Rain break looms

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Young girls lead play push

TWO Mount Gambier children are leading a neighbourhood campaign to have a playground established at a community reserve on Matthew Flinders Way.

Imogen Lines, 10, and Olivia Lauterbach, 6, are spearheading the push for a children's play space at the currently vacant reserve to service children and families residing in the expanding north-eastern residential development.

The Stuart Court residents recently engaged residents in the area through door-knocking and mailbox letter drops, taking their argument to Mount Gambier City Council's monthly meeting on Tuesday night.

While praising council for its development of the Wulanda Recreation and Convention Centre, the young girls urged the local government body not to forget the importance of neighbourhood playgrounds.

"They are an essential tool in our development, they are so much more than fun and games," Olivia said.

"Families gather, children climb, slide, swing, laugh, shout and the benefits improve quality of life for children now and for the rest of our lives," she said.

Olivia said playgrounds also encouraged children to play outdoors away from screens and devices, telling The Border Watch she had developed the strength to use the monkey bars through regular playground use.

Imogen highlighted the benefits of increased self confidence, self esteem and relationship building provided by community playgrounds, as well as numerous health and wellbeing benefits.

She also said the "empty" Matthew Flinders Way reserve was more than a kilometre from the nearest small neighbourhood playground at AF Sutton Reserve, 2.5km from Vansittart

Park and over 3km from the rail lands.

In response to the deputation, council acting chief executive Barbara Cernovskis encouraged supporters of the playground proposal to make a submission to the Mount Gambier Sport, Recreation and Open Space Strategy consultation, launched last week.

According to council, community input will guide the future development of sporting, recreation and open space facilities in Mount Gambier and help sourcing of grant funding from State and Federal governments for future capital works projects.

Council will use information collected dur-

ing the initial strategy community engagement process to prepare the draft Sport, Recreation and Open Space Strategy, which will be then be released for further community consultation later in the year. Mount Gambier Mayor Lynette Martin said the youths made a "compelling case" and they had given council the reasons why it should do the project.

"It is wonderful to see young people in our community taking such an interest in our community and coming forth in this venue and having such passion in your argument," Ms Martin said.

Praising the girls for their deputation,

councillor Ben Hood asked the speakers if they had given thought about the type of playground they would prefer at the site.

"We did think about a sustainable playground because there's lots of plastics playgrounds but sustainable playgrounds are good for the environment," Imogen responded, agreeing with Cr Hood's follow-up question regarding whether a nature play space was preferred.

Concerns aired over PATS change

MEMBER for Mount Gambier Troy Bell has raised concerns regional Patient Assistance Transport Scheme offices may close, following the circulation of a survey to users of the scheme by SA Health.

The independent MP has questioned whether the survey may determine whether regional offices should close, including one currently based at the Mount Gambier and District Health Service.

Mr Bell highlighted the importance of face-to-face service delivery for the "complex" scheme, which provides travel and accommodation subsidies to South Australians who are required to travel over 100kms to access medical specialists.

PATS program and business improvement manager Alexis Horel said the scheme regularly reviewed service delivery at its six offices across the state and the short survey was aimed at existing PATS clients.

Mr Bell said given Limestone Coast residents were among the biggest users of the scheme, collectively their voices could determine the future of the Mount Gambier office.

More than 7000 claims were lodged from Limestone Coast residents in the 2019/20 financial year, with approximately \$1.5m in subsidies issued.

"One of the biggest sources of complaints to my office is the loss of face-to-face services from our State Government," he said, stating

the regional PATS offices were closed to the public for most of 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions.

"When it comes to navigating a complex system like PATS, some people like to deal with a real person, not a computer or voice on the end of a telephone line," he said.

"Your feedback may affect how SA Health determines the future of regional PATS offices."

If the regional offices were to close, Mr Bell said it would be a disappointing decision for many across regional South Australia.

"More and more services are becoming online-only, which is a bit of a one-size fits all approach," he said.

"People should be able to use the method that best suits them and some people just need a little help and personal contact."

The survey is open until May 5 and has already received more than 1300 responses.

Ms Horel said the short survey would help continually improve the statewide services PATS provides to consumers and the community.

"We would like to hear from people about our public offices and customer service over the past 12 months, what works for them, what isn't working and what suggestions they have for change," Ms Horel said.

"Our staff are located in six offices across the state and a phone service is available at each office, with staff able to assist clients regardless of where they call from or where they are located," she said.

"We regularly review our services and would like to reassure the community that PATS offices remain open and patients requiring PATS can continue to access services by phone and email or by visiting the PATS website."

Feedback collected at a community forum held in Mount Gambier in 2019 previously triggered major statewide changes within the scheme.

Restrictions that required patients to travel directly to and from their appointment were lifted, along with the limitation that disqualified people from receiving a subsidy if they stayed more than two additional nights in commercial accommodation, or more than five additional nights with family and friends.

Additionally, the scheme was modified to support people with a terminal condition who engage a medical specialist to continue visiting that specialist.

Anzac honours

COMMUNITIES across the Limestone Coast will honour the nation's service men and women on Sunday as public Anzac Day services return for the first time since 2019.

Mount Gambier's traditional dawn service will start at 6.15am at Vansittart Park, with members of the public urged to sign in at one of several manned checkpoints before entering the congregation.

A breakfast will follow at Mount Gambier Community RSL with bookings compulsory.

Two commemorative services will be held in the city from 9am, one at the Boer War Memorial at the intersection of Lake Terrace and Bay Road, as well as an Airmen's Service led by Reverend Murray Earl at Lake Terrace Cemetery.

The traditional street march - led by World War II veteran Jack Hopgood - will take place from 10am, with a Royal Australian Air Force plane to conduct a flyover during the event.

A service will also be held at Casadio Park from midday as a tribute to Lieutenant Anthony Casadio, a naval pilot who died while serving in Vietnam in 1966.

Commemorative events will begin in the Blue Lake city tomorrow with a service marking 70 years since the battle of Kopyong, held at Vansittart Park from 11am.

Limestone Coast author Max Carmichael will also launch a biography of Vietnam War veteran and Nelson resident Mick Bawden from 3pm at the Mount Gambier Community RSL.

Millicent's dawn service will be held from 6am but the community gunfire breakfast will not continue, with only select guests invited to that gathering due to COVID-19 protocols.

The march down George Street will start from 10.45am ahead of an 11am service.

Coonawarra Penola RSL will hold its Anzac Day dawn service from 7am for a 7.30am start at Penola War Memorial Park.

The service will be followed by a march down Church Street to the RSL Hall.

Breakfast at the RSL is limited to members and invited guests due to COVID-19 restrictions.

A group of returned soldiers has also organised a dawn service at Port MacDonnell from 6.15am.

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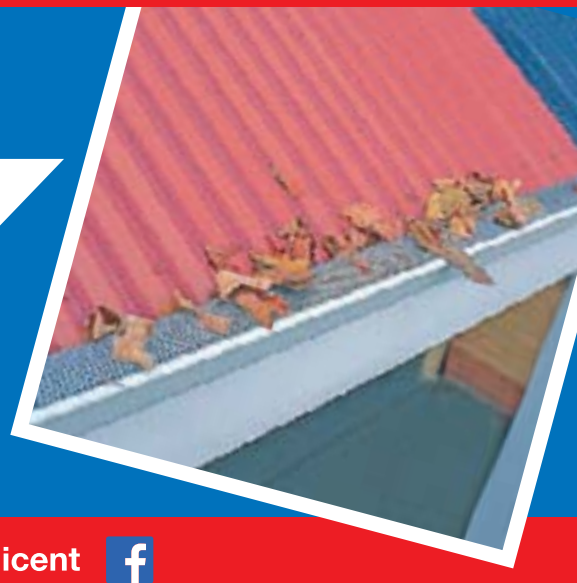
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Teen charged over Compton crash

A MOUNT Gambier teenager will face court later this year charged with causing serious harm by dangerous driving.

It follows a single vehicle crash at Compton on Sunday night which left a 17 year old passenger with serious injuries.

Man has been arrested over a serious crash near Mount Gambier on Sunday.

A 2007 Ford Ranger - driven by an 18-year-old Mount Gambier man and con-

taining three passengers - was travelling east on McKay Road when it lost control and collided with two garbage bins and a stobie pole.

Major Crash Investigators arrested the driver on Wednesday and charged him with one count of cause serious harm by dangerous driving.

He was bailed to appear in the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court on August 24.

Postal food ban criticism

AN AUSTRALIA Post decision to stop delivering perishable food items from June 30 will add "significant pressure" to food and beverage producers already affected by COVID-19, Food South Australia chief executive Catherine Sayer has warned.

The national carrier has blamed complex and differing food safety regulations across states and territories for its decision, which will impact the transport of meats, seafood, eggs and frozen meals.

Ms Sayer said Food South Australia was aware consistency and reliability of delivery had become an increasingly significant issue for producers of perishable products sending goods through Australia Post but stated the decision would negatively impact the sector.

"The producers are doing their best to

ensure products are well-packed but the inconsistency of delivery has become a serious issue," she said.

"We all know there's a problem here, but just announcing cessation of the service with barely two months warning isn't addressing that problem, it is just penalising an industry that is critically important to the Australian economy because no-one has found a better way to manage it yet."

Australian Small Business and Family Enterprise Ombudsman Bruce Billson said given Australia Post had 80pc share of the total delivery market, the abrupt decision could be devastating to small business food producers.

LEGO event plan builds

THE return of regional South Australia's premiere LEGO fan event is being pieced together brick by brick ahead of the October long weekend.

The 2021 Empak Homes BrickGambier two-day showcase is expected to attract hundreds of AFOLs - adult fans of LEGO - to the region for its fourth installment and first since 2019 after COVID-19 restrictions forced last year's cancellation.

Fresh from attending and exhibiting at Bendigo Bricks this month - a major regional fan event similar to the Mount Gambier event - BrickGambier organiser Emma Robinson said she had already fielded strong interest from high-level interstate and South Australian exhibitors.

Ms Robinson has observed a surge in popularity with LEGO in recent years, boosted by the popularity of the hit television program LEGO Masters, which returned for its third season this week.

The show has created celebrities within the world of AFOLs, with at least one former contestant already a confirmed guest for BrickGambier and the possibility of more to come.

The sold-out Bendigo Bricks two-day event - one of the first major LEGO fan events in Victoria since January 2020 - has buoyed Ms Robinson as planning continues for the October 3-4 event.

It is in stark contrast to the same time last year when organisers were forced to weigh up whether a community event could take place.

"We were very close to holding it last year but it just became too complicated like everything unfortunately," Ms Robinson said.

"In 2019 about half our exhibitors came from Victoria and if we had gone ahead it would have been a lot smaller and not what people have come to expect," she said.

"In previous years we've been able to have play areas for the kids... those sort of things might not be able to happen this year but certainly we are going to try and do what we can."

According to Ms Robinson, exhibitors have already started to book accommodation ahead of the event, which expects to draw a crowd in excess of 2000 people over the two days.

"The appeal for Mount Gambier is that it is still a decent drive from Melbourne or Adelaide but gives people an opportunity to show what they've created to other people," Ms Robinson said.

"We like to show off what we've made."

It is what took Ms Robinson over the border, complete with a two-metre high LEGO mosaic featuring a Toy Story 4 theme, which took over 50 hours to create.

Ms Robinson is unsure how many LEGO bricks the work entails but she was able to specially order the required bricks, a positive for the LEGO fanatic given a growing trend she has noticed in retail outlets.

"LEGO sells out a lot quicker than it used to," she said.

"People have always loved LEGO but I think LEGO Masters has put it into that next category."

"I found at the first BrickGambier, which was well before LEGO Masters came out, most of the comments were from adults who didn't realise you could do so much with LEGO."

Its growth in popularity has also triggered the launch of the Limestone Coast LEGO Users Group, a social club that meets at the Mount Gambier Showgrounds on the third Sunday of each month.

The group has around 20 members with interested members of the public welcome.

Bring on the rain

LIMESTONE Coast farmers are looking to the skies this week as the annual seasonal rainfall break looms, a "measuring stick" for the season ahead for the agricultural sector.

More than 18mm of rain fell in the Mount Gambier district on Tuesday, almost half the monthly total to date, but farmers remain hopeful of more rain at a critical time for their pastures.

The season break has traditionally fallen around Anzac Day with a wet start to the season helping to speed up feed generation for stock.

However, the Bureau of Meteorology has forecast a relatively dry week ahead with some slight rainfall expected over the next three days.

The Penola and Coonawarra region closely followed as it received over 17.6mm throughout the month with

Penola-based farmer David Galpin said while signs were positive, more rain would be welcomed to help germination in drier ground across the region.

"We are on par with rainfall from last year and as always we like to have our start before ANZAC Day but that doesn't always happen," Mr Galpin said.

"The rainfall around ANZAC Day is usually a measuring stick for the rest of the region because it starts from then on."

Mr Galpin said the grass within his acreage had started to appear greener but another property around 20km north looked less vibrant due to scattered rainfall in that area.

"It is still a bit patchy there but the more rain we can get now the better it will be right through the up and coming season," he said.

"We have just finished calving season and will soon begin lambing season, which means we will soon have more mouths to feed."

"The last two months we have been feeding grain and hay out so it lightens out the feed because once the grass begins to grow we don't need to put feed out."

The seasoned farmer said the next three to four weeks was a key period where rainfall was required, which would help establish farms right through to Christmas.

"If we can get the grass established now it will grow better throughout the whole season and if the grass germinates now it will be strong enough for the rest of the year," he said.

Keeping annual rainfall records, Mr Galpin said he had noticed a trend with heavy rain falling around the same day each year.

"Although the rainfall seems to be happening at similar times each year the underground has gotten a lot drier and our swamps have dried up quite a bit," he said.

"They only have a little bit of water in it and the underground water has dropped, which means plants and trees are unable to reach that water."

Gambier Seeds director Rick Jordan said the significant rainfall earlier this week was

what farmers needed to help break the season.

Mr Jordan said early Autumn rainfall had allowed for grass to grow out of dormancy, providing a boost for farming enterprises.

"This means the smaller rainfall events that we may have is going to be enough to put feed in the paddocks earlier, which is fantastic for farmers," Mr Jordan said.

"The early feed is really good and it is important for farmers to keep stock off the fresh growth to allow it to get going before they put the stock on it."

Mr Jordan said dry earth underground may prove a challenge for farmers over the coming months but consistent rain should improve the conditions.

"The soil profile down at depth is actually still very dry because of the effectively dry winter last year," he said.

"As long as we keep getting around the 15-20mm a week, we will get through the season."

"We are at about the halfway point for April but it looks as if we are going to be okay as the long-term prognosis is above average for the rest of winter."

"At the moment the rainfall is a good start and this cold weather we are having will see some insect pests, which affect pastures, come out of hiding so it is important for farmers to ensure they are looking after their pastures, keeping things down, keep monitoring and look forward to the coming season."

Vaccine hub work continues

WORKS continue to establish Mount Gambier's COVID-19 vaccination hub - announced late last month - to support the state's vaccine rollout.

More than 100,000 South Australians have received COVID-19 vaccines to date.

Announcing two additional Adelaide vaccination hubs, state health minister Stephen Wade said works were continuing to establish the Mount Gambier site.

More than 1200 Limestone Coast residents had received a COVID-19 vaccine prior to Easter with the rollout expanded to the region's emergency services personnel.

Mr Wade said the level of vaccination in South Australia was closely aligned to the share of the population and opening more clinics across the state would help further scale up the rollout.

"We will continue to assess and investigate how the State Government can best support the rollout of the COVID-19 vaccine across South Australia to ensure that every South Australian has access to the vaccine," Mr Wade said.

Tribute to city elder

MOUNT Gambier Mayor Lynette Martin has paid tribute to indigenous elder Uncle Mikey Hartman who died earlier this month.

Uncle Mikey was a regular participant in cultural events across the district, often leading smoking ceremonies at City Council events.

"Uncle Mikey was highly respected for the role he played in the community and will be missed by all who had the pleasure of knowing him," Ms Martin stated at the start of this week's April council meeting.

The mayor also acknowledged the passing of Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh.

Ms Martin highlighted Prince Philip's role in founding the Duke of Edinburgh scheme.

"He felt education was much more than what was learned in the classroom," Ms Martin said.

The civic leader also said church bells tolled around the region on Sunday at midday in a sign of respect for the deceased royal.

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Thefts take toll on store

A MOUNT Gambier retailer has stepped up its in-store security following a string of thefts this year, with offenders brazenly stealing stock despite the business' history of identifying suspects on social media.

Intersport Mount Gambier has installed additional security cameras in its James Street store this week after recently identifying its sixth theft in 2021.

Owners Di and David Jones have been left frustrated and disappointed by the thefts, warning other businesses to be vigilant in a bid to stamp out offending.

"Each incident that has occurred we have put up on social media to make people aware we won't stand for it but also to make other businesses aware that it is happening in our town," Ms Jones said.

"Since we began to put these incidents online the community response has been very helpful with people coming forward with possible names and others being parental figures who have actually come back into the store and rectified the situation," she said.

The business - which employs 10 people and support numerous sporting and community organisations - has opted for high quality security cameras to monitor the expansive store.

"The new cameras are quite high tech and give us good photos of potential perpetrators when we do need it," Mr Jones said.

"The outcomes so far have been quite positive and we have been able to identify offenders through public and police assistance and there have been stages where we have had the goods returned or someone has paid for them."

Ms Jones said police had also prosecuted some offenders.

"It is very frustrating and annoying that we have had to go to the lengths of installing more cameras within the store because we are a locally owned business and these incidents have also been putting pressure on our staff to ensure people are doing the right thing," she said.

Ms Jones said staff had been trained to monitor suspicious activity in-store and encouraged other businesses to adopt strategies or review their own security measures to mitigate any potential risks.

Mental health tools delivered for tradies

JEREMY Forbes is drawing on lived experiences to develop a new type of toughness at construction sites and sporting clubs, equipping blue collar workers with the tools to acknowledge and address mental health needs.

The Hope Assistance Local Tradies (HALT) founder will visit the Limestone Coast next week for a series of Save Your Bacon discussions, aimed at raising awareness of anxiety, depression and well-being in construction and manufacturing sectors.

Through a series of club and business visits - as well as a free community forum at Sir Robert Helpmann Theatre on April 28 from 7pm - Mr Forbes will discuss risk factors associated with mental health, how and where to access support services, the importance of listening to your mates and yourself, as well as how and where to have the "tough conversations".

Mr Forbes said society encouraged people to ask "are you okay?" but people needed to be prepared if someone responds with "no".

"It is about creating that safe space and place where someone can be vulnerable with no shame," Mr Forbes said.

From "you'll be right" to "have a cup of

concrete", Mr Forbes said some tradespeople were conditioned by a "blokie culture", leaving some feeling vulnerable about divulging their personal challenges.

The former painter and decorator now travels the nation urging people to realise there is nothing wrong with discussing mental health or "tuning in" to how you or your mates are feeling.

Acknowledging mental health support was a whole of community issue, Mr Forbes said he visited construction sites, hardware stores, factories, TAFE and group training environments and sporting clubs to ensure

strategies and services reached these communities.

"It is about building momentum and the capacity to engage more services and engage the community," he said.

"I encourage all men and women in the region to make an effort, come along and get out of your comfort zone."

The Mount Gambier and Districts Suicide Prevention Network has helped facilitate the event, with StandBy Support After Suicide coordinator Tracey Wanganeen encouraging all residents to join the free theatre event.

"It is not a lecture, Jeremy shares his expe-

riences and encourages seeking help within that cohort of people," Ms Wanganeen said.

"The more we are having these conversations around suicide prevention and mental health, the more people are going to be able to reach out if they are struggling or will feel more confident to reach out to a friend they are worried about," she said.

Ms Wanganeen said she had noticed a changing perspective towards mental health in her seven-year involvement as a program coordinator.

"We all have physical health, which can be good or bad, and we all have mental health that can also be good or bad," Ms Wanganeen said.

"Sometimes it is only a moment in time that it is bad or it can become an illness that needs treatment, diagnosis and support," she said.

"If we can switch that thinking that the minute we hear mental health we go straight to a negative, instead start thinking what we can do to maintain good mental health and well-being."

Money warning

LIMESTONE Coast residents are urged to be vigilant when checking their cash following a recent surge in counterfeit notes being passed across the state.

Police have received over 50 reports of counterfeit \$50 notes being passed at businesses across South Australia this month with people urged to inspect any money to ensure it is legitimate.

According to police, the notes appear convincing but have certain defective features including the seven-pointed star being out of alignment and the coat of arms not being visible when the note is held to a light source. In some instances, the printing appears to be flaking or scratched off on the edge of the notes.

To determine if a suspect note is counterfeit, it is best to compare it with a note that is known to be genuine.

Should a business inadvertently receive a counterfeit bank note, police advise to secure it in an envelope or paper bag and contact police on 131 444.

Zero emissions job concern

THE Morrison Government's move towards a net zero emissions target will destroy jobs in the electorate of Barker and undermine the Australian way of life.

gluten free husband to eat and all I wanted was a flat white in my own carry coffee cup.

We were just amazed at the depth of industry that we never see in our corner of the rural world.

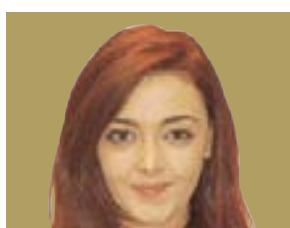

MOUNT Gambier fundraiser extraordinaire Lois Bayre has returned for one final stint as organiser of regional South Australia's premiere Biggest Morning Tea following over two decades of service.

Ms Bayre had planned to step aside after last year's event, which was subsequently cancelled due to COVID-19, and will return this year to build on the \$140,000 raised for the Cancer Council since the event's inception.

While invites have been sent for the May 27 event, which will be limited to 200 people due to restrictions, Ms Bayre remains hopeful of surpassing \$150,000 prior to her retirement.

"We are very close to reaching our goal this year and I am hoping to reach it before I retire."

Reflecting on the past two decades, Ms Bayre said she would be emotional on May 27 with the annual fundraiser becoming family-oriented with her late husband and two children involved over the years.

Mr Bayre's memory is commemorated each year through the trading table with Ms Bayre's daughter emceeing the day annually and her son assisting with logistics.

"It has been a wonderful achievement for both me and my family and to think about how much we have raised over the years is very special to me," she said.

Hosting the Biggest Morning Tea

has given Ms Bayre - Mount Gambier's 2018 citizen of the year - a number of fond memories and life-long friendships.

"There have been coordinators who I have shared important life moments with such as weddings and children and for me it has been very beneficial both ways," Ms Bayre said.

"I have done something that I have loved but I have also given back, while having many people supporting me through volunteering.

"It is not about me but is about having a great support network and it is amazing how many people want to be involved... because it isn't all work but there is a lot of fun to it."

Ms Bayre also praised businesses and community members for their generosity in supporting the fundraiser, first held in 1999.

"It is amazing how generous

the people in Mount Gambier can be each and every year," Ms Bayre said.

"Before COVID-19 shut down the event last year, people were already donating - it didn't stop businesses from supporting the event."

Despite a smaller attendance this year, Ms Bayre said it would still be an eventful morning with the annual fashion parade, lucky door prizes and many raffles to be won.

"I am disappointed that we cannot have the usual 300 people there, however that is not up to me and it will still be a lovely morning for everyone involved," she said.

Robe unites for veterans

ROBE has established itself as a welcoming and supportive community for veterans seeking respite through a unique grassroots program but its acknowledgement of the nation's servicemen and women will ramp up this weekend as part of a whole-town Anzac Day commemoration.

Businesses, sporting clubs and residents have rallied behind the four-day Robe 2 Recovery event which will bring war veterans from Queensland, New South Wales and across South Australia to the seaside town for a series of commemorative events.

The tight-knit community has rallied behind the initiative, which builds on the community's participation in Robe 2 Recovery, a program that provides veterans with accommodation, gifts and vouchers to be used during a respite stay in Robe.

Dozens of businesses provide produce and products for the program, which provides short-stay holidays for veterans experiencing post-traumatic stress disorder or other health challenges as a result of service to the nation.

Robe 2 Recovery president Jacqui Bateman said the community was building on traditions and values instilled within it from the post-World War I era when many soldier settlers relocated to the area.

"There is a lot of compassion here for those who go away and serve our country - it has always been like that in Robe," Ms Bateman said.

"There are descendants who still hold dear the memories of veterans who were involved in the first World War," she said.

"The Dawn Service has always been a very special event."

Businesses and residents are being encouraged to line their shopfronts and homes with poppies or Australian flags over the four-day event, which began last night with the presentation of purpose-made Robe guernseys designed by local creative Jordan Kelly.

The guernseys will be worn in tomorrow's Mid South East football and netball A Grade matches between Robe and Hatherleigh with the Flanders poppy incorporated in Robe's red and white design, while the Eagles' blue and gold jumper will feature a soldier sounding a bugle.

Australian Defence Force veteran Nathan Bolton - who served in Afghanistan - was also scheduled to speak at yesterday's community event.

The sport-focused concept was sparked by Ms Bateman's desire to recreate a sense of occasion attached to sporting matches such as

the Anzac Day clash between Collingwood and Essendon.

This will be achieved through the participation of the Naracoorte-based 3rd Light Horse Regiment, which will parade around Robe Oval in a pre-match ceremony from 1.30pm.

Another significant touch - weather permitting - will be the delivery of the match football by the Mach 5 Wingsuit Team.

"We are hopeful the weather is going to be reasonable enough - it looks pretty good," Ms Bateman told The Border Watch.

"Everything is coming together and it has been a huge event to organise but we have had some fantastic support."

The inaugural Veterans Ambrose golf day will be held today at Robe Golf Club, which Ms Bateman hopes will become an annual fixture.

The program of events will culminate on Sunday with a dawn service at the town's war memorial with all welcome.

It is a significant community program more than a year in the making after COVID-19 restrictions forced the abandonment of last year's planned fixture.

Importantly, the event aims to further promote Robe 2 Recovery's impact within the veteran community, having grown in stature since it was established in 2015 by Ms Bateman.

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“The veterans we support may have been discharged from the army, sometimes for medical reasons, and they didn’t want to leave - it is like being cast out of the family,” Ms Bateman said.

“Some are all alone and they fall through the cracks,” she said.

“We started Robe 2 Recovery so we could provide support and respite visits for those who were perhaps not receiving that.”

Ms Bateman said private donors provided up to five nights accommodation in homes within the town, with veterans greeted by a basket full of produce, vouchers and personal messages on arrival.

“It is a little contribution from everyone that together makes an amazing, beautiful gift,” she said.

“The personalised notes are so heartfelt.

“We often see these big tough guys get very emotional reading the messages.”

Looking ahead to this weekend, Ms Bateman was excited for the event to unfold.

“For Robe 2 Recovery members, it’s about giving back to the Robe community, thanking supporters and sponsors, showcasing the respite program, and importantly, creating awareness about what small towns can do.”

Warning for water off Port Fairy

Anyone who experiences illness after coming into contact with discoloured water in this area should seek medical advice.

A community update will be provided once test results are available.

State hooks global fisheries congress event

SOUTH Australia has secured the 2021 World Fisheries Congress, uniting the brightest minds in commercial fishing, with a focus on conservation and sustainability.

Scientists, managers, fishers and aquaculture operators from across the globe will descend on Adelaide from September 20-24, with the eighth congress promoting international cooperation in fisheries science, conservation and sustainability.

The event will host esteemed speakers from around the world, and feature presentations, workshops, networking events and industry exhibitions.

Adelaide Convention Bureau chief executive Damien Kitto said the event was significant for fisheries across the globe.

"It will be the largest gathering of research, industry and management sectors to discuss the latest advances in fisheries world-wide," he said.

The congress was postponed from October last year due to COVID-19 restrictions with the use of both in-person and online formats allowing the new date to proceed.

Attendees and exhibitors could be eligible for funding of between \$5000 and \$250,000 under the Federal Government's Business Events Grant program.

The event is expected to generate \$2.7m into the state economy.

Mr Hunter is one of around 100 new or continuing university and TAFE students supported the Playford Trust in 2021, totaling over \$700,000 in support.

With a twin interest in basketball and engineering, Mr Hunter was able to pursue both during a gap year at college in California following his completion of Year 12.

Returning home, he began studying at the University of Adelaide and moved into St Ann's College before being awarded the President's Sports Scholarship.

Qualifying for the St Ann's College Medal by receiving 10 high distinctions and six distinctions across the first two years of study, Mr Hunter was also awarded the Kent Stockdale Scholarship in 2020 for high academic and sporting achievements.

He has since taken on several roles within the St Ann's community including wardenship, coaching sports teams and serving on the gym and IT committees.

Hoping to one day manage construction

projects with a team of engineering and use his leadership and teamwork skills, Mr Hunter plans to major in structural engineering.

Playford Trust chair and former Premier Dean Brown said the receipt of the scholarships was the highest ever level of funding.

"We again received great support from our partners in industry, government and the universities and an enthusiastic response from students," Mr Brown said.

"Encouraging and fostering skills and research in areas where South Australia has the greatest competency and opportunity will help us meet the growing need for skilled staff for the future," he said.

Mushroom warning

SOUTH Australians heading outdoors are reminded to not pick and eat wild mushrooms as the wintry weather takes hold.

The Department for Health and Wellbeing has issued a warning as wet weather conditions increase, providing a thriving environment for mushrooms.

While some wild mushrooms might look like common supermarket varieties or mushrooms popular overseas, department scientific services branch director David Simon said ingesting them can cause serious illness or even death.

"Mushroom poisoning causes violent stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea," Dr Simon said.

"It can take several hours for symptoms to appear and can last for up to three days," he said.

"Poisoning from varieties such as the death-cap mushroom can cause serious liver damage, which can be fatal.

"We often see a surge in calls made by South Australians to the Poisons Information Centre coinciding with this time of year."

Around two-thirds of calls made to the hotline about mushroom poisonings annually involve children less than five years-of-age.

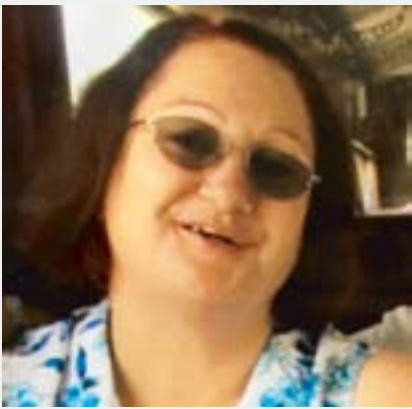
Nine of the 14 cases handled by the hotline so far this year involved young children and four of these were referred to hospital.

"In 2020 there were 20pc more calls made about mushroom exposure to the Poisons Information Centre than the previous year, which may be attributed to more people being active outside when COVID-19 restrictions were in place," Dr Simon said.

If you suspect you or someone you know has eaten a wild mushroom, do not wait for symptoms to appear.

Contact the Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26 for advice and always call triple zero (000) in an emergency.

If you suspect your pet has eaten wild mushrooms, seek veterinary attention immediately.

Seasons changing

SEVERAL Limestone Coast farmers will take a break from weekly sales following a strong selling season buoyed by high prices and quality livestock.

Yardings will now reduce as the season and weather changes, with the selling season a largely positive outcome for most producers following ongoing uncertainty caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Nutrien Ag Solution stock agent Sam O'Connor said while the fat cattle numbers were expected to reduce, store sale yardings had remained at high levels due to strong pricing. Mr O'Connor said the high numbers were a "double-edged sword" as many farmers took advantage of the exceptional prices and yarded a large

percentage of young cattle several months earlier than normal.

"Many of the young cattle wouldn't normally be sold until July or August and we also had a high number of older cattle that would normally be grown on and finished as bullocks in the spring," Mr O'Connor said.

"Those cattle have instead gone to feedlots with farmers deciding on that rather than feeding through the cold winter months."

Mr O'Connor said this would reduce the input costs with farmers taking advantage of the exceptionally high prices. He foreshadowed a potential drop in yardings in July and August from traditional numbers due to the change in tactics. Mr O'Connor also

congratulated the region's farmers for their perseverance and leadership during the pandemic.

"The farmers in the district really do deserve a huge amount of credit for the way they have led the economic recovery in the states in the continuous COVID-19 pandemic," he said.

"People often say that wealth is developed in the regions and not in the cities and regional farmers right across the agricultural industry sector have really held that up.

"They are the ones that have been really good at driving all the way through the economic stimulus in the state and it has been tremendous.

"They continue to be rewarded with good prices and we can only hope that continues into the future."

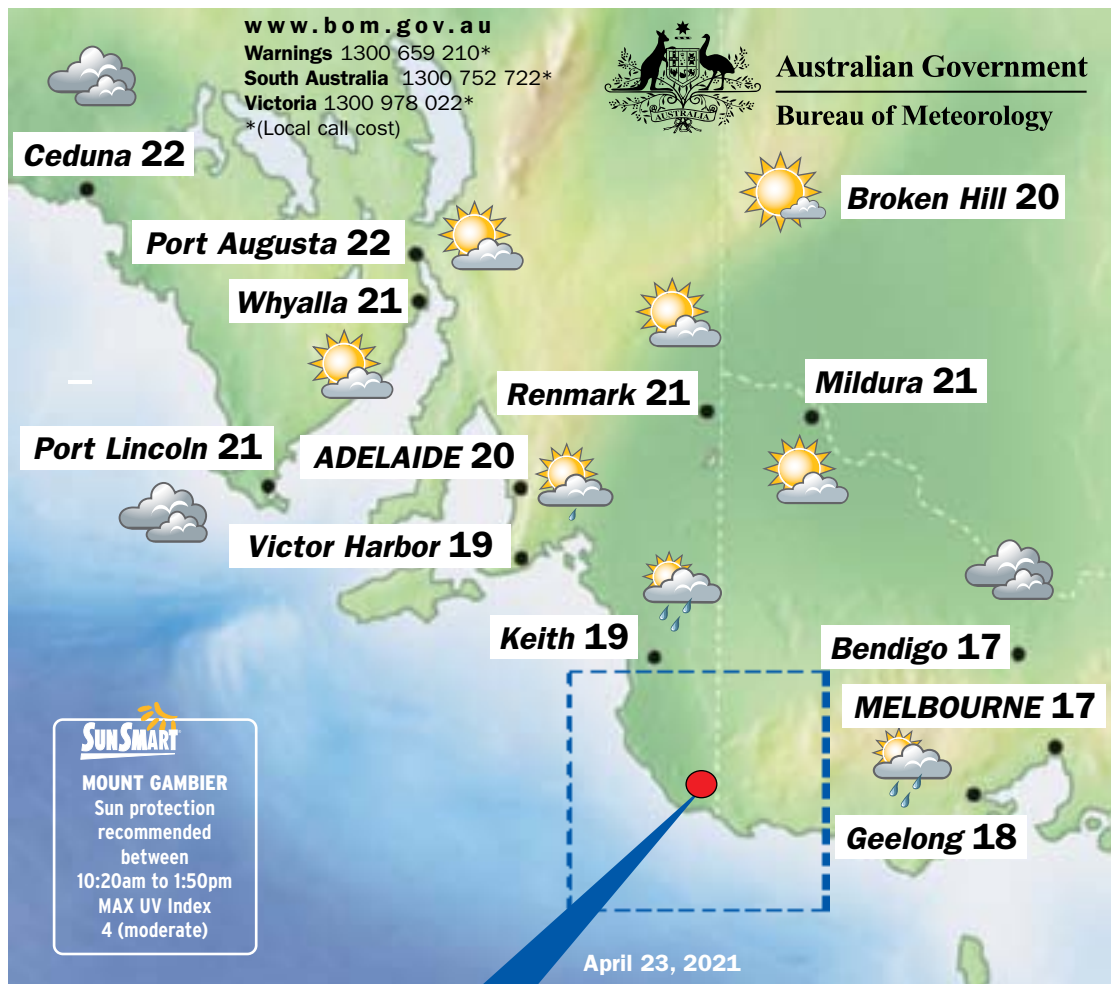

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Stable fly in region

CATTLE producers and horse owners are being urged to keep a lookout for stable fly after reports of the aggravating pest in south-west Victoria.

Issuing a warning about stable flies, which can cause production and welfare issues, Agriculture Victoria district veterinary officer Elle Moyle said they could be a serious pest of livestock around feedlots and pastures.

"Cattle will try to avoid the fly by stamping their feet, tail switching, throwing their heads down toward their front legs, and kicking sand up onto their legs and body," Dr Moyle said.

"High numbers of flies on animals will cause issues including reduced weight gains, milk production and lower feed efficiencies," she said.

Stable fly numbers can be monitored by counting the flies on all four legs of about 10 animals.

When the average number is more than 25 flies per animal, action is needed.

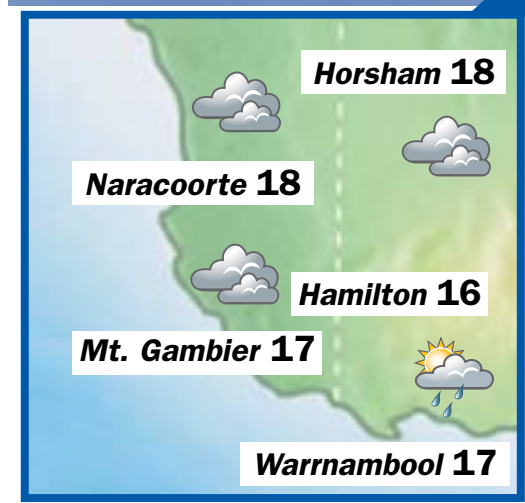
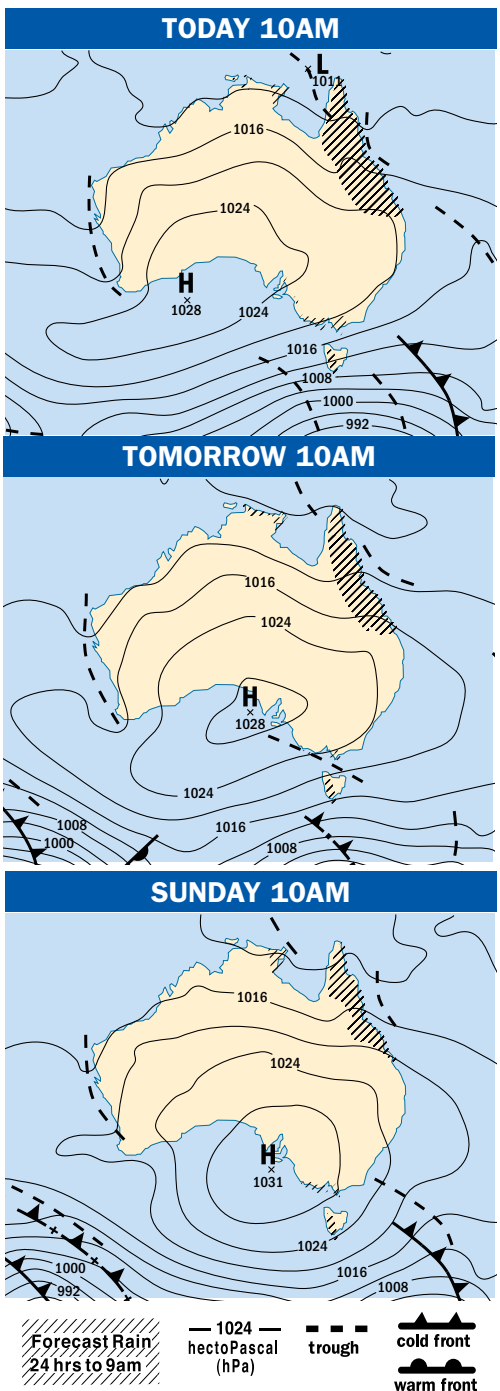
When stable flies are present in large numbers (more than 20-30 per animal), cattle will often bunch together in an effort to get to the centre of the group and avoid the fly, or they may stand in open water to avoid being bitten.

Dr Moyle said stable fly breeds in old manure and rotting organic matter, such as old silage or spilled feed, and needs to have a blood meal from any large animal to survive.

"Owners should remove fly breeding sites including damp and rotting vegetation (old hay, open silage) from their properties—particularly after rain or warm weather."

Removal of breeding sites is the number one method of control.

Other management tools include fly traps, promotion of dung beetles and chemical control.

A SETTLING sea saw plenty of anglers hit the water off Port MacDonnell in search of big tuna and there was a handful landed and plenty lost, so things look to be shaping up right on time.

The sea was not perfect, with a bit of wind and slop to compete with, but the keen and experienced anglers headed out in search.

There was a big fish tagged and released late last week off Port MacDonnell and over the course of the weekend I have heard of pulled hooks, snapped hooks, bust offs and other fish hitting the line and snapping off.

If you speak to anyone who targets barrels, there could be hundreds of hours between bites and even when you do get one, there is a lot that can let you down.

I have not heard a lot of news about school fish, but with the weather as it was, the only boats out there were pulling big lures for big fish, so I have no doubt when we see guys targeting them, we will see great numbers.

I have not heard a heap from bottom bouncers this week - it has not really been the weather for dropping the anchor.

Once we see the swell drop a little bit more, I have got no doubt the sharks will still be there in good numbers just as they have been.

The South East Amateur Surf Fishing Club held the Chris Ploenges Memorial over the weekend and by all accounts it was a challenging competition.

Mountains of weed on most beaches meant anglers had to work hard for their fish.

The lucky winners were Gary Lawes, Les Godrick and Graeme Ploenges.

There was a nice mix of salmon, whiting and mullet weighed in and it was great to see so many blokes fishing even in trying conditions.

There have been a few boaties chasing the whiting over the past week and while the numbers are not like we were used to prior to the big weather event a week ago, the size has remained excellent.

Land-based fishos have had it tough with weed and kelp being washed ashore in most bays, so it has been a week for the boats.

Carpenter Rocks and the Port MacDonnell breakwater have been probably the best, but a few other areas have also produced.

With all the seaweed piled up on the beaches, now is the perfect time to start chasing mullet in the shallows.

As the weed starts to break down and rot the mullet come in their droves to feed on the bugs that eat it.

Getting a small burley trail going is the best bet, then a light float with some gents or cut cockle is a great way to put a feed on the table.

You will probably find the odd salmon trout, silver trevally or garfish on your travels too.

A few anglers took off inland over the weekend to some of the lakes and reservoirs across western Victoria and found some good fishing.

Rocklands Reservoir has been fairly consistent recently, some nice yellowbelly are still being reported and we are seeing more trout turn up too.

Black Magic Rattlesnack lures have been red hot for the trollers in the western lakes, picking up not only trout, but some chunky redfin too.

Mill Swamp has been excellent again.

I have seen plenty of fish coming from there and although they are not all monsters, there is plenty to keep the kids entertained.

The Glenelg River is slowly but surely kicking into gear.

We are seeing a few more mulloway each week being caught and it is only a matter of time before we crack a few big ones.

The estuary and township areas have been a bit weedy thanks to those large seas, but that weed is subsiding and those fishing around it have done fairly well.

The bream and estuary perch have been fairly good again this week.

Lure fishos have found them on heavy weighted plastics and deep diving minnows along the steeper rocky banks and bait fishos have been in much the same areas.

The forecast for the weekend at this stage looks fairly fishable.

The wind and swell are both backing off for the offshore and surf guys, so hopefully we see plenty of anglers out on the water.

Until next week, safe fishing.

THE Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club attracted one of its largest crowds in a number of years to Tara Raceway for last Sunday's Group Listed Mount Gambier Cup, sponsored by the Commercial Hotel.

Patrons were once again back at the track and lining the fence to witness the club's major race, run continuously since 1981 when won by Tara Topar at Mount Gambier's original greyhound track, situated inside the thoroughbred race track out at Glenburnie.

For the first time at Tara Raceway, the TAB

and a bookmaker operated side by side, Darren Guthridge reporting brisk business and delighted to have been fielding at a Mount Gambier Cup meeting.

For the first time in a while there were kids back in the playground.

Also taking in the action was Tony Pasin, Federal Member for Barker, who found himself called upon to conduct a much-belated kennel house opening ceremony after COVID-19 had put paid to the original opening.

But it was an announcement on course by Greyhound Racing SA Chairman Grantley Stevens that set the scene for a great Mount Gambier Cup day - an announcement of much significance as far as Mount Gambier greyhound

racing is concerned.

The forerunner to this announcement had been back in January when the Mount Gambier Greyhound Racing Club executive committee, headed by Jason Newman, put together an extensive proposal relating to Category 2 prizemoney for Sunday meetings at Tara Raceway.

So when the chairman announced GRSA had agreed to the MGGRC's Sunday meetings taking on Category 2 status as from July 1 it was clearly a vote of confidence in Mount Gambier greyhound racing.

What the change from Category 3 to Category 2 means is a substantial prizemoney increase and will place the club on the same

level as Gawler and Murray Bridge.

As an example, the winner of a low-grade race (grade six) over 512 metres currently receives \$615.

From July 1, winners of the same grade and distance will collect \$990. This rises proportionately with the class of race.

SA-bred maiden winners over 512 metres will receive close to \$2000. Also on track for last Sunday's cup was inaugural club secretary, 84-year-old Colin Potter.

He would have noticed a few changes since that night back on September 14, 1972 when a public meeting was held in the Mount Gambier City Hall to form the South East Greyhound Racing Club.

Bred and raced by the Hallinan family of Clergate in NSW, Zipping Zarbo was handled with aplomb by 24-year-old Ricky Coleman who did his mother and step-father proud.

He was full of praise for the three-year-old red fawn daughter of El Grand Senor and Zipping Abby.

"She's been with us since pre-training and has always tried her heart out," he said.

"Winning the cup was certainly a big thrill and we're now looking to race here in Mount Gambier on a more regular basis."

Zipping Zarbo has now raced on 50 occasions for 24 wins, 14 minor placings and \$94,000 in stakemoney.

THE 2020 Mount Gambier Cup winner Sunset Milo, now trained by David Peckham for Tim Aloisi and Matt Lehman, led all the way last Sunday to win the Exchange Printers Mount Gambier Cup Consolation (512m) in 29.85 seconds.

For Peckham, this was his second consecutive consolation win after Silent Jacko had been successful last year.

However, still the cup eludes him.

Sunset Milo, a son of My Bro Fabio x Jewel Action, hung on to narrowly defeat the Steve Bartholomew trained Galactic Horizon, a litter sister to Galactic Athena who won the 2019 Mount Gambier Cup.

This was the second of two feature race successes for the day for the Allendale East trainer after Maximum Refusal scored a big win in the Allen Cram-sponsored The Tankman 600.

Raced in the same interests as Sunset Milo, Maximum Refusal made his Tara Raceway debut the week prior when running a handy fourth behind Renewed in a heat of the Mount Gambier Cup.

A winner over 545 metres (Ballarat), 600 metres (Angle Park) and 618 metres (Richmond), the brindle dog settled in a handy spot early from box one before taking up the running down the back straight.

From then on it was a matter of how far as Maximum Refusal powered away to a 7½ lengths win over Oakvale Impact, with the heavily supported reserve runner Freda Rocks a further length back in third spot.

The winner's time was interesting.

He ran 34.83 seconds which was only a

half-length outside the 34.79 seconds track record established by Pirate's Curse - also trained by Peckham for Aloisi and Lehman.

In fact, Maximum Refusal's time was the fastest recorded over the middle-distance journey at Tara Raceway since Pirate's Curse ran the record on April 21, 2019.

Cup day started well for Peckham after first-starter Bourne Brett led all the way to defeat another first-starter in Galactic Dreamer in the Bourne Kennels Stake (305m).

Well boxed in the eight, Bourne Brett used plenty of the track when scoring by three lengths in 17.84 seconds. The win was the first for the Paddy Whacker x Raz's Girl litter, the dam having won 12 races over 400 metres at Tara Raceway.

The day also ended well when Aston Model finished too strongly for Aston Stella in the Metal Worx Stake (400m), the daughter of Aston Dee Bee and Aston Regas scoring by 1¼ lengths in 23.37 seconds.

Back to Penola for the Cup

THE biggest meeting for the remainder of 2021 for Limestone Coast racing is the Millicent Cup fixture on Sunday, May 30.

The Millicent racing club has been in “no man’s land” as to the venue for its annual meeting since deciding to leave Penola racecourse two years ago.

In the end it was a rather bitter departure (due to a massive racecourse rental rise) as the Millicent club had raced at the Penola course since the early 1980’s.

A deal was then struck with the Mount Gambier racing club for Millicent to return to race at Glenburnie in 2020, the venue for Millicent Cup Day since the closure of Millicent racecourse in the late 1960’s up until the early 1980’s.

But, as we all know, the Glenburnie course continues to have issues and, together with the COVID pandemic, Millicent Cup Day in 2020 was held behind closed doors (no public allowed) at faraway Bordertown.

It was hoped that Millicent would get to race at Glenburnie this year, however any hope of that occurring was knocked on the head a couple of months ago when racing at Glenburnie was further put on hold until the end of this year.

It is my understanding Millicent officials were then told by Racing SA to race at Penola this year or not at all.

The Millicent committee voted on the issue and the majority gave the green light to return to Penola next month.

Newly elected Millicent Racing Club president John Payne said the wheels are now well and truly in motion for Millicent Cup Day and its associated events.

“We will again have our 600 club in the lead up to the meeting, and the calcutta will be conducted on Friday, May 28 in Millicent,” he said.

Millicent cup day has always received magnificent support from the community in and around Millicent and, for many, it is the only race meeting of the year they attend.

Payne wants that to continue, stating “buses will be available to take racegoers to and from Penola as was the case previously, and I suggest that racegoers check with local hotels nearer to cup time as to bookings and departure times”.

If the Millicent Cup can attract a crowd like we saw at the Penola Cup Day meeting on Easter Sunday, then it will be a real highlight of the local racing season.

TAB OUTLET TO CLOSE

THE only independent/stand alone TAB agency outside of the Adelaide metropolitan area will close its door at the end of the financial year (June 30).

It will end 49 years of operation for the Mount Gambier west agency in Commercial Street West, opposite the Mount Gambier Bowling Club.

The agency opened in 1973 and I can qualify for life membership as I have frequented the agency on a very regular basis ever since.

Lack of patronage and a downturn in turnover at the agency (apart from Saturdays) has made it not viable to keep operating and will result in five staff losing their jobs.

It is not that punters are not betting like they were, the fact is the majority of punters (especially the young ones) now bet on their phones.

It is an extremely disappointing decision for the older patrons, especially those who make it a meeting place to gather each Saturday.

A petition is in circulation to try and reverse the decision by the Queensland based owners.

Good luck with that, as they are bound to point out that the nearest TAB agency is 20 metres away at the Park Hotel and that there are seven pub TAB’s and one club TAB here in Mount Gambier.

Originally there were two TAB staffed agencies here in Mount Gambier, the other one in Commercial Street East (opposite Gourmet India) which was managed by Liz Robertson.

Glad Davis was the first manager of the

Gambier West agency and she is still remembered for her efficiency and good public relation skills.

It was totally different in those early days as everything had to be done manually and Glad would have to start work early to get all the scratchings and put them on the betting sheets.

All bets were written out by staff in triplicate (remember carbon paper?), and there was no such thing as betting up until race time as betting closed 30 minutes prior to a race so that all bets could be phoned through to head office in Adelaide.

As for collecting, you had to have the patience of Job as immediate payouts were unheard of.

Agencies closed during the afternoons and reopened for a couple of hours in the early evening when you could bet on a couple of night meetings and collect your winnings from earlier in the day.

If you were lucky to jag a fourtrella (quadrilla) you had to wait until the following day to collect, or until Monday if it was a Saturday fourtrella as Sunday trading was never a consideration back in those days.

You had no means of watching a race live, and it meant having a powerful radio (wireless) to pick up 5DN (Adelaide) or 3UZ and 3DB (Melbourne) to hear a race as 5SE and the ABC mainly covered Saturday and public holiday city meetings.

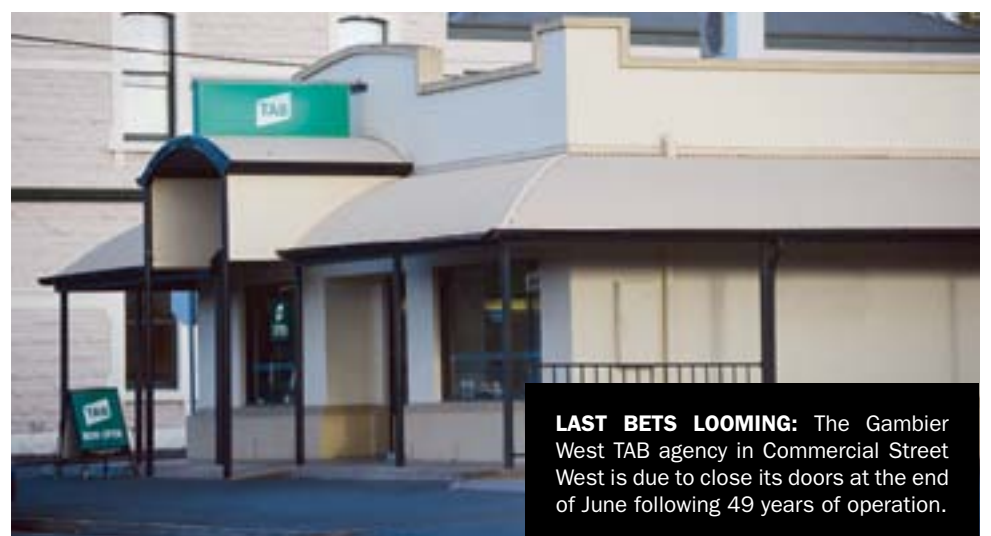
Some shenanigans went on in those old days and I recall one Naracoorte cup day in the 1970’s when the local race was delayed and ended up clashing with a race at Seymour.

The Seymour race was therefore not broadcast on course and, for some unknown reason, both the on course tote and bookmakers kept betting on the race well after the time it was due to be run.

It is the only occasion that I have come across that the TAB has bet after a race has been run, but no doubt it also occurred elsewhere in Australia at some time.

Someone had heard the Seymour race on their car radio and word quickly got around (as it does on a racecourse) that a 20/1 chance had won the Seymour race and punters quickly started cashing in.

Bookmakers got briefly hit until they soon smelt a rat with the sudden interest for one

horse (an outsider) at Seymour and the win dividend on the South Australian TAB returned only 9/1 with, I suspect, most of the winning tickets invested at Naracoorte racecourse after the race had been run.

There is no doubt that the introduction of computerised betting to what we have today has proven a godsend for both the punter and TAB staff.

HORSES CAME FROM EVERYWHERE

THE race meeting at Naracoorte last week saw the biggest number of horses compete at a Limestone Coast meeting for many years.

They came from all points of the compass with 93 runners for the eight race program and one of the leading South Australian stables, the father/son combination of Tony and Calvin McEvoy, saw fit to send three runners down from their Angaston headquarters.

The McEvoy’s went home without a winner with honours shared by Mount Gambier trainer Michael O’Leary and the Sue and Jason Jaensch combination with doubles.

Penola born jockey Caitlin Jones also chipped in with a double, one of those a brilliant ride on the O’Leary trained Bossy Britches where she never left the fence at any stage in the 1430 metre BM 64 handicap.

Without doubt, the ride of the day came from Casterton based jockey Sonja Wiseman who won on O’Leary’s other winner Jaywick in the 1100 metre maiden.

Somehow, from the extreme outside barrier, Wiseman managed to have Jaywick in the box seat in third spot after going only a couple of hundred metres and the four year old gelding always looked the winner from the 500 metre mark

Over at Terang last Sunday, eight local gallopers competed on Terang cup day, and one of the outsiders got the chocolates.

That was the Belinda O’Loughlin trained Weekend Bang (\$34) which led all the way in the 1400 metre maiden with local apprentice Jacob Opperman in the saddle.

Hayden’s memorable day out

HAYDEN Schroder had his 10-year-old son Blake to thank for winning his fourth The Barn Club Championship at the Mount Gambier Golf Club.

After claiming his first title back in 1999, Schroder won again in 2008 and 2012, before “kids and work” got in the way.

But with Blake now a keen player himself, Hayden has found a new reason to spend some more time out on the course.

That paid off for both of them on Sunday, with Hayden beating Setio Prajogo-Shanahan 4-and-3 to win the major title.

Blake made it a historic day for the family after taking out the D Grade final 9-and-8 against Max Hellyer.

Despite the victory, Hayden was quick to acknowledge his game had not been on song, particularly over the first 18 holes of the 36-hole final.

He found himself two down after the first two holes, with Prajogo-Shanahan winning the first after putting in from off the green for birdie and taking the second with a regulation par.

Schroder got one back on the third after his opponent found bunker trouble, but lost the fourth after another sprayed drive.

In fact he had so much trouble with the driver he eventually had to switch to a 3-wood off the tee and took 14 holes to find his first fairway.

But even that did not lead to a change of fortunes because Prajogo-Shanahan played one of the shots of the day, a punched five-iron from a poor lie to inside two feet for an easy birdie.

That put him 1-up and he doubled that lead on the par-five 15th after hitting a superb pitch shot to one metre from about 50m out for another birdie.

Unfortunately he gave that back on the easy par-four 18th after a poor approach shot finished short and right despite driving down the middle of the fairway.

In fact he was only able to hit five greens in regulation on the first 18 holes despite hitting 11 of 14 fairways.

Schroder on the other hand hit nine greens in regulation despite hitting just three fairways.

“I just lost my rhythm altogether (with the driver),” he said.

He also said he didn’t “feel comfortable with the putter all day“, while Prajogo-Shanahan made difficult putts for wins on the first, fourth and 10th in the first 18 holes.

After turning 1-down, Schroder got back to square with a par on the first, but looked likely to give it back on the par-four second hole when he hit his drive into the right side of the third fairway.

But with Prajogo-Shanahan safely on the green for two, Schroder played an incredible six-iron over trees and the greenside bunker to

about seven feet.

That hole was halved with pars, but Schroder went 1-up on the fifth after Prajogo-Shanahan again had bunker issues.

That margin was maintained through the ninth, but Schroder extended that to 3-up with pars good enough to win the 10th and 11th.

Prajogo-Shanahan got back to 2-down after an incredible 40-foot par putt on the 13th, but lost the 14th after more bunker problems and the match was over after Schroder made a short putt for birdie on the 15th.

The 36-hole A Reserve final finished on the same hole with 21-year-old Josh Knowles beating 14-year-old Callum Harvey 4-and-3.

Knowles admitted he played the round of his life on the first 18 holes, shooting 77 off the stick to make the turn 4-up.

He did not play quite as well in the second round, but Harvey was unable to make the most of the opportunities that came his way.

In the B Grade final it was relative newcomer Brett Shepherdson who made a one-act affair of his 36-hole match against Bryan Hunt, taking the title 8-and-7.

Shepherdson, who only started playing golf two years ago after moving from Adelaide, was 4-up after 18 holes thanks to a great short game and a red-hot putter.

Hunt tried to hang in but Shepherdson produced the shot of the match on the par-five

The match went to the 18th hole, with Pascoe winning 2-up. The second semi-final between Geraldine Scott and Lynda Nannings was a sea-saw affair on the front nine, with Scott able to dig deep and win 4/2. Scott had to relinquish four strokes to Nannings.

The current holder of the Division 2 Title Lyn Annand placed straight into the final after bye’s in the quarter’s and semis and will meet newcomer to championships Karen Panagopolous.

The semi-final between Trudy Herbert and

Panagopolous proved to be of a high standard, Panagopolous winning 1-up on the 18th.

"I didn't really feel good on the bike and got pushed back to seventh, but finished sixth.

"It was really a sprint race and I did some respectable times."

The second race of the weekend saw Skeer with an impressive fastest lap time of 59.443 seconds.

He said last time the championship raced at Wakefield Park that time would have put him on the top step of the podium.

"I am happy with those times, but the top three have upped the pace so much," he said.

"I was able to run the most consistent pace through the race - my lap times only varied by half a second over the 16 laps.

"To do the times the front runners are doing, I don't know where I can find the time.

"I just don't know where all this pace has come from at the front."

Despite the hot pace at the front, Skeer is confident he can be in contention for a podium finish in a race and even the season.

It is the best start to a season he has had, which places him in a good position, ready to pounce on the front runners if the chance arises.

"Usually we have the first round at Phillip Island and I don't go the best there, so I usually start on the back foot," Skeer said.

"We have had all short tracks a bit like Mac Park so I have started a bit more consistent.

"There are only five points between four of us for fourth place.

"The next round I will look to move to fourth, then if something happens with one of the top three I will hopefully be there."

Skeer now has a break for the a few months, with the next round in Queensland in August.

He plans to use that time to try out some new parts which will hopefully push him closer to the front runners in the series.

"We kept fit the whole way through and didn't have any injuries so it worked out well."

Dwyer said both fighters have spoken about a rematch, which could be a possibility in the near future.

However, for now it is time to relax and spend some time with the family.

"I have a bit coming up this year, but I would take the fight in a heartbeat," Dwyer said.

"I definitely want to go back and get the win I should have.

"We have a few fights on the table at the minute with a few different promoters, but now I will spend a bit of time off and make a decision going forward."

"Everyone expected when we got the grant and would get started straight away, but we were on the back foot because we had no plans in place, we had to start from scratch.

"Council approval was the end of December and we were ready to kick off in January but struck some issues with SA Water.

"We have had some little hiccups but we finally have some light ahead."

Ploenges said the new building would include space for the canteen, which would then open up the change rooms, which have had a bit of TLC over the summer.

In the interim the club has made do with what it has in place.

"Over the summer we served out of the canteen," Ploenges said.

"We don't get a heap of people there, so we set a fire up and sat out there.

"It was not ideal but something for people to do.

"People were still supporting us and now the swimming season has finished we can hire the hall there.

"We can also hire the community hall near the museum and can get around 100 people in there."

Ploenges said with no hotel in the town the football club was an important place for people to meet up.
