Marina issues stack up

KINGSTON District Council will spend up to \$750,000 per year - or 19.2pc of its annual rate revenue of \$3.2m - on dredging works at the Cape Jaffa Marina to maintain the marine facility, a parliamentary committee has heard.

Kingston District Council chief executive Nat Traeger said issues at the marina, which was temporarily closed to mariners in 2018, was the result of "bad data, bad decisionmaking and lack of evidence around what would be good decision-making processes on a coastline".

Bait ban push

A MOUNT Gambier family has called for a ban of a lethal poison used for controlling wild pests after the agonising death of two pets suspected to have ingested the pesticide.

After witnessing the beloved dogs Bear and Luna suffer their final hours withering in pain, the family - who asked not be named - believes the dogs died after eating poison laced in a meat-based bait.

The chemical sodium fluoroacetate, commonly known by its brand name of 1080, is used to kill introduced "pest animals" such as feral dogs, foxes, cats and rabbits.

While proponents of the bait say 1080 is essential to protect livestock and native animals being mauled by feral pests, the family want it banned, claiming baiting programs were dangerous and inhumane.

The incident allegedly occurred in Piccan-

nine Ponds Conservation Park - a place the state's Environment Department said is annexed for conservation purposes with pets, including dogs, not permitted to enter.

But the family - which discovered more bait on the beach following the death of their dogs - said there was no formal signage from the South Australian side to warn of baiting in progress.

'Support the vulnerable': MP

MEMBER for Mount Gambier Troy Bell has urged the State Liberals to lobby its Federal counterparts to permanently increase the JobSeeker payment to combat hundreds of residents being pushed into poverty.

The independent MP said Limestone Coast-based welfare agencies, including Lifeline South East, Salvation Army and ac.care had reported an increase in the number of people who are homeless and accessing services.

Mr Bell told parliament that agency members were concerned along with a lack of mental health and substance abuse support services, their clients' woes will be compounded once JobSeeker payments decrease at the end of March.

"The revised payment, even with a \$50 increase in the former Newstart payment, will destine people to try and manage on a payment that is a long way below the poverty line," he said.

"We implore the South Australian Liberal government to advocate for a long-term increase in JobSeeker to a level that is sustainable and allows people opportunities to afford basic necessities and climb out of poverty.

"They have also asked me as their local member to help raise this issue with the State Government to increase its spending on social housing.

"More investment in this area will not only help our clients but also provide an economic stimulus as well as meeting a vital need going forward."

Mr Bell said agencies were also worried about the lack of affordable, safe and emergency housing for residents, with requests for accommodation rising by 30pc in the past



few months. He said some women are being housed in tents due to a lack of accommodation availability, saying more community and social housing was desperately needed in the region.

"Currently in the Limestone Coast area, rental prices have increased exponentially," he said.

"Real estate agents confirm applications for every property far outnumber the properties available.

"Single adults without children who are on JobKeeper do not have affordability to rent housing in addition to paying for utilities, food and other living expenses."

Mr Bell said challenges in securing rental accommodation was exacerbated for Centrelink recipients and others on low incomes and long waits currently exist for Housing SA rentals.

"A client was told they were on category 1 for public rental and on top of the list," he said.

"They are still waiting for a property 12

months later.

"All attempts to secure private rental have

"All attempts to secure private rental have been unsuccessful."

In a statement, Human Services Minister Michelle Lensink said the State Government provided a range of annual initiatives to support vulnerable South Australians, including the cost of living concession and water and energy subsidies.

Ms Lensink said private rental subsidies are already available through Commonwealth Private Rental Assistance and eligible South Australians can receive up to \$185 per fortnight.

She said the government committed ad-

ditional funding during the COVID-19 pandemic to support the state's most vulnerable including a \$7.3m initiative to ensure South Australians were accommodated in motels and hotels.

"In addition to this support, the State Government also provides financial assistance for bonds, rent in advance and rent in arrears, which helps people to access or maintain private rental accommodation," she said.

Ms Lensink said the government had also committed \$400m to deliver 1000 new affordable homes across the state - including in regional South Australia - by 2025.

The minister's office directed questions regarding JobSeeker payments to the Federal Government, saying rate increases was the role of the Commonwealth.



Dog death prompts bait plea

A MOUNT Gambier family has called for a ban of a lethal poison used for controlling wild pests after the agonising death of two pets suspected to have ingested the pesticide.

After witnessing the beloved dogs Bear and Luna suffer their final hours withering in pain, the family - who asked not be named - believes the dogs died after eating 1080 laced in a meat-based bait.

The chemical sodium fluoroacetate, commonly known by its brand name of 1080, is used to kill introduced "pest animals" such as feral dogs, foxes, cats and rabbits.

While proponents of the bait say 1080 is essential to protect livestock and native animals being mauled by feral pests, the family want it banned, claiming baiting programs were dangerous and inhumane.

Two weeks ago, the family noticed one of the their two Border Collie x Kelpies acting irrationally while at their Mount Gambier prop-

"We thought Bear had been bitten by a snake because he was screaming, yelping and vomiting, but we had a look around and we couldn't find anything," the family said.

"He was in agony, but the symptoms only lasted 10 minutes before he died.

"He used his last bit of life to get to his bonded mate Luna, where he died as my partner held him.

"We didn't even have time to get him to the vet because we didn't know what was going

Just three hours after the death of Bear, Luna started exhibiting similar symptoms, prompting the family to rush their beloved Border Collie cross Kelpie to the vet.

"She started screaming and started running around the backyard, her eyes were wide and started having a seizure," the family said.

"As soon as she arrived, Luna died on the vet floor, but the vet brought her back and kept on giving her medication to ease the pain.

"The vet asked if we wanted to get her stomach pumped and we said yes, but Luna was in such a fragile state - her heart rate was beating from 210bpm to 240bpm.

"We were told to go home and wait and at 8am, we got a call saying Luna had another seizure and due to its intensity and how weak her body was, she suffered a heart attack."

The family were told by the vet - who they claim initially suspected 1080 poisoning Luna had died four times on the operating

Attempts to contact the treating vet were unsuccessful, with the company saying disclosure of information was against policy.

"The vet told us to keep an eye out for any evidence of 1080 because of the way Bear had died - the position, the arched back, the wide eves and open mouth and how quickly rigour mortis had set in," the family said.

After returning to their home, the family

found undigested pellets in a pool of vomit not treated promptly." near Bear's bed.

"We thought Bear ate the bait, vomited and Luna ate part of his vomit and died as a result of secondary poisoning," the family said.

"We initially thought someone might have purposely baited the dogs, but we couldn't find any evidence.

"Earlier on in the day, my partner took Bear to the beach and after found out Luna had passed, we took a drive to Piccanninie Ponds to try and figure out if it was some-

"We found bait on the beach, just scattered everywhere and marked with bright pink flags.

"There were no visible signs from the South Australian side, the only sign that was up was facing the Victorian border and you could hardly see it from a distance.'

But the state's Environment Department said as the area is annexed for conservation purposes pets, including dogs, are not permitted to enter and signs advising the public that dogs are not permitted within Piccannine Ponds Conservation Park are in place.

A department spokesperson said the use of 1080 was preferred for fox control as it does not affect the native wildlife that are present within the area.

"Foxes are known to be in the area and are a widespread problem in the Limestone Coast causing destruction to our native wildlife, particularly nesting shorebirds including the threatened Hooded Plover, but also to primary producers," the spokesperson said.

"As required for fox baiting, legal specified warning signs that 1080 baiting is currently being undertaken are in place at all official entrances and continue to be displayed.

"Alternatives exist however they are more toxic to wildlife and remain toxic to dogs if

While recognising the need to control introduced species such as fox, an RSPCA SA spokesperson argued the control methods should be as humane as possible, with available evidence on the effect of 1080 indicating it is not a humane poison.

The animal welfare organisation said a new type of lethal bait called PAPP, which causes a drop of haemoglobin levels leading to lethargy and weakness followed by loss of consciousness and death - has been approved for use for wild dog and fox control.

"Pets are unfortunately at risk because of their natural behaviour, consuming things they find," the spokesperson said.

"It is concerning to see the number of reports that come to us were people suspect their pet has eaten something poisonous, but they haven't taken them to a vet.

"Clearly that is not the case with the owners of these two dogs and we're appalled that these animals suffered and died in this way.'

The RSPCA SA spokesperson urged pet owners to watch animals while walking to ensure dogs do not ingest something that is potentially harmful.

Coalition of Australians Against 1080 Poison co-founder Alex Vince said despite assurances there are stringent regulations for 1080 baiting programs, non-target animal deaths were not uncommon.

Mr Vince said the deaths of Luna and Bear are believed to be the second 1080-related fatality in the region, with more than 60 sheep found dead on a Bordertown property after a landholder failed to store a large drum of 1080-laced oats.

"Until Australia catches up with the rest of the world and prohibits the use of 1080 tragedies like these will continue to occur", he said.

"No amount of regulation or legislation can prevent them and nothing short of a ban is going to be good enough for the families who have lost loved ones to 1080 poison".

Australia is one of a handful of countries in the world that permits 1080 for baiting programs, along with New Zealand, Japan, Israel, Mexico and South Korea.

The odourless and tasteless poison is banned in most countries, including the United States, where it was outlawed in the early

RAAF Anzac Day flyover secured

MOUNT Gambier has secured a Royal Australian Air Force flyover during the traditional street march, which will return along with a public dawn service following last year's COVID-19 restriction-affected

Mount Gambier Community RSL president Bob Sandow said a flyover request had been granted for April 25, with a military aircraft to fly over Commercial Street during the parade in a rare privilege for the community.

While the aircraft involved in the flyover will be a surprise on the day due to RAAF's resource management, Mr Sandow said organisers were delighted with the inclusion.

"We've not had a set flyover from the air force since I've been here," Mr Sandow said, praising Mount Gambier Aero Club members for their efforts in recent years.

"I just hope whatever comes is flying at 50 feet instead of 500.'

The Australian Defence Force contribution adds to a week-long calendar of events to mark Anzac Day in the Limestone Coast, with Mr Sandow welcoming the return of traditional services following last year's altered

"There was always going to be something on Anzac Day this year," Mr Sandow said.

"I work with our local police force here and they do know we try to do the right thing and we insist people do the right thing," he

Mr Sandow said the public's cooperation

at Remembrance Day had given the RSL branch the confidence to push ahead with Anzac Day planning.

While stricter measures remain in place at metropolitan ceremonies, Mr Sandow said all next of kin would be permitted to march on Anzac Day, while the community is invited to line Commercial Street to pay their respects.

With the Dawn Service at Vansittart Park scheduled for 6.10am, Mr Sandow also encouraged residents to mark the occasion in their own way, including standing at the end of their driveway - a sign of respect which grew in prominence last year due to COV-ID-19 restrictions.

"I liked what was done last year and I suspect there will be a few people who do that again," Mr Sandow said.

"I see it as a positive way to encourage the children to be involved.

"I also have a commitment as RSL president to do something for the veterans and for the community.

"While I'm president there will always be something.'

Mr Sandow said the street march was an important and symbolic show of respect on Anzac Day

"The march is the same as in years ago when people marched past a mate's coffin,"

"It is not there to wave and cheer, it is the solemn part," he said.

"The service at the end is there just as the service at the coffin was."

Reflecting on the importance of dates

such as April 25 and November 11, Mr Sandow encouraged the community to take part in services or pay respects in their own way.

"I still maintain we walk on their shoulders - they did what they did to allow us to do what we do today," Mr Sandow said.

The recent issue of medallions to World War II veterans, marking 75 years since the conflict ended, has also helped connect the RSL with veterans.

"We thought once Charlie (Miller) passed we had three World War II veterans left, now we have about seven," he said.

"A lot of these particular people are living in aged care homes and we don't see them, we don't know them"

Mr Sandow said around 200 people involved in modern conflicts - such as Iraq and Afghanistan - lived in the region and hoped more would connect with the RSL.

"We try and do what we can to support everyone within our budget," Mr Sandow said.

"When you consider three years ago we were a week from closing - we're still here."

The region's Anzac Day celebrations will also be boosted by a visit from Royal Australian Navy captain Matthew Richie, who manages the upkeep and updates of Collins Class Submarines.

Residents and visitors attending Anzac Day services across the region will be required to complete a COVID sign-in prior to entering

People not prepared to abide by COVID restrictions are asked not to attend public ser-

Drink-drive risk failed

LIMESTONE Coast police nabbed eight drink drivers across the Easter weekend, which remained fatality free for the region. A targeted safety campaign leading into the four-day period was largely heeded by the community, with police resources bolstered to manage the holiday influx.

Among those detected over the weekend included a 66-year-old Henley Beach South man on Good Friday, stopped at a driver testing site at Beachport where he recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.124.

Around five hours later at 1am on April 3, a 26-year-old Naracoorte man recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.035 at Robe, breaching his probationary driver's licence. A 39-year-old Kingston Park woman visiting Robe and a 23-year-old woman in Mount Gambier were also stopped and tested on Saturday, returning blood alcohol readings of 0.053 and 0.084 respectively.

Police stopped a 34-year-old Millicent man in Beachport around 1am on Sunday, April 4, with the rider given a expiation notice for riding an uninsured and unregistered motorcycle. He also produced a blood alcohol reading of a 0.068 and was reported for drink driving. Later that day at 9.30pm police stopped a 20-year-old Mil Lel man on Wehl Street North, Mount Gambier, with the driver recording a blood alcohol reading of 0.109.

About half an hour later, police responded to reports of an alleged drunk driver in a vehicle on Penola Road, Mount Gambier. A 43 year old Mount Gambier man provided a blood alcohol reading of 0.181.

Penalties varied from expiation notices to immediate loss of licence and 28-day vehicle impoundment.

Book explores cost of frontline service

AS a founding member of the 9th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, former Mount Gambier resident Mick Bawden deployed to South Vietnam as part of Australia's commitment to the Vietnam War in 1968.

Mr Bawden's training as a professional army officer had instilled in him a strong sense of duty and when deployed, was keen to test his training in combat.

However, like many other veterans of the Vietnam War and other conflicts involving Australians, the experience had a prolonged impact on his life and the life of his wife Mardi.

Author and veteran Max Carmichael has released a new book detailing the Bawden's post-war experiences titled 'The Cost of Duty', which aims to critique social and political attitudes to military and first respond-

Mr Carmichael said the book aimed to remind the community of the physical and mental issues faced by servicemen and women, as well as all other first responders, in carrying out their duty and the impact those costs have on their families.

"I am a veteran myself, having served two tours to East Timor and one in Bouganville all under the UN flag," he said.

"In comparison to many my active service was fairly quiet, however as I argue in the book, it involved a personal cost.

"I realised all duty involve a cost, but members of the military and other first responders often pay a greater cost, even if that cost does not involve being wounded or

"Sadly many civilians either ignore this fact or simply forget it except perhaps on


cial occasions such as Anzac Day, politicians on the other hand often deliberately choose to ignore this cost.

"They are only too happy to send folk in harms way, but are rarely prepared to deal with the aftermath of their decisions."

Mr Carmichael said Vietnam veterans were treated particularly poorly by society on their return to civilian life and believed he could best highlight the cost of duty by following the experience of a returned solider and his family.

"I have known Mick and Mardi Bawden for many years, having met Mick when I joined the Citizen Military Forces - today's Army Reserve - in Mount Gambier in 1965,"

"I was aware Mick has had some difficult dealing with his wartime experiences and as

I approached him for permission to tell his story.

"At first he was reluctant, then agreed, then after a short time withdrew his consent as he found the process too upsetting. "Some months later he contacted me again and asked if I could recommence.

"I am sure if was a painful process for both Mick and Mardi, but the book has now been completed.

"I have chosen to highlight the experiences of the Bawden's as I believe they are typical of those who have paid, and are still paying, the cost of duty."

The battalion served a year-long tour of duty based out of Nui Dat, conducting operations mainly in the Phuoc Tuy Province as part of the 1st Australian Task Force.

Their first major operation, Operation

Goodwood, was undertaken in response to the increasing presence of Viet Cong forces

Over the course of the tour, the battalion undertook eleven major operations that lasted roughly a month each.

The battalion remained in South Vietnam until November 1969.

Sadly, 35 members were killed and another 150 were wounded.

South Australian singer-songwriter and honorary member of the 9th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment John Schumann said the book was an important piece of work.

"All of us must remember the price our veterans and their families pay," he said.

"Lest we forget."

The book will be launched at the Mount Gambier RSL on Saturday, April 24 at 3pm.

\$750k coastal costs detailed

KINGSTON District Council will spend up to \$750,000 per year - or 19.2pc of its annual rate revenue of \$3.2m - on dredging works at the Cape Jaffa Marina to maintain the marine facility, a parliamentary committee has heard.

The seaside council detailed its significant issues at the Cape Jaffa Marina, Wyomi Beach, Maria Creek and the Kingston Jetty to members of the Environment, Resources and Development Committee at a hearing in Mount Gambier on Wednesday.

Kingston District Council chief executive Nat Traeger said issues at the marina, which was temporarily closed to mariners in 2018, was the result of "bad data, bad decision-making and lack of evidence around what would be good decision-making processes on a coastline".

"There were some instances where there should have been sand management over many years, but it was just neglected," she said.

"What the result of that is, is a marina that is silted up and closed to mariners.

"We eventually got it open but... the sheer challenge of keeping that particular marina open, which is home to a commercial fishing fleet, is very, very onerous on the council."

In 2019, council co-contributed \$1.5m for a dredge to be used at the marina, which was developed in partnership with a private developer and includes a residential subdivision.

"We are spending anywhere between \$700,000 to \$750,000 a year just to operate the dredge to see that open...three quarters of a million dollars is a lot in a \$3.9m rate revenue," Ms Traeger said.

"After owning the dredge for two years, we have finally got it out to the western beach.

"Even then, it is out there and operating like it should, it is still operating at a cost of three quarters of a million dollars and it will for some time until we have got that particular marina back to a sustainable position after dealing with that form of neglect and poor decision-making around coastal impacts and coastal environments and data."

Ms Traeger said the councils coastal issues were further exacerbated by sand and seagrass build up at the Maria Creek boat launching facility, which has been closed to recreational fishers for almost two years.

She said reinstating the marine facility was estimated to cost \$7.6m in addition to \$720,000 in ongoing operational costs.

"Add \$720,000 a year in the cost of ongoing operational costs to the cost of dredging at Cape Jaffa, you're already up to \$1.5m and you're already at a large proportion of your rate revenue without taking stock of any other normal local government function that needs to happen," she said.

"Our long-term financial plan without Maria Creek was not expecting us to return to a surplus for some four or five years."

The council chief said elected members had adopted an in principle position not to proceed with the reinstatement of the boat ramp after an independent report found rate revenue would need to increase by up to 19pc to fund the project.

Council has undertaken a ratepayer survey to determine community support for the facility and to help elected members in the final decision-making process.

The results will be tabled at Kingston District Council's upcoming monthly meeting.

Ms Traeger said the removal of the groyne was estimated to cost up to \$2.4m, with further investigation needed to be undertaken to mitigate environmental impacts such as flooding.

She also raised concerns with the State Government-owned Kingston Jetty, saying council was "having trouble trying to comprehend why we should spend money on that when it does not own it". "In 2016... the repair bill on that was \$2m," she said.

"We are currently trying to do a gap analysis between 2016 and now to find out what that new repair bill is going to be.

"The damage on this jetty with the sand inundation and the way it is dilapidated is an everyore"

Ms Traeger called on the State Government and the Coast Protection Board to consider long-term funding pathways as opposed to annual grant funding processes, saying it would provide councils with security and confidence to incorporate significant projects and the potential of co-contributions into strategic funding.

Keith hospital thrown lifeline

MACKILLOP MP Nick McBride has welcomed a State Government funding agreement of \$3m over two years for the Keith District Hospital, but says the uncertainty of the facility's long-term future will be of a concern to the community.

The hospital will be supported until December 2022, with the State Government providing \$1.5m to the facility each year.

Health Minister Stephen Wade said the funding, which comes in addition to more than \$3.5m to support the hospital since 2018, will support the hospital's board transition to a new model of services.

An additional \$200,000 in funding is also being provided to engage a project lead to support the development of a Health Care Hub model, working with the Commonwealth and State Governments to strengthen sustainability of services in the area.

But Mr McBride said the expiry of the funding and development of a new service model will be a concern for both the hospital board and the community who "won't know where they will be after the two years".

"The Keith District Hospital board and the community will welcome the offer that has been made by the minster, which has been three years in the making," he said. "The board and the community will hopefully take the opportunity to use the facility and hopefully it can operate in a way that SA Health looks favourably at whatever hospital model may be suggested after the two-year funding has ended.

"It will be interesting to see how the Keith District Hospital board and the Limestone Coast Lower Health Network investigate what services and facilities will be at the hospital after this period."

In a statement, Mr Wade said the government was committed to working with the management of the privately-run Keith Hospital to provide the best long-term health care.

"The Marshall Liberal Government made a commitment to deliver better health care, closer to home, for regional South Australians and we are delivering on that promise," he said.

"The Limestone Coast Local Health Network will continue to support the Keith Hospital board as they work through the provision of health care for Keith and the surrounding districts."

Limestone Coast Local Health Network chair Grant King said the funding commitment will provide greater certainty for the community as they work to develop a longer term model of care.

Murderer jailed for 34 years

A KALANGADOO man drank at least a carton of beer before getting in an argument with his teenage son and shooting the 19-year-old and his son's girlfriend dead, a court has heard.

Pawel Klosowski, 46, was sentenced to at least 34 years in jail for the murder of Lukasz Klosowski and his son's girlfriend Chelsea Ireland in August last year at his Mount McIntyre property.

In sentencing, Justice Anne Bampton told the Adelaide Supreme Court Klosowski's contact with his son was irregular following the divorce from his mother in 2012, with Lukasz telling friends he did not talk to his father much and he "got angry easily and drank a lot".

Justice Bampton said in the months prior to the shooting, Lukasz noticed his father wanted to build a relationship and arranged to visit with his girlfriend on the weekend of August 21.

"Prior to visiting you, Chelsea told friends that she did not want to go but she wanted to be there to support Lukasz," she said.

"She told a friend that you were always drunk and you would argue with and make fun of Lukasz which would upset him."

The day after the pair's arrival, Klosowski started to drink beer at 9.30am and after drinking about six beers at his stepson's morning football game, he purchased a carton of beer on the way home.

Klosowski's wife purchased another carton of beer later in the afternoon and the defendant's request on the way home.

In the evening, Lukasz told the defendant he was considering moving out of his mother's

home to live with friends, to which Klosowski "badgered Lukasz to talk about moving out, which caused him to become upset."

Chelsea exchanged messages with a friend at 10.46pm describing the evening has having "turned to shit", adding "Lukasz is literally crying in front of him and he has nothing to say and he keeps bringing money into everything".

Chelsea said she also started crying and Klosowski's wife told her "that this happens every single week, if it's not about Lukasz it's about one of the other kids."

Klosowski told the pair to leave the property, with Lukasz saying "f—k this" prompting the defendant to physically assault his son

and his girlfriend.

"Your wife and Chelsea went into the spare room where Lukasz was on his back on the bed with his hands up in front of his chest," Justice Bampton said.

"Your stepson could hear Chelsea saying "Stop, stop, this is your son".

"As you went to leave the room Chelsea swore at you... you stormed over to her, pushed her on the bed and held yourself over her.

"You then got off the bed stating 'f—k this, where's my gun?"

Klosowski's wife followed him to the gun safe and pleaded with him not to get a gun before returning upstairs telling her two children to get out of the house and hide.

"As Lukasz appeared at the top of the stairs your wife saw you raise the gun and fire a shot at him from the base of the staircase," Justice Bampton said.

"You moved up the stairs firing a second shot at close range, striking Lukasz in the upper right-hand side of his chest."

At 11.21pm, Chelsea contacted 000 and told the operator she had sought refuge in a locked bathroom and "you were trying to shoot them".

Klosowski reloaded the gun and fired at the door to gain entry into the bathroom, before firing a second shot striking Chelsea in the back of her shoulder.

Police arrived at the property at 12.10am and found Klosowski's wife hiding with her two children while the defendant was seated on the couch in the lounge room with the gun

on his lan

A court psychiatrist said Klosowski - who was estimated to have a blood alcohol level of .22 at the time of the offence - qualified for a diagnosis of alcohol use disorder, and said the large amount of alcohol the defendant consumed was a "much more prominent cause" for offending behaviour.

Justice Bampton said Klosowski reported suffering "a few head injuries and being involved in two high-speed motor vehicle accidents" and started experiencing seizures from the age of 30.

She said a psychologist determined the offending behaviour was related to a combination of background personality, relationship issues along with intoxication, situational frustration and an underlying frontal lobe impairment and intermittent explosive disorder.

"In your anger and intoxication, while your 15-year-old stepson, your 11-year-old stepdaughter and their mother hid, you pursued your son and having shot and killed him, you pursued Chelsea and shot her dead," Justice Bampton said.

"The circumstances of your offending are at the higher end of seriousness for the offence of murder.

"A substantial non-parole period is necessary as you have committed two separate offences of murder involving the use of a firearm against two young people who presented no threat to you."

Klosowski will be 80 before he is eligible to apply for parole.

Ex-Bordertown man convicted of rape

A FORMER Bordertown man who broke into a house while on a "drug bender" and raped a woman while she was sleeping has been jailed for at least 12 years.

Michael Paul Benfell, 26, appeared in the Adelaide District Court in March for sentencing after he was found guilty of two counts of rape and one count of aggravated serious trespass.

The court heard in the early hours of April 10, 2018, Benfell entered the home of a Parkside share house through an unlocked door and waited in the unlit lounge area until the victim went to bed.

Sometime later, Benfell entered the bedroom of the victim - who was not known to him - while she was asleep and sexually assaulted her.

"At all times the lights were off in the bedroom and... the room was dark," Judge Paul Slattery said.

"The victim was still rousing from a very deep sleep and on her then level of compre-

hension she thought that you were [her boy-friend].

Judge Slattery said there were further acts of rape, with the victim initially thinking it was her partner. According to Judge Slattery, the victim re-

alised Benfell was not her boyfriend due to certain conduct during the offending. "The victim then knew it was not [her

boyfriend] as he would never act in that manner," Judge Slattery said. "As she reached for the light switch you yelled 'Don't'... you grabbed her arm forc-

ibly, you threw her onto the bed.

"In the light, the victim first saw you, a man she had never seen before."

The court heard the victim identified Benfell from an identification kit of a series of photographs shown to her by police, with Judge Slattery saying "she had never seen you or spoken to you before".

Benfell's DNA was linked to the crime scene from a stain located on the clothing of the victim and was arrested two days after the offence.

Police searched Benfell's address and lo-

cated and seized a number of items, including a one-way ticket to Melbourne departing on April 18.

Judge Slattery said Benfell attended four different primary schools - including in Bordertown - as a result of his mother's lifestyle of frequent relocation.

He said Benfell's life "went downhill" following the breakdown of a long-term relationship and the defendant "turned to drugs".

The judge said on the day of the offence, Benfell - who was on parole - missed a meeting with his parole board officer and went to the beach, with defence counsel submitting he had used ice and had been drinking at a hotel.

"Your counsel submits that on the night in question you were under the influence of alcohol and the ingestion of methylamphetamine," Judge Slattery said.

"He said you were on some sort of drug bender."

Judge Slattery said after the offence, the victim slept with a knife on her bedside table and suffered from acute post-traumatic stress which greatly affected her personal and professional life and has since moved

to live interstate.

"I think it is impossible to completely describe the terror, pain, humiliation or effect that has followed as a result of your action," he said.

"You violated the sanctity and safety of the home of these women.

"Your actions were premeditated.

"Your offending has caused irreparable pain, particularly to the victim and also those present that night and those close to them."


Benfell was given a head sentence of 15 years jail with a non-parole period of 12 years.


"You read an apology to the court," Judge Slattery said.

"In that apology, you said that it was not until you heard the victim impact statements that you realised the harm and pain that you had caused.

"After you read your apology to the court, your counsel submitted that the version of events of what happened that night that you gave in evidence in the trial was concocted.

"In those circumstance, I have given such weight to your apology as I think appropriate."





Loyalty rewarded

ROGER Davis still recalls walking onto the Jubilee Highway timber mill for the first time 50 years ago as a long-haired, skinny kid looking to work alongside his father and

Manual production and lax safety procedures were far more common in 1971, with Mr Davis recalling how he made it through more than half of day one without being approached by anyone questioning his presence.

Fast-forward five decades and Mr Davis is treasured by the now-OneFortyOne managed sawmill for his expertise and site knowledge, having worked across the entire site throughout his career and in recent years serving as kilns manager.

With his retirement looming, Mr Davis was given the honour of recently switching on the first of two new Continuous Drying Kilns (CDK) at the site, which will replace the existing old batch kilns with more efficient and environmentally conscious biomass fuelled system.

The \$16m two-stage investment has been hindered by COVID-19 complications, including key staff unable to leave New Zealand to progress the upgrade, which was originally due for completion in March last year.

With construction of the second kiln set for completion by Christmas, OFO Jubilee Sawmill general manager Paul Hartung said CDK techology was considered state-of-the-art as the kilns produce higher-grade timber, with less energy and downtime.

"As the name suggests, the Continuous Drying Kilns operate nonstop, moving product through continuously and maintaining and ideal temperature," Mr Hartung said.

"The efficient design is powered by biomass, using sawdust and wood waste, and

shares heat between two chambers with no need to turn the kiln off.

"There's no cooling down and reheating like in the old batch kilns - meaning more product processed with less energy."

The batch kilns operated at temperatures in excess of 160 degrees and took around eight hours to process timber, an aggressive process according to Mr Hartung.

Recalling how he worked on kiln technology dating back to the 1950s during his career, Mr Davis said the latest technology made a significant difference for operators.

"With the batch kilns there is a lot more manual operation from the kiln operators,"

"Whereas this (CDK) kiln is basically just

load the timber on the in-feed and it works its way through."

Mr Davis was given the honour of starting the new kiln on March 30, joined by his wife Carol and children Craig and Nicole for the

"I'm glad I've stayed on because I just wanted to see this kiln going," Mr Davis said.

The first kiln has the capacity to dry 240,000 cubic metres of timber per year, with capacity to double once the second kiln is commissioned. The retired batch kilns operated for 10 years, with a total drying time of 332,000 hours and produced four million cubic metres of dried timber.

The CDKs are energy neutral as they are fuelled by biomass, sawdust and wood waste.

Bat virus warning

PEOPLE heading outdoors are urged to avoid any contact with bats after two recent exposures in South Australia last month were confirmed to have involved bats carrying Australian Bat Lyssavirus.

Health and Wellbeing Department Communicable Disease Control Branch director Dr Louise Flood said the latest exposures were the third time in South Australia that the virus had been confirmed in bats, with the first instance detected in 2012.

"Australian Bat Lyssavirus is a rabieslike disease that can be transmitted to humans if they are bitten or scratched by an infected bat and if treatment is delayed until after the onset of symptoms, the condition is invariably fatal," Dr Flood said.

"While only one per cent of bats usually carry Australian Bat Lyssavirus , these two recent exposures are concerning and is an important reminder that bats should only ever be handled by appropriately trained and vaccinated animal handlers.

'While the development of Australian Bat Lyssavirus from bat bites or scratches can be prevented through prompt wound management and post exposure prophylaxis, it is important to avoid contact in the first place.'

Primary Industries and Regions South Australia chief veterinary officer Dr Mary Carr said exposure to Australian Bat Lyssavirus from bats was a concern for animals as well as humans and pet owners should ensure animals avoid contact with bats.

"If you notice bats around your home, ensure your animal is physically separated from them by either relocating the pet either indoors or elsewhere until the bat is gone," she said.

"If you suspect your animal has been either bitten or scratched by a bat please contact your local vet or the Emergency Animal Disease hotline on 1800 675 888.

Individuals who are bitten, scratched or come into contact with bat saliva should clean the area with soap and water for at least five minute, apply an antiseptic and contact a doctor.

Bank SA to leave Port MacDonnell

PORT MacDonnell will soon be left with a sole bank agency after Bank SA announced it will withdraw services from the coastal

At this week's council meeting, Grant District chief executive Darry Whicker said staff received notification last month advising Bank SA agency services will end on May 1

In a letter to council, Bank SA regional general manager Shayne Manuel said BankSA the existing dial up network technology used for agency services will be switched off in June, with the financial institution ending its agency network.

Mr Whicker said the decision to close was based on the low number of transactions that are processed through agencies across the state, in addition to outdated network technology that is not viable to upgrade given approximately 48 customers are using the agency on a regular basis.

"Statewide currently there are 35 [Bank SA] agencies which is down from a previous network representation of 107 agencies at their peak," Mr Whicker said.

"Due to the declining reliance on these

agencies and the shift towards alternate arrangements such as Australia Post and other delivery electronic channels, Bank SA will not continue to operate an agency

"Bank SA will contact their clients that will be impacted by this decision to promote the various options that are available to minimise the impact of this closure.

"This decision will most likely have a greater impact on the local business operators in Port MacDonnell and on the school banking from Allendale East Area School that were regular users of the agency service."

Council has provided agency services on behalf of Bank SA, ANZ and Bendigo Banks in Port MacDonnell for more than

In 2016, ANZ withdrew the agency services at the Port Macdonnell Community Complex, leaving Bank SA and Bendigo Bank with a presence in the town.

Councillor Megan Dukalskis expressed her disappointment at the decision, saying the move was "just a cost cutting measure disguised as a technology issue".

Alert time

STATE fire authorities are urging Limestone Coast residents to change their smoke alarm batteries, a livesaving habit encouraged annually as daylight savings ends.

Statistics show nearly half of all significant house fires in South Australia involve homes where smoke alarms had been disabled, or the batteries had gone flat.

The Metropolitan Fire Service and Country Fire Service are urging the community to act given their firefighters respond to hundreds of house fires across the state each year that cause destruction and heartache.

"With an average of 64 Australians dying in preventable house fires each year and up to 2000 people receiving burns, changing smoke alarm batteries is the best way to give you and your family early warning to evacuate safely," MFS community engagement officer Angelo Mastripolito said.

"If you have elderly family or neighbours living alone, offer to help them out by fitting new batteries for them," he said.

Residents are also asked to check the age of their smoke alarm, which is printed on or inside the alarm.

If the date stamp shows the device is 10 years or older, it should be replaced as alarms become less reliable with age.

SES issues 'join' call

FROM mitigating the impacts of extreme weather events to supporting road crash or rescue operations, no week is the same for Limestone Coast State Emergency Service volunteers.

The group of around 110 trained individuals, spanning from Bordertown to the southern coast and west to Kingston, is currently looking to expand with residents urged to consider joining as volunteers.

SES South East district officer Brad Flew said the organisation's diversity was not just reflected in its roles and tasks, but in its volunteers.

"We have a broad range of people from tradespeople to white collar workers, stay at home parents, and it is a really diverse group age-wise from retirees through to people fresh out of high school," Mr Flew said.

Mat Tye joined the volunteer agency in 1994 as a 16-year-old cadet, and was last year appointed Mount Gambier and District unit manager.

"Over time the training has changed and progressed, much like the SES itself - it has come a long way from where it started," Mr Tve said.

"The new national accrediation you receive from training is a good thing for members to be involved in," he said.

At the other end of the spectrum, Ben Lamb and Jonathan Basford have served the Mount Gambier unit for around 12 months,

both relocating to the district within the last decade and subsequently searching for a way to give back.

"I'm originally from Queensland so it is a way to try and meet new people while helping the community as well," Mr Lamb said.

"I was involved in a similar organisation when I lived in Adelaide and I started looking at the SES because I wanted that experience back - helping the community, helping save lives and being back out there," Mr Basford said.

Mr Flew is hopeful a new batch of volunteers from across the region will step up to a new challenge, with the agency offering a myriad of pathways and training opportunities for volunteers.

In addition to being the control agency during extreme weather events - such as heat, storms and flooding - members can also service as road crash rescue responders, land search personnel, as well as communications operators and administrative and logistics support.

In addition to local operations, Limestone Coast SES crews have also been tasked nationally in times of emergency.

Most recently, a group of volunteers nominated to be sent to flood-ravaged New South Wales, arriving in Adelaide to be deployed, only to be told they were no longer required.

"You can really put your hand up and say this is the area I'm interested in and we can usually find a suitable role," Mr Flew said.

"Smaller communities are typically harder to find volunteers because people are already contributing to other volunteer groups," he said

"We don't expect our volunteers to answer every call, it is when they're available."

Mr Flew while all volunteers were welcome, there was a need for people available during business hours to help when required.

The regional SES leader also called on Limestone Coast residents to prepare for the winter months now while the weather remained calm.

"During winter we see a fair bit of work, whether that's trees down or on a house, to local flooding and blocked storm drains," Mr Flew said.

"We are asking people to do that preventative maintenance now, such as clearing your gutters and making sure everything is in order on your property."

Licence loss

DRIVERS believed to have killed another as a result of negligent, reckless or dangerous driving will instantly lose their licence under new laws passed in parliament.

Under the new laws, an individual who is charged with causing death by dangerous driving or is reasonably believed to have committed the offence will have their license suspended or disqualified immediately.

Attorney-General Vickie Chapman said the reforms will ensure action can be taken at the scene and the sanction would only be lifted in exceptional circumstances.

She said the suspension or disqualification will remain in place until the charge itself has been resolved.

"An individual who has had their licence suspended or disqualified can appeal to the courts for a reversal of the decision," Ms Chapman said.

"However, community safety will be one of the paramount considerations when such an appeal is lodged."

The government is preparing necessary changes to the regulations to allow the law to come into effect, with a commencement date yet to be announced.

'George the Farmer' read

THE award-winning creators of popular children's character 'George the Farmer' have unveiled a new book to coincide with South Australia's record apple harvest.

'Hailstorm Heroes' is the 10th children's picture book released by Limestone Coast residents Simone Kain and Ben Hood since launching their educational agriculture-based brand in 2015.

The tale follows George the Farmer's children as they create the 'Hailstorm Heroes' marketing campaign at their school in order to help out local growers.

The books' star apple growers - Sid and Elizabeth - have been named after the children of Kalangadoo growers Glenn and Alicia Tucker.

Ms Kain said the book - which focuses on weather events, technology and food waste - was inspired by a 2017 Hort Innovation marketing campaign encouraging consumer to purchase blemished or bumpy apples. The campaign was developed in response to a severe hailstorm which impacted apple orchards across the Adelaide Hills and Limestone Coast, resulting in major losses for growers.

"The Hort Innovation campaign encouraged consumers to support growers and the economy by assuring them that the apples were still tasty despite some climate battle scars," Ms Kain said.

"We wanted to share a solutions-based, community-oriented story about the simple apple while also weaving in a food waste message and with Australians wasting 7.3m tonnes of food each year, it's an important message."

The book will be accompanied by a paddock to plate video as part of the Federally-funded \$5m 'Kids to Farms' project, in collaboration with Primary Producers SA and Apples

and Pears Australia.

Filmed in the Adelaide Hills and set for release in early August, the video will be supported with a Virtual Reality (VR) experience and complimentary curriculum-aligned educators guide for Foundation to Year 4 students.

Resources on chickpeas, forestry and dairy will also be available, with most of the video and Virtual Reality resources being filmed in the Limestone Coast.

"We are proud to be showcasing local produce and growers to a national audience," Ms Kain said.

"The positive responses that we continue to receive from parents, teachers and kids really does make us so excited for the future of George the Farmer - there are so many stories that we can share."



GRANT High School child studies students are putting theory into practice through a monthly community Kid's Club at Mount Gambier Marketplace.

Road law quiz reveals concerns

A MAJORITY of motorists do not know when they need to keep left on a multi-lane road, a Royal Automobile Association of South Australia (RAA) road rules quiz has revealed.

Many of the 2800-plus quiz participants also struggled with rules regarding round-abouts, merging, traffic lights and parking, findings of the multiple-choice online survey found.

The results show 58pc incorrectly answered the question 'when do you need to keep left on a multi-lane road?' - the correct answer being when there is a keep left unless overtaking sign or the speed limit is above 80km per hour.

A slim majority (53pc) correctly answered a question about indicating when leaving a roundabout.

Meanwhile, just 56pc correctly said the closest you can park to an intersection without traffic lights was 10 metres, while only 59pc correctly answered that the minimum distance you should keep from the car in front of you when travelling at 60km/h is eight car lengths.

RAA safety and infrastructure senior manager Charles Mountain advised drivers to regularly brush up on road rules to help them become better motorists.

"Motorists can also forget rules, or pick up bad habits, so it's important all road users know what the rules are to avoid potentially causing confusion, traffic congestion, conflict or collisions," Mr Mountain said.

"All road users need to take responsibility to reduce road trauma."



Caravan park works delay

WATTLE Range Council chief executive Ben Gower says work is continuing on the reinstatement of the Southend-on-Sea Caravan Park and bush camping ground, but is unable to nominate a specific date for its reopening.

The reopening of the bush camping ground was initially slated for the summer holiday period, while the caravan park was expected to be reopened early January, but both were postponed due to "a number of unavoidable delays".

Mr Gower said contractors and council staff had been working in readiness for the next stage of the reinstatement in recent weeks and hoped both sites would be open by mid-2021.

He said the new amenities block had been delivered to the caravan park and expected contractors to return onsite and start the next stage of the project.

"Work will now start on connecting the new amenities block to services, as well as the construction of some decking, access ramps and stairs to the amenities," Mr Gower said.

"Resurfacing of the internal roadway and landscaping is also to be undertaken, whilst the bush camping site continues to benefit from further work, including vegetation management.

"It's pleasing to see work progressing, but like everyone else, we're certainly looking forward to the time when the gates are open and the campers and caravaners are enjoying the spectacular Southend coastal environment.

"As a result of the activities that still need to be undertaken, we're not in a position to nominate a specific date, but we are working towards having the gates open mid-year."

Families given hand to help stay together

FAMILIES with children at imminent risk of entering care will be supported to stay together in an innovative early intervention

Centacare will deliver RESTORE Intensive Family Services in Mount Gambier, with the four-year program intended to address complex challenges and reduce incidents of child abuse in families of children aged 0 to 18 years.

Under the \$20.7m program, families will receive six-month in home and communitybased supports, including a senior practitioner, case manager, clinical nurse, financial advocate, Aboriginal engagement worker and a "dads and fatherhood worker".

Priority will be given to children of young parents aged 25 years or less, Aboriginal families, adolescents with complex trauma histories, and families of infants at high risk.

Clients will be referred under the Human Services Department's Child and Family Support Services Triage Line and the department's Child and Family Safety Pathway Hub, which is currently being established.

Children's Services executive manager Leanne Haddad said RESTORE would build on the work of Centracare's Targed Intervention and Family Preservation services, which ended on March 31.

Ms Haddad said RESTORE was an evidence-informed model promotes strengthening and restoring parental capacity to improve family functioning.

AN influx of community donations will be used to provide the Mount Gambier district's Country Fire Service (CFS) brigades with key tools used in emergency response situations.

The CFS Mount Gambier Group will spend more than \$5000, comprised of community donations collected over the last 18 months, to purchase torches and electric drills for each brigade, as well as upgrade appliance lighting with LED technology.

Among the most recent donations presented to the district's CFS was \$1260 from the Easyriders Social Motorcycle Club's Limestone Coast charity run, held March 20.

The event was more than a year in the making due to the COVID-19 pandemic, originally planned for early 2020 as part of an Australian-wide fundraiser supporting volunteer firefighters in the wake of the devastating 2019/20 summer bushfires.

With border restrictions between South Australia and Victoria easing, the Limestone Coast pushed ahead with planning for the event more than 12 months on, attracting 55 bikes and seven cars for the regional cruise.

Participants visited Tarpeena, Port Mac-Donnell and returned to Mount Gambier, where vehicles cruised down Commercial Street from White Avenue to Pick Avenue, finishing at the South Eastern Hotel.

"We were really happy with the turnout, it

was fantastic," Easyriders SMC South Australian president Mark O'Neill said.

"We had a social club visit from Victoria that stayed here just for the run.'

The \$1260 was raised through entry fees and a raffle, with Mr O'Neill proud of the collection given the club only has 10 members

"We just wanted to make sure the money we raised went locally," Mr O'Neill said.

CFS Mount Gambier District operations captain Bob Davis said the funds would be used to purchase equipment not supplied by the volunteer organisation.

"The amount of funds organisations have donated to us over the last 12 to 18 months is greatly appreciated," Mr Davis said.



Major talent on city stage

SIR Robert Helpmann Theatre will forever hold special memories for globally-renowned contemporary dance choreographer Lewis Major.

The Limestone Coast - where Major grew up on a sheep farm - is far from his home in France yet the region has remained close to his heart throughout his decorated performing arts career, which has spanned six continents.

In recent weeks Major - who turned 33 on April 1 - has forged new memories at the Helpmann, a venue he considers the state's best with a stage he recalls experiencing his first spark of inspiration to pursue dance.

Major will lead his dance company of 15 performers in a double billed show featuring S/WORDS and Unfolding in the Blue Lake city on Saturday night, fresh off an Adelaide Festival premiere last month.

It is a special moment for Major who developed one of the works around two years ago at the Mount Gambier theatre, only for the CO-VID-19 pandemic to derail the planned April 2020 debut.

Even after 10 years of global performances and life abroad, regional Australia, and more specifically the Limestone Coast, has always been at Major's core.

A self-confessed "late bloomer" in the arts sphere, Major moved away from the region to an Adelaide boarding school aged 16, having previously attended Kangaroo Inn Area School, making a serious foray into dance at 18.

Over a decade later, Major has returned to Australia to further hone his craft and share his talent.

"Since returning to Australia I've always made it a focus to stop off in the regions, especially where I'm from," Major said.

"Originally we wanted to have community members in the show but it became a bit of a health and safety nightmare with COVID," he said

Embedding his dance company in the Blue Lake city following the festival debut, Major said it had allowed the performers to get a sense for the community and what it wanted to see

"I do keep saying that we will have Paris again but until then, we have Mount Gambier.

"We were able to premiere at Adelaide Festival, which is the biggest arts festival in the world at the moment, so it's pretty fun that we were doing that a few weeks ago and now we are here in the regions."

As for Saturday night's dual performances, Major said audiences could expect two very different pieces.

"At the premiere we had some people like the first but not the second and vice versa," Major said, adding it was a healthy response to contemporary dance. Unfolding melds fluid dance with shifting 3D projection animation by creative coder Fausto Brusamolino and a score by James Brown to create an immersive journey that invites the audience to think about the concept of duality.

S/WORDS then follows a slap-dash tribe of performers coming to terms with the failures of a system that they once believed in: an apocalyptic, absurd vision of a collapsing world where language is no longer used to build trust and solidarity, but to destroy and divide.

The production has already garnered interest from the iconic Sydney Opera House and now New Zealand promoters, reflecting Major's reputation built up over many years.

Yet despite all of his success, it is the audience that remains a core focus for Major, who always strives to make art accessible to all.

This goal manifested at the recent Fringe Mount Gambier festival with a drive-in dance performance, a world-first concept that leant into retro nostalgia and placed art in a unique format

"Art is supposed to be for people," Major said.

"The drive-in is an interesting concept and you can put anything in the drive-in - opera, musical theatre, dance, live music.

"I'm open to hear from people with ideas because we know how to do it now."

Major's double bill S/WORDS and Unfolding will be performed at Sir Robert Helpmann Theatre on April 10 from 7pm.

Grassroots support

COMMUNITY groups, organisations and individuals can now apply for the Limestone Coast Landscape Board's latest Grassroot Grant program.

Through a funding pool of \$250,000, the board will strive to support innovative and exciting ideas on how to successfully manage the Limestone Coast landscape.

Board chair Penny Schulz said the Grassroots Grant program was an important element in the Landscape SA reform agenda, which ensures there is more funding opportunities for local communities dedicated to enhancing the region's landscape.

The 2020/21 funding stream supported 16 projects ranging from a trial of large-scale feral deer trapping, through to a cultural connection program at Millicent High School.

The Wine Grape Council of South Australia Incorporated was supported in its establishment of new demonstration sites in the Coonawarra region to showcase the use of native insectary plants in and around vineyards, while Beachport District Development Association Inc was awarded funding to develop a Spiny

Rush management program for Lake George.

Mount Gambier City Council received more than \$30,000 through the inaugural funding round to undertake weed control measures in the vicinity of the Crater Lakes area in line with the Crater Lakes Conservation Manage-

Limestone Coast students are involved in the conservation and land managements activities around the Crater Lakes, including Millicent High School students who are learning cut and swab techniques to remove weed plants and small self-sown wild pines located along the slopes of the saddle.

Eight students involved in the Conservation and Land Management Pathways program are receiving hands-on training under the guidance of council's Valley Lakes Conservation Park coordinator Orazio Cultreri to complete the weeds and chemical handling component of the course.

The focus of this program is to develop the student's awareness of the environment, flora and fauna, soil and weeds and Work Health and Safety," Mr Cultreri said.

"Given the majority of the weeds in the area are woody shrubs, the students will apply the cut and swab method of weed control using hand saws.'

Students will also learn the importance of controlling feral weeds to protect the natural vegetation within the Crater Lakes.

"Controlling weeds around the conservation area is very important so it does not impact on the ecology of the conservation park," Mr Cultreri said.

"The weeds compete for light, water and soil nutrition and the woody weed plants/ shrubs may impact on nesting behaviour of our native birds and impact food sources for our native animal."

Agri sector revenue decline

SOUTH Australia's primary industries and agriculture revenue totalled \$14.1b in revenue last financial year down by 7.6pc from the previous final year - according to figures released in the Primary Industries Scorecard 2019/20.

The report, undertaken by Primary Industries and Regions South Australia said the main drivers were decreases in overall industry of wool (down 40pc), forestry (down 27pc), wine (down 13pc) and seafood (down 13pc).

Horticulture recorded 3pc growth, dairy was up by 4pc and field crops and livestock increased by less than 1pc.

While grain production was up by 12pc compared with the 2018/19 season to reach 6.5m tonnes, it was still 16pc below the five year average with most areas in the state producing below average yields.

Livestock sectors that recorded growth in revenue was beef, which increased by 22pc, and pork (up 16pc).

Seafood industry revenue fell by 13pc as a result of the decrease in exports of rock lobster, which fell by 18pc due to the China trade ban and as the pandemic hit during the peak export season.

Forestry revenue declined by 27pc from \$2.2m to \$1.6m mainly as a result of 24pc decline in sales and wood products.

According to the scorecard, the 2019/20 bushfires had an impact of \$186m on primary production, with more than 15,000ha of forestry valued at \$143m affected by statewide

More than 65,000 sheep valued at \$14.4m, \$9m of hay and fodder and \$8.6m worth of viticulture was affected as a result of the bushfires.

The Primary Industries Scorecard includes the revenue, sales, exports and gross value production of primary industries sectors and associated processing such as field crops, livestock, horticulture, wine, seafood, dairy, forestry, wool, skins, seeds and animal feed.

Value unearthed in clover

THIS is the sixth installment in a series prepared by Gambier Seeds to feature in The Border Watch throughout 2021. The focus of these articles will be to help farmers optimise productivity from their pasture and forage bases. At Gambier Seeds we believe pastures and pasture renovation are an investment, not only in your farm production and profitability, but in its future.

CLOVER as a plant species has been used in the agricultural industry for hundreds of years, with a continuous focus over time on plant breeding improvements for such characteristics as seed set, disease resistance, flowering time, and ability to grow in different environmental parameters (pH and grazing

As a part of a mixed pasture sward clover brings palatability, energy, and protein to the livestock diet through grazing and/or fodder production, as well as the ability to fix nitrogen when the compatible rhizobia is present.

In the Limestone Coast we have the capacity to grow many types of clover depending on the soil, fertility, water access and manage-

Species such as Subterranean clover, Red clover, White Clover, Strawberry Clover and Annual type production clovers can be seeded to suit many situations, from annual fodder production crops, perennial pastures, and irrigation pastures.

Subterranean Clover (Sub Clover) varieties have a wide range of different maturities and attributes to add value to your pasture production system.

If managed well and allowed to set seed sub clover varieties have a great ability to regenerate in following seasons so are highly recommended in a perennial pasture blend.

The different maturities of sub clover in the pasture allows for variations in the growing season to counterbalance false breaks and early finishes.

White clovers are generally grown under irrigation or high rainfall "late country" and provides a highly palatable feed source.

Annual clovers can produce large volumes of feed through winter/spring and possibly early summer while being a beneficial break crop and fixing valuable nitrogen at the same

Legumes such as clover have an amazing

symbiotic relationship with rhizobia: a type of soil bacteria that infect the legume plant roots to form nodules.

The rhizobia live in these nodules and can fix nitrogen gas (N 2) from the atmosphere.

The plants provide the rhizobia with a nutrient and energy, a habitat and the rhizobia fix nitrogen which can be used by the plant and then other crops once the nodules break down and the nitrogen in released into the soil

Nitrogen Fixation by the legumes-rhizobia symbiosis is not apparent in all soils.

There is a requirement for the presence of a compatible and effective rhizobia population to allow for the nitrogen fixing nodules to

When clover is sown it is not always into a soil that has the correct rhizobia existing there, thus the importance of introducing the correct rhizobia inoculant to the site.

There are nearly 40 different groups of rhizobia inoculants commercially available in Australia with differences between clover varieties too, making it important to select the correct inoculation group.

Even though clover has been grown throughout the region for a long time different parameters can affect the quantity of rhizobia in the soil, for example acidic soils (low pH) and diminishing legume density can reduce the efficacy.

FreshCoat is Gambier Seeds and Naracoorte Seeds legume inoculation process, which uses a peat-based product to treat the seeds to ensure maximum rhizobia survival.

We inoculate the seed "on demand" so the inoculant is as fresh as possible for better establishment, more plants per square metre and ultimately more nitrogen produced by the legumes (clover) in the pasture.

This process encompasses rhizobia, lime, and seed conditioner, as well as a polymer compound to ensure the seed does not "bridge" while flowing through modern seed-

Our active rhizobia count (CFU-Colony Formation units) are known to be one of the highest in the seed industry in Australia.

Inspection of the root system six weeks after germination will indicate the success of effective nodulation and long-term nitrogen

Climbing the Wall

ith blocks become smaller and people increasing opting for townhouse and apartment living, vertical gardens are becoming a popular alternative to traditional garden beds and pots, which can encroach on valuable living space.

Vertical gardens or green walls work well in courtyards, small decks and balconies.

The benefits are numerous from carbon dioxide reduction and cooling ambient temperatures to their humidifying effect and their ability to capture toxic gases from deodorants, carpet, paint, furniture and building materials.

Green walls can also reduce noise, capture water run off and increase biodiversity.

Officer couple Neil and Kris Holmes recently installed vertical gardens in

their alfresco living area and on an upstairs balcony.

The couple employed a professional horticulturalist to install 5 vertical gardens and are thrilled with the results.

The gardens are equipped with their own watering systems and the only maintenance needed is the occasional prune and a good dose of fertiliser once a year.

Neil said the vertical gardens soften the upstairs balcony and provide a striking contrast with the Corten screens and industrial feel of the exterior of their home.

The individual pots can be moved and rearranged to create different planting patterns. They are potted with a mix of cascading varieties as well as those that grow upwards and out. Once vertical gardens are established (give them at least a year to take hold properly) they become very resilient and long living.

Your vertical garden can even become a source of food, with herbs particularly suited to pots and tubs.

According to choice.com.au simple plant pots stacked in frames or wire shelving that can create a standalone green partition wall are fine for individual herbs and edible plants, as well as flowering pot plants.

There are many tub type modular products on the market that hook onto a wall or into a supporting structure. Again, these often hold individual plants and each pot will require daily watering.

It is a good idea to invest in an automated irrigation system with a timer to ensure the plants never dry out. The amount of water needed depends on what you'll be growing – if it's an edible garden, you'll be fertilising and watering it a lot more.

- · bromeliads
- · fuschia
- · agapanthus
- · ferns
- anthuriums
- · begonia
- · callisia fragrans
- chlorophytumcrassula
- · impatiens
- · peperomia
- · plectranthus
- · spathiphyllum

With the addition of a few toys or garden figures, they can be turned into




little fairy gardens.

Weather superb for catches

on the water

BEAUTIFUL conditions over the Easter break were a delight to both local fishos and holiday makers.

The sun was out, the wind was down and the sea was fairly calm which made for an extremely fishable few days.

The crew from Southerly Fishing Charters have made the most of the beautiful weather for their clients.

Over the last week they have done some bottom fishing over the shelf and landed some great blue eye, hapuka and gemfish, in closer at around 80-100m for gummy and school sharks and other mixed reef species, to inshore reef fishing for sweep and snapper.

There are still no local tuna to report just yet, but a few of our boats headed to Portland over the weekend and had no trouble finding school fish at the back of the Julia Reef, or down on the north shore.

Rat kings are still mixed in with them too, so a great mixed bag is on offer for those willing to travel.

There have been whispers of barrels over that way too with some boats claiming to have seen fish jumping clean out of the water and another boat was spooled, but until one gets landed, we will never to 100pc sure.

The surf fishing over the Easter period was unbelievable.

Not only was the weather amazing but the weed stayed away and the fish turned up.

Plenty of crews went to the Coorong and I have seen some excellent fish already.

Caleb Mulraney and crew found some excellent shark upwards of 15kg and I have heard a few unconfirmed reports of mulloway

around the 50lb mark too.

I am yet to see any pictures but it would not surprise me in the slightest.

Locally we saw a few nice sharks hit the beach - from Discovery Bay at Nelson, through Piccininni, Paradise and Browns Bay, the fishing was fairly good for most.

Gummy shark to 10kg, salmon, elephant shark and mulloway were all on the menu, along with plenty of rays, seven-gillers and other undesirables.

Garfishos have been stuck into some of those nice big red beakers this week while the wind has been down and they have been well spread out.

The usual hot spots such as Cape Douglas, Nene Valley and Livingstons Bay have all been good, as have other lesser fished areas such as the Port MacDonnell breakwater, Petrefied Forest and Hutt Bay.

There are still tommies and mullet around in the same spots, so do not be surprised if they turn up too.

The whiting fishing over the weekend was a little bit tougher than it has been in previous weeks, which can be put down to conditions being too good.

As most of us know the whiting love the milky and stirred up water, so when the sea is too flat for too long, it is just too clear.

That said though, they will still feed in deeper water or at dawn and dusk, so there was still a few nice fish landed by both the boaties and land-based anglers.

When the water is clear, there are a plenty of other species on offer for those who would usually target whiting.

You have sweep, garfish, tommy ruff and squid which are all up there as great whiting alternatives and are generally found around the same sort of areas.

The dawn and dusk sessions on the Port MacDonnell jetty have been fairly productive, from whiting and salmon trout, to squid and garfish, it fished quite well for most.

We saw some nice fish over the weekend from the Glenelg River this week.

One crew who were staying down at the River Vu Caravan Park in Nelson managed a few nice mulloway on cut pilchard to 80cm down in the town ship itself, while some others had luck up at Taylors Straight, Hutchessons Landing and even a couple from as high up as Sapling Creek.

The bream have been well spread out again. The estuary has been good, as have the rock walls heading up stream.

Estuary perch have been a little slower this week, but there has been the odd fish caught on plastics by the guys targeting bream.

Looking forward to the weekend and it looks like we are going to cop a pizzling, with 7.2 metres of sea forecast for Sunday morning



on the lure GREYHOUND RACING

ANOTHER greyhound to shake off her injury woes last Sunday was Galactic Athena, having only her sixth start since last winning on August 6 at Tara Raceway when defeating Silent Jacko in the Tara Trackstar (512m).

Back in the boxes for the first time since January 31 and with connections' sights set firmly on this Sunday's Commercial Hotel Mount Gambier Cup heats (512m), she lined up in the eight in the AVM-D Easter Gift (512m) which comprised a handy field of open class greyhounds.

As it turned out, it was pretty much a case of litter sisters fighting out the race, Galactic Athena displaying great pace from the boxes and leading the pack around the first turn while Galactic Horizon was left to do the chasing

But in the run home, Galactic Athena was much too good, running out a 4¾ lengths winner in 29.64 seconds over Galactic Horizon both greyhounds owned by Robert Chuck of Moorak and trained at Worrolong by Steve Bartholomew.

Back in 1981, Bartholomew had handled Tara Topar, the inaugural Mount Gambier Cup winner, for his mother-in-law Joan Cruise.

Then, 38 years later, he handled his own winner - Galactic Athena who ran down Slingshot Hammer to score a terrific win in a then race record 29.43 seconds.

At 19 months of age she was the youngest

greyhound to win the cup.

Now, two years later, Chuck and Bartholomew are chasing further cup history as the daughter of Paddy Whacker and Galactic Rumball attempts to become the first winner of dual cups.

Sunset Milo, now in the Allendale East kennels of David Peckham, will be chasing consecutive cups after last August running down kennelmate Kipling in the Covid-interrupted 2020 Mount Gambier Cup.

By My Bro Fabio out of Jewel Action, Sunset Milo was trained by part-owner Tim Aloisi when winning the cup in a race record time of 29.42 seconds after having gone close to a track record in his heat the previous week.

Off the scene between September and December, the black dog has won four races since the cup, his last win at Cranbourne a month ago.

From a Mount Gambier Cup point of view there were a couple of other nice trials last Sunday - Night To Burn, trained at Hamilton by Kyle Goodwin, leading all the way in the Metal Worx Stake (512m) to defeat Crush You Enemy by 6¼ lengths in 29.64 seconds.

Koroit trainer Peter Keane's Hello Keen showed blistering early speed in the Bourne Kennels Stake (512m) when running out a four-lengths winner in 29.58 seconds over Perseverance who put in her best run for some time.

Heats of the 41st Mount Gambier Cup will be run on Sunday at Tara Raceway, Lake Terrace East, with the final conducted on Sunday, April 18.

Cup field taking shape

THE stage is set for a great afternoon of racing with the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club conducting the final of the Group Listed Commercial Hotel Mount Gambier Cup (512 metres) on Sunday, April 18 at Tara Raceway on Lake Terrace East,

The Mount Gambier Cup final always attracts a strong field, with star locals going up against 'city' greyhounds racing at Angle Park travelling to the Limestone Coast as well as interstate raiders looking to get their slice of the \$14,275 prizemoney on offer.

First run in 1981 at Glenburnie, the race continues to gain further prominence in the racing community after becoming a Group Listed event in 2018 with that year's event won by Xtreme Caution, trained by Brian Weis.

Other recent past winners include Mojito Mayhem in 2016, the speedy Fabregal, who was a Group finalist and winner of more than \$200,000 in prizemoney in 2017 and Galactic Athena in 2019, the youngest greyhound to win the cup in just her seventh start, giving local trainer Steve Bartholomew a most memorable win.

Last year's event was held in August due to the COVID-19 outbreak, with Sunset Milo for Adelaide trainer Tim Aloisi taking the honours in a race record time of 29.42

Stepping stone to more cups

AN excellent staying performance to win last Sunday's \$28,510 Penola Cup has set the scene for Cuban Toonite to tackle more country cups this autumn.

Cuban Toonite only joined the Sue and Jason Jaensch stable in mid 2020 from the Hayes/Dabernig establishment in Victoria and last Sunday was his first run in open company.

That gave the five-year-old gelding his third win from 13 starts for the Jaensch stable and plans are now being drawn up for him to tackle the Millicent Cup, also at Penola, on May 30.

Even a start in the Casterton cup a fortnight earlier (May 16) is now a possibility.

"I haven't looked at the Victorian racing calendar but I will now after that effort in the Penola Cup," Sue Jaensch said.

"The Penola Cup was always part of the plan as he is part owned by Michael Palm, a committeeman of the Penola club."

Both Cuban Toonite and runner-up Jester Halo made their runs from the tail of the field at the 800 metres and quickly rounded up the leaders at the top of the straight.

It was a great day for the Jaensch stable with three winners at Penola, a first for cotrainer Jason Jaensch who only got his trainer's ticket at the start of this current racing season.

Bullet Kid kick started the treble and it ended when the heavily backed Miss Mosh (\$4.80-\$3.20 fav.) stormed home to win the final event at her first run back from a four month spell.

"We were devastated when a skin rash went through the stable a while back and it virtually wiped out stable runners for three months, but all that is now behind us," Jaensch added.

For winning jockey apprentice Ben Price, it was his second Limestone coast cup success having piloted the Jaensch trained Von Costa Glass to win the Naracoorte cup in early February.

Price rode a double at Penola on Sunday to move into third spot on the jockey's premiership ladder (10 wins, all since January), in arrears of Jacob Opperman (21) and Sairyn Fawke (13).

FINALLY BROKE THE ICE

ALSO enjoying the delights of riding a double last Sunday was the Casterton based jockey Sonja Wiseman.

A relative newcomer to racegoers in this region, Wiseman arrived here around Christmas time from Queensland and the Northern Territory where she had ridden 319 winners.

"I rode for six years in northern Queensland, two in Darwin and another two in Rockhampton," Wiseman told The Border Watch earlier this week.

"I ride track work at Mount Gambier three

times a week for most of the trainers there and trial horses for Peter Hardacre in western Victoria whenever the need arises."

Riding at some of the more remote tracks in Australia has resulted in Wiseman encountering all types of surfaces, whether they be grass, sand or dirt.

It has been a patience game for Wiseman to notch her first winner in these parts, as from 27 rides prior to Sunday she had notched six seconds and two thirds.

Her local duck was broken with a narrow victory aboard Blueberry Boy for Mount Gambier trainer Belinda O'Loughlin in the opening race.

She didn't have to wait long for her second winner, that coming in easier fashion just 35 minutes later when the Lee Creek trained Real Valentia led all the way in the 100 metre maiden

O'Loughlin also completed a winning double for the day when Runbro defied running down in the concluding stages of the 1700 metre BM 58 handicap.

Wiseman's partner - and soon to be husband - is former jumps jockey Tommy Logan who is back playing footy at Casterton and is furthering his interests in the equestrian world by taking up polo.

A CUP DAY TO REMEMBER

WHAT a sensational day for Limestone Coast racing at Penola last Sunday for its cup meeting.

The Penola club has raced on Easter Sunday since 2001, the one exception was when the Clare club stole the date in 2011.

Last Sunday's Penola cup meeting will go into the record books as one of the best ever in the history of the proud club.

Perfect weather saw a huge crowd rock up, and they were obviously a thirsty lot as beer stocks had to be quickly replenished as early as race three.

It was easily the biggest crowd of the Limestone Coast racing season, surpassing Naracoorte cup day and even the Coonawarra Vignerons cup day fixture back in January.

People of all ages seized the opportunity to celebrate Easter, enjoy life and have a day in the sun to forget about any pandemic con-

Over at Warracknabeal on Easter Saturday, the two most impressive winners on the program were from South East stables.

The Peter Hardacre trained Thrill Kill was well backed (\$4-\$2.80) at his first run for over three months before impressively winning the 1200 metre BM 64 handicap, beating fellow local Rohlon Drunk.

Then the Sue Murphy trained Desert Spirit (\$4.40-\$6.50) scorched the turf with Jacob Opperman in the saddle to lead all the way and went within a whisker of the 1000-metre track record in the 0-58 handicap.

TWO CLASSIC JUMP EVENTS

WHILE I am a supporter of jumps racing, I am not an avid fan however two steeplechases held during the recent Oakbank carnival were absolute classics.

I was fortunate to be on course for both races, firstly the Von Doussa steeplechase last Wednesday week where Zed Em and Yensir had a stirring two horse war for the last 500 metres after clearing the final hedge.

They slogged it out, nose and nose, for the entire home straight with Yensir prevailing by a short half head at the end of the 3250-metre journey.

Then the Great Eastern steeplechase last Saturday had the Oakbank crowd of just under 10,000 in a frenzy when the hot favourite Zed Em led the field for home, only to be gunned down by the South Australian jumper Spying On You.

The atmosphere in the final 200 metres was such that you would have thought there were 30,000 in attendance when it became obvious that the Tommy Ryan ridden Spying On You had more gas in the tank after 4950 metres.

The pair got a mini Winx reception when they returned to scale and the cheering continued through the trophy presentation ceremony.

Restrictions meant that only 10,000 people could attend at spacious Oakbank last Saturday, yet 40,000 are allowed into a much more confined Adelaide Oval for AFL games.

I posed that question to Oakbank CEO Shane Collins who replied "if you can find the answer, let me and the committee know immediately".

OVERZEALOUS REACTION

HAPPY go lucky Irish jumps jockey Tommy Ryan has somewhat of a cult following and his fan club was at Oakbank in full voice last Saturday.

Ryan had outlaid \$1200 in airfares just to go to Oakbank from Melbourne before the carnival to ride jumpers in trials and his efforts were repaid many times over when he rode three winners on day one followed up with wins in the Von Doussa steeplechase (Yensir) and the Great Eastern steeplechase (Spying On You).

When he arrived in the members bar after a shower and quick change of clothes following the Great Eastern steeplechase, his supporters were already celebrating the occasion and suddenly the bar went into party mode.

The chant "there is only one Tommy Ryan" went up amid the back slapping, Ryan then did a small jig carrying a female fan in his arms before he was hoisted up onto the bar.

There were no complaints from anyone in the bar in regards to the spontaneous party, however two security officers thought otherwise.

They had stood bored and poker faced all day at the entrances to the member's bar and decided to make their presence felt and justify their existence by quickly ending such folly.

It had been all innocent fun, no harm was done and it definitely brightened up the day for the rest of the crowd in the bar to see a group of young people thoroughly enjoying themselves with their idol.

The big loser out of it all were the two security officers who lost a lot of respect for their actions.

Tara record holder turns in another almighty effort

IT was back in August 2020 Meningie trainer Tim Richards first appeared at Tara Raceway with Almighty Stripe, a son of Fabregas and Spicy Peppa (a half-sister to former SA champion Worm Burner) that he bred and races in partnership with his sister Sheree Hayes.

At the time the black dog had won 13 races at Angle Park, Gawler and Murray Bridge, adding Mount Gambier to his list of winning tracks when defeating Sol's Buddy by seven lengths over 400 metres in a quick 22.88 seconds.

Then, on October 22, Almighty Stripe made a stunning return to Tara Raceway, running a track record 22.68 seconds.

This came after Dyna Carnie had held the record for the better part of the year, lowering Cryer's Ricky's time of 22.78 seconds to 22.74 seconds on January 5.

Almighty Stripe headed Richards' team of five engaged at Tara Raceway last Sunday, the former football coach, come fisherman, come greyhound trainer of six years looking to add to an already successful 2021 at the local track - 14 wins, including the Summer Classic with Justice For All.

Lining up from box one in the Easter Sprint (400m), Almighty Stripe's chances hinged on a quick getaway as there were some keen judges of the opinion he was probably better suited out wide where he had a "bit of room to move".

But with a first split of 10.55 seconds he pretty well had all the room he needed, eventually running out a 7¾ lengths winner over Ed Deeds in 22.55 seconds - Tara Raceway's first track record for 2021.

Filling third spot was the record breaker's litter brother and kennelmate Jervois Boy.

With Richards handling Jervois Boy in the race, a handler was required for Almighty Strine.

Who better for the job than Glenroy train-

er Richard Clayfield, later in the day successful with Glenville Rose in the South Eastern Hotel Stake (400m) in 23.36 seconds.

After all, Clayfield knows what it is all about to train a 400-metre record breaker after leading Slipper's Might to the boxes on March 28, 2014.

That was the day the son of Lochinvar Marlow x Slipper's Tonic became the first greyhound to break the 23-seconds barrier when running 22.93 seconds.

Meanwhile, Rocketline, the greyhound that chased home Almighty Stripe in his initial record-breaking run, finally shrugged off his injury woes at Tara Raceway last Sunday when successful in the Trackside Meats Stake (400m).

Suited by the small field, the son of Peter Rocket x Headline quickly overcame a slow start to settle in second spot behind Saint Charlotte before railing through on the home turn and running out a three-quarters of a length winner in 22.98 seconds.

The win was Rocketline's first since July

for Compton breeder-trainer Tracie Price and local owners Michael Robinson and Willie Vossen who purchased the May 2018 black dog as a pup.

Litter brother Burn Time, certainly one of the better greyhounds to have come out of Mount Gambier in recent times, brought up his third successive staying win when winning a heat of the time-honoured Association Cup (720m) at Wentworth Park on Saturday night.

Raced by Lisa and Keith Hellmuth of Pearcedale, Burn Time had previously won twice at Angle Park over 731 metres prior to venturing to Sydney for the Group 1 stayers' series, the final of which will carry \$75,000 to this Saturday night's winner.

The Hellmuths also raced Peter Rocket (22 wins and \$328,000 in stakemoney) and Headline (16, \$53,000) prior to Price taking over Headline for breeding purposes.

The litter has now won 49 races, with Burn Time the "headline" act, having won 18 races and \$73,000 in stakemoney.

"It is nice to get the whole club together, especially with Round 1 at home.


"We started training early this year and we have had good numbers, so we look forward to the culmination of all the hard work to come together on Saturday.'

Reigning Western Border best and fairest Tenille Gray will again take the goal attack bib, combining her East Gambier duties with Premier League duties in Adelaide.


She will work with young star Amryn Bosko, who has already had a taste of A Grade action and has shown she is more that up to the task, with her clever positioning, accurate finishing and composure.


