excitement from them and the coming together of the two states.

"Being a border community we have been very aware how (COVID) has affected our Victorian neighbours."

It has been a whirlwind ride for the couple since rediscovering their love for vans in recent years.

"My husband and I have been married for many years and he once had a panel van that he sold for a house deposit and I don't think he ever recovered from that," Ms Slotegraaf said.

"As our kids have left home and we've had more time and money, we've been able to develop our interest again," she said, adding Rod had completed a vehicle conversion to a delivery van.

The passion snowballed into the couple

travelling to other Majestic Vanners events and independent showcases, with a 'van-in' in Port Hughes last year planting the seed for a South Australian title event.

Ms Slotegraaf hopes through the auction, raffle and other fundraising measures - including a gold coin donation for spectators - the event can raise significant funds for the RFDS.

"I see just about on a daily basis that they are present in our community," Ms Slotegraaf said.

"The number of people I've seen them come and collect is significant and a lot of the time it is lifesaving for those people," she said.

BIKE LAWS TIGHTENED

NEW laws tightening restrictions on young motorcyclists have passed South Australian Parliament this week, raising the age riders can obtain their licence by two years.

The reformed Motorcycle Graduated Licensing Scheme legislation received bipartisan support, raising the the minimum age for a learner's permit and R-Date licence (comparable to a provisional driver's licence) by two years from 16 to 18.

The new laws will still allow 16 year olds living in regional South Australia to hold a motorcycle licence if they travelling for education, work or sport.

Provisional car licence holders aged 17 years old can also hold a motorcycle licence.

Riders on a Learner's Permit must have no passengers, no alcohol in their system

and must not ride between midnight and 5am if they are under 25. They are also prohibited from towing and restricted to bikes with automatic transmissions.

The R-Date licence minimum age has increased from 17 to 19 and must be held for two years. Riders must be 21 to obtain the R Licence classification.

Both licences restrict riders to bikes with automatic transmissions.

The legislation was guided by an expert report from Adelaide University's Centre for Automotive Safety Research, as well as input from key road safety stakeholders, motorcycle groups and industry representatives.

Five motorcyclists have lost their lives on SA roads so far this year.

ELECTRIC CAR SALES STALL

NEW figures released this week by the Electric Vehicle Council show Australian electric car sales remain stagnant at a time when the rest of the world is hitting the accelerator hard.

There were 6900 electric cars sold in Australia last year, a 2.7pc increase from the 6718 sold in 2019.

The 2020 figures show electric cars accounting for 0.7pc of total Australian car sales.

By comparison, electric vehicles in the European Union increased their market share from 3.8pc in 2019 to 10.2pc in 2020.

In the UK, it was 3.1pc in 2019 against 10.7pc in 2020.

In California, market share went from 7.6pc to 8.1pc, while in Norway it rose from

56pc in 2019 to 75pc in 2020.

Electric Vehicle Council chief executive Behyad Jafari claimed Australia had marked itself as a uniquely hostile market to electric vehicles.

"We have no targets, no significant incentives, no fuel efficiency standards - and in Victoria we even have a new tax on non-emitting vehicles," Mr Jafari said.

Mr Jafari believes it would only take a handful of small changes from governments to increase Australian electric car sales.

"If we follow the rest of the world and look to accelerate the shift to electric vehicles, we will be rewarded with clean city air, reduced carbon impact, enhanced fuel security, and a renewed manufacturing sector."

Richards pushes the records

GREYHOUND RACING

MENINGIE trainer Tim Richards' involvement in greyhound racing goes back something like six years.

Prior to that his sporting interest had been football, one highlight being the 2005 grand final in the River Murray Football League when he coached Jervois to a record-breaking premiership win over Tailem Bend.

These days it is records of a different kind, with Almighty Stripe's 22.68 seconds for 400 metres at Tara Raceway last October the fastest recorded at the track, while Justice For All's time of 29.59 seconds over 512 metres when winning last Sunday's Summer Classic was a race record.

Richards won his first race at Tara Raceway just over three years ago with Allen Paul which he had purchased from NSW breeder Paul Wheeler for \$500.

At the time he had said he hoped to become further involved through breeding his own stock.

That is where his involvement with Worm Burner's owners Cameron and Yvonne Butcher, also based at Meningie, came into play.

"I've enjoyed success with a couple of their bitches that I've bred with - Spicy Peppa, a winner of 25 races, has produced Almighty Stripe, Contrail, Jervois Boy, Jervois Bruit and Meek And Mild from a mating to Fabregas," Richards said.

"Then there's Molly Be Nimble's litter by Aston Dee Bee which we shared and includes Jack's Well (14 wins and \$40,000 in stakemoney) and Justice For All.

"She was recently mated for a third occasion, this time with Barcia Bale.

"I have to say, Cameron and Yvonne have been really helpful and very good to me.

"I certainly appreciate that they have given me an opportunity to become involved in their line which is highlighted by Little Looper, the dam of Worm Burner."

Justice For All sounded a warning of bigger and better things to come when defeating Saint Rock by six lengths over 512 metres in 29.66 seconds at Tara Raceway on January 17.

A week later, over 400 metres, he clocked a near record 22.71 seconds.

The Summer Classic, first run in 2015, is an age-restricted event for dogs and bitches whelped on or after January 1 two years' prior.

It looked an ideal race for Justice For All who was whelped in January 2019.

In the past the classic had served up some pretty handy winners - Cryer's Ricky, Menzel Boys, Hutch and Galactic Panther - all reached the Mount Gambier Cup final the following month.

This year also attracted a pretty fair line-up.

Justice For All made it through to the final after leading all the way and defeating first

starter Boombox Hammer by 1½ lengths in 29.79 seconds.

As it turned out this was the fastest of the three heats, although Richards perhaps had hoped for a little more.

Maybe, but one thing is for sure, he would have been more than happy with the black dog's all-the-way win in the final.

He was never going to be beaten from box one, eventually running out a 6½ lengths winner over rank outsider Don't Forget Kev and Crush Your Enemy - the winner's litter brother and kennelmate.

Speaking after the win - his first to carry a presentation rug - the 56-year-old trainer was quick to acknowledge the efforts of his greyhound "checker".

"Look, I don't want to go into any details but I attribute much of the success I'm currently enjoying to the person checking my greyhounds on a regular basis," he said.

Richards said he was now looking at today's Murray Bridge Cup heats (455m) with Justice For All, a winner at the track over 395 metres in mid-February.

"All being well, I'd then like to have him back here for the Mount Gambier Cup," he said.

"At the moment Justice For All is referred to as Jack Wells' brother.

"Who knows, a bit of success in the cups with him might even reverse the reference."

Last Sunday's win was the start of another big day at Tara Raceway for Richards who finished with a running treble and 14 local wins this year after the classic winner's sister Butter Up Again and Contrail were also successful.

Butter Up Again and Blue Bonnet slogged it out in the Williams Crane Hire Stake (400m), the former eventually winning by a neck in 23.47 seconds.

Contrail matched motors with Sianna Magic for much of the Gordon Refrigeration Stake (400m) before running out a half-length winner in 23.49 seconds.

The running treble was the second this year for Richards at Tara Raceway.

On Sunday, January 24 he won successive races with Two Hands George, Justice For All and Jervois Bruit who had staged a mighty effort to defeat Another Pick and kennelmate Almighty Stripe over 400 metres.

Meanwhile, Richards, assisted at last Sunday's meeting by Tanya Bialek, also had Sketchy Gun engaged in the Bourne Kennels Masters Stake (305m).

At 6½ years of age, the son of Brett Lee and Motown Girl is one of the oldest greyhounds racing in SA.

All told, he has now raced on 167 occasions for 23 wins and 59 minor placings.

His last win was at Gawler over 400 metres in September.

A winner of the Christmas Challenge at Tara Raceway in 2018, Sketchy Gun was purchased by Richards in May 2016 for \$1000 from Allan Ivers of Newcastle after two unplaced runs at Muswellbrook and Tamworth.

He has now won \$43,000.

Regaining a winning edge

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HOW often do you see a horse strike winning form at roughly the same time each year?

The fact it happens on a regular basis suggests it is more than a coincidence.

Joining that list last weekend was local galloper Kyshaka (\$8.50-\$11-\$9.50) who was the saving grace for Limestone Coast trained gallopers in the final race at Murray Bridge.

A dozen local horses headed to Gifford Hill (Murray Bridge) to race for the day and things looked bleak until the Peter Hardacre trained performer sprinted clear to win the 1800-metre event for horses who had won one metropolitan race previously.

That was the five-year-old mare's first win since saluting at the same venue over a mile on January 15 last year.

The pleasing aspect of the 2.5 length victory was the fact it was Kyshaka's first try beyond 1700 metres.

The win was the icing on the cake for winning apprentice Stacey Metcalfe, a relative newcomer to South Australian riding ranks, as it gave her a treble (all in successive races) for the day.

Anyone who got the Metcalfe ridden TAB treble at Murray Bridge have no monetary worries for a while with the dividend of \$21,577.

Furthermore, it was her first ride for the Hardacre stable and her second treble since arriving in South Australia late last year.

"I've been trying to get her for a while to ride some of my horses as she looked like a well balanced apprentice and her three-kilogram claim certainly helps," Hardacre commented.

For the in-form Hardacre it was his ninth winner in the first two months of 2021.

"Kyshaka has been consistent without winning this preparation and her win on Saturday was a lot like her performance at Murray Bridge just over a year ago."

It was Kyshaka's eighth run this campaign for one win, two seconds and a third.

Hardacre is looking at a run in Adelaide in a fortnight's time or a Friday night race at Moonee Valley for Kyshak's next start.

VERY POSITIVE SIGNS

WE finally caught up with Glenburnie track manager David Shepherdson last Monday to get his latest assessment of the course proper.

"The kikuyu grass is in a really good position with its roots down to 200mm and spraying is continuing to eradicate the puaa," Shepherdson stated.

"Currently the thatch layer is down to around 40-50mm and it needs to get to 100mm to race on it, so we are about half way there.

MAKING AN IMPACT

SOUTH Australian racing overall seems to be on the rise, helped in no small way by a couple of apprentice jockeys.

Jessica Eaton made the move from Victoria last year (via Mount Gambier) to be based with the Michael Hickmott stable at Murray Bridge and her career has really taken off.

So much so that Eaton clearly leads both the senior jockey and apprentice's premiership ladders for metropolitan racing.

With 48 winners so far, Eaton is eight in front of Todd Pannell with Jason Holder (34) seven wins clear of Barend Vorster for third spot.

Eaton is a regular rider here in the Limestone Coast and has ridden five winners this season but was out of the limelight at Penola last week where she could not manage a placing from five rides.

The efforts of local apprentice Jacob Opperman has been well documented in recent times and he dominates Limestone Coast racing at present.

Opperman rode another metropolitan winner last Saturday on the even-money favourite Outlaws Revenge at Murray Bridge for Morphettville trainer Ryan Balfour.

Then on Sunday at Balaklava, Opperman had success aboard Hateech (\$6.50) for the Richard and Chantelle stable.

Another youngster to impress in a short space of time - but not on the same level as the above-mentioned pair - is Ben Price, son of former top jockey Simon Price and younger brother of Will who is starting to make a name for

himself in Victoria.

Ben Price only started his career a couple of months ago and has already booted home several winners, including a cup victory with Von Costa Glass in last month's Naracoorte Cup.

EDENHOPE CUP TOMORROW

OVER the years, the Edenhope Race Club has relied on - and always received - strong support from both the public and trainers from the Limestone Coast for its cup meeting in early March.

So, Edenhope officials breathed a sigh of relief when the Victorian border reopened recently and our trainers have, as usual, supported Edenhope cup day tomorrow extremely well.

When nominations closed on Tuesday, 25 local gallopers were entered for the eight-race card.

Among the Limestone Coast nominations for the Edenhope Cup were Farooq, Dr Dee Dee, Dyagilev and Bossy Britches.

Yet again, the Edenhope club (which only has one meeting a year) has been poorly treated by Racing Victoria in regards to scheduling of meetings with Stawell racing today and Warrnambool on Monday.

Anyone thinking of heading to Edenhope tomorrow should note Racing Victoria regulations still stipulate everyone has to pre-register their attendance with the club (0418 659 016), no later than today.

Meanwhile, the Port Lincoln club over on Eyre Peninsula is having a boom season in regards to race fields and today stages the \$52,250 Port Lincoln Cup.

Interest from this region in the cup (at 3.50pm) will be centred upon the Mil-

licent owned Bear Arms, formerly trained by the late Ned Walker and now with Port Lincoln trainer Simon Drewitt..

STAKE MONEY BOOSTED FOR GOLD CUP

JUST eight days until the running of the Mount Gambier Gold Cup for harness racing, a night always well supported by the local sporting fraternity.

Country pacing cups in South Australia are currently \$10,000 events but the Mount Gambier club has chipped in an extra \$2,000 to make it \$12,000 this year.

With \$8,000 on offer for both the Mount Gambier derby and trotter's cup, along with another two races offering \$7,000 each, Mount Gambier officials are expecting - and needing - an influx of more horses from Victoria than we have seen so far this season.

As usual, there will be plenty of entertainment for the family and local form guru Trevor Dent will operate the punters club for those who would like an interest in the local races.

It will be a co-share meeting with Port Pirie and the final fields (and times) will be released next Wednesday afternoon.

At this stage, Mount Gambier officials have not been notified whether Mount Gambier will be the first cab off the rank followed by Port Pirie, or vice versa.

HIGHLIGHTS of racing at Penola last week were doubles to leading trainer Sue Murphy, Adelaide jockey Jason Holder and Mingbool apprentice Jacob Opperman.

Horses to follow from the meeting are the Mount Gambier pair, Bossy Britches and Royal Mile.

Bossy Britches had a charmed run when successful the previous start at Naracoorte but came from last at Penola in the 2100-metre BM 64 to dispose of her rivals with consummate ease.

Royal Mile was heavily backed (\$11-\$6.50) in the 1100-metre class two handicap and flashed home late for second at his first start out of maiden class.

Five of the eight favourites won, while the best backed runner all day was Bullet Kid (\$17-\$5) in the BM 54 handicap who also ran second.

MEMBERS AREA DOUBLED

A RECENT day at Warrnambool races revealed the members area has been doubled in size and refurbished.

The Matilda Room, as it is known, has been completed in time for the big three-day carnival at Warrnambool in the first week of May.

On Monday, Warrnambool will host the first meeting of the Australian jumping season with two hurdles and a steeplechase programmed.

Shark back on the menu

FISHING

THE weather over the weekend was not the best, but we did have a few opportunities for the keen anglers to get among the fish, with a few nice captures reported.

The offshore news was a bit thin but there were some nice fish caught.

The Southerly Fishing Charters crew put their clients onto some nice shark and mixed bottom fish, with some of their sharks being up near the 20kg mark.

There has been no real hot spot out there, but anywhere from 50 through to 100 metres and beyond is worth a look.

Just find some features on the bottom, be it a reef or rock and you are in with a good chance.

There have still been no signs of tuna yet, but no one is too concerned.

We still have a long way to go in this season.

The surf fishos have been into some reasonable fish, with a few crews hitting the Corong and I have heard of plenty of gummy shark.

There have not been any particular hot spots but the general consensus is the higher you go, the better the fishing.

I have heard of a few nice gummy shark caught around the Canunda area and a handful of smaller mulloway.

There are also some nice big salmon kicking around at the moment which are great fresh bait.

There has been plenty of snapper off the surf this week around Nene Valley.

I have seen pictures of fish around 60cm from that area but plenty of smaller fish around 40-50cm.

There have been more snapper caught land based at Orwell Rocks, Factory Bay and Browns Beach. I have heard of a handful of elephant sharks this week and although the size has not been big, they are still a tasty capture.

Snapper fishos out in the boats are still landing some nice fish.

The big stir over the weekend has been excellent for the snaps, with just about every hot spot firing up.

Orwell Rocks, Flinty Point, Danger Point and Green Point have all been excellent, just to name a few.

There seems to be millions of juvenile snapper around at the moment.

Sometimes it does not matter where you go, they are just in plague numbers.

It is good to see such big numbers of snapper in our local waters and in the next few years they should be absolute rippers.

There has still been a few other species around our inshore kelp beds this week.

Gummy shark, silver trevally, whiting and squid have all been boated, just to name a few.

Whiting fishing has been red hot yet again this week.

I have seen some nice catches from the Racecourse Bay area, through to the Port MacDonnell breakwater and out the other side to Carpenter Rocks.

Most of the sandholes around ribbon weed beds will hold whiting.

It is just a matter of getting out there and having a crack.

Craig fished Sunday evening at Carpenter Rocks and managed his 10 fish in next to no time - some as big as 46cm.

Garfishos have had it tough the last couple of weeks with the wind and tides working against one and other but the forecast for the coming weekend looks like things should turn around.

There has still been some nice catches in the early mornings and late afternoons, but this week should really kick back into gear.

The inland fishos hitting Rocklands Reservoir have been having an absolute ball trolling Daiwa double clutch lures around the snags.

There have been some nice yellowbelly boated and even the odd cod in the same areas. There are still plenty of trout up there which will readily take a double clutch too.

Lake Charlegrark has still been fishing well for those targeting Murray cod.

Trollers have been doing well on chatterbaits and spinnerbaits in bright colours, while the bait fishos have done the best on chicken chunks.

There are some pretty big fish in there now, and it would not surprise me if we see a fish of a metre or more soon.

The Glenelg River has fished well again this week. We are starting to see a bit more consistency with the bream and estuary perch.

Up until now they have been fairly sporadic in their feeding, but there seems to be a bit more happening now.

They are well spread and I know of fish from down the front on the sand, all the way up in the snags.

Trust your sounder, have a crack and you will be surprised. Mulloway reports are thin, but there have been a few reports of fish from the estuary.

They are not massive but just legal to

around 80cm which is a great start.

Hopefully over the coming weeks we start to see a few more pop up around the place.

The forecast for the long weekend does not look too bad at this stage, so let's hope it gets better from here on in.

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Small field but big scores
