Logs for jobs

A FEDERAL Government committee has released a slew of recommendations addressing timber supply constraints in the plantation sector, with the establishment of an industry-led voluntary code of conduct high on the list of proposed measures.

The committee's 'Aussie logs for Aussie jobs' reports outlines 10 recommendations,

including a code of conduct, information on softwood log prices and a review on the regulatory settings relating to plantation growth.

The report found one of the key difficulties facing processors was the "lack of transparency in regard to export market prices" and said a voluntary code of conduct could help facilitate long-term timber supply contracts for the mutual benefit of both.

OneFortyOne Plantations told the committee water access was the "single biggest imped-

iment to the timber supply chain in the Green Triangle", with the report backing a review of regulatory settings relating to plantations.

In a submission to the committee, Kalangadoo-based Plantation Treated Timber managing director Peter Badenoch suggested the adoption of a code of practice and information on pricing and sales to provide transparency.

Rock lobster quota carry over

COMMERCIAL rock lobster fishers will be able to carry-over uncaught quota and have extended fishing seasons in temporary changes to help fishers manage the financial impacts of the double impact of COVID and trade restrictions.

Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham said changes are being introduced at the request of the state's rock lobster fishers and will help the industry which has experienced a challenging 12 months.

Mr Basham said southern zone rock lobster fishers will be granted additional time to catch quota this year, with the current season being expanded to July 31 and the next season opening on September 15.

He said fishers will also be granted the option to carry over up to 20pc of their quota entitlements from this season to the next if they do not catch all of their quota, which has been recommended by the industry.

"To help navigate the current market turbulence, our fishers have requested extended fishing seasons as well as the opportunity to carry over quota," Mr Basham said.

"The Marshall Liberal Government is pleased to support these requests and provide fishers with the flexibility they need, so long as the sustainability of our premium fish species is protected.

"These changes build on similar flexible arrangements for fisheries introduced last year in response to COVID-19 market disruptions and I thank all fishers who engaged with their



local industry representatives to reach these recommendations."

"South Australia's rock lobster industry is incredibly important to our state economy supporting thousands of jobs and the sector has endured a challenging past year through the double impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and changes to trade with China."

South Eastern Professional Fishermen's Association executive officer Nathan Kimber

said the temporary management changes for the Southern Zone was welcome news.

"The rock lobster industry has been impacted by a range of market disturbances and access issues over the past 14 months," Mr Kimber said.

"These temporary management measures will provide fishers with a level of flexibility as they assess the best ways to deal with the current market outlook."

OVER 1200 Limestone Coast residents have received a COVID-19 vaccine since the state's rollout started, with Mount Gambier earmarked for a new community vaccination clinic this month.

The State Government has committed to establishing a community clinic in Mount Gambier as part of SA Health's targeted response to regional communities at risk of not being able to be vaccinated.

Details of the additional clinic remain unknown while the process is finalised, including a start date.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network chief executive Ngaire Buchanan revealed preparations were underway to help deliver vaccines to emergency services personnel, with a visiting service among the measures floated to address large numbers with organisations such as the Country Fire Service and State Emergency Service.

Looking ahead to the peak Easter long weekend holiday period, Ms Buchanan urged residents and visitors to remain on alert regarding COVID-19, including the monitoring of symptoms and accessing testing if required.

"COVID has not gone away, we've only just started our vaccination program here in SA," Ms Buchanan said.

"The main thing is to keep alert where you've been and keep alert to any mild symptoms, get yourself tested and isolate until you get the test back," she said.

Limestone Coast Police will continue to monitor COVID restriction compliance over the long weekend, including QR Code use.

Easter safety choice plea

NOT even stringent safety gear use or more than a decade of experience could save Geelong motorbike enthusiast Billy Bubb from traumatic and life-altering injuries following a riding accident in sand dunes near Beachport.

The 22-year-old's New Year's Eve accident is sadly one of numerous incidents in recent years that have triggered a pre-Easter campaign from Limestone Coast authorities, urging residents and holidaymakers to slow down and consider their choices this long weekend.

According to Limestone Coast Police, the road safety risk for motorists increases up to three-fold on the Thursday prior to Good Friday as drivers hit the road in preparation for the four-day break.

However, off-road activities remain a focus for emergency services this Easter in the hope recreational accidents, such as the one involving Mr Bubb, do not occur.

Mr Bubb spent the first 10 days of 2021 in a coma and suffered a severed spinal chord, broken back and other injuries following the crash in sand dunes north of Beachport Conservation Park on December 31 last year.

He remains in Melbourne's Royal Talbot Rehabilitation Centre where he has relearned how to speak, eat and drink, but remains without use of his legs and right arm.

Despite his significant injuries and tedious rehabilitation, Mr Bubb remains committed to returning to his home and resuming his career as an excavator.

Almost \$70,000 has been raised for the Bubb family to help with Billy's recovery

- including \$21,000 from a March 21 fundraiser in Geelong - with Billy's sister Amy hopeful her brother's experience would highlight the importance of protective equipment for motorcyclists and prevent a similar outcome in the future.

"His whole life Billy was always the one to wear his protective gear," Ms Bubb said.

"If he wasn't wearing his helmet or didn't have his boots on, it (the accident) might have been a lot worse - he might not have been here," she said.

"It doesn't matter if you've been riding for six years or six months, accidents happen."

Ms Bubb's sentiments were echoed by Limestone Coast Police operations manager Inspector Campbell Hill, who said accidents could happen to the most diligent of people.

Insp Hill pointed to the 32 lives lost on South Australian roads so far in 2021, urging the region's residents and visitors alike to take extra time to "make good choices" this Easter.

"Enough is enough," Insp Hill said, adding one life was lost on Limestone Coast roads over the 2020 Easter period.

"We want people to be getting home safely," he said.

"We don't want people to be driving selfishly, we want them to be wearing seatbelts, not drink or drug driving, getting enough sleep beforehand and allowing enough time to get to their destination."

Stating the region had a history of recreational accidents, Insp Hill urged people not to make "stupid or selfish" decisions and warned those who take significant care could still become involved in traumatic experiences.

"It is time to short-circuit that cycle of people just doing things automatically and just stop for a minute and calculate what they're doing," Insp Hill said.

"These can be really acute traumatic incidents but they've got a massive legacy," he said

"It impacts everybody that has any involvement in it."

Given the focus on recreational activities and a forecast bumper period across national parks and coastal hotspots, Limestone Coast Parks and Wildlife manager Nick McIntyre said additional rangers would be deployed to ensure the public complied with rules.

"We really want to see everybody come and have a good time and go home safely and not have to call on SAPOL, or CFS or the SES or any of the agencies.. to come and deal with an incident because people haven't been safe in our parks," Mr Mc-Intyre said.

The summer holiday season reported a visitation increase of 36pc across all sites, with Mr McIntyre adding most campsites were booked out ahead of this weekend.

Mr McIntyre urged visitors to national parks to take note of signage and conditions and to follow designated tracks.

"Always be aware that someone could be coming from around the corner on a sandhill or coming from another angle on the park," he said.

South Australian Ambulance Service crews regularly face trauma in their duties, with Limestone Coast acting operations manager Daniel Forrest urging residents to maintain their safety while soaking up the region.

State Emergency Service Mount Gambier unit manager Mat Tye said the organisation's highly-trained volunteers often faced traumatic scenes, pleading with people to act safely to limit the need for first responders to be called out.

"A lot of members do take this (trauma) back home with them," Mr Tye said, adding support measures were in place for volunteers.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network chief executive Ngaire Buchanan said the impacts of traumatic incidents "doesn't go away for a long time".

"Take care of yourselves, take care of others, and just be mindful of the responders that are going to come and assist you and be mindful of the long journey it's going to take to get back into society," Ms Buchanan said.

Water biggest hurdle

ONEFORTYONE Planatations has told a parliamentary committee water access is the single biggest impediment to the timber supply chain in the Green Triangle region.

In a submission to the Federal Agriculture and Water Resources Committee, the company estimated losses of more than 25,000ha in the South Australian portion of the Green Triangle under the state's current water allocation limits.

OneFortyOne executive general manager - Australia Cameron MacDonald said there was a risk the forest industry will be required to absorb water allocation reductions "based on data that is outdated at a time when economic productivity has never been more important".

"Without adjustments to regulatory conditions and the way water use is calculated and managed in South Australia, growth and future investment will be inherently limited," the submission said.

"Without action there will be an overall reduction in the national planation estate by 2050, having profound implications upstream and downstream of the industry and for the broader Australian community."

The inquiry's Aussie Logs for Aussie Jobs report said New Forests also called for the removal of South Australian water licensing arrangements, claiming the restrictions as limiting plantation establishment.

The report said OneFortyOne had also "questioned the currency of the data used as the basis for water allocations and called for government investments in 'future research initiatives including additional groundwater monitoring, subregional models, and additional groundwater dependent monitoring."

Primary Industries and Regions South Australia (PIRSA) told the committee the Forest Industry Advisory Council of South Australia had recommended the State Government considers evidence-based proposals from industry to reform water licensing and increase water allocations in the lower Limestone Coast.

The Environment and Water Department has previously said the lower Limestone Coast water allocation plan is due to be reviewed by the Limestone Coast Landscape Board by November 2023 at the latest and will have regard to all available science.

A departmental spokesperson said industry concerns about the water allocation plan were a key driver of the State Government to temporarily halt and review allocations scheduled under the water allocation plan.

The committee's report acknowledged while reversing the decline in the planation estate had been a goal of both State and Federal government for many years, "to date these policies have had limited success".

"Though the committee welcomes the Australian Government's plan to grow a billion

new trees within a decade, it as not resulted in a tangible expansion of the planation estate," the report said.

The nation's peak industry body representing the forestry resources and processing sector welcomed the committee's recommendation to review regulatory settings relating to plantations.

Australian Forest Product Association chief executive Ross Hamtpon said removing regulatory barriers to tree planting for farmers and landowners was important for the industry to grow.

Labor parliamentarian and state shadow Regional Development Minister Clare Scriven said while the report had a number of positive recommendations to support forestry industries in Australia, it revealed the Federal Government "failed to follow through on its announcements on forestry."

Ms Scriven, who chairs a state-based parliamentary inquiry into the timber industry, said the report noted government's promise to provide concessional loans to encourage investment in forestry plantations had not been delivered.

"It is very disappointing that the Liberal Government made forestry announcements before the last Federal election but hasn't delivered on them," she said.

"Forest industries are hugely important to our regional and national economy, but the government is dragging its heels on key promises."

Season catch quota is all snapped up

THE South East commercial snapper fishery has closed after 100pc of the commercial snapper quota has been caught.

The commercial closure follows the early closure of the South East recreational fishing season on March 10.

Anglers can still participate in snapper fishing over the Easter long weekend, with charter boats still able to operate in the South East.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham said the charter boat have managed its strictly limited fishing effort in a way that will enable families to have the pick of the southern waters for their snapper fishing tour.

"As we all know the COVID-19 has impacted on regional tourism over the past year so I encourage recreational fishers still wanting to hook some snapper over the long weekend to support these local businesses by booking a charter fishing tour," he said.

Minister Basham said limited snapper fishing has been allowed in the South East since the State Government closed the snap-

per fishery in other areas of the state to allow depleted populations to recover.

"Ideal fishing conditions have resulted in strong catches of this iconic fish in both the recreational and commercial fishing sectors this year," he said.

"Since the current snapper management arrangements were announced in 2019 we always indicated that fishing would cease once each of the sectors reached their allocated catches.

"We've already closed the recreational snapper fishery after recreational fishers achieved their allocation in just five weeks.

"Our fisheries management decisions continue to be based on the best available scientific information and expert advice, in order to protect this iconic species.

"We will continue to monitor stocks and set catch limits accordingly in the South East to ensure we can keep the balance right."

Processor says access key

A KALANGADOO timber processor could increase the number of full-time employees by 15 people at the site but is unable to source access to fibre, a parliamentary committee has heard.

Plantation Treated Timbers managing director Peter Badenoch told the Agricultural and Water Resources said the company had been unsuccessful in negotiating medium and longer term supply with any major plantation owners, with supply contacts due to expire by 2024.

In a submission to the committee, Mr Badenoch said the company had orders pending that are older than 12 months and had rejected "a considerable amount of orders... over the preceding three years" due to its inability to access log.

Mr Badenoch estimated the site could double production and increase the number of full-time employees from 20 to 35 if the company had long-term access to fibre

The company said although most plantation owners have expressed a desire to

sell logs on a basis of export parity, there was a "lack of transparency as to what this actually means."

"A number of processors are frustrated in their inability to negotiate in a meaningful way with several planation owners in the Green Triangle," Mr Badenoch said.

"Three-year terms are not enough to justify capital expenditure... Plantation Treated Timber seeks a medium - seven to 10 year - or longer term contracted supply.

"If Plantation Treated Timber could secure additional supply of log on longer term contracts, the company could be in a position to invest a further \$3m in capital expenditure."

Mr Badenoch suggested the adoption of a code of practice and information on supply, pricing and sales to provide transparency to export operations to enable a comparison to domestic supply options. "Measures to expand the plantation reserve won't solve my problem if export prices spike and the forestry managers decide to just put it all on boats again," he said.

"It doesn't matter how big the estate is if the market operates as it does now."

Timber code recommended

A FEDERAL Parliamentary Committee has recommended the establishment of a voluntary code of conduct as well as an index of relevant log prices to facilitate access to timber by softwood processors.

The Australian Parliament's Agriculture and Water Resources Committee has handed down its final report into timber supply chain constraints in the nation's plantation sector, including the need to facilitate long-term supply contracts between producers and processors for the mutual benefit of both sectors.

The development of an index of relevant timber prices to aid negotiations between growers and processors was among 10 recommendations to enable growth and innovation in the sector.

Committee chair Rick Wilson said the issues surrounding a perceived lack of transparency in respect to softwood pricing was illustrative of the challenges experienced by the industry.

"Processors have stressed that they are willing to pay a fair price, if only they could determine one," he said.

"They made clear they do not want to be subsidised by local producers. "However, one key difficulty facing processors is their apparent inability to accurately ascertain export prices for the timber they are seeking to purchase."

Mr Wilson said inquiry participants had suggested the development of a voluntary code of conduct would support the growth of an efficient domestic processing sector while reducing the risks to plantation owners dependent on export markets.

However, HVP Plantations drew attention to the requirements to support local growers in certification standards and said any code

of conduct beyond the existing certification schemes was "not justified".

The company said government support for processors should "focus on mechanisms to improve the efficiency of processors, rather than imposing market distortions on growers".

OneFortyOne agreed, saying industry codes are "designed to address market failure rather than the interests of specific supplies" and cited the Australian Treasury's code of conduct policy framework which states codes of conduct "are not designed to protect smaller participants from competitive pressures that relate to bargaining power, access to markets or limited scale when purchasing".

Australian Forest Products Association which is the peak national industry body representing growers and processors - said it was happy to work with the committee's recommendation that industry take the lead in developing a voluntary code of conduct.

The South Australian Timber Processors Association - which developed a draft forestry code of practice last year - has welcomed the help boost domestic manufacturing and regional prosperity.

"The reason we formed and wrote a draft framework of a code of practice was to try and prevent the massive volume of logs being exported from this region," South Australian Timber Processors Association chief executive David Quill said.

"Since our establishment in August 2017, we have tried to stem the tide of exports given we could see there was a potential for our region to grow through domestic manufacturing.

"Initially, we lobbied the State Government - both the Labor and Liberal parties - in an effort to try and put some controls into the number of exports at the expense of the expansion of domestic processing.

"We ran a concurrent campaign with the Federal Government and had great support from Member for Barker Tony Pasin.

"The bipartisan committee has unanimously agreed to the recommendations and findings and we are thrilled the association which is a small group of local processors - has been able to influence the Federal Government.

'We also applaud the support of the Australian Forest Product Association which has accepted the principles of the report.'

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said if the committee's recommendations are supported, the voluntary code of conduct will be developed between the government department and industry over a 12 month period.

"The codes are always on the first instance voluntary and if need be, as we have done with other codes of conduct, they become compulsory," he said.

"There are a lot of other agricultural industries such as the wine and dairy sectors which have codes of conduct... the fact there

committee's recommendation, saying it will is a recommendation for a code of conduct is unsurprising, but it is the first time it has been formalised.

"The inquiry is part of the election commitment I secured, we have done the report and I expect the industry to be very happy with it as I have worked very hard with the industry to secure the recommendations they wanted. "Now it is a matter of putting pressure on the minister to make sure the government adopts these recommendations.'

Assistant Minister for Forestry Johnathon Duniam said the Federal Government will consider the report and work in lockstep with the forestry industry in responding to the recommendations.

"There is no bigger supporter of the forestry industry than this Government," he said.

"Establishing this inquiry was an election commitment, and I welcome the release of the committee's report."

An AFPA spokesperson said while the association could not speak for individual companies, the AFPA Board, which includes directors drawn from both the growing and processing sectors, had considered the committee's recommendation and supported the development of a voluntary code of conduct, as long as the work is led by AFPA and properly resourced by the Federal Government.

"It is unclear how the proposed log price index differs from the Australian Pine Log Price Index that already exists, and which is updated every six months," they said.

"The Australian Pine Log Price Index is independently collated by KPMG using log price information from all major softwood growers, much like the index recommended by the committee.

"AFPA will seek further clarification on this."

School holiday fun arrives

THE much-anticipated \$350,000 upgrade to Beachport's Susan Memorial Playground is nearing completion and will open to the public for the Easter long weekend.

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower said although works were continuing at the foreshore playground, construction would stop over the Easter period to allow children to use the equipment.

Mr Gower said the front fence was yet to be installed, but expected works to be completed by the Beachport and Rivoli Bay Lions Club in the immediate future.

"Everything is on track for a soft launch for next Thursday, but we will do an official launch to thank Member for Barker Tony Pasin for the Federal Government grant funding and the Lions Club for doing the barbecue areas and front fence," he said.

"Our goal was to make sure the playground was open before Easter and we are nearly there, so we will open over the Easter period and then close it again to do those final works."

Community members were invite to vote for a preferred playground from five shortlisted designs, with an overwhelming response for a wooden ship in a nod to the town's rich maritime history.

The project was funded by a \$200,000 grant through the Local Road and Community Infrastructure Program as well as a council contribution.

Young visitors to council's coastal towns during the upcoming school holiday period will be entertained with the launch of the Rivoli Bay Jetties Junior Fishing Competition.

The inaugural event will run from noon on April 13 until 3pm on April 17 and includes three age categories, including five years and under, six to 12 years and 13 to 17 years. Registrations for the competition open on April 12 at the Beachport Recreation Centre and a

Flying 'Roo touches down in region

QANTAS state manager South Australia Anthony Penney says passengers will be able to book flights from Mount Gambier to Mackay, Manila or Mumbai and return with the launch of the national carrier in the Limestone Coast.

Hordes of residents turned out at the Mount Gambier Regional Airport on Sunday morning to welcome the Flying Kangaroo into the region.

Country Fire Service crews conducted a ceremonial water arch to mark the start of new flights into Mount Gambier before passengers were greeted by elected officials, business leaders and Qantas executives.

At an event celebrating the first arrival, Mr Penney said the airline was proud to help drive domestic visitation to South Australia's second largest city and enable greater connectivity to Australian and international destinations.

"Before COVID, more than 11 million Australian passengers were travelling overseas, so by enabling our flights out of Melbourne and Adelaide to Mount Gambier we hope to drive more traffic into the Limestone Coast," he said

"We have been working quite closely with the South Australian Tourism Commission and everyone around the Limestone Coast to highlight everything that is on offer so we can drive more visitation and help grow and diversify the economy.

"You can book a flight from Mount Gambier to Melbourne or to Manila or Mumbai and return.

"We have had lead in fares as low as \$99 so I am sure people from the community will more than welcome increased competition, increased choice and hopefully more competitive fares moving forward."

Qantas operates five weekly return flights from Mount Gambier to both Adelaide and Melbourne.

The flights will be operated by the airline's 50-seat Q300 turboprop aircraft, which features upgraded cabin interiors, and will offer 500 seats on each route per week.

South Australian Tourism Commission chief executive Rodney Harrex said the extra flights will significantly build confidence in the region's tourism and business sectors.

"Victoria is our largest interstate domestic overnight market, so these additional flights are going to be a great boost for local businesses in the South East and further drive visitation to the Limestone Coast from Adelaide and Melbourne," he said.

"Having additional services means that we can continue to grow visitation, rebuild the visitor economy and create more jobs.

"I congratulate Qantas on further committing to the South Australian market, helping our visitor economy recover and support-

ing the work of the South Australian Tourism Commission."

"Standing out there watching QF2215 land and taxi into the Mount Gambier airport, I almost caught a tear in my eye," he said.

"I remembered a meeting with [Qantas chief executive] Alan Joyce in 2013 where it was suggested that my wish to bring Qantas flights to Mount Gambier was an unrealistic goal.

\$10,000 fine for lobster fisherman

A PORT MacDonnell commercial rock lobster fisher has been convicted and fined nearly \$10,000 after the removal of eggs from two female rock lobster.

Ian Taylor, 62, was found guilty of being in charge of a commercial vessel where two female rock lobster had their external eggs intentionally remove from under their tails. The man was convicted in the Adelaide Magistrates Court after he entered a guilty plea in December and was subsequently sentenced in March.

The fisherman was prosecuted after Fisheries Officers determined rock lobster had the eggs removed from under their tails before being landed as part of a commercial catch in October 2019.

Female rock lobster with external eggs are a protected species and it is an offence to interfere with them.

In addition to being ordered to pay fines, levies and prosecution costs totalling \$9770, the Southern Zone Rock Lobster licence and offender will be penalised with 80 demerit points.

Commercial fishers are subject to a demerit point system, where the accrual of more than 200 points within five years will result in the cancellation of a fishing licence. Individuals can be disqualified from holding or obtaining a fishing authority and fishing as a master of any licence in South Australia for a period of 10 years.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham said the although events of commercial fishers breaking the rules was rare, it should never occur

"The commercial fishing fleet are our stewards of the ocean and provide premium local product to our restaurants and fishmongers," he said.

"The commercial fishers I have met are passionate about harvesting in a sustainable way. I know other fishers will be very disappointed this occurred."

Individuals can report illegal fishing activity through the 24-hour Fishwatch number on 1800 065 522.





St John SA Limestone Coast division officer administrating command Joseph O'Connor welcomed the new facility, saying it had been a challenge to undertake training and response tasks without a permanent site.

"It is exciting to have the fleet out the back

and have the training centre under the same roof," he said.

"Previously, we were running out of a shed and our other equipment was stored else-

"Now it is really smooth as we can go to the one centre, grab whatever we need and then go.

"The commercial team can come into an office and conduct administrative duties, training and sales both on and off the site and stock supplies here instead of their house."

Mr O'Connor said the new facility allowed the volunteer organisation to continue to provide first aid training and products, first aid at events, youth development and social inclusion programs across the region.

"The Limestone Coast division provides many event health service coverage in the

lower South East, including the Mount Gambier show, the Christmas pageant, Generations In Jazz and we also assist with state events such as the Royal Adelaide Show and Schoolies," he said.

"Our team also has a bushfire response group which recently attended the Lucindale Blackford fire and assisted the CFS and other emergency services and the community in the relief centres at the staging grounds.

"The cadets are pretty much the backbone of St Johns because they are the future leaders... and the facility will be their new home.

"Cadets can come here for a few hours after school, hang out with everyone they know and learn something they have an interest in.

"Over the last three years we have built so many memories at the last facility, but now it's time to start making memories here."

At the official launch held last week, St

John Ambulance SA chief executive Mark Groote said the organisation was delighted to have a physical presence in the region.

"This is the first opening of a regional centre we have had in many, many years," he said.

"I have been told it has taken us about three years to find the right place and it has been a long journey for the team to make sure we get a space that is good, is in the right location and with the density we need.

'Everyone should be really proud of what we have here as a building.

"It is a place volunteers can finally call their own and also somewhere for our first aid students to come and do training."

Mr Groote hoped the new centre would encourage individuals to volunteer with St John and further support the dedicated group of adult volunteers and cadets.

MOUNT Gambier art teacher Yunita Manfrin will forever be seen as a bride on her wedding day to husband Paul, a running joke that's not far from reality for the couple.

Impacted by a severe vision impairment limiting his vision to just 5pc - it has also been around seven years since Paul clearly saw his twin children Cameron and Isabella, now 14.

While able to see defined shapes and some detail on a perfectly-lit day, Paul has entrusted the Manfrin family's newest member - five-year-old assistance dog Bree - to guide him throughout his day.

The close bond formed between Bree and the Manfrin family since 2018 has served as inspiration for Yunita's debut art exhibition, 19 pieces aimed at showcasing her talent while raising awareness for the role assistance dogs play for the visually impaired.

On display at Mount Gambier's Main Corner throughout April - coinciding with International Guide Dog Day - Ms Manfrin has produced fine art through to digital works to showcase Bree's vibrant personality in The Art Of Assistance.

Close family and friends were among the first to view the exhibition last Saturday ahead of its Sunday opening, an occasion a long time in the making for Ms Manfrin after her exhibition was postponed in April 2020 due to CO-VID-19.

With the majority of pieces based on lived experiences or photos taken on Ms Manfrin's mobile phone, the digital art teacher said she now had the confidence to showcase her art.

"It has taken many years of getting over people telling me other things to get to this point," Ms Manfrin said.

"That's why as an art teacher, all I'm doing

is building up the kids," she said.

That growth in confidence aligns with the similar experience of welcoming Bree into the family in what has been a life-changing move for the Manfrins.

"You have to accept that you are putting your trust into, really, a four year old to walk you around," Ms Manfrin said.

It has not stopped Paul from taking on challenges, including tackling the Mount Gambier Parkrun course around the Blue Lake with Bree leading the way.

The Art Of Assistance will be displayed at the Main Corner until April 30.

Dedication to the cause

POURING over 80 years of combined service and raising well in excess of \$70,000, Joy Axleby and Kathy Golder have made significant contributions to the Royal Society for the Blind (RSB).

Both Limestone Coast women were recently recognised for 42 years of volunteer service as key members of the Mount Gambier and Districts Club for the Visually Impaired.

The club has been instrumental in raising tens of thousands of dollars for the society through the sale of handmade arts and crafts, as well as RSB badge days and merchandise sales.

At its peak the club had an estimated 60plus members but numbers have declined over the years, with a committed group of six women still fundraising to support visually-impaired residents across the region.

Members recently used \$1000 raised over the festive season to purchase glasses to help a young boy with a significant impairment, as well as a talking watch, which was gifted to a woman.

Ms Axelby and Ms Golder reflected on their four decades of service last month when awarded a certificate of appreciation from the RSB.

Ms Golder recalled how to group was originally formed in support of a visually-impaired resident, with membership surging in the first 12 months.

"The elderly ladies would come together and used to knit squares," Ms Golder said.

Ms Axelby's original invitation to the group was to assist the men's card games, developing an interest in the craft aspect and eventually taking over the key fundraising effort.

In addition to raising money and awareness, the group also support visually-impaired residents through a number of initiatives to improve their quality of life.

Among the measures was the Talking Newspaper initiative, supported by Grant High School students, who would record

themselves reading The Border Watch on tape in the pre-digital era, which was passed on to residents.

Ms Golder said a lot of support focused on youth in the current day, with the club purchasing several iPads and other digital devices - considered 'gamechangers' for education, recreation and communication.

"To see the look on the children when they come to get it (a device), even the older ones, there is just such excitement," Ms Axelby added.

RSB executive director Damian Papps praised both women for their outstanding contribution - as well as that of their peers - in supporting the Limestone Coast's blind and vision impaired community over many years.

"Selfless service such as theirs is both humbling and inspiring, and on behalf of the entire team at RSB we extend our sincere thanks to both Joy and Kathy for their work over four decades which has assisted us in serving the blind and vison impaired community," Mr Papps said.

The Mount Gambier and Districts Club for the Visually Impaired meets Wednesdays at 9am at the former cycling club hall behind the Vansittart Park grandstand.

Members will also hold two fundraising stalls at Mount Gambier Marketplace on April 30 and May 7.

Finding Nemo: New species

A NEW jumping spider species has been discovered living in Limestone Coast swamps with its vibrant orange head and white-striped body earning it the name Nemo.

Research released today by Museums Victoria's Joseph Schubert identifies the peacock spider scientifically as Maratus nemo, the 92nd species within the genus.

It was first documented by Nature Glenelg Trust ecological field officer Sheryl Holliday while searching for orchids in a swamp near Nangwarry in November 2018, photographing the spider as it jumped through vegetation.

"I was out there looking for sun orchids and these little things caught my eye," Ms Holliday

"I knew all about peacock spiders because I had spent around three years looking for them but when I saw this spider I didn't know it was a peacock - I knew it was a jumping spider of some sort," she said.

After posting the images to social media, Mr Schubert contacted Ms Holliday believing she had made a world-first discovery given the male spider's vibrant colour appeared on its head, not the abdomen like a majority of peacock spiders.

The species' seasonal nature meant it wasn't until November last year that Ms Holliday was able to collect live specimens of the spider - each the size of a grain of rice - and send them to Victoria for further identifica-

Immature male peacock spiders do not get their colouration until their final moult - a key element in distinguishing the species from other spiders - while the females are larger but remain brown in colour.

In a twist of irony given its name, one spi-



der was collected on a fishing net while Ms Holliday was catching native fish at the Nature Glenelg Trust-managed Mount Burr Swamp.

"It is amazing to think this is the only place in the world this species has been found," Ms Holliday said.

"Jumping spiders are everywhere - it is just a matter of tuning your eye for that tiny bit of

The Maratus nemo does not weave a web, stalking its prey using its superior vision, but it does create string-like strands when it jumps as a 'safety rope' and weaves small cocoon-like

It is the 13th new species of spiders in the Maratus genus and 18th jumping spider Mr Schubert has identified, becoming a worldleading researcher at just 23 years of age.

Mr Schubert praised Ms Holliday for her work, highlighting the importance of citizen scientists in making new discoveries.

"Roughly only 30pc of Australia's biodiversity has been formally documented scientifically, so this means we could be losing species before we even knew that they existed," Mr Schubert said.

The colourful Maratus spider genus has grown in popularity in recent years thanks the peacock spiders' small size and intricate mating ritual, a 'dance' which has been enhanced with music and photoshopped elements.

"I think peacock spiders have captured the public's attention because they're really, really cute - they've got these massive forward-

facing eyes and you can kind of relate to them more than you could like a huntsman," Mr Schubert said.

Overwhelmed by the interest in the new species, it is not the first time Ms Holliday has made a world-first discovery in the last decade working as an ecological field officer, a world away from her 20-year career with Australia

With a long-held passion for finding and photographing orchids, Ms Holliday - a Mil Lel resident - discovered a tiny spotted blue flowered orchid now named helymitra abrupta, the Abrupt Sun Orchid.

The species had been reported on the Fleurieu Peninsula in the 1980s but had since disappeared, reemerging at the Marshes Native Forest Reserve north-west of Glencoe.

Humbled to have made the important ecological discoveries, Ms Holliday said the unique finds highlighted the importance of conservation.

"It is a reminder for people on the land that if they have a wetland, fence it off from livestock because you never know what could disappear before you even know about it," Ms Holliday said.

Halls get new lease on life

TWO halls at the heart of their communities have been given a new lease on life through federally-funded infrastructure upgrades.

Improvements to the Coonawarra Community Hall and Mil Lel Memorial Hall were unveiled late last month, modernising the facilities which serve as key community hubs for residents.

Coonawarra Soldiers Memorial Community Club invested heavily in its Project 100 hall upgrade, coinciding with the hall's centenary.

The club injected \$84,045 into the build, supporting by \$77,545 from the Federal Government's Building Better Regions Fund, \$2500 from Stand Like Stone Foundation and \$2000 each from Wattle Range Council and Bendigo Bank.

A new indoor/outdoor bar and dining space was created as part of the upgrade, which also included improved main hall flooring, paint works, a ceiling replacement and new toilet facility.

Coonawarra Soldiers Memorial Community Club committee member John Innes said the government grant was the most significant external funding the hall had received in its 100year history, enabling the project to be completed to mark its centenary.

"In maintaining the heritage of the building,

as well as enhancing its various spaces, the new and improved building will continue to serve future generations with increased capacity and vigour," Mr Innes said.

"The Coonawarra Hall is used very regularly for community events, wine industry gatherings film nights, choir practice and the all-important annual tomato competition," he said.

"We still have many more projects ahead of us and I think Project 100 has been a major boost, giving us great confidence for the future of the Coonawarra Hall."

Wattle Range Council Mayor Des Noll said the hall had been a major part of the local lifestyle, inviting the community to come together and connect with each other.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin opened the refurbished facilities last Friday, stating the development would strengthen the Coonawarra community. "With the increased capacity that this redevelopment has facilitated, I can see the hall will be used for more local events, especially as we emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic and as restrictions ease," Mr Pasin said.

Speaking to the significant \$152,000 Mil Lel Memorial Hall upgrade, Mr Pasin said there was a strong sense of community in Mil Lel and the hall had been at its heart for over 60 years.

The project - split between federal (\$77,000) and club (\$75,720) funding - included construction of a new ablution block to include new showers and toilets with disabled access.

"I know that there has been a committed fundraising effort to upgrade the amenities and I'm really pleased that the Federal Government was able to support this project," Mr Pasin said.

Mil Lel Memorial Park secretary Janet Phillips said after eight long years of fundraising, planning and the contribution of a Building Better Regions Fund grant, the project had a pleasing result.

"Mil Lel Memorial Park committee would like to thank Naralilla Homes for the great work they did and all those who contributed their time, donations and support to enable this project go ahead," Ms Phillips said. "The wider community will reap the benefits of the facilities for many more years to come."

\$15,000 regional student funds

TEN scholarships valued at \$15,000 have been launched to support students studying at TAFE SA's Mount Gambier campus.

The Destination Australia domestic scholarships will support students studying Certificate IV in Training and Assessment as part of a campaign encouraging people to enhance their skills and experience life in a regional city.

Dartmoor rail trail underway

The rail trail project, targeting 1.3km of unused rail track in the town centre, follows five years of community campaigning and will provide residents and visitors with an accessible sealed walking and bike path.

Once completed, the trail will connect the Dartmoor township through to Fort O'Hare camping ground, one of Glenelg Shire's most popular camping spots. Dartmoor Progress Association presi-

dent and key project advocate Wendy Dowling said last week's sod turning was a special day for the Dartmoor community.

"Five years ago we began our campaign

to secure a lease for the unused rail line and now the project is only months away from completion, it is a huge achievement for our township and we couldn't be more excited," Ms Dowling said.

"The rail trail will be a real asset not only for Dartmoor, but the Glenelg Shire as a whole, encouraging further visitation to our thriving region," she said.

Ms Dowling said the rail trail project - which is managed by Glenelg Shire Council and funded by the Federal Government - could be enjoyed and accessed by all community members.

"We are exceptionally lucky - we have a brilliant town with brilliant volunteers, and we thank all levels of government who played a part in ensuring this much-needed project could be realised."



Young guns of wine

TWO Limestone Coast residents have been shortlisted among 50 finalists in the 2021 Young Gun of Wine Wine Awards.

Coonawarra's Penley Estate winemaker Lauren Hensen and Wangolina owner and vigneron Anita Goode were selected after two days of intensive judging by a panel of leading industry figures from across the country.

The Goode family have farmed the land of Wangolina Station since 1923 after arriving in Mount Benson in the late 19th century.

Vines were planted on the sprawling property in 1999, with cabernet sauvignon, shiraz and sauvignon blanc going into the ground and the first wines were made in 2001.

At just 15 years of age, Ms Goode chose to do her work experience with Southcorp Wines - now Treasury Wine Estates - which was followed by a degree in winemaking and vintage seasons in America, Australia, Bordeaux and in Mount Benson.

Ms Goode gradually assumed control of the vineyard management from her father from 2013 and she has since replanted and grafted wines over from the original and more traditional plantings.

"In 2015, I took a risk and grafted half of my beloved semillon over to grüner veltliner, one of the first growers to use the Hahndorf Hill clones outside of the Adelaide Hills, and I'm still the only grower of grüner in the Limestone Coast," she said.

"The joy of being the sole winemaker and owner of Wangolina means that the decision making is always on me.??"I'm not responsible to anyone but myself when making the wine, and I have learnt how to be resourceful, resilient and reflective when mistakes have been

Ms Goode's other strong focus is to champion Mount Benson and Mundalla as regions, saying the areas are often diluted away into big company blends.

Ms Hansen arrived at Penley Estate via a three-year stint as the assistant winemaker for the legendary Pete Bissell at Balnaves.

She graduated from her viticulture and oenology agree as dux as 2012, before working in the Hunter Valley and Victoria.

Ms Hansen works alongside head winemaker Kate Goodman to refine Penley classics and dramatically reframe possibilities with project wines.

"Our goal is to create wines that show a modern approach to a classic style," she said.





Coast: public views sought

A PARLIAMENTARY committee will hear evidence in relation to the current status and potential reform to the Coast Protection Board in Mount Gambier next week.

Residents and councils are encouraged to present evidence and views on coastal views on coastal wiews on coastal management at a public hearing held by the Environment Resources and Development Committee on April 7.

The committee will tour sites of concern during the three-day visit, including Kingston, Robe, Cape Jaffa, Port MacDonnell, Southend and Beachport as part of the inquiry into the state's statutory body and associated regulations.

The board is a statutory body in South Australia that manages coasts and marine protection issues and provides advice on coastal development.

Protection and development in coastal areas and future management, inlacing community and stakeholder expectations, evidence-based decision making and managing reviews or appeals of decisions will be among the issues investigated by the committee.

The Limestone Coast Local Government Association will present evidence to the committee and highlight some of the challenges faced by councils in managing the coast and suggest changes and increased support for the region.

Kingston District Council will also discuss its coastal challenges, including beach and dune erosion, increased seagrass and sand accumulation.

Committee presiding member and MacKillop MP Nick McBride said it was important for the committee to visit and listen to regional communities before reporting to the parliament later in the year.

The committee will hear evidence at the Mount Gambier City Council chambers on April 7 from 1pm to 4pm and sessions are open to the public

Joint attack

THE Limestone Coast Landscape Board has urged the region's landholders to work with neighbours to produce a coordinated fox control program this season.

According to the board, a coordinated fox control program has proven effective at controlling pest fox numbers.

Limestone Coast landscape officer Saxon Ellis said baiting twice a year was key with early autumn timely given young foxes start to spread from the den, looking for new territory, food and are easily attracted to baits.

Early spring is also effective as vixens require more food during this time.

"There are a range of fox control methods that can be used such as ground shooting, baiting and fumigation of dens," Mr Ellis said.

"Other options may include using guard animals, trapping, exclusion fencing and fox deterrent lights," he said.

"Most effective control occurs if multiple methods are used and by teaming up with your neighbours in a coordinated approach.

"Additionally, whilst any effort to reduce feral fox numbers is a benefit to our landscape, a concentrated neighbourhood baiting program in a condensed period can reduce the fox population significantly whilst limiting the social impact of the baiting."

Foxes are a declared pest animal under the Landscape South Australia Act 2019 and the Limestone Coast Landscape Board is committed to reducing the impact of foxes to native wildlife and agriculture.

Landscape officers can supply 1080 and PAPP fox baits, canid pest ejector capsules, and trap hire.

An approval and notification process must be completed before baiting can be under-

There is a mandatory requirement to notify neighbours of baiting programs and specific distance requirements to assist with safety for dogs, and in some instances wildlife.

BRING BACK THE BIG BANDS: Generations In Jazz will return in April 2022.

Vision formed for iconic fest

THE future of Generations In Jazz has been put in the spotlight by organisers as they prepare a long-term vision for the nationally-renowned music showcase.

Key stakeholders joined organisers at strategic planning meetings last month to discuss the event's strengths, opportunities and direction, as well as its scheduled return in April 2022 following two successive postponements due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Generations in Jazz Board chairman Peter Roberts said normally the organisation would be in full swing managing the final stages for the event but was instead conducting a review and crafting a five-year plan.

"The board is intently focused on using this time to review the passion for and the 'why's' of holding this event, to ensure that the plan for the next five years reflects the best possible outcomes," Mr Roberts said. A second session

focused on the logistical feedback from those who are "hands on " in the event.

"This offered a valuable insight on what we do now and what we can do into the future," Mr Roberts said.

"Of course not only are we gethering this

"Of course not only are we gathering this feedback for the future five years, we are also very intent on planning a truly epic event for 2022 - really delivering the 'wow' factor.

"It is really important that our core market,

the schools, know that we are working hard to bring a truly great return event after two years of cancellations."

While not in a position to confirm guest artists just yet, Mr Roberts said artistic director James Morrison would deliver a Saturday evening concert you would only ever see at Generations in Jazz.

There have been acres and acres of baitfish working up out there in the last week or so, so the tuna should be here very soon.

The sea over the next week or two and into the Easter break looks fabulous.

I would say we will see a few more boats on the water and hopefully a few tuna.

The surf fishos have continued catching some reasonable fish this week.

I have heard of more gummy shark to 8kg from the Paradise and Green Point areas, along with plenty of snapper, some undersize mulloway and salmon.

There have been some more reports this week of some reasonable salmon coming from the Beachport Salmon Hole.

The guys fishing baits have done the best but the lure guys are getting solid numbers of slightly smaller fish.

If we are getting some good ones now, hopefully it is a sign for a cracking winter.

The garfish have improved.

A few of the keen anglers last week said that the fish were tapering off a bit, but now it seems they have come back in droves and we are seeing some of those big red-beaked winter fish turning up.

The usual haunts around Cape Douglas, Livingstons Bay and Pelican Point have fished quite well for both the waders and the boaties.

A few anglers have fished the Port MacDonnell jetty for garfish with some nice results.

The beauty of the jetty is the variety of fish you will find in there.

Rotate earns a shot at cup

PORTLAND greyhound Rotate opened his winning account this year for owner-trainer Robert Halliday when surprising in the Swallow Drive Meats Open Stake over 512 metres at last Sunday's Tara Raceway meeting.

One of the outsiders in the six-dog field, the blue dog gained a clear passage early from box eight before settling in second spot midrace behind the well-fancied Spring Value who looked to be travelling like a winner.

But off the back Rotate found the front before running out a three-quarters of a length winner in 30.03 seconds over \$2.10 favourite Silent Jacko, while the early leader was a further half-length back in third spot.

For the son of General Destini and Guru Doll it was his 10th win from 50 starts, Halliday later saying he would run Rotate in the Commercial Hotel Mount Gambier Cup heats (512m) in a fortnight's time.

"Look, I wouldn't expect that he would make it through to the cup final but there's always the cup consolation to fall back on," Halliday said.

The long-time trainer has never won a Mount Gambier Cup but was successful in the 2018 cup consolation with his former terrific chaser Hutch who defeated Henry in a best-of-day time of 29.56 seconds.

In fact, Hutch contested three Mount Gambier Cups, reaching the 2017 final which was won by the flying Fabregal.

The following year he finished unplaced in a heat behind Print The Money before winning the consolation.

Then, in 2019, he ran Aston It Is to $1\frac{3}{4}$ lengths in a heat.

Meanwhile, Koroit trainer Peter Keane was back at Tara Raceway with Gotcha Laz for last Sunday's Bartholomew Pick 6 Grade 5 final (400m)

This was after being initially unaware the brindle dog's outstanding win at the track the previous week had been in a heat.

"To be honest, I had no idea that the race he won had been a heat until I received an email from GRSA a few days' later informing me that Gotcha Laz had drawn box seven in last Sunday's final," Keane said.

"I should have been aware of the procedure in relation to heats and final races at SA tracks.

"As a result Lindsay (Brookes) and I made the trip over with only one dog when we could have brought a few more had the nominations not already been closed."

But for all that, the trip turned out to be worthwhile after Gotcha Laz, a member of the successful Fernando Bale x Sisco Sizzle litter, turned in an another outstanding effort in last Sunday's final when leading all the way to defeat Aston Model by 1¾ lengths in 22.92 seconds.

Gotcha Laz is now likely to tackle the Formula 400 at cup time. This is an Open event over 400 metres with heats on Sunday, April 11 and the final complementing the Mount Gambier Cup on Sunday, April 18.

The Keane-trained pair Me Silly and Hello Keen, both littermates of Gotcha Laz, are also likely to return for the Mount Gambier Cup heats after recently clocking 30.00 seconds and 30.04 seconds respectively over 512 metres when placed behind Rough In Vegas.

Additional track funding

FOLLOWING consultation between Greyhound Racing SA Strategic Projects Manager Scott Wuchatsch and the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club committee, additional funding has been allocated for agreed projects at Tara Raceway.

Projects the committee identified as funding priorities were a greyhound ambulance (John Deere Gator), an upgraded water trailer (manual track irrigation) and a concrete tractor turnaround.

In addition, the committee believed there was a need for additional wash bays in the vicinity of the kennel house.

Also identified as a priority were new entrances to the facility along with perimeter fencing.

Wuchatsch said the estimated cost of the agreed projects would be in the vicinity of \$110,000.

"Other suggested projects include a concrete kerb along the front straight, a second slipping track, automated greyhound educational circuit, septic system for kennel house and maintenance/vehicle shed," Wuchatsch said.

Iron Arrow testing

IT was a foray into untested stamina territory for three members of the Blue Lake Archers who entered the recent Great Southern Archers Iron Arrow archery endurance contest.

Ian Harris, Ben Kilsby and Paul Freeman nominated into the endurance test which pitted them against outdoor target, field and indoor archery rounds, all in the same day.

To put it into perspective, the local archers normal event repertoire varies from 60 and up to 120 arrows for a full session on the range, 90 arrows being the most common local event.

The Iron Arrow required 222 arrows to be shot and scored in a single day across three different venues.

The day began at Strathalbyn at 9am as the 15 archers lined up for a 90-arrow outdoor target WA 60/900 event, a familiar round to the local archers who compete in that round

The initial event concluded at lunch with a break before a shift to the less familiar field archery event at the GSA field range.

A trek through the 24-target bushland field archery course in warm conditions greeted the archers, with a total of 72 arrows required.

The final challenge after a 40 km drive to GSA's Goolwa indoor range put the group back on more familiar territory as they tackled a double Australian indoor round totalling 60 arrows, the same as a regular Friday night on the Mount Gambier indoor range.

The long day concluded with a presentation immediately after the indoor round, a full 12 hours after the day began.

Harris competed in the Veteran plus division, Freeman in the Masters division and Kilsby in the Open.

An unusual scoring system effectively added bonus points for the field and indoor sections to acknowledge those archers completing all three events.

The trio representing Blue Lake Archers were fatigued at the end of the day, but all three successfully completed the day that saw several archers retire during the events.

Freeman and Harris were in the senior division and received certificates for completing the entire challenge.

In the open men's division Ben Kilsby went even better and was declared the overall win-



The two combined under the LCFA for the upcoming season, with the hope to streamline the sport and showcase the women's game more.

However, the rules now state unless a female does not have a club to play for, she cannot play in the men's competition.

It leaves some outlying clubs such as Millicent in a difficult situation where women have been relied on to fill the numbers on game day in the men's competition.

Millicent Soccer Club co-president Ian Lines said he will take the decision to a president's meeting next week in the hope to have the rule overturned.

"About four or five weeks ago the (LCFA) board decided to ban women from playing the men's game," he said.

They wanted to push the women's game a bit more and they also suggested if you let the women play in the men's comp, you have to let the men play in the women's comp.

"Some of the regional clubs like us rely on girls topping up the boys teams, especially are doing here. our junior grades."

Lines said it was also important for the improvement of the women's game overall.

"If you have a talented female you want

them to play in the best competition you can," he said. "If you want to make the next Jenna Mc-

Cormick they have to play in the boy's league to get that competitive edge to improve themselves. "It improves their own skills and they take

it back to the girl's competition and improve that.'

Lines said he believed most clubs wanted the rule overturned.

Caroline Dower, whose daughter Eliza has played in Millicent's mixed competition since starting the mini roo program, said the

ruling will have a significant impact on her wellbeing and sense of self.

"She has fostered really important relationships with her teammates and identifies them as being her friends, through under 12's, under 14's and now under 17's," she

"This has consistently been her team that she has trained with and played with for years and for her now to be told purely on gender she is no longer allowed to be part of this team is outrageous.

"It is really important for any child to have an opportunity to belong and she feels she belongs to this club and with this team."

Dower said there was no consultation with affected parents and players, many of whom who have already started pre-selection training.

"The LCFA have had no consultation with the clubs and they have just made a decision," she said.

"My understanding is they are meant to represent the clubs, but that is not what they

"I have concerns about the decision-making process and I have significant concerns about the impact for our club, teams and individual players."

However, LCFA president Eric Nieto said women were not banned from playing in the men's competition.

He said with the two leagues now one entity, players could not have dual registrations to allow them to play in both.

"The women haven't been banned,' he

"We have a women's competition and if there is a position for you to play in the women's competition, you should play in the women's competition.

"If your club doesn't have a women's team, you can play in the men's competition."

All clubs currently have women's teams, der their umbrella so we got that. hich leaves the girls with only the one competition to play in.

Nieto said there was a lot more to the decision, which was designed to ensure the women's game flourished.

"What you find in the past is the girls were playing three games a weekend playing SEWFA and Limestone Coast," he said.

"Then 'little Johnny' is sitting on the bench twiddling his thumbs while there were girls playing three games.

"Let's say, if a club has girls who want to play in the boy's competition and they go up to Under 17 boys, you might not have enough girls to have a women's team.

"You are then forfeiting your women's team because you don't have enough play-

"The clubs wanted a women's comp un-

"What is the point of bringing the women across if you are going to let them play in the men's competition and forfeit the women's."

Nieto said there were other factors in play

He said if the decision was overturned it would open the door for men to play in the women's competition.

"If you go down that path where you want girls to play in the boy's league, there is nothing wrong with a man playing in the senior women's competition," Nieto said.

"If you open it for the women, you have to open it for the men.

"We are not there to favour men or women - we have to give them a fair opportunity.

"We have tried to cover every angle with what is best for men and women equally."
