'Cut it out'

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SOUTH Australia's peak timber processors association has questioned why log exports out of the Port of Portland have continued amid a nationwide shortage of structural timber.

But OneFortyOne plantations and the Australian Forest Products Association say local mills are already running at full capacity, with customers continuing to receive sawlog despite high demand for the product.

Demand for sawlog - which is the wood that can be processed into beams, planks or components of timber frames - has skyrocketed across the globe, with the finished product fetching prices 350pc higher than the same time last year in some international markets.

Photographs taken on April 26 at the Port of Portland show what South Australian Timber Processors Association chair David Quill described as "intense activity" at marshalling yards owned and managed by various forest companies.

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ONE of South Australia's most decorated librarians has warned potential cuts to the state's library services would disproportionately affect regional areas and decimate key educational, digital and social programs.

Wattle Range libraries, tourism and information manager Janice Nitschke AM, who has

spent five decades working in libraries, is calling on the State Government to keep funding levels steady amid widespread concern over the continuation of a long-standing government agreement.

The current 10-year agreement between the State Government and the Local Government Association will expire at the end of June, with a new funding arrangement yet to be confirmed.

Ms Nitschke said the retention of existing

services would not be possible to maintain if the government contribution reduced, meaning additional funds would need to be sourced from other parties, including potentially local councils.

She warned widespread cuts could impact the operation of the OneCard program, which allows users to borrow books from any library across the state at their local library.

The health advice comes as border checkpoints were reinstated across major arterial roads linking South Australia and Victoria in response to a COVID-19 outbreak in Melbourne, with the Victorian Government announcing lockdown measures yesterday.

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Regional vaccine rollout

INDIVIDUALS over the age of 50 seeking the Pfizer vaccine will be unable to access it unless referred to a regional vaccination clinic by a general practitioner, the state's health authority says.

COVID-19 bookings are now open for regional residents over the age of 16 at a number of sites across the Limestone Coast, including Millicent, Naracoorte, Penola, Bordertown and Penola hospitals and the Mount Gambier community clinic, located at Mount Gambier Central.

The Pfizer vaccine is available for those aged under 50, while the AstraZeneca remains the preferred vaccine for individuals aged 50 or over.

A spokesperson from SA Health said people aged over 50 will only be able access the Pfizer vaccine following a referral from a GP.

"The Pfizer vaccine is preferred over the AstraZeneca vaccine in adults aged under 50 years, however people who have had their first does of AstraZeneca without any serious side effects can be confident in getting their second does, as per Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation advice," the health authority said.

"Australia's vaccine safety and regulatory process is world class and people can be confident that vaccines approved for use are safe and effective.

"Australia is taking a phased approach to the vaccination program roll out. Australia is currently utilising two vaccines – the Pfizer and the AstraZeneca vaccines.

"People should discuss their individual circumstances and any concerns with their GP."

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GP vaccine push

MILLCENT'S medical professionals have urged residents not to put off getting immunised for coronavirus after observing a spike in vaccine hesitancy among older patients.

The Medical Clinic Millicent, which is the town's sole clinic, has noted a dramatic reduction in patients aged over 50 following changing regulatory advice and cases of rare blood clots linked to the AstraZeneca vaccine.

Medical Clinic Millicent nurse practitioner Jill Little said just 13pc of residents who are eligible for the AstraZeneca shot have started their two-dose vaccine.

Ms Little said the clinic had previously experienced huge demand for the COVID-19 vaccine, but bookings had plummeted after emerging concerns over the very rare blood clotting syndrome.

"At our peak we did 166 a week and we have the ability to do up to 300 vaccinations each week, but we are probably only getting 60 in," she said.

"About one third of people don't want to get it at all, another third want to get the Pfizer vaccine and the rest want to wait to see how the vaccination is rolled out.

"It's estimated we need around 86pc of people to be immunised for herd immunity and we only have 13pc of the eligible age group vaccinated, which is very low."

Ms Little said the clinic was now offering a Saturday clinic to accommodate community members who may be unable to access the facility during the week.

"We have moved to a Saturday clinic to capture people who work, but there has not been a lot of take up," she said.

"The consult is free and it is very quick - it takes 25 minutes total from the assessment to the injection.

"If people want to talk to the doctor about the vaccine and decide they are not ready, they are free to come back another time."

Ms Little said AstraZeneca was safe for use, with Pfizer preferred for people who have had an anaphylactic reaction to any vaccine in the past, cerebral venous sinus thrombosis or



heparin-induced thrombocytopenia.

The most common side effect we are seeing is a sore arm or possible flu-type symptoms, which usually go away in 48 hours," she said.

"The risk of getting a blood clot is very, very rare - you are more likely to get struck by lightning."

Royal Australian College of General Practitioners president Dr Karen Price said vaccines, like all medicines in Australia, are assessed by the Therapeutic Goods Administration to ensure they are safe for use.

As we speak, new COVID-19 cases have emerged in Victoria and we simply do not know if and when more outbreaks will occur.

So please, get vaccinated as soon as you can because we all have a role in combating this pandemic."

Dr Price urged individuals who were planning to avoid receiving AstraZeneca and wait until another vaccine was available not to wait.

Australian Medical Association SA presi-

dent Dr Michelle Atchison said vaccinated individuals were still able to contract COVID-19, but less likely to experience serious symptoms and hospitalisation.

"If you are vaccinated and you get COVID, you are likely to have a serious type of illness and are very unlikely to require intensive care," she said.

If you are not vaccinated, you run the risk of requiring a ventilator or having high intensity care and the reality is that in an outbreak, the regions can't manage that.

We recognise there is a very small chance of serious side effects, but it is a safe vaccine and we encourage people to take it."

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said health advice clearly recommended Australians over the age of 50 should take the AstraZeneca vaccine.

"I encourage all eligible Australians to take the vaccine and in doing so you are not only protecting yourself, but you are also protecting the broader community from this highly infectious disease," he said.

Border checks reinstated as Victoria enters lockdown

POLICE checkpoints have been reinstated on major arterial roads on the South Australia-Victoria border in response to a COVID-19 outbreak in the Greater Melbourne area.

Patrols have returned to several Limestone Coast roads linking the two states as part of South Australia's response to the interstate health crisis.

Victorian authorities recorded 12 new COVID-19 cases overnight Wednesday, taking the state's tally to 34 active cases as of Thursday morning.

Week-long lockdown measures for Victo-

ria were announced as this edition of The Border Watch went to print.

Now in effect, Victorians are banned from travelling more than 5km from home and can only leave home for essential shopping, authorised work or education, caregiving, compassionate or medical reasons, to receive the COVID-19 vaccine and exercise.

Exercise will be limited to a two-hour window and face masks must be worn indoors and outdoors when residents leave their home. Announcing new travel direc-

tions for South Australians on Wednesday, Police Commissioner Grant Stevens placed an indefinite travel ban on people from the Greater Melbourne.

Only essential travellers, returning residents, relocating people or those fleeing domestic violence are permitted to enter South Australia from Melbourne.

Comm Stevens said the restrictions announced Wednesday did not impact regional Victorians.

"Border controls are put in place to allow us to take a more relaxed approach with our

internal restrictions," Comm Stevens said.

Comm Stevens said he acted on strong health advice from South Australia's chief medical officer, Professor Nicola Spurrer, based on the number of positive cases in Victoria and the number of high-risk locations identified interstate.

The senior police official did not rule out increasing restrictions within South Australia, dependent on the evolving situation in Victoria.

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The need to read

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MILLICENT Public Library users have warned prospective cuts to council library services will decimate an essential community hub and affect key educational, digital and social programs.

Library volunteers Wendy Thomson, Nan Minty and Kerry Lawson have urged the State Government to keep funding levels steady amid widespread concern over the continuation of a long-standing agreement.

The current 10-year agreement between the State Government and the Local Government Association will expire at the end of June, with a new funding arrangement yet to be confirmed.

Currently, the State Government provides around \$20m per year to South Australia's libraries through the partnership and councils provide approximately \$86m.

The trio decried any decreases to library funding, saying the Millicent facility provided essential services to community members, including marginalised groups such as young families, older people and people without access to technology.

"The library is a wonderful hub for our community and it is safe space for people of any age, young or old, to read, research or relax," Ms Thomson said.

"There are not a lot of places you can socialise in Millicent and the library is a place people come to as a social outlet.

"We see a lot of new people who come here who need help to access information or lodging documents online and the staff here are always happy to give them the help they need.

"If the library doesn't have funding or there's a cut, it will be the programs like the school holiday activities and book launches that are really important for our community that are going to be cut."

The Wattle Range Library Service comprises of the main Millicent and Penola facilities, a smaller Beachport branch and depot at Tananoola.

In addition to the traditional collecting and borrowing services, the network has adapted to community and digital needs and provides individual and group-based technology literacy sessions, children's activities, local history talks and collaborative events with service providers.

The Millicent Gallery is also housed within the library complex and provides a space for new and emerging local, national and international artists to exhibit their work.

The library continued to operate during the height of COVID-19 restrictions, offering a click and collect service and moving its popular children's story time to an online format.

"There's no doubt that the library helped a lot of people who might have otherwise struggled during COVID," Ms Thomson said.

"For some people, the click and collect service might have been the only contact they

had with a person."

Local Government Association (LGA) president mayor Angela Evans said the organisation has been negotiating a new agreement with the government, but had yet to be provided with any figures.

Ms Evans said the association would not sign off on the arrangement without confirmation of funding for 2021/22 and beyond.

"At a minimum, the LGA wants to see current funding levels maintained, with indexation applied every year for the term of the new agreement," she said.

"Any decrease in libraries funding will be felt by councils and their communities, and especially smaller regional councils that rely on this support to help fund their physical collections."

Wattle Range libraries, tourism and information manager Janice Nitschke AM said a decrease in funding would prompt a review into service delivery across the council-run facilities.

"Libraries are not just about books anymore, we have adapted to the digital needs of the community and we are now a community hub," she said.

"Our programs include Tech Savvy Seniors, local history groups and art exhibitions which not only provide a service, but empowers people so they feel they can contribute.

"All of this is only possible if we are adequately funded."

Ms Nitschke said the retention of existing services would not be possible to maintain unless an additional funding source was secured

- which could require an increase in council funding.

She warned widespread cuts could impact the operation of the OneCard program, which allows users to borrow books from any library across the state at their local library.

"If there are any cuts, it might mean instead of a two day wait for a book community members might wait for one month for a book," she said.

The library has joined a Local Government Association-led campaign which encourages users to email, write or scan a QR code to automatically email MPs supporting the retention of library funds.

A State Government spokesperson did not address a question as to how much funding would be provided under a new agreement.

"The State Government allocates significant funding to libraries each year," the spokesperson said.

"This year's budget is still being finalised and will be handed down in June."

Labor parliamentarian Clare Scriven called on the State Government to immediately commit to long-term funding and ensure the continuation of council-run libraries.

"Our local libraries are fantastic public assets that don't only provide books, but also connect people together and provide important services such as computer and internet services, JP services, and venues for community events," she said.

TAFE SA regional reform

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THE STATE Government will consider the establishment of regional TAFE SA boards after a successful motion introduced by independent MP Troy Bell was unanimously backed in Parliament.

After almost three years of advocacy, the Member for Mount Gambier's push to abolish the centrally-operated TAFE SA board is one step closer as the government indicated it will consider reforming the vocational provider.

Mr Bell's three-part motion also sought a commitment regional TAFE SA campuses be accountable and responsive to country communities.

The long-time campaigner for TAFE SA decentralisation has previously said there is a strong desire to return to local boards of management - similar to the regional health structure that has been established - and investigate opportunities to expand training currently offered in the region.

Labor parliamentarian and former shadow Industry and Skills Minister Clare Scriven said there was value in examining how TAFE SA could better meet the needs of Limestone Coast industry and students.

"There are challenges in regional areas that are totally different to those in Adelaide, and without strong local input, decisions that are made often overlook the local conditions," she said.

"We get better outcomes when the voices of the local community are really embedded in the decision-making, so Labor was pleased to support the motion.

"We need TAFE to be an effective public training provider with strong local support."

Last year, Education Minister John Gardner responded to Mr Bell's questions about TAFE SA and said the organisation was "in the midst of reviewing its structure to improve its business operations."

"This has included an analysis of regional manager positions across the organisation," he said.

"The proposal being consider includes regionally-based positions to respond to local training needs."

At the time, Mr Gardner said he had been advised TAFE SA was consulting with its staff and unions on the proposed restructure and no decisions had been made.

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Timber exports questioned

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SOUTH Australia's peak timber processors association has questioned why log exports out of the Port of Portland have continued amid a nationwide shortage of structural timber.

Demand for sawlog - which is the wood that can be processed into beams, planks or components of timber frames - has skyrocketed across the globe, with the finished product fetching prices 350pc higher than the same time last year in some international markets.

Photographs taken on April 26 at the Port of Portland show what South Australian Timber Processors Association chair David Quill described as "intense activity" at marshalling yards owned and managed by various forest companies.

Images taken on May 17 show what appears to be an increasing amount of log, with other images showing a half-empty wood holding yard.

"Obviously it is going to India because they are pursuing a market as the China ban on log exports continues," Mr Quill said.

Port of Portland chief executive Greg Tremewen said there was "hardly anything" being exported from the Port of Portland and directed questions about volumes to OneFortyOne, HVP Plantations and Timberlands.

While HVP Plantations and Timberlands did not respond for comment, OneFortyOne said it had not exported structural sawlog since 2018 and had exported minimal quantities of pulp log this year.

Earlier this year, the South Australian parliamentary inquiry into the Limestone Coast

timber industry heard there were two definitions of sawlog - with difference hinging on 15cm to 20cm in diameter.

But OneFortyOne executive general manager Australia Cameron MacDonald said a log that meets the diameter specifications of a structural sawlog was unable to be used for construction if it does not meet certain classification requirements.

"A defected log that does not meet all classification requirements for construction is classified as a pulplog," he said.

"India is currently the only export market for OneFortyOne pulplog however due to COVID-19 disruptions there is no export of any log until the end of August."

Mr MacDonald acknowledged while there was a short-term demand for structural sawlog nationwide, mill customers were continuing to receive the resource.

"It is our understating that Green Triangle mills are operating at full capacity," he said.

Australian Forest Products Association deputy chief executive Victor Violante said Green Triangle sawmills had increased production as imported timber has been unable to fill the domestic gap due to global demand for framing.

"The fact is that all the timber framing sawmills in the Green Triangle are already working overtime, double shifts, and weekends at maximum capacity to try to meet the unprecedented demand caused by the COVID pandemic induced building boom which has been spurred on by incentives like Home-Builder," he said.

But Mr Quill said processor association members with sawmilling capacity would work a double shift if the resource was available and term of log supply was sufficient to

justify increasing the workforce.

"There is no doubt provided that there was term associated with supply, some of the smaller processors would start a second shift and they could employ the necessary labour," he said.

"The question that needs to be asked is why are we continuing to export sawlog from this country which would be suitable to meet our building requirements?"

SA-Best parliamentarian Frank Pangallo, who sits on the state-based timber inquiry, has called for an emergency summit next week to discuss the state's timber stock and implications for the shortage.

"The country is desperately short of timber and we are shipping it offshore to India and Korea and eventually it is finding its way to the United States," he said.

"There's actually a worldwide shortage of timber at the moment, but we are feeling it pretty badly here.

"It's almost a repetition of LPG gas, where we were shipping it out cheaply to Japan, its being processed over there and then coming back here at a much more expensive price - it's ludicrous.

"Federal and State Governments need to realise just how important the forestry industry is in Australia.

"It is crucial and unfortunately not many pay attention to it because it's not that visible but it will be when you suddenly can't get buildings and homes completed or even started."

The recently-completed Federal parliamentary committee into the timber supply chain has recommended the establishment of a voluntary code of conduct as well as an index of relevant log prices to facilitate access to timber by softwood processors.

The state-based committee is continuing to hear evidence as part of its inquiry, with a hearing scheduled for June 1.

Growing industry needs big workforce

THE Green Triangle forest industry is gearing up to plant an estimated 27 million trees this season, across 20,000 hectares, comprising around 19.6 million softwood pine seedlings and 7.5 million hardwood blue gums.

It is a labour intensive task that relies on seasonal workers, but Green Triangle Forest Industries Hub chair Ian McDonnell has warned more workers will be needed for the planting season.

Traditionally supplemented by a workforce of foreign backpackers, the industry has relied on domestic seasonal workers since border restrictions were introduced last year due to COVID-19.

Of the 7.5 million blue gum seedlings needed for re-sowing, 3.5 million plants will be provided by Gildera Forestry Services.

Gildera employs nearly 70 staff, including around 40 seasonal workers.

While it has been able to fill most of its current labour needs, Gildera managing director Tim Scanlon said it was always looking for more workers.

"It's a tough one, we've got 70 staff, you would think we would have enough. But we actually need a few more here. But yeah, it can be difficult," he said.

While Mr Scanlon has used job agencies and placed ads on backpacker forums, he tends to rely on word of mouth for attracting new employees.

He also tends to employ people based in the Limestone Coast, which has helped foster more long-term working relationships.

In particular, Mr Scanlon has hired a number of people from the Karenni community living in Mount Gambier.

"Over the years, we've employed a lot of the Karenni Burmese. And they, quite often, are the ones that come back every year. Some of them have been with us for six or seven years. We obviously lose them once they get permanent jobs or whatever. But we've employed a lot of families basically," Mr Scanlon said.

More recently, the new starters have been young Limestone Coast residents, looking to start their working careers, such as Cara Day.

Ms Day is currently in her second year at Gildera.

She works with a cohort of women sorting and grading seedlings along one of the nursery's conveyor belts.

"I absolutely love it, this is my favourite new job," she said.

Mr Scanlon explained it was not as physical as planting seedlings in the field, but re-

quired a strong work ethic to be productive.

While Forest Industries Hub chair Mr McDonnell agreed planting seedlings was indeed physical, he pointed out it paid well.

"This is a very manual and physical job but for those wanting to increase their fitness and earn a good income, working with great people, it can be a rewarding job," he said.



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Freight plan fury

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WATTLE Range mayor Des Noll has again fired shots at the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan after a \$20m windfall from the Federal Government will fund four Victorian arterial roads.

Announced in the 2021/22 Federal Budget, the additional \$20m for the Green Triangle's Roads of Strategic Importance corridors will focus on road upgrades across south-west Victoria, with a focus on roads providing freight connections to the Port of Portland.

In a press release, Green Triangle Freight Action Plan Committee chair and Glenelg Shire deputy mayor Karen Stephens said the funding was testament to the strength of "our cross-border committee members who continue to advocate for our region and its importance on national scale".

But Mr Noll said the funding - which will facilitate upgrades along the Henty Highway, Portland-Casterton Road, Portland-Nelson Road and Princes Highway West - did not include any South Australian roads.

"This confirms my thoughts that the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan Implementation Monitoring Group is simply not working," Mr Noll said.

"For the entire \$20m to be allocated to Western Victoria and shutting South Australia out, is clearly a sign that it is not working.

"Whilst I believe in the concept of the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan and South Australia and Victoria working collaboratively together, it's a total slap in the face for all South Australian stakeholders who are involved in this group and not getting any benefit for their involvement."

Mr Noll believed the interstate campaign required a major independent structure change and a collaborative terms of reference developed for the plan to work effectively and equitably.

"I doubt very much that there are any terms of reference in existence that serves both South Australia and Victoria fairly," he said.

"I requested a copy of this document recently from the chair of the Green Triangle Action Plan, but none was forthcoming."

Mr Noll took aim at the joint state concept last month after Glenelg Shire Council indicated it was unable to commit to a financial contribution to upgrade 14km of Border Road to a sealed standard.

He labelled the Greens Triangle Freight Action Plan as "Victorian-centric" and called for it to be scrapped unless a change of direction occurs.

However, Ms Stephens said the biggest project undertaken by the Green Triangle Freight Action Committee was securing funding for the multi-million dollar Penola Bypass.

"The Green Triangle Freight Action Committee pushed and funded the Penola Bypass, which is the biggest project we had in South Australia," she said.

"We will continue to spend the money where it is needed on road and bridge infrastructure to support the economic growth of industry across the entire region."

But former long-term Wattle Range mayor Peter Gandolfi - who was instrumental in securing funding for both the southern section of the Penola Bypass and the long-awaited stage two corridor - said the committee had no involvement in funding the road.

Mr Gandolfi said prior to his election as mayor in 2010, no funding has been secured for the project other than a verbal agreement between former Wattle Range mayor Don Ferguson and then state Transport Minister Pat Conlon for stage one.

He said the second stage of the bypass was following a meeting with Federal Minister Jamie Briggs, with the Commonwealth Government committing \$9m to the project.

The then Weatherill Government refused

to commit the remaining \$4.5m towards the project, citing implications on untied funding it received from the Federal Government.

Wattle Range were instrumental in lobbying both the State Labor and Liberal Party for a commitment, with the \$4.5m headlining an ambitious pre-election wishlist in the lead up to the 2018 polls.

Both Nick Xenophon and the State Liberal Party committed to funding the bypass if elected to Parliament.

Mr Gandolfi said he had never met the committee during his two-term tenure as mayor.

"Success has many fathers, failure is an orphan," Mr Gandolfi said.

"If the Green Triangle Freight Action Committee claims to be the father, it ran off with its Victorian mistress when the bypass was an infant - it didn't secure any funding."

History shared

ONE of Millicent's pre-eminent historians will discuss events in the year the township was proclaimed as part of an upcoming local history talk.

The Millicent Public Library will host historian Chris Parmenter as he discusses the year that was 1870 on June 1.

Global, national and state-based events will be canvassed by Mr Parmenter at the event, which will be followed by an afternoon tea.

The event will start at 1.30pm and people are encouraged to contact the Millicent Public Library on 8700 0903 to register their attendance.

Seaside funds

A POPULAR seaside festival could return in a modified form, with Wattle Range Council earmarking a \$13,000 contribution for a new event.

Wattle Range Council director development services Emma Clay said council was in discussions with the community to develop a weekend festival similar to the defunct Beachport Festival By The Sea.

"We are looking to reestablish a festival of a similar nature for Beachport to showcase some of the region's produce, particularly now as the Limestone Coast Fishermen's Co-Operative is selling direct to the public," she said.

"Currently we are in discussions with the fishermen and the Beachport District Development Association (BDDA) as we are keen to frame this as a community-driven event to enable groups to fundraise."

While the festival is still in the planning stages, it is likely to be held at the end of the fishing season.

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Positive change plan

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COMMUNITY leaders united last week to discuss how to engage the Limestone Coast with the Department of Social Service's Stop it at the Start campaign, which encourages enforcing positive behaviour in young people across Australia.

Leaders from education, health, not-for-profit, government and private sectors reviewed the campaign's resources and identified what action could be taken within the Limestone Coast to positively influence the attitudes and behaviours of young people around respectful relationships and gender equality.

The national campaign aims to educate and reduce violence against women and children through a series of television advertisements.

The campaign aims to intervene before attitudes and behaviours develop that may lead to violence.

The session held at Mount Gambier City Hall was one of many forums taking place across the country in support of the campaign.

Speaking at the event, campaign community agency officer Emma Devoss said it was focused on behaviour change in regards to prevention rather than supporting those who have already experienced family or domestic violence.

She said the campaign was aimed at developing ideas within communities on how to better work together to promote respect and support young people in developing relationships and respectful relationships within the community.

Now in its third phase, the campaign also encouraged adults to have a positive influence in attitudes and behaviours of young people.

"Unlike a lot of campaigns that are about behavioural change this is a prevention campaign meaning that instead of focusing on supporting people who have already experienced family or domestic violence this campaign tries to address where it comes from and

prevent those behaviours and attitudes before they are formed," Ms Devoss said.

"We know children are like sponges and learn from the world around them and it is the small moments of disrespectful behaviour that we brush off which can add up and bring a viewpoint when they are older that it is okay.

"This stage of the campaign asks for adults to take action in moments where they witness disrespect and just different ways they can make small moments to teach proper behaviours."

Participants also conversed in groups discussing the resources available across the region before being given a suite of tools and resources further assisting how to model positive behaviours and start conversations about respect with young people in their lives.

Ex-nun joins rally

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FORMER nun and voluntary assisted dying advocate Jane Qualmann took her fight for the right to die to the steps of parliament this week, joining hundreds of people to send a united message of support for the bill.

Ms Qualmann stood alongside Labor MLC and bill co-sponsor Kyam Maher, Go Gentle Australia founder Andrew Denton and Member for MacKillop Nick McBride ahead of debate on the bill on Wednesday night.

Debate on the bill started at 7.30pm and was overwhelmingly supported by Lower House MPs, passing the second reading vote 33 to 5.

Mr McBride said his broad support for the bill was borne from life experience and hearing the "enormously difficult stories from others who have had loved ones subjected to unbearable suffering when facing a terminal illness."

"I am supporting an approach that enables people, who are at the end of their life and experiencing intolerable suffering to go peacefully and with dignity, I feel it is their right," he said.

"I want to see situations avoided which traumatise and scar family members forever, after being helpless to assist the prolonged suffering of loved ones who want to end their lives."

If the bill is passed at the third and final stage, voluntary assisted dying will be legal for South Australian residents who are diagnosed with a terminal illness and expects to die within six months or 12 months for a neurodegenerative disease.

The House of Assembly will enter the final stages of debate on June 9.

Celebration of culture across Limestone Coast

INDIGENOUS history and culture is being celebrated across the Limestone Coast as part of National Reconciliation Week.

Launched on Thursday, the region's schools and community groups are leading celebrations around this year's theme 'More than a word', which urges the reconciliation movement towards braver and more impactful action.

Boandik Elder Aunty Michelle Jacqueline-Furr will be the special guest at today's public screening of Kanyini, a compelling documentary delving into more than 40,000 years of culture.

Presented by social welfare agency ac.care at the Main Corner from 1.15pm, the free event is open to all.

Indigenous culture will be highlighted on the big screen at Sir Robert Helpmann Theatre on Monday for Nunga Screen, a series of short films presenting strong women connecting with their culture, forging collective pathways to healing, truth and harmony for themselves and future generations.

Meanwhile, the Mount Gambier Library's Children's Library has been renamed 'the

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'Painful' memories at vigil

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THE final painful and traumatic days of Limestone Coast stalwart Viv Maher were tearfully recounted by her son Kyam at last week's voluntary assisted dying vigil.

The Labor heavyweight held back tears as he told a crowd of around 60 voluntary euthanasia supporters at the Mount Gambier event of his mother's final days following her decision to stop cancer treatments.

"I remember on the morning of August 11, 2017 and the afternoon before, when my mother was towards the end of her battle with pancreatic cancer," Mr Maher said.

"She brought myself, my brothers and my dad to Ashford Hospital where she was at the time and told us that she had enough and couldn't take the pain she was in.

"She didn't want anymore treatment, we very much wanted a way to end the suffering there and then, but that wasn't legally possible.

"Without a legal way for that to happen, she spent the next week essentially wasting away, not getting continued medical treatment and not getting the food and water to sustain life.

"I remember the morning after she made that decision and being in the room with my three boys - which was the last time they saw their grandmother - and then watching her waste away.

"It's not right, it's not dignified and that's why at that moment I knew supporting wasn't enough anymore.

"I had to do everything in my power to make this a reality in South Australia."

Mr Maher's landmark bill to legalise voluntary assisted dying in South Australia was introduced into the House of Assembly on Wednesday evening and if supported by a majority of members, will become legislation.

The bill is based on the Victorian scheme which has been in place for two years and was passed by a majority of Upper House parliamentarians last month.

"Victoria has been running for two years, Western Australia starts the scheme in July and Tasmania has just passed legislation, so in some ways it becomes an equity issue.

"Two states are very, very near east and west to us and both states allow their citizens to die

with dignity if they have a terminal illness and are suffering intolerable pain.

"That is what this legislation does for South Australia."

Mr Maher headlined a diverse range of voluntary assisted dying supporters at the candlelight vigil, including Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell, Liberal MP Nick McBride, Christians Supporting Choice for Voluntary Assisted Dying Reverend Michael Dowling and Mount Gambier resident Jane Qualmann, who is in the final stages of neurogenic bowel syndrome.

Ms Qualmann praised Mr Maher's advocacy, telling the Labor MP "Mount Gambier is immensely proud of you for pushing such an important law forward".

"Kyam's strength and courage has encouraged me and many others to try and lobby for this change and give people the opportunity to die with dignity," she said.

"I have been very blessed to have been able to give a voice to voluntary assisted dying and to everyone who has suffered."

Reverend provides religious view

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A MEMBER of the clergy has rejected theological interpretations used by Christian opponents of voluntary euthanasia, saying arguments using the Bible are "so lacking in substance they are forced to use illogic and misrepresentation".

In a stirring speech at last week's voluntary euthanasia vigil, Christians Supporting Choice for Voluntary Assisted Dying Reverend Michael Dowling told the crowd there was nothing in the Bible regarding the contentious subject.

Reverend Dowling said opponents often relied on generalities, with anti-voluntary assisted dying arguments based on the Commandment in the Old Testament "Thou shalt not kill".

He said the misrepresentation of the commandment - the prohibition against murdering someone compared to someone who is asking for suffering to end - was wilful and egregious.

"A better translation from Hebrew is indeed 'Thou shalt not murder'," Reverend Dowling said.

"If Christians over the centuries had actually followed that as a commandment rather than a guideline, they can push away when convenient, Christians wouldn't have slaughtered other Christians and non-Christians in wars and slaughtered people and inquisitions.

"In the Gospels, there is nothing specific

about what Jesus said - voluntary assisted dying is not covered in it.

"But we can get a hint on how Jesus engaged with those who suffered. "Reading the Gospels, it would appear that Jesus had few limitations when it came to healing and suffering.

"Sadly, our modern medical science has many limitations and sometimes someone is dying and that is all there is.

"I wonder, would Jesus not look at someone in pain and suffering whose suffering could not be relieved and would he not feel moved in his gut with compassion for that?"

Reverend Dowling said rejected notions held by religious and ideological opponents that voluntary assisted dying is intrinsically evil, saying ending a person's life with the primary intent of relieving pain was a compassionate choice.

"If you have had pets, you may have had that very painful visit to the vet when your animal is dying and suffering and the vet says that suffering will only get worse," he said.

"Now mentally transpose the dying animal who suffers with a dying human being who suffers.

"Here we see the illogic in what was seen as an act of compassion - the case of putting a dear animal out of their suffering - now on the part of people opposed religiously to voluntary assisted dying is seen as an act of evil.

"Unlike the animal, they ask for that suffering to end and suddenly what was an act of compassion in the case is now evil."

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EDITOR'S COMMENT

LIBRARIES have long been gateways to knowledge and culture, providing a fundamental role in helping people learn and communicate.

Now more than ever, it is disingenuous judge library's value to its community simply by its books.

The facilities have moved far beyond being simply book depositories, with libraries across the region developing into community hubs by providing safe, welcoming spaces for meetings and information exchange.

Loaning resources is no longer the central role of a library, with the council-run facilities providing a range of services for all members of the community, including children and their parents, teenagers, adults and senior citizens.

But the much more important role public libraries play, particularly in the digital age, is one that contributes to community empowerment and lifelong learning.

Libraries provide free access to high-speed internet - often difficult to obtain away from urban centres - and other technological resources that help peoples' ability to fully participate in employment, education and other aspects of society.

However, the inability to quantify the sociologic and psychological benefits of libraries among users is likely a reason why cuts or long-term freezes to funding can be quantified by the State Government.

If the government chooses not to provide long-term funding to the state's public libraries, the only option is to reduce service provision or seek funding sources from elsewhere.

While some libraries will manage their existing resources, funding cuts may result in just one activity each holiday or one gallery launch per year. Some libraries will lobby their respective councils to fund the shortfall, adding to a long list of cost-shifting exercises from the State Government to local government.

The State Government should not only commit to a long-term funding plan akin to the current arrangement but increase in line with CPI to secure the viability of the imperative community facilities into the future.

No shame in support

ONE of the things that COVID taught us in 2020 was that anyone, regardless of their financial or employment status, is only one or two major life events away from disaster.

This unprecedented global pandemic changed the way life was lived for much of last year, and into 2021.

For many, this disaster triggered a partial or complete loss of income, job security, and in some cases, a place to live or food on the table.

Whilst many were supported by government, there were also many who fell through the cracks and managed to find their way to The Salvation Army.

While you would expect that the majority of those reaching out to the Salvos would be the most vulnerable and marginalized in society, in fact there were more and more people knocking on the Salvo's door for the first time.

Some had even donated to us in the past, but now found themselves on the receiving end of a food hamper or assistance to pay their rent.

COVID-19 has highlighted, and allowed us

Conversely, they may also hate what they see!



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
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Family honours 'lost' mum

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AFTER six decades without a permanent memorial, a new headstone and grave marks the plot of former Mount Gambier woman Edna May Gordon.

A poignant memorial recently took place at Mount Gambier's Lake Terrace Cemetery as Ms Gordon's children remembered their mother who was laid to rest in a 'paupers grave' after suddenly dying at 42 years old.

The occasion was one of mixed emotions for the family, who were placed into state care following the death of their mother in November 1957 due to being illegitimate children.

Newspaper reports at the time said the children, who ranged from two to 10 years of age, claimed the family had "practically no clothing" and were found with "a man who had been living with their mother".

"Mum and Dad were not married, Dad had previously been married and took up with Mum, which was totally shunned upon back then," son Robert Curnow said.

"Dad tried to get us - in the only family court case that went back to State Parliament at the time - but he couldn't because of the law.

"The court committed us to an institution and we got sent to Adelaide - the boys aged five years or older went to Glandore Boys Home and my brother Peter and the girls went to Seaforth Home."

Mr Curnow, who was aged nine at the time, said his siblings were not cognisant of their mother's death and their separation in the aftermath.

"For quite a few years, we basically ignored the whole situation because we didn't know what had happened," he said.

"I was nine and our older sister was 10, so we had no real idea what went on because it was such a flurry of people moving.

"Dad came to visit us at the boy's home, but there was nothing he could do, so he told us he had to leave and we didn't see him again.

"After time in Glandore, we were fostered out to other people - some of us got along and some of us didn't, but eventually myself and my three brothers were adopted into one family."

The family was largely separated for the better part of 30 years before Mr Curnow started a quest to find his three sisters and youngest brother.

Unable to directly access government records, Mr Curnow sought the help from not-for-profit organisations to find his siblings - including younger brother Peter Putsey - who was 27 months old when the family was separated.

In the early 90s, Mr Putsey received a phone call from Community Services advising him that his brother and sister were looking for him.

"I was silent and all I heard was a gasp and someone saying 'you don't know, do you'," Mr Putsey said. "They said I had five brothers and two sisters and until then, I had no idea.

"It was hard for me because I had a terrific upbringing but my family had some very different lives - some very poor, some were involved in the National Redress Scheme after being sexually, mentally and physically abused."

A majority of the family reunited in Adelaide in 1993, but were yet to find their oldest sister and the whereabouts of their father.

The family found out their father had passed away just one year earlier and was also buried in a pauper's grave in a mass site near Albury.

Ultimately, the family found their oldest sister Ronda and the next year, all eight brothers and sisters were reunited for the first time in almost 50 years.

"We would have loved for our Dad to have been with us at the reunion, because we know Mum would have been there in spirit," Mr Curnow said.

"After we all met, we decided as a family we should all contribute for getting Mum a grave top because for all of those years, she never had one. "While we had other mother's after our mum passed away, our love for her never died.

"We wanted to make sure before we pass, we could honour her by putting a grave top and a headstone on her final resting place."

Mr Curnow, Mr Putsey and their family members travelled from Adelaide to Mount Gambier last week to see the results of their efforts in procuring a grave covering.

"Mum's death was a significant loss to us all and we are pleased with the fact that after 63

years, I can look at Mum's grave and feel we have given her the best we could and we are happy for her now," Mr Curnow said.

"All of us have had different lives - we were fostered, adopted and then we were free and we have all learnt that life is not easy and you have to make your own opportunities.

"We are glad to have had the opportunity to give Mum dignity in death."

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Eagles eye overhaul: Clubrooms upgrade

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WATTLE Range Council has encouraged community groups to engage with local government through deputations and meetings to help shape future budget priorities.

Among the most recent groups to present to council was Penola Football Netball Club, with president Marcus Devereux outlining the club's desire to overhaul its changeroom facilities.

While council has formed its 2021/22 draft budget and business plan, which is currently open to public consultation, the deputation was welcomed by council with chief executive Ben Gower.

"Deputations help elected members with decision-making and what the needs of the community are," Mr Gower said.

"We get a deputation every third meeting or so and with the draft budget now released, we will be holding a specific hour aside for deputations clearly coherent with the budget."

Mr Gower said while some requests exceeded council's ability to help, elected members were happy to steer organisations in the right direction.

Among the potential funding pathways for major projects, such as the Penola Football Netball Club upgrade, slated in the 2021/22 council budget is a \$100,000 pool for community infrastructure grants.

Mr Devereux's approach to council included a request for support to replace the downstairs changerooms at McCorquindale Park, which the club president said were built in the 1970's and were in dire need of an upgrade to accommodate growth.

He said the upstairs section of the clubrooms also required improvements given this area is close to 30 years old and is regularly used.

Mr Devereux explained the club's main focus was to ensure the future facilities catered

for all users, including an increase in women's football participation.

"We now have both genders out there in the region playing football and the local schools also use these facilities, which are now outdated," Mr Devereux said.

"We have brainstormed a plan of what we wanted and how we are going to fund it and have been working on this for close to five years now."

The club president said he felt buoyed following his council deputation, stating the club was heading in the right direction for the future of McCorquindale Park.

"We need council's support on this because we are a small sporting club and can't fund the complete project ourselves," he said.

"We need to know whether we are able to get the funding so we can match dollar for dol-

lar down the line and we are confident that we can get our \$200,000 in place before December, provided we get funding from the council as well."

Mr Devereux said the proposed upgrades would modernise the venue and improve its status as an events hub.

"It would open up avenues for other sporting and community bodies to come to Penola," he said.

"Because we are so central to the South East, we are perfect to host events or meetings and this upgrade gives us better facilities to do so."

Students switched to offline

PENOLA High School senior students will no longer be able to access their mobile devices during school hours under a new policy now enforced at the education facility.

Under the policy, students must not use their personal devices, including phones, smart watches, tablets and laptops, during school hours in a move to further prevent distractions and increase student safety by limiting unfiltered internet access.

Students who do not comply with the new policy risk suspension under a three-step warning system adopted by the school.

Staff will work with students to implement the new rules with all devices brought on school grounds to remain locked in students' lockers throughout the day.

The policy has been implemented following discussions between staff and the school's governing council, which also sought community feedback.

In a message to parents through the school's May 20 newsletter, principal Lesley Okholm said while the policy appeared harsh towards students, she said there was significant evidence worldwide that allowing mobile phones in the school environment was problematic.

"Most certainly we see distraction and time wasting as hugely impactful at Penola High School, especially at senior secondary level in study lessons," Ms Okholm said.

Ms Okholm said since the removal of mobile phone use for Year 8-10 students last term, staff had reported less bullying, more attention to task and deeper listening and learning.

The new rules will be reviewed at one leadership and staff meeting in the first term of each year.

Council puts wheels in motion for car park plan

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SMOOTHER road access and improved wheelchair facilities are among proposed upgrades to Rymill Hall car park.

Wattle Range Council is currently seeking community feedback on a plan to improve site's car park, which a Penola Pastoral Agricultural and Horticultural Show Society spokesperson has labelled as dangerous in its current state.

Among the proposed works include repairs to a number of potholes and uneven surfaces around the hall while site drainage and guest access to the hall and newly-installed Warner Pavilion Shed will also be improved.

Council stated the proposed design would improve the surface, maximise parking and increase pedestrian safety.

Show society secretary Kathy Fennell said the improvements would be a wonderful addition to the area following a string of upgrades within the site.

"It will be much easier for cattle trucks to enter the area during the show as there will be a lot more room," Ms Fennell said.

"From the plan we were given there will also be a storage shed on the south-western side of the facilities that the society can share with other sporting groups."

Ms Fennell said the society backed the proposed upgrades, labelling the current state of the car park as dangerous.

"There are bits of road hanging out and

bumps all around," she said.

"It is no wonder someone has not fallen over yet, but the drains also need to be fixed."

The project follows the demolition of the 60-year-old Warner Pavilion Shed and construction of a new fully-powered replacement venue, which was used heavily during the Penola Coonawarra Acoustic Music Gathering held earlier this year.

Ms Fennell said the improved shed would be an important addition to the McCorquindale Park space as it supplied cover during the winter months.

"During the show the petting zoo will be held there and some of the cattle will also be hosted there," she said.

"We will also be able to have some agricultural equipment on display as well."

It is hoped the new facility would also be used by a number of community markets. Ms Fennell said the society was eager to use the new pavilion and extend its community use.

"It can be used for the sports clubs if they wanted to train undercover and really it is open to anyone," Ms Fennell said.

"We do charge a hire fee for those outside the McCorquindale Park members but it is available for event hire."

Council is inviting public comment on its proposed Rymill Hall car park upgrade until June 9.

Construction will not start until a budget has been allocated.

Stance eases

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MILLICENT'S peak business association has softened its hardline stance on shop trading hour deregulation, following hanging demographics and a Mount Gambier supermarket offering twice-daily home delivery to the township.

Debate over the town's unique retail regime has reignited following Treasurer Rob Lucas introducing a Bill for a referendum of shop trading hours to be held on the same day as next year's state election.

Millicent is the only regional town in the state where supermarkets larger than 400 square metres - Woolworths Millicent and Foster's Foodland - are unable to open Sundays, public holidays and past 6pm on weekdays.

While owners of Foster's and Millicent IGA remain vehemently opposed to any change to the status quo, Millicent Business Community Association chair Lee Morgan said the group had embraced an "enlightened" view in light of changing dynamics within the community.

"We have changed our position slightly where we are recognising the dynamic in Millicent has changed somewhat, where we are seeing new people and new arrangements," he said.

"The world has changed, especially since COVID, which has brought in another dimension such as online shopping.

"There are a whole lot of factors that may mean a change in thinking and a change in the conversation."

Mr Morgan acknowledged the popularity of Coles delivery service to Millicent, which

provides residents with groceries at designated time slots.

Since the supermarket started the service, it is understood the delivery frequency has increased to seven days a week at either morning or afternoon slots.

Coles did not respond to requests from The Border Watch about the frequency of deliveries, whether the service was available to outlying areas or if there was scope to further increase the number of deliveries to Millicent.

"We do know Coles have increased their home delivery schedule to Millicent and that is why we have changed our stance," Mr Morgan said.

"We also know Millicent has a major catchment area stemming from Robe, Clay Wells and Lucindale and we need to work to keep those people here instead of them diverting to Mount Gambier."

Mr Morgan expressed disappointment with what he termed as the State Government's lack of consultation on shop trading hours and said the group was concerned about the statewide referendum proposal.

"We don't need to go to a referendum, we need informed people making informed decisions," he said.

"Whether it is getting SafeWork SA, a ministerial advisor, the supermarkets, council and the Millicent Business Community Association together so we can work a way forward and legislate something that might be a bit better."

Treasurer Lucas said the elevation of the issue to the first state referendum in more than 30 years was not taken lightly, saying the current legislation was "completely and utterly broken".

MP not committed to deregulation vote

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MEMBER for MacKillop Nick McBride has refused to address questions on whether he will cross the floor in the unlikely event the State Government's proposed shop trading hour referendum bill progresses to the Lower House.

The State Government's retail referendum push is at odds with the Liberal MP's Millicent constituents, who have twice voted in support of the most restrictive trading hours in regional South Australia.

At an event in Millicent held in June 2018, Mr McBride told Millicent community members he would not vote against the then deregulation proposal as it would not change the vote.

However since that time two Liberal MPs have moved to the crossbench, with the government having just 23 of the 24 votes required in the House of Assembly to pass legislation.

Mr McBride said he supported the views of Millicent residents and their desire to maintain the current shop trading arrangements, adding he sought to ensure any new shop trading legislation has the flexibility to maintain the town's status quo by working through the Liberal Party room.

But Treasurer Rob Lucas has said there will be no carve outs, saying the current legislation was a "completely haphazard implementation of shop trading hours across the board".

Mr McBride said the progress of the Bill would depend on the support of Labor and the five-member crossbench in the state's Upper House and he would "watch with interest".

However, he would not be drawn to comment on whether he would support the Bill if it gained majority support in the Legislative Council.

Labor parliamentarian Clare Scriven said the state opposition was opposed to total deregulation and she was unable to see any way the party would back the referendum.

The Greens have indicated its two Upper House MLCs will not support the Bill and labelled the proposal as a waste of money.

SA-Best parliamentarian Frank Pangallo, who hosted a shop trading hours forum in Millicent, said the party's position had not changed since voting against the government's original deregulation bill in 2018.

"We are cognisant of the impact it would have on Millicent," he said.

"We believe it would not only hurt the strong independents we now have in South Australia, but it would open the door to increases in your groceries.

"If you ask the people are you prepared to pay more for your shopping by having deregulated shopping hours, what do you think the answer will be?

"This furphy about creating more jobs won't be the case at all, because you are just going to spread the shopping all out."

Millicent free meal initiative praised

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A NEW supermarket-led free meal initiative aimed at addressing food security in Millicent has been praised in the state's Legislative Council.

In this week's parliamentary sitting, Labor parliamentarian Clare Scriven told the chamber of Millicent IGAs attempt to fight hunger in the township by offering free meals to community members.

The scheme has been launched by New Heaven Indian Restaurant owner Sukhchain Dhaliwal - who is also a part owner and manager of Millicent IGA - and is available every Monday evening.

Residents are able to pick up a free meal from a designated fridge in the store's foyer which has been cooked by Mr Dhaliwal and

made with ingredients donated by IGA and New Heaven Indian Restaurants.

Since launching the initiative last month, the number of meals have doubled from 30 to 60.

"Sukhi as he is known... often talks of his gratitude to the people of the Millicent area for their support and love since he moved to Millicent and now he wants to give back to the community," Ms Scriven said.

"Sukhi says that as the free service has become known, it has really highlighted how many people there are in need in the area.

"It also highlights the importance of small business in regional towns such as Millicent.

"Sukhi saw a need, saw the opportunity to help and made it happen."

The initiative is based of a Sikh practice referred to as langar, which serves vegetar-

ian meals to community members free of charge.

"In our tradition in India, langar is available in every Sikh temple 24/7 all over the world," Mr Dhaliwal said.

"I want to bring that tradition to Millicent to show my culture and to thank the community who have always helped us."

In addition to the free meal initiative, the store will donate a portion of its takings each month to a community member or community group in need.

"Small businesses invest in their local neighbourhoods - their profits don't go to big multinationals," Ms Scriven said.

"They support other small businesses and back their local communities as Sukhi is doing.

"This Parliament should be baking him in return."

Among those taking up the challenge, which raises critical funds for mental health support services, is Active8 Gym group member Sam Benton who looks forward to sharing the workload with teammates.

While she knew of the challenge for years, Ms Benton said this year was the first time she would take on the challenge.

"I had just come off a six week gym challenge at Active8 and my personal trainer had created a group for us to do it," Ms Benton said.

"We decided all the money we would raise will go towards our local Headspace because we know the effort they put into hosting much needed events here in Mount Gambier."

Ms Benton said the challenge was a good

opportunity to continue her fitness while also raising awareness and money for Headspace and mental health.

"I am also the secretary of the Mount Gambier and District Suicide Prevention Network so mental health is something close to my heart," she said.

"We work really hard to try and break the stigma around suicide and mental health in general which is a very important cause.

"Promoting mental health is so important because everyone goes through something in life and to varying degrees and it is important to normalise these conversations around mental health and suicide."

Headspace Mount Gambier community liaison worker Nick McInerney said excitement was building for this year's push-up challenge.

"After the success of last year's challenge, we were rapt by the support from our community," Mr McInerney said.

We are hoping the community can continue to get behind this challenge again to learn some mental health facts, get active and raise some funds to promote the well-being of young people in the community."

Help behind the wheel

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A SHORT course helping to give learner drivers experience behind the wheel and insight into licence testing has been strongly supported by Limestone Coast residents.

Mount Gambier's TAFE SA campus recently held two fully booked Prepare to Drive short courses, which allowed several young drivers to obtain their learner's permit through an alternative route to the traditional Services SA test.

Participants were also given valuable insight in driving skills and knowledge by trained professionals.

TAFE SA Limestone Coast education pathways manager Tania Plunkett said the program supported people who struggled in a test environment or with anxiety.

"The test is performed in a comfortable setting that does not feel like a test and really takes a lot of the pressure off the students," Ms Plunkett said.

"Students are able to come in with a support worker if they feel they need to and it also brings a lot of benefits to the community because it helps people achieve their goals to get their learners, helps them improve their employment opportunities and chances."

Ms Plunkett said the large interest in the program demonstrated a need within the community for the course.

She said there was also evidence of further volunteers needed within the region to assist those struggling to perform the hours needed.

"From various meetings with the

community it has shown us there is a need for volunteers to help people get their hours and help the learner drivers get their experience," she said.

South Australian learner drivers must complete 75 hours of recorded driving, as well as 15 hours of nighttime driving, before being eligible to apply for a Provisional-1 licence.

Khristopher Hood, who participated in the course earlier this year, believed there was a need for more volunteer-based driving support services to help learner drivers accumulate the required hours under guidance.

"It is good to be able to drive my own car and go out and do what I need to do," Mr Hood said.

"I have friends that are also helping me out with my hours and it is good because I can go where I need to but what I think we do need more of is volunteers to help out because it can be hard to find someone to drive with me when a lot of people are at work all day."

Mr Hood praised the TAFE SA short course, hoping it remained a fixture within regional areas.

"A lot of people cannot get into Services SA and having the 20-plus people in the classroom at a time rather than the five or so makes it much easier," he said.

"I found the course was really well run and it did not feel like a test at all, it was more like a one-on-one as well as a classroom environment and was very laid back."

The next courses will be held at Mount Gambier's TAFE SA campus on June 15 and at Millicent Football Club on June 16 with registrations necessary.

Roundwood on cutting edge

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FARMERS, government representatives and industry leaders converged at Tantanoola's Roundwood Solutions to view to a world-first timber post treatment facility which converts residue into biochar.

More than 40 people attended the company's biochar and timber post plant tour to hear the new treatment option for posts which solves common disposal issues and brings a slew of environmental benefits.

Roundwood Solutions managing director Steve Telford said the company's creosote-based wood preservative - Tanapost - was a carbon-neutral fencing product which is both environmentally friendly and approved by the Environmental Protection Authority.

Mr Telford said Tanapost was the only timber fencing product that has been treated all the way through the entire product, ensuring more durable product with a longer life and increased safety benefits for users.

The product, which was a finalist in the Premier's Climate Change Council 2020 SA Climate Change Leaders Awards, aims to replace the current toxic treated timber products with no end of life answer.

"We take a sustainable log which is soaking up carbon, we use a carbon-based wood preservative, we send it out to the market and at its end of life, we say to the market we will take it back rather than the consumer trying to put it in landfill or finding some other costly method of disposing of it," Mr Telford said.

"It is the complete circular economy at work, with the end result being part of a bigger picture.

"No other company is currently doing what we are doing and we are here as an example to all other companies in the industry to look at our business model and how to implement it in their own business."

Mr Telford said the posts could be repurposed at the facility's on-site boiler, extracting the heat and energy to produce biochar.

He said added to soil, biochar holds and slowly releases water and fertiliser which can be used to make soil more productive.

"Biochar, at the very least, is carbon soap for the next 1000 years and has a number of benefits particularly in agriculture, where it saves water and fertiliser in pasture," Mr Telford said.

"This gives farmers better bang for their buck per acre, whether it is what they grow or how many head they stock per acre."

Mr Telford said in addition to reducing emissions, the move to a carbon-neutral operation would also result in economic benefits.

"Carbon is the new language in politics and economics and carbon is emerging as a form of currency," he said.

"We will get carbon credits because of our model and the fact we make biochar.

"This business is one of those places people could invest in to offset their own carbon emissions because we are carbon neutral."

Wattle Range Mayor Des Noll praised the company and said it demonstrated the council region was "open for business to all industries and businesses".

"This is a great example of a company taking responsibility for its product and being part of the environmental solution," he said.

"Wattle Range Council is a great supporter of businesses like Roundwood Solutions which is at the forefront of carbon-neutral industry."

Keeping plants alive this winter

WHEN winter rocks around we can sometimes forget that our indoor plants may need different care than they did in summer.

One of the most common problems with indoor plants is over-watering, especially in the cooler months.

Another issue in winter is that plants, both indoors and outdoors, tend to need less fertiliser and nutrients because they grow more slowly during a period of rest.

If you have suspicions that a plant has been over-watered, remove it from the pot and start by taking away the wet, smelly soil and rotting roots.

Re-pot the plant in dry soil and prune any yellow leaves.

Finding sunlight can be a challenge in winter but indoor plants thrive when they get that little bit of afternoon sun.

It's important to look at the sunlight requirements of each individual plant because they all differ.

And remember plants love warmth in winter but extremes can also cause an unhappy plant, so it's best not to leave your plant near any cold draughts or on top of a heater vent.

So what are some of the best plants for winter you ask?

Well here's a bit of a list.

First off, aloe vera thrives in light throughout the year, so if it gets enough it will flower nicely in winter. They do need good drainage soil and bright light where possible.

The second is a never fail plant, perfect for beginners and it goes by the name of a snake plant. It loves any condition, heaps of sunlight or partial shade and very rarely needs repotting.

Third on the list is of course cacti of any species because they hold water and nutrients, so they can be watered spasmodically and are the perfect winter companion.

Not only does the next plant look good, it is easy to care for. A fiddle-leaf fig enjoys temperatures of 18 to 25 degrees and can cope with bright to medium light exposure. You can also let the soil nearly dry out before watering again.

And for something a little bit bigger in size, try a rubber tree and no that doesn't mean fake. Rubber trees grow into a two and a half metre tree and make the perfect foliage. The soil needs to dry out before watering again and they can't get enough of room temperatures that sit between 15 to 26 degrees.

Hopefully these tips and tricks will help keep your plants alive this winter or might inspire you to invest in some greenery this year.

Prepare the rose garden

AT OUR rose farm we've started our busiest season, with thousands of rose plants to be dug out every day, pruned, graded and prepared for dispatch.

I personally grade all the plants we grow and put aside what I think is not good enough for our high quality standards; the plants that don't make our selection will never reach the market.

While we are doing this, we are also preparing the field and the soil for next year's production, cutting and de-eyeing the rootstock for the new rose plants.

If you have ordered bare root roses for this winter, you should now be preparing the soil for their arrival in July/August.

We know some chain stores are already selling bare root roses now, but at Wagner's we believe plants should stay in the ground as long as they can, to develop a stronger root system; it's only when the weather is cold and the rose plants naturally stop flowering and producing leaves that they are ready to be dug out and transported.

So, while you're waiting for your winter roses, prepare the area where you want to plant them following these simple steps.

1) Firstly, decide which kind of soil you have.

- Clay soil has poor drainage and a very high PH. This means that you will need to improve the drainage by adding Gypsum and reduce the alkaline by adding organic material or elemental sulphur. Well-aged compost, manures and organic fertilisers will be also essential.
- Sandy soil will drain too quickly and will not retain enough water and nutrients for your plants. Here you will need to introduce more organic material such as well-aged compost, manures and organic fertiliser.
- If the organic content of the soil is too high, the acidity could also be too high, this can be remedied by adding agricultural lime or dolomite. Roses prefer a soil with a PH of 6.5; a little higher or lower is OK.

2) Dig a hole and till over the soil very well making sure to aerate and loosen roots, but do not damage the roots of existing rose plants.

3) Check if you have sufficient drainage by dig-

ging a 30cm hole and filling it with water. The water should take approximately 15min to drain away, not faster and not slower.

4) Add bone meal, blood meal or NPK (Nitrogen, Phosphorous, Potassium) at the bottom of the hole, cover it with a little bit of soil and let it sit for few weeks, before planting your rose. This will create a good reserve of fertiliser for your new rose plant.

5) Do not replace a rose with another rose. If you need to do this in your garden, while digging out the old rose you must take half a wheelbarrow load of soil with it.

You can then replace the soil from another part of your garden that has not had a rose involved.

This will ensure the new rose will settle in the spot comfortably.

New life for flowers

Are dried flowers all they are cracked up to be?

In my opinion, drying your flowers gives you double the amount of use as just keeping them fresh.

They can be used for crafts (pressed flowers), but they can also make lovely gifts and most commonly, be used as decor.

So how does one dry a flower?

The most common method is to hang and air dry. This is usually done for bouquets and larger flowers.

- **Step 1:**
Remove all leaves from the stems of the flowers.
- **Step 2:**
You can hang them individually or group them together in a bunch (tie with a rubber band/string).

- **Step 3:**
Attach them to a hanging stick, hook, or coat hanger (just has to be something that can hang and is strong enough to hold the flowers). You want to hang the flowers upside down.
- **Step 4:**
Hang the flowers in a cool, dark place to dry out.
- **Step 5:**
Leave the flowers to dry for a few weeks. A good indication that they are finished drying is if you can easily snap a stem.

For smaller flowers you can also press them. You can do this by placing them in an old book or buying an actual flower press. You can research flower pressing more if this looks like something you would rather do than air drying.

Water funds scooped up

A PROJECT that aims to bring together industry, environmental groups, First Nations people and the broader community to ensure water security in the Limestone Coast has received a \$500,000 State Government grant.

Under the lead of the Limestone Coast Landscape Board, the holistic, multi-part project will roll out water use concepts at various stages of development, underpinned by managing the regions' water resources.

The board has received a further \$350,000 under the government's Landscape Priorities Fund to improve the control of feral deer in the region.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board chair Penny Schulz said the Making Every Drop project sought to improve the availability of water for both environmental and economic outcomes by attempting to reduce the loss of fresh water to the sea.

"The project aims to retain more water in the landscape to recharge aquifers, improve water retention in wetlands and the medium to long-term view would be to make some of that water available to industry as well," she said.

"First we will look at groundwater dependent ecosystems and trial groundwater

retention - holding water in the landscape on a smaller scale. "We hope to measure the feasibility of holding the water and if it does recharge the aquifer, if it does improve wetland ecosystems and look at new infrastructure, alternative water sources and drainage management options that can help make that groundwater retention easier." Ms Schulz said the fully-funded deer project will facilitate the development of a statewide deer distribution map and remove satellite infestations of deer in priority biodiversity and agricultural areas.

The grant will also provide funding for ground shooting contractors for rapid response.

Environment Minister David Speirs said the fund - which is funded from landscape levies (formerly known as Natural Resources Management or NRM Levy) collected in the metropolitan area - demonstrated the government's commitment to a decentralised approach to natural resources management.

"The Landscape Priorities Fund is a significant change to how Landscape levies are collected and distributed and will deliver practical projects which wouldn't have been possible under the old system," he said.

Region hosts major dairy event

MOUNT Gambier will host the annual DairySA Innovation Day next month, exposing local producers to the latest advances in the dairy industry.

Limestone Coast dairy farmer and Dairy SA Innovation Day chair Andrew Cavill said the June 9 event, held at The Barn, would focus on touchstone issues currently impacting the industry.

"The traditional landscape is changing for today's dairy farm business, with increased pressures on boosting milk production whilst at the same time committing to sustainability for the long term," Mr Cavill said.

DairyBio program leader and principal research scientist for Agriculture Victoria, Dr Jennie Pryce, will speak at the event and explain how farmers can achieve more fertile, productive and healthy herds by unlocking genetic gains.

Similarly, DataGene chief executive Dr Matthew Shaffer will provide insight into how Limestone Coast dairy farmers can apply specific technology to help drive genetic gains in their own herds.

Other presentations explore pasture management, cow lactation issues and colostrum management and its impact on the health and growth of dairy calves.

Dairy Australia managing director Dr David Nation will also deliver a presentation on the state of the industry.

The event will end with the popular Innovation Day Dinner with Ben James, from

Plenty in store at saleyards

THE region's livestock producers continue to experience strong sales and favourable weather conditions this month, with the Mount Gambier and District Saleyards netting record yarding numbers.

Combined Agents chair Sam O'Connor believes the sector remains "in a very positive state" as sales and prices continuing to trend upwards.

Store sales in particular are experiencing record numbers as producers take advantage of high cattle prices - with last fortnight's store sale at Glenburnie yarding over 4000 head.

"The appetite for smaller cattle is just insatiable, NSW farmers just can't get enough... so our local producers are selling their stock younger and smaller and taking advantage of the great prices," Mr O'Connor said.

The current demand is being driven by a nation-wide cattle herd rebuild, particularly through New South Wales, as farmers look to replenish their stock after two years of drought-induced decline.

With the exception of parts of Western Australia, most cattle producing regions across Australia have also seen improved seasonal conditions.

Above average rainfall in the northern parts of Australia, along with exceptional rains throughout NSW, has left many farmers throughout these regions with an abundance

of feed, which has also helped drive demand.

According to Meat & Livestock Australia, cattle numbers fell to 24.6 million head in 2020, the lowest levels since the early 1990s.

Numbers are expected to rebound by 2pc in 2021, as the national cattle herd enters into a rebuild phase.

But Mr O'Connor said it was a "double edged sword", with the strong store sales at the Mount Gambier and District Saleyards impacting the fat market sale numbers.

Consequently, while store sale numbers are historically high now, they are expected to be lean over the next 12 months, as large num-

bers of stock continue to be sold and moved north, out of the Limestone Coast.

"I think that our cattle numbers, although they're historically very high now, I think for the next 12 months they'll probably be historically low," Mr O'Connor said.

"Because we've forward sold so many cattle that normally wouldn't come onto the market until the spring time," he added.

Yet, despite the slowing store sale forecasts, Limestone Coast producers still look to be in good shape with favourable weather conditions delivering the traditional Anzac Day seasonal break, which should help producers

secure feed into the summer.

"We were lucky enough to get what we'd now consider to be the break a few weeks ago with good rainfall, and since then, we've had steady follow up rains," Mr O'Connor said.

"We'd love to see another good rain event in the next couple of weeks now, to really solidify that break, but certainly, I think we've had the break in the season and it's been a good one so far."

THE 2021 Ford Ranger Raptor X has major styling changes including over the top stripes running along the bonnet, roof and tailgate as well as side stripes.

The grille, door handles, rear bumper cover, tailgate handle, fender vent and foglight bezel will be given a new matte black finish.

While the wheels remain the same, they have been given an Asphalt Black matte finish.

Its Ford Performance interior features a new accent package with red contrast stitching on the steering wheel and dash replacing the original blue stitching, while Hydrographic and Black Alley accents across the dashboard and door round out the interior enhancements.

The Ranger Raptor X is powered by a 157kW/500Nm Bi-Turbo engine through a 10-speed automatic transmission.

It has a Terrain Management System, which includes Baja mode, inspired by Mexico's famous Baja Desert Rally.

In this mode, vehicle systems like Traction Control are loosened to allow spirited off-road driving with less intervention from the vehicle's on-board systems.

HISTORY OF A CLASSIC BENZ

ON THOSE rare occasions that I see an early model Mercedes-Benz 180 I have sometimes wondered if the owner is aware that this car was once officially known as the Ponton.

When reviewing the car on release a German motoring writer nicknamed it the Ponton because its unitary chassis construction reminded him very much of the layout of a military pontoon bridge.

Surprisingly the name stuck and eventually even Mercedes-Benz used it frequently to describe the whole range of 1953-1962 models which shared the 180's body style.

The 180 was the first Mercedes to use a unitary body construction.

It replaced the 170 which first saw the light of day in 1935 but was reintroduced after WWII and actually continued to be sold up to 1955 alongside the 180.

Both the 170 and the early model 180s used the same side-valve 1767cc four-cylinder engine but in the 180 the engine compression ratio was upped from 6.5 to 6.7:1, which lifted its output to 39kW at 4000rpm.

To speed up production of the 180, it was

designed with all front end components including the engine, all-synchromesh gearbox, steering gear as well as the coil and wishbone front suspension with double acting hydraulic independent shock absorbers incorporated on a unique sub-frame.

The 180 series was produced throughout the 1953 to 1962 period as both four-cylinder and six-cylinder models in both petrol and diesel-powered forms.

The diesel-powered 180 was much more popular than the petrol engine version between 1953 and 1959 with many being used as taxis the world over.

In 1957 the old side-valve engine was replaced by the 1897cc OHV four-cylinder engine developed initially for the 190SL.

In the 180a, as it was called, this engine was slightly detuned but still gave an extra boost of 10kW to 49kW compared with the side-valve version.

This engine continued to be used in the 180b and 180c models as well as the upmarket 190b version with various modifications to compression and carburation to obtain increased power output.

The ancestor of the six-cylinder engine was the pre-war styled 220, introduced in 1951, and powered by a 2195cc OHC six-cylinder engine.

This was effectively a long wheel-base version of the old 170 which was replaced in 1954 by the 220a.

It used the 220's engine but with an aluminium head and compression ratio increased from 6.5 to 7.5:1, giving an increase in power output to 63kW.

The cabriolet and coupe versions of the 220 were kept in production until 1956.

By mid-1956 the 220a was replaced by the 220S which was fitted with twin carburettors and developed 75kW.

This was regarded as the most refined of the six-cylinder Pontons and there were also coupes and cabriolets which gave the marque a prestigious image.

All the Ponton engines were durable and very reliable.

Gearboxes, which had synchromesh on all four gears, performed well and the drum brakes were effective but needed a heavy right foot to bring them to a halt.

From introduction in 1953 to their phase out in 1962 there were over 300,000 petrol engined Pontons manufactured whilst almost 235,000 diesel engined versions were also produced.

Local success for long-time trainers

GREYHOUND RACING

IT has now been more than 40 years since Coleraine owner-trainer Bob Wombwell won his first race in Mount Gambier with a greyhound called Dynamic Tarmel out at Glenburnie over 289 metres.

Still a regular at Tara Raceway meetings, Wombwell had been one of the many Victorian trainers whose appearances last year at the local track had been severely restricted due to border closures.

In fact, last Sunday's appearance in the Winningformula.net.au Stake (400 metres) with Blue Bonnet had seen him chasing his first Mount Gambier win since January 2020 when Serene Rose had been successful.

He had picked up Blue Bonnet, a daughter of Barcia Bale x Annie Weaver, as a giveaway prior to racing from the Tamworth-based Ray Aslin.

Her first win had come at start number 11 at Warrnambool over 390 metres in August last year.

Lining up for start 28 last Sunday, she was a \$14 chance when chasing her second win.

She never looked in any danger of defeat when crossing from the outside and leading all the way for a 3¼ lengths win over Jack Be Quick in 23.39 seconds.

Wombwell is now hoping for bigger and better things as he breaks-in a few young ones. "They're shaping up ok," he said.

Also to follow is a litter, 4½ months old, by Sennachie out of Serene Rose.

In the following race, the Commercial Hotel Maiden/One Win Stake (512m), Southern Cross trainer Ray Mahony was chasing his first Tara Raceway win since Raging Rampant had won there in September 2019.

He was back with Tapering Off, a 38 kilograms son of Barcia Bale x Tear Away Babe, who had made his debut at the track the previous week when running a handy fourth.

Obviously all the better for the run, the black dog quickly worked into second spot before taking the lead down the back straight.

From then on he was never going to be beaten, eventually running out a three-lengths winner over Paradise Five in a more-than-handy 29.90 seconds.

But, as Mahony explained, the February 2019 whelping's first win had not come without a setback or two along the way.

"The problem with him first started when I was trialling him at Warrnambool and he hit the catching pen gate," he said.

"While no real physical issues resulted,

what happened was he then became reluctant to run into the catching pen.

"Eventually I decided to trial him at Tara Raceway which operates with a finish-on-lure and no catching pen.

"This seemed to work well and when he started to trial sub-30 seconds needless to say I was pretty happy with him."

Owned by the breeder, Queensland-based Duane Dalton, Tapering Off was reared by Mahony who also trained Tear Away Babe for eight wins - four of those at Tara Raceway.

Mahony's involvement in greyhound racing goes back 50 years.

Now he hopes Tapering Off will be his best yet.

He will also hold a strong hand in this Sunday's Grade 5 Series (400m) after Out Of Gas, Sunset Milo, Sunset Firefly and Midnight Incy made their way through to the final.

The December 2018 litter, bred at Mor-

phett Vale by Damien Smith, has now won 46 races, Helen's Memory (nine wins, \$23,000 in stakemoney) and Fab Six (11, \$11,000) so far the most successful.

Glenville Rose has won seven races as has De Minaur while Fiddly is a five-race winner, Shimmy Sharna (four) and Roxy Diva (three).

The litter is now spread far and wide - De Minaur in NZ, Fiddly in WA, Helen's Memory, Fab Six and Roxy Diva in Victoria and Shimmy Sharna and Glenville Rose in SA. Fiddly, Fab Six and Shimmy Sharna were also originally trained by Clayfield.

Leading Tara Raceway dam, Sisco Sizzle, took her number of wins this year to 13 after the Peter Keane trained Nanda Sizzle defeated Sunset Firefly by three-quarters of a length in 23.21 seconds in the Trackside Meats Stake (400m), the second heat of the grade 5 series.

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AS trainers, jockeys and punters can verify, you have your good and bad runs in the racing game.

That definitely applies to Tatiara trainer Darryl Dodson as, over the years, we have seen his stable fly out of the blocks at the start of the season up until Christmas and then have a lull in the new year before firing up again.

This season has been no different for Dodson, who had three city winners up until early December and then a somewhat lean run for much of this year.

Following two winners at Bordertown on January 6, the Dodson stable had one winner in both February and March and was then out of the winner's circle until last Sunday week at Casterton when Just Chipping Away got the chocolates.

That was followed up with a metropolitan winner at Murray Bridge last Saturday when Dr Dee Dee showed his best form for some time with a half head win in the 1600-metre BM 64 handicap.

The gelding had finished down the track at two previous runs at Oakbank and Murray Bridge and, not surprisingly, was a \$16 chance last Saturday.

A copybook Jacob Opperman ride enabled Dr Dee Dee to chalk up win number nine and take his career earnings to \$137,900.

That was the second leg of a double for the afternoon for Opperman who had won earlier on the \$20 chance Victory Club for Murray Bridge trainer Matty Seyers.

On Wednesday, Opperman represented South Australia in the Australian apprentice's series at Doomben and did so brilliantly when he got the favourite Fleet Dove home in the final few bounds of the class-three plate.

BIG CUP MEETING ON SUNDAY

MILLICENT cup day at Penola this Sunday will be the biggest meeting in the Limestone Coast for at least the next six months.

It is always one of the most popular meetings on the local racing circuit and buses from Millicent, Beachport and Mount Gambier have been chartered to head to Penola.

Fashions on the field will offer more than \$3000 in prizes and when nominations for the meeting closed on Tuesday, 134 entries were received for the eight-race program.

The 2100-metre Millicent Cup has attracted nominations from several country cup winners including Andrea Mantegna (Horsham Cup winner), Patch Adams (Colac, Casterton and Mount Gambier Cup), Von Costa Glass (Naracoorte Cup), Cuban Toonite (Penola Cup) and Muntham Missile (Hamilton Cup).

There will be plenty of sentiment attached to the 1400-metre BM 58 handicap which will see the inaugural running of the Ned and Nan Walker and Sue Skeer memorial.

If there are betting moves in that race for Miss Mosh, then the mare may be the best bet of the day.

LETTS WAS THE PUNTERS PAL

LEGENDARY Adelaide jockey John Letts will be a guest of the Millicent Racing Club at Penola this Sunday, and while he may be an unknown these days to the younger punters, he will always be remembered by the older generation.

I can relate a few stories about the Hall Of Fame rider, including a trip to the Darwin Cup in the early 1980's with Kym Berkefeld.

Darwin cup day can be a long day in the tropical heat, with social activities starting well before lunch time.

After the final race, Berkefeld and myself somehow found ourselves in the jockey's room and made ourselves known to Midge Didham and John Letts.

We told Lettsy that we were from Mount Gambier and he then stated that Tearon, trained here by Ezzy Thompson, was a good thing to win in Adelaide at Victoria Park the following Saturday.

Being young and impressionable, we were chuffed with this information and, as it turned out, we were in Adelaide on the return journey and headed to Victoria Park.

We took Tearon one out in the fourtrella (as

it was known those days) and backed the gelding also.

True to what Letts predicted, Tearon charged to the lead at the furlong pole and went on to win easily.

With our fourtrella dividend and the winnings from Tearon, our trip to Darwin had suddenly become a very cheap exercise.

Some months later, I was imbibing in the Nelson Hotel with local Harry Huebner who was a part owner of Tearon.

I congratulated Harry on the victory and told him Letts had given us the good oil to back Tearon.

Harry was a nice chap but did not always see the funny side of life.

He went red in the face, fuming "Letts never told any of the owners that Tearon was a good thing".

Another occasion I was at Great Western races with Ron Cox (Mount Schank) and Anthony Rook (Digby) and we were doing our money on the punt.

When Letts was at his peak and winning premierships, there was a saying "when in doubt, back Letts in the last".

Great Western races were huge in those days, with several thousand people in attendance, including university students who made the pilgrimage from Melbourne for the annual meeting.

In those days, the last race in Adelaide was normally the last race anywhere to have a bet and Tearon was a 6/1 chance in the final event at Victoria Park with Letts in the saddle.

We badly needed some money to square the ledger and have some necessities for the three hour trip home (fuel and beers).

These were pre-Sky Channel days with no telecast and only a radio broadcast over the public address system, and it seemed everyone left in the betting ring backed Tearon.

Racecaller Ray Fewings incited the crowd with his call of "and Tearon is starting a run from well back in the field", then "here comes Tearon out wide on the track".

The cheering, no doubt helped by the intake of the local champagne throughout the day, got louder and louder and when Fewings said "and Tearon gets up to win", the crowd went berserk.

It was suggested we immediately get in the bookmaker's queue as there was every prob-

Local trainer Bill Drury caused the upset of the Hamilton meeting when the previously out of form Your Not With Me won the NR 47 pace at tote odds of over 100/1 by leading all the way.

There were just the three races at the Greenwald Paceway last Tuesday night, three more than the co-share meeting at Port Pirie where all five races were abandoned due to the weather and state of the track.

Veteran Hamilton trainer Jim Barker teamed up with his granddaughter/driver Jackie Barker to win two of the three races with Presidentialchange (\$4.20-\$3.10 fav.) and Morgan Art (\$4.20-\$3.30).

Mingbool trainer David Drury won his seventh race of the local season when he drove Sweet American (\$1.12 fav.) to an easy win in the final event.

Offshore scene fires up

A WARM and sunny weekend was a delight for anglers across the Limestone Coast, with plenty making the most of what could be our last nice weekend for a little while.

Lots of fishos made their way to the water to throw a line in, with plenty caught.

The offshore scene was a bit quiet until this weekend, largely due to the weather, but once it settled and allowed more boats onto the water, more and more fish were caught.

Tuna trollers have been back into the fish.

Most have found the fish reasonably easily in anywhere from 30 metres of water and beyond.

The standout lures so far have been black magic jetsetters and halco laser pro 190s, but if you have any lure in the water, you are a chance.

There has been a little bit of big fish talk this week - one fish of around 80kg was lost boat side off Port MacDonnell on Sunday afternoon after a two-hour fight and although the fish was lost, the signs are encouraging.

The bottom fishing has been nothing short of fabulous.

I have seen some excellent shark pictures so far, both gummy and school shark over 20kg, not to mention the nannygai, knifejaw, flathead and blue morwong that are mixed in with them.

Simon and Connor Hall boated some nice gummy shark on Saturday and a few other mixed species.

Surf fishos have enjoyed the conditions and some lovely fish have been caught.

Tyronne Box and Katherine Hibberd managed seven sharks from Browns Beach last week in an unforgettable four-hour session, keeping a couple for the table and letting the rest go.

There have been some nice salmon caught around Carpenter Rocks and the Canunda NP.

The Lighthouse Bay area has cleaned up with weed and it seems the fish are on the move.

Lure fishos have done well in there this week, casting 40g metals at them and bait fishos have done quite well on half pilchards.

Every year I see anglers struggling to cast the distance with their seven-foot rods and

heavy lures, but having the right gear makes salmon fishing so much easier.

Nine-foot graphite rods, 10-15lb braid on a little spin reel and you will cast twice, if not three times the distance with only one-third of the effort.

Fishos have targeted mullet in the same areas this week and caught not only great numbers, but some thumping fish.

Get them going with a burley trail, then throw in a bunch of gents or some peeled prawn under a float and it should not take long to put a nice feed in the esky.

There are still the odd tommy ruff, salmon trout and even King George whiting mixed in

with them in the shallows, so expect a few surprises.

The gar fishos have found some nice sized fish.

A few of the local gurus have mentioned there are thousands of maggots coming out of the rotting weed on the beach and into the water, so the garfish are fat and full of tucker making them a bit harder to catch.

The size has made up for the numbers, so if you stick it out, you should end up with a nice feed.

The Glenelg River is starting to fire more consistently.

The hot spots still seem to be from Hutchesson's Landing down to Dry Creek, but if you are new to fishing that area, trust your sounder.

Find the baitfish on the sounder and that is where you should be fishing.

Jesse Davies landed mulloway to 68cm on Sunday morning around the Sandy Waterholes area and a boat down river managed fish to 85cm.

Ben Jeffrey has been at it again this week down there, harassing the local bream and perch population with cranka crabs and soft plastics.

He managed to land quite a few over the weekend, taking a quick snap and letting them all go again.

There has been some nice bream caught down the sandflats this week by bait fishos, with prawn and cut pilchard the most productive.

The forecast looking forward sees the wind down and the sea settling for the weekend, hopefully enough to let anglers back out to sea.

Until next week, safe fishing.

The 30-year-old, who had not won a competition for more than 12 months, topped the leaderboard with 41 stableford points.

While most golfers highlight improved putting for their turnaround in form, Younghusband said a new set of Callaway Maverick Pro irons had helped significantly.

"I've only had them for four competition rounds and I'm still not exactly sure which one I should be hitting," he said.

"But they've added two clubs to how far I'm hitting so they're certainly making a difference."

As an example, the 12-handicapper said he would normally hit a six iron on the par 3 16th hole.

But on Saturday, even with the pin right at the back of the green he hit an eight iron close enough to make a birdie for three points.

That was his second birdie in succession after making four on the par 5 15th.

As well as those two birdies, he had also made nine pars to that point, his only blemish being a wipe on the par 3 sixth hole.

Even a missed par putt from inside four feet on the 17th could not derail the win, with a one-point bogey on the final hole good enough for 41 points, one ahead of Chris Lynch.

"I thought 41 would be a pretty good score, although the conditions were ideal so I wouldn't have been surprised not to win," Younghusband, who also coaches the East Gambier Football Club reserves side, said.

As it turned out, his score was good enough to win A Grade by two points from fellow 12-marker Peter Lock.

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BMX Bombski pumped

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LIMESTONE Coast BMX rider Jaiden Bombski finished the weekend on a high after claiming third place in the Red Bull UCI Pump Track World Championship qualifier at Mount Gambier.

The event was held at the Hastings Cunningham Reserve pump track venue, with the ultimate prize an all-expenses paid trip to the World Championships later in the year.

The winner of the men's and women's categories both received that prize, while for Bombski it means having to fund his own trip if he wants to compete at the world level, but he had qualified after his podium finish on Sunday.

It was a big improvement from the 2019 event, where the Mount Gambier-based Bombski finished mid-pack.

He was clearly pleased with the result when speaking to The Border Watch this week.

"I am pretty happy with it," he said.

"I did not expect to go that well."

The podium finish was even more impressive considering Bombski's bike is a freestyle BMX bike, not designed for pump track racing, but more for skate park use.

"I had to put brakes on my bike before the event," he said.

"I don't normally run brakes, so I had to bolt them on for the event and took them off when I got home.

"The other bikes are designed for that and are very light, but my bike is built for strength to withstand what we do on them.

"It is probably double the weight."

At the end of the day Bombski was asked if he could put on a bit of a show and he joined

another three riders from the region to entertain the crowd.

"We were ahead of schedule and they asked me if I would do something and I thought why not," he said.

"Me and my mate Jack Hann and the other two local boys the Dejong brothers joined in.

"They asked us to do most creative and best trick, so I just did what I thought would be good.

"It was a bit of fun."

While pump track racing is not something Bombski trains for, he decided to give it a go when the track was created for the 2019 world qualifiers.

He said after racing in his young years, he decided to try his hand at skate park riding, then gave the pump track a go.

"I thought, we have it, I might as well do

it," Bombski said.

"I did 2019 and finished about 16th, so this was a big improvement."

While Bombski does not have his travel paid for if he decides to compete at the world championships, he has cleared the main hurdle.

"I can go there and race, where other people have to earn their way in," he said.

"I haven't thought much about it because it will be in Europe and travel is not an easy

thing at the moment.

"It would also be quite expensive to go, so I am not too sure at this stage."

The men's competition was won by pro BMX rider Jayce Cunning, from Kyah Elburn-Tabone and Bombski, while Australian world championship-level rider Saya Sakakibara claimed the women's honours, from Annaliese Rokov and Johanna Jephcott.

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However, he still needed special dispensation to drive in the grassroots support category, with Toyota also having a minimum age of 16 for its competitors.

With the likes of Paul Morris and Erebus Motorsport in his corner, it was only a matter of time before he had his chance.

This weekend will see the young protege head to Winton Motor Raceway in country Victoria for the second round of the series and he is keen to hit the track in race mode.

"I am looking forward to racing at Winton," Allen said.

"I have done a little bit on the track - I did a few test days in a Toyota 86 road car and I did a couple of races in a Hyundai Excel.

"I did a test day with my team in my Toyota 86 I will be racing this year, but I haven't done a race in the Toyota yet, so I will see how I go."

Allen said while it was disappointing not to race at Bathurst for the opening round, he would have the chance in the final round when the series returns to the iconic circuit.

"I went to the first round (at Bathurst) to watch, to learn how it all works, how they approach the weekend and how the drivers deal with the racing," Allen said.

"I learnt a lot from that and can put it into perspective for Winton.

"I got a certificate from Norwell Motor-

plex to say I am ready to race and eligible, so they have allowed me to race the second round.

"After this one I will be all good to go for the rest of the season - I turn 16 at the end of June which is not too far away."

Along his journey Allen has received tutelage from the likes of Morris and Erebus driver Brodie Kostecki.

He said the support and advice they had given him was "unreal", while other drivers have also assisted.

"I have tried to put in all the effort and training I can to make myself the best possible," Allen said.

"I have been up at Norwell (Motorplex) a lot, fine tuning little things.

"I did a few laps with Broc Feeney the other day - I did a shoot out with him.

"It was good to get in the mindset of doing just one lap."

On a more local scene, Peter Gazzard from Carlin and Gazzard has been instrumental

in helping Allen achieve his goals, opening doors, providing sponsorship and space to set up a simulator, which he said Allen had spent countless hours on.

Gazzard simply said he liked to help where he could, with his own racing career providing some insight for the young driver.

"Peter has been unreal," Allen said.

"All the contacts and people I have met through him has been really good.

"He has been like a bit of a mentor, even in the early days through karting.

"I got to meet a lot of people through him like Mick Doohan and Mark Webber and heaps of other people."

As for this weekend, Allen said he simply hopes it all goes well.

From there he will complete the series, which includes rounds at Townsville, Sydney Motorsport Park and of course Bathurst.

"It is a pretty good series," Allen said.

"We will get a few laps in on the way - we have practice, qualifying and three races each weekend, so we get a fair few laps and a lot of TV coverage.

"It is good to promote me and get my name out there."

Looking further ahead, Allen still hopes to find a seat in the Supercars Championship and see where his career pans out from there.
