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Medical facility in full flight

MORE than 700 patients, including 100 life-threatening cases, have benefited from the Mount Gambier Patient Transfer Facility in its first year of operation.

The Royal Flying Doctor Service has facilitated 586 operational flights since the facility was commissioned at Mount Gambier Regional Airport in June last year.

Speaking at a community celebration this week, RFDS operations manager Anthony Pryzibilla (pictured) said the facility had improved the safety and care available to both staff and patients.

Trailblazing plan

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CONSTRUCTION on the first stretch of a world-class cycling and walking path will start later this year as Wattle Range Council moves ahead on its ambitious cabinet to caves

recreational trail.

After more than a decade of discussion, ground will break on the first stage of the trail in September, starting from the northern section of the Penola Bypass.

The first stage of the project is largely funded by the Federal Government's Local Roads

and Community Infrastructure Program and will follow Coonawarra's abandoned railway line to Memorial Drive, Coonawarra.

A further \$928,596 in the third round of Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program funding has been earmarked for stage two of the project, which if approved by the

Federal Government will facilitate the expansion of the trail to Glenroy Bool-Lagoon Road.

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower said the objective was to provide a 75km trail between Naracoorte and Penola.

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Full steam for rail trail

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Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower was confident the funding would be approved and allow the trail to continue approximately 15km north of Coonawarra.

Mr Gower said the objective was to provide a 75km trail between Naracoorte and Penola, using prime redgum agricultural land and a range of native and plantation forests as well as following the railway line.

"Everything will depend on the tender process and quotes, but we hope we can construct the trail to include all of the wineries, get past Rymill and eventually connect to the Naracoorte Lucindale Council trail via Father Woods Park" he said.

"Wattle Range's section is a little bit different from Naracoorte as they will be using unmade road reserves, conservation and forestry

tracks which will be more suited to mountain bikes, while we are following the railway line.

"Our section will be all spray sealed - it won't be full blown asphalt, but there will be a seal as it is mandatory by the department for the rail corridor section to mitigate the contamination."

Cycling proponents are celebrating the conversion of the disused rail corridor into a shared-use path, with long-time advocate Wendy Hollick saying she was "relieved and excited now it's starting to come together".

"For the best part of 15 years, we have talked about this," she said.

"It makes it much safer for people to get some exercise and access the wineries."

Ms Hollick said the development of the trail also provided opportunities to boost the region's tourism economy, support existing business as well as encourage new tourism ventures to meet the demand of users and attract visitors to the town.

"There are cycling tourists across the world and it is a massive industry," she said.

"Anyone who is forward thinking could set up a business centred around cycle tourism, such as providing bikes to hire."

Mount Gambier cyclist Nick Kidman echoed Ms Hollick's sentiments, saying other trails developed across the country provided a slew of benefits, including increased tourism, businesses and health benefits to users.

The competitive rider said he was looking

forward to taking his children to Penola to ride in a safe environment when the trail is complete.

"The health benefits of exercise are well known and exercising is a safe and clean environment not everyone has access to," he said.

"It's great that the community and its visitors will be able to utilise that in another way."

The region's network of trails The Coonawarra trail complements the region's existing network of trails and follows the completion of Grant District Council's shared path.

Grant District Council's latest addition encompasses Toller Road to Crafter Road and connects with Mount Gambier City Council's Avey Road section.

Construction on the second stage - Crafter Road to Capiroco Road - will start in coming months.

Member for Barker Tony Pasin said he was pleased the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program - which helps councils to deliver priority projects - could support the Coonawarra Rail Trail development.

"Every single project we support makes a huge difference in our local community, that is why we have moved quickly to approve this stimulus funding," he said.

"This funding under the Local Road and Community Infrastructure Program will enable Wattle Range Council to deliver community facility and infrastructure improvements and upgrades across the council area.

"I am pleased to be partnering with the Wattle Range Council to ensure this project gets underway supporting jobs in our local communities."

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Road speed drop requested

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OB Flat businesses are calling for improved signage and a speed limit drop along Clarke Road to make the stretch safer for visitors and staff. Following a request from The Barn manager Kent Comley, Grant District Council will write to the Transport Department in support of reducing the speed limit on Clarke Road from 100kph to 80kph.

In a letter to council, Mr Comley said the road was used by residents, the Barn's 70 staff

as well as customers and employees of The Apple Farm.

"Currently the limit is 100kph on the short 800m stretch of road," he said.

"The Barn's staff re-enter the road at the conclusion of their shifts typically between 10pm and midnight, which coincides with the time that guests depart The Apple Farm.

"We have observed that there are a large number of road users who are 'flooring it' up the quiet stretch of road oblivious to the number of other cars entering the road.

"It is clear that accidents could be avoided if a 60kph or even a 80kph was invoked."

The Apple Farm owner Kelsie Prowe supported a decrease in speed limit, but also called for signage along the road.

"I've had The Apple Farm for eight years and in that time, traffic on that road has probably increased by 1000pc," she said.

"I do believe 100kph is not acceptable for that length and use of that road.

"It's dangerous for people at night time and people who don't know the road, as well as the safety of staff.

"But I also think it's a good idea to get it signed because a lot of people wouldn't even know what the speed limit is because there's no sign."

Council works manager Adrian Schutz told the chamber the Transport Department would assess the road and determine whether the speed limit was able to be dropped.

"It's only a 800m section - if it was reduced to 80kph it would only take another five seconds," he said.

Millicent mural takes flight

MILLICENT'S central business district continues to take flight with two internationally renowned street artists collaborating on the town's latest public mural project.

After completing a three-dimensional mural on Millicent's landmark Beehive Corner, artist Mike McInterney - who is known as Mike Makatron - has returned to the town to undertake another artwork along George Street.

Mr McInterney has been joined by fellow Melbourne-based artist Conrad Bizjak to complete the piece located on the Turner, Duldig and Hamilton Partners wall, which will feature birds, gum leaves and books.

The artists said the decision to include books in the mural was a nod to the buildings' heritage as it formerly housed the old institute library.

"I originally suggested lorikeets, but the owners asked if we could do rosellas as they are found in Millicent," he said.

"The building used to be the old library and I wanted to acknowledge that too.

"I had the idea, I tell Conrad and he made it better."

The pair recently completed a large scale mural on a water tower in Stansbury as part of the Southern Yorke Peninsula Water Tower project.

"Because of lockdown, we were in no rush to get back to Melbourne and had a van full of paint we thought we would use," Mr McInterney said.

Imagine Millicent Arts Group committee member Sandra Melrose said the beehive mu-

ral had generated enormous traction within art groups and the broader community and hoped the latest piece would continue to stimulate visitation to the town.

"People love the uniqueness of the murals and have genuinely gone out of their way to come and see them," she said.

"Ultimately, we want people to get out of their cars and walk our streets to view them and hopefully stop and spend some money.

"The murals are to bring more vibrancy to our town, attract tourists and to help create Millicent's unique art identity as we are not following any other trends, but creating our own."

The mural is expected to be complete today (Friday).

Pfizer demand on rise

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DEMAND for COVID-19 vaccinations has increased in response to the outbreak in Melbourne, with almost 779 Pfizer shots administered across the Limestone Coast last week.

In the week prior, 529 vaccinations were delivered across the region's hospitals as part of the State Government's vaccine rollout, bringing the total number of vaccinations to more than 5800 across the Limestone Coast.

Limestone Coast Local Health Network chief executive Ngaire Buchanan said the expansion of the Pfizer vaccination program for regional residents aged between 16 and 50 had been well received, with a two week waiting list for appointments.

Ms Buchanan said moves were currently being undertaken to increase appointment availability in line with current staffing levels.

"Our staff have been doing an excellent job providing the COVID-19 vaccine to those in phase 1a and 1b, and now more people will have access to this important vaccine at vaccination clinics across our region," she said.

Ms Buchanan said planning was underway to establish additional AstraZeneca clinics.

AstraZeneca vaccinations are available at GP clinics across the region.

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RFDS facility in full flight

MORE than 700 patients, including 100 life-threatening cases, have benefited from the Mount Gambier Patient Transfer Facility in its first year of operation.

The Royal Flying Doctor Service has facilitated 586 operational flights since the facility was commissioned at Mount Gambier Regional Airport in June last year.

RFDS Central Operations chairman Peter de Cure revealed the site's impact on improving patient safety and comfort in front of stakeholders and community members who attended a special launch event on Tuesday.

Whilst the event formally recognised the 800 plus individuals and businesses that donated to the project, it was also a chance to show the public how the facility services the community.

Guests remained dry and in relative warmth, as the barometer hovered around 11 degrees, rained and blew a frigid south easterly wind.

RFDS South and Central Australia operations manager Anthony Pryzibilla believes the transfer facility has been a welcome boon to the safety and comfort of both patients and medical staff.

"Providing a facility like this allows staff and patients to be cared for in an environment that's out of the weather. It's well lit, the temperatures are right... a facility like this allows you to manage unpredictable scenarios in a much safer environment," he said.

"So it's a big change from where we were, prior to this facility, where we did air side transfers in the rain, wind and heat. It allows us now to service those patients in this community a lot better."

president Bill Russon agrees.

"It's an essential part of giving humane, decent treatment to people... delivering patients timely, comfortable hospital care from the regions," he said.

Mr Russon, together with the RFDS Mount Gambier Support Group were critical in the fundraising efforts behind the Mount Gambier Patient Transfer Facility.

And whilst Mr Russon felt it was too early to

announce any future plans to the facility, he is eager to see more work done on the building to expand its capabilities.

The RFDS has another five patient transfer facilities planned for other regional locations, including the Riverland and Kangaroo Island.

Mr de Cure believes funding would follow a similar model to that of Mount Gambier - which was predominantly funded by the local

community and businesses, with grants and support from local government and corporate sponsorship.

Mr de Cure is also open to state government support.

"We'll obviously be seeking sponsorship. We're working with, in particular, the state government, in terms of what they might like to do, but largely, we'll fundraise the money," he said.



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Ratepayer blasts council time limit

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GRANT District Council copped criticism at this week's meeting when a ratepayer expressed anger over the five-minute time limit on speeches before angrily telling the chamber "we employ you, you don't tell us what to do".

Grant resident Dirk Verschure was scheduled to present to elected members regarding roads in the Eight Mile Creek area, but instead slammed council for imposing a five minute time limit.

Mr Verschure did not discuss the road network, using most of his allocated time to lambast council over what he described as a "joke".

"We're entitled to present that case as long as we need and if you give me five minutes, you can go jump in the river," he said.

"People are entitled to present their case

for as long as necessary.

"If you want to play bully games, then you can play bully games, but don't play them with me."

When mayor Richard Sage asked Mr Verschure whether he would like to present, the ratepayer responded with "no, I'll come back another day".

"You gave me five minutes, that's an insult sir," Mr Verschure said.

"I think you should shape up or ship out.

"We employ you, you don't tell us what to do, you tell us what the limitations are."

Grant District Council chief executive Darryl Whicker told Mr Verschure exceptions can be made, with Mr Verschure angrily responding "there should be no exceptions".

"Every person who comes to this place and wants to present their case should be given as much time as they want," Mr Verschure said.

Following the meeting, The Border Watch sought comment from Grant District Council

about whether it had a policy regarding time limits on deputations and why Mr Verschure was advised he had five minutes to speak.

Grant District chief executive Darryl Whicker said council did not have a written policy, but it was common practice to stipulate a time for deputation to ensure efficiency.

Mr Whicker said at the time of approving Mr Verschure's deputation request, council already had two additional deputations scheduled.

However, elected members were informed at Monday night's meeting a deputation from the Green Triangle Forestry Hub would be moved to a workshop.

"Council did our best to support his request and allocated a timeframe of five to 10 minutes which is common practice so that meetings run in an efficient and orderly manner," Mr Whicker said.

"No issues were raised at the time of his conversation with me on the time allocated."

Wattle Range carbon emissions review

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A STUDY investigating carbon emissions across 12 local government-owned sites across Wattle Range will be undertaken to provide baseline data for council's Climate Change Action Plan.

Elected members voted in support of a \$5280 allocation to undertake a carbon audit to measure electricity, gas and fuel use on Millicent, Penola and Beachport sites, staff travel to and from work and flights taken by council's 151 staff.

The audit will measure the use of carbon from council's main Millicent office, Elec-Air office, engineering office, works depot, Gladys Smith Early Learning Centre, Millicent Salesyards, the Millicent Library and the Millicent Visitor Information Centre.

Carbon emissions at Penola and Beachport's works depot and visitor information centres will also be measured.

Last month, elected members deferred a decision to allocate the funds following revelations a carbon audit had been previously conducted in 2009 and concerns over the audit being a "desktop exercise".

At this week's monthly meeting, Wattle Range Climate Change Consultative Group members Michael Bleby and Sandra Young told the chamber of the need for an updated audit to provide updated baseline data to ensure emission reduction targets are appropriate and sustainable.

Mr Bleby said the previous audit would provide council with information as to changes to its carbon footprint in an 11 year period.

"An audit update will provide information such as what the priorities are to change over to electric vehicle, priorities regarding solar panels and battery storage, council procurement policies and the purchase of goods and services," he said.

"The standards are global and have been set and we do need to use the experts in this field... and we do need an update."

Wattle Range chief executive Ben Gower said the previous audit found landfill was

council's major carbon contributor.

"A fair bit has been diverted from landfill through the free mulch program," he said.

"I am interested to see where we have moved. The real interest is the economic benefit and regarding the free mulch program, it has also reduced our transport costs."

Councillor Sharon Cox supported the audit, saying a benchmark would provide council with knowledge "we are heading in the right direction with our emissions", with Cr John Drew adding an updated audit was a "no brainer". "It is a matter of gathering evidence," Cr Drew said.

"Obviously it is showing to the community we are serious about climate change, it is also about saving money and economics.

"[We should be able to] pay back this \$5000 as a result of efficiencies."

But Cr Peter Dunicliff decried the proposal, labelling the audit - which will be conducted by analysing data given to consultants by council - as a "feel good exercise".

"I am dead against spending money on this," he said.

"I have read the lower South East of South Australia has nearly net zero carbon because of all of the pine trees are around and I think it would be an interesting exercise to measure that. I don't know if a financial advisor is going to give much information on carbon."

A majority of elected members voted in support of the audit, with Cr Dunicliff and Graham Slarks rejecting the move. Councillors Dennis Muhovics and Rick Paltridge were absent.

Salmon frames sought

RECREATIONAL fishers are urged to donate filleted salmon frames as part of a research project aimed at collecting information on the size, age and reproductive status of the species.

Australian Salmon caught and filleted in South Australian waters are being sought by the State Government for a research project to help inform management of the fishery.

Primary Industries and Regional Development Minister David Basham said the South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI) were in need of filleted frames to help improve biological knowledge of Australian salmon.

Mr Basham hoped to build on the success from last year's project, with more than 350 salmon frames donated for research.

"Researchers need Australian salmon frames with the head, gut cavity and skeleton intact, but not the fillets," he said. "Once you've filleted your catch, put the frames in a bag, and freeze them until you can get to a donation point."

Fishers can drop off frames at Spot On Mount Gambier until October 31 and individuals who supply contact details and information about the catch will go into the running to win fishing gear.

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DV safety hub open

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LIMESTONE Coast women and their children experiencing domestic, family and sexual violence will now have better access to help and information following the opening of a safety hub in Mount Gambier.

Human Services Minister Michelle Lensink and Assistant Minister for Domestic and Family Violence Prevention Carolyn Power joined volunteers, community members and service providers at the official opening of The Haven at the Mount Gambier Library last week.

The program, which is operated in partnership with the Women's Information Service and Mount Gambier City Council, features face-to-face support from volunteers, phone and computer access. Volunteers are trained to do on the spot referrals to service providers, help people access counselling and provide practical support.

Ms Lensink said it was vital regional women and children had the same opportunity to feel safe and supported as those living in the metropolitan area.

She said The Haven had been developed in partnership with Limestone Coast-based frontline service providers to ensure it was tailor-made for the region.

"This particular hub is going to be very important for people in the community who might not want to go to a service provider or they might not even recognise that what they are experiencing is domestic violence," Ms Lensink said.

"For people to be able to access a safe place where they are going to get that information, get some support and be connected to services is going to be absolutely critical.

"Part of what we are trying to do is move domestic violence upstream so that it doesn't get to that crisis where open are in a situation where it is unsustainable for them."

Women can receive information on housing and legal matters, family dispute resolution, counselling, multicultural resources, drug and alcohol support and referrals to specialist domestic violence and other services.

Safety Hub support officer Sonya Mezinac said The Haven aimed to provide women with access to crucial information to help them make informed decisions earlier to improve their lives.

"People often only start looking for information when they're in crisis," she said.

"The more informed people are about those red flags in relationships, the better equipped they will be to help themselves and others."

Mount Gambier resident Kathy Griffen said she was encouraged to volunteer to support at-risk women and children and boost community understanding about domestic violence.

"I think it's important and there's a need for it in Mount Gambier," she said.

"I have the time to do it and thought that I wanted to give back some time."

Ms Griffen said the comprehensive training program, mentored shifts and ongoing support provided confidence for volunteers to increase the knowledge and understanding of domestic violence in the community.

"When they said the training was intensive, they really do mean it," she said.

"There were around nine online sessions that were an hour and a half each, Zoom sessions were provided by trained staff and the others covered awareness of domestic violence and abuse, information sharing and Aboriginal culture.

"I have never been involved in the domestic violence sector before so the training has been really important."

The Haven is located at the Mount Gambier Library and is open on Monday to Friday from 9am to 4pm.

Anyone who has experienced or is at risk of family and domestic violence and/or sexual assault can contact 1800RESPECT or 1800 737 732 for 24 hour assistance.

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Winter lashes region

FALLEN trees, sunken roofs and runaway verandahs were just some of the 16 callouts emergency services dealt with this week as the Limestone Coast was given an intense dose of winter weather.

State Emergency Service (SES) members across the Limestone Coast were called out to incidents early in the week, including eight fallen trees, a verandah becoming dislodged at Naracoorte's Sunrise Christian School and the Kingston Soldiers Memorial Hospital roof collapsing.

Mount Gambier SES unit manager Mat Tye said volunteers at the Kingston SES unit worked closely with the Country Fire Service to eliminate hazards at the healthcare facility and ensured staff could operate safely.

He said the roof section which collapsed did not harm any staff or patients with the area not in use.

"Volunteers eliminated as many hazards as they could by covering the top of it, stopping more water entering and securing the area so nobody could enter," Mr Tye said.

"We also moved debris and secured the structure before advising owners to make contact with their insurance company."

Mr Tye said the small number of callouts was welcomed by volunteers, who had braced for more incidents.

"The Limestone Coast community were fairly well prepared and that is because the word is getting out there to prepare before winter comes along," he said.

"We are still putting the word out there for residents to be cautious because the ground has softened so there may still be trees which topple over and we are encouraging people not to park their cars under trees or sit under

them and continue to be mindful of their surroundings."

Mr Tye said volunteers were pleased with the community's response to the weather.

The local SES units put in place the South East Operation Coordination Unit on Monday night in preparation for the weather, which received calls from the public and sent tasks to specific areas.

Mr Tye said the coordination unit supported volunteers, which returned a streamlined and positive outcome for both them and the community.

"The weather started to come in really strong there at one point but it seemed to

die down pretty quickly and stay in a steady stream," he said.

The Bureau of Meteorology had issued a severe weather warning for the state on Monday, including the Upper and Lower South East.

Naracoorte recorded 95km/h wind gusts on Monday while 12mm of rainfall fell in Mount Gambier on Monday.

Coonawarra's lowest temperature recorded for the week was 6.5 degrees on Tuesday, alongside 15.8mm of rainfall following 63km/h winds on Monday.

Padthaway recorded winds up to 72km/h on Monday.

Road laws tighten

DANGEROUS drivers whose vehicles have been impounded will fork out up to \$1395 before their vehicles are crushed for sold for scrap metal under new laws.

As of July 1, irresponsible road users must pay a minimum fee of \$1135.50 to release their vehicle from SA Police after the 28-day confiscation period ends.

At the end of the 28 days, offenders will have 10 additional days to pay the fee - which could increase to almost \$1400 - before police can sell or scrap the vehicle.

Payment plans will not be permitted. Police Minister Vincent Tarzia said vehicles can be impounded or clamped if a person has been charged, arrested or reported for a range of offences, including speeding, drink and drug driving, leaving the scene of an accident or misuse of a motor vehicle.

Mr Tarzia said offenders can request to have their vehicle destroyed instead of paying impound fees, but will be made to pay a \$320 disposal fee.

The new laws follow the introduction of a government Bill to create a new offence targeting extreme speed drivers.

If passed, motorists convicted of driving at an extreme speed - 55kph or more above the speed limit in a 60 zone or less or 80kph or more in a zone marked above 60 - could face three years in jail and a mandatory two-year licence disqualification.

The license disqualification period would be increased to five years for subsequent offence.

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Aged care concern

now here's a thought

DO WE have a responsibility to provide quality care for our aged?

It is an indictment that I even pose the question.

However, over the past 15 months we have witnessed aged care facilities ravaged by the COVID pandemic, seen the release of the Royal Commission into Aged Care which elicited damning judgements and now we find that the vulnerability of this sector has hardly improved.

So, I ask, do we care enough?

Or is it a case that once our elders enter

such facilities they are out of sight and out of our minds?

We were told that aged care would be the highest priority for vaccination.

I am prepared to allow for some logistic problems to impact on the vaccination rollout but to have not ensured the vaccination of all staff and residents right from the get-go is beyond stupid.

Even when they are supposedly prioritised they are not a priority.

It is not as though the vaccinators had to go out and find these community members; they are living in facilities which should make the challenge a good deal easier than vaccinating the general population.

We (and the Federal Government) don't even

We saw the Federal Government take this into consideration in the formulation of the Budget, allocating a staggering \$18b to the sector, but what for exactly?

It would seem that aged care is a problem which needs to be solved and that, inherently, the aged are problems too.

This goes to the heart of how we perceive the value of those who are the oldest in our society.

Demand for vaccine choice

I WRITE in regards to the COVID Plea article (The Border Watch, May 28) regarding vaccination numbers diminishing amongst over 50's being "offered" the preferred Astra Zeneca.

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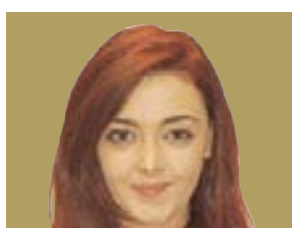

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100 years on

A SERVICE will be held at Port MacDonnell War Memorial on Sunday to commemorate the centenary of the laying of the memorial's foundation stone.

The ceremony, scheduled for 12pm, will be held at the memorial, which acknowledges the sacrifice of soldiers from Port MacDonnell, Mount Schank and Allendale East that died while serving their country.

The Reverend Dr Murray Earl said while he believed the meaning and purpose of Australia's war memorials - and their significance within society - had changed over time, Sunday's service would focus on remembrance.

"I think that's basically what we're doing Sunday, is that we're giving remembrance to the cost of World War I on a society like Port MacDonnell and small communities. And in the passage of time, it's changed, and yet it has stayed the same as well. That's what we're trying to capture," Dr Earl said.

Built in 1921 to commemorate the soldiers that died during World War I, the Port MacDonnell memorial later expanded to include the names of the fallen that took part in World War II and Vietnam.

One hundred years on, it is difficult to comprehend the impact of World War I on Australian society.

It remains the costliest war - in terms of casualties - that Australia has participated in and left a visibly evident sense of loss within many communities, both large and small.

"So, within the context of Australian society, [the memorial] wasn't so much about the victory, it was to somehow recognise the one in five who died, and that was the shock that affected Australian society," Dr Earl said.

"A lot of troops still were not home by 1921. And so, the kind of missing was very promi-

nent in people's minds... and so for Port MacDonnell, of all places, to get a memorial up by 1921, just signifies how important it was to the local community that some reference point needed to be identified, to acknowledge the price that was paid by Port MacDonnell's society."

Construction of the Port MacDonnell War Memorial started on June 13, 1921, at a cost of around £200.

The Chairman (of the then) District Council of Port MacDonnell, Mr R. C. Hayman, laid the foundation stone.

The memorial was completed and officially unveiled 10 days later on June 23, 1921 by Colonel F. H. Howland.

The Port MacDonnell community has kept vigil over this sacred place ever since.

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Town centre plans backed

THE rollout of the Penola Town Centre development will be a slow burn according to Wattle Range Council, which has endorsed a final concept following an extensive community consultation process.

The streetscape overhaul focuses predominantly on Penola's town centre, including Bowden, Queen and Portland streets - as well as Petticoat and Roden lanes - and includes the surrounds of the Prince of Wales and Royal Oak hotels.

Among the improvements foreshadowed in the plan include increased cycling infrastructure, town entry statements, as well as street activation and outdoor dining measures.

Public art, improved footpaths and the activation of building facades were also highlighted for consideration.

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower said elected members made a few adjustments to the plan, such as opting for planter boxes near the Prince of Wales Hotel rather than trees.

"Councillors also wanted to make sure they are not endorsing the works to go ahead, just the plan itself," Mr Gower said.

"The next step is costing and engineering designs such as power cables and other such things, which we have money allocated in the budget for.

"This will give us more of an idea of costing for the project and some sub elements which will be cost estimated next year."

Mr Gower said elected members were expected to apply for additional grant funding across the coming five years to complete the projects outlined within the concept design.

"We will go after the projects in the design which have the best benefits and value for the town and the community," he said.

"It is more about where to go from here rather than the plan itself as it is a multi-step process."

Mr Gower said there would be multiple

long-term benefits from the concept design such as town growth, increased tourism and enabling Penola to be an overall better town to live and work.

Other priorities included street lighting, town wayfinding and signage, natural shade and tree planting and interactive social spaces, street furniture and flexible event spaces.

The design consisted of five cycling node points, three open space upgrade points, eight key wayfinding entry signage points and seven opportunities for public art.

Priority projects for the town square were the increased activation of the public space, making the area a low speed environment and increased parking and pedestrian links and crossings.

Penola War Memorial Park was also highlighted in the report with activation to the park a consideration as well as an upgrade of the existing playground, skate park redevelopment and upgrade of the toilet facilities.

Alongside key infrastructural redevelopments, a number of small improvements were highlighted within the concept design as a high priority, given a requested completion timeframe of two years.

These included a large paved plaza between Alfred and Church Street, six-metre long timber seats for community events for the town square, retention of existing trees, community garden beds and existing on street parking and new shelters for the Penola War Memorial Park.

Elected members noted and endorsed the final concept design on Tuesday night, which the plan produced by Adelaide's WAX Design company following an extensive community consultation project across the past 12 months.

Last year there were several workshop sessions held at Rymill Hall with over 80 members taking part in a number of activities and a further 57 survey responses delivered as of March this year.

Change of Aus Day venue, with plans to share

NANGWARRY, Glencoe and Mount Burr could share in hosting Wattle Range Council's Australia Day Award Presentation events, with elected members backing a proposal to rotate the venue.

The presentation ceremony for the Sorby Adams Ward has been held at the Kalangadoo Institute for a number of years and a breakfast is provided by the Kalangadoo Lions Club.

Sorby Adams resident Ruth Price urged elected members to consider introducing a four-year cycling program to provide the Nangwarry, Mount Burr and Glencoe communities with an opportunity to host the event.

"Each township has a venue which would very adequately serve the purpose along with community groups to provide the

obligatory breakfast," she said.

"I would suggest that operating on a four year cycle, more residents of each township and surrounding area would become involved, hence lifting the presentation within Sorby Adams Ward.

"To date, from my observations, the occasion is chiefly attended by Kalangadoo residents."

Former Sorby Adams Ward councillor Peter Dunicliff said it was critical any change from the traditional format was "as good as Kalangadoo".

"I was a representative on this ward and Kalangadoo put on a fantastic show," he said.

"If we are going to change it, we need to make sure the town that wants it can have a show that is as good as at the one there."

Cr Dale Price acknowledged the voluntary efforts of the Kalangadoo Lions Club, but said council should consider allowing other community groups from neighbour-

ing towns an opportunity to host the event.

"The Kalangadoo Lions do a fantastic job, but I also believe there are other organisations that will do a great job," he said. "While I respect the efforts of the Kalangadoo Lions Club, I don't think they have exclusive rights to it."

Kalangadoo Lions Club secretary Debbie Guenther said there were no objections to a change in venue, adding the service club was willing to provide help to neighbouring towns if necessary.

"There's a lot of preparation that goes into cooking the breakfast, but it's all supplied by council and whoever does the ceremony would get the same funding from council," she said.

"We are happy to help out and hand on our list of what we supply if anyone needs a hand."

Land key to town future

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A PARCEL of unused land in a prominent part of Millicent and the town's Italian Club could soon be on the market after Wattle Range Council supported its transfer back to the State Government.

Elected members voted in support of returning the land and Millicent Italian Club back to the Environment and Water Department with a view to sell the land for residential housing or other development opportunities.

A council report said the land was "strategically located" directly next to Transport Department land which incorporates the former railway infrastructure.

The report said there was benefit in both parcels of land being placed on the market by the State Government.

The revocation of community land follows the decision to mothball councils' rehabilitation and development plans at the former soccer field after staff estimated costs of \$450,000 to address site contamination issues.

Council said the Millicent Railway Lands precinct represented was a "prominent but under-utilised part of the Millicent township that if developed would greatly benefit the community", as well as alleviate residential land shortages.

The report noted council would not purchase the land.

"Largely these lands have remained unoc-

cupied for many years and if offered for sale, could be purchased alongside the adjacent Millicent Railway Lands and present a significant combined development offering," the report said.

In a letter to council, Millicent Business Community Association chair Lee Morgan acknowledged the shortage of residential land in the township, but suggested a portion of the land be annexed for recreational purposes.

Mr Morgan said preliminary feedback on the draft Millicent Town Centre Concept Design - which identifies the development of the lands as a key project - has suggested the development of an athletics track.

"[The track] could be used by the community for general exercise and also school-based competitions," he said.

"The Transport Department land would be conducive for this land use as it is close to the town centre.

"Although these ideas are in their infancy, it is suggested that the proposed land classification of the subject land does not prejudice the future use of the Transport Department land.

"I therefore recommend that an area of at least 200m by 280m is earmarked for the future purpose on the Transport Department land."

Councillor Dean Burrow asked council staff whether a portion of the land could be reserved for future development, with staff responding "that won't be up to council after the land is revoked".

Food for thought

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THE Millicent Community Learning Centre is adapting its opening hours to match student needs in an innovative bid to improve health, grades and attendance.

Students are starting the day a little later than their Millicent High School campus counterparts, with the centre opening its doors at 11am on Tuesdays.

Millicent Community Learning Centre manager Gemma Winterborn said the innovative approach had been hugely popular with students.

"We have students who are doing school-based apprenticeships and other work, so the late start allows us to accommodate their schedule," she said.

"It is a good way for the centre to fit around the students rather than the students having to be made to fit the schools."

Ms Winterborn said the alternative program runs through to 7pm and students have the option of preparing a meal and eating with peers and faculty, with hearty dinners including roast lamb and spaghetti bolognese.

Fruit, vegetables and non-perishable items are donated to the centre by Foodbank and Foster's Foodland, while Andy's Bakery provides students with savoury items and sweets.

Students can access pre-packaged microwave meals cooked by Mount Gambier-based Spare Ya Change 4 Kids and the centre also receives items such as fleece blankets, donated by Mount Gambier businessman Vince Versace.

Essential household items such as toilet paper and tissues are also distributed to the centre and are packed and delivered by students to families in need.

"We have a cook up every Tuesday and sometimes the kids get involved and sometimes the staff prepare it for them," Ms Winterborn said.

"It's a great way make sure the kids have something to eat before they go home and it's also a good opportunity for staff and students to relax.

"Foodbank makes a massive donation to the centre and which we then donate to our students' families.

"Some of our students leave home without having breakfast or aren't able to eat a lot of tea and this donation goes a huge way in helping them and their families who might otherwise struggle."

Millicent Community Learning Centre student Chloe Deverell said she was grateful for Foodbank's donations and the opportunity to have a meal while studying.

"I've received the Foodbank donations before and it is good because it takes the stress off having to worry about food," she said.

"Sometimes we struggle and it's nice to be able to get help. "Studying can be hard enough without having to worry about if you have enough to eat."

Amelia's gift keeps giving

IT IS an annual charity concert that is quickly becoming something of a Mount Gambier tradition but what makes it so special is it was conceived and organised by a 10-year-old Mount Gambier girl.

Amelia Clark, now 15, has asked family and friends to join her on stage to perform the concert, with all proceeds raised from the event going to the Salvation Army Red Shield Appeal.

It all started when Amelia helped at the Salvation Army during its 2015 Christmas Appeal.

Seeing people within the community that were less fortunate than her, Amelia felt compelled to try and raise money for others.

"I helped out with the Salvation Army Christmas Appeal and I just wanted to raise money for people that had come in... [needing] presents," Amelia said.

The Christmas appeal passed but Amelia's desire to help others did not. Amelia reflected, with guidance from her mum, Jacinta, on the skills she had and how she could use them to raise money for others.

Learning a musical instrument at the time and attending dance classes, Amelia decided to hold a concert with the proceeds going to the Salvation Army.

Ms Clark explained they were unable to organise the inaugural concert in time for the 2016 Red Shield Appeal, so they ran it a few months later, around Amelia's birthday.

The birthday concert stuck, that is until this year, when it was decided to try and run the concert at the same time as the Salvation Army's 2021 Red Shield Appeal launch.

Speaking with the Salvation Army Captain Judy Shaw, it was evident she was both proud of Amelia's generosity but also touched by the spirit of charity exhibited by the wider community.

"For a little girl of 10 years old to want to help people is lovely, but to see this concert grow this year into something much larger is overwhelming," Ms Shaw said.

The Salvation Army will use the donated money to fund a number of its local programs, such as its emergency services catering programs and emergency relief programs - giving funds to individuals or families in desperate need.

Now in its fifth year (the 2020 concert was cancelled due to COVID), the concert has moved into the Wehl Street Theatre, accommodating more performers and a larger audience.

And as it has grown, so to has the support from other community members.

"We're just really grateful that the perform-

ers we're willing to perform, because obviously, they donated their time and their skills... we can't have a concert without our performers," Jacinta said.

"And obviously, we had a number of people that helped back and in the side stage.

"Without the support that we had, our friends and family, [this concert] wouldn't have been what it was."

The 2021 concert was held on May 29, with the Salvation Army Band, Melaleuca Choir and a bunch of Amelia's friends and family banding together.

Some sang, others played instruments, some performed dance routines solo and others in groups.

Mount Gambier businesses donated food for the concert and prizes for a silent auction.

Amelia's parents paid for the theatre, and together, the Mount Gambier community donated \$1900.

Students uniting through art

MILLICENT High School and Wattle Range Council are painting a stronger relationship between youth, council and Indigenous culture through the development of a collaborative Reconciliation-themed art project.

Secondary students and teachers in collaboration with Millicent High School Aboriginal Support officer Jenny Bishop and council are in the process of creating an Indigenous inspired artwork to be painted on the garden beds at the intersection of Davenport Street and Glen Street in Millicent.

Millicent High School teacher Fernanda Ikeda said students were invited to submit a design considering reconciliation, the Boandik country and landscape, emotions and feelings and their experience in developing a shared pride for the cultures.

Ms Ikeda said 28 entries were received and five have been selected to be shared with the community. She said the students' designs are currently being further developed and will be placed on the garden beds in the coming months.

"The symbolism of the designs draw inspiration from the local fauna and flora, the local people and how nature and humanity interact," Ms Ikeda said.

"Under the influence of Aunty Michelle and her workshops, students were able to

express their creativity and pride through the designs they created.

"The students reflected on the history of the Stolen Generations and have found that their design, once painted in the community, will be their way of saying sorry and celebrating with pride the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people's contribution to our society."

Wattle Range Council director development services Emma Clay said council was grateful to be able to facilitated the display of meaningful community artwork.

"It is important for students to examine the indigenous culture and history of our region, and their studies culminating in a project that enables them to raise awareness in the community, whilst also beautifying the streetscape is a beneficial outcome for the town."

During Reconciliation week, students continued to reflect on their own reconciliation journey and act on what they believe still needs improving to recognise the traditional owners of the land.

Uncle Doug attended the school to share stories and celebrate Indigenous people's accomplishments, before joining students at Millicent High's Aboriginal Sacred Garden to lead a smoke ceremony.

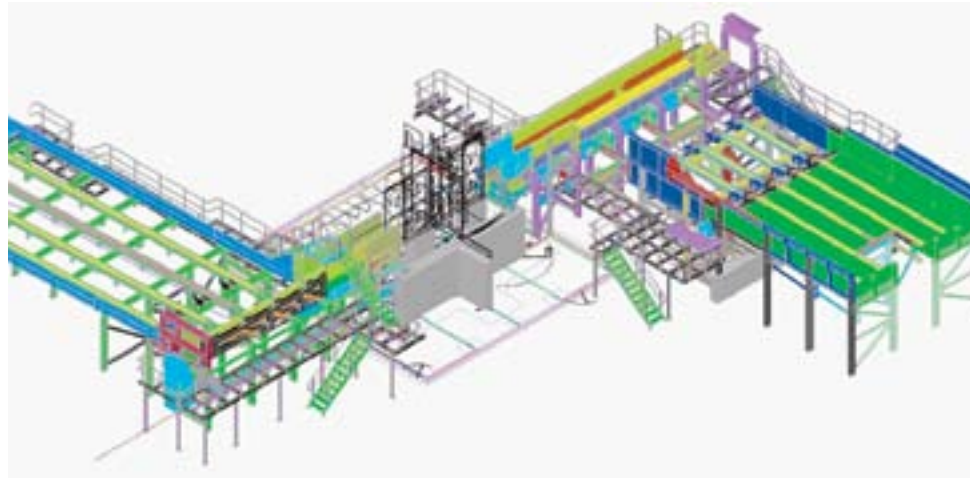

Cow simulator boosts skills

AGRICULTURE students studying over the border at South West TAFE have been given access to a cow simulator used to hone their skills before handling live animals.

The \$70,000 simulator and accessories are giving students experience in pulling a calf on a realistic and life-size cow before their first live procedure.

South West TAFE agriculture teacher Rebecca Toleman said she was excited to be teaching students using this new technology.

"We are fortunate to be the only trainers in regional Victoria offering this technology and our students are so lucky to be able to learn techniques on this state-of-the-art new training tool," she said.

Ms Toleman said the simulator would allow students to become proficient in their practical skills without the need to endanger or cause unnecessary discomfort to live animals.

She said the simulator was sourced from Veterinary Simulator Industries in Canada and was one of only a few of its kind in Australia.

"The simulators are designed in partnership between professional designers and fabricators and veterinary educators to create teaching tools that are realistic in appearance, are highly functional, durable and meet the needs of our teachers and students," she said.

Other features of the new technology will allow students to experience managing the birthing process including breach birth, haltering a cow, placing body ropes for casting a

cow, identifying mastitis, obtaining milk samples and pregnancy testing.

National Herd Development South West sales representative and breeding advisor Dylan Jewell said it was beneficial for students to gain practical experience looking at and feeling what a cow's organs were like before working on a live animal.

"I would have loved something like this when I was training," Mr Jewell said.

"Technology has evolved so much and to have something like this in the south-west is unreal. This is a game-changer," he said.

South West TAFE Land, Food and Fibre manager Paul Meredith said funding for the cow simulator was made available through the Regional and Specialist Training Fund program, which aimed to support training for specific skills in the regional and specialist areas with thin or highly specialised training markets.

He said farming made up a large proportion of the region's workforce and it was important to give our future farmers the chance to learn using the latest training equipment.

"This new training tool is a big boost to our agriculture programs and will give students a huge advantage in preparing them for their first live procedure," he said.

Fishing fightback on film

THE formation and subsequent impact of the Limestone Coast Fishermen's Co-operative will be showcased in a special ABC documentary, which follows Australian primary producers as they battle to save their businesses from the brink of disaster.

Airing June 15, *Fightback Farmers: Feeding Australia Together* features three innovative co-operatives which are working collaboratively, in order to save their livelihoods.

The documentary follows colourful rock lobster fisherman Craig "Slim" Reilly, who was caught in the recent trade crossfire and believes his family fishing business would have collapsed if not for the local co-operative.

A community leader, Mr Reilly was pivotal in forming the Limestone Coast Fishermen's Co-operative in 2019.

"He's got seawater running through his veins," his wife Mandie said.

He's so passionate about fishing and his family."

The co-operative's young and passionate Limestone Coast chief executive Justin Phillips is also featured, detailing the difficulties his industry faces but remains determined to forge ahead.

After just two years of operation, proponents of the co-operative believe their move to the structure has loosened the grip of corporately-owned factories and processors on their local seafood industry and brought longer term benefits for the smaller, generational

fishing families and their coastal towns and communities.

The documentary also follows co-operative farmers as they face the triumphs and tragedies of trying to stay on the land and keep operating through trade disruptions, climate disasters and even complete industry restructuring.

"We're a bunch of farmers one day, and the next we're all coming together to form a co-op," dairy farmer Stuart Crosthwaite states in the documentary, discussing how the co-operative farming model saved them after the collapse of dairy giant, Murray Goulburn.

Executive producer Steve Bibb, from Barking Mad Productions, said he had long admired the Australian families who dedicate their lives to living on the land - farming, feeding and clothing the nation - generation after generation.

"As a city boy, I also know that most of us don't appreciate what is actually happening, that small family farms are disappearing. It begs the question: why?" Mr Bibb said.

"In *Fightback Farmers*, I wanted to meet some of these small farming families - the great characters - who are going back to the future," he said.

"These farmers and fishers are turning back the clock in a new take on an old way of working together."

Fightback Farmers: Feeding Australia Together will premiere on ABC at 9pm on June 15 and will be available on ABC iView.

THE juxtaposition of Heaven and Hell, along with the events of 2020, were depicted on stage last weekend as Saint Martins Lutheran College drama students performed at Wehl Street Theatre.

KONA DRIVES CHANGE

HYUNDAI Kona Electric is a fully electric vehicle from the Korean company that's very serious about making the world a better place.

It has received a facelifted exterior and specification upgrades.

Most importantly it now has a WLTP measured driving range of 484 kilometres, it was previously 449km.

STYLING

The Kona's front is neatly shaped as part of its aerodynamics, there's a small hatch in its left side which opens to accept the charging cable.

The lower section of the front has what looks like a radiator grille, but it's an inlet for cool air to keep the battery at its correct temperature.

The headlights stretch part way around the side of the car to increase its apparent width.

Vertical air inlets in front of the wheel arch claddings enhance its aerodynamics by keeping the air away from disturbance created by the wheels and sending it cleanly along the side of the body.

There's a new design of LED Daytime Running Lights at the front. The rear has a new bumper design and horizontally-stretched rear lamps. There are machined face 17-inch alloy wheels.

INTERIOR

Now standard across the Kona Electric range is a wireless charging pad which allows compatible Qi-standard devices to be charged in a recess in the front-centre console.

INFOTAINMENT

A large 10.5-inch horizontally mounted screen is simple to use and not only gives access to entertainment, but also detailed information on the state of charge in the battery

The Harman Kardon premium audio system has eight speakers (including a front centre speaker and a woofer) and an external amplifier. It gives excellent sound quality through optimised system tuning.

POWERTRAIN

Kona EV has a Lithium-ion Polymer 356-volt battery with 64 kWh.

The electric motor is under the front bonnet and drives the front wheels through a 7.89 reduction gear. Peak power is 150 kW while torque is a hefty 395 Nm from one rpm.

Charging time using an onboard DC 100kW charger 10 to 80pc is about 47 minutes and about 64 minutes with a 55kW charger.

A home charging station using onboard AC 7.2kW charger to get from 10pc to 100pc in about nine and a half hours.

If you really get stuck and have to charge it from a regular 240 volt three-point electric plug. It will take about 28 hours for a full charge.

Slow, but better than being stranded without power.

SAFETY

There's a very strong emphasis on primary and secondary safety in the 2021 Hyundai Kona Electric.

It incorporates upgrades to the standard SmartSense safety suite.

Supplementing the Lane Keeping Assist system, Lane Following Assist cameras detects lane markers and the vehicle in front of you.

It provides steering assistance to ensure the vehicle stays in the centre of the lane.

At speeds of 20 km/h or above, Blind-Spot Collision-Avoidance Assist detects vehicles next to yours and diagonally behind.

If a vehicle is present in the blind spot, a vi-

sual alert is displayed in the exterior mirrors.

If the driver activates an indicator, a flashing visual warning is provided and an audible alert is sounded.

Given that most drivers turn the steering wheel before they start to indicate this BCA could be a crash saver.

At speeds of 60km/h or above, if the driver proceeds to carry-out a lane change after the audible alert is sounded, BCA will apply partial braking to the wheels on the opposing side of the potential collision point.

This hopefully brings the vehicle away from danger. BCA can also help prevent collisions when exiting a parallel parking spot at 3km/h or lower.

If a potential collision with an approaching vehicle is detected, the system will apply braking force to help avoid a collision.

Rear Cross-Traffic Collision-Avoidance Assist monitors for traffic approaching on either side of the Kona when reversing out of perpendicular parking spaces at speeds of up to 8km/h.

Should RCCA detect a vehicle approaching, an audible warning will sound, with a visual warning displayed on the dash cluster.

If the driver does not adhere to the warning, RCCA will apply a braking force and help avoid a collision.

The Safe Exit Warning helps occupants utilise the radar sensors on either side of the rear bumper to detect vehicles approaching from the rear.

If a vehicle is detected and a door is opened, the system will sound an audible alert and display a visual warning in the instrument cluster. Rear Occupant Alert detects the entry of occupants via the rear doors opening and closing.

Upon parking and opening the driver's door, the system gives an audible chime and gives a visual warning message to "check rear seats", to ensure that rear occupants are not accidentally left behind.

DRIVING

As always, the first thing we enjoy about any electric vehicle is the instant response the moment we move the accelerator.

There's peak torque on hand from just one rpm and the 395Nm of grunt is there virtually all the time. You can adjust the amount of battery regeneration using paddles behind the steering wheel.

We chose maximum regeneration but initially found ourselves slowing too much or too little as we juggled the accelerator.

After a few days driving we had pretty well perfected this and were pleased that we were not only saving electricity and increasing the driving range, but also minimising brake pad wear.

First time owners may choose to start on less regeneration then gradually work up to their chosen level. We know that those going electric are conscious of helping to minimise climate change so are very likely to choose maximum regeneration. Well done guys and gals...

There's more road noise than we like but that's possibly due to there being virtually no sound from the powertrain.

Noise was at its loudest on concrete motorway surfaces and on some recently resurfaced coarse-chip country roads.

We were impressed by the distance to empty readings corresponding almost exactly with the distance travelled.

So, there will hopefully be no occasions when you're getting short of battery range and still have a fair way to go to the next charging station.

Handling isn't set up for sporty driving but the Kona EV responds well to steering input and there's only a little understeer when pushed hard at bends on our favourite road test route.

SUMMING UP

Hyundai Kona Highlander Electric is a solid

move towards the time when only electric vehicles can be sold new. Okay, that's many years away, particularly in Australia where politicians are very keen to please the oil industry moguls.

SALE SPIKE

THE demand for new vehicles for business and private use remains strong with a 2021 record number of 100,809 new vehicle sales being recorded in May.

The result this month surpasses the March result of 100,005 and has the industry on track to return to sales of more than one million new vehicles for the year.

It shows an increase of 68.3pc on the corresponding month last year which was significantly impacted through COVID-19 lockdowns across the country.

However, the 2021 result is an 8.9pc increase on the May 2019 result of 92,561 vehicles.

The Federal Chamber of Automotive Industries chief executive Tony Weber said the result once again showed confidence in the national economy and pent-up demand across all sectors were strong enough to counter issues related to COVID-19 uncertainties and supply chain issues.

"While we cannot be certain about the future economic impacts of the COVID-19 situation, businesses and households are showing

their confidence by purchasing new vehicles," Mr Weber said.

"I expect this situation will continue to improve in the second half of this calendar year as confidence continues to grow, coupled with incentives such as the extension of the depreciation allowance for business which was announced in the Federal Budget during the month."

Mr Weber said the rental segment continued to grow with the year to date result up 69.4pc, while private sales were up 50.3pc year to date.

"The result also highlights the outstanding efforts by all parties in the supply chain in continuing to meet the demands of their customers in the face of ongoing challenges such as the shortage of microprocessors and shipping delays," Mr Weber said.

Toyota was the market leader in May 2021 recording sales of 21,156.

It was followed by Mazda (10,554), Kia (7124), Ford (6493) and Mitsubishi (6478).

The Toyota Hi-Lux was the highest selling vehicle (4402) followed by the Ford Ranger (4254), Toyota RAV4 (4014), Toyota Landcruiser (3399) and the Isuzu Ute D-Max (3058).

CROWN NEVER THE KING

THE Toyota Crown always offered good value for money but never sold in large quantities, unlike smaller Toyota vehicles, compared with comparable Holdens and Fords of its time.

Perhaps its rather bland and conservative looks contributed to this situation for on driving aspects alone it was at least equal to and often better than the competition.

The car certainly should have appealed to buyers looking for excellent finish, high comfort levels and solid basic engineering providing they were prepared to accept its tasteful and neat styling.

The 1975 Crown was powered by a 2.0-litre SOHC six-cylinder engine which ran smoothly and was an excellent piece of automotive engineering.

Whilst the car had only minimal insulation it never suffered from mechanical or road noise

- always a sign of good design and build quality.

Good acceleration meant you could reach 100km/h in 14.4 seconds but it still gave excellent economy.

An average of around 10.5 litres per 100km was achievable when driven conservatively.

Many of the Crown's mechanicals were straight out of the superseded model but as Toyota engineers have usually followed a thorough development program, buyers could be sure that everything worked well.

The Crown featured a fairly conventional front suspension system comprising coil springs and wishbones with an anti-roll bar.

At the rear, like the Holden of that time, it had a live axle, with coil springs and trailing links.

Where the Crown did shine was in the interior.

Apart from the dashboard, which had an overdone plastic look unlike the conservative exterior, the rest of the interior said luxury.

Good comfortable seats, an efficient heater

with a quiet fan, all the usual and essential instruments and radio made for pleasant motoring.

Storage wasn't overlooked either, with a centre console bin and a combination arm-rest/glove compartment.

The Crown was a quality motor car, which satisfied most owners' needs for comfortable and reliable motoring.

First introduced in Japan in the mid-1950s nearly two million of the marque were made up until this model was introduced so most bugs were ironed out in earlier development programs.

Later models continued this trend and there can be little doubt that in any comparison with similar cars the Crown won hands down when it came to equipment.

It had lots of clever little bits and pieces which the Japanese saw as not only standard but essential.

In short, the Crown offered remarkable value for money and had a feeling of everlasting solidarity.

WINTER is certainly the busiest season for the rose industry, and our rose farm is not an exception.

After months feeding and looking after the new rose plants, now is time to dig them up and post them to our customers around Australia.

With the cold season, the roses stop flowering and start their dormant phase; this is the ideal condition to pull them out and sell them as bare root plants without creating any trauma to their roots.

Many big chain stores had bare-root roses on their shelves already in April, but here at Wagner's we strongly believe that we need to respect the natural stages of a rose life and let the plants grow a strong root system in the ground for as long as possible.

Digging the plants out, pruning, grading them and selecting the best ones only - this a job I personally do, carefully choosing the plants with a good and strong roots system - bundling, boxing and finally posting them.

So many steps and so much work involved!

Standard rose plants (60cm, 90cm and 120cm high) are always the last plants to be pulled out, as they need an extremely strong root system to support the weight of the plant growing on their top, and that's why we deliver standard rose plants around beginning of August only.

While we organise the roses for our retail and wholesale customers, we also prepare the soil for next year production, laying plastic in the new growing areas, and planting the root-stock that we previously de-eyed.

This year will be another busy and successful one for our industry, with gardening becoming a very popular activity for many.

In such a challenging and unpredictable period, spending more time outside and looking after our living space is certainly the best thing to do for ourselves and the people we love.

For over 60 years, we've been growing more than 800 varieties of roses.

We have one of the biggest selection of roses in Australia, but we are also selling them out very quickly, and every day we update our stock and have to delete some varieties from our website.

There are some popular ones though that we decided to over bud last spring and that are still in stock.

Iceberg is one of these varieties: one of the most popular floribunda roses in Australia, and for very good reasons.

Iceberg roses are extremely reliable in all climate, they continuously produce an abundance of white rosette flowers throughout spring, summer and autumn.

They are not fussy with soil type and can handle a bit of shade, they are disease resistant and as established plants can tolerate reduced watering.

Bees and beneficial insects are attracted to their rapid and continuous flowering.

Iceberg roses are available in four colours: white, blushing pink, brilliant pink and burgundy, so you are able to get the benefit of a hardy and reliable rose in the colour suitable for your landscape.

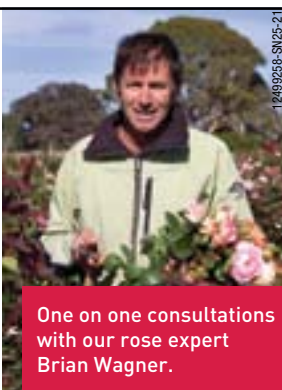

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Wild, but excellent catches

FISHING

WIND and rain belted the Limestone Coast over the last week or so and made the offshore fishing difficult.

A few of the bigger boats made the journey out and found some excellent fish, as did the anglers up the river or off the beach.

Wilbur and Carn from Southerly Fishing Charters put their clients onto a mix of fish, boating some nice shark, pink ling, tuna and other species.

There are plenty of signs of big tuna out there at the moment.

The birdlife, the baitfish, whales, dolphins and seals are all in big numbers - the only thing missing is the big tuna.

They are still catching some big fish down off the Great Ocean Road at the moment, so we just need to sit tight until they turn and head back our way.

Green and Danger points have both continued to produce nice shark for the boaties in around the shallow reef areas.

School and gummy sharks are both on the chew in that 5-10 metre area.

Just look for a broken, reefy bottom with a big rise or fall and you should be right in the area.

There has been a bit of bait in the same sort of areas too, so a fresh salmon, mackerel or even a garfish is an excellent thing to catch.

Surf fishos have found some nice salmon this week.

I have heard of fish to 3kg up at the Beachport salmon hole late in the afternoons, but those nice lumpys of around 1-1.5kg are generally there most of the time.

The fish in Redrock and Lighthouse bays are not quite as big as those 3kg specimens, but fish to 2kg are caught quite often and the numbers are usually pretty good.

Lures and baits are both claiming their fair share of fish, so which ever you prefer to use should see you heading home with a feed.

Gar numbers seem to be slowly improving this week, with more of our usual hot spots productive, such as Livingstons Bay and Cape Douglas.

There have been some nice catches reported from the Petrified Forest at Port MacDonnell and Racecourse Bay.

I have heard a few people start talking to my ruff this last week.

The size is pretty good so far and it sounds like the numbers are also on the improve.

There have been plenty of fishing trips that have been cancelled all of a sudden and we are seeing plenty of those trips moved up to the Murray River.

There is some amazing fishing to be had up that way and some beautiful spots to see.

Wayne Bromley and Sue Ayers had their Victorian trout trip cancelled by the latest Victorian outbreak but changed their plans and headed north to the river.

They trolled a handful of different lures such as stumpjumpers and oar-gees for several nice callop, some over 2kg.

If you do not have a boat, the bank fishing is just as hot. Grab yourselves some live shrimp or a bunch of worms and you are set.

The Glenelg River has finally started to kick back into gear and there were some nice fish caught.

Anglers from the South East who have their ET number have fished in the upper sections of river this week and found some cracking estuary perch.

One crew had a session late last week and boated upwards of 50 estuary perch to 45cm, 20 bream to 38cm and a mulloway at 80cm.

They said the higher they went, the better the fishing was.

Ben Jeffrey and Craig Turner hung a bit lower and fished the Dry Creek to Donovans section with cranka crabs and found some crackers, boating around a dozen fish to 42cm.

I have not heard much news from down low in the river, but I would not be surprised

if the mulloway have started to turn up in the estuary.

This time last year there were fish in the high 30-pound range caught by trollers, so hopefully they are here again this year.

As I pen this report, the forecast for the upcoming long weekend looks absolutely fabulous. The wind and swell are both shaping up to be the best we have seen in quite a while.

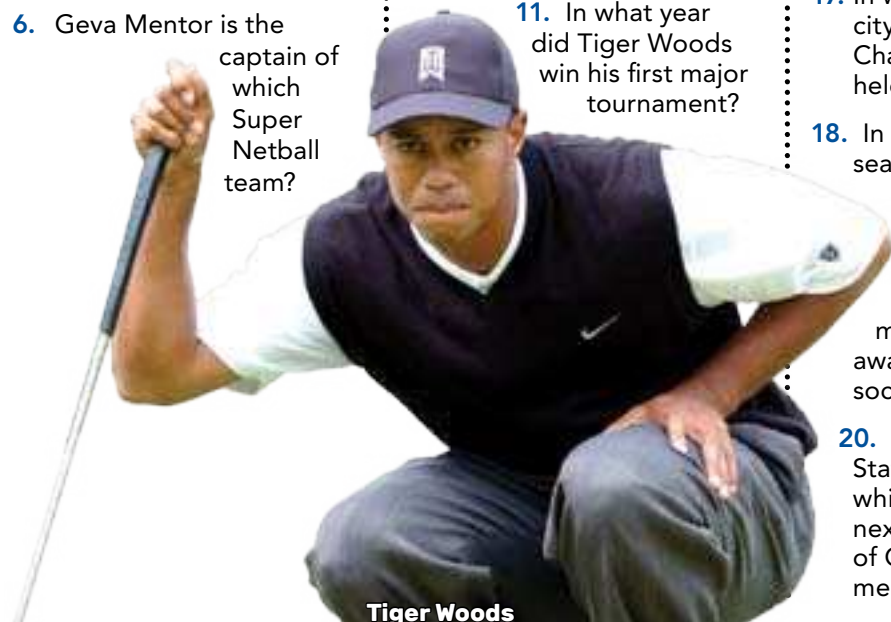

THE win of Millie Bay in the 400-metre Progreyhoundtips.com Maiden Stake probably passed pretty well unnoticed at Tara Raceway's meeting last Sunday afternoon.

Having her fifth start for Portland plasterer-come greyhound owner-trainer Andy Graham, Millie Bay led all the way to defeat Limousine by 2½ lengths in a time of 23.82 seconds - a couple of lengths outside the standard winning time for the track, distance and grade.

Also bred by her owner-trainer, she is by Sulzanti, a quick dog that raced on only 12 occasions for seven wins, out of Cee Anna Rose who won six races - including two at The Meadows - and ran nine placings from 18 starts for Graham in 2011.

The Sulzanti litter - whelped in January 2019 - was her last after previous matings had produced winners to Collision, Cosmic Chief and Magic Sprite (the sire of Sulzanti).

But as far as Millie Bay is concerned, there is a bit more to the story.

As Graham tells it, back in February 2020 she was still being reared in a long run with a couple of other similarly-aged and also unnamed youngsters prior to being broken-in.

"I remember thinking at the time that the fawn female had put on a bit of weight but didn't think much of it," he said.

"Anyway, not long after I had to take her to the vet on an unrelated matter.

"And it turned out she was in pup, the sire being one of her mates in the same yard - a brindle dog by Zinzan Brooke out of Angle Park distance winner Tahlo.

"I have to say Greyhound Racing Victoria was very good about the whole mix-up.

"So I named the sire Bad Boy Tex (still unraced) and the dam Millie Bay and registered a litter of three dogs and three bitches after the subsequent whelping in March 2020."

It is probably fair to say there is even more uncertainty than usual surrounding this litter as it now approaches breaking-in age.

But forever the optimist, Andy Graham continues to remain unfazed as he quite rightly points out: "You never know where a good one's coming from."

The Portland-based Halliday was successful again in 2008 with Ella Rule (Elite State x Nayleen Bale).

The finals of the Anniversary Cup and the Reid Memorial will be run on Sunday, July 18 to correspond as close as possible to the South East Greyhound Racing Club's opening meeting at Glenburnie on Saturday, July 21, 1979.

Also run on this day will be the Eric Lewis Memorial, a one-off Open event over 600 metres which was first run in 2014 and won by the Robert Britton trained Zipping Basil (Mantra Lad x Cho Chang).

Then on July 25, heats of the Foodbank Feature Grade 5 (512m) will be run.

This event is an initiative of the Tara Tipsters, a group of 14 Tara Raceway regulars who contribute each week for a six-month period to a designated charity.

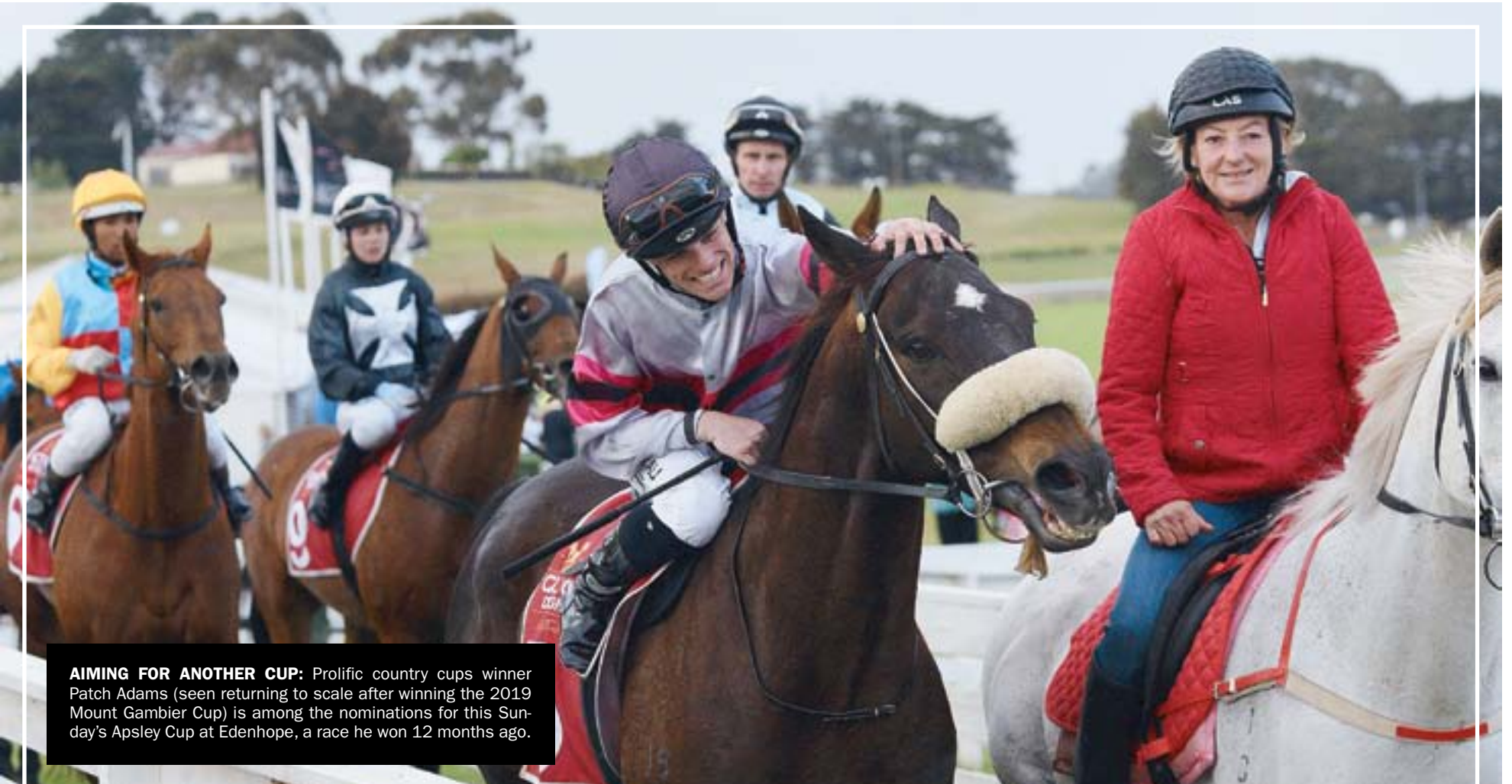
rights in relation to the number of winners selected on the day.

Kah in the fast lane

NO jockey has ever ridden 100 winners in one season in metropolitan Melbourne.

Brett Prebble went as close as one can get many years ago with 99.5 winners.

Furthermore, no female jockey has ever won the Melbourne jockey's title and, to the best of my knowledge, no South Australian jockey has ever won the Melbourne jockey's premiership.

Mount Pleasant (SA) raised Jamie Kah is poised to achieve possibly all of the above in the next seven weeks.

After riding her first winner at Clare on Easter Saturday back in 2012, Kah won three Adelaide jockey premierships before moving to Melbourne a couple of years ago to test the water at the highest level.

Following an early double at Flemington last Saturday, Kah has moved into the "nervous nineties" and sits on 91 Melbourne winners going into this weekend.

Kah is a certainty to win the title as her nearest opponent is Damien Lane (57 winners) and the only query is whether she can crack the century of winners before the season ends on July 31.

The first time Kah attracted my attention was here at Glenburnie back in 2012 when she rode the Ned Walker trained Lionhearted Girl in a 0-68 event over 1400 metres.

At the time, Lionhearted Girl (who went on to win races in Adelaide with Kah in the saddle) was no world beater, but that day the mare won by an ever increasing 10 lengths after Kah cuddled her in the lead before releasing the brakes at the top of the straight.

I was left wondering if Lionhearted Girl had improved that much or whether it was Kah's poise, control and riding style on the mare that resulted in the huge winning margin.

I am sure all South Australian racing fans will be keeping a close eye in the coming weeks on Kah and urging her to crack the magical century of winners.

GOING DOWN TO THE WIRE

THERE are only two race meetings left

in the Limestone Coast to complete the 2020-21 season.

Mount Gambier was originally programmed to race this Sunday but that was scrapped as early as last year when it was clear the track needed more time.

With the Apsley cup meeting at Edenhope on the same day, the Mount Gambier meeting was not rescheduled to another Limestone Coast club and it was given to Murray Bridge.

That means the only meeting for June is at Naracoorte on Sunday, June 27 followed by the final meeting at Bordertown on Wednesday, July 7.

There is a battle royale going on for the trainer's premiership, with only a cigarette paper separating the Sue and Jason Jaensch stable and arch rival Sue Murphy.

The Jaensch stable have racked up 16 wins, 14 seconds and 17 thirds to lead Murphy (16, 14, 14), with a gap to Darryl Dodson (11, 4, 7) followed by the Mount Gambier trio of Michael O'Leary (10, 7, 6), Lee Creek (9, 9, 4) and Jamie Opperman (9, 7, 7).

It is a totally different ball game for the jockey and apprentice's title where Jacob Opperman leads the rest by the length of the airport straight.

The teenager can start preparing his speeches now for the presentation day to be held this year out at Glenburnie on Sunday, August 15.

With 22 winners, 21 seconds and 22 thirds, Opperman has an unbeatable lead over senior riders Dominic Tourneur (13, 13, 13), Sairyn Fawke (13, 4, 5), Caitlin Jones (12, 12, 6) and fellow apprentice Ben Price (12, 4, 3).

NO CROWD FOR APSLEY CUP

THE Apsley Racing Club, which only conducts one meeting a year (at Edenhope), simply cannot take a trick in recent years.

Back in 2017, the meeting was moved to Hamilton at the last minute when the Edenhope track was deemed unfit to race on.

Then, last year, the annual meeting was held at Casterton with the gates locked to the general public due to COVID-19.

It was all systems go with a big crowd expected at Edenhope for the Apsley cup meeting this Sunday (June 13) until the recent COVID outbreak in Victoria.

"We were advised by Racing Victoria that a decision on whether the public would be allowed this Sunday would not be made until Thursday (yesterday)," Apsley racing club president Roger Pfizner told The Border Watch.

"That news was no good to us because, if the crowd ban was lifted, it would have given us only a few days to prepare everything for the general public and members, including erecting all the marquees.

"So we had to make an early decision and, like Swan Hill, have decided to proceed without any crowd in attendance here on Sunday at Edenhope."

For the Swan Hill club, it is the second year straight its three-day cup carnival (which is huge for the town) will be run without any crowds.

It is again a bitter blow for the Murray River club as all accommodation in the town was booked out for the three days and tickets for cup day on Sunday sold out some time ago.

When nominations closed for the Apsley race meeting on Tuesday, there was (as usual) plenty of support from Limestone Coast stables.

The Belinda O'Loughlin trained Muntham Missile, who will be gunning for her third cup success this season, clearly looks the best of the locals in the \$45,000 Apsley Cup over 2000 metres, while prolific cups winner Patch Adams is among the nominations for the race he won 12 months ago.

Michael O'Leary, last seen sunning himself at the Adelaide River cup meeting (south of Darwin) last Saturday, may provide the winner of the 2000 metre 0-58 handicap with Emil.

The gelding caught the eye with a fast finishing third in similar company at Casterton before being out of his depth when unplaced in the recent Millicent Cup.

FUTURE BRIGHT FOR MILLICENT RACECOURSE

THERE is every possibility that the Millicent racecourse, closed for official racing since the late 1960's, may be getting a new lease of life.

These days it is a much needed training track, especially at this time of the year and the track and its facilities were inspected last week by Racing SA officials.

According to Millicent Racing Club president John Payne, the inspection ticked all the boxes and the facility will most likely be utilised even further in future.

Bayley had not competed for a while and used the round to settle back into rhythm, beginning the process of pushing his level of accuracy back closer to where he would like it.

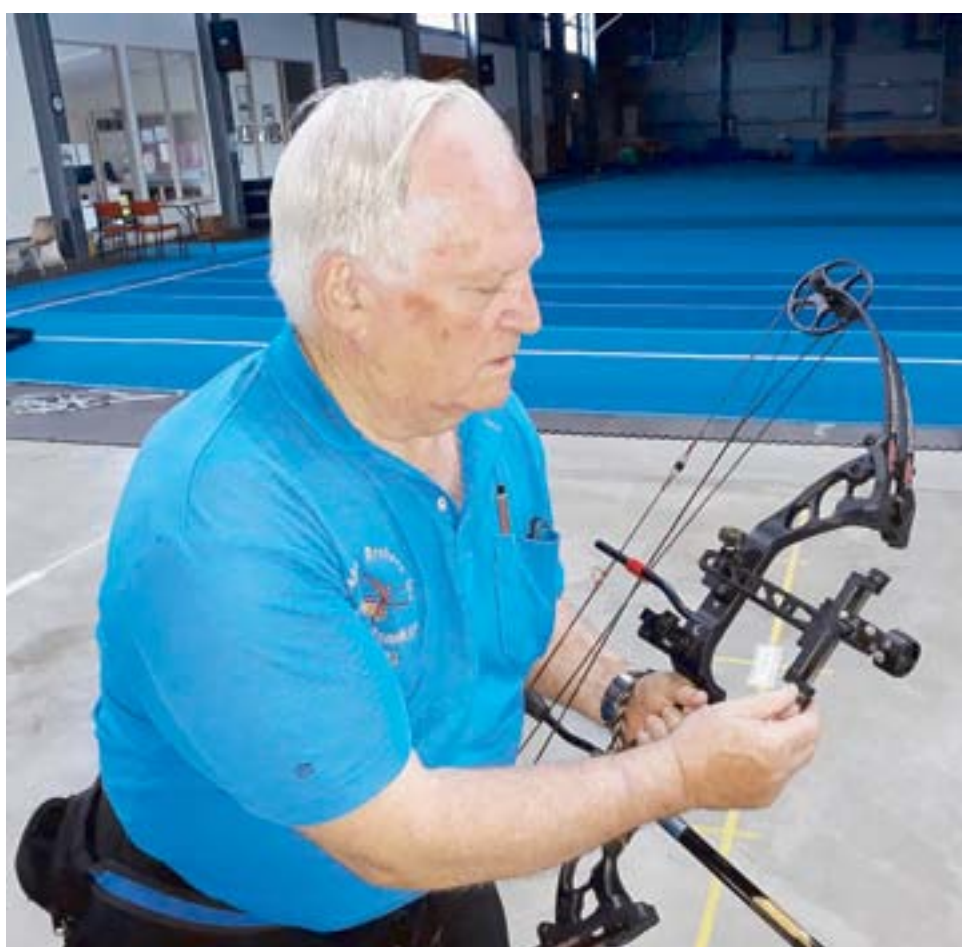
Ben Kilsby and Graham Lock were his companions on the indoor range.

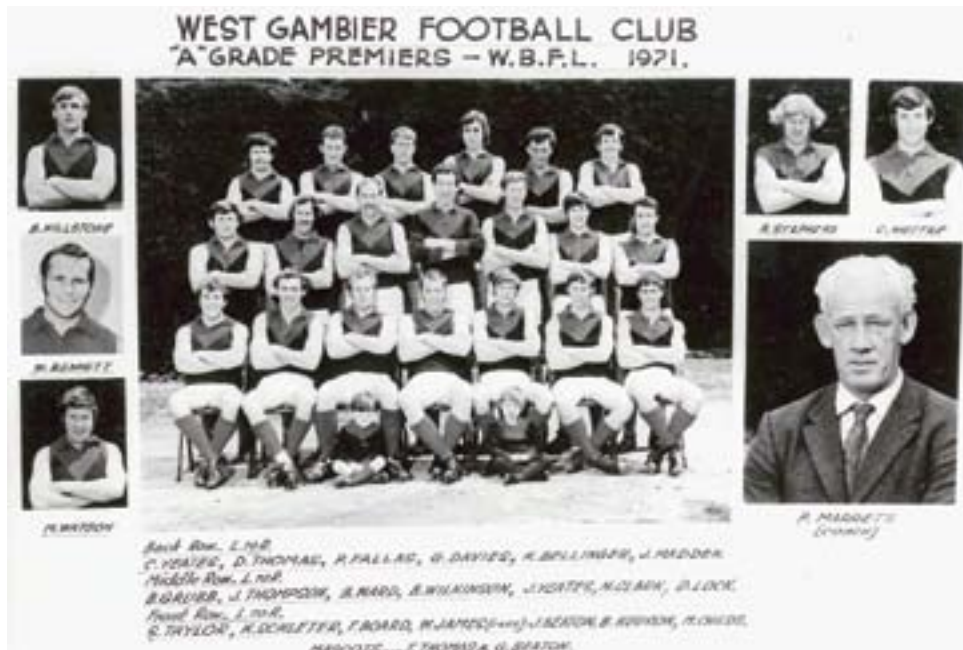

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Sport grants help youngsters excel

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IT has been a long wait for the Australian Junior National Track Championships for Limestone Coast cyclist Neil van Niekerk.

Van Niekerk had hoped to attend last year, but the COVID-19 pandemic put an end to those hopes.

This year he is set to head up to Brisbane, Queensland to take on the nation's best from July 1-4, with a grant through the Federal Government to help him reach his goals.

The grant came through the Federal Government's Local Sporting Champions program, presented this week by Federal Member for Barker, Tony Pasin.

The grant provides some funds to help offset to cost of young athletes chasing their dreams.

For the 14-year-old van Niekerk - one of eight athletes to receive the grant from the region - it will help with the cost of flights and accommodation as he looks to make his mark in his chosen sport.

Van Niekerk said he considers himself more of a sprinter than an endurance rider and enjoys the explosive nature and variety of track riding.

"My favourite event is the individual pursuit, but we do a bit of everything," he said.

The only issue faced by the young cyclist as he prepares for the nationals has been an illness which left him out of action for a short period.

However, he is still motivated to return to the training track, with the Blue Lake Sports Park velodrome the ideal location to hone his skills.

"I can usually go out to the track whenever I want, unless it is too wet," van Niekerk said.

"I can also train on the road to keep fit."

Van Niekerk started riding at seven years of age, but only began competitively about three years ago.

While only a short time, he has big plans already.

"I am hoping to get into SASI (South Australian Sports Institute) for track and road, and possibly the state development squad," he said.

Last year's disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic saw cyclists from around the country recording times online, with a big focus on training.

Van Niekerk said it did not bother him too much.

"Most of the events were cancelled, so most of it was just training and not doing any events," he said.

"I was able to focus on training and not worry about the races which was pretty good."

Mr Pasin met with four of the students this week in Mount Gambier to present them with certificates and congratulate them on their achievements.

Administered by the Australian Sports Commission, the Federal Government program recognises the sporting achievements of young people who have represented their team at a state or national sporting competition throughout Australia.

The initiative awards successful individual applicants a minimum of \$500 to assist with

the cost of travel, accommodation, uniforms or equipment.

The program is available to young people, between the ages of 12 and 18, travelling more than 250 kilometres return to compete.

"The program is a rolling application process and I encourage all sporting groups and individuals that meet the eligibility criteria to apply," Mr Pasin said.
