

Brave Koa a warrior

ALEISHA Koopman and Ben Gibson are living "every parent's worst nightmare" after their newborn daughter Koa was diagnosed with an incurable brain malformation that carries a life expectancy anywhere between one and 10 years.

The devastating diagnosis carries a long list of "wonts" in Koa's development but already the eight-week-old is defying her condition and giving hope to the young family, which has been overwhelmed by support from the Limestone Coast.

Border road battle

WATTLE Range mayor Des Noll has lambasted an interstate campaign focussed on upgrading the Green Triangle region's key freight routes as "Victorian-centric" and warned unless a change of direction occurs

it should be "scrapped". Mr Noll took aim at the Green Triangle Region Freight Action Plan, an initiative involving South Australian and Victorian border councils, the timber and freight industries and the Port of Portland.

Among the key actions of the plan is targeting State and Federal Government funding for road improvements to address emerging

capacity constraints for transport associated with the forest and freight industries.

Mr Noll's comments follow Glenelg Shire Council advising Wattle Range it will not financially commit to a co-funding contribution to upgrade Border Road to a sealed standard, which is estimated to cost \$4m.

In a joint statement to Wattle Range, Gle-

nelg Shire Council and the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan Committee said they were "incredibly disappointed and disheartened that the reputation of committee and council had been brought into disrepute as a result of misleading and false information".

Nurses union lashes Scriven

THE state's peak professional nursing and midwifery organisation has hit out at "incendiary and blatantly irrelevant" comments made by Labor frontbencher Clare Scriven on voluntary assisted dying during a parliamentary debate.

The Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation SA Branch dismissed claims made by Ms Scriven about the potential for euthanasia to be expanded to non-voluntary assisted dying, that the system could be abused or that a patient could be coerced to die without consent.

Federation director operations and strategy Rob Bonner said voluntary assisted dying legislation in the US state of Oregon - which the Victorian bill was modelled on - had not been amended since the act came into effect in 1997.

"The so-called slippery slope argument Clare Scriven uses is clearly nonsense, the Oregon model has been in place for 20 years and hasn't been widened in any meaningful way at all," he said.

"There are no active calls in Victoria for a broadening of their scheme other than the people who have always wanted a broader scheme, but there is no active consideration on legislation.

"The legislation that has passed in Western Australia and Tasmania is rooted in the Victorian model and it hasn't seen either state leapfrogging Victoria to do something better or on the slippery slope down."

Mr Bonner lashed Ms Scriven for creating what he termed as a false argument by referring to European legislation during her 40-minute parliamentary speech on euthanasia.

"Talking about the experience in Europe when you know that is not being proposed here and is almost the antithesis of what is being proposed here is not a reasonable or fair moral and ethical argument," he said.

"If we were proposing the Netherlands bill that might be a relevant consideration, but we are not.

"There are a whole range of things that may or may not have happened in the European models that are not possible under the Victo-

rian and South Australian models because of the restrictions."

Mr Bonner said South Australia's voluntary euthanasia bill was centred on the patient having control of the initiation of any voluntary assisted dying discussion and retaining active control of consent throughout the process.

He said a survey of Australian Nursing and

Midwifery Federation members found 85pc were in favour of a South Australian bill that was based on the Victorian model.

"Of the 15pc who were against, those people were split in either not wanting any change, while some didn't feel the bill went far enough," he said.

"These are people who deal with patients, friends and family members who are dying or

are in that trajectory in their work and I think that really says it all.

"It is traumatic for nurses who are powerless to help ease their suffering.

"There is nothing dignified about forcing someone to go through unnecessary pain and suffering at the end of their life if voluntary assisted dying is what they want to do."

Ms Scriven said the federation's criticism of her speech was "bizarre" given SA-Best MLC Frank Pangallo had also referred to the European model, saying once euthanasia was legally permitted in any form, proposed safeguards "end up being ignored".

"Getting into all the differences in all of the different models is a deliberate tactic to camouflage the fact regardless of the model once it is in, it changes the practice within the medical profession," she said.

"Numerous models have shown that you end up with about half being voluntary euthanasia and half being non-voluntary euthanasia.

"Whatever these proposed safeguards are, they end up being ignored."

Advocacy group Nurses Supporting Voluntary Assisted Dying convenor and nurse Fiona Jacobs said respect to patients' autonomy was a cornerstone of modern medical ethics and nurses played a key role in advocating for patients.

"The principle of respect for autonomy is usually associated with ensuring the patient has a right to make their own decisions about which health care interventions they will or will not receive," she said.

"If we are to honour autonomy, then we must respect views held by the patient about what dignity actually means for them."

Ms Jacobs also dismissed the notion that the acceptance of voluntary assisted dying will inevitably lead to the acceptance of non-voluntary or involuntary euthanasia.

"History has shown there is no evidence of the 'slippery slope' in other areas of the world and there is no good reason to believe that the experience would be any different in Australia," she said.

"Voluntary assisted dying legislation is no different to any other legislation, if the law is broken then the legal consequences are invoked."

Trapped dog saved from burning house

A DOG trapped in a burning house in Mount Gambier's east early on Thursday morning is on the road to recovery thanks to quick-thinking emergency services personnel.

Metropolitan Fire Service crews responded to the Telford Street blaze around 2am with the house's four occupants already outside after being awoken by a smoke detector.

Firefighters entered the property where a fire had been contained to a room, with the dog found unresponsive inside.

MFS Mount Gambier station officer Rob Baker said the dog was carried out "in a pretty bad way" and an adult human oxygen mask was applied to the animal, which started to show signs of life.

Limestone Coast Police then transported the dog to a local vet, with Mr Baker pleased to learn yesterday morning that the dog was recovering.

"It would be a bit of a frightening ordeal

for anyone if you woke up to a couple of firefighters pulling you out of a house," Mr Baker said.

Mr Baker said an electrical fault is believed to have ignited the fire, which caused around \$25,000 damage and took around 10 minutes to extinguish.

"The smoke alarms were active and the occupants did the right thing, got out of the house and shut all the doors to help stop the spread," Mr Baker said.

"It is so important that people check their smoke alarms are working," he said.

"Coming into winter, people also need to check their electrical items are safe for use."

It is not the first time Mr Baker has been involved in an animal rescue in his 23-year career, adding it was best people evacuate a burning structure and allow firefighters to locate pets.

"We've done a few animal rescues over my time and had a fair bit of success," Mr Baker said.

"Animals are linked to the recovery pro-

cess - a lot of people can lose their property and belongings but having their pet and exposure to animals is part of the recovery," he said.

Meanwhile, MFS Mount Gambier station officer Adrian Puust said a quick and direct response from the city station helped prevent a fire from spreading at Mount Gambier's Presidential Motel on Sunday afternoon.

Mr Puust said crews were able to limit the spread of the fire throughout the motel's eastern wing, estimating around \$100,000 of damage but a potential asset save of up to \$1m.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation with a female occupant of the room where the fire is believed to have started requiring treatment for minor burns and cuts at the scene.

"The woman has escaped through a window and was treated by staff and other guests before SA Ambulance arrived," Mr Puust said.

'Cash for cans'

PEOPLE will soon be able to return cans, bottles and cartons for 10c in Victoria, with the Andrews Labor Government flagging the start of the container deposit scheme for 2023.

Victoria is the only state without a scheme, which has been in operation in South Australia since 1977.

State Energy, Environment and Climate Change Minister Lily D'Ambrosio said the scheme will allow people to return containers at various locations including shopping centres, drive through collection depots, mobile drop off points for events and community festivals.

She said the scheme - which aims to reduce Victoria's litter by up to half - will allow charity, community and sports groups to have the option of operating container collection points to raise extra funds.

"All charities and community groups can benefit from Victoria's container deposit scheme," she said.

"Victoria's container deposit scheme will provide a stream of clean recyclable materials for re-use in new products instead of going to landfill or polluting the environment and harming our wildlife."

Brave Koa's biggest battle

THE Limestone Coast is rallying behind a young family whose newest member, eight-week-old Koa, has been diagnosed with a rare and incurable brain malformation that carries a life expectancy anywhere between one and 10 years.

Former Mount Gambier woman Aleisha Koopman and partner Ben Gibson say they are living "every parent's worst nightmare" after Koa, their second child, was diagnosed with Lissencephaly - a genetic condition impacting large parts of the brain which are smooth with no texture.

Ms Koopman said the family - now based in Armstrong Creek near Geelong - had been given a long list of human functions Koa is unlikely to achieve, including walking, talking, smiling and laughing - with daily seizures also a reality.

Despite the devastating diagnosis, Ms Koopman said the family was buoyed by hope and strong support flowing from both South Australian and Victorian supporters, as well as early signs of defiance from Koa whose name is apt given its meaning of "warrior" and "brave one".

"They said she would never smile but we believe she is smiling," Ms Koopman said.

"They also said she might not be able to hear but her hearing is at 99pc," she said.

"We think she is blind but who is to say she might not be able to see one day."

Throughout the optimism it has been an unfathomable experience for the young couple, also blessed with three-year-old Ava, who were made aware of potential growth complications during Ms Koopman's third trimester.

Ms Koopman said she was told Koa's head appeared to be developing slower and appeared small but was given no indication of the potential for an incurable and terminal disease.

"When she was born we looked at her and she looked perfectly fine - we were so elated," Ms Koopman said.

Within 10 days Koa's health started to deteriorate as the newborn showed signs of health issues, hospitalised due to the brain malformation's impact on her respiratory system.

After a series of ultrasounds, X-rays and an MRI, the family received the shock diagnosis - a condition affecting around one in 100,000 newborns.

"The diagnosis was quite quick but it seemed like an eternity for us," Ms Koopman said. "The news we got was the worst news in the world," she said.

"We are now just finding ways of accepting

it and getting on with our life."

For Ms Koopman that will mean being Koa's full-time carer, with up to three medical appointments per week and regular hospital stays predicted.

The family currently travels the hour-plus trip to Melbourne where Koa is being treated at the Royal Children's Hospital by specialists.

It has been a challenging 12 months for the family after Ms Koopman - a travel agent - was heavily impacted by COVID-19 travel restrictions, while the young couple's wedding - slated for September last year in Fiji - was also cancelled with the pair unable to recoup finances as pre-paid businesses declared bankruptcy.

Ms Koopman's father Trevor - who lives in Mount Gambier with wife Debra - has also been battling his own private health battle during this time.

Around \$18,000 has already been raised for Koa via GoFundMe, while several Limestone Coast businesses have planned fundraisers.

"Having all this support from the community means financially, it is one less thing to worry about," Ms Koopman said.

"I will be a full-time carer so having this help is massive," she said.

"I want to say a big thank you to the community around my Mum and Dad too, they are receiving a lot of support back home and that is appreciated - I know they're grateful."

Donations can still be made through www.gofundme.com/f/help-support-baby-koa-her-family.

Cafe Melzar and Brew Coffee Bar will both donate \$1 from every coffee sold this weekend to the family.

A major fundraiser is also being planned at Blue Lake Public Golf Links and donations are being collected at Country Post and Bistro at Glencoe.

Ms Koopman has vowed to keep the community updated with Koa's progression through @koa_eve Instagram page.

"I hope Koa's here for a long time but realistically they don't expect her to live past 10 years of age," Ms Koopman said.

"For me, the page is giving me some form of solace to share her story," she said.

"I just hope that whatever time she here, it makes an impact."

Cross-border freight 'farce'

WATTLE Range mayor Des Noll has lambasted an interstate campaign focussed on upgrading the Green Triangle region's key freight routes as "Victorian-centric" and warned unless a change of direction occurs it should be "scrapped".

Mr Noll took aim at the Green Triangle Region Freight Action Plan, an initiative involving South Australian and Victorian border councils, the timber and freight industries and the Port of Portland.

Among the key actions of the plan is targeting State and Federal Government funding for road improvements to address emerging capacity constraints for transport associated with the forest and freight industries.

Mr Noll's comments follow Glenelg Shire Council advising Wattle Range it will not financially commit to a co-funding contribution to upgrade Border Road to a sealed standard, which is estimated to cost \$4m.

The Federal Government has provided \$2m towards the project, with the funding application based on a partnership with West Wimmera for a 1.8km stretch, Glenelg Shire for a 14km section and Wattle Range for a 15.8km length.

While Wattle Range and West Wimmera have committed to the program, Mr Noll said Glenelg Shire was unable to commit to a financial contribution.

Mr Noll said discussions with the Portland-based council had not been fruitful and claimed further discussions with the Green Triangle Region Freight Action Plan chair Karen Stephens - who is also Glenelg Shire Council's deputy mayor - were "ignored".

"A request to have the Border Road topic

placed on the agenda at a stakeholders meeting - Wattle Range Council being a stakeholder - was denied," he said.

"A response from the chair was that Border Road is not a priority.

"I made a request to the chair for a copy of the Green Triangle Action Plan charter/terms of reference, but this request has not been forthcoming."

Mr Noll expressed disappointment over what he termed as a lack of a cooperation considering the Federal Government's major contribution towards the project.

"It is not in the spirit of what the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan stands for and was originally designed to achieve," he said.

"Clearly, it has become a Victorian-centric entity and simply lost its way as a joint South Australian and Victorian initiative.

"If this is the continued direction of the Green Triangle Regional Freight Action Plan Implementation Monitoring Group, then I am calling for it to be scrapped."

In a joint statement emailed to Wattle Range an hour before Tuesday night's meeting, the Glenelg Shire Council and the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan Committee said they were "incredibly disappointed and disheartened that the reputation of committee and council had been brought into disrepute as a result of misleading and false information".

"Wattle Range Council submitted a \$2m application for a 50/50 co-contribution towards a \$4m project to upgrade 15.8km of Border Road," the statement said.

"However, Wattle Range submitted this application without seeking formal consent

from Glenelg Shire.

"If Wattle Range had simply communicated prior to this application, an agreement position may have been achieved."

The statement said Mr Noll's comments on the overall vision, purpose and success of the freight action plan was of most concern.

"The Green Triangle Freight Action Plan is highly regarded at all levels of government and is considered a 'stand out' model, with the methodology being rolled out across regional Australia," the statement said.

"Based on the ongoing achievements and funding successes that the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan has secured in recent years, it is quite clear that it is meeting all the goals that it was designed for and even more."

Wattle Range descopes road upgrades

WATTLE Range Council will descopes a proposed \$4m upgrade for Border Road and request \$1.7m of Federal Government grant funds be redirected after Glenelg Shire rejected to co-contribute to the project.

Staff will apply to redirect a majority of the \$2m Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program funds towards upgrades towards Tower Road, a local road between Casterton Road and the Riddoch Highway.

If permitted, council will also proceed with upgrades on a 1.8km section of Border Road from Derholm Road, estimated to cost \$500,000 which will be split between the Federal funding, Wattle Range and West Wimmera Shire. Elected members backed a staff recommendation to redirect the funds to Tower Road with an additional budget allocation of \$875,000.

In a letter to council, Glenelg Shire and the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan Committee rejected claims Border Road was a priority or critical freight road. "The Green Triangle Freight Action Plan Committee has a 'scale of categories' with roads across the region bundled into categories ranging

from number one being the highest priority through to number twelve being the least significant," the letter said.

"The Border Road sits within a 'group of roads' at number four, therefore it is not of a high or immediate priority."

But Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower said the road, which runs north/south along the South Australian and Victorian border, was a regionally significant route.

Mr Gower said the road predominately carries logging trucks from the adjoining plantation forests to processing facilities near Mount Gambier and to the Port of Portland.

At Tuesday night's council meeting, Sorby Adams Ward councillor Deb Agnew sought an explanation for the "contradictory statements" made by Wattle Range and Glenelg Shire about the funding agreement and application.

Mr Gower said given the relatively short notice of the Federal Government funding round, Wattle Range did not have time to seek a formal co-contribution commitment from the adjoining Victorian councils.

"Requests to do so were submitted in

parallel with the application in May 2020," he said. "There was a very, very short delay in requesting their consent because of the timeframes associated with the grant.

"We were right at the beginning of Covid going off the charts back in this timeframe and the government threw an extra \$500m into the kitty for this program.

"We didn't have the luxury of a full council cycle to get a formal resolution from the Glenelg Shire before we put this in."

Mr Gower said Wattle Range, West Wimmera and Glenelg Shire staff had met on site to discuss the program prior to the application being lodged and reaffirmed its regional significance.

"I have no idea why they claim they have not received our letters - they were sent electronically and in the mail," he said. "We requested to meet with them on site in Glenelg and the answer was 'no, you're not welcome'.

"I am not sure what is going on behind the scenes here and I would love to know what the nature of the problem is so we can find a solution to it."

Glenelg Shire was contacted for comment.

Premier urges job patience

PREMIER Steven Marshall has conceded changing medical advice limiting the use of the AstraZeneca vaccine is a "curveball" for South Australia's vaccine schedule, saying it will take a few weeks to recalibrate the rollout.

During a visit to the Limestone Coast, the state leader urged community members to remain patient after the Federal Government scrapped AstraZeneca as the preferred vaccine for adults under 50.

The Federal Government has secured another 20 million doses of the Pfizer vaccine,

with Prime Minister Scott Morrison anticipating the doses will be available in the last quarter of this year.

Mr Marshall said meetings were currently underway between the State and Federal Government to continue the rollout and vaccinate the population as quickly as possible.

"It was really a curveball last week with that expert advice changing, it will take a few things to get that right," he said.

"As soon as that information is available,

we'll be making people very, very aware of it.

"Even today, there are further meeting between the Commonwealth and the states, we're very actively involved in those and as soon as we get that recalibrated plan, we'll be sharing it as soon we do."

Mr Marshall said South Australia was currently administering phase two of the Covid rollout - comprising of elderly adults, health care workers and other high-risk industries including police, fire, emergency services and

meat processing - and would soon start phase 2a. The Premier said around 300 GPs across the state were administering the vaccine.

"We always said we were going to start with a small number and get this right," he said.

"The logistics of moving those does around the country is a Federal responsibility.

"It is a complex job there is no doubt about that, now it's even more complex with that split between AstraZeneca and Pfizer, but we are asking people to be patient at this time."

State backs forestry industry

PREMIER Steven Marshall has reiterated the State Government's commitment to boosting the economic value of the region's forestry sector, saying a review into the Lower Limestone Coast Water Allocation Plan was expected soon.

Mr Marshall said a review of the science underpinning reductions in the Lower Limestone Coast's Water Allocation Plan was currently underway, with the government investigating other ways to recharge the aquifer for the benefit of all water users.

The state leader met with representatives from the Green Triangle Forest Industries Hub, Australian Panel Products - formerly known as Borg - and Roundwood Solutions executives as part of a visit to the Limestone Coast this week.

Mr Marshall said water access and the availability of water, firefighting capabilities and skills were among the issues canvassed by growers and processors.

"We're doing research at the moment to see how accurate the model the water allocation relief on and some of that information is coming through very soon now," he said. "We're also looking at other ways to recharge the aquifer that might provide some opportunities for the sector to grow into the future.

"We are 100pc to committed to growing this sector, making it more sustainable and of course, employing new people.

"But there's plenty more that needs to happen and that is only going to happen by good, two-way respectful negotiations between the sector and the government looking at ways that we can improve the sustainability and long-term employment very, very quickly."

Mr Marshall's comments follow the release of Federal Parliament's Aussie Logs for Aussie Jobs report, which recommended the removal of South Australian water licensing arrangements after growers labelled the restrictions as the single biggest impediment to the timber supply chain in the Green Triangle region. In a submission to the bipartisan Agriculture

and Water Resources Committee, OneFortyOne Plantations estimated losses of more than 25,000ha under current South Australian water allocation limits.

The report said OneFortyOne had questioned the currency of the basis for water allocations and called for government investments in future research initiatives, including ground-water monitoring. Green Triangle Forest Industries Hub chair Ian McDonnell said the group briefed Mr Marshall into better understanding tree water use, which he said will help the government's upcoming review of the water allocation plan to ensure the most up to date science and data on tree water use.

"The Premier was very receptive to our plans to explore how to better utilise existing water supply, harnessing drainage water for environmental and industry gain in a partnership with other South East primary producers," he said.

"We sought a commitment from the State Government that it will support our sector as we embark on \$300m of new capital investment, expanding and diversifying our manufacturing base with goals of getting more trees in the ground to expand the fibre base.

"Overall, the Premier was particularly pleased to see our forest and timber sector actively collaborating on a united strategic vision, investing heavily in research and development through the National Institute for Forest Products Innovation, the University of South Australia and its partners to future proof our businesses and further enable its workforce."

Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell welcomed the Premier to the Limestone Coast and said it was important Mr Marshall understand the issues and opportunities for investment in the region ahead of the 2022 election.

"There were many proactive meetings with the forest industry which canvassed a range of topics," Mr Bell said.

"A focus for the next 11 months leading up to the next state election will include investment in our region, mental health services, jobs and an increase in tourism spend."

Millicent mill given high praise

PREMIER Steven Marshall has praised the efforts of Kimberly-Clark Australia Millicent Mill employees in producing almost half a billion toilet rolls in 2020 amid COVID-19 panic buying.

The state leader addressed employees at the facility's 60th anniversary event on Tuesday, telling the crowd he was grateful for the continued production of toilet paper at the Millicent Mill.

"The country was relying on you guys to provide on extraordinary levels and of course, no stress there whatsoever for this workforce," Mr Marshall said.

"We all got to know how important tissue was last year and I want to say thank you to every single person here who made sure the operation continued through what was a very difficult year for manufacturing right around the world.

"I am very grateful this operation was continuously operating during that very difficult period we had."

Mr Marshall said the coronavirus pandemic demonstrated the need for sovereign manufacturing capabilities in Australia.

"I genuinely believe we have got to make things in this country and I know the Prime Minister shares that sentiment very much," he said. Kimberly-Clark is a great manufacturer globally... [it] makes an enormous contribution to our national economy, but particularly here in Millicent.

"[The 60th anniversary] is a big celebration for Millicent, for the South East, and it's a big celebration for us right across South Australia and quite frankly, right around the country.

Mr Marshall attributed the long-running success of the organisation to continuous

investment in equipment and technology, quality product and product development and the 400-strong workforce at the Millicent production site.

"You have got product that is coming in from right around the world, you've got much cheaper, lower cost companies in countries you've got to compete with," he said. "The continuous investment the company makes, the focus on product development, the investment in people are the ways you have been able to remain not just competitive but actually thrive in an increasingly competitive global market.

"There are not that many manufacturing companies that have stood the test of time and have performed well in the past that perform well today.

"This is a company with a great past, it is a campy with a great future.

"It is the largest employer in the area and I think it is going to be the largest employer in the area for a long period of time."

Kimberly-Clark Australia managing director Doug Cunningham said the site produced close to half a billion toilet rolls in 2020.

"Looking back over the last couple of years, it has been an interesting sort of ride, particularly the last 12 months.

"Never would we have thought we would be a national treasurer making toilet rolls, but toilet rolls this time last year were flying off the shelf.

"I had phone calls from every retailer, I had phone calls from ministers asking whether we were going to run out of pulp.

"The mill here did an amazing job and it is something we are very proud of."

Millicent town plan revealed

THE creation of an open air plaza in Millicent's main street, transforming Eudunda Lane from a dull thoroughfare to an active space and public art on McLaughlin Way are key considerations in the town's roadmap for the future.

Wattle Range Council has released the Millicent Town Centre Concept Plan for public consultation following extensive research aimed at creating a vision for future development and budgets.

Wax Design has spearheaded development of the blueprint, with with almost 200 submissions made across community sur-

veys and in-person workshops.

Community members are encouraged to provide feedback on the draft concept design, which identifies seven priority projects including street activation measures to transform Millicent into a vibrant family friendly town centre.

Among the opportunities flagged in the document is the potential for full scale murals on blank walls including McLaughlin Way, redevelopment of the Millicent Rail Lands and sculptures at the eastern entrance of the town's central business district.

Wax Design said the plan aimed to centre

Millicent as a magnet for residents, day-trippers and visitors, with the town centre serving as a gateway to exploring Millicent and the Limestone Coast.

"Millicent's town centre faces both opportunities and challenges, as well as social, economic and environmental impacts," the report said.

"What is apparent is the community's desire for Millicent to strengthen and grow as a major destination, with a vibrant main street and numerous community assets into the future.

"The Millicent Town Centre Draft Concept

Design provides a roadmap for the town, ensuring that future actions, proposed developments, public and private investment, as well as capital works contribute to achieving the vision for Millicent."

Copies of the draft plan will soon be distributed to Millicent organisations, schools and community groups and made available at the council office, Millicent Library, Millicent Visitor Information Centre and online.

Wax Design will deliver a one hour presentation on the draft followed by a question and answer session at an upcoming consultation session.

Tantanoola fatal crash due to medical episode

POLICE have determined the death of a Mount Gambier man in a road crash in Tantanoola last month as a result of a medical episode.

Just after 6.30am on March 25, emergency services were called to Tantanoola Road after reports a red Commodore sedan left the road and hit a tree stump.

The driver and sole occupant in the vehicle, a 56-year-old Mount Gambier man, sadly died at the scene.

Police said the man's death will not be counted in the 'Lives Lost' road total.

There have now been 36 deaths on South Australian roads compared to 33 for this time last year.

Tatiara says numbers right

TATIARA District Council is likely to retain its current number of elected representatives after a period of public consultation attracted no written responses.

Councils in South Australia are required to undertake a representation review at least once in each 'relevant period', which is set by the Local Government Minister.

Tatiara's current structure was adopted by council in 2013 and includes no wards, nine area councillors and the mayor and a principal member elected by the electors.

Council adopted an in principle decision to support the retention of the current structure and did not support and change of its composition.

In a report, Tatiara District Council chief executive Anne Champness said the sole submission received was in response to a social media post after the public consultation period, but it was in support of the status quo.

Council will now undertake representation review report and a further three-week consultation on the subject.

Kalangadoo honours Anzacs

MEMBERS of the Kalangadoo community will gather on April 18 to remember two World War II veterans for the town's annual Anzac commemoration service.

The service of Private Williams (Bill) James Peake and Craftsman Leo Matson Bilney will be honoured at the 6.15am ceremony at the Kalangadoo Cemetery.

Born in Mount Gambier on March 1, 1924 and educated at the Kalangadoo Primary School, Private Peake enlisted in the Third Light Horse Regiment as a 17-year-old.

Private Peake - who was 6ft tall and an accomplished horseman - lied about his birthdate and stated he was born in Queensland to enlist, using his skills to train others in the handling of horses and their care.

After six months training with the 10th Australian Infantry Battalion in South Australia, New South Wales and Victoria line of commands, Private Peake was transferred to the Australian Warfare School in July 1942.

He completed in September and was posted to the 2/7th Australian Independent Company, which sailed to Port Moresby, from which it was flown to Wau, in New Guinea in January 1943 to reinforce the Kanga Force during the Salamaua-Lae campaign.

In April 1943, Private Peake was transferred to the 2/25th Field Park Royal Australian Engineers which was involved in the fighting in New Guinea, including along the Kokoda Track.

Private Peake contracted malaria in November and was in and out of hospitals until

he recovered in February 1945, where he was transferred to the 2/27th Battalion and was part of the Operation Oboe Landings on the island of Borneo, in Indonesia.

After the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and the war ending, Private Peake transferred to the 65th Infantry Battalion, travelling to Japan to undertake guard duty, patrolling and training.

Private Peake left Japan in December 1948 to return to Australia and was discharged on

January 1949, serving a total of 2551 days - including 1591 days active service overseas.

Craftsmen Bilney was born at Kalangadoo on October 14, 1907, the 11th child of 15 to parents Henry and Coral.

The 34-year-old reported for duty at Woodville on February 17, 1942, training for active service as part of the 128 Brigade Workshop before transferring to the 129 Australian Brigade Workshop in July the same year.

He embarked for overseas active service on

the USS Henry T Allen from Brisbane on July 16, 1943 and arrived at Port Moresby four days later.

Upon arrival, the 129 Australian Brigade Workshop was attached to the 3rd Infantry Division and worked with the 15th Infantry Brigade Group, moving with the brigade to Dumpu in January 1944 to relieve the units of the 7th Infantry Division in the final stages of the Ramu Valley Campaign.

After its capture, the 129 Brigade Workshop left for Lae in April 1944 and worked at the New Guinea province until August before returning to Mapee, Queensland to rejoin the 15th Infantry Brigade Group. While Australian units returned to New Guinea to relieve the US troops, Craftsman Bilney suffered injuries and was unable to rejoin his unit in Bougainville until February 1945.

Craftsman Bilney was discharged on January 9, 1946 after completing 1402 days service including 692 days active service overseas.

Both men returned to the Limestone Coast after their service, with Craftsman Bilney passing away in June 1972 and Private Peake passing away in August 2000.

Craftsman Bilney and Private Peake are both interred at the Mount Gambier Carinya Gardens Cemetery.

Members of the Bilney and Peake families will attend Sunday's Kalangadoo Remembers service to honour their forebears.

The commemorative service will be followed by a gunfire breakfast at the Kalangadoo Institute.

Millicent's Anzac Day commemorations altered

THE traditional gunfire breakfast at Millicent's Anzac Day dawn service will be restricted to RSL members and veterans under an altered commemorative activities.

The popular breakfast is cooked by the Millicent Lions Club and attended by hundreds of residents following the dawn service each year.

But residents will be permitted to attend this year's commemorative services at the Cross of Sacrifice after Covid restrictions

limited the 2020 service to RSL Millicent sub-branch members only.

The dawn service will start at 6am, while the mid-morning march is scheduled to start from George Street at 10.45am with vintage cars carrying veterans and legacy widows who are not able to march.

People wishing to lay wreaths at the 11am mid morning service are requested to have them at the Cross of Sacrifice by 10.30am.

1080 is used widely for fox and wild dog control in inaccessible areas.

However, the saving of livestock is also an important picture.

It is estimated that any sheep farmer can lose up to 20pc of his lambs through foxes.

Foxes generally remove the tongues of lambs or chew the throats etc.

I have seen them chew the backside of a sheep giving birth.

While the dog deaths were traumatic, spare a thought for animals mauled by dogs and foxes and there lingering deaths.

These deaths run into the hundreds and thousands yearly.

Also spare a thought for the farmer who has to shoot his sheep that have suffered all night, let alone the cost and losses plus trauma.

In Australia we have an estimated 7.2 million foxes today.

This is with all controls used, such as poison, shooting and trapping.

This is not to mention wild dogs in some areas in the north of Australia are now not able to run sheep due to wild dogs.

The question to ban poison is not an easy one.

We need balanced decisions.

It seems according to the article the dogs were running in a prohibited area - this is another issue.

If the poison was banned and no replacement found or used, it would result in an explosion of fox and dog numbers.

This in turn would result in more deaths and suffering in other areas of our ecological system.

The Blue Lake city's population swelled from around 10,000 to almost 40,000 as people scrambled to catch a glimpse of the Royal visit.

According to reports, thousands of school children assembled at Vansittart Park were among the first residents to catch a glimpse of the Royals in the region.

I WAS at the Blue Lake Caravan Park. There was a highland dancing comp there and the dancers formed a guard of honour as she (the Queen) drove down into the Valley Lakes area.

I LINED up at Renmark as an excited five year old holding her flag to wave at the Queen. When I moved to the Mount four years later we lived up at the Queen Elizabeth Caravan Park for a few months and the tree the Queen had planted on her visit was there outside the gate.

JUDY

AS A seven year old I travelled by train from

Millicent to Mount Gambier.

We were all in either blue or red uniforms and assembled at Vansittart Park to form a flag but can't remember which one it was.

The late Eric Arthur was the local photographer who covered the visit for the press and in later years I was very privileged to see many of his photos that were never published. My sister Judith was too young but she ended up being the loyal royalist in the family. Special memories never leave you.

ANN

NOT the 1954 trip, but Prince Philip on a more recent visit, 1973 I think, when he reprimanded a photographer who unwrapped a new film to put in his camera, and threw the wrapping on the ground.

PAT

I WAS seven years old and remember our excitement. We were dressed in red, white and blue with hats to match.

MARILYN

I WAS six years old. Went on the train from Bordertown. Pretty sure we were up near where the tree was planted at the caravan park.

JOY

I WAS one of the school children at Vansittart park. I was part of the "W" in WELCOME, all composed of children.

SANDY

I WAS only a baby and we saw them at Vansittart Park but remember my mum and dad talking about their visit many years later.

GAYE

I was not there. I received a little book on the Royal visit while in Infant School.

I will take a look at it today.

Regional rail hits spotlight

A REGIONAL rail advisor has proposed ambitious plan to transform the Bordertown Railway Station to include a cafe, a cellar door and a station garden.

South Australian Transport Action Group southern region co-ordinator and advocate Gary Field has called on Tatiara District Council to acquire the railway station and grounds for lease from the Transport Department to assure the stability and long-term solution of creating a vibrant railway station.

Mr Field said the station, which consists of a platform, general concourse, building, garden, grounds and shed, includes seven rooms of which three were suitable for lease.

"The three rooms could be converted to cafe, cellar door [and] local produce," he said.

"The cafe would cater for railway passengers, visitors and the local community.

"Based on the Henry and Rose Cafe in Keith which started as a small cafe and attended mainly by the local community, until visitors realised that a quality cafe was available.

"The local community would benefit from the cafe as a refuge for quiet meetings, job interviews and general social engagements."

Mr Field said it was hoped regional bus services and tourist buses would patronise the station to facilitate better transit services, with a cafe allowing travellers to have meals "rather than the present roadhouses, which requires transit passengers to line up for meals along with motorists obtaining food or drink only".

"A separate area of the cafe could be transformed into a cellar door for tasting and purchase of local wines and local packaged produce, attracting a more broader clientele base," he said.

"[A] station garden will not only serve as a retreat but has the advantage to be self-sufficient financially, however details will not be discussed until the station is leased."

Mr Field said the further income could be generated through the station grounds, with the development of a carpark - including a long-term secured parking bay - a bus transit zone and bus layover.

He said allowing residents outside of major towns to park in a secure bay and catch a train or bus to their destination would alleviate the need for residents to drive to the city or a ma-

for airport, pay high parking fees on arrival and drive on unfamiliar and congested roads.

Private tourism entrepreneurial opportunities - such as Segway and electric bike tours - were also floated by Mr Field.

"Improvements to the Bordertown Railway Station would be a welcoming sight to first time visitors and the opportunity for visiting motorists to visit the station and have a break while touring the town," Mr Field said.

"Future tourism campaigns... would have rail visitors to set down on the Bordertown Railway Station and spend the rest of their day in Bordertown, staying overnight in local accommodation and prepare for their holiday the following day.

"Future tourism would include cyclists, hikers and prearranged local tour operators"

Minister orders Bordertown Railway Station clean up

INFRASTRUCTURE and Transport Minister Corey Wingard has issued an immediate order to clean the Bordertown Railway Station following a plea from Tatiara District Council to address the declining condition of the facility.

In a letter to council, Mr Wingard said the platform, building and gutters will be immediately cleaned, with the Transport Department planning to improve the annual planned maintenance to include additional cleaning and garden maintenance.

Mr Wingard said the Transport Department was interested in discussing collaborative options for the station with council with a preference for the station to be managed at a local level.

Tatiara District Council chief executive Anne Champness said council has been raising concerns about the declining condition of the building and the negative image presented to travellers and the general public, noting correspondence with the Infrastructure and Transport Department dates as far back as 2002.

Significant heritage works were undertaken on the station in 2014, including the restoration of foundations, gutter and drain repair, mending vandal damage, lighting improvements and the removal of pigeons.

In a letter to the minister earlier this year, Ms Champness said although the building was structurally sound, it had been neglected for many years and "the pigeons have made it their home again".

Million-dollar hotel revamp

THE Mount Gambier Hotel will undergo a \$1.1m refurbishment to facilitate accommodation and the creation of local tours and overnight tourism packages.

The popular hotel has received a \$336,740 State Government grant to help develop tourism infrastructure and boost the profile of the Limestone Coast.

Matthews Hospitality chief executive Andrew Kemp said the groups' venues - which include 'The G', Colhurst House B&B, South Eastern Hotel and Park Hotel - played an integral role in the region.

"He said the funding will allow the group to champion the region's tourism experiences and local businesses to grow visitation to Mount Gambier.

"We are designing a series of tours including highlights of the Limestone Coast and a tour for food lovers that will take visitors directly to the doorstep of local food and wine businesses," Mr Kemp said.

"Visitors will discover a range of produce including ice-cream made from camels' milk in Mount Benson, Kalangadoo organic apples, beers from the Robe Town Brewery and wines

from the Coonawarra region, to name a few.

"The accommodation upgrades and tours will go hand-in-hand, encouraging more visitors to Mount Gambier to enjoy the world-class experiences and produce the Limestone Coast has to offer."

The venue is one of 12 regional tourism business receiving funds under the State Government's Tourism Industry Development Fund. Mount Gambier Apartments received \$158,181 towards a \$527,272 project to construct two new luxury wheelchair accessible apartments. Premier Steven Marshall said a

key aim of the funding scheme was to create new jobs and give regional economies a boost.

"We know from the latest Tourism Research Australia data that January 2021 has been the best month since the pandemic began," he said.

"Visits, nights and expenditure were the highest for a month since March 2020.

"These results are on the back of a strong intrastate market and recovering interstate market so it's great that we've got a pipeline of new and exciting experiences to keep visitors coming back to our regions."

Hub marks safety boost for at risk Limestone Coast women

WOMEN and their children experiencing domestic, family and sexual violence in the Limestone Coast will soon have better access to help and information with the opening of a new safety hub in Mount Gambier.

The Haven - Mount Gambier will open on May 3 at the Mount Gambier Library, with specially trained volunteers staffing the facility from 9am to 4pm from Monday to Friday.

Women will be able to access information, referrals and support from volunteers and may provide help with housing and legal matters, family intervention, counselling, drug and alcohol services and phone and computer access.

A range of online, Zoom and telephone services will be available at the hub and staff will also provide direct referrals to other agencies and services in the Limestone

Coast including police, mental health, financial counselling and medical services.

Human Services Minister Michelle Lensink said the safety hubs were one of many measures rolled out by the State Government to support at-risk women and children. "It's vital that women and their children living in regional South Australia have the same opportunity to feel safe and supported as those living in inner Adelaide.

"Our safety hubs are not only boosting community understanding about domestic violence and are a safe haven for support, they are empowering women to help each other by training and up-skilling local volunteers.

"Given the varying needs and challenges of different South Australian regions, the hubs are developed in partnership with local frontline service providers to ensure each one is tailor-made for the community it serves."

The Mount Gambier hub is one of four

facilities to share in a total of \$300,000 of Federal Government funding, enabling their opening to be fast-tracked in 2021 in response to the Covid pandemic.

Centrecare Limestone Coast Domestic Violence Service manager Susie Smith hoped the space will facilitate women to build confidence and courage to disclose information about their private lives and identify potential abusive behaviours before it escalates.

"The facility is a gateway which will provide women options and give them information to allow them to unpack the situation which will increase their power and awareness," she said.

"But it is not just about domestic violence, women will be able to go in there for whatever reason they want whether they need legal help or to access counselling.

"It is about volunteers having an antenna to help women who haven't had the chance to identify problematic behaviours in their relationship see the red flag."

Redress support expands

MORE survivors of institutional child sex abuse in South Australia will be supported after the State Government agreed to include local governments in the National Redress Scheme.

Attorney-General Vickie Chapman said the expansion will ensure financial support and counselling is available to individuals who have endured historic abuse in the state's institutions.

Ms Chapman said the cost of claims against local government institutions would be managed through the \$146m set aside by the State Government to cover payments.

"Addressing the wrongs of the past is a responsibility that South Australian governments share, both State and local," she said.

"Through this commitment, we are ensuring victims have access to these supports, without potentially overwhelming local government with the cost."

In two years, the scheme has received 9642 applications nationwide, with \$414.1m worth of redress payments made to survivors.

In South Australia, the state's Redress Response Unit had received 888 applications, with more than \$18m worth of payments made.

Fines track distraction in drivers

INCREASING numbers of motorists are being fined for driving while distracted, with figures revealing a 15pc rise in fines for failing to have proper control of a motor vehicle since 2017.

The RAA has warned drivers that they risk more than a \$287 fine for personal grooming or eating while behind the wheel.

RAA senior manager safety and infrastructure Charles Mountain said in 2020, 1238 drivers were fined for the offence compared to 1078 who were fined in 2017.

Mr Mountain said another 684 motorists were cautioned for the offence last year.

"Unlike illegal use of a mobile phone, these fines are issued to drivers for behaviour like doing their make-up, using an electric razor, brushing their teeth or reading a book when behind the wheel," he said.

"Motorists must remember they risk not just a fine or caution but potentially their lives and other road users' safety when they don't fully concentrate on the task at hand when behind the wheel.

Drainage board regions call

THE South Eastern Water Conservation and Drainage Board has called for greater collaboration with the Coast Protection Board, with chair Lee Morgan telling a parliamentary inquiry the board “appears to have a focus on managing coastal issues affecting the Adelaide metropolitan area”.

In a submission to parliament’s Environment, Resource and Development Committee, Mr Morgan highlighted a number of challenges relating to the functions of the conservation and drainage act which planning for emerging risk related to sea level rise and sand movement. Mr Morgan said the board manages a 2500km network of drains in the region, with the management of flood waters to protect agricultural productivity a function of the board.

He said historically, the drainage practice has been to direct flows to the ocean through 13 outlets, the largest of which are located

within or close to Kingston, Robe, Beachport, Southend and Port MacDonnell.

“These outlets provide a direct conduit for ocean surges to inundate inland areas of the coastline, which have the potential to render agricultural land unproductive, and cause damage to property, buildings and state infrastructure,” Mr Morgan said.

“The South Eastern Water Conservation and Drainage Board are already challenged with managing drainage flows and any increase in sea level rise will impede flows and cause additional risk of inland flooding.

“Movement of oceanic sands causing blockages at outlets is an ongoing maintenance issue that requires the expertise of officers of the Coast Protection Branch to address.”

Mr Morgan said while there was a need for collaboration between the Coast Protection Board and the drainage board to ensure risks were managed, he said a greater presence in regional areas was required.

“The Coast Protection Board appears to have a focus on managing coastal areas affecting the Adelaide metropolitan area,” he said.

“There will be an increased need for the experience of the Department of Water and Environment staff assisting the Coast Protection Board to support regional areas like the South East as these issues continue to emerge.”

Have your say on suicide prevention strategy

PEOPLE with lived experience of suicidal distress are encouraged to have their say on the development of a new statewide suicide prevention plan for 2022 to 2025.

In an Australian first, the State Government is planning to legislate the state’s suicide prevention framework after through community consultation.

Once finalised, the bill will establish a whole-of-community and whole-of-govern-

ment approach to suicide prevention.

Health Minister Stephen Wade said the government was working in partnership with the community to help make a meaningful change in suicide prevention.

“The experience and wisdom of South Australians, particularly people who have been directly or indirectly impacted by suicide and suicidal distress, can really help us understand what we need to do to reduce

and prevent suicide in our community,” he said.

“We would like to hear from people whose voices are not always heard.

“That’s why we need to hear from as many South Australians as possible about what could make a difference.”

The ideas, comments and experiences shared by the community will be used to shape the first draft of the South Australia Suicide Prevention Plan 2022-2025, which

will be made public in September 2021 for further feedback.

Consultation on the plan is open until April 23 and can be accessed by visiting openyourworld.sa.gov.au or phoning 1800 955 709.

Making more out of waste

THE City of Mount Gambier understands the challenges, opportunities and unique issues of managing waste and offers several recycling initiatives to encourage residents to dispose of items responsibly.

“Many people want to recycle as much as they can and council offers convenient locations like the Library and Civic Centre to dispose of these items that are otherwise difficult to save from landfill given they are unable to be recycled through the kerbside blue bin,” City of Mount Gambier environmental sustainability officer Aaron Izzard said.

Bread tags, oral care products and plastic bottle lids can be dropped off in the designated bins in the Civic Centre foyer during business hours where they will be collected and sent off to be recycled locally.

Batteries and mobile phones should never be put in the general waste or recycling bin, but they can be dropped off at the Mount Gambier Library during opening hours for recycling.

“This will ensure that harmful chemicals are not leaked in landfill causing environmen-

tal pollution, while also reducing the risk of them starting a fire,” Mr Izzard said.

Accessories such as charges and cords can also be dropped off in the designated bins at the library.

With tonnes of organic waste unnecessarily ending up in landfill each year residents are encouraged to purchase a FOGO (green waste) bin to dispose of food scraps and garden waste through kerbside collection.

“Bins can be purchased by contacting council or make the most of great discounts available from Compost Revolution and start composting at home.”

Further recycling opportunities, including polystyrene, are available via the Waste Transfer Station.

Useful items in good condition can be dropped off for free for resale at the ReUse Market.

Crime spree leads to arrest

A NEW South Wales man was arrested in Naracoorte on Wednesday over a recent crime spree across South Australia.

Police are continuing to investigate the crimes, which started sometime between Tuesday 6pm and Wednesday 6.30am when a silver Toyota Prius was stolen during a break-in at a Kings Park home in Adelaide.

At around 8.15am Wednesday, police received reports of the stolen Prius being involved in a petrol theft at Willalooka.

It was also reported driving dangerously on the Riddoch Highway, almost colliding with a truck.

A Naracoorte Highway Patrol spotted the car stopped on the side of the Riddoch Highway, however the car sped off as police ap-

proached and attempted to stop the vehicle.

The pursuit was quickly terminated due to safety reasons and was last seen heading south towards Naracoorte.

A Lucindale patrol saw the stolen car again on Deviation Road at Naracoorte where they were able to successfully spike both passenger side tyres.

The driver stopped the vehicle and fled on foot into the yard of a nearby home.

Police set cordons around the area and arrested the alleged driver after jumping fences of homes in Gordon Street.

A search of the stolen car uncovered other property believed to be stolen from a car at Clarence Park on Tuesday night.

A 27-year-old man from New South Wales

was charged with a number of offences including aggravated serious criminal trespass, two counts of theft, driving dangerously to avoid police pursuit and other traffic offences.

He was refused bail and was set to appear in the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court yesterday.

DRUGS AND IMITATION FIREARM RECOVERED

POLICE arrested a man after a traffic stop in Mount Gambier last week with a subsequent search of a passenger and home uncovering drugs and an imitation firearm.

About 10am on April 9, Mount Gambier Police stopped a Ford Ranger utility on Vansittart Road at Mount Gambier after spotting a young child in the car not wearing a seatbelt.

Police searched the occupants and located cannabis, methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia on one passenger, a 40-year-old Mount Gambier man.

A house in Laird Street, Mount Gambier was later searched with police locating cannabis and a regulation imitation firearm (gel blaster).

The Mount Gambier man was arrested and charged with possessing a regulation imitation firearm, possessing an unregistered firearm, breaching a Firearms Prohibition Order, and two counts of trafficking in a controlled drug.

The driver of the vehicle, a 59-year-old Mount Gambier man, will be issued a fine for failing to ensure a passenger under 16 years old was wearing a seatbelt or approved child restraint.

Smoking hurting oral health

SOUTH Australian health authorities are focusing on the impacts tobacco smoking has on oral health as part of a new campaign encouraging people to quit.

While tobacco smoking remains one of the single most preventable causes of illness and death in Australia, Drug and Alcohol Services South Australia tobacco control unit manager Dr Clinton Cenko warned smokers were two to four times more likely to develop gum disease.

It is estimated about 32pc of moderate to severe gum disease is due to smoking.

"Because your mouth is the first part of your body to be exposed to tobacco smoke, this is where a lot of damage is done," Dr Cenko said. "However, if you quit, your mouth starts healing and you can reverse a lot of that damage."

Dr Cenko said five years after quitting smoking, the risk of oral cancer is halved, while after about 10 years, the risk is similar to a non-smoker.

"We are encouraging smokers to think about their overall health and quit smoking in their own way, by trying out a variety of quitting methods and seeing what works best for them in their quitting journey," Dr Cenko said.

"It almost always takes multiple attempts to quit successfully and smokers wanting to give up the smokes can register for the Quit your way in May campaign to receive support, assistance and advice to build the skills and confidence to quit long term."

Penalties increased

INDIVIDUALS caught with contraband within 100 metres of a prison will face jail terms of up to 10 years under a landmark bill aims to strengthen the security of South Australian prisons.

Visitors caught with contraband inside a correctional facility or individuals found with a controlled drug inside a prison buffer zone - 100m of any prison - will face up to 10 years imprisonment.

Possessing a prohibited item within a prison buffer zone will now be an offence, with individuals facing up to five years jail.

The bill also places restrictions on drones, with people caught using un-

manned aircraft near a prison will face a maximum fine of \$10,000 or two years jail.

Correctional Services Minister Vincent Tarzia said the passing off the bill follows South Australia's nation-leading drop in the rate of recidivism.

Mr Tarzia said the state's rate of return to correctional services resulting from a new sanction was the lowest in the country at 42.3pc and below the national average of 54.9pc.

He said the state also had the nation's lowest rate of return to prison with a new sentence at 34.8pc.

Farm funds flow

SEVERAL Limestone Coast farm projects have benefited from a \$6.4m Federal Government windfall to boost agricultural innovation.

The Smart Farms Small Grants supports farmers in the adoption of innovative practices that increase farm productivity, profitability and protection of natural resources management.

Thirteen grants have been awarded to Barker-based enterprises as part of the fourth funding round, including the MacKillop Farm Management Group Incorporated, which has received \$95,625 towards its grazing standing crops projects, aimed at enterprise versatility, resilience, summer groundcover and soil health.

Women Learning Together has received \$57,490 to help build the capacity of rural leaders to support women farmers to adopt best practice sustainable agriculture across the South Australian landscape, while Charles Sturt University was awarded \$99,600 to increase dung beetle awareness among cattle and sheep producers.

The Grassland Society of Southern Australia will use \$97,660 to generate improved carbon capacity in the Limestone Coast, while the Wine Grape Council of South Australia Incorporated received \$99,980 to grow its EcoVineyards program throughout the state.

Potatoes South Australia Incorporated received \$100,000 to help it demonstrate the potential of compost to reduce diseases and increase productivity.

The South Australian No-Tillage Farmers Association will use \$28,700 to improve the sustainability of forestry, cropping and livestock operations through access to newly-created, large-scale biochar supplies, and a further \$29,500 grant to advance inter-cropping in mainstream No-Till farming systems.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said he was excited by the great ideas put forward by the successful local applicants under Smart Farms Small Grants.

"This investment encourages clever ideas and goes directly to the grass roots, empowering locals to deliver benefits for their communities and natural resources," Mr Pasin said.

MONDAY TERMINATOR 2: JUDGMENT DAY


7MATE, 8.30pm

Mark Mudford was the angler on the rod and the fish is estimated at 120kg, so we are off to a late, but great start.

I have got no doubt the smaller fish will be right behind them, so let's hope we are in for another boomer.

Before the big blow there was plenty of fishing going on by the boaties.

The offshore anglers had been stuck into some great shark fishing anywhere from 50 metres and beyond, with school and gummy shark over 20kg hauled aboard.

There have been plenty of reefies mixed in.

I have seen some nice queen snapper, red snapper and flathead, just to name a few.

A few guys have had small makos swim up the burley trail which is a great sign to see.

The Port MacDonnell Offshore Angling Club's 40th tuna and sports fish tournament is only a matter of weeks away now, with entries available in store or on the PMOAC website.

Let's hope the weather is kind to us this year and we have a great competition.

Surf fishos enjoyed a week or so of calm seas before the weekend and there were some

nice fish caught.

Anglers making the effort and walking the beaches on the eastern side of the Glenelg River mouth have found some nice gummy shark, salmon and smaller mulloway.

From the mouth through to Nobles Rocks has plenty of excellent water and not being able to drive on the beaches keeps the crowds relatively low.

There have been a few sharks caught locally down along the Piccininni area this week by those who have made the effort and although they have not been massive fish, they are still good on the table.

It is usually this time of year we see some nice big sea bream start turning up in the first gutters of most beaches.

Downsize your gear a little bit and you will be surprised at just how hard they can fight in the shallows.

With the big sea forecast to roll into the coming weeks, we should see some salmon start popping their heads up in better numbers.

From now on I think we will see the size start to creep up as the weather deteriorates, which is what those big jackies love.

Canunda NP is always a hot spot for the big salmon, but getting in is an adventure in itself.

Keep to the track and avoid the big waterholes and you should be right.

I think after the swell event we had, the sea should stir nicely and be just right for the big whiting.

Hopefully the water is not too cold for them and they keep on as they were.

I have said it before, but what a whiting season it has been.

I think if we did not catch another fish now until the next season comes around, I doubt you would hear anyone complain.

The landbased and boat anglers have had a dream run, landing not only great numbers of fish, but excellent size too.

It was not only the usual hot spots that fired this year - we saw whiting in some of the lesser fished areas as well, so hopefully we see that trend continue not only for the next few weeks, but in coming seasons too.

Prior to this past weekend, the Port MacDonnell jetty has been red hot of an evening for the landbased fishos.

We were seeing some nice catches of big tommies, garfish, mackerel and even some nice squid still.

Hopefully once things settle, we will see them return back to the numbers we were catching.

The Glenelg River fished well over the weekend for those targeting a few bream, although the mulloway were a little on the quiet side.

The bream were quite spread out for the most part and I know of fish from Isle of Bags, all the way through to the upper reaches.

Prawns and cut pilchards were the weapons of choice for the weekend, but we know how often they can change their tastes.

I have not heard any perch news from this week just yet, but there is no doubt a few still sniffing around.

The forecast for the coming weekend is better than the last one, but it is still going to be very average.

Looking to go one better

IT is now two years since Lara greyhound training team Deb Coleman and Rob Camilleri were at Tara Raceway with Slingshot Hammer for the Group Listed Mount Gambier Cup (512 metres).

As luck would have it, he drew box one in the final after a best-of-day 29.45 seconds heat win.

It is now history, though, how the local youngster Galactic Athena ran down Slingshot Hammer in the shadows of the post to score a memorable win in what was then a race record 29.43 seconds.

The pair had Zipping Zarbo engaged in last Sunday's Mount Gambier Cup heats, the daughter of El Grand Senor and Zipping Abby boasting a record of 22 wins from 48 starts but having never seen the track and having to contend with box four.

A short-priced favourite in heat four, she looked to be in a bit of trouble early before railing through on the first turn and then taking the lead down the back straight.

From then on she was never in any danger of defeat, eventually running out a 6¾ lengths winner over Night To Burn in 29.54 seconds which ultimately was the second-fastest of the six heats.

Once again, as luck would have it, Coleman and Camilleri drew box one in a Mount Gambier Cup final, now hoping to go one better in this Sunday's final.

Last Sunday turned out to be a good day for the kennel with Coleman in NSW with Destruction and Overflow Lisa for heats of the Ladbrokes Nowra Puppy Classic (520m) - both making it through to the final when running first and second in their respective heats.

Speaking from Lara earlier this week, Camilleri said he had been pleased with Zipping Zarbo's effort in her Mount Gambier Cup heat considering she had not previously seen the track.

"It's now a matter of whether she can nail the start and make full use of box one," he said.

"If she can, then obviously she should be very hard to beat.

"She's very consistent, a pleasure to train and gives it all she's got.

"And really, that's all you can ask."

Camilleri said the whole operation was a real team effort, with Coleman attending to much of the daily maintenance and her son Ricky, handling Zipping Zarbo yesterday, trav-

elling to many of the tracks with their runners.

"Actually, Ricky's doing a great job and he'll be back with her for the final," he said.

"Now that he knows the way to Mount Gambier I'd like to utilise Tara Raceway on a more regular basis."

Allendale East trainer David Peckham struck a blow for the locals when Tippla won the first heat.

Leading all the way, the son of Barcia Bale x Irisize hung on to win by a head over Saint Mac in 30.31 seconds.

The black dog is raced by Tim Aloisi and Matt Lehman who won last year's cup with the Aloisi-trained Sunset Milo.

Peckham is still chasing his first cup win but after the running of the remaining five heats it appears Tippla's task will not be all that easy, especially from box five.

At Tara Raceway for the first time - and suitably impressed - Two Wells trainer Bec Romyn, after a couple of time-graded wins with Stareena and Bella's Night in February, took a step up in class yesterday when contesting the second heat of the cup with Renewed.

Having his first SA start after six wins in Victoria and another six in WA, the son of Kinloch Brae x Receptive handled himself pretty well considering it was his first look at the track.

Always on the pace, Renewed, a winner over 600 metres, matched motors with Numinous and Tiger Time down the back before railing through on Tiger Time turning for home and proving too strong when running out a 1¼ lengths winner in 29.72 seconds.

Romyn, who trained greyhounds in Victoria for 13 years prior to relocating to SA in July last year, currently has 25 in work and has done well since making the move.

Renewed's former owner had suggested to Romyn that the brindle dog could be a good purchase for her to race SA.

She then roped in dad Peter as a part-owner.

So far he has no complaints.

"Being a September 2017 whelping, we actually purchased him with veterans' races in mind. Making the Mount Gambier Cup final is certainly a bonus although the final is going to be a tough race to win," she said.

"But I certainly couldn't be happier in the way he pulled up."

As things stand, Romyn rates her favourite dog as being Angry Trip.

That could change come Sunday afternoon.

Laharum owner-trainer Jeff Guy knows

only too well the frustrations of a Mount Gambier Cup final after finishing sixth in the 2018 final with his former terrific chaser Paraphernalia behind Xtreme Caution.

He was back last Sunday for another try, this time with his speedy daughter of Fernando Bale x Dark Smiffy, Fugacious, who last month strung together a couple of quick 29.66 seconds and 29.70 seconds runs as a lead-up to the cup.

She went right on with the job, away well from box seven (the same box she has drawn in the final) before taking over the running from Silent Jacko down the back straight.

On the line she had a length to spare over Portland trainer Neville Lenehan's Hostile Savage who stormed home to be beaten a length in 29.76 seconds, much to the disappointment of local owner Jim Collins.

Further disappointment was to follow for Collins when Hostile Savage (29.8175 seconds) was relegated to first reserve for the cup final after two other runners-up in Tiger Time (29.81 seconds) and Oakvale Style (29.8120 seconds) reached the final by the narrowest of margins.

However, Lenehan, acting as caretaker trainer for Andrea Dailly of Anakie, led in the final two heat winners - Fabriola Zad and Gypsy Bun both impressing when running times of 29.33 seconds and 29.67 seconds respectively.

Having his first run at the track, Fabriola Zad was quickly away from box eight and in front turning out of the first turn.

From then on it was always going to be a matter of how far, the red fawn dog finishing full of running to defeat last year's cup winner Sunset Milo by 8¾ lengths.

Raced by the Dailly Greyhound Farms Syndicate, the winner's time was only three-quarters of a length outside Rockoon's track record of 29.28 seconds established on July 1, 2018.

In the sixth and final heat, the Dailly team's Gypsy Bun took the lead down the back before holding off a determined Oakvale Style to score by two lengths.

Meanwhile, for the first time in many years, a bookmaker will be fielding at Sunday's Mount Gambier Cup final, along with the TAB.

For well-known local bookmaker Darren Guthridge, this will be the first time he has operated at the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club's cup meeting.

Guthridge is the son of former leading local greyhound trainer Kevin Guthridge who trained Cindy's Range, runner-up to Tara Topar in the inaugural Mount Gambier Cup at Glenburnie in 1981.

Expectant: Cup fever hits Tara Raceway

IT is set to be a great afternoon of racing with the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club conducting the final of the Group Listed Commercial Hotel Mount Gambier Cup (512 metres) on Sunday, April 18 at Tara Raceway on Lake Terrace East, Mount Gambier.

The Mount Gambier Cup final always attracts a strong field, with star locals going up against "city" greyhounds racing at Angle Park travelling to the South-East as well as interstate raiders looking to get their slice of the \$14,275 prizemoney on offer.

First run in 1981 at Glenburnie, the race continues to gain further prominence in the racing community after becoming a Group Listed event in 2018, with that year's event won by Xtreme Caution trained by Brian Weis.

Other recent past winners include Mojito Mayhem in 2016, the speedy Fabregal, who was a Group finalist and winner of more than \$200,000 in prizemoney in 2017 and Galactic Athena in 2019, the youngest greyhound to win the Cup in just her seventh start giving local trainer Steve Bartholomew a most memorable win.

Last year's event was held in August due

to the COVID-19 outbreak, Sunset Milo for Adelaide trainer Tim Aloisi taking the honours in a race record time of 29.42 seconds.

With this year's event returning to its traditional Autumn timeslot, Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club president Noel Perry said the club was looking forward to seeing crowds return to the track to enjoy local greyhound racing's biggest day of the year.

"This is a race that is certainly steeped in tradition, with Tara Raceway actually taking its name from the Mount Gambier Cup's first winner, Tara Topar, who was raced by one of local greyhound racing's founding fathers in Newman McDonnell and trained by Joan Cruise," he said.

"And we're delighted to this year welcome on board the Commercial Hotel as sponsors

of the Mount Gambier Cup and Exchange Printers as the Mount Gambier Cup Consolation sponsors."

Entry to the event is free with gates opening at 11am.

There will be full catering, bar, TAB and bookmaker facilities and live music for patrons to enjoy as well as the club's playground to keep the kids entertained.

The toast of the town

IT had been a long time between drinks since a Mount Gambier owned and trained galloper won a feature race in Adelaide with a Mount Gambier jockey on board.

It all changed last Saturday when the feature race at Morphettville, the Listed \$107,625 Port Adelaide Guineas over 1800 metres, was taken out by three locals.

The Lee Creek trained Royal Mile, ridden by gun apprentice Jacob Opperman, continued his fairytale start to racing by winning his fourth race from seven starts.

At the three-year-old gelding's three other starts he had finished runner-up.

To make it a totally local affair, Royal Mile is owned outright by well known Burringule resident Rob Dycer, a former Wattle Range councillor for 13 years, 12 of those as deputy mayor.

In this day and age, it is rare for a galloper to have one owner and, in some cases when syndicates are involved, we sometimes see more than 20 owners in a horse.

"I've raced horses previously with several people and have always wanted to race a horse by myself," Dycer stated.

"My reckoning has been that if the horse is any good after five starts I will keep it, otherwise I'll get rid of it."

It is safe to say Royal Mile will remain in Dycer's name for some time yet.

The youngster was purchased at the Adelaide sales and Saturday's win boosted his career earnings from \$53,660 to \$112,010.

Being a Listed race, it lured trainers from near and far and almost half the field was from respected Victoria stables.

As such, it was easily the biggest test of Royal Mile's fledgling career and he passed with flying colours.

And, what a plum ride by Opperman to have Royal Mile (\$11-\$8.50) third on the fence and then not having to leave the rails after securing an inside run in the straight.

That brought up the hat-trick of wins for Royal Mile following a narrow win at Naracoorte on March 10, then a more authoritative victory in Adelaide on March 27.

It also was the second leg of a winning double at Morphettville for Opperman who had won earlier on the Victorian trained River Twain.

Speculation earlier in Royal Mile's career that he is the best horse Creek has had since the star sprinter Casino Wizard (whom Dycer also had a share in) has proven spot on.

It continues the very good run for Creek who is having his best local season for many years with nine winners up until Wednesday's Naracoorte meeting.

UNFORGETTABLE FIRST YEAR

Jockey Jamie Kah has taken the eastern seaboard by storm in the past nine months to easily lead the Melbourne premiership ladder and then last Saturday rode her first Group 1 winner in Sydney aboard Cascadian in the Doncaster Handicap, Australia's greatest mile race.

Taking South Australian racing by storm in his first year in the saddle is our very own Jacob Opperman who only started his riding career last April.

Who would ever have envisaged 12 months later the Mingbool apprentice would have 60 winners to his name - 10 of those in the metropolitan area - and have a commanding lead on the Limestone Coast jockey and apprentice's premiership ladder.

After his double in Adelaide on Saturday, Opperman buttered up with another double at Hamilton the following day from just the three rides.

Once again his two winners were the result of top rides, starting with a confident last to first win on the Warrnambool trained Sunburnt in the 1200-metre 0-58 handicap.

Then, in the final event, he made Millicent trainer Krystal Trembath's day (as well as several punters) by saluting on the well-backed Brobak (\$6.50-\$4).

Brobak has always shown ability but had gone off the boil this year until Sunday when

he dropped in class from Benchmark 64 grade back to 0-58.

Opperman had the eight-year-old gelding parked in behind the leaders until the top of the straight and Brobak went on to win his second race in Victoria and his fifth overall since joining the Trembath stable in 2017.

Some have been asking how Opperman is handling all the travelling and his weight?

"The travelling is OK and I am purchasing a new Cherokee in May while my riding weight is steady at 54 kilograms," the youngster stated.

"We have a spa out the back which helps and, as for the future, I am thinking about going on a three month loan to a stable closer to Adelaide but, for now, I am quite happy down here."

SHOWING PROMISE

While our gallopers continue to win races in Adelaide at an astonishing rate, it has been just the opposite for local pacers.

Admittedly, most local stables these days prefer to go to the closer Victorian meetings where the stake money is as good, if not better.

Glencoe trainer Kevin Von Duve broke the drought last Saturday night at Globe Derby Park when his youngster Springfield Affair landed

some good wagers to win the over age pace.

Backed from as much as \$51 into \$11, the three-year-old got the chocolates at his second run from a three month spell to make it career win number four from 21 starts.

"I bought him at the Melbourne sales and he was a bit unruly at his first few runs but has really improved at his last 10 starts," Von Duve told The Border Watch earlier this week.

"He had a cruisy run last Saturday night and I thought he was way over the odds.

"I've got him entered for the \$30,000 SA Derby on Saturday night but if he doesn't get a start I will look for a suitable race over the border."

Two local stables bookended the meeting at Terang last Monday night and it was great to see Glenburnie trainer Ken Dihm have success in the opening event.

That was with Bayside Victory (\$4.60) which used the sprint lane to break through after some consistent efforts of late.

Following three recent placings, the Steve Fennell trained Coming Hot (\$7) ran home resolutely to win the NR 51 pace with Jason Lee in the cart.

DRURY STABLE DOMINATED

It is also the younger players at the club

Foster has been a big talking point since joining the club and Kain said his input, on the scoreboard or not, is invaluable.

Foster did not kick a goal on Saturday but had plenty of input around the ground.

"He came up the ground a bit, but he just presents at the ball all day," Kain said.

"Myself and Kym Eagleson hit the scoreboard, but he had one of their better defenders on him.

"I think that is the big thing other sides are going to struggle with - it doesn't matter who your two key backman go to, there are another two guys who will hit the scoreboard."

Along with the new inclusions and young players, the likes of O'Neill still holds a key to
