Little trees given big investment at Glencoe

A MAJOR \$7m upgrade to OneFortyOne's Glencoe nursery will produce an additional four million seedlings annually and streamline the growing process.

The significant investment will introduce state-of-the-art technology to the site from July, including an improved irrigation system to deliver efficiencies in irrigation, fertigation, and pest control.

On-site working conditions will also be improved with new shedding to house all operations, except for the growing phase, while a new automatic vacuum seeding will allow trays to be filled, seed sown and covered in one pass.

OneFortyOne Nursery manager Craig Torney said planning for the upgrade started four years ago, aiming to improve the site's sustainability and workforce well-being.

"By introducing technology to assist and streamline the process, the upgrade will increase container growing capacity three-fold with the potential to grow an additional four million container seedlings per year," Mr Torney said.

"Instead of needing to bend or crouch

down to work at ground level, we'll have a process where trees will be grown in trays at a bench set to a more ergonomic height," he said.

"The move away from field growing into bench supported containers will improve our working conditions, site safety and sustainability, and ultimately result in a better end product for forest growers and local timber processing customers across the region.

"The investment is a sign of OneForty-One's confidence in the future of the industry and our commitment to remaining part of our local community."

The upgrade moves almost all winter production under cover and includes improved facilities such as new amenities and lunchroom, as well as internal road upgrades and nursery beautification.

Works will start in July with the project due to be completed in 2023.

The Glencoe Nursery has been in operation since 1982 and supplies over 10 million trees for OneFortyOne and other forest growers in the region.



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Eagle given fighting chance

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AN INJURED wedge-tailed eagle rescued from a roadside near Nelson has had a strong start to its recovery thanks to several Limestone Coast animal carers.

Mount Gambier wildlife rescuer Julia Dangerfield and South East Veterinary Clinic both played a key role in treating the raptor, which had suffered feather loss and lacerations.

The bird has since been relocated to Adelaide for specialist care where it is expected to endure a long road to recovery.

Ms Dangerfield said the eagle was found on a roadside between Mount Gambier and Nelson and showed visible signs of injury and disorientation.

"The vets reviewed him and did a medical assessment and found he was missing a number of feathers needed for flight," Ms Dangerfield said.

"Although it has a bit of a limp, there were no broken bones which is fantastic because if everything goes according to plan he will make a full recovery and regrow his feathers.'

Ms Dangerfield said the optimism was not typically shared with birds found in similar shape, urging the public to be wary of birds while travelling.

"The issue with eagles around here is that they eat roadkill, they are not huge into hunting and are happier eating the kill on the road and because people hit roadkill and just leave it, eagles are then eating right on the side of the road," she said.

"When wedge-tailed eagles try and fly off they actually need a run up to take off because they are so heavy so vehicles come along and the eagles can't get out of the way fast enough and they either end up getting hit or rolled by the turbulence.'

Ms Dangerfield said rescued eagles were often found with serious injuries such as broken legs and wings.

The wildlife rescuer said it was critical animals struck by vehicles were also checked to see if care can be rendered or if a dependent animal, such as a joey, required rescuing.

"We do encourage people to stop and report if they see any injured animals because its common for people to just drive around and not do anything," Ms Dangerfield said.

"I think people have just grown up around

it so much now they don't think to stop and check pouches or move the carcasses off the side of the road because it is so common here," she said.

Blue Lake Vet's Doctor Caroline Weston said the clinic treated a diverse range of wildlife, including koalas, possums and bats.

"They are typically hit by cars, attacked by domestic animals or hurt through people hunting wildlife," Dr Weston said.

"Most injuries are too severe to treat resulting in euthanasia with only a quarter being treatable and relying heavily on experienced careers with specific knowledge."

Healthy start to reduce pregnancy issues

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A MOUNT Gambier Obstetrician will hold free preconception counselling session in a bid to reduce complexities experienced during pregnancy and childbirth.

Dr Monique Kanters said the Before the Baby session would help couples plan for pregnancy to increase their chance of having an uneventful labour.

Held at Mount Gambier Library on May 27 from 6.30pm, Dr Kanters aimed to give the community access to accurate medical information prior to falling pregnant.

"I think in the long term, we need to get good information out there to people, not just whatever they've happened to get on Google," Dr Kanters said.

Dr Kanters has noted a rise in births in the district, accompanied by an increase in complexities experienced during childbirth.

Some issues can be attributed to wellknown causes, such as the harmful effects of women at the older end of the spectrum,



smoking during pregnancy, which Dr Kanters said remained a minor ongoing issue within the community.

Other issues are more widespread and can be attributed to the general increase in the average age of women falling pregnant.

"We do have a fairly young-ish cohort of mothers here, but we're also seeing more in their 30s and even into their 40s. (These women) may tend towards having more

complicated medical issues," she said. Dr Kanters said weight remained another big issue, explaining it was harder for women with a high Body Mass Index (BMI) score to conceive a child.

Similarly, men with a high BMI are more likely to encounter fertility problems.

From a facilities perspective, the Mount Gambier and Districts Health Service is unable to facilitate women with a BMI score of 45 (the extreme obesity category),

"Ultimately, these women have to be referred to larger centres for their antenatal care, as well as their deliveries, which is not ideal... we like to be able to offer services locally, but we do have limitations on us because of the level of complexity that comes with those really high BMI scores," Dr Kanters said.

Dr Kanters said the preconception session were not just designed for women.

"There are things that the guys have to do as well, so this is not just a women's only session because it's a team effort, and both members of the team have to be up to scratch really."

Depending on the interest, Dr Kanters hoped to increase the frequency of sessions each year.

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ALMOST half of Naracoorte Lucindale Council's ratepayers will experience a decrease in rates next financial year as under its draft annual business plan and budget.

Council is proposing a 1pc increase in general rates in 2021/22, estimating 2890 - or 46pc - of ratepayers will experience a decrease in rates as a result. ??

Around two-thirds (67pc) of ratepayers will have a general rate increase of less than \$52 next financial year, with another 13pc of properties having an increase of less than \$100 for the year.

Naracoorte Lucindale expects to collect \$10.7m in rates in the upcoming financial year, with almost half (56.6pc) derived from the primary production sector.

Council chief executive Trevor Smart was confident the proposed budget was an appropriate balance between the current economic climate and ensuring staff and elected members continued to deliver on the community's expectation for effective services. ?

"In 2021 we see the continued impact and recovery efforts of the COVID-19 pandemic and council has worked hard to retain a low rate increase to reflect the pressure on families at this time," he said.

Despite the modest increase in general rate revenue and a proposed \$11.5m for capital works and projects, Naracoorte Lucindale is estimating a \$580,000 budget surplus - the only Limestone Coast council to be in the black in 2021/22. ??

Council's draft budget includes a \$2m allocation to the redevelopment of the Naracoorte Library, which will be housed in the former Naracoorte Herald building on Smith Street. ??

The recently released plans include creating a new extension to the library for a dedicated

Rates up 6.6pc

KINGSTON District Council's planned dredging campaign has been identified as a primary contributor of a \$681,096 operating deficit in the upcoming financial year.

The coastal council's draft annual business plan and budget proposes a 6.6pc increase in general rate revenue to raise \$4.2m in 2021/22.

Kingston's Community Wastewater Management System charge will increase by 16pc for property units, with unoccupied units to be charged \$300 and occupied houses slated to pay \$450.

The increase has been prompted by a review of the system including costs, maintenance considerations, future capital and ongoing compliance which found council was not recovering sufficient funds to ensure the long-term sustainability of the service.

Council will finalise options for the Maria Creek Boat Launching Facility following a joint council and community decision not to reinstate the ramp due to the capital outlay and ongoing operational costs, allocating \$50,000 towards Kingston Jetty planning.

A further \$50,000 has been allocated to Kingston Foreshore Precinct planning, including upgrades of the Lions Park on Hanson Street.

Kingston has also earmarked \$100,000 to develop detailed plans for a staged approach of Rosetown infrastructure and \$80,000 towards footpaths

Council will allocate \$90,000 of funding received as part of the Federal Government's Local Roads Community Infrastructure Program towards lighting the 1.2km Maria Creek walking trail and a replacement of all ageing boundary signage at all of council's road entrances.

Council has allocated \$240,000 to implement the Naracoorte Creek and Creek Walk Plan, which aims to establish a high-quality linear park through the Naracoorte township area, including the installation of weirs.

Lucindale will receive a upgrades to its skate park and centennial park, a pump track and town entrance and wayfinding signage as a result of a \$323,363 allocation, while Frances has been allocated funds to implement its masterplan - including the installation of artwork, entrance statements and completion of the town centre focal point.

McTernan Park's aged playground infrastructure will be replaced following a \$177,000 allocation, while funding for major events including the Tour of the Great South Coast Bike Race, Fringe Festival and the World Heritage Run will continue.

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Wattle Range flags projects

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WATTLE Range Council has allocated \$1.1m towards the construction of a new machinery shed for its Millicent Works Depot in its 2021/22 draft annual business plan and budget, but has yet to select where the new facility will be located.

But no funds have been allocated to the proposed \$5.5m new council office, which councillors voted to build on corner of North Terrace and Williams Road in Millicent, with Wattle Range chief executive Ben Gower saying it was "premature to include it in this budget".

Council's draft annual business plan and budget proposes a number of upgrades for the Aberle Street works depot, including \$55,000 for automatic gates, \$33,000 for office and lunchroom floor renewal and \$11,000 to upgrade lighting to LED lights. Rates will increase by 2.5pc across Wattle Range, plus growth from new developments.

Mr Gower said the new machinery shed, which is one of the largest capital works projects proposed for the next financial year, was required to house councils' equipment.

"We can't fit any graders, trucks or any plant machinery in the current shed, so we have a lot of the equipment that is not being stored inside," he said.

"We have got to built a fit-for-purpose, all season, all weather facility to store our equipment.

Mr Gower said a site for the new machinery shed had yet to be finalised, but expected it would be located in close proximity to Millicent's industrial sector.

The surprise inclusion of the machinery shed is in addition to a renewal of the premix shed at council's Millicent depot, which is currently underway and expected to be complete in July.

Originally earmarked as a \$110,000 upgrade,

additional funds have been required for the upgrade resulting in an increase of \$57,000.

According to council's third budget review, a further \$33,000 has been spent on building designs for the Millicent Depot.

Mr Gower floated the potential for the de-

pot to be relocated in the future, saying the Depot Masterplan would assist council in determining the viability of the current offices.

Despite preliminary work moving ahead at proposed office site on North Terrace and Williams Road, no funding has been allocated for the new administration office in the draft document.

"It will be premature to include that in this budget, because we still need to bring detailed designs back to council," Mr Gower said.

The broad concept has been agreed to, but we need to get costings to ensure the new facility is within the figure councillors have previously endorsed."

Mr Gower said if an allocation was needed to progress the \$5.5m, it could be included in one of councils' budget reviews.

A bulk of council's \$26.7m budget will be spent on capital expenditure, with the \$3.5m construction of Tower Road the biggest expense in 2021/22.

Council has allocated \$1m the Border and Casterton Road intersection, in addition to \$500,000 for Border Road, \$150,000 on the Gordon Street and Dergholm Road intersection and \$330,000 on the Mount Burr Service Road.

Approximately \$1.9m has been allocated towards resheets and reseals across the council areas and a further \$264,000 will be spent on footpaths, including Millicent's Kentish Place, Williams Road and Ridge Terrace.

A new machinery shed is also slated for the Beachport Works depot, with council allocation \$275,000 towards the project in the draft budget.

The Beachport Boat Ramp will receive \$130,000 to repair the concrete ramp and renew pontoons, on top of the recurrent \$150,000 allocated for the facility's dredging campaign.

Council has allocated \$22,000 for furnishings, signage and equipment at the Millicent dog park, which is located behind Centennial Park, \$55,000 to seal the Lake McIntyre car park and \$26,000 to repair the Geltwood anchor shelter in Southend.

After being saved from closure earlier this year, \$138,000 will be spent on lighting replacements and timber railings at the Millicent Saleyards in addition to \$35,000 for "various infrastructure repairs".

City Council tables \$45m loan borrowings

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ALMOST all of Mount Gambier City Council's proposed \$54m capital expenditure for 2021/22 will fund the Wulanda Recreation and Convention Centre, with its draft annual business plan and budget showing it will owe \$45m in loans.

The draft document shows council has allocated \$45.1m to the facility, formerly known as the Mount Gambier Community and Recreation Hub, in the upcoming financial year.

Loan borrowings will increase by \$26.8m next financial year to fund the project, which is co-funded with Commonwealth and State Government grant funding.

Mount Gambier mayor Lynette Martin said the completion of building works which is now scheduled to be finished mid-2022 - was a key influence on the draft document

"The budget continues to ensure that service delivery is maintained while council oversees the development of its largest ever infrastructure project, the Wulanda Recreation and Convention Centre," she said.

"The build at Olympic Park is expected to be completed in Autumn 2022 and I am very excited for the community to have access to his much needed state of the art facility.

"Wulanda will be a place for all, provid-

ing aquatic, sports, cultural, youth, cafe and creche facilities as well as a convention space for the benefit of the entire community.

Acting chief executive Barbara Cernovskis said rates will continue to increase by 4.5pc in line with council's 10-year plan, but was unable to provide details on average rate increases until next month.

"Council is notified about the differential rating outcomes in mid-June each year, so we can't provide the details for 2021/2022 at this time," she said.

A majority of capital works under the draft plan will focus on asset renewal, including \$2.1m on road reconstruction, \$400,000 to refurbish the Valley Lakes toilet, \$145,000 towards upgrades at the Mount Gambier Library - including Bookmark Cafe - and \$300,000 towards the Railway Lands play space. ??Council is proposing to spend \$1.1m - including \$800,000 in State Government funding - to extend the shared walking/ cycling path from Wandilo Road to Wireless Road and install solar lighting and \$600,000 towards its LED street lighting project.

According to the organisation's long-term financial plan, which was endorsed at the February meeting, council plans to run a deficit for the next five financial years, peaking next financial year at \$2.2m, before returning to surplus in 2026/27.

Council expects to post a \$4m surplus in 2030/31.

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GRANT District Council will facilitate negotiations for a joint occupancy agreement between two groups for the use of Donovans Hall following a recommendation from an independent review.

But members of the Donovans Recreational Advisory Committee are apprehensive of granting joint occupancy, claiming the Glenelg River Classic Boat Club has indicated it was not interested in a shared agreement.

The future leasing and licensing arrangements for the community facility has been put on hold for almost a year, after the advisory committee sought a review of a council resolution granting leases to the Victorian-based boat club.

At council's June 2020 meeting, elected members awarded the lease over the building to the boat club, which has held concurrent leases over the facility from December 1999.

At the time, a staff report said several options were available for consideration, including offering individual leases to the boat club and the progress association, or a licence to occupy to both parties for joint use of the facility.

While the report said the Donovans com-

mittee would "consider" allowing the boat club to use their building, the group have since claimed it had been "taken out of context and added by council and considered an unfair input by council".

Following council's resolution, the Donovans-based association lodged an internal review, with president Steve Gillett telling elected members the group "struggle to understand council's decision to choose a non-South Australian club which has three facilities in their own town of Nelson, Victoria over ratepayers in their own council district

In a review, Norman Waterhouse Lawyers partner Felice D'Agostino said there was "significant merit" to grant occupancy rights to



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both the Donovans group and the boat club.

"It wasn't clear to me, based on the information I had, there had been an explosion of the possibility of both these organisations being accommodated," she said.

"If there is a possibility they both can be accommodated, in my view, it is worth exploring".

At Monday night's council meeting, Mr Gillett said the association would would be willing to share the facility with the boat club, but said the boat club was not interested in a joint agreement.

"If they are not allowing us to share it with us or have part control so we can use it, we're back to where we were 12 months ago," he said

In a letter to council, boat club president Allan Wilkinson and secretary/treasurer Bruce Mackereth said the group had provided access to the facility to a number of organisations, including the Donovans Shack Owners Group, Donavans Recreation Association Group, Glenelg River Angling Club and SA Health since securing the lease 21 years ago.

The club stated it had undertaken significant maintenance and upgrade works to the building, including rebuilding the slipway to enable access to anyone, including people who are not members of the boat club.

Elected members authorised Grant chief executive Darryl Whicker to facilitate an agreement and report back to council in 60 days.

Soldiers set to move on

THE Port MacDonnell and District RSL sub-branch has shelved plans to remove 10 soldier's plaques from under the trees of Sea Parade and relocate them to a new memorial area.

In one of the final activities before the sub-branch permanently closes, members are undertaking a major beautification project on the coastal town's war memorial.

The group intends to commemorate the Port MacDonnell War Memorial with a new area and garden on Sea Parade to recognise those who paid the supreme ifice in Australian theatres of wa In addition to installing a black granite structure with the crests of the Australian Defence Force, the project also included relocating the soldier's plaques to the memorial area.

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However, the sub-branch has since decided not to pursue the relocation of the memorial plaques and instead incorporate the details on the plaques into the memorial design.

At this week's Grant District Council meeting, Port MacDonnell ward councillor Gill Clayfield said the town's returned soldiers were "really cross" with the proposed relocation.

Cr Clayfield said discussions with a heritage advisor also recommended against the relocation.

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A bright, early festival start

MOUNT Gambier's iconic Cave Gardens will light up this winter as the region is given receive a sneak peek into the Illuminate Adelaide art, light and technology showcase.

Digital Garden in Mount Gambier is the first of three regional installations as part of the extensive program, which will largely take place in Adelaide from June 9.

The inner-city garden will be illuminated by art installation from international and Australian artists, with an immersive experience to also explore the union of future technologies and creative industries.

"We are giving Mount Gambier and its surrounds a look ahead of everyone else, which is really exciting for the region.

"Mount Gambier has a good population base and a fantastic environment for the installations and the Cave Gardens is really a natural amphitheatre where everyone can enjoy themselves."

We're holding the rally to honour all those who've suffered at end of life while waiting decades for reform, and to call on Lower House MPs to act swiftly to pass a law that's already been adopted in Victoria, Western Australia and Tasmania.

It's not wilful ignorance which is a whole other issue. I simply and temporarily have had enough and need to retreat.


I have written previously about making

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

Schools out for university graduates

A SEA of around 90 mortarboards and draping gowns lined Sir Robert Helpmann Theatre last week as University of South Australia students celebrated their graduation.

Students from across the Limestone Coast and south-west Victoria who studied at the Mount Gambier campus celebrated the culmination of their latest academic pursuit, which had been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

A record number of graduates received their degrees on stage, including several 2019 graduates who were unable to have a formal celebration due to restrictions.

Students and guests, which included family and friends, heard how a significant number of the regional campus's graduates had secured employment in local hospitals, schools, social work agencies and businesses, bolstering the region's professional services.

Among the speakers, which included Uni-SA chancellor Pauline Carr and vice chancellor David Lloyd, was Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower who spoke highly of the students' continued efforts and contributions to the community.

"I did not perform well academically and struggled to find my feet for quite a few years," Mr Gower said.

"Life teaches some really interesting things along the journey, it knocks us out but the key is how we pick ourselves up, dust ourselves off and how we embrace the next journey in life," he said.

"For many of those who graduated, this is that first step in their learning and I encourage them all to continue to learn, embrace study and education as it really does broaden the horizons, not just career wise but also personally."

Ms Carr praised the resilience of the graduates and said learning was significant, encouraging further education.

"This year's graduates' resilience over the past year is proof that their attitude and work ethics give them the freedom to work independently and proves they will let nothing stand in their way of achieving what they set out to achieve," Ms Carr said.

"I am sure one of the keys to their success has been the love and support of those closest to you, including you family and friends, and I am sure they are all aware as a model that without their support the graduates would not be where they are today."

Uni set to grow

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STUDENTS studying throughout 2020 have received high praise for their resilience by University of South Australia vice chancellor David Lloyd.

Visiting the regional Mount Gambier campus last week to celebrate graduations alongside students and colleagues, Mr Lloyd said although 2020 was a difficult year for those studying, it remained a successful period for the university.

While COVID-19 impacted each individual campus differently, Mr Lloyd said students studying at Mount Gambier still exceeded expectations despite having to adhere to restrictions imposed on other areas of the state considered COVID-19 hot spots.

"The Mount Gambier campus was only closed for three days and that was during the Parafield cluster and when you think about how far away that is from Mount Gambier it is quite crazy but rules are rules and we always need to put community health first," Mr Lloyd said.

"We had staff on campus the whole time throughout 2020 and even when we had people working from home there were those on campus to assist anyone who decided to come in "

Mr Lloyd spoke to a number of students during his visit and said many felt they had not been disadvantaged during the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Much of the educational experience here on the Mount Gambier campus is blended anyway," the vice chancellor said.

"We have a combination of online and then face to face learning so the shift to online learning was not as jarring for some students as it could have been.

"But all in all we went pretty well and we did have a few students who decided to drop out for various reasons but they have actually come back again as they know we are back to normal and able to help the students with anything they need."

Mr Lloyd also congratulated staff on their



ability to adapt to working online, stating regional campuses had an upper hand on metropolitan campuses.

"We have the teaching innovation unit which we used to support staff to be online and the Mount Gambier staff had more experience of remote education and technology because a lot of what they do is connected back to the cities," he said.

"The overall transition was pretty okay and we made sure we had the right supports in place but we also have an employment assistance program for anyone who may be stressed or struggling and made sure there were a lot of flexible arrangements in place."

While the city's student numbers have remained steady since the COVID-19 pandemic was declared, Mr Lloyd said transport to the Wireless Road West facility remained an issue.

"One thing that kept coming up when we were speaking with students was accessibility of the campus for those outside of Mount Gambier who are struggling to get to campus," Mr Lloyd said. **POSITIVE LEARNING:** University of South Australia's vice chancellor David Lloyd with regional manager Ian McKay.

"We are really focussed on keeping up that connectivity as we have students coming from Millicent who struggle because of public transportation, so it is something we will have to look into."

Alongside improved transportation, Mr Lloyd said the university would enter discussions with the neighbouring TAFE SA facility to enquire about childcare services in order to maintain a family friendly and flexible learning environment on campus.

"We have been good in terms of program numbers as well and as we increase the number of programs online, there will be opportunities for the Mount Gambier campus to be a learning centre and more of a study hub so people can come in and have access to our tutorials through our infrastructure," he said.

"Education will be one of the learning areas we are looking at expanding as we have seen growth in education offerings because we supply both the primary and secondary specialist degrees, so we will see how that continues in regards to demand."

Campus caught in cyber attack

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STAFF at the University of South Australia Mount Gambier campus were among those affected by a recent cyber attack which prevented email access and disrupted internal systems.

The university's campuses were subject to the cyber attack on Sunday morning but a university spokesperson said the issue was

now being contained with no data breaches identified.

The attack has left staff unable to receive or access emails, with impacts expected to continue in the coming days.

University vice chancellor David Lloyd said university officials notified the relevant authorities as soon as the university was aware of the issue.

"We are working to restore affected systems as soon as possible, but unfortunately it is quite likely that staff emails will be impacted for the new few days," Mr Lloyd said.

"I am very grateful to our information technology team for their diligence and hard work to remedy this matter and also want to thank all concerned for their patience as we work through his inconvenience."

Alongside emails, other internet-based facilities have been interrupted including online bookings and student virtual applications.



University of South Australia regional manager Ian McKay said the formal graduation ceremony was a highlight for many students and was an opportunity to celebrate their achievements.

"It is a memorable closure of an important chapter of a student's life," Mr McKay said.

"It is important to celebrate this milestone with friends and family alike."

PLANNING is underway for the Penola Pastoral Agricultural and Horticultural Show with the event to proceed so long as COVID-19 restrictions allow.

The popular country show was one of many cancelled across South Australia last year as a result of ongoing restrictions but show society secretary Kathy Fennell said preparations were underway for this year's event, scheduled for the last weekend of October.

Ms Fennell said the society expected strong support this year following the May cancellation of the 2020 event.

"The crowd will be looking forward to it as they have been talking about it all year," Ms Fennell said.

"Exhibitors are also excited to be able to showcase their produce once again and we have really gone out of our way to organise and provide fantastic entertainment."

While the traditional show is back on the community's social calendar for 2021, Ms Fennell said there would be some differences to comply with ongoing COVID-19 requirements.

"We will have mandatory QR codes for visitors to sign into and there will be sanitising stations and all the rest of it," she said.

"There are still a lot of restrictions and it is a big job to prepare for the show, which is something a lot of people don't realise.

"It is going to be hard work to get the event organised but we are moving with everything now so it can all be approved before showtime."

Ms Fennell predicted the community would be pleased for the event to go ahead with many already asking about the October 29-30 date to lock into their calendars.

"A lot of the cookery people start making their fruit cakes now and the crafty people get a move on this time of the year," Ms Fennell said.

"Not to mention those who enter into the cattle, they choose which cow they want to exhibit and begin working on them now.

"The show is not just one weekend for us or for exhibitors, there is a lot of work leading up to it and we are at that stage where we are getting started now."

Priorities for Penola

THE Penola Stadium will undergo a \$240,000 facelift if Wattle Range Council's draft annual business plan and budget is formally endorsed.

Council has proposed allocating the funds for renewal works, including roofs, gutters and internals at the facility located within the McCorquindale Park complex.

The project will be partly funded by a \$120,000 grant from the Education Department.

Almost \$90,000 will be spent on upgrades to Penola's Arthur Street toilets including automatic locks and external painting - with a majority of funds earmarked for floor tile replacement.

gressing better than expected and the feature would add to the facilities at the town's central sporting hub.

"We are so happy with the way the playground is going and think it is a fantastic addition to the area," Ms Abbey said.

"McCorquindale Park is on a roll at the moment with the number of upgrades happening across the board and it is developing into a great community and sporting hub for the area."

Ms Abbey said the nature playground would give children another central play area and would be used heavily over the weekends during sport season.

"It is going to be great for families because it is located in a more central area, it will be easier for parents to keep an eye on their children," she said.

"Although we would ideally love for a big-

ger space, we are hoping children will enjoy it because it is something different for them to climb on and do during football or netball games." Council has allocated \$55,000 for landscaping in Penola's town centre and \$15,000 towards landscaping around the drainage reserve on Clarke Street.

A further \$30,000 has been earmarked to demolish the current storage shed at Rymill Park and construct a new facility at the same site.

Council's Penola works depot is slated for external upgrades with a \$22,000 allocation to repair stonework and painting and an additional \$22,000 to replace the rear boundary fence at the site.

A \$3.5m allocation has been provided to upgrade of Tower Road from Casterton Road to the Riddoch Highway, while \$500,000 has been allocated to upgrade 1.8km of Border Road from Dergholm Road.

\$15,000 to move Millicent sculpture

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WATTLE Range Council will spend almost \$15,000 to relocate a \$138,000 public artwork piece less than 300m from its original proposed site.

The artwork, which was scheduled to be installed last month, will now be located at its original proposed site on the corner of Williams Road and Ridge Terrace after elected members endorsed the new location.

Councillors requested a site relocation feasibility report for the Millicent entry marker statement after raising concerns about the visibility and effectiveness of the art sculpture on the corner of Williams Road and North Terrace.

In the Millicent Parklands and Civic Precinct (Domain) Masterplan, which was adopted by council in 2018, the art sculpture was proposed for the corner of Williams Road and Ridge Terrace.

However, the Domain Planning Committee - which comprises Corcoran Ward elected members, senior staff and a group of local educational staff proposed moving the sculpture due to concerns with the line of sight and a lack of parking.

In October 2020, elected members selected the former netball courts on the corner of Williams Road and North Terrace for its new council office site.

At the same meeting, councillors received and noted an officer report which confirmed the updated location of the marker and entry statement.

tween October 2020 and March 2021," a staff report said.

Councillors heard a change of site would require an additional site review, including infrastructure assessment, landscaping and reassessing pedestrian and traffic approaches. The total cost to undertake the additional

works was estimated at \$19,980 and the new completion date was flagged for July 2021.

The report said council has spent \$25,994 from the \$138,000 budget allocated in the project.

Elected members supported moving the structure, which depicts a large white hand holding a streamer, to the Williams Road and Ridge Terrace corner.

A model of the works was displayed to the community in the Millicent Public Library and public comment was invited on the designs.

A total of 478 responses were received in the online and ballot polls, with the Exhibition Studios design narrowly winning the public vote with 28pc.

Millicent vaccination hub axed

PLANS to establish a COVID vaccination clinic at the Millicent Italian Club have been axed, with Wattle Range Council footing a \$4000 bill for preparation work ahead of SA Health hiring the site.

Council chief executive Ben Gower told elected members an unbudgeted \$4000 was spent on maintenance works to prepare for a community vaccination clinic.

Mr Gower said council had since been advised SA Health would not establish a vaccination clinic following "government changes to how they are going to roll their vaccines out". Limestone Coast Local Health Network chief executive officer Ngaire Buchanan said authorities conducted a scoping exercise earlier this year to access and explore opportunities for potential vaccination sites, with an increased number of individuals able to access COVID-19 vaccine via general practitioners.

"With GP's now expanding their vaccine delivery to Phase 2a groups, this has allowed more people to access the COVID-19 vaccine in their community," she said.

"We are continuing to plan for the next phase of the rollout and will provide further information on where people can get vaccinated once details are finalised.

"While we continue to progress through the COVID-19 vaccine rollout, GPs, respiratory clinics and pharmacies have played an instrumental role in the vaccine delivery across our region and we continue to support them in their role."

Ms Buchanan said 587 vaccines had been administered at the Millicent Hospital and vaccinations would continue to be rolled out for aged care residents, frontline healthcare and emergency workers and staff across the region in line with the Commonwealth Eligibility framework.

SHIPPING and manufacturing issues as a result of COVID-19 has delayed the delivery of a new Mount Burr Country Fire Service (CFS) truck, but authorities expect the new truck will be delivered by the end of the year.

The ageing single cab truck has been flagged for replacement as part of the CFS's ongoing maintenance program, with CFS operational infrastructure and logistics director Lee Watson telling The Border Watch in October a new appliance was due to arrive in "coming months".

However, Mr Morgan said the truck has been delayed due a backlog caused by CO- VID-19 shipping and manufacturing delays. "It is expected that their truck will be delivered before the end of the year," he said.

Mount Burr CFS truck delay

The Mount Burr truck is one of the oldest in the Wattle Range Group fleet and sits two people in the front and up to four in the back outside of the cab, providing little protection in the event of a burn over.

Currently, crew members are required to sit on a bench seat in the tray of the truck, roll down a curtain and stick the fire hose outside of the curtain.

Volunteers must not only spray the area in their vicinity but also the cabin in front as there is no spray system around the cabin.

The only protection for volunteers who are inside of the cabin is a blanket.

It is one of four single-cab trucks remaining in the Wattle Range group, along with Kalangadoo, Maaoupe and Monbulla.

Previously, Mr Watson said planning was underway to replace the Maaoupe and Kalangadoo trucks in the next 18 months.

Mr Watson said the Kalangadoo station has been identified for replacement as part of the CFS's capital program and planning to start on the new station was slated in the next financial year.

Earlier this year, the Mount Burr CFS station was upgraded to a two-bay shed and includes a meeting room, toilets and washing facilities.

The previous Mount Burr CFS facility was built in 1973 on Pettman Terrace but became unsuited to larger fire trucks.

A CHILD who became stuck in mud in Mount Gambier's Valley Lake after their pontoon bike became immobilised was rescued without incident.

Emergency services responded to the Valley Lakes precinct on Monday around 3pm after a dislodged propeller caused the aqua craft to become lodged in thick mud.

The child was not considered in immediate danger but was unable to access the shore, with emergency services assisting them back to solid ground.

State Emergency Service Mount Gambier District crew leader Mark Smyth said his team and the city's Metropolitan Fire Service devised a plan to bring the child to shore using a ladder as a bridge back to land.

"We worked together to devise a plan to

get the minor out of there, so we got a ladder to him through the weeds and he was able to make his way back to shore before we also got a hold of his pontoon bike," Mr Smyth said.

"It's not very often we get called down here

LIMESTONE Coast personality and George the Farmer co-creator Simone Kain will be interviewed by Vogue as part of the Vogue Codes Country next week.


The online seminar will feature a number of leaders across the nation and aim to empower future female innovation.

Brittany taking the plunge for charity

TOUCHED by the generosity of the Ronald McDonald House in support of her younger brother, Mount Gambier's Brittany Close will face her fears in a bid to raise over \$1000 for the charity.

Ms Close will be one of 100 people abseiling down Adelaide's InterContinental Hotel, braving the 25-storey descent for her younger brother Joseph Lockwood, a beneficiary of the Ronald McDonald House program.

Joseph was born 24 weeks premature and Ms Close recalls staying at the Ronald McDonald House as an 11 year old while her mother and brother received specialist care.

Joseph endured a brain hemorrhage during the birthing process, which was complicated for both mother and child.

Since his birth, Joseph has had multiple surgeries, including on his brain and hip, while also being developing cerebral palsy.

"I was only 11 at the time Joseph was born and because I was so young we all had to go up to Adelaide as well," Ms Close said.

"Mum couldn't really be away from us for too long so we stayed at the Ronald McDonald House and they were just fantastic and be-

cause (Joseph's) disorder is a bit too complicated for regional hospitals, whenever he gets sick we usually have to go up to Adelaide," Ms Close said.

"Sometimes it would be on short notice or for longer periods of time and we wouldn't know where to stay or wouldn't be able to afford it, which is when we usually stay at the charity." Ms Close said although her brother's health had now improved, she wanted to raise awareness of the critical service.

"They always had things for us to do if we were missing school and the people there helped us so much, especially mum emotionally," Ms Close said.

"They are like our friends and family and I want to ensure regional families are aware of what they do there and how they help because one day it might be them that need to go and stay there."

Speaking on the event at hand, Ms Close said it was something out of her comfort zone but was a worthy cause.

"I am nervous because I have never been abseiling before so it is out of my comfort zone, but Joseph thinks it is hilarious and wants to see if I burst into tears on the day," she said.

"What I am calling for now is the community to support this cause because the Ronald McDonald House itself is a community.

"I am not a super outgoing person and so it is out of my comfort zone to ask people to donate but it is for such a good cause and is close to me and my family so I am happy to do it."

Donations are able to be made to Ms Close's charity through the Ronald McDonald House website before her descent down the building on August 27.

Celebrating new citizens

WHEN Oanh Whicker came to Australia from south Vietnam in 2014, she knew no English, had no family and had big dreams.

This week, Ms Whicker's young family proudly beamed as she recited the citizenship pledge and was welcomed as Grant District Council's newest Australian citizen.

Ms Whicker's naturalisation ceremony is the culmination of a journey that started almost eight years ago, when her father urged her to leave her hometown.

In October 2019, the couple and their young daughter Olivia moved to the region after Mr Whicker secured Grant District

Council's top job.

Their second child Darson was born in January 2020 and Ms Whicker is currently employed as a registered nurse at Mount Gambier Hospital's surgical ward.

In a nod to her heritage, Ms Whicker wore a red áo dài - a Vietnamese national garment - to Monday's naturalisation ceremony, with the colour symbolising prosperity, happiness and luck in the South East Asian culture.

"My mum wanted me to wear red because it is lucky and I wanted to wear the áo dài to remember where I come from while I celebrate my new home," she said.

"I am nervous about becoming Australian because I can now vote, so it is important for me to understand the politics of the country.

"Darryl has helped me a lot because he has worked in council and my work in an Australian environment has also helped my language skills and understanding of how things work."

In a further attempt to bring her culture to the region, Ms Whicker is currently planning to open a Vietnamese restaurant in Mount Gambier later this year.

She expects the restaurant to be open by July.





AIRBORNE GEOPHYSICAL SURVEY

Geoscience Australia in collaboration with South Australia, Victoria and NSW, is conducting an airborne geophysical survey over a large area of eastern Australia in 2021, as seen in the map below.

The survey will be carried out by a fixed-wing aircraft fitted with specialist geophysical equipment flying on 20 km – spaced lines. The aircraft and the equipment that it tows will be flying at approximately 100 metres above the ground. There will be no ground contact within the survey area.

Whilst flyovers will not present any known COVID 19 risk to the population, all appropriate preventative actions will be undertaken by ground staff and flight crew

Tips to improve home security

1. DOOR LOCKS

HAVE key-operated two-cylinder deadlocks fitted to all external hinged doors.

A quality knob-inlock set will have a 'dead latch' mechanism to stop burglars using a credit card to open it.

While looking at external doors, you may also want to check that they are solid and robust.

If not, perhaps you should replace them, or add a security screen.

You may also want to consider fitting a wide angle peephole on your front door.

2. SLIDING DOORS

A favourite point of entry for burglars!

Fit key-operated locks or patio bolts to all external sliding doors, such as patio/veranda doors.

Sliding doors can also be made more secure by inserting a wood or metal dowel into the track to limit movement.

3.WINDOWS

AN open window, visible from the street, may be the only reason that your home is chosen by a burglar.

Ground floor windows are more susceptible for obvious reasons.

Make sure you have a security grill, security screen or burglar bars applied to all accessible windows, or alternatively have key-operated single cylinder window locks fitted.

4. LIGHT TIMERS

INSTALL light timers to switch on automatically if you aren't home when it gets dark, or have gone away for a few days.

The timers should mimic when you would usually switch lights on or off.



They are not expensive and are available at most hardware stores.

5. EXTERIOR LIGHTING

EXTERIOR lighting is also a good deterrent, provided it is switched on and off as though

someone is at home.

Make sure the approach to your house, especially any entryway, is brightly lit, controlled by a light timer if necessary - this also makes it safer and more comfortable if you come home after dark.



LIMESTONE Coast students descended onto the Canunda National Park last week to learn about the region's Indigenous culture, pioneer history and natural environment as part of the March in May event.

Students from Newbery Park, Beachport, Melaleuca and Kangaroo Inn Area schools alongside Year 6 and 7 students from Tenison Wood College explored the history, culture and environment while enjoying a loop walk of the park.

Starting from the Coola Outstation carpark, students trekked more than 8km to four interpretation sites, including wetland ecology, shorebirds, Indigenous culture and the pioneer history of Canunda.

Friends of Canunda and Beachport president Mike Bleby said the event, which is run in collaboration with the Limestone Coast Landscape Board, aimed to educate students about the importance of the national park.

"There are a lot of local children who are not aware of the existence of Canunda and what it has to offer and we hope the event might stimulate them and their families to stop and revisit sometime," he said.

'Each year we work with the department who work with the schools and since the event started more than 20 years ago, it has become more dovetailed to the schools' curriculum.

"We have had good support from Woolworths Millicent and Foster's Foodland who provided snacks for the kids and we also had involvement from the Friends of the Shorebirds South East for the first time in recent vears.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board education coordinator Vanessa Freebairn said organisers hoped the event would familiarise local students with the outdoor environment and encourage youth to minimise disturbance while in national parks. "One of our education stations was focused on wetland ecology and how we have lost a lot of wetlands since the South East was first settled," she said.

"Pre-European settlement, 44pc of land surface in the South East was wetlands and now we have around 1.5pc to 2.5pc left.

'We told the students how important it is to look after our remaining wetlands as 70pc of our threatened species rely on wetlands.

"Another of our stops focused on shorebirds and how to behave at the coast in a way it will not impact the shorebirds or minimise the disturbance."

Newbery Park senior school student Stella enjoyed the shorebirds walk station, with Friends of Shorebirds South East and National Parks staff providing an informative session on the shore of Lake Bonney.

The Year 7 student said the walk station was of particular interest, due to the school raising funds to purchase a geo-locator to track the migration pattern of a wader.

'It was really interesting to hear about the shorebirds and how they migrate from here to Siberia," Stella said.

"They can fly 11,000km in 10 days without stopping.

Newbery Park Year 7 student Evan said his favourite stop was the Indigenous culture, which centred around the Bungandidj people. "I thought it was good to learn about the



National conference success

A SURPRISE presentation of a Governor-General's Medal for community service was a highlight of the Ryder-Cheshire Australia national conference held in Mount Gambier over the weekend.

More than 50 people attended the biennial conference at University of South Australia's Mount Gambier campus, which linked virtually with hubs in Ballarat, Casterton and Melbourne, as well as Timor-Leste, India and New Zealand.

Melbourne resident Anthea Swann was announced as the Governor-General's Medal recipient by the daughter of the charity founders, Dr Elizabeth Cheshire, who joined the conference via Zoom from England. "It's been such a privilege to work with Ryder-Cheshire -

for 21 years now, since Peter Newton recruited us and we went to East Timor," Ms Swann said.

"It's just been a really important part of our lives." The humanitarian organisation's Klibur Domin facility in Timor-Leste has grown to become an 85-bed healthcare centre that caters for sick, disabled and destitute people, and also provides a specialist service for tuberculosis patients.

Governor-General David Hurley and Ms Hurley expressed in a letter addressed to Ms Swann that time and time again they had been "struck by the selflessness and generosity of Australians".

"It makes us both enormously proud to be Australian and hopeful for our future," they said.

SOUTHEND residents should prepare for further foreshore construction works with Wattle Range Council approving a further \$52,000 towards additional works at the town's caravan park and bush camp.

Council chief executive Ben Gower says council hopes to meet its extended mid-year deadline despite a number of additional works required prior to reopening the caravan park and bush camping facility.

Elected members heard the construction of a new ablution block with disability access would cost approximately \$30,000, an additional \$5000 will be required for a water softener and \$10,000 required for boundary fencing.?

The unbudgeted works also include a \$6750 new electrical meter board.

Economic development manager Roger Babolka said of \$135,610 of council's \$193,364 had already been spent on the site, including \$35,000 of unknown costs relating to underground infrastructure.

"The original concept here was to develop this as a self-contained RV park and the reason behind this was based on the potential cost to council," he said.

"We are not in a position to hand over to the new operators until the site is fit for purpose and it is not fit for purpose given what needs to be done to make it into a caravan park.'

Council has undertaken extensive demolition works - including removing the main office, permanent vans and cabins and other infrastructure - to facilitate its operation and management as a caravan park and camp site.

It follows an independent report which identified considerable physical risk to the park and other assets from coastal erosion.

A staff report said additional works have been progressively required throughout the reinstatement process due to the overall condition of both sites

BlazeAid closes camp

LUCINDALE'S BlazeAid camp will close today after four months of voluntary efforts, saving fire-affected landholders more than \$300,000 by helping to rebuild fences destroyed by the Avenue Range-Blackford fire.

The camp was established in the wake of the fire, which started in the Blackford, Avenue Range and Lucindale area on January 11 in hot and windy conditions.

The fire burned more than 17,000ha of grass and scrub and destroyed three structures, numerous sheds, thousands of livestock and incurred a significant loss to fencing.

Since opening the camp, more than 200 volunteers devoted a collective 1675 days, cleared 78km of fences and assisted rebuilding over 300km of fencing.

BlazeAid Lucindale co-ordinator Rob Edwards said work had been completed on 36 properties, with work expected to be complete on the final property today.

"A majority of the work we have done is assisted contractors with rebuilding fences, so we have put a lot of droppers in and running wires," he said.

"There are some areas where we have been doing total fencing, but the bulk of it has been helping out the contractors.

"We averaged four teams going out each day, which is made up of four to five people, who average around six hours a day."

Mr Edwards praised the Lucindale and broader Limestone Coast community for its strong support for the BlazeAid camp, with a number of organisations and individuals donating supplies for the volunteers.

"BlazeAid is just one organisation, but we couldn't do what we do without the help of other community groups," he said.

"The Lucindale Lions Club has let us stay at Yakka Park and they have been absolutely tremendous, if there's anything we need they are happy to help us out.

"The Lions throughout the South East itself has been amazing, clubs such as Mount Gambier donated a whole bunch of frozen meals for the volunteers and there are other organisations and people who have come in from Naracoorte every now and then to bring us in food and sweets.

"We have made some great friendships and as well as making a difference to the lives of farmers, they have made a big difference to the lives of volunteers."

"During National Road Safety Week we are asking all drivers and road users to 'Drive So Others Survive!' As a very large and very important road user group we welcome the support of the Caravan Industry because like us, they recognise that everyone has a right to get home safe to their loved ones, every day, with no exceptions." explained Peter Frazer, President, SARAH Group and Founder National Road Safety Week.

"With more caravans on our roads during peak holiday and traffic times, it's even more important for both their drivers and others around them to be aware of keeping a safe

distance to make sure everyone safely reaches their destination," Mr Frazer said.

This comes at a time when campers traditionally look to head north in search of warmer weather.

While there remains some hesitance and uncertainty when it comes to the risk of border closures, a recent survey showed that 65 per cent of caravanners and campers were intending to travel north this season.

The research also indicated increased de-

sire from Australians who would not normally travel north, a likely result of the increased popularity of caravan and camping following the pandemic.

The past 12 months has seen many Aussies

MITSUBISHI PAJERO FINAL EDITION REVEALED

THE Mitsubishi Pajero has been around nearly as long as Mitsubishi Australia itself, but now it's being farewelled after a 39-year production run by the Mitsubishi Pajero Final Edition.

Due in showrooms within weeks, the 2021 Mitsubishi Pajero Final Edition will be limited to just 800 units for Australia, where the first two-door Pajero arrived in 1983 – three years after Mitsubishi Motors Australia was established – followed by the four-door in 1984.

It will be available in all three model grades – GLS, GLX and Exceed – and, like all Pajeros, fitted with seven seats and a 141kW/441Nm 3.2-litre turbo-diesel fourcylinder matched with a five-speed auto

and four-wheel drive.

Pricing is yet to be announced, but the existing models are priced at \$54,990 (GLX), \$59,990 (GLS) and \$62,990 (Exceed) – all plus on-road costs – and the Final Edition is likely to command a small price premium, if any.

There are no mechanical changes, but there will be a Final Edition badge and a range of locally fitted accessories including a tinted bonnet protector, leather cover for the owner's manual and service book, carpet floor mats, plastic cargo liner and a protective boot lip cover.

All Mitsubishi Pajeros come standard with heavy-duty equipment including a rear differential lock, 3.0-tonne towing capacity, 700mm wading depth, 36.6-degree approach angle, 22.5-degree ramp-over angle and 25-degree departure angle.

Also standard across the range is Apple CarPlay and Android Auto connectivity, and while the base GLX rides on 17-inch alloys, GLS and Exceed variants add 18s and Rockford premium audio.

Mitsubishi announced it would axe the Pajero – whose name lives on with the Triton ute-based Pajero Sport seven-seat off-roader – in July 2020, when it posted its biggest operating loss in 18 years and said it would exit Europe and slash costs by 20 per cent.

Killing off rather than replacing the current Pajero, which is now 15 years old but rides on a platform that dates back to 1999, was a direct result of that cost-cutting.

The Mitsubishi Pajero has found more than 3.3 million sales globally over four generations since 1982, including more than 150,000 in Australia, where sales peaked at about 8500 in 2002 but shrank to a third of that last year when less than 2400 were sold.

UPDATE: Pricing for the 22MY Mitsubishi Pajero Final Edition has been confirmed at a \$500 premium over the three existing variants on which it's based, with a starting price of \$54,990 plus on-road costs.

However, all three variants are available at lower drive-away prices: \$52,490 DA for the GLX, \$59,490 DA for the GLS and \$62,990 DA for the Exceed.

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

On The Water FISHING

A BIT of rain about over the weekend was not enough to stop anglers from trying their luck on the water, with some nice catches reported.

The offshore guys had a bit of wind and swell against them for the most part of last week, but those who were able to sneak out when conditions allowed found plenty of tuna.

Southerly Fishing Charters put their clients on to some mixed bags of fish, with tuna, gummy shark, snapper and a nice mixture of other bottom fish which made for a great few days on the water.

There has been the odd whisper of big fish this week from way down the east, but I am yet to see any pictures.

School shark have been on the move in close along the coast for the last few weeks, making them a good target for both surf and boat-based fishos.

Danger and Green Points are the hot spots for the bigger fish, with some being right up near the 30kg mark.

There are plenty of gummy shark mixed in with the schoolies, so get down there and have a crack.

Salmon fishos have managed some lovely fish this week to 2kg and better along Canunda NP and into the Oil Rig.

Bait fishos still seem to have the upper hand and while the fish are not super concentrated yet, the signs are encouraging for a big season ahead.

I have to keep reminding myself it is still only May and the best is yet to come.

There were some nice fish to around 1kg caught in both the salmon hole and Light-

house Bay over the weekend on a mixture of baits and lures.

The size is slowly getting better and the numbers seem to be improving.

I have heard of some nice flathead to 50cm caught in the Lighthouse Bay area by the bait fishos, so if you can manage one or two of those on top of some salmon, you are doing well.

There have been some good reports again this week of nice gar from the Cape Douglas and Livingstons Bay areas.

Waders and boaties are sharing the success the only secret is to get the burley happening, then wait until they come to you

There are plenty of areas to chase the humble old gar - inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater is a great spot if you are new to the game, but any sheltered bay with a nice seagrass bed is worthy of a dabble.

Tommies, mullet, salmon trout, small whiting and other bits and pieces will all frequent the same areas, so there is plenty of variety on offer.

There are a few nice redfin still being caught this week even though the weather has cooled down a lot.

Mill Swamp is popular and fishing well and although the size has not been like what were used to in summer, it is still a great place to go and get into a few fish.

I have heard of some nice redfin from Lake Koonongwootong in Coleraine, but remember its electric motor or paddle power only on that lake.

There are some nice trout in there too, but they are getting pretty cagey and harder to catch.

The Glenelg River is starting to heat up, be it from more fish on the move, or more anglers down there having a crack,

I have seen some nice ones from up high around Dartmoor and plenty from down low

In fact, he was giving Ramified, the oldest runner in the race, close to two years on the age-scale but very little when it came to the number of race starts.

Ramified, an August 2015 son of Magic Sprite and Hey Sexy Lady, lined up for his 121st start on Sunday, while Just Kenny had previously raced on 111 occasions.

Young Harry Trengove of Lewiston is Just Kenny's third trainer, only taking over the son of Kinloch Brae x Glass Roof in March and winning his first race with the black dog at Mount Gambier's time-graded meeting last week.

Just Kenny did his 20-year-old owner-trainer proud when leading all the way in the Winningformula.net.au 5+ Wins Stake over 400 metres, holding out Ask Me Now to win by a head in a best-of-day 23.28 seconds.

Back at Tara Raceway for the second time in the space of only a few days, he looked well placed in the Masters.

He quickly found the front before running away to a 4¹/₄ lengths win in 17.94 seconds over Ima Maldini, Ramified and Azumi Spirit who virtually crossed the line as one.

But the Trengove family's day was far from over.

Lining up in box two in the Trackside Meats Mixed Stake (600m) was Hold On, trained by Harry's step-mum Shelley.

Hold On, a son of My Bro Fabio and Asteroid Miss, and a brother to Let's See, a 720-metre Wentworth Park winner earlier this month, was back at Tara Raceway for the first time since April 11 when defeating Oakvale Impact over 600 metres.

Connections were hoping a change of scenery might do the trick for the Michael Wallworth-owned black dog whose past two starts at Murray Bridge and Gawler had seen him finish unplaced.

As it turned out, he was always on the pace, little separating him and Lee Bartholomew's Rough Pearl for the entire journey.

In fact nothing separated the pair on the line after the judge declared a dead-heat in a time of 35.41 seconds.

Doing his best to make it a triple dead-heat was Mick's Kimmy who came from a mile back to be beaten a head.

Her trainer Peter Crawley continues to keep an anxious eye on the 732-metre start as the club awaits the delivery of a set of starting boxes.

Then it was the turn of Clint, father of Harry, with Mootwingee, back at Tara Raceway for the first time since defeating Two Hands George in a 400-metres Juvenile in January.

Only fairly away from box four, the daughter of Worm Burner and Batty Allen quickly worked into third spot down the back before finishing strongly to defeat Fernando Deeds by $1\frac{1}{2}$ lengths in 23.28 seconds.

Bred and owned by Grant Daubeny, Mootwingee has been in the Trengove kennels prior to racing, Harry Trengove describing her as a tough and tenacious little chaser.

Meanwhile, completing a good day for the family was Mootwingee's litter sister It's Smudgy, owned and trained in the same interests, and winning on Sunday night over 531 metres at Gawler.

"With SA-bred greyhounds able to win six juveniles there should be sufficient time for them to gain further experience before progressing through the grades and distances," he said.

All happening for Opperman

LIFE refuses to stand still for one moment for local apprentice jockey Jacob Opperman.

The latest achievement to put him in the spotlight was the announcement he has won the Carbine Club scholarship for 2021 here in SA.

That meant a trip to Adelaide last Friday for Opperman to accept the scholarship and be interviewed at the Carbine Club luncheon at Morphettville racecourse.

It is the first time a jockey has won the scholarship which entitles the winner to spend \$3000 over the next three years on needs for their career.

"Normally a footballer or a cricketer wins the scholarship but this year I was the lucky winner after Briony Moore (full time manager of the SA Apprentice Academy) submitted my name for the award," Opperman told The Border Watch.

"Jacob has already received plenty of media publicity in Queensland regarding his career and there is every chance he will have extra rides at the meeting as he has his manager chasing up rides," Briony Moore said.

FIRSTS ALL ROUND

CASTERTON cup day last Sunday was fruitful for the Limestone Coast with locals providing the quinella in the \$45,000 Casterton Cup.

Naracoorte trainer Sue Murphy won her first Casterton Cup and her second country Victorian cup in the space of just over two months when Farooq (\$4-\$5.50) thrashed his rivals, defeating the Mount Gambier trained Jester Halo 5.5 lengths.

Murphy was born in Casterton and raised in nearby Dunrobin, and the beaming smile on her face immediately after the race showed it meant something special to her.

"To come home and train my first Casterton Cup winner is really special," Murphy confided.

"The result was also good for Jacob (Opperman) who has now had three rides on Farooq for three wins.

"We thought of running Farooq over 1700 metres during the Warrnambool cup carnival but decided to scratch him after all the heavy rain Warrnambool received on the Monday

A ROUND that came out of the blue has justified David Anderson's decision last year to put his bowls away and dust off his golf clubs.

The 70-year-old turned in the best score of the day at Attamurra on Saturday, signing for a +3 in the par round in the field of 106 players.

Anderson first joined the Mount Gambier Golf Club back in 1973 after moving from Clare and was good enough to get his handicap down as low as nine.

These days he is off about 22, a result largely due to playing very little golf over the past couple of decades.

"Work and family took over in the 90s, which meant golf took second place," the former ETSA worker-turned vegetable seed grower said.

"I ended up playing bowls for about 10 years, but then last winter I had a knee replacement and when it got better I decided to see if I could still swing a golf club.'

His form in recent weeks had been improving and on Saturday it finally came together.

'The difference was I hit some fairways and then got close enough to the greens to get up and down a few times," Anderson said.

"I hadn't been hitting many fairways until Saturday ... I'm usually off to the right.

He hit the ball so well from the start of his round he raced to +3 after the first five holes, helped by pars on the first, fourth and fifth.

Unfortunately he undid that good early work, falling back to square after wiping the eighth, ninth and 10th.

Luckily he stopped the rot just in time, managing halves on the 11th and 12th before picking up shots on the 13th and 14th.

He gave one of those back by wiping the par-five 15th, but came home with two more pluses to finish at +3.

That saw him top the leaderboard, one clear of a group of five players, including three-time club champion Darren Bilney.

Playing off a handicap of +2, Bilney shot 68 off the stick after birdies on the fourth, seventh, ninth, 15th and 16th.





"If we didn't have these regional centres willing to support these prestigious and historic bike races, I think they would be part of our history," Ambrose said.

"In places like Mount Gambier we have the support of the council and the whole community.

"We are really appreciative of that support."

The 100 Mile Classic itself is becoming a rarity, with few long handicap events held anywhere in the country.

Many of the competitors enjoy the challenge of what is known as a tough, but rewarding course.

"A lot of the riders who did the 100 Mile, also did Melbourne to Warrnambool and went to Wagga recently," Ambrose said.

"The riders say the 100 Mile Classic is the harder.

"It is a handicap so you have to ride pretty hard, but in both the men's and women's races you weren't in the top 10 unless you had some prestige to your name."

It is a similar scenario with the state kermesse, with the closed roads around the Blue Lake making for a safe and competitive event.

"This is a really great course," Ambrose said.

"You have no interaction with traffic so it is safe and it is something we can close without affecting too many residents, which is important to us.

"From a rider's perspective they love this course.

"It is one of the courses people go back to Adelaide or Melbourne or wherever they are from and talk about how good it is.

"From a racing perspective there is a bit of everything - one year you might get a bunch win and another a breakaway."

Economically Ambrose said the two events injected financial benefit to the region, but also made an impact which was harder to measure.

"It is becoming more important from a strategic point of view to have these marquee events on the calendar," he said.

"It is great for the cycling community and for the local community as well.

"There is the direct tourism impact of having 150 people stay in the town for a few days.

"Then the Australian track team visited a few schools, so there is that impact, about the importance of a healthy lifestyle.

"Cycling has always been a super accessible sport and these guys racing are some of the best in the world.

"It is so accessible to the community and you don't get to see that in other sports."

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AUSTRALIAN Olympic cyclist Kelland O'Brien backed up his 100 Mile Classic victory on Saturday with the SA Open Kermesse Championship on Sunday on another tough day for racing.

O'Brien

It was back-to-back titles for O'Brien, who won the event last time it was staged in 2019.

The elite men rode for 75 minutes around the closed Blue Lake circuit, before two final laps to decide the victor.

An early breakaway saw Leigh Howard take the initiative, before moves were made and the field split.

O'Brien joined Howard, along with Luke Plapp and Sam Welsford and the Australian Olympic cyclists controlled the pace from there, with little chance of the main group closing the growing margin.

In the end it came down to a race to the line between O'Brien and Howard, with the former again saluting.

O'Brien said he was pleased to back up his 100 Mile victory with the state title, despite the tough conditions around the back of the Blue Lake.

"There was a bit of rain and the wind picked up more towards the end," he said.

"The climb around the back is pretty hard - at the start you don't think much about it but after an hour and a half that hill, with a cross wind, it hurts."

As with the 100 Mile Classic the day before, O'Brien said there was no real race plan in place, just to ride it out and see how it unfolded.

"We ended up in the right place at the right time," he said.

"At the end we saw two laps to go and went hard to the finish."

The women's championship was claimed by Annette Edmondson, from Ruby Roseman Gannon and Maeve Plouffe.

In an impressive effort, Mount Gambier's Tess Wight crossed the line in seventh place.

For the junior riders, Mount Gambier's Molly Opperman claimed the Under 11 honours, from first male and state champion Austen Decker.

Liam Underwood claimed the Under 13 honours from brother Ryan, with Freya Miller female champion.

Paige Squire won the Under 15 female race, while Darcy Greenwood sprinted to the line ahead of Ewan Landman to claim the championship honours.

The Under 17 event saw a tightly-contested race, with the 10-rider group together for the full five laps.

A sprint to the line saw Kalan Tucker claim the win from Will Mathwin and Jamie Anderson.

B and C Grade races were also held over 50 minutes plus two laps.

In an interesting twist, Australian Olympic endurance team coach Tim Decker claimed the B Grade honours in a sprint to the line, while Phil Crick claimed C Grade.

Olympian claims Classic

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O'Brien crossed the line with team mate Luke Plapp, after the pair broke away from the front group in the final kilometres.

Fellow Australian rider Leigh Howard finished some 10 seconds back in third place, while Dave Bryant crossed the line as the first Mount Gambier rider home.

It was an impressive performance, with O'Brien and his Australian team mates starting from the scratch group, around an hour after the first riders headed off.

The weather was always going to play a part, with cross, head and tail winds all combining for an uncomfortable ride.

The scratch riders did not catch the front group until late in the race on the way back from Port MacDonnell and then faced plenty of opposition as riders jockeyed for position.

Eventually O'Brien took his opportunity and was joined by Plapp at the top of the Blue Lake as the race drew to a finish.

A salute across the line showed the joy of the victory, with a clear gap to the remainder

great to still have a really long handicap going," he said.

O'Brien said kit choice was as important as any other preparation, with the cold wind sapping energy and morale.

The pace was on from the outset, with a desire to close the big gap to the limit riders. "There wasn't too much talk to begin with

amongst the scratch group," O'Brien said. "You know you are giving away a full hour,

so basically 30 kilometres. "The wind was interesting on the way

out to the first turnaround and we averaged 50kph for the first hour, which was crazy.

"It put a lot of people under pressure early, then coming up over the Range Hill was pretty tough."

Once back in Mount Gambier, the riders headed down to Port MacDonnell for the final turnaround, which again tested the stamina.

"There were a few attacks on the way down to Port MacDonnell and that was where the race-winning split happened,"

O'Brien said the front group was caught with around 15km to run and from there the race continued a frantic pace.

"It was pretty good handicapping," he said.

"There were a few guys in the front of the race who were super strong and they got in with us and started racing.

"Sam Welsford, Luke Plapp, Leigh Howard and myself from the Australian Olympic team were at the front, but we didn't think about the tactics, we just let the race unfold.

"The first point is to chase everyone down and catch the limit, then once that happens you race full gas and everyone can take their own opportunities."

With the two Australian team mates coming together at the top of the Blue Lake it was always going to be an enticing sprint to the line

O'Brien raised his arm in celebration after a tough few hours in the saddle.

"It is as hard as it gets," he said of the

Despite the difference to the Olympic event the team competes in, O'Brien said it was important preparation.

"It is super important," he said.

"We have had a good block of country Australian racing in the legs now, the Melbourne to Warrnambool, Wagga to Albury, a few races at Casterton and now this one.

"The Olympic race we do is four kilometres and this is 100 miles, but getting that base in and suffering all day helps with the four kilometre team pursuit.

The women raced for their own honours over a 110km course.

Alexandra Manly claimed the win and a record fastest time in a sprint to the line with Ruby Roseman Gannon, with Eloise Sandow in third place.

Young Mount Gambier rider Tess Wight finished eighth after starting from the 14-minute mark, while Hamilton's Nikki Menzel came home in 14th.

For the younger riders, the Under 11/13 race went to Molly Opperman, from Austen Decker and Eddie Buckland, with Ryan Underwood fastest time.

O'Brien said it was a tough race and one he was pleased to win.

"There are not too many handicaps over this distance in Australia any more, so it is

O'Brien said.

"Getting across to the front group in the head wind was pretty hard and mentally it is pretty hard too because it is still 25kays to go from Port MacDonnell."
