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Firies sound 'age' alarm

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MOUNT Gambier's Metropolitan Fire Service is operating with ageing and unreliable trucks with crews fearful of a mid-emergency breakdown, a fire fighter union official has warned.

The issue has been compounded by a 13-year-old pump truck, which was sent to Adelaide for repairs, being replaced with a 24-year-old appliance, considered a last resort option for crews given its age.

United Fire Fighters Union state secretary Max Adlam (pictured) said under-resourcing was hurting MFS crews across the state, revealing Mount Gambier firefighters had stripped equipment from one truck before sending it to Adelaide for repair, fearing the gear would be taken to fill other crews' needs.

MP vote slammed

MEMBER for MacKillop Nick McBride's support for overhauling the state's abortion laws has resulted in growing disquiet within the conservative electorate, with a Christian advocacy body urging constituents to reconsider their vote ahead of the 2022 state election.

Around 70 people attended meetings in Mount Gambier and Naracoorte hosted by the Australian Christian Lobby to discuss the Termination of Pregnancy Bill, which was passed in parliament last month.

Mr McBride was among the 29 parliamentarians and one of the only country MPs who voted to overhaul the state's abortion laws. But Australian Christian Lobby South Australian director Christopher Brohier slammed the MacKillop MP for "knowingly voting against the wishes of his electorate".

Crime rate decline

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CRIME is on the decline across most townships within the Limestone Coast, with property and trespass-related crimes drastically declining across a number of Limestone Coast areas

over the last five years.

Despite the fall in general crime, serious assaults and illegal use of a motor vehicle figures have increased by more than 50pc in some areas.

An analysis conducted by *The Border Watch* has found a steady crime decline in Mount

Gambier over the last five years, from 1226 reported offences in 2015/16 to 1072 reported offences in 2019/20 - marking a 12.5pc decrease.

Serious criminal trespass offences have fallen by more than 37pc in Mount Gambier and theft-related offences - including theft

from shops and "other" - has also decreased.

While basic assault reports have decreased by 45pc, serious assault numbers are up by 56pc in Mount Gambier, with 172 offences reported in 2019/20.

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Crime rate on decline

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While basic assault reports have decreased by 45pc, serious assault numbers are up by 56pc in Mount Gambier, with 172 offences reported in 2019/20.

However, theft from a motor vehicle has increased by 11pc and the illegal use of a motor vehicle - which includes driving, using or interfering with a car without obtaining the consent of the owner - has increased by 54pc.

Crime has fallen in Millicent by 8.7pc over the same period, with 198 offences ranging from assault, theft, serious criminal trespass, property damage and the illegal use of a motor vehicle in 2019/20 compared to 217 offences in 2015/16.

Bordertown's crime rates have fallen by 13pc over the last five years, while Kingston recording the largest decrease - 51pc - with just 38 reported offences in 2019/20. Naracoorte crime numbers have jumped by 32pc, with a majority of the 215 offences reported in 2019/20 relating to property damage (113).

Comparatively, 65 property damage-related offences were reported in Naracoorte in 2015/16.

Other theft-related offences has increased by 48pc over the last five years in Naracoorte, serious criminal trespass is up 16pc and serious assault reports have risen by 51pc.

Crime has also significantly increased in some rural areas, jumping more than 36pc in Moorak and 75pc in Worrolong.

In 2015/16, six offences were reported in Worrolong compared to 24 offences ranging from property damage, theft and assault in 2019/20.

Limestone Coast police officer in charge Superintendent Phil Hoff told *The Border Watch* the Limestone Coast Local Service Area has one of the lowest rates of crime per capita in South Australia, but said the low rates of crime can result in a disproportionate perception of crime due to the relatively low numbers involved.

"Every day we review reported crime data with other available intelligence to determine

what strategy we will employ to prevent crime and maximise the use of our local police," he said.

"Major drivers for us include road safety, persons causing alarm in the community because of deteriorating mental health, property damage, theft, assaults - generally within the home or a familial setting as a result of family violence.

"The reasons for changes in crime rates can vary, but generally, the vast majority of crime is committed by a handful of people.

"Many of that small cohort of criminal offenders are largely transient and move from place to place around the Local Service Area, often occurrences in crime marries with their movement."

Supt Hoff said police had sought to encourage people to report crime, particularly instances of family violence to allow authorities to help in intervention opportunities.

"Increased reporting is therefore not necessarily a sign of increased crime rates and on occasions reflect the confidence of the community to report," he said.

"We continue to encourage our community to report suspicious behaviour so that we have an opportunity to investigate and pre-

vent crime before it occurs.

"Sometimes information about suspicious behaviour is the last piece to the jigsaw puzzle to help us investigate crime and apprehend those responsible."

Supt Hoff's comments follow a report released by Crime Stoppers SA, which revealed a record number of calls to Crime Stoppers - 20,240 - answered in 2020. Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services Minister Vincent Tarzia said the record number of calls to Crime Stoppers demonstrated that South Australians are vigilant and protective of their community. "We are the first South Australian Government to directly fund Crime Stoppers with more than \$800,000," he said.

"South Australians deserve to feel safe and Crime Stoppers is one way we can protect the community at a grassroots level."

Falling crime rates in Millicent and Bordertown has prompted the state's Court Authority to scale back Magistrate Court circuits at both locations and increase the frequency of sitting dates in Naracoorte.

Millicent circuits will sit every two months, Bordertown will sit every three months and Naracoorte circuit will increase to two times a month.

A Magistrates Court spokesperson said a review had been undertaken last year to ensure the efficiency of court operations.

"The Magistrates Court regularly reviews the workload of the region as a whole to ensure the best use of court resources in relation to circuit locations and frequency," the spokesperson said.

"The number of cases in Bordertown has fallen, fewer sittings are required at Millicent and the need for further sitting time in Naracoorte has become evident.

"The circuit dates in Naracoorte were increased which also has the effect of absorbing any cases that might not be accommodated in the reduced circuits in Millicent and Bordertown.

"A review of all circuit locations will take place periodically to monitor how the changes have affected numbers."

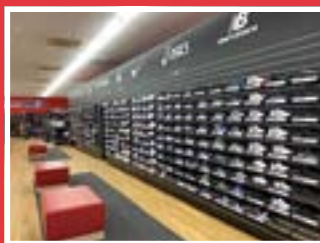

New upgrade ready to roll

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TENPIN bowling in the Limestone Coast has been secured long-term thanks to a \$500,000 upgrade to Mount Gambier's Kaboom Family Entertainment facility.

The family entertainment empire - which includes Treehouse Adventure Centre - continues to expand with the official unveiling of a brand new interactive gaming system and pin-drop machinery at the bowling alley.

A new retail store with Elizabeth Street frontage has also been created on the ground floor - combined with a nine-hole mini golf course and virtual entertainment hub - delivering stage two of a three-tier overhaul of the entertainment site.

Kaboom managing director Stewart Owen said the professional entrance - which includes a wide array of Marvel-themed giftware - was a major progression for the business, which previously used an unassuming side entrance to its second floor venue.

Mr Owen said the pin machinery upgrade would provide significant safety and efficiency benefits for staff and patrons, with interactive screens now allowing players to control a majority of aspects within the game.

This includes group photos, player names, use of bumpers, as well as the ability to launch mini games.

"We have had a lot of issues with our machinery with pins getting jammed or stuck in the gutters," Mr Owen said.

"Staff were forever running out the back but this will fix that," he said.

"If we do have a problem, we will get a message on our phones before the customer even knows something is going on."

Mr Owen said improving reliability was a

key focus in the stage two development, with plans for a third stage to resurface lanes and connected approaches.

"We have to make the game run from frame one through to frame 10 without issue," Mr Owen said.

"The scoring system was \$150,000 alone so that's quite a lot of games we have to sell but it will be worth it in the long run," he said.

"We've bought the best of the best."

The new pin-drop machines feature pins attached to string, which retracts pins and

keeps them connected to internal machinery, as opposed to having to be mechanically reset.

The emerging technology is set to become the new industry standard and while it has not been without differing opinions, it has been shown to only increase scores by an average of two pins per game.

Mr Owen said the new retail store provided a more welcoming first point of contact for patrons and helped secure the mini golf long-term.

While acknowledging the investment was

significant given the impacts felt by entertainment venues due to COVID-19, Mr Owen said the pandemic would not halt his plans.

"We have a fantastic group of families here in the Limestone Coast, we have absolutely loved it," Mr Owen said.

"There is no fear, I guess.

"I don't say that arrogantly, I'm very humbled by the level of support we get from the community."

Kaboom Family Entertainment will officially unveil its new upgrade this weekend.

Further COVID restrictions eased

SOUTH Australian venues will soon be able to host more people after the State Government announced a significant easing of restrictions.

From March 31, the density requirement will be lifted from one person per two square metres to three people per four square metres. Dance floor capacity limits will be re-

moved for venues which cater for up to 1000 people.

Venues which cater for up to 1000 people with fixed seating - such as cinemas, churches and seated entertainment - can operate at 100pc capacity if masks are worn.

Meanwhile, international passenger flights to Victoria will resume following

comprehensive expert reviews into the management of new highly-infectious, rapidly changing variants of coronavirus.

From April 8, flights will start with an arrivals cap of 800 people per week and increasing to 1120 per week subject to capacity and the completion of ventilation works at quarantine hotels.

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Ageing fleet takes its toll

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MOUNT Gambier's Metropolitan Fire Service is operating with ageing and unreliable trucks with crews fearful of a mid-emergency breakdown, a fire fighter union official has warned.

The issue has been compounded by a 13-year-old pump truck, which was sent to Adelaide for repairs, being replaced with a 24-year-old appliance, considered a last resort option for crews given its age.

The station's current lead truck is an 18-year-old appliance - three years beyond the government-recommended replacement age of 15 years - but that vehicle is also scheduled for repair in the coming weeks.

United Fire Fighters Union state secretary Max Adlam said under-resourcing was hurting MFS crews across the state, revealing Mount Gambier firefighters had stripped equipment from one truck before sending it to Adelaide for repair, fearing the gear would be taken to fill other crews' needs.

Visiting the city this week to meet with

MFS firefighters and Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell ahead of a planned mass rally in Adelaide next Thursday, Ms Adlam said firefighters were taking unprecedented action after years of "making do" and "covering the gaps".

The protest follows around 18 months of enterprise bargaining agreement negotiations, with Ms Adlam stating firefighters were happy to accept a "modest" pay increase but were being "stonewalled" on resourcing.

Ms Adlam said the city's appliances were without burnover protection and thermal imaging cameras, which she considered both essential components of fire-fighting.

Describing MFS crews as "ragged trousered philanthropists" who love their job and make it work despite being under-resourced, Ms Adlam called for the MFS and State Government - the dual employer of firefighters - to deliver an asset management plan for crews.

"We know we can't get everything at once but when something reaches the end of its natural life, it ought to be replaced in a planned way," Ms Adlam said.

"Firefighters make things work and in a way we've covered the problem up for too long," she said.

"In the past there would have been a fleet of spares - now we have trucks being worked on for more than six months."

Ms Adlam said investment in the engineering department was a priority given 40pc of the state's appliances were beyond 15 years old, adding regional stations appeared to be "the poor cousin" of metropolitan crews.

"They hide these old trucks out in the regions and because they look shiny and bright and our people get out there and do the job, nobody realises," Ms Adlam said.

"It has been spiraling down to a place where it isn't going to be recovered from unless we do something."

South Australian Emergency Services Minister Vincent Tarzia said the government was committed to ensuring the safety of hardworking firefighters and had provided more than \$67.5m in additional funding to the MFS since March 2018.

Mr Tarzia said the MFS currently had 12 new heavy urban appliances on order following additional funding of \$3.2m

in 2018/19 and a further \$11.5m in the 2020/21 State Budget, forming part of the government's overall \$97.5m plan to create a more bushfire resilient South Australia.

An extra \$2.8m is supporting the construction of a Heavy Aerial appliance.

"I met with Fraser Fire and Rescue representatives virtually in February and have a follow-up meeting later this month," Mr Tarzia said.

"They have advised me the first of the 12 appliances will be delivered in April."

However, Ms Adlam said despite claims of increased funding, she did not believe it had positively impacted on resourcing.

"We don't think the budget is enough," Ms Adlam said, adding Productivity Commission data showed South Australia's MFS was funded almost \$30 per person less in 2018/19 compared to the national average.

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Funds flow to region

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GRANT District Council have won a \$850,000 State Government grant towards the multi-million dollar upgrade of the Mount Gambier and District Saleyards.

The major infrastructure project, which includes a 13,600m² cattle roof, holding pen reconfigurations and the installation of solar panels at the Glenburnie site, is among three council-led projects awarded funding under the government's Local Government Infrastructure Partnership Program.

Mount Gambier City Council were successful in obtaining \$800,000 for a shared walking and cycling path extension from Wandilo Road to Wireless Road West, while Kingston District Council will receive \$662,000 to reinvigorate the Cape Jaffa Lighthouse.

Treasurer Rob Lucas said the program was expected to support hundreds of local jobs, with construction required to start on the projects within the next 12 months.

Grant District Council chief executive Darryl Whicker said the funding will help progress the \$5m transformative project, which is also reliant on a Federal Government contribution.

"Our council aims to undertake the ultimate asset renewal and this particular funding will help leverage additional funding from the Federal Government," he said.

"We are grateful to the State Government for the funding and we have had terrific support putting the grant application together.

"The funding is also excellent recognition for the role local councils have played in sup-

porting the economy and the community throughout the COVID-19 crisis and in the case of Grant District Council, we have provided relief for those who have been impacted by the pandemic.

"I think in lieu of that, the State Government has repaid the faith in terms of this project and continue to help the Limestone Coast's economic recovery."

Real-time fuel pricing launch

LIMESTONE Coast residents can now shop around for cheaper petrol following the launch of real time fuel pricing information.

Under the State Government-led scheme, which will run as a trial for two years, all South Australian fuel retailers will be required to report prices to a central database within 30 minutes of a change.

Service stations that fail to comply could face penalties ranging from a \$550 expiation fee to a maximum penalty of \$10,000.

The scheme follows an extensive review undertaken by the South Australian Productivity Commission into the issue which assessed models in other Australian jurisdictions to find a suitable solution for the state.

The Productivity Commission found both options in place around Australia – either the Western Australian model where prices are frozen for 24 hours, or in other jurisdictions where outlets must report any pricing changes – benefited motorists.

The commission estimates access to real-time fuel pricing information will save motorists more than \$3m each year.

RAA fuel expert Mark Borlace said rising

fuel costs were placing an extra cost of living burden on households and encouraged motorists to take advantage of the "money saving tool".

"RAA has long campaigned for real-time fuel price apps because – unlike the previous ones – they will include every retail outlet and are updated within 30 minutes of the price being changed," he said.

"Motorists will welcome the introduction of real-time fuel pricing because it will give them the information they need to find the cheapest fuel no matter where they are in the state."

Mr Borlace said the RAA will be offering real-time pricing data free to all motorists on its myRAA app to help individuals locate the cheapest prices on the market and save money at the pump.

Unclaimed super tips \$77m

LIMESTONE Coast residents are encouraged to check if they are entitled to part of an estimated \$77m in unclaimed superannuation across the Barker electorate.

Workers may have lost or unclaimed super if they have changed their name, moved jobs or changed addresses, or forgotten to update details with their super fund in the last few years.

Last superannuation refers to inactive super fund accounts and ones that have lost contact with their fund member.

By law, the fund is required to transfer certain accounts to the Australian Taxation Office,

which then becomes unclaimed super money.

Around \$13.8m of super remains lost or unclaimed in the 5290 postcode, with a further \$2.5m unaccounted for in the 5291 area.

Naracoorte's 5271 district (\$3.5m) and Millicent's 5280 area (\$2.2m) also have substantial unclaimed amounts.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin encouraged residents to log into MyGov to check for lost super with the ATO.

"In a few clicks you could boost your super balance," Mr Pasin said.

Qantas to touch down

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THE Flying Kangaroo will be wheels up for the first time in Mount Gambier this weekend, with the first Qantas flight arriving in the Limestone Coast on Sunday morning.

Flight QF2215 departing from Melbourne is expected to touch down in Mount Gambier at 10.25am and will be followed by the first departure to Adelaide an hour later.

From March 28, Qantas will operate five weekly return flights from Mount Gambier to both Melbourne and Adelaide.

The flights will be operated by the airline's 50-seat Q300 turboprop aircraft, which feature upgraded cabin interiors, and will offer 500 seats on each route per week.

A spectacular water salute - a ceremoni-

al aviation tradition to honour new airlines - will mark the start of Qantas' services at the Mount Gambier Regional Airport on Sunday.

Rival Regional Express (Rex), which slammed Qantas' expansion as "predatory behaviour", has launched throughfare tickets to from Mount Gambier to Sydney and Coolangatta.

The \$208 tickets are available through the airline's website until March 31 and no travel period restrictions apply.

Rex general manager network strategy Warrick Lodge said the flights represented exceptional value for money.

"When you combine the attractive thru-fare pricing with the ability for Rex passengers to check-in to their final domestic destination, including the seamless transfer of baggage, it is something that we see as a game-changer for regional communities," he said.

Christians slam MP

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MEMBER for MacKillop Nick McBride's support for overhauling the state's abortion laws has resulted in growing disquiet within the conservative electorate, with a Christian advocacy body urging constituents to reconsider their vote ahead of the 2022 state election.

Around 70 people attended meetings in Mount Gambier and Naracoorte hosted by the Australian Christian Lobby to discuss the Termination of Pregnancy Bill, which was passed in parliament last month.

Mr McBride was among the 29 parliamentarians and one of the only country MPs who voted to overhaul the state's abortion laws. But Australian Christian Lobby South Australian director Christopher Brohier slammed the MacKillop MP for "knowingly voting against the wishes of his electorate".

"The Hansard, which records everything that was said, records McBride stood up towards the end of debate and said 'I am pro-choice, but my electorate is pro-life,'" he said.

"He knew what he was doing."

Mr Brohier conceded although the bill was "always going to pass" the state's lower house, the advocacy body had lobbied to ensure significant amendments were made to the original bill, including outlawing sex selection abortion, changes to conscientious objection provisions and require provision of information about counselling.

He said two amendments moved by Environment Minister David Spears centred on tightening provisions for late-term abortions

were also rejected by Mr McBride, but commended Mount Gambier MP Troy Bell for voting in support of the changes.

"It's not just that we can vote every four years, we have to be involved and let the members know what we really think and what they do will affect how we vote for them," Mr Brohier said. "If you don't like what they do on this fundamental issue, you can vote them out and you should."

"I know there is a huge amount of anger in country seats and there's talk of running independent candidates."

"What I want to encourage you to do is join with people in MacKillop to hold McBride accountable because he voted against it. "Why should you give your allegiance to the Liberal Party?"

In a letter to constituents opposing the bill, Mr McBride said he had carefully listened to the electorates views, as well as the current law, evidence, research and advice.

Mr McBride said late-term abortion was principle concern, but backed the bill because

of inclusions which, in addition to professional medical standards, will restrict the potential for later term terminations to occur.

"Late term abortions would only happen in limited circumstances, and only if agreed by two medical practitioners," he said.

"The agreement by two medical practitioners is important as they are responsible for assessing all relevant health and well-being matters associated with a termination."

Mr McBride said he had discussed the bill with health professionals and said in rare circumstances, serious foetal anomalies can be detected late in a pregnancy.

"Pregnancies presented late may also be associated with drug use, incest, and mental conditions such as psychosis which, if not managed, could result in harm to both the mother and the foetus," he said.

"These are extreme examples, but illustrate that decision making in relation to a termination is complex and requires the guidance and support of a professional medical team."

Conservative party to run in Limestone Coast

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PRE-SELECTION will soon open for the conservative Australian Family Party in the Federal seat of Barker and the state seats of MacKillop and Mount Gambier in a bid to counter the "disappointment of the major parties" across the nation.

Former Family First Senator Bob Day has launched a political comeback, pledging to focus on family resilience, family economics, family technology, freedom of speech, religious freedom and participation in work.

Mr Day said the Limestone Coast had historically recorded strong results for the former Family First party, polling between 5pc to 8pc at the 2013, 2014 and 2016 state and federal elections.

"We have no reason to believe that will change," he said. "Putting families and farmers first has always been a core part of who we are."

The Family First Party - which was generally considered to be part of the Christian

Right - enjoyed its greatest electoral support in South Australia during its 15 year existence.

The party's best Federal performance was in 2013, with Barker candidate Kristin Lambert receiving 7.96pc of first preferences.

At the 2016 election, Family First candidate for Barker Yvonne Zeppel recorded a decrease and secured 5.7pc of primary votes.

The party first ran candidates in the Limestone Coast at the 2006 election, winning 7pc of first preference votes in MacKillop and 4.1pc in Mount Gambier.

At the 2014 election, the party picked up 7.5pc of first preference votes in MacKillop and 5.1pc of primary votes in Mount Gambier.

In 2017, a merger between former Senator Cory Bernardi's Australian Conservatives and the Family First Party was announced, with Family First to be absorbed into the Conservatives.

Following the amalgamation, the party increased its vote at the March 2018 polls

with MacKillop candidate Richard Bateman securing 8.7pc of the primary vote. In the seat of Mount Gambier, the party suffered a decrease in its primary vote, with candidate Gregg Bisset achieving a vote of 2.2pc in a field of eight candidates.

The date of the federal election has yet to be announced, but is speculated to be held in the final quarter of this year. The state election will be held on March 19, 2022.

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Target closes

TARGET will no longer have a presence in the Limestone Coast after the organisation shuts the doors at the Naracoorte store this weekend.

Following earlier store closures in Mount Gambier and Millicent, Target Country will cease trading at the Smith Street shopfront tomorrow (Saturday).

Last year, parent company Wesfarmers announced a major shake-up of its nationwide network of 284 Target and Target Country stores, including its Limestone Coast sites.

Despite pleas from the Naracoorte Lucindale Council to reconsider the closure, a Target spokesperson said a comprehensive restructure was needed to improve its financial position.

"Ultimately, we need to operate a much smaller number of stores and build a stronger online business, with products that truly meet our customer's needs," the spokesperson said.

Naracoorte Lucindale mayor Erika Vickery previously told The Border Watch the community was disappointed and said she believed the Naracoorte site "has been a very successful store" that had been "caught up in

a lot of corporate closures".

"We are very fortunate that we have got a good electrical shop and good clothes shops as well, but there are some things at Target that aren't sold anywhere else," she said.

"I do know there are people who come to Naracoorte from all over the Limestone Coast to do that sort of shopping so we will certainly miss those people coming in."

Highly prospective oil field find

OIL and gas company Red Sky Energy has completed a petrophysical analysis of its Killanoola project, with the organisation announcing a strong outlook for significant reserve growth from the "highly prospective" Limestone Coast tenement.

The evaluation found 16 metres net pay within a well-developed hydrocarbon column at Killanoola SE-1, which the company said was in stark contrast to original estimates of 1.5m.

Located near Coonawarra in the Penola Trough, the licence covers an area of 17.5km² and was acquired from Adelaide-based Beach Energy last month for an undisclosed price.

Killanoola-1 was drilled in 1998 and initial flow rates were as high as 300 barrels per day, but quickly declined due to the waxy nature of the crude oil.

The company will undertake geological and geophysical works, record a 3D seismic survey over the area and complete a field development plan.

The oil field has estimated oil in place of seven million barrels, with the company estimating modern enhanced oil recovery techniques could be up to 40pc - equating to 2.8 million barrels.

Following the announcement, the state's peak industry representing the resources sector revealed its 12 member companies - which include Beach Energy and Cooper Energy - contributed \$107.7m of direct and indirect spending to the Limestone Coast economy in 2019/20m, equivalent to .9pc of gross regional product.

According to data from the South Australian Chamber of Mines and Energy (SACOME), member companies directly employs 202 people in the region and indirectly supported 525 people in the region.

More than \$26m in wages were paid in 2019/20 to full-time employees in the region and \$34m was spent in supply chain purchases from 114 businesses.

SACOME chief executive Rebecca Knol said the 12 member companies provided a \$5.9b contribution to the state's economy - or 5.3pc of South Australia's gross state product.

She said the data showed the size of the resources sector's contribution to metropolitan Adelaide, adding when considering the highest total economic constriction sorted by state electorate, eight of the top ten divisions benefiting from the resources sector are located in the city.

"The perception of the resources sector only contributing to regions where operations are located is inaccurate," Ms Knol said.

"Our operations may be regionally located but have a whole of state impact."

Meanwhile, Beach Energy has discovered gas at its Artisan 1 well, located off the Victorian coast.

Beach managing director Matt Kay said while the discovery was at the lower end of pre-drill expectations, it was being cased as a future producer.

Lights on for Portland smelter

PORTLAND'S aluminium smelter has been given a five-year \$150m lifeline following a deal struck between energy companies and the Victorian and Federal Government.

Last week, the Victorian Government announced an in-principle funding agreement for Alcoa's Portland Smelter had been reached after the company secured five-year energy generator agreements.

AGL, Alinta Energy and Origin will supply electricity to the facility, which employs approximately 600 employees and contractors - or 14pc jobs in the Portland area - and injects more than \$100m into the Portland

region each year.

The Federal Government has committed to provide \$19m per year for four years, which will be matched by the Andrews Government.

Under the agreement, the facility will see Portland reduce its energy demand at peak times, making more electricity available to the national grid.

At a press conference in Portland last week, Prime Minister Scott Morrison labelled the agreement as a "smart deal" which will secure jobs and "keep the lights on".

Long-time councillor issues amalgamation push warning

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A VETERAN Wattle Range councillor has warned mayor Des Noll against supporting amalgamation, saying the consolidation of local councils had "many dangerous associated with it".

At the March monthly meeting, Mr Noll said there was "no doubt in my mind that amalgamations for several regional councils are imminent", adding potential mergers needed to be considered, particularly in relation to how it will affect the Limestone Coast.

But Millicent-based elected member John Drew urged Mr Noll to proceed with caution on any amalgamation push and suggested councillors undertake "robust discussion" on the issue.

"One of the secrets of good governance and good government is word local in local government," he said.

"I have had a great deal of experience with boards that cover larger areas and I have noticed that the local element disappears completely and things are separately run.

"There are many, many dangers associated with [amalgamation].

"I am wary and cautious."

Mr Noll defended his comments and reiterated it would be "very wise" of every local government agency across the state to discuss the issue, regardless of whether elected members personally supported the move or not.

"It is important to be vigilant and discuss

this issue," he said.

"That conversation would include their individual scale of economies, community accountability and long-term viability to be independently sustainable into the future.

"This will further impact directly on a positive economic growth of the Limestone Coast."

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District mayor defends car cost

The article (*"Mayor dodges debt"*, *The Border Watch*, March 12) revisits a motion and decision made some 10 years ago by the Grant District Council elected members.

It is also concerning the information provided to *The Border Watch* comes from council's internal files and the contents are selective and ignores context of the elected members' decision-making at that time.

To understand council's decision-making, we need to understand the background of what was happening 10 to 11 years ago.

We were facing the biggest fight in the South East's history against the SA Government over the "forward sale" of our forests, and I was actively working for our community to try and prevent this decision.

This involved many government, community and stakeholder meetings, I was chair of the newly-formed Forestry Stakeholders Group, there were minutes, agendas, phone calls, letters, working with consultants, forest business owners and forest industry workers, as well as rallies on the steps of parliament.

This fight went on for two years. I was also appointed as a member of the Roundtable that was formed to fight for the conditions on the sale.

Disappointing as it was that the sale went ahead, we negotiated for \$24m to come back into our region from the asset sale for reinvigoration within the timber industry.

This work involved many phone calls in addition to the normal Mayor workload, while my phone bill was approximately \$500 a month.

At this time, there was not an option for the capped phone plans that are available today.

You paid for each phone call by logged times.

To compare the two is misleading. As a small business owner, I was also wearing the cost from this unexpected workload.

I had made a huge commitment to our community to fight the sale while still trying to run my two small businesses and keeping up with the day-to-day running of the council.

I did approach the council and agreed to contribute \$16,698 towards the costs of the motor vehicle.

I had only just been elected as Mayor and was new to this role.

I went into this agreement in good faith without fully realising the amount of time needed and its impact on my business and family. They were tough times.

I had no money at the time to contribute, and my business was just surviving.

I went to council with a proposal of six alternative ways so they could move forward when I realised what was happening.

I presented to council with the above information and withdrew from the meeting for them to discuss and make a decision.

Council decided to sell the Landcruiser and trade it on a Ford Ranger PX XLT 4 x 4 crew cab and purchased that in June 2012.

The particulars were a Toyota Landcruiser purchased in March 2011 for \$70,816.92 (ex GST).

The trade-in price in June 2012 was \$62,727.27 (ex GST)

The Ford Ranger XLT Ute, purchased in 2012, was \$39,990 (ex GST)

Council received a cash surplus from the sale \$22,737.27.

Council's decision to replace the vehicle with a Ford Ranger XLT Ute meant the vehicle changeovers were less than what had been budgeted.

This resulted in a profit paid to the council from the changeover of \$22,737.27.

So in fact there was no outstanding debt.

Council had recouped its investment with the changeover at that time.

I was grateful for the decision councillors made 10 years ago.

Councillors also considered my family circumstances.

My wife and daughter were living in Adelaide for over four months before the birth of my very premature granddaughter and associated health risks my daughter was facing.

It should also be noted the remuneration package, after I was appointed as Mayor,

dropped by \$4000 10 months later, and it has taken 12 years for the remuneration level to return to what it was for the previous mayor.

To the people out there who really know me, I have always put the community first and at times to my own and my family's detriment.

I have willingly made many personal sacrifices to do this job.

I fight for community causes because I do represent the ratepayers and the community, I take up issues that need to be addressed, and I do look at things outside the box with a different perspective to many others, as this delivers results for our community.

I accept at times I don't get it right too.

I respect the position I hold as mayor. No-one can say I have not been committed to this role.

I am a quiet achiever who just gets the job done and you have no idea how many hours I have put into council.

It certainly is more than a full-time job.

I am proud of the District Council of Grant for what we do for our community, along with our dedicated staff.

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Public in the dark on notices

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SOUTH Australian Labor has slammed the State Government for voting against a requirement for public notices to be printed in local newspapers, with Limestone Coast MLC Clare Scriven labelling the move as an "onslaught" against regional publications.

Under changes supported by the Liberal Party, the Greens and independent John Darley, it will no longer be compulsory for councils to publish public notices - including information relating to consultation, meetings, development and planning issues - in newspapers that only circulates in their community.

Labor upper house MP Emily Bourke said the change will have a lasting negative impact on regional papers and regional communities, telling the chamber "very few, if any rate-payers, will turn to a website or Google the South Australian Gazette in search of a public notice that is relevant to their lives".

"This will hit hard in our regional communities where many do not have access to reliable internet," she said.

"People must not be excluded from civic engagement because they cannot afford or access the internet." In opposing Labor's amendment to insert the requirement back into the legislation, Treasurer Rob Lucas said the mandatory requirement was expensive for some councils and did not necessarily reflect a contemporary approach to community engagement.

Mr Lucas cited information provided by the Local Government Association, which he said showed some small regional councils are paying tens of thousands of dollars to comply with the current provisions.

"The cost for small regional councils is

obviously a cost that has to be borne by the ratepayer of the small regional ratepayers of the small regional council for that particular legislative requirement," he said.

But Ms Scriven said the move, which follows the State Government's removal of mandatory notices for Planning and Development and Energy Laws demonstrated the Liberal

Party's continued "onslaught against regional papers".

"This is the latest piece of legislation that has undermined the important work of country newspapers by removing the requirement of government notices to be published in newspapers," she said. ?

"Local newspapers such as The Border Watch are an important means of letting people know about laws that may affect them.

"Many people in the local area don't have reliable internet access.

"It is important that they don't miss out on important information just because the Marshall Liberal Government wants to save a few dollars.

"I have spoken against this in Parliament on a number of occasions, because it is important that regional residents have accessible information, and also because the revenue from these notices are an important part of sustaining regional journalism."

The Border Watch managing editor Brett Kennedy said removing the requirement for public notices to appear in print media alienated community members who are not digitally literate or do not regularly engage in online activity.

"Regional newspapers are a key source of information within their communities, connecting the audience with important news relevant to their daily lives," he said.

"Such government announcements may be of critical importance or of interest to these people and measures should be maintained to ensure maximum dispersal of this information, not limited coverage.

"Both print and digital platforms form part of a broader network of information sources but one medium should not be favoured over the other to ensure government messages are being delivered into all households."

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Victoria to further relax COVID rules

MASKS will no longer be required in retail settings and more visitors will be permitted in private residences under further relaxation of Victoria's COVIDSafe settings tonight.

From 6pm tonight (Friday), individuals will no longer need to wear masks in stores, but Victorians will still need to carry one with them at all times and wear it on public transport, in rideshare vehicles and taxis and in sensitive settings such as aged care facilities and hospitals.

Victorians will be able to host up to 100 people in their home per day.

Outdoor gatherings in public place - the beach, the park - can also increase to 200 people.

Density limits in venues still operating under more restrictive settings - like casinos, nightclubs and karaoke venues - will move from one person to four square metre to one person per two square metre.

Additional people will also be allowed in indoor non-seated entertainment venues with an increase from 50pc to 75pc, but a 1000 cap will remain.

Dancefloors will move to the same density limit of the venue and the 50 patron cap will also be removed.

Busy Walnut Shop cracks in Millicent

A MILLICENT woman has helped reduce the impact of prostate cancer on Australian men, their partners and families one piece of pre-loved clothing at a time.

The Walnut Shop coordinator Wilma Moore has raised more than \$32,000 for the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia since starting the popular op-shop six years ago and hopes to double that amount within the same period.

After being forced to find a new location following the closure of the Rotary Community Market last year, Ms Moore has established a new base in Millicent and has since expanded stock and trading hours.

"When the Rotary Market closed down, I still had a lot of stock left and I really wanted to continue with the shop," she said.

"My husband died of prostate cancer and I had raised a bit more than \$30,000 and I wanted to double it to make it worthwhile."

Staffed completely by volunteers - largely Ms Moore herself - the store stocks clothing, jewellery, books, hats and shoes, with most donations coming from community members.

"Some of the items we have in here are brand new such as the shoes, which have been donated by Maureen Brennan from Sassi," Ms Moore said.

"People are so generous and have donated a lot of items, sometimes I might have to do a little bit of preparation work, but it is all very good quality."

"I've sold beautiful, vintage fur coats before, I have sold some very nice underwear and corsets and a lot of high end designer clothes."

"I had a beautiful wedding dress I sold to a lady in her 80s, which came with a matching handbag and she looked lovely."

Ms Moore said meeting a broad range

of people ranging from "label hunters" to "young lasses getting done up for their deb" was a highlight of the shop.

"We get all kinds of people come in from young kids who are looking for dress up clothes to people who are getting kitted up for weddings and funerals," she said.

"There are a lot of label hunters who come through - people who are looking for brand name clothing and we are lucky to have a lot of great items donated."

"I also get bric-and-brac donated and I have had some really interesting stuff come through. I've got a couple of pewter mugs from the year Australia won the America's Cup, a lot of racing fascinators and at the moment I have an old bowling bowl and shows to match."

Ms Moore hoped to expand the second-hand shop even further in the future and ultimately secure a more prominent location.

"It would be nice to have a shop in the main street, but because I donate everything to prostate cancer I can't pay a lot in rent," she said.

Previous production star and TV legend John Wood urged men to speak up and not ignore how they feel.

"It is a very Australian thing - not just male, necessarily - to feel that it's none of our business and that someone knows what they're doing," Wood said.

"But men need to ask the questions and not ignore their apparent depression or inner pain."

Kingston District Council chief executive Nat Traeger encouraged the community to

support the event.

"Social inclusion and strong social connections are linked to improved quality of life and better health outcomes," Ms Traeger said.

"What better way to connect than over a pint, parmy and play, the former two quintessential Aussie traits which we hope will resonate and draw our community members to the event."

Fringe funding on notice

MEMBER for Mount Gambier Troy Bell has sought a confirmation from Premier Steven Marshall whether an ongoing funding commitment will be provided to support and grow regional Fringe Festival events.

During last week's sitting of parliament, the independent MP asked the state leader recurrent funding will be allocated towards the event as the State Government's three year, \$10,000 commitment expires at the end of 2021.

Mr Bell said the Mount Gambier Fringe has benefitted from the major funding commitment for the last three years, telling the house it would be "very devastating" for the uncertainty of funding to be the catalyst for 2020 being the last event.

"The Marshall Liberal Government has put an extra \$1m in regional events during this year through the 2021-22 Regional

Event Fund," he said.

"As our community recovers from the pandemic, the Fringe is bringing some much-needed life back to the hospitality and entertainment industries, which have been devastated by COVID.

"It is hugely important to ensure that these events continue in regional and rural communities and for our State Government to show its support financially for them to be sustainable."

In response, Mr Marshall said the funding was provided to the Fringe which decisions on funding allocations, adding he did not have details as to what the Adelaide Fringe's future plans entailed.

Mr Marshall said festivals requiring additional money can apply to the South Australian Tourism Commission's regional events and festivals fund.

Staff change but still caring

THE South East Animal Welfare League (SEAWL) will farewell operations coordinator Caitlin Mellor today as she pursues her dream of becoming a qualified veterinary nurse.

Ms Mellor joined SEAWL as a volunteer in 2015 and was employed the following year, with her love of animals - as well as her own pet family - growing exponentially during her time at the welfare site.

Long-time volunteer Marica Perkovic will step into the role left vacant by Ms Mellor, who

will remain in Mount Gambier.

"The only thing that would ever make me leave (SEAWL) is an opportunity to be a vet nurse," Ms Mellor said, describing the profession as highly competitive.

Ms Mellor said she had helped care for hundreds of animals at the Riddoch Highway facility, also adopting three cats and a dog over the six-year period.

"I have done everything from hand-raising kittens, handling dogs and cats and looking af-

ter them when they're unwell or after surgery," Ms Mellor said.

"It has definitely prepared me for what's next."

A former tattoo artist, Ms Perkovic was drawn to SEAWL through an animal studies course focused on greyhounds around five years ago.

After volunteering and filling a weekend paid position, the new operations coordinator said she looked forward to spending more

time on-site.

"It is rewarding to see the turnaround in the animals we get," Ms Perkovic said.

"Someone has to look after the abandoned or lost animals in the community and I'm blessed it is us."

Ms Perkovic said while special connections formed with certain animals, it was never bittersweet when they were adopted.

"You are always happy when you see them take their freedom ride," she said.

Rescue pet transition support

SPECIALIST behavioral training and pet owner education form part of a current South East Animal Welfare League initiative supporting the transition of dogs into their 'forever home'.

A \$5000 Stand Like Stone Foundation grant has allowed SEAWL to offer the service to adoptees living within a 30km radius of the Riddoch Highway site at no cost, spread across up to three two-hour training sessions.

Accredited dog trainer John Laube will deliver behavioral training, education and awareness to promote responsible pet ownership with a view of forming a long-term

and happy relationship between pet and owner.

There is currently less than 10 animals on-site at the facility across its kennels and cattery, all looking for a new home.

SEAWL operations coordinator Trina Twilley said there was a noted increase in adoptions since the COVID-19 pandemic was declared when assessing the availability to adoption ratio.

"People were home more and have taken on a new pet," Ms Twilley said.

She said there was significant interest from Adelaide adoptees due to a shortage in

rescue animals in metropolitan areas.

Ms Twilley also urged all residents to comply with South Australia's dog and cat management laws, including compulsory micro-chipping, as well as mandatory desexing for any dog or cat born after July 1, 2018.

"We still do get some dogs that aren't microchipped or desexed," Ms Twilley said, adding the welfare league had been able to return some animals to their families after microchips were detected.

SEAWL is located on the Riddoch Highway just north of Mount Gambier Regional Airport.

ageing members and dwindling attendance, Mr Beasley implored clubs to improve their public profile by meeting the needs of the community they serve.

"In order for us to be attractive we need to be developing projects which people can relate to," Mr Beasley said.

to raise the normal level of funds to support their projects," he said.

"It is a good opportunity to reset goals and look at what the emerging opportunities are."

Naracoorte sport in concept

NARACOORTE Lucindale Council has appointed Adelaide-based Studio Nine Architect to deliver a full suite of concept designs for the proposed \$20m Naracoorte Regional Sports Centre.

The design and implementation plan will deliver a clear set of outcomes that are staged and costed for future development.

The facility will include four indoor net-

ball and basketball courts, five squash courts, a hydrotherapy pool, a 25m swimming pool and combined and unisex sports clubrooms and change rooms with universally accessible toilets.

Council endorsed the Naracoorte Regional Sports Centre Masterplan in 2019, which was co-funded by the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing. During preparation of the masterplan, significant community and stakeholder

consultation occurred included surveys, interviews, face-to-face meeting and site inspections with current user groups of the site.

Studio Nine Architect director Justin Cuchiarelli said the team will focus on understanding needs to design a centre that meets community needs.

"We will work within the completed masterplan framework and build on the research and consultation that has already been under-

taken, weaving in the history of Naracoorte and the Limestone Coast into the narrative of our final concept design," he said.

Council will also establish a project steering committee to work with architects during design development.

The project is scheduled to start in May 2021 and is anticipated to take four to five months to complete.

Garden gates open to the public gaze

THE gates of a picturesque five-acre Compton property open to the public this weekend as part of the Opens Gardens SA initiative.

Community members will have the opportunity to visit The Post and Rail and view sweeping lawns, beds of roses, perennials, hedges and a collection of young deciduous trees selected for the autumn colour.

Property owner and horticulturalist Cindy Cross - who runs a cooking, gardening and art school on the premises - hoped to provide visitors with a genuine, home-grown experience.

"I really want people to immerse themselves in the garden and not just stop and stare at the plants - I expect people to taste the tomato on the vine and I have an apple tree that is ripe and I will encourage people to pick an apple off of the tree," she said.

"I don't have any fancy soils or fancy ovens, so when people come I hoped it provides them with confidence to try something different for themselves and then share it with their family and friends."

Ms Cross' produce garden with heirloom fruit and vegetables is among a highlight of the property, which was purchased three years ago and has peaceful views of rolling hills and a pine tree plantation.

The productive garden replicates the style of a traditional French potager, but Ms Cross' penchant for a more natural look means the planting is informal.

"My garden is an 18 by 18 metre potager,

which is a French word meaning a collection of all things," she said.

"It isn't a meticulous fancy garden, I don't have it perfect and I let things go to seed.

"I think it shocks people because a lot of people think there are a lot of rules with gardening and there is an oversupply of information about how you should grow something, when you should plant it, what direction it should face and things like that.

"Even though I know the exact way to do it, the easier version is to just plant it and see what happens."

A number of fruit trees - including rare varieties - and a collection of unusual citrus also feature at the property.

"I have a lot of unusual varieties of produce that if I followed the rules, are not supposed to grow here," Ms Cross said.

"But I have seen avocado down here, mangoes and bananas, even though all the information says they can't survive.

"If we paid attention to the rules all the time, we wouldn't try anything new."

The garden is located at 7 Bill James Court, Compton and will be open tomorrow (Saturday) and Sunday from 10am to 4.30pm.

Ms Cross will address visitors and provide a demonstration on preserving produce at 11am and 2pm on Saturday and Sunday.

Entry for adults is \$8, \$6 for pensioners and Open Gardens SA members and children are able to enter for free.

Funds will be donated to the Mount Gambier Anti-Cancer Foundation.

Food to fuel volunteer effort

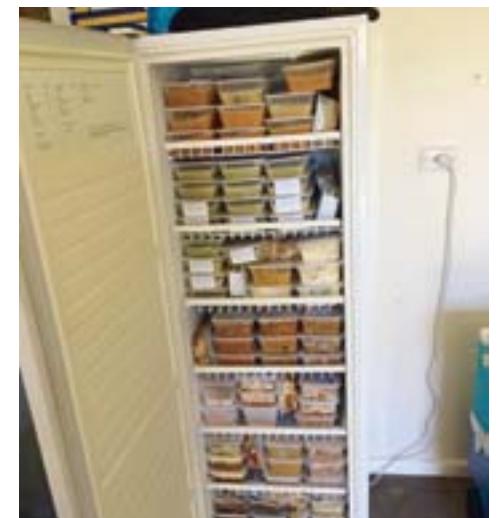

S-CLASS COMES OF AGE

THE seventh generation of the Mercedes-Benz S-Class, has arrived in Australia and it's crammed full of the latest in infotainment and technology.

It's slightly larger than the model it replaces. All external dimensions have grown, with the wheelbase extended by 71 mm in short, or standard wheelbase models, and by 51 mm in long wheelbase models.

Very much high-tech machine, the new S-Class has second-generation MBUX (Mercedes-Benz User Experience), with displays on up to five large screens, in part with OLED technology.

Options for personalisation and intuitive operation are used by both outer rear-seat passengers as well as the driver.

The voice assistant "Hey Mercedes" is available from every seat, while certain actions - such as accepting a phone call - can be performed even without reciting the keyword.

The S-Class is equipped with a head-up display as standard, and a larger, AR-HUD is optionally available.

The latter projects a substantial image that appears virtually on the road ahead at a distance of 10 metres. For the driver, this blends into the surroundings ahead of the vehicle, and can contribute to reduced driver distraction.

When navigating animated turn-off arrows are virtually projected onto the road lane. The image-forming unit consists of a high-resolution matrix of 1.3 million individual mirrors and a highly efficient light source.

A large central display features OLED (Organic Light Emitting Diode) technology. Positioned in portrait format, it is within easy touch and vision between the driver and front passenger.

At the touch of a button, it is possible for the driver to switch to a 3D mode, achieved with the help of eye-tracking via two integrated cameras.

The image in the driver display is continuously adjusted to offer the sensation of depth, without special glasses.

The appearance of the driver display and central display screens can be individualised with a choice of four display styles (Discreet, Sporty, Exclusive, Classic) and three modes (Navigation, Assistance, Service).

Using cameras in the overhead control panel and learning algorithms, the S-Class recognises and anticipates the intentions of the occupants.

It does this by interpreting head direction, hand movements and body language, and re-

sponds with corresponding vehicle functions.

For example, if the driver looks over their shoulder towards the rear window, Interior Assist automatically opens the sunblind.

If the driver is looking for something on the front passenger seat in the dark, it automatically switches the light on.

Natural hand movements are also recognised, allowing the driver or passengers to open the sliding sunroof with a gesture.

Active ambient lighting (optional) supplements standard ambient lighting with an additional layer of light.

With around 250 LEDs it is integrated into the driving assistance systems, and can reinforce warnings visually. In addition, visual feedback is possible when operating the climate control system or the 'Hey Mercedes' voice assistant.

During severe frontal collisions, a rear airbag (standard on long wheelbase models) can

considerably reduce loads on the head and neck of seat-belt-wearing occupants in the outer rear seats.

Rear-axle steering (optional) can make the S-Class almost as maneuverable as a compact car. The steering angle at the rear axle is up to 10 degrees, reducing the turning circle by as much as two metres to less than 10.9 metres.

Passengers in the rear seats have infotainment by way of two 11.6-inch displays (optional) with touch controls on the rear of the front seat backrests.

The optional MBUX rear tablet can be used outside the vehicle, its screen content can be shared with other passengers, and selection and amendment of navigation destinations is possible from the rear seats.

A personal profile can be created directly in the S-Class and synchronised with the existing profile data of the Mercedes me account. Personal preferences such as a favourite radio station and preselected settings can be trans-

ferred to any seat via the personal Mercedes me profile. Up to seven different profiles with around 800 parameters are possible in the vehicle. The driver can activate a personal profile using fingerprint recognition.

New Mercedes-Benz S-Class has achieved improvements in aero-acoustics.

The high rigidity of the new bodyshell provides very good noise and vibration comfort. We've no doubt this is correct, but we will have to check this when we road test one.

Mercedes-Benz S-Class is the flagship the German company that's world renowned for its engineering and this seventh generation seems assured to be bought by those who want nothing but the best.

The Mercedes-Benz S 450 4MATIC is priced at \$240,700 (MRLP) while the long-wheelbase S 450 L 4MATIC is priced at \$264,900. Both vehicles will be available to order from March 2021.

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Anglers soak up conditions

FISHING

SOME lovely weather over the last week has been enjoyed by anglers right across the Limestone Coast.

I've seen plenty of pictures of some impressive fish, so let's get stuck into the report.

Offshore fishos have found some nice sharks this week.

Wilbur and Carn from Southerly Fishing Charters have found their clients some nice school shark off Port MacDonnell, and some other nice bottom fish too.

Tim Carrison fished a couple of hours on Sunday morning off Blackfellows Caves and managed two nice sharks and a handful of good size terakhi and latchet fish.

Still no word on the tuna yet, but Portland and Victor Harbor are still going great guns, so it's only a matter of time.

Surf fishos did well over the weekend, even with the breeze.

I heard of a few nice fish caught in the Canunda National Park from the old drain all the way through to the Oil Rig.

Salmon numbers in the day time have been fairly impressive, with fish to 2kg, while off an evening on fresh salmon fillets, the shark have been great.

Gummy and school shark have been caught, and even the odd bronze whaler.

Other areas have fished well also, a few anglers have fished Paradise and Green Point from the beach and have been bombarded with snapper to 55cm, which were all released safely.

There were a few salmon and undersize mullet mixed in with them.

Guys targeting shark out around Danger Point have had mixed results over the weekend.

While some anglers found them without too much trouble, others had fairly quiet days.

The gummy sharks that were caught were around that 10kg to 15kg mark, making for an excellent fight in the shallow water.

There were still lots of snapper around in the same areas, and plenty of baitfish such as salmon and pike through there too, so I wouldn't mind betting that the inshore mullet aren't far behind them.

Whiting fishos have continued their run of great numbers this week, all of the local hot

spots have fished well again, which is good to see.

The Port Mac Breakwater, Carpenter Rocks and Beachport have been on fire for the boaties, while the land-based guys have done well at Cape Douglas, Blackfellows Caves and the Beachport Jetty.

Some fishos will argue that you need to burley up for whiting, and in some cases, they're right.

But often when fishing shallow inshore areas, the burley can work against you.

Whiting can be a very shy and timid fish so if there's a lot of competition for the food from bigger salmon or snapper, they'll often hide away.

Next time you're targeting whiting, just use your cockle shells as burley.

You might find you catch less other species and more and bigger whiting.

Freshwater fishos have still been catching some beauties.

Lake Charlegrark has continued fishing well for cod on chatter and spinner baits from the boats, while the bait fishos off the bank have done well on chicken strips and worms.

Rocklands has been good for yellies again this week, I've heard of some fish around the 1kg mark from the Brodie's and Glendinning areas, all just by trolling around in the timber.

There has been some nice fish from the river this week.

Hayden Sneath and Greg Saunders found a nice patch of big bream and perch to 41cm each, along with mullet to 82cm.

The Laslett's area was the hot zone for those boys on the weekend, but we know how quickly it changes.

Charles Minge found a heap of nice bream on baits around the Dry Creek to Reed Bed area on Saturday.

Mark and Lyn Struthers also found some big fish around the same area.

I have heard of some nice perch from the upper reaches of the Glenelg over the past few weeks, but one angler did say there was a fair bit of colour in the water coming from upstream.

Hopefully there's not enough to slow the fish down, but just enough to kick the bigger mullet into gear.

There is a bit of breeze forecast for this weekend, but I don't think it'll be too much to handle.

The sea is settling nicely, so hopefully can wet a line.

Until next week, safe fishing!

MUMBANNAR trainer Monty Wilson, who not so long ago was more than happy if he could run at an average of one winner a month, brought up his ninth winner for the year at Tara Raceway last Sunday with Mystic Lane.

In Wilson's kennels since January, the brindle bitch was having her fourth race start when leading all the way in the Gordon Refrigeration Maiden Stake (305 metres) and defeating Winter Wizard by 2½ lengths in 17.90 seconds.

By Oaks Road out of Fascinated, Mystic Lane - bred and owned at Penshurst by John Cameron - was the only pup in the litter.

And yesterday's win brought back memories of the day almost three years ago that Fascinated recorded her 12th and final win for Cameron at a Friday time-graded meeting at Tara Raceway.

Purchased as a pup from Portland breeder Cassandra Billington, Fascinated is by Hutmaker, a well-bred son of Premier Fantasy and Beekeeper, out of Spellbound, a Victorian city winner and successful on 16 occasions at the local track.

On the day of that 12th win Cameron had made the trip across with fellow Penshurst owner-trainer John "Buzz" Burow who as it turned out had Good Yarn engaged in the same race.

But it was Fascinated who led all the way in the 512 metres event, defeating the strong finishing Good Yarn by 2½ lengths in 30.34 seconds and giving the Penshurst pair the quinella.

One can only imagine how the trip back to Penshurst on the Friday afternoon would have played out.

"Here we were travelling home, Buzz in the passenger seat, frequently quenching his thirst, empty cans rolling around everywhere. And I'm having to put up with him telling me how unlucky Good Yarn had been," Cameron had said at the time.

Just another typical Buzz and Camo road trip.

These days, the Penshurst presence is all but gone. And Tara Raceway race meetings are all the poorer for it.

Incidentally, Fascinated, who tipped the scales at just over 24 kilograms, raced on 93 occasions with one of her best wins being the Fashion D'Or Ladies Bracelet over 600 metres at Tara Raceway's 2017 Christmas meeting.

Greyhounds geared up for 'smooth' Cup

WITH any sort of luck, this year's Mount Gambier Cup should run somewhat smoother than that of last year when Sunset Milo finally won the on again-off again Group Listed event at the end of August.

With the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club welcoming local businesses the Commercial Hotel and Exchange Printers on board as major sponsors, heats of this year's cup over 512 metres will be run on Sunday, April 11 and the final on April 18.

From a local point of view, Compton trainer Tracie Price, with a treble last Sunday, looks to hold one of the strongest hands.

Golly Gumdrops, winner of the Williams Crane Hire Christmas Cup (512m), made it three wins in a row when leading all the way in the Greg Martlew Autos Mixed Stake (600m).

Price was also successful with Slick Fernando who dropped back to 400 metres.

However he was a 512 metres winner the previous week in a quick 29.69 seconds.

And Rough In Vegas continued his consistent form when holding out the Peter Keane-trained littermates Me Silly and Hello Keen in the Winmore Greyhound Kennels Mixed Stake (512m) in a time of 29.95 seconds.

A member of the successful Fernando Bale x Sisco Sizzle litter, Me Silly is better known over the short course but last Sun-

day worked home well to go down by only three-quarters of a length.

And with Hello Keen, a quick 25.09 seconds 450 metres winner at Warrnambool earlier in the year, also working home well it will now be interesting to see whether the Koroit-based Keane heads back here for the cup.

Staking a claim in the Formula 400 (400m), one of the supporting events at cup time, would be littermate and kennelmate Gotcha Laz who was an impressive 8¼ lengths winner last Sunday in 22.96 seconds in the JB Irrigation Stake (400 m).

Portland trainer Nifty Lenehan has already signalled his intention to tackle the Formula 400 with the John Cameron-owned Free Gift, a 22.98 seconds winner over 400 metres the previous week.

Lenehan said the son of Lightning Frank x Jasmine Lilly had initially been a bit of a challenge in as much that all he wanted to do was to mess around with other dogs.

"For sure, in the early stages he just wouldn't break-in and he did require a lot of patience," Lenehan said.

"But he now seems to be switched on. I've been really pleased with his past two runs which have resulted in wins in quick time at Warrnambool and Mount Gambier."

Another cup-supporting event is the Tankman 600 (600 m), won last year by the Cap Abbott-trained Black Spring.

And Toolong trainer Phil Lenehan, who won the feature middle-distance event at the 2016 cup carnival with Lek-

tra Kelly, may well consider a crack at the Tankman with Don't Forget Kev after the son of Keybow x Lektra Hutch yesterday ran Golly Gumdrops to 2½ lengths.

Once again, Greyhound Racing SA cup bonuses linking both the Murray Bridge Cup and the Mount Gambier Cup are in place.

These include a \$5000 bonus if the same dog can win both the cups and a \$5000 trainer bonus if the same trainer can win both cups (SA or interstate or different dogs).

With Air Marshall, a half-brother to 2019 Mount Gambier Cup finalist Wan-chai Express, having won the Murray Bridge Cup interest will now centre on Reeves Plains trainer Ray Murray and whether he intends to chase the \$10,000 bonus.

With four Sunday meetings at Tara Raceway in April - Easter, ANZAC Day and two for the cup - and five Thursday time-graded meetings, it will be a busy time for local greyhound racing.

Meanwhile, due to a lack of response, next Tuesday's scheduled greyhound health and fitness checks at Tara Raceway by Craig Finlayson have been cancelled.

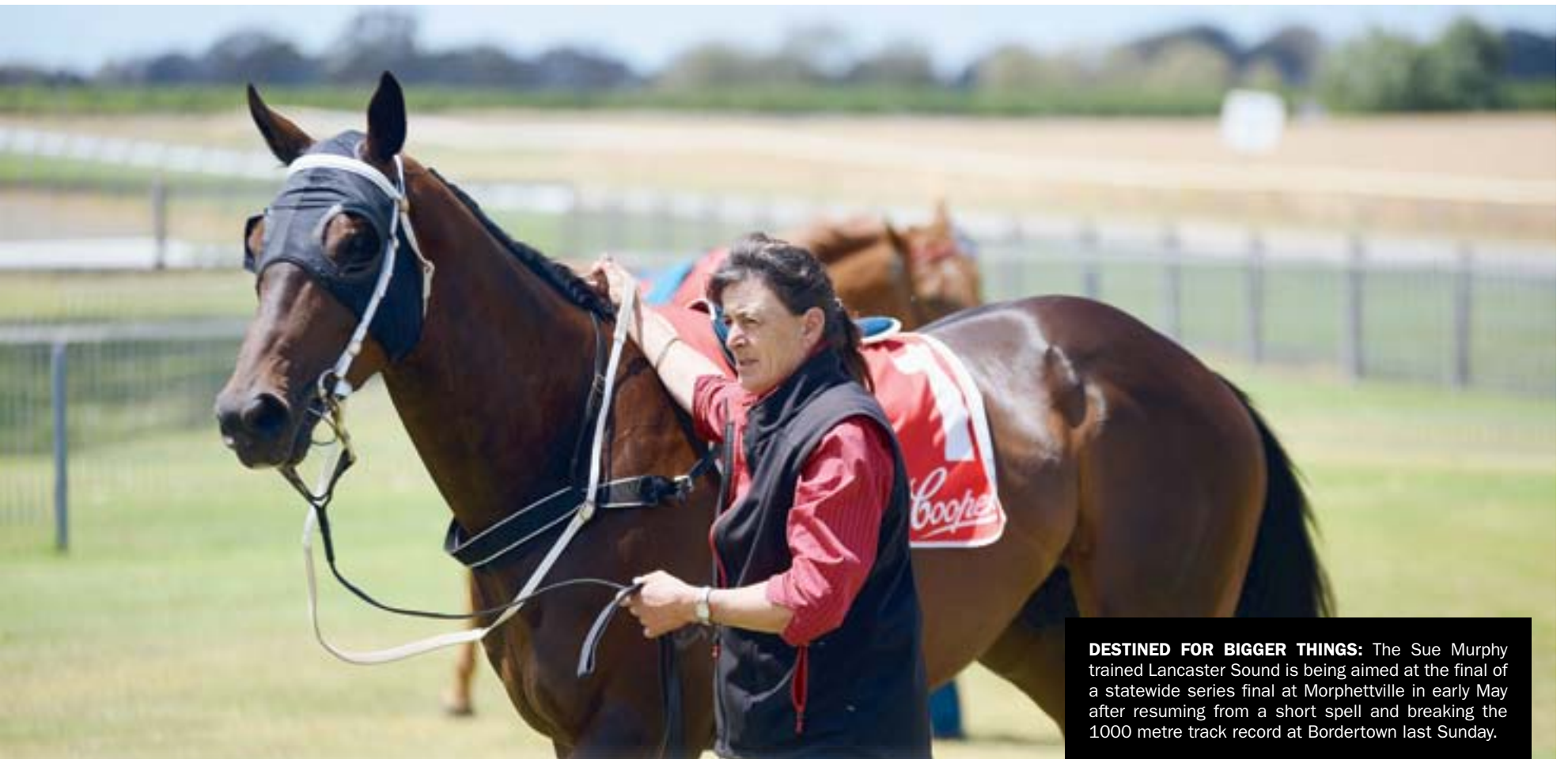
The free checking service by the highly-regarded veterinary surgeon, which had been instigated by the MGGRC at the request of participants, now looks in danger of being discontinued.

Our land of contrasts

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IN Dorothea McKellar's famous poem "I love a sunburnt country", mention is made of Australia being "a land of sweeping plains".

McKellar could also have mentioned how it is also a land of vastly contrasting weather as we saw last weekend.

In the lead up to the race meeting at Ballarat last Sunday, the track was rated a Good 4 but that quickly changed on race day.

Heavy rain most of the afternoon saw it downgraded all the way to a Heavy 10 and, in the end, the club were lucky the meeting went the full distance.

Up the road at Bordertown, 340 kilometres away, the sun shone all day for the race meeting (31 degrees) where the track was upgraded rather quickly from a Good 4 to Good 3 prior to race one.

It was lightning fast, so much so that the Sue Murphy trained Lancaster Sound broke the track record for the 1000 metres in race two, forcing stewards to further upgrade the track to a Firm 2, a reading very rarely seen in the Limestone Coast.

There were late scratchings at both venues, at Ballarat because the track was too heavy and at Bordertown because the surface was too hard.

TREBLE FOR MURPHY

NARACOORTE trainer Sue Murphy has registered winning trebles a few times but never at Bordertown.

That changed last Sunday when Murphy trained three of the seven winners to set up a big lead in her quest for back to back premierships titles in the Limestone Coast.

"I've had three winners on the one day at Naracoorte, Penola and Mount Gambier but never at Bordertown, until last weekend," Murphy stated.

Murphy has always had a good opinion of Lancaster Sound and she has already mapped out bigger challenges for the five year old gelding this autumn following his win in the BM 62 handicap.

"He is looking for extra journey now, and he will go to a heat of the Autumn series to be run at Penola on Easter Sunday and hopefully qualify for the final in Adelaide in early May."

Stablemate O'Mizzna (\$3.70) gave apprentice Jacob Opperman his 20th winner on Limestone Coast tracks this season with the narrowest of wins in the 2000 metre BM 62 handicap.

It was arguably the best win of the five year old mare's career and she defeated the favourite Bronski in a stirring battle over the final furlong.

"O'Mizzna did it tough, sitting for wide for most of the trip and it was a good, gutsy effort."

The final leg of Murphy's treble saw the ultra consistent Pewter (\$6) win his third race on local tracks this season in the 1550 metre BM 70 handicap.

It gave Irish born jockey Emily Finnegan her first winner back from a nine month break after being injured in July last year.

Finnegan only resumed riding at Balaklava last Wednesday week and was quickly in the winner's stall at only her fourth ride.

"Pewter is as honest as they come, always puts in 110 percent and he didn't mind the firm surface".

From his last 10 starts, Pewter has registered two wins and been placed on seven occasions.

In what was a good quality BM 70 field, Pewter gave his rivals a start and a beating after being second last with 500 metres to run.

WORTH THE EFFORT

TWO Victorian trainers who headed to Bordertown on Sunday were more than pleased they did so as they had their first wins for 2021.

Horsham trainer Stephen Lenehan had his first success since Swan Hill in November when Archnattack (\$10-\$8) rattled home to win the 1000 metre maiden.

For the Casterton based Tom Gilchrist, the win by Zag in the 1300 metre maiden broke an even longer run of outs.

His last winner was over 12 months ago on Edenhope cup day, and Zag had bookmakers cheering when he flew home to win as a \$31 chance.

It was a sad day for favourite backers with not one favourite winning.

The horse to follow is the locally trained Bassons who easily ran his best race this campaign when third in the 2000 metre BM 62 handicap after being denied a clear passage from the 400 metres.

FREE ENTRY FOR TROTS TOMORROW NIGHT

ANOTHER Saturday night of local harness racing at the Greenwald Paceway tomorrow night with the two heats of the Border cup being the feature.

Just the four races with the first event at 8.55pm and the last at 10.20pm.

It is sponsors night and it will be free entry for the public.

Contrary to some media reports this week, tomorrow night is not the final meeting of the season as local harness racing will continue with two Tuesday night meetings in April and two meetings in May.

REFRESHINGLY OPEN

HAVE you noticed in recent times how many trainers, when interviewed on race mornings in regards to the chances of their runners that day, have become refreshingly open, and dare we say it, even honest?

In the olden days, trainers would play their cards very close to their chest and give absolutely nothing away in regards to their winning chances on the day.

One of the main reasons was because any stable money had not been invested with the tote or bookmakers as there was no such thing as fixed odds in the days leading up to a meeting, and most betting was done in the final few minutes prior to a race.

If a trainer gave his/her horse a sniff of a winning chance, that could mean bookmakers slashing the odds and the stable followers would miss out on the odds they desired.

I can recall Naracoorte trainer Sue Jaensch being extremely coy many years ago about the chances of a first starter she was taking to Mindarie-Halidon that afternoon.

While the Jaensch's are not known as a big betting stable, Sue was nevertheless determined not let anything out of the bag and, not surprisingly, the first starter won with plenty to spare.

Nowadays, betting is freely available up to 72 hours prior to a Saturday city meeting with corporate bookies and fixed odds.

At country meetings, fixed odds can usually be obtained on race eve and the markets can change dramatically.

There were a couple of examples at Bordertown last Sunday when two Mur-

ray Bridge trained horses had their odds slashed.

On race eve, Canindae was a \$3.80 chance in race six, firming up to \$3 on Sunday morning and then into the \$2.30 favourite at starting time.

Then there was Gangster Rap in race three, a big firmer from \$34 into \$11.

Not that the plunges came off as Canindae ran third and Gangster Rap was unplaced.

An example of trainers being very open these days in their assessment is top Melbourne trainer Ciaron Maher, who was interviewed a couple of months ago on a Saturday morning in regards to his many runners around Australia that day.

When quizzed for his two best chances anywhere, he quickly replied that Black Sail in Adelaide was his best winning chance and he duly got the chocolates as a \$4.60 chance.

Maher's best outsider for the day was a \$16 chance in Melbourne which ran third.

EASTER SUNDAY AT PENOLA

PENOLA cup day on Easter Sunday is the next gallops meeting here in the Limestone Coast.

As usual, it will family orientated with plenty for the kids including a visit from the Easter bunny, kids races and a jumping castle.

The revamped Oakbank carnival, now spread over three days, starts this Sunday followed next Wednesday with the Harry D. Young hurdle and the Von Doussa steeplechase as the highlights.

Easter Saturday is the final day, now known as Super Saturday, with the feature race being the Great Eastern steeplechase.

Tigers roar in Barber Shield

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THE Tigers have roared once again in the Hoggies Wines Barber Shield with several young cubs stepping up in the 2020/21 season decider to deliver a North Sportsman's threepeat.

Celebrations are winding down for the dominant North side which decimated underdog Penola with the ball and held firm with the bat, needing just over an hour on day two to secure the Mount Gambier and District Cricket Association's ultimate prize.

The Eagles had the first victory of the weekend after winning the toss and electing to bat on a relatively tame Frew Park pitch, which required disciplined bowling to snare wickets.

An early boundary to Jake Schulz gave the Eagles confidence as the Tiger attack shook off nerves but the opener came unstuck when he played a Declan Kenny delivery into the hands of Elliott Fisher.

North captain Nick McNerney - leading the club in its seventh consecutive Barber Shield grand final - said from this point it was the pressure from bowlers that continued to bring the Eagles unstuck.

"Once we got that first one, it set the tone," McNerney said.

"An early wicket is always key but especially in a final," he said.

"We bowled fairly disciplined lines and didn't give them a lot to score off.

"That meant they had to start scoring off balls that might not have been there."

McNerney and Kenny both helped unhinge the top order, as did Isaac Mulraney with the first ball of his first grand final, dismissing Penola captain Mark Smith for just two.

"Isaac didn't bowl in the semi-final so it was

massive for him to relieve some of the nerves and to step up and get a wicket with his first ball," McNerney said.

At 5/33 and in a world of hurt, Tom Clayfield produced a defiant 51 as his teammates looked to protect their wicket and keep the momentum.

However, the Eagles' innings came crashing down with the last four wickets falling cheaply, adding just nine runs to the final 104 run tally.

Seasoned campaigners Young (3/13), Kenny (3/19) and McNerney (3/23) were damaging for North.

"Our boys took some great catches and really capitalised on most chances Penola gave

us," McNerney said.

With 28 overs left in day one, North openers Jake Schutz (37) and Brad Robinson (40) were pivotal for the Tigers and donned the pads once again on Sunday morning.

"It was a huge moment for us for those boys to get through that 28 over period with the bat and not lose a wicket," McNerney said.

"If we had of lost a couple of wickets, who knows how day two could have gone," he said.

It was a coming of age performance from Robinson - who was named man of the match - in just his second grand final, having played in a losing season decider against Penola in 2017/18.

"Brad has been a really strong B Grader for us and has always been in the mix for our senior opening batter," McNerney said.

"We have had some strong batsmen over the years so he probably has never always had the opportunities he deserves until this year," he added.

"For him to step up and not only become a premiership player but also to be player of the match is reward for effort.

"It is so pleasing to see blokes like Brad and Isaac step up and play massive roles for us.

"We have said all along we don't rely on one or two blokes to get the job done."

A couple of late wickets to Penola's Paul Ellis (2/24) did little to halt North's flow as the Tigers secured their third straight title from a boundary.

In fitting style, North veteran Michael Johnston was on the ground when the final runs were made, securing his 11th premiership in a season where he also claimed the club batting trophy.

Celebrations kicked off early for North and continued into this week, with it too early for McNerney to turn his sights onto a four-peat.

"It is hard to tell what we will look like next year," McNerney said.

"There might be one or two changes like there seems to be every year but we are really happy with some of our younger players and even our reserves are coming on strong," he said.

In other grades, Glencoe was victorious in the Crouch Shield after stepping up into the B Grade competition this season, successfully defending its 112-run total against South Gambier (88).

Kalangadoo lifted the Cox Bros Shield with a mammoth 282-run innings proving well out of reach for Mil Lel, which scored 137.

With a small band of officials controlling the track, racing got under way after a ballot draw to see who would be the first driver back on track after a lengthy hiatus with Nicholas Doll given the honours. Battling a dry surface, drivers were forced to wait between runs to allow debris to settle and provide clear conditions for contestants.
